

s the ACM Awards take the field this evening at the Home of the Dallas Cowboys, we're being led by an all-star team. Blake Shelton and Luke Bryan are making their third turn as co-hosts together on what will be one of the most important nights in Academy of Country Music history. Playing to a sold-out crowd at AT&T Stadium in Arlington,

Texas, and millions more watching at home, the 50th Annual ACM Awards will be the largest awards show ever staged on live network television.

Shelton and Bryan both won their first industry accolades at the ACM Awards and are both nominated again this year. They usually take a light-hearted approach to whatever they tackle, but each artist recognizes the importance of what they're undertaking tonight.

"This is the 50th anniversary, I mean what else can you say?" Shelton said. "It's at the home of the Dallas Cowboys, there's going to be 60-thousand plus people in this room. It's going to be the biggest stars in country music, and when I say biggest stars, I mean the past, present, future — it's all going to come together in one night."

"You look back, and there've been a lot of historic moments that happened over the past 50 years," Bryan added. "A lot of careers have really had the opportunity to get launched on the stage at the ACMs and a lot of great people show up and put on a great performance for the whole country, and it propels them to another level of stardom. It's an important awards show, and I'm certainly glad to be part of the history of it. A lot of artists have memories associated with the ACM, and I know Blake feels the same."

Shelton and Bryan have proved a winning duo, earning rave reviews from their peers and country music fans alike with their deft humor and genuine personalities. They've also got a fan in one man who is very accustomed to seeing great talent take the field in Arlington.

"When you see two guys that have worked as hard as they've worked and accomplished what they've accomplished, they make it look easy," said Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones. "We all know what a skill that it is. I'm excited. They were great hosts last year for the Academy of Country Music Awards, but on this day, it'll be really special to have them in our stadium."

"IMPROVING LIVES BY CONNECTING FANS, ARTISTS AND THE INDUSTRY."

That's the overriding mission of the Academy of Country Music — whether through the annual *ACM Awards* show or the organization's charitable arm, ACM Lifting Lives. In the 50-plus years since its inception, the Academy has grown from a regional Southern California trade organization to a national powerhouse dedicated to a higher purpose.

The Academy was officially founded in 1964 in Los Angeles when performer Tommy Wiggins, songwriter Eddie Miller and club owners Mickey and Chris Christensen teamed up with other performers, radio and record label executives to establish the Country and Western Music Academy. Their vision was to promote country music in the western 13 states and to support artists based on the West Coast such as Billy Mize, Johnny Bond, Glen Campbell, Merle Haggard, Roger Miller, Buck Owens, Wynn Stewart, Jimmy Wakely and Tex Williams. In 1965, an official board of directors was formed. The Academy hosted its first official country music awards show in 1966 (after three informal awards banquets held at the Christensens' Red Barrel Niteclub) honoring the industry's accomplishments during the previous year. It was the first country music awards program

held by a major organization, propelling country music into the public spotlight for the first time. Winners that year included Merle Haggard, Bonnie Owens and Buck Owens.

The Academy's signature "hat" trophy was created in 1968, the same year Fran Boyd was hired as the Academy's first paid employee. During the early 1970s, the organization changed its name from the Academy of Country and Western Music to the Academy of Country Music (ACM). The Academy also expanded its efforts to broaden the horizons of the country music industry, sponsoring the "Country Music Caravan" in Los Angeles and beginning its history of charitable endeavors with a "Concern for Prisoners of War" benefit concert (also held in Los Angeles), and, later, the ACM Celebrity Golf Classic.

The awards show hit the airwaves in 1972, broadcast for the first time in national syndication on the ABC network. Gene Weed took

over producing and directing the show in 1974, and in 1979 the Academy joined forces with Dick Clark Productions to produce the show. Dick Clark and Al Schwartz served as producers while Weed continued to direct. The Academy named Bill Boyd executive director, and he also served as the talent coordinator for the show. Under their guidance, the ACM Awards moved first to the NBC network and finally to CBS, where it remains today.

In 1995, Fran Boyd (the Academy's first paid employee) became executive director after her husband, Bill Boyd, passed away. Boyd had steered the Academy since 1980 and held many key positions before taking on the role of executive director that was later bequeathed to his wife. After 34 years of service to the Academy, Fran Boyd retired in 2002 and handed the reins over to Bob Romeo, who currently holds the position Chief Executive Officer. The Academy has grown leaps and bounds under Romeo's direction,

with the creation of new in-house departments (including Operations & Events, Creative & Content Production and Publicity & Marketing) as well as the signing of a new 10-year deal with CBS that will keep the ACM Awards on the network through 2021. The show is still produced by dick clark productions under the direction of longtime Executive Producers Barry Adelman and Richard A. "Rac" Clark.

After being staged in Los Angeles since the 1960s, the ACM Awards left Los Angeles for the first time in history and settled into Las Vegas at the Mandalay Bay Resort & Casino Events Center in 2003, then moving to the MGM Grand Garden Arena in 2006. The Academy also adopted a sleeker, modern version of the "hat" trophy that year, and in 2004 the organization implemented online awards voting for its professional members, becoming the first televised awards show to do so. In 2008, fans were invited to vote online for the Academy's coveted Entertainer of the Year award (after the professional membership had selected the nominees in that category). Fans continue to be part of the show today through interactive voting for Entertainer and New Artist of the Year.


While the Academy strives to foster high-quality entertainment through the annual awards show and the ACM Honors ceremony in Nashville, many events such as the annual ACM Party for a Cause® Festival and ACM Lifting Lives Celebrity Golf Classic serve a dual purpose

as fundraisers for the Academy's charitable arm. ACM Lifting Lives strives to improve lives through the power of music by supporting deserving charities through its annual grant cycle, as well as supporting those in the music industry hit with unexpected and catastrophic expenses through the Diane Holcomb Emergency Relief Fund. To date, more than \$8 million dollars has gone to a variety of causes nationwide — including Wounded Warrior Project, Stand Up 2 Cancer, Folds of Honor and Nashville's Vanderbilt Kennedy Center for the annual ACM Lifting Lives Music Camp.

In 2015, the Academy will mark a major milestone — the 50th anniversary of the ACM Awards. To celebrate, the ACM has partnered with Jerry Jones and the Dallas Cowboys, bringing the ACM Awards to AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas, on April 19th for what will become the largest live awards show ever staged. The show — as well as the two-day ACM Party for a Cause Festival at Globe Life Park — sold out in 18 minutes, paving the way for Country Music's Party of the Year® to invade Texas and continue the Academy's mission to connect fans, artists and the industry in creative and meaningful ways.





ason Aldean is the reigning ACM Male Vocalist of the Year, an award he's won for the last two years. He's riding high with his sixth-consecutive platinum album, Old Boots, New Dirt. The lead single "Burnin' It Down," raced to No. 1, reached platinum status and inspired his extensive 2014 Burn It Down Tour. Aldean won his first ACM Award as the 2005 New Male Vocalist with hits like "Hicktown" and his first No. 1 single, "Why." As a young man, he divided his time between Georgia and Florida, and signed to Broken Bow Records after countless club dates. His powerful duet with Kelly Clarkson, "Don't You Wanna Stay," claimed 2011 ACM Awards in the Single and Vocal Event categories. A year later, he repeated a victory in the latter category after bringing in Luke Bryan and Eric Church on "The Only Way I Know." That all-star collaboration achieved platinum in 2014, as did the title track to 2012's Night Train. With millions of concert tickets sold in his career, Aldean became the first country artist to headline historic Fenway Park in Boston, which helped him earn the 2012 ACM Crystal Milestone Award, Still blazing up the charts with smashes like "Just Gettin' Started," Aldean resumed his electrifying Burn It Down Tour in February. He will share a bill with pal Kenny Chesney on 10 stadium dates this summer.

GARTH BROOKS

arth Brooks mounted his longawaited comeback in 2014 with a blockbuster tour of the U.S. and an album of all-new material, Man Against Machine, Within months. it became the latest platinum-certified project in his long-running career. As the ACM Artist of the Decade for the 1990s, Brooks is no stranger to the winner's circle. He claimed 1990 ACM trophies for Album (No Fences), Single ("Friends in Low Places"), Song and Video (both for "The Dance"), as well as the first of back-to-back Male Vocalist awards. By the end of the decade, he embodied country music by dominating radio playlists, album sales charts and network TV specials, while racking up six ACM Entertainer of the Year statuettes. Compelling music videos for "We Shall Be Free" and "The Red Strokes" claimed ACM trophies in the mid-1990s as well. Brooks received special recognition from the Academy with the 1994 Jim Reeves Memorial Award, the 1997 Gene Weed Special Achievement Award, the 2005 40th Anniversary Milestone Award, the 2007 Crystal Milestone Award and the 2010 Cliffie Stone Pioneer Award. The proud Oklahoma native joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1990 and the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2012. He is the top-selling solo artist in the 20th century, with 135 million albums sold, according to the RIAA. His latest singles include the dramatic "People Loving People" and the poignant "Mom."



uke Bryan shook it for 1.7 million country fans in 2014, his best year of touring yet. An undeniable force at radio, Bryan carried a record-setting six songs from 2013's Crash My Party to No. 1 on Billboard's country charts: "Crash My Party," "That's My Kind of Night," "Drink a Beer," "Play It Again," "Roller Coaster" and "I See You." He also joined Florida Georgia Line on the feel-good No. 1 smash, "This Is How We Roll." In 2014, Crash My Party was certified double-platinum, while "Country Girl (Shake It for Me)" rattled up to triple-platinum status. Bryan won the 2012 ACM Entertainer of the Year award, in addition to the Vocal Event award for "The Only Way I Know" with his buddies Jason Aldean and Eric Church. Just three years earlier, Bryan picked up his first ACM trophies for New Artist and New Solo Vocalist. He's sold seven million albums and 27 million digital downloads in his career. This is Bryan's third year to co-host the ACM Awards with Blake Shelton. He toured in Europe for the first time earlier this year, with plans to launch the Kick the Dust Up Tour stateside in June. He'll be the subject of a summer exhibit at the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum. The album Spring Break - Checkin' Out, the final installment in a long-running series, dropped in March.



MIRANDA LAMBERT

iranda Lambert is the ACM's reigning Female Vocalist, a distinction she's earned five consecutive years. She has kept a high profile since the release of 2014's Platinum, which earned a Grammy award for best country album. A native of Lindale, Texas, Lambert claimed her first ACM Award as 2006 New Female Vocalist after releasing her fiery video, "Kerosene." Just one year later, her second album Crazy Ex-Girlfriend won ACM Album of the Year due to breakthrough singles like "Famous in a Small Town," "Gunpowder & Lead" and "More Like Her." She repeated in the Album category with Revolution and Four the Record, while "White Liar" picked up the 2009 Video of the Year trophy. Along with a double-platinum certification, "The House That Built Me" landed 2010 ACM Awards in the Single Record, Song and Video categories. She also won the 2012 Single Record and Song statuettes for "Over You," a very personal song written with husband Blake Shelton. Last year, she accepted ACM awards for Single Record ("Mama's Broken Heart") and Vocal Event ("We Were Us" with Keith Urban). Lambert's first four albums have reached platinum. Meanwhile, Platinum includes "Automatic," "Somethin' Bad" (with Carrie Underwood) and "Little Red Wagon." She's said she named the album Platinum because it describes her Airstream trailer, as well as her favorite beer, hair color and jewelry.

That smash single crossed over to pop radio (with rapper Nelly) and ushered in an impressive hit list: "Get Your Shine On," "Round Here" and "Stay," all from their full-length debut, Here's to the Good Times. A deluxe edition of that album offered "This How We Roll," with Luke Bryan on guest vocals. Just two years ago, Florida Georgia Line picked up ACM awards in the categories of New Vocal Duo or Group as well as New Artist of the Year. Hubbard hails from Monroe, Georgia, while Kelley comes from Ormond Beach, Florida. They met as students at Belmont University and found a common interest in country, hiphop and worship music. Look for them on Jason Aldean's Burn It Down Tour.



The Band Perry

THE BAND PERRY STAKED THEIR TERRITORY at country radio with Pioneer, the ensemble's gold-certified sophomore album. "Better Dig Two" made a bold statement of devotion while racking up double-platinum sales and climbing to No. 1. In addition, "Done" peaked at No. 1 and became a platinum-certified breakup anthem. The sibling trio of Kimberly, Neil and Reid Perry followed those hits with "Don't Let Me Be Lonely," a satisfying single that showed their vulnerable side. After returning to the Top 10 with "Chainsaw," the trio received a Grammy for their melodic rendition of Glen Campbell's classic "Gentle on My Mind." The Band Perry collected 2010 ACM Awards for New Artist and New Vocal Duo or Group on the strength of "If I Die Young." Written by lead singer Kimberly Perry, the melancholy track crossed over to pop radio and has since reached sixtimes platinum. More hits from their self-titled platinum debut album include "Hip to My Heart," "You Lie," "All Your Life" and "Postcard From Paris." The family band grew up in Mobile, Alabama, and made Greeneville, Tennessee, their home base. In 2014, they balanced arena dates on Blake Shelton's Ten Times Crazier Tour along with their headlining We Are Pioneers Tour.

Dierks Bentley

DIERKS BENTLEY ASCENDED TO NEW HEIGHTS in 2014. achieving his first-ever platinum singles for "I Hold On" and "Drunk on a Plane," Both tracks come from his Grammy-nominated album, Riser. Bentley took inspiration from the birth of his son and the death of his father to create the song cycle, yet made the project relatable to all listeners. Bentley set the pace for his career when his 2003 self-titled debut album prompted his win as ACM Top New Artist. Despite an enviable string of No. 1 hits and gold-certified singles - from "What Was I Thinkin'" to "Home" — he remains a risk-taker. In 2010, he issued the bluegrass collection, Up on the Ridge. Soon after, he balanced that with feel-good country anthems like "Sideways" and "5-1-5-0." Bentley is a licensed pilot and has lent his name to restaurants in Phoenix (his hometown) and Chicago, His Sounds of Summer Tour kicks off in June with Kip Moore, Maddie & Tae and Canaan Smith. They made the announcement in January by jumping into a freezing lake outside Nashville - one of Bentley's yearly traditions.



Lee Brice

LEE BRICE BUILT HIS MUSICAL FOUNDATION as a songwriter prior to becoming one of country music's most consistent artists. His newest album, I Don't Dance, debuted at No. 1 on Billboard's country chart in September, and its title track quickly earned platinum certification. He wrote the song as a wedding gift to his wife, Sara. As an artist, Brice's hit streak started with "Love Like Crazy," which spent a record-setting 56 weeks on the country airplay chart in 2009-2010. That breakthrough led to "Hard to Love," "A Woman Like You" and "I Drive Your Truck," with the latter winning ACM Song of the Year for 2013. As a songwriter, Brice shared the ACM Song of the Year trophy for cowriting Eli Young Band's "Crazy Girl." He's also secured cuts by Garth Brooks ("More Than a Memory"), as well as Jason Aldean, Kenny Chesney and Tim McGraw. A South Carolina native, Brice played football for Clemson University until an injury turned his full attention to music. After touring with Luke Bryan, Brice co-headlined with Chris Young early this year. His latest hit is "Drinking Class."






Brothers Osborne

BROTHERS OSBORNE WERE RAISED IN THE blue-collar waterfront town of Deale, Maryland, in a family of seven that enjoyed creating music. Their mother was a hairdresser and their father was a plumber, although he also wrote songs and played informal shows for friends in a shed behind the house. In time, he converted the building into a home studio for his guitar-playing sons, John and TJ. Then they formed a father-and-sons band called Deuce and a Quarter and started playing covers in local bars. Their repertoire ranged from Merle Haggard and Dwight Yoakam to Lynyrd Skynyrd and Bob Seger. After both siblings moved to Nashville, they formed the Brothers Osborne with TJ on vocals, In 2011, they landed a publishing deal with Warner Chappell and a label contract with Capitol Nashville the year after that. So far they have notched two Top 40 singles - "Let's Go There" and "Rum." Last fall, the good-natured duo opened for Little Big Town and released their debut EP. They toured with Lee Brice and Chris Young earlier this year. Hank Williams, Tom Petty and Bruce Springsteen are among their favorite artists, while they describe their own music as "aggressive, bold and fragile at times."




The Cadillac Three

THE CADILLAC THREE ARE NASHVILLE NATIVES who infuse their country music with Southern rock grit. Singerquitarist Jaren Johnston, drummer Neil Mason and Jap steel player Kelby Ray have known each other since they were kids. Johnston grew up spending many weekends at the Grand Ole Opry because his father was the house drummer. In the early 2000s, Johnston fronted the rock band American Bang and started co-writing for country artists, Keith Urban earned a No. 1 hit in 2011 with "You Gonna Fly," which Johnston co-wrote. Additional cuts include Frankie Ballard's "Sunshine & Whiskey," Billy Currington's "Don't It," Tim McGraw's "Southern Girl" and Jake Owen's "Days of Gold" and "Beachin'." He's also a writer on McGraw's ACM-nominated duet with Faith Hill, "Meanwhile Back at Mama's." After hitting the road with the likes of Dierks Bentley, Lynyrd Skynyrd and ZZ Top, the trio will be touring with Eric Church this year. Church and Urban's new duet, "Raise 'Em Up," was co-written by Johnston, The Cadillac Three enlisted Bentley, Eli Young Band's Mike Eli and Florida Georgia Line to appear on their debut single, "The South." The band followed that rowdy hit with "Party Like You." Look for more new music in 2015.


Glen Campbell

GLEN CAMPBELL CONCLUDED HIS EXCEPTIONAL CAREER with "I'm Not Gonna Miss You," a Grammywinning song that sheds insight on his struggle with Alzheimer's disease. The emotional ballad manages to capture his resonant baritone as well as his ability to share a story through music. For the first five years of a recording contract with Capitol Records in the 1960s, Campbell found little success as an artist, even though he was a sought-after session guitarist on the West Coast. In 1967, he finally established himself with the now-classic "Gentle on My Mind," which picked up an ACM Award for Single of the Year. In the late 1960s, he received backto-back awards in the Male Vocalist and Album categories, as well as No. 1 hits with "I Wanna Live," "Wichita Lineman" and "Galveston." Along with crossing over to pop radio, he branched out into film roles and his own television series, The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour. "Rhinestone Cowboy" brought him back to the ACM podium to collect 1975 Single and Song statuettes. His achievements were honored with the 1998 Cliffie Stone Pioneer Award and induction to the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2005. He is the subject of the Oscar-nominated documentary Glen Campbell: I'll Be Me.



KENNY CHESNEY HAS BEEN GIVING FANS THE GOOD STUFF for two decades now. In 1995 he reached the Top 10 with "Fall in Love" and "All I Need to Know," helping him capture the 1997 ACM Award for Top New Male Vocalist. In 2002, he claimed the Single of the Year trophy for "The Good Stuff" as well as a Male Vocalist award. He achieved the illustrious Triple Crown Award after being named 2004 Entertainer of the Year -- an achievement he repeated for 2005, 2006 and 2007. His multi-platinum projects include Greatest Hits; No Shoes, No Shirt, No Problems; When the Sun Goes Down; and The Road and the Radio, After selling more than 10.5 million concert tickets, the ACM honored him with the 2011 Crystal Milestone Award. The Tennessee native spent 2014 off the road to focus on making his latest album, The Big Revival, Lead single "American Kids" climbed to No. 1 and picked up platinum certification. In 2015 he'll team with Jason Aldean for a stadium tour, along with his own arena trek. Listen for new favorites such as "Til It's Gone" and "Wild Child." Chesney himself painted the bus on the colorful cover of The Big Revival.



Eric Church

ERIC CHURCH TITLED HIS ALBUM The Outsiders even though he's one of the most admired singer-songwriters in modern country music. The Outsiders earned platinum certification and a Grammy nomination for best country album, while its title track reached gold. In addition, "Give Me Back My Hometown" rose to platinum and topped the Billboard country airplay chart. He showed his diversity on the back-to-back singles "Cold One" and "Talladega," with memorable music videos to match. The North Carolina native eased his way onto the country charts in the mid-2000s with three Top 20 singles, but it was his live show that solidified his reputation as one to watch. He accepted the 2010 ACM Award for New Solo Vocalist after breaking through with "Love Your Love the Most" and "Hell of a Heart." Two years later, he won ACM Album of the Year for Chief, boasting smash singles like the platinum "Drink in My Hand" and the double-platinum "Springsteen." He also shared the 2012 Vocal Event win with Jason Aldean and Luke Bryan for "The Only Way I Know." Church will tour with Kenny Chesney this summer. He's teamed up with Keith Urban for a dynamite new single, "Raise 'Em Up."



Brandy Clark

BRANDY CLARK OPENED A NEW CHAPTER OF HER LIFE with 12 Stories, her critically-acclaimed debut album. The character-driven collection carried her into the national spotlight with numerous media profiles detailing her unusual entry into country music. Clark grew up in the small town of Morton, Washington. Her father died in a logging accident and her mother worked in the mill office. Clark was also employed in the lumber industry but dreamed of a country music career like her heroes Patsy Cline, Loretta Lynn and Merle Haggard. After steadily building her reputation in Nashville as an inventive songwriter who respected tradition, Clark gained a foothold as a co-writer on The Band Perry's "Better Dig Two," Miranda Lambert's "Mama's Broken Heart" and Kacey Musgraves' "Follow Your Arrow." She's also had cuts by Toby Keith, Reba, Darius Rucker and Keith Urban. A charter member of CMT's Next Women of Country campaign, Clark's clever video for "Stripes" introduced her as a recording artist. In 2014, she signed to Warner Bros. in Los Angeles and earned Grammy nods for best new artist and best country album. In addition to developing a Broadway musical based on Hee Haw with ACM Award-winning songwriter Shane McAnally, Clark will tour with Alan Jackson in 2015.

Dan + Shay

DAN + SHAY ENCHANTED LISTENERS with "19 You + Me," their gold-certified debut single. The duo selected the last lyric of the song as the album's title - Where It All Began. The project debuted at No. 1 on Billboard's country albums chart in 2014. Dan Smyers grew up in suburban Pittsburgh while Shay Mooney is a native of Natural Dam, Arkansas. They met at a late-night jam session at Smyers' house and found a musical bond in their harmony-driven singing and detailed songwriting. They cite Rascal Flatts, Keith Urban and Tim McGraw as musical influences along with '90s pop and R&B. The pair wrote or co-wrote all 12 songs on the album, which covers the emotional spectrum of love and new relationships. In addition, Smyers co-produced the album with Danny Orton and Scott Hendricks. The duo built on their early momentum with the breezy "Show You Off" and a subdued rendition of "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas." Following their initial success, Dan + Shay toured with artists like Hunter Hayes and Blake Shelton. This year they are headlining the Where It All Began Tour. 


Faith Hill

FAITH HILL ESTABLISHED HERSELF AS ONE OF THE MOST RECOGNIZABLE ARTISTS in country music by applying her striking voice to an impressive catalog of solo hits, ranging from "Wild One" to "Mississippi Girl." She earned her first ACM Award as the 1993 ACM Female Vocalist of the Year, thanks to "Wild One," "Piece of My Heart" and her multi-platinum debut album. She married Tim McGraw in 1996 and they ruled the charts with "It's Your Love," which won ACM Awards in the Single, Song, Video and Vocal Event categories. On a hot streak, she later secured ACM trophies for "This Kiss," "Breathe" and "Just to Hear You Say That You Love Me," another McGraw-Hill duet. Her 1999 album, Breathe, sold eight million copies. She shared the 2006 ACM Career Achievement Award with McGraw for their high-impact Soul2Soul Tours. She followed the double-platinum album Fireflies with The Hits and the Christmas collection Joy to the World. Her career album sales now surpass 25 million. A three-time ACM Female Vocalist (1998-2000), Hill has expanded her career into film roles, football themes and fragrance lines. "Meanwhile Back at Mama's" is her sixth hit single with McGraw. The poignant duet received gold certification and a Grammy nomination.



Sam Hunt

SAM HUNT GATHERED HIS COUNTRY, HIP-HOP AND R&B INFLUENCES for an unmistakable signature sound. His full-length debut, Montevallo, bowed at No. 1 on the Billboard country albums chart the same week that his platinum debut single, "Leave the Night On," topped the Hot Country Songs chart. Hunt is the first artist in 22 years to achieve that feat. He's also charted with "Take Your Time" and "House Party." Hunt grew up in Cedartown, Georgia, and seemed poised for a football career. Although he was the starting quarterback at the University of Alabama in Birmingham, and spent a brief time with the Kansas City Chiefs, he eventually moved to Nashville to pursue a music career. He'd been writing songs in college and found a publishing deal soon after his move to Music Citiy. He's landed high-profile cuts with Kenny Chesney ("Come Over"), Billy Currington ("We Are Tonight") and Keith Urban ("Cop Car"). Hunt found an early, yet eager audience on Spotify with 2013's Between the Pines, a mixtage of acoustic songs. In 2014 he joined CMT on Tour with Kip Moore. This year he's headlining the Lipstick Graffiti Tour. The album title Montevallo references a town in Alabama where Hunt goes to unwind.

In addition, they picked up an ACM Award for their stunning music video, "Tornado," and their first-ever Vocal Group of the Year trophy. Of course this perfect storm has been brewing for a long time. After several personal and professional setbacks, the band made a mark in 2005 with the gold-certified "Boondocks," a celebration of small-town life that remains a staple of their live show. After releasing the platinum album The Road to Here, they won the 2006 ACM Award for New Vocal Duo or Group and this year marks their ninth nomination for Vocal Group. Little Big Town is Karen Fairchild, Kimberly Schlapman, Phillip Sweet and Jimi Westbrook. The band issued the tantalizing single "Girl Crush" earlier this year.



Maddie & Tae

MADDIE & TAE MADE A MEMORABLE FIRST IMPRESSION with "Girl in a Country Song," the young duo's debut single. It served as a reminder that women in country music are more than just ornamentation. Maddie Marlow is a native of Sugar Land, Texas, and Tae Dye hails from Ada, Oklahoma. Growing up as fans of the Dixie Chicks, Marlow and Dye met at the age of 15 through a vocal coach and spent a summer in Nashville learning about music publishing. After interest from Big Machine Label Group, Marlow decided against college and Dye graduated high school early in order to relocate to Nashville. They wrote "Girl in a Country Song" with Aaron Scherz on St. Patrick's Day - and luck was on their side. The humorous, gold-certified anthem glided up the country chart and the duo's self-titled EP appeared in January on Dot Records. Their follow-up single is "Fly," an empowering song they wrote about inner strength and learning as you go. In addition to a performances on The Tonight Show with Jimmy Fallon and praise from NPR, Maddie & Tae are part of CMT's Next Women of Country initiative and will tour with Dierks Bentley this summer.



Martina McBride

MARTINA MCBRIDE INVITED FANS TO SEE ANOTHER SIDE OF HER PERSONALITY with her two latest projects. First she issued Everlasting, a powerhouse collection of classic R&B songs. After that, she prepared Around the Table, a compilation of her favorite party recipes and entertaining ideas. A confident performer and a compassionate artist, McBride connected with her core country music audience on the Grammy-nominated single, "I'm Gonna Love You Through It," which became an anthem for women and their families facing breast cancer. With such a powerful voice and a kind spirit, it's no surprise that this Kansas native is a three-time ACM Female Vocalist of the Year and an ACM Humanitarian Award winner. McBride is a hero to many of country music's female artists, thanks to her undeniable blend of femininity and empowerment. A longtime member of the Grand Ole Opry, McBride's career highlights include "My Baby Loves Me," "Independence Day," "Wild Angels," "A Broken Wing" and "I Love You." She has collaborated with iconic figures like Jimmy Buffett, Kid Rock, Dolly Parton, Ray Price and Bob Seger. In addition to an intimate theater tour, McBride was a special guest on George Strait's The Cowboy Rides Away Tour.





Tim McGraw

TIM McGRAW IS THAT RARE MODERN SUPERSTAR WITH A HISTORY that stretches back two decades. The Louisiana native nabbed his first ACM Award as the 1994 New Male Vocalist. That same year, Not a Moment Too Soon won the trophy for ACM Album of the Year, McGraw's mantle boasts two ACM Awards for Male Vocalist, five trophies for "It's Your Love" (with Faith Hill) and three for "Live Like You Were Dying." McGraw and Hill's dazzling Soul 2 Soul Tour was rewarded with the ACM's 2006 Career Achievement Award; the couple revived the concept in 2012 for a residency at the Venetian in Las Vegas. Platinum certifications continue to roll in, with the singles "Truck Yeah" and "One of Those Nights" reaching that honor in 2014, while "Southern Girl" grabbed gold. Last year he earned an ACM Video of the Year win for "Highway Don't Care," the double-platinum smash featuring Taylor Swift and Keith Urban. In addition, McGraw launched his high-energy Sundown Heaven Town Tour, named for his latest album. He's still grabbing listeners with memorable singles like "Meanwhile Back at Mama's" and "Shotgun Rider." Drawing on traditional country music, the single "Diamond Rings and Old Barstools" features sterling harmony by his cousin Catherine Dunn.



Ashley Monroe

ASHLEY MONROE ADDS A TOUCH OF MOUNTAIN TRADI-TION to her style of country music. Blessed with a sweet voice and an early desire to perform, Monroe held down a nightly gig in a country music revue in Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, at the age of 12. In her early teens, her father died suddenly. After a few years in mourning, she and her mother moved to Nashville. Monroe sang in the honkytonks, then landed publishing, management and record deals by the time she was 17. The label contract didn't work out, although a duet with Ronnie Dunn titled "I Don't Want To" did earn a 2006 ACM nod in the Vocal Event of the Year category. Meanwhile, Monroe gained momentum as a songwriter with cuts by Jason Aldean ("The Truth"), Miranda Lambert ("Heart Like Mine") and Carrie Underwood ("Flat on the Floor"). As a vocalist, she teamed with Lambert and Angaleena Presley in Pistol Annies, as well as Blake Shelton on "Lonely Tonight," One of CMT's Next Women of Country, Monroe is a regular guest on the Grand Ole Opry. She issued Like a Rose, an acclaimed album produced by Vince Gill, in 2013. New music is expected in 2015.




Kacey Musgraves

KACEY MUSGRAVES BROUGHT A FRESH PERSPECTIVE to country music with Same Trailer Different Park, a collection that received broad media attention for its candid portrayal of small-town life and open-minded social commentary. The endearing collection was named ACM Album of the Year and earned praise from NPR, Esquire, New York Times, Nashville Scene and countless other outlets. In 2014, she won Grammys for best country album as well as best country song for "Merry Go Round." The East Texas native began performing and writing songs as a child and later appeared on Nashville Star, Collaborating with friends like Brandy Clark, Shane McAnally and Josh Osborne, she co-wrote every song on Same Trailer Different Park. The project reached gold, as did the singles "Merry Go Round" and "Follow Your Arrow." Her publishing catalog includes Miranda Lambert's "Mama's Broken Heart" and Martina McBride's "When You Love a Sinner," as well as "Undermine" from ABC's Nashville. She is a charter member of CMT's Next Women of Country. In 2013, she opened stadium shows for Kenny Chesney and theater concerts for Little Big Town. After supporting Lady Antebellum and Katy Perry last year, Musgraves headlined her Same Tour Different Trailer series of shows in 2015.



Brad Paisley

BRAD PAISLEY HAS CHARMED MILLIONS OF COUNTRY FANS by combining clever lyrics, a sentimental heart and natural showmanship. You might call it a "Perfect Storm," to borrow the title of his latest chart-topper. The West Virginia native is a five-time Male Vocalist winner (2006-2010), as well as the 1999 Top New Male Vocalist. Paisley studied at Belmont University in Nashville and released the album Who Needs Pictures in 1999. He's won ACM trophies for "Waitin' on a Woman" (Video), "Start a Band" (Vocal Event with Keith Urban), Time Well Wasted (Album), "Online" (Video), "When I Get Where I'm Going" (Video, Vocal Event with Dolly Parton) and "Whiskey Lullaby" (Video, Vocal Event with Alison Krauss). A Grand Ole Opry inductee in 2001, Paisley forged lasting friendships with longtime members Bill Anderson, the late Jimmy Dickens and many others. Since releasing his Hits Alive in 2010, he's maintained a steady chart presence thanks to "Old Alabama," "Remind Me" (with Carrie Underwood) and "Beat This Summer." He's appeared as himself on ABC's Nashville and Comedy Central's South Park. Anchored by the gold-certified "River Bank," the album Moonshine in the Trunk arrived in August. His newest single is "Crushin' It."

Rascal Flatts

RASCAL FLATTS RACED FORWARD WITH REWIND, their newest album in a long and satisfying career. Last year the title track became their 29th Top 10 Billboard country hit in a catalog that stretches back to "Prayin' for Daylight" in 2000. That strong debut earned Gary LeVox, Jay DeMarcus and Joe Don Rooney the ACM trophy for New Vocal Duet or Group. For seven years straight (2002-2008) they picked up the ACM Award for Vocal Group of the Year, along with earning a 2002 statuette when "I'm Movin' On" was named Song of the Year. Since that time, they have raised \$3 million for the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt. In turn, the Nashville facility named its pediatric surgery center in their honor. The ACM presented them with the 2007 Humanitarian Award, while the Grand Ole Opry inducted them in 2011. Last year, the trio accepted the ACM's Jim Reeves International Award for promoting country music abroad. In 2014, they achieved a platinum single with "Come Wake Me Up," while "Rewind" and "Changed" rose to gold. This is their 10th nomination in the Vocal Group category. Rascal Flatts return to the road with Scotty McCreery on the Riot Tour starting in May.

Thomas Rhett

THOMAS RHETT CONNECTED WITH COUNTRY FANS THROUGH HOOK-FILLED NO. 1 HITS like "It Goes Like This" and "Get Me Some of That." Yet it's his undeniable stage presence that keeps loyal fans coming back. Rhett grew up in the Nashville area as his father Rhett Akins recorded for Decca Records. In college, Thomas Rhett decided to study anything but music after seeing his father's ups and downs in the music business. However, a friend encouraged him to try singing at fraternity parties across the South. At those gigs, Rhett dove into all of his musical influences - country, rock, hip-hop and more. His father, who had become one of country music's top songwriters, encouraged him to do a short set in Nashville just prior to another artist's showcase. Although it was a no-pressure performance, it caught the attention of EMI Publishing. Soon, Rhett had secured a Jason Aldean cut ("I Ain't Ready to Quit") and signed to Valory Music Co. His full-length debut, It Goes Like This, arrived in 2014. His publishing catalog also includes Lee Brice's "Parking Lot Party" and Florida Georgia Line's "Round Here." After getting his groove on with "Make Me Wanna," Rhett is touring with pals Florida Georgia Line in 2015.

Blake Shelton

BLAKE SHELTON IS DOING WHAT EVERYBODY LIKES performing in arenas, recording No. 1 singles and reaching millions of viewers through TV shows like The Voice, Saturday Night Live and 60 Minutes. He's come a long way since his 2001 self-titled debut album, which just reached platinum last year. Before becoming a household name, Shelton landed chart-topping hits like "Austin," "The Baby" and "Some Beach." Yet the sparks started flying with 2008's "Home," a No. 1 single that featured his future wife Miranda Lambert on harmony. He won his first ACM Award in 2009 when "Hillbilly Bone" brought him (and Trace Adkins) a Vocal Event of the Year trophy. Two years later, Shelton accepted his first Male Vocalist award. He and Lambert shared a 2012 ACM Song of the Year statuette for her version of "Over You," which they co-wrote about Shelton's late older brother, Richie. Shelton's staggering rise to stardom was recognized with the 2012 ACM Gene Weed Special Achievement Award. Lately he's shared the spotlight with newcomers like Gwen Sebastian ("My Eyes") and Ashley Monroe ("Lonely Tonight"). This is the fifth year that Shelton is co-hosting the ACM Awards. His newest album, Bringing Back the Sunshine, quickly earned gold status, as did his No. 1 single, "Neon Light."






Cole Swindell

COLE SWINDELL SET THE CHARTS ON FIRE with "Chillin' It." The song shot to No. 1 on Billboard's Hot Country Sonas chart and sold more than a million downloads. That payoff followed several years of selling merchandise for Luke Bryan on the road and paying dues in the songwriting trenches. Swindell grew up in small Bronwood, Georgia, and studied marketing at Georgia State University (that's their logo on Swindell's ball cap). After college he joined Bryan's crew and used that opportunity to watch how entertainers connected with crowds. In 2010, Swindell secured a publishing deal in Nashville while building his fan base in college bars across the Southeast. After a showcase in Atlanta, he signed to Warner Bros. Along with "Chillin' It," radio embraced follow-up singles "Hope You Get Lonely Tonight" and "Ain't Worth the Whiskey." Meanwhile as a songwriter, his notable cuts are Bryan's "Roller Coaster," Florida Georgia Line's "This Is How We Roll" and Thomas Rhett's "Get Me Some of That." His songs have also been recorded by Craig Campbell, Scotty McCreery and Chris Young. Swindell - whose given name is Colden Rainey Swindell - issued his selftitled album in February 2014, followed by the Down Home Sessions digital EP in November.

The Swon Brothers

THE SWON BROTHERS SECURED A NATIONAL AUDIENCE on The Voice, yet they had already cultivated a following through their family's band. Zach and Colton Swon grew up in Muskogee, Oklahoma, and spent many weekends of their childhood performing in area churches with their parents' gospel group. They also competed in local talent shows with a young Carrie Underwood, who lived down the road in Checotah. As the brothers grew up, their parents staged a family-style variety show in Wagoner, Oklahoma. Colton and Zach emerged as natural entertainers, singing material by Michael Jackson, Elvis Presley and Frank Sinatra, as well as country standards. With a lifetime of experience, the siblings auditioned for The Voice in 2013. As part of Team Blake, they made it to the Top 3. Soon the Swon Brothers signed to Arista Nashville and partnered with Mark Bright to produce their album. On a return visit to The Voice, the duo premiered their catchy debut single, "Later On." Emphasizing their seamless vocal blend, their self-titled debut album includes the poignant "Pray for You," as well as "Songs That Said It All," written with Charles Kelley and Dave Haywood of Lady Antebellum. This spring, they joined Brad Paisley's tour.



Carrie Underwood

CARRIE UNDERWOOD CAPPED A MAGNIFICENT VOLUME OF HER CAREER in December with Greatest Hits, Decade #1. The impressive collection marked the 10th anniversary of her American Idol victory. She's certainly not been idle since then. Her debut album, Some Hearts, sold seven million copies and won an ACM award. She also picked up trophies in the Single and Video categories for "Jesus, Take the Wheel" and "Before He Cheats," respectively. Underwood is an ACM Triple Crown winner, following awards for New Female Vocalist, Female Vocalist (three times) and Entertainer (twice). The albums Carnival Ride, Play On and Blown Away have kept her at the forefront of female vocalists. In 2013, she released a goldcertified concert DVD, recorded the opening theme to NFL Sunday Night Football and starred in a live broadcast of The Sound of Music. After wrapping her Blown Away Tour, she donated \$1 million to the American Red Cross. Her accomplishments prompted the ACM to present her the 2013 Gene Weed Special Achievement Award. Lately she's commanded attention with "Somethin' Bad" (a duet on Miranda Lambert's Platinum), while "Something in the Water" ushered in another gold-certified single and her seventh career Grammy. Her latest and most important project is brand new son Isaiah Michael Fisher, whom she and husband Mike Fisher welcomed into the world on Feb. 27, 2015.





Keith Urban

KEITH URBAN IMMEDIATELY SET OFF SPARKS with Fuse, which earned a No. 1 debut on Billboard's country album chart and sustained his superstar status. By the end of 2014, Fuse reached gold status, while "Cop Car" was certified platinum. Meanwhile, American Idol viewers admire him as a friendly and insightful judge. Early singles like "Your Everything" led to the ACM Award as the 2000 Top New Male Vocalist. That paved the way for "Somebody Like You," a landmark 2002 hit that became the decade's top country song, according to Billboard. He won ACM Male Vocalist of the Year trophies for 2004 and 2005, along with a 2004 Album of the Year award for the exceptional Be Here. He shared a 2008 Vocal Event trophy with Brad Paisley for "Start a Band," then accepted the ACM's Jim Reeves International Award in 2009. He joined Tim McGraw and Taylor Swift on "Highway Don't Care" in 2013 and their dazzling video won an ACM trophy. He shared a Vocal Event win with Miranda Lambert last year for "We Were Us." His new single is "Raise 'Em Up," a dynamic duet with Eric Church. Urban's annual We're All for the Hall concerts have raised \$600,000 for the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum.



Zac Brown Band

ZAC BROWN BAND JUMPED RIGHT INTO A NEW PHASE of their celebrated career with "Homegrown," the irresistible lead single from their first project in partnership with Republic Records, Big Machine Label Group, fashion designer John Varvatos' record label and Brown's Southern Ground imprint. The Georgia-based band picked up the 2008 ACM Award for New Vocal Duo or Group, thanks to the distinctive debut album The Foundation. Hits like "Chicken Fried," "Whatever It Is," "Toes," "Highway 20 Ride" and "Free" propelled it to triple-platinum status and led to a 2009 Grammy for best new artist. They maintained momentum with 2010's platinum album You Get What You Give. "As She's Walking Away," a duet with Alan Jackson, grabbed a Grammy and an ACM Vocal Event trophy. From 2012's platinum-certified Uncaged, they scored with "The Wind," "Goodbye in Her Eyes," "Jump Right In" and "Sweet Annie." In 2013, they issued an edgy EP with rock star Dave Grohl titled The Grohl Sessions, Volume 1, followed by their own Greatest Hits So Far... a year later. Along with vocalist and guitarist Brown, fiddler Jimmy DeMartini, keyboardist Coy Bowles, bassist John Driskell Hopkins, drummer Chris Fryar, multi-instrumentalist Clay Cook and percussionist Daniel de los Reyes complete the Zac Brown Band lineup.







CAREER ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Alabama

ALABAMA RECEIVED THE ACM ARTIST OF THE DECADE AWARD for the 1980s after winning the Entertainer of the Year award for five consecutive years. Combining their rock influences with Southern roots, the ensemble charted 51 Top 10 hits between 1980 and 1999, with 32 reaching No. 1. They also earned six consecutive ACM awards in the Vocal Group category. Alabama joined the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2005. In 2011, original band members Randy Owen, Jeff Cook and Teddy Gentry brought their mountain music back to country radio by singing on "Old Alabama," Brad Paisley's salute to them. In 2013, the



band celebrated 40 years in country music with the "Back to the Bowery" Tour and the tribute album Alabama & Friends, which featured Jason Aldean, Luke Bryan, Kenny Chesney, Florida Georgia line and many others. Their 2013-2014 run culminated in the September 2014 releases of the Angels Among Us: Hymns and Gospel Favorites album and the Alabama & Friends At The Ryman live CD/DVD. Also in 2014, Alabama frontman Randy Owen celebrated the 25th anniversary of his call to country radio to support St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis. To date, the "Country Cares for St. Jude Kids" initiative has raised more than \$500 million for the hospital.

CRYSTAL MILESTONE AWARD


Loretta Lynn

LORETTA LYNN REMAINS ONE OF COUNTRY MUSIC'S MOST BELOVED AND ADMIRED ARTISTS. Celebrated for her keen songwriting and downhome personality, she was named the ACM Artist of the Decade for the 1970s, an honor bestowed after she claimed four Female Vocalist awards, four Vocal Group awards (with Conway Twitty) and ultimately 1975 Entertainer of the Year — the first woman ever to earn that distinction. Lynn joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1962 and the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1988. The film version of her life, Coal Miner's Daughter, is an Oscar-winning classic. Lynn has captivated a younger generation as well, collaborating with rocker Jack White on the Grammy-winning Van Lear Rose album and championing today's female vocalists like Miranda Lambert. In 2014, Loretta celebrated her 50th anniversary in country music. New music is expected in 2015.

GENE WEED SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Luke Bryan

LUKE BRYAN IS EXPERIENCING A CAREER RUSH THANKS TO HIS DOUBLE-PLATINUM PROJECT, Crash My Party. The album ushered in a record-setting six consecutive No. 1 singles: "Crash My Party," "That's My Kind of Night," "Drink a Beer," "Play It Again," "Roller Coaster" and "I See You." In 2014, he performed for 1.7 million fans, marking his best year of touring yet. In January, he carried his music to Europe for the first time and announced a schedule of arenas and stadium concerts stateside. An exhibit on his stellar career will open at the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum this summer.



JIM REEVES INTERNATIONAL AWARD

Eric Church


ERIC CHURCH IS PROVING THAT MODERN COUNTRY MUSIC TRANSLATES ACROSS BORDERS, even when his biggest songs reference iconic American imagery like "Springsteen" and "Talladega." The North Carolina native introduced The Outsiders World Tour to Europe in early 2014, sharing his rugged, original music across 12 major markets and thousands of new fans. Church began his ambitious international trek in Dublin, Ireland, with dates following in Belfast, Northern Ireland; Glasgow, Scotland; Manchester, United Kingdom; London, England; Amsterdam, Holland; Cologne, Hamburg and Munich, Germany; Malmo and Stockholm, Sweden; and Oslo, Norway. His worldwide legion of fans is known as the Church Choir.

MAE BOREN AXTON AWARD

Barry Adelman

BARRY ADELMAN, EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF TELEVISION FOR DICK CLARK PRODUCTIONS, has been a tireless champion of the Academy of Country Music Awards as the show's long-time writer and executive producer, and has served on the ACM Board of Directors. He is one of the most prolific producers working in Hollywood today, with credits including the Golden Globes, American Music Awards, So You Think You Can Dance and Dick Clark's New Year's Rockin' Eve, among many other high-profile live broadcasts. He has received multiple Emmy nominations in his role as a producer and has written speeches for Presidents Clinton, Bush and Reagan. Early in his career, he also wrote for The Sonny & Cher Show and wrote the eulogy for Elvis Presley's funeral.






Tim DuBois

TIM DuBOIS ENJOYED A SIGNIFICANT SONGWRITING CAREER before developing Arista Nashville into a powerhouse label in the 1990s. His writing credits include ACM-nominated songs such as Alabama's "Love in the First Degree," Vince Gill's "When I Call Your Name" and Jerry Reed's "She Got the Goldmine (I Got the Shaft)." Under his leadership at Arista, artists like Brooks & Dunn, Alan Jackson, Brad Paisley and Pam Tillis picked up numerous platinum albums and industry awards. Despite his busy schedule, DuBois has given countless hours to the Academy of Country Music as an officer and a member of the Board of Directors for more than 30 years. His experience and wisdom have been instrumental in helping the Academy grow and transition. He currently serves as the ACM board's Sergeant-at-Arms. Following positions at ASCAP and Vanderbilt University, he is now a partner at Artist Managers Partners.

POET'S AWARD

Bob McDill

BOB McDILL WEAVES HIS INCREDIBLE STORIES WITH VIVID LANGUAGE, MEMORABLE MELODIES AND A WISE, RELATABLE PERSPECTIVE. The Texas native has written 30 No. 1 country hits since moving to Nashville in 1970. His rich catalog includes Alabama's "Song of the South," Alan Jackson's "Gone Country," Waylon Jennings' "Amanda" and Don Williams' "It Must Be Love." In addition, his ACM-nominated songwriting credits are Mel McDaniel's "Baby's Got Her Blue Jeans On," John Schneider's "I've Been Around Enough to Know," Dan Seals' "Everything That Glitters (Is Not Gold)," Pam Tillis' "All the Good Ones Are Gone" and Keith Whitley's "Don't Close Your Eyes."





Felice and Boudleaux Bryant

FELICE AND BOUDLEAUX BRYANT MOVED TO NASHVILLE IN 1950 AND HELPED ESTABLISHED THE CITY'S SONGWRITING INDUSTRY. Boudleaux Bryant matched his talent as a professional fiddler to his wife's interest in poetry to create a winning formula. Their catalog includes the Everly Brothers' "Bye Bye Love" and "All I Have to Do Is Dream," as well as Eddy Arnold's "How's the World Treating You," Jimmy Dickens' "I'm Little But I'm Loud," Roy Orbison's "Love Hurts" and the Osborne Brothers' "Rocky Top." Boudleaux died in 1987; Felice died in 2003. They were elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame in 1991.


50TH ANNIVERSARY MILESTONE AWARDS

MOST AWARDED ARTIST

Brooks & Dunn

THE MAGICAL PARTNERSHIP OF KIX BROOKS AND RONNIE DUNN SPANNED TWO DECADES of sold-out tours, classic hits and industry accolades. The best-selling duo in country music history, Brooks & Dunn have charted 23 No. 1 hits and sold more than 30 million albums. Since their debut in 1991, Kix and Ronnie have amassed some 80 awards, among them three ACM Entertainer of the Year trophies, 16 ACM Vocal Duo awards (8 of those consecutively) and the ACM Triple Crown Award. When they disbanded with "The Last Rodeo Tour" in 2009 to pursue solo careers, they had won a total of 27 ACM Awards, making them the most awarded artist in Academy of Country Music history.





MOST AWARDED ACM ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR


Garth Brooks

SINCE FIRST STEPPING ONTO THE ACM AWARDS STAGE IN 1990, Garth Brooks has made an indelible mark on country music history. Certified by the Recording Industry Association of America as the top-selling solo artist of the 20th century, Brooks is the only solo act to have six albums each top the 10 million mark in sales. He became a global superstar, incorporating arena-rock theatrics into his live shows and setting attendance records from Ireland to New York's Central Park. After announcing his retirement in 2001, Brooks returned to Oklahoma to raise his three girls, taking the stage only for charitable benefits. In 2009, he began the four-year run of his intimate one-man show at Wynn Las Vegas. After 180 shows, Brooks announced he going back on the road in 2014 and released his first new album in 13 years, Man Against Machine. Inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2012, Garth has won 21 ACM Awards, including ACM Artist of the Decade for the 1990s and six ACM Entertainer of the Year trophies, making him the most awarded Entertainer of the Year in the Academy's history.

ACM WINNER OVER FOUR DECADES

George Strait

GEORGE STRAIT'S QUIET TEXAS COOL AND CLASSIC VOICE HAVE EARNED HIM THE NICKNAME "THE KING OF COUNTRY." He has sold more than 100 million albums and charted 60 No. 1 singles from his 39 albums. His movie star good looks earned him a place on the silver screen in 1992's Pure Country, and his devoted fans continued to turn out in droves for his live shows, making him one of the first country acts to sell out football stadiums. Inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame in 2006, Strait was named the Academy of Country Music's Artist of the Decade for the 2000s. In 2013, George launched his "Cowboy Rides Away Tour," announcing that he was retiring from touring. After 47 shows, he ended his run with a sold-out show at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas. Strait was named ACM Entertainer of the Year for 2013, making it his second Entertainer trophy and 21st ACM Award over four different decades. Having won his first ACM Entertainer accolade for 1989, Strait's 2013 win in the category gave him the largest span — 24 years — between Entertainer wins in Academy history.



FIRST FAN-VOTED ACM ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR

Kenny Chesney

WITH THE PERFECT MIX OF LAID-BACK BEACH VIBE AND SUPERSTAR CHARISMA, Kenny Chesney has amassed a loyal following of fans who subscribe to his "no shoes, no shirt, no problems" take on life. The East Tennessee native was named one of *Billboard* magazine's Top 10 touring acts of the last 25 years, putting him in the company of legendary acts like Bruce Springsteen, U2 and Madonna. To date, Chesney has sold more than 30 million albums and charted 22 No. 1 singles. After a brief hiatus from touring the nation's football stadiums, Chesney came back refreshed with new music on *The Big Revival*, both a commercial and critical success. Chesney has won 11 ACM Awards during his fruitful career, including the ACM Triple Crown Award and four ACM Entertainer of the Year trophies. In 2008, Chesney became the first artist in Academy history to be named Entertainer of the Year by the fans, who were allowed for the first time that year to cast their votes online for their favorite artist.

MOST AWARDED SOLO FEMALE ARTIST

Miranda Lambert

TEXAS NATIVE MIRANDA LAMBERT MELDED GLAMOUR AND GRIT, making her one of the freshest voices of her generation. In only five albums she has established herself as a thoughtful songwriter, soulful singer and dynamic performer. Three of her collections have been named ACM Album of the Year (her latest, *Platinum*, is also nominated this year), and she has the most consecutive wins in the ACM Female Vocalist category with five. The top nominee at the 2015 ACM Awards with eight, Lambert is the most awarded female in the Academy's history with 18 awards to date.





MOST AWARDED ACM FEMALE VOCALIST

Reba McEntire

SINGER, ACTRESS, AUTHOR AND ENTREPRENEUR, REBA McENTIRE HAS DEFINED COUNTRY GRACE for more than three decades. She has sold more than 56 million albums and has charted 35 No. 1 hits. Her commanding stage presence and Broadway-style productions have been a big hit worldwide, selling more than 9 million tickets and earning Reba the title of Boxscore's top female country touring artist. A member of the Country Music Hall of Fame, Reba is also the longest-running host of the Academy of Country Music Awards, helming the show a record 14 times. She has won a total of 13 ACM Awards and is one of only eight female acts to win ACM Entertainer of the Year. To date, Reba has won seven trophies for ACM Female Vocalist of the Year, making her the most awarded Female Vocalist winner in the Academy's 50-year history.



YOUNGEST ACM
ENTERTAINER OF THE YEAR

Taylor Swift

SUPERSTAR TAYLOR SWIFT HAS ACHIEVED HEIGHTS ACROSS ALL MUSICAL GENRES in way that no country artist has before her. The youngest artist ever to win the Grammy for Album of the Year, Swift has harnessed the power of social media and has turned her insightful songwriting and theatrical stage show into a string of record setting feats through her five albums, including her latest multi-platinum seller 1989. One of the top-selling digital artists of all time, the 25-year-old Swift has sold more than 40 million records and was named one of *Time* magazine's "100 Most Influential People in the World." Among her countless accolades are eight ACM Awards, including two for Entertainer of the Year — making her one of only eight female acts to hold the title, and only the second to win it twice. She won her first Entertainer trophy at 21, making her the youngest ACM Entertainer of the Year in the Academy's history.


