## Labels Are Watching CMT More, But Are Listeners Using It Like Radio?

As recently as two years ago, some labels were steering away from doing videos for every new country act. BNA group Lonestar, for example, was launched without the benefit of a video for its first single. Now, although its penetration in U.S. television households is just 40% (and 57% of all homes with cable), CMT has quietly become the target of renewed interest for some on Music Row, and perhaps renewed concern among radio pro-

At the recent Country Radio Seminar, it was noted on several occasions that CMT users often talked about "listening to" rather than viewing CMT, suggesting that people were using the 14-year-old cable music video outlet like a radio station, leaving it on in the background at home as they perform other tasks.

Atlantic Records first noticed the trend during recent focus groups, in which people said they were using CMT like radio, rather than actually sitting and watching the videos. At-lantic VP/GM Bryan Switzer says that CMT "is becoming the biggest radio

station we have."

Thus the Row's renewed interest in CMT. "Two years ago, a lot of the industry here tried to talk ourselves out of the video game," says Switzer. 'If we had to cut budget somewhere, video was an easy, good place to cut. But with the amount of new artists out there, it's still one of the most viable ways to develop the artist, to put a face with the name.

Curb Records recently launched David Kersh without a video for his debut single, but Curb VP of promotion John Brown says, "I really miss it when we have a brand-new artist without a video; that worries me.

Still, not everyone believes CMT fans are using the video outlet like a radio station. "There is a theory that thousands of housewives are sitting around with CMT in the background," says Brown. "I think that's a myth. I don't know any housewives. Most people are working today."

"Housewives still have to get their kids off to school and want to know the weather and what's going on in their area," says KMLE Phoenix PD Jeff Garrison, who believes those factors will always make radio more im-

## Sentimental Ballads Are Good For The Format



new crop of ultrasentimental ballads on the chart is drawing attention to a song genre that has long been a staple of the country format.

While they evoke strong listener reactions, most such songs tend not to enjoy heavy airplay once they become recurrents or gold titles. Instead, titles such as "Where've You Been" by Kathy Mattea and "How Can I Help You Say Goodbye" by Patty Loveless are used only as secondary gold to provide an occasional lump in

While reviewing our list of the 300 mostplayed oldies and recurrents in our Country Radio Seminar issue (Country Airplay Monitor, March 7), I discovered that only 10 of the 300 songs listed fit into the ultrasentimental-ballad category (which, admittedly, is a subjective one). Of those 10, only one, Alabama's "In Pictures," was on the recurrent list; the remainder are from '95 or before.

Tim McGraw's "Don't Take The Girl" was the highest-ranking tear-jerker, at No. 29. The rest were Garth Brooks' "The Dance" (No. 40), "If Tomorrow Never Comes" (No. 61), and "Unanswered Prayers" (No. 96); "Love Without End, Amen' by George Strait (No. 73); "Can't Be Really Gone" by McGraw (No. 109); "Go Rest High On That Mountain" by Vince Gill (No. 145); "Love, Me" by Collin Raye (No. 171); and "The Greatest Man 1 Never Knew" by Reba McEntire (No. 179)

Recently, there's been an unusually high number of these ultrasentimental songs appearing on our airplay chart, and there's more than one reason why. Aside from the fact that the format has always championed these songs, they tend to spur vigorous sales activity. The most recent example of immediate retail reaction for such material is Kippi Brannon's "Daddy's Little Girl," which opened on Billboard's Top Country Singles Sales chart at No. 15 one week ago. That title moved more than 1,600

units during its debut week and increased 200 units the following week. That doesn't mean the pressing plant has to add an additional crew to keep up with the demand, yet (the No. 1-selling single moved more than 17,000 units last week), but Brannon's debut proves that if a song's message is powerful enough, it doesn't necessarily have to be by a well-known artist.

Not far behind Brannon on our airplay list is "The Hopechest Song" by Stephanie Bentley, which seems to be gaining ground at radio, as are Jeff Wood's "Use Mine" and Tammy Graham's "A Dozen Red Roses.

Although this much sentimentality at once may be due to the collective wisdom of label executives who know that these songs tend to be good sellers, they also can ignite listener passion and, ultimately, become image songs for the

Throughout country's history, ultrasentimental or tragedy songs have served as mile markers; "A Dear John Letter" by Ferlin Husky and Jean Shepard ruled the charts for six consecutive weeks in 1953; "Mommy For A Day" by Kitty Wells discussed the emotional ravages wrought by divorce and was a major hit in 1959: Red Sovine's teary recitations, such as "Giddyup Go," clotted the country charts for three decades beginning in the mid-'50s. These types of songs became fairly scarce in the "Urban Cowboy" period, at least until Mattea's "Where've You Been" hit in late '89. After that, Brooks carried the sentimental torch, and Loveless' "How Can 1 Help You Say Goodbye" packed a powerful punch as an image song three years ago.

Regardless of whether these new sentimental songs become major hits, they all have the potential to connect in powerful ways with listeners, so it's hard to gauge their impact by chart numbers alone. Some programmers may be quick to dismiss these tracks as "sappy," but perhaps the sales figures should prompt a second

## Kevin Metheny Goes Public on Jacor, Country, R&B, And, Oh Yeah, 'Private Parts'

ee if this sounds familiar. A boy catches the broadcasting bug from his father. Starts in radio in the '70s. Becomes a PD. Ends up in New York radio in relatively short order,

makes the move to cable TV, then multiple radio stations. Finally, after realizing that unique talent is indeed more important than a station's formatics, he becomes the subject of a bestselling book and a major

motion picture.

That's not just Howard Stern's story. It's Kevin Metheny's story, too. The son of veteran broadcaster Terrell Metheny, Kevin spent four years as PD of WNBC New York, then held various programming positions at MTV Networks during the mid-'80s. Since 1995, he's been director of programming and operations for Jacor's five Jacksonville, Fla., stations, including country WQ1K and R&Bs WJBT (the Beat) and WSOL-FM

But it's the book and the movie that have gotten Metheny all the unsolicited attention lately. In Stern's "Private Parts," a PD modeled on Metheny (and other WNBC managers) and nicknamed Pig Vomit becomes Mr. Wilson to Stern's Dennis the Menace, Yosemite Sam to Stern's wascally wabbit, the truant officer to Stern's Ferris Bueller.

When prerelease hype for "Private Parts" began, Metheny-who was actually dubbed Pig Virus by Stern-was quoted in Entertainment Weekly and all three New York dailies. There were also requests by "Inside Edition" and "Hard Copy" to tag along when he saw the movie. "I'm typically reluctant to talk to the press, because . they're looking for is ugliness, and I don't have any real ugliness to share with them,

"I think the world of Howard Stern as a guy and as a performer. We went through what we went through because we had different roles that at times forced us into contentious positions, but I'm very proud of Howard and what he's accomplished. I wish I could claim a bigger role in his success, but I think that would be a little dishonest.

Unlike the movie's long-suffering PD, Metheny did not end up running a strip mall in Florence, Ala. After MTV, he programmed KHKS Dallas (then KTKS), developing a rhythmic top 40 format that would become the forerunner of today's highly successful version of the station, then had a GM stint at WAEV/WSOK Savannah, Ga., and two oldies PD jobs at KFRC-FM San Francisco and KQQL Minneapolis. He joined WQIK six months before Jacor's purchase of WSOL/WJBT and just in time to see that company become one of the megapoly era's most aggressive station buyers. He works with two different GMs (Les

Samuels at WQIK and Ralph Christian at WSOL/WIBT) and four PDs (Doc Wynter at WJBT/WSOL, K.J. at gospel AM WZAZ, Larry Stevens at N/T WJGR, and newly ar-

rived Gail Austin at WQIK).

In the fall Arbitron, WQIK was down 9.5-8.5 12-plus but remained in its customary perch as the market leader. WJBT was up 5.5-6.8. WSOL was off 4.5-4.3 but has since rebounded after segueing from a gold-based adult R&B format to a more contemporary version of the format. WJBT, after a brief foray from R&B to rhythm-crossover, became a younger-skewing hip-hop outlet along the lines of WQHT (Hot 97) New York. It, too, has moved toward the center, following the realization that with the two stations niched 18-24 and 35-44, R&B listeners in the middle were going untargeted.

WQIK, like many other country outlets, recently tightened its currents and began reemphasizing some of the oldies from the format's '89-'93 boom years. Unlike most country stations, WQIK can sometimes be heard playing two or three of those oldies in a row. Both R&B and country, Metheny says, "have been responsive to, and to some degree driven by, the recording industry's notion of product life cycle . . . rather than the actual programming potency of the music. Our stations are less susceptible to that, because . . . we're a consumer-focused company.

Presentationally, Metheny says, he may have used too much "left of center" positioning when he arrived at WQIK. Those tactics helped KQQL's duopoly partner, WBOB, force its way into contention against rival KEEY (K102) but may not have been necessary for an incumbent heritage station such as WQIK. Today, however, "this is Jacksonville's station of record," Metheny says. "We sound like Jacksonville, and that's more important than all the 12-in-a-rows and all the birthday games in the world.

It was a similar desire in 1982—to build a full-service, larger-than-life station-that led to Stern's tumultuous relationship with "W-NNN-B-C." "I remember vividly sitting in my office when it was announced that [rival top 40] WABC was throwing in the towel. Everybody was dancing on the desks and uncorking champagne bottles, and I was inconsolable. Without WABC to kick around, we had to have a better act than just 'Imus In The Morning' and be a better music station from 10 a.m. to 5:30 a.m. It was crystal clear . . . We needed a major-firepower afternoon personality.

So how much of Stern's tenure at WNBC is as "Private Parts" tells it? "NBC's running a promo for a movie of the week in which they say 'Based on actual events.' The movie is loosely based on a book that's loosely based on Howard's recollection of actual events. Did we endeavor to bring Howard into compliance with NBC standards and practices? Yes, we did. Did it drive Howard up a wall? You bet. Did he know that we were going to do it before he agreed to come to work for us? Absolutely. Was there ever a sinister, insidious plot to force him into compliance with our smallminded criteria that would have stripped his act of all its programming potency? Or make him so miserable that he'd walk on his contract? Absolutely not. We had a vested interest in his success.

Unlike in the movie, Metheny and Stern never physically wrestled in the halls, although there may have been an incident between Stern and a later NBC manager. Metheny never fired Robin Quivers, although the station did attempt to team

## Y96's Wild Bill Cody Stunts For Flood Relief

o assist American Red Cross floodrelief efforts, WYGY (Y96) Cincinnati morning man "Wild" Bill Cody will trek down the Ohio and Mississippi rivers and into the Gulf of Mexico, ending up in New Orleans on a boat from the Smurf ride at local amusement park Old King's Island. Cody set a fund-raising goal of \$9,600 and took pledges from listeners. His previous stunts have included riding a roller coaster 11,000 times, and shaking 82,712 hands, both of which earned him a spot in the Guinness Book of World Records. He also has been buried alive for 96 hours, rode a pogo stick for 20 miles, and, most recently, pushed a peanut down a 1-mile stretch of Michigan Avenue in Chicago.

Asylum artist Kevin Sharp performed March 17 at a Red Cross benefit for northern California flood victims sponsored by KSAN San Francisco. Sharp is a native of Sacramento, Calif. He is also scheduled to appear at KBEQ (Q104) Kansas City's fourth-birthday bash March 26. Other scheduled performers are Mila Mason,

Ty Herndon, and Little Texas.

WRBT (Bob 94.9) Harrisburg, Pa., was broadcasting from the Uni-Mart ticket outlet when 70,000 tickets were put on sale for five area Garth Brooks concerts. Fans lined up to receive wristbands entitling them to a place in the ticket-buyer line, but not guaranteeing them tickets. After approximately 400-500 fans were turned away when the shows sold out, Bob 94.9 invited the disappointed fans to redeem their wristbands for a form to be used in on-air drawings for the station's promotional tickets to the

Tracy Byrd and WSIX Nashville will cosponsor a bass-fishing tournament April 26 on Old Hickory Lake in Hendersonville, Tenn. The participant who catches the largest bass will win a bass boat worth more than \$27,000. Proceeds from the tournament benefit the Police

Athletic League.
WFMS and WGRL Indianapolis will sponsor the third annual Indiana Country Music Expo April 5-6. The event will include seminars on songwriting and how to make it in Nashville, plus guitar pulls, autograph sessions, vendor booths, and a local band competition. Scheduled performers are Trace Adkins, Gary Allan, the Buffalo Club, Ty Herndon, David Kersh, David Lee Murphy, and Gene Watson.

At a recent performance in Chattanooga, Tenn., an appreciative fan threw a dollar at Trace Adkins' feet. Other fans followed suit, and Adkins ended the night with \$200 onstage. He promptly handed the money over to WUSY's David Earl Hughes and asked him to donate the money to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis.

KMPS Seattle set a new station record by raising \$382,976 at its recent radiothon for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. This is the highest St. Jude radiothon dollar figure raised by any station west of Texas so far this year. KEEY (K102) Minneapolis raised more than \$331,000 with its sixth annual St. Jude radiothon, breaking last year's record by \$19,000.

More than 32,000 people attended WKIS Miami's daylong country chili cookoff, making it the largest event of its kind in Florida. More than 60 teams competed for a chance to go to the state chili cookoff finals. Performers included LeAnn Rimes, Alabama, Marty Stuart, Burnin' Daylight, and BR5-49. Working with Stern and Imus, Metheny

says, led him to the belief that "one ought not undermine the impact of a powerful entertainment force with unnecessary boundaries." Eventually, Metheny says, he realized "the propellerhead programming dweebs are really here to make the world a safe place for unique talent to do their thing.

Ultimately, Metheny says, NBC wasn't a corporate environment where that could happen for Stern, "but Infinity clearly was the company. Howard could probably only have made his act happen as big as it did working for Infinity or Jacor, because it takes a Mel Karmazin or a Randy Michaels to support people like him.

Jacor has shown that commitment to high-profile talent with its recent acquisition of Rush Limbaugh syndicator EFM Media, along with much of the rest of the Western world. Asked about working for the rapidly growing Jacor, Metheny says that Michaels and group PD Tom Owens "both have annoyingly high-bandwith IQs and intimidatingly deep powers of recollection. The amount of data that they are able to consume and retain and effectively act upon is astonishing to me.

There is a kind of elegant simplicity to the way Tom tends to view things. In my case, he has often backed me off from trying to make things more complicated than they were and really simplified the task at hand. I don't know how they're continuing to give us this much time and attention, but we seem to get what we need . . . This is really a nurturing environment and probably a lousy place to work if you don't love doing radio. And it's pretty astonishing how much of the family sensibility been able to retain. **SEAN ROSS**

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

portant to housewives than CMT.

'I don't think people use television in that fashion," agrees WTDR Charlotte, N.C., PD Loyd Ford. Our medium is not threatened by

## **SELLING RECORDS?**

Most label reps say it is virtually impossible to gauge how much of an influence CMT has on record sales because there are no markets that just have CMT without also having a country radio station. A study conducted by ASI Entertainment in December 1995 found that 43% of the CMT viewers surveyed said their country album purchases were influenced by watching a country music video, and 55% said they consider videos important in their decision to purchase albums.

Label reps says CMT is an important tool, particularly for new and developing acts. "It's another avenue to get that music exposed," savs Switzer: "As radio continues to be a little constrictive, CMT remains pretty aggressive.

'In terms of [CMT] being a priority, it hasn't changed," says Arista VP of promotion Bobby Kraig. "We want our videos viewed, and it's the best avenue to get that done."

and marketing, says that while the actual sales impact is "undefinable, to a large degree," he adds, "I believe in [CMT]. It's an active vehicle for us that we believe our active customer is accessing and paying attention to, and that's why we keep making videos.

Brown at Curb says the influence of CMT depends on the act and on the market. "I've seen it have tremendous impact in one case and none at all in another," he says. For Tim McGraw, Brown says, CMT was a tremendous career boost; for Perfect Stranger, the video outlet had almost no impact. Another Curb act, Sawyer Brown, is one Brown defines as "a huge video artist. They have a huge impact on CMT, and CMT has a huge impact on them

As for the influence of CMT in a particular market, that depends on CMT's penetration, which fluctuates widely. In Madison, Wis., for example, CMT is in 7.4% of television households. In San Diego, it's in 76.8%, but, Brown says, "where they have coverage, they have an impact.

In Boston, where CMT's penetration is 33.8%, WKLB PD Mike Brophy says, "I see very little activity on the phones from people telling me they've seen videos or [asking] why are we not on a song that's on CMT

"The CMT stuff for us has pretty low imsays WTDR's Ford. But he believes that CMT may have some intangible benefit for country radio. "Anything that promotes country music helps," he savs. "I don't think you can make a case that CMT is hurting country radio. It's probably helping our industry.

## **COMPANION TO RADIO**

Although CMT's influence is curtailed by its relatively small (although growing) household penetration, both radio and label reps view it as an important companion to radio and as something that boosts the overall visibility of country music and artists.

The biggest advantage of CMT is [viewers] can find out who the artist is and what the album is because it's on every video," says

CMT works to boost its presence through frequent tie-ins with radio and retail. Last year, for example, CMT sponsored WWYZ Hartford, Conn.'s Great American Music Fest, which draws an estimated 30,000 listeners. It also has an ongoing relationship with Wal-Mart, with whom it co-sponsors an annual new artist tour. Partly as a result of efforts like these, CMT has increased its U.S. household penetration 170% from July 1991 to March 1997.

For new artists, CMT is usually airing the video weeks before radio. In some cases, Brown says, that video play "sets up" the single for radio and may generate some early requests, which Brown says helps determine "if there is going to be a [listener] demand on radio.

"It's just an enhancement as we target radio," says Brown. CMT "can be a huge ally for us as we're trying to build a story at radio.

"I think CMT can only help country radio by building awareness of country music, especially here in the Northeast," says WWYZ PD Greg Roche, despite the fact that CMT is not available in the bulk of the Hartford metro.

KMLE's Garrison believes that in much the same way MTV helped top 40 in the '80s, CMT is helping country stations in the '90s.

According to the ASI Entertainment study, 69% of the CMT viewers surveyed said CMT has made country a part of the music mix they listen to." Of those surveyed, 72% said CMT "lets them understand the music they hear on

'CMT is real important because it helps establish a face to the music, and right now, with so many new acts coming out, it's good for radio," says Garrison. "It helps familiarize the audience with records, and sometimes, if there is a buzz, we'll see it in requests and sales." For example, he says, Kippi Brannon's single, "Daddy's Little Girl," debuted at No. 2 in local singles sales even before the market's country stations were playing it heavily. He also cites BR5-49 as an example of a group helped by video locally even without much radio exposure. Another example is the Mavericks, who, Garrison says, "did well on CMT and helped their sales a lot and didn't get the airplay per se that would generate those kinds of

And although Garrison does view CMT as a competitor, he says that "hopefully the positives [of CMT] outweigh the negatives in developing the country audience and expanding it.

## Big House "COLD OUTSIDE" (MCA)

The six members of Big House, all veterans of the Bakersfield, Calif., music scene, got together just a year ago and were quickly signed to MCA. Since then, the group has opened for Travis Tritt, Wynonna, Patty Loveless, and Collin Raye, in between recording dates for a self-titled debut album, which is due March 25. Harmonies are shared by all of the group members: brothers Monty and Tanner By-rom, David Neuhauser, Chuck Seaton, Sonny California and Ron Mitchell.

## Kippi Brannon "DADDY'S LITTLE GIRL" (CURB/UNIVERSAL)

Kippi Brannon was signed to MCA at the age of 14 and charted with such singles as "If I Could See You Tonight," "He Don't Make Me Cry," "In My Dreams," and a remake of Webb Pierce's "Slowly" between age 15 and 17. In 1982, she was a top new female vocalist nominee at the Academy of Country Music Awards. But after four singles and without having recorded a full album, she quit the business to attend college. During her break from music, Brannon married twice and worked as a secretary and an accounting assistant, among other jobs. Now 30 and the single mother of a 9-year-old girl, Brannon makes her Curb/Universal debut, "I'd Be With You."

## The Buffalo Club "IF SHE DON'T LOVE YOU" (RISING TIDE)

Three musically diverse artists came together to form this band. Guitarist Charlie Kelley grew up on a farm listening to everything from Bryan Adams to Willie Nelson. Lead vocalist Ron Hemby, a former member of the Imperials, brings in a strong gospel background from his native Missouri. Drummer John Dittrich, formerly of Restless Heart, hails from New York and Texas, where he enjoyed jazz and top 40.

## **★** Anita Cochran "I COULD LOVE A MAN LIKE THAT" (WARNER BROS.)

In an unusual move for a new artist, Anita Cochran co-produced her debut Warner Bros. album, "Back To You," with label presi-Bros. album, "Back To You," with label president Jim Ed Norman, wrote none of the set's 10 cuts, and played all the guitar leads, banjo, mandolin, and dobro parts. A South Lyon Mich., native, Cochran began playing guitar in a band with her parents at the age of 4½. She studied to be a florist in high school but ended up running a recording studio in Canton, Mich., where she cut the demos that led to her deal with Warner Bros.

## Sara Evans "TRUE LIES" (RCA)

Sara Evans was raised on a farm in Boones-boro, Mo., a town of 1,200. Her family, which included seven children, raised corn, beans, cattle, hogs, and tobacco. Evans started singing at the age of 4 and learned the mandolin shortly thereafter. She became locally famous, performing with her brothers as the Sara Evans Show in churches and at retirement homes, PTA meetings, and bluegrass festivals. The extra income the group earned supplemented the Evans family's meager farm income. Sara moved to Nashville in 1991, where she met and married musician

Craig Schelske and then moved to Schelske's home state of Oregon, where they performed together for three years. She returned to Nashville in 1995, when a demo of Harlan Howard's "I've Got A Tiger By The Tail" helped land her a deal with RCA. Pete Anderson produced her debut album.

Nikki Nelson "TOO LITTLE TOO MUCH" (COLUMBIA) Nikki Nelson grew up in Topaz Lake, Nev., 35 miles south of Carson City, so it is not surprising that her first performing experience was at a casino, where as a 12-year-old, she performed with her band, Nikki & Gold Rush, five nights a week She moved to Nashville at the age of 18 and worked as a bartender, waitress, and secretary while pursuing her musical ambitions. National exposure came when she replaced Paulette Carlson as lead singer of Highway 101. Her self-titled solo album was produced by Don Cook.

## Sons Of The Desert "WHATEVER COMES FIRST" (EPIC)

The Texas-based Sons Of The Desert honed their skills in dance halls and nightclubs, traveling for two years in a '72 Dodge Apollo RV. Group members are lead singer Drew Womack, guitarist Tim Womack (Drew's older brother), bassist Doug Virden, keyboardist Scott Saunders, and drummer Brian Westrum. In an unusual move for Nashville, album producers Doug Johnson and Johnny Slate let the band members play on their Epic debut album. Drew Womack penned most of the material on the 10-song set

## Jeffrey Steele "A GIRL LIKE YOU" (CURB)

After years of singing lead and playing bass with the group Boy Howdy, Southern California native Jeffrey Steele is going solo. He wrote or co-wrote all of the songs for his new Curb album, as well as previous Boy Howdy hits "She'd Give Anything," "They Don't Make Em Like That Anymore," and "A Cowboy's Born With A Broken Heart." He also wrote three songs on Kevin Sharp's debut album. Steele, who now lives in Franklin, Tenn., is a weightlifter and an avid mountain-biker who once tried out with the San Diego Padres before a knee injury from a motorcycle accident sidelined his baseball career.

## Lee Ann Womack

"NEVER AGAIN, AGAIN" (DECCA)

## **Does Country Still Deliver The Males?** Or Are They Getting Too Much Attitude?

by Phyllis Stark

It is becoming increasingly common at industry conventions like the recent Country Radio Seminar to hear discussions about why all the male country listeners are leaving the format and where they are going. But despite some evidence indicating that the format seems to have been particularly hard hit by an erosion of male listeners, not everyone thinks there is a problem.

Even after the format's leveling off of recent years, country is at or above where it was in the pre-boom spring of 1989 in every demo except two: men 18-plus and adults 35-64. The 9.9 share for men in fall '96 marks the first time the format has been below a 10 share with men since Billboard and Arbitron jointly began tracking national shares of listening in 1989.

While female shares have grown 9.7-11.5 from spring 1989 to fall 1996, male numbers are off 10.1-9.9. Comparing each demo to its peak period, the drop-off is sharper. Female num-bers peaked at 13.9 in the spring and fall of 1993 and have since dropped 2.4 shares from that high. Male numbers peaked at 13.4 in the fall of 1992, but the format has lost 3.5 shares of men since then.

So, where are all the men going and why? Theories range from female-attitude songs like Mindy McCready's "Guys Do It All The Time" to the rise of modern rock and other formats that

target men.
At WIVK Knoxville, Tenn., MD Chris Huff says in some male demos the station was down as much as 8 shares in the last book. "We saw a major erosion," he says. And while he says he has seen some evidence to indicate it may have been merely a fluke, Huff believes that some of what he calls the "female-slanting songs may have turned some guys away." He cites "female anthems" such as "Guys Do It All The Time," Shania Twain's "Any Man Of Mine," and even Deana Carter's "Strawberry Wine," which Huff says "was great song for the format but may not be as big for men as it has been for women."


You look back, and a lot of the music that has been out there the last six months has been leaning female, Huff says. "It may not be driving men away en masse, but it's part of the puzzle to look at. We have to do a better job of balancing the music that comes in. Now, we're taking a song like Terri Clark's 'Emotional Girl' and being more careful about it than we [would've] been in the past.


"In the good old days, you didn't have to worry about it. All the songs were mass-appeal," adds Huff. "Now, there is a little more gender fragmentation [in the music]

## Montgomery's Good Influence On Sara Evans

ccasionally, when I review writer credits on new product, a familiar name jumps off the page like a bolt of lightning. I first reviewed Sara Evans' debut RCA album, "Three Chords And The Truth," without benefit of writers credits, but I kept returning to one track, "If You Ever Want My Lovin'." When I got the list of writers credits for the album, I realized why. That track was co-written by Evans, new Almo Sounds artist Billy Yates, and Melba Montgomery.

Once I learned Montgomery was a cowriter, I felt a bizarre sort of déjà vu on subsequent listens. I couldn't help hearing an overwhelming Montgomery influence in Evans' vocals. I would picture Montgomery onstage with Roy Acuff or George Jones, belting this lilting, sassy song out for an enthusiastic Opry audience. Montgomery has one of the best pure, rippling Southern country voices ever, and hearing Evans sing this song was eerie and exciting.

Montgomery has a history in country music that even Hollywood would have had trouble dreaming up. She was raised on a farm in rural southern Tennessee and had her first guitar by the age of 10. Her entire family was musical. In 1958, she and her brother entered a talent competition sponsored by Pet Milk, with the finals held in WSM Nashville's Studio C.

Montgomery was noticed by Opry godfather Roy Acuff, who hired her as a replacement for the female singer in his troupe. During four years with Acuff, she toured the U.S., Europe, North Africa, Australia, and Canada, hitting virtually every military base along the way.

way.
With Acuff, she appeared on the Grand Ole
Opry and worked with comedy duo Lonzo &
Oscar. She was signed to United Artists in '62,
when producer Pappy Daily teamed her with
Jones. Her own composition, "We Must Have
Been Out Of Our Minds," became a big international hit duet for Jones and Mont-

Besides her duet success with Jones, Montgomery had noticeable pairings with Gene Pitney and a best-selling duet album with Charlie Louvin in 1970. Her biggest solo hit was the 1974 Harlan Howard recitation, "No Charge," which went to No. 1 on Billboard's Hot Country Singles & Tracks chart. More recently, Montgomery co-wrote "Close To Crazy" for the new Reba McEntire set, "What If It's You."

Her recent songwriting renaissance comes at a time when other country poets are experiencing renewed interest, such as Tom T. Hall and Bill Anderson. It's probably no coincidence that these writers are resurgent at a time when many radio programmers, critics, and fans are chanting protests about a homogeneous sound in our music. Homogeneous is one word that's never been used to describe Montgomery, or Hall and Anderson, for that matter

Montgomery's recordings can be tricky to find. Check your favorite used-record stores, or ask your Capitol rep to send you the 1996 reissue "George Jones & Melba Montgomery" from the Vintage series.

## Canada Converts To BDS Data

OH CANADA! Several years after the first Broadcast Data Systems monitor was deployed in Canada, that country's leading trade magazine, The Record, has converted its charts to BDS-monitored data. In Canada, BDS monitors more than 125 stations in 15 markets and five different formats-modern, mainstream rock, top 40, AC, and country. Plans are under way to expand into more markets this year, and even if knowing that a Kingston, Ontario, monitor is coming doesn't mean much to our American readers, Canadian monitoring has meant that some U.S. outlets (such as modern WBTZ Burlington, Vt.) can be monitored from Canada. Other problems in clude power outages, station-signal fluctuation, damaged antennas, and monitor failure When such instances occur, BDS quickly reacts to the problem, but in cases where the problem continues for three or more days, BDS and Airplay Monitor remove affected stations from the charts until the problem is

MIXES MATTER: We've said it before, but it's worth re-emphasizing to labels that BDS needs all versions of your song. For instance, even though we might have the CD in the system, mixers commonly use vinyl on the air. CD and vinyl are different media to the computer. Jeffrey Steele "A GIRL LIKE YOU" (CURB)



"That, coupled with the fact that the format is extremely female-leaning, [means] it may not be a male experience right now. The music is speaking to the female audience . . . The songs coming out of Nashville seem to be so relatable to women." As for female-attitude songs, Sledge says, "I don't know if they're driving men away as much as they are appealing to women.

KXKC Lafayette, La., PD Renee Revett calls "whiny songs" rather than "attitude songs," but she too believes they may have driven some males away. "The whiny females syndrome may subtly have a negative connotation. There are so many new female artists, and so many of them have that attitude," she says. 'Mindy McCready is so precious I hate to pick on her, but 'Guys Do It All The Time' is a whiny song. Last year, somebody came out with a positive love song, and I didn't know how to act. I thought, 'She's not mad about anything.

Huff thinks another reason males are leaving the format is that some country stations are now researching only women in focus groups and auditorium tests-something that marked top 40's slide from mass-appeal to a niche format in the late '80s/early '90s. "I've always wondered why stations would just research women," he says. "Country is a very broad format, and if you just start researching yourself into a corner like that, you're going to find yourself in a corner."

Revett believes the glut of new artists so often blamed for country's overall downturn has had a particularly detrimental affect on male listeners because women "are just paying a little closer attention. Perhaps men don't listen with the same intensity, so its harder for them to keep up.

A couple of years ago, I said that if country didn't get careful, we were going to be upstaged by groups like Hootie & the Blowfish, [but] Nashville continued its glut," says Revett. "It's very similar to something that happened here in Louisiana. We had an oil and gas industry that was just phenomenal. Everybody was making money, and there was so much excess it just busted. Hopefully, there won't be a bust in country music, fbut lit's very similar as far as the excess. [The thinking is], if one is good, then nine are better:

There is a much-mentioned theory that other formats have improved and become more of a draw for men. The formats most often cited for taking male country listeners are modern, classic, and album rock; jazz; and news/talk. In Knoxville, Huff believes that most of the listeners he lost in the fall seem to have turned up at the market's classic rocker

Sledge believes the male audience hasn't left radio, just country. "The good news is they're [still] using radio. They're responding," he says. The challenge for country is to figure out the way to get them back, either musically or through nonmusical elements.

But regardless of whether the men come back, Sledge says he is "glad it's a female-driven format. They are loyal and aware of the radio station. That really serves the format well right now. Radio stations don't create markets, they serve them . . . [So] if there was a market for [country] stations that were male-leaning, perhaps you'd see those stations on the air.

## ARBITRON: A WIVES' TALE?

Ironically, the perceived downturn in male numbers comes at a time when Arbitron has greatly increased its response rates among men 18-34, thanks to higher diary premiums and more follow-up calls to households containing a target male

But Pierre Bouvard, Arbitron's GM of radiostation services, says he has frequently heard the theory that the increased male-response rate, and the fact that Arbitron has increased its overall sample sizes from 40% to 70% in most markets in the past four years, has actually had a detrimental affect on country shares. According to what he calls the "wives' tale," the new listeners being surveyed must be rock listeners because they are 18- to 34-year-old men. In fact, Bouvard says, increased sample and a better representation in male demos simply means more accurate measurement across the board.

But Bouvard is among those who does not believe country's male shares are off any more than its female shares. He cites a two-year trend showing country off about 17% with men and about 15% with women.

## **GUYS DO IT ALL THE TIME**

Bouvard is joined in that belief by some programmers, like WYGY (Y96) Cincinnati's Patti Marshall, who say there is no problem with eroding male numbers in country. "I don't remember being crushed in the last book by a lack of males," says Marshall, who is particularly incensed by the theory that female-attitude songs may be driving men away. "That's not giving our male listeners much credit," she says. Name me a sexier female than Shania Twain or Mindy McCready. The females have never been sexier.

According to Marshall, male programmers who say female-attitude songs are a problem are "threatened" by strong female artists. Male programmers "are so busy wondering where their drinking songs went that they're not concerned about what their predominantly female audience wants to hear. Strong females are putting out great songs, not just female-attitude songs.

Marshall cites results of a recent auditorium test showing that in Cincinnati, "Any Man Of Mine" actually scored higher among men than women, that "Guys Do It All The Time" scored just slightly higher with women, and that Strawberry Wine" scored the same with both

"All of a sudden, we've become overly gender-conscious," says Memphis-based consultant Craig Scott, who believes the perception that there is a male problem may have come from people looking too hard for the causes of the format's overall audience declines. "Whatever is going on in this format, you can't point to it being peculiar to one gender," he says.

We have a lot of people in this format that are examining all possible reasons why there could be a slump," Scott adds. "In the interest of trying to find out at the station level and maybe the industry level why something is going on, you start looking under rocks that are real small for something to point to. I wouldn't point my finger to Nashville or to radio, and certainly not to men.

## In Heated Nashville Battle, Kyle Cantrell 'Tunes Up' No. 2 WSM-FM With New Sound

ith a brand-new marketing campaign built around the phrase 'tuned up" on-air and on billboards across Nashville, and a new music mix heavy on '80s gold, WSM-FM is mounting an effort to reclaim its former place as the market's leading country station.

Over the years, some very astute people at WSIX have taken our rightful place in country music's heritage away from us, and shame on us for letting that happen. But I believe we can get it back," says Kyle Cantrell, OM at WSM-AM-FM and N/T sister WWTN. Cantrell believes he can defeat market leader WSIX, claiming, "If I didn't think so, I wouldn't be here. WSIX is a great radio station. I just think we're better, and we can be better than we are . . . WSM's call letters have a great deal of equity, and we deserve to be the premier radio station in the U.S. We're working on that from here on out.

In the fall '96 Arbitrons, WSIX slipped 14.8-11.9 12-plus, while WSM-FM was up 8.4-9.7,

making the stations No. 1 and No. 2 in the market, respectively. Although WSM was just threetenths of a share ahead of where it was in fall '95, WSIX lost 3.4 shares in the same year, narrowing the lead it once had over WSM. One reason the gap narrowed in the fall is WSM's live broadcast from the co-owned Wildhorse Saloon dance club six nights a week. The show, hosted by Rich Miller, pulls a 9.3 share at night, the only daypart

share. WSM's musical changes, implemented Feb. 17, sound more dramatic on-air than they look on paper. Cantrell says he made the changes, be-"the station needed freshening. We were too similar to our competitor . . . For a long time, we've been much like them, because it's such a heated battle.

in which it beats WSIX, which had a 5.8 evening

Now, Cantrell has cut back his currents from 49 to 45 and decreased the rotations of powers from 38 to 31 spins a week to make room for a new gold category consisting of "less-played songs from the '80s." Among the titles heard recently on the station are the Desert Rose Band's '89 hit "She Don't Love Nobody," Restless Heart's "Dancy's Dream" ('90), Keith Whitley's "Homecoming '63" ('86), and older titles from Alabama and Highway 101

Cantrell says deciding which records to include in the new category was "nothing scientific, just one of those gut-level calls." He went through the library of country gold sister WSM-AM to pick out some songs "that mainstream country radio has long since given up" and that were particularly strong hits on WSM when they were first played as currents. Even though he cannibalized the AM's library a bit, Cantrell says the records he chose for the FM will remain on the AM as well.

Here's a recent afternoon hour on WSM-FM: Toby Keith, "A Little Less Talk"; Terri Clark, "Better Things To Do"; Brady Seals, "Another You, Another Me"; Kathy Mattea, "455 Rocket"; Little Texas, "What Might Have Been"; Trace Adkins, "(This Ain't) No Thinkin' Thing"; Sawyer Brown, "Six Days On The Road"; Tim McGraw, "Maybe We Should Just Sleep On It"; Diamond Rio, "Mirror Mirror": Tracy Lawrence, "Better Man, Better Off"; Alan Jackson, "Little Bitty"; Kentucky Headhunters, gin' The Blues"; Tracy Byrd, "Don't Take Her, She's All I Got"; and Sammy Kershaw, "She Don't Know She's Beautiful."

Meanwhile, the new "tuned up" campaign hit the air and the streets Feb. 24. A new TV campaign started March 17. At the moment, jocks are using the "tuned up" slogan between every record, although Cantrell says they may back off eventually. "This is very much akin to a grand opening," he says. "We're using it with a great deal of frequency just to get the message across.'

Cantrell says the "tuned up" slogan was selected because "it means a lot of different things to a lot of different people . . . [We were] looking for something almost cutting edge that could be easily tailored to what we're doing at the time tuned-up music, tuned-up contests." And although Cantrell says a few people have made comments like "I didn't know it was out of tune." most of the listener reaction to both the slogan and the musical changes has been favorable.

'I wondered at the time how much listeners would really notice, but we sometimes don't take into account the sophistication of our listeners, he says. "We've gotten continuous feedback, most of it positive.

WSM recently hired consultant Bob Moody of McVay Media. Although the station had not previously worked with a consultant, Cantrell says Moody's move to Nashville made him a logical choice. "We thought his physical presence here [gave us an advantage]," he says. "We can always use another set of ears turned our way'

But while he says he has nothing against consultants, Cantrell believes the country industry is resisting fragmentation because it will wrest control away from consultants and labels. "The present system is just being threatened," he says. But, Cantrell adds, "I don't believe they'll be hurt by it. At WSM, our two stations are stronger because of our doing something different [from each other]. I can't believe it's been bad for us. I can't see any downsides to fragmentation ... I don't see it as anything but bringing people into the format who may be disenfranchised by what mainstream stations are doing.'

Cantrell believes that the musical balance needs to return to country for the format to prosper. "If country radio is going to continue to be successful, the pendulum needs to stop swinging" between traditional and contemporary sounds, he says. "There has to be diversity in the music for everyone to be happy. Every time the pendulum has swung one way or the other, the business has suffered as it goes too far. If we could keep it balanced and make room for traditional sounds and contemporary sounds, everyone will be happier."

Like many who have passed through WSM's doors over the years, Cantrell is living his dream. "All I have ever wanted to do in my life is work at WSM," he says. A Nashville-area native, Cantrell grew up listening to WSM and imagined himself as a Grand Ole Opry announcer introducing acts like Roy Acuff. Now, he is the Saturdaynight announcer at the Opry in addition to his programming duties and calls that job "one of the loves of my life." He has been working at WSM since 1982, when he joined as a P/Γ jock. Although it's his dream job, he concedes that you get bogged down in it some days. You wonder if it's a dream or a nightmare. We have the same concerns and problems as any station

### 'Play Misty '97': Real-Life Tales Of An Often Terrifying Occupational Hazard

It's part of the air-personality job description to project a friendly demeanor on the air, relate one-on-one with listeners, and meet the public. Doing it right generally pays off in ratings and listener loyalty, but it sometimes has the unfortunate byproduct of attracting stalkers.

Stalker stories—some funny, most terrifying—are common across all format and gender lines. Personalties who have been stalked say they have learned a few tips about protecting themselves, as have managers at stations where stalkers have struck.

"It always starts off with fan mail," says WVAZ (V103) Chicago afternoon jock Bonnie DeShong. "This one guy started writing to me and seemed like a nice guy, level-headed. Then the letters got to the point of saying, 'I'm glad we're in love and we're gonna have a relationship.' He even told his grandmother we were getting married ... He told me he'd been watching me, going to all my appearances, and making sure I'm getting into my building OK at night." When he

threatened to come to the station because DeShong didn't show up at the wedding, the station contacted his grandmother and confirmed that he had some real mental problems. "They ended up putting him into an institution for a while," she says.

WDAS Philadelphia midday personality Pat Jackson realized her "faithful fan" was a potential problem when the cards and gifts got bigger and more frequent. "Everyone has regulars who call every day, but this guy started to send me gifts, cards with personal messages, and flowers or balloons that said 'I love you.' "The stalker then began showing up at remotes and club appearances where, Jackson says, "he would just stare at me and not say a word or talk to anyone." He would also show up at the station as she was coming off the air.


While programming New York college station WNYU, John Loscalzo, now SW Networks director of rock programming, started getting calls from a woman who, he says, "was completely out of her mind. She used to call up and burp and make guttural noises." She augmented the calls by sending things to his parents'


### P1s Love Country, But Where Are P2s?



### Study Says Country Has Farthest Reach

More than 43 million listeners tune in to country radio each week, making it the farthest-reaching format, according to Interep's new qualitative profile of the country radio format audience. With a weekly cume of 43,547,000, country tops AC (36.4 million), news/talk (31.3 million), oldies (20.9 million), and every other format. The study also revealed that other for-

The study also revealed that other formats share more of their listeners with country than country stations do with other formats. For example, 25% of AC listeners also tune into country, but just 21% of country Pls say they also listen to AC. The difference in other formats is more dramatic: 19% of album rock listeners also listen to country, but only 5% of country listeners say they also listen to album rock; 23% of oldies radio listeners also tune into

country, but country shares just 11% of its audience with oldies stations.

According to Interep's profile of country listeners, 94% are white, 81% have a high school-level education or better, 72% own a home, 69% are employed full or part time, 64% are married, and 62% have a household income of \$30,000 or more. Also, 71% of country listeners are in the 18-49 demographic and 65% are in the 25-54 demo.

Despite country music's rural themes, the study found that 71% of country listeners reside in metropolitan areas, and only 29% live in nonmetro areas. The largest number of country listeners (43%) live in the South, with 26% residing in the Midwest, 18% in the West, and 13% in the Northeast.

### **Highlights From The 28th Annual CRS**

he 28th annual Country Radio Seminar is now in the history books, and the vast majority of comments I heard from attendees were positive regarding both agenda and nonagenda functions. Here's my own short list of convention highlights.

Best line used during a session: While introducing panelists during "The State Of Country: Trend Report" session, co-moderator Mark Edwards of ABC Radio Networks introduced McVay Media's Bob Moody as "the former gentleman who programmed WPOC Baltimore." Immediately, Moody's fellow panelist, Radio IQ consultant Jaye Albright, who underwent a sex-change operation in '95, quipped, "No, I'm the former gentleman here."

Most talked about performance: Tanya Tucker (see story on page 4).

Most honest comment made during a session: At the Friday Night Rap Room, one attendee suggested that every piece of product that comes out of Nashville cannot become a hit, to which another programmer responded, "Yeah, and too many [of those songs] that end up being hits really shouldn't be."

Comment heard most often between sessions: "I hate this hotel."

Best musical moment: Three enthusiastic

standing ovations that happened toward the end of the annual guitar pull, "WCRS Live!" The first came after songwriter Jim Weatherly sang his "Midnight Train To Georgia," a 1973 hit for Gladys Knight & the Pips. The second standing ovation came after a performance of the 1980 George Jones hit "He Stopped Loving Her Today" by songwriter Bobby Braddock. After the crowd sat down, Braddock's fellow performer Clint Black remarked, "Most people who grew up listening to country music during my generation think that's the greatest country song ever written." Black's comment prompted the third standing ovation.

Charlie Monk's funniest line: Music pub-

Charlie Monk's funniest line: Music publisher Charlie Monk's humor is a mainstay at CRS; some applaud, while others boo. While opening "WCRS Live!," Monk asked, "What's the difference between Elvis and [TNN's 'Prime Time Country' host] Gary Chapman?" The answer, "Elvis died privately."

Most unfortunate early departure: After Matraca Berg performed "Strawberry Wine" at the guitar pull, about 25 attendees left the room at the same time. Why so unfortunate? See "best musical moment" above.

Best use of humor on a lapel pin: Curb regional promotion manager Susanna Pritchett's strategically placed button, which read, "Stop talking to my breasts. They're deaf."

### CRS Panels Diverge Widely On Format Health

If country's core listeners are so happy with the format, why are all the secondary and tertiary listeners still missing in action?

That's the big question that emerges from an overview of the panels at the 28th annual Country Radio Seminar, held March 5-8 at Nashville's Opryland Hotel.

Panelists' take on the state of the format diverged widely, depending on which session you attended. At the unveiling of this year's second Eagle Group "State Of Country Radio" study, the complaints about country were few enough that consultant Rusty Walker said, "The people who consume our product have a higher opinion of [country radio] than those who create it."

Yet, a controversial focus group of country listeners staged for CRS was particularly down on the format. And at several panels, evidence pointed to a lack of new listeners (and a loss of previous secondary fans). At a panel on the future of the format, stats were unveiled showing country album sales down 12% last year vs. a 3% rise across the business.

Last year's Eagle Group study showed how strongly the majority of country listeners want a mix of old and new songs on the radio. This year's study still showed a high rating (8.5 on a 1-10 scale) for the "yesterday and today" approach but showed fewer people than last year who felt that country was becoming more like rock. As was the case last year, about 45% of the sample couldn't come up with anything they "disliked most" about country radio. Asked for specific changes, 34% couldn't recommend any, although 16% complained about the length of stopsets—something that was particularly noticeable at the young end.

Eighty-seven percent of those polled say they're listening to country radio more or the same amount of time as last year. Of those listening less, 51% said it was because they "enjoy other music more now," 29% blamed a lifestyle change—such as a new job where they couldn't listen to radio—and 11% said they just don't enjoy country as much now.

Those who remain show that country is a format more dominated by longtime P1s, who listen longer (66% of respondents listen to country "often"; that figure is up from 55% last year). The study also showed that country has shown virtually no cume growth in the last two years. Asked how long they had been listening to country, only 4% of the respondents said one year or less, identical to last year's figure. The majority of this year's respondents (73%) have been listening to country six or more years.

### WHERE WILL THE P2s PLAY?

At the previous day's session on "The Future Of Country Music," Left Bank Management's Jordan Berliant unveiled similar statistics showing a lack of new converts and noting that less than 20% of the audience is under the age of 25 now. Berliant pointed out that none of the top 10 artists cited by country

listeners has broken more recently than Shania Twain in 1995 and called for PDs to try to draw both the urban and suburban audience as well as younger listeners and males to the format again.

How? KZLA Los Angeles PD John Sebastian, whose station has drawn a lot of attention—much of it hostile—for using noncountry gold, said that the country format always expands by broadening, and he attacked the format's "purity police." Sebastian ended up in a heated exchange with artist Mary Chapin Carpenter, who bemoaned the fact that KZLA didn't mention being a country station in its TV spots until the very end, an approach she called "stealth country." That kind of discussion would have been common at CRS in the '80s but has not been since the country boom.

But Carpenter was in favor of broadening, too, at least musically, noting that during the boom years, there had been more musical diversity in the format. "I think we're in for a soell of balance, but it may take a while."

spell of balance, but it may take a while."
At that evening's "Rap Room." WSM-AM-FM Nashville PD Kyle Cantrell had a similar take. "We've got to stop the pendulum from swinging because the listener wants it all," he said. "In a few months, all you'll be able to [get from labels are] all these traditional things."

### **HOCUS FOCUS**

At Friday morning's "Live Focus Group," respondents called for a greater variety—not just in terms of older gold, but from a greater number of new artists. Respondents complained about DJs who trashed artists on-air and said that they felt country radio was too talky, particularly in the morning. But, like many research respondents, these respondents complained that DJs didn't back- or front-sell music enough.

The focus-group panel was instantly controversial because its respondents were recruited from country fans who were at Opryland for the express purpose of stargazing at CRS and because participants were told that their responses were being watched. Respondents also used more radio jargon and had a greater knowledge of current artists than many nonindustry listeners. While the nature of the panelists led many in attendance to minimize their conclusions, Moon Mullins cited the 80/20 rule about the percent of listening that comes from core listeners, adding, "I'd rather know what they think than people who drop in and out of the format."

Other recurring topics at the CRS panels included the speed at which records move up and down the chart. At BP Consulting Group's "Seminar Before The Seminar" March 5, KZLA's Sebastian called country radio's habit of dropping records as soon as they peak "ridiculous." "If you keep playing it [as a current] or drop it down to recurrent ... you'll get more ratings out of that song," he said. At the Rap Room, consultant Keith Hill noted that country was no longer in a position where it could "open up the Fed Ex's and put

them in the CD players" and still win.

Then there was the issue of whether Country Music Television is cannibalizing radio listening. After several attendees noted that those who used CMT were now talking about "listening" to it rather than "watching" it, the Eagle study showed that video watching was almost unchanged from last year. But consultant Jaye Albright noted the stats were different in markets with heavy CMT penetration.

You might be interested to know that we just celebrated out fourth year on the air, and yes, it's true most of the "mainstream," heritage country stations around said we would not last in this format.

Please let me note one thing. The article read like we were one of the Alliance-formulated stations like KYNG, KYCW, and KYCY. That's really not the case at all. We bought the rights to the name Young Country, and that's it. KBEQ is really not similar to the stations I list above. It's its own animal and really is not included under that umbrella.

Secondly, regarding your feature on Kansas City country radio [Country Airplay Monitor, Feb. 28], I enjoyed the entire article. I just wanted to make you aware of one little bit of misinformation. When [KFKF Kansas City OM] Dale [Carter] makes reference to KFKF being "the

leader," he forgets to let you know that KFKF is the leader in its target demo, 25-54. KBEQ is "the leader" 18-34. That's our target demo, where 57% of our audience resides.

It's unfortunate that people still think 25-54 is the only demo alive today and the only demo that matters. Last I heard, programmers loved country music because they could get listeners from the cradle to the grave!

house. "I'd get a call from my mom or my dad, and it would be like, 'Miriam stopped by. She, uh, left you a present.' And it would be an envelope full of lint." It got to the point where she was sure Loscalzo was in danger and started phoning in emergency calls for him, once sending an ambulance to his house. It came to a head one day at the station. "I was sitting in studio C reading the paper. I look out the porthole window in the studio and see the barrel of a shotgun and cops in riot gear walking by. Upon going outside, Loscalzo learned that Miriam had told the police that a man with a gun was in the station.

KUBE Seattle PD Mike Tierney recalls the

telephone stalker who was enamored with af-ternoon jock Eric Powers. "She found out Eric's voice-mail extension and began leaving him rambling, nonsensical, profane messages after hours," he says. Not content to stop there, the caller moved up the corporate food chain to the point where she was harassing a major shareholder in the station's parent company. That's when the FBI stepped in.

WFXE (Foxy 105) Columbus, Ga., middayer Terri Thomas has been harassed by the same man for almost four years. "He started by calling the request line. Then when he saw me in a TV commercial, he came to a remote and approached me for a date," she says. "You always get listeners that ask you out, but this guy was extremely persistent. At first, he was really nice. but when I didn't return his interest, he started to get nasty. His calls are abusive, often arrogant, and sometimes threatening.

The record holder for long-time stalkee must go to WAMO-AM Pittsburgh jock Brother Matt, who has been pursued by a listener for almost 30 years. "I met her at a gig in 1968, and she's been around ever since," he says. The woman, who occasionally shows up at the station, calls often and mails Matt lengthy, rambling letters about "their relationship." Every year, there's a birthday, Christmas, and even Father's Day present. "She sends me pictures of her kids and says they're ours. She's accused me of having an affair with her neighbor and claims I talk to her when I'm on the air," he says. After 30 years of being stalked, Brother Matt says, "I don't worry about her too much, but I shake every time I hear 'Play Misty For Me.' It's just a little spooky."

### **GONNA GET A LIFE**

Despite the mental picture you might have of a stalker as someone on society's fringe, WGCI-FM Chicago morning producer Jimmy Jam Richards was stalked by a kindergarten teacher. APD Don E. Cologne says she would wait outside, trying to meet Richards. So one day, they let her in. Cologne says, "She went into the studio with him, and she was putting her hands in his pockets, hugging him, and carrying on. And Jimmy said, 'Sorry, I'm not feeling you like that.' She didn't want to leave, she was crying. She called and came back another day. She was out there ringing the doorbell, waiting for somebody to come out so she could catch the door ... She was a professional person, [so] you never know who's going to have a couple of loose

Former country WSM-FM Nashville MD/afternoon host Kim Leslie, now with Asylum Records, says her stalker "wasn't the kind of person you were afraid of when you saw her. She was a perfectly [normal-looking] girl that just needed a life.

Leslie's stalker called many times a day and would show up with homemade bread and cookies at Leslie's appearances. The offerings accelerated to "elaborate needlepoint gifts, things that took hours of work." For Leslie's birthday, she received a framed photograph of her stalker and a videotape of the woman's life, complete with footage of a dance she had choreographed for Leslie. "She'd plan vacations with me and was constantly inviting me to go places with her,' savs Leslie.

While she believes she was never in real danger and didn't involve the police, Leslie had unsettling moments when her stalker mentioned that she was moving into Leslie's apartment complex. When Leslie asked how the stalker knew where she lived, the woman confessed that she found the apartment by driving around Leslie's neighborhood and looking for her car in the early morning hours.
WYYD Roanoke, Va., PD/afternoon host

Robynn Jaymes first met her stalker, Earl, at a remote. "He looked like any other listener, so I smiled and gave him some stuff from the station," she says. Earl began calling every day, and Jaymes says she was friendly at first, until he upped the call frequency to several times per shift and began sending her letters mentioning dead babies and telling Jaymes he could tell she was in love with him by the songs she played on

After he began showing up at remotes on a regular basis, station management called the po-lice, who were able to pay Earl a visit, thanks to the return address he included on his letters. Jaymes says Earl got the message, but he would still call from time to time. But Jaymes savs the incident, which lasted several months, was so frightening that she bought a gun for protection. "It was a freaky time, because I was coming out of the building alone at 7 p.m. and looking over my shoulder," she says.

Occasionally, stalkers target an entire station. When he was PD at KWMX Denver, John Peake, now PD at KRBE Houston, says, "a guy kept calling the station, telling us to stop saving his name over and over on the radio. He said it we didn't stop, he'd begin shooting people. The man came to the station one day "to pick up his royalty check," claiming the station owed him money for saying his name so often on the air. After a tense meeting with the GM, police arrived to escort him out.

Peake recalls when another "average listener" showed up at the station and confronted him about a sweeper that was obviously broadcast solely to him: "You're listening to Mix 107.5." 'How on earth did you know that I was listening right at that moment?" asked the agitated

### ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT STALKING

So how does someone in the public light, particularly someone whose job includes being friendly to strangers, avoid becoming tomorrow's headline? You can make yourself less accessible by using an air name, having an unlisted phone number, and being careful about giving out personal information on-air. Police have advised victims of stalkers to record all conversations with the stalker and save any mail or gifts they receive as future evidence.

It helps to be aware of your demeanor. Jaymes echoed many we talked to: "You can't be too friendly. You have to be kind of reserved. It's difficult because radio is so high profile and you pull so many appearances, but the listener that obsesses over you listens to you every day and thinks they know you and thinks they can come into your life.

Many jocks suggest taking the situation seriously and telling as many people about it as possible. "Notify management immediately and don't worry about people thinking you're crazy," says WDAS' Jackson. "You never know when that listener may be the one who's crazy.'

'Make sure everyone around you is aware of the situation and of the person, as you just don't know when someone is going to snap," agrees Leslie.

Station management can help allay fears by tightening security. KRBE's Peake says that's just what his station did after one jock there started receiving phone calls threatening violence. The station is now posting a 24-hour security guard who will escort the jocks to their cars upon

Stalking and harassing in this business happens more often than you think: I don't believe we take it as seriously as we should," says Peake. 'If one person becomes a threat to someone at the station, that puts everyone in the building at risk, from the receptionist to the chief

### **Big House** "COLD OUTSIDE" (MCA)

The six members of Big House, all veterans of the Bakersfield, Calif., music scene, got together just a year ago and were quickly signed to MCA. Since then, the group has opened for Travis Tritt, Wynonna, Patty Loveless, and Collin Raye, in between recording dates for a self-titled debut album, which is due March 25. Harmonies are shared by all of the group members: brothers Monty and Tanner Byrom, David Neuhauser, Chuck Seaton, Sonny California, and Ron Mitchell.

### Kippi Brannon "DADDY'S LITTLE GIRL" (CURB/UNIVERSAL)

Kippi Brannon was signed to MCA at the age of 14 and charted with such singles as "If I Could See You Tonight," "He Don't Make Me Cry," "In My Dreams," and a remake of Webb Pierce's "Slowly" between age 15 and 17. In 1982, she was a top new female vocalist nominee at the Academy of Country Music Awards. But after four singles and without having recorded a full album, she quit the business to attend college. During her break from music, Brannon married twice and worked as a secretary and an accounting assistant, among other jobs. Now 30 and the single mother of a 9-year-old girl, Brannon makes her Curb/Universal debut, "I'd Be With You."

### The Buffalo Club "IF SHE DON'T LOVE YOU" (RISING TIDE)

Three musically diverse artists came together to form this band. Guitarist Charlie Kelley grew up on a farm listening to everything from Bryan Adams to Willie Nelson. Lead vocalist Ron Hemby, a former member of the Imperials, brings in a strong gospel background from his native Missouri. Drummer John Dittrich, formerly of Restless Heart, hails from New York and Texas, where he enjoyed jazz and top 40. The band's self-titled debut is scheduled for release in March.

### Bill Engvall "HERE'S YOUR SIGN (GET THE PICTURE)" (WARNER BROS.)

Comedian Bill Engvall, a native of Galveston, Texas, originally planned to be a teacher until he discovered that he loved making people laugh. He has made several appearances on "The Tonight Show" and, in 1992, won the American Comedy Award for best male stand-up comedian. Éngvall, who currently lives in Los Angeles, released his debut comedy album on Warner Bros. last May. Engvall will be hosting the New Faces show during Country Radio Seminar March 8.

### Nikki Nelson "TOO LITTLE TOO MUCH" (COLUMBIA)

The Texas-based Sons Of The Desert honed their skills in dance halls and nightclubs, playing everything from Vince Gill to Elton John covers and traveling for two years in a '72 Dodge Apollo RV. Group members are lead singer Drew Womack, guitarist Tim Womack (Drew's older brother), bassist Doug Virden, keyboardist Scott Saunders, and drummer Brian Westrum, a Minnesota native who once



played in a polka group. In an unusual move for Nashville, album producers Doug Johnson and Johnny Slate let the band members play on their Epic debut album. Drew Womack

penned most of the material on the 10-song set.



### Can Boom Times Be Far? Echoes Of '87 Are Heard In Today's Country Radio

As PDs gather for the Country Radio Semmar, Country Airplay Monitor looks at country radio 10 years ago and today to determine what lessons '87 holds for '97 and country's

Clint Black and Garth Brooks were still two years from their chart debuts, but country's post-"Urban Cowboy" doldrums were already starting to give

way in 1987. Consider that Randy Travis, who had broken through the previous year, released his signature song, "Forever And Ever, Amen" in '87. That hit, along with George Strait's Western swing "All My Ex's Live In Texas," constituted a onetwo punch for new traditionalism. And new and established artists unleashed rock-influenced records that helped redefine country, among them Foster & Lloyd's "Crazy Over You" the Desert Rose Band's "One Step Forward," Steve Earle's "Goodbye's All We've Got Left," Steve Warmer's "Lynda!" Hank Williams Jr.'s "Born To Boogie," and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's "Baby's Got A Hold On Me.

Presentationally, a change was in the works, too. The morning show was coming into its own at country radio. Rusty Walker, who had garnered a lot of attention at WYAY (Y106) Atlanta with a heavily produced, high-energy country station, did it again with the launch of KCYY (Y100) San Antonio, Texas, thus hastening a transition from the soft AC presentation of the early '80s to today's top 40-influenced sound.

Were these changes recognizable in 1987? As WKXK Chicago PD Ted Stecker, who was consulting and programming KSCS Dallas in 1987, notes, "Radio played the crap out of 'Forever And Ever, Amen,' but we didn't say, 'Here's a guy starting a brand-new sound.' " Also, as the week's top 10 shows, there was still an ample representation of mid-'80s core artists making the AC-flavored ballad-to-midtempo records that are most often associated with the era (see page 6). And, compared to the music that emerged in 1989-90, much of '87's most innovative country would prove more influential with other artists than enduring at country radio (see Airplay Monitor's 200 most-played gold titles, page 16).

But by '87, Travis, Strait, the Judds, and Reba McEntire were already generating press about a country music renaissance. And "Forever And Ever, Amen" is often considered the moment that Travis, who had galvanized country's existing audience, began drawing new fans into the tent. He also helped redefine what a country album could sell.

The ups and downs of most formats, PDs agree, are cyclical. Top 40's boom/bust in the early '90s was, in many ways, identical to its early '80s crisis. As a result, country's proponents have made two main contentions over the past four years. One is that country's lull leaves the format in a better place than it was in 1982-87. (Airplay Monitor na-tional format rankings go back to '89; country remains well-ahead of those numbers except in the 35-64 demo and with men.)


The other contention is that this down-cycle, too, shall pass. The questions then become when and how?

### THE BEST (AND MOST) NEWS

There are many aspects of country radio in which echoes of 1987 are unmistakable in 1997. The good news is that on the presentation side, those echoes are relatively faint. Shortly after the "hot country" movement began to wind down, some stations showed signs of returning to the "10 in a row" or "best and most country"-type positioning that had typified the format in the mid-'80s. Others, fearing the format sounded too much like top 40, backed Continued on page 6

ones Satellite Networks launched a format, Classic Hit Country, March 1. Lew Jones has been hired as OM/midday host. He most recently was PD at the Branson Music Network. JSN's senior OM, Jim Murphy, will host the 3-8 p.m. shift. Mark McColl, previously with JSN's U.S. Country format, hosts nights. JSN staffer Cherokee Wells hosts overnights. The new format's core artists include Willie Nelson, Charley Pride, Dolly Parton, George Strait, the Oak Ridge Boys, Merle Haggard, Conway Twitty, Waylon Jennings, Hank Williams Jr., and Alabama. JSN now syndicates three full-time country formats.

KUPR San Diego, after several months with country, will have unveiled its new format, rhythmic AC, by the time you read this. The station will be known as KMCG (Magic 95.7).

SFX Broadcasting, which is in the process of acquiring WDSY Pittsburgh from Secret Communications, announces plans to spin off WDSY to EZ Communications in exchange for EZ's rock station, WRFX Charlotte, N.C. SFX will also pay EZ \$20 million as part of the deal. WRFX is being spun of in accordance with a Justice Department ruling requiring American Radio Systems to sell that station and KSSJ Sacramento, Calif., before it can close on its purchase of EZ. ### Brooks & Dunn, Rimes, Strait Top ACM Noms

Brooks & Dunn, LeAnn Rimes, and George Strait top the nominations for the 32nd Academy of Country Music Awards, which were announced March 3. Winners will be named April 23 during a three-hour prime-time special airing on NBC-TV from the Universal Amphitheatre in Los Angeles, hosted by Strait, Crystal Bernard, and Jeff Foxworthy.

### So Who Really Broke The Grammy Barrier?

uring the 39th annual Grammy Awards Feb. 26, the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences handed its best new artist trophy to LeAnn Rimes, who became the first country artist to win this award in 20 years. Considering the stiff competition in that category (Garbage, Jewel, No Doubt, and the Tony Rich Project), any country artist would have been a dark horse, making Rimes' win all the more meaningful.

At the post-awards show parties, much of the discussion about Rimes' best new artist win centered on the category's previous country winners, and whether they were really country artists at all. Bobbie Gentry took the trophy in 1967, and Debby Boone won it 10 years later. But since both had bigger pop than country hits, can they be considered country winners? And if Gentry and Boone are really pop artists, wouldn't that make Rimes the first country artist to win the award? Well, it's a matter of perspective. But here's what we know about the winners' chart his-

"Ode To Billie Joe," Gentry's 1967 signature song, opened on Billboard's Hot 100 Singles chart one month before it appeared on Hot Country Singles. It spent 14 weeks on the singles chart and eight weeks on the country list. The song rose to No. 17 on the country list, but controlled the No. I slot on the Hot 100 for a solid month. From a chart standpoint, Gentry's song was a much bigger pop hit, but its Mississippi Delta imagery and mysterious ending gave it the earmarkings of a rural Southern tragedy ballad. Besides "Ode To Billie Joe," Gentry's biggest country hit was a duet with Glen Campbell, and her original version of "Fancy fared only slightly better on the country chart than on the pop side, reaching No. 31 and No. 26, respectively.

Boone's releases, decidedly more pop than Gentry's, fared better over a longer period on the country charts. Like Gentry, Boone's biggest hit opened on the pop chart about one month before making its

debut on the country chart. "You Light Up My Life" reached No. 4 on the country list but set up housekeeping at No. 1 for a whopping 10 weeks on the Hot 100. But Boone's subsequent releases performed better on the country list than the pop scorecard, and, in spring 1980, she reached No. I on the country list with "Are You On The Road To Loving Me

Although "You Light Up My Life" peaked on the country list at No. 4, it was a bigger radio hit at the time than Rimes' debut single, "Blue," which peaked at No. 10 last year. Rimes scored a No. 1 country song ("One Way Ticket") more quickly than Boone after both made their initial impact, but "Blue" had an impressive run on the Hot 100 as a result of its sales.

After 1981, Boone was absent from the country chart. Gentry never reappeared there after her hit duets with Campbell but had minor pop successes in 1976, when the movie version of "Ode To Billie Joe" spurred an unusual cover battle between Gentry's original version and a rerecorded version from the movie, also

A few more factoids here: Both Rimes and Boone recorded for Mike Curb at the time of their breakthroughs; both received such immense amount publicity due to their first hits that the knives were already poised for them by their second, yet both survived a disappointing follow-up to rebound with subsequent

The difference is that while Boone became a reliable hitmaker for several years, one doesn't think of her now as having been an image artist for the format. Rimes comes at a time when country badly wants more image artists. Three hit singles, thus far, might not put her alongside Garth, George, Clint, and Reba yet, but it's pretty good for an artist still in her "early years." Beyond the "first country artist" question, a lot of people outside the format applaud Rimes' efforts, and that's a phenomenon often called super-

# M Street Format Monitor Country Gains Nine Outlets; Top 40 Up, Too

Just in time for this week's Country Radio Seminar (March 5-8), the country format gets some good news from February's M Street Format Monitor—the tally sheet of who changed format during the month according to the M Street Journal. Country, which has been losing stations at an average of more than six a month since we launched the M Street feature last fall, was up by nine stations in February.

The combined top 40 format—including mainstream and rhythmic outlets—recovered from a slight downtick in January to post a net gain of nine stations. That reflects a heavy amount of inbound traffic, as there were also a number of stations headed out of the format last month. AC and adult top 40 were off slightly.

The R&B formats, after several stagnant months, posted a combined net gain of four stations.


On the rock side, triple-A, which has been averaging a gain of three stations a month, continued to nudge forward, as did mainstream rock. Modern, after a growth spurt at the beginning of the year, was off slightly. News/talk, religious-formatted music outlets, and the all-sports format—all of which have been on a roll in recent months—continued to grow.






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
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### Can Boom Times Be Far? Echoes of '87 Are Heard In Today's Country Radio

off on some of the jock energy or became less highly produced.

KZLA Los Angeles has gotten a lot of attention for its move to a more music-intensive presentation. But there are stations at the other extreme. such as New York's new WRGX (Y107) trimulcast, which isn't produced much differently from when it was a modern rocker. Most are still in the middle. Rather than look to quantity of music as the magic bullet-something that was often thought to indicate a lack of confidence in the music itselfmany stations are now positioning themselves around some variant of "today's country and yesterday's favorites."

KNCI/KRAK Sacramento, Calif., GM Doug McGuire was PD of WLVK Charlotte, N.C., in 1987. Asked if he saw any sign of a return to the "10 in a row" era, he says, "No, and I hope I don't, because that was the least fun I've ever had. None of us got into the business wanting to play 10 in a row, but it was necessary at the time. KCYY PD R.J. Curtis, PD of KZLA Los Angeles in '87, notes that once country music became better produced, it was necessary for the presentation to change to keep up. That seems unlikely to be reversed, nor do country stations seem likely to give up the personality morning shows they've developed. So if presentation is an issue, country has missed the worst of the '80s cycle—or hasn't come to it yet

Ray Cyrus' "Achy Breaky Heart" to top 40 airplay. In 1987, pop-to-country crossover was still common. Beyond the presence of the Eagles in many gold libraries, Ken Johnson, then and now PD of WYRK Buffalo, N.Y., remembers playing Jim Croce's "Operator" and Danny O'Keefe's "Good Time Charlie's Got The Blues' as oldies and Billy & the Beaters' "At This Moment" as a current. Bill Hagy, WXBQ Bristol, Va., PD in '87, played "Sweet Home Alabama." The move to purge those records for most stations wouldn't start for a few

Will that cycle be unbroken? KZLA has gotten some press for restoring the Eagles and the Marshall Tucker Band to its gold library. WRGX plays "Heard It In A Love Song" and titles from Roy Orbison and the Travelling Wilburys that crossed to country in New York. So far, there seem to be few other takers, although KVET/KASE Austin, Texas, OM Bob Cole thinks a new country-based album from the Eagles would reignite outside interest in the format. And Hagy, now OM for WXBQ's owner, Bristol Broadcasting, thinks KZLA made the right decision for its market.

Moreover, Hagy says that unlike 1987, when there was both a new traditional influence and a rock influence, little is happening now to keep younger listeners interested in country, "Southern Pacific, Desert Rose, and some of those bands helped us turn the corner. In the past two years, that's been kind of a missing ingredient to me."

### SLOWING DOWN THE CHART CYCLE

At 1987's CRS, besides the perennial argument over whether radio's responsibility is to sell records, there were complaints about the state of trade charts. Three years before the introduction of Broadcast Data Systems, in a year when country had 49 No. 1 hits, one major retailer charged, "We can't get a chart that's worth a damn. No one wants an honest chart."

While the chart debate has pretty well dissipated over the past five years, the extent to which many country PDs follow them has not, and with it the twin issues of whether stations are too tied to major label priorities, and whether stations are cycling through hits too quickly. Over the past year, PDsand even some label folks—have repeatedly suggested that the solution for this down cycle is to hold on to records longer and aim for quality, rather than quantity, with new artists.

Here, the similarities between '87 and '97 become a little louder. "All the talk you hear about reducing playlists, and maybe relying more on toptesting gold titles, is very similar," says Stecker. And Cole, who was then out of country, programming AC KKMJ Austin, says, "I remember feeling that I didn't know a lot of the music. There was so much new music coming out at the time that I was losing the familiarity I once felt with the format," a line that is usually used to describe listeners, not PDs, these days.

"Whenever there's a soft spot in the road for our format, one of the first things that happens is that playlists get cut," says Bobby Kraig, VP of promotion for Arista and Career, who was PD of KPLX Dallas in '87. "I think it will always be that way, but it generally doesn't last too long.

### BETTER CLASS OF DOLDRUMS

Even some of the PDs who are programming more conservatively than they were a few years ago are quick to point out, as does Curtis, that the format and the music are is in a better place than they were in the mid-'80s. If some claim today's country is disposable, he says, "it's better disposable music. After Clint Black and all the others, the bar was raised, and at least people are trying to jump over it. You listen to some mid-'80s music now and wonder, 'How the hell did we play that?' I don't think I'll look back at 'Her Man' or 'Nobody Knows' and wonder, 'Why did we play that " he adds.

Yet the consensus is that superstars brought country out of the first slump, and PDs still complain about a lack of new superstars. Cole recalls watching the first Garth Brooks TV special and crying," but not being affected that way by any of 's artists. "If there's another phase to country music, it's not here yet," says then Viacom VP of programming Bob McNeil, now in a similar position with Heritage Media. "We're still in the phase of replication where we have a lot of people who sound the same and are struggling to find those new superstar artists.

### HE WALKED ON WATER

All of this leads one to ask how the superstar artists who could reinvigorate country music will do so in this climate of greater conservatism? Country PDs recall that they embraced acts like Travis because they suddenly became available. Most when asked if radio had to change its mind-set before an act like Travis could break, say no.

Yet even before "1982" became Travis' breakthrough hit, his "On The Other Hand" had been released once, unable to clear the twin hurdles of being a traditional record by a new artist. "A lot of stations had to be dragged kicking and screaming into adding [Travis]," recalls WYRK's Johnson. Today, unlike Travis, whose basic sound remained unchanged for several years, LeAnn Rimes turned her debut into a string of hits at country only by switching to a less-traditional sound the third time out, suggesting that there might still be some initial PD resistance to anything that different.

Consultant Joel Raab believes that "what fuels the growth of country is when the format is truest to its roots," something he says is happening again. As for whether PDs would again become more aggressive on new music if they felt the product was there, as was the case in 1990-93, responses are split. Curtis says he would play more smashes if he had them. Johnson believes that country's adult audience can assimilate new music only so quickly.

# **MONITOR PROFILE**

### RCA's Waugh's In A Position To Learn As Well As Teach Patience In His New VP/GM Role

f there's one thing RCA senior VP Butch Waugh hopes to bring to Nashville in his new position as senior VP/GM of RCA Label Group, it's patience. Noting how much more quickly singles break—and break apart—in country vs. the other formats he's worked, Waugh is among the many industry executives who think the country format could benefit by slowing down. And as part of the team that spent a year and a half breaking "Macarena," Waugh knows a little something about patience.

Waugh's patience will also extend to himself, as he learns a new city and a brand-new country format and marketplace. As a Southerner, Waugh grew up on country but says his only previous country promotion experience came in the early '80s, during a three-year stint as a local rep at Capitol. Waugh admits the country business has changed a lot since then. "As I recall, the average playlist was 55-65 songs . . . back then," he

He recognizes a world of difference between how the pop and country worlds operate, including the accelerated frequency at which artists release albums in country. "What's different from what I'm dealing with now is that you're always setting up the artist's next album" in country.

What also comes more quickly in country are singles. On the pop side, Waugh says, labels typically take 16-25 weeks to actively work a single, then wait eight weeks or more before coming with the next one. "It takes a long time for records to break at top 40," he says. "Singles come a lot more quickly in country," and "it seems that records don't stay in recurrent as long in country, and albums are [over] more quickly

What I hope to bring [to Nashville] is an attitude about developing artists and sticking with them a long time," says Waugh. "We stick with the records as long as [we] get encouraging signs back from radio and the marketplace.

Another major difference between country promotion and that of other formats is that there are more format options on the pop and rock side. For example, RCA has been working the Leah Andreone single since last June, taking it from one format to the next as it breaks in each, according to Waugh. For a dance record by an act like La Bouche or Wild Orchid, labels have the option of first taking them to what Waugh calls the "major dance stations who are open minded and aggressive on these kinds of records." After building a story there, the label may then have a better chance at taking the record to other top 40 outlets and making it a hit.

In country, there are no such options, meaning this format is harder to work, says Waugh. You don't have the luxury of going to certain stations to get [airplay]. It seems like you have to go to the whole panel at once. When you release a song, you have that one shot. You take it to the one format, and you have nowhere else to go." To compensate for the lack of available format options, Waugh says, the key element in country promotion becomes "setup, setup, setup.

Among the things he likes best about his new role at RLG is being brought in on the music process even earlier in the game. On a recent trip to Nashville, he found himself in the studio while Lorrie Morgan was recording her new album. "It's like a close-knit family . . . The artists are wonderful," he observes. "They are great to work with. They are so open and friendly.

RLG chairman Joe Galante says Waugh was the first person he considered when Randy Goodman announced his plans to vacate the label group's senior VP/GM slot. "He's the perfect person for this job," says Galante. "He comes from a radio [promotion] background and is a very organized, bright individual, a student of the business. At the same time, he's very people- and artist-friendly. He's going to be a great leader."

Galante says Waugh's background outside the country format will be an advantage for the label group. "We're in the general marketplace, not just in the country music business," he says. What helps us as we become global players is the ability to attract executives from the general marketplace. In contemporary music, you're used to juggling so many different kinds of music that you learn to do things differently."

According to Galante, Waugh is assuming his new role at a time when the company is "extremely healthy," despite a softening in the country music business in general. "We're in a very tough marketplace," he says. "That's the sobering fact—that you can have all this success, but there aren't a lot of people in the stores right now buying records. But as far as the overall health of the operation, it's never been better . . . We've got great people and great music, [and we're] not just dependent on one artist."

Waugh's new duties at RLG will include promotions, sales, marketing, creative, press, and special projects. He expects to move to Nashville to assume his new duties in midsummer.

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

### Are PD Demands For Free Stuff Out Of Control? Call Lake Tahoe And Ask Them!

Are radio programmers getting

Talk to label promotion reps and you'll hear that complaint a lot. They say radio has its collective hand out for say radio has its collective hand out tor freebies more than ever. Reps say that PDs are approaching them for every-thing from extra promotional CDs and cigars to cruises and trips to Tahoe with alarming frequency, and that the demand has accelerated dramatically in the lest six months. in the last six months

On the flip side, PDs, and even many label reps, say if radio is asking for more, the labels themselves are to blame. In the high-stakes game coun-try record promotion has become, they say, the "whatever it takes" mentality is prevailing. Labels are more of-ten offering items of value as incentives

ten othering items of value as incentives to add records or boost their rotation, even without being asked by radio.

To encourage candor on this subject, Country Airplay Monitor agreed not to reveal the identities of its sources. As a result, the stories of abuses on both sides were readily offered. sides were readily offered.

"I was amazed at the number of programmers who have their hands out," says one label source, who was asked for a trip to the Bahamas for a PD and several of his female friends.

Some say the current industry climate has added to the problem. "Since deregulation came along, the phone hasn't stopped ringing for things," says one label VP "All of a sudden, the radio one label V.P.'All of a sudden, the radio station isn't a single entity, it's part of a big group with lots of stations in lots of markets. Where you had one station fending for itself, now they are one of 80 stations. The VP of programming or the consultant for the group will imply, If you don't help [our] little guy, we won't help with [your] big guy.'

"One station wanted us to start bringing artists in on a regular basis to be part

of the salan wanted to start timigering artists in on a regular basis to be part of the morning show," he continues. "We're getting tons of that [listener] appreciation stiff. Then we get the usual demands for exorbitant amounts of tickets for the bigger artists and backstage requests. We've had requests for artists to the salar times to the salar requests for artists to the salar requests. artists to come mingle at station events with clients and tons of requests for con-tributions to their charities. If somebody sits on a flagpole for a week, they fully expect everyone to drop everything to be attentive to their cause."

Depending on what label you ask, the percentage of PDs making exorbi-tant demands is between 10% and 40%. However, most agree that, what-ever the figure, it has doubled from

what it was a year ago.

## Caution: Artist Hearing Debut Song While Behind The Driver's Wheel!

The leading cause of traffic accidents may not be drunk or reckless drivers. It may actually be artists hearing their debut single on the radio for the first time. We asked some of the artists who will be performing at this year's Country Radio Seminar to tell us about the moment they first heard themselves on the radio. A surprising number of them involved cars and overexcited drivers, but the central theme of all of their stories is the power of radio to touch people's lives.

### TRACE ADKINS

"Tony Michaels, the Capitol Nashville regional,



and I had visited KITT Shreveport, La. When we left the station and got in the car to go, my song was playing on the radio. So we sat in the parking lot and listened to 'There's A Girl In Texas.' It was a very cool feeling."

### **CLINT BLACK**

"I have a very clear memory of hearing my debut single, 'I Don't Want To Set The World On Fire,' for the first time on the radio. I was

# Ballads Gaining Ground; Newest Titles Still Dominate Gold

A Look At Country's **Most-Played Titles** 

The theory that ballads are the country format's most durable songs is chanted like a mantra in programming circles, but a look at country's most-played titles still reflects the dominance of tempo in recent years, although ballads may be gaining some ground.

We examined a list of country songs for the period of Feb. 9-15 and listed the 100 most-played recurrents (songs that peaked in 1996) and the 200 most-played oldies (those that peaked before the first Country Airplay Monitor chart of 1996). Here's what we discovered.

With respect to tempo, the recurrent list for the same period last year (Feb. 7-13, 1996) yielded 32 ballads. The remaining 68 songs were medium to uptempo. This year, the list of titles peaking in 1996 shows that 39 of the 100 mostplayed are ballads. This slight increase by ballads probably suggests a trend toward stronger ballad material by new artists, such as Deana Carter's "Strawberry Wine" and Kevin Sharp's "Nobody Knows." Half of that list's top 10 titles are ballads by artists who didn't appear on that same list last year. Of those five songs, three are debut singles.

On the gold list, here's the way it stacks by vintage: 60 of the top 200 titles are from 1995; 43 are from '94; 34 are from '93; 29 are from '92; and 18 peaked in '91, proving that country radio's gold base remains heavily influenced by recent titles. Titles appearing on the gold list that peaked prior to the beginning of '90 are in the single digits: Nine titles came from '89, and only one title— "Forever And Ever, Amen" by Randy Travis—is from '87, although "Fishin' In The Dark" by the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band narrowly missed the cut, as did the Judds' '84 hit "Why Not Me."

If we can conclude that country's gold base stretches from '87 to '95, there is plenty of material missing from sev

eral key years. For example, 1988 titles are absent from the list entirely. That year's biggest hit was Keith Whitley's "When You Say Nothing At All."
