MTV's Andy Schuon On Dereg, M2, Websites, And The IHOP Sessions

If you're in Orlando, Fla., for the Billboard/Airplay Monitor Radio Seminar and Awards, you can see MTV executive VP of programming Andy Schuon deliver the keynote address the morning of Oct. 17. As a sneak preview, here's his free-flowing dialogue with Monitor's Kevin Carter about the state of radio, the launch of M2, and not being able to take his KROQ Los Angeles morning show out for breakfast.

"I don't listen to the radio as often as I would like," Schuon says. "I live in New York City and have a very short commute to work. But I still love radio—where else could you be in Anytown, U.S.A., and still be in show business? I was always fascinated with radio and also wanted to be a stand-up comedian. Less than an hour into my first air shift, I quickly changed my career goal to programmer. Sure it was cool doing a show, but I wanted to be the guy who writes these liner cards; I wanted to have some control over what happened. Hell, I held an aircheck session with myself before I'd let the PD hear it."

Once he hits the office, Schuon, gainfully employed in a visual medi-

um, heads right for the TV. "I've got picture-in-picture that splits four ways," he says, beaming the way most guys do when discussing the technical capabilities of their TV set. When asked what channels are usually on, he mentions MTV, VH1, and CNN, along with a fourth, rotating wild-card pick.

"I do have a stereo in my office, with most of the New York stations preset, like [WXRK] K-Rock or [WHTZ] Z100," he says. However, in his capacity of overseeing the music, talent, production, and program-scheduling departments, and with close to 100 employees, Schuon is rarely found in his office. He's usually spotted running through the several floors of MTV or in nonstop meetings. However, he says, "I remain fascinated by radio. I find myself spending most of my weekend listening in the car, because I miss it."

Some people who make the transition from radio to the rarified air of TV forever perceive themselves somehow higher on the show-biz food chain. Schuon doesn't give off that vibe. "When I was in radio, it was com-

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

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Nationwide Exits Radio Side

Jumping headfirst into broadcasting's high-stakes, bozo-buck bonanza, Nationwide Communications surprised the industry last week by letting it be known that the entire 17-station group is now available for tire-kicking. Nationwide owns, among others, album rockers WMMS Cleveland and KEGL Dallas, modern KTBZ Houston, and modern adult KZZP Phoenix.

Jacor strikes San Jose, Calif., picking up album KSJO from American Radio Systems for \$30 million.

EXEC SUITE: NEUMANN TO CAPSTAR
Chancellor Broadcasting senior VP of finance Eric W. Neumann becomes Capstar senior VP, reporting to another former Chancellor exec, Capstar president/COO Steve Dinetz.

Wayne Stafford, GM of the CHUM Group's four Detroit stations, including modern CIMX (89X) and triple-A CIDR (the River), exits.

KQRS Inc. director of sales Amy Waggoner advances to station manager of KQRS Inc., overseeing album KQRS Minneapolis and its duopoly partners, active KEGE (93X) and triple-A KXXP (Zone 105). She'd previously overseen sales of those three ABC properties.

PROGRAMMING: PEAK, RE-PEAK
Modern KXPK (the Peak) Denver is re-imaging itself under PD Gary Schoenwetter and consultant SBR Radio. Schoenwetter says that when the station first hit the air—before his arrival—it targeted 25- to 44-year-olds. After skewing younger for some time, research has shown that "there's an awful lot of music that doesn't get played in Denver," says Schoenwetter. While this will not be a wholesale return to the initial incarnation of the Peak, Schoenwetter says that a lot of the library the Peak first drew on will return as the station heads back into combat with triple-A KBCO.

He counts Tom Petty, Melissa Etheridge, Smashing Pumpkins, Nirvana, Los Lobos, and Lyle Lovett as a representative cross section of the library. The station positioner is shifting from "Denver's rock alternative" to "Mondo variety." No staff changes are planned.

Triple-A WXRC Charlotte, N.C., flips to active rock under consultant Greg Mull. During the early phases of this launch, Mull is handling the programming at the station, though a full-time PD will be put in place, as will a full air staff. The station is currently running jockless.

Chancellor Media is now running its pending acquisition, modern adult WNSR (the Buzz) New York, through an LMA. On Oct. 10, there were massive staff cuts, including PD Steve Weed, MD Linda Silver (201-271-9844), p.m. drivers Abby Bonell and John Malronney, as well as the station's GSM, NSM, controller, 10-year receptionist, and sales and administrative staff. Rona Landy, GM of co-owned WLTW, will oversee the station for now, although GM Mark Bench stays on as a Bonneville employee until closing.

Citadel has made some Providence, R.I., changes, moving WDGF from its disco oldies incarnation to classic hits as the Hawk, with new call letters pending. Mornings are hosted by Bonnie Holden, who had been doing production at modern sister WDGE. Jim O'Brien is in for middays. Meanwhile at WDGE, the former Edge has added the likes of Guns N' Roses, Van Halen, and AC/DC to its library while still embracing currents from the modern world. PD Brent Petersen hesitates to call it an all-out flip to active rock.

Chris "RJ" Fleming, last APD/marketing director for Nashville top 40 WQZQ (the Party) and country WZPC, returns to his rock roots as PD/afternoons at modern WGRD Grand Rapids, Mich., replacing Allen Fee.

Across the street: In the wake of the departure of Tom Marshall from modern leaning

WKLO Grand Rapids, sister classic rock WLAV PD Tony Gates is now OM of both outlets and has returned WKI.Q, which was billing itself as "the rock alternative," further into active rock territory. WLAV is keeping the syndicated Howard Stern feed in the morning and dropping "LovePhones" at night. It has split the midday team of MD Mark Fleurie and Aris Hampers, moving 25-year veteran Hampers to afternoons, replacing the exited Flea. Stern producer Wizzie is now in nights, having traded that post with Daisy Mae. The Rat moves from specialty programming to late nights.

Modern KMYZ Tulsa, Okla., PD Paul Kriegler is exiting.

Dan McClintock returns to the rock world, as PD/afternoons of classic rock KRKQ Des Moines, Iowa. Also new to the station is GSM Gary Pizzati, who most recently was an AE at top 40 WKDD Akron, Ohio, but previously worked with McClintock at album WNCD Youngstown, Ohio, in the late '80s/early '90s.

Album WAOR South Bend, Ind., PD Bill Martin has left the building.

Country WIXL Lansing, Mich., PD Jay J. McCrae is upped to OM of WIXL and sister album WJXQ, following the recent departure of WJXQ PD Mark Stevens.

Internet broadcaster Allradio.com adds the talents of two veteran PDs. KEDJ (the Edge) Phoenix PD Shellie Hart adds programming duties on Allradio's modern rock channel, Alternative Alley, while WJJS Roanoke, Va., PD David Lee Michaels picks up PD duties for the Rock, replacing that maternity-leaving Charlie Maxx.

Classic hits WGOL Lynchburg, Va., flips to soft AC as WRVX (the River).

Pollack Media Group has unveiled plans to re-launch its New Media & Music Conference, set for March 11-15, 1998, in L.A.'s Beverly Hilton.

PEOPLE: MIRALDI MOVES TO Q

Former oldies WCBS-FM New York director of marketing Paul Miraldi crosses to classic rock WAXQ (Q104.3) for the same position.

WZNF (Rock 95.3) Champaign, Ill., which has been minus a morning show since Jonathon Brandmeier went unsyndicated, adds the syndicated Bob and Tom.

Album WBZX Columbus, Ohio, welcomes back former morning host Suzy Waud to afternoons to replace the exiting Steve "the Gatekeeper" Hammond.

Modern adult KYSR (Star 98.7) Los Angeles welcomes back former afternoon co-host Leah Brandon for nights, as Gary Thompson moves to late nights. Most recently, Brandon was Rick Stacy's morning co-host at KQKS (KS107.5) Denver.

Modern adult KVSR (Star 101) Fresno, Calif., ups afternoon jock Julie Logan to MD, while Billie Wright returns from an extended maternity leave, teaming with Marlon the Part-time Guy for mornings.

Active rocker KAZR Des Moines morning producer Paul Oslund adds MD stripes, while production director Ryan Castle returns to his former night shift, replacing former MD Leigh Taylor.

Detroit Red Wings forward Darren McCarty will provide on-air commentary on hockey and rock for album WKRK (K-Rock) Detroit, joining afternoon host Millen twice a week.

Album WKHY Lafayette, Ind., P/T Ski Anderson adds promotions duties.

FIRE ON HIGH

Fire struck the modern WPLA Jacksonville, Fla., tower, knocking the station off the air from 10 p.m. Oct 7 into early the next morning. Once back on the air, the station was operating at 50%. As we went to press this week, that had increased to 80%, with the hopes that it would be at full power by Oct 17.



CHEET SHEET

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Size 14's Excellent Adventure

If the names Bill and Ted, Wayne and Garth, Beavis and Butt-head, and Spicoli meant nothing to the public, then maybe a band like **Size 14** wouldn't work. But since those are enduring American pop-culture characters, the Los Angeles quartet's inside look at the geek side of the slacker culture could have its share of "ready to rock" fans. **Size 14** plays raucous bubblegum pop bolstered by a heavy metal/punk undercurrent that sounds like half of the **Ramones** forming a band with the **Cars** and not being able to decide on anything except that they like the **Beach Boys**.

Size 14 founder and singer/guitarist **Linus** has the perspective of a self-deprecating former metal head whose songs poke fun at his own insecurities. "In high school I was like a total mess. I had acne and braces, the whole thing. I was such a geek. I used my sense of humor to cope with that," he says. "If someone said, 'Hey, pizza face,' I would totally nail them with something. I like to flaunt my flaws." **Linus** was the giant geek with big feet (hence the band's name); a towering 6-foot-2 frame when he was 15 years old put him a foot taller than most kids. Writing about his imperfections, he says, is more convincing because "more people can relate to feeling inadequate than relating to **David Lee Roth**, even though it's fun to think you're him," he reasons.

Linus' ability to spoof the absurdities inherent in the whole slacker-metal genre comes from firsthand experience. He grew up in the picture-perfect suburbia of Satellite Beach, Fla., an ocean-side town of palm trees and malls where half the kids in school were surfer types and the other half were headbangers. **Linus** was part of the latter, and his crew called themselves the Black Shirts because "everyone wore tour shirts every day." Debate about who was the best guitarist was delivered with such vigor over the lunch table in the cafeteria that it often ended up on the verge of fistcuffs. By the time he was 15, **Linus** was playing in cover bands in the area, having already become a prodigious bass player and guitarist. In fact, he turned down a scholarship to study jazz bass "because I thought my glam band was going to get signed," he says with a mock sigh.

Despite how unfashionable it was during the reign of grunge, **Linus** remained true to his metal-tinged, bubblegum power-pop and left for Los Angeles to pursue it in 1994. He began working in telemarketing, the old standby job for many an aspiring musician in L.A. Besides being able to make decent money and sit in an office drinking coffee, he says, "that's how I met everyone that I know, including **Kevin Danczak**, the guitar player in the band, and my girlfriend." He also met a guy who was working at MCA, who in turn did him the favor of dropping his tape on the desk of an A&R rep. Label interest ensued, with Zoo (now Freeworld) coming out on top.

Size 14 signed with Zoo in early '97 and selected producer **Mike Clink** for his seminal work on the debut **Guns N' Roses** album. To up the ante on the pop side, they enlisted studio owner and perennial '70s hitmaker **Daryl Dragon** (of **Captain & Tennille** fame) to add his trademark keyboard/synthesizer sounds to five songs.

Despite songs like "I Touched Her Ass," "Sleeping In The Wet Spot," and "Death Metal Steve," **Linus** says **Size 14** is not a comedy band. "I prefer to say that we have a sense of humor. Because there's a lot of bands that are silly just for the sake of it and don't really come from anywhere, whereas I think that we have some honesty," says **Linus**, who received the nickname when he first moved to L.A. for his constant wearing of striped shirts like the Peanuts character. "When I write lyrics, they're coming from somewhere; I'm not just making up stuff to make people laugh. Usually I'm upset or whatever, and I write to make myself feel better."

Linus longs for the days when **Van Halen** unabashedly sang about beautiful girls and bands strove for entertainment value in their music. Contemporary bands are too staid, he says. "None of the kids down the street are like **David Lee Roth**." But if more people would fess up, he suggests, there could be a reversal of that trend. "Everyone our age either grew up listening to the **Smiths** or the **Cure** or listening to heavy metal; and a large part of the alternative demographic grew up on metal. And it's funny because no one really wants to admit it. Where we come in," he says with a laugh, "is we steer people to kind of recognize their metal roots." Party on, dude.

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

fortable, like when you're in college and wanted to stay there forever," he says. "I've had some great radio jobs and wouldn't trade any of those experiences for anything."

Based on the success that Schuon enjoyed when he programmed modern rock pioneer KROQ Los Angeles, MTV came calling in 1992. "You do on the radio what we want to do on TV," he recalls it saying. "I thought it was a great thing to have a chance to mess around with my two main loves, music and television.

"I fueled my career at well-branded stations like KISS San Antonio, Texas, KAZY Denver, and, of course, KROQ," he adds. "Marketing, promotion, and branding—that's what MTV is about."

To help move that L.A. spirit to the New York base of MTV, Schuon initially recruited KROQ veterans Lewis Largent and former intern-turned-VJ Kennedy. Later, KROQ MD Darcy Fulmer joined VH1 and is now concentrating on new sister network M2.

Upon Schuon's arrival, MTV was very much a radio station with pictures. Today, he's working on achieving a balance between videos and long-form programming. "MTV is now on its third or fourth cycle of viewers, and we must stay true to its personality," says Schuon. "Yes, the music industry gets frustrated, but longform program-

mous for creating media icon/NBC sitcom star Jenny McCarthy, as well as "Remote Control" vet Colin Quinn, now a regular on "Saturday Night Live." Schuon cites other MTV staffers who are headed for mass-appeal acceptance: Kennedy, who will be doing commentary during next year's Olympics; Toby Aimes, who joined from MTV Europe for the live afternoon show; Ananda Lewis, who worked on BET's "Teen Summit"; and Carson Daily, another KROQ import. Another radio vet, Matt Pinfield, continues to host "120 Minutes" while picking up a brand-new show called "Mattrock," available in both a daily and weekly edition.

M2 THE GROOVE

Growing up in Reno, Nev., Schuon listened to legendary top 40 KFRC San Francisco and its heritage rock rival, KSAN, via cable. "I was inspired by how perfectly executed KFRC was and was equally inspired by the free form and creativity of KSAN, and I took that spirit with me when we created M2," he says. "Everything in life is so formatted today, even walking down a grocery aisle."

"Every single song on M2 is hand-selected by the trained artisans of MTV programming," Schuon says with a grin. "The idea is that every video relates to the one before it in some way, either by the director or musical style, but there will be threads of commonality. We don't just hit 'return' and spit out music." Schuon allows that there have been preliminary talks about launching another channel in the future.

MTV also recently unveiled new, multimillion-dollar studios overlooking Times Square, featuring blocklong, two-story-high windows, and with that, the announcement of live programming. "Again, as a radio guy, I missed the experience of walking into the control room and smelling the cigarette smoke from the jock before me," Schuon says. It is that sense of immediacy, borrowed from radio, that now powers MTV programming. In most cases, Schuon says, any pre-taping will be done the same day, "plus live breaks with a lot of interaction with the news department."

WALKING ON THE SPIDERWEB SITE

MTV was early in its involvement with America Online and the subsequent birth of MTV Online. What is the value in extending the product line to an arena that some say competes with radio and TV? "Sure it's competition for us; let's face it, we're all fighting for eyeballs," Schuon says. "In the Internet arena, we figured we would plant our stake in the ground now and deal with it in the future. Besides, it's good for our image and a great extension of our product to our audience." To that end, MTV uses the expertise of another radio vet: Matt Farber.

Schuon admits to surfing the World Wide Web and spotting some bad radio station Web sites: "You look at an out-of-focus picture of some night jammer somewhere and you think, 'They should have kept the mystique alive.'"

RIVAL IN THE BATHROOM

From his current vantage point, Schuon is amazed at the rapid changes in his former radio landscape. "I still have friends in radio," he says, "and I wonder from afar how they can possibly still get people to push the envelope creatively when one owner has five stations in the same market? I loved the competitive aspect of radio. In Denver, I was locked in a five-way rock battle, and we just loved nailing the competition. Today, that guy is using the same bathroom as you; I imagine that would cause some tension." Schuon also imagines the collective fun come budget time: "One PD wondering, 'Hey, how come he got money for an outdoor campaign and I didn't?'"

"I'm now working harder than I ever have, but this position is very rewarding, creative, interesting, and inspiring," he says. "Being here at MTV has taken me to places, both physically and creatively, that I never would have had a chance to go to in radio."

Rocktober Brings Out Best In Promos

As the season changes and the leaves start to turn, the thoughts of promotion directors turn to making a big splash in their market for the fall book. We spoke with a bunch of rock stations to find what promotions they're excited about. Here's a nice cross section of some old favorites and new spins.

At modern KXPK Denver, a recently revamped format has become the fall promotion, as PD Gary Schoenwetter reimages the Peak under the Mondo Variety banner. The new station was launched with a weekend hosted by Barenaked Ladies. At press time, Phil Hartman was set to host the next weekend. Once the launch is under way, Schoenwetter intends to fine-tune the music and then

passes, all-access backstage passes, as well as a private dressing room with snacks and refreshments. The winner's name will appear on the coliseum marquee and scoreboard during the concert, and they get to make the opening-show announcement," says promotion director Phil Lavrovsky.

Fall flyaways are in the works for modern KJEE Santa Barbara, Calif. "In addition to sending winners away to see Jane's Addiction, we'll be giving away a trip to see the Stones and Pearl Jam in San Francisco. We've already sent listeners to see them in L.A. with the Wallflowers," says PD Eddie Gutierrez. He also notes that the station is very visible this fall with "Monday Night Football" gatherings at a local bar and by giving away Station Citations redeemable for prizes by listeners who are

start structuring late-fall contests around the Mondo Variety positioning statement.

In a Row promotions continue to flourish this fall. Album KLB Austin, Texas, has been running a Nine-Song Music Marathons or \$900 contest for three months. Classic rock KSD St. Louis started a similar Seven in a Row or \$7,000 contest in the spring. Six months into the contest, it has given away some \$35,000. "When other people in the market are talking about playing 20 in a row or 100 minutes of music," says PD Steve Brill, his contest has "worked out to be a tremendous counterpositioner. Every time we start the music, it's going to be seven in a row. Nothing sexy or glamorous, but it's very effective."

Both KLB and modern KNDD (the End) Seattle plan to have their listeners do their marketing. This is the first year Austin will experience the Show Us Your KLB contest, with a \$10,000 reward to be handed out in November. The End is also offering a \$10,000 jackpot to the person who most creatively Exposes the End to the most people. Second prize is the station's prized 1960 Oldsmobile with \$500 of much-needed auto supplies. Promotion director Aubie Beal says, "We live in a very creative, arty city. I have high expectations for our audience." The contest will end in mid-November with a big party that will award the prizes and show a video of the best entries.

Modern KDGE Dallas tries a variant on the money-song contest under the Need or Greed heading. Every Thursday, a song is mentioned at the top of each hour. When that song is played during that hour, the winner is given the choice of being needy and earning \$100 on the spot or being greedy and entering the pool for a \$25,000 drawing.

ANYBODY SEEN MY WINNERS?

With several major bands touring in the fall, including the Rolling Stones, concert giveaways are a natural. Album WRCN (Rock'n 103.9) Long Island, N.Y., plans to tie in with the upcoming Motley Crue show at the Nassau Coliseum. "One winner will become concert promoter for the day. The grand-prize package includes tickets for the winner and nine friends to see the concert, VIP parking

wearing KJEE paraphernalia or motorists who have a KJEE bumper sticker.

Album KXUS Springfield, Mo., is in the middle of its yearly Rocktoberfest, this year celebrating the return of Aerosmith, the Stones, Fleetwood Mac, and U2. "Each week, we choose one of these as the artist of the week, and whenever you hear a song by them, you win music and qualify to win a trip to see them in concert somewhere in the U.S. By now, our listeners expect us to do something for Rocktoberfest, and this is a great way to build time spent listening," says PD Todd Holman.

Album WJXQ Lansing, Mich., gives away a coveted Harley-Davidson bike each year. APD Bob Olson plans to cap off this year's promotion by giving away a pair of snowmobiles in the Q106 White Hot Winter contest. This client-focused promotion finds the station taking the prize to various remotes around the market, which brings in "lots of extra revenue," says Olson. "We do a lot of bar promotions, and we take it to the local strip club and women take their picture with the prize." You can hear the wistfulness in his voice as he talks about how crazy they go when he brings the Harley by each year.

Olson is amazed at how much attention the station gets simply by driving its Blazer with the snowmobiles in tow. "If it's a nice day out and the covers are off, people just gawk," Olson says. "They speed up to catch up with you and try to drive apace with you. It's a great visual."

KLB PD Jeff Carroll recently did what radio does best by turning a recent news event into a highly entertaining and timely promotion. When Texas state Sen. Drew Nixon was snagged allegedly trying to pick up a prostitute who was actually an undercover cop, the station got an audiotape of the bust, which it used as drops to give away an appropriate package containing a police scanner, a condom, and \$35 (the amount of money Nixon allegedly offered for the sex act he desired).





Gary Barlow

Arista

After an international hit as the lead singer of Take That's "Back For Good," Gary Barlow



goes solo with the release of the album "Open Road," which debuted at No. 1 on the U.K. albums chart. His first solo single, "So Help Me Girl," was produced by pop mega-producer David Foster. The set's U.S. release date is Nov. 11. Barlow is organizer and headliner of the Third Concert of Hope, set for Dec. 7 at London's Wembley Arena to benefit the Diana, Princess of Wales Memorial Fund.

Meredith Brooks

Capitol

Raised in Oregon, longtime L.A.-native Brooks broke through earlier this year with the multi-format smash "Bitch," written after she "got up in a really bad mood one morning." She's just released the new single, "What Would Happen," from her Capitol debut, "Blurring The Edges."

Jim Collins

Career Records

Country vocalist/multi-instrumentalist Jim Collins has been recording since the '80s, releasing independent singles like 1985's "I Wanna Be A Cowboy Til I Die." Born and raised in Nacogdoches, Texas, he moved to Nashville in the mid-'90s after touring through Texas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana. Last year, he signed with EMI Music Publishing and this year signed with Career Records for his new album, produced by James Stroud and Wally Wilson.

Creed

Wind-up Records

Originally from Tallahassee, Fla., this rock quartet consists of Scott Stapp, lead vocals, Brian Marshall, bass, Scott Phillips, drums, and Mark Tremonti, guitar and vocals. Formed in 1995 as a band that "tries to appeal to people on an emotional level," says Stapp, the quartet toured the northern Florida club circuit. Creed recorded its first album, "My Own Prison," for less than \$6,000 and released it in April. Within two months, Creed had sold more than 5,000 copies in Tallahassee, with Florida airplay that extended to Tampa and Daytona Beach. The act was signed to BMG-distributed Wind-up Records in June and proceeded to rerecord and remix the set.

Dance Hall Crashers

(510)/MCA

With "Honey, I'm Homely!," the Dance Hall Crashers again mix pop, ska, and punk sounds with a definite attitude. Born in Berkeley, Calif., in 1989, the group took its name from a '60s ska compilation and grew as a side project for seminal punk/ska band



Operation Ivy. After a debut release on Moon Records in 1990, the group disbanded. But local demand was so strong that in early '92 the band reunited to play what it thought would be one last show at Slim's in San Francisco. In '95, the act signed to (510)/MCA and released "Lockjaw." The group's music has appeared on several compilations and soundtracks for '96's "Biodeome" and this year's "Godmoney."

Alana Davis

This young singer-songwriter was born and raised in New York's Greenwich Village. Her dad was a noted jazz pianist, and her mother was a singer; she cites among her influences Stevie Wonder, Siouxsie Sioux, Joni Mitchell, and Bill Withers. Her debut, "Blame It On Me," features a brilliant reworking of Ani DiFranco's "32 Flavors." The album was produced by Ed Tuton, who has also worked with Maxwell.

Destiny's Child

Hailing from Houston, the members of Destiny's Child, singers Beyoncé, Kelly, LaTavia, and LeToya, met during grade school and have sung together as a quartet since 1993. Still in their teens, the group made a '92 appearance on the national "Star Search" talent show. Signed to Columbia in '96, the act leads off its self-titled debut album with the single "No No No," produced by Vincent Herbert and Rob Fusari of 3 Boyz from Newark Entertainment.

Mic Geronimo

Writer/rhymer Mic Geronimo was born in Flushing, N.Y., and raised in the New York neighborhoods of Elmhurst and Harlem. After discovering soul, jazz, and hip-hop as a kid, he began DJing and rapping; LL Cool J and Big Daddy Kane were key influences. Mic worked with several DJs and producers until being signed to Blunt. He released his first album, "The Natural," in 1995. His second set, "Vendetta," which features Sean "Puffy" Combs, Jay-Z, Monifah and production by

Puffy, Havoc, Pete Rock, and Buck Wild, is being readied for release.

Kim Fox

Born and raised in New York and influenced by Laura Nyro, Fox attended Vassar College, where she starred in musicals, studied voice and music theory, and became the campus concert booker. After graduation in 1991, she continued writing "weird pop songs" and became a secretary in the dance department at MCA Records. She then began performing in clubs with big bands and in a one-woman cabaret act. Soon she quit, bought a \$100 keyboard, and practiced her writing and singing skills. In '94, a BMG Music Publishing exec overheard her in a rehearsal and partnered her with Bloomington, Ind., writer Paul Mahem. Then she developed a demo that earned her a recording deal with DreamWorks. Her debut album is "Moonhut."

DreamWorks

The unique rap duo of Knumskull and Yukmouth hail from Oakland, Calif., and met at West Lake Junior High. Once part of a six-member crew known as B.W.P. ("Brothers With Potential) that performed at lunchtime, Knumskull and Yukmouth began working on rhymes together and calling themselves Luni Tunz. After guesting on fellow Bay Area native Dru Down's '92 independent album, Luni Tunz blew up with "I Got 5 On It" from its debut album, "Operation Stackola." Its new set, "Lunitik Music" is due Nov. 11; the leadoff single will be "Jus Mee And U."

LaTanya

Born and raised in Chicago, LaTanya began singing at age 4, surrounded by gospel, R&B, and hip-hop. Like many other singers, she honed her skills in the church choir, where she was spotted by her manager, Ray Gregory, who began grooming her for success. She began to open for local shows by R. Kelly, Jennifer Holiday, and the Rude Boys until she caught the eye of Chicago producers Steve "Silk" Hurley and M. Doc. They signed her to their Indasoul Records and released "I Want The Bomb." She also recorded the Al Hudson/Alicia Myers tune "If You Play Your Cards Right."

Blunt/TVT

Born and raised in Chicago, LaTanya began singing at age 4, surrounded by gospel, R&B, and hip-hop. Like many other singers, she honed her skills in the church choir, where she was spotted by her manager, Ray Gregory, who began grooming her for success. She began to open for local shows by R. Kelly, Jennifer Holiday, and the Rude Boys until she caught the eye of Chicago producers Steve "Silk" Hurley and M. Doc. They signed her to their Indasoul Records and released "I Want The Bomb." She also recorded the Al Hudson/Alicia Myers tune "If You Play Your Cards Right."

LL Cool J

He's come a long way from the skinny St. Albans, Queens, N.Y., teenager in the Adidas warm-up suit and floppy hat claiming "I Can't Live Without My Radio" in 1985. This year, the superstar rapper/producer/actor and last year's No. 1 rap airplay artist returns with the album "Phenomenon," with both the title cut and the track "Candy Girl" appearing on

Def Jam

playlists. Star of in "In The House," the sitcom now in its fourth season, he has penned the candid autobiography "I Make My Own Rules." The former James Todd Smith, one of only a handful of artists from the early days of rap to have maintained a profitable career into the '90s, was the first rapper to record a rap ballad, '87's "I Need Love." Now he maintains his image as one of rap's sexiest stars while keeping his harder-edged street flow.

Longpigs

British quartet Longpigs had an arduous path to signing to the U2-owned label Mother. Three years ago, guitarist/singer Crispin Hunt cut a demo with drummer Dee Boyle, formerly of Cabaret Voltaire, then the two lied their way into a few record companies to play it. After a few showcases, Longpigs were signed by Elektra U.K. Indie-rock producer Gil Norton was enlisted, and the group set about recording its debut album. But three weeks before its first single, Elektra U.K. was shut down, leaving the act signed to Warner Bros. Longpigs entered a limbo of legal entanglements, and three members were laid up with extended hospital stays after the group's van rear-ended a truck (Hunt was in a coma for three days). Two days after the act nullified its Warner Bros. deal, Mother was waiting with a contract.

Luniz

A demo tape reached LaFace, and the artist was signed by label co-founder L.A. Reid. His debut album, "It's On Tonight," went to retail Sept. 30, led off by the single "After 12, Before 6."

Salt 'N Pepa

Red Ant/London/Island

The trio of Salt (Cheryl James), Pepa (Sandi Denton), and DJ Spinderella (Dee Dee Roper) has given hip-hop its most consistent infusion of the female perspective since the



'80s. Originally from Brooklyn and Queens, N.Y., the group first jelled to record "Showstoppa," an answer to 1986's "The Show" by Doug E. Fresh. The group was signed to Next Plateau and recorded "Hot Cool And Vicious," which yielded the smash "Push It." Numerous hits later, the group released '93's "Very Necessary," featuring "Shoop," "Whatta Man," and "None Of Your Business," which earned them a Grammy. This year, Salt 'N Pepa break out with the album "Brand New," released through their new deal with London/Island and Red Ant Entertainment. The album is conceived, written, and produced by the group. Single "R U Ready?" is already gaining spins.

Ichiban (19 S. Orange Ave., 423-2688). "Best sushi in town. It's crowded for a reason. There are a few Florida twists—gator rolls and Mexican rolls are unusual but tasty treats. They move a lot of product here, so the raw stuff is very fresh. Reservations are occasionally accepted for parties of six or more."

Cafe Jose (Washington Street in the Thornton Park area). "Hole-in-the-wall Mexican. They grill tons of veggies and about six different salsas, all homemade."

WHERE THE LOCALS EAT

Dexter's of Thornton Park (808 E. Washington St., 648-2777). "Great wine-by-the-glass bar and a good place to unwind. Light entrees are served. There's another location at 200 West Fairbanks in Winter Park [629-1150]."

Enzo's on the Lake (1130 S. Highway, Longwood, 834-9872). "Classic Romano-Italian. Everything is *fresh, fresh, fresh*. This place is packed every night! It has a nice lakeside view. Reservations are recommended."

Antonio's (611 S. Orlando Ave., Maitland, 645-5990). "Call ahead—if osso buco is on the menu, go. It's a house specialty. They have a wood-burning oven, which makes for some unique homemade pizzas, as well as wood-roasted chicken and vegetable dishes."

Park Plaza Gardens (319 S. Park Ave., Winter Park, 645-2475). "Seasonal specialties in an atrium dining room! One of the best places for spending an afternoon with a bottle of wine—invite someone if you must, but they'll just drink your wine! Oh well, order more!"

IF YOU HAVE A CAR AND WANT TO EXPLORE

Cafe Citron (State Road 434 and I-4, Longwood, about a 30- to 35-minute drive from the hotel, 831-2504). "The duck and venison (it's a special, so it's not always on the menu) are the best. Regular menu fare is light and flavorful. Weekend reservations would be a good idea. Service is best suited for a leisurely dinner. Great wine list, full-service bar, reasonable prices, and it's cigar friendly. The best cigar store in Orlando is located three doors down. Save room for dessert."

Le Coq Au Vin (4800 S. Orange Ave., about 20-minute drive from the hotel, 851-6980). "It's as intimate as any small place in Little Italy, with great food! The signature dish, coq au vin, is excellent and always on the menu. The menu is seasonal and has just changed. I've never been disappointed (except that my stomach was not big enough). Excellent and well-priced wine list. Reservations are a must."

Little Saigon (1106 E. Colonial, 423-8539). "Great Vietnamese! The menu has about 100 choices, all made from about eight different ingredients—it's amazing. They will even accommodate special orders. Vegetarian friendly, with tons of flavor. Not real formal, but great food. Reservations are not accepted."

MIKE MOORE, PD WWKA (K92)

Del Friscos (729 Lee Road, 645-4443). "The best steaks anywhere. Appetizers are outstanding. Everything on the menu is absolutely great. Service is impeccable."

SHADOW STEVENS, MD WWKA (K92)

Copeland's (8255 International Drive, 354-2220).



"New Orleans-style cuisine and Dixieland music. You have to talk loud over the music, but the dinner is well worth it. Order the crayfish."

PAUL WILLIAMS, UNIVERSAL STUDIOS

Lagniappe Cafe in Bayhill Plaza (7625 Turkey Lake Road, 354-0024). "Great Cajun food. The owner was a cook in Baton Rouge, La., that Shaquille O'Neal brought with him to Orlando. Order the Shaq Daddy Sandwich."

Bahama Breeze (8849 International Drive, 248-2499). "An island-flavored restaurant. I order fish in a bag." Outdoor deck and live music on the weekends.

RIC AUSTIN, RED ANT ENTERTAINMENT

Rainforest Cafe (in Disney Village, 827-8500). "Great atmosphere, great food, long lines! They do not take reservations, so get there early, put your name in, and shop around Disney Village." Smoke-free dining.

Charley's Steak House (8255 International Drive, behind Ripley's Believe It or Not, 363-8255). "If you want steak, go here—it's incredible. The beef is aged four to six weeks, and it's one of the top 10 steakhouses in America. They only take reservations after 2 p.m."

California Grill (15th floor of Disney's Contemporary Resort Hotel, 939-3463). "When the stars come to Disney, they eat here. If you get a table near the window you'll be able to get a gorgeous view of Disney's nightly fireworks display which is usually around 9 p.m."

RUSS ALLEN, PD WJHM

Longhorn Steak House (locations throughout Orlando, 897-6047). "My favorite is the steak and potatoes. Just look at my girlie figure and you can tell I'm there a lot."

Rachel's Restaurant (401 E. Semoran Blvd., North Casselberry, 767-2977). "The chicken primavera is to die for. My music director likes the lobster tails and shrimp. Great atmosphere for lunch, dinner, or just drinks, although the drinks can be a bit pricey. I haven't taken anybody there yet who didn't love the place."

ADAM COOK, PD WXXL

Steak and Shake (2820 E. Colonial Drive, 896-0827). "Because I'm a cheap date and love those steak burgers and chocolate milkshakes."

Ruth's Chris Steak House (999 Douglas Ave., Altamonte, 682-6444). "I only go here when Charlie Walk's buyin'—best steaks in town."

Vivaldi's (107 W. Pine St., 423-2335). "It's killer Italian in downtown Orlando. I love the lasagna. I know I shouldn't eat so much meat, but I'm training for a half-marathon in December, so I do eat salads and things like that."

JESSIE SCOTT, PD WRIT NASHVILLE (AND FORMER MD WMMO ORLANDO)

Pebble's (17 W. Church St., 839-0892). "Casual, elegant, nouvelle. Interesting juxtaposition of ingredients from the light to heavy. You can stuff yourself silly, or you can be politically correct."

Sapphire Supper Club (54 N. Orange Ave., 246-1419). "One of the more eclectic music rooms in town. It has a new chef as of a year ago, David, who is British and a wonderful addition."

Sister Hazel

Universal Lead vocalist and acoustic guitarist Ken Block formed Sister Hazel with bassist/vocalist Jeff Beres, rhythm guitarist/vocalist Andrew Copeland, lead guitarist/vocalist Ryan Newell, and drummer Mark Trojanowski in 1993, named for a crusading African-American female minister who ran a rescue mission in their home town of Gainesville, Fla. Sister Hazel recorded a self-titled debut album that sold more than 11,000 copies. Its second album, "... Somewhere More Familiar," also self-produced, sold more than 10,000 copies after its September '96 release, propelled by the multi-format hit "All For You." The band's success led it to Universal Records, which then remixed and remastered "... Somewhere More Familiar" for national release this past February.

WHAT TO LISTEN TO

The Future Is Here, Or... An Epcot Center Of The Dial

If any market represents the changing face of post-Telecom Act radio nationwide, it's Orlando. All but one of the city's major music outlets are owned between three groups, Clear Channel, Chancellor, and Cox. All three of those have absorbed other companies themselves in recent times, and only Chancellor was already the owner of all its Orlando stations before its merger. It's also a good place for syndicated morning shows—Howard Stern, Tom Joyner, John Boy and Billy. You just missed the chance to hear the recently disbanded "Ron & Ron Show," but you can hear Delilah's syndicated nighttime love songs show instead.

Here's a quick rundown of O-Town's major FMs, as well as a special BDS custom chart combining all of Florida's reporting stations.

WWKA (K92, 92.3)—One of the market's longest-running outlets, K92 never entirely embraced the young country movement, using a short-lived duopoly FM for that purpose instead. So while it did cut back its currents earlier this year, like many of the Cox country outlets, the change wasn't as drastic as it was for many stations. Currently K92—"Today's Country And All-Time Favorites" is on TV promoting its \$10,000 Dollar Bill Game, with cash prizes up to \$10,000 (and an average of \$1,000 a day). K92 doesn't have direct competition in the market, but country fans have plenty of other choices, including Daytona Beach's **WGNE** (98.1) and Lakeland's **WPCV** (97.5).

WCFB (Star 94.5)—Until two years ago,

this adult R&B outlet was young country, aimed at protecting duopoly partner K92 from a new competitor. Then it went "rhythmic AC," aimed more overtly, but not directly, at R&B **WJHM**, which was frequently K92's **STAR 94.5** competitor for the No. 1 spot. When new owner Cox closed Star, the Madonna and Gloria Estefan records went away. A few more classic slow jams were added, as was ABC's syndicated "Tom Joyner Morning Show." Recently, Steve Smith began consulting Star, which is now using the "smooth R&B and classic soul" positioner. Its fall promotion is the \$1,000 Song of the Day where Joyner, through the magic of voice tracks, is able to interact with the winner.

WHTQ (96.5)—One of the first major affiliates for John Boy and Billy's syndicated morning show, WHTQ is one of those hard-rockin' classic outlets that will play AC/DC and doesn't play much Fleetwood Mac. Last spring it gave away a Corvette and, since this is Orlando, a chance to do two 180 mph laps at the Richard Petty Driving Experience, a nearby tourist attraction.


WMMO (98.9)—Nearly a decade ago, before there was WMMO, as we know it and long before modern AC, there was WMMO, not the first "rock AC," but one of the longest-lived.

WMMO has gone through changes over the years—more progressive, more like a mainstream AC that just happened to play only rock-image artists, etc. It became part of the triple-A community until new owner Cox took over. It's now much tighter and more AC-ish, although there are still some currents in the mix, including the Rolling Stones single. And in a massive change of pace for those who remember him from legendary top 40 CKLW Detroit, Bill Gable does mornings on WMMO, having joined from oldies rival **WOCL**.

WSHE (100.3)—After a year of modern AC, "SHE," formerly heritage rocker WDIZ, has become a lot more focused and less gold-based than it was at its inception, although it still holds on to some songs that weren't hits nationally (e.g., Nil Lara's "How Was I To Know"). It's also backed off the male-bashing liners in recognition that the audience is actually 50/50 male/female, instead of predominantly female, as first expected. The station's fall promotion is flyaways to various House of Blues concerts nationwide. You'll also see them on TV this fall.

WJRR (101.1)—When WJRR signed on in 1993, the calls stood for "Just Ron & Ron," referring to the station's morning team, and "Just Rock & Roll," referring to its (then) unusual album rock/mainstream rock/top 40 hybrid. Eventually, the format evolved to guitar-driven alternative, until the Paxson folks took over, added some of the staff and elements of the former WDIZ, and returned to active rock. Recently, says PD Dick Sheetz, it's become more 21-34 focused, with a few more modern crossovers. One key change—Ron and Ron exited with Paxson's sale to Clear Channel, so you'll hear afternoon host Crash and character voice Larry the Cable Guy teamed in mornings now. And since WJRR is known for its early support of local acts, check out Native Noize at 10:20 Thursday nights.

WJHM (101.9)—102 Jamz celebrates its 10th anniversary as Orlando's first R&B FM next year. Launched at a time when few thought this 10%-12% African-American market could support one R&B FM (much less two), 102 Jamz was instantly successful. For most of its history, it had one PD and consultant. Recently, new PD Russ Allen and new consultant Bob Mitchell revamped the lineup, teaming WJBT Jacksonville, Fla.'s Paco Lopez with former talk host Ms. B. Allen also dayparted more heavily, and added 40-minute music sweeps and more benchmark features, including the Thursday-night "Back In The Day Thunderstorm Mix" at 9 p.m. One thing hasn't changed: Due to the market's ethnic comp,

Jamz still looks for songs that test both black and Hispanic, and there's still a strong presence by the multi-format superstar acts.

WLOQ (103.1)—Another one of the market's longest-running formats, as well as the last independently owned FM among the majors. PD Steve Huntington regards WLOQ as "cutting-edge smooth jazz," meaning that some of its vocals tend further toward the triple-A and AC side (Paul Carrack, Kenny Loggins, Steve Winwood), while some of its jazz goes a little further left of center than many of its brethren. NAB's 1997 jazz Marconi Award winner, WLOQ is responsible for several major concerts a year in conjunction with local arts festivals. Its fall promotion is a direct-mail campaign with trips to London for the winners.

WTKS (Real Radio 104.1)—One of the few legitimate success stories among "hot talk" FMs, WTKS is cited here as the Orlando



home of Howard Stern. It has also run an adult-leaning modern format on weekends since

before WJRR's foray into modern rock. **WOMX** (Mix 105.1)—One of the country's hottest ACs when it changed from heritage top 40 WBW (BJ105), Mix had softened over the years. While it's still very recurrent driven and

still uses its long-time "50/50 music mix of yesterday and today" positioner, the station has picked up the tempo recently. And on its Friday-night '80s show, one of the first in the country, you can hear Gary Numan's "Cars" or Sammy Hagar's "I Can't Drive 55." Promotionally, Mix had the good fortune to be the co-sponsor of Elton

John's annual tennis tournament for AIDS research, which took place this year, a week after the release of "Candle In The Wind 1997," and was able to send a winner on-court with Elton as a celebrity judge.

WOCL (Cool 105.9)—A late-'80s convert to oldies, Cool is worth checking out for p.m. driver "Cool" Ray Michaels, one of the few '90s jocks with the sort of on-air writing skills that were common when these songs were current. Market vets (and former top 40 jocks) Scott Sherwood and Allen Spector handle mornings.

WXRL (XL 106.7)—Orlando's only top 40 station has always been a little ahead of its time. It leaned modern for years, but by the time the modern rock revolution came, XL was already leaning dance.

XL still pounds some dance titles that aren't mainstream top 40 hits everywhere (e.g., Jocelyn Enriquez's "A Little Bit Of Ecstasy"), but the addition of more modern crossovers means the station is "really open-minded right now" as OM Adam Cook puts it. XL's fall promotion is a song-of-the-day contest with \$500 daily prizes and \$5,000 Thursdays.

WMGF (Magic 107.7)—This longtime soft

AC recently became less oldies-based, but it's still softer than many of its format brethren, and it's a station on which you can hear Michael Bolton and Barry Manilow without apologies. Like WSHE, WMGF is doing concert flyaway trips this fall. It also recently added Broadcast Programming's syndicated Delilah show at night.
