

NEW YORK, March 18.—The Eilbourd's Second Annual Radio Editor-Publicity Survey, the first portion of which is presented in this issue, has been broadened over last year's study and this year will also analyze radio's exploitation methods, in addition to the somewhat more routine gublicity methods. 

In this pillar haveral weeks ago we suggested to Equity in what was intended to be a most constructive and friendly fashion that it should take steps to provide more effective bonding for players. Equity's response took the form of a full-page blast in its house organ against The Billboard and the conductor of this column's accusing us among other things of not knowing what it is all about; of hastening to print without checking on facts and—in a very subtle way, of course—of being unfriendly lowards the organization.

It is a said duty indeed to confess that we see clearly definite signs of senflity in the organization, that not long ago was the paragon of everything good in the family of actors unions. It is one thing to be old, substantial and mellow quite another 56 be old, mildewed and a victim of degenerative processes. Perhaps Equity isn't in the latter category, but it certainly disproves by its conduct in this matter any claims on its part that it, is in the prime of life. A healthy organization can take criticism of any sort. But it seems that Equity is incapable of accipting in good grace even criticism that is constructive and offered with only one motive—the welfare of the organization and of its members.

Equity's blast represents a flat misstatement in at least two respects. It makes a loud noise about the hisplewood case. We did not suggest that Equity assume responsibility in all cases of defaulted bonds but merely that in doubtful cases members be properly apprised of the

Which more or less indicates that any added burden Equity might assume would be alight indeed, particularly in riew of the fact that responsibility was suggested only in cases involving failure to forewarn members of a bonding company's irresponsibility. There's a crack at the tail end of the diatribe about Equity's being entirely dependent on members' ques. Which indicates that the Siuce-paying members should be protected as much as Fossible by the organization that it idened to lean so heavily on them,

In a very sectoral way it puszles us that the present Equity administration should get into a dither over a suggestion put forward for the protection of its membership. If it is Equity's sincere contention that we should have checked with it before's penning our piece the snawer is that we are in the newspaper business and not in the profession of abort union counseling and that when we know our facts to be correct it is neither our duty nor moral obligation to consult beforehind with those who are the subject of any piece we choose to pen.

Again we assert that our original piece was not meant as carping criticism but as a helpful suggestion. The administration's inability to accept even an honest and well-meant suggestion in the spirit it was offered indicates that pretty strong criticism would not be out of place. Before we leave the subject—and for good we hope—it might be well to remind Equity's present administration that The Billboard has been more than morely a good friend to the organization for years that stretch much further back than the memories of Equity's older officials, who ought to know or remember better.

## **Opening Mail Habits**

A total of 96 editors said they read the publicity sent them, 5 stating they did not, thus giving an overwhelming majority to the affirmative. However, only a minerity, 34, read all the material sent them each day, while 53 read but part of it. None of the editors who threw away their mail unopened were on papers publishing didle material. This same regula was returned in the voting last year, when 126 editors said they find their mail. However, last year 97 editors reld, they read all of it, so against this year's figure. This is an indication of the decrease in radio newspaper space.

ROCKESTER, N. Y., March 18.—A decision of unusual interest to the anuson megit industry, indoor and option allign, was recently handed down in New York City in a criminal prosecution of a theory for untrue and misleading advertising. Defendant theater advertised an admission price of 25 cents until 1 p.m. and a children's admission price of 15 cents stall times. Complainant saw the advertisement and attended the theater with his wife and daughter. The line was so long that compainant did not reach the ticket window until a few accords after 1 p.m. The theater refused to sell him's 25-cent ticket and also instated upon an adulticket and also instated upon an adulticket and also instated upon an adulticket being surchased for the minof daughter. daughter.

In dismissing the charge against the theater the court held that a place of anguennent does not sell merchandles nor render service but merch admit or il-censes likepatrons to view the performances given. It is not required by its othersorer to grant the privilege to all concers and is free to admit only those whom it chooses to admit, subject only to the nondiscrimination privileges relating to civil rights.

Inf-connection with the change of price at 1 p.m., the court points out that where a barrain price is granted the parton is under the duty to come surficiently early to avail himself of the barrain rate and that the theater is under no obligation to sell more telestational than the number of persons its facilities. Will accommodate

with reference to refusal to sell a children's ticket to the minor daughter in this case, the court points out that in view of the fact that there is notationte governing the subject the theater has a right to determine for their whether the individuals presented at that ticket effice come within its opinion of this term "children." It is to be noted that in this case a specified age was indicated, then the theater would be bound by its cown specifications. However, where the planes "children" is used the theater is ontitled to exercise its discretion as to whether the individual community in the classification. within the classification.

In the past there has been considerable confusion upon the subject opened by this decision, but we feel that such confusion is now eliminated and that the law has become reasonably settled to be reapable of application in most cases involving similar facts. 

# What Taxation Laws Are Valid?

ANY license or taxation law is void and uncertorceable if its terms either are:
(1) unreasonable, (2) or discriminatory,
(3) or vointe or contradict any united States or State law, (4) or contradict the United States or State or State Constitution.

On the other hand, a State or a city may less a valid law to prevent or restrict operation of amusement places in certain districts or areas where it is known that the amms till interfere with the pencettly occupation and prevents also, a State law or city ordinance is valid by which the operation of places of amusement is regulated in other of any laws of this nature are purely restrictive, and do not fall within the classification of license or taxaston laws. Of course the state restrictions are absolutely necessary to eafeguard the general public against dangerous conditions. If this cannot be proved then the State or city may be compelled to license the particular place of amusement.

#### Carnival Exempt

Carnival Exempt

Various higher courts have held that taking laws will not be emlarged by the courts, and no property will be held as embraced within the terms of a taxing statute by mere implication. In other words, to impose taxes on property requires a lengue and explicit command of the sovereign power represented by either a wild State has or city ordinance. The P. H. Bee Shows, Inc., is a corporation engaged in opeducting a carnival at various places through the country for periods of about one week at each place. It has an inclosed area of ground within which are located various contributes for enumerate and various independent shows. None of them, belong to the F. H. Bee Shows, except an amusement contributes within the inclusive Tailed the Loop-o-Plane. The charge for entrance into the grounds is 10 cents per person. Each person after entering the grounds may patronize at additional charges any and all of the various amusements. The State officials contended that the F. H. Bee Shows about pay tax based upon the amount appent by each individual.

However, counsel for the F. H. Bee

However, counsel for the F. H. Boe Shows argued that it should not be compelled to pay any tax because it collected only 10 cents from each patron, and the law provides that no tax was payable if the admission charge was less than 11 cents. In upholding this contention, the higher court and; "Clearly none of the fees or charges for entrance to any of the amusements or entertainments located within the carnival inclosure are demanded of, or involuntarily imposed upon, the patron after he gains entrance into the grounds. On the contrary he can take them or let them alone, according to his own volition, after he gets in."

#### Club Organization Liable

The court always looks thru any scheme intended and designed to avoid payment of legal license or taxation fees.

For illustration, in State vs. Chartson, 104 S. W. (24) 150, a State law was adjudicated which provides that propretors of places of amusement must pay a ficense tax of 8100 per year.

(2d), 965, 15 was shown that a State law provides that a tax of 2 per cent must be paid on ticking for admission to all places of amusement. The law further provides that no tax shall be charged for admissions to State, county, district and local fairs. The legal question arose whether this exempted taxation on ticking add to grand-stand shows and other places of amusement within the fairgrounds.

It is interesting to know that the higher court held that taxes must be paid on all dickets accept those sold for general identication. The court said: "Within the fairgrounds there is a grand stand for admission to which separate tickets are sold by defendants. There are also other places of amusement and entertainment within the fairgrounds for which separate tickets are sold. We think it is what is commonly known as admission to the fair or to the fairgrounds which the Legislature intended to exempt. That is generally reparted as a distinct thing from admission to grand stands or other places of amusement within the grounds. If the Legislature desired to exempt from the tax the sale of admission to such places it easily could have used language which would have made that meaning clear."

Protection of Lives

Prequently municipal officials endeavor to verify validity of license or restrictive laws on the grounds that they are necessary for protection of health, morals or lives of citizens. In order that readers may understand the precent law and rulings of the higher courts on this particular phase it is well to know that under all direumstances the power of municipalities extends to the protection of its lives, health, comfort and quiet of all persons and to the protection of private property within the city. Therefore in the exercise of that power nuncipal officials may suppress, prohibit or license any and all businesses and it may regulate the same in such manner necessary for the safety, morals and welfare of the people.

Therefore, if the business of operating a place of amusement is detrimental to the general public, municipal officials may suppress, prohibit its operation. In one higher court case, for instance, a municipality peased an opilinance limiting the seating capacity off show house. This was deemed proper and beneficial to the public. But a law will not be held valid where places of annusements have been singled out and legislated against, legicans the classification is so arbitrary and the discrimination so unreuconable as to fall under the head of "class legislation." See Springfield vs. Smith, 19 S. W. (2d) 1. On the other hand, if all places of business, excepting those necessary for health, as drug stores, are compelled to close on Sunday, this law-is valid.

Another important point of the law that municipalities have only such authority to pass ordinances as is enpressly or implicitly authorized by State laws. Therefore an ordinance not all-thorized by State laws is void it for any reason it is not reasonably advantageous and likely to beneal, the morals, health or enjoyment of the general public. See Enight vs. Johns, 137. 80. 508.

In one case the walidity of an ordinance was contested on the grounds that it was unreasonable and not adapted to benealt the general public, because it merely required places of amusement to choose at a specified time. Also, it was shown that the ordinance was not upoclically authorized by the State laws, Therefore the court held the law invalid. All States laws impliedly authorized municipalities, under public policy, to protect the health, lives and morals of citizens. 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# RADIO SHORTAGE IN STICKS

### Gov't Survey Discloses 31% of Rural Homes Are Without Sets

Saturation point is far off, survey shows-midget and portable sets should be hot prize numbers in rural areas South offers least exploited market

NEW YORK, March 18.—Exploding a popular myth that the radio market is approaching the saturation point, a survey just completed by the Joint Committee on Radio Research inverse that great marketing potentialities still exist for radios in the United States, particularly in rural districts. The report shows that 3 per cent of all rural families are still without radios and large numbers are using sets which are either in need of repair or gractically obsolete. Among Southern States there is by far the greatest lack of radio equipment. North Carolina. Alabama, Georgie, Arkanasa, Mississippi, South Carolina and Louisiana all have less than 50 per cent radio expensibly. Yet in these States the greatest increase in radio sales has taken place, due apparently to extensive electrification projects still under way. In the months shead it is believed the largest number of nets will be sold in the South.

Investigation revealed that some

Investigation revealed that some 15,000,000 of the 31,000,000 radios in use are more than five years old. Why are consolation awards effered on a deal? A simple question to answer, isn't it? Yet, despite the fact that consolation awards are offered for a definite purpose, to stimulate sales, we doubt whether operators give the attention they should to the choice of these extra premiums. At least it would seem so, judged by the similarity of consolation awards featured on most deals introduced. Apparently operators are playing follow the leader and are taking the line of least resistance with art item which can mean the difference between a successful deal and a flopperco.

a good major award will what the appetite of a prospective purchaser. A good consolation award will help knock him over. The prospect will shell out much faster when he realizes he has one or more chances on another appealing from besides the big one. There is no argument here. Any operator who has made gales which he would not have made otherwise because of the consolation prize. And yet the extra award is almost treated like a stepchild.

What do we find when we look at the deals introduced in the last few years? Most of them have featured the same type of extra award—cither a pencil or type of extra award—cither a pencil or a pen. Now there is nothing wrong with either one—a pen or pencil has universal appeal—but thru constant repetition those premiums are bound to lose their effectiveness as trade attinuiants. And unless the consolation award can lend a helping hand, most deals will take too long to pay out and prove unprofitable.

We believe it amount business and good operating to change off on consulation awards from time to time. There is no reason, why the pen and pencil should not continue to play an important role in deals—but not in exclusion to all other items, even if it means on eccasion that the operator must pay a few cents more for another type of premium. The added sest and quicker turnover should more than compensate for the additional footh.

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

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

# ABOUT TIME

A guest editorial by Bill Cersh, director of tales promotion; Byrde, Richard & Pound, New York City

It's about time for some of us to get the idea out of our systems that airplane travel in modern flying ships now dotting American skies is unsafe. It's about time that many of us realized that anyone flying today can purchase the same insurance policy sold to railway passengers. And certainly it's about time that many of us who live by the coin-operated machine industry should have faith in it.

It's about time to bring home to our fellow citizens the fact that this is a new and modern division of America's great amusement industry. That the die-hards come to realize that when so many millions of people place their stamp of approval upon our industry then it cannot be demoralizing to their beliefs and sentiments.

It's about time that ugly word "racket" be removed from the coin-operated machine industry. Just as laws were once on the books to prevent trains running thru certain States, to ban movies and to regulate other minor conduct, it's about time we let people know that a lot of outworn laws are hampering an industry that is coming of age. That just as other industries have had to rise thru a maze of adverse and useless laws, so this industry is making its headway.

It's about time to bury the expression "an infant industry." Thousands of men have invested millions of dollars in the coin machine industry and depend upon the industry to continue to earn them a decent living.

It's about time that the few spineless creatures still in the industry either get out of it or strengthen their moral fiber and assert themselves. It's about time that the mockers stop mocking their fellows who champion the industry as being "as legal as any other industry."

It's about time that members of the industry realize that what can be done in the sweet name of charity can also be done in favor of generally helping fellow Americans to have a business and employment.

That to give employment, to relieve other crowded industries, help keep money in circulation, to help small business and professional men everywhere is a respectable goal comparable with any industry.

The future of the industry depends upon the men now engaged in it. A spineless acceptance of statements made by the press or persons who know very little about the industry must cease, and in its place must come a fighting, forceful defense of the entire industry. The defense may not be so diplomatic in all respects but it must be a bold defense.

All great industries have fought their way thru much legal and reform opposition. They have waded thru much mud. They have continued to grow and to become great only thru the faith of those engaged in them. It's about time that those engaged in the coin machine industry show their faith. Their faith in the business is the one and only way to remain in business. Many difficulties already lie in the past and

many more are to be faced. But the general sentiment of all engaged in the business is to raise it to higher and higher levels and to gain for it proper respect and appreciation.

The millions of dollars spent by the public in the enjoyment of amusement machines during the worst years of depression is a powerful testimony to the ability of the American people to keep their chin up. The investment of millions of dollars in a new industry during the darkest depression years is an attest to the courage and daring of business and professional men in America.

Ask the nearest merchant what amusement machines have meant to him. What it meant to his existence when times were very black. Coin-operated machines made history in those days when such drastic measures as closing all banks were necessary. And the patrong and merchants will not forget.

The public demands a continuance of the industry. It is this demand that keeps factories working and that enables operators to stay in business.

The industry has not only provided greater conveniences for the consumer to buy small articles, but it is contributing steadily to a finer appreciation of music. The most popular music is made available to the public at those times when it seeks diversion. Even foreign populations gather at public locations to hear the music of their native lands, offered to them not for \$2 or \$10, but simply upon the insertion of a 5-cent coin into a coin-operated phonograph. Native American music, in the form of hillbilly tunes and spirituals, is given wide circulation. It has all become so much a part of the modern world that all the attempts to tax and hinder cannot defeat the public demand for such entertainment.

All the world uses coin-operated machines made in America. Allied industries have sprung up, or factories have been turned over to making parts and supplies.

All this means business and it means that you should have faith in your business. Greater liberalism comes with greater faith. Your belief in your own business will gain more friends for you and your industry than all the opposition can destroy. Have faith.

The industry has given you a livelihood. It has given you a good return on your investment. Think it over. It has brought you comfort and well-being and respect. Why not help to keep the industry on the upgrade by having faith in its future?

Whatever your position in the industry, wherever you are, have faith in it. Have faith because by having faith you can't lose. The people of your community want economical entertainment, they want convenience in buying, they want to hear popular music, and they will get what they want. Whatever the obstacles in your territory now, the public demand will bring better days for your

It's your business and your investment, with your future tied up in it. It's about time you have faith in it.

Tabulation is based upon radio performances, these music sales and record releases of the week. Reports from music publishers as to the relative importance of certain sough in their catalogs are also considered, as well as information received each week from prominent operators.

#### COINC STRONG-KEEP THEM IN

Deep Purple. This, as well as its companions in this category, is still among the most popular songs of the day in every department of performance and sheet sales. The caliber of the current Tin Pan Alley hits seems to be such that they look good to stay on top for several weeks more, with not too many new tunes coming up to challenge them. It's either Larry Clinton or Jimmy Dossey on this one.

Penny Sorenade. Another powerful hit and a grand coin-machine number, Copies are selling strongly, with no stackening off at all perceptible. Keep it in for some time yet, in either Guy Lombardo, Sammy Haye or Horace Heidt version.

Little Sir Eche, Novelties always seem to have what it takes to catch the public fancy and this little item is no exception. Like the two foregoing runes, it's one of the country's biggest abset music sellers, and it will probably keep its ace spot in your phonos for quite a little while longer. Guy Lombardo again for this.

Hold Tight. Not as strong as if was a couple of weeks ago, this still should be kept around a bit longer as recorded by either the Andrews Sisters or Fatz Waller.

#### COMING UP-BETTER STOCK THEM

t Get Along Without You Very Well. Just on the fringe of breaking into the big time as far as phono songs are concerned, this is a very big sheet seller. From the angle of radio performances and copy sales this really belongs in the above category, but it hasn't quite reached its peak of phono appeal to rate a slot-tip there. Next week may do the trick. At any rate, have it around, as played by Jimmy Dorsey or Red Norvo.

The Masquerade is Over. Almost the same thing applies here. Get the number into the machines if you haven't done so already, because in a short while you may be in dire need of it. Jimmy Dorsey and Larry Clinton offer the best discs for phono purposes.

Heaven Can Wait. Another potential bailed, authored by the writers of Deep in a Dream and So Help Me, that looks good to repeat the success of those two hits. Glen Gray and the Casa Loma Band have a fine recording; ditto Hay Kyaer.

Undecided. Chiek Webb and Ella Fitzgerald may do for this one on their waxing what they did for A-Tisket A-Tisket, which should be enough of a hinf to do something about getting it under the needles pretty som. It's a swell rhythm song and one they're bound to go for.

Getta Get Some Shuteye. A good fast melody and a bright lyric combine to make this a good bet for the machines. It's already a leading radio tune and a pretty fair sheet music seller, with the wave of public favor pretty apt to extend to the boxes next. On the reverse of Kay Kyser's disc is Guckoo in the Glock, another likely-looking number. Better be prepared on both.

#### OPERATORS' SPECIALS

Listing covers those songs which in themselves connot be classified as popular nation-wide hite, but which are, or give every indication of becoming, successful phonograph numbers.

Sweet Adeline. The Mills Brothers get together on one of the best known songs ever written to make an item that is liable to be memorable for operators.

On the reverse is a new balled that you may be needing seen, A New Moon and in Old Serenade. Its publishers are going to work on it shortly, and hig things are expected.


Legislatures in session since the bearing of the year already have before them 603 new tag and license proposals and 78 tax encreases, the National Consumers' Tax Commission reported. The proposals range from a tax of 15-0ents a cigaret in Weshington to a lavy on bachelora in Georgia.

"This total will be increased greatly in March, traditionally the heaviest menth for introduction of tax legislation," said Mrs. Kenneth O. Fracier, president of the NCTC, a women's tax education organization, of which 3,700 local units have aprung up since hast September. "Ail indications," as said, "now point to this year as reaching a new high in tax proposals that penalize the consumer."

It has been difficult for the small rator to speak his piece or to get a caring. In many cases the small crater has become too "hungry for mines" and has stirred up trollole all by being too greedy. But among a small operators there are also sound, the filtest and most othical members the trade.

The following "roice of the small op-rate" appeared in the "Letters to the Effor column of The Newark (N. J.) bersing Neme March 4, 1999. It is said to have caused the newspaper to recon-tering editorial attitude toward pin-tal games:

"I am a small operator having 25 most of which are located in most of which are located in a County. I feel that your linking he bigstelle game to the alot machine is nost unfair. The fact is that beganile sames are played and have always prayed for the pleasure gotten ten the very playing of the game. Before prizes were ruled out they did construct an additional inducement to pay, but this was never more than secondary at best, and the big play came been those people who could not afford

onaive forms of ammenment but who expensive forms of ammement our who could spend a few hours or even a whole-evening enjoying themselves with others at bagatelle and spending but of few cents for the whole evenings furnit is not at all out of line to call hagatelle the poor man's golf game.

"As furner I know and have been able to observe, there are no racketeers and no racketeers in the pin-game business. As a matter of fact, the bagatalle game, by providing a legitimple form of amusement, has helped-drive out the illegal abot machine, and, in the case of New York City, the worst enemy of the pin game operator was the crowd made up of the old abot machine operators whose illegal business was hurt by the livest amusement afforded by pin games. The operators of the bagatelle games, at least in this part of the State, are all small men, every one of whem works on the job and by hard work manage to make a living. There is no big money in the Susiness, but if a person is willing to work hard he can make a decent living out of it. I know this from my own position and from my own position and from my own position and from my ownset alls for not only mental effort. own postion and-from my contacts with other operators. This work is not easy and calls for not only mental effort but plenty of hard physical work in moving machines, collecting and all the other work that goes with the business. I feel that I earn every bit of the rela-tively small income I make and you can understand, in view of this, why I wel-custy object to being classed with slot machine macketsers, who made huge sums of money with little or no work.

"It may be that there are some men in the business who are not a credit to it. These are few in number, and the decent men in the business want them driven out as much as anybody else.

PARIS, March 18.—The year 1939 has started with a bang in the automatic industry, and indications point to a banner gear in France. The sales turnown during the month of fanuary, was 40 per cent higher than during any corresponding time of 1938, which was a very poor

The dealers and operators are in accord that several proposed regulations, which are almost sure to become laws, are responsible for the present buying fover and as these regulations are to come up for study within the next few weeks the boom is expected to continue.

Rose Godin, editor of La Rosus de l'Automatique, who by hard work and a careful study of the situation was able to have the new regulations introduced before the Chambre des Deputies, is also optimistic for the future.

#### Liquor Legislation In Thirty States

ORIGAGO: March 18.—Legislation designed to either tighten or relax control of liquor occupied the time of at least 30 Legislatures now in season through the country this past week. At week-end a survey abowed only a few bills passed, but a host of pending measures on liquor taxes, ticenses, sales controls, local option, advertising, Sunday sales, etc.

Some of the bills pending were:

Oklahema, a dry State, proposed a permit, system for importing liquors for medicinal, scientific or religious purposes, almed at securing federal aid in checking illicit liquor running.

California heard a proposal for a \$2 annual drinking license and a State farm for inchristes; also sening and closing rulings.

Arizona sought control with a new control commission and limitation of bars
according to population.
South Dakota legislators would padlock locations for liquor law violations.
Mains would profibits, beer licenses to
gasoline stations or places within 500 feet
of them.

Pennsylvania would establish a 300floot dry tone around schools and churches. Also would permit package beer sales in groceries, and delicatessens. Messachusetts would ben candy slid fruit stores from dealing in liquor.

Lows sought to stop beer sales in drug and grocery stores, Also to eliminate sit-down beer drinking by forbidding chairs, booths for tables; prohibit all massic except radios and serving of food in beer places. South Dakota would halt sale of 3.2 beer and wine outside city limits.

North Dakota would eliminate road-houses by restricting sale of liquor to chies and villages.

Minpesota would foib! sale to swomen at bars,

Vermont and New Mexico sought to re-lax restrictions on Sunday Inquor Sales, but Colorado, Massachusetta, Maryland and South Dakota considered tightening such laws. Maine and Connecticut pro-posed by prohibit readside billboard liquor advertising, and Idaha all liquor adver-tising.

Liquor tax or license increases were recommended in South Dakota, Pennsyl-vania. New York, Texas, North Carolina, Connecticut, Maryland, North Dakota and

Connecticut, Maryland, North Dalota and Oregon.

As this is written Tennessee seems about to pass a local option law over the rovernor's veto. It seems that Arkansas, another dry State like Tennessee and Okiahoma, has surned down a new proposal to have liquer in the State.

By the time this gets into print important changes may have taken place in these legislative proposals which would affect liquer locations.



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
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
