ENON

High Society (Touch and Go)


Oh, Enon. Your name spelled backwards means “none,” but that’s just the opposite of what you are. A certifiable pop smorgasbord of sounds, *High Society* is the NYC band’s catchy follow-up to indie infusion *Believe!* Former Brainiac guitarist John Schmersal reprises his characteristic vocal meanderings, and the group’s debut on Touch And Go harks back to Brainiac’s glory days as the label’s electro-rock wunderkind. But times have changed, and so has Enon. Skeleton Key junk percussionist Rick Lee is out, and sweet-voiced bassist Toko Yasada (Blonde Redhead, The Lapse) is in. Jumping between the crashing guitar rock of “Old Dominion” and robotic dance maneuvers of “Disposable Parts,” Schmersal, Yasada and drummer Steve Calhoun stick to a steady pour of dance beats, alien-like effects and quirky, synth-heavy hooks. Comin’ on like a Beck-Gary Numan hybrid, Schmersal adds some dry fizz to booty-shaker “Carbonation” (“Is there a stupid dance coming from in your pants?”) and injects sure-fire hit “Natural Disasters” with a precise litany of falsetto. An acoustic number with string and sax flourishes, the album’s title track could very well rival X’s caustic rant (of a similar name) as a sentimental take on this manicured rat race called life. — **Solvej Schou**

FUNERALS

Pathetic Me (TMT Entertainment)

The Funerals’ debut is a sonic slap in the face to those under the impression that contemporary Icelandic pop music must sound like the creation of extra terrestrials. Owing more to Smog than Saturn, *Pathetic Me* is a tribute to Americana that keeps its quirkiness slight. This, in turn, makes the experience of an Icelandic band doing sparse, rootsy music all the more surreal. Opener “Puppy Eyes” sets the bare-bones bar — it coasts on mid-tempo, shuffling drums that are way in the foreground, while a persistent electric guitar riff quietly attempts to take over. In typical anti-folk/alt-country fashion, most of the songs bespeak desperation, both lyrically and in the slow, plodding nature of the music. However, the Funerals throw in enough humor to distinguish them from their American counterparts, and in doing so enliven their melancholy. On “Teenagers,” leader Ragnar laments being pushed in the video store by someone with a “pimple face and evil eyes.” “I’m still afraid of teenagers/ I will never be a man,” he sings along with Lára, who then goes on to scat during the song’s bridge. All of this is delivered with a straight face, but considering the band’s musical intelligence, it’s a witty façade. How Scandinavian of them.

SPEEDY J

Loudboxer (Mute)


Similar to the stylings of Richie Hawtin and Richard James, Speedy J (a.k.a. Jochem Paap) swirls together depressed-sounding melodies and ferocious drum clanging into a violent audio maelstrom. It was through a joint deal between both Warp Records and Plus 8 Records that Speedy J was able to unleash his full-length debut, *Ginger*, in 1993. However, it was not until 1997's *Public Energy No. 1* that Speedy J had his finest moment. Critically acclaimed worldwide, the record was easily one of the year's most stunning and ambitious pieces of work; it was the sound of pure energy captured and manipulated on vinyl. After releasing the 1999 follow-up *A Shocking Hobby*, a record that explored the musical depths that Brian Eno never dared to enter, Paap went right back into the studio. On his latest effort, *Loudboxer*, Speedy J has produced a record that further updates his revolutionary sound. The album is divided into two distinct seamlessly mixed sections; the first six tracks offer up intelligent, minimalist techno beats with tempestuous atmospheres, while the second portion of the record, beginning with "Kreck," is dancefloor devastation at its best. You'll need a rubber room and a straitjacket after listening to this one. — **Justin Kleinfeld**

MY VITRIOL

Finelines (Epic)

After storming the U.K. with five smash singles, London's My Vitriol readies its monstrous-sounding *Finelines* for U.S. shores. Clocking in with a whopping 16 tracks, the quartet's soaring epic rock is *veddy* British, yet its over-achiever sound gives it mass appeal: not too dark and not too exclusive for Americans to lap up. Singer/guitarist Som Wardner has a voice that's bubbly and enticing, but his sweet nothings often hold more than a few hidden barbs, much like Weezer's Rivers Cuomo employed on that band's sexual *unhealing* *Pinkerton* album. "Losing Touch" and "Grounded" employ a bittersweet mix of Wardner's vocals and dizzying riffs; elsewhere, aggressive percussion moves forward in the mix ("Ode To The Red Queen") and effects-laden guitars reminiscent of Ride and Lush show off My Vitriol's ability to use all its ammunition — namely guitarist Seth Taylor, drummer Ravi Kesavaram and bassist Carolyn Bannister. The group truly comes together on "Tongue Tied," a glittering instrumental that dives and turns like a rollercoaster through a Cure songbook, one moment sunny and mellow, the next prickly and foreboding. Book-smart (the band cribbed its name from the stark Graham Greene tome, *Brighton Rock*) as well as street-savvy, My Vitriol seems most likely to succeed, here and otherwise.

INDUSTRY NEWS

Adding additional responsibilities in the areas of programming, production and development at MTV and VH1, Brian Graden has been promoted to President Entertainment for both channels. • Speaking of MTV, did you hear how much the network got sponsors to pay for the season's recent final episode of *The Osbournes*? How about \$100,000 for a 30-second spot! Not bad considering the show was getting \$10,000 to \$15,000 per 30-second spot before it was such a hit. • The Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) has promoted Hilary Rosen from President to Chairman/CEO, while Cary Sherman rises from Sr. Executive VP to President. • German media giant Bertelsmann AG has agreed to buy troubled song-swapping service Napster for \$8 million. The sale announcement came just three days after Napster CEO Konrad Hilbers and co-founder Shawn Fanning resigned their posts because Napster's Board of Directors rejected Bertelsmann's initial offer. As part of the approved sale, both Hilbers and Fanning have agreed to stay on. You'll recall that Bertelsmann first partnered with Napster in October 2000, providing them with \$85 million to help turn the free service into a fee-based system that has yet to be launched. • Lots of news on the satellite radio front this week:

Sirius Satellite Radio recently reported that it had only signed up 412 paying subscribers in the first quarter of 2002 but expects to meet expectations of 100,000 to 150,000 subscribers by the end of this year. Sirius' 100 channels of programming can now be heard in 28 states. Over at XM Satellite Radio, Chairman Hugh Panero has received a letter from the Reverend Horace Sheffield III, president of the Michigan chapter of civil rights organization National Action Network, com-

plaining that NAN believes XM lacks diversity in management and is looking for a more positive programming stance from XM for African-Americans. • RIAA head Hilary Rosen called it "ridiculous," but artist manager Jim Guerinot labeled it "worth looking into." We're talking about the recent KaZaA/Verizon proposal, that computer manufacturers, ISPs, blank-CD makers and software manufacturers pool their resources into a fund that would pay artists for their works, as described in *USA Today*. It's really not a new idea, but think about how much money would be collected for the fund if only \$1 per user per month was collected from just the ISPs. The question is: would that be an amount to suffice all parties concerned with artist royalties? Obviously Ms. Rosen doesn't think so. •

Apple Computer customers beware! Don't try to play copy-protected CDs in the company's computers or you will be voiding your repair warranty. The computer manufacturer claims that customers are complaining of several problems, among them booting and removing the copy-protected discs from their machines.

LABEL NEWS

EMI Group has acquired Mute Records for \$35 million cash, plus another \$30 million in performance-related payments over the next four years. • Universal Records Sr. VP/Marketing and Artist Development Kim Garner adds on Sr. VP/Media Relations duties. • In case you were wondering, Mariah Carey has decided to sign with Island Def Jam Music Group. The deal, reported to be \$20 million for three albums, includes an option for a

fourth disc and her very own imprint through Island, (tentatively called) Monarch, headed by industry veteran Jerry Blair. • Dee Murphy has been promoted to VP/Sales for Rhino Entertainment/Warner Strategic Marketing. • Investment banking firm Blackstone Group has shelled out \$450 million for a majority stake in AOL/Time Warner's music and movie club Columbia House.

MUSIC NEWS

Following recent news of a potentially sweet deal Ozzy Osbourne and his family may be receiving to return for a second season of their reality show,

MTV's *The Osbournes*, the kooky clan held a press conference in New York to announce the impending release of the *Osbournes Family Album*, which will be hitting stores right around

the time you read this, on June 11. Serving as a soundtrack to the show, the CD features tracks selected by all the members of America's current favorite family, including songs from John Lennon, Starsailor, Pat Boone, three from Ozzy himself and daughter Kelly Osbourne's long-awaited cover of Madonna's "Papa Don't Preach." The press conference, attended by all of the Osbournes except for Ozzy — who was beamed in via satellite — also featured a good deal of hysteria of its own, including confused journalists who hadn't been informed exactly why they were there, and Sharon Osbourne threatening to castrate Ted Nugent for insulting her oh-so-sensitive husband. (At least you can't say he doesn't have it coming.) In related news, the U.K. premiere of *The Osbournes* was delayed due to unspecified "contractual

difficulties" with MTV. It has been speculated that the problem is due to the ongoing negotiations in progress for the show's second season. After weeks of promoting the series, MTV U.K. insists that it will still be aired as soon as possible. In the meantime, the scheduled premiere was replaced with a documentary on Ozzy, cunningly entitled *Ozzy Rules*. • Wilco fans, rejoice! While the band has only just (finally) released the long-awaited *Yankee Hotel Foxtrot*, it already has another record ready to go, according to frontman Jeff Tweedy. Currently entitled *dBpm*, the band decided to record the entire album in the space of a week. Starting the process in reverse, they came up with the title, artwork and track listing, then hit the studio with only four songs completed. As a result, each band member took the reins to help improvise a track to fill out the disc. The band hopes to repeat the process this summer and put yet another record in the can. Unfortunately, no release date for any of these tidbits has been set. • In other news to get you drooling, Radiohead is also gearing up to send some new music your way. Band kingpin Thom Yorke recently joined in a chat on a Radiohead fan site,

atseaweb.com, where he claimed the group is hard at work on new material, stating that it would be ready "sooner than you think." The boys are also getting ready for their two-week

July tour of Portugal and Spain where Yorke said they will be playing "virtually all new material." • More album news: Beck has finished up work on his album, which was overseen by longtime Radiohead producer Nigel Godrich. The CD, as yet unnamed, is due in stores on Sept. 24; The Icelandic musical heroes of Sigur Rós are nearing the end of their work on their new album, and are also eyeing an autumn release. Ringleader Jon Thor Birgisson wrote on the band's label website that eight or nine songs have already been completed, and it will begin mixing in June. "The main difference is that this time the production will be less polished," wrote Birgisson on the Bad Taste site. "The sound will be much more bare and alive"; Members of Queens Of The Stone Age and Rage Against The Machine have collaborated on the soundtrack to a new movie, *The Dangerous Lives Of Altar Boys*. Featuring songs recorded by Queens' Josh Homme and Nick Oliveri with Rage drummer Brad Wilk, the CD is in stores June 11; Indie darling Juliana Hatfield will be the subject of a greatest hits retrospective on June 25. The 20-track collection, entitled *Gold Stars 1992-2002*, will feature new songs and old favorites, as well as tracks from *God's Foot*, the Hatfield album recorded in 1996 and 1997 for Atlantic Records that was never released; The sophomore disc from Coldplay, *A Rush Of Blood To The Head*, has been

slated for an Aug. 27 release; Former Pixies frontman Frank Black will put out two new albums on the same day this summer, Aug. 20. *Black Letter Day* and *Devil's Workshop* are

both collaborations with Black's current band, The Catholics, and will be put out by spinART Records. The label is also releasing a collection of nine rare Pixies demos on July 9, titled simply *Pixies*. The demos precede the band's first record deal and include previously unheard songs; With the Detroit rock scene returning to its former glory through the help of bands like the White Stripes and the

kicking off July 16 at the PromoWest Pavilion in Columbus, Ohio. *Promise Ring*, *Desaparecidos* and *Recover* will be the opening acts, although only two of the three bands will open each show; The Unlimited Sunshine Tour, which starts out July 31 in St. Louis, was dreamed up by members of Cake, who wanted to put together a tour featuring non-mainstream bands. Joining

Cake on the 16-city romp will be De La Soul, Flaming Lips, Modest Mouse and Kinky. • Liz Phair is making her big-screen debut in *Cherish*, a film from *Dream With The Fishes* director Finn Taylor, star-

Von Bondies, the timing is perfect to glance back at the city's former glory days, when the MC5 was king. *America's Most Wanton* is a career-spanning look at seminal Detroit punk band the Sillies. Out on June 17 through Scooch Pooch Records, the disc features a number of previously unreleased tracks from throughout the band's 25-year history; There may still be a bit of a wait before the next Massive Attack album sees the light of day, but fans desperate for something new can still pick up *Eleven Promos*, a DVD collection of the group's videos in uncut form, including the previously unseen promo for *Mezzanine* track "Angel." The group is donating proceeds from the release to the Red Cross, and Virgin Records, its label will match the donation. • Tour news: Jimmy Eat World is set for a 12-date tour,

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Beat Master

Turtable icon DJ Shadow reveals the logic behind his new album, his love for Radiohead and why he thinks college radio is so damn important. Story By Doug Levy • Photo By Brian Appio

Taking a long time between albums can be a double-edged sword. Sure, expectations build and build, but so does the pressure to release material that will meet those expectations. It's not an easy task — just look what happened to the Stone Roses. This was exactly the challenge facing Josh Davis, a.k.a. DJ Shadow, in following up his widely acclaimed and hugely influential debut sample-fest, *Endtroducing*. It's been six years since that record turned the music world on its ear with its stunning mastery of beats and feats of sonic construction, as Shadow redefined DJ culture and, in the process, paved the way for everyone who would follow in his wake, from Kid Koala to the Avalanches. In the meantime, Shadow released another record with Mo' Wax label boss James Lavelle under the alias of U.N.K.L.E., collaborated with Jurassic-5's Cut Chemist on two projects (*Brainfreeze* and *Product Placement*), refined his skills as both a producer and an artist and shifted over to a new label (MCA) — all the time waiting until the moment was right for his full-fledged triumphant return to the solo spotlight. The result is *The Private Press*, an astounding collection of songs that delves bravely into new sonic territory, pairing Shadow's innovative approach to instrumental hip-hop with everything from soul to psychedelia to dancefloor delirium. CMJ got a hold of the superstar DJ long enough to find out where's he coming from, where he's going and how he continues to find inspiration.

How did your approach in making this record differ from your approach to making your first record?

I didn't want to resort to any of my old tricks, so I was very conscious of trying to do things differently, on an arrangement level and also on a technical level, a musical level. Also, the different influences that I took in — I knew that if I made a record right after *Endtroducing* that it was going to sound very similar to *Endtroducing*, because I needed quite a few years to take in a lot of new influences... I consider myself to be kind of a receptacle, in the sense that what you plug in, what I feed into me, influences what comes out.

That actually really does come through on the record.

As far as influences, there are certain genres of new music that didn't exist in 1995, for example, when I was working on *Endtroducing*. And also, there are certain old types of music that I found myself listening to a lot more, like psychedelic garage rock, or early '80s kind of new wave, no-wave stuff. So, in addition to my normal hip-hop and funk diet, I definitely found myself listening to a lot of other types of music as well. Not in any kind of calculated way, but over six years, I've gradually found myself just becoming interested in these genres that I didn't know as much about.

When you talk about styles of music that have come about since 1995, is there anything in particular?

Yeah, like, for example, turntablism as a genre. I mean, obviously people were scratching and doing that style of scratching, but there weren't any

records that you could go out and buy that were just an hour of solid scratching, the way you can now. Now there's probably a dozen new releases a week that are just turntablism, and that didn't exist then... Also, a lot of Dirty South kind of rhythms, from producers like Organized Noize or Hypnotized Minds or Timbaland and Mannie Fresh, people like that — that same kind of sound didn't really exist on the scale that it does now back then either.

***Endtroducing* seemed to be more about composing the record, putting it together — taking the different pieces of a puzzle and creating the whole from them. Was there any attempt with this record to avoid that kind of approach?**

I think that what you were saying about the puzzle, that's a good analogy. On this album, I was much more concentrated on each individual song being a unique experience in its own right. And I think actually, since *Endtroducing*, on U.N.K.L.E. and all the other work that I've done, I've tried to keep that in mind for some reason... When I think that maybe I'm in the process of developing a concept album, I tend to shy away from that just a little bit and try and just concentrate on making the songs good first. Threading an album and making it seem really seamless throughout the whole thing is one of the most difficult things that I've ever tried to do, and with *Endtroducing*, it just somehow clicked. But every album has to tell its own story, and I just felt like with the material that I prepared for this album, it would benefit less from a really explicit storyline.

So, you weren't trying to make a concept album, but there are points, like with the tracks "Mongrel..." and "...Meets His Maker" and "Mashin' On The Motorway" and "Blood On The Motorway," where you start to wonder if that was your intention at one point, with the way the songs tie into one another, or continue from one to the next.

I think that that's important. Any album should flow... I like to give myself like six weeks after all the songs are done, just to try and figure out different combinations of how they should sit, and it was fairly obvious before the songs were even finished — I knew that "Blood On The Motorway" and "Mashin' On The Motorway" just belonged together. And so, I actually created them to be together, to be almost like a continuous thing. And then "You Can't Go Home Again" wasn't part of that initial chain, but I felt like it just sounded really nice to have it after "Blood On The Motorway." It just seemed to really work there, and even though initially I had always intended "You Can't Go Home Again" to be the second song, or third song, it just didn't want to be there. I didn't want to force it to be where it didn't want to be. So, in that respect, I do spend a lot of time trying to do justice to the songs that I've done by putting them where they want to be.

The tone of a lot of the new material is very lively, almost really dance-y at points. Do you think that that's going to surprise people?

It's hard to figure, because, of course, to me, everything makes sense. I'm 100 percent sure that I've thought more about my music and how it ties in than anybody else alive... Early on, some of the first material that I was working on (for *Private Press*) was pretty down-tempo and moody — songs like "Fixed Income" and "Six Day War"... I became very conscious of, like, "OK, wait, I need to make sure that this album really reflects all the different emotions that a person can have," because I like music to reflect your daily existence. I don't like to make records that are just really linear. I was also influenced by (Radiohead's) *Kid A* and *Amnesiac*, in the respect that those albums are so diverse musically, and I really wanted to hear that, and I wanted my album to reflect that as well. So I just tried to make the lively songs very much so, and the dark songs pretty dark. I like that they're more extreme in that respect, whereas *Endtroducing* was kind of this flowing moodscape, if you will.

What are your thoughts on college radio and the impact it can have on music?

For a long time for me, in the town that I grew up in, college radio was my only source for rap music, in the early and mid-'80s. I mean, it's college radio that made Run-DMC's first album blow up and go gold in 1984, because the real political tone of it just resonated with college DJs... Of course, I don't know how much you're aware of my history with a station called KDVS, in Davis [California], the university station in the town I grew up in. It's the first radio station that I started playing mixes on, back around 1987. It's also the station where I met Chief Xcel (of Blackalicious) and Lyrics Born (of Latyrx) from Quannum, the rap label that I co-own. So, it's been incredibly influential in my career, just being able to go down to the station and check out all the new promos and get to hear stuff really early on, and shape my opinions really early on. It's a great resource and there's some really good shows out there... Especially now that radio has become, you know, like two companies own every station in America now, so what kind of a choice is that? And half of them own the record labels that are played, so it's really shady, and it's a shame, because it didn't always used to be that way. You used to be able to hear diversity on FM and AM radio. So college radio really is all we have on that level. It's like our own pirate radio. **NMR**



Yay, Brit-pop! If that's your feeling about the genre then stop reading right now, because A is anything but your typical Brit-pop band. One of the world's best-kept rock secrets since the 1999 release of *Monkey Kong*, A knew it wanted to be an internationally known rock band

and not just some European flame (à la David Hasselhoff). Now A is back with *Hi-Fi Serious*, an album with a bigger international rock sound, more dynamic guitar riffs and lyrics that will make even the strongest man break down and sing along — check out "Something's Going On" and call me a liar! "Nothing," the band's first single, is a wonderful rock song that will attract an even greater number of fans, but the buzz won't stop there. Make The Cowboy Robots

Cry (Sub Pop)

The Beachwood Sparks may actually be the best *Pet Sounds*-fixated group out there, and with the many Elephant 6 and twee-pop contenders for the throne, that's pretty damn impressive. Mixing country

twang with falsetto vocals, multiple harmonies and a stunning ear for catchy melodies, the L.A. quartet (once again featuring original drummer Jimi Hey) never misses a step on this new six-track outing. From back-country banjo playing to otherworldly noise, every moment of the recording comes through with crystal clarity and a disarmingly warm feel. Album opener "Drinking Water" is a true epic that's as ingeniously catchy as it is long, and by the time the charmingly rickety "Galapagos" leads into the full-on '60s pop of "Ghost Dance 1492," it's pretty difficult not to get swept up into the world of the Sparks. The group has refined its psychedelic tendencies a bit since the last recording, and what remains is both incredibly tasteful and wholeheartedly original — the perfect ingredients for a beautiful-sounding record.



What It Is (Kimchee)
Cordelia's Dad may well be the first band suitable for both the alternative rock crowd and the congregation of a snake-handling church. Indeed, the group's rocking takes on traditional and sometimes creepy folk tunes bridge a vast culture

gap, with delightful effect. The rock, however, has steadily slithered to the forefront on each of the band's four prior studio albums and on *What It Is*, the trio (Tim Eriksen, Peter Irvine and Cath Doss, also known as the indie-rock threesome, Io) again dials it up a notch (Praise Jesus! Pass the diamondback!). Sonically, some of the folksy aesthetic is lost, but the stark, vivid lyrical imagery remains (On "Camille's Not Afraid Of The Barn," a barn with a piss-and-cigarette stench is sung into holographic existence. The image of horror-stricken "Brother Judson" and his catatonia is depicted simply but effectively). That's not to say the rootsy sounds aren't entirely forsaken: "Dark and Rolling Eye" boasts the fiddle of erstwhile member Laura Fisk, and if you listen closely, you can hear acoustic instruments amidst the din. But why nitpick or analyze? *What It Is* is just plain good.



The Vibration Of Sound (Transparency)

If it's true that drummers have a bass drum where most of us have hearts, then Danny Frankel has an entire percussion studio hidden beneath his skin that would rival New York City's famed Manny's Music. At the

center of his latest album, *The Vibration Of Sound*, is Frankel's tremendous ability to produce both rhythm and melody on bongo drums. Throw into the mix his genius on at least a dozen other percussion instruments, plus the guitar and woodwinds of Woody Jackson and Pablo Calogero, respectively, and you have an album unlike much else out there. Frankel succeeds where many others fail in bringing percussion from the back of your head to center stage. *The Vibration Of Sound* is a sincere example of what experimental is on its own. On "Birdcage," Frankel's beats chase after the sounds of finches, but you'll wonder whether it's Frankel playing around the birds, or the birds trying to keep up with Frankel.

This Flag Signals Goodbye (Secretly Canadian)

Swearing At Motorists duo Dave Doughman and Joseph Siwinski bring the latest of their doleful, lo-fi gems with the endearingly casual *This Flag Signals Goodbye*. These 14 tracks run the gamut from aggressive, sweat-ridden

and distorted rockers to folk-tinged tunes to 30-second musical asides featuring acoustic guitars, tambourines and banjos. Sure, the Guided By Voices and Built To Spill comparisons will abound, but S@M is much more than just another copycat band. 


TRACK STAR

Lion Destroyed The Whole World (Better Looking Records)
There's an episode of "Pinky And The Brain" that's somewhat analogous to San Franciscan indie poppers Track Star. Pinky and Brain become characters on a children's show, endear themselves to the pint-sized viewers, then freeze

themselves; the idea is to return decades later to reap the adulation of the grown rugrats, who may or may not be in positions of power and willing to do P&B's bidding. Now, Track Star hasn't been gone for decades—much less frozen—but five years is a hell of a chasm between records. Thankfully, *Lion Destroyed The Whole World* makes the wait worthwhile. Its 11 tunes range from sedate ditties ("Feet First," "Amy, Tell Me Why") to sublimely poppy rockers ("The One We Play," "Cities on Cities,") that whiz by in a brief yet blissful 30 minutes. The listener, were s/he powerful, might be moved to hand Track Star the key to the world. But it's safe to say TS is more content to rock the planet than to rule it.




BUTCH WALKER

Left Of Self-Centered (Arista)
Usually reserved for hip-hop records, the "wacky skit" is used to open the solo debut from Butch Walker, the force behind dearly departed Marvelous 3. The on-target mock infomercial "Rock Vocal Power" stabs at hack rockers and their tech-

niques, but what's even more clever (or perhaps ironic) is how Walker manages to use rock cliché to his advantage on the rest of the record. The lead single, "My Way," comes off like '80s pop hair-metal done right, with handclaps, a "hey-ya, hey-ya" vocal hook and multiple choruses squeezed into just over three minutes. As he did in Marvelous 3, Walker gets that rock 'n' roll is a big show; these songs are never sluggish and their intentions (along with guitar and vocal hooks) are crystal clear. On "Suburbia," Walker runs through a yearbook of characters (the jock, the rich kid, the star-crossed lovers) that has a surprisingly dark air about it for such an upbeat glam rocker. Stay tuned way past the end of the record for another gag, where Walker goofs on smooth R&B. — Steve Ciabattoni


WAXWINGS

Shadows Of The Waxwings (Bobsled)

The Golden Vessyl Of Sound (K)
The cast of players and the titles of songs are irrelevant once the digital doorway to Yume Bitsu's *The Golden Vessyl of Sound* is opened. In fact, there are no song titles on this musical collage, just tracks. A noise-pop orchestra infuses musical ideas and textures from the last 200

years to spin the yarn of the Moth People and their attack upon the Small Towers Of The Elders. Fantasy-land imagery and lysergic musical improvisation place Yume Bitsu in a long, proud prog-rock tradition. Often the guitars, samples, horns, seagulls, vocals, synths, laptops, beats and whatever else is handy white wash into symphonic waves of sound. Ambient noise plays hide-and-seek with the melody, keeping the music from an endless drone or your typical weed-fueled, shoe-gazing alt-rock band. So Captain Trips, lean back and launch into innerspace with *The Golden Vessyl of Sound* in all its aural galactic wonder. Just make sure you're on autopilot, because you can't drive on Yume Bitsu. — Chris Larry

While its former members are individually busy with a number of new projects, the first official post-Fear Factory band is beginning to take shape. Guitarist Dino Cazares has enlisted ex-Built XL frontman Jason "Gong" Jones to handle the vocal chores for an unnamed new group. So far, the duo — which is still in search of a drummer and bassist — has reworked a few of the songs that were originally intended for use on Fear Factory's fifth album. Cazares is still contractually obligated to Roadrunner Records and demos of the aforementioned songs have been earmarked for submission to the label, so it is expected that Roadrunner will eventually release the fruits of this musical union. In a semi-related story, S.O.D. vocalist Billy Milano, looking to replace guitarist Scott Ian and drummer Charlie Benante (with whom Milano had a highly publicized falling out with earlier this year over that otherwise uneventful Anthrax *Behind The Music* special on VH1), approached Cazares and former FF drummer Raymond Herrera about joining the mighty *Stormtroopers Of Death*. While the notion of a new S.O.D. (Feartroopers, perhaps?) is pretty damn intriguing, the two camps won't be joining together anytime soon. "I approached Ray and Dino," Milano confirmed in a written statement. "They both have their own things going on at the moment, so [S.O.D. bassist] Danny [Lilker] and I wish them well. I have nothing but respect for their abilities as musicians. It would have been interesting to see where it could have gone." By the way, wait until you hear Milano's new band, the Jersey Rebel. We heard one cut and we're shitting ourselves! It's vintage Milano. • In even more related FF news, Cazares spoke in depth — and was extremely candid — about his former band and its eventual break-up in a recent Q&A with blabbermouth.net. When asked about the disappointing sales of FF's last studio effort, *Digimortal*, the guitarist stated that, "if Fear Factory would have just been writing the stuff that we had been writing, keeping it brutal and heavy and true, I think that it would have been a more successful record." In addition to criticizing the Factory's somewhat misguided musical direction, Cazares also described, in detail, vocalist Burton C. Bell's abrupt departure from the highly influential metal band. "I heard that before he came to rehearsals, he had gone out and bought a bottle of Jack Daniels and drank, so I'm assuming he came to rehearsal pretty much buzzed or drunk," Cazares claims. "Probably because he was looking for enough courage to come and tell the guys [that he was quitting]. So when [Bell] quit, me, [drummer] Raymond [Herrera] and [bassist] Christian [Olde Wobers] decided that that was gonna be it — that we were all gonna go our separate ways and do our own thing." According to Cazares, Bell told the band, "I don't wanna play with you guys, and I especially don't wanna play with you, Dino," before "literally" running "out the door." Hey, Dino... no offense, but after giving you some bad news that you probably wouldn't want to hear, we'd run from you too, bro. • The grease-paint bandits known as Mudvayne have enlisted David Bottrill (TOOL, Peter Gabriel) to handle the production duties for the group's follow-up to 2000's *L.D. 50*. The band will record the new effort near Minneapolis beginning in July and expects to release it late this year or early 2003. • Though it couldn't be confirmed at press time, rumors circulating on the web suggest that former Snot guitarist Mike Smith is the new guitarist for Limp Bizkit. Also unconfirmed is a barely audible, circular-like hum that may or may not be Lynn Strait spinning in his grave. • In an interview published on May 13 in Swedish newspaper *Expressen*, Pantera vocalist Phil Anselmo was asked whether or not the Cowboys from Hell would saddle up and record another album. "I would think so," he replied. "When, I don't know." We can certainly

understand the reasons why Anselmo couldn't/wouldn't be more specific about a potential target date for a new Pantera record. After all, the guy is currently moonlighting as the vocalist for two high-profile bands, namely Down and Superjoint Ritual, both of which have new albums out and heavy tour itineraries. But, in one of his most revealing comments about Pantera to date, Anselmo confessed that there are issues within the band that need resolution before it can move forward. "In Pantera, there are some things that are going on that I'd much rather not comment on," Anselmo disclosed. "I think that they... mostly [guitarist] Dimebag [Darrell], he has some things to root out in his life and make things right before me and him can get down and be happy again." Please fellas: be happy with each other. Then get *really fucking mad* and write a new album together. • In related news, the highly anticipated Superjoint Ritual, Skinlab and Speedealer tour will kick off on June 7 in Atlanta. Just as long as all 63 members of both bands are armed with gas-powered hedge clippers, maces and a handful of medieval crossbows, we're so there! On the other hand, if Mushroomhead bails out of the fight, it seems as though Slipknot's labelmates in Nickelback would be a suitable replacement for an ass-kicking. "If I ever see any of those fuckers," Taylor said of the Canadian band in the same colorful interview, "it's going to be brutal." • Guitarist Chris Bartlett has joined the growing list of six-string free agents after amicably parting ways with New England's All That Remains. Apparently, this is not a productive time to be a guitarist. In recent weeks, Hatebreed, Fleshcrawl, Queensrÿche (Kelly Gray is out), Machine Head (Ahrué Luster has departed) and Flaw have all split with their axemen. • Sure, there are more available guitarists floating around right now than dragons at a Dio show, but it took Powerman 5000 the better part of seven months to find a replacement for former bassist Dorian Heatsong, who split from the band last October. PM5K have announced that the group's new four-stringer is a gentleman from Norway named Sigve. "Everyone calls him Siggy," vocalist Spider One wrote in a post on the band's message board at www.powerman5000.com. "He is an amazing musician and I know that you all will be blown away by his energy and skills. This is a big moment! PM5K is back in full effect!" That's good, 'cause we were starting to loose some sleep over the whole thing. • Type O Negative has completed nine songs for its new album, due out on Oct. 29 through Roadrunner. • Medication, the band that features guitarist Logan Mader (Machine Head, Soulfly), Whitfield Crane (Life Of Agony, Ugly Kid Joe), Blunt (Adayinthelife) and Kyle Sanders (Piece Dogs, Skrew), will release its debut full-length, *Price Valium*, on June 18.

FIVE QUESTIONS WITH... SPEEDEALER'S JEFF HIRSHBERG!

"There's no one in this band that has any aspirations of being a rock star," *Speedealer* vocalist/guitarist Jeff Hirshberg tells CMJ. "It's about music; it's not about that crap." In that one sentence, Hirshberg manages to totally nail what makes *Speedealer* one of our favorite new bands. While most nü-metal groups are following the (insert sarcastic tone here) brilliant career path defined by bands like *Slaughter* and *Winger* (face it: nü-metal is this generation's hair metal), *Speedealer* is all about making good rock music. We recently nabbed some phone time with Hirshberg to discuss the band's latest offering, titled *Second Sight*, which was produced by some bass player named Jason Newsted.

Is it true that R.E.O. Speedwagon legally made the band drop "R.E.O." from its original moniker, R.E.O. Speedealer?

Yes. In 1997, they issued us a cease-and-desist order. We actually met them once and from what I understand, Kevin Cronin's son used to come out to our shows, but I've never met him.

Metallica's old bass player, Jason Newsted, produced *Second Sight*. How did you hook up with him?

Our A&R guy, Michael Alago, signed Metallica and remained friends with Jason through the years. He sent him a demo of our new material, and he really liked it and said that he wanted to produce it. We didn't have a producer at the time, so he and I started talking on the phone and I went to his house and everything just fell into place.

You guys are from Texas. And Texas, because we differ so much culturally, might as well be in a totally different country to us up here in the Northeast. How do you feel the state influences the sound and attitude of the band, if at all?

That's kind of like asking a blind person what it's like to be blind. They wouldn't know what it's like to see because they've never had that sense. So, I don't know, I've never created music outside of Texas. I know for a fact that *no one* in the band is influenced by wide-open spaces or oppressive heat. If anything, oppressive heat is detrimental to the creative process.

I read that you guys played 309 shows in 1999 alone.

Yes, and in 2000 we did about the same. It beats staying home and doing nothing. Dallas, Texas is not the greatest place to live on earth, but it is cheap and centrally located. So, it's a good reason to tour. Hopefully we'll keep being able to make the records we want to make and tour. It would be nice to pay our bills and see the world.

What's your favorite song on the new album to play live and why?

"Infinitesimal," the instrumental. I like it because I don't have to sing and it's the most interesting track to play. I will never get bored of it and there's room for improvisation in it where on other songs there's not. It's a seven-and-a-half-minute song, so with the set times we have right now, we unfortunately only get to play it a couple of times. But when we have our own shows on our days off, we'll play it then.

Second Sight (Palm)

The instant that vocalist Jeff Hirshberg's attention-grabbing belly screech cuts through the muddy onslaught of his bandmate's tuneful sludge rock at the beginning of "Leave Me Alone," the first cut on Speedealer's *Second Sight*, listeners will clearly recognize that they are about to embark on a gritty yet inviting

musical adventure. Not quite stoner-rock, and not totally speed metal, Speedealer is a raw amalgamation of both, sort of like Motörhead fist-fucking Fu Manchu. At the heart of the band's stoner-thrash is Hirshberg, a simple and effective vocalist with a keen lyrical style and a howl that hangs with the best of them. His strongest moments, on the aforementioned "Leave Me Alone," as well as "The Thin Air" and "Fractured," provide the album with impressive highlights. Yet, while Hirshberg is the aural glue that keeps Speedealer secure, his fellow bandmates — namely guitarist Eric Schmidt, drummer Harden Harrison (who sings lead vocals on two cuts) and bassist Rodney Skelton — are clearly connected with the same musical mind, as is brilliantly displayed on the instrumental "Infinitesimal." Other highlights to be found on *Second Sight* (which was produced by former Metallica bassist Jason Newsted) include the evocative "As Ever," "Kill Myself Tonight," the delightfully grimy "Blinded." Be sure to check out our *Five Questions With* Hirshberg in this very issue.



Three Humid Nights In The Cypress Trees (Victory)

Loud Rock fans ought to respectfully hoist their metal horns to the heavens as a sign of gratitude that, after a four-year hiatus, Florida's Bloodlet has returned. Produced by the band with Steve Albini (Nirvana, Neurosis), *Three Humid Nights In The Cypress Trees* is a

rare treat for metalcore fans; it's an album that draws from a deep well of dark emotions and musical ferociousness that few bands doing this style of music ever manage to dredge up. While it goes without saying that most of the metalcore bands existing today owe a great deal to Bloodlet (the trail blazed by this band during the mid-'90s has been traveled time and time again), *Three Humid Nights* is confirmation that these guys aren't quite ready to stop raising the bar on what we can expect from the genre. Vocalist Scott Angelacos is a criminally overlooked lyricist and his flair for rich prose comes bubbling to the forefront on this 12-track effort. On "The Way Of The Leeches" he howls, "His visions ride on angels wings/ his words are like a summer's breeze/ heaven sent and mostly bent/ restraint and compassion are already spent." This is clearly not the work of a mindless songwriter who is excited at discovering that "moon" and "June" make a nifty rhyme. And, Bloodlet is a band that is clearly still way ahead of the curve.

Soundbombing 3 (Rawkus)

Rawkus Records' third Soundbombing installment continues the Rawkus compilation tradition of bringing underground and lesser-known artists to the forefront. This time around, the label focused more on collaborations (the more left-field, the better) as opposed to merely putting together an album of hot tracks, both new

and old. On 3, more well-known tracks like Styles and Pharoahe Monch's "The Life" and Jonell's "Round And Round Remix" (featuring Method Man, Kool G Rap and Pharoahe Monch) lie alongside newbies like "Freak Daddy," the debut from Mos Def's hard rock act Black Jack Johnson. Some of the more inspired match-ups include the Talib Kweli/DJ Quik joint "Put It In The Air" — guaranteed to be heard booming from car stereos for the next few months — while Common and Kweli trade metaphors on Zap Mama's mystical "Yelling Away." Kweli can also be heard on the Roots' "Rhymes And Ammo." The funky "Crew Deep," with Skillz rapping over supremely funky Latin-tinged percussion, has a killer melodic line that resonates as deep in the chest as it does low on the keyboard. The track blends right into the remix of Kool G Rap's insta-classic, "My Life" (which includes the lyrical stylings of Capone N Noreaga). Q-Tip also makes a return to his hip-hop roots on his contribution, "What Lies Beneath" (finally! He raps again!). Rawkus couldn't have picked a better selection of artists and tracks to show non-believers that they still know hip-hop. This one's a classic already.

The intro to People Under The Stairs' O.S.T. begins:

"Do you get high?"

"Yes."

"Offa what?"

"Music."

With PUTS' first full-length in two years, prepare to get *fucked up*. PUTS (the L.A. duo Thes One and Double K) are not out to break any hip-hop molds. Rather, they are committed to bringing this oft-maligned art form back to where it belongs ("Hang Loose" and others sound like tracks straight off a Furious Five or Grandmaster Flash album). With its first album in two years, the duo remind listeners of the simple beauty of original hip-hop with funky beats and soulful samples highlighted by scratching and a percussive, easy and laid-back rhyming style. The chemistry between the two MCs is friendly and easy-going and they feed off each other in a generous way. Both are equally comfortable taking center stage or working in the background, all the while using music as their cue ("The Outrage" is a shining example of this). Is anyone out there strong enough to resist the infectious post-party head-nodder "The Suite For Beaver, part 2?" Doubt it. *OST* is the perfect summer album with its funky, good-time feel... it is perfect music for when you have absolutely nothing to do except listen. This one's not coming out of the CD changer for a long while. I think I'm in love!

ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

DOVES

They started out a decade ago as Sub Sub — a trio of Manchester club kids inspired by long evenings at the city's legendary Hacienda nightclub — to deliver feel-good dance music to feel-

good fans. The three released an album, *Full Fathom Five*, worked with the likes of Tricky and New Order's Bernard Sumner, and then nearly lost it all when their studio burned down, taking all of their equipment and the masters for their sophomore release with it. While many acts would have called it quits, the trio chose instead to return in a new incarnation, as Doves. Their 2000 debut release, *Lost Souls*, was a mesmerizing swirl of layered guitars, haunting vocals evoking dark rooms and storms at sea, and the odd pop tune thrown in for good measure. The record was a major critical success, leaving the band with only one challenge: how to top it. The answer lies in *The Last Broadcast*, an album that not only matches the quality of its predecessor, but finds the band moving in a bright new direction. Vocalist/bassist Jimi Goodwin recently spoke with CMJ about *The Last Broadcast*'s quick domination of the U.K. charts, how the group's latest transformation took place and the music that's been making his day.

Your new album debuted at No. 1 in the U.K. How does that feel? Are you surprised about it?

Yeah, we're surprised. But your life doesn't change or anything like that. When we were 18 or 19, we had a hit with the old band, Sub Sub, and I guess back then, you know, when you're a kid, you're sort of going, 'Right, this is it. Tomorrow it's all going to be different.' And it's not; it's just business as usual. But obviously we're thrilled to bits. It's been a long time coming, I suppose. We've really been working hard and determined for it to happen for Doves. And it is. It's good... it's weird.

Did you have those kinds of expectations for the record?

We're sort of ambitious, but we're not like, 'We must succeed at all costs.' Literally, the bottom line being, we've just got to make great albums. From track one to track 12 it's got to not make someone want to turn it off, or be overbearing. It's just got to be a flow. And that's always been the game plan. That was it with *Lost Souls* and it's the same now... We don't think like, 'Oh this going to take us to the next level,' or, 'This particular track is going to do it,' or, 'This one might work in the States, this one might work in England,' because you're fucking doomed if you think like that. You've just got to make honest to goodness beautiful music, and that's what we try to do.

With the first album, it seemed like the press was paying a lot of attention to the back story of the band. Did you feel that was overshadowing what you were trying to do at the time?

A little bit. But only when you get asked the same questions over and over. I mean, the story is an interesting story, of how we got to where we are now... It's good that, right now, all we get asked about is *Lost Souls* to now. They don't go back anymore — but I find myself making them go back. You know, we learned a lot

from those early days, clubbing and going out in Manchester. So I feel like bringing it up even if they don't ask it, because I'll just start thinking about those times or how we got here.

Was there any kind of conscious decision on your part to write more upbeat music for *The Last Broadcast* or did it just happen? It's not like we had board meetings, but early on, it was kind of like... well, fundamentally, without even saying it, we all just knew it's not *Lost Souls Part II*. Everything we've ever done, I think — even in the space of an album — there's lots of different strands and different influences hitting the fan. We're not the one-trick-pony guitar band. We've never aspired to be that.

A lot of artists are unhappy with the state of music right now. How about you?

I'm not unhappy at all... I think on the whole, there's fucking great bands coming out. There's a band from New York at the moment called the Rapture — I think they're going to be huge. I hope so... they sound like a real New York band, but inspired by early-'80s sort of Brit-funk. You know, like white guys who shouldn't really touch funk, but do and make it sound pretty good. They've got a single out called "House Of Jealous Lovers" and it's fucking great. They're going to support us hopefully at this place in Cornwall, in England, called the Eden Project. It's like a biodome, where they've created an indoor rainforest, basically. I've never been, but I've seen the photos and it looks amazing.

What other music have you been getting excited about?

I can't stop listening to that Richard Hawley album. He's a guy who plays in Pulp, who used to be in the Longpigs, a guitarist... He's from Sheffield, and he just makes really tender, almost '50s-inspired crooner-style music, but it's really nice. Also a bit of Morrissey in there, a bit of Chet Baker, a bit of Elvis, almost. It's not rock 'n' roll, or even ballad rock, but it's got a little bit of that flavor. It's just really great songwriting. It's called *Late Night Final*. It's really good, and CornerShop's new album is really good.

A lot of stories seem to make a big deal out of Doves being a very "Manchester" band, or having a very "Manchester" sound...

I don't know what a Manchester sound is. I'm really puzzled by that. It's such a diverse city — the bands that have come out of it, you know? It may be that anyone from the Northwest has got a certain way of looking at things, certainly in the humor... But we're not a regional thing, I hope. It's hopefully a worldwide thing — it's just anyone with good taste in music. We don't live or define ourselves by where we come from. I think that's pretty narrow-minded of anyone to want to be like that.

You introduced some of the new songs into your live set a while back. Were you trying to give people an idea that things were going to be a bit happier from now on?

Never happier, because there's always a bit of bittersweet in our stuff, lyrically. But, no, there is happiness in there and hope and positive stuff, but with a twist always. It's sort of our dry outlook on life.

How many watts is your station? How many people do you reach?

We are a big bad 125 watts. It's not much, but with a new transmitter installed over the winter holiday, we've suddenly found ourselves in places we've never been before. I wouldn't doubt that we could get three-quarters of the county we're in, which is around 280,000 people. So we've got damn good potential — it's just whether or not they listen.

What's the station motto?

"We Are What Music Sounds Like: The Point 91.1." It's a cool tagline that we adopted this year, after seeing it on the back of some of our really old hats. We are also working on a secondary name, something to the extent of "Fort Wayne's Non-Stop Alternative." We got a new logo this year and everything. A new image is always fun to play with.

How long have you been and will you be MD?

I started as MD my sophomore year. This year I have full reign, with assistance from Andy Mack and "Willo." Next year I will too, but Willo will be gone, and I'll begin to train my successor.

What do you do to build your station's audience?

I never shut the hell up about it. It's on my letter jacket, it's on my car, it's on my computer — if I had a dog... well, never mind. But I love the station. I love the business. We've tried so much this year, and I have to say it's worked pretty well. The biggest thing was switching to 24/7 and having that transmitter increase. Outside of that, we just try and pull a lot of promotions off

inside the school. Our logo was designed by a sophomore during a three-week logo contest last fall. We had whole classes turn in stuff for that.

What's the most fucked up thing that ever happened to you while you were on-air?

Countless numbers of people have walked in — we don't have a "radio phone system" per say, so it can ring in the middle of a shift. That can be really weird. (We're not allowed to put live callers out over the air, due to previous incidents.) Our Radio Director occasionally will walk in on us to see how we're doing, even if we're on air.

What was your most embarrassing radio-related moment?

Probably being out on the football field towards the end of halftime, helping with a field goal kick contest, attempting to broadcast live to the stadium PA and on-air. That didn't work. The PA didn't work like it was set up, and I wasn't aware of it. In turn, my voice was over air, not the PA. I had no clue, and I was friggin' pissed.

What's the best line a promoter ever used on you to get you to play a record?

Weekly emails are funny as hell if people have been having a good week. And if they haven't, it makes you feel that much better. I love people that beg; it cracks me up. Of course, everybody has their own personality and catchy lines, and I couldn't list 'em all here if I wanted to. All the people I deal with are awesome, and I wanna shout-out to them now. Thanks for workin' with me! Just remember, all of you will always have a little special space in my heart. Whether or

not I show compassion is a different story.

Every station has that one old dude from the local town that's been doing a show since anyone can remember. Who is it at your station, what kind of show do they do, and what's their deal?

My U.S. History teacher Tom Stephenson, a.k.a. the Blues Man. Stephenson has been doing the show since the station started, practically. As the moniker hints, he hosts the "Blues Review." He's just cool enough to keep pumpin' out some kickin' tunes every week during the school year. He does the lunch shift, noon to 12:45 p.m., pre-recorded because of class, but it runs just fine. He's a great person all around, and it's impossible to say how big of an asset he is to the station.

Are you interested in going into the music industry? Doing what?

Hell, yeah. Doing what, I don't know yet. Big cities are cool, but I'm more of a mid-sized city person. But I love music, I dig it — it's gotten me out of some of the most depressing times I've ever had, never failing. I mean, for God's sake, I have a friggin' subwoofer for my computer. Does that say much?

Any shoutouts?

I have to plug something for high schoolers that actually chill with CMJ: hit me up! I've been working on starting a high school radio discussion email list, and so far I've gotten some minor pull with it. Go visit <http://groups.yahoo.com/group/HSSRadio/> and check it out, then sign up. I'm big into giving back, and this is one of the ways. Sharing tips and ideas. I know we sure needed it.

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COPE WITH IT

Last night I was speaking with a record biz cohort about several "vital issues" (aren't they all?) surrounding the business, when out of his "experienced" mouth came the question, "Do you really think independent retail makes a difference anymore?" Considering this came from a guy who's not just a label geek, but an educated one at that, I was shocked. After all, we had just spent last week (CMJ's cover story) explaining the importance of independent coalitions and the need these stores have to band together. Apparently, the magazine hadn't yet made it into the hands of the record label.

Now don't worry, I'm not going into my usual tirade on why indie retail is important. If you as a label or distribution company still don't understand, I can't help you. What I do want to do is to try and understand where this thought process actually comes from (though I really don't think it's too difficult to figure out). According to SoundScan, close to 80% of music sold today is accounted for by the major chains (essentially five accounts we can all name). That being the case, labels have to take a logical look at the remaining 20% and decide where to place their ad dollars/support in order to get the most bang for those bucks.

Let's take a closer look here. Could these SoundScan breakdowns be leading people to believe, and even perpetuate, a myth about indie-to-major-account sales ratios? Granted, while SoundScan may be the best system we have for tabulating historical sales info, it also seems to control our definitions for major accounts (who gets lumped in or

thrown out of the mix), which has consequently weakened the perception and effectiveness of who makes up categories like "Independents," "Online Sales," and their ubiquitous and ill-defined "Others." Is Amazon considered an "Online Sales" account or a "Major Chain?" Is Manifest Discs (CIMS) considered an "Independent" or a "Major Chain?" It's time to dig a little deeper into these numbers.

CIMS President Don Van Cleave brought up an excellent point in one of his emails a few weeks ago where he pointed out that many CIMS stores where counted as "Major Chains" by SoundScan, thus preventing the full and true picture of the independent accounts impact on sales from being taken. Is it really necessary to remind the music business how instrumental these indie accounts have been in breaking *O Brother Where Art Thou?*, the Hives, Jack Johnson, White Stripes, Norah Jones or John Mayer? Shall we tally up the number of artists K Mart, Wal-Mart, Circuit City, and Best Buy have recently broken (we're not just talking about selling mass quantities)? If a label ignores or minimizes the sales of independent retailers, then it is my belief it is out of touch with what needs to be done to break new artists on the street. As I have stated so many times in the past, if the indies represent even just 10% of the overall business, it just may be the most important 10% of an artists' sales life. Think about it!

New albums I like: Marah's *Float Away With The Friday Night Gods* and Sonic Youth's *Murray Street*. Go Lakers!

SPEAK OUT

In response to Cope's comments last week about the music downloading consumer and the label's current CD pricing practices, Alligator Records' Bruce Iglauer decided to weigh in.

It would be nice if we could find a way to explain to consumers that we labels have many additional costs of which they're unaware. Perhaps we could make it clear that they can't compare self-released CD

prices to label-released ones. For example, we have to pay song publishers, who in turn have to pay songwriters. If a band writes their own songs and releases their own homemade album for \$9.99, they probably aren't setting aside royalties to pay themselves for their own songs. When a "real" label takes the album over, its costs (just for the songs) are about a dollar higher than the band's since it now has to pay the artist for using those songs (before any of the labels costs are recouped). And of course

the band probably isn't sending out 5000 radio, press and in-store promo copies either; they're probably not hiring two or three indie promo people whose cost may be recoupable, but only if the band recoups (the label eats the costs if the band doesn't).

Unlike artists who control their own songs, we can't offer free promo downloads without the approval of the publishers, and we certainly can't offer downloads for sale unless royalty rates have been agreed to with

both the publisher and the artist. Consumers need to understand there is so much we *can't* do or offer because we have to obey laws, contracts, copyrights, artist agreements—factors the downloading public doesn't care to know when asking, "Why can't downloads be available easily and cheaply? If they were, we might consider paying for them!"

As far as variable pricing goes, I'm *fine* with all CDs being priced around \$16 in the stores (though I don't think the public

I just met another music junkie at the WFMU collector show, Bob Perry, who owns a couple of the coolest stores out there in North Miami Beach. Bob is a namedropper, but he's got enough credibility to make you believe each story is true and they are. Both of us were bitten by the vinyl virus in our youth and the disease still lingers. Bob originally moved to Florida from Maine in 1967, and his resume since then has become a virtual slice of the biz. He first started in distribution and within a few years had worked with many of music's great legends. Bob's resume during that

indictable, word. One more turn at Warner's convinced Bob to get out of the corporate world and dive into music retail. He opened his store, Blue Note Records, in 1984. That early location was just 500 square feet. Since then, Blue Note has moved twice and expanded to a double space of over 3000 square feet: one side that houses urban, latin, world, reggae, folk, and blues titles, while the second smaller side houses rock, alternative, and punk. Bob also moved all Blue Note's jazz, vinyl and collector sections to a unique two-story space about a mile away in a non-retail area, next to the water in an unbelievable atmosphere with iguanas out back and manatees in the front. Over the years many artists and personalities have stopped by to shop, including: Sun Ra, Jimmy Page, Bobby Womack, John Fogerty, Africa Bambata, Snoop Dogg, Lenny Kravitz, Bobby Byrd, and Shaq.
