Foreword

by Stanley Adams
President of ASCAP

"As Americans we pride ourselves on the freedom and independence of our creative artist. Your Society has played a conspicuous role in fostering the atmosphere which permits creative people to work most effectively and to find greater reward for their artistic achievements.

The above excerpt is from President Johnson's letter of January 6, 1964 to me on the occasion of ASCAP's Fiftieth Anniversary.

The Society, a democratic, nonprofit clearing house for performing rights, was founded in 1914 by eight composers, lyrists and music publishers together with the famous copyright attorney, Nathan Burkan. The composers were Victor Herbert, Louis A. Hirsch, Raymond Hubbell, Silvio Hein and Gustave Kerker; the lyrist Glen MacDonough and the publishers George Maxwell and Jay Witmark. The charter membership consisted of 170 writers and 22 publishers. Growing at the average rate of 564 new writers and 180 publishers every year, the ASCAP membership today numbers more than 8,500 writers and 2,800 publishers.

The early history of the Society was largely a record of litigation through the courts of the nation to establish the principle that the copyright owner was entitled to just compensation whenever his music was "performed publicly for profit". This last phrase is from the 1909 Copyright Act.

But ASCAP is more than legal battles and governmental laws. ASCAP is people - the men and women who create the music and lyrics that are performed not only in the United States but throughout the world.

Part of ASCAP's strength lies in the diversity of the music created by its members, and the honors won by our writers in so many different fields is a constant source of pride to those of us entrusted with the operation of our Society. To cite just a few...

- ...60 ASCAP members have been elected to membership in the National Institute of Arts and Letters.
- ...23 have been awarded various Pulitzer Prizes in music, theatre and poetry.
- ...33 have won the Motion Picture Academy award for the best film song.
- ...21 (including members of affiliated foreign societies) have won the Academy award for the best original film score.

Upon the death of an ASCAP member, royalty payments have been continued to his next of kin. Similarly, a composer whose works become posthumously famous may be elected to ASCAP at the instance of his heirs, who thus share in the income from the use of his works.

Membership in ASCAP is open to any composer or author of a regularly published musical composition, and to any active publisher of music whose publications are used on a commercial scale, and who assumes the financial risk involved in the normal publication of musical works. Members whose compositions are performed by Licensees of the Society, as shown on the Society's surveys of performances, are entitled to share in the distribution of royalties. Membership is available to every qualified composer, author or publisher, regardless of sex, color or creed.

The Society is governed by a board of directors, twenty-four in number, twelve writers (i.e., composers and authors) elected by the writer membership and twelve publishers elected by the publisher members. Three of the publisher members of the board must be publishers of "standard" (serious) music, and three of the writer members of the board must be "standard" writers. Elections for the entire membership of the board take place every two years.

ASCAP is an entirely nonprofit association. The revenue which it collects is divided each three months among the members. The only deductions made are the necessary costs of operation -- maintenance of a sales force, salaries, legal expenses, and the like.

The Society itself owns nothing. It has no money or property of its own. All its assets are the property of its members.

Revenues remaining after deduction of costs of operation are divided half to composer-author members and half to publisher members. Composer-author members themselves decide how their share shall be divided; publisher members do the same for their half. Although the aims and functions of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers are well-known in the musical world, the general public does not always clearly realize that ASCAP is merely a voluntary, nonprofit association of composers and authors and their publishers.

ASCAP is not a corporation. The Society does not publish anything, nor does it have any means of recommending music for publication. It does not buy or sell music, records, transcriptions, or any other physical property.

ASCAP is not a labor union. It has no connection with the American Federation of Musicians, the American Guild of Musical Artists or the Screen Composers' Association.

ASCAP serves the public interest by acting as a clearing house through which users of music may obtain at reasonable rates a license to perform any and all of the compositions written and published by the Society's members. It enables the members in turn to get just and equitable compensation whenever their works are played publicly for profit. With more than 5,000 radio broadcasters, 560 television stations and some 30,000 restaurants, hotels, taverns and other general users of music, it would be impossible for any one member to determine when his songs are being performed, or to negotiate separately a license for each performance.

In the following pages, you will find brief biographies of some 5,238 members. This is more than twice the number of biographies published in our last edition. We hope that in reading about these talented men and women you will gain a knowledge of the breadth and completeness of the ASCAP repertory.

Preface

The 1966 ASCAP Biographical Dictionary represents a conscientious effort to present an accurate picture of the highlights in the careers of the Society's members. It does not attempt to be a complete history of each writer's accomplishments. The music titles, for example, are primarily intended to give a representative sampling. Complete catalogues of all members' works are, of course, on file at ASCAP headquarters.

Some explanations аге necessarv regarding terminology. "Author" refers to one who writes the words, or lyrics, to songs or lengthier compositions. It is also used in the over-all definition of one who writes plays, books, films, poems, etc. "Stage scores" and "Film scores" refer to either composer or author, or both. Under "Collaborators" we have listed only members of the Society, or writers whose works are licensed through the Society. Three general headings have been used to denote the type of musical composition. Under "SONGS" are found primarily brief pieces including words and music; under "INSTRUMENTALS", primarily brief pieces without words; and under "WORKS", lengthier compositions, including concert music, operas, etc. At times, these designations may overlap, but every effort has been made to list the titles after their proper heading.

In determining the information included under each member's name, we have been guided by many reference works. The primary sources have been questionnaires filled out by ASCAP members; the three-volume ASCAP Song Index (1964); the ASCAP 50th Anniversary Hit Tunes; the 1952 ASCAP Biographical Dictionary, edited by Daniel I. McNamara; Baker's Biographical Dictionary of Musicians, edited by Nicolas Slonimsky; Jack Burton's Blue Books of Tin Pan Alley, Broadway Musicals, and Hollywood Musicals; The Columbia Encyclopedia: David Ewen's Popular American Composers; Leonard Feather's New Encyclopedia of Jazz; Stanley Green's The World of Musical Comedy: Julius Mattfield's Variety Music Cavalcade: Nat Shapiro's 2-volume Popular Music (1950-59, 1940-49); Alfred Simon's and Richard Lewine's Encyclopedia of Theatre Music; Sigmund Spaeth's A History of Popular Music in America; Irwin Stambler's Encyclopedia of Popular Music; Oscar Thompson's International Cyclopedia of Music and Musicians; and Who's Who in America. Individual biographies have also been consulted.
