





THE CHAIRMAN OF ACM LIFTING LIVES®

t has been an exciting and progressive year of continuing to build and refine the Academy's philanthropic arm we all know as ACM Lifting Lives. The organization has three official annual giving opportunities including the Lifting Lives grant cycle. Lifting Lives moment at the ACM Awards and the ACM Entertainer of the Year matching gift. In addition to these, Lifting Lives is dedicated to improving lives through the power of music by way of spontaneous giving and participation with the ACM/The Home Depot Humanitarian Award and providing immediate financial assistance through our Diane Holcomb Emergency Relief Fund.

Through Lifting Lives grants, we fund music education and programs across the country that advance healing through music. This year we have achieved an expanded grant cycle from one to two in 2009. With the second round of grants, we increased funds to approximately \$230,000 overall and reached 15 programs in total. Our largest recipient was the Vanderbilt Kennedy Center's Williams Syndrome Music Camp in Nashville. They received \$30,000 in scholarships for the camp that has a dual purpose of studying Williams Syndrome and providing music therapy for kids. The most recent grant recipients were Childrens Hospital Los Angeles Program, Mr. Holland's Opus Foundation and Soldiers' Angels, joining many other programs that have been funded throughout the year.

The special moment featured at the 45th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards will be Toby Keith's performance of "Cryin' For Me (Wayman's Song)" in honor of the fight against cancer. The performance will drive viewers to the Lifting Lives website so that they can learn more about Stand Up To Cancer, an active organization that funds cancer research.

Lifting Lives has also partnered with 2008 Entertainer of the Year Carrie Underwood and her C.A.T.S. Foundation. Instruments and vocal equipment were provided to help ensure the future of music programs in public schools in Carrie's hometown of Checotah, Oklahoma. Lifting Lives will present a matching gift opportunity to this year's ACM Entertainer of the Year for any endeavor that uplifts through the power of music.

Iconic music duo, Montgomery Gentry, is this year's recipient of the ACM/The Home Depot Humanitarian



Award. The honor will be presented tonight during the 45th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards. In its ninth year, the Humanitarian Award recognizes country music artists who are noted for their ongoing community service and charitable giving of their time and talent. Some of the charities Montgomery Gentry have devoted their time to are the TJ Martell Foundation, Make-A-Wish Foundation, Camp Horsin' Around and many others. We'd like to give a special thanks for their previous participation with Lifting Lives.

The Diane Holcomb Emergency Relief Fund was established to honor Diane Holcomb's memory by her only daughter, Gayle Holcomb, who served four years as Chairman of the ACM Board of Directors. This fund enables ACM Lifting Lives to respond to unforeseen and immediate financial needs of ACM members, staff and music related organizations and individuals.

No one person can make these achievements alone. I would like to thank President Gayle Holcomb, Vice President Mark Hartley, Director Erin Spahn and the Lifting Lives Board of Directors for all of their hard work in making this a successful organization.

In closing, I'd like to give a warm and special thanks to Carrie Underwood and Brad Paisley as well as the Lifting Lives sponsors and donors for their contributions and continuing support to the growth of ACM Lifting Lives .

REBA MCENTIRE

eba had better make a beeline for the roulette table when she arrives in Las Vegas for the 45th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards. As if her list of accomplishments isn't already long enough, the singer just scored her 34th No. 1 single "Consider Me Gone." in the 34th year of her country music career.

"It feels incredible," Reba says of her record-breaking success. "It really does. I'm very honored, very blessed. I thank God every day for the people I get to work with and play with – and that's the best thing about this whole 34-year career, are the people that I've met and got to hang with and learn from over these 34 years."

Spending three weeks at the top of the country charts, "Consider Me Gone" is the biggest hit of Reba's illustrious career and the longest-running No. 1 song for a female country artist since Taylor Swift's "Our Song" topped the charts for multiple weeks in 2007.

"You never know which song is going to be the one," Reba notes. "People always say, "What makes a hit?' Well Lord, if I knew that I'd be rich! I have no earthly idea. All I can do is say 'I want the song that touches my heart' because if that song touches my heart, hopefully when I sing it, it will touch yours."

Keep On Loving You, which is Reba's first project with The Valory Music Co. and 31st studio album, was the biggest debut for a country album by a female artist in 2009. Besting both the *Billboard* Top Country and Top 200 charts, Reba set a new record with the album – she now has the most No. 1 country albums of any female artist in *Billboard* history. The distinction was formerly held by country music legend Loretta Lynn.

"To be in the same sentence as Loretta Lynn is a huge honor to me," says Reba. "She set the bar high at the very beginning. People like Loretta, Dolly, Barbara, Minnie Pearl, Kitty Wells – these are the people that all of us girls in the country music business today need to read up on, remember what they did, what they taught us and remember the work ethic that they had."

Of course, Reba is well known for her own solid work ethic. She's the definition of a dynamo and she's bringing her energy back to the stage this year, touring with George Strait and Lee Ann Womack on one of the season's hottest tickets in support of her new album.

"It's been a lot of fun and I'm really grateful to have a job and glad to be out on tour with George and Lee Ann. I'm in the middle slot [of performances], which is really

good. It's different for me and I'm just getting a big kick out of it!"

Reba has had plenty of kicks on her own headlining tours in the past – and plenty of Kix as well, having hit the road four times with her good friends and the Academy's most-awarded duo, Brooks & Dunn. Reba will perform in the duo's honor at *ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn – The Last Rodeo* all-star concert at the MGM Grand Garden Arena on April 19th before Kix and Ronnie head out for their final tour together.


"As it's growing closer, I'm getting a little nostalgic," Reba says about her friends' impending split. "I love them both. They're two of my best friends. And I'm not surprised; when Ronnie [Dunn] told me, I wasn't really surprised but gosh dern it – we could do some more tours together!"

Prior to her appearance at the Brooks & Dunn tribute, Reba will again take center stage at the 45th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards, hosting the show for an unprecedented 12th time – which is also the number of ACM awards she has taken home to date.

"I just love live television," she continues. "I appreciate the Academy of Country Music letting me host the awards this many years. It's fun. I just love to be on stage with that live television! Having to sit in the audience now when everybody else is up there working and hosting, it's kind of like 'Oh, I can't wait 'til it's my turn again!"

OUR HISTORY

n 1964, performers Eddie Miller and Tommy Wiggins teamed up with club owners Mickey and Chris Christensen to establish the Country and Western Music Academy. Their vision was to promote country music in the western 13 states, where now-legendary artists such as Johnny Bond, Glen Campbell, Merle Haggard and Buck Owens were creating a new frontier in the country music landscape. Governed by a board of directors, the Academy held its first awards show in 1966. It was the first country music awards program held by a major organization, propelling the genre into the public spotlight for the first time.

During the early 1970s, the organization changed its name to the Academy of Country and Western Music and finally to the Academy of Country Music (ACM). The Academy also sponsored the "Country Music Caravan" in Los Angeles and began its history of

charitable endeavors with a "Concern for Prisoners of War" benefit concert (also held in Los Angeles).

The awards show hit the airwaves in 1972, broadcast for the first time in national syndication on the ABC network. In 1979, the Academy hired Dick Clark Productions to produce the show, which also moved to the NBC network and finally to CBS, where it remains today.

The new millennium ushered in a new era for the Academy. In 2003, the awards show left Los Angeles and settled into Sin

City at the Mandalay Bay Resort & Casino Events Center. The Academy implemented online awards voting for its professional members in 2004, becoming the first televised awards show to do so. Creating an associate membership program (now called the Academy A-List) in 2004 also expanded the Academy's efforts to make country music more accessible. Fans voted online for the ACM Video of the Year that year; in 2008 they were invited to vote for the Academy's coveted Entertainer of the Year award and in 2009 the Academy also opened up its Top New Artist categories to fan voting.

Not only did the Academy move its awards show to Las Vegas, but it also took over town for the entire Week Vegas Goes Country'. For days prior to the annual ACM Awards, the Academy sponsors several events that showcase the best acts in country music including the ACM Chairman's Ride, ACM Concerts at Fremont



One of the most recognizable acts in country music history, Alabama took home 20 ACM Awards during their career including five Entertainer of the Year titles. They were named ACM Artist of the Decade for the 1980s, an honor that only four other artists have won.

Street Experience, the All-Star Jam and various other events.

While the Academy strives to foster high-quality entertainment through its events, many Academy events also serve a dual purpose as fundraisers for the Academy's philanthropic arm, ACM Lifting Lives™. Originally formed as the Academy of Country Music Charitable Fund in 2004, Lifting Lives has since been rebranded and expanded its reach to fund multiple programs across the country that improve lives through the power of music. To date, the organization has given away more than \$1 million to charitable causes.

The Academy partnered with Dick Clark Productions as producers of the awards show in 2008, the first time the show was broadcast live from the MGM Grand Garden Arena in high-definition. Arena seats were entirely sold out, as were the New Artists' Show and the All-Star Jam. ACM Weekend on Fremont Street, including two nights of free live concerts – reeled in the largest crowd in Fremont Street history. The Academy also introduced its annual ACM Honors gala in Nashville later that year, which honors the recipients of the Academy's special and industry awards.

Between 2008 and 2009, the Academy nearly doubled its audience with significant increases in ratings both years. Last year, the Academy also taped the *George Strait: ACM Artist of the Decade All-Star Concert* television special, which aired later in the year and also ranked No. 1 in viewership. Country super-duo Brooks & Dunn will be honored with their own television special, *ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn - The Last Rodeo* this year, to be taped on April 19th following tonight's telecast of the *45th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards*. As country music continues to reach an increasingly wider audience, the Academy of Country Music also continues its mission to promote the industry and engage country music fans not just in the western states, but from coast to coast.

Standing in the corner of the CBS studio at Fifth Avenue and 59th Street, Shelton stood patiently as an audio tech changed the batteries in the wireless microphone pack tucked into the back of his jeans. With the task complete, Blake turned to those around him and deadpanned, "Most

people don't know I'm battery powered, and that is indeed where they go."

Neither Blake nor ACM Awards host Reba McEntire needed any battery power to be fired up as they read nominations on live TV for the 45th Academy of Country Music Awards. Reba called Blake's name along with Trace Adkins in the Vocal Event category for their duet "Hillbilly Bone," while Blake returned the favor by calling out Reba among the five women competing for Top Female Vocalist. Although she holds the record for wins in that category, Reba says it's still a welcome surprise every time she's nominated.

"I'm always surprised," McEntire said after the press

conference. ""It makes me feel very, very good because everybody wants to be loved and accepted and I'm no different."

Shelton has been nominated twice for Top New Male Vocalist and received his last ACM nod in 2003 for the Vocal Event category.

"I think I was up for new guy twice, like a 150 years ago, and now to have made this 150 year comeback, it's amazing," he joked. "I feel like John Anderson in the '90s. I'm back!"

Also feeling the love from Academy voters was trio Lady Antebellum, which lead the pack with seven nominations, including Top Vocal Group, Album, Single, Song and Video. Right behind with six nods were Carrie Underwood and Miranda Lambert, who was in the CBS studio watching the monitor when boyfriend Shelton read the list on-air.

Taylor Swift received five nominations, including her first for Entertainer of the Year. She will compete with Kenny Chesney, Toby Keith, Brad Paisley, George Strait, Taylor Swift, Keith Urban, Zac Brown Band and reigning Entertainer of the Year Carrie Underwood. This is the first time in Academy history that the category has been opened to eight nominees instead of five. Chesney, Paisley and Zac Brown Band all earned four nods each overall.

Brooks & Dunn, who later this year will call it quits after 20 years as a duo, once again are competing in the Top Vocal Duo category. With 26 ACM Awards to their credit, the pair holds the record for the most wins of any artist in Academy history. That accomplishment will be honored with the primetime special ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn - The Last Rodeo, which will tape tomorrow night and air March 23rd on CBS.

Four-time ACM Entertainer of the Year Kenny Chesney had an impressive 2009:

His Sun City Carnival tour was the top-selling country tour, reeling in more than 1 million concert-goers; he scored his 19th No. 1 hit as an artist (and fourth chart-topper as a songwriter) with "Out Last Night" from his Greatest Hits II and also found huge crossover success with "I'm Alive," a duet with Dave Matthews from Chesney's 2008 release Lucky Old Sun. The Luttrell, Tennessee native stuck to his own compositions and exploring life in the Caribbean on Lucky Old Sun, which topped both the Billboard 200 and Top Country albums charts. Chesney's 2009 release, Greatest Hits II, elevated the artist's tally of No. 1 country albums to nine. During his Sun City Carnival tour, Chesney filmed performances in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Seattle, Boston and Indianapolis that are featured in his concert film Kenny Chesney: Summer in 3D that premiered in Las Vegas last night and opens wide on April 21. A 10-time ACM Award winner, Chesney is booking only a handful of shows for 2010 while he works on his next album, which is expected to be released in the fall. He will play the Bayou Country Fest and BamaJam plus four special concerts booked at The Joint at the Hard Rock Hotel & Casino Las Vegas.

Ranked No. 3 on Billboard's Top 200 Artists of the Decade. Toby Keith sold nearly 30 million albums and scored more No. 1 singles than any other country artist between 2000 and the end of 2009. Billboard named him Country Artist of the Decade and Country Songwriter of the Decade, an honor that was also presented to him by the Nashville Songwriters Association International. "American Ride," the first single from Keith's current American Ride album, added to his impressive list of No. 1 hits, joining chart-toppers such as "Should've Been A Cowboy," "I Wanna Talk About Me," "Courtesy of the Red, White, & Blue (The Angry American)" and "God Love Her." The album's hit second single "Cryin' For Me (Wayman's Song)" is a moving tribute to Keith's close friend, basketball player and jazz bassist Wavman Tisdale, who died from complications of cancer in May 2009. A 10-time ACM Award winner, Toby had a unique experience during his winter European tour when he performed at the Nobel Peace Prize concert in Oslo, Norway, which featured performances by artists from around the globe. A longtime supporter of the USO, Toby also participated in the ongoing Haiti relief efforts this year by donating seven semitrailers to two nonprofit organizations, Can-Do and Livin' the Music, that were filled with supplies and shipped to the country recently devastated by an earthquake. Toby will spend this summer on his

American Ride tour, which starts June 19 in New Jersey and runs

through late September.







When American Saturday Night - the eighth album from the three-time and reigning ACM Top Male Vocalist - debuted at No. 1 on Billboard, Brad Paisley was also sitting atop the country singles chart with his 10th consecutive No. 1 hit "Then." The album has since produced successive charttoppers "Welcome To The Future" and "American Saturday Night." The West Virginia native, who spent his teen years on the WWVA Jamboree USA, continues to develop as a songwriter, earning writing credits for every song on the album. With 23 Top 40 singles, Paisley has proven himself to be a stylistic chameleon, getting topical ("Celebrity"), rowdy ("Mud On The Tires," "Alcohol"), tender ("We Danced," "Waitin' On A Woman") and poignant ("When I Get Where I'm Going"). His most recent tour, which started in 2008 and concluded in early March, was seen by more than 1.5 million people in nearly 100 cities. A 12-time ACM Award winner, Paisley will be entering the world of scripted television this year as creator and co-producer of a drama series, tentatively titled Nashville, for the CW. Brad's charitable foundation supports organizations in West Virginia and his long-time association with the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis led to the creation last year of the Paisley Lodge at the Target House, a charity affiliated with St. Jude's.





GEORGE STRAIT

Named the Academy's Artist of the Decade for the 2000's, George Strait celebrated his 25th anniversary as a recording artist in 2009 as well as his induction into the Country Music Hall of Fame and his first-ever Grammy win for the No. 1 album *Troubadour*. A 20-time ACM Award winner, Strait holds the distinction of having the most No. 1 singles of any artist in history, with 57 currently under his belt buckle. He has had at least one single hit the top every year since his first No. 1 in 1981, "Unwound." With 33 platinum or multi-platinum albums to his credit, the Texas native has more RIAA platinum certifications than any other country artist, and only the Beatles and Elvis Presley hold more. His latest effort *Twang*, recorded in a small studio in Key West, Florida, debuted at No. 1 on the *Billboard* 200 and the Top Country Albums charts. It was the fourth time he opened at No. 1 on the overall chart and the 13th time besting the country chart. Strait co-wrote three songs on *Twang*, including the debut single "Living For The Night," which he penned with his son, Bubba. One of the biggest tours of winter 2010 featured Strait, Reba McEntire and Lee Ann Womack. They performed in 19 arenas between late January and early April.



Taylor Swift was the juggernaut of 2009. The Associated Press named her Entertainer of the Year and the American Music Awards crowned her Artist of the Year. At one point, she had eight singles on the Billboard Hot 100. Every stop on Swift's 52-city arena tour in 2009 sold out, and tickets for her 2010 tour dates have sold out within minutes. "You Belong With Me" was the No. 1 country music video of the year, holding the top spot on CMT's chart for 11 weeks in a row. In addition, she became the first country artist in the 19-year history of SoundScan to have two singles reach No. 1 on the pop chart. Swift's ACM Awardwinning album Fearless sold more copies in 2008 and 2009 than any other artist in any genre of music. Now 20, Swift started singing at the age of 10, entering karaoke contests and singing at county fairs around her hometown of Wyomissing, Pennsylvania. At 14, she became the youngest person to be signed as a professional staff songwriter at Sony/ATV Publishing and at 17, she became the youngest person to single-handedly write and sing a No. 1 country hit. Already a fourtime ACM Award winner, Taylor's first single of 2010, "Today Was a Fairytale," sold 325,000 downloads in its first week making it the fastestselling download by a female artist

in the format's history.



"Cowboy Casanova" is Carrie Underwood's 11th No. 1 single and the fastest in her short but meteoric career to reach the pinnacle position on the radio airplay chart. It was the first single from her third album, Play On. Previously, Underwood was the first country artist in history to log 10 chart-toppers from her first two albums, the first of which, Some Hearts, was named the top country album of the decade by Billboard. The reigning ACM Entertainer of the Year and former American Idol champion was inducted into the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame last year, just a few months before she starred in her first variety television special Carrie Underwood: An All-Star Holiday Special. Carrie recently delved into acting, appearing in an episode of CBS' How I Met Your Mother this March and playing the role of a church youth leader in Soul Surfer, a film about champion surfer Bethany Hamilton. The top-selling country female touring artist of 2008 - her Carnival Ride tour was attended by 1.2 million fans - started the North American leg of her Play On tour on March 11. Having already traveled to Africa with American Idol's Idol Gives Back and visited troops in the Middle East, Carrie recently established the C.A.T.S. Foundation to help with causes in her hometown area of Checotah, Oklahoma. In 2009, C.A.T.S. (which stands for Checotah Animal, Town and School) partnered with ACM Lifting Lives to donate musical instruments to her alma mater, Checotah High School. An eight-time ACM Award winner, Underwood's charitable efforts have influenced the songs on her new album, including "Temporary Home," which tells of a boy in foster care and a young mother in crisis, and "Change," which addresses the need to aid those less fortunate.



Defying Gravity, Keith Urban's third album to top the country chart and his first No. 1 on the Billboard Top 200, went double platinum and has produced two No. 1 country singles so far, "Only You Can Love Me This Way" and "Sweet Thing." Urban credited his wife Nicole Kidman for being his muse on the 2009 release, which features seven songs co-written by Keith. Born in New Zealand and raised in Australia, Urban moved to Nashville in 1992 and after fronting The Ranch started releasing platinum-selling solo albums in 1999. He topped the charts with singles such as "But For The Grace Of God," "Somebody Like You," "You'll Think Of Me" and "You Look Good In My Shirt." Having spent almost all of last year on his Escape Together World Tour, Keith will be playing various festivals through the end of this summer. A six-time ACM Award winner, Urban was a central force in the "We're All for the Hall" benefit concert that raised a half million dollars for the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum in Nashville, opening the all-star show with an hour-long performance and staying onstage while others took over the spotlight. Following the earthquake in Haiti, Keith and Nicole partnered with the Artists for Peace and Justice organization and have committed to funding a school in Port-Au-Prince for the next five years. The school will also help provide children with basic medical needs.



ZAC BROWN BAND

After years of touring and recording three independent albums, the Atlanta-based Zac Brown Band became a mainstream sensation in 2008. The band has landed three No. 1 singles so far from their platinum-selling project *The Foundation*: "Toes," "Whatever It Is" and the anthem that got it all started, "Chicken Fried." With success on the recording front, band front man Zac Brown ventured into two additional businesses under his Southern Ground banner in 2009: a record label, which launched with the signing of three Atlanta artists, and a line of steak rubs and barbecue sauces. A cookbook, with recipes from a restaurant Brown used to co-own, is also in the works. Food clearly plays a key role for the band – get-togethers with fans on the road are called "Eat and Greets." In addition to Brown, the band includes keyboardist Coy Bowles, violinist Jimmy De Martini, bassist John Driskell Hopkins, multi-instrumentalist Clay Cook and drummer Chris Fryar. The reigning ACM Top New Vocal Group headlined the *Breaking Southern Ground Tour* in the fall of 2009 and spring 2010 and will hit the road again in July opening shows for the Dave Matthews Band.



TRACE ADKINS

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

With 13 years of hits under his belt, Trace Adkins is still embracing new avenues to reach fans and making the traditional ones as strong as can be. A two-time ACM Award winner, he has been on the road since late January on a 40-city Shine All Night tour with Martina McBride and Sarah Buxton that runs through April 25. Just as the tour was starting, Trace became the first artist signed to Toby Keith's Show Dog-Universal Music label. (Trace and Toby toured together in 2009, having known each other since they

were on the club circuit in the 1980s). In November 2009, Trace became an illustrated hero in *Luke McBain*, a four-part comic book series. An Opry member since 2003, 27 of his singles have landed on *Billboard's* country charts, with 15 breaking into the Top 10 and three reaching No. 1 status. Three of his albums have debuted at No. 1 on the country charts. His concerts are a balancing act of lighthearted romps such as "This Ain't No Thinkin' Thing" and "Honky Tonk Badonkadonk" coupled with the emotional ballads "Arlington"



and "You're Gonna Miss This." An avid supporter of the men and women in the military, Trace's performance with the West Point Glee Club at last year's ACM Awards raised more than \$100,000 to benefit the Wounded Warrior Project through direct donations and download sales on iTunes. The Louisiana native expressed his strong political and social views in his book, A Personal Stand: Observations and Opinions from a Freethinking Roughneck, which continues to be a strong seller three years after its initial publication.


TOP NEW VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR

Female duos are rare in country music, but Bomshel has quickly proven how distinct the pairing of women's voices can sound. Fiddler Kristy Osmunson and singer Kelley Shepard, performing together for just two years, cracked the country Top 40 last year with the singles "Fight Like A Girl" and "19 and Crazy." Kristy and Kelley met at a multi-artist event in Michigan, where Kelley's performance inspired Kristy to ask her to join Bomshel, which had been performing in Nashville clubs with a different lead singer. Kelley, a country music fan since her youth, had been working with Brian McKnight in Los Angeles, where she moved after performing in the clubs of her hometown of Phoenix, Arizona. Kristy, an Idaho native, began fiddling as a four-year old in a group called Fiddler's Hatchery, performing during the summer in the U.S and Canada. She moved to Nashville in 2002 and formed Bomshel, getting the duo signed to Curb Records in 2004. That edition of the band landed a song, "The Power of One," in the soundtrack to the film *Evan Almighty*. Praised for their ability to move seamlessly between rowdy party songs and poignant ballads, Bomshel released their debut album, *Fight Like A Girl*, in October.

BROOKS & DUNN

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR

Kix Brooks and Ronnie Dunn have hit No.1 on Billboard's country singles chart 23 times on their way to becoming the top-selling country duo of all time. Also the most honored duo in country music history, Brooks & Dunn most recently received the President's Award at last year's BMI Country Awards. They have recorded 10 studio albums during their 20-year partnership, five of which have reached No. 1 status. Brooks & Dunn's most recent compilation album, "=18 ... and Then Some," scored yet another chart-topper for the duo. Since then, their sound has grown to encompass everything from stadium rock ("Honky Tonk Stomp") to straight-forward honky tonk and gospel ("Believe"). Their popularity has resulted in 26 Academy of Country Music awards, the most recent being the 2007 trophy for Top Vocal Duo. The end of Brooks & Dunn's ride, though, is coming to a close this year. Their 47-city farewell tour, titled The Last Rodeo, starts April 23 and runs through Aug. 8. After the tour, Dunn intends to release a solo album and Brooks will continue with his American Country Countdown radio show and write songs for a solo album of his own. The Academy will also be honoring the pair this year with an all-star concert tribute, ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn - The Last Rodeo. The taping will take place tomorrow night here at the MGM Grand and will air May 23rd at 8 p.m. ET/PT on CBS.

LUKE BRYAN

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP NEW SOLO VOCALIST OF THE YEAR TOP NEW ARTIST

When Luke Bryan's single "Do I" hit No. 1 last December, it also became his first single to go gold, selling more than 500,000 digital copies. Luke, who composed Billy Currington's No. 1 hit "Good Directions," co-wrote "Do I" with Lady Antebellum's Dave Haywood and Charles Kelley. Their band mate, Hillary Scott, convinced Bryan to sing the tune with them at a concert in Augusta, Georgia, which led to others suggesting that he record the tune for his second album. That album, Doin' My Thing, debuted at No. 2 on Billboard's country chart, more than doubling the first week sales of I'll Stay Me, his debut album released in 2007. To promote the new album, Bryan took on a tough road trip, performing nine shows in 10 days in October 2009, one of which was held on the football field at his high school in Leesburg, Georgia. The son of a peanut farmer, Bryan also launched a special series of one-off concerts that benefit charities or organizations in local farming communities. The country traditionalist spent 2009 headlining his Doin' My Thing tour and spent the beginning of this year opening for Jason Aldean. Bryan, who has toured with Kenny Chesney, Dierks Bentley and Trace Adkins, will again headline shows from June through September. Luke is also active with St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and the Make-A-Wish Foundation, among other causes.

People magazine placed Billy Currington at No. 10 last year

on its list of "Country's Sexiest Men" just as he was cracking the upper reaches of the Top 10 with his music. Currington's third album, Little Bit of Everything, hit No. 2 on the Billboard country chart and yielded the No. 1 singles "People Are Crazy" and "That's How Country Boys Roll." The album title refers to Currington's blending of various elements with country music, specifically R&B, pop and rock 'n' roll. A songwriter whose singing was mostly done in church before he arrived in Nashville from Rincon, Georgia, Currington has been scoring Top 10 singles since 2003's "1 Got A Feelin'" and "Walk A Little Straighter." Duets with Shania Twain ("Party For Two") and Michael McDonald ("She's Got A Way With Me") helped expose him to new fans early in his career. Currington recently founded his Global South Relief Foundation, which delivers supplies to locals in Central American countries. He gave a group of kids a guitar lesson in Jaco, Costa Rica, in December and spent most of 2009 touring as a headliner and opening shows for Sugarland.

ELI YOUNG BAND

NOMINATED FOR:


TOP NEW VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR

The Eli Young Band is carrying on the grand Texas tradition of country bands who know how to rock as well as twang. Named for lead singer Mike Eli and guitarist James Young, the band also includes drummer Chris Thompson and bassist Jon Jones. Eli and Young wrote eight of the 12 songs on Jet Black & Jealous, their first major label release after three independent albums. Formed at the University of North Texas in October 2000, the quartet spent eight years on the Texas club circuit, releasing their first independent album in 2004.

They built a larger regional following after the video for their single "When It Rains" made it onto the country music channels. The track itself would spend 30 weeks on *Billboard's* country chart and set the record for an independent release racking up the most weeks on the *Billboard* Hot Country singles chart. After the band signed a major record deal, *Jet Black & Jealous* landed the band in the Top 5 on the country albums chart and "Always The Love Songs" became their first Top 10 hit at country radio. Over the last



several years, the EYB has opened shows for the Dave Matthews Band, Alan Jackson and Jason Aldean, recently scoring a spot on Gary Allan's *Get Off On The Pain* tour. As a headliner, they have sold out 6,000-seat venues in Texas. On May 14, they will start the summertime *Country Throwdown Tour* with a dozen acts including Montgomery Gentry, Jamey Johnson, Ryan Bingham and the Dead Horses and Jack Ingram, who was the first artist they opened for while still in college.

BILLY GIBBONS

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

Billy Gibbons is the one and only guitarist for ZZ Top, the rock band he formed in Houston in 1969. ZZ Top played 17 dates with Brooks & Dunn last summer while preparing to record a new album with producer Rick Rubin. ZZ Top reinvented Texas-style boogie in the 1970s and with the advent of MTV, they produced music videos that were long on girls, guitars, cars and beards. Known for one of the most identifiable guitar sounds in rock history, Gibbons' appearance on Brooks & Dunn's Top 20 single "Honky Tonk Stomp" was one of several recent high-profile guest stints for the guitarist. He played in the band at the final *Tonight Show with Conan O'Brien*; performed Jimi Hendrix's "Foxy Lady" with Jeff Beck at the 25th Anniversary Rock and Roll Hall of Fame Concert; and recorded "Broke Down On The Brazos" with Gov't Mule. Gibbons' guitar also has been heard on records by Kid Rock ("Hillbilly Stomp"), B.B. King ("Tired of Your Jive"), Hank Williams III ("Trashville") and Les Paul ("Bad Case of Loving You"). The band's 2010 concert calendar includes dates in South America and Florida in May plus Eric Clapton's Crossroads Guitar Festival in June that raises money for the Crossroads center rehab program.


TOP NEW VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR TOP NEW ARTIST

The four-part harmonies of Tom Gossin, Mike Gossin, Rachel Reinert and Cheyenne Kimball define the sound of Nashville-based band Gloriana. It began as a trio when the Gossin brothers, who left their North Carolina home for Nashville, partnered in 2007 with Rachel, who had secured a publishing deal when she was 15. Soon thereafter, Cheyenne, who made her first record when she was 13, came in on vocals and mandolin. Producersongwriter Matt Serletic signed them to his Emblem label and hooked up the band with 10 of Nashville's finest songwriters. The results included "Wild At Heart" and the other tracks that make up their self-titled album, which was the best-selling country debut of 2009. It debuted at No. 2 on the Billboard country album chart and No. 3 on Billboard's Top 200. "Wild At Heart" was the best selling single by a new country artist in 2009. A second single, "How Far Do You Wanna Go," was one of the most watched country videos. Their popularity has reached beyond country music's borders as



evidenced by Gloriana receiving the T-Mobile Breakthrough Artist Award at the 2009 American Music Awards. In conjunction with the Winter Olympics in Vancouver, B.C., Gloriana contributed a new song, "The World Is Ours Tonight," to the official soundtrack album for the games. Having toured with Alan Jackson, Jason Aldean and Dierks Bentley, the quartet is now opening shows for Taylor Swift.

PATTY GRIFFIN

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

Patty Griffin was in high demand as a duet partner in 2009, recording "Seeing Stars" with Jack Ingram, "Beautiful World" with Dierks Bentley and "Waiting For My Child to Come Home" with Mavis Staples while preparing for her own venture into recording Gospel music. Released in January, Griffin's seventh album, *Downtown Church*, was recorded at Nashville's Downtown Presbyterian Church with Buddy Miller as producer and debuted in the Top 40 on the *Billboard* Top 200. Over the last two years, Miller, Griffin, Emmylou Harris and Shawn Colvin have toured the country as Three Girls and Their Buddy. Griffin's previous album, *Children Running Through*, received critical acclaim and contributed

to her being named Artist of the Year by the Americana Music Association. A native of Maine who acquired her first guitar at the age of 16, Patty got her start in the early 1990s performing on the folk music circuit in and around Boston. Several performers



have also recorded her songs, among them the Dixie Chicks, Reba McEntire, Miranda Lambert and Kelly Clarkson. She recently finished the first portion of her *Downtown Church* tour. This is her first ACM nomination.



RANDY HOUSER

backseat of a car lip-syncing to Randy Houser's "Boots On," the clip became a fast internet sensation and creative gold. Houser's team seized the opportunity and incorporated the comical clip of the youngster into the official video for the song, which helped push "Boots On" to the top of the country radio chart. It was Houser's first No. 1 hit, following the Top 20 success of his debut single, "Anything Goes" from his debut album of the same name. A native of the central Mississippi town of Lake, Houser grew up on the music circuit. His father performed in nightclubs in the Jackson area and later on, around Biloxi, where Houser joined him. After his father's death, Houser moved to Nashville where he was quickly signed to a publishing deal. Among his early co-writing successes was "Honky Tonk Badonkadonk," which he penned with close friend and fellow artist Jamey Johnson. Houser's second album, *They Call Me Cadillac*, is scheduled for a summer release. He co-headlined last year's *CMT On Tour* with Johnson and recently wrapped his first USO tour with Johnson and Kellie Pickler, performing for troops at camps throughout the Persian Gulf. This is his first ACM nomination.



JACK INGRAM

To get the word out about his 2009 release Big Dreams & High Hopes, Jack Ingram embarked on a promotional plan that landed him in The Guinness Book of World Records. The charismatic artist gave 215 interviews in one day, shattering the record for most consecutive radio interviews in a 24-hour period. After fielding questions from interviewers in the U.S., Canada, Ireland and Australia, Ingram returned home to Texas to perform for local fans in Dallas and Austin. Big Dreams & High Hopes, his seventh album, yielded "Seeing Stars," a tender duet with Patty Griffin, and the summer party anthem "Barefoot and Crazy." A native of Houston, Ingram began his singing career while attending college at Southern Methodist University, and he quickly gained a following across the Lone Star state. After a long recording career that started in 1995, he was named the ACM Top New Male Vocalist for 2007. Having toured last year with Gary Allan and the Eli Young Band and recently completed his Acoustic Motel Tour, Ingram will next be seen as part of the Country Throwdown Tour starting May 14. He also continues to act, having made a guest appearance on a recent episode of Army Wives and appearing on an episode of Are You Smarter Than A 5th Grader that raised funds for TOMS Shoes, which provides footwear to children in need.


Being named Songwriter of the Year

in the 10th annual Country Music Critics Poll in January was yet another accolade to spring from Jamey Johnson's 2008 release *That Lonesome Song*. The album was certified gold in early 2009 after it appeared on "Best Albums of 2008" lists in *Rolling Stone, USA Today*, the *New York Times* and other publications. A native of Alabama, Johnson arrived in Nashville on New Year's Day 2000, first working for a sign maker and an industrial pumping company before starting his own construction firm. Demo tapes and club shows landed him a recording

contract in 2005 and his songs soon appeared on other performers' albums. His first major breakthrough was with George Strait's version of "Give It Away," co-written by Johnson and named ACM Song of the Year for 2006. Jamey won that very honor last year as both artist and songwriter, taking home the prize for his Top 10 single "In Color." Late last year, Johnson



returned to the recording studio to start work on his next album. A three-time ACM Award winner, Jamey has toured with Randy Houser and recently completed a stint on Hank Williams Jr.'s Rowdy Friends Tour. 
TOP NEW ARTIST OF THE YEAR

The debut album from husband and wife Rory Feek and Joey Martin, The Life Of A Song, spent 50 weeks on the Billboard country chart. Not bad for a duo that only started performing together in 2008 – and that was to audition for the CMT show Can You Duet. Their debut single "Cheater, Cheater" not only landed in the country Top 30, but also made it into the Top

10 on the dance club chart. Known for harmonies, romance and unique arrangements such as their ballad rendition of Lynyrd Skynyrd's "Free Bird," they have recorded a follow-up simply titled Album #2 using the same producer, Carl Jackson. When not performing, Joey lends a hand at Marcy Jo's Mealhouse, a restaurant she and her sister-in-law co-own outside of Nashville, while Rory continues to write songs for his publishing



company. Rory, who arrived in Nashville from his native Kansas in 1995, has worked steadily as a songwriter ever since. Some of the hit tunes he has penned include Easton Corbin's "A Little More Country Than That", Jimmy Wayne's "I Will", and Blake Shelton's "Some Beach." Joey + Rory just finished an arena tour with the Zac Brown Band, where they played the role of emcees in addition to performing.

Lady Antebellum's second album Need You Now posted big first-week sales numbers when it sold 481,000 copies in late January. The album was released just as honors were pouring in for "I Run to You," their first-ever No. I single released in the summer of 2009. Timing could not have been better: The title track from Need You Now not only topped the country chart, but after several TV performances, it crossed over to the pop side and cracked the Top 10 on the Hot 100 as well. Charles Kelley and Dave Haywood, who were classmates at the University of Georgia, moved to Nashville and joined forces in 2006 with Hillary Scott, daughter of singer Linda Davis. Besides performing, the trio also clicked as writers, penning "All We'd Ever Need" and "Love Don't Live Here" during one of their very first sessions. The trio's first album, was the rare freshman effort to debut at No. I and go platinum. That out-of-the-gate success landed them on an arena tour with Martina McBride, followed by tours with Keith Urban and Kenny Chesney. The trio picked up its first ACM Award in 2007 for Top New Vocal Group. Since then, Lady A has been performing about 200 shows annually and this year has landed an opening spot for Tim McGraw. Lady Antebellum leads tonight's nominations with an impressive seven nods.

The titles of two-time ACM Award winner Miranda Lambert's songs suggest there's a fire in her belly. "Gunpowder & Lead," "Kerosene" and her first No. 1 single, "White Liar," all fit right in with her string of songs that chronicle relationships gone awry. Mixing elements of a small town girl and a rowdy headbanger, Lambert has made an impression and different media have picked up on one trait or another: People magazine put her on 2009's "100 Most Beautiful People" list and in 2008, Esquire named her its "Terrifying Woman of the Year." Working with producers Frank Liddell and Mike Wrucke, who have been with her since the start, Lambert took a different approach with her third album Revolution, recording 13 of its 15 tracks in a weeklong session in early 2009. When Revolution opened at No. 1, Miranda secured her place as one of only three country artists in the 19-year history of SoundScan whose first three albums debuted at No. 1. Her 2007 release, Crazy ExGirlfriend, was named ACM Album of the Year for 2007. Lambert, a Texan who now lives on a farm in Oklahoma, first came to prominence when she finished third in the first season of the televised singing competition Nashville Star. Earlier this year, Miranda opened shows for Brad Paisley, and in March she began her first headlining tour, appropriately titled Roadside Bars and Pink Guitars. She will also be appearing as part of the 2010 Lilith Fair this summer.

LITTLE BIG TOWN


NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR

After spending 2008 opening shows for the likes of George Strait, Martina McBride, Sugarland and Carrie Underwood, Little Big Town graduated to headliner status in January 2009 and spent most of the year on the road. They closed out the year in the studio recording their fourth album Little White Church, the title track of which was released earlier this year. The album that helped Little Big Town cross over into mainstream music, A Place to Land, was initially released as an independent and then picked up by Capitol Nashville. It yielded the Top 40 country hits "Fine Line" and "I'm With The Band." Hailing from Alabama, members Karen Fairchild and Kimberly Schlapman began singing together while attending Samford University in Birmingham. Both moved to Nashville in the mid-1990s and invited old Alabama friend Jimi Westbrook to join them in 1998. Arkansas native Phillip Sweet completed the band later that year. Over the course of three albums, they have retained their traditional country roots while pushing their music toward '70s-style pop-rock popularized by



groups such as the Eagles and Fleetwood Mac. The band was named the ACM Top New Vocal Group for 2006. Active in various charitable causes including the T.J. Martell Foundation, Little Big Town participated in the Nashville Light The Night Walk last fall, at which 2,500 people walked through the streets of downtown Nashville and raised nearly \$6,000 to support the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society. The band is among the headliners on the 2010 Country Throwdown Tour that starts May 14 in Tampa, Florida and ends June 20 in Mountain View, California.



THE LOST TRAILERS

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP NEW VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR

The genesis of The Lost Trailers was, appropriately enough, in church. Singer Ryder Lee and guitarist Stokes Nielson first joined forces as teenagers in a church band, naming themselves Ryder Stokes and bringing in drummer Jeff Potter. The addition of Stokes' younger brother Andrew on keyboards and bassist Manny Medina fleshed out the lineup. The band changed its name after several unfortunate incidents involving more than one equipment trailer. The Lost Trailers really came to life performing at one of Willie Nelson's Fourth of July picnics, and they haven't looked back. Their debut album, Holler Back, rose into the Top 5 on the Billboard country albums chart, driven by the success of the title track and the emotional ballad "How Bout You Don't." Known for energetic live shows, The Lost Trailers lived on the road headlining clubs and, once they landed a major label record deal with Sony Music, started opening for acts such as Sugarland, Carrie Underwood, Dierks Bentley and Kenny Chesney. The Lost Trailers just finished opening shows for Tim



McGraw and will join the *Country Throwdown Tour* this summer. For their tours, they have adopted the message of "Lean, Clean and Local," a campaign they started last year that translates into using commercial flights to cut CO2 emissions and partnering with Keep America Beautiful where local branches facilitate recycling at concerts rather than bringing a team to each venue. Prior to the earthquake in Haiti, The Lost Trailers had been involved in supporting the orphanage Danita's Children, an association that was stepped up after the recent tragedy.



DAVE MATTHEWS

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

In 1991, South African singer-guitarist Dave Matthews assembled the Dave Matthews Band, quickly developing a strong fan base and releasing two platinum-selling albums within the first four years. Now the highest-grossing American act of all time, the Dave Matthews Band also became one of only two groups to have five consecutive studio albums debut at No. 1 on the Billboard Top 200 with last year's Big Whiskey and the GrooGrux King. Matthews has also enjoyed a successful career as a solo artist, garnering a Grammy for his 2003 single "Gravedigger" and teaming up with several artists through the years including Béla Fleck and the Flecktones, Emmylou Harris and Blue Man Group. He made his first major splash on the country scene last year with his appearance on Kenny Chesney's "I'm Alive," a cut from Chesney's 2008 release Lucky Old Sun. An avid supporter of multiple causes, Matthews has been a member of the Farm Aid Board of Directors since 2001, and he and the band have donated more than \$6 million to various humanitarian and environmental initiatives through their Bama Works Fund. This is Matthews' first ACM nomination.

REBA MCENTIRE

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP FEMALE VOCALIST OF THE YEAR



In the year since Reba McEntire debuted her sassy single "Strange" at last year's Academy of Country Music Awards, the superstar's career has been on an astounding trajectory. Her first solo album of new material in six years, Keep On Loving You became Reba's first to debut at No. 1 on the Billboard Top 200. The album was her 11th No. 1 on the country albums chart, giving her sole possession of the record for the most No. 1 country albums among female acts. "Consider Me Gone" had a four-week reign at No. 1 on the country singles chart, becoming the longest-running chart-topper of her career and her 34th No. 1, a string that began in January 1983 with "Can't Even Get the Blues." Last year, Billboard, Country Aircheck and Mediabase named her the biggest female hit-maker in country music history. Reba's last 13 studio albums have all been certified platinum or better; worldwide she has sold more than 55 million albums. Having branched out into television and Broadway, Reba is focused again on music and just completed a tour with George Strait and Lee Ann Womack. A 12-time ACM Award winner, McEntire holds the record for the most wins in the Top Female Vocalist category with seven.


MONTGOMERY GENTRY

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR

With the release of Back When I Knew It All in 2008, Kentucky natives and honky tonk ambassadors Eddie Montgomery and Troy Gentry celebrated a decade together as a duo. The album produced three Top 5 singles: "One In Every Crowd" reached the top tier after "Back When I Knew It All" and "Roll With Me" hit No. 1 on the country chart. Montgomery Gentry returned to the recording studio in 2009 to work on their seventh studio album Freedom, which was released this spring. Ten years after making their Grand Ole Opry debut, Montgomery Gentry was inducted last year as a member. At holiday time, Montgomery Gentry worked on the promotion of "The Uniform of Heroes: The Taste of Support," which provides an opportunity for people to send hand-written postcards to any service member stationed worldwide. An album the duo released at Cracker Barrel stores, For Our Heroes, raised money for the Wounded Warrior Project. The singers are also active with the T. J. Martell Foundation and the Make-A-Wish Foundation, and Eddie works closely with Camp Horsin' Around, a place for chronically and terminally ill children. Besides their own headlining dates, the duo also appeared as part of Kenny Chesney's Sun City Carnival Tour in 2009 and is among the headliners on this summer's inaugural multi-act Country Throwdown Tour created by the organizers of the Vans Warped Tour. Named the Academy's Top New Vocal Group for 1999, Montgomery Gentry is also this year's winner of the ACM/ The Home Depot Humanitarian Award, which will be presented live on tonight's show.





DAVID NAIL

NOMINATED FOR:

SINGLE RECORD OF THE YEAR

David Nail tried moving to Nashville twice before he settled on staying in Music City. Now that his single "Red Light" has made it into the Top 10 and scored Nail his first ACM nomination, it looks like he made the right decision to leave his hometown of Kennett, Missouri. The son of a former high school band director who grew up on the music of Elton John and the Beatles, Nail strives to bridge the gap between traditional country music and more R&B styles like those of Lionel Richie and Ray Charles. His debut album, I'm About to Come Alive, was named after a song that Train recorded in 2003, and Nail lends it new life on his debut album. He also cowrote four of the album's original tracks, including "This Time Around" and the moody closing song "Missouri." A high school sports star, the second time Nail tried his hand at music he also returned to the ball field, helping a college buddy coach the Twitty City Knights in Nashville. Still sportsminded, Nail helped Chicago Bears tight end Greg Olsen raise more than \$50,000 last year to benefit the Greg Olsen Foundation -- Receptions for Research, an organization that raises funds for cancer research. Nail is opening shows for Miranda Lambert, who sings on Nail's sultry "Strangers On A Train," during her Roadside Bars and Pink Guitars tour this spring.

RANDY ROGERS BAND

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR

Together for 10 years, Randy Rogers and his Texas-based bandmates surprised Nashville

when their self-titled fourth album debuted as the mostdownloaded country album on iTunes and hit No. 3 on the Billboard country chart. Singer Randy Rogers, fiddler Brady Black, drummer Les Lawless, guitarist Geoffrey Hill and bassist Jon Richardson have earned a reputation for putting on an exciting live show, one that got Rolling Stone to put them in a list of 10 "must-see" bands. They are true road warriors, plaving more than 200 shows per year for the last several years. They have opened for Willie Nelson, the Eagles, Gary Allan and Dierks Bentley, taking a break last year from touring for their inaugural For The Sake Of The Shot Golf Tournament in New Braunfels. Texas. The tournament raised more than \$52,000 for Camp Sweeney, a camp for diabetic children. The band also participated on a compilation CD to benefit Hill Country Conservancy in central Texas. Their current tour of Texas and nearby states started in March and winds up at the end of May.



RASCAL FLATTS


NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL GROUP OF THE YEAR

Ten-time ACM Award winners Rascal Flatts became the first country act to perform a concert at Wrigley Field, the home of the Chicago Cubs, as part of their American Living Unstoppable Tour last year. That sold-out show was further evidence of their appeal as a live attraction. They have played 400 dates as a headline act and have sold nearly 6 million tickets. The ACM Top Vocal Group every year since 2002, lead vocalist Gary LeVox, bassist-singer Jay DeMarcus and guitarist-singer Joe Don Rooney have been together since 1999. Jay and Joe Don were in the touring band for Chely Wright, while at the same time Jay and cousin Gary had a local club act in Nashville. The three joined forces as Racal Flatts and within a few years created some of the most successful records to come out of Nashville in the 21st century, including "These Days," "Bless The Broken Road," "What Hurts The Most" and "Take Me There." Rascal Flatts has more titles on Billboard's Top 100 Songs of the Decade than any other country group. All of their albums have gone multi-platinum, with



five of their studio albums topping the country chart and their last four hitting No. 1 on the *Billboard* Top 200. Part of Rascal Flatts' participation in the Haiti relief efforts involved creating a video that spread the word about the need for help. Rascal Flatts has visited U.S. troops in Iraq on a USO Tour and raised more than \$3 million for the Monroe Carell, Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt University among other charitable works that were recognized last year with the ACM/The Home Depot Humanitarian Award.




DARIUS RUCKER

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP MALE VOCALIST OF THE YEAR

Darius Rucker's first country album, Learn To Live, debuted at No. 1 and generated three No. 1 singles, "Don't Think I Don't Think About It," "It Won't Be Like This For Long" and "Alright." As frontman for pop powerhouse Hootie & the Blowfish, Rucker shook up the rock world when their album Cracked Rear View became the biggest-selling debut in history with 16 million copies sold. A decade and a half later, country radio and fans embraced Darius with similar enthusiasm. He delivered a big thank you by performing a free show at the Grand Ole Opry for Jimmy Kimmel Live! in August. An avid golfer and intense football fan, Darius sang the national anthem last year before the game between the Tennessee Titans and his favorite team, the Miami Dolphins. He also became a spokesman for First Lady Michelle Obama's Let's Move campaign to encourage communities, families and kids to lead healthier, more active lives. Darius has been active with Musicians On Call, which provides live and recorded music for patients in healthcare facilities. Rucker recently finished a string of opening dates for Rascal Flatts and will be mixing headlining shows with festival appearances this summer. This is his first ACM nomination.



BLAKE SHELTON

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

The fastest-rising single of Blake Shelton's career, "Hillbilly Bone" featuring Trace Adkins, hit No. 1 on the *Billboard* chart not long after he assisted in reading nominations for the Academy of Country Music Awards. Having four of his first five albums reach gold status, Shelton converted to the idea of the "six-pack," releasing six-song EP collections in place of full albums. *Hillbilly Bone* is Shelton's first effort; he plans to release a second six-pack in late summer and is considering another collection for the end of the year. A notoriously avid user

of Twitter, Shelton has found several new ways to promote his music and connect with fans. Prior to the release of *Hillbilly Bone*, his website featured weekly videos with

him reading various "Top 6" lists. As a teenager in his hometown of Ada, Oklahoma, Shelton performed at weddings and talent contests until songwriter Mae Axton encouraged him to move to Nashville. After seven years of odd jobs and having a record company fold after he signed to it, Blake hit No. 1 with the single



"Austin." He has since returned to Oklahoma, where he lives on a ranch outside his hometown. Active with several charitable organizations, he and Miranda Lambert teamed up on Valentine's Day this year for a benefit concert to raise money for the Texoma Animal Improved Living Society and area veterans groups.




STEEL MAGNOLIA

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR
TOP NEW VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR

One of the most prominent trends in country music in 2009 was the growth in popularity of duets, especially the pairing of male and female voices. Steel Magnolia was founded on that concept. Meghan Linsey, a New Orleans native and Joshua Scott Jones, an Illinois rocker who first tried to establish a music career in Los Angeles, met in a Nashville karaoke bar. After singing a duet on Air Supply's "I'm All Out Of Love". the two knew they had a special chemistry. That proved true when the duo, a couple offstage as well as on, won season two of the hit CMT show Can You Duet. Meghan, who moved to Nashville the week after she graduated from high school, had previously opened shows for Toby Keith, Brad Paisley, Travis Tritt and others. Josh, fresh from the clubs of Los Angeles, received some airplay for his single "Long Lovely Night." Formed in 2006, Steel Magnolia scored their first Top 15 hit on the singles chart with "Keep On Lovin' You." The single is featured in the soundtrack of the recent hit film Valentine's Day. The duo has yet to release their first album, but released their simply titled Steel Magnolia EP in February.


NOMINATED FOR:

TOP VOCAL DUO OF THE YEAR

The third studio album from Sugarland's Jennifer Nettles and Kristian Bush, Love On The Inside, skyrocketed them to superstardom, reaching No. 1 on both the Billboard Top 200 and Top Country Albums charts and propelling them to headliner status in 2009 as they toured the U.S. and six countries in Europe. The Atlanta natives have landed five No. 1 country singles, the latest being "It Happens." Nettles performed at "We Are One: The Obama Inaugural Celebration at the Lincoln Memorial" and the duo participated earlier this year in a re-recording of "We Are The World" that benefits relief efforts in Haiti. Their live CD/DVD, Live On The Inside, landed another No. 1 in 2009 for the duo, whose overall album sales have topped 7 million. They also released the holiday collection Gold and Green, their first Christmas album. "Stay," from Sugarland's Enjoy The Ride, earned both the ACM Song of the Year and Single Record of the Year for 2007 and is the first Song of the Year to be penned solo by a female artist since 1972. Sugarland's 2010 North American tour, titled The Incredible Machine, begins April 23 in Primm,



Nevada, and will travel to more than 55 cities. The Academy's reigning Top Vocal Duo spent the early part of this year recording their next album, which is scheduled for a summer release.




RANDY TRAVIS

NOMINATED FOR:

VOCAL EVENT OF THE YEAR

The Academy of Country Music honored Randy Travis last September for his creative and commercial contributions to country music, presenting him with the Cliffie Stone Pioneer Award. Twenty-five years ago, Randy was the first of the "New Traditionalists," and in the years since he has sold more than 25 million albums and hit No. 1 on the country singles chart 22 times. His last studio album, Around The Bend, was his first secular album in a decade; both it and a greatest hits compilation landed in the Billboard Country Top 5. Carrie Underwood had a hit with Travis' "I Told You So" last year, nearly two decades after Travis' version of the song reached No. 1. The two performed the song together during Grand Ole Opry Week on American Idol, the show on which he also mentored the Season 8 cast that included now up-and-coming country singer Danny Gokey. A 10-time ACM Award winner, Travis' current tours alternate between country music and "inspirational appearances," where he and his band perform acoustically and Travis shares personal testimonies. He also continues with his acting career, recently completing the film Jerusalem Countdown.





LEE ANN WOMACK

NOMINATED FOR:

TOP FEMALE VOCALIST OF THE YEAR

A five-time ACM Award winner, Lee Ann Womack returned to the more traditional country music she sang early in her career when she entered the studio to record Call Me Crazy, her critically acclaimed seventh album. The first single "Last Call," about an alcohol-induced phone call from a bar stool, connected with past Womack hits such as "I May Hate Myself In The Morning" and "The Fool." Call Me Crazy reached the Top 5 on the Billboard country chart, continuing Womack's string of landing all her albums in the Top 20. In 2000, Womack had a mega-hit with her crossover hit single, "I Hope You Dance." That rare musician who studied the music business in college, Womack has been working on a new album that is penciled in for a summer release. The first single, "There Is A God," made its debut in November. Before her new album is released, Lee Ann can be heard with Alan Jackson on the Vern Gosdin classic "Till the End," which appears on Jackson's latest album, Freight Train. Host of the second annual ACM Honors gala in 2009, Womack made her film acting debut last year as one of the stars of the independent film Noble Things. The Texas native was part of the all-star lineup that opened the Dallas Cowboys' new football stadium, which led to Lee Ann being asked to join George Strait and Reba McEntire on their winter 2010 tour.

CHRIS YOUNG

NOMINATED FOR:
TOP NEW SOLO VOCALIST
OF THE YEAR

Using Keith Whitley and Randy Travis as inspiration, Nashville Star winner Chris Young tapped into a modern twist on traditional country to generate his first No.1 hit in "Gettin' You Home (The Black Dress Song)." His second album, The Man I Want to Be, hit No. 6 on the Billboard country chart this past year, the title track currently climbing the ranks of country radio. For his second collection, Young got the opportunity to duet with one of his heroes, Willie Nelson, on the Waylon Jennings classic "Rose in Paradise." The

grandson of *Louisiana Hayride* performer Richard Yates, Young spent his teen years performing in Nashville clubs, self-releasing an album just as he was finishing high school. Chris attempted to juggle college studies at Middle Tennessee State University and a performing career for a couple of years before dedicating himself to music. The Murfreesboro, Tennessee, native left home to play



regularly at a honky-tonk in Arlington, Texas, returning after an audition in Houston for *Nashville Star* brought him back. Young, who toured with Martina McBride in 2008, will be opening shows for Alan Jackson through May 23. He also headlined this year's Music 4 Music benefit at Ravenwood High School in Tennessee to raise money for the school's band instruments.








CLIFFIE STONE PIONEER AWARD

MARTY ROBBINS

With his smooth voice and boisterous stage presence, Marty Robbins proved just how far the boundaries of country music could stretch. Born in Arizona, Robbins learned to play guitar in the U.S. Navy during World War II. He then returned to his home state where he began to grow a following as a musical performer. He landed his own TV show, Western Caravan, and signed a deal with Columbia Records in 1951 thanks to one of his guests – Little Jimmy Dickens. Robbins' charted his first No. 1 single, "I'll Go On Alone," in 1953 and began an illustrious career that lasted four decades. Robbins was a master at performing all types of musical styles, from the teenage fare of "A White Sport Coat (And a Pink Carnation)" to the 7-week No.1 gunfighter ballad "El Paso." He dabbled in rockabilly and Hawaiian music while also charting country hits



like "Don't Worry," "Devil Woman" and "My Woman, My Woman, My Wife." A member of the Grand Ole Opry, Robbins was the last performer to play the historic Ryman Auditorium stage and the first to play the brand new Grand Ole Opry House in 1974. Robbins also used his big personality to land roles in both TV and movies, while offstage he pursued his passion for race car driving. Robbins was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1982, and he died two months later on Dec. 8 after suffering his third heart attack. His smile and versatile talent have continued to bring new generations of fans to his music.



MEL TILLIS

Mel Tillis may be well known for his stutter, but it's his talent as a songwriter and performer that earned him a spot in the Country Music Hall of Fame. Born in Florida, Tillis suffered a childhood bout of malaria that left him with the speech impediment that he turned into a charming part of his down-home stage persona. After studying music as a child and serving in the U.S. Air Force, Tillis moved to Nashville in 1956 to try his luck as a songwriter. Country star Webb Pierce took the Tillis-penned tune "I'm Tired" to No. 3, which earned Tillis a writing deal with Pierce's Cedarwood Music. Tillis crafted several more hits for Pierce ("I Ain't Never") as well as Bobby Bare ("Detroit City"), Ray Price ("One More Time") and Kenny Rogers and the First Edition ("Ruby, Don't Take Your Love to Town"). The songwriter charted his own first Top 40 hit with "The Violet and a Rose" and continued to perform his own songs, charting the hits "Wine," "Stateside," "Life Turned Her That Way," "Good Woman Blues," "Coca Cola Cowboy" and "I Ain't Never," which gave him his first No. 1 hit in 1972. Tillis branched out into movies, starring with

Burt Reynolds in W.W. and the Dixie Dance Kings and with Clint Eastwood in Any Which Way But Loose. Songwriting, however, continued to be his first passion. Tillis wrote hits for Nashville's new generation, like "Honey (Open That Door)" for Ricky Skaggs and "Diggin' Up Bones" for Randy Travis. In 2002, his daughter, Pam Tillis, recorded an entire album of her father's songs called It's All Relative. Tillis continues to perform today and was inducted into the Grand Ole Opry cast in 2007.

JIM REEVES INTERNATIONAL AWARD

KEITH URBAN

Country music's global reach expanded greatly when multi-platinum artist Keith Urban hit the scene. Born in New Zealand and raised in Australia, Urban has achieved international superstar status since he moved to Nashville in 1992 to launch his music career. He is known for mixing elements of pop and rock music with traditional country, appealing to a wide audience beyond the country scope. A six-time ACM Award winner, Urban is known for his many hits including several chart-toppers such as "Somebody Like You," "You'll Think of Me," "Making Memories Of Us" and "Sweet Thing." He continues to be a global music sensation, sharing his passion for country music around the world as one of the hottest touring acts in music. Urban's recent world tours have taken his show to six countries on three different continents where he has played to packed houses.



ROD Essig

MAE BOREN AXTON AWARD

Former ACM Chairman Rod Essig started his expansive career in the music industry as vice president and co-owner of Variety Artists International, a booking agency based in Minneapolis. In 1992, Essig joined Creative Artists Agency and headed to Los Angeles for a time before moving to Nashville, where he was instrumental in opening the agency's Music City operation. Essig currently helps to steer the careers of some of country music's biggest acts, including Tim McGraw, Reba McEntire, Martina McBride and LeAnn Rimes. He has served on the Academy's board of directors in various capacities for 14 years. During his tenure as chairman, the Academy rebranded and re-launched its charitable arm, ACM Lifting LivesTM. The Academy expanded its reach in the digital realm with fan voting for the Entertainer of the Year and Top New Artist categories and its presence on television with the top-rated *George Strait: ACM Artist of the Decade All Star Concert* special and significantly higher ratings for the annually televised *Academy of Country Music Awards*. Essig has also been a key supporter of the ACM Chairman's Ride (formerly called the ACM Charity Motorcycle Ride) since its inception in 2004.





CRAZY HEART

TEX RITTER AWARD

Country music truly is at the heart of the award-winning film Crazy Heart. The romantic drama stars Academy Award-winner Jeff Bridges as "Bad Blake," a broken down country singer/songwriter who wants to turn his life around after establishing a relationship with a young journalist named Jean, played by Oscar nominee Maggie Gyllenhaal. Bad Blake's professional career starts to look up when he reconnects with his old band member Tommy Sweet (Collin Farrell), who wants Blake to write songs for him. The movie soundtrack, produced by T Bone Burnett, featured work by late guitarist Stephen Bruton. The original song "The Weary Kind," written by country singer/songwriter Ryan Bingham, won both the Golden Globe and the Oscar in 2010. POET'S AWARD

CINDY WALKER

A member of the Country Music Hall of Fame, Cindy Walker might have just as easily become a Hollywood starlet. Her entertainment career began in stage shows in her native Texas, but she soon made her way west to Los Angeles where she talked her way into an impromptu audition for Bing Crosby. The legendary performer recorded Walker's song "Lone Star Trail," which became a Top 10 hit. That break began a 13-year stint in Hollywood, where Walker appeared in and wrote songs for Western films. Western Swing legend Bob Wills recorded more than 50 of Walker's songs, including "Cherokee Maiden," "Bubbles in My Beer" and "You're From Texas." Walker went on to pen hits for Johnny Bond, Ernest Tubb, Hank Snow, Webb Pierce, Gene Autry, Jim Reeves and Eddy Arnold. It



was Arnold who pitched her the song title "You Don't Know Me," which Walker turned into one of the most enduring country hits. The tune has been recorded by many artists, including Ray Charles. A charter member of the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, Walker died in 2006 at the age of 87. She willed the rights to her body of work – more than 500 songs – to the Country Music Hall of Fame® and Museum.



DON SCHLITZ

North Carolina-born Don Schlitz hit a homerun on one of his first cuts as a songwriter. Kenny Rogers recorded Schlitz's story song "The Gambler," which went on to become a massive crossover hit and one of Rogers' concert staples. Schlitz went on to find great success co-writing with Paul Overstreet for a new artist named Randy Travis. Schlitz co-wrote some of Travis' biggest hits, including "On the Other Hand" and "Forever and Ever Amen," which won back-to-back ACM Song of the Year awards in 1986 and 1987. Schlitz also crafted Keith Whitley's signature hit, "When You Say Nothing at All." A Grammy winner and member of the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, Schlitz has also penned hits for The Judds ("Rockin' With the Rhythm of the Rain") and Reba McEntire ("One Promise Too Late"). He was commissioned by President George H.W. Bush to write the theme song for the national "Points of Light" program. The song, "Point of Light," became a Top 5 country hit for Randy Travis.



ACM MILESTONE AWARD

BROOKS & DUNN

Few acts in any genre of music have charted as many hits, won as many awards and gained so many loyal fans as Brooks & Dunn. Since their first album, *Brand New Man*, hit the charts in 1991, they've gone on to sell more than 30 million records and chart 23 No. 1 hit singles. Their driving country style has been front and center on an amazing body of well-loved country classics over two decades, including "Neon Moon," "Boot Scootin' Boogie," "She's Not the Cheatin' Kind," "Rock My World (Little Country Girl)," "Only In America" "You're Gonna Miss Me When I'm Gone" and the 2005 ACM Song of the Year "Believe." In August 2009, they announced they will retire as a duo in 2010 and embark on a final farewell tour called "The Last Rodeo."

Tomorrow night here at the MGM Grand Garden Arena, the Academy of Country Music will honor the duo's amazing accomplishments with the all-star tribute concert, ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn – The Last Rodeo.

"Brooks & Dunn have defined country music for twenty years," said Bob Romeo, Executive Director of the Academy of Country Music. "With this all-star concert tribute, the Academy is honored to recognize Kix and Ronnie for their contributions to the country music industry, fans and to all the artists they have helped get a break."

During the show, Kix and Ronnie will receive the Academy's Milestone Award in recognition of their 20-year record-breaking career. They will be honored for holding the record for the most wins of any artist in the Academy's history with 26 awards in total, including three Entertainer of the Year awards. They will also be honored for holding the record for most Top Vocal Duo wins, with 15 awards, eight of which are consecutive from 2000-2007.

At tonight's award show, Brooks & Dunn are once again nominated for Top Vocal Duo of the Year and for Vocal Event for "Honky Tonk Stomp," their collaboration with ZZ Top's Billy Gibbons.

ACM Presents: Brooks & Dunn — The Last Rodeo will air Sunday, May 23rd at 8 p.m. ET/PT on CBS.






