## 'Backyard' Studios—New-Sound Frontier

NEW YORK — The regional recording studios are giving their big city counterparts a run for the money in the pop market. These studios, which are out of the New York-Los Angeles-Nashville axis, and their associated staffs of musicians, producers and writers have been capturing increasingly larger segments of the hit single and album action during the past couple of years. In 1967, "The Letter," by the Boxtops, was a chart-topper out of Memphis, and one of this year's biggest singles, "Judy in Disguise," by John Fred and his Playboy Band, was cut in a small studio in Tyler, Tex. In addition to producing many hit singles with

local talent, many of the regional studios are becoming identified for their own "sound" following the image established by Stax Records with its "Memphis sound."

It's still not certain what has caused the rise of these independent operations with their own studios, musicians, producers, writers and label located in one small town. In the case of Stax/Volt, Memphis was the home of Jim Stewart, Stax president. Stewart began recording, albeit unproductively, in the country field, then entered the rhythm & blues market where he met with immediate success with releases by Rufus Thomas

## 3-System Unit By PlayTape

NEW YORK—In a move to solidify all continuous loop configurations under one equipment umbrella, PlayTape has engineered a CARtridge player which will play its own tapes and 4 and 8-track cartridges.

The concept essentially permits a complete interchange of tape sizes in one player. Key to the design is the 3 3/4 i.p.s.-speed common to the three continuous loop configurations.

While many compatible 4 and 8-track tape cartridge players are on the market, this design is the first geared to bring the 2-track PlayTape into the fold. It is also aimed at spreading the PlayTape concept to other manufacturers. PlayTape will O.E.M. its design for other manufacturers and will provide all information on the design.

## Publishers Joining Parade to Minifilm

NEW YORK — Music publishers are joining record labels in utilizing 16mm minifilms as a major source of artist exposure. April-Blackwood has just signed Record-on Film Corp. to produce its first TV promotion film, featuring writer-performer Margo Guryan for Mala Records. And Screen Gems-Columbia is bolstering its film promotion activities.

The decisions come in the wake of more singles breaking via TV film exposure; the increasing number of record labels swinging to minifilm promotion; and companies, currently in minifilm promotion, beefing up their film production schedules.

"Baby Make Your Own Sweet Music," by the Bandwagon, is the third single for Epic Records to break as a result of a promotional film, according to Fred Frank, Epic Records' national promotion and marketing director. The single, listed last week as a national breakout in Detroit, initially received no other exposure. Key Detroit radio stations have now picked up the disk. The Bandwagon film was produced by

Michael Joyce's Record-on-Film Corp.

Roulette Records has also hopped on the film bandwagon. Morris Levy, president of the

## Classical Out At Harmony?


NEW YORK — Columbia Records is turning its low-price Harmony label into a pop and country line. The conversion is being accelerated with the deletion of five classical titles from the current Schwann catalog. Odyssey, Columbia's low-price classical line, is in its 16th month.

The phasing out of classical product would leave Mercury Wing and Pickwick/33 as the only economy-price labels featuring pop, classical and country material. Although three albums by the Oslo Philharmonic still remain on Camden, RCA essentially completed phasing out classical titles from that low-price line in 1962, about a year before the launching of Vic-

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

## Hail, James Brown

James Brown, well known for the clamor he can cause with music, proved in Washington last week that he is just as powerful with peace. Brown has made his living in crowds—in front of crowds—all shouting and elbowing to be nearer to "Soul Brother No. 1." Amid the looting and burning in Washington, Brown came instead to the people, and with the simplicity and conviction of a lesson well-learned, told a television audience: "Get off the streets, go home. Nothing could be gained by the looting and burning, only sorrow and misery. . . . Give the kids a chance to learn."

A few hours later, those who were not at home to see Brown make an appeal, were at home watching the continuous re-broadcasts of Brown's plea. Washington, and the rioters, withdrew into its homes, taking the advice of James Brown, who is not a politician, but a singer.

Brown went to Washington at his own expense, just as he did in Boston and other riot-torn cities. His record, "Don't Be a Drop-Out," has sold over 1 million copies, and he has given away free thousands of "Stay in School" buttons, printed at his own expense.

Brown is a credit to his race, his profession and his country. He is living evidence of what opportunity can do, of how an industry can serve a man, and how he, in turn can bring esteem to an entire industry.

## King to Stay Under Same Reign

NEW YORK—King Records will continue to operate under a new internal management group. The appointment of Johnnie Miller as vice-president and manager of sales, manufacturing and general activities, by the directors of the company, squelches rumors of the sale of King and/or some of its affiliated companies which include the Lois Publishing group, pressing and printing plants, and various real estate holdings.

## 5 Citations in Month for Col.

NEW YORK — Columbia Records has picked up five gold records in the past month. Spearheaded the list of gold record albums is Simon and Garfunkel's latest LP, "Bookends," which has such heavy orders weeks in advance of its release that Columbia was able to apply for award certification before its first appearance in stores.

Just three weeks ago, Simon and Garfunkel picked up a gold record for their soundtrack album, "The Graduate," which they scored. Other gold record album winners were Bob Dylan for "John Wesley Harding" and the Byrds for "The Byrds Greatest Hits."

Columbia's most recent gold record for a single was won by the Union Gap's "Young Girl." This, the group's second single, is following the pattern of their debut disk, "Woman, Woman," which also won a gold record.

## Tower Leans to More Teen Tracks After Records Click

LOS ANGELES — Capitalizing on what has turned out to be a profitable venture, Tower Records is releasing three new soundtracks within the next four to six weeks. All are aimed at teen-agers. Perry Mayer, national merchandising manager for the label, said that the record company had released 18 soundtrack albums already. The latest, from the movie "Psych-Out," starring Dean Stockwell and Susan Strasberg, is already above 40,000 in distributor orders. Sal Licata, East Coast promotion chief for the label, added that many distributors were already reordering. The record company's interest, of course, is the fact that the Strawberry

The future of King came up for trade speculation after the death, several weeks ago, of its owner-founder Sydney Nathan.

Jack Pearl, New York attorney, and Dr. David Nathan, brother of the company's founder, have been qualified as executors of his estate. Pearl said, "There are no negotiations currently pending with anyone for the acquisition of King and its affiliates. Inquiries, yes; negotiations, no."

James Brown, mainstay of the King roster, is aiding the firm's executives in all areas, including production and promotion, and a suite of offices to house James Brown Productions has been set up on the King premises in Cincinnati, staffed by Bud Hobbard. Brown will continue his a&r production function in channeling sides into King through his James Brown Productions firm which now produces Bobby Byrd, Vicki Anderson, Marva Whitney, and the Dapps.

Miller has been with King for 21 years, serving in various executive capacities, and since 1964 he was the firm's manager, reporting directly to Nathan. Miller is now looking for personnel to staff a&r activities and other general management functions.

King recently completed the building of a studio with 8-track facilities, a new 40-mike console, mix down room, and a mastering technique setup that includes a new compatible system developed by the firm's engineers, Ron Lenhoff and Dave Harrison. King's pressing plant now has 50 presses operating

Alarm Clock and the Seeds perform several tunes in the soundtrack.

"This type of album sells almost 100 per cent to teens," Mayer said. "If you get a good box-office for the picture, you usually have a good-selling album of the soundtrack." The investment in these soundtracks is minimal.

# Hall of Fame Being Organized to Honor U.S. Writer & Tune Greats

NEW YORK — The formation of The American Music Hall of Fame to memorialize great pop music composers and authors of the U. S. and their most famous compositions is under way.

A host of prominent names, representing various segments of the industry, have endorsed the American Music Hall of Fame concept and have offered their services to bring the project to fruition. They are Stanley Adams, president of ASCAP; Robert Sour, vice-chairman of the board at BMI; John Hammond, head of talent acquisition at Columbia Records; Edward Eliscu, president of the American Guild of Authors and Composers; Duke Ellington, Johnny Mercer, disk jockey William B. Williams, personal man-

ager Cork O'Keefe; David Kapp, former head of Kapp Records; Leonard Feist, head of National Music Publishers Association; and music publishers Howard S. Richmond of TRO, Buddy Morris of E. H. Morris & Co., and Victor Blau, head of Music Publishers Holding Corp.

### On Steering Group

Serving on the steering committee, which began considerations for the American Music Hall of Fame in 1965, are Paul Ackerman, music editor of Billboard, executive director, and Abe Olman, of TRO, managing director.

The American Music Hall of Fame working charter will contain provisions for the election to the Hall of Fame of the outstanding songs which have had the largest continuing popularity over the greatest number of years. Nominees to the Hall will be voted through an industry balloting process to be announced shortly. The aim of the American Music Hall of Fame is to give recognition to outstanding songs and writers in much the same fashion as the Baseball Hall of Fame has for the most illustrious players over the years.

Beyond this, and regarded as the most significant facet of the American Music Hall of Fame project, is the establishment of an all-inclusive library of American pop music to contain copies of the songs by the nation's most outstanding composers.

More than 1,000 pieces of music have already been collected of the works by the top

Broadway show and motion picture songwriters, as well as composers of the most memorable individual songs. These are expected to become the foundation of the library, which has been designed to be available to students and the public for research and study. At a later point, it is envisioned that these copies of music and manuscripts will be housed in a Hall of Fame museum, further honoring the contributors to the American music culture. Several colleges have expressed willingness to provide space and facilities to house the library.

## WB-7 Line to RCA's Club

NEW YORK — The RCA Records Club has made a non-exclusive licensing agreement with Warner Bros.-Seven Arts. All labels in the WB-7 combine are now being offered to RCA club's membership.

Among the artists who will have their albums offered by the RCA club are Frank Sinatra, Nancy Sinatra, Dean Martin, the Kinks, Jimi Hendrix, Arlo Guthrie, Sammy Davis Jr., Trini Lopez and Miriam Makeba on Reprise, and Petula Clark, Harpers Bizarre, Bill Cosby, Peter, Paul and Mary, the Association and the Tokens on WB.

from a dry-blend system. Miller said that they are now renovating the pressing plant under a \$600,000 program. King's printing plant, which has full color presses, is capable of turning out more than 300,000 fronts a day. The jacket fabrication plant has a daily capacity of more than 25,000 jackets. The King operation also includes its own art and photo lab, plating and mill rooms.

The company has notified all its distributors and affiliates around the world of its continuation and plans for expansion.

## Memphis Music Assn. Planned

MEMPHIS—Local music industry executives are planning to launch a Memphis Music Association here similar to the Country Music Association (CMA) and the main objective will be to promote the "Memphis Sound," which is noted for its r&b flavor.

Marty Lacker, general manager of Pepper Records located in Memphis, said the organization will be open to all record people, publishers and musicians . . . "anyone who has anything to do with music in Memphis."

The idea for the organization seems to be a joint brainchild of many music executives in Memphis, including Jim Steward of Stax Records, Jud Phillips and Harold Streibich.

"The organization will be like the CMA, to promote music in Memphis. What's special about

Memphis? It's a hit-making town. People are constantly coming here to record in Memphis studios." Among the record labels headquartered in Memphis are Goldwax, Pepper, Holiday Inn, Stax and Volt, Chips

Moman's Penthouse, Hi and Penn Records, Lacker said.

Lacker said that interest was high in the new association and that a recent meeting had to be canceled because of the death of Dr. Martin Luther King.

## Executive Turntable



# Latins in U. S. Are Starving for Latin Music: Roulette's Levy

NEW YORK — The major boom in the record business is not r&b records, according to Morris Levy, president of Roulette Records and its subsidiaries of Tico, Alegre, and Mardi Gras. "With all of this talk about rhythm and blues, you have about 20 million Latin Americans in the United States starving for Latin music, plus another 400 million around the world who are Latin and moving into a middle-class environment in many countries."

Tico, Alegre, and Mardi Gras, under the guiding hand of Pancho Christal, had a 100 per cent increase in sales in the past year, Levy said. Roulette has also just acquired

Swinger Records, another Latin line, from Angel Santiago.

At present, there are basically two kinds of Latin sounds in the U. S.—Mexican and Puerto Rican. Levy felt that it's only a matter of time before there will be a "marrying" of these sounds. One of the leading contributors to integration of the music is boogaloo. Christal described boogaloo as a cross between soul and Latin and "it's happening in every market. The records are usually in English; there's a third generation of Latin kids in the U. S. who talk perfect English, but who go for Latin sounds. Yet, boogaloo is becoming so popular in other coun-

tries that we're now also having to do versions in Spanish for countries where they speak strictly Spanish."

A bonus of the Latin product is that many are getting pop sales, Levy said. He named artists such as Joe Cuba, Ray Barreta, Pete Rodrigues, and Ricardo Ray.

A Latin single might go as high as 100,000 in sales in the New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut areas; then there's another 40,000 sales potential in 78 r.p.m. Up to 800,000 is possible on a Latin record that breaks across the nation.

Roulette Records is partner with Panasonic in Discos Tico in Mexico, and has cross-promotion and sales with all product the firm originates in Mexico. Levy also opened his own branch distributor in Puerto Rico a year or so ago—Central Distributions.

"We will do 1 million more in business this year than last year," Levy said. "But one of the most pleasing aspects of the Latin business is that the return factor is less than 3 per cent. And your catalog stays good; we've never scrapped a Tico album." He said that the firm had a catalog of more than 60 albums and that he was still selling Tico product recorded 14 years ago.

There are many more outlets for Latin product in New York, Levy said, than for pop records. A unique distribution aspect is that mobile one-stops service as many as 30 stores.

Henry Stone at Tone Distributors in Miami, has done well in racking Latin product, Levy said. "He's flipped out about the Latin business . . . and he was in on the r&b business in the beginning."

Sales of Latin records outside of the U. S. are also growing—up some 300 per cent in the last three years, according to Levy.

## MGM Films Gross Rose

NEW YORK—Gross revenue of MGM, Inc., increased to \$127,704,000 from \$117,355,000 for the first 28 weeks of fiscal 1968, which ended March 14. Robert H. O'Brien, MGM president and chief executive officer, reported revenues and earnings figures were the best in the corporation's history.

In his quarterly letter to stockholders, O'Brien reported that profits jumped to \$9,227,000 compared to \$7,543,000 for the same period last year. He said the earnings were equivalent to \$1.60 a share on the 5,756,783 average shares outstanding during the year. The letter dated April 10 was accompanied by a quarterly dividend payment based on 30 cents a share.

## Division to Use A&M Artists for TV, Films

LOS ANGELES—Artists on A&M Records will get an opportunity for worldwide exposure in films and on TV through A&M Productions, the record company's new film-TV division.

The division, a subsidiary of A&M Records, will act independently under Perry Leff, but plans call for the new company "to make use of A&M artists in films and TV, whenever possible."

Leff, who resigned as partner and executive vice-president of Creative Management Associates, will put the division into operation May 1. Other officers and members of the board of directors include Herb Alpert, executive vice-president; Gil Frieson, vice-president; Jerry Moss, treasurer, and Abe Somers, secretary.

A spokesman said "roster art-

ists on A&M will have an opportunity to work in several areas of entertainment, although the division also will be offering opportunities to new creative talent."

A&M has more than 30 artists on its roster, including Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass, Sergio Mendes and Brasil '66, Julius Wechter and the Baja Marimba Band, Wes Montgomery and Claudine Longet. Although Herb Alpert and the Brass have made several TV specials, they have no film commitments.

Headquarters for the new wing will be A&M Records' two-acre studio in Hollywood, purchased in 1966 from CBS.


Under the new operation, Frieson, general manager of A&M Records, also will work with Leff in the development of films and TV projects.

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## SAMMY DAVIS DEPLORES LACK OF NEGRO OPENINGS

CHICAGO—Sammy Davis Jr. said here last week that he was "ashamed of show business" because of its lack of allowing Negroes opportunities to gain executive positions. Asked specifically if he thought the recording industry had been too slow in opening management positions to Negroes, he said, "I'd hate to rap the recording industry by itself. There are too few opportunities in all areas. I'm reminded of a comment by Elmer Bernstein after the Oscar TV Show was postponed. He said it was too bad the television crew didn't have a couple of black cameramen instead of postponing the show out of courtesy to Dr. Martin Luther King."

Davis' comments were made during a press conference to herald the opening of "Golden Boy" here Tuesday (23).

Davis said he intends to go into Chicago's ghetto while here. "A performer should allow himself to be seen there. He should be seen eating and shopping in the black areas. We have to make a commitment to the black man on the street," he said.

## Alpert, Nancy Sinatra Top Emmy Biddings

LOS ANGELES — Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass garnered four Emmy nominations, and Nancy Sinatra three in the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences 20th annual nominations.

The winners of the Emmy statuettes will be announced on the Television Academy Awards Show on NBC-TV May 19.

Alpert's special show earned nominations for outstanding musical or variety special, achievement in electronic camera work (Beino Ripp, technical director), individual achievement in electronic production (William M. Klages, lighting director) and directorial achievement in music or variety (Dwight Hemion).

Miss Sinatra's "Movin' With Nancy" special received nomination in outstanding achievement in cinematography (Vilis Lapenieks), outstanding directorial achievement in music or variety (Jack Haley Jr.) and special classifications of individual achievements (David Winters, choreographer).

Earning nominations in the music division were Mitchell Ayres, "Hollywood Palace"; Arthur Fiedler, "A Boston Pops Concert for Youngsters"; Neal Hefti, "Fred Astaire Show"; Sammy Cahn, lyricist, "Legend of Robin Hood"; Lee Bale, special material, "Dean Martin Christmas Show," and Arthur Malvin, "A Man and His Music, Plus Dila, Plus Jobim."

Other music nominations included:

"Bell Telephone Hour," outstanding musical or variety series; "A Man and His Music,

Plus Ella, Plus Jobim," outstanding musical or variety special; "The Sounds and Sights of Chicago," Bell Telephone Hour, outstanding achievement in film editing — Peter Johnson; "Boston Pops Concert for Youngsters," news and documentary achievements; "An Evening at Tanglewood," cultural documentaries, and "Duke Ellington"; "Love You Madly," cultural documentaries.

Nominations for outstanding achievement in musical composition included Lalo Schifrin, "Mission: Impossible"; Bernard Green, "CBS Playhouse"; Earle Hagen, "I Spy"; Pete Rugolo, "Run for Your Life"; Morton Stevens, "Gunsmoke"; and Harry Sukman, "The High Chaparral."

Frank Sinatra will emcee the awards program in Hollywood, with Dick Van Dyke guiding the show in New York.

## RKO General Adds Studio

clients of the studio, and their "Party Doll" and "I'm Stickin' With You" were produced there.

But the unique story about Norman Petty's operation is the comeback of the Fireballs. Between their last hit—"Sugar Shack" on Dot Records and their recent "Bottle of Wine" on Atco Records, was a drought of five years.

All this time, the original group stayed together "playing any job they could get," Petty said. When Randy Wood left Dot Records, Petty took the group off the label.

It was only the publishing activities of the firm—Nor-Va-Jak Music and Dundee Music—that kept them going, Petty said.

Success, he knows, is a long "chain of events. There's no magic formula." But he places a lot of faith in his studio. "The studio loses money, but it's there for the publishing." He has about six local groups under his wing.

None of the hit records have come easy. But his aim is to develop groups who have their own identity. On a trip to Edmonton, Canada, he heard nine groups who "were duplicating sounds they'd heard on record better than the record. But these groups should have been creating their own sound . . . establishing their own identity. That's where it counts."

## Miss Peggy Lee Is Heavenly Superstar

NEW YORK — The voice of Peggy Lee will never die, nor will it fade away. Whether she reminisces with "Why Don't You Do Right," one of her songs going back some 20 years, or she swings with a Tim Hardin song, "Reason to Believe," a current Capitol single, Miss Lee shows no sign of wear.

Miss Lee displayed a sterling command of both the music and the audience in her opening Copacabana appearance Thursday (11). Her spicy delivery spun the audience into sheer joy.

Miss Lee was in with the times, while still embracing her light Latin beat. Her opening number "Do I Hear a Waltz" featured an electric harpsicord.

## Davidson on Target With the Happy Beat

NEW YORK—John Davidson, a clean-cut, wholesome and rather engaging young man who records for Columbia, is also quite an album seller.

Davidson demonstrated the nature of his appeal at his New York night club debut — at the Persian Room Wednesday (17). He's the boy next door, who happens to have a fine singing voice.

Davidson overcame a faltering start and some apparent opening night jitters when he breathed life into "Bonnie and Clyde," and later did well with his new Columbia single, a bittersweet contemporary folk number, "Yesterday's Wine."

And he really caught fire

when he accompanied himself with guitar on "Georgie Girl" and "There's a Hush All Over the World." An accomplished musician, he demonstrated his versatility with some first rate banjo work on such vintage numbers as "Mention My Name in Sheboygan" and "Yes, Sir, That's My Baby."

Davidson, who's appeared in a couple of Disney films (The Happiest Millionaire) and "The Genuine, Original Family Band" and on such national TV shows as "The Kraft Theater," comes off best with happy and inspirational material. ## Houston Sets the Tone High With an Old Irish Selection

NEW YORK—David Houston opened at the Nashville Room Tuesday (16) for a one-week engagement and the result was an entertaining program of well-sung, first-rate country music. Houston's falsetto was in top form, especially in "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen." This old Irish song is a regular part of the Epic artist's repertoire and it's easy to see why. The combination of high tone upon high tone and sensitivity of interpretation made this one of the evening's many high spots.

Some of his top Epic hits also were given their accustomed fine treatment from his opening "You Mean All the World to Me" to his concluding multiple-Grammy winner "Almost Persuaded." These two selections and "With One Exception," another big Houston hit, were good examples of the excellent material utilized by the artist in attaining his key place on the current country scene. All three were gems.

But, a top artist doesn't rest on past laurels as Houston's current hit "Have a Little Faith" an uptempo song with a message, also was a high spot. The program effectively alternated between uptempo numbers and ballads. "Hey, Good Lookin'" was a prime example of the former. This was preceded by "Too Far Gone," a fine ballad. Houston's "Cattle Call," a lit-

tle faster than Eddy Arnold's hit version, was another piece where the falsetto was brilliant. The artist was backed by the Persuados, a five-man group featuring Gene Crawford, who records for MTA.

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
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## Lees Setting Up Firm; Moves Into Broadway

## Sly and the Family Stones Have Energy of Locomotive

NEW YORK—The five boys and two girls who make up Epic Records' hot new group, Sly and the Family Stone, are rough around the edges but they have an inner drive that's propelled by raw energy. It's this uninhibited musical vitality which brought excitement to their opening show at The Generation Tuesday (16). Sharing the bill with Sly's family was Verve/Forecast's Richie Havens, a last-minute replacement for RCA's the Youngbloods, one of whom was on sick-call.

Sly Stone runs a tight little musical ship with a happy, integrated (five blacks and two whites) crew. Their music is a fusion of rhythm and blues, pop and jazz hyped by electronic power. What's missing, however, is diversification. There's a sameness to their presentation that makes the going a little tedious, and it's not until they move into their final number,

## Howlin' Wolf Fine Wailer, Brass Buttons Polished Act

NEW YORK—Howlin' Wolf, a veteran Chicago blues man, and the Brass Buttons, a young Rochester, N.Y. rock sextet, combined on Tuesday (16) for a topnotch show at the Scene. Beginning a two-week stint, Howlin' Wolf, a Chess Records' artist, ranged through deliberate and uptempo blues as he quickly established rapport with the young audience at the West Side discotheque.

His businesslike manner almost hid traces of humor in the selections as he strode to the front tables, singing directly to members of the audience. "Hard Luck Blues" was a powerful Southern-flavored deliberate selection, while "Shake It

for Me, Baby" was a fine uptempo piece loaded with good humor. Howlin' Wolf's face made be impassive during his performance, but his wailing is anything but. And the appreciative audience showed they caught his electricity.

The Brass Buttons, being sponsored by Gene Cornish of the Rascals, were a surprise. Opening groups frequently consist of new groups still molding their acts, but this young sextet showed a polish and degree of musicianship sometimes lacking in the name groups.

In Jay Capozzi, they have a strong-voiced lead singer with a blues flair and a telling delivery. Guitarist Eric Thorngren also handled his vocals well. The unit's arrangements were highly original, even with familiar material such as Freddie Scott's "Hey Girl" and the Rascals' "How Can I Be Sure."

Elements of jazz and even Indian music played important parts of the instrumental sections as Joe Graziano, organist doubled on trumpet, trombonist Mike Julian doubled on sax and cello, and Bob Guglielmino played a variety of saxes. Daniel Labatte provided a steady drum beat.

The group's varied program included their own "The Box" and new treatments to such materials as the Beatles' "Taxman" and Sandy Shaw's "Always Something There to Remind Me." FRED KIRBY



## Drake-Chennault to Debut FM Syndicated Pkg. in Six Weeks

NEW YORK — The Drake-Chennault program consultant firm will bow an FM syndicated music package within the next six weeks, Bill Drake announced here last week. The tailored programming will be featured on the 10 FM stations Drake is connected with, as well as available on a national basis.

The programming will have a certain similarity to that featured now on WOR-FM here, he said. Drake's staff will provide everything from logos, to jingles, to the records. He felt that people like popular music, but that popular music had become segmented to a large degree. "My theory is simple—play the things people like from a large list. This includes Chuck Berry, Elvis Presley, the Moonglows, the Penguins, and the Five Satins . . . middle-of-the-road stations were not playing this type of thing. And rock 'n' roll stations were only going back two years in their selection of oldies. So you had a void. My philosophy was to shoot for the audience that Alan Freed had created here. I felt the potential of FM had not been reached; it was logical to me that persons between 18-34 years of age were more likely to own FM sets than youths 13-14 years old."

There is room here, he said, for two or three stations playing progressive rock. "What we did with WOR-FM was a gutty move; we never got credit for that. It was a gutty move to take off something that had at least received a lot of publicity . . . and it had done well. But it was not, we felt, at the potential it could be.

"We came to New York saying this is a radio station—

we're going to put on a sound. Gary Mack came in to sit it up and do some of the research. Bill Watson is the chief programming man of the entire organization. He's involved with every station and is the type of guy, honest-to-god professional, who knows more about detail, working with guys, training deejays, than anyone."

### Scored 10 Share

The new WOR-FM just recently scored a 10 share on a Pulse audience rating for evening time. Drake's theory is that Elvis Presley is his Frank Sinatra or Tony Bennett and "the Four Tops are my Four Aces, the Supremes my Andrews Sisters, Otis Redding my Eddie Fisher. I'm constantly trying to find out how to reach more people."

The reason that Drake stations are currently ignoring certain records by name groups, and this includes certain records

by the Beatles and the Monkees, is that Drake feels their records already get enough exposure.

"When Elvis Presley came on the scene, you didn't have the type of network of promotion that you have now . . . of trade publications and teen magazines. Some of these teen publications can sell nearly as many records of the Monkees as a station playing it. People who don't listen to a top 40 radio station are being exposed to the records of certain groups through movies, TV, and teen magazines. The public," he felt, "might like top 40 radio, but can't stand a steady diet of teen music. Why play a record just because it's by somebody without any regard to whether it would sell or not or whether it would appeal to a mass audience?" He is not ignoring all teen records, just the ones he doesn't believe are good.



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# L. A.'s FM Industry Unsparked

By ELIOT TIEGEL

LOS ANGELES — FM radio in this market is offering the broadest spectrum of music in its history. But one giant obstacle prevents the growth of FM from becoming a mass audience communications medium here: The FM industry is trapped in a quagmire of lack of imagination, and exploitation-promotion. And FM is generally second cousin to the AM medium.

There are 47 stations in this area, but only a fair share have signals strong enough to cover considerable sections of Los Angeles and Orange counties. Thirty stations broadcast 24 hours. Whereas years ago FM was a bastion for classical music, today the medium here is a conglomeration of easy listening outlets—10 broadcasting in stereo—one all-jazz, two all-country, one progressive rock, one listener-supported, one all-classical, and several combining the classics with richly arranged pop music.

Gone are deep-voiced announcers reading the toughest of classical compositions with ease. Today, one discerns only a few of these voices.

### Excellent Personalities

There are a number of excellent personalities on the FM band, down-to-earth voices like Mike Saxon and Paul Werth of KRHM-FM or Chuck Niles and Paul Slaughter on KBCA-FM or Andy Wilson with KPPC-FM. These men could easily make the grade on a major AM station, but their intrinsic tastes in good music tie them to FM, which is here still strongly identified as the top radio service.

Despite the growing popularity of FM radios—car sales are considerable in this area—financial revenue has not been forthcoming from national advertisers. Hence the FM stations remain poor financial counterparts to the AM operators. And in remaining in a stalemated situation, the FM sta-

tions have not been able to aggressively advertise their programs to lure listeners.

Much of what the stations do is a dark secret. Consider: KCBH-FM, an excellent classical station, switched to a middle-of-the-road concept in the daytime, while retaining its classical identity evenings and never said a word; KBCA-FM, the all-jazz station, has been preparing for its multiplex debut and hasn't raised any ballyhoo.

KADS-FM dropped its classified advertising to concentrate on pretty music under the banner of KOST-FM call letters, and hardly told anyone.

KBCA-FM, the city's 24-hour all-jazz voice, is a prime example of a station in need of stronger programming direction.

Situated close by KBCA-FM are KBIG-FM and KTYM-FM. Both play jazz, with the latter a pure mish mash jazz and of rhythm and blues during a wild and frantic 11 a.m. to noon hour with "The Road Runner," a shouting r&b DJ.

FM lacks the punch and live flavor of AM. One reason is that many of the stations are automated, like KNX-FM, KHJ-FM, KPOL-FM and KMET-FM with its female DJ's.

Country music of a slick nature gets dual representation on KGBS-FM and KFOX-FM. The intellectual community is nurtured by KPFK-FM, the Pacifica Network outlet, which runs the entire gamut of topics, from folk to jazz to lectures on

Japanese artwork. Despite a weak signal KPPC-FM appears to be gaining ground as the station for devotees of the pop/hippie bands and it has no true competition for this audience.

KFAC-FM remains the purist classical station, simulcasting a portion of its day with its AM counterpart.

What is amazing about the local FM band is that within the same time period, Andy Williams, Miles Davis, Webb Pierce, Arlo Guthrie, and Sibelius can be heard.

### Crack Through

Despite itself, FM representatives do crack through into the Los Angeles - Orange County Pulse surveys. And despite its disk jockeys, KBCA-FM turns up the leading FM station in the Pulse ratings because of its appealing gutbucket jazz music. The station draws 4-6 shares evenings, to rank as the fourth station in the market, according to a Pulse spokesman.

Since Pulse graphs stations which register a share of audience, KHJ-FM, formerly programmed by Jack Wagner as a bright easy listening outlet, and KUTE-FM, a background music station, are represented in the surveys. As of yet, KPPC-FM, the pop/hippie station has yet to crack through in a Pulse book. But the January-February book is due shortly and the station will probably make its debut then.

Over-all, in the broad scope of

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

## CARSON SHOW RATING TOPPER

NEW YORK — "The Tonight Show" starring **Johnny Carson** averaged more than 4.3 million homes per minute during January, February, and March, according to the NBC Research division. This represents a new high in audience for the NBC-TV network show and about 23 per cent better than **Jack Parr's** best first quarter.

WTLC-FM, the soul station in Indianapolis, has received FCC permission to go up to 100,000 watts, and general manager **Tom Mathis** says the station "shall proceed with great speed to facilitate upgrading." 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

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

## ABC's Cohen Sets 5-Yr. Growth Plan

NASHVILLE — Paul Cohen, newly named head of the ABC Records office here (Billboard, April 20), has a "five-year plan" for the growth of the label here which he will begin implementing in May.

Cohen, a 34-year veteran of the recording business, said he would "move Kapp out and move ABC in" to the offices he now holds on Record Row. "The office is in my name, and I'll retain the property I have," Cohen said.

"I haven't signed anyone to the label yet simply because my contract does not take effect until May 5. We'll do plenty of

signing after that," Cohen added.

The first two days on the job for the new label will be spent in Las Vegas, where the board of directors of the Country Music Association is scheduled to meet. Cohen, a past president of CMA, is now a member of the board.

"Nashville is going to be big business for ABC," Cohen said. "We have a five-year plan worked out whereby we will grow and become stronger in all fields."

Cohen said that he had been dickering with ABC on a contract for the past few months while MCA maintained a policy of silence as to its future here.

## Listeners Rate High As Buyers of Albums

SAN DIEGO — A survey of country listeners here shows nearly 25 per cent buy 10 to 12 country music albums annually.

This survey was made at a KSON country music concert attended by a sellout crowd of 4,500. Information relating to local country music record sales had been requested of KSON president Dan McKianon, who complied with the complete survey.

Three per cent of the audience tested bought as many as 25 LP's per year. An addi-

tional 10 per cent bought between 15 and 20.

Some 2.6 per cent of those questioned said they bought from 30 to 40 albums per year; 2.2 per cent purchased 50 or more.

A wide variety of answers was given to the question of why they didn't purchase even more country records during a year. The heaviest volume centered around the availability of stereo recordings. Nearly 16 per cent fit into this category.



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## Undergrounders Surfacing in Nashville; Aim at Collegians

NASHVILLE — The Nashville Underground has surfaced, with its new sound aimed primarily at the college market.

The "underground" consists of five RCA artists who have directed their country music sound into an updated folk-country blend.

The artists are John Hartford, John D. Loudermilk, George Hamilton IV, Ed Bruce and Jerry Reed. The latter has a soon-to-be released album,

"Nashville Underground." Loudermilk and Hamilton are working on a joint album, one which will give as much emphasis to Loudermilk the artist as Loudermilk the writer. The two, in fact, will record songs written by each other. Additionally, with Chet Atkins, Loudermilk now is co-producing the Hamilton sessions.

Wally Cochran, promotion director of RCA's country product, is working with Atkins and

other company officials on an autumn promotion which could prove to be one of the biggest things ever to hit the college scene.

"The college kids know what's happening," said Cochran. And this is the underground theme.

Hamilton defines it as "country product with plenty of lyrics, and more meaningful lyrics."

At the University of Wisconsin recently, 600 Loudermilk albums were sold in a single day. Both Loudermilk and Hamilton had their music beginnings in college.

Country music no longer has to deal with love triangles or tavern shootings, Hamilton explains. It can now cover the "broad spectrum of life."

Songs written by Reed ("U. S. Male") and by Loudermilk ("I Wanna Live") are on the Hot 100 chart and on the country chart.

## Show to Mark Country in N. Y.

BUFFALO, N. Y. — A special hour-long anniversary show marking 20 years of country music in the New York State area will be telecast here Sunday night (21) on WGR-TV.

The show, put together by veteran performer and disc jockey Lou Shriver, will include Buck Owens and his Buckaroos, Tommy Collins, and Rose Maddox, as well as Shriver and his band.

Paul Sciandra, program director of WGR-TV, said this station pioneered regularly scheduled country music in the region and has programmed it continuously since then.

The Channel 2 special will be in color.

Sciandra said the continuous broadcasting and telecasting of country music in that region had made it particularly strong in Western New York State and in Southern Ontario.

## Mercury Planning Giant Country Expansion Drive

NASHVILLE — The Mercury - Phillips - Smash complex plans a strong expansion program here, with heavy emphasis on the country product, according to Charles Fach, Mercury vice president.

"We already have signed about seven new artists, plan to increase the roster even more, and will add more personnel to the company in Nashville," Fach said.

He also said facilities would be expanded soon, and that Jerry Kennedy, chief of a&r, would be adding other producers to his staff.

"Right now we are seeking a strong sales and promotion man to fill that office, and we'll lean hard on country music," he said.

Mercury has just signed Roy Drusky, one of five "regulars"

who have been virtually the entire Mercury roster in country. The others have been Roger Miller (Smash), Priscella Mitchell, Faron Young, Jerry Lee Lewis and Dave Dudley. To this list have been added Billy Grammer, Linda Manning, Tom T. Hall, Warren Smith, Norro Wilson and others yet to be announced.

"Since we moved Jerry Lee Lewis back into the country field he has outsold anything he's ever done in pop," Fach said. "He's in that right fold here, and he'll stay in country."

Fach also said there would be more emphasis on building a roster of country artists for Smash. "Rory Bourke in Chicago is excited over the country product, and we intend to give him a strong roster to work with," Fach said.


### Nashville Scene

trola, a classical budget label. MGM also has separate low-price lines with Metro for pop and Heliodor for classical, but both lines were started in essentially their present forms.

The five titles, all in monaural versions only, are designated by a diamond in the current Schwann. This symbol states "to be discontinued by manufacturer as soon as supply is gone; will be dropped from

future issues of this Catalog."

Among the five scheduled deletions is a two-record set of Puccini's "La Rondine," which formerly was the only listing for the opera. A new stereo version has recently been issued on RCA. The Harmony set stars Eva de Luca and Giacinto Prandelli.

Two Tchaikovsky instrumental albums—"Romeo and Juliet" and "Overture 1812" with Artur Rodzinski and the Cleveland Orchestra, and excerpts from

"Swan Lake" and "Sleeping Beauty" with Walter Goehr and the Rome Opera House Orchestra—are also set for deletion, according to Schwann's. The other two albums are Johann Strauss waltzes with Max Schoenherr and the Vienna State Opera Orchestra, and Erich Leinsdorf and the Rochester Philharmonic in a coupling of Grieg's "Peer Gynt Suite No. 1" and Tchaikovsky's "Nutcracker Suite."

While classical listings have not been an important part of the Harmony catalog, some titles still remain including an Ezio Pinza recital with the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and a pairing of Saint-Saens "Carnival of the Animals" and Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf" with Eddie Bracken as narrator with the Paris Philharmonic.

With an important part of Odyssey's catalog devoted to "Legendary Performances," now available in stereo only, some Harmony titles may turn up on that label. Negotiations are under way with the Metropolitan Opera to make available some out-of-print and other Columbia opera set for Odyssey, but a final agreement has not yet been reached.

Among the operas recorded with the co-operation of the Met are Gounod's "Faust" with Eleanor Steber, Eugene Conley and Cesare Siepi; Puccini's "Madama Butterfly" with Miss Steber and Richard Tucker; Donizetti's "Lucia di Lammermoor" with Lily Pons, Frank Guarrera and Tucker; Puccini's "La Boheme" with Bidu Sayao and Tucker; Leoncavallo's "Pagliacci" and Mascagni's "Cavalleria Rusticana," with Lucine Amara and Tucker; Strauss' "Die Fledermaus" with Ljiluba Welitsch and Tucker; and Mozart's "Così fan tutte" with Steber and Tucker.

RCA last year expanded its Victrola repertoire to include material by Arturo Toscanini and the NBC Symphony in the pre-stereo days. While the first of these reissues was available in monaural version only, recent titles have been rechanneled for stereo. Kay Camden titles, which once were an important part of that catalog, probably will turn up on Victrola under RCA's new policy for the label. Previously, Victrola only reissued material originally pressed in the stereo era.

Several regular-price labels have low-price classical lines, but not pop counterparts, such as Angel with Seraphim, London with Richmond and the London Stereo Treasury Series, Philips with World Series, Epic with Crossroads, Vox with Turnabout, Baroque with Pirouette and Westminster with Music Guild. Vanguard's Everyman label recently was expanded to include folk pressings, while Elektra's Nonesuch and Scepter's Mace line also includes international material. The classical series of Audio Fidelity and Monitor also are economy priced.

In addition to Oslo Philharmonic recordings of Strauss waltzes, Grofe's "Grand Canyon Suite," and Tchaikovsky selections, Camden still has John McCormack albums of both Irish and sacred music in its catalog.

## DGG and Angel Vie For 'Lulu' Business

By FRED KIRBY

NEW YORK—Rush releases of telegrams to dealers and air shipments mark the sharp competition between Deutsche Grammophon and Angel on new recordings of Berg's "Lulu," the first new version of that modern opera in about 20 years.

DGG gained the jump by having the three-record set in the hands of dealers within 45 days of its recording by the Deutsche Opera in Berlin. Angel's package, a Hamburg State Opera performance, is due soon.

Angel's treatment originally scheduled for June release, while the other set was slated for November. Both claim to be live performances. DGG recorded "Lulu" late in February with Karl Boehm conducting a cast featuring Evelyn Lear in the title role with Dietrich Fischer-Dieskau, Patricia Johnson and Donald Grobe.

James Frey, manager of MGM's classical division, which distributes DGG product in the U. S., asked DGG in Germany to move up the release and he received "immense co-operation." The first shipment arrived in U. S. on March 29 and the full 3,000-set shipment went out to dealers on April 1, with dealers west of Chicago receiving their copies by air.

The competition, unusual for European-based labels in the U. S., has been highlighted by the telegrams. First, Brown Meggs, Capitol vice-president for international and classical, sent a telegram to key dealers saying, "Angel world premiere stereo recording (of the) Hamburg State Opera(s) 'Lulu' on the way. Most anticipated opera set of (the) year. Take advantage. Unusual consumer demand. See or phone your

CRDC (Capitol Records Distribution Corp.) sales representative. Place pre-release order today. . ."

The MGM classical division telegram countered, "The world (Continued on page 43)

Mass" with Saramae Endich, Beverly Wolff, Enrico Di Giuseppe, Paul Plishka and the Tanglewood Choir.

On July 27, Leinsdorf will conduct Brahms' "Requiem" with Helen Beatright, Sherrill Milnes, the Berkshire Chorus and the Tanglewood Choir. The Aug. 24 Leinsdorf Wagnerian program has Hanne-Lorre Kuhse, Jess Thomas and David Ward in the finale of "Das (Continued on page 43)

## Beautiful 'Butterfly' Marks Kirsten's 25th Year at Met

NEW YORK—Soprano Dorothy Kirsten, celebrating her 25th season with the Metropolitan Opera, gave an effective dramatic portrayal of the title role in Puccini's "Madama Butterfly" April 11 at the Met. The intensity of her performance gave power to the opera which was ably conducted by Lamberto Gardelli.

Miss Kirsten, who was featured in a Capitol program ad, sang a fine "Un bel di," but her high points were later in the second act, when Pinkerton's ship returned, and her last act, which was stunning vocally and dramatically. She also has recorded for RCA and Columbia, including some material currently deleted.

Gardelli, one of the finest interpreters of operatic repertoire, was plugged by a London ad, which listed that label's forthcoming Cherubini "Medea,"

which features Gwyneth Jones, Pilar Lorengar, Fiorenza Cossotto, Bruno Prevedi and Justino Diaz. He also is the conductor on London's complete recordings of Ponchielli's "La Gioconda," Verdi's "Nabucco" and Puccini's "Il Trittico (Il Tabarro, Suor Angelica, Gianni Schicchi)."

Tenor John Alexander, who sang Pinkerton, did not sing freely until the last act, when his "Adio fiorito asil" displayed the artist's full voice at its best. Alexander has recorded for Columbia and RCA.

Baritone Ron Bottcher, a promising young artist, made a fine Sharpless. Nancy Williams as Suzuki and Andrea Velis as Goro also performed capably. Miss Kirsten was honored for her 25 years with the company at a private ceremony recently along with Jean Madeira and Frank Guarrera.

ances each are listed for the Lenox String Quartet and the Pennsylvania Ballet Co.

Other scheduled artists include clarinetist Benny Goodman, pianist Guimar Novaes, soprano Eleanor Steber, violinists Joseph Fuchs and Tossy Spivakovsky, the Argentineo Mozart Quintet, jazz pianist Duke Ellington, Jose Greco and his group, and guitarist Carlos Montoya.

A maximum of 300 students will be enrolled in an institute to run concurrently with the festival. Robert E. Page, a Temple music professor, will direct the institute, whose teaching faculty will include members of the Chamber Symphony and Lenox Quartet, Miss Steber, Miss Novaes, Fuchs, and Sascha Gorodnitzki.

### Lanza's 'Caruso' Gets Gold Record

NEW YORK — The RCA soundtrack album of "The Great Caruso," starring Mario Lanza in the title role, has been certified by RIAA for sales in excess of \$1 million. The MGM film and RCA soundtrack album were released 17 years ago. The soundtrack of "The Student Prince," with Lanza's voice, gained a gold record 10 years ago.

### Hummel Record

WELLESLEY, Mass.—Cambridge Records is issuing an only recording of Hummel's "Bassoon Concerto in F." The work featuring soloist John Miller with the Chamber Orchestra of Copenhagen under Harold Farberman is paired with a Weber concerto.

# Airline Gets State Award

NEW YORK — Eastern Airlines has received a New York State Award from the New York State Council on the Arts for sponsoring the Metropolitan Opera's new productions of Wagner's "Der Ring des Nibelungen."

The new stagings of the four-opera cycle began this season with "Die Walkure." "Das Rheingold" is scheduled for 1968-69 with "Siegfried" and "Die Goetterdammerung" to follow. Eastern's contribution for the project was reported to be \$500,000.

The Hudson Valley Philharmonic Society of Poughkeepsie gained an award for "demonstrating that a regional concert ensemble can meet the high standards usually not to be found outside large metropolitan areas; for bringing fine live music to hundreds of thousands who might otherwise rarely or never hear it; and for the training and encouragement given to talented young people in a region that hitherto could provide them with no means for the development of their gifts." Claude Montoux is the orchestra's director.

premiere (stereo) recording is on DGG and (is) available now... from your local distributor. Frey reported the 3,000 initial shipment was sold out within a week. He said reorders were almost doubled. Frey explained, "We can't keep turning out 'Traviata' and 'Boheme' unless we have outstanding new soprano or tenor. When new material is available, the first company out with it reaps the benefits, especially after 20 years of waiting."

Meggs explained, "That two major companies should simultaneously offer outstanding productions of special work as 'Lulu' is surely testimony to the astonishing vitality and resourcefulness of today's record business. It can be argued that both the Angel and DGG (versions) will suffer by dividing an admittedly limited market."

The original monaural release, more than 10 years ago, is still active in the Columbia catalog. This "re-channelled for stereo" version should reach some new buyers. Gould's performance, of course, is the same superb effort as the original.

This seven-record package offers one of the outstanding and most-recorded artists of our time in a variety of material, including music of Bach, Telemann and Mozart. Assisting Rampal in sonatas, chamber music, concertos and suites are such other top artists as Mario Duchenes on flute and recorder, and Kenneth Gilbert and Kelsey Jones on harpsichord.

**RACHMANINOFF: THE 24 PRELUDES FOR PIANO (2 LP's)**—Moura Lympny. Everest 3198/2 (S)  
The 24 Rachmaninoff preludes of Op. 3, 23 and 32 offer a challenge to the pianist, but here Moura Lympny meets this challenge with her skill and sensitivity. Always a superior artist, Miss Lympny's Rachmaninoff in this collection is a two-record set the admirer of sterling piano interpretations will treasure.

### LOW PRICE CLASSICAL

**BACH: SAINT MATTHEW PASSION (4 LP's)**—Various Artists/Vienna State Opera Orch. (Woeldike). Everyman SRV-269-72 SD  
This certainly ranks among the better recordings of Bach's monumental work. Performances by Stich-Randall, Kmentt, Roessl-

Majdan and Berry are outstanding. And the Vienna State Opera Orchestra, with Woeldike conducting, captures the essence of the work. An earlier release could have captured some Easter sales.

**THE ART OF MAURICE ANDRE**—Philips World Series PHC 9094 (S)  
This collection of baroque sonatas finds Andre, a superb trumpeter, at his best. Included is an only listing of Roberto Valentini's "Sonata No. 10," a fine piece. Also represented are Loelliet, Handel, Telemann and Marcello. Harpsichordist Laurence Boulay and bassoonist Andre Senedat also perform ably.

## JAZZ

**ELEMENTS OF NOW!**—Big Black. Uni 73018 (S)

The rhythms of Africa, America's Southland and South America are the "Elements of Now," brought together by Big Black, composer and virtuoso of the drums. His impressions of Africa, punctuated by his drum solos and synthesis of pop and primitive, signal and evolution of jazz backwards into the original elements, the pieces, that, today, are r&b and hard blues. "La Da Da" and "Come On and Get It, Baby" are samplers of the Afro-American heritage, a musical memo to history.

# Musical Instruments

## Tots Start Early With Instruments

By RON SCHLACHTER

This is the first in a series of articles on the learning experience involved with musical instruments.

CHICAGO — The trend for pre-school children to participate in a variety of learning experiences is also evident in the area of musical instruments. However, while a toddler is being encouraged to master the techniques of swimming, he will most likely be given only a general exposure to musical instruments.

Orff and Kodaly are two of the most popular methods in the field of preparatory musical training. The former features instruments (strings, percussion and marimbas) designed for very young children, while the latter utilizes pictures and hand signs.

"The purpose of Orff and Kodaly is to develop gifts for and reaction to music," explained Dr. Leon Stein, Dean of the DePaul University School of Music in Chicago. "With a general exposure, the child acquires a feeling for melody and rhythm. At the same time, this broader exposure provides a greater variety of music experience which can be appreciated and utilized in later years and higher levels.

"A person with a broader background is a better musician. As often said, it's possible to be a good singer or violinist without being a good musician. In short, this early exposure to musical instruments adds another dimension to a person's experience, regardless if he decides to pursue an instrument seriously or not."

Mrs. Marilyn Zimmerman is an associate professor of music education at Northwestern University in Evanston, Ill. She is also co-director of a U. S. Office of Education project entitled, "How Children Conceptually Organize Musical Sounds."

### Orientation

"Maybe the children don't realize what they're doing at such an early age, but they are given the exposure," said Mrs. Zimmerman. "The whole thing is to orient them to music by getting them actively involved. It's not teaching them to play a specific instrument.

"I don't think there are any harmful effects with this type of early experience. If we took three, four, and five-year-olds and made them practice and study every day, this would be harmful in that it would kill their interest. Instead, we're trying to capture their interest. The early experience provides an extension of something they're already doing, whether it's hitting two sticks together or something else."

Dr. Clifton Burmeister, chairman of the music education department at Northwestern, believes there's nothing wrong with the game-like atmosphere that is often prevalent in the early training. "We've come a long way from the Puritan ethic that if something is fun, it's not good. A child looks at this early exposure as a game, but it's positive. Aren't interest, play, and motivation almost synonymous? "At the same time, this doesn't mean we're throwing all sorts of discipline out the window. The

A spokesman for AIP said future film releases will call for major recording artists to use Vox equipment in new films.

## NVA Near Solution To Problem of Slugs

CHICAGO—National Vendors Association (NVA) legal counsel Don Mitchell reported here last week that the U. S. Secret Service has stepped up efforts to halt the distribution of bingo chips, which have been used as slugs in vending units.

Preparing a report to be delivered at NVA's annual convention and trade show at Pheasant Run near here May 2-5, Mitchell said:

"Special Secret Service agent A. E. Whitaker has contacted several large chain stores and has met with the counsel of the New York State Bingo Commissioner. We are close to a solution of the problem."

The action taken against manufacturers and stores has been spearheaded by Roger Folz. He and his brother Harold operate one of the world's largest bulk vending operations, Folz Vending, Oceanside, L. I., N. Y. Both Folz brothers have led a long anti-slug fight by the New York Bulk Vendors Association.

In addition to bingo chips, which are more troublesome in New York because of that State's

legal bingo activity, ring pull tabs from can drink containers have also plagued operators. Mitchell indicated that NVA has successfully approached manufacturers of such containers in efforts to effect a change in design.

### Other Services

Mitchell said NVA's legislative program, to improve the situation of bulk vendors hit by inequitable laws and ordinances in Florida, has also progressed. A report will be given during the convention here.

NVA voted last year in New Orleans to set up a legislative program to aid operators in selected sections of the U. S. Florida was selected as one area of activity for 1967.

Among other NVA services to be pointed out at the convention are the association's brochure, "Dollars and Sense of Bulk Vending," published to combat location ownership and operation of machines, and NVA's "Damon Runyon Memorial Fund for Cancer Research, Inc."





Sell 1-Cent Vending as Service, With No Commission Involved

ATLANTA — Penny peanut and candy vending machines can often be installed in industrial locations without offering a commission, according to H. B. Hutchinson Jr. Other locations such as trucking firms and wholesale parts firms can be profitable additions to routes, Hutchinson claims.

Hutchinson, a veteran of 21 years in the bulk vending industry and owner of the distributing firm here bearing his name, said: "The penny is still the backbone of our business down here.

"We're selling this Sweetart from Sunline and Leaf Gum's Sweet and Sour Zips for a penny. If I could get half-cent items like this I would be in that business, too," he said, referring to the new non-wrapped bulk candy item.

"Our operators are still selling peanuts for a penny, too," said Hutchinson. "You can't vend 14 or 15 peanuts like you used to. Now you vend 8 or 10 nuts.

No Commission

"The beauty of vending peanuts is in the fact that you often don't have to offer a commission. The second location I acquired when I started out years ago was a trucking company, and this is where I got the idea.

Arcade Operators Face Charges on Obscene Films

SAN ANTONIO—Two men charged on felony counts of exhibiting obscene photos and motion pictures in downtown arcades were arraigned Thursday, April 11, in County Court-at-Law No. 2.

Arraigned on a misdemeanor count of possessing and exhibiting obscene films was Carl Kunert, operator of the Alamo Amusement Center. His bond was set at \$500.

Charged with felony counts as repeaters were Jesse Black, who operates Black's Shooting Gallery, and Joseph D. Mulvihill, operator of the Fun Palace.

About \$2,000 worth of equipment, including 45 coin-operated projectors and dozens of films showing women in various stages of undress, was confiscated by district attorney's investigators in raids on the three arcades.

Maximum punishment on a misdemeanor charge is a year in prison and a \$1,000 fine or both. Felony counts, filed when there have been prior convictions on similar charges, carry a maximum penalty of five years in prison and/or a \$10,000 fine.

Black was fined \$500 May 26, 1964, in County Court-at-Law No. 3, after pleading guilty to a charge of possession and exhibition of lewd film. Mulvihill pleaded guilty to a count of possession of lewd film and paid a \$200 fine May 5, 1965, in County Court-at-Law No. 2.





## NVA Adds to Exhibitor List; Sunline, Inc., Newest Entry

ST. LOUIS — The steady growth of the National Vendors Association (NVA) is evidenced again this year by new exhibitors attracted to the association's May 2-5 convention. One new firm, Sunline, Inc., has been in business 34 years, and is enthusiastic about the bulk vending industry.

Sunline emerged as an important manufacturer in the bulk vending field last year after developing a product called SweetTarts.

Attending the NVA convention at Pheasant Run near Chicago will be Glenn Davidson, director of marketing; Ed Burns,

national sales manager; Jim Gagliaducci, plant manager here, and Ron Salek, manager of Sunline's Chicago plant.

SweetTarts, an unwrapped candy-coated item, will be displayed in the five flavors. This is a 1-cent, 460-count vend item. Also shown will be giant jawbreakers in varieties to vend at 1, 5 and 10 cents. These are solid color and the colors change as they are eaten.

Sunline will also show SweetTart jawbreakers to vend at 1 cent. This is a 210-count item. Two other completely new items will likely make their debut here.

Davidson said the firm is enthused with the bulk vending industry. Sunline has only recently addressed bulk vendors

after development of a candy-coated process that allowed Sunline's candy to be dispensed in bulk machines.

"The bulk industry has at least two things going for it," said Davidson. "There is the novelty effect of dispensing products in such a way as to appeal to large groups of youngsters, and there is the convenience of this method."

"Many stores that normally would not sell candy if it had to be handled over the counter will allow vendors to place machines. This opens up unlimited areas of merchandising."

### Began In 1934

Sunline, Davidson said, started its operation in Salt Lake City in 1934 with the development of a product called Lik-M-Aid aimed at the 4-to-8 year age group. Sunline still markets the item.

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

## Cigarette Smoking Dips

WASHINGTON — The Agriculture department has discerned a slacking off in rate of cigarette smoker gain. The rate of gain in per capita consumption has dropped in comparison to the percentage increase in number of teen-agers reaching smoking age.

Although the total of 549 billion cigarettes smoked in 1967 topped all previous totals, the per capita rate of 214 packs per year for smokers 18 and over was slightly below the 1966 level, and 1½ per cent below the 1963 peak of over 217 packs per smoker.

Over 72 per cent of 1967 production was in filter tip, up from 68 per cent in 1966. The 100 millimeter filter tip made up nearly 10 per cent of 1967 out-

put, up from 2 per cent in 1966. The increase by 30 billion in filter tip cigarettes more than offset a 21 billion cigarette decline in non-filters, which made up something over 27 per cent of the total.

Total smoking in 1968 may edge a "modest gain over 1967," but contributing factors will be increase in population of smoking age, and high levels of income, rather than a rising rate

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# International News Reports

## EMI, British Decca Set Joint Rack in England

By NIGEL HUNTER

LONDON—EMI and British Decca are setting up a joint racking operation in Britain under the name of Record Merchandisers, Ltd. The joint venture was decided upon after market research into the merchandising of records in self-service racks in this country and abroad.

EMI already has nearly 100 racks in various locations, mostly southern England, and the addition of the Decca group product will substantially broaden the scope and impact of the records available.

"Our racks are in locations which attract a large walk-through trade," said an EMI spokesman. "We hope obviously that as the business of Record Merchandisers expands, the company will be able to offer the public records from all the manufacturers."

### Big Question

This is the major question mark hanging over the business. One school of thought believes that

none of the other majors and smaller labels can really afford to ignore the racking issues following this development. They must either join in or begin their own parallel operations. This question will undoubtedly be resolved during the coming weeks.

The new joint company will handle Decca group labels such as Deram, London and Decca itself as well as MCA product which Decca distributes. EMI product already available through rack outlets include HMV, Columbia, Parlophone, Capitol, Tamla/Motown, Stateside, Dot, Bell, Waverly and Regal Zonophone, plus CBS, United Artists, MGM, Immediate and Disney which EMI distributes.

The emergency of Record Merchandisers marks the introduction of rack jobbing in British disk retailing on a formidable scale, and confronts the impending Grammophone Record Retailers Association conference with its most serious and dramatic issue since it was formed.

## Singapore Booming As a Record Center

NEW YORK — Singapore is becoming a factor in the Asian record business, according to Chan Chin Bock, director of the Singapore Investment Promotion Center, an organization which promotes industry in Singapore and which is located here.

Chan said three new record companies were formed in Singapore in 1967, and first-year production figures are reported at 2,450,000 records with a retail value of \$2,250,000. Target for the three companies, within five years, is an annual combined production of 8,925,000 records, with 60 per cent for the export market.

The three companies setting up production in Singapore last year are EMI, Phonographic

Industries and Life Recording Industries.

EMI (Southeast Asia Ltd.), a British-owned company, began production last August with 45 employees. Phonographic, a joint venture of Philips of Holland and Singapore businessmen, began production last April with 50 employees. Life, another joint venture, is building a plant.

According to top executives from the three companies, the government tax incentive program, the availability of leased factory space, and the proximity to the Southeastern Asia market were responsible for the decisions to locate in Singapore.

Chan said that next to Japan, Singapore is the largest record market in the Far East, with the country importing \$1,300,000 worth of records each year and re-exporting 25 per cent of this total to neighboring countries.

## Abbate Acquires Connelly Firm

MILAN — Gabriele Abbate has acquired Edizioni Musicali Connelly of Milan—a company which was formerly in partnership with Campbell Connelly, London.

The name of the company has been changed to Abbate Editore S.R.L., and the sub-publishing contract between Abbate and Campbell Connelly, London, initiated in 1954, has not been renewed.

However, part of the Campbell Connelly catalog will continue to be exploited here by Abbate.

## TRACK TO CGD, SUGARMUSIC

MILAN — CGD and Sugarmusic have acquired record and sub-publishing rights of the French movie soundtrack "Les Jeunes Loups." The deal was concluded in Paris by CGD director Giuseppe Giannini and French record producer and publisher Norbert Saada. CGD is rush-releasing the single, "Per Sempre Insieme," Nicole Croisille's Italian version of the main song from the film, "I'll Never Leave You."

## Audio Festival & Fair Opens

LONDON—The 1968 Audio Festival and Fair opened here April 17 at the Hotel Russell, Russell Square. It is the biggest in the history of the event with 99 exhibitors, including trade magazines such as High Fidelity.

Philips Hi-Fi and Tape recorders, Decca, Grundig, Telefunken and Shure Electronics were among the exhibitors. Lugton's again ran a trade lounge, where dealers could meet and discuss trade matters with the company's area representatives.

This year's exhibition was spaced over six floors of the Hotel Russell, one more than in the past. The sixth was for the convenience of visitors wishing to listen to equipment on show without extraneous traffic noise.

## Slot Stereo Unveils 2 Tape Home Units

LONDON — Slot Stereo unveiled two home units manufactured by University Recording at the 1968 Audio Fair here April 17-21.

One is a self-contained system priced at \$204, including purchase tax. It has its own amplifier and full set of controls, including an off-on indicator light, volume, tone and speaker balance knobs, plus track-selector button.

The second is a satellite unit, provisionally priced at \$105.60, for plugging into an existing hi-fi set. It consists of a tape deck, pre-amplifier and a track-selector switch.

Both tape players, designed by Wolff Olins, are surrounded by a bag-pressed wood laminate casing designed to fit into any room setting. Both players are equipped with the Motorola 12-volt DC tape deck with transformer-fed DC supply.

A feature of the self-contained unit is its all-British amplifier with 23-transistor, all-

silicon, direct-coupled circuitry.

Last September Slot Stereo introduced an 8-track tape player for cars, and both car and home units are operated in the same way. An 8-track tape cartridge is "posted" through a slot in the tape player, and is simply pulled out again to stop the music.

Eight-track cartridges of varying repertoire drawn from EMI, Pye and CBS sources are being duplicated at Slot Stereo's Islington plant.

## Fest Deadline Set

ATHENS — The organizers of the first international pop song festival to be held in Greece—the Apollonia Festival (Billboard, April 6)—have announced that the deadline for the submission of original songs for the festival is June 15. The festival will be held in Athens from July 26 to 28.

## Curbs Hurt Swedish Acts In Booking at Folkparks

STOCKHOLM—Fewer Swedish artists are being booked for summer tours of the folkparks this year because of a new policy of booking only local artists who have had intensive radio and TV plugging.

Neither Monica Zetterlund nor Owe Thörnqvist will tour Sweden this summer because they claim that the booking organization, the Folkparks, is more interested in making fast money than in presenting a well-balanced program to the public.

The top pop groups like the Hep Stars, Ola and the Janglers and the Tagas, will make Folk-

park tours, but last year's top sellers the Shanes, the Fabulous Four and the Slam Creepers have not been booked this year.

Tours have been arranged for the Spencer Davis group and the Kinks, and Eartha Kitt will tour Sweden from Aug. 2 to 18. Monolito (Henry Darrow) from the TV series "High Chapparral" will also be seen on Swedish stages.

Lill-Babs will be making her 15th tour of the folkparks with the Rune Ofwerman Orchestra and Siw Malmqvist will make a short tour, playing up to three concerts a day.

# Mexican Folk Acts Steal Discometro

MEXICO CITY — Mexican recording artists' most coveted award, the Discometro, will be awarded later this month to a list of recording artists selected by "Mercado de Discos," record store, Salvador Suarez, president of the chain, announced.

For the first time in recent years, Mexican folk music reversed the annual trend of rock artists.

Only one rock group made the list this year. New entries were in traditional or ballad-type music and artists interpreting native Mexican music rather than translations of foreign rock hits.

Olga Guillot and Marco Antonio Muniz won in the ballad category. "Revelation of the Year" 1967 prize goes to CBS' (Columbia) Los Piccolinos.

Other folk artists who will receive awards are Lucía V'ila, Jose Alfredo Jimenez, Angelica Maria, Alberto Vazquez, Hermanas Nunez and the Los Panchos Trio.

The Rockin' Devils rock group, the Sonora Santanera tropical music group, Pablo Beltran Ruiz orchestra, Imelda Miller (RCA Victor) and Carlos Lico (Capitol) also won; latter two were named "Revelations of the Year."

Cecilia Cruz, David Zaizar, Tito Guizar and Juan Torres will also get awards.

# HISPAVOX UPHELD IN ITS PACT SUIT ON RAPHAEL

MADRID—The Supreme Court in Madrid has dismissed the appeal of singer Raphael against the finding of the Labor Court which held that the singer must fulfill his contract with Hispavox. On April 1, the Supreme Court ruled that the decision of the Labor Court must stand and that Raphael is not free to make recordings for any company other than Hispavox licensee, Radio Triunfo, Ltda., has secured an injunction from the Court of the Third Civil Branch of the District of Lisbon ordering the withdrawal from commerce of recordings made by Raphael for EMI, and distributed in Portugal by Valentim de Carvalho.

# 'A Record for Summer' Draws 56 Unpublished Songs & New Talent

MILAN—The Italian radio-TV contest, "A Record for the Summer," will feature 56 unpublished songs and a host of new talent, April 21-June 8. The contest, reserved for Italian songs and singers, is co-sponsored by RAI-TV, the State-controlled radio-TV company, and the Italian Association of Record Companies (AFI).

In addition to AFI-affiliated companies, member labels of APDI, a smaller association, will compete in the contest, including Bentler, CDI, Beat, Tiffany, St. Martin, Equipe and Kansas. AFI, made up of major companies, is affiliated with the London-based International Federation of the Phonographic Industry (IFPI).

Record companies were assigned from one to three entries, depending on their share of the market, seniority, and radio exposure of their catalogs. Scoring for the six-week tournament will be handled through popular ballot and RAI-TV juries. Semifinals for the first 24 songs will be held June 6-7, and the finals for 12 songs on June 8, both in Turin.

Some of the best sellers to come out of the contest include, "Il Mondo," "La Mia Serenata," by RCA-Italiana's Jimmy Fontana, "La Rosa Nera," by CGD's Gigliola Cinquetti and "Se Stasera Sono Qui," by Ricordi's Wilma Goich.





# Audio Retailing

## Expert in Classical Music Gives Florida Retailer Big Sales Boost

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — A professional trumpet player with a local symphony orchestra here has helped build Hoyt High Fidelity Center into a top merchandiser of classical records and audio equipment.

As in many specialized areas of audio and sound products retailing, expertise is a necessary sales ingredient in employees, manager Landon Hoyt said. In the area of classical music, Hoyt gives much credit to Madge Bruner, who also generates sales of high quality equipment.

Miss Bruner plays the trumpet with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, holds regularly scheduled classes in trumpet for serious-minded students, and is a thorough expert on every aspect of the category. Her opinions are so well trusted that customers buying a fine \$400 to \$800 stereo phonograph often asks her to "pick out a bunch of classical albums you think I'll like."

A typical example was a local automobile dealer, who had bought one of the top-priced phonographs in Hoyt's inventory. He asked Miss Bruner to make up a list of classical records. The sale amounted to more than \$100.

Hoyt High Fidelity Center devotes three full browsers to classical records, supports the local symphonic music circle actively, and concentrates on the serious-minded music lover.

### Specialization

"Some of our salespeople sell only pop music, and others concentrate on classical," Hoyt pointed out. "Miss Bruner is always brought in whenever there is a question of the subject, or where the customer confesses that he doesn't know what he wants, but would like to add classical music to his collection."

The suburban Jacksonville record dealer ship makes a continuous and serious effort to interest younger people in classical music. Of tremendous help has been the "modernized" album sleeves and jackets displayed on

the wall behind the classical browsers. Included are "I like Tchaikovsky," "Chopin for lovers," many fashion covers, and even mod covers, which are likely to cause even a teenybopper to look twice at the store's classical suggestions. A giant stride was the recent "Youth Concert," given by the Jacksonville Symphony at its new waterfront park location near downtown Jacksonville.

"Another help is the fact that younger people, starting out by earning excellent incomes, often buy good-quality stereo phonographs, and want to include classical music along with their other favorites. Whenever we sell a fine phonograph, no matter what the age or the musical tastes of the customer may be, we immediately play one or two classics for him.

Better orchestrated classical music, of course, brings out all of the capability of the phonograph, and quite possibly the customer will back up his expensive investment in the machine with such records to impress others, even if he does not like classical music himself," said Hoyt.

### School Band

Still another avenue which should be exploited in selling classical music to younger customers has been the skyrocketing high school band situation, Miss Bruner added. Band superintendents can easily be convinced to play some classical music, which, of course, can be expected to develop similar interest on the part of the young musicians involved. We have scores of teen-age classical music customers who developed their original taste for this music by actually playing it as a member of a band.

The expanding industrialization of the Jacksonville area has produced a steady stream of customers who buy expensive phonographs and home entertainment centers with no par-

ticular music preferences involved. People who can afford to buy such impressive equipment as status symbols are, of course, highly amenable to classical music, feeling that "they owe it to the phonograph," Miss Bruner said.

"One way of making sure that every phonograph or fine tape recorder purchaser will want some classical music is to play an organ album of Handel's overtures," Landon Hoyt pointed out. "Turned up to high volume, this recording literally shakes the room, demonstrates stereo separation as its best, and starts the customer thinking in terms of classical music other than sheer listening pleasure. We never miss in selling customers their first classical albums once this process has been followed."

The record used, incidentally, is Virgil Fox's, with the background of the Philadelphia Philharmonic Orchestra.

### Budget Product

The Hoyt center makes unabashed use of "budget classics" to get many of its pop customers to experiment with their first classical music purchase, and finds that these inexpensive versions are often all it takes to convert a customer to at least a partial liking for classic.

"Appreciation for classical music is often latent in a customer, particularly a young one, who doesn't actually know that he has a feeling for this sort of music until he plays it on his own phonograph, and can devote sufficient time to listening," Miss Bruner said. "Now, we never let a customer's appearance or apparent musical taste dissuade us from talking up classical music, demonstrating it, etc. Frequently, the customer's response will be excellent, and a surprise even to himself.

"To merchandise classical music successfully, there must be plenty of space and a broad enough inventory that the cus-

NAMM, however, is planning seminars that will deal specifically with phonograph records and pre-recorded tape. These seminars, scheduled for June 25-26 here, will mark the first time the 66-year-old association has included sessions for both phonograph records and tapes. The increased interest by record companies in exhibiting at the annual NAMM show led to the inclusion of this category of merchandising. Highlights of the seminar series concluding here were presentation of a film, "Move to Music," and a talk by Charles M. Faulhaber, president, Ward-Brodt Music Co., Madison, Wis. He told dealers how to effectively use the NAMM-financed



# Tape CARtridge

## A&M Wins Injunction in Duping Suit

LOS ANGELES—Superior Court Judge Robert S. Thompson issued Friday (12) a preliminary injunction prohibiting Superba Tape Co. from duplicating Tijuana Brass, the Sandpipers and We Five recordings produced by A&M Records.

Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss, A&M head, charged that Superba, a Lancaster, Calif., firm, without authorization had copied Tijuana Brass instrumental recordings and those of two vocal groups, the Sandpipers and We Five, on tapes, and sold them to the public.

The injunction was against Edward F. Knasin Jr. and Barry K. Pressman, both of Superba Tapes. Both maintained, however, that since recordings are not protected by copyright laws they were within their rights to copy the material.

### Pays No Royalties

Thompson, who issued the injunction, said that Superba pays no royalties to neither the artists nor to A&M and, therefore, is ineligible to copy product on tapes for consumer distribution.

Moss said that A&M Records will continue to bring legal action against unauthorized tape duplicators.

Recently, 13 publishers filed suit in U. S. District Court here naming a score of tape cartridge duplicating firms as defendants in an action charging alleged violation of the Federal Copyright Act.

The Southern California companies are charged with unauthorized duplication of copyright material from three albums "Sounds Like," Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass; "Insight Out," by the Association, and material by the Doors.

Named as defendants in the District Court are: William C. Henning and Frank W. Martirano doing business as Pi-Tronic Systems; Mobile Stereo, Ltd., doing business as Muntz Mobile Stereo Pak; Louis Johnson Enterprises and U-Tape-A-Tape; B&N Car Radio Service; Edward F. Inasin Jr. and Barry K. Pressman, doing business as Superba Tapes Co.

Plaintiff's complaint also asks for an accounting and that royalties be paid plus damages three times the amount of royalties.

"We will not license this design," said PlayTape president Frank Stanton, "because we want the industry to be free to use this concept on all their equipment. We'll give them

every possible assistance to manufacture and market this concept."

MGM, which currently markets an MGM-2 Player, will be the first to go into production on the new machine. It will also

market an adapter for 8-track cartridge players, permitting them to accept PlayTape cartridges. Stanton also said that he was lining up other companies to manufacture or private-label the compatible player.

Using one common speed motor, the first models will include two slots for cartridge insertion, one for 4 and 8-track cartridges and the other for the smaller PlayTapes. However, Stanton said that at the Consumer Electronics Show in June he will unveil a PlayTape cartridge adapter for use with existing 8-track players.

Four-track cartridge can be played also on the equipment with the use of an adapter such as the Gidget. The Gidget is a small device, manufactured by Automatic Radio, which adds a pinch roller to 4-track cartridges, permitting them to be played on any 8-track unit.

The design concept follows the statement of Oscar P. Kusisto, vice-president of Motorola, a leader and pioneer in the 8-track field, would build PlayTape units. "The PlayTape concept complements our 8-track product line for worldwide market applications," he said, "because it has the same basic concepts (speed and continuous loop) we feel are so important to our related industries; that is, tape system manufacturers and the producers of music libraries." No information, however, was forthcoming from Motorola as to its intent with PlayTape's compatibility design.

## ITCC Gets Rights To MGM Tracks

NEW YORK — International Tape Cartridge Corp. has acquired world rights for two 20th Century-Fox soundtracks. The agreement marks the first time in which a tape cartridge duplicator has been given the rights for both the album and tape cartridge. Fox's record label, 20th Century-Fox Records, who had first rights on the tracks, approved the agreement. The two film scores are "Planet of the Apes" and the upcoming "Bandelero," starring Dean Martin and Jimmy Stewart. Both films were scored by Jerry Goldstein. The agreement was made by ITCC president Larry Finley and Lionel Newman, music director for 20th Century-Fox.

Finley has, in turn, assigned the albums to Enoch Light's Project 3. The score of "Planet of the Apes," in distribution to film houses across the nation, is set for immediate release on both album and cartridge. "Bandelero" will be released in the first two weeks of May.

## All-Electric Cassette Unveiled by Auricord

NEW YORK—Auricord Corp., OEM tape CARtridge deck manufacturers, unveiled a slot-loading cassette mechanism featuring electro-mechanical controls.

The three-motor AC record/playback unit functions completely independent of all mechanical switching. In the display model shown, all operating buttons were mounted in a separate unit connected to the cassette mechanism only by electrical wiring. "We've set up our unit, in this manner," said Auricord President Leonard Rosenblatt, "only to show the absence of mechanical controls on existing equipment," he continued, "controls such as fast forward and reverse are mechanically connected to the motor." The unit's stop mechanism features electro-mechanical braking. No brake bands, clutches or linkages are used. Cost of the unit was said to be under \$50, O.E.M.

Rewind time of pre-recorded cassette, Rosenblatt said, is under 30 seconds. Upper frequency response is 1,000 cycle. The unit is currently tooled, with production slated the end of June.

Rosenblatt also disclosed that the company is designing a "reverse-o-matic" cassette mechanism which will permit both sides of the tape to be played without removing the cassette.

Cassettes will be fed into the unit from the front and then drop into a trough, Rosenblatt said.

## Raxall Bows Auto Rack

LOS ANGELES — Raxall Systems Inc., in Sherman Oaks, has introduced Tape&Eze, an auto stereo tape cartridge rack.

The wire rack fits on the lip of the seat, "out of the way and out of sight of pedestrians or other undesirable eyes," according to C. W. Brohammer, an executive with Raxall Systems. The unit, which holds six tapes, also can be placed in the glove department or in the trunk. Suggested list price is \$3.95.

## Discoteoa, Dot Release Deal

LOS ANGELES — Dot product will be released in the 4 and 8-track configurations in Venezuela by La Discoteoa S. A. The company, Dot's record distributor, just entered cartridge duplication.

In other foreign markets, Dot's cartridge involvement centers around Festival in Australia (4 and 8-track and open reel); Nogram in Holland (cassette) and Trutone in South Africa, which has yet to begin its own reproduction. Trotono has been importing 4 and 8-track cassettes from the U. S.

## ARC Electronics Into Home Mart

LOS ANGELES—ARC Electronics, Inc., manufacturer of auto stereo tape players, will enter the home market next month with a compatible 4 and 8-track player.

Bob Tibbetts, president of ARC has introduced the "Melody Supreme," an automatic, compatible unit. List price is \$139.95.

It features input plugs for AM-FM radio and guitar amplifier.



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# Radio Doctors Offers Education Prescription to Dealers, Buyers

By BENN OLLMAN

MILWAUKEE—Radio Doctors, which has two outlets here that function as sub-wholesale one-stop outlets as well as retail stores, has made effort to educate dealers and customers in all aspects of tape CARtridge product.

As manager of the downtown outlet here at 240 W. Wells, Stu Glassman clears up confusion from out-of-state dealers ordering tape in wholesale quantities and in helping retail customers who come into the store.

Dealers should be cognizant of the sales appeal in tape units that can be attached to hi-fi sets in the home, and in commercial establishments, Glassman said.

"We sell a lot of 8-track cartridge tapes for use with hi-fi

systems in restaurants, discotheques and taverns. One go-go spot in town here has already bought four units from us along with dozens of prerecorded tapes."

**Dealers Confused**

"Dealers are especially confused," Glassman said. "We move a lot of tapes to the trade through our one-stop operation. A big percentage of upstate dealers who do business with us consistently place orders for the wrong type of track. They order 4-tracks when it should be 8-track, and vice versa. In the first three months of this year roughly one-third of the tapes we shipped to our one-stop dealer accounts were returned because they had ordered the wrong track."

"Displaying tapes in the store

also constitutes a problem for the retailer," according to Glassman. "Tape packages don't make as dramatic a display item as do LP albums because of their small size. A dealer can put \$5,000 worth of prerecorded tapes on his shelves and it looks like nothing. So, unless you have a massive display, tapes can get lost in a good-sized record shop."

More than 4,500 prerecorded tapes are on display in the downtown outlet. Backup inventory in all categories amounts to another 4,500 tapes. All tapes are concentrated in one section of the store which now covers three times the display space allotted to it several years ago.

Radio Doctors' experience with tapes goes back "to the beginning . . . at least eight years ago," says Glassman. Cartridge sales began as soon as they were introduced to the market.

Glassman, in his efforts to improve tape sales, asks the industry to offer more product in twin-packs. Customers should be shown that with twin-pack tape albums they get more music for much less than the price of quality record albums."

Glassman scores the industry, however, for its lack of consumer education. Very little education is now being offered by the tape makers. The typical customer buys a tape recorder and is mystified. Labels turning out prerecorded tapes should include more helpful instructions with each package. This lack of knowledge is most apparent with users of reel-to-reel units, where new customers experience difficulty in simply putting on and taking off tapes. The users who find themselves stymied by the difficulty of determining where the tape begins are not going to remain steady customers."

A final question: Has the growth of the tape business been hurting his record sales?

"Not at all," answers Glassman. "Although we are not selling tapes generally to the same people who buy records, the interest in tapes boosts total volume by increasing store traffic."

Goldstein, who joined Jay-Gee five years ago in promotion, has been in charge of West Coast promotion and sales. Jay-Gee issues Jubilee, Josie and Port Records and distributes the B. T. Puppy and Toot labels.

The recording facilities of many of these regional operations are not first class by standards here, but many are custom-built installations which are thoroughly understood by the recording artists, musicians, and producers using them. The recording facilities at Stax are 4-track machines, custom-made locally. A good deal of the work is cut on one or two tracks in a set-up simulating a live performance with the vocal recorded as the band plays. However, the quality of the recordings cannot be faulted, as product by Otis Redding, Arthur Conley, and Aretha Franklin, among others, from Memphis, and Rick Hall's studio in Muscle Shoals, Ala., demonstrate.

Among other independent label, studio and staff operations which has been making a dent in the pop market is Abnak Records in Dallas, from which the Five Americans, and the

Jon and Robin recordings have been issued.

The surfacing of the regional studio operations has forced many of the big city labels to listen to all material sent in. Neil Bogart, president of Buddah Records, said, "It is impossible to discount the small town operations. For instance, the Lemon Pipers record in Cleveland, and Question Mark and the Mysterians record in McAllen, Tex. Talent comes from all across the country these days and all established labels must be continually aware of what is happening outside of New York and the West Coast."

## American Breed in Commercials Kick

NEW YORK — The American Breed are on a commercial jingle binge. The group recently completed "The Lone Phone" jingle for Bell Telephone, which marks their third commercial assignment. Last month, the group's "Fly The American Way" television spot for American Airlines was broadcast in 20 major cities at the same time as their Coca-Cola jingle was airing on national radio.

The American Breed's latest Acta single is "Ready, Willing and Able." A new album is scheduled for release within the next three weeks.

# Copyright Bill May Get New Life

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McClellan would introduce a bill to extend expiring copyrights in this session. On the CATV issue, if the Supreme Court makes CATV liable to copyright fees under present law, he expects copyright owners to observe a moratorium on lawsuits until protective legislation can be worked out.

Copyright Office Register Abraham Kaminstein believes this course is doomed, and said so last week in sharp language. He had hoped that fast Senate action could at least salvage the modernizing provisions of the revision—including the longer copyright term, and a single Federal copyright system.

Kaminstein believes any attempt to put another bare extension bill through Congress this session would be doomed in the House. Any attempts to

pass a revision bill next year would mean to "reopen old issues . . . and we would have years of dissension and debate." Even if some piecemeal revision law comes out in the next Congress, he believes it would be bad law.

All of this came out in release of letters from the Copyright Office, requesting the skeletal bill, sent March 29, and the Senator's unexpected answering rejection released April 17. The copyrights subcommittee chairman released both letters the day he met with Register Kaminstein, and involved parties at a conference between educators and copyright owners on the controversial issue of payment for new technological uses.

Although language was barely careful on both side, it was clear that the Copyright Office felt the Senate had committed

itself to copyright action of some kind this session to maintain the "momentum" of modernizing the old 1909 law, and put the U. S. in line with international copyright. McClellan clearly resented the implication that the Senate could have acted faster. He wrote the Register that even if the Copyright Office had spent 13 years on the revision work, the Senate had been in active consideration only since the start of the present Congress.

He recognized the Copyright Office's strong belief that the House would have no stomach for going back through the jungle of hearings and floor action on another over-all revision attempt. But he answered this by promising to launch the action on the Senate side in the next Congress. He admits action in this session would not be possible.

company, signed Hashberry Films to do a series of minifilms. First of Roulette's artists to be filmed is Tommy James and the Shondells performing their new single, "Mony Mony." Hashberry's president, Hank Schwartz, announced that his company has just completed a three-film series for Chess-Cadet Records on the Rotary Connection.

April-Blackwood's decision to have minifilms produced for some of its writer/artists stems from the stepped-up number of new singles releases being issued by record labels. "Record companies are issuing so many new singles that they just don't have time to adequately promote each disk," said A-B general professional manager Dave Rosner. "Publishers have to become more consumer promotion conscious," he continued.

The publishers' increasing involvement in production is another factor behind A-B's mini-

film plans, Rosner said. "Our producers depend on us to properly promote their products, and if we can establish a writer/artist as a hit recording star, the film's cost becomes minimal, not only because of mechanical royalties, but more importantly to us, the widespread acceptance of the artist's material by other recording artists. We feel that TV film exposure opens a whole new area of effective promotion."

"There's a necessity to use these films," said Emile LaViola, Screen Gems-Columbia general professional manager, because of the flood of new releases reaching radio stations coupled with radio's tight programming." S-G, in association with its Colgems Records, its subsidiary, had released the first Lewis and Clarke single as a minifilm. LaViola indicated that the company is currently readying film productions to be timed with the unveiling of several new recording artists.
