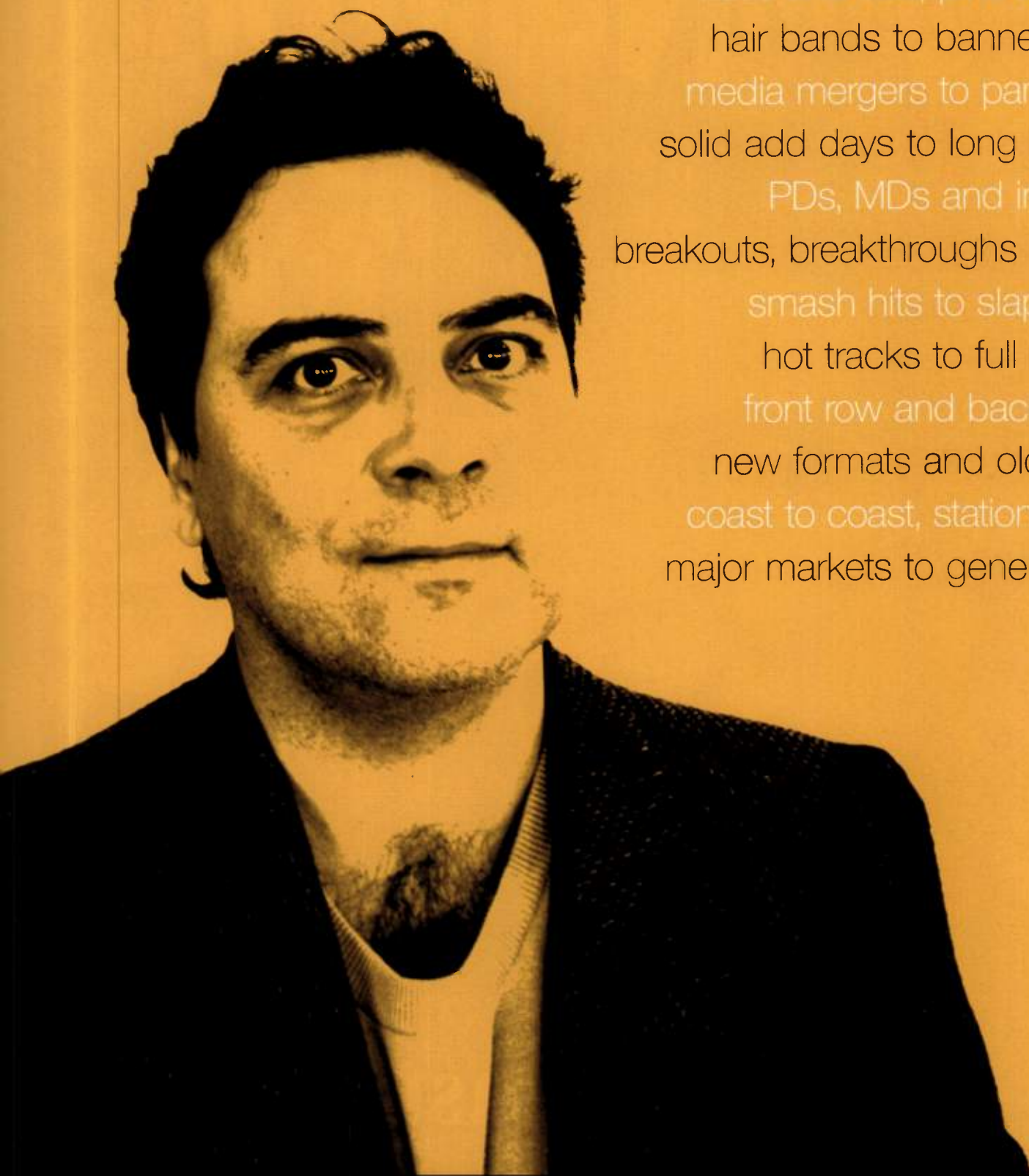

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Twenty years of Tommy Nast. Seems like an impossible task for any consumer to stomach, yet the readers of *Album Network* haven't seemed to mind...at least not so we noticed. The circulation has expanded almost as much as Tommy's waistline.

In the volatile industry known as music (which includes records and radio), 20 years at the same place is as rare as an evening with Tommy without Jäger. Tommy's tenure has outlasted that of everyone else at *Album Network*...including the original owners. In a business that makes most of us gypsies, Tommy planted roots at *Album Network* 20 years ago...and although the branches have spread in many different directions, the trunk has remained solid. Compare your past 20 years with Tommy's and see how implausible his tenure really is. Twenty years ago today, I was programming KFRC San Francisco. After that I moved to New York's WAPP, then to Kansas City, after that to Miami where I was VP programming for TK Communications (overseeing AOR heritage WSHE and Q96 Orlando...this is where I first met Tommy), from there to Sacramento as GM of KWOD and finally to *Network 40*. All this time I was getting to know the Bekins' movers on a personal level while Tommy was saying, "Don't quote me on this, but...."

Tommy Nast is synonymous with *Album Network*. Without Tommy, it would be merely be *The Album Network*...probably more profitable, but not nearly not as much fun.

In the 10 years we have worked together, I've grown to know and admire Tommy. Twenty years at any desk would tend to make one cynical and tired. Not Tommy. He's just as enthusiastic and passionate about the music as he was when I first met him (even though we make fun of the way he taps his foot and plays bad air drums). Just last night he was trying to drag me out to see Tommy Lee.

Tommy and I are as different as two people could be. He's a rocker. I'm Top 40. He shoots Jägermeister. I sip wine. I enjoy sitting quietly at a restaurant. He relishes ripping his shirt off at a bar and spinning people around on his shoulders. He likes hockey. I like golf.

But something funny happened on our way to wherever we were going. We became friends. And partners. I still won't go to a hockey game with him. But I might break down and toast his anniversary with a shot of Jäger. And maybe take a spin at the bar.

To all my fellow Jerry Bruckheimer Bad Boys hockey crew, you are all such great friends that have provided a special bond each week, playing the greatest sport in the world.


To my assistant Kat and all the staff at the Network Magazines, each and every one of you possesses such great qualities. I hope we continue to be a part of each other's lives for a long time.

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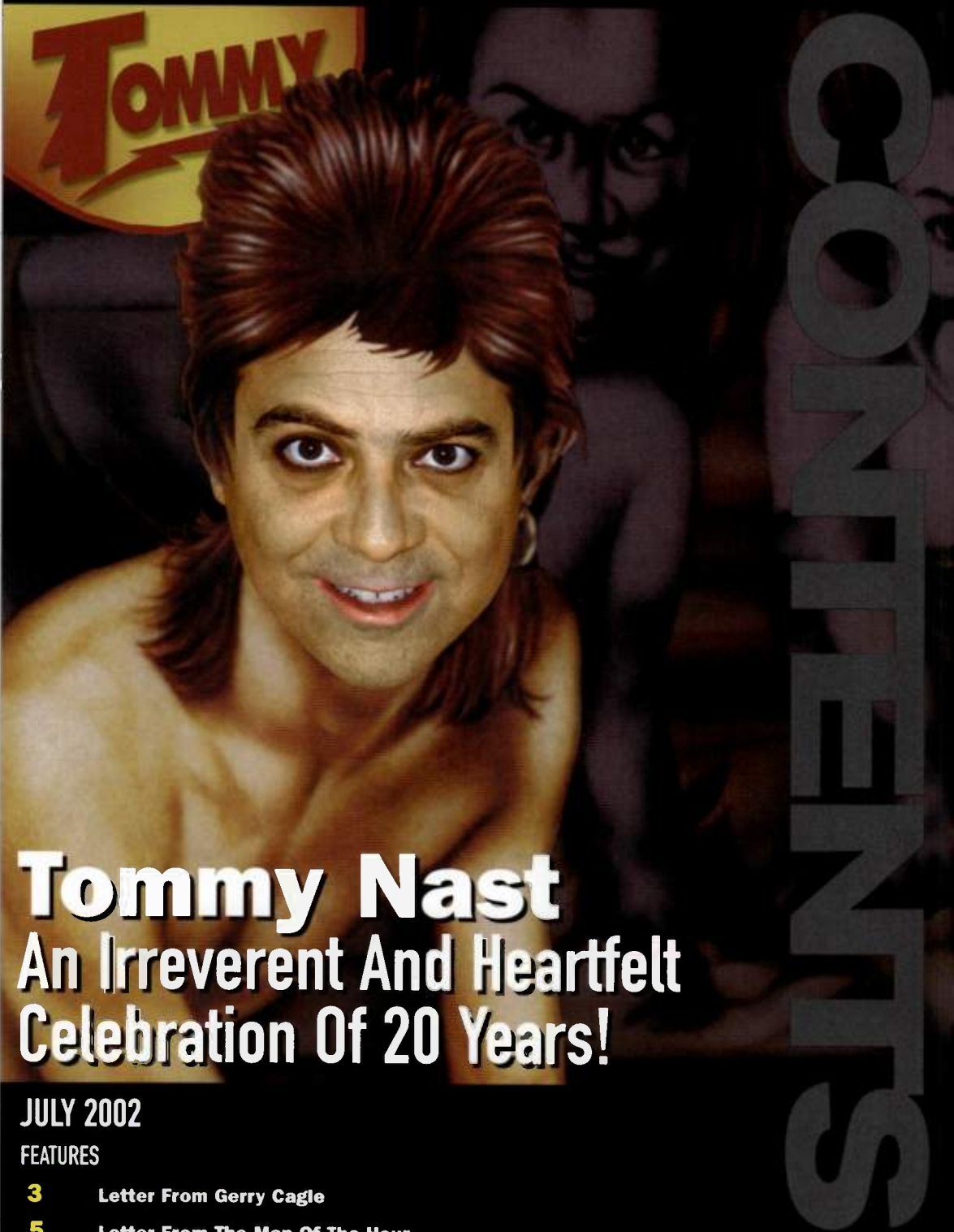

**Has Seen It All, Done It All, Heard It All—And Apparently Drank It All—In His 20 Years At The Album Network**

**F**our score and seven years ago (it was actually only 20, but it *seems* that long), our forefathers brought forth on this company a new employee, conceived in Rochester and dedicated to the proposition—any proposition will do—that all men are created for rock & roll, hockey, wrestling and Jäger shots. Now we are engaged in a great tribute magazine (okay, *great* might be pushing it, but at least it's serviceable), testing whether that employee, or any employee so conceived and so dedicated, can endure 20 years. We have come to dedicate all these pages as a tribute for the man they call Nast (because that's his name) who here gave most of his adult life that *The Album Network* might thrive. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. (Of course, we just work here so what choice did we have anyway?) But in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate (whatever *that* means), we cannot hallow these pages. The man we're honoring has consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract (jeez, this is getting outta hand). # Life of Riley

**When you were a kid, do you remember some of the things that you thought you wanted to be when you grew up?**

I always wanted to be a pro hockey player or a singer in a band.

**And how disappointed are you now that it didn't work out for either of them?**

Well, it's funny, because I've really been lucky, because I've fulfilled so many fantasies that many people couldn't. Everybody knows I love singing "Gloria." I've done that with so many bands, from Cheap Trick to local groups to the people that we work with here when we have parties. That was something that I used to sing when I was in our first band. And it's a good thing I don't pull out "Li'l Red Riding Hood" from Sam The Sham & The Pharaohs, because that was another one. Having a fantasy of singing, and being able to do that with people, and also being able to have the connections that I've made in the world of hockey, and having played with pros and doing camps with them, hockey tournaments and things, it's been pretty good.

**When did you first think that radio was something you might want to try?**

I grew up listening to the big Top 40 station in Rochester, WBBF. I used to call in and win records and request songs all the time. It was big to have dedications to your little girlfriends, and we used to do that all the time. It was great to grow up like that and then be able to go back and work at that station, which I was fortunate enough to do.

**What was your first gig on the air, where you got paid to work?**

I got hired at WSAY, which was just on from 6 am-midnight, and they had three jocks: The morning jock was always Tommy Thomas, the afternoon jock was always Jerry Jack and the night jock was always Mike Melody. Growing up in Rochester, you always heard the same name. The owner of the station, Gordon Brown, felt that if you always kept the same jock name you wouldn't have to pay anybody any decent money, because if somebody wanted to leave, the new guy would just take over the name. He owned the names and everything, so it was pretty funny.

I had come out of College radio thinking, "I did College radio in L.A. and I'm going back to

Rochester so I'll get a job in a heartbeat." I was knocking on doors and it was, "College radio doesn't really count." I got turned down by a number of radio stations at the time, but the last one that I went to was WSAY, and I just happened to be in the right place at the right time. Their morning guy had just quit the day before, and they called me in to read this audition. The next thing I knew, I was doing mornings; my name is Tommy and I just happened to get the Tommy Thomas slot.

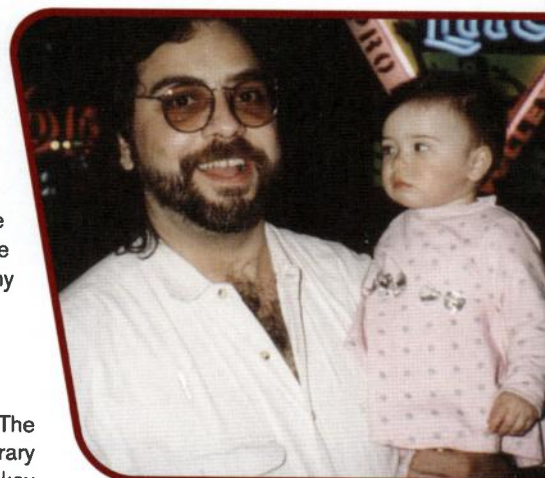
**What was the first song that you ever played?**

I want to say it was Maureen McGovern's "The Morning After." This radio station had an album library that was just phenomenal. I asked the PD, "Is it okay if I play some of these album cuts?" He said, "I'll tell you what, if you want to do it, fine, but if the owner catches you, you're on your own." So I just started throwing these album cuts in. This was the summer of '73 and it was David Bowie, Slade, Mott The Hoople—there were so many bands, and I started putting all this stuff in. That was the year that I ended up creating a great, hard rock AM station. Some people that are familiar with Rochester, like Mike Van Orsdale and Michael Plen, used to listen to it.

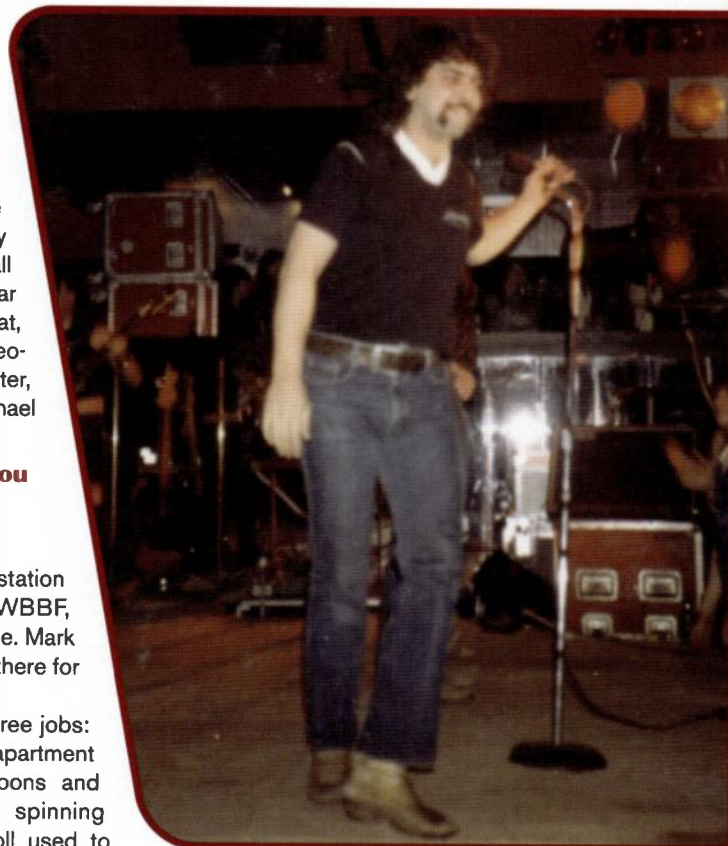
**What other stations did you work at in the Rochester area?**

I worked at one other radio station after a year at 'SAY. I went to WBBF, which was the station at the time. Mark Driscoll hired me and I worked there for six years.

At one time I was working three jobs: I did mornings, I worked at an apartment rental business in the afternoons and three nights a week I was spinning records at clubs. Mark Driscoll used to come into the club and I used to try to fix him up with girls.

## Sounds like payola.

No, just leftovers. I would do anything I could to get his attention. I even remember him washing his car one day as I was walking down the street. He had this hot red Porsche and I was like, "Oh wow, man, check this out, I was the guy on 'SAY and I'd love to work at 'BBF' I worked the guy to death and he finally hired me. So between getting him laid and washing his car, I got hired.

## Who worked you on records back then?

I worked with Kevin Sutter, Barry Lyons, John Sykes, who was my local Epic guy. Phil Quartararo was one of my local guys, too. Bruce Moser and Doug Dombrowski, Jerry Myers, those are some of the indies that I dealt with then. If I only knew then (laughs).

## Was Gary Bird one of your indies?

Gary Bird didn't like me. I had an opportunity to go to a radio station in Cleveland that he worked closely with and he sabotaged me. There were so many people that worked

# SFX Network Group Reorganization

## President Steve Smith Announces Promotions

SFX Network Group President Steve Smith announces a restructuring of the senior management team. Smith says, "These promotions are intended to showcase the complementary talents of four key executives as we continue to integrate our operations with SFX Entertainment and meet the competitive challenges of broadcast and music industry consolidation."

Gerry Cagle is appointed to the newly created position of Executive VP, Publishing for the SFX Network Group. All departments of the company involved in editorial content, research, graphic design and publishing will function at Cagle's direction. Cagle and Smith will work together to expand the company's trade and consumer publishing, including the SFX consumer magazine, *Live Tonight*. Cagle will also be responsible for the company's core business operations. "Eight years ago, when I came to the Network Magazine Group," Cagle recalls, "I told Gary Bird and Steve Smith I wanted us to make history, a lot of money and have fun. They told me to make history, a lot of money and be miserable. Today, I'm happy to say, I'm more miserable than ever!"

Tommy Nast becomes the new Executive VP, Music And Media for the SFX Network Group. Across all music formats, Tommy will set the standards for the company's initiatives in artist development, radio promotion, talent relationships and radio syndication. The New York- and Nashville-based SFX Radio Networks operations will report to Tommy, alongside the essential operations role played by SFXRN Executive VP/GM Ted Utz. Nast says, "First and foremost, for almost 18 years now, I've been following the visions of Steve Smith and have seen them turn into great successes. I look forward to tackling this new role and I'm extremely anxious to work even closer with my partners Gerry Cagle, Miller London and Karmen Beck. Finally, high fives to Gary

Bird on his new venture and I'm extremely happy to see he'll still be around in a consulting role with our companies."

"The Urban Network enjoys unparalleled respect and support of the industry, thanks in large part to the exemplary contributions of Miller London," Smith explains. Miller has been appointed Executive Vice President, Urban Entertainment for the SFX Network Group. Miller, one of the most respected executives in the entertainment industry, who was VP/GM for Motown for over 20 years, says, "I'm excited about the opportunity to expand my role at the SFX Network Group. Working with the team Steve Smith has assembled will enable us to help shape the future of the entertainment business."

Karmen Beck rises to Executive VP/GM of the SFX Network Group. Karmen will be responsible for the day-to-day operations of the SFX Network Group. All operational issues, including convention planning, human resources, financial modeling and business development will be under her direction. Karmen says, "I have been associated with *Album Network* since its inception. I'm very excited to work even closer with Gerry, Tommy and Miller and look forward to my expanding role. I want to acknowledge and thank Bruce, Eli, Gary and Steve for paving the way for me and allowing me to grow. One could not ask for better teachers."

All of the executives will report directly to Steve Smith.

through that marketplace that have gone on to be big record and radio executives, like Jay Meyers, who's now with Clear Channel. He and I worked against each other. There was Paul Barsky and so many other people that came through upstate New York. It was really amazing. It just seems like there was always a thread to upstate New York. The Leeds brothers, too [Harvey and Steve]. That was Rochester.

## And then you moved on to Syracuse?

Yeah. On January 1, 1980, I signed on WSYR 94Rock, which was one of the greatest radio stations, and experiences, I've ever been involved in. Lee Abrams and Lee Michaels put it on and it was just phenomenal. I never saw anybody just take over a town the way we did. Our battles against Ted Utz and Ed Levine were legendary at the time.

## What station were they at?

WAQX. They were in the market before us. We were part of Newhouse and had this big 100,000-watt signal that covered everywhere, from Albany to Rochester to Watertown to Binghamton and into Canada.

## What was your name at that station?

Tommy Nast.

## Were you the Music Director?

Yeah, and I ran the station there for a bit after Howie Castle left. Howie and I were quite a team there. I was the Music Director and when Howie left, I was offered the Program Director job there. I had a few other offers at the time. Doug Sorenson, God rest his soul, had offered me a job in Minneapolis. Lee Arnold had offered me a job, and Howie wanted me to go to work for him in Pittsburgh. Then *The Album Network* job came up and I ended up coming here.

## So you were in Syracuse for how long?

Almost two and a half years. I can tell you stories for days about Syracuse. The legendary bus station story is one that comes to mind. We really set the standard for competition. There was such a battle between 95X and 94Rock, which we always won, for the most part. It used to be a big deal to get the exclusive, to be the first station to play an album in its entirety. You know, "Here's a brand-new record by so and so." We used to always out-exclusive each other.

One record stands out: Judas Priest's *British Steel*. Now, this was in the pre-Federal Express days, and what we used to do was put a record—and it was a record at the time—on the bus. My friend in Rochester had a copy of the Judas Priest record before it came out, and he put it on a bus to me. Knowing that it was going to be at the bus station at 6 pm, we were on the air promoting the fact that, "Tonight at 11, we'll play you a brand-new exclusive record. We're not even gonna tell you what it is, but it's gonna be a major artist." We didn't want to tip off 95X as to what records we were gonna be breaking, because then they'd call the label and get a cease & desist. We'd surprise the hell out of 'em. Well, Ted Utz and Ed Levine heard that promo, and just happened to go to the bus station. Utz said, "I'm



picking up a package for Tommy Nast," and they gave him the package. The person that I sent to pick it up was told, "You already picked it up." We used to monitor each other to hear what was going on and sure enough, the next thing we knew, 95X was saying, "Tonight we've got the new Judas Priest British Steel album." We freaked; I got so pissed off I called the cops and said, "This is Tommy Nast from 94Rock and I want to report a case of corporate espionage. This is going to cost our company thousands in revenue because of the ratings we might lose." In the meantime, I'm telling Howie, "Listen, you've got to drive back to Rochester, because if we get another copy we can still play it." So we were still able to play it at the same time as they did.

The cops kept going back and forth to the radio station and Ed Levine was telling the police, "Oh, no way, it's totally a bunch of lies." Finally it got pretty heavy and the cops were gonna take us both in for lie-detector tests. They told Levine, "Okay, we're gonna ask you one more time, who took this record?" And he goes, "Ted Utz." He burned Utz, and it got to be a pretty ugly scene. Ted actually ended up leaving the station. He will deny that that was why he left, but he ended up leaving to go run 'PYX in Albany.

We had one of the biggest radio wars going. I walked out to my car one night and it was wrapped up in aluminum foil. Ed Levine claimed that I had his car egged, which I will never admit to.

### So did you?

Now would I actually do something like that to somebody like him?

### In a heartbeat.

He gave somebody some free albums to try to harass me in a bar, and I turned around and told that same guy, "I'll give you \$100 if you go and throw a beer bottle at him right now." He was spinning records, and the guy whipped a beer bottle in there. It really was pretty ugly.

### So you and Ed have had a wonderful, long-running relationship?

Oh yeah, absolutely. We became good friends after all of the stuff that happened. To this day, we're still very competitive with each other; it's pretty funny. He's really done a great job, though. Ed's gone on to become a great business person, owning radio stations in that area, so it really worked out for all of us.

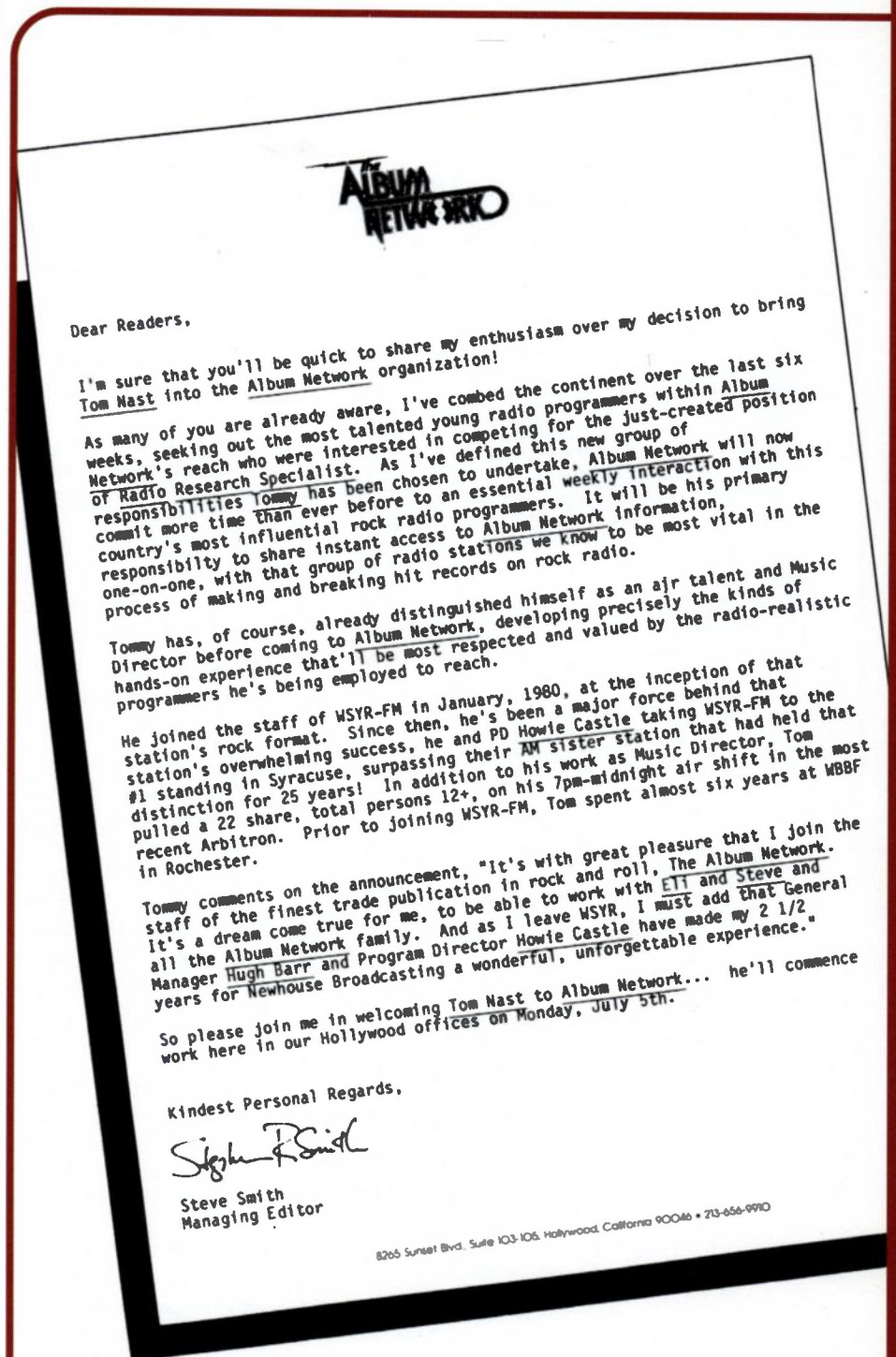
### How did your relationship with *The Album Network* begin?

I was reporting our list every week to Luanne Siebert. We had, like, a little phone relationship. Then I came out here on a vacation. Having the relationship in L.A., having gone to high school and college, I used to love coming back out here. Even when I worked in Rochester, I'd visit the record guys out here. Then I met Luanne and came to *Album Network* to visit. Luanne, Steve, Deborah Smith and a guy named Fred Moore were here. Luanne and I hooked up and we fell for each other, which started a long-distance romance. In the meantime, Fred Moore left and Steve Smith had an opening. Luanne said, "Jeez, you ought to try to go for this job." I was like, "Okay, it would be awesome. I'd love to do that."

### What was it that made you leave radio to work for a trade magazine?

It was L.A.; it was an opportunity to be on both sides. I was still talking to all the radio stations and I was hanging out with the record companies. I always loved the mystique of the promo guy, because back then, the promo guy was probably perceived a lot differently than today. I remember when the label guys would come in, it was like, "Free dinners, free drinks. We're gonna party and hang out." There was an aura. They would cre-

ate promotions and get dressed up in outfits! The job seemed like it would be really cool—to be able to talk to the creative radio guys, the ones that were into breaking music at the time, and have the record guys to deal with as well, too; to write record reviews, to be a part of what I thought was just a great scene in the early '80s. Jesus, I would never have thought that I'd still be here 20 years later.

### When you came here, did you have a short-term plan, or was it open-ended?

I think Steve wanted to get somebody who could take some of the pressure off of him, somebody who had good relationships. At the time, to me, *FMQB* was the East Coast trade and *Album Network* was the West Coast trade. One of my first goals was to make *Album Network* as well-known and nationally renowned as possible. With the fact that I had a big connection with radio people in the Northeast, as well as other parts of the country, it was a good fit. Steve would always set up a great game plan—he was always brilliant in putting together a game plan and having the right people execute them. Steve and I had a good yin and yang to our relationship. It got to a point where Steve didn't want to be the one asking record companies for money, and it was something that just came naturally to me—helping to establish new bands, breaking records and getting support for the work that we were doing.

### How long was it after you got here before you asked Luanne to marry you?

A year. We lived together when I got here. I moved here in June/July, and asked her to marry me Christmas of that year and we got married at Eli's house the next July.

### Who was your best man? Bryan Adams?

No, it was Marko Babineau. Bryan Adams was there.

### What kinds of things do you do as Executive VP Music & Media?

Overseeing everybody and making sure that all of our various sections are meeting the financial goals that we set. Talking to all the major record executives and making sure on that level that they're happy with what we're doing, trying to help them infiltrate the Clear Channel system. I've been dealing a lot with our concert promoters and giving them information that will help them make the best decisions on what acts they book. I'm still helping out Tom Maguire on the Nasty Nooz—and I want to say how great a job he's done in representing that. There are so many different things, like helping Gerry Cagle with all of our strategic moves within the record business.

### Do you still talk to radio?

Absolutely, especially now that we're doing the PDPs within Clear Channel, from Brad Hardin to Michael Steele, as well as my buds Dave Richards, Keith Hastings and Charlie Logan, just to name a very few of the many.

### You have this reputation for playing great practical jokes on people. How did that come up?

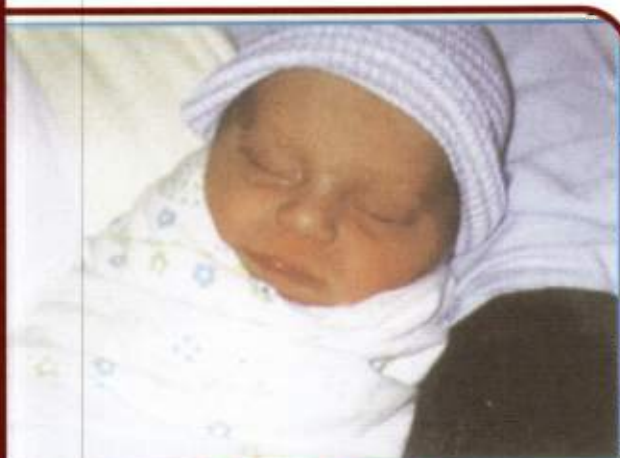
I always liked doing bits on the radio when I was on the air. I always thought I was a pretty good jock and was creative when I was given the opportunity with the right program directors, and phone bits were always great. I've always been into practical jokes. It's just been something that I've always done since I was a kid. I would hide in a closet for a half hour just to be able to pop out and scare somebody.

I love pulling practical jokes and I still do phone bits all the time. I've done it to many of my friends, from Jeff Naumann to Paul Brown to J.B. Brenner and Lou Blair. I've been fortunate enough to tape some things, too. The funniest thing was when I called and said I was a travel agent and was trying to cancel Jeff and Ellen [Naumann]'s honeymoon. When I got J.B., I told him about all the other pranks I did and he called me up and went, "Nast, I'm so pissed at you, I thought it was you." I said, "What are you talking about?" "The guy that was working for me called me and he had this lisp and talked real funny and I was like, 'Fuck you, Nast, I know it's you,' and it wasn't you; it was really him."

It was so funny when Jeff Naumann and I set up Ellen so terribly one day while they were doing construction. We called her at work and I said that I was a contractor and had broken a water line. I had her get Jeffrey on the phone and he wasn't gonna cooperate, and I said it was gonna cost more money to do it. We actually had this whole thing set up to make it seem that the house was flooding. We hung up and laughed and by the time we called her back to tell her it was a joke, she had darted out the door and gone to the house already. Needless to say, Jeffrey had a couple of chilly nights.

### Let's talk about Powercuts, the radio show, which ran from the mid-'80s to the early '90s.

Global Satellite Network wanted to work with us to create a new radio show. We had great success with that show. We came up with a concept of a weekly Rock superstition—not necessarily a countdown show, but the hottest songs that were happening each week and interviews with the artists that made them. It was an interactive show; we had people calling up nationwide to vote on a 900 number for

their favorite two songs. There was David Perry hosting, then Geno Michellini. Cindy Tollin, Mark Felsot and I put the show together and we made a great team. We went out on the road and cleared it on stations. I think we did a real good job and the show had a really great run.

**And that's where the Nasty Nooz thing in the magazine got started.**

Yeah, Nasty Nooz started on the radio first as a feature.

In The Studio had a tremendous run, as well, too.

Redbeard is still utilizing a lot of the interviews that he did on his great XM show.

**What is your percentage in the Jägermeister company?**

God, I should have millions. When Howie Castle moved to Memphis, I went in for a show—this had to be about 1985, '86, something like that. He goes, "You've got to try this drink, it's called Jägermeister." Several shots later, it was like, "Wow, man." The next thing you know, it's one of those things that are legendary. You can't do it every night, but every time I'd travel there would always be somebody that would say, "Hey, Nast, you've got to do a Jäger with me, let's go." When 20 people want to do a Jäger with you, you're dead. But the next thing you know, it was like, "Drink Jäger, let's go, let's go," and bands were picking up on it.

**Speaking of bands, you've been involved with breaking a couple. Is there one that comes to mind that you're the most proud of?**

I can't say one, but I can say several that I've always taken pride in being a part of from the early days, from Bryan Adams to Van Halen. I've enjoyed working with the Van Halen guys and being fortunate to be an insider and what I consider a friend to them throughout the years in every facet of the band. [Late VH manager] Ed Leffler was always a dear friend and a mentor of mine and I think that helped the relationship, but I've always been happy to have been involved with them.

The Black Crowes were another one. I remember seeing them for the first time and going, "Oh, wow. There is something really special about these guys." The Black Crowes were a great band to see and if they ever get back together again, they still will be. There are really so many, though. In Syracuse, if you can break something in a region or locally in your marketplace, it's just as good. To this day, I'm really proud of what I did with Benny Mardones. Many people don't know that he had one of the biggest songs in the world, "Into The Night." And you know what? It's rare to see something like this, but there's a documentary that has just been filmed about Benny and how he has made it in one market; why he happened in Syracuse, New York, and nowhere else. There were people featured in there, from Bill McGathy to Tommy Mottola, who have all got stories.

**Do they have you in there?**

Yes, I'm in the movie.

**When does that come out?**

They're working on it; it was just screened at the SXSW Film Festival and it got unbelievable reviews. I saw it and I was just riveted—it's just a really, really great story.

**Let's talk about your family: You've got two kids—how old are they now?**

Ali's nine, Nicky's four. Ali's very musical and a great dancer. I think she gets a lot of her musical influences from me and Luanne, and she's big time into horses, which Luanne grew up with. So Luanne has helped her in her horse training and she's been very successful, getting first-place blue ribbons and having successful shows at a very early age. She's got great promise for that. Nicky, God love him, is just like his dad: Into hockey and wrestling, and that's great. He's just a little personality as well, too. Neither of the kids are real shy.

**Describe a typical weekend at the Nast house.**

Oh, there's screaming; it's like *The Osbournes*, you know? I can't get the remote to work, "What the beep is going on with this beep?"

**And that's Nicky talking.**

Yeah (laughs). We live kind of far away and it's a long haul, so on weekends I like to try to spend as much time with the family as I can, whether it's just hanging out in our backyard or going to movies together. I still like to go out to shows when I can, although nobody comes close to Robert England when it comes to doing the show routine. But I get out and do dinners and visit with clients, have meetings, etc., so a lot of times, as far away as I live, I'm not home every night

Except for the past few months, I've been involved in head to head competition for four years. In that time, I've received, and have also been denied, many a co-promotion. In our battles with WSYR-FM, we were out-witted and out-rated. So all things being equal, co-promotions generally didn't go to my station. I would fight for the promoter not to give any station a co-promotion (a good pact if you've got the lesser ratings), and then challenge the other station to out-promote you. Some of my favorite stunts include holding a banner contest outside the only entrance to an SYR-FM promoted Eddie Money concert. We've also done things like giving away a free limo outside the arena where The Cars were playing, and doing it the night of the SYR sponsored concert. And at all of their co-promoted shows, we always showed up outside the hall with a huge sound system and thousands of free concert patches. The impact of this, visibility-wise, was tremendous.

However, more importantly, the impact psychologically on the staff of that station had to be enormous. We don't have the problem with co-promotions anymore, but in a strange way, I miss it. I mean, it got so intense that Tommy Nast had to leave radio altogether (Editor's Note: Ed, I left with a 13. As I recall, you had a 31)

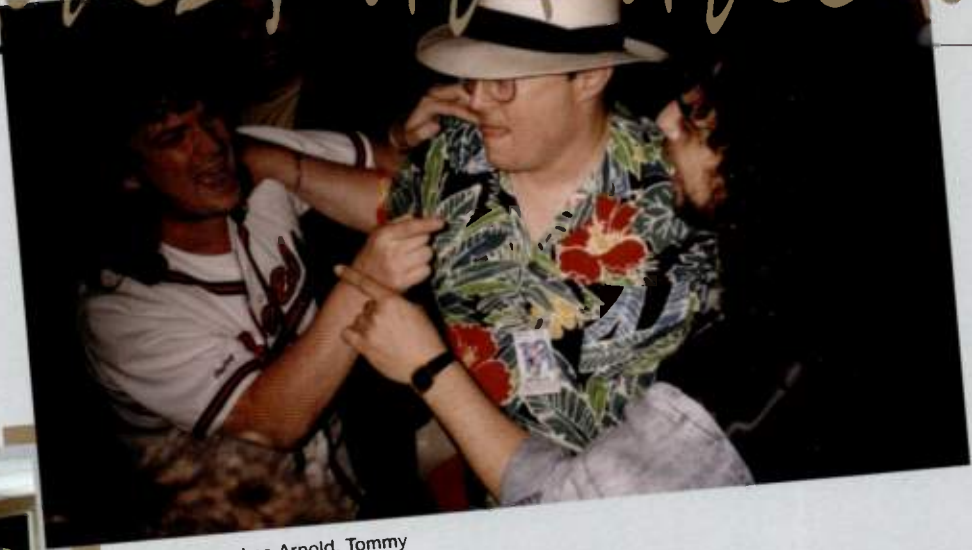

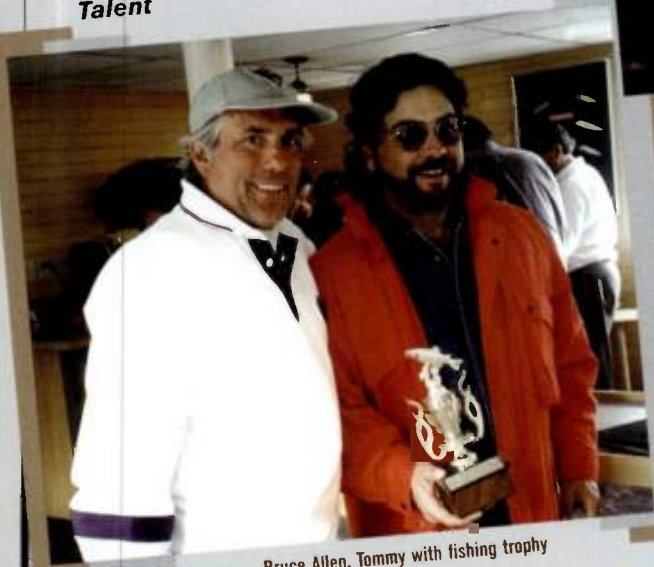

**This music industry is in a lot of trouble. How would you fix it?**

(Grinning) A lot more trade ads. People tell me that it's gonna get worse before it gets better. I'm

starting to feel that it's getting better. I'm extremely happy that there are some newer labels that are starting to see the light of day. I appreciate the business that our major clients have given us. I'm extremely grateful to the labels that have supported us over the years, and I understand what they're going through right now. Record companies are always perceived as having the deepest pockets and looked at as a well that would never run dry, but you haven't seen the prices of CDs and recorded music go up at the same pace as the price of making music. You haven't seen those major price shifts to accommodate the cost of doing business today. It's real tough, but I'm happy to see the emergence of the Palm Records of the world, the ARTISTdirects, the Artemis Records. A lot of the smaller labels, like Extasy—I could name more and more. Lost Highway is an amazing label. What Luke Lewis has done there is just an amazing story. What they've done with Ryan Adams and other artists—jeez, look at *O Brother, Where Art Thou?* I'm just glad to see that there are more labels, because we need to support the music that these labels are bringing us to keep the lifeblood of the business going and to keep it healthy. I hope that's going to be the case, but it's a shrinking world out there, and the labels have to deal with recorded music issues. I don't know if there's a plan that can be put into place that will protect the artists' rights. I don't believe that people should just be giving music away for free. I don't think it's right to take music from artists without their permission. What startled me the most was when I heard that recordable CDs are far outselling recorded music. I think that it's wise to utilize singles today to promote downloads for the right price. The record companies have to embrace modern technology and they've got to be able to do it with everybody's help and support. If we can all get on the same page, we can try to clear up that issue.

**Is the rumor true that the cast of *Married With Children* asked you to be a regular?**

Oh, yeah (chuckles). No, they didn't ask me to be a regular. Wild Elmo was a one-time-only thing, my 15 minutes of fame.

**How much do you get every time that's played?**

Oh, I still get about three or four bucks a year. I actually got a \$6 check this week.

**Has anybody ever come up to you and said, "I got into radio because of you?"**

Absolutely. There have been people in the radio and music business—one of our concert promoters for Clear Channel, Geoff Gordon out of Philadelphia, was my paperboy in Rochester when I was on the air at 'BBF. Duane Doherty [of KDGE Dallas] said he used to listen to me on the radio. There is nothing more rewarding than having someone come to you and tell you, "I used to listen to you on the radio," or, "It's because of you that I did this."

**Anything else you'd like to add?**

I want to take a second to thank Gerry Cagle for letting us put this together. He's been a great partner and when he came in as President, a lot of people were surprised that he and I were gonna be able to work together as closely as we did. There's been a great mutual respect between the two of us. Miller London has been a great person and a great part of the upper management team here, and Karmen Beck is one of my dearest friends. She does just an amazing job here. We've been lucky enough to have great senior executive guys here, too, like Robert England and Jim Nelson, guys that have been here for so long. You guys have really made me look good on so many occasions. The whole staff has been great. 🎧

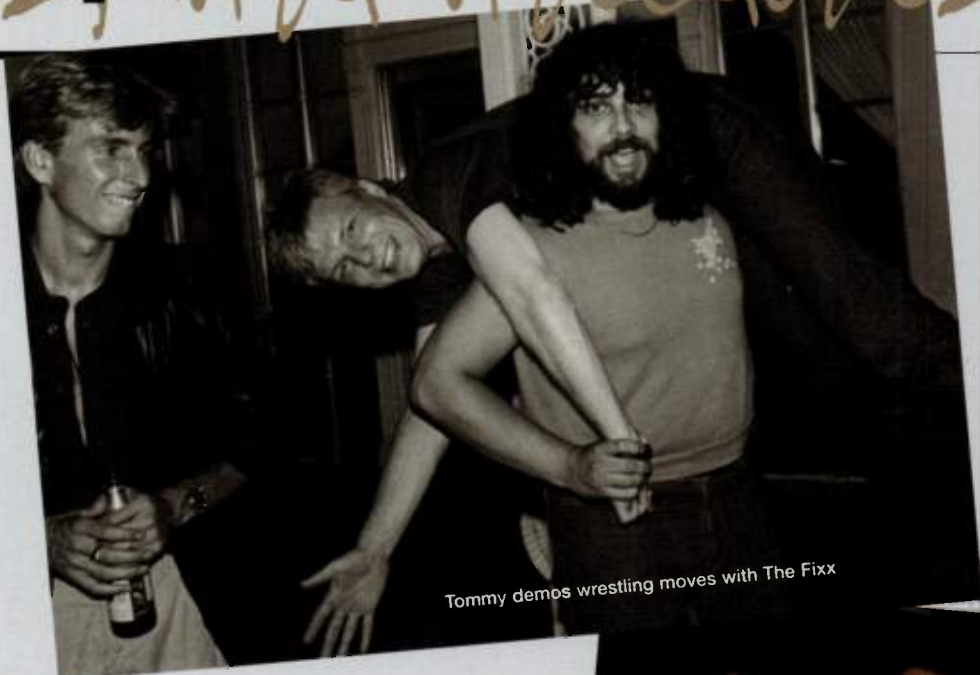

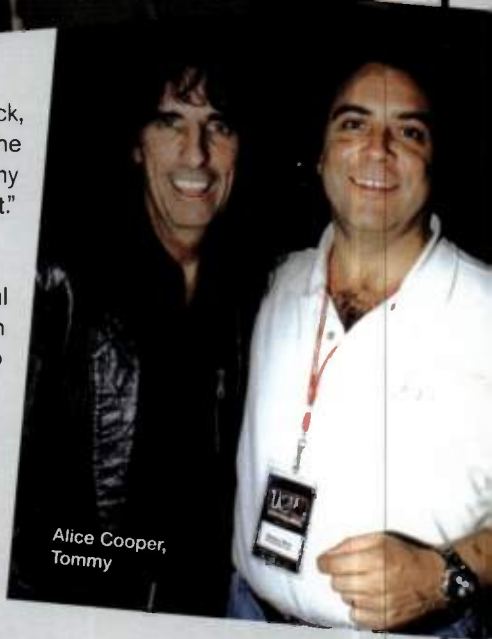

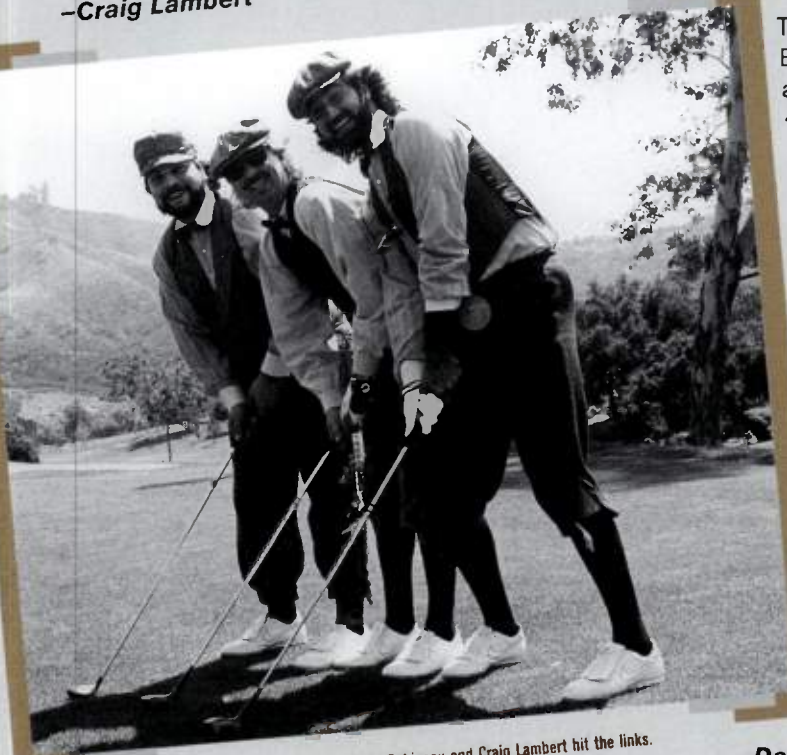

"In remembrance of 'Tchommy' Nast's 20th anniversary, I recall, back in the mid-to late '70s, during radio's halcyon days, Tommy was known under the *nom de air* of Tommy Thomas. People still remember his inimitable style on what was then a progressive AM Rock station. They used to end their broadcast day with the rosary—and Lord knows they needed to, after Tommy Nast and his satanic bent on music. He was well-known for playing Ten Years After's 'I'm Goin' Home' right before the end of his shift.

I, being much younger, somewhat hazily remember listening to Tommy, as I was a mere college student at the time. Years later, when I got into radio and Tommy was long since departed for the West Coast, we were guests of Geffen Records at a record junket in Memphis. We were down for some band, I can't even remember who it was, which may have been due to the fact that I was under the influence of one Thomas Nast. We stayed at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis (the place with the ducks and the lovely lobby bar) and all I remember is constantly hiding bottles of Jägermeister under our chairs every time hotel security came around. I don't remember if anything happened with the ducks. That's my story and I'm sticking to it.

"There was also the infamous trip a bunch of us took to Graceland the day before the showcase. I remember making an indelible impression on the staff, because when they conduct the tour, you stop in each room, they tell you a little about it and then you move on. So after they would finish their little spiel in each room, all of us would just kind of mumble, in Elvis voices, 'Thank you, thank you very much.'"

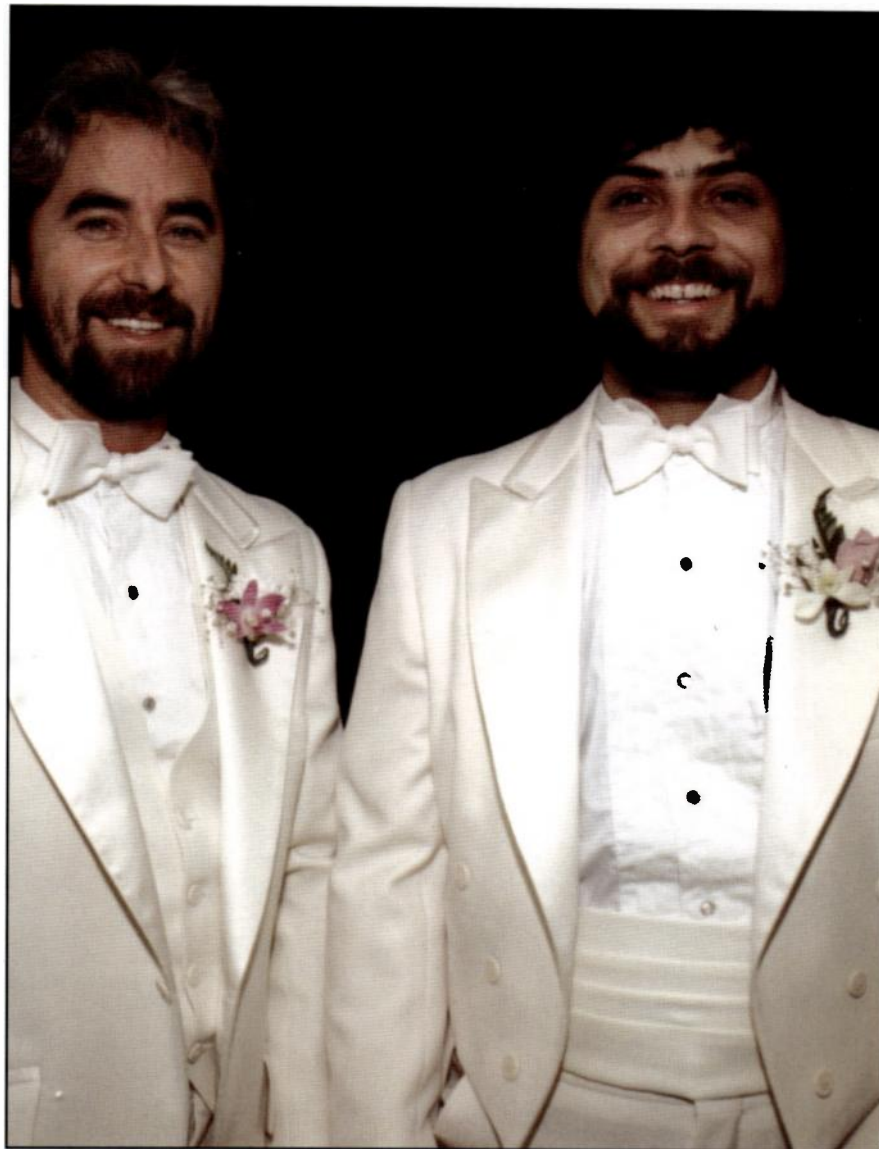

"I worked at *The Album Network* twice; once in 1983 and then again in 1985 doing Marketing Research. My prior jobs were Music Director at KMET Los Angeles and ACE Entertainment (indie promo). Tommy, Lu and Steve were old friends (via my days at KMET) and we'd always talked about working together at some point. But the real truth is, they bailed me out when my previous gigs imploded. My job interviews with Tommy usually consisted of our closing down Boardner's in the bowels of Hollywood at 2 or 3 in the morning. Ergo, I seriously doubt that either one of us could recall a damn thing about what was discussed. F.Y.I.: Boardner's is a legendary drinking establishment.

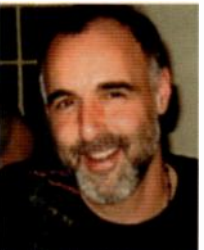

Steve Smith and I met then and discussed the possibility of my coming out to L.A. Steve needed someone to help Luanne

Nast do all of the work, since Tommy was out partying every night! So I became *The Album Network's* Music Director from 1983 to 1990.

"My office was directly next to Tommy's for seven-and-a-half years. Christ...every day was memorable! I learned more about hockey than I ever needed to know. We were a family back then, putting in 12-hour days—sometimes more. We did everything together. The night we all went to Tom Petty's house to hear *Southern Accents* was something I'll never forget. Tommy's bachelor party...just a couple of guys sitting around, drinking beer and playing folk songs on acoustic guitar. Very mellow.

"What did I learn from Tommy Nast? Honestly? No matter what you did the night before, get your ass into the office, do your work and have a good attitude about it. Tommy never complained. Complaining is for wimps! Nasty-ola of rock and rolla. You'll always be a big part of my L.A. life and Jill and I love you, man.

"Before I joined *The Album Network* I had jumped from radio to the record side of the fence to do promotion with what was then the

biggest Midwest rock independent company, New Avenues Music. The players were Craig Lambert, Dave Loncao, Mike VanOrsdale (Vano) and me. We were based in Chicago and we ruled. Black Friday changed that, the last time the anti-independent flag was raised and we all went to labels. I was doing regional promotion for Arista and was on the road with The Grateful Dead. I met Steve Smith and Tommy Nast at a Conclave convention and they were looking for someone to act as a liaison between the labels and radio. I believe I made an impression in a suite at the Conclave somewhere between 3 and 4 am. For whatever reason, Steve and Tommy thought I might fit in and flew me out to Burbank and I bit. I had never seen a baggage carousel that was outdoors. Ah, California. I was the Research Administrator from I think 1986 to 1990, but I did whatever Luanne Nast told me to do.

"Memorable events? Highlights of my life, more like it. I distinctly remember going to the Grammys with Tommy and Luanne. We went to an after-party at Chasen's and I ended up sitting in a booth with Tom Petty, George Harrison and Bob Dylan. My wife at the time didn't recognize Harrison and asked him what he did for a living. He told her he had a band and she asked him to hum a few bars of a song she might recognize. I was shrinking by the minute only to find that Petty, Dylan and Harrison found her innocence—or ignorance—refreshing.

"Tommy always had hockey tickets, and before the Kings signed 'The Great One' you could shoot a cannon through the Forum. That was fun; I couldn't believe you could order sushi at a hockey game. Tommy always got us into the Forum Club after the game to hang with the Kings and the Lakers. That was always a trip. Having a constant flow of artists come by our offices on a weekly basis was also tons of fun. Before Steve Smith realized it took away from the work at hand, we'd always invite them into our conference room and they'd play acoustic. Plus we'd always have the advances way before radio, so we could pump up the excitement. I vividly remember hearing Aerosmith's 'Love In An Elevator' on the way to a Dodger game in the backseat of Marko Babineau's BMW—Tommy was always in the front. It was a Hollywood brat pack with Marko, Mark Di Dia, me, and at least one rotating L.A. heavy. We're talkin' stupid times.

"One thing about Nast no one else knows is he's an extremely loyal fuck. This business was based on relationships and all that's changed now. Tommy Nast is not a fair-weather friend. For all the people he's beat over the head for advertising over the past 20 years, I can honestly say I've never once heard him speak ill of anyone. For some of the crass things you've heard, there are so many more instances of class you haven't heard about. He helps people in many walks of life and doesn't brag or really talk about it. Plus, he's a great father and he loves his wife, as well he should. Take all the snowfall in Buffalo for the last 20 years and you've got an idea of the size of this guy's heart.

"Tommy, you, sir, are a testimony to the survival of an ultimate cross between a true party animal and a true businessman. To think you've outlived in every sense of the word the guy who jogged every day, wrote a book about it and dropped dead during a morning run, is a true testimony to your staying power—which, by the way, preceded Viagra and Bullhead!"

So was going to Kings games and hanging out with Luc Robitaille sometimes afterwards, and the outrageous roast beef sandwiches at the Whistle Stop at the Forum.

"I remember the night of the Guns N' Roses *Use Your Illusion* broadcast, I told Duff McKagan to go fuck himself because he was pissed off I didn't go down the street and get him some more liquor. Tommy had my back with his manager, who took exception to the fact that I didn't move 3,000 miles to be some drunk asshole's delivery boy.

"What did I learn from Tommy Nast? Names and locations of dealers, pimps, hookers, bookies, underground gambling establishments...you know, the important stuff. Oh yeah, and always—no wait, *never* park in Gary Bird's private parking space.

"I will pay Tommy the greatest compliment of all: Every time we fucking went out, it was a story. For the normal, everyday guy, these would be stories, but for Nast, it was pretty normal stuff to experience something stupendous just about every time.

Unbeknownst to me, *The Album Network* was looking to expand their broadcast department and Tommy suggested that we meet immediately. It was a lunch with Steve Smith and Tommy Nast at the former Burbank eating institution known as Chadney's. They were very enthusiastic about my coming to work at *The Album Network* as soon as possible and they had no problems making sure I would make more money than at my previous place of employment. Thank you, Steve and Tommy! I started in July 1992 and eventually became VP Broadcast Services until December 31, 2000, when there was a change in ownership and I was traded for a player to be named later.

"I have many memories of my time at *The Album Network*. The *Album Network* 20th Anniversary Party at the Santa Monica Pier was a great evening. The Van Halen *Balance* World Premiere Broadcast in London that Tommy co-hosted. The AC/DC World Premiere Broadcast in London that Tommy hosted, which included a side trip to Amsterdam...oops, I was already well paid to keep my mouth shut about that one. I also learned that when Tommy said, 'This record is going to be huge,' it meant that we were going to be doing a radio show with that artist no matter how bad the record was.

"Since I don't have the pictures to back any of them up, all my 'Nasty' stories are just hearsay—and since I still live in the same city as Tommy I'll just leave it at that. Let's just say that the next time (and there will be plenty of those moments) you see Tommy starting to drink Jägermeister, find a video camera and start recording because something unique/amazing/unbelievable/outrageous (pick one) is about to happen. And it is at that point you will learn something about Tommy Nast that no one else knows. And it won't be pretty!

"And lastly, in the nine years of working with Tommy I was able to avoid the world famous Tommy Nast airplane spin! Tommy—congratulations on finally winning the Stanley Cup!"

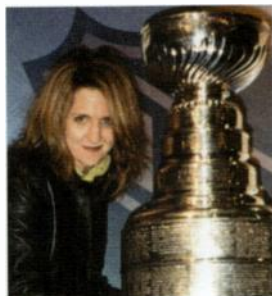

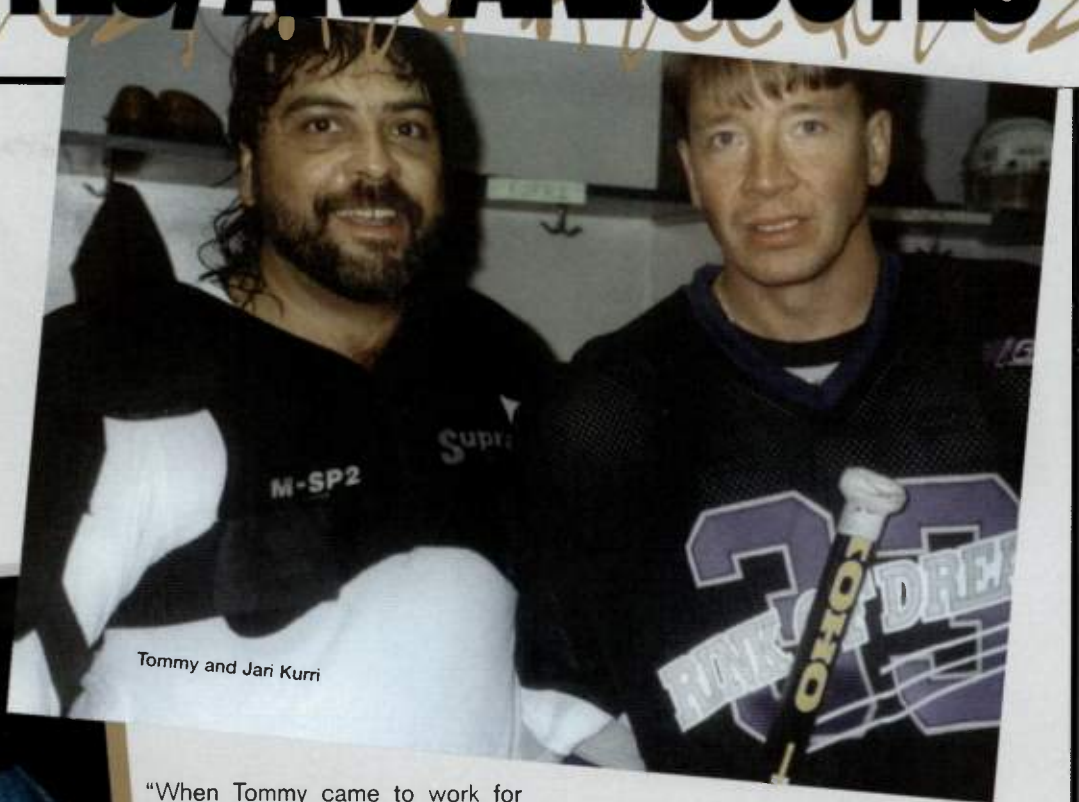

"When Tommy came to work for 94Rock in December '79, we had to prepare the rest of the people working in the WSYR radio and TV center. It was a very conservative company and the other employees were warned that the new FM people might look a 'little different.' Tommy's trademark look was long, curly hair, a Fu Manchu mustache, a white or blue cotton work shirt and blue jeans with rainbow suspenders. He got a lot of strange looks and generated more than a few whispers. But the highlight was on Halloween day in 1980, when fellow 94Rock staffer Michele Michaels (now with WDVE Pittsburgh) came to work as 'Tommy Nast'...her hair in big curls, a painted-on mustache, a white cotton work shirt, and blue jeans with rainbow suspenders! It was classic!

"In 1980, 94Rock and 95X were locked in a fierce, and not very friendly, competitive battle. Each station would try to scoop the other on airing core artists first. 94Rock had an advantage, because our station was in downtown Syracuse, while 95X was located in Manlius, a suburb. This allowed earlier mail delivery to our place, including special delivery packages. We were also only a few blocks from the bus station, which is how many of the upstate record reps would ship albums.

"On one occasion, Magic 92.5 in Rochester, about 90 miles west and a fellow Burkhart-Abrams station, got an advance copy of the Judas Priest *British Steel* album and was airing tracks. They offered to send a dub of the album on the bus to Syracuse so we could air it on our midnight album feature. Once we knew the tape was on the way, we began promoting a 94Rock 'exclusive.' Unknown to us was that 95X was able to monitor Magic 92.5 and heard them playing tracks, then heard our promos. They correctly guessed we'd be getting a tape on the bus, so they checked the schedule and were there waiting when the bus came in. Their program director identified himself as being from 94Rock, got the tape and scribbled some signature on the release form. When one of our staff members arrived a short time later, she was told the tape had already been picked up.

"Then 95X began promoting that *they* had an 'exclusive' on the same album. Tommy was on the air at the time and figured they had intercepted the tape, so he called me at home and I drove all the way to downtown Rochester, picked up another tape, then drove all the way back to Syracuse with about 20 minutes to spare before our midnight airing. But it didn't end there. Tommy had called the police and lodged a complaint. When the police showed up the next day at the 95X studios, the staffers there at first denied the whole incident, but later admitted that they'd taken the tape, then tried to downplay it as a harmless prank. When the police called Tommy back and said 95X wanted to settle the matter, he told them he didn't want to talk to them...just 'Book 'em!' The following day, the GMs got involved and the matter was quietly settled. But it's a story that's still around, more than 20 years later.

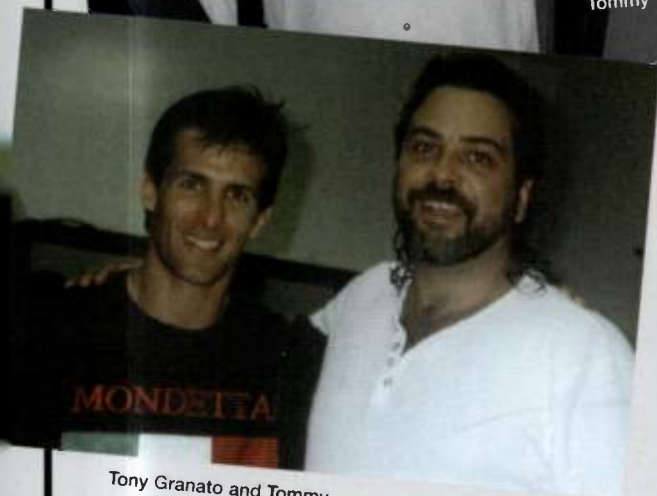
"There are other stories, like the two stations calling the fire marshals on each other when we'd have club promotions. The clubs would usually be over capacity, so the fire marshals would close them down for a while. This became very disruptive and both stations eventually stopped doing it.

"To be honest, there are even more stories, but they wouldn't be suitable in print!"

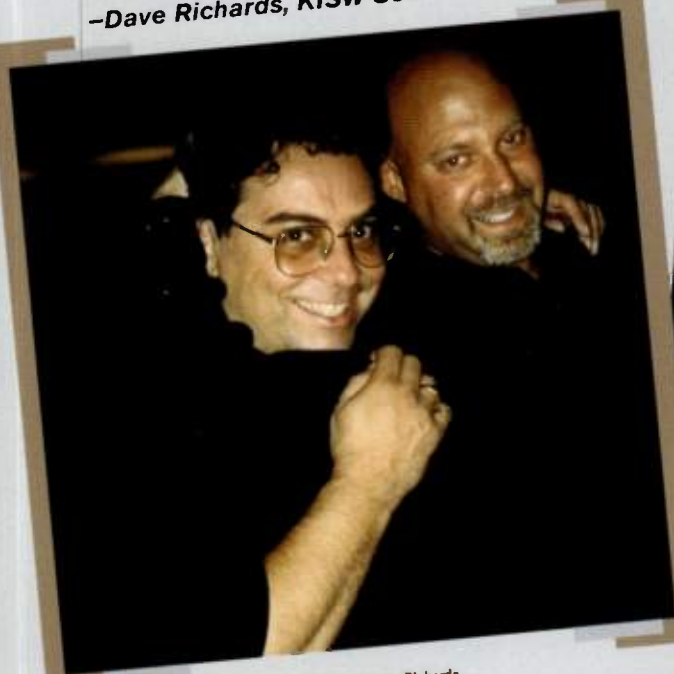

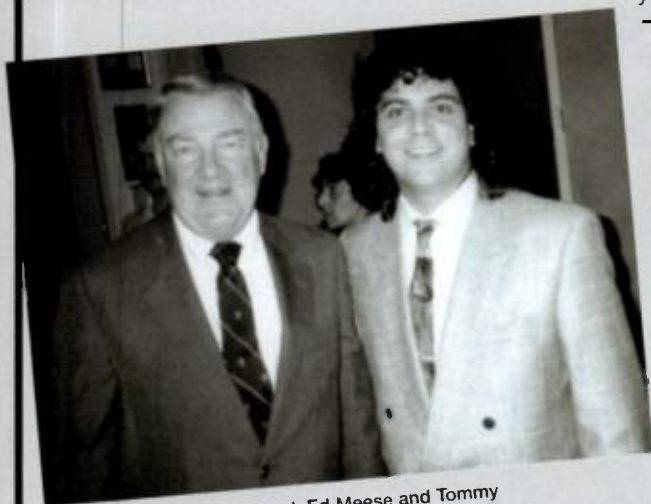

The Day I Met Tommy Nast And My Life Changed.

"It was 26 years ago to the da—okay, that's conjecture. It could be, but after more than a quarter-century, let's say plus or minus three months. I was working for Polydor Records in the Promotion Department, ostensibly doing AOR promotion. There were still a few "Free Form" Album Rock stations—Abrams/Burkhardt, et al, still hadn't gotten to everyone. But I digress.

"The company had just signed a band called Billion Dollar Babies. They were actually the Alice Cooper Band, minus Alice Cooper, but then, originally (you can look it up) Alice Cooper referred to the whole band and not the lead singer, Vincent Furnier. But all that's not really the point. In this assemblage was one Michael Marconi, a guitar hero from Rochester who was not an original Alice Cooper member, but was recruited by the others, being of tender young age and a household name—provided your household was in Rochester. And

that's where Tommy Nast comes in. His household was in Rochester—more likely a one-room, bachelor walk-up. But who cares or remembers? Since the aforementioned consultants weren't 'kvelling' over B\$B (note the cool abbreviation) and since they didn't sound like Yes, ELP, Starcastle or others of that ilk, the only support on that record came from a Rock AM in Rochester called WSAY, which was so far on the right of the AM dial that the Gospel and Spanish stations had better signals—or so I like to imagine.

"So this guy, Tom Nast, who probably did every air shift and carried a screwdriver to make sure the antenna was still attached to the roof, came forth as an act of God, so that a novice promotion guy—me—could demonstrate that something—anything—was transpiring with B\$B. Lo and behold, B\$B, with their local hero, played the WSAY Raft Race, making it one of only four shows they ever played before becoming a footnote to history—the other places being Flint, Muskegon and Detroit—all attended by Michael Marconi's family and few others, if memory serves.

"But soon thereafter, Tom Nast made the big territorial move to that market of note, Syracuse—WSYR, methinks, but again, it's a quarter-century past. Now we had what used to be known in the music business as a relationship. He didn't even know the vivacious Luanne Siebert yet. So I'm now buddies with the emerging king of western New York radio, not including Buffalo, mind you.

"Then Nast decides that the next big thing will be Benny Mardones, on—get this, people—Polydor Records. I'm such a big cheese by this point that I bring in big Bill McGathy from Orlando and two-ton Rocky Del Balzo from CW Post College to our Album Rock department, and when the dust settles, Mardones becomes a household name in Syracuse (beyond Nast's household—you can look it up). Benny *still* plays arenas in Syracuse while you guys scratch your less-than-hirsute heads and ask, "Benny who?" And you know what? The Nastyman, as he was becoming known, became Benny's guy—not an easy feat, because his crosstown rival, Ed Levine at WAQX, was doing everything to wrest the association away. Benny was the god-damn Beatles in that town, for Christ's sake. And the threats about our other records (you mean Polydor had other records?) were palpable. Benny Mardones, to this day, is a lasting testament in Syracuse to how Tommy Nast dominated a market.

"So Tommy—I can still call you Tommy—let's make this relationship last at least another quarter-century. See you at Del Mar with the missus, buddy."

"There is the somewhat infamous story of the Judas Priest bus station incident that involved the release of *British Steel*. I was at WAQX at the time and we were supposed to get a copy of that sent to us for a world exclusive. That was in the early '80s, before FedEx was a factor—people would bus the stuff. It was Ted Utz and I on one side at 95X and Howie Castle and Tommy Nast at 94Rock on the other and the two stations hated each other back then, to put it mildly.

"I sent Ted down to the bus station to pick up our tape and we didn't have one down there—but 94Rock did have a package there, so Ted signed for it. It turned out that they had a copy of *British Steel* also coming to them from another source. So while 94Rock was on the air promoting a world premiere coming up at 8 or 9 pm, we went on at 6 pm and put the album on the air. Of course, Tommy or one of his cronies goes down there to pick up the album at the bus station and they find out that it's already been signed for.

"Lo and behold, the next morning I walk in to find two of Syracuse's finest in the lobby of the radio station. They proceeded to question me for about an hour or so and 15 minutes into that, they said, 'Ed, we like you. We like your station. We're listeners of the show, but if you tell us one more lie, we're going to have to take you downtown.' And with that, the other police officer started reading me my rights. So I gave them the answer that they wanted, which was that Ted Utz had picked up the tape. Ted wound up leaving and having a very nice career shortly thereafter. Tommy was very disappointed because he was convinced that I was the one that had gone down and picked up the tape. I didn't do it—I just put Utz up to it. While he got Utz, he really wanted me. Utz was just caught in the crossfire.

"There was one incident when I came out of work one night in 1980. Tommy and I were not only music directors on competing stations, but we were also both on the night shift. It was just *mano a mano*. I had a bright red 1980 Trans Am with a screaming eagle on the front and it was covered in eggs from the front of the car to the back—just covered in eggs. Nast swears he had nothing to do with it, but I wouldn't bet a lot of money on that.

"I was also working a club night in Syracuse around that same timeframe and

one night somebody asked me, as I was spinning records in the DJ booth, 'Are you Ed Levine?' I said, 'Yeah!' And he said, 'Tommy Nast says 'hello.'" And with that, this big lug reaches into the DJ booth and proceeds to dump a beer on my head. Of course, I never did anything to Tommy to retaliate and I didn't do anything to instigate this incident. It's hard to conceive of two radio stations hating each other as much as those two did. Now it can be told 20 years later.

"I had about five or six guys whose 'jobs' every night were just to call Tommy up while he was on the air, as early in the show as possible, and tell him that he sucked. If you do that in the first five minutes of a guy's show, it's a good way to pretty much wreck his show and set him off on a bad tone for the night. They called themselves the 94Rock Harassment Team. They didn't work for us or anything. They just did it because you were either on one side or the other, you couldn't root for both—like the Yankees and the Mets. Tommy handled it very maturely—he would challenge them to fights.

"The real winner for those three years we competed head to head, from '80 to '82, were the listeners, because those two stations would do anything possible to one-up each other.

"The funny thing is, once Tommy left the market and he and I got to know each other, we became very good friends. It's probably similar to two boxers who went 15 rounds with each other. You know just how tough and conniving the other guy is and a certain respect comes with that. I've always given him credit because he created a job that did not exist before Tommy Nast. His job at *The Album Network* was designed for his specific abilities of bullshitting and hanging out until five in the morning with music directors. When Steve Smith put that job description together, I would like to have seen what it was, because the job is basically to bullshit and party and get paid a lot of money to do it. But nobody has done it better for 20 years, so hats off to Tommy!"

Hell of a way to meet the man, huh?"

"When I first met him, I was desperately in need of a disc jockey for a dying radio station and Tommy Nast walked in, dressed in a red velour suit, with hair down to his shoulders. I said, 'This is what I need.' With Tommy's help, I turned that radio station around and was able to make a little money with it."

"I would like to reminisce about Ed Leffler. After Le Dome would close, a bunch of us would go up to Camp Leffler, a place Sammy Hagar referred to as 'The Club,' which normally opened around 2 am, closing around 5 pm the next day (obviously, this was many, many years ago). We watched a lot of sports on the dish and partied very hard. Those days are long gone, but not forgotten.

"Eddie Leffler told me I should hire Tommy and I agreed. I remember asking Tommy if he wanted to join Geffen Records in 1982, to lead the Rock department and beyond. Tommy had just moved from New York and had been at *The Album Network* for about five months. Just putting the offer on the table made Steve (Smith) and the Birds (Eli, Bruce and Gary) absolutely nuts. We all had a meeting, where they informed me that Tommy was the future of the company. I replied that if this was indeed the case, then give Tommy a contract—which they did; his very first one, at that! With Tommy in at *The Album Network*, this opened the door for [me to hire] Marko Babineau, who left A&M and took the Geffen position. The rest is history!

"Congratulations, Tommy. Here's to celebrating 20 great years! I cherish every one of them!"

# Yeah, He's Fun At A Party, But You Don't Have To Work With Him!

So, you think you know Tommy? Well, we figured you might not know the side that we all see, so we got many current and former longtime co-workers to tell their version of the story. After reading some of the following, you may say to yourself, "Yeah, I can picture that," but you'll also learn plenty about the Jäger-drinking man of the hour.

"I met Tommy in February, 1982, when he came to Los Angeles on vacation. Before that, we'd been phone buddies for a year or more, when he was at 94Rock in Syracuse and would call in his playlist to me. It was Grammy week, so there were lots of record company and radio folks in town and in that era, *The Album Network's* office at 9000 Sunset Blvd. was the

place to hang. After we got the sheet to the printer on Thursday a bunch of us went down the Boulevard to La Maganette, which at the time was about as happening as Le Dome is now. The place was packed and some drunk started giving me trouble, so Tommy 'rescued' me—

and he's been my knight in shining armor ever since. We went on to have a great weekend, followed by a few months of weekend rendezvous and astronomical long-distance bills, until Tommy moved to Los Angeles in July as Radio Research Special-list at *The Album Network*. We were married a year later at Eli Bird's home.

"You may be surprised, but the Nastyman is really a sentimental softie who cries at sad movies and Hall-mark commercials, and gets teary-eyed when he watches his kids play, or whenever he reads a handmade 'I Love You, Daddy' card. Tommy is actually a very sensitive guy.

From helping old ladies up and down the stairs to taking communion at church, to playing with kids, to knowing the right thing to say to the waitress, mechanic or the person at the checkout counter, Tommy has an uncanny skill—not just for the gift of gab, but the ability to use that gift to make the day a little brighter for those he comes into contact with."

"Tommy went on to become as important to the company as any of the owners: Steve Smith, Bruce Bird, Gary Bird and myself. Established at my home in June of 1982 were feelings of appreciation and trust from the get-go until today. That bond will never be broken. My feelings at this moment and forever are dedicated to the one who was always there, the one who always cared, the one who always understood. *The one like whom there is no other:* Tommy Nast."

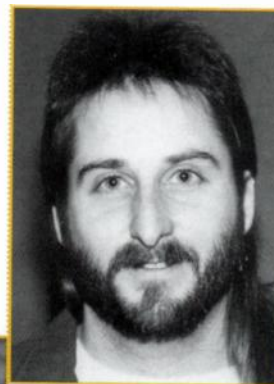

"There are so many stories I could tell about Tommy. One I will never forget is when I was working at Geffen. We flew a group of PDs and consultants into Memphis to showcase a band called Junkyard. The track we were working was called 'Hollywood,' so we figured it was a great idea to take everyone out to the sticks of Mississippi to a honky-tonk called The Hollywood. The place was famous for its fried dill pickles and its catfish. After the showcase, we all sat down for a nice dinner. There was a very cool honky-tonk band playing. After a few shots of Jägermeister, Tommy decided to go jam with the band. He whipped us into such a frenzy with his patented version of 'Gloria,' that everyone forgot about the band we just showcased! Let's see if I remember what else was in his repertoire that night. He sang 'Gloria,' 'Gloria,' and... 'Gloria.' If you ever hear Tommy sitting in to jam with a band, please see if he can play anything other than 'Gloria.'"

"We all know Tommy as the successful club owner. In the early '90s, Tommy was a partner in the Key Club, but did you also know that in the late '80s he was a co-owner of a club on Carol Drive? Miami at the old BDA conventions, where Tommy made Mercury Morris look like a chump.

"Tommy would always send me and [Rock Editor] Greg Sorrels to the Foundation's Forum Metal convention each year. It was one of the things Greg and I would look forward to attending. One year, Greg talked Tommy into getting a suite so we could throw a party to launch our new Aggro section in the magazine. We ended up collaborating with then-Metal Blade Promotion Director Mike Rittberg: We supplied the room and the Jägermeister, while Metal Blade supplied the music and the kegs of beer. It ended up being *The Party* of the convention. There was a line down the entire hallway to get in and once you got in, there was barely any place to move.

"The evening is still a blur to me, but I do remember beer dripping from the ceiling, empty Jägermeister bottles everywhere, the sliding glass door off its hinges and laying on the floor and Tommy throwing a lamp across the room, shattering it to pieces. Hotel security came up and closed down the party. Afterward, Tommy found me and told me that he was crashing in my room (which I was sharing with Greg and Production Manager Eric Harter) because he couldn't drive home. I thought to myself, 'If my boss wants to crash in my room, what choice do I have?' So we end up at the pool at about 3 am, where Tommy passes out. Another hour goes by, so Eric and I decide to drag Tommy to our room. Greg is already there having a bite to eat and I guess the smell of Greg's hamburger must have revived Tommy, because he snatched the burger from

Greg's hands, stuffed the entire thing in his mouth, yelled a couple of profanities and did a face plant in my bed. I was laughing so hard—until I realized that now I had to sleep on the floor!

"A few days later, Greg and I got called into Tommy's office and was he pissed! He was yelling at us, saying the hotel is asking for reimbursements for carpeting, a broken chair and a broken lamp. When he asked about the carpeting and broken chair, we couldn't come up with a good answer on how it happened, but when Tommy asked, 'Who was the moron who broke the lamp?' Greg and I said at the same time, 'You did!' Tommy had forgotten about the entire evening until Greg and I filled him in. Needless to say, his mood improved slightly."

"Tommy...oh, that guy. You mean 'The Rock,' yes? 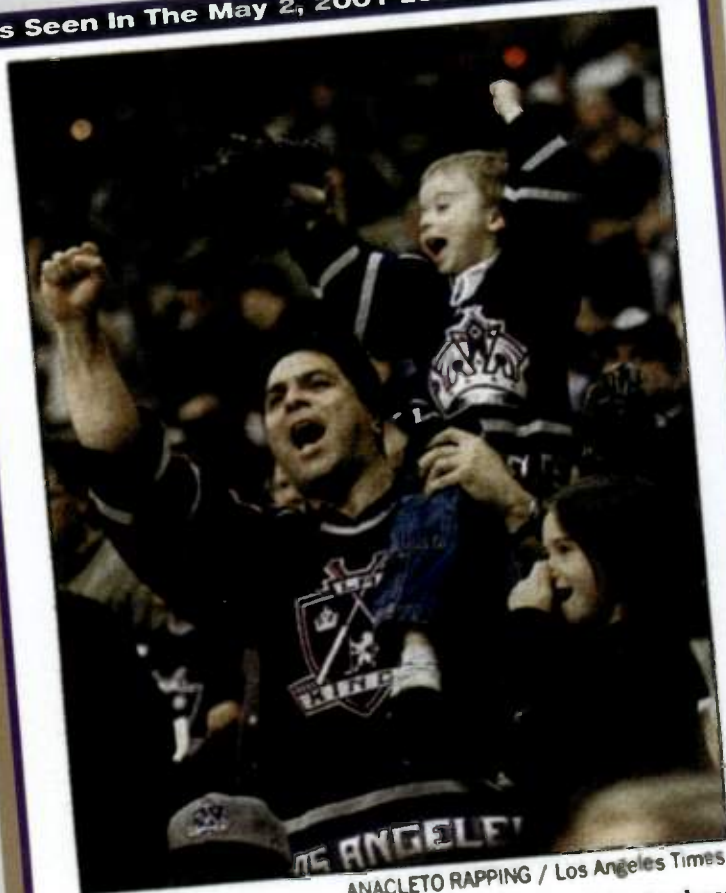

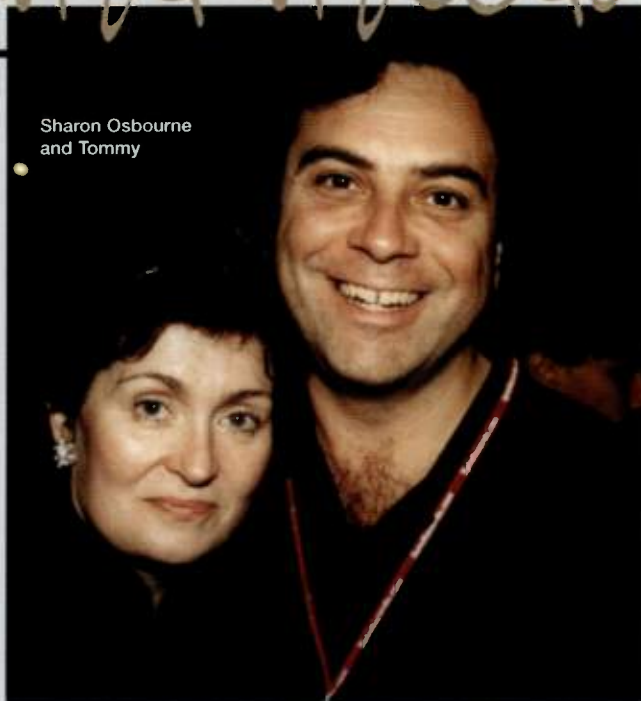

"Back in the late '70s at WBBF (950 AM) Rochester, it was a wild time! I think Tommy really invented voice-tracking. I was the 'all-around utilities guy' (there wasn't such a thing as a promotion director back then). Tommy would be doing his famous 10 pm-2 am shift on 95 'BBF. He'd grab me, bring me in the studio, lay down some breaks on a reel-to-reel, tell me which ones to run in between which songs and then he'd disappear for about half an hour or so. "I first met Tommy at the Lucky Seven, a tacky pool hall on the wrong side of the tracks in Syracuse. He was playing pool with a bunch of biker toughs, and tried to cheat them in a boozy game of snookers. Not pleased, the biggest biker, a fellow named 'Stash,' went for Tommy big time. In a matter of seconds, Tommy had the brute pinned. A few airplane spins later, Stash was on his ass...out cold. 'Wow,' I thought, 'here's a talented fellow!' I convinced him to come with me to Chicago to meet Knuckles Battagliano, who at that time ran the wrestling rackets for the Cicero mob. Unfortunately, Tommy was hung over from a bawdy night on Rush Street and wasn't at his best. So, I thought L.A. was the place for Tommy and we booked the next Amtrak to the Coast (Tommy had been banned from most U.S. air carriers as a result of an alleged in-flight incident on a Delta flight out of Orlando).

"On the long ride west, Tommy confided that he really wanted to be in the music business and leave a wrestling career behind. Having a working knowledge of the business, I suggested he meet with some of the leading companies. We met with RSO Records, The Gavin Report, Casablanca Records and KMET Los Angeles, figuring we'd start with the big names—the companies that would be around for awhile. After striking out, a disgusted Tommy considered Ringling Brothers for the travel, interesting people, good circus money and a chance to work with Herm Dipner, the legendary lion tamer. I convinced him to stick with his music dreams. He rebuffed me and I moved on. Years later, I heard he quit Ringling, and joined a Smith fella. Nice guy...Texan. They worked on some music newspaper. Hear he's doin' real well. But I can't help thinking, if only he'd impressed Battagliano."

"The first time I met Tommy Nast was back on the A&M lot. I had just been promoted from Assistant National Rock Director out of Chicago to National Rock Director in L.A. This was quite overwhelming, considering I had only been doing national [promotion] for four months. My first week in L.A., A&M Records held four out of five of the top-5 most-added for the week. They were: The Police's *Outlandos d'Amour*, Supertramp's *Breakfast In America*, Joe Jackson's *Look Sharp!* and Squeeze's *U.K. Squeeze*. Welcome to the record business! Beyond these four great albums--that's right, albums--we had this new artist, Bryan Adams, who had a single out called 'Let Me Take You Dancing.' It was going nowhere fast, except with this DJ up in Rochester who decided he

jump up on my desk and drop his drawers and show me 'The Moon.' That's right, there was Tommy, in all his glory, mooning me with the whole promotional staff staring into my office with astonishment. By now, security was at my door, ready to remove this unsavory character and his unsavory ass. I told the guards to leave us alone and Tommy and I struck up a conversation that went for about an hour. We told stories of similar situations with the same friends. We became fast friends.

"Within the next year, Tommy had fallen madly in love with Luanne and asked me to be his best man. I was flattered. Here's a guy with too many friends and he's asking me to take this honored role in his marriage. Well, as all good stories are supposed to have a beginning,

middle and an end, this one has exactly that. Isn't it funny that Tommy, at the beginning of his career, was on this crusade to break Bryan Adams? Tommy and I spent many a night on the road with Bryan, through three albums' worth of hits, developing his fame. So, of course, at Tommy's wedding, the musical entertainment was none other than Bryan Adams. And as I sat behind the drums, I watched Tommy magically

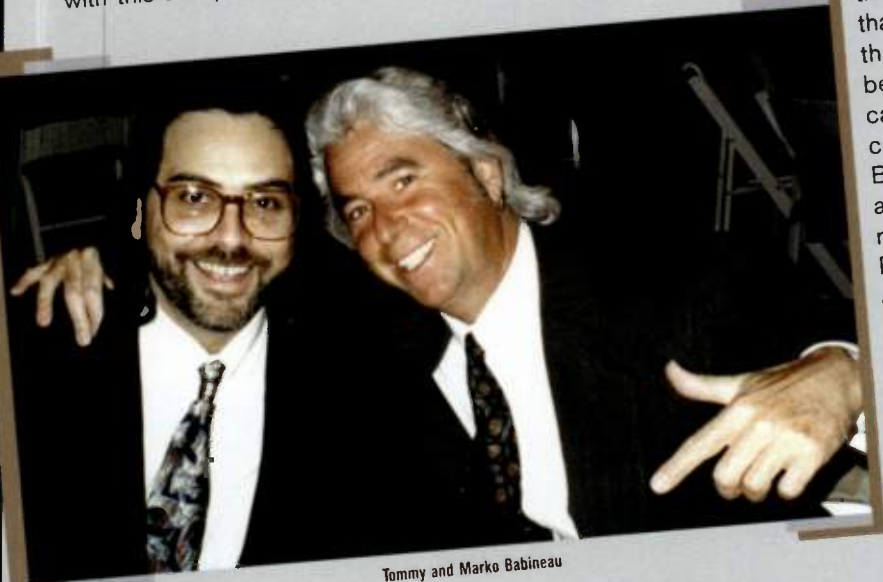

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# Tommy Has Always Known Which Side His Bread Is Buttered On

## Records

"The first person that comes to mind is Craig Lambert. Craig has been a dear friend and I have seen his promotion expertise at every level, from when he had New Avenues as an independent to his various stops along the way. Craig is as loyal as the day is long, he is a great strategist and he motivates people unbelievably. He is always there for his friends; loyalty is a major part of his M.O. That's one of his great plusses: If you are part of Craig's team or part of his circle, he is there and will always be there."

"Marko Babineau is as creative as they come. He would just come up with concepts that were unbelievable in getting records played. From locking himself in his office for days to dressing like a Christmas tree, Marko has an extremely creative mind, and has always been relentless at getting airplay."

"One of the other people I remember starting out here at *The Album Network* is Bill McGathy, even going back to my days in radio. The thing about Bill is that he still loves the music, and as successful as he may be today, music has always been a part of his dealings. I think that is very important, not to mention the fact that he was brilliant in how he combined his independent record promotion business with artist management; he has

proven to be incredibly versatile. He does a great job. Bill is a great guy to have as a friend and can be a bear of an enemy. But Bill is awesome."

"I think about the old days when I worked in radio and some of the promotion people that I worked with: John Sykes, Phil Quartararo, Michael "Van-O" Van Orsdale, Michael Plon, Neil Lasher, J.B. Brenner, Barry Lyons, Kevin Sutter, Bruce Moser and Brad Hunt. These guys are still an extremely pertinent part of today's landscape. There are some great people, like Jim Del Balzo. "Rocky" has always been just relentless, always doing whatever it takes to get the job done. George Cappellini, who is probably the most consistent guy in the business and another one with a great management background, has done an amazing job with whatever records have been put in front of him. He always gets it on the radio. Joey Scoleri takes the best of the old school and the best of the new school methods of promotion and gets the job done. He is awesome. Mike Rittberg is going to be around this business for a long time. He is extremely smart and extremely well-liked within his company and outside his company, too. He can be a hard businessman, but a fair businessman."



## Radio

"Without a doubt, one of the best program directors I have seen is Kevin Weatherly. Kevin is brilliant with keeping his radio station fresh and is not the least bit arrogant; he's an extremely approachable, honest person. He is a really good human being who puts a great product together. Guys like Brad Hardin; Brad is another guy who I think the world of because what you see is what you get. He is honest, works his butt off and is a creative guy that has good people around him all the time. Keith Hastings falls into that category. Keith is real smart, real sharp and a total pro. Since he has written in our magazine he has really shown the strength of the pen through the ideas he comes up with in his columns. He has been really good.

"Over the years, too, I loved working with guys like Tony Gates, Lex Staley and Ron Diaz, three of the greatest morning guys. After having them on our staff, I should have opened a morning show boot camp. These guys were great. Getting to know their personalities, it's no surprise to see that they are so successful on the air and I am sure they will continue to be. I love Dave Richards. Dave is another great people person. The people that work for him always really love the guy. He is a great PD and he is great at assembling great talent.


"What can I say about my good buddy Ed Levine? I have seen him go from a mediocre jock (just kidding) to a great program director to a station owner. To make the transition and work his ass off over that, I will always have great respect for Ed. When it comes to on-air guys, what do you say? Howard Stern is the best air personality ever. While we are talking here, I want to give kudos out to Brother Wease and Dave Kane, who have been at the same radio station [WCMF Rochester] for so long and have continued to be successful. I guess I have a lot of respect for people that can enjoy longevity and continue being pertinent and successful at the same place. There is a lot to be said for that.

"One of the other things I wanted to cover was the success that I have seen in being hands-on with what was our radio network. It started when we went with Global Satellite Network and created *Powercuts* in the mid-'80s, *In The Studio* with Redbeard and our World Premiere Broadcasts and live broadcasts. It was just an amazing run we had during the '80s, up till just a couple of years ago. It was amazing to do the shows that we did, from U2, Bruce Springsteen, The Black Crowes, Robert Plant and The Beatles. The programs we put together for Rock, and even Top 40 with The Backstreet Boys and \*NSYNC, were just great. We had a great crew of radio people: Neal Bird (who's always been like my little brother), Mark Felsot and Ted Utz, Maria Musaitef, Johnny V., Regina Livesay, Jim Villanueva, Mike Davis, Jerry McQueen, Ellen Naumann, Beth Arzy and Jessa Bouso: It was just a great crew of people who put together some great stuff. I am extremely proud of all the programs that we put together over the last 15 years or so. I miss that entity a lot, but times change as you go on. Those are all great people that I am sure will have a lot more success in the future."

## Influences

"There have been some incredible people, but as I think about it, the Bird family always comes to mind: Eli, Bruce and Gary. Eli was an unbelievable inspiration for me over the years. Not a day goes by that I don't think about Bruce Bird; he always seemed to be the calming influence of the three. The powerful personality that Gary is—I think I got a lot from him. When I think about them, I've got to put Steve Smith in there, too. Steve is a brilliant strategist and seeing the work ethic he put forth inspired me a lot. Smith was always the first one in and the last one to leave, day in and day out, year after year after year. So he really set a standard.

"Looking at people outside that immediate family, Eddie Leffler was probably one of the greatest managers; I learned a lot about the world of artist management through his handling of Sammy Hagar and Van Halen. Eddie was great and he had the memory of an elephant. I think a lot about Eddie and a lot of the things he did. He was a real mentor and an inspiration. He and Johnny Barbis helped me get my first contract. Speaking of Johnny Barbis, to this day I love bouncing things off him. He is as brilliant as they come and is well connected to every facet of the entertainment business.

"Bruce Allen is a dear friend and a great artist manager that I learned a lot of the business from. He is just as good as they come. On the record side, I still admire everything Don Jenner has ever done. Donnie is just amazing personally and he can be as tough—and compassionate—as they come. He is somebody that I wish I had the opportunity to have worked for in my career; if you can be successful under Donnie, then you can do anything in this business. I really think he is one of the best record executives to this day. So those are several people, and recently there's Gerry Cagle. Gerry has been a great influence over the last year. Working with him, I have learned a lot from his style—and he does have a great style. He has a strong character, as well. He is a great leader and I'm glad to be on his team."

She is one of my best friends in the world and one of the greatest workers I have ever had the pleasure of working with. Every time we would put together a function, if Karmen was running it, you knew it was going to come off top-notch, from our conventions to various parties that we have thrown. I remember our 20-year anniversary that we had at the beach at the Santa Monica pier—what a bash that was. People will be talking about that one for days upon days, years upon years. That was just an unbelievable party that Karmen put together and there are so many stories that can come out of that. The first convention that we did a few years ago in New York, when the hurricane hit, was unbelievable. We were getting cancellation calls left and right,

from ZZ Top to Program Directors to other people that did not want to fly into that weather.

"There are so many other stories. One of the best had to be when Luanne and I and Tony Gates were at a Grammy party, and Tom Petty saw me and invited us to join him for a beer with George Harrison. Holy shit! I was out of my mind, just having a beer, hanging out talking with George Harrison and Petty. And George was talking about the Traveling Wilburys at the time and his upcoming solo record, and talking about his relationship—which at that time was not great—with Paul McCartney. He was extremely candid, friendly and funny. Being able to sit and have a casual conversation for an hour with George Harrison and Tom Petty was something that you never imagine could ever happen, but sure enough, it did. It enlightened me to see what a wonderful person George was, and I will remember that as long as I live. It's as good as





it gets when you are able to sit down and talk about how great The Beatles were and what it was like back then. He answered every question as personally as possible.

"Then there was the time when I was flying to London with George Cappellini, Craig Lambert and Gary Bird to do an AC/DC world premiere. So we decided to play basketball with Gary's open mouth as the net and peanuts from the flight attendant as the ball.
