

NEW MANAGEMENT.

Enlarged Plant and Increased Capacity.

The S. D. Hunter Bill Posting Company, of Steubenville, O., has gone under new management, Mr. C. M. Murphy, late of Madison, Ind., and F. C. Werkman, of Steubenville, having taken charge of the plant. Ten new boards have been erected, by which the capacity has been increased to 2,000 sheets. A new wagon has been built for the country route, which includes twenty-one towns. The office and bill room has been established at 135 North Third street, and the firm reports that business is booming.

In brief, the plant is exceedingly well equipped and prepared to handle any amount of paper that may be sent. The boards are all excellently located, some of them being at Mingo Junction and Brilliant, O., and all along the trolley lines connecting these places with Steubenville; along the railroads and main streets.

BIG DAMAGE SUIT.

Ogg & Cole, of Minneapolis, Alleged They Are Up Against a Trust.

Minneapolis, Minn., May 12.—Ogg & Cole, bill posters of this city, claim they are up against a trust, and have sought relief via the courts. Suit has been entered for \$50,000 damages against the Gunning System, R. J. Gunning, the George J. Sherer Sign Company, Minnesota Advertising Company, Michael Breslauer, L. N. Scott, Norman H. McAllister, Robert C. Hoffman, the Northern Display Advertising Company, E. H. Schroen and the Cudahy Packing Company.

It is alleged that the defendants, through one of their branches, has set aside \$6,000 with which to fight Ogg & Cole; that petty suits have been brought in the courts; that the bushness integrity of the firm has been attacked in various ways; that all manner of unfair methods have been taken to conceal the signs erected by plaintiffs; that their employees have been seduced away by various devices, and that their patrons have been tempted in all manner of ways to break their contracts. The alleged conspirators are accused of having rented plaintiffs' office and other quarters, so that they would have no place in which to do business.

LEVYNE'S LETTER.

Cincinnati, O., May 10.

To the Editor of "The Billboard":

Dear Sir,—The other day I made a hurried jump to Indianapolis and Terre Haute. In Indianapolis I saw Alcock, Harbison, and, as usual, he went plumb to sleep before he spoke a half dozen words.

Terre Haute has a population of not quite 50,000. J. M. Dishon is the billposter, and in the whole of the United States there is not a city of 50,000 population that can make a better showing than this city. Dishon can put up 125-24 sheets without putting two on a board. Aside from this he has 50 distinct 8-sheets, 500 distinct 3-sheets and 500 distinct 1-sheet boards, besides being able to put up 1,000 one-sheets on his daubs. He has two wagons, painted in a most brilliant yellow, and lettered in black, the most conspicuous turnout imaginable. His billboards are framed with a molding made from a 2x4 and painted yellow, so that each one of his holdings looks as if it was a constructed picture frame. The distributing is done by men in uniform. He employs five the year round, and on some occasions has from 12 to 15 at work. Each one of his men is under \$100 bond for the faithful performance of his duty and no boys are hired at any price.

The peculiar construction of the city makes a one-sheet display remarkably effective. Fifteen one-sheets would give the advertiser more than his money's worth, and the importance of this can be readily grasped, when it is understood that there are 500 one-sheet boards built for this purpose. Harry Brown, manager of the Portland (Me.) Bill Posting Company, was married recently to Miss Clara L. Harris, of the same city.

The twelfth annual convention of the Wisconsin Bill Posters opens at Fond du Lac, May 14. There are sixty members of the association.

In Paris, France, sky signs are prohibited, but church doors, walls of private residences and bases of statues are used to post paper on.

The heavy windstorm that visited Council Bluffs, Ia., last week, damaged E. W. Nichols' bill posting and distributing plant to the amount of \$500.

Myers & Crump, bill posters at Waynesboro, Va., have dissolved partnership. Crump will continue the business, and has purchased new boards.

The American Posting Service in Chicago is now located in its new offices, near the corner of Lake and Morgan streets. They are a marvel of convenience.

J. M. Dishon is the pioneer in the movement for beautiful bill boards. All of his plant is indeed a handsome one.

The Women's Christian Temperance Union, of Mt. Vernon, O., are conducting an anti-chlorine against paper posted in that town by the "Crystal Slipper" Company.

Dayton (O.) Connell recently passed an ordinance providing a penalty of \$20 for the posting of bills on any building, fence, tree box, post or other object without consent of the owner thereof.

Arrangements have been made to entertain the delegates to the national convention, which will meet at Louisville, July 15. No doubt they will experience some "Kentucky hospitality."

It is said that Ramsey's stock in the Consolidated of Louisville has not yet been formally transferred to the Big Four, by reason of the fact that attachments thereon preclude a good title.

Philadelphia law makers are considering an ordinance imposing a tax of 10 cents annually for each square foot of bill board space. If the ordinance becomes a law, a violation of its provisions will be punishable by a fine of \$50.

Mrs. R. C. Campbell, accompanied by her children, arrived home Monday, May 12. They left Thomasville, Ga., May 7, and stopped at Atlanta, Chattanooga and Nashville. All are much improved in health by their winter in the South.

The Commissioners of the District of Columbia have adopted regulations requiring the payment of an annual tax of \$2 for each square yard of area intended for use for bill boards. The Commissioners also take the right to designate the locations of the boards.

We are going to make a feature of circus routes in the future, and want to make our list as complete as possible.

There is a well-defined rumor current in Chicago which has it that the American Posting Service, the R. J. Gunning Co., the Cusack plant, Bour & Co., and all the others will be consolidated into one big plant. Details are lacking, but the fact that Thos. J. Murphy was seen in and about the Windy City shortly before the rumor spread, lends it some color of probability.

FREAK ADS IN PARIS.

Latest Scheme of Parisian Journal to Attract Attention.

The latest and most original addition to the crowd of prizes nowadays offered by newspaper proprietors, says a correspondent in the London News, was exhibited during the Easter holidays in the streets of Paris. A Parisian journal had commissioned a very popular novelist to write a sensational romance, and every reader of the romance is tempted, by the chance of winning an "automobile with four seats" to make guesses at the fate of each of the eight leading characters in the story.

Life-size "portraits" of these persons are placarded about the streets; five are women and three are men. Under each portrait stands the name of the person and a series of questions for the competitor to answer. For instance: "Catharine, Will Catharine marry?" Again: "Will her scheme to gain the Marquis be successful?"

Next comes: "Germaline. Will she deceive her husband?" Then "Marie. Will she marry or die before the end of the romance?" Lastly, "Zizi. How many men will she attract? Who will be her last lover?" These individual queries are followed by a group of general problems for solution. "Which of these five women will die of poison? Which of them will administer poison? To whom?"

Each of the three masculine portraits is also underlined by one or more similarly ridiculous questions. No competitor may send in any reply until a specified number of the chapters of the novel has been published.—The Fourth Estate.

PRESSMEN STRIKE.

As a Result Show Printing in New York is Tied Up.

Show printing in New York is at a standstill, consequent to the strike which was inaugurated by a general walk-out of the pressmen last week. They demanded a 10 per cent. increase in their present pay, and the employers declared they would not concede this scale, as they considered it exorbitant.

There is no doubt that the walk-out had been carefully planned, for a committee, having waited upon the various lithograph firms and stated their request, which was refused, the strike immediately followed.

As yet there have been no developments, as both forces remain unyielding.

POSTER ARTISTS

Assembled at Cincinnati in Third National Convention.

Last week the Poster Artists' Association of America held its third national convention in Cincinnati, O., and while the delegates were given a most enjoyable visit, a considerable amount of routine business was harmoniously and satisfactorily transacted. Forty delegates were present, representing New York, Buffalo, Cleveland, Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit, Erie and Cincinnati. The association includes 97 per cent. of the poster artists of the country, and their constitution is a model one, dealing with direct legislation on the Swiss plan, with the object of personal justice to every member.

In the United States there are only about 300 men in this line of the lithographic business, and the object of the order is to encourage the study of high art. Among the order's honorary members are a few of those who have risen from the poster lithographic business to higher planes of art work. There are Edward Potthast, Louis Schwartz, of New York, who won the Lazarus prize, and is now studying in Rome; Arthur Keller, who is in Munich studying; Arthur Snyder, who was recently selected as court painter to the Sultan of Morocco, and who is at present at his new post of duty, and Louis Maner, who won the Carnegie prize.

On Wednesday night the delegates were banqueted at the Zoo, and on Thursday they visited the famous Mammoth Cave of Kentucky in a body.

Among the important matters discussed and favorably considered at the convention was the advisability of instituting local councils at Boston, Philadelphia and Niles, Mich., and of sending one or more apprentices abroad every year, for the purpose of elevating the standard of work.

The mortuary fund was increased from \$100 to \$1,000, and a distinct insurance department was established, while the reserve fund was increased from \$12,000 to \$18,000.

A national seal, designed by Member William Crane, of Buffalo, and embracing the monogram, "P. A. A. A.", was adopted, and action was taken endorsing affiliation

with the Lithographic Artists, Designers and Engravers' League of the United States and Canada.

The next convention will be held in Cleveland, O.

The Donaldson Litho. Company added another press last week. They also put in a folding machine and an automatic knife sharpener for their cutting machine room. The installation in the press dispatches that the United States Litho. Company (Russell & Morgan) is in any way responsible for the New York strike is pure rot. It is malicious talk—an insinuation like this that prevents the show printers from getting together in a protective organization.

ARE TIGHTS GROUNDS FOR DIVORCE?

They were paying him \$100 a week, also paying his help and feed. Floto acknowledges that the act cost him about \$300 per week. They had to hire two troupes of dogs, because their own can not work. Not one of the pony acts is finished, so they only do parts of acts. Floto seems to think that they will be all right and get things straightened out by the time they reach Denver, but the knowing ones say that as soon as a certain partner, who is now in Europe, returns to America, the stuff will be sold off. Everybody is sorry for Floto. He is a good fellow, popular and well liked, but he lacks experience. He has done some clever things at that; but no matter how bright or how game a man may be, there is nothing like the lessons of former years."

FELL FORTY-EIGHT FEET.

Achille Phillion, with the Gaskill Company, Has a Narrow Escape.

Nashville, Tenn., May 12.—That Achille Phillion, the famous equilibrist, is still in the land of the living seems a miracle to the thousands who were in attendance at the Eagles' Carnival, May 8. Phillion is a member of the Gaskill Carlton Carnival Co., and had mounted the spiral tower to begin his act. He was seen to stagger and fall. As his body shot downward he made a desperate clutch at the cable and wires, his body striking against the timbers of the platform below, and his head hit the iron-pointed tips of a ladder projecting from the platform. He lay unconscious, and many thought he was dead, but prompt medical attention revived him to an extent, and he was taken to a hotel. It was found that the most serious injury was a broken jaw-bone. He will be able to resume work, it is thought, in ten days.

Achille Phillion is one of the most noted equilibrists in the country, having originated the spiral tower act in 1892. He is a French-Canadian by birth, and his home now is at Akron, O. Phillion never had an accident before, and Mr. Gaskill is of the opinion that the fall was caused by the wet cable.

OBITUARY.

Geo. Battison, a prominent dog fancier and proprietor of extensive kennels near Youngstown, O., died recently of lung trouble.

He was secretary of the Jockey Club, Newport, Ky., and at the time of his death was serving as entry clerk at Churchill Downs. Mr. Hanley was 55 years of age and has been identified with the turf from his early days. A wife and one daughter survive him. Under the direction of the Louisville Lodge of Elks, the body was embalmed and shipped to Paris, Ky., where the interment took place May 8.

THE CITY OF WINDS.

Harry Earl Writes of Things of Interest in Chicago's Pleasure Whirl.

Chicago, Ill., May 12.—The first of the summer resorts to open was the Masonic Roof Garden, and about the only change this place has made since last season is to raise the price of a portion of the seats, which may be reserved in advance. There isn't anything wonderful about the opening bill, there being a strong flavor of Kohl & Castle Circuit about it, but later on we may expect some remarkable bills at this place, so I am told. LEDERER'S "WILD ROSE"

BLOOMS LUXURIOUSLY ON BROADWAY

CURRENT ATTRACTIONS ON THE WANE.

New York, May 12.—One by one attractions which have enjoyed long and triumphant runs are disappearing, forced from the theaters by the increasing warmth weather and expiration of time contracts. Those that remain, however, are of the best, and fully able to hold their own with the new productions.

Knickerbocker. Entitling antiparous, Geo. W. Lederer's "The Wild Rose" abounds in color, light, fun of the knock-about and emphatic order, with catchy music by Ludwig Engländer, lines by Harry B. Smith and Geo. V. Hobart, which frequently are bright and sparkling with wit, the whole concoction is delivered piping hot and with a swing that denotes the stagecraft of the master of ceremonies, who last Monday, at the conclusion of the first performance, was called out to receive the congratulations of his many friends assembled. Geo. W. made a hand upon the heart speech, thanking everybody present for their apparent appreciation of his efforts, and most of the departing audience seemed of the opinion that the once hicky George had produced in "The Wild Rose" as meritorious musical comedy as has been presented in New York this season, not excepting "The Little Duchess" or "Dolly Varden." The former gave us the latest Parisian creations in the gowns of the Sadie girls, and while the show girls and principals in the latter are picturesquely attired in the bourees and turbelows of ye olden time, Mr. Lederer, in "The Wild Rose," gives scores and scores of pretty young women, not only picturesquely attired, but some picturesquely lacking in attire. Eddie Foy headed the comedians as Paracelsus Noodle, a hypnotist, and sings a droll song, which he is forced to repeat nightly. Al Hart, as Muhomet, a gipsy Lothario, sings blood-curdling gypsy chants in thunderous tones, and makes merry in an artful fashion, and June McCree, who makes her appearance in a flying machine, plays a good second in this admixture of frolic and music. Miss Irene Bentley heads the comedians, and is as charming and witty as of old. She sings and dances in her characteristic manner, and apparently she has still her old-time grip on a metropolitan audience. Miss Cahill makes a hit each evening with the song, "Nancy Brown," whose swinging chorus catches the fancy of the lower portion of the audience, as well as of the gods aloft, who each night whistle the refrain and force encores until Miss Cahill is about on the verge of collapse. "The Wild Rose" will require some prolonged shaking before it begins to shed its petals to an unappraised audience. At present it is blossoming bravely to the nightly gratification of thousands of horticulturists, who go in exclusively for this species of flowers.

Wallack's.—Edward E. Rice's new production, "The Show Girl," as the program states, is a "jolly lot of tomfoolery in two acts," and it might be added that its muscle is of the catchy order, with a book which is held in Cyprus, and presumably the audience are expected to believe it to have been left there permanently, as it never shows any complete anatomical portion of itself upon the boards of Wallack's. The scenery is beautiful, the costumes even more so, and the women—well, the collection is worth while looking at if you admire fairness in femininity. They figure in every scene and act, and the press agent hopes soon to announce that a few of them have rounded up a flock of millionaires ere Broadway commences to whistle one or two of the new tunes that are hoped will rival "Florida's" "Tell Me, Pretty Maldon" in popularity.

Academy. E. C. Whitney's "Quo Vadis" is running along to an evenly good attendance at this house.

American.—"Woman Against Woman" is the production for this week. Comedy and pathos is happily blended in this play story, which is by Frank Harvey, and many of the situations are dramatic.

Bijou.—But three weeks more remain of "A Modern Magdalen," which has now been presented by Miss Amelia Bingham and her associate artists, Wilton Lackman, Henry E. Dixey, Joseph Holland, Arthur Byron, Miss Madge Carr Cooke and Ferdinand Gottschalk, for many successful performances.

Broadway.—The last two weeks of Messrs. Klaw & Erlanger's production of "The Sleeping Beauty and the Beast" are announced, making the closing date Saturday, May 24.
