Bob Barker, Oprah...Reba McEntire. Great hosts
have always been the glue of great shows and
tonight country music's red-headed Renaissance
woman takes the reins of the Academy of Country
Music Awards for an unprecedented 11th time.

While some might tire after so many years of performing the integral role of host, Reba graces the stage every time with renewed wit, energy and of course – a spectacular new wardrobe.

"The biggest challenge of being the host of the AGM Awards is finding the right outfits for the special night!" McEntire says. "The next biggest challenge is saying the right thing about each artist I include in my monologue. I work with some great writers to make sure the script is as current and fresh as we can make it."

She is undisputedly a pro at every project she tackles, from hosting the awards show to screen acting, stage acting, designing her multiple REBA brand products and turning out the tunes that have made her an icon in the country music industry. This year, the Academy of Country Music's most-awarded female vocalist has returned to the recording studio after an almost six-year hiatus and is gearing up for the release of her debut album on The Valory Music Co. label, which she joined late last year. Reba's much-anticipated music project will be the 25th studio album of her expansive career.

In addition to her hosting duties, Reba is also a nominee tonight.



"They of course both have red-headed daughters, so they said I was the third red head that inspired them to write it," Reba said. "I just love Brooks & Dunn. I like their personalities. They're totally different as night and day. So are their wives. I get along with all four of them. We've toured for years together and then we've hung out together. It's just like family. When I go back to Nashville I want to see them 'cause I miss them a lot. And so being out here in L.A. as much as we are I miss my musical family, and Brooks & Dunn and their families and organization is a big part of that musical family for me."

Reba is a 12-time ACM Award winner, including Entertainer of the Year and seven wins for Top Female Vocalist. She was named the ACM/The Home Depot Humanitarian Award winner in 2001.

Lifting Lives is the newly-re-branded but longstanding charitable arm of the Academy of Country Music, which works to improve lives through music. The philanthropy was previously referred to as the Academy of Country Music Charitable Fund (ACMCF). #### February 11, 2009 Country Music Hall of Fame - Nashville

It was a 6:45 a.m. call time at the Country Music Hall of Fame's Ford Theater, but you couldn't tell it was the break of dawn from the four ladies reading nominees for the 44th Academy of Country Music Awards. Julianne Hough, Kellie Pickler, LeAnn Rimes and Jessica Simpson were all glammed out and ready when the CBS Early Show beamed the nominations press conference live across the country.

When the names were read, both Hough and Rimes were rewarded for getting up early. Hough received her first ACM nomination for Top New Female Vocalist and Rimes was named this year's ACM/The Home Depot Humanitarian Award winner.


"I was shocked! Most people don't get things past me before I walk onto live television," Rimes said shortly after hearing the news. "It never crossed my mind that I'd be recognized for my humanitarian work."

For the 44th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards, Brad Paisley and George Strait are the top nominees, each receiving a total of six nods for their work in the 2008 calendar year. Paisley's name appears in multiple categories, including Album of the Year, Single Record of the Year, Song of the Year and Video of the Year for his No. 1 hit "Waitin' On A Woman" and Vocal Event of the Year for his

collaboration with Keith Urban on "Start A Band." Also receiving his fifth ACM nomination for Top Male Vocalist, Paisley will be vying for his third consecutive win in that category and returning for the second time as a nominee for the prestigious Entertainer of the Year award.

With an impressive 80 ACM nominations now under his belt, George Strait returns this year with six nods in five categories: Album of the Year (*Troubadour*) Song of the Year (for "I Saw God Today"), Video of the Year (for "Troubadour"), Top Male Vocalist and Entertainer of the Year. Strait has won 19 ACM awards to date, including five Top Male Vocalist trophies and the 1989 Entertainer of the Year award. He will also be honored as the Academy's Artist of the Decade in a television special that will air later this year on CBS.

Also receiving multiple nods include Heidi Newfield and Jamey Johnson with five each, reigning Entertainer of the Year Kenny Chesney, reigning Top Female Vocalist Carrie Underwood and reigning Top New Female Vocalist Taylor Swift with four each, and Keith Urban with three. Other artists receiving multiple nominations this year include Trace Adkins, Brooks & Dunn, Miranda Lambert, Little Big Town, Montgomery Gentry, The Lost Trailers, James Otto, Jake Owen and Sugarland.

#### WHAT WOULD YOU SAY WAS YOUR CAREER HIGHLIGHT OVER THE BAST YEAR?

KENNY: I think that it's a moment that you really can't define when you're on the stage with your band. Everything is magic and you know that you're connecting with a lot of people and there's this moment where you feel like it's almost like an out of body experience really. There were a couple of moments this year like that with me and the guys, and it was really a great feeling because it hadn't always been that way for us.

KENNY: My favorite moment of the whole day is when we leave the "vibe room." The vibe room is a place where me and the band and everybody get together with some radio people, family and friends and kind of wash away the day. It's a moment where we remember why we came. And we turn up a lot of music and we kind of get in our own little head space where we need to be. When I leave that room and walk to the stage, that anticipation kind of builds all day from the moment you wake up because in the back of your mind you know that moment is going to come when it's just you and there's nothing between you and the crowd but a son. That's it.


obviously it lets you know that you're doing something right. You're definitely not a one-year or one-hit wonder. That's good. That's the thing that I work the hardest on-entertaining. It's the thing that I spend all my time on, even my off time I'm always on the phone. I'm always thinking, "How are we going to make it not necessarily different, but more real?" That's what the nomination means to me is that all that stuff means something, and the people that we actually make our music for really get it and love it. That's all you can ask for as a singer and a songwriter and an artist and somebody that really loves what they do. It's the ultimate honor.

YOU'RE ALSO NOMINATED FOR VOCAL EVENT FOR "DOWN THE ROAD" WITH MAC MCANALLY. THIS ISN'T THE FIRST TIME YOU'VE RECORDED HIS MUSIC. WHY DO YOU FEEL A KINSHIP TO HIM?

KENNY: Mac and I grew up very similar. Mac is from Alabama, and I grew up in East Tennessee. I know what that means in the lyric when it says "Mama wants to know if you're washed in the blood or just in the water." I grew up in a Baptist church. That song has been around a long time. I'm not the first guy to ever cut that song, but I think we cut it right. It was a gamble I felt like to release that song as a single production-wise. It was just me and Mac and a couple of guitars. The fact that that song was a number one record the way that it was just goes to show you that a great song and a great lyric will always be a very attractive thing. I learned a lot from that song. I've recorded a lot of records where there was this huge production and sometimes that can get lost. "Down the Road" was just a blessing really.

ATIAT CAN FANS EXPECT WT. (\*) OR NEW

KENNY: Well, they can expect that we are going to hit the stage pretty hard. We've been in rehears als now for about three weeks, and we've got like two or three new songs we've never played live that they're obviously going to hear. They're going to hear some older songs this year—songs that people maybe thought we forgot about. Maybe we did! But we're going to bring a couple of those back this year. We're thinking about doing maybe an acoustic set somewhere in the middle, only because "Down the Road" was such a good record for us. We don't know how we're going to work that in just yet, but I think that the fans are going to have fun this summer. If they're going to feed off of us at all, we know they are!


#### YOU'RE ONE OF THE TOP NOMINEES THIS YEAR WITH SIX NODS. HOW DO VOUPROCESS BEING HONORED IN THAT WAY?

BRAD: Anybody who does this for a living wants to be nominated for certain awards. Don't let them kid you! I really think that's true. If you're like me you grow up and you dream of walking up on that stage and accepting something. I'm always just happy to be in any category that they'll put me in, but to be in that many is always a little trippy. Then, you look out and see a full arena and it's just packed. To look out and be able to entertain that many people on one given night, take them away from what's going on in their lives is really the thrill of a lifetime.

BRAD: Everything about the day of a concert is really wonderful in my opinion. There's this moment at the beginning of the show that we did last year where I pop up at the end of a ramp. There's a video of me that sings the first few lines of "Mud on the Tires," and then the band kicks in and I'm standing way down on the ramp. Everyone is looking at the video thinking that's me until I appear back there. I always look forward to that moment, because there's people that I can see in front row. I'm standing there right in front of them in the dark, and they are looking around me as I'm standing there going "I wish this guy could move so I could see Brad." That's always a thrill for me.



GEORG — 's nice to have a nomination in all these categories, and it's hard to say one of them is more important than the other.





I was such a huge fan of his, and that was the first time I ever saw him.

CARRIE: I don't really think I did too many crazy things as a fan. I bought albums. I went to concerts. I was a member of a couple of fan clubs. I was a member of Bryan White's fan club, and he's the person that I've seen in concert before all this, before I was in the business. When I was younger he was the person I saw

in concert the most. I think I saw him three times. That was a lot for me. Saved my allowance!

#### WHAT'S YOUR FAVORITE WAY TO KEEP IN TOUCH WITH YOUR FANS?

CARRIE: I have a fan club site and I often go on. People will get on the message board and ask questions, stuff that they're curious about, and I go on whenever I can. As long as the questions are appropriate I'll answer anything. I'd say my fan club site is a really important tool for me to hang out with everybody. I love the polls too. They'll tell me their favorite songs and stufi like that. So it's also important for me to go and visit that and see what people are liking or disliking or wanting more of.

ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR IS A FAN VOIED AWARD, AND WE'VE ALL BEEN FANS AT SOME POINT IN OUR LIVES. WHAT WOULD YOU SAY IS THE CRAZIEST THING YOU'VE EVER DONE AS A FAN?

KEITH: I had about five Ricky Skaggs albums when I was probably about 15 or 16. Highways and Heartaches had just come out about that time I think, so I was playing that one repeatedly. Albert Lee played guitar on one of the record, and another suy called Ray Flack was playing guitar on the record. So, I was learning all these solos from Ray Flack and was just like so into this country pickin'. Then I was also playing part time in this band that played all this heavy metal. I was in the band for about a week. They had asked me to join, so I joined this band and I'm playing these like totally heavy metal songs and every time a solo came around I'd bust out these Ricky Skaggs solos. I got fired. It's the only thing I've ever been fited from.


KEITH: It's coming from just my life. To have my family, my own family, it's a great grounding and a great sense of belonging and purpose. Having a little girl recently just deeper. So for me it's a combination of the family life and being really grateful for where I am in my career, too. All I ever wanted to do was play and sing and tour and make records. So to be doing it at this level at this time in my life with family and everything something I didn't think I

would ever....I thought I may not even see it in my life. I mean I'm deeply, deeply grateful.

### IS THAT FEELING PREVALENT ON ALL THE CUTS OF THE NEW ALBUM, DESPING CRAVITY?

K TIM: Year, it's a very uplifting record. I don't set out to write any kind of specific record or I don't write in terms of themes or anything. It's like a photograph. You take a photograph and that's where you are in life, for better or worse. It's just where it is. And as we went on making this record it just seemed that everything was up. It's very clear and just had an energy and an essence about it that I hadn't really heard in my records quite to this extent, hence the title because it's a very uplifting record.


#### NOMINATED FOR SINGLE RECORD OF THE YEAR, SONG OF THE YEAR

With a strong, melodic voice housed in an imposing 6'6" frame, Trace Adkins is pretty hard to ignore. He caught the eyes and ears of the country music community in 1996 and has steadily gained momentum ever since, releasing favored hits such as "(This Ain't) No Thinkin' Thing," "Every Light in the House is On," "Honky Tonk Badonkadonk," "Ladies Love Country Boys" and the ACM-nominated chart-topper "You're Gonna Miss This." Adkins possesses an impressive baritone range that few artists can emulate, appealing to a wide range of fans with his bold, cheeky, drinkin' songs and tender, introspective ballads. With eight studio albums and two hits compilations to his credit, Adkins has become a multi-platinum selling artist and charted 20 Billboard singles. The Louisiana boy has also gained considerable recognition on the television screen, appearing on shows such as Hollywood Squares and qualifying as a finalist on Donald Trump's hit series The Celebrity Apprentice among a cast that included Stephen Baldwin, Marilu Henner, Lennox Lewis, Piers Morgan and Gene Simmons. Adkins' performance on the show not only brought him more exposure as an artist, but also gave Adkins the opportunity to raise funds and awareness for the Food Allergy & Anaphylaxis Network (FAAN), a cause that hits close to home for Adkins. With his commanding voice and stage presence, largerthan-life personality, steely determination and proven ability to compete in multiple medias, Adkins is a true "American Man" who's not to be missed.

#### NOMINATED FOR TOP VOCAL DUO

Nearly a decade has passed since the powerful duo of Big & Rich first performed ogether and completely redrew the once-established boundaries of country music. Since then, "Big Kenny" Alphin and John Rich have been perfecting their unique sound hat combines traditional country, hip-hop, rock and even the occasional rap. They have given fans anything and everything from rowdy crowd-pleasers like the smash hit Save A Horse, Ride A Cowboy" to romantic wedding ballads such as the duo's first No. song, "Lost In This Moment." Big & Rich has recorded three studio albums, two of which have achieved No. 1 status. Their most recent project Between Raising Hell and Amazing Grace is perhaps their most mature collection of songs to date that explores a ill range of human actions and emotions from rolling in the dirt to walking the line. In addition to creating memorable music, both Alphin and Rich are individually known or their producing and songwriting talents including their work with fellow country superstars Faith Hill, Martina McBride, Tim McGraw and Gretchen Wilson (who is also a member of their Nashville-based consortium, MuzikMafia). Both artists have also taken their talents to the screen, Alphin having produced several film and media projects in conjunction with his humanitarian work in Darfur and Rich continuing to produce the successful reality series Gone Country, among making other TV appearances. After finishing their third album, the duo went on a brief hiatus and Rich eleased his solo album Son of a Preacher Man featuring the hit single "Shuttin" Detroit Down."

"Class act" is a term that perfectly describes country super-duo Brooks & Dunn. They are a household name when it comes to country music and downright royalty in the class of country duos. With 26 wins to their credit, Brooks & Dunn is the most awarded duo in Academy history and has earned the Top Vocal Duo title 14 times, maintaining its hold on the award for the past eight consecutive years. Brooks & Dunn is also the top-selling country duo of all time, having released an impressive 13 albums in their long career together including their current Top 5 record Cowboy Town, which produced hits such as "Proud of the House We Built" and the Grammy-nominated "God Must Be Busy" as well as their current ACM-nominated smash "Cowgirls Don't Cry," which features Reba McEntire. Expanding their writing skills to the world of print, Brooks & Dunn also co-authored The Adventures of Slim & Howdy: A Novel, published in May 2008. The huge, sell-out success of their first-ever Australian tour last year prompted this dynamic duo to shine up their boots and kick off a second tour Down Under in May 2009, this time bringing along special guest Dierks Bentley to join in on the special B&D brand of a rockin' good time.

#### NOMINATED FOR TOP NEW FEMALE VOCALIST

Singer/songwriter Sarah Buxton has landed her second consecutive ACM nomination as a contender for country's Top New Female Vocalist award. Buxton has always had a flair for music and songwriting, even from a young age. After attempting dance lessons and sports to little avail, Buxton found her calling after her parents signed her up for piano lessons and never looked back. With one of the most arresting voices on country radio today, Buxton has given country music fans such Top 30 hits as "Innocence" and "That Kind of Day" from her digital EP Almost My Record. She also co-wrote Keith Urban's Top 10 hit "Stupid Boy" and has performed as a backup singer for country acts like Cowboy Troy, Kenny Rogers, Keith Urban and most recently Dierks Bentley on his hit single "Sweet & Wild." Buxton's current single "Space" is steadily climbing the charts and taking over the airwaves. Her multifaceted personality shines through with confidence on each of her singles, allowing fans to connect with Buxton on a deeper, more personal level with every true-to-life song this talented musician produces.

The members of the Eli Young Band - Mike Eli, Jon Jones, Chris Thompson and James Young - have that combination down to a science that has brought them their first ACM nomination this year. riple-threat singer, actress and dancer Julianne Hough has the country music community spinning - and not just around the dance floor. She is already known o millions as the two-time professional dance champion on ABC's top-rated TV Peality competition Dancing with the Stars. Having conquered the dance floor, ulianne is taking that same drive, determination and talent and channeling it oward the country music airwaves. Entering the country music scene in 2007 with ner single "Will You Dance With Me?" that was released to benefit Kansas tornado ictims, this young artist now proves that she is a force to be reckoned with. After igning with Mercury Nashville, Hough brought a feisty, warm and infectious voice o her self-titled debut album, which released at No. 1 on the Billboard country charts in May 2008. 
### NOMINATED FOR TOP VOCAL DUO

Never has there been a pair quite like Rory and Joey Feek, the husband and wife duo that has been dubbed as Joey + Rory. The two possess a natural ability to communicate their own life experiences into expertly produced songs that travel through the highs and lows of small town life. Deeply rooted in a classic country sound, Joey + Rory are a rare breed of entertainers that continue to lead the lives that are at the heart of the music they make. Before the pair finished third on CMT's Can You Duet in 2008, Rory worked as a songwriter whose tunes have been recorded by artists such as Blake Shelton, Clay Walker and Jimmy Wayne, and Joey had released a solo album in 2005 entitled Strong Enough to Cry. The combination of their talents - Joey's distinguished vocals and Rory's complimentary songwriting and guitar licks - amounts to a perfect blend of beautiful harmonies and authentic country music in their debut album The Life of a Song. The album's first single, "Cheater, Cheater," became a Top 30 hit and drew thousands of listeners into the intimate musical journey that Joey + Rory so lovingly and honestly shares.

### Nominated for Album of the Year, Single Record of the Year, Song of the Year, Top New Male Vocalist

That Lonesome Song is the title of Jamey Johnson's highly acclaimed first album since his debut single "The Dollar" hit radio waves in 2006. Although nominated for Top New Male Vocalist, Johnson is hardly a newcomer to the country music scene. He has penned hit singles for many top artists, including Trace Adkins ("Honky Tonk Badonkadonk," "Ladies Love Country Boys"), Joe Nichols ("Another Side of You") and George Strait ("Give It Away"), the latter earning Johnson an ACM Song of the Year award in 2006. His current ACM-nominated album showcases Johnson's talents beyond the writers' room, bringing his raw, piercing style to mainstream radio. With the huge success of his Top 10 hit "In Color" and latest single "High Cost of Living," Johnson proves that his own voice is one worth hearing. That Lonesome Song is an extraordinary collection of lyrical compositions and original sounds that tell Johnson's real, emotional stories and resonate with a bare-bones intimacy that flawlessly juggles tough feelings, dark humor and self-reflection. It is this enduring compilation that has rightfully earned Johnson five ACM nominations this year and three Grammy nods including Best Country Album, Best Country Song ("In Color"), and Best Male Country Vocal Performance.

### NOMINATED FOR TOP MALE VOCALIST


For a guy who started his career singing "Should've Been a Cowboy," country music superstar Toby Keith hasn't done too badly as a musician, entertainer and business entrepreneur. In fact, he's become a veritable multimedia mogul with 14 studio albums and more than 31 million records sold, his own Show Dog Nashville record label, multiple film and television projects and even a restaurant chain. Keith also acted as producer for the second consecutive time of his latest No. 1 release, That Don't Make Me A Bad Guy, on which Keith also wrote or co-wrote all 11 tracks. The album has yielded several hits in the past year, including the chart-topping heartbreaker "She Never Cried In Front Of Me" and No. 1 smash "God Love Her." No stranger to being the top dog, Keith has taken 18 songs to the No. 1 spot and won numerous awards for his songwriting, producing and vocal skills. Keith has won a total of eight ACM Awards, including two Top Male Vocalist and two coveted Entertainer of the Year awards. Beer For My Horses, a film comedy scripted by and starring Keith and comedian Rodney Carrington, also earned the Academy's Tex Ritter Award this year for bringing the country music community to the cinema screen and further proving Keith's superstar appeal across multiple media formats.

### NOMINATED FOR TOP VOCAL GROUP

Affectionately known to fans and now the music industry as "Lady A," ast year's ACM Top New Vocal Duo or Group Lady Antebellum has kyrocketed to stardom in a whirlwind two years as a band. Dave Haywood, Charles Kelley and Hillary Scott make up the newest golden group of Nashville, whose self-titled debut album hit No. 1 on the charts ast year and broke records as the highest-selling digital album by a country band in history. Hits such as the Top Five debut single "Love Don't Live Here," the fun and flirty "Lookin' For A Good Time" and vocal runaround "I Run To You" have not only caught the ears of isteners across the country, but also highlight both the individual alents and combined chemistry which the members of Lady Antebellum have to offer. Haywood's easy instrumentals and soft background vocals provide the perfect scenery behind the harmonic blend of Kelley's husky tenor and Scott's sultry alto, their mostly selfwritten songs ringing with relatable truths about everything from leavng home to love. Scoring two Grammy nominations for Best New Artist and Best Country Duo or Group and their second ACM nominaion this year, Lady A is definitely lookin' good in 2009 as they gear up o perform with country superstar Kenny Chesney and friends on his Sun City Carnival tour this summer.

# Nominated for Top Female Vocalist, Single Record of the Year

Country's standout rocker Miranda Lambert blew the music industry, audience - and even herself - away last year with her ACM award-winning sophomore album, Crazy Ex-Girlfriend. Upon scoring the Album of the Year trophy in an especially competitive field, Lambert said: "I'm freaking out right now! I'm new still and I've never even had a Top 10 hit." But the dynamic singer/songwriter's humble statement no longer rings true in 2009 as her explosive Top 10 hit "Gunpowder & Lead" (from Crazy Ex-Girlfriend) vies for the ACM's Single Record of the Year. Also being recognized in the heavily weighted Top Female Vocalist category, Lambert exhibits a rare concoction of raw artistry and smokin' star power that have gained well-deserved acclaim during her relatively new career. She has nabbed two ACM awards and earned a total of nine ACM nominations, as well as two Grammy nods for Best Female Country Vocal Performance and several additional industry accolades. An already mature writer and performer with two No. 1 albums and multiple hit singles under her belt, Miranda Lambert keeps her guns blazing in 2009 as she heats up to tour with superstar Kenny Chesney and release her much-anticipated third studio album in the fall.

### Nominated for Top Vocal Group, Vocal Event of the Year

Bince making its way onto the mainstream music map in 2005, Little Big Town has been a perennial force in the top ranks of country vocal groups. The talented quartet exudes an irresistible warmth and charm that is audible in their music and angible in their live performances, their love for one another as apparent as their expert musicianship. Having banded together more than a decade ago, the nembers of Little Big Town have mastered the art of harmonizing - each vocalist aking the lead here and there, all four complementing one another perfectly in every song. The group's platinum-selling album The Road To Here, which earned a Grammy nod for Best Country Album in 2006, showcased Little Big Town's earthy, pluegrass-infused sound and produced hits such as the boot-stomper "Boondocks" also Grammy-nominated) and sensual "Bring It On Home." Their third studio album and current release, A Place To Land, brings out a slightly edgier, rock-tinged side of Little Big Town that harkens back to the early Eagles, Fleetwood Mac and other classic rockers which blends seamlessly with the band's down-home roots and exhibits a heightened level of confidence and versatility. With seven ACM nominations, three Grammy nods and the 2006 ACM Top New Vocal Duo or Group ward to their credit, Little Big Town has definitely found its nesting place in counry music and is readier than over to Funch its first headlining tour in

### NOMINATED FOR TOP VOCAL GROUP, TOP NEW VOCAL DUO OR GROUP

The Lost Trailers blazed onto the country music scene in 2001 when they opened for the legendary artist Willie Nelson at a Fourth of July picnic. Since then, the good-natured group has been on quite the ride performing at hundreds of honkytonks, concert halls and packed stadiums opening for the likes of country sensations Dierks Bentley, Kenny Chesney, Sugarland and Carrie Underwood. Learning from their peers, The Lost Trailers poured all of their experiences into their music with increasing creative tenacity and maturity. The wiley bunch, comprised of Ryder Lee, Manny Medina, Andrew Nielson, Stokes Nielson and Jeff Potter, are continually winning over fans with their irresistible boot-stompin' verses and friendly banter. The title track off of the group's fifth album, Holler Back, became a Top 10 country hit and its current single "How 'Bout You Don't" is climbing the charts. The album continues not to disappoint as it captures the fun energy and excitement of The Lost Trailers balanced with several wrenching ballads that truly come from the heart. While the road to the Academy of Country Music Awards may have been a bumpy one so far, The Lost Trailers are moving full speed ahead with two ACM nominations this year.

### NOMINATED FOR VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

\ veritable fack-of-All-Trades, veteran singer/songwriter Mac AcAnally is also a producer, session player, publisher, band member and studio owner whose name is known well in the country music community. More than 30 national recording artists have recorded ongs by McAnally including Garth Brooks, Jimmy Buffett, Kenny Chesney, Ricky Skaggs and George Strait. His guitar and backup work is also widely sought and is featured on the works of Alabama, Mary Chapin Carpenter, Amy Grant, Nanci Griffith, Patty Loveless, Reba AcEntire, Roy Orbison, Dolly Parton, Linda Rondstadt, Hank Williams r. and Travis Tritt. While McAnally has built his reputation largely in he areas of songwriting and session playing, the multi-talented artist and true-to-life storyteller has recorded 10 studio albums of his own ncluding Nothing But The Truth, Simple Life and Live & Learn, all of which ncorporate the influences of rock, jazz, country and gospel while ticking to McAnally's good ole' Southern roots. He was the first artist tigned by David Geffen of the famed Geffen Records and has appeared on all major record labels since. McAnally, who is currently producing projects for Little Feat and performing with Jimmy Buffett and his Coral Reefer Band, also received an ACM nomination this year for his

#### NOMINATED FOR VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

She's come a long way since she was discovered singing the national anthem at the National Finals Rodeo in 1974, but Reba McEntire is still the tried and true cowgirl she's always been. Undisputedly a pro at every project she tackles, McEntire is known for keeping several irons in the fire at once, from screen and stage acting to designing her REBA brand products to hosting the Academy of Country Music Awards and turning out the tunes that have made her an icon in the country music industry. This year, the Academy's most-awarded female vocalist has returned to the recording studio after an almost six-year hiatus and is gearing up for the release of her debut album on The Valory Music Co. label, which she joined late last year. McEntire's much-anticipated music project will be the 25th studio album of her expansive career. She has won 12 ACM awards including the ACM/The Home Depot® Humanitarian Award. One of the few women in the Academy's history to earn the coveted Entertainer of the Year title, McEntire is truly in a league of her own as an artist and performer and returns to her rodeo roots this year with her collaboration on the hit single "Cowgirls Don't Cry" with Brooks & Dunn.

# Nominated for Top Vocal Duo, Album of the Year

With two No. 1 singles and a third song climbing the charts, it certainly seems that country's favorite rabble-rousing duo Montgomery Gentry has acquired the wizened know-how they sing about in their ACM-nominated album Back When I Knew It All. The boot-stompin', beer-drinkin' pair has been nominated for the Academy's Top Vocal Duo award every year since 2000, having acquired a total of 12 ACM nominations and captured the Top New Vocal Duo or Group title in 1999. Known for playing with a more rock-influenced twang and producing lyrics that simply "tell it like it is," Montgomery Gentry delves into the everyday lives of everyday people with smart, truthful insights and music that appeals to a broad audience. On their new album, Montgomery Gentry shows a deeper level of maturity and artistry, kicking it into high gear with up-tempo rockers such as "Back When I Knew It All" and laying it on back with the almost lullaby-like chart-topper "Roll With Me." The two hit singles off of Back When I Knew It All also brought Montgomery Gentry its first streak of back-to-back No. 1 songs, the duo having had five chart-toppers to date and six studio albums as a platinum-selling pair.

# Nominated for Top Female Vocalist, Single Record of the Year, Song of the Year, Video of the Year

Newly solo artist Heidi Newfield, who formerly fronted the ACM award-winning group Trick Pony, swept the field this year with an impressive five nominations. In addition to earning a spot in the Top Female Vocalist category, Newfield also garnered nominations for Single Record of the Year, Song of the Year (as both an artist and composer) and Video of the Year for her highly acclaimed hit, "Johnny And June." The epic song, which heralds the storybook love of ultimate country power couple Johnny Cash and June Carter, is just one of many songs on Newfield's debut solo record What Am I Waiting For that shows a shining new side of an already established artist. When Newfield departed from Trick Pony in 2006, she hung up the honky-tonk rockers for which she had become famous to explore new depths as an artist, songwriter and woman. The resulting record grabbed the ears of the industry and audiences alike. What Am I Waiting For is an intricate, dynamic compilation of yearning ballads such as "Johnny And June" to boot stompers like the Pony throwback "Can't Let Go" that has Newfield fans waiting for what's next as this feisty blonde with a big voice continues to soar solo.

### Nominated for Top New Male Vocalist, Song of the Year

ames Otto has recently been hailed as the "Biggest Voice in Country Music" - and considering the incredible year he's had, it would be hard to refute that claim. His second album Sunset Man vas released in April 2008, putting the country soul man on a non-stop ride ever since. Singing carefully selected songs that ange from matters of the heart to promises of a brighter future, Otto exhibits depth not only as an outstanding singer but also as a naturing songwriter. He co-wrote nine of the 11 tracks on Sunset "Man, including the No. 1 sensation "Just Got Started Lovin' You" which garnered a Grammy nomination for Best Male Country Jocal Performance and became the overall No. 1 country single of 008. Sunset Man has also produced the Top 40 singles "For You" and "These Are the Good Ole Days." Otto also received both a Grammy nod and an ACM nomination for co-writing Jamey ohnson's hit "In Color." Far from setting, James Otto's star is hining highter than over as he carries on strong in 2009.



### NOMINATED FOR TOP NEW MALE VOCALIST, TOP NEW ARTIST, VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

Very few newcomers to country music have a resume quite like that of the ACM's newly crowned Top New Male Vocalist Jake Owen. His debut album Startin' with Me, on which he co-wrote all 11 songs, produced three Top 20 hits including his infectious first single "Yee Haw," the self-reflective "Startin' With Me" and the seductive crooner "Something About a Woman." With several hits already under his belt, Owen released his sophomore effort Easy Does It earlier this year, already receiving critical acclaim for the record and transitioning from an upstart artist to a bona-fide star. While some new artists might let such quick success go to their heads. Owen maintains a quiet confidence and irresistible charm that makes it all look as easy as his latest album title implies. Owen's current single "Don't Think I Can't Love You" is climbing the country charts and further highlights the rich, smooth vocals and classic country style that Owen maintains in his music. Having toured with some of country's hottest artists including Kenny Chesney, Brooks & Dunn, Alan Jackson, Little Big Town, Brad Paisley, Sugarland and Carrie Underwood, Owen is making his own mark in the music industry and doing it in style, earning his second consecutive ACM nomination and first win in the Top New Male Vocalist category this year and moving on to compete for the title of overall Top New Artist.

### NOMINATED FOR TOP VOCAL GROUP

Although they've been stirring up crowds and hitting up honky-tonks for many years, the wildly popular Randy Rogers Band is relatively new to the Nashville music scene. They caught the attention of the mainstream country crowd when their fortuitously titled album Just A Matter Of Time surpassed all others in the genre and debuted as the most downloaded country album on iTunes in 2006. With gritty, Texas-style tunes and no-frills lyrics that show insight into a variety of very human characters, the Randy Rogers Band has long appealed to college-age listeners yearning for a more raw brand of music. Rolling Stone magazine named the five-piece band one of its "Top 10 Must-See Artists" for the summer of 2007, ranking the Randy Rogers Band with the likes of global sensations U2 and the Rolling Stones. Recognizing both the band's accessibility and unique craftsmanship, many A-list country artists have sought out the Randy Rogers Band as an opening act on tour, including Gary Allan, Dierks Bentley, the Eagles and even the legendary Willie Nelson. With the release of their current self-titled album on Mercury Records, the Randy Rogers Band shows no signs of slowing down as they move into the mainstream and their efforts have been rewarded with the band's first-ever ACM nomination.

The multi-platinum super-group's members Jay DeMarcus, Gary LeVox and Joe Don Rooney have scaled to unbelievable heights in the nine years since they first burst onto the country music scene in 2000 and have rightly earned their place in the crème-de-la-crème of the entertainment and music world. The top-selling artist of all genres in 2006, Rascal Flatts has also become one of the most consistently awarded musical acts - they tied with legendary country group Alabama in 2007 for having the most consecutive wins in the Academy's Top Vocal Group category, as well as sweeping up multiple Grammys, American Music Awards and People's Choice Awards. Through each one of the group's projects, the Flatts maintain their signature sound of soaring harmonies, clean, technical instrumentals and lyrics that are guaranteed to fit any mood and make anyone sing along or "bob that head." Fiercely loyal fans remain at the core of the trio's career, even helping Rascal Flatts choose the cover artwork of their most recent album through a People's Choice contest online. With their intensely emotional current single "Here Comes Goodbye" fast climbing the charts and Unstoppable only days away from release, the Flatts won't be saying "sayonara" to the country music community anytime soon.

### Nominated for Top Vocal Duo, Vocal Event of the Year

Spreading the love just comes naturally to Sugarland's Jennifer Nettles and Kristian Bush. The duo positively radiates with passion in every aspect of their art, whether they're on stage, at the recording studio or in the writers' room. Their aptly named third album Love On The Inside is an exquisitely crafted and deliciously complex body of work that overflows with love from the inside out, inviting listeners into a truly moving musical odyssey from feel-good, falling-in-love tunes like the No. 1 hit "All I Want To Do" to laugh-it-off uppers such as the current Top 20 single "It Happens" to stripped-down soul-piercers (a la the duo's highly acclaimed "Stay") like "Keep You." While Nettles' voice is undisputedly one of the most recognizable and vibrant in the business, Bush's subtler vocals shine through more prominently than in previous records on several tracks of Love On The Inside, further showcasing the duo's palpable synergy. Sugarland has garnered three ACM awards as a duo since their first win in 2005 for Top New Vocal Duo or Group; Bush also won an ACM award as a producer of "Stay" in 2007 and Nettles took home trophies for producing and writing the critically acclaimed song that same year. "Stay," from Sugarland's double-platinum Enjoy The Ride, was the first ACM Song of the Year to be written singlehandedly by a woman since Donna Fargo penned "The Happiest Girl in the Whole U.S.A." in 1972 and also earned two Grammy awards earlier this year.

### Nominated for Top Female Vocalist, Album of the Year, Video of the Year

Vineteen-year-old Taylor Swift is a bona-fide multimedia sensation who has prought country music back to younger audiences and successfully maneuvered Detween music genres with both of her No. 1 studio albums in 2008. As an icon, Swift has been everywhere from Rolling Stone to CSI and has become a household name in the little more than two years since her debut on Big Machine Records. Swift scorched the charts and made history in a variety of ways during the past ear, becoming Billboard's Best-Selling Artist of 2008 and the Best-Selling Country Artist of 2008 with more than six million records and more than nine million ligital downloads sold between her two studio albums, Taylor Swift and the ACM-nominated Fearless. The latter, which spent four weeks at No. 1 on the Billboard Top 200 and 8 weeks at No. 1 on Billboard Top Country Albums chart, also ook the cake as the biggest-selling debut for a female artist in any genre in 2008 and placed Swift fourth overall behind the debuts of pop and rock heavyweights il Wayne, Coldplay and AC/DC respectively. Swift's chart-topping "Love Story" wept both pop and country listeners off their feet, becoming the most-downoaded song in history earlier this year with more than two million digital tracks sold and establishing country's teen queen as a successful crossover smash. Crowned as the Academy's Top New Female Vocalist last year, Swift has received eight ACM nominations in the short span of three years, gaining her first nod as a producer this year on Fearless.

### NOMINATED FOR VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

Small town living and big story telling are at the heart of Josh Turner's rich, signature sound. Since debuting on the country music scene with his performance at the legendary Grand Ole Opry in 2001, Turner has gone on to refine his traditional musical style that appeals to modern country audiences. With the release of his latest album *Everything is Fine*, Turner reveals an intimate, engaging body of work that includes the Top 20 title track as well as Turner's sizzling hit "Firecracker" and ACM-nominated duet with Trisha Yearwood, "Another Try." Turner has charted nine singles in his career, two being the No. 1 songs "Your Man" and "Would You Go With Me" from his double-platinum, chart-topping sophomore album *Your Man*. The hit record was one of only four country albums to reach double-platinum status in 2006 and also earned two Grammy nods. Heralded as one of the brightest beacons of traditional country music and known for consistently bringing audiences to their feet with his Cash-like bass voice, Turner's career is setting off sparklers left and right.

#### Nominated for Top Female Vocalist

Equipped with one of those powerful voices that can be as seductively sweet as it is hauntingly soulful, Lee Ann Womack has been a fixture in the ranks of country's finest female vocalists since her 1997 self-titled debut album and first single "Never Again, Again" took radio waves by storm with its blend of traditional country sounds and modern pop elements. Her No. 1 smash hit "I Hope You Dance" solidified Womack's appeal to multiple genres, topping both pop and country charts in 2000 and earning the gamut of awards including ACM, ASCAP, BMI and Grammy awards. After adopting a more pop-influenced sound on her next album, Womack returned to traditional country with her 2005 release There's More Where That Came From and stunned listeners once again with her latest project, Call Me Crazy. The album, which charted in the Top 5, showcases Womack's artistic integrity and captures the vocalist's audible vulnerability and capacity to elicit deep emotion and understanding from the lyrics of songs like the album's current heartbreaking single "Last Call," for which she received a Grammy nod for Best Female Country Vocal Performance earlier this year. Womack has also taken home five ACM awards to date.

# TRISHA YEARWOOD



### NOMINATED FOR VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

Three-time Grammy winner and two-time ACM award winner Trisha Yearwood has earned another nomination this year for her collaboration with Josh Turner on Turner's introspective, emotional ballad "Another Try." Yearwood complements Turner's vocals seamlessly as they deliver the heartbreaking reminder of the consequences people face when emotions go unshared and treasured relationships dissolve without a fight. Yearwood's esteemed career in country music has been a lifelong goal of the talented songstress' - when many children wanted toys for Christmas, all Yearwood wanted was a tape recorder so that she could hear her own voice. Fortunately for country music, Yearwood maintained an unwavering drive that took her from playing with that simple tape recorder to recording in major studios. Since entering the music scene in 1991 with her hit debut single "She's In Love With The Boy," Yearwood has gone on to chart 38 singles on Billhoard Hot Country and sell six multi-platinum albums. This Georgia peach's talent, dreams and determination have taken her from local honky-tonks to some of the world's most prestigious venues and she is one of the most recognizable female figures in country music. Her most recent project and Big Machine Records debut Heaven, Heartache and the Power of Love featured some of the singer's most intimate vocal performances to date. including her Grammy-nominated single "This Is Me You're Talking To," which is fittingly similar to Turner and Yearwood's breathtaking duet.

# NOMINATED FOR TOP NEW VOCAL DUO OR GROUP, TOP NEW ARTIST

Armed with musicianship, songs with deep southern roots and high-energy performances, the Zac Brown Band began its career by building word-of-mouth buzz, playing 200 dates a year and independently selling more than 30,000 CDs. The six-man band has been performing together for five years, finally signing with Atlantic Records in November 2008. Their first national album, The Foundation, debuted at No. 3 on the Top Country Chart and No. 17 on the Billboard Top 200. Their first single "Chicken Fried" became a smashing No. 1 hit, also debuting as the second-most downloaded country single on iTunes and distinguishing the Zac Brown Band as the first country band to reach No. 1 with a debut single since Heartland accomplished the feat in 2006. Having landed opening slots for superstar acts like Little Big Town, Lynyrd Skynyrd, Willie Nelson, Sugarland, Travis Tritt and ZZ Top, the Zac Brown Band continues to build its widespread appeal on a well built - and undeniably talented - foundation, coming on strong as the winner of this year's industry and fan-voted Top New Vocal Duo or Group award and a contender for the Top New Artist title.

# 2009 Recipient LeAnn Rimes

The Academy of Country Music/The Home Depot Humanitarian Award recognizes country artists who serve others with a generous spirit and help build the dreams of those in need. "It never crossed my mind that I'd be recognized for my humanitarian work," Rimes said. "I've been doing a lot of different things with different organizations for a long time. It's part of what I do, not just as a celebrity, but as a human being. I guess it's the way I was raised."

Rimes has made giving back a priority in her career and has been particularly devoted to children's causes. She previously served as the International Spokesperson for Children's Miracle Network, which secures top-flight medical care for sick kids, and has generously supported Camp C.O.P.E., a service that teaches the children of wounded veterans to deal with their parents' altered lives.

In 2007, Rimes partnered with Kellogg to draw attention to disabled veterans when she was featured on patriotic cereal boxes. She recorded the song "I Want You With Me" for this project and donated all proceeds from the song to the cause.

Rimes also financed construction of the LeAnn Rimes Adventure Gym at the Vanderbilt Children's Hospital in Nashville by contributing royalties from her 2000 hit single, "I Need You." Additionally, she is an ardent supporter of the Nashville Humane Association and continues to speak out on the need to treat animals compassionately. Rimes has previously been honored with the International Entertainment Buyers Association Humanitarian Award and Redbook magazine's "Strength and Spirit Award" for her distinguished record of charitable achievements.

"Philanthropy and giving back are core values at The Home Depot and something we share with the country music community,"



# George Strait

With a record-breaking career that spans nearly 25 years, George Strait has more than earned his distinction as the "King of Country Music." On April 6, 2009, the Academy of Country Music will name Strait as the Artist of the Decade. He joins only four other artists who have received this honor: Marty Robbins, Loretta Lynn, Alabama and Garth Brooks.

A cowboy singer who walks the walk and talks the talk, Strait has endeared himself to country music fans everywhere as the real deal. His knack for picking great songs has helped him amass 56 No. 1 hits and countless other beloved classics, among them "Amarillo By Morning," "The Chair," "I Cross My Heart," "I Saw God Today" and the 2006 ACM Song of the Year "Give It Away."

With the Artist of the Decade award, Strait has now won 20 Academy of Country Music awards including Entertainer of the Year for 1989. He also holds the record for the most No. 1 hits on the *Billboard* Hot Country Songs chart. He has sold more than 68 million records, garnering him 32 different platinum or multi-platinum albums resulting in the most RIAA platinum certifications in country music and the third in all genres, behind The Beatles and Elvis Presley. Strait's current album, *Troubadour*, is certified gold, and his career only continues to grow. Tonight, he is nominated for six ACM Awards in five categories, tying him with Brad Paisley as this year's top ACM nominee.

For the first time ever, the ACM Artist of the Decade trophy will be awarded during its own, unique televised event.

George Strait – ACM Artist of the Decade will feature an all-star musical tribute. Produced by dick clark productions, the special will be taped at the MGM Grand Garden Arena on Monday, April 6th, 2009, and will air May 27th on CBS.

he Academy of Country Music Special Awards are voted on by the ACM Board of Directors and are not necessarily awarded every year, but instead are given out in years when there are clear and deserving candidates. The Special Awards winners, along with winners for Industry and MBI (Musician/Bandleader/Instrumentalist) awards will be celebrated at ACM Honors, a private event set for September in Nashville.

The Cliffie Stone Pioneer Award is presented to an outstanding pioneer of country music. Past recipients have included Hank Williams, Johnny Cash, Roger Miller, Willie Nelson, Loretta Lynn, Dolly Parton and Conway Twitty. The Jim Reeves International Award is presented to an individual (not necessarily a performing artist) for outstanding contributions to the acceptance of country music throughout the world. Past winners have included Jo Walker-Meador, Garth Brooks, Louise Scruggs, Charlie Nagatani, Buck Owens and Dick Clark.

The Poet's Award goes to a songwriter or songwriters for outstanding musical and/or lyrical contributions throughout their careers in the field of country music. Special consideration is given to a song or song's impact on the culture of country music. Past recipients include Bill Anderson and Fred Rose.

The Tex Ritter Award is given to a movie released in the preceding calendar year that features or utilizes country music. Past winners have included Coal Miner's Daughter, O Brother Where Art Thou and Walk the Line.

The Mae Boren Axton Award is given in recognition of years of dedication and service by an outstanding individual to the Academy of Country Music. Past recipients have included Gene Weed and Jack Lameier.

Dolly Parton

Speak the words "Dolly Parton" to just about anyone anywhere in the world and you are likely to get a big smile in return. Through unique talent and sheer determination, the little girl from the mountains of East Tennessee has become a global superstar. As an internationally renowned singer, actor, songwriter and philanthropist, Parton has contributed countless treasures to the world of entertainment, penning classic songs such as "Jolene," "Coat of Many Colors," and her massive hit "I Will Always Love You." With 1977's crossover hit "Here You Come Again," she successfully blurred the line between country and pop music, bringing a whole new worldwide audience to country music. "I'm not leaving country, I'm just taking it with me," she said of her crossover success. Indeed, after conquering the United States with her music and roles in hit films like 9 to 5, she took country music with her to Europe in 2007, playing to packed houses in Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, the Netherlands, England, Scotland and Ireland. She returned to Europe once again in 2008 to promote her latest album, Backwoods Barbie, performing 17 stadium and arena shows. Her sold-out shows in Glasgow and London were filmed for a future DVD release. After 40 years as an entertainer, Parton is still shoring up the foundation of country music and sharing it around the world.

# Jennifer Nettles

As the lead vocalist of country super-duo Sugarland, Jennifer Nettles has already won much acclaim as both an industry and a fan favorite who challenges musical traditions as much as she also upholds them. In 2008, Nettles reached new heights of her own by sweeping the "triple crown"—ACM Award, CMA Award and Grammy Award—for country songwriting with Sugarland's hit "Stay," which Nettles wrote and performed with the kind of raw, piercing power that only the most gifted artists achieve. The song brought to light her depth as a writer and as a woman, for which Nettles carries the torch by making her indelible stamp in a traditionally male-dominated field. She is the first woman to solo-write the Academy's Song of the Year since 1972, when Donna Fargo penned "The Happiest Girl in the Whole U.S.A."

Nineteen-year-old Taylor Swift is a bona-fide multimedia sensation who has brought country music back to younger audiences and successfully maneuvered between music genres with both of her No. 1 studio albums in 2008. As an icon, Swift has been everywhere from Rolling Stone to MTV and has become a household name in the little more than two years since her debut on Big Machine Records. She scorched the charts and made history in 2008, being named Billboard's Best-Selling Artist of all genres. In the digital realm, Swift sold more than nine million digital downloads in 2008, and she surpassed six million in sales for her first two studio albums. With "Our Song," Swift became the youngest female country artist to write and perform a No. 1 country single. Her latest album, Fearless, garnered the biggest-selling debut week for a female artist in any genre in 2008.


### CLIFFIE STONE PIONEER AWARD

Jerry Reed

All-around actor, singer, songwriter and "Guitar Man" Jerry Reed left a rich inheritance of laughter and entertainment to the country music family. Reed scored his first single, "If the Good Lord's Willing and the Creeks Don't Rise," when he was only 18 years old, gaining more recognition in 1958 when rock-n'-roller Gene Vincent covered Reed's "Crazy Legs." He also penned Brenda Lee's hit "That's All You Got to Do" and found success of his own with "Goodnight Irene," "If I Don't Live Up to It" and his first charting single "Guitar Man," which was later covered by Elvis Presley. Reed's first Top 20 hit was a tribute to Presley entitled "Tupelo Mississippi Flash." Throughout the 1970s, Reed made regular appearances on the Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour. His unique picking style -eventually dubbed "The Claw"- paired with his charm and humor made him a favorite with audiences. He released his biggest hit "When You're Hot, You're Hot" in 1971, followed by a string of Top 40 hits and his second No. 1 in 1973, "Lord, Mr. Ford." Reed branched off from recording in the mid-'70s to pursue a career in acting, appearing in several films alongside close friend and fellow film star Burt Reynolds. His most



popular role was as Reynolds' sidekick "The Snowman" in their *Smokey and the Bandit* series during the late '70s. Reed continued to record and release songs into the '80s, scoring more hits with "She Got the Goldmine (I Got the Shaft)," "The Bird" and "I'm a Slave," shifting his primary focus to touring through the '90s. His special blend of talent and ingenuousness resonated with many generations throughout his expansive career whether he was on screen, at home or simply picking on guitar strings.


Kenny Rogers

With tender, raspy vocals and songs that transport listeners to another world, Kenny Rogers has become a veritable icon of country music. For more than five decades, Rogers has captured fans' hearts in rock, pop, soul and country with songs that have distinguished him as one of the best crossover artists in history. The Texas native got his start as a member of First Edition, releasing hits like "Reuben James" and "Ruby, Don't Take Your Love to Town." Rogers became a superstar in his own right in 1976 with the release of "Lucille" and a string of other classics including "The Gambler," "We've Got Tonight," "Through the Years" and "Lady," which became his first No. 1 pop hit. He brought country music to a wider audience through his visibility in other genres, also earning fame for duets such as "Islands in the Stream," a colossal crossover hit for both Rogers and Dolly Parton. Rogers remained a celebrity throughout the 1980s and 90s with appearances on television specials, films and even fast-food restaurants. An artist in every aspect, Rogers has recorded 65 albums, charted more than 70 hit singles across multiple genres and released two photography books. He has nine ACM awards to his credit (among countless other awards), including Entertainer of the Year in 1978 and the Career Achievement Award. Having sold more than 120 million records during his illustrious career, Rogers is one of the Top 10 best-selling artists of all time. His new project is scheduled for release in 2009, featuring another duet with fellow music legend Dolly Parton.

### CLIFFIE STONE PIONEER AWARD

Randy Travis

Classic country crooner Randy Travis is one of the biggest hit makers of the late 1980s and early 90s, earning a string of seven No. 1 songs that have become foundational to other artists. Travis began his music career playing guitar with his brother at the age of 8 and was discovered by Lib Hatcher at a talent contest in Charlotte, North Carolina, when he was a teenager. Convinced that Travis would one day be a star, Hatcher moved to Nashville with the young singer and ran the famed Nashville Palace where Travis worked as a cook and entertainer. Warner Brothers eventually offered Travis a record deal and released his debut album Storms of Life in 1986. The album sold more than three million copies and earned Travis his first three ACM awards, including Album of the Year, Single Record of the Year and Song of the Year for his hit first single, "On the Other Hand." Dominating the radio with his recognizable baritone voice and classic hits like "Diggin' Up Bones," "No Place Like Home" and "Forever and Ever Amen," Travis was again awarded ACM Song of the Year in 2003 for "Three Wooden Crosses," a surprise hit from his gospel album Rise and Shine. He has sold more than 25 million records, scored 22 No. 1 hits to date and reaped numerous accolades including six Grammy awards and nine ACM titles. A celebrity on TV and film screens as well, Travis has his own star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame and is considered a pivotal figure in the history of country music. His highly anticipated current project, I Told You So: The Ultimate Hits of Randy Travis, was released this spring.



### CLIFFIE STONE PIONEER AWARD

Hank Williams Jr.





Hank Williams Jr. could have easily been lost in his famous father's shadow, but his own grit and innate musical gift gave him the tools he needed to forge his own path. After making his Grand Ole Opry debut at age 11 and singing his dad's classic songs to continue the family legacy, Hank Jr. found his unique voice writing anthems for the common man, including the now classic "Whiskey Bent and Hell Bound," "All My Rowdy Friends (Have Settled Down)" and "A Country Boy Can Survive." His talent for turning the sentiments and struggles of everyday life into musical poetry that mixed country, blues and southern rock has made him a legend in his own time. Not content to just write about the wild life, Hank Jr. has done his fair share of hell-raising, documenting his "unique position" in the autobiographical "Family Tradition." Having tackled his own demons, Williams continues to make his mark today. "Are You Ready for Some Football," the theme for ABC Monday Night Football, earned him the distinction of being the first country artist to win an Emmy Award. Williams was also named the Academy of Country Music's Entertainer of the Year three times, and his music videos for "All My Rowdy Friends are Comin' Over Tonight," "Young Country" and "There's a Tear in My Beer" all won for ACM Video of the Year. His latest album, 2006's hit collection That's How They Do It in Dixie, has been certified gold. With 10 No. 1 singles and six platinum albums to his credit, "Bocephus" continues to create new music and to inspire a new generation of musical outlaws including Gretchen Wilson, Tim McGraw and Kid Rock.

### **POET'S AWARD**

# Merle Haggard

A native Californian and true pioneer of the "Bakersfield Sound," Merle Haggard began his enduring music career in 1962 when he joined Las Vegas entertainer Wynn Stewart's band as a bassist. He scored his first Top 20 hit in 1964 with a cover of Stewart's "Sing A Sad Song," putting his own pen to paper in 1966 to produce his first major hit "Swinging Doors" and following up with his first No. 1 single, "The Fugitive," in 1967. Haggard's earnest lyrics and grittier musical style hailed from a lifetime of hard living, appealing to the working class crowd and eventually gaining "Hag" a reputation as the "poet of the common man." Unafraid of confronting difficult topics in his music from prison life to politics, Haggard gained popularity in 1969 with songs like "Working Man Blues" and the controversial rebel anthem "Okie from Muskogee." He dominated the charts throughout the 1970s and 80s with several hits, 40 of which achieved No. 1 status including "That's The Way Love Goes," "Hungry Eyes," "Today, I Started Loving You Again" and the commonly quoted "Mama Tried." Inducted into the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1977 and the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1994, Haggard has received numerous accolades throughout his distinguished career, among them 11 ACM Awards (including Entertainer of the Year in 1970), two Grammy awards (as well as the Grammy Hall of Fame Award), two BMI awards, NSAI's Songwriter of the Year and Music City News Songwriter of the Year.





### POET'S AWARD

# Harlan Howard

More than 4,000 songs have come from the pen of legendary scribe Harlan Howard, who has been dubbed as both the "Irving Berlin" and "Dean of Country Music." Howard is responsible for an entire catalog of country classics including "I Fall To Pieces," "I've Got A Tiger By The Tail," "Somebody Should Leave" and "Why Not Me." Beginning to write music at age 12, Howard honed his craft until his career finally took flight during the late 1950s when a few songs such as Charlie Walker's rendition of "Pick Me Up On Your Way Down" and Ray Price's "Heartaches by the Number" both hit No. 2 on the country charts. Pop icon Guy Mitchell covered the latter song in 1961, taking it to the top in that genre and reaffirming Howard's decision to move from Los Angeles to Nashville to work as a full-time songwriter the previous year. Initially writing for Pamper Music - also the songwriting home of Willie Nelson and Hank Cochran - Howard scored an unprecedented 15 compositions in the Top 40 during 1961 and penned 100 Top 10 hits throughout his songwriting career. He was above all a lyrical man, particular in matching his songs to the right singers who have included Ray Charles, Patsy Cline, Waylon Jennings, George Jones, Patty Loveless, Joe Simon, Conway Twitty and Kitty Wells. Among many accolades, Howard received two ACM awards including the elite Pioneer Award in 2006 and was inducted into the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1973 as well as the Country Music Hall of Fame and the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1997. He died at the age of 74 on March 3, 2002, in Music City, his legacy continuously carried through his songs that are still recorded by many artists today.

### TEX RITTER AWARD

Beer For My Horses

Rough ridin', beer drinkin' and trouble chasin' are only a few aspects of the uproarious film comedy *Beer For My Horses*. Country music superstar Toby Keith and comedian Rodney Carrington star in this action-packed movie filled with excitement, adventure and revenge. Based on the hit duet by Toby Keith and Willie Nelson, the film features Keith playing the role of Joe Bill "Rack" Racklin, a rogue Oklahoma deputy sheriff whose girlfriend packs up and drives out of his life. As fate would have it, Rack's old flame Annie (Claire Forlani, *CSI: NY*) turns up again at the same time, back from the big city. But their reunion is interrupted when Annie is kidnapped by a ruthless drug lord demanding the release of his recently arrested brother. Operating against the sheriff's orders and racing against time, Rack hits the road with fellow deputy and best friend Lonnie (Carrington) for a raucous trip across state lines to rescue the love of his life. This thrill-fest includes appearances by famed actors Barry Corbin, Greg Serano and Tom Skerritt as well as music legends David Allan Coe, Willie Nelson and Ted Nugent. Such an eclectic group of actors playing absurdly eccentric characters makes this classic road comedy scripted by Keith and Carrington an

David Young

In his 20 years with the Academy of Country Music, there isn't a job that David Young hasn't tackled with enthusiasm. From receptionist to executive assistant to senior director of operations, Young has been a constant thread in the growth of the Academy. Through the years his responsibilities have included credentials, membership, hotel reservations, ground transportation, on-location catering and ACM in-house production for the New Artists Show and the All-Star Jam. Young has also been charged with overseeing logistics for ACM events, computer technology, coordinating volunteers and interns, and working as one of the liaisons with dick clark productions. Prior to joining the Academy of Country Music, Young worked for a large defense company. Upon joining the Academy as receptionist, his work ethic and desire to excel quickly paid off when he was promoted to executive assistant for the former executive director of the Academy, Fran Boyd, who retired in 2002. Young previously managed the annual Celebrity Golf Classic and the New Artists Show. Though the list of areas that Young touched is long, the list of people he has touched with his smile and quick laugh during his 20-year tenure is much longer. David's contributions have helped set up the Academy for a long and bright future. He is retiring from his ACM post this year to move closer to family in Indiana.

# Academy History

In 1964, performers Eddie Miller and Tommy Wiggins teamed up with club owners. Mickey and Chris Christensen to establish the Country and Western Music Academy. Their vision was to promote country music in the western 13 states with the support of artists based on the West Coast such as Johnny Bond, Glen Campbell, Merle Haggard, Roger Miller, Buck Owens, Wynn Stewart, Jimmy Wakely and Tex Williams. In 1965, a board of directors was formed to govern the Academy and Dick Shofield became the organization's first chairman.

The Academy hosted its first country music awards show in 1966 honoring the industry's accomplishments during the previous year. It was the first country music awards program held by a major organization, propelling country music into the public spotlight for the first time. Winners that year included Kay Adams, Merle Haggard, Bonnie Owens and Buck Owens. The Academy's signature "hat" trophy was created in 1968, the same year Fran Boyd was hired as the Academy's first paid employee.

During the early 1970s, the organization changed its name to the Academy of Country and Western Music and finally to the Academy of Country Music (ACM) to avoid confusion about whether the organization was a music school. The Academy also expanded its efforts to broaden the horizons of the country music industry, sponsoring the "Country Music Caravan" in Los Angeles and beginning its history of charitable endeavors with a "Concern for Prisoners of War" benefit concert (also held in Los Angeles).

The awards show hit the airwaves in 1972, broadcast for the first time in national syndication on the ABC network. Gene Weed took over producing and directing the show in 1974 and in 1979 the Academy joined forces with Dick Clark Productions to produce the show. Dick Clark and Al Schwartz served as producers while Weed continued to direct. Under their guidance, the show also moved to the NBC network and finally to CBS, where it remains today.

The Academy put a foot in Nashville with the start of another of its long-tanding traditions in 1988: a partnership with Country Radio Broadcasters yielding the ACM-sponsored Super Paces show at the annual Country Radio Seminar (CRS) in Music City. The Super Paces showcase has opened CRS with country's biggest acts—including Hank Williams, Jr., Garth Brooks, Brooks & Duan, Dolly Parton and Alan Jackson. In 2005, the event was redefined as the Music City Jam when the famous Muzik Mafia (Big & Rich, Cowboy Troy and Gretchen Wilson) took the stage. Toby Keith, Brad Paisley, Tim McGraw and Keith Urban are also among the list of country music heavyweights who have headlined the Music City Jam.

In 1995, Fran Boyd (the Academy's first paid employee) became executive director after her husband, Bill Boyd, passed away. Boyd had steered the Academy since 1980 and held many key positions before taking on the role of executive director that was later bequeathed to his wife. After 34 years of service to the Academy, Fran Boyd retired in 2002 and handed the reins over to Bob Romeo, who currently holds the executive director position. The Academy's staff expanded under Romeo's direction in 2007 with the creation of new departments including Creative Development, Membership & Events and Publicity & Marketing.

The new millennium usbered in a whole new era for the Academy. In 2003, the awards show left Los Angeles for the first time in history and settled into Las Vegas at the Mandalay Bay Resort & Casino Events Center. The show is now held at the MGM Grand Garden Arena. The Academy also adopted a sleeker, modern version of the "hat" trophy that year, and in 2004 the organization implemented online awards voting for its professional members,

becoming the first televised awards show to do so. Creating an associate membership program in 2004 also expanded the Academy's efforts to broaden the appeal of country music and make it more accessible. Fans had the ability to vote online for the ACM Video of the Year and in 2008 they were also invited to vote for the Academy's coveted Entertainer of the Year award (after the professional membership had selected the nominees in that category). Associate membership has since grown to more than 100,000 and more than half a million people participated in the first-ever Entertainer of the Year fan vote. Fan voting was expanded to include a new category, Top New Artist, in 2000.

Not only did the Academy more its awards show to Las Vegas in 2004, but it also took over the town for the entire Week Vegas Goes Country. For days prior to the annual Academy of Country Music Awards, the Academy sponsors several events – both ticketed and open-to-the-public – geared toward showcasing the best acts country music has to offer. In addition to the ACM Celebrity Golf Classic (est. 1983), the Academy also sponsors the ACM Chairman's Ride (formerly the ACM Charity Motorcycle Ride; est. 2004), Fremont Street Experience (est. 2006), New Artists' Show (est. 2004) and All-Star Jam. Various other events have also been included intermittently in the Week Vegas Goes Country, such as a Songwriters-in-the-Round showcase (est. 2006) and an industry "Beach Party" and live charity auction (est. 2004) when the awards show was held at Mandalay Bay.

While the Academy strives to foster high-quality entertainment through its events, many Academy events also serve a dual purpose as fundraisers for the Academy's charitable endeavors. The Academy of Country Music Charitable Fund was formed in 2004 to manage monies raised by the Academy for various charitable causes connected with the music industry, as designated each year by a separate governing board. In 2008, the Academy allocated more than \$1 million to charity. In 2009, the charitable arm of the Academy was rebranded as Lifting Lives ", which continues to support worthwhile charitable groups that are improving lives through music.

2008 was a banner year for the Academy – having fully partnered with Dick Clark Productions as producers of the awards show, the Academy took a more aggressive approach to promoting the 43rd Academy of Country Music Awards and the Week Vegas Goes Country. The 43rd Academy of Country Music Awards was broadcast live from the MGM Grand Garden Arena in high-definition for the first time and ratings skyrocketed with an increase of 26%. Arena seats were entirely sold out, as were the New Artists Show and the All-Star Jam. The Fremont Street Experience concerts, headlined by Randy Owen and Sugarland, reeled in more than 58,000 fans and was the largest event in Fremont Street history. The Academy also introduced its new annual ACM Honors event in Nashville later that year, hosted by Martina McBride and honoring the recipients of the Academy's special awards including the Jim Reeves International Award, the Musician/Bandleader/Instrumentalist awards, Pioneer Award and Poet's Award.

With its fruitful production partnership and several new initiatives in place, the Academy continues to move forward in 2009 and has already achieved additional milestones. Following the 44th Academy of Country Music Awards will be a second show honoring the Academy's Artist of the Decade, George Strait. The Artist of the Decade television special will air later in the year and will be the Academy's second television special (the first being its 40th Aminersary Celebration in 2005). As country music continues to reach an increasingly wider audience, the Academy of Country Music also continues its mission to promote and support the industry.






