





I'm excited to share with you the premiere *BizBuzz* lifestyle insert! I hope you enjoy it, and do let us know if you'd like more *BizBuzz* in future issues!

Now, let's bring you up to speed:

The Green Council is moving forward with guidelines for eco-responsible entertainment.

We plan to change our industry to a problem-SOLVER that influences viewers around the world to find solutions, too.

We worked hard for California Proposition 28, which brings arts and music education back into K-12 public schools — at no extra cost to the taxpayer — a real win/win.

Finally! The American Music Fairness Act was introduced in the Senate. High-profile SAG-AFTRA members stepped up on behalf of journeyman recording artists robbed of royalties by AM/FM radio with testimonials, recorded videos and signed letters to Congress.

The Performing Artist Tax Parity Act has new energy in the House, with a lot of representative co-signatures and a chance of passing before the end of the session, meaning better tax deductions for our middle-class performers!

Tell your congressperson to support PATPA!

The Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair Act, or CROWN Act, is gaining national recognition and support from Senate leadership. Hair equality at work and school is foundational to acceptance of the beautifully diverse threads that make up the fabric of the human experience.

While we're on the subject of acceptance, there has been an unacceptable public outburst of antisemitism by a member. SAG-AFTRA has zero tolerance for racism of any kind!

If you choose hate over love or instigate violence of any kind for any reason, you are prejudiced and guilty of discrimination.

I continue to fight on behalf of our members who feel discriminated against because of their COVID unvaccinated or unboosted status, which is keeping them from working in many major studio productions.

As a result of this lingering policy, many performers have lost their representation, their medical benefits and their livelihoods.

We want to take the pulse of the entire member body on this issue and many more, so watch for the national SAG-AFTRA survey, and answer all the questions to help our National Board best represent you.

For those members not being fairly considered by studios with regards to their religious or health exemptions, help is on the way!

As promised when I was elected, new SAG-AFTRA Senior Health Plans are rolling out! These user-friendly programs will be available by Jan 1. I am so thrilled to say that help is on the horizon for our senior community.

Our work with Actors & Athletes: Unions

for Democracy helped get out the vote in many communities. Check out this great panel discussion at sagaftra.org/videos or youtube.com/sagaftra.

I recently appointed the National Self-Tape Committee to make recommendations that will inform our TV/Theatrical negotiating work as we define digital-age auditioning!

Many want to open up the rules on local awards, while maintaining the prestige of our important national awards like the Life Achievement and George Heller awards. I've asked the National Honors and Tributes Committee to set guidelines for locals to be able to recognize members within their local.

Now, it's time for all of us to let old grudges drop and MOVE ON!

As the holiday season unfolds, remember that letting go is a valuable life lesson and forgiveness is invaluable.



hank you. Yes, you. As we enter the holiday season, I am overcome with gratitude for each and every one of you. We are living in very trying times, and yet each of us — actors, singers, dancers, broadcasters, stunt performers and creatives of all types — have dedicated our lives and livelihoods to entertaining and educating our brothers, sisters and siblings across the globe. You are the union — SAG-AFTRA does not exist without you.

My gratitude for our union was compounded when I met performers from all over the world at the International Federation of Actors (FIA) recently. It became clear that the structure, protections and support of SAG-AFTRA are unparalleled. We have, of course, a multitude of issues on our own turf. But even though we still struggle, it's important to remember that the hard work and dedication of SAG-AFTRA members, leaders and staff have created the most substantial and consequential artists union in the history of the performing arts.

SAG-AFTRA, and all that we do, echoes across the globe, and when performers in other countries find themselves confronting substantial barriers created to prevent them from being a part of or forming a union, they look to us as an example of what can be achieved.

It was incredibly heartening to connect with our sibling unions across the world and see firsthand how our global solidarity ensures that SAG-AFTRA members receive the protections and compensation they deserve when working overseas or when their content is distributed globally. Our foreign royalties program has secured tens of millions of dollars for our members, because no matter when or where you work, SAG-AFTRA makes sure you get paid. Period.

The domestic and international challenges performers face are fierce, and the opposition is always ready to tear down progress. But, the economy needs our myriad skills — effective communication, storytelling and bringing to light stories that have often been invisible or erased. Our efforts to support these ideas are sustained and sincere, and, as we continue to lay new groundwork and guidelines for an ever-changing domestic and global marketplace, we must remain focused, vigilant and flexible.

Creating and maintaining a healthy and vibrant union also means that each of us must engage beyond our personal circumstances and careers. Prior to the national election, SAG-AFTRA made voting rights a centerpiece of activism with a tremendous first meeting between union performers and NFL Players Association representatives. We also encouraged members to show up for issues that affect our communities, like Prop 28, which will put nearly \$1 billion annually into K-12 California schools — the largest investment in educational arts in decades.

Your participation is crucial when it comes to sustaining the union and keeping it focused on the future. So, please, I implore you to attend the wages and working conditions (W&W) meetings to give your feedback about what to tackle in our upcoming TV/Theatrical negotiations. Check your email for dates and details.

Life and careers can be tough, but know that SAG-AFTRA is dedicated to providing the tools, information and support to all members. That's my mission, too, and in the coming months, with gratitude, I look forward to even more progress on the issues affecting you.

Fellow Members of SAG-AFTRA,

he holidays and the start of a new year are fast approaching, and, no doubt like you, these annual milestones always give me pause for reflection and recalibration.

First, I want to say how proud I am of all the SAG-AFTRA members and our staff. Thanks to the determination and hard work of leadership and everyone on the union team, some truly groundbreaking rights have been secured for all performers, and that fight continues into the new year, with the promise of further gains.

Hotbed issue alert: I have been following the advancements and restructuring of guidelines for self-taping, in particular. We are all aware that due to the lockdown restrictions of the pandemic, auditioning received an overhaul to allow performers to continue to find work. Now that technology is embedded in the process, and while many prefer this highly individualistic creation method, many others of us find old-school, inperson auditions more satisfying and a more enriching experience. And, some of us book more jobs! As we move forward into fewer restrictions, and as a member of the newly formed National Self-Tape Committee, I am keeping engaged with this issue to ensure divergent viewpoints are heard and included.

Equally essential, I believe, is engaging with SAG-AFTRA leadership to ensure that as segments of our industry grapple with health concerns for all performers, dropping some guidelines of protection and reinstating others, that we put forth the most sensible guidelines that benefit the greatest number of performers. We all have to make our own choices based on the majority opinion, and I'm looking forward to reviewing the results of the poll recently put out that asks each member to voice their concerns on this topic.

This is the main point, in fact, of everything I've reflected on for this past year: engagement. When members take the time to read the SAG-AFTRA positions on topics that affect their lives and career. and then make sure they cast their votes and make their voices heard - this is how we all win in the end. Much like the general election that just concluded, each of us must engage or we are leaving ourselves and our world in the hands of others alone. I pray that we union members consistently show up for our own elections, as well as for our nation only by being heard will any progress be made.



Dear Member.

fter a couple of unprecedented and challenging years, I am very pleased to report that planning is well underway for the reopening of all SAG-AFTRA offices on Jan. 30.

The return to office will be an orderly and phased-in process, as we replace resource conservation with a period of moderation. In-person events at our offices will gradually resume over the succeeding weeks. It is evident in the restrictions on self-taping we have been negotiating into our contracts as well as the new exclusivity provisions with the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers and Netflix. It all begins with you, so make your voice heard.

Lastly, as this is our last issue of SAG-AFTRA magazine for 2022, I'd like to wish you happy holidays. May you find peace and joy throughout the season and in the new year.

AG-AFTRA members voted overwhelmingly in August to ratify the 2022 SAG-AFTRA Netflix Agreement. The vote was 89.03% in favor of the new contract. Highlights of the agreement include:

- A new Albuquerque Background Actor Zone is established within a 30-mile radius around Albuquerque City Hall. This represents the first new background zone in 24 years.
- For the first time under any agreement, stunt coordinators will be paid a fixed residual for the continued exhibition on Netflix of a high-budget streaming program produced under the Netflix Agreement.
- The Netflix Dubbing Agreement has been expanded to include dubbing into Spanish. The terms for Spanish-language

- dubbing will match the terms that apply to English dubbing.
- The agreement includes major improvements in options and exclusivity rules for series regulars below the new money breaks, which have substantially increased. It creates a new "conflict-free window" of at least three months during each season, in which performers may accept a permitted appearance on another show or network without first confirming availability and potential scheduling with Netflix.

The SAG-AFTRA National Board approved the tentative contract on Aug. 8 at a special meeting and overwhelmingly recommended that members vote to ratify it. The Netflix agreement applies to scripted, dramatic episodic and feature-length productions made by Netflix Studios LLC.

New Exclusivity Terms Reached with AMPTP

Series regulars will have more freedom to take other work, after SAG-AFTRA and the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers reached an agreement on new exclusivity terms. The agreement, which was approved by the SAG-AFTRA National Board on Aug. 20 — with more than 95% of the board voting in favor — will apply to work under contracts entered into on or after Jan. 1, 2023. Among the key points:

The agreement creates a "conflict-free window" of at least three months during each season, in which performers may accept a permitted appearance on another show or network without first confirming

National Board Preps for TV/Theatrical Negotiations, Expands Podcast Coverage and Affirms Self-Tape Limits

At its Oct. 22 videoconference plenary, the SAG-AFTRA National Board appointed members of the 2023 TV/
Theatrical Wages and Working Conditions Plenary and Negotiating Committee, adopted a resolution affirming restrictions on self-tapes under the low budget agreements, and announced a set of new podcast-specific contracts.

There are now two options for podcasters: the MicroPod Agreement for podcasts that generate less than \$10,000 of income per year or season, and the Independent Podcast Agreement for podcasts that generate \$10,000 or more in earnings. More information on the new Podcast Contracts can be found at sagaftra.org/podcastcontracts.

The Board unanimously voted to appoint members of the 2023 TV/
Theatrical Wages and Working Conditions
Plenary and Negotiating Committee, which will be chaired by SAG-AFTRA President
Fran Drescher.

The committee will oversee the member-led wages and working conditions process and the subsequent negotiations for successor agreements to the TV/Theatrical Contracts during bargaining expected to commence in 2023. SAG-AFTRA National Executive Director Duncan Crabtree-Ireland will serve as chief negotiator of the contracts with Chief

Contracts Officer Ray Rodriguez as lead negotiator.

SAG-AFTRA members also continued their work of putting in place additional self-tape protections for members. The Board adopted a joint resolution by the Low Budget Committee and the TV/ Theatrical Standing Committee that affirms page restrictions on all self-tapes under the low budget agreements. In addition, a newly seated Self-Tape Committee will coordinate the ongoing work of various union committees around self-taping.

Drescher updated the Board about efforts to get out the vote and announced a panel discussion on voting and voting rights held in partnership with the National Football League Players Association, Rock the Vote and the Brennan Center.

She updated the Board on the activities of the Green Council, noting a number of new members and the group's focused mission of banning single-use plastic on sets and onscreen.

On the legislative front, Drescher reported on efforts to support the American Music Fairness Act, the CROWN Act and the Performing Artists Tax Parity Act. The American Music Fairness Act will ensure that singers and musicians are paid when their work is played on AM/FM radio. The CROWN

Act prohibits discrimination based on a person's hair texture for all federally assisted programs, housing programs, public accommodations and employment. Drescher noted that a statement of support for this legislation, signed by members of the National Board and dozens of influential performers, was delivered to Congress.

Crabtree-Ireland updated the Board on the status of several contracts, noting that both the Network Television Code and Netflix Agreements had been ratified by members since the last National Board plenary.

He also reported that since its introduction less than a year ago, there have been more than \$6 million in covered earnings under the Influencer Agreement, plus even more under the Influencer Waiver. He noted that the union is actively investigating and acting on developing technologies including AI, the metaverse, NFTs and other technologies to ensure SAG-AFTRA members are protected and can take advantage of newly developing areas of work.

In the finance report, Secretary-Treasurer Joely Fisher and Chief Financial Officer Arianna Ozzanto presented results for the first quarter of fiscal year 2023, noting that the union is on solid financial footing and tracking favorable to plan.



The Summer of Labor and Hip-Hop

Since announcing their partnership in February 2022, SAG-AFTRA and the Hip-Hop Alliance made two special public appearances during the summer. The Alliance's mission is to promote and secure the strongest protections for its members and to extend union resources to all creators in hip-hop and R&B.

SAG-AFTRA Vice President, Recording Artists/Singers and HHA Board of Trustees member Janice Pendarvis, alongside HHA founders Kurtis Blow, Chuck D and Doctor Bob Lee, and several other HHA members, attended the 113th NAACP National Convention on July 20. The union sponsored the convention's 53rd annual labor luncheon, *Two Movements: One Goal*, where Pendarvis gave opening remarks and both parties formally signed a memorandum of understanding. Chuck D was also a guest speaker at the labor workshop, *This Is Power: Workers Organizing for Solidarity and a Voice in the Workplace*, where he discussed HHA's ongoing organizing work in the hip-hop community.

The two organizations were also present at the 2022 New York Labor Day Parade & March on Sept. 10. The marchers, made up of SAG-AFTRA member leaders, New York Local members and HHA members, were greeted by state and government officials (see page 94).

Health Plan to Reimburse Travel for Abortion Services

Since the U.S. Supreme Court's Dobbs decision, which overturned Roe v. Wade, many people have been understandably concerned about the health implications. To help, the SAG-AFTRA Health Plan will now reimburse participants for travel needed to access reproductive health care in other states if it's not available in their state of residence.

Starting Aug. 1, the reimbursement applies to travel expenses that are primarily for, and essential to, obtaining abortion services covered by the plan that are performed by a licensed medical provider.

Travel expenses that are not primarily for and essential to obtaining covered abortion services are not covered.

Covered expenses include transportation expenses for one caregiver or travel companion as well as lodging. The new benefit requires submitting receipts and has specific requirements, so before taking advantage of it, read all the details at sagaftraplans.org.

SAG-AFTRA Members Push for Passage of CROWN Act

Cince the passage of the Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair, or CROWN Act (H.R. 2116/S. 888), in the U.S. House of Representatives in March, SAG-AFTRA continues its work to get the bill passed in the Senate.

On Oct. 18, the union issued a statement about the importance of the bill asserting that federal agencies and institutions must take steps to ensure that discrimination based on natural appearances is no longer tenable. Kerry Washington, Don Cheadle and Angela Bassett were among the many signers.

Introduced by Sen. Cory Booker and Rep. Bonnie Watson-Coleman, the CROWN Act would effectively end hair texture-based discrimination in the

United States. The bill would not only address discriminatory practices within federal agencies and institutions, but also in both public and private workspaces, including the entertainment and media industry. The union's wholehearted support of the bill aligns with its ongoing work to advance hair and makeup equity through prioritizing this issue in contract negotiations, raising awareness, leveraging industry partnerships and supporting legislative efforts.

"When you work in an industry where you can be hired — or not hired — largely on how you look, you become acutely aware of how damaging it can be to discriminate against someone based on something as extraneous as how they wear their hair." said SAG-AFTRA L.A. Local

"We've made strides in our own industry, but ... until our nation's leaders say, in no uncertain terms, that it is not acceptable to discriminate against someone based on their hair, private employers and institutions will continue to skirt the issue with ease. The CROWN Act sets a new standard of equity that makes it harder to justify harmful and outdated practices."

Dues Relief Extension Program and SAG Awards Deadline

Dues Relief Extension Program is Aavailable for members experiencing COVID-19-related financial hardship. Members can request a due date extension and installment plan for their November membership dues. Members recently received their SAG-AFTRA semi-annual November dues statement along with information on the due date extension and installment plan for those in need.

Dec. 12, 2022, is the deadline to make your November dues payment to be eligible for SAG Awards® voting and to receive For Your Consideration screeners. If you request COVID-19 hardship, you must make the request and your first dues installment payment no later than Dec. 12 to maintain good standing and be eligible for SAG Awards® voting and screeners, unless prior period payments are owed.

Making your payment by this date allows critical services of the union, such as residuals processing, legal advocacy and member support services, to continue

without disruption. Please note that your request for a due date extension and the first installment payment must be received no later than Dec. 12 and your second installment (with the March 1 due date) must be received on or before March 13, respectively, to maintain good standing for the November 2022 dues period (assuming no prior dues period payments are owed). Refer to your billing statement for complete information.

Election Eligibility Reminder

In order to meet the November dues period good-standing eligibility requirement to be nominated for election as a national or local board officer, National Board member



or local board member or convention delegate, members who opt to take advantage of the COVID-19 Dues Relief Extension by Dec. 12 must ensure that all November 2022 dues bill payments are made in compliance with the program.

If your November dues payment is not received by Dec. 12, 2022, and you have not made a request for a dues extension by Dec. 12 or if your dues payments are not in compliance with the installment deadlines outlined previously, you will not be eligible to run for a national or local board office, National Board or local board or convention delegate position. Failure to pay dues in accordance with the COVID-19 Dues Relief Extension may also affect your ability to vote, nominate and participate in referenda.

given by the SAG-AFTRA Committee of Locals, was presented at the committee's virtual awards ceremony on Oct. 21.

The award, which was created in 2008, is named after the late actor and singer Howard Keel, who served as the Screen Actors Guild's 10th president.

Butler's exemplary service to SAG-AFTRA and legacy AFTRA spans four decades, beginning on the AFTRA San Francisco Local Board in 1997. Nationally, he served on the AFTRA National Board, as well as a vice president from 2002 until merger in 2012. Additionally, he was a participant on the Group for One Union Committee, crafting the merger of SAG and AFTRA. Butler has been a member of the National Board of SAG-AFTRA since its inception and is now serving his third term as vice president, broadcasters.

Fradin is an actor who first became involved in SAG at the Chicago Branch, later moving on to the Regional Branch Division and then to its successor after merger, the Committee of Locals. She was a founding member of the Group for One Union (G1), which worked on the 2011–2012 merger campaign and afterward served on the G1 Committee as a founding member. She has served three terms as vice president, mid-sized locals, over four years on the National Board, as well as in a multitude of other positions.

Back-to-Work Agreement Modified, Extended

The DGA, SAG-AFTRA, IATSE, Teamsters and the Hollywood Basic Crafts announced on Oct. 26 the extension of the COVID-19 Safety Agreement through Jan. 31, 2023.

The agreement maintains the multifaceted approach that has kept the industry working safely since shortly after the onset of the pandemic. The extension maintains core protocols while permitting minor modifications reflecting improved conditions in most areas. In addition, the agreement again grants a bank of six additional sick days reflecting the shorter term of this extension.

The new agreement requires the strictest protocols be implemented on productions occurring in any metropolitan area or county with 14 or more COVID-19 hospital admissions per 100,000 population. This is a reasonable and appropriate modification in the trigger given the current environment.

The agreement also gives productions the option of a daily antigen testing regime for Zone A during a surge in which the production reverts back to the more stringent Part 1 mandatory protocols.

Importantly, employers retain the right to adopt more stringent requirements regarding masking and testing on a production-by-production basis and to mandate that employees in Zone A be up to date on their vaccinations.

Other than these modifications, all other provisions remain in full force and effect. In all cases, the full set of stricter protocols will be reintroduced if there is a COVID-19 surge over the winter.

The parties will continue closely monitoring COVID-19 developments.

SAG-AFTRA Collaborates Across the Pond

The International Federation of Actors Executive Committee met in London during the last week of September. In a historic first, the meeting was presided over by an American, FIA President Gabrielle Carteris, who was elected to the post in 2021. The three-day event was well-attended, with representation from more than 20 performers unions from across the globe, including SAG-AFTRA Executive Vice President Ben Whitehair and National Executive Director Duncan Crabtree-Ireland, along with other SAG-AFTRA staff.

This was the first in-person meeting since before the COVID-19 pandemic. The group discussed and debated a number of important issues, including the ongoing ratification process for the Beijing Treaty, challenges impacting performer unions due to rapidly evolving technology and the increasingly important role of streaming platforms in our industry. The group also presented yearly reports on important matters, including diversity, equity and inclusion efforts across member nations.

The Federation also passed several impactful resolutions, including a resolution in support of the principle of "no collection without distribution." This principle is paramount to the global future of the industry, as it calls for collecting societies around the world to proportionally distribute any money they

collect to the performers to whom they are owed, regardless of reciprocity between countries. For SAG-AFTRA members, this could mean collecting tens of millions of dollars more each year in royalties from the foreign use of their work that currently goes unpaid. Another important resolution showed the body's unanimous support for the Alliance of Canadian Cinema, Television and Radio Artists in its ongoing dispute with the nation's ad industry.

Producers Roundtable

Health and Safety in the Industry

SAG-AFTRA National Executive Director & Chief Negotiator Duncan Crabtree-Ireland was a featured panelist at TheGrill *Producers Roundtable* on Oct. 12. Hosted by *The Wrap*, TheGrill's two-day symposium brings together industry professionals to discuss industry issues.

This year's roundtable focused on different issues, including health and safety and the pandemic's continued effect on productions. Crabtree-Ireland reflected on how the early collective response from major entertainment unions and the AMPTP have benefited productions over the past few years.

"I think we can agree that the most important thing we did was find a way to get on the same page about restarting production." said Crabtree-Ireland, in reference to the 2020 Return to Work Agreement. "If negotiations had been done separately, we would have different rules for different types of workers, and I think the industry would have been in chaos."

He also spoke at length about the continued impact of Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization on productions and workers across the country. While praising the unions' and studios' early response to the news via coverage for emergency travel, he noted how it was important to be proactive in addressing other concerns, particularly those surrounding work taking place in states with restrictive reproductive health care laws.

"[I know] that there are some companies who are scared of being attacked by politicians, but as an industry, we do have to be willing to stand up ... for [our workers]," he said.

Other featured panelists included Producers Guild of America Executive Director Susan Sprung; Hello Sunshine President, Film and Television Lauren Neustadter; Madison

Wells Media Head of TV and Film Rachel Shane; and producers Sera Gamble (You), Warren Littlefield (The Handmaid's Tale) and Tazbah Chavez (Reservation Dogs).



Union's Trust & Estates Team Tracks Donan Members Who Haven't Provided Valid Addresses for Their Residuals

ne of the core missions of SAG-AFTRA is to ensure members get their residuals money in a timely manner. But what happens IS CALL when the union has an

invalid address? Keep reading to see how the union connects members with their money.



When residual checks are returned to SAG-AFTRA due to an invalid address, the union tries to contact the member through email, phone or by letter to an alternate address, and holds the check for about four weeks while it awaits a response.

> If you're moving, make sure your residual checks move with you. Let the union know your new address by logging on to sagaftra.org, via the app or by calling the contact center at (855) 724-2387.

> > If the union does reach out to you about held funds. it's important to respond. We can't get you your money if we don't hear from you.

IF THERE IS NO RESPONSE FROM THE PERFORMER

SAG-AFTRA's records are updated to indicate that the address is bad. After the four weeks, the

funds are deposited in a trust account that holds the money for members. All subsequent residuals are routed to the trust account, and SAG-AFTRA's research team is notified to start additional outreach to notify the member. Research includes: LexisNexis, IMDbPro, affiliated unions and social media platforms. Each month and every time a deposit is made into the trust, a message is automatically generated and sent to the member's email on file, notifying them that funds are being held for them. In addition, the performer gets a notification when they log into the

sagaftra.org website and the SAG-AFTRA app.

IF THE PERFORMER RESPONDS

SAG-AFTRA staff updates the address in the union's system and all future residuals are mailed to the new address. In addition, the union encourages the performer to consider switching to direct deposit so that a change of address never causes a problem again.

Philly Superstar Pays Homage to Queen Beyoncé

Most morning traffic reports tend to offer little more than a simple play-by-play of road conditions. But as Philadelphia commuters know, that's not always the case when broadcaster Sheila Watko is on the newsfloor.

Watko has been a SAG-AFTRA member and broadcaster since 2016, starting out in the industry as a weekend radio host in New York. The Emmy-winning reporter is currently NBC10 Philadelphia's traffic anchor and entertainment reporter — a perfect fit given her longtime love of Broadway — and often adds the best of both worlds to her segments by slipping in recording artists' song titles within her overall coverage.

Watko bases her choices on her favorite artists, which range from country-pop superstar Taylor Swift to the late rock singer Meat Loaf. But her most recent viral moment was all thanks to the Renaissance queen herself, fellow union member Beyoncé, whose iconic lines she quoted, such as "To the left, to the left," and hit song titles, including the summer smash *Break My Soul*.

"I've honestly been a fan [of Beyoncé] since Destiny's Child," said Watko, who notes that while her tribute was meant to premiere on the release date of the artist's latest album, Renaissance, it was delayed due to breaking news coverage. Still, with a bit of encouragement from her colleagues, the green light from her producers and ideal road conditions, viewers started their day listening to a report with nearly 20 different references across Beyoncé's full discography.

Said Watko about the timing, "I was nervous because there was such a build-up [surrounding the segment]. But it was great to follow the hype after it had come out, especially after the weekend when everybody had had a chance to listen to it."

These fun moments are typically praised by NBC10's viewership, but Watko went viral almost immediately and caught the attention of the star's mother and biggest fan,



Tina Knowles-Lawson, who later reposted the video to her 3.5 million Instagram followers.

"That was the ultimate compliment, honestly even more than Beyoncé herself," said Watko. "You know moms are always so proud [of their kids], and ... I'm assuming she sent it to Bey as well. [I'm hoping] she got a little laugh out of it."

There's no telling who may receive the Watko treatment next, but like Beyhive fans across the globe, she's waiting for more news of the entertainer's upcoming world tour. At the time of this interview, no dates or cities have been officially announced.

"I haven't seen her on tour before and would love to," said Watko. "We've seen her over the years do these performances ... with sets and the costumes, and the music and dancing, and her backup dancers. I'm excited!"

Shop Steward Training Focuses on Onboarding New Members

n Sept. 22, SAG-AFTRA Broadcast staff and stewards convened the third virtual quarterly shop steward training of 2022, which was open to all shop stewards, and more than 50 attended. Staff opened the discussion by diving into

best onboarding practices, including the importance of contacting new hires early to welcome them to the unit, providing a hard copy of the union contract and educating new members on station culture.

Additionally, the training covered how to best answer common new member questions, such as membership requirements, how to handle personal service contracts, and the benefits of being in the union. Experienced stewards in shops across the country also had an opportunity to share their protocols and strategies for onboarding new members.

Staff members shared their role in

the onboarding process, focusing on the components of the welcome email sent to new members with union information, and the role of membership officers, who are responsible for dues, membership applications, notices and more.

The training wrapped up with a discussion on the efficacy of virtual onboarding, what resources stewards think would be helpful in the future and an open Q&A for stewards and staff. The next shop steward training was scheduled for Dec. 1, with the discussion to focus on running effective labor-management meetings.

Pittsburgh TV, D.C. Radio Stations Get First Contracts



SAG-AFTRA's success in organizing media stations nationwide has been translating into more units with a first contract, and now two more have achieved this significant milestone.

Employees of WAMU 88.5 FM radio, a public news/talk station that serves the greater Washington, D.C., metropolitan area, got their first contract in August. The unit consists of approximately 55 on- and off-air employees, including reporters, hosts, editors, engineers, producers and others who create content for all areas of the station, including DCist.com, *The Politics Hour with Kojo Nnamdi, 1A, The Big Broadcast, Hot Jazz Saturday Night* and the podcasts *Dish City, What's With Washington* and *Diane Rehm: On My Mind.*

The contract delivers guaranteed wage increases, opportunities for career advancement at the station, increased transparency, training and safety protocols, and mechanisms for monitoring diversity, equity and inclusion at the station.

The employees voted unanimously to recognize SAG-AFTRA as their union in December 2020.

Meanwhile, in Pittsburgh, KDKA-TV employees reached an agreement for a first contract with CBS Broadcasting Inc. on July 26, which was subsequently ratified on Aug. 15. The new 29-member bargaining unit includes news, sports, web and digital line producers. SAG-AFTRA has represented announcers at the station, including hosts, anchors, meteorologists and reporters, since the 1950s.

The contract includes significant wage increases, with more than half of the unit getting annual increases of \$7,000 or more. In addition, the union achieved a system of comp time for when employees work in excess of their regular workweek, a labor-management committee dedicated to improving the work-life balance of employees, and protections around employee discipline and termination, including guaranteed severance and a requirement that the employer adhere to the principles of progressive discipline.

Producers first informed station management of their intention to organize in October 2020, with management agreeing to voluntarily recognize SAG-AFTRA as their union following a card check in November 2020.

Broadcast Steering Committee Remembers Shelby Scott



n August 27, the SAG-AFTRA Broadcast Steering Committee gathered via Zoom for its second meeting of the year. The meeting opened with a tribute to the late broadcaster and union leader Shelby Scott from the New England Local, who served as AFTRA national president for eight years. She was also

a board member for many years, a trustee on the AFTRA Health and Retirement Funds, a founding member of the BSC and a leader in the efforts to merge SAG and AFTRA. Her union activism continued as a member of SAG-AFTRA and throughout her retirement.

A video highlighting Scott's career and contributions was played before committee members shared fond memories of her career and service as a pioneer female journalist and labor leader. BSC member and Boston journalist Nichole Davis said, "Shelby Scott was a reporter we all trusted and enjoyed watching, but for young women in New England who wanted to go into journalism, she was also inspirational. She was always real; someone we could look up to and relate to. While I admired her style of direct but empathetic reporting, she truly shined in her severe weather coverage, undeniably setting the standard. Seeing her on the screen gave me courage to try my own journalism career, and I know she inspired many other women in our industry, too."

The committee went on to discuss general updates and recent victories and challenges in the field, with a particular emphasis on public media organizing and bargaining as well as accountability practices for diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives.

The committee also discussed ways to involve and engage broadcast members, allies and employers on the issue of safety for journalists who work in the field. Vice President, Broadcasters Bob Butler led a discussion with the committee on safety in the field and next steps to creating a Safety Bill of Rights, in an effort to continue the focus on this important national issue.

In addition, the committee received an in-depth look at current best practices for the union and member leaders in regards to discipline, termination and layoffs. Topics presented and discussed included an overview of representation in Weingarten meetings, separation agreements, contract language on severance, issues of confidentiality and non-disparagement, health coverage and member-produced content. The committee will meet again in December 2022.

he post-lockdown entertainment industry continues to sort out what stories draw the largest numbers in theaters and which stories promise first-place streaming — but one thing has become clear: Native American actors and content are pulling in record-breaking ratings and topping critics' lists around the world.

It only took three days for director Dan Trachtenberg's sophomore project, *Prey*, to shatter Hulu audience numbers in August to become the most-watched content in the history of the service, which debuted in 2007. By October, the film set new world records on both Hulu and Disney Plus and the sci-fi action film doesn't seem to be slowing down, pulling in millions of new viewers across Latin America and Europe.

Released this summer, the origin story prequel to 1987's *Predator* is now the best-reviewed film in the franchise, and might be its most unique, chronicling a seek-and-destroy battle between the nefarious predatory alien and an Indigenous tribe living 300 years ago. Notably, it was produced by Comanche and Blackfeet

film ever to offer a version fully dubbed in the Comanche language of Numunuu. (Hulu has both English and Comanche versions available.)

Many believe this type of success occurs, in part, due to the dominance of streaming platforms over the last decade — a boom elevated by the pandemic lockdown — that allows small screens (TV, phone and otherwise) to offer even more diverse theatrical-caliber content, especially for voices that have historically struggled for representation. Native actors and storytellers are taking advantage of

this broadened landscape, and critics and audiences are responding.

Many current films and series now include an abundance of Native characters and storylines, even if they're not the primary focus of the show. In 2021, the showrunners of Dexter: New Blood, the mini-revival of Showtime's serial-killer killer, chose to set their terror tale in Native-adjacent Alaska and cast part Choctaw and Chickasaw actor Julia Jones as the Native sheriff of a Pacific Northwest town — as well as Dexter Morgan's love interest. Jones is best known

from the *Twilight* series and *Westworld*, and received a Saturn Award nomination for her work on *Dexter*.

ABC's *Alaska Daily*, starring Hilary Swank as an investigative reporter, also fills prominent roles with Native co-stars, including her partner in crime, Secwépemc actor Grace Dove.

FX's true crime miniseries Under the Banner of Heaven cast Gil Birmingham (Yellowstone) with Andrew Garfield as detectives, one Comanche and one Mormon, who attempt to unravel a horrific LDS cult. Syfy's Resident Alien, a mystery-comedy-drama about an Earth-stranded alien on a mission to wipe out humanity won the Best Cable Series, Comedy award from the Hollywood Critics Association in 2021 and includes prominent Indigenous actors Sara Tomko, Gary Farmer and others in featured and recurring roles.

Many Native stories are front-and-center, however, and this year has proven especially significant for Indigenous points of view. Sundance Institute founder, actor Robert Redford, brought his new incarnation of Tony Hillerman's novel *The Dark Wind* to the small screen, and it has received much acclaim. In 1991, Redford produced a feature film adapted from the same book series but it failed to make an impression. In contrast, the AMC series *Dark Winds*, produced by Redford and created by Chickasaw Nation writer Graham Roland, has been hailed as a tightly drawn and absorbing thriller that combines traditional Native rituals and heritage with a 1970s world — something non-Native audiences have responded to in large numbers.

Zahn McClarnon, who is half Lakota and appeared in Westworld's first season as well as in FX's second season of Fargo, stars as Sheriff Joe Leaphorn, and he also executive produces the series. The cast is also mostly Native actors, many of whom are making their screen debuts.

Another success came in Peacock's streaming sitcom Rutherford Falls, which boasted the largest writers room of Native American talent in history, but was canceled after two seasons due to setbacks from the pandemic. FX's Indigenous comedy-drama Reservation Dogs, however, created by Seminole Nation filmmaker Sterlin Harjo and


New Zealand's Maori filmmaker Taika Waititi, has been a sustained hit and was recently renewed for a third season.

Reservation Dogs focuses on the contemporary experiences and social takes of a group of Indigenous teenagers who would do just about anything to get out of their boring, dead-end town — a familiar trope, except this time, that dead-end town is an Oklahoma reservation. It's also filled with traditions, myths, potential magic and harmless back-alley territory scraps that lend themselves to the tongue-in-cheek title nod to Quentin Tarantino's Reservoir Dogs. The program has thus far received a Peabody Award and the American Film Institute named it one of the best television programs of 2021.

The dark comedy also breaks new ground by featuring all Indigenous writers and directors, a soundtrack composed of popular songs by Native artists, and an almost entirely North American Native cast and production team.

Devery Jacobs is one of the show's breakout stars, and was named in October to Time magazine's Time100 Next, a list of the most influential rising stars. The actor attested to the significance of the series' Indigenous-led approach to storytelling, telling Good Morning America that the show was made "by Indigenous people, and it's for Indigenous people, and it's so fueled with love for our communities, and there's no explaining or spoon-feeding to non-Native audiences." Jacobs and co-star McClarnon also appear in the upcoming Disney+ Marvel Studios Echo series, which features an Indigenous superhero portrayed by Alaqua Cox.

Reservation Dogs benefits as well from seasoned professionals such as Jana Schmieding (Rutherford Falls) and Sarah Podemski (Resident Alien), as well as cameos and recurring roles from veteran Native actors Gary Farmer (Smoke Signals) and Wes Studi, best known for his roles in The Last of the Mohicans and Dances with

Wolves, and his heroic turn as the

Highway, an award-winning

titular character in Geronimo. Studi

began his career in 1988's Powwow

contemporary road trip buddy film about two Cheyenne friends that was produced by George Harrison's Handmade Films — a project that also featured a then-unknown Graham Greene, who would later receive an Oscar nomination for his work in Dances

Studi, who won an honorary Oscar in 2020 for his body of work, is receiving new accolades for his current film, Bleecker Street's A Love Song, which premiered at Sundance and ranks 98% on Rotten Tomatoes. His niece, actor and playwright DeLanna Studi, serves as chair of SAG-AFTRA's National Native Americans Committee. She believes the current expansion of Indigenous representation in media is a step in the right direction.

"Native Americans have been on screen since the inception of film in the United States, but it has been difficult finding any portrayals of Native people, let alone contemporary ones. Native American artists are not only misrepresented, but are also invisible. According to illuminative.org, 'The analysis from Reclaiming Native Truth in 2018 found that the inclusion of Native characters in

primetime television and popular film ranged from zero to 0.4%.' But change is being seen across multiple genres and platforms. Native artists are creating content that reflects our beautifully diverse communities, and it's been a long time coming."

> The union's Native Americans Committee works to promote and safeguard the interests and rights of Native American members and push


for a heightened awareness of Native actors to help expand their presence in entertainment content. The advances made by Indigenous artists in the last decade seem like strong evidence that this commitment to fair employment practices has been effective for

many performers.

The support of SAG-AFTRA's committee and members, and the willingness of casting directors. producers and showrunners to create inclusive content for Native performers are remapping the narrative landscape for many artists and offering hope of more inclusivity in the future. That's being seen as a positive change in

the industry, and with the digital arena offering more room now than ever for historically neglected perspectives, many are rooting for Native artists to be given all the space they need.





'Dark Winds' & 'Reservation Dogs' Star

Zahn McClarnon

Honors the Past While Looking to the Future

akota actor Zahn McClarnon has been performing on big and small screens for decades, amassing an acting resume highlighted with major TV credits like Westworld, Longmire, Fargo and The Son. His broad and fruitful career of Native-specific roles have led him to perhaps the triple crown of acting: appearing concurrently on three series. He's starring on AMC's Dark Winds, renewed for season two, FX's Reservation Dogs, renewed for season three, and he'll be on the upcoming Disney+ Marvel Studios Echo — all of which put Native characters and stories center stage.

Off-screen, McClarnon has worked with SAG-AFTRA's National Native Americans Committee for years to finally see this kind of representation take place. He has appeared in a union-sponsored video for casting directors and as part of actor roundtable discussions to promote and expand the images of Indigenous actors.

With so many Native-centered projects receiving critical acclaim and audience accolades, it's a watershed moment for actors like McClarnon. SAG-AFTRA sat down with him to

discuss representation and where he'd like to see Native stories headed in the future.

AS A YOUNG MAN, WERE YOU ABLE TO FIND IMAGES OF YOURSELF ON SCREEN?

ZAHN: Well, Chief Dan George and Will Sampson were a couple of my heroes growing up — No. 1 was Will. Seeing *One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest* for the first time ... it's still one of my all-time favorite movies. That scene with Will and Jack, [where] he hands him the piece of Juicy Fruit [gum] to me is one of the best scenes in the history of the movies. I was living in Montana at the time, right outside the reservation, and it just humanized Native characters in a way that I had never seen before. And those scenes in *The Outlaw Josey Wales* with Chief Dan George lying on the ground, and he says some funny things to Clint [Eastwood] about dying — those are the kinds of scenes that stuck out to me as a kid more so than watching the stereotypical tropey Natives on horses running around scalping people or always being the bad guys. Those are the kind of Natives that I was around; I have

a lot of funny aunts and uncles and I always wondered as a kid why there weren't more characters like that.

DID THESE PORTRAYALS INFLUENCE YOUR DESIRE TO BECOME AN ACTOR?

Z: I was a big film buff — my father used to take us to the drive-in every Friday night up in Montana and we'd watch those '70s exploitation movies, the hippie films like *Easy Rider* and *Sometimes a Great Notion* by Ken Kesey, but I never really thought about being an actor; that came later on in life. I guess it was when *Dances with Wolves* came out that I started thinking more about possibly trying to be an actor, and I auditioned for some local community theater stuff when I was living in Nebraska — it was kind of a whim to be honest.



Z: [Laughs] Yeah! I did that in the '90s, actually! They asked me to say something in my language, and I'm not a fluent speaker, so I kind of said some bad words and let it go — we all had fun with it [laughs].

HOW DID YOU FEEL WHEN YOU GOT YOUR SAG CARD IN 1991?

Z: I did a Fox TV pilot called *Lakota Moon*, and they had to Taft-Hartley me in, and that was the first time I was eligible to be

A VERY GOOD WHIM!

Z: Yeah! [laughs] I took some acting classes in high school, but kind of for an easy credit, so it wasn't until my 20s when I started thinking about what I wanted to do with the rest of my life. I auditioned for a play and I got it, and I fell in love with acting.

AND YOU HAD A RELATIVE IN THE BUSINESS.

Z: Yes! My great-great-uncle Francis Zahn, who I was named after, was a writer, painter and a tribal judge on the Standing Rock Reservation in North Dakota, and, at one time, he was an interpreter for Teddy Roosevelt between the Lakota tribe and Roosevelt's people. He was also an actor in Errol Flynn's movie *They Died with Their Boots On* — he actually played Sitting Bull. I even have a picture of Flynn and my uncle together, but I didn't find this out until later in life. I think it's pretty cool.

a SAG member — and, yes, it was extremely exciting! You move to Los Angeles, you want to be an actor, and the first thing they say is that you have to be in the union. How do you get into the union? Well, you have to get a union job! [laughs] You kind of go up against the wall and try to figure it out, so I was extremely excited when I had a production that wanted to make me eligible to join. It's a big deal for any actor.

SPEAKING OF YOUR FIRST JOB, YOU'RE SURROUNDED BY SO MUCH YOUNG TALENT RIGHT NOW, ESPECIALLY ON "RESERVATION DOGS." WHAT'S THAT BEEN LIKE?

Z: When Sterlin Harjo came to talk to me about selling his and Taika [Waititi]'s pilot and told me the synopsis of it, the first thing I said was, "How are you going to find these Native teenagers to play the lead and regular roles?" Because there's

not a big pool, and I was like, "Good luck!" [laughs]. So he hired Angelique Midthunder, who's a wonderful casting director, and they took Rene Haynes [casting director for *Prey*] and went out across the country and set up auditions, and they found some wonderfully talented people. Working with these kids is just a dream, and being on the set with them and watching them grow is a wonderful thing to see. It's funny, you can find these actors who've never worked before and they're just naturals — like Paulina Alexa. There's a lot of Native talent out there that hasn't been discovered yet.

educating themselves and hiring the proper consultants, and, you know, being open to the ideas of the writers and the actors. I'm glad I'm a part of it.

IS HOLLYWOOD MORE OPEN TO CASTING INDIGENOUS ACTORS IN A VARIETY OF ROLES NOW THAN IN THE PAST?

Z: Yes, I think it's opening up quite a bit more for actors to get roles that they're just right for or just talented enough to do, not just because of their ethnicity. We all get pigeonholed as actors, obviously, and I'm not complaining about it. I like to work, and if it's a Native role, I'm happy to be Native American, but, yeah, I'd

ARE YOUR YOUNG CO-STARS AS EXCITED TO BE IN THE UNION AS YOU WERE?

Z: Definitely. You know, the actors I work with now have the opportunity to tap into those good health insurance benefits and they have their retirement plans they can look forward to in the future. A few of these actors are pretty rural people, and they have access to these beautiful benefits that the union gives us, and I think it's very important to them in their lives. It's a good thing, the union and its protections. I wouldn't know what to do without my health insurance. SAG-AFTRA is always watching out for us!

MANY NEW PROJECTS ARE SHOWCASING NEW INDIGENOUS TALENT AND SPOTLIGHTING SEASONED ACTORS.

Z: Absolutely. It's a wonderful time right now, a very unique time. I've been doing this for a few decades, and I'm very happy. I'm not just seeing *more* representation, but also Natives being able to control their own narrative stories and producers who are

like to be looked at as an actor first. These young kids coming up in the business definitely want to be cast as many different things.

IS THERE A PARTICULAR INDIGENOUS STORY YOU'D LIKE TO SEE THAT HASN'T BEEN DONE YET?

Z: One I'd love to see is a story on [Lakota activist and writer] Mary Crow Dog in the 1970s — and a better or truer story about what happened with the American Indian Movement in South Dakota, the 1973 Wounded Knee Occupation. I'd also like to see historical films and programs from a Native perspective, and always more contemporary stuff.

AS FOR CONTEMPORARY, CONSIDERING WE HAVE A NATIVE AMERICAN SECRETARY OF THE INTERIOR, WHY NOT A STORY ABOUT THE FIRST NATIVE AMERICAN PRESIDENT?

Z: Right on! A Native American president would be awesome! Count me in. ●



Members Sound Off on Audition Self-Taping

uditioning used to be relatively straightforward: Show up on time, be prepared and give your best performance. But ever since technology made possible self-tape and online auditions. these nontraditional methods of getting the job have been growing in frequency, to the point where they are now the norm. The pandemic, and the increased need for remote work turbo-charged this trend, and some members have struggled to keep up. Self-taping has come with its own set of complications: the need for equipment, a certain level of technical aptitude, tight turnaround times, asks for performances with excessive amounts of dialogue or in uncomfortable circumstances, and much more.

Members have been rightfully concerned — and the union has been working to ensure members have the knowledge and resources they need — while also placing limits on what actors are being asked to do. In fact, the union negotiated strict self-tape audition regulations into the last Commercials Contract and the National Board affirmed page restrictions on self-taped auditions for low-budget productions, as well as forming a National Self-Tape Committee to coordinate the work being done to tackle this issue.

SAG-AFTRA asked members about their experiences and greatest concerns, and here's what you said, by the numbers.







WHAT ARE YOU AUDITIONING FOR?





WHAT CAN I DO?

Thank you to members who responded to the survey — and your union isn't done listening. One great way to make your voice heard is to show up to the wages and working conditions meetings for next year's TV/Theatrical and New Media negotiations and speak up on the kinds of provisions that should be in the union's contracts regarding self-taping.

5 Helpful Self-Taping Reminders

elf-taping is an undoubtedly important skill to have in your utility kit.

But even if you're recording your first or 100th self-tape, it's easy to forget certain tips and tricks. Experts recommend that the next time you find yourself getting ready to press record, keep these things in mind:

FOLLOW CASTING'S DIRECTIONS CAREFULLY. No two auditions are alike, and what one casting director prefers another may not. So, before you start, be sure to read the breakdowns carefully and follow recording and submission instructions to a T. If you have any questions, reach out to casting.

REVIEW YOUR TAKES. Self-taping gives you the advantage of making as many takes as possible, but that doesn't mean every one is worthy of submission. Before you send off your take — or takes — give everything one last review. Also, be objective: If something stands out that you dislike, you can bet casting will notice it as well. In those cases, either choose a better take or try again. Remember, your goal isn't to film a perfect audition, but to record your best performance.



CREATE AN IDEAL RECORDING ENVIRONMENT. You want there to be as little distraction in your recording as possible — after all, the focus should be on you and your performance. While you can't control everything happening around you, take stock of what you can control: lighting, your backdrop and clothing, and outside noise. Make sure that you're well-lit on camera, your backdrop and clothing are solid colors with no patterns or wording, and that you've eliminated manageable noise like your fan.



LABEL YOUR TAKES. Be sure that your files are labeled according to instructions. If none is provided, label your file with your name, the role and the number of each take. For example: "JOHN DOE SUPERHERO 01." While there's no guarantee you'll be cast for the role you're going out for, it's always possible that what you record today offers a new opportunity tomorrow. You want to make sure that casting can easily find you when the time comes!

PRACTICE. Like in-person auditions and acting itself, self-taping is a skill that you master with practice. When you're not actively going out for roles, practice self-taping. The more you familiarize yourself with the process, the easier self-taping becomes — which means a better submission each time.



Taking time away refreshes your mental outlook and can benefit your health – not to mention your creativity and ability to give it your all on the job. If you're on a budget or short on time, there are places you can go right in your own backyard, no matter where in the United States you call home.

Even if your town doesn't have a Statue of Liberty or Golden Gate Bridge. there's plenty to see and do on a budget. Here are some ideas for free or low-cost entertainment in three regions that can refresh and renew you.

Pacific Northwest

The Pacific Northwest is an outdoorsman's paradise. With its endless trails, rivers, forests and beaches, don't forget to bring your camera.

Around Portland, there are sights and state parks such as Multnomah Falls or Silver Falls, which can be visited for free or just the cost of a parking pass. Further north, along the Washington coast. Cape Disappointment is anything but; the rugged scenery and driftwood-strewn beaches are breathtaking.

If you have a few bucks and want to dig deep into Seattle's history, consider taking an underground tour of the city through passages that were once on street level.

Washington, D.C.

Our nation's capital has one of the best culture-to-dollar ratios you'll find anywhere; there's a lot to do and most of it is free. A walk along the National Mall, with its plethora of monuments and memorials, brings American history to life.

Explore the Library of Congress, the National Gallery of Art, the Smithsonian National Museum of Natural History, the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum, and so many others. Every city has free ways to enjoy the local ambiance, but D.C.'s offerings are a cut above. Check out washington.org for a list of 100 free activities in the region.

Austin. Texas

Those who live in the Lone Star State already know that Austin is a great place for live music, and from festivals to free concerts, there's something to love in nearly every genre. The sheer volume of remarkably talented artists gives you plenty to choose from.

Looking for something just a bit more unusual? Between March and October, make your way to Austin's Congress Bridge just before sunset to watch 1.5 million Mexican free-tailed bats put on a show as they forage for a meal. It is said to be the largest urban bat colony in North America.

Pack Your Bags

And, when you want to splurge, an adventure may be in order.

Take a page from actor-producer Ryan McPartlin's book and plan a family outing. McPartlin has been so busy with various projects that he has missed three birthdays and Thanksgiving with his family due to work. So when it came time to plan a vacation, he and his wife Danielle wanted to spend time with each other and their sons, Wyatt and Dylan.

They chose to take a cruise to Alaska, leaving from Seattle in July, with stops in Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway.

In Ketchikan, the family took a hike through a temperate rainforest and had the opportunity to view lots of bald eagles. In Juneau, they enjoyed a whale-watching excursion, being fortunate enough to view an entire pod of the massive creatures. Then, in Juneau's Red Dog Saloon, the family got to see a pistol that was left behind by Wyatt Earp — McPartlin's son's namesake. At the last stop, Skagway, the quartet hopped on ATVs and rode up to a glacier.

McPartlin said the entire family had a great time, and that it was restful and rejuvenating to be away from the phones and computers that can take up so much of our time and attention.

"What made it a good vacation? We got away from our devices and we got out in nature," he said. "I got to learn more about my kids."





What to Know Before Curtain Call

WHO CHOOSES THIS YEAR'S NOMINEES?

Every year, two nominating committees are formed to vote on awards nominees for film and television. Each committee is made up of 2,500 union members in good standing, all chosen at random from SAG-AFTRA's membership.

HOW CAN I SERVE ON A NOMINATING COMMITTEE?

The nominating committees for this year have already been selected, and previous participants cannot serve on the same committee for at least eight years following their service. But there's still a chance to cast your final ballot before the big night!

HOW CAN I VOTE?

All members who have paid their dues by Monday, Dec. 12 are eligible for final voting. Just make sure that your contact information is up to date in our system by logging into your sagaftra.org account, checking your profile via the SAG-AFTRA member app, or calling (855–724-2387. Also, be on the lookout for this year's voting postcard (below).

WHEN CAN I VOTE?

Final voting opens on Wednesday, Jan. 18, 2023, and closes at noon PT, on Friday, Feb. 24. Ballots can be submitted online or a paper ballot can be requested by calling (800) 961-8287 before the deadline on Friday, Feb. 10.

HOW WILL I GET MY SCREENERS?



availability and potential scheduling. This "conflict-free window" is not mandatory where the filming schedule between seasons is less than four months.


- An increase in the exclusivity money breaks from \$15,000 per week or per episode for half-hour programs and \$20,000 per week or per episode for one hour or longer programs to \$65,000 per week or per episode for half-hour programs and \$70,000 per week or per hour for one hour or longer programs.
- · An unprecedented expansion in permitted appearances for series regulars, including the ability to be a series regular on a second series and to do an unlimited number of guest star appearances, including an unlimited number of continuing roles that do not exceed six episodes.
- A strict limitation on the permissible reasons for which a series producer may stop a series regular from accepting an appearance on another program, along with a requirement of good-faith consideration of all permitted appearances and an obligation to keep records that are available for the union to review of series regular requests to work on other programs and the series producer's response.

The exclusivity rules extend to all series regulars on children's programming, subject to limitations on series regulars who are minors taking roles on other children's programs. These

limitations do not apply to adult programs, and cease upon the minor reaching 18 years of age.

This agreement comes on the heels of an agreement between Netflix and SAG-AFTRA, in which Netflix agreed to join the multiemployer bargaining unit represented by the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers.

In light of the AMPTP agreement, legislation for the California Let Artists Work Act was withdrawn.



Tips & Best Practices

Actors and costumers from SAG-AFTRA, the Costume Designers Guild and Motion Picture Costumers IATSE Local 705 have joined forces to create best tips and practices to encourage a safe and respectful workplace. s performers and costume designers, we work closely to build characters and stories through costume. It is vital to maintain the sacredness and safety of the fitting room space.

Here are some best practices to keep in mind to ensure that no matter your gender identity, body size, body dysmorphia, disability, neurodivergence, race, age or ethnicity, you will be treated with respect and find the support you need with your collaborators. These responsibilities apply to performers, costume designers and costumers (costume team), as it's our mutual commitment that can ensure everyone's well-being.


Our commitment to each other's safety should encompass all areas of our collaboration. Performers have a measure of power on set and can speak up to protect the costume team if they see inappropriate behavior toward them. Costume teams are on the front lines and can speak up to protect actors during body mic placement, scenes with nudity, and at other times when they may feel vulnerable.

With mutual respect and shared goals, we can use our close working relationship to positively affect the tone of the workplace. Here are ways to ensure a productive collaboration.


Have a Pre-Fitting Discussion

During this discussion, the costume designer and costume team should get the following information:

- · The performer's pronouns.
- A performer's current sizes and measurements of their body. It is essential that a performer take new measurements at the beginning of every job, even if they feel certain they have not changed. Without these, the design team cannot be properly prepared for a fitting, which will put production behind schedule.
- · The QR code at right will direct you to a helpful measurement chart.
- Performers can also take their measurements by using a piece of string and comparing it to a ruler or hard tape measure.
- · Any access needs to consider, including certain fabrics or closures, if assistance will be required navigating to the facility, and that there is adequate space in the dressing area for assistive devices and/or personnel, wheelchairs, canes, service dogs, personal care assistants, etc.
- · Any allergies or sensitivities to fabrics. specific undergarment needs, and color or cut preferences, if applicable.
- Some costume teams may ask for a performer's current weight in order to fit them. However, some performers either cannot or should not share this information and must feel comfortable saying so. Performers in recovery for disordered eating likely know that knowledge and



disclosure of their weight jeopardizes their recovery. Others might simply have distanced

be unable to provide it.

Provide A Private Changing Area for Every Fitting

It is in everyone's best interest that a private changing area be provided and utilized regardless of individual comfort levels. The area must have adequate space to accommodate the needs of disabled performers, such as changing benches, room for mobility aids, and ADA-compliant restrooms in the facility. A private changing area precludes the most obvious opportunity for potentially harmful behavior from all parties when a performer

is in a state of undress, and is therefore important for the mental health and safety of both performers and the costume team. This is a simple way to prevent harm to everyone involved. particularly if anyone present experiences body dysmorphia or is uncomfortable with nudity. In the case of minors, all members of the costume team should leave the room and allow the parent or guardian to help the minor dress in full privacy.



Keep the Fitting Room Area Free of Anti-fat & Size Bias, Ableism & Gender Bias

Size bias is prevalent in the film/TV industry. By being aware of this dynamic, we can avoid the harmful behaviors of body-shaming, limited clothing options, and downplaying the feelings of curvy and plus-sized performers. Please note that body issues may affect actors of all sizes and genders. Ableism can occur with comments about how "inspiring" people with disabilities are and also with inappropriate comments about disability (visible and non-apparent). Gender bias affects us all differently; people need to be aware that this can occur with male-presenting performers as well. Another way gender bias exists is in relation to trans performers. Comments to avoid include telling trans performers they don't look trans (the implication being that looking cis is favorable), having limited clothing options, ignoring pronouns and making any inappropriate body-related comments.

Provide Proper Undergarments

Performers are responsible for showing up to a fitting wearing well-fitted undergarments. Costume teams are responsible for ensuring that the size and fit of any specialty undergarments work for a performer.





Remember that Photos May Be Taken

Reference photos could be taken in order to be shared with the rest of the production staff. Performers can help the costume team with the presentation of their work by arriving in whatever state of photo readiness the performer is comfortable with.

Seek Consent Before Touching Someone

Working in such an intimate, vulnerable setting means extra care must be taken to ensure consent before touching performers during a fitting. For performers and costume teams, being aware of the setting and the extra caution required when in sensitive states of undress is essential. Never touch a performer with a disability or their assistive devices without the express permission of the performer themselves.





Keep the Fitting Room Free of Body Talk of Any Kind

This applies to anyone of any gender identity, body size, disability or race. Even coming from what is intended to be a kind or complimentary place, comments about bodies might be harmful. In the same way one cannot assume a person's pronouns, one cannot assume someone else's relationship to their body. Compliments and comments about clothing and fit are entirely appropriate, whereas compliments and comments about the body within it are not.

- If someone does comment on your body in a way that makes you feel uncomfortable, set boundaries by politely letting them know that you would prefer they didn't.
- All parties should also avoid making disparaging or comparative statements about their own bodies during the fitting process.
- When taking measurements, ensure that the numbers are kept between the fitter and the designer by physically showing the
 measurement tape to the person writing the measurements rather than announcing them aloud.

Collaboration is Key


The fitting room is the appropriate place to discuss comfort levels with different clothing items, character questions, fit, and anything else that performers and the costume team need to be on the same page about. For costume designers, this is the time to share your vision for the show and how a performer's character fits into the narrative. For performers, this is the time to feel empowered and voice what you need to do your job comfortably and confidently. The fitting room is a place of mutual vulnerability, and these simple tips can help performers, costume designers, and costumers do their best work while ensuring everyone is treated with dignity and respect. Coast-to-Coast, Members Celebrate Labor

SAG-AFTRA members joined their brothers, sisters and kin at Labor Day parades across the nation to honor and celebrate the value of work.

One of the largest took place in the Big Apple, where, on Sept. 10, members marched up 5th Avenue at the New York City Central Labor Council's annual New York City Labor Day Parade and March. Broadcasters Feel the Power of Unionism

Twin Cities

Twin Cities broadcasters are part of the national surge in union organizing victories.

On July 28, members at newly organized Minnesota Public Radio music stations The Current and YourClassical celebrated the conclusion of negotiations and the first union contract at their stations. The following day, digital and streaming producers and assignment desk editors at WCCO TV in Minneapolis voted unanimously in an NLRB election to join SAG-AFTRA.

With these organizing victories and successful contract negotiations, Twin Cities broadcasters are contributing to a renaissance of the American labor movement and taking a stand on behalf of better wages and working conditions.

Local Voices Heard at Labor Council Convention

In July, the SAG-AFTRA Seattle Local President Rik Deskin and then-Portland Local Vice President Harold Phillips were joined by Davis Powell — then broadcast manager and labor couns

Powell — then broadcast manager and labor counsel, and now local executive director — as they journeyed to Wenatchee, Washington, as delegates for the 2022 Washington State Labor Council Constitutional Convention.

While there, amid masked delegates, Deskin and Phillips worked together with Powell to determine which resolutions needed their support. Over the course of three days, the delegates heard from various guest speakers, including AFL-CIO President Liz Shuler, Washington state Attorney General



Prior to an online screening of the locally produced 13-minute short film *Boxed*, Miami Local Board member Laurel Levy and other cast members discussed the making of the film, the process of ensuring it was a union production and how SAG-AFTRA interacted with producers. The Short Project Agreement applies to projects that shoot entirely in the United States with a maximum total budget of \$50,000 and a maximum total run time of 40 minutes, not including episodic or animated projects.


DFW Salutes One of Its Greats

It was a fun, informative way to celebrate, showcase the union's relevance and educate young people on the career opportunities our industry offers.




booths offering information on everything from potential film locations to local media contact opportunities.

In Memoriam



ANGELA LANSBURY, a Screen Actors Guild Life Achievement recipient, died Oct. 11 at the age of 96, five days shy of her 97th birthday.

Lansbury — who joined Screen Actors
Guild in 1943 and AFTRA in 1944 — had a
career filled with impressive screen and stage
accomplishments, from garnering an Oscar
nomination for her first film appearance — in
1944's Gaslight — to receiving the Order of the
British Empire in December 2013, bestowing
upon her the title of "Dame." She was one of the
most decorated players in stage history, having
received five Tony Awards. In 1996, Lansbury
received the 33rd Screen Actors Guild Life
Achievement Award and was inducted into the
Television Academy Hall of Fame. In 2013 she
received an honorary Academy Award.

Lansbury received the SAG Life Achievement Award for her professional and philanthropic endeavors, which included involvement with charities that combated domestic abuse and HIV infection. In accepting the award, Lansbury lauded her fellow performers:


"You know, over the past 54 years I've been fortunate enough to have worked with some of the greatest talents in the business: actors, directors, producers, composers, lyricists and animators. And wonderful craftspeople: crews, carpenters, lighting technicians [and] cameramen," she said. "It has been an outstanding life, especially for me. I just love actors. I love the creative environment of our work."

RICHARD FERRONE. award-winning audiobook narrator and chair of the SAG-AFTRA National Audiobook Steering

Committee since its inception, died Oct. 3 at the age of 76. He was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer on Sept. 18.

The wages and working conditions that audiobook narrators work under continuing to grow to this day - exist in no small part from the singular efforts of this champion of union leadership. Ferrone was dedicated to his craft and his union, and served as a National and New York Local Board member, convention delegate, chair of the New York Audiobook Narrators Caucus and the New York Organizing Committee, co-chair of the MORE Committee and vice chair of MOVE New York and the National Organizing Committee.

Once a lawyer for the Labor Department in Washington, D.C., he gave up law in the early '70s and joyfully began acting on stage, screen and behind the mic. He recorded over 150 audiobooks and received an Audie Award and four Audie nominations, as well as 12 AudioFile awards.

He joined both legacy unions in 1981 and is survived by his wife, SAG-AFTRA member Cynthia Darlow, and their extended family.

MARSHA HUNT, a legendary actor, social activist during Hollywood's Golden Age and SAG's last remaining board member of the 1940s died Sept. 7. She was 104.

A member of the union since 1938, Hunt performed in more than 50 films, including Paramount's Born to the West (1937) and MGM's These Glamor Girls (1939), Pride and Prejudice (1940), Blossoms in the Dust (1941), The Penalty (1941) and Pilot No. 5 (1943).

Hunt served on the board of Screen Actors Guild from March 1945 to November 1947. In October 1947, just three months

after the death of her newborn daughter, she fought to defend freedom of speech when she and her husband, screenwriter Robert Presnell Jr., joined the Committee for the First Amendment. Hunt and other actors on the Committee, including former SAG board member Humphrey Bogart and wife Lauren Bacall, traveled to the Washington, D.C., hearings of the House Committee on Un-American Activities in support of the First Amendment rights of the "Hollywood Ten."

Her outspokenness cost her a place on the SAG board, as the nominating committee did not choose her to run as a candidate for re-election the following month. A longtime liberal but never a Communist, Hunt's thriving acting career largely came to a halt after her name appeared in the publication Red Channels: The Report of Communist Influence in Radio and Television in June 1950 — three months after she graced the cover of LIFE magazine. She was blacklisted, but she survived and put her energies into humanitarian works.

In 2018, the union honored Hunt with the SAG-AFTRA Founders Award.

End to Latin-American Cliches In Entertainment Sought by Actor



Ricardo Montal ... Khaaaan!

s Star Trek villain Khan Noonien Singh, in both the 1967 "Space Seed" episode of the original TV series and an even larger-than-life resurrection of the character in 1982's feature film Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan, Ricardo Montalbán was unforgettable. In real life, through his vast humanitarian works, he was even more impressive.

In April 1960, during the Screen Actors Guild's theatrical strike, in the final months of Ronald Reagan's SAG presidency, Montalbán became a National Board member and would serve until November 1971, including six terms as 3rd vice president. In September 1962, he was one of six National Board members appointed to a committee to create an award that, the board noted could "... give consideration to the possibility of honoring at the annual meeting some of the industry's past 'greats' who have been of service to the Guild, such as Eddie Cantor, who served as the second president of the Guild at a most crucial period."

From that committee was born what would become the SAG Life Achievement Award, and three decades later, Montalbán himself received the recognition from his union peers. The SAG Honors and Tributes Committee booklet of potential candidates lauded Montalbán as "... the first Hispanic celebrity to support the



raised money for or personally contributed to the American Lung and Heart Association,

the American Cancer Society, the Breast Cancer Association, AHORA Responds to AIDS, Mexico Earthquake Relief Fund ..." The list exceeded two dozen organizations.

Always working to expand acting opportunities and better roles for Latino actors, in 1970 he helped found Nosotros, a Latino arts advocacy organization. He told Drama-Loque in January 1989, "I talked to producers and writers and told them I thought it was demeaning the way they were portraying us. It showed a terrible picture of us. I realized what they wanted to do was make pictures 'colorful.' I never got the feeling it was prejudice or done to hurt. It was total ignorance, which is just as bad. It was ignorance of what they thought we were. That's why we founded Nosotros."

In 1992, he shared with Screen Actor magazine his belief about the need for more Hispanic screenwriters to solve the problem: "We have not developed enough writers. 'What is not on the page is not on the stage.' This is an area where we should be concentrating our efforts because the good Anglo-Saxon writers, though well-intentioned to write about us, do not know how. We become stereotypes even when they're trying to flatter us."


