
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President's Message

As President of The Academy, I welcome you. I am honored to be a part of the team that will usher The Academy of Country Music and its membership into the new millennium.




Warm greetings to all those gathered in Universal City, California, for the 35th annual presentation of the Academy of Country Music Awards.

went to his favorite music store in Danbury, Connecticut, where he was oddly drawn to

one particular guitar. A Taylor made with koa wood, a rare Hawaiian wood used only on a small number of Taylors.

That night Cliff called an old music buddy of thirty years who lives all the way across the country in Albuquerque. They hadn't spoken in more than six months. "You'll never believe this, but I bought another guitar today."

To which his friend responded, "You're kidding, so did I, a Taylor koa."

"I bought a Taylor koa too."

It turns out, that at the same moment Cliff Seltzer walked out of a music store in Connecticut, his friend had left a music store in New Mexico — both carrying the same rare guitar.

"You can explain away crop circles, but not this," Cliff says. "It's pure unexplained phenomena, no doubt about it."




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Dolly Parton

Dolly Parton is one of the best known superstars in country music. The East Tennessee country girl has never let go of her roots, nor has she ever let go of her dreams. She chose to have a multilevel career as a songwriter, singer, recording artist, businesswoman, actress and performer, and her no-holdsbarred personality has allowed her to move easily from circle to circle.

Parton will tell you that her first love is songwriting. Had she only written "I Will Always Love You," the songwriter side of Parton would have been forever remembered. It is her most recorded song, having been recorded and revived by not only the songstress herself twice, but also by Whitney Houston in the movie *The Bodyguard* and again by Parton and Vince Gill a few years later.

As a performer, Parton has the ability to captivate a crowd. There is almost an immediate rapport when Parton walks on stage, as she combines just a little bit of sass with a whole lot of talent and personality.

Parton's recording career is marked by many highlights, ranging from the poignant "Me and Little Andy" to "Coat of Many Colors," "Jolene," "Here You Come Again," "Islands In The Stream" and "9 to 5." Most of her songs come from her own pen and deal with her life experiences. The others are so well chosen that it seems she should have written them. Her voice is different and special, and those who are familiar with her recordings know that special quality she has of making each and every song she sings exclusively hers.

As an actress, who can forget her role as Miss Mona in *Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*? Or the plotting secretary in *Nine To Five*? Or her contributions in *Steel Magnolias*?

Never apply the "dumb blonde" generalization to Parton. In the first place, Parton will quickly point out that she isn't really

blonde! In the second place, no one can argue with her success as a businesswoman and philanthropist. Her success with the East Tennessee theme park Dollywood is more than anyone would have guessed, and her dream of providing jobs to folks from her hometown area is being accomplished every day. She has had her own television show and several specials and had her own production company to pursue doing her own specials and movies.

She has established the Dolly Parton Wellness and Rehabilitation Center of Fort Sanders Sevier Medical Center, the Dollywood Foundation to support education and improve the quality of life for all children in Sevier County, and Imagination Library, which provides books for children.

Parton has six gold albums, three platinum albums, and 22 number-one singles. Her awards include the Academy's Entertainer of the Year in 1977 and Female Vocalist in 1977. In true Parton fashion, she says her most treasured honor is a bronze sculpture of herself that the citizens of her hometown, Sevierville, Tenn., erected on the courthouse lawn.

As for her particular style, Parton says, "I don't know if my style has description, except that it's just me. It's my soul and my feelings, in high pitch! I think what soul I have in my voice, the feeling that's there, is strictly from my church-singing days. I get a feeling from singing gospel songs that I never get from singing anything else. That same soul and feeling and sincerity cross over into anything I sing, but I think the expression and all that

sort of thing definitely comes from those early singing experiences."

Recently she turned back to her roots, recording an album of acoustic music, Something Special. After that, she really explored songwriting with Hungry Again and has just recently released The Grass Is Blue, a Dolly Parton bluegrass collection featuring some of that genre's finest musicians and performers.

"I've been guilty of trying to do things that are commercial, but it just doesn't work if I do things that aren't from my heart," Parton told Tommy Goldsmith in an interview for Bluegrass Unlimited magazine. "My true soul is music; that's the thing that brought me out of the Smoky Mountains. None of the other matters to me as much as my true gift."





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

ith the release of their 22nd career album, Alabama pushed the envelope, joining 'N SYNC in a vocal collaboration on that group's hit "God Must Have Spent a Little More Time on You."

Alabama, which received the ACM's Artist of the Decade award for the 1980s, has now been on the charts longer than any other contemporary country group. Alabama is also the most awarded act in the history of the American Music Awards.

Commenting on "God Must Have Spent a Little More Time on You," Alabama said, "Working with 'N SYNC on this record was a real pleasure. They are true professionals, and it's easy to understand why they have achieved such success."

Country radio immediately recognized the song as a hit. After a pirated copy of the song made its way onto the airways, RCA Records was forced to release the single five weeks before schedule. The single created demand for the album, which was also released ahead of schedule.

All of this resulted in a nomination for Top Vocal Event of the Year from the ACM. "We're honored to be nominated by the ACM this year with 'N SYNC for 'God Must Have Spent a Little More Time on You,' " Alabama said, adding, "Thank you, country radio, for all the airplay."

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
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
recent trip to Australia found Gary Allan hoping to hear the cry "Surf's up!" Seems the Californiaborn singer is a surfer who grew up dividing his time between the beach and neighborhood honkytonks, where he played music with his dad and brother.

When he was 15 he turned down a recording deal with A&M Records, then in 1995 went to Nashville to do a demo. Decca Records representatives flew to California to see him play in a local club. The label offered him a recording contract, only to fold a couple of years later. Parent company MCA took him in and his success continues.

Among his most recent accomplishments is "Smoke Rings in the Dark," a song Country Weekly magazine says is a perfect understated performance. Allan heard the demo tape the day after the song was written and said he instantly loved it. Three weeks later it was decided that the song would be the debut single from the album, and the rest, as they say, is history. Allan maintains that "Smoke Rings" is the closest he's come to putting out a sound that's really him, something with a Roy Orbison-type vibe.

In a first, Allan played the role of rockabilly star Eddie Cochran for a CBS miniseries last fall. Despite the fact that he had never had an acting role, he pulled the part off just fine.

essica Andrews says that as far back as she can remember, the one constant in her life has been music. Now granted, that's only remembering back about 15 years, but to make a decision about a career at that young age is decidedly mature.


"I am so excited about being nominated for Top New Female Vocalist at the ACMs this year!" Andrews said. "I used to sit in my living room and watch the award shows, eating popcorn and hoping the artists I picked would win.


While it might seem that in three decades everything that could have been written about Benson has been written, that is not so.

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

lint Black says that for years he has wanted his wife, Lisa Hartman Black, to duet with him on one of his albums, but he knew he had to find just the right song to persuade her to do it.

The singer/songwriter knew he had that song after he wrote "When I Said I Do," but he still had a lot of convincing to do to get Lisa to agree to record the song with him. In fact, she talked herself out of it so many times that the actual recording took place just four days before Black's deadline to turn in the recording project!

It's no wonder, then, that being nominated in this category is special for the singer. "Being nominated is always a proud moment. It is most special sharing it with my wife. The best part is being able to perform on the show with her."

Lisa was equally thrilled. "I'm extremely flattered and very very excited about being part of the show," she said.

When asked what he might write in a story about himself that has not already been written, Clint laughed and quipped, "I wouldn't tell you anything you don't already know, because I'm saving it for Barbara Walters." After just a second's pause, Black continued: "Seriously though, I can't think of anything . . . Okay, I cry at the movies . . . when the cars blow up!" His wife, on the other hand, was much more candid. "I find bugs fascinating," she replied.

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
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eing nominated is the biggest thing; that means that your peers place you in the top three for the new male artist category," said Chad Brock about his two ACM nominations. "Because it's done by your peers, that's an honor to me. Even if I don't win, that's huge to me."

Brock is nominated with singing partners Hank Williams, Jr. and George Jones for Top Vocal Event. Williams, it turns out, is one of Brock's biggest fans.

"I am especially proud to be nominated with my old friend George Jones, but also with Chad Brock, whom I have yet to meet in person," said Williams. "I think Chad is the up-and-coming star for the new millennium. I'd be thrilled to win an award shared by my friends for the song that launched my career, 'A Country Boy Can Survive."

Brock moved to Nashville in 1992 but found himself on the road, playing bars and honky-tonks all over the United States. That experience sharpened his skills and gave him the confidence to play for his fans.

When asked what people might not know about him, Brock answered "I'm a big fan of little kids and old people. I just love them both. I could sit and play with kids all day or talk to an older person because you can learn from them."

A three-time winner of the Academy's Entertainer of the Year award, Williams continues to sing for the folks who know about surviving in America's heartland. And while his concerts may evoke a party atmosphere, and his friends may still love to get down, Williams admitted, "I'm not as rowdy as people think I am, but I used to be."


Kix Brooks says that one of the things he likes about writing with Bob DiPiero is that they don't get hung up on writing to be commercial, but write stuff they will have fun playing.

Whatever the method, the two come up with some cool songs that fans seem to really like. And it doesn't hurt that they continue to win awards.

"The ACMs have been such an important part of our career," Brooks said. "The first year, when we won new artist and duet [awards], was a huge springboard for the next 10 years. Winning Entertainer [of the Year] twice and the run of duet awards have also done a lot to keep us rocking and to give us that extra boost along the way. Besides that, it's just a ton of fun."

Dunn added, "No one has benefitted more than we have from the 10 years of support that the ACM's has given me and Kix. It always continues to amaze and humble us."

When asked what folks might not know about them, Brooks replied "With all the outside hobbies and activities we have — like race cars, Sea-Doos, hot-air balloons, horses, etc. — what I enjoy the most is hanging out with my kids." Adds Dunn, "With the rowdy and outgoing image of Brooks & Dunn, no one probably really would believe how introverted and painfully shy I am."



Dixie Chicks eing the first country group to play Lilith Fair is a big honor and one not taken lightly by the three women who comprise the Dixie Chicks. Even the hectic schedule was not a deterrent when Emily, Natalie and Martie were invited to join the tour.

The three Texans are not often deterred, whether they are standing up to the record label for suggesting they not include a song on their album (as happened with "Sin Wagon" on the latest album) or making tough decisions about their own personal lives.

Their bluegrass-tempered sounds meld well with gospel overtones and Celtic influences. The Chicks chalk up some pretty interesting sales figures. At last count, it was six million and still going strong in sales for *Wide Open Spaces* (the most sales ever on an album by a country group), and cash registers are clicking away consistently as copies of *Fly* wing their way out the doors of record shops.

The group's approach to music is to record something they like and they figure that others will like too. Whether it's the song "Goodbye Earl" or "Cowboy Take Me Away," with the album Fly the Dixie Chicks take another step forward in their quest for independence and individuality in their music.


"When Patty Loveless sings with me, it feels like blood, like she's a real sister," Gill said. "And this song isn't just somebody coming in and singing harmony and saying it's a duet. It was conceived as a duet and written melodically as a duet. It's very reminiscent of a Conway/ Loretta record."

Loveless is equally excited about her opportunity to sing with Gill. "Anytime I get to sing with Vince, it's like winning an award. This song reminds me of all those classic country duets—like Conway and Loretta, Dolly and Porter—and it's one of those songs that's just fun to be a part of."

The two singers are not just partners in the studio, they are genuine friends both on and off stage. "I really enjoy touring with Patty because we're so compatible musically," Gill said. "We always wind up doing 45 or 50 minutes of music together. Our band will work up 'Timber' or 'On Down the Line' or some of her other songs. She'll sing 'When I Call Your Name' and 'Go Rest High on That Mountain' with me. I think it's pretty neat."


Touring with Loveless might not have been a possibility had she not overcome her shyness as a young girl.

"When I was a little girl, we used to listen to the Opry and I loved to sing so much," she recalled. "But I was so shy that when my mom wanted me to sing for company, I'd have to go into the kitchen because I didn't like to look at the people. I'd just stand out there in the kitchen, singing my heart out."

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




lan Jackson says he recorded Under the Influence to be a catalog item for Arista. He wanted to do the album for himself and his fans who might find it interesting to hear him sing songs that influenced his career. He also wanted to pay respect to the artists who were influential in his decision to seek a career in country music.


Much to his surprise, Arista execs thought it was a great idea and decided to release singles, including the Jim Ed Brown classic "Pop a Top." Jackson's current single, "The Blues Man," written by Hank Williams, Jr., salutes a man by whom Jackson was very much influenced in his early days of performing.

Jackson is no slouch at writing a good country song. He has contributed to many of his hits, among them "Livin' on Love," "Wanted," "Chasin' That Neon Rainbow," "A House with No Curtains" and "Chattahoochee."

Whether it's a tune he wrote, a revised classic, or a song written by one of Nashville's master songwriters, Jackson says he just records what he likes and feels that he can best sing. He has worked long and hard for that privilege, and it's one that he doesn't take lightly. After all, a man who believes in tradition as much as he does should be allowed to start a few traditions of his own.

hite Lightning," George Jones' first number one record, hit the charts in 1950. Four decades later, the master vocalist continues to pour his heart out for his fans.

In an ironic twist of fate, Jones' most recent chart success, "Choices," might have hit a little bit too close to home. That was the song he was trying to find on his stereo system to play for his stepdaughter by way of cell phone when he had the near-fatal auto accident near his home outside of Nashville last year. The song's message turned out to be even more meaningful after the auto accident.

Considered by many to be the greatest voice in country music, Jones has had more chart singles than any artist in any genre of music, with chart action for five decades. He laughingly says he might also be the oldest artist to hit the Billboard country charts—he was 68 when "Choices" was making its way into the magazine's Top 40.

Jones has recorded with everyone from B. B. King to Keith Richards to Tammy Wynette to Alan Jackson. He has survived immeasurable odds and has proved once again that the strong will survive, the great voices will not be forgotten, and the great song will always prevail.

"It's nice to know that my peers have recognized the work I've done," Toby said. "After seven albums I was starting to think no one was paying attention."










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o have the longest running single in country music in 1999 is an amazing and wonderful accomplishment, something not overlooked by members of Lonestar. They agree that country music is their home, and if other songs recorded for the country market hit the pop charts, then that's just more recognition for country music.

The Texas-born guys are not afraid of work. Before signing with a major label, the group hit the road for 500 shows a year. One of their gigs was as the house band for the Wildhorse Saloon in Nashville.

"One fact that a lot of people don't know about us is that we were once called Ironhorse. Before we came up with Lonestar, we had a crowd at the Wildhorse here in Nashville submit on napkins their ideas of names for our group. After drawing some pretty crazy names out of a hat, we settled on Ironhorse—but only for an hour."

The Academy nominations are very dear to Lonestar. "It's a special awards show for us because the ACMs were our first nomination and win for Top New Group in 1995. What a great night!"





wings and watching Elvis."



hen she was 12 years old, Jo Dee Messina discovered country music, finding in the music the same passion and emotion that she was discovering in her own life. It didn't take long for her to understand that a career in music was in her future.

A strong woman who is a survivor, Messina recorded songs on her second album, *I'm Alright*, that reflect being true to oneself and learning from hardships. Apparently Messina's peers recognize not only her talent but also the message she was trying to convey. That's why her ACM nomination means so much to her.

"There is nothing quite like being recognized by your peers," Messina said. "The ACM voters have been so kind to me, and I am truly honored by the nomination. I am such a fan of the other nominees, and it is especially exciting to be included with them."

Her first two singles off the album, "Bye, Bye" and "I'm Alright," are just the tip of the iceberg indicating the depth of passion in the material she picks. According to the Massachusetts native, the songs she sings must have a message she can relate to, or she can't do them justice.

There is one thing Messina has not yet learned to overcome. "I'm not sure how many people are aware that I have a tremendous fear of flying," she said.

aybe country's done been polite too long," proclaims Alanna Nash in her review of "Tattoos and Scars" for Entertainment Weekly magazine.

Don't misunderstand . . . it's not that these boys aren't polite, but they do like to have fun! They also don't mind taking chances, like releasing southern rock-oriented music during a time when a more complacent sound is popular.

To them, the ACM nomination means "that people are hearing this music and seeing how serious we are about what we do—playing to the fans, taking it to the people, really making hardcore honky-tonk music," said Troy Gentry. "I guess this is the industry's way of letting us know they see what we're doing and they like it."

Adds Eddie Montgomery, "It's cool. Life is hard, so to be able to go out and kick it a little with people, make 'em forget for a little while . . . to do that and have people inside the business notice that and nominate you, well, that's about the best feeling in the world."

The two concur that their lives are open books, and they have lived the songs they sing, or know people who have. "Maybe that's it," said Montgomery, "we really are these songs and this music. Life isn't one long love song, and we know that."

"I think our music is about the hard stuff in real life, too," Gentry added. "We want to mean something to people, but we also want to make sure they get to let loose a little bit, too."

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
hen Brad Paisley was 4



"When you talk about my 'classic' hits, that's kind of scary," Strait said with typical candor. "I'm just glad that I've been fortunate to have a few hits."


Does he have a favorite? "Amarillo By Morning" is his immediate response.

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single mother and former prison guard at one of Texas' maximum security prisons, Chalee Tennison is candid enough about her life to admit that she can sing about almost any subject that a country song might broach. Her vocals are rich and commanding; she captures the emotion in a song and proceeds to sing it with both passion and conviction.

The songs she sings depict real life and have to touch her personally before she can do the songs full justice. She doesn't think that she can make others feel it and believe it if she herself does not believe in the song.

Tennison's debut single, "Someone Else's Turn to Cry," which she co-wrote, is admittedly autobiographical, an anthem of self-worth and awakening. Songs on that first album range from the country soul of "I Let Him Get Away with It" to the country rock sounds of "It Ain't Easy." She is also at ease with ballads, such as "I'd Rather Miss You."

As do many performers, Tennison began singing in church and soon yearned for a career in music. She held on to that dream through the turmoil of three marriages and taking care of three kids. Eventually, a CD she had recorded made its way to Jerry Taylor at Sony/Tree, and he began to use the songstress on demo work before she was finally signed to Asylum.

With part of her goal met, Tennison hopes to fulfill the rest of her dream, which is to comfort other people who are struggling or hurting by letting them know they are not the first ones to go through their experience.




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



ne of three new acts to crack country music's Top 10 list in 1999, Yankee Grey describe themselves as sometimes being "untamed" when they perform. The group's diverse range and vocal harmonies ring out on their debut album, and the fact that they like to have fun is very apparent.

Hailing from Cincinnati, Ohio, Tim Hunt, Joe Caverlee, Matt Basford, Jerry Hughes, Kevin Griffin and Dave Buchanan worked the same nightclub circuit in that area for 10 years before joining forces to form Yankee Grey. They crossed paths numerous times and eventually realized that they all had similar goals—a burning desire and an abiding love for making music and performing.

The band members knew early in life that music was their destiny. The influences are very diverse, ranging from Kansas and Aerosmith to Alabama, Waylon Jennings, the Beatles and Mark O'Connor. Throw in a few others, like Stevie Ray Vaughn, Jerry Lee Lewis and Kiss, and you can see the different musical styles that have merged to form Yankee Grey's distinctive sound.

Asylum Records assumed otherwise, and the world has been privileged to hear those soaring harmonies once again.

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






































The Academy Story

It was 1965. Eddie Miller, Tommy Wiggins, and Mickey and Chris Christensen were sitting in the Christensens' nightclub talking about the music industry and how to increase visibility for performers on the West Coast. Someone suggested that an organization was needed to promote West Coast talent, and that night the seeds were planted for the beginnings of what is today known as the Academy of Country Music.

Together with other members of the music industry in the 13 western states, that core group formed the Country and Western Music Academy in 1965. The Academy had full support from artists such as Buck Owens, Merle Haggard, Glen Campbell, Roger Miller, Tex Williams, Jimmy Wakely, Wynn Stewart, and Johnny Bond, all of whom promoted the organization and solicited membership.

In the early 1970s the name was changed to the Academy of Country & Western Music because people who saw the name in the phone book thought the office was a school of music. In the mid-1970s it was changed to the Academy of Country Music because there weren't many western singers or many western movies with musical soundtracks at the time.

The Academy, dedicated to promoting country music around the world to both the business community and the country music fans, comes from humble beginnings. The first office was furnished with a desk with three legs, a typewriter with keys that didn't work, a file cabinet painted military green, and curtains from Fran Boyd's apartment in Germany! The office was located at the Crossroads of the World and has been described as "a little larger than a closet."

"I opened their first office in 1967," said executive director Fran Boyd. "I was offered the job by then president Tex Williams, who asked me to come to work but said they couldn't pay me. I told him my daughter, who was 8, was in school, but my 4-year-old son was not. He said I could bring him to work with me or they would pay for a babysitter, so I chose to bring him with me. They had me work from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. so that I could be home when my daughter got home from school."

The Academy didn't hire anyone else to work in the office with Boyd, who was executive secretary, until 1974 when they hired a receptionist. Boyd says the two of them did everything from emptying garbage cans to answering the phone to taking memberships.

"Probably one of the neatest things I remember was that Donna Fargo was the elected secretary

of the ACM when she got her Warner Bros. recording deal," Boyd recalled, adding, "But she finished out her term. When she was elected secretary, she was a schoolteacher."

Boyd also remembers the hard work and dedication it took to get through the early years. Take the four-page newsletter, for example. Boyd recalled having to address by hand about 350 newsletters because the organization had no labeling machine.

"Then I would go to the post office and buy 350 stamps, lick them, and stick them on. Members still get a newsletter, but it's no longer mailed out in this manner," said Boyd. "We hand wrote all the membership cards. I sold awards show tickets out of my house. We did whatever it took to keep the organization going."

The first awards show was held in 1966 (for the year 1965). Kaye Adams was the first Top New Female Vocalist, and Merle Haggard was the Top New Male Vocalist. Bonnie Owens was Top Female Vocalist, and Buck Owens was Top Male Vocalist. Touring Band was Buck Owens' Buckaroos.

The awards show was syndicated in 1972, when it was picked up by ABC-TV, until 1979. At that time the Academy became associated with dick clark productions inc. and moved to NBC, becoming one of the most-watched awards show specials each year. In 1998 a new partnership with CBS was launched and continues to this year's awards.

The show is unique in that it mixes the best of country music with some of Hollywood's best-known personalities. Boyd recalls one of her most vivid memories of an awards show—the year her daughter, Shari, and Tanya Tucker disappeared when Tucker was supposed to be rehearsing.

"My daughter was a year younger than Tanya, and they were hanging out together. One minute they were in the theater, the next minute I couldn't find them anywhere. I sent one of the runners out into the Knott's Berry Farm to look for them, and they were found riding the rides. Tanya had missed her rehearsal for 'Delta Dawn,' but she did a great job that night and everything worked out all right."

As the organization grew, it began to sponsor local country music shows that included a caravan of country stars. Held primarily in Southern California nightclubs, the tour would go to two or three nightclubs one month, then two or three other places the next month. The

Academy also sponsored picnics and concerts at different city parks.

In addition to giving something back to the community, the Academy sponsored activities to bring people in the music industry into contact with people in the business community. Such events included luncheons at the Los Angeles Press Club, and the Celebrity Golf Classic. The golf tournament has since been renamed Bill Boyd Celebrity Golf Classic after long-time board member Bill Boyd, who was hired as executive director in 1980. Started in 1983, the tournament raised more than \$120,000 for charities last year.

The Academy became a part of Country Radio Seminar in Nashville, at first hosting a suite and then sponsoring the Super Faces Show and new artists showcases. Seminar registrants have been treated to shows by Alan Jackson, Brooks & Dunn, Hank Williams, Jr., Alabama, The Judds, George Strait, Garth Brooks, Reba McEntire, Bryan White, Patty Loveless, John Michael Montgomery and Tim McGraw.

Academy members have a voice in the organization because they get to vote on the awards and for members on the ACM Board.

The Academy uses a number of volunteers who help make the work load a lot easier for everyone. The Academy salutes those who make a special effort to see that things in the organization run smoothly.


As country music reflects the lives of the people it is written for, the Academy strives to keep in touch with all aspects of the business, offering ideas and solutions to the people who work to

dick clark

Dick Clark is one of the world's premier entertainment spokespersons. He is known for many landmark accomplishments and is probably best remembered by baby boomers as the host of *American Bandstand*, a music program that established guidelines for all the music shows that followed.

In country music circles, he is well known as the man behind the scenes at the Academy of Country Music's annual awards presentation, and the host for behind-the-scenes interviews during that show.

Over the years Clark has helped the ACM awards show and country music become the highly popular entertainment that it is today.

"I don't really recall my very first association with them (ACM), but I do remember hosting the show in 1972, when it was at the Palladium," Clark said, recalling how he became involved with the Academy of Country Music Awards.

"My association started earlier than that, but that year was when I formally got involved with them. What was amazing about the Academy was the number of stars they had and the enthusiasm from the people in Hollywood who were embracing country music."

Clark, a member of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, has seen many changes in the world of music, especially in country music in recent years. "I've watched country music evolve from a regional form of music to becoming truly America's music," he said. "Obviously, it's one of the most successful forms of music on broadcast television. With the endorsement of broadcast television and the growth in popularity of the music, advertisers have come to embrace it too."

The acceptance of country music on a nationwide level and on broadcast television can be directly linked to awards shows like the ACMs and the endorsement of high-profile entertainment figures, along with producers like Clark who work hard to keep country music shows in step with the times.

"The staging has become grander," Clark said of the show. "We moved from the Hollywood Palladium to Knott's Berry Farm, and now we come from the Universal Amphitheatre. If you look at the acts that are booked to perform this year, every single one is a chart person, coupled with stars from Hollywood who have an affinity for country music. It is that unique combination that makes us a little different."

Having been involved in the show for so many years, Clark has seen many interesting sights behind the scenes. He is particularly fond of a "Blooper" story that involved Brooks & Dunn and a rather large inflatable bull.

"Somewhere toward the end of their song, the bull began to collapse,"

Clark recalled with a laugh. "The positive side is we were on a show that aired that segment again as one of television's bloopers. . . . It didn't hurt Brooks & Dunn's performance; it was just a funny moment."

Clark, an Emmy and Grammy award-winner, also remembers a more poignant moment in 1965, when Buck Owens was named Top Male Vocalist and a young fellow named Merle Haggard was named Top New Male vocalist.

"One of my more current memories is watching Faith Hill perform on the show when she was very pregnant, and our thinking that we might have a first for the show if her baby were born that evening!" Clark said. (An interesting note: There was a doctor in the house, brought there for just that very reason.)

Clark, who is also a member of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences Hall of Fame, is excited about the ACM's 35th anniversary show. "There is an extraordinary lineup of talent performing," he said. "There will be legends, the new artists and the current stars."

He is also looking forward to many more great years in country music. "I think country music is growing by leaps and bounds because it touches so many people of so many ages. It's understandable, it's melodic, it has a message—it reaches just about everybody."

The following are the official criteria and voting procedures used by the Academy of Country Music (ACM) to determine its annual award winners. The criteria and voting procedure was set forth by the Board of Directors of the ACM ("the Board") in accordance with the by-laws and may be amended from time to time as the Board deems appropriate in the best interest of country music. Unless otherwise approved by the Board of Directors, the Selection Committee and Video Selection Committee shall be comprised of Directors, the President, the Vice President, the Executive Director, the Chairman of the Board and the Secretary of the ACM.

THE ELIGIBILITY PERIOD FOR EACH AWARD IS SET FORTH IN THE CRITERIA BELOW:

Any disputes shall be resolved by the Chairman of the Board in accordance with Roberts Rules of Order.

1. VOTING PROCEDURE

The voting procedure shall comply with all legal requirements and any requirements of any network airing the awards show. Disputes as to voting procedure shall be resolved by a majority of the Board.

A. COMMITTEE LEVEL

- The Selection Committee and Video Selection Committee shall meet prior to the Board meeting and determine the slate of nominees to be presented to the Board.
- The Committees shall consider all relevant material in arriving at their slate.
- 3. The Chairman of the Selections
 Committee and the Chairman of
 the Video Selection Committee
 shall determine the voting procedure at the selection committee
 meeting after first consulting with
 the Chairman of the Board, the
 President and the Executive
 Director. The Chairman of the
 Board shall resolve any disputes.

B. BOARD LEVEL

- 1. The committees shall present their slate of nominees to the Board.

 The Committees may submit up to 10 nominees in each category, except Top New Male Vocalist, Top New Female Vocalist, Top New Group or Duo (collectively the "New Categories") where they may submit up to 7. By way of clarification, the Committees are not obligated to submit the maximum in any category.
- 2. At the Board meeting where nominees are considered, any board member may make a motion to add a nominee to any category. If seconded, the nomination is put to the Board for a vote. If a majority of the Board in attendance votes in favor of the motion, the nominee is added to the slate.
- 3. Once the nominations from the floor are completed, the Board will vote on each nominee. Each Board member shall vote for only 10 nominees in any category, except the New Categories, where they shall vote for only 7 nominees. The top 10 vote-getters constitute the final slate except New Categories where the top 7 constitute the final slate to be submitted to the membership for the first ballot.

4. The actual voting shall be by secret ballot, in writing or electronically, and the results shall remain confidential until duly announced by the ACM. The voting shall be monitored by an independent accounting firm and such other persons as determined by the Chairman of the Board.

C. MEMBERSHIP LEVEL

- 1. The first ballot shall be submitted to the membership. The top 5 vote-getters, plus ties, in each Category (except the New Categories where the top 3 vote-getters (plus ties) shall constitute the final nominees to be submitted to the membership on the second ballot. The Board shall set time limits for returning the first ballot.
- The second ballot shall be submitted to the membership. The top vote- getter in each category shall constitute the winner. In the event of a tie, each nominee shall be declared a winner. The Board shall set time limits for returning the second ballot.
- 3. An independent accounting firm shall count ballots properly and timely returned.
- 4. Each member shall be required to sign his or her ballot.

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
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ACM AWARDS CRITERIA

Revised by Board of Directors 5/97. Effective for Show 1998 (Formerly known as Explanation of Awards)

ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the individual, duet or group who showed the most overall success in the country music industry during the prior calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, success of music videos, live concert ticket sales, artistic merit, appearances on television, appearances in films, songwriting, writing and contributions to the country music industry.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP MALE VOCALIST

This award is presented to the most outstanding individual male vocalist in the country music industry during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP FEMALE VOCALIST

This award is presented to the most outstanding individual female vocalist in the country music industry during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall

be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP NEW MALE VOCALIST

This award is presented to the most outstanding individual male vocalist in the country music industry who gains either initial fame or significantly greater recognition through his efforts during the prior calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.

Any male artist who has been a final nominee on a previous ACM ballot in this category is not eligible. Any male artist who has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in the Top New Male Vocalist category is not eligible.

Any male artist who has had a single record or album reach top 20 or better in any country music industry publication chart during the prior calendar year is eligible.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP NEW FEMALE VOCALIST

This award is presented to the most outstanding individual female vocalist in the country music industry who gains either initial fame or significantly greater recognition through her efforts during the prior calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.

Any female artist who has been a final nominee on a previous ACM ballot in this category is not eligible. Any female artist who has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in the Top New Female Vocalist category is not eligible.

Any female artist who has had a single record or album reach top 20 or better in

any country music industry publication chart during the prior calendar year is eligible.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP NEW VOCAL DUO OR GROUP

This award is presented to the most outstanding duo featuring a vocalist, or group featuring a vocalist (herein called "duo or group") in the country music industry who gains either initial fame or significantly greater recognition through their efforts during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performance.

Any duo or group who has been a final nominee on a previous ACM ballot in this category is not eligible. Any duo or group artist who has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in the Top New Vocal Duo or Group category is not eligible.

Any duo or group who has had a single record or album reach top 20 or better in any country music industry publication chart during the preceding calendar year is eligible.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP VOCAL GROUP

This award is presented to the most outstanding group featuring at least one vocalist in the country music industry during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.





The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

TOP VOCAL DUO

This award is presented to the most outstanding duo in the country music industry during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered in arriving at this award include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of records, live concert ticket sales and vocal performances.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

In the event that the Board of Directors determines that there are not enough nominees in this category in any particular year, this category may be merged with the Top Vocal Group at the Board meeting and shall be called the Top Vocal Group or Duo.

SINGLE RECORD OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the artist, producer and record company of the most popular country music single record during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music embodying the single, and the impact of the single on consumers and the country music industry.

Any single commercially released prior to the preceding calendar year but achieving its highest charted position in any accepted country music industry publication chart during the preceding calendar year is eligible unless it has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in this category.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

EVENT RECORD OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the artist(s), producer(s) and record company of the most popular country music event single record during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered include but are not limited to success at radio, sales of prerecorded music embodying the single and artistic merit of the single.

Any single commercially released prior to the preceding calendar year but achieving its highest charted position in any accepted country music industry publication chart during the preceding calendar year is eligible unless it has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in this category.

To be eligible, the single must be a collaboration between two or more artists who do not normally perform together.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

ALBUM OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the artist(s), producer(s) and record company of the most popular country music album during the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered include but are not limited to success of singles from the album at radio, sales of prerecorded music embodying the album and artistic merit of the album.

Any album commercially released prior to the preceding calendar year but achieving its highest charted position in any accepted country music industry publication chart during the calendar year is eligible unless it has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in this category.

Any album, which contains more than three (3) previously released selections, including but not limited to "best of" or "greatest hits" albums are not eligible.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

SONG OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the songwriter(s), publisher(s) and artist performing the most popular country music song of the preceding calendar year. The factors to be considered include but are not limited to the success of the song at radio, sales of prerecorded music embodying the song and the impact of the song on consumers and the country music industry.

Any song contained on a single commercially released prior to the preceding calendar year but achieving its highest charted position in any accepted country music industry publication chart during the preceding calendar year is eligible unless it has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in this category.

Any song which has been a previous ACM Song of the Year winner shall not be eligible.

The nominees shall be selected by the Selections Committee and are subject to approval by the Board. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

VIDEO OF THE YEAR

This award is presented to the producer, director and artist performing the most popular country music video during the prior calendar year. Emphasis shall be placed on creativity, production, visual appeal and impact on consumers and the country music industry. Other factors to consider include but are not limited to success of any single record for which the video was made at radio, sales of prerecorded music embodying the single record for which the video was made, and success on any accepted video chart in the country music industry (sales or performances).

Any country music video released prior to the preceding calendar year but which achieves its highest charted position in









any accepted country music industry publication chart during the preceding calendar year is eligible unless it has appeared on a previously published ACM ballot in this category.

The nominees shall be selected by the Video Selections Committee. The winner shall be determined by a vote of the membership of the ACM.

ARTIST OF THE DECADE

The nominees for this award are selected and voted on by the Academy Board of Directors. This award is presented to the artist who has made substantial contributions toward the exposure of country music during the decade.

SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Presented for unprecedented, unique and outstanding individual achievement in the field of country music during the preceding calendar year, voted by the Board of Directors. (THIS AWARD DOES NOT HAVE TO BE GIVEN EACH YEAR.)

CAREER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

To an individual artist who has had fame in prior years — has made a substantial comeback in the preceding calendar year, voted by the Board of Directors. (THIS AWARD DOES NOT HAVE TO BE GIVEN EACH YEAR.)

JIM REEVES MEMORIAL AWARD

To an individual, not necessarily a performing artist, for outstanding contributions to the acceptance of country music throughout the world during the preceding calendar year, voted by the Board of Directors. (THIS AWARD DOES NOT HAVE TO BE GIVEN EACH YEAR.)

PIONEER AWARD "The Cliffie"

Outstanding "pioneer" in the field of country music. Individual receiving the highest number of votes by the Board of Directors on a single ballot will be so honored. (THIS AWARD DOES NOT HAVE TO BE GIVEN EACH YEAR.)

TEX RITTER AWARD

(Motion Picture)

A movie released and/or receiving major exposure during the preceding calendar year, featuring or utilizing country music, voted by the Board of Directors. (THIS AWARD DOES NOT HAVE TO BE GIVEN EACH YEAR — can be voted by the Board or the membership; Board's decision as to voting procedure.)

MAE BOREN AXTON AWARD

*Not a televised award

The Mae Boren Axton Award is given in recognition of years of dedication and service by an outstanding individual.

NIGHTCLUB / CASINO / TALENT BUYER & PROMOTER*

The nominees for these awards are selected by a panel of Blue Ribbon Judges. They must have bought or promoted at least twenty (20) country concerts / dates during the calendar year of the award, be in good standing with all agents and help to promote country music ticket sales.

The winner will be notified two weeks in advance of the Academy of Country Music Awards Show.

DISC JOCKEY OF THE YEAR*

This award is presented to the outstanding country music "on-air" radio personality of the year, selected by a panel of Blue Ribbon Judges in a two-ballot concept. In order to be considered for the award, an audiocassette composite demonstration tape of the Disc Jockey/personality's "on-air" presentation of a maximum length of ten (10) minutes, must be submitted to the ACM office along with a one-sheet (8-1/2 x 11) description of the radio station's best attributes including market share/ratings information for the calendar year of the award; community involvement, public service, charitable contributions, etc.

All entries become the property of the ACM. A panel of Blue Ribbon Judges, approved by the Board of Directors, shall give consideration to ratings, public service, community involvement, entertainment and professionalism of the demo tape in determining the top ten (10) nominees for the first ballot. The winner from the previous year is ineligible to win the award for the current calendar year.

The winner will be notified two weeks in advance of the Academy of Country Music Awards Show.

RADIO STATION OF THE YEAR*

This award is presented to the outstanding Radio Station in a two-ballot concept. The Radio Station will submit to the ACM office a (15) fifteen-minute (maximum length) audiocassette composite demonstration tape of the station's on-air presentation and a (1) one-sheet (8-1/2 x 11) description of the radio station's best attributes, including any and all of the following: 1) Market share/ratings information for the calendar year of the award; 2) Community involvement, public service, charitable contributions, etc.

All entries become the property of the ACM. A panel of Blue Ribbon Judges, approved by the Board of Directors, shall give consideration to ratings, public service, community involvement, entertainment and professionals of the demo tape in determining the top ten (10) nominations for the first ballot. The winner from the previous year is ineligible to win the award for the current calendar year.

The winner will be notified two weeks in advance of the Academy of Country Music Awards Show.
