
Bunkka (Maverick)

Imagine that you've got some scenester clout and you've wormed your way into a chic and intensely private L.A. club. It's 2 a.m. and the festivities are *just* warming up. Sweaty, barely clad folks who look like they have been torn from the pages of *GQ* and *Vogue* surround you. After finishing off your first Red Bull and vodka cocktail, you start to take notice of the celebrity clientele: Jane's Addiction frontman Perry Farrell, Grant Lee Phillips, Ice Cube, Emiliana Torrini, Nelly Furtado, Tricky, Hunter S. Thompson, and Shifty Shellshock (nice name, bro) from Crazy Town — who let this guy in? — are all there. It's shaping up to be a great night, no? Well, Paul Oakenfold's latest full-length, *Bunkka*, is the aural equivalent of that fantasy evening, with each of the aforementioned artists making an appearance on the album. Arguably dance music's most popular DJ, Oakenfold is a pivotal section of the bridge that connects the worlds of techno and pop music and, with the 11 tracks that comprise *Bunkka*, he continues to successfully link that gap. This platter's first single, "Ready Steady Go," just begs to be spun at raves until the sun rises, but the real gems here are "Get Em Up" (which boasts a fiery lead vocal from Ice Cube), "Time Of Your Life" and "Southern Sun." — **Kevin Boyce**


HOWIE DAY

Australia (Epic)

It seems the singer/songwriter domain has become quite a crowded genre these days, making it difficult for one to stand apart from the rest. Stepping up to the plate, however, is Howie Day, with his impressive debut, *Australia*. Day doesn't re-invent the proverbial rock 'n' roll wheel by any means, but when it comes to writing catchy and sophisticated acoustic pop songs, there aren't many who can do it better. For someone who is just 21 years old, Day certainly has a knack for writing hooks that will stick with you for days on end, not to mention the fact that his smooth tenor can romance your ears with a peaceful lullaby. On the opening "Sorry So Sorry," the introductory strums over automated beats provide a cozy support for Howie's velvety voice before it launches into a storm of drums, guitars and effects on the chorus. And when Day sings, "When she says she wants someone to love/ I hope you know she doesn't mean you," on the lonesome-sounding "She Says," the truth hits deeply. The dreamy "Ghost" seems as though it would snuggle in nicely between the Calling and the Goo Goo Dolls on VH1's *Top 20 Countdown*, making *Australia* sound like a lovely place to visit. — **Louis Miller**

The Book of Spectral Projections (Rainbow Quartz)


Psychedelic commando Brother JT named an album by his band the Original Sins *Acidbubblepunk*. Brother JT's new terminology also names the gooey, beautiful mess that is Outrageous Cherry. Hailing from Detroit Rock City, these veteran psych-rockers are finally seeing a domestic release for *The Book of Spectral Projections*, originally released in the U.K. last year by Alan McGee's Poptones label. This double-length album unfolds into a conceptual collection of space-pop with a non-linear storyline about parallel dimensions, spirit worlds, sorcery and electric children. The guitar is the monolith here that all the monkeys dance to and is laden with flange, distortion, wah-wah, fuzz, loops and played with flashes of Dave Davies, Link Wray, Eddie Hazel and Roger McGuinn.

"Everything Is Back To Normal" features the riff from R&B stomper "My Baby Like To Bugaloo" and proves the universe makes sense. Sounds emanating from the speakers will disorient you with droning electrified mantras and vertigo-inducing volume until you're a quivering lunatic in the corner. But just when the end is nigh, Outrageous Cherry will massage you back to sanity with star-crossed ballads of redemption that make you smile, nod your head and stare into the sun. — **Chris Larry**

LOS LOBOS

Good Morning Aztlan (Mammoth)

Did anyone say "road trip"? Pack up the Jetta, folks, for the new effort from Los Lobos will make you itch for the open highway. *Good Morning Aztlan* hits the ground running from the get-go with the Texas-blues driver "Done Gone Blue," and from there, the group winds its way through other well-produced blues and lite-radio gems equipped with just a pinch of sass to give them flavor. Although a few platitudes and clichés (both lyrical and musical) seem to have put a restraint on the boys' more heartfelt musical passions, the more Latin-influenced "Malaque," "Maria Christina" and "Luz De Mi Vida" stand apart from the rest. This album is likely to find a home somewhere in the jukeboxes of the more upscale martini bars of the western deserts, as the band's roughness and grit has been polished to a high sheen on this effort. Los Lobos continues to carry on the tradition of blues and good old rock 'n' roll despite all the band has seen and heard in the past 25 years. Thank god we have musicians like them to carry the torch. — **Lisa Hageman**

INDUSTRY NEWS

Although the specific dollar amount of webcast royalty fees was not determined at press time (a decision was scheduled to come down on June 20), the U.S. Copyright Office indicated that there will be "interim" reporting requirements which will be significantly down from the original 18 data points per song that the RIAA and SoundExchange originally lobbied for. "Likely" to be required from webcasters will be artist, title, album (if available), label (if available) and total number of performances. • Blue Note recording artist Norah Jones, whose debut album *Come Away With Me* has been blowing people away for months, recently signed with EMI Music Publishing. Meanwhile, the music publisher welcomes Shawn "Tubby" Holiday to the position of Creative Director. • In case you haven't heard, the Reverend Al Sharpton and famed attorney Johnny Cochran have formed a coalition that they say will investigate whether record companies are financially exploiting artists. The "dynamic duo" has already signed Michael Jackson as the coalition's first member. Jackson's relationship with his label Epic is rumored to be on shaky ground. • Fordham University's WFUV has proposed reducing the height of its transmission tower from 480 feet to 380 feet because of previously determined environmental damage it has caused the nearby New York Botanical Garden (a registered historical site).

LABEL NEWS

Zomba Music Group, parent company of Jive Records, has exercised its put option (scheduled to expire in December) for Bertelsmann Music Group (BMG) to purchase the remaining shares of Zomba that it

doesn't already own by year's end, provided all of the regulatory hurdles are jumped. BMG acquired a 25 percent stake in Zomba's publishing division in 1991, then a 20 percent stake in its record division in 1996. •

Palm Pictures recently announced several layoffs in its music division, including Head of Promotion Paul Langton, National Director/Promotion Dan Connelly and

College/Non-Comm representative Jeff Goodman, plus local reps Allison Smith (Chicago) and Steve Smith (Atlanta).

Head of Music Mike Bone and West Coast National Greg Seese are holding down the fort for now. • Also downsizing is Gold Circle Records, where SR./VP Promotion Alan Oreman, VP/Promotion Mike Klein, VP/Rock Promotion Joel Habbeshaw, National Promotion Directors Leslie Marques and Al Risi, plus Promotion Coordinator David Kotton are looking for their next opportunities. Please reach out to these industry friends from Palm and Gold Circle in any way you can! • It's now official.

Elektra Entertainment Group welcomes home Pete Rosenblum as VP/Alternative promotion from the same position at Mammoth Records. Rosenblum was last with the label in 1998 as National Director/Alternative Promotion. Elektra has also announced the promotion of Andrew Hilsberg from National Sales Manager to

It was bound to happen sooner or later: a hipster's dream come true, the White Stripes and the Strokes are teaming up for a brief series of joint shows in their respective hometowns of Detroit and New York. The first will take place at New York City's Radio City Music Hall on Aug. 15 and will see the two bands take the stage for one of four shows the groups will play together, including one more NYC gig at Irving Plaza, and two in Detroit. At

press time, the Irving

Plaza date is tentatively scheduled for Aug. 16, according to the White Stripes official website, with one Detroit show confirmed for Chene Park on Aug. 9. The second, at Clutch Cargo's, will most likely happen on Aug. 8. Each band will headline the concerts in its own home cities.

In other White Stripes news, for anyone who still believes Jack White's assertion that he and partner Meg White are actually brother and sister, as opposed to a divorced couple, website gloriousnoise.com has provided further evidence of the duo's once-sacred bond. Over the past few weeks, the site posted a copy of a marriage license, then a divorce certificate, stating that the Whites were first wed in 1996, before dissolving the union in 2000. Both documents appear to be authentic. • Fans wishing for a behind-the-scenes look at the making of an album by their favorite band are in for a treat

this summer — assuming their favorite band is Wilco. *I Am Trying To Break Your Heart*, the documentary chronicling the making of the group's CMJ chart-topping opus, *Yankee Hotel Foxtrot*, has been scheduled for theatrical release in three major cities. Directed by Sam Jones, the film picks up just after the untimely departure of drummer Ken Coomer and follows the whole story behind the recent album, including the band's break from Reprise Records and the departure of yet another member, guitarist Jay Bennett.

The documentary will open in New York City on July 26, followed by Aug. 2 openings in Chicago and Los Angeles. • After months at work on a new album, Swedish phenoms the Cardigans have reportedly trashed all their recent recordings, opting to start the album-making process over from scratch. Frontwoman Nina Persson told Norwegian newspaper *Vedens Gang* the group was disappointed with the way the recent sessions, which took place in England, Spain and Sweden, had turned out. "Right now it all feels totally hopeless," Persson said. "We have at least another month left in the studio."

However, the group still plans to have the new disc — the follow-up to 1998's multi-platinum selling *Gran Turismo* — ready for release this fall, when the band will celebrate its 10th anniversary. "We wasted so much time at the start, that

we are paying for it now," Persson said, before adding, on a brighter note, "For the Cardigans, when it comes to quality, we always live up to what we want to attain." Persson released a solo album overseas last year, produced by Sparklehorse's Mark Linkous, under the moniker A Camp. That disc has yet to receive a U.S. release. • Two years after the tragedy at the Roskilde music festival in Denmark that left nine people dead and dozens injured as a result of a massive crowd surge towards the stage during a

set by Pearl Jam, a Danish court has ruled that no charges will be filed against the festival's organizers in relation to the incident. The decision came after a second inquiry was made into the disaster. "There is no reason to presume that something punishable has been done," said the state

prosecutor in a June 11 statement. • Album news: Sinead O'Connor is working on a collection of traditional Irish songs, due for release in October. The disc, *Sean Nos Nua*, provides a modern spin on the traditional material and will feature a number of renowned Irish folk musicians, as well as production from

Adrian Sherwood and Donal Lunny; Badly Drawn Boy is in Los Angeles working with producer Tom Rothrock towards a September street date for a real second album to follow the recent release of the *About A Boy*

soundtrack. BDB, a.k.a. Damon Gough, told *Rolling Stone*, "I like to think it's a hybrid of the naïveté of *Hour Of Bewilderbeast* and the slightly more sophisticated and perhaps cleaner kind of thing from the soundtrack"; Violent Femmes' Gordon Gano has a solo album on the way, just as his band celebrates its 20th anniversary. Entitled *Hitting The Ground*, the record features a slew of guest vocalists, including Lou Reed, PJ Harvey, Frank Black and They Might Be Giants, and will hit stores in either late summer or early autumn; R.E.M. has been recording demos for its next album back home in Georgia after Peter Buck's recent acquittal on air-rage charges in the U.K. Recording will most likely begin later this year, with the record dropping in 2003. • The current incarnation of Guns N' Roses is promising to finally tour the U.S. this fall, after completing a string of Asian and European summer shows. The band's last European tour was scrapped after guitarist Buckethead — who, for those who don't know, actually wears a bucket on his head — became ill. Meanwhile, next year will mark the one-decade point since the group, which now features Axl Rose as its sole remaining original bandmember, last released an album. The near-mythical CD *Chinese Democracy* still remains without a release date. • Former Smiths sex symbol Morrissey will head out on the road in the U.S. in August, for a series of dates that will see him stopping off in a number of Western and Southwestern states. There will be 13 shows in all, including one in Alaska, along with a break for two performances in Japan. On the final dates of the tour, in California, Moz will serve as support for Mexican rockers Jaguares.

CAROLINE DISTRIBUTION FIERCELY INDEPENDENT

Greenwich Village, New York, 1983. Some of the music business' most independent minds launch one of the industry's most fiercely independent companies, Caroline Distribution. From a single apartment, Caroline was created for the sole purpose of importing new wave and punk. In its first year alone, the small company employed a mere five people and sold nearly 200,000 units (mostly vinyl). Nineteen years later, Caroline Distribution now employs over 100, ships to more than 700 accounts (mostly mom-and-pop indie stores) from a 50,000-square-foot Memphis warehouse (opened in 1996) and has become a major force in U.S. independent distribution.

Why has Caroline become so successful, especially in an age when major distribution companies and labels are gripping the commercial radio/video airways and dominating the landscape of major accounts like never before? Caroline's success can be directly attributed to its uncanny ability for recognizing and supporting independent talent. The company's diverse roster over the years now reads like a who's who of small and large independents record labels, including: Astralwerks, Ninja Tune, Fat Wreck Chords, Ultra, Go Kart, Nuclear Blast, Century Media, Hopeless, Nitro, Sequence,

Definitive Jux, Coup d'Etat, High Times, Warp, Ipecac, Teepee, Quannum, Jade Tree, Saddle Creek, Earache, Armed, Emperor Norton, Radikal, Nettwerk and more.

Caroline has built itself on a history of cutting-edge artists who have helped define and redefine music's own history. Just a sampling from its graduating class includes Smashing Pumpkins, White Zombie, Fugazi, Mos Def, Nirvana, Monster Magnet, Ben Folds Five, Chemical Brothers, Fatboy Slim, Crystal Method, Hole, Coldcut, Air, Rancid, Pennywise, Offspring, Mudhoney, Primus, Mighty Mighty Bosstones, Blink-182, Green Day, Soundgarden, Less Than Jake, White Stripes and many others. All of these artists got their start on Caroline-distributed labels.

CMJ Retail recently sat down with a Caroline GM Rick Williams to get his perspective on Caroline's birth, growth, success and vision for the future.

Where do you put yourself in the pack of independent distributors? And what makes Caroline different from the others?
We are up there with the biggest and best. But our philosophy is to

push the envelope, to search for new and interesting music, to help independent labels and artists get their music to consumers. And what makes us different is that we still consider independent record stores to be the core of our business.

What does Caroline do that other distributors ignore?

I don't think any one of us [distributors] is ignoring anything these days. It would be fatal to do so. It's more a matter of degrees and emphasis. As I said before, we still keep the independent customers as a major priority.

On the flipside, what does Caroline choose not to do and why? Are you non-exclusive?

We don't do classical, country, gospel and jazz. Although I'm sure if some crazy young classical pianist came along who didn't really fit into the mainstream, we'd take a look, especially if he smashed his piano to pieces after each performance. We are always on the lookout for new and interesting projects and don't limit ourselves by looking for one thing in particular. Exclusivity is important to us, but we do carry some non-exclusive labels. However, at this point we probably would not enter into any new non-exclusive arrangements.

What are your relationships like with both major and independent retail?

We work with independent coalitions like CIMS, LINCS, Music Monitor Network and the DMRC. We now have some more urban-leaning projects, so we hope to be working more closely with some of the urban coalitions soon. As far as major retail goes, we have good relationships — those accounts are, of course, essential to maximizing sales potential. And for the most part, they are very understanding and supportive of what we do.

How difficult is it to get new releases of unknown groups or labels into one-stops and retailers with small or non-existent budgets?

Obviously, we have to do this a lot. It is very difficult, but because we have been doing it for quite some time, we have been able to build relationships with our customers to a point where they are willing to trust us and often take the leap of faith that we ask of them.

There's a lot of uncertainty out there in the music business. From Caroline's vantage point, how do you see the future of the business shaping up?

For starters, independent retail certainly has its work cut out for it these days. The competition is brutal. It's remarkable that anyone still has the balls to try, but there are special people who through hard work and a love of music will always be there. Most of those involve themselves in their local music scene and work hard to promote customer loyalty. That's harder to do at the major chain level, since major retailers are less likely to carry catalog in depth the way they used to. This is an area where the independents can have an advantage. I wouldn't be surprised to see more consolidation at the major retail level this year. Though online retail is showing good growth for us, I'm not sure how healthy it all is. For the foreseeable future, I don't think anyone can really say, but if you know someone who is convinced they know, I'd love to meet them because they must be smoking some really good shit. One thing to note, though, is that at some point digital downloads are going to become a real factor in the sale of music. It's a matter of when, not if.

Given that as a backdrop, what about Caroline's future?

After last year the whole industry is still reeling. Caroline has been fortunate enough to have a good start this year though, and over the coming year we will hopefully continue our growth. Not an easy thing to do in this market, but we've been lucky. Hopefully, the market will stabilize and we will be able to continue doing what we do.

In a nutshell, few distributors are better equipped to read and broadcast the barometric effect of a new group than a distributor with its pipeline fully connected to both independent and major retail. Caroline is in a unique position to not only recognize when a smaller label has more than a cool new release on its hands, but can also use its credibility and know-how to take those new artists and labels to their next levels of success. Because it stays true to those early independent values, Caroline is poised to withstand the challenges of the ever-changing music business. Its independent roots, product mix and customer base have given Caroline the knowledge, experience and credibility to weather the storms. **NMR**

Free All Angels (Kinetic)

This Northern Irish foursome has never quite duplicated its immense British success in the U.S., but times may be about to change. The group's first three fuzzy pop records boast a pack of solid, grimy-yet-catchy hits that sound equally influenced by Nirvana and Abba. Now, for

better or worse, Ash seems to have taken a turn for the emo-core. Since its debut, 1996's *Trailer*, Tim Wheeler's finely-crafted lyrics have been teetering on the brink of sappiness, only to be saved from sinking into a pit of sentimentality by thrashing guitar riffs and crazy drums that smash at just the right nanosecond. On *Free All Angels*, Ash preserves its standard punk-rock sweetness, but now the sound is denser, more orchestrated and rich with mid-20s maturity. Nothing on *Free All Angels* is as gimmicky as "Kung Fu," their ode to Jackie Chan from the 1996 release, *1977*; instead, earnest tracks like "Walking Barefoot" celebrate summer love with unabashed sincerity. It's emo for sure, but it's been seasoned with years of beer-guzzlin', karate-lovin' pop-star glory.

most complete effort to date. *Counterfeit* is one of those rare dance records that will have mainstream appeal without being smothered in heaps of gouda. Tracks such as the radio-friendly "Boomerang," "Half a Cell" and "You Are" are reminiscent of Kosheen's vocal-breakbeat style. Fans of seriously hard breaks should check out "Hit The Decks," "Straight Laid Out" and "Unbreakable," while the funkier side is represented though "Breakbeat Suckers" and "Ghettoblaster." With an assorted mix of fashions there is something here for any dance music fan. Cirrus has

stepped up to the plate and produced its best record to date — one that the Crystal Method has unsuccessfully tried to make for years. — **Justin Kleinfeld**







Black Rooster (Dim Mak) Forget the power trio — the power duo is where all the action is. Take, for example, the Kills, a U.K.-based duo that just released its debut EP. As raw and caustic as a mouth full of sand, *Black Rooster* is bluesy punk rock stripped down to its most basic, honest

elements and undiluted by pretension. And that, friends, is a beautiful thing. Float Away With The Friday Night Gods (Artemis)

When Marah fans heard that Bruce Springsteen was guesting on the group's latest album, they probably expected more of the blues-tinged folk rock the Philly band was so renowned for — this time with the approval of their hero, the Boss.

What no one could have guessed, including Springsteen himself, is the dramatic departure from that sound the band would make on this, their third record. FIVE QUESTIONS WITH... OTEP

When OTEP performs on the Second Stage during this summer's Ozzfest, someone might want to hold the hands of the guys in Adema and Drowning Pool so they don't get too scared when the band is onstage. Fronted by the ultra-powerful Otep Shamaya, OTEP is one of meanest female-fronted groups existing today. We recently nabbed a little phone time with Otep (the person) to discuss the band's major label debut, Sevas Tra, as well the frustrations of being a strong woman in a male-dominated genre.

OTEP is an anagram for "poet." Do you feel that lyricists in many of today's metal bands could benefit from studying more classic or contemporary prose?

It's important for writers and vocalists to keep their heads full of words; that's our weaponry. It's always nice to have the arsenal stocked. It would benefit most everyone to broaden his or her experiences in the literary world.

Does having a forum to open up and be vulnerable, as you are at numerous points on *Sevas Tra*, allow you to conquer inner demons?

Yes. That's one of the reasons I started vocalizing, because it was so liberating. It allowed me to emancipate myself from all that negative energy and experiences that were trying to force me into a ridged identity. By allowing myself to be absolutely pure and spiritually naked — when there is no armor and it's just me — it's no longer flawed, it's just what it is. I am able to let the subconscious to take over and just sort of travel through those emotions.

Music is therapy for you, isn't it?

Absolutely. Art can be therapy for anyone. It doesn't mean that you have to be Picasso, or William Blake; just the act of creating is so important. It doesn't mean that creating has to be your job, or that you're going to change the world, but you are changing yourself and that is what is the most important.

I would imagine it gets annoying when people focus so much on the fact that you're a woman in a male-dominated genre.

Sometimes, especially when they try to compare me to other women vocalists. Why not classify all of us as vocalists? I think because there are so few women vocalizing in this genre — aggressive music — it's easy for them to do that. It is difficult is because the first thing that people do is judge me, and woman in general, by what we look like and that has no bearing on the type of music that I am writing.

I think when men hear a voice as powerful as yours they get intimidated and want to pigeonhole you and compare you to another woman and not judge you equally. You're being judged by a different standard.

I think so. Some guy came up to me once and said, 'You kick Kittie's ass!' and my bass player was like, 'Well, what about Corey from Slipknot? Doesn't she kick his ass too?' And he said that to make a point, because I don't think someone would walk up to Corey and say, 'Man, you kick Jonathan Davis's ass!' They don't even look at it like that because they're two different bands, but for us — woman vocalists — we're all the same person.



KORN

Untouchables (Immortal-Epic)

Whether or not KoRn's fifth album, *Untouchables*, was worth the \$4 million-plus price tag to record it is up for endless debate (it's not — no album is). Regardless, fans, critics and cynics alike can say what they will about these nü-metal architects. As its credibility with traditional metal fans diminished, KoRn

evolved over the past eight years into one of the most influential bands in rock music. Since its self-titled debut in 1994, this Bakersfield, California troop has delivered a surplus of memorable gems ("Blind," "Faget," "Got The Life" and "Freak On A Leash" to name a few) defined by a trendsetting style of guitars tuned down to a notch just above indistinguishable, bone-quaking bass lines and innovative vocals that go from intensely vulnerable to freaking-the-fuck-out all within a single verse. *Untouchables* finds KoRn at a crossroads. Easily the band's most commercially accessible album to date, this 14-track effort is sure to both please and infuriate die-hard fans. While cuts like "Embrace" (the best song on the album), "Wake Up Hate," "Blame" and the undeniably catchy singles "Here To Stay" and "Thoughtless" are sure to make the KoRn Kids twist their hair braids and pull up their sagging jeans in lackadaisical delight, other offerings, such as "Hollow Life," "Hating," "One More Time" and "Alone I Break" might make them wonder just what the hell their beloved band is doing sounding so sweet and radio-friendly. Either way, KoRn continues to dominate the genre it spawned and, as always, we will continue to follow the leader.

CHEVELLE

Wonder What's Next Four-Song Sampler (Epic)

Since its 1999 debut, *Point #1*, Chicago's Chevelle has matured at a pace that is comparable to the alarmingly swift rate at which a Great Dane transcends from a cuddly puppy into a 150-pound ball-cruncher. Blending the emotional characteristics of a

band like Far with the chugging guitar riffs of Helmet, Chevelle can be likened to what TOOL might sound like if it wrote four-minute radio singles instead of sweeping, experimental epics. What makes Chevelle perform as well as the '70s muscle car that the band takes its name from is that its three members — all brothers — know how to write solid songs that have plenty of punch and are intensely focused. This radio-only sampler features four cherry-picked tunes from *Wonder What's Next*, the band's Epic debut, and each track is so memorable that it's bound to stick in listener's heads like *Crazy Glue* on bare flesh. "The Red" and "Comfortable Liar" are perfect examples of Chevelle's indisputably strong songwriting abilities, while "Family System" — a track that could have been on TOOL's *Undertow* — is one of the band's more furious offerings. "Send The Pain Below" features a smoldering bridge that begins at around two-and-a-half minutes in during which vocalist Pete Loeffler opens the throttle (pun intended) and shows just what a great vocalist he is. General Motors wishes it could make a car as badass as this band.

As the new high priestess of hip-hop, Khia, watches her first single "My Neck, My Back" creep its way into rotation up past the Mason-Dixon line (she is already blowing up down South) and her video gaining momentum on MTV. We stopped by the Artemis Records offices to chat with the artist, who dropped some knowledge about being a woman in the male-dominated hip-hop world, finding her king and above all, keeping it real.

Is it intimidating being a woman in hip-hop?

No. They need me; they've been needing me cause they've been doggin' us for a long time. I'm keeping it real. I'm not trying to exploit myself. It's just about pleasing me, making me feel good, respecting me. "My Neck, My Back"... it ain't all about what you got, it's about making me feel good like, rub my feet.

If you achieve success, how would you carry that success differently than the other women out there right now?

I like somebody that promotes respect, strength and truth. A lot of the female rappers out there today let men write for them so it's coming from a man's perspective and I'm not gonna write something that I'm not gonna do. So when you rap about these things, these people listening to you are thinking that's the way you live. Don't rap make-believe. When I'm rapping, either I've been through it, or I've seen it. I rap the truth.

You say you've learned from mistakes. What have you gone through in your life that's reflected in your music?

Just situations. Just with guys, my mom, growing up, doing things your mom told you not to do and you get in trouble because you do them anyway, being able to look back on that and say, "It's not worth it."

Tell me about your relationship with your mom.

That's my girl. My mom passed away a year ago and it's been a year since I've been having my success so I know it's because of her. She always took care of me, even though we used to bump heads and not see eye-to-eye. She had been there, done that and I was trying to learn myself. We were so much alike, we had such a good relationship and I can just appreciate her more now that she's gone. She was just such a wonderful woman. I can see a lot of me in her now — you can just see things clearer now.

Where'd you grow up?

I was born in Philadelphia and I moved to Tampa when I was 11. It was just me, her, my brother and my sister. She worked hard, took care of us. We were middle class. The realness in the streets had me where I would rather hang out in the 'hood on Fridays with the real people than in middle class — where my mother knew I needed to be 'cause being in the 'hood's gonna get you in trouble. That's where my friends were at, that's where the real people were at. People didn't judge you. There was just a lot of love in the 'hood. I was a mixture of them both. That's why I called my album *Thug Misses*.

Who were your role models?

Not really anyone in rap music. I have a lot of role models in R&B. I love Lauryn Hill, Janet Jackson, Patti LaBelle, Stevie


Are you concerned with the way people will perceive you?

to the rest of what I got then god bless. You have to use your sexuality to open the doors. When you're writing this real stuff they don't really listen but when you're all like "puss, puss, crack," it's all good. That's your opportunity to open the door so you can get in. It's working, and I'm thankful. It's a shame that it's like that, but it is. You gotta work within the system.

What's your idea of the perfect man?

I gotta song on the album called "For My King" and that's my perfect man. The whole song is about how I want my king to be a kind, considerate, loving, strong, dominant man that I know is a man. I want a man to be a man, who'll respect me and I'll respect him. To treat me like a queen and love me but still be strong and dominant... the *man*. Not too many *men* out there right now.

The two have a delicacy and strength that many women artists lack these days; both are willing to speak their mind as well as wear their hearts on their sleeves. From the seductive whisper of "Say Yes" to the give-and-take between songstress Marsh and floacist Natalie (one uses words to undress, the other uses musical sighs and high notes to convey her desire) of "Getting Late," these women sound like honey. ARTIST SPOTLIGHT

HOWIE DAY

Howie Day spent his late teens being slightly more productive than most; not only did he write, record and release his debut, *Australia*, in 2000, he also toured and promoted enough to sell nearly 30,000 copies of the album out of

the trunk of his car. Epic is now re-releasing the record in hopes of reaching a wider audience, and people are taking notice: last week, Howie was No. 2 most added on the CMJ Top 200 charts with 114 adds. He is also about to take his legendary live show on the Jeep World Outside Festival with Sheryl Crow, Train, Ziggy Marley and more. Howie recently spoke with CMJ about how his songwriting has grown over the past few years, his upcoming tour and his future goals.

What are your goals with *Australia*?

I'm the kind of guy who always looks three steps ahead. I think my goals are mostly business-minded. As far as how many we'll sell, I don't know, we'll see. It's kinda like I took the snapshot and I finished the record when I was 19, and I was happy with every single song on it at that point. It was a snapshot of who I was as a musician then, and now I'm looking forward to the next one. I hope at least that it's going to be exposed to everyone that wants to hear it.

Is there a song on this record that you think really exemplifies who you are as a songwriter?

Well, my favorite songs are "Sorry," "Ghost" and "Disco." Those are the newest songs on there, as far as when I wrote them. As far as representing me as a songwriter, I think I grew up a lot writing those songs and recording them. Those ones are a little bit of the direction of where it all went and what I became as a songwriter.

Your songs can be fairly dark... how true to life are they for you?

They're somewhat true-to-life, although I don't have a totally dark life [laughs]. I guess that's the part that's fun to write about and fun to try and have people relate with — those are the songs that I like. I either go for the sappy love songs or the darker, twisted, I-hate-you type of songs. I don't know what it is, it's what I like, so it's what I end up writing. Although I do have these hankering to write a nice, optimistic song, like "Beautiful Day."

You wrote most of the songs from *Australia* over two years ago. How do you keep them fresh and make sure that you have a good time playing them?

Well, about a year and a half ago, I discovered the most amazing thing ever, which is live sampling, through this guy Joseph Arthur that I saw live. So that was a huge turn, because up until a year and a half ago, every show I'd ever played was just me and an acoustic guitar and that's it. Now it's still just me and an acoustic guitar, but I have two pedalboards full of effects. There's a lot more room for creativity and for me to do whatever I feel like onstage — and there's a lot more spontaneity.

How did you get into that? Did you take a month to learn all

the pedals and sampling tricks or did you just jump right in?

I pretty much just jumped right in. I'd been thinking about it for a while, but when I finally went out and found the machine, my "dream machine," so to speak, I just brought it to the show that night and plugged it in and I was playing through it. I think the first night I just kinda looked at it and didn't use it, but it was a slow evolution of effects. In the beginning I probably had one pedal, whereas now I have probably 14. I just slowly added all these things. It just evolved out of itself. It was never anything that I had to rehearse.

I've heard that you will write songs on the spot while you're playing shows.

Yeah, well, I don't do that so much anymore. I used to do that a lot, but now I get a little freaked out. Shows are a little bigger than they used to be. It's a great way to do it, because it really puts me on the spot and I'm forced to come up with something. I have to sing something or play something. It's almost like forced creativity.

You've become known as a sort of "one man band," using loops and making your own percussion.

Yeah, I've got the cymbals between my knees and everything [laughs].

Any plans on ever getting a full band to tour with?

I would love to. I don't have any plans to, but eventually that will be a necessary step, I think. My philosophy is, get the dream-team band by getting the best possible band member for each spot that I can possibly think of, so I'm just now starting to put that together in my head for when that day comes.

You have toured fairly extensively through college markets... what drew you toward that demographic?

Well originally, it just seemed to make sense. I guess college markets are the music lovers. And a lot of it had to do with that was just who was booking me at the time. [Those were] the bookings I could get... a lot of college coffee houses and that sort of thing. So we did hundreds of college shows, and that was the majority of what we did even up to a year ago. And now we've started to do a lot of clubs and started to headline more shows, but that's been more of a newer thing. For the longest time we just pounded out colleges and I remember going back to the same colleges two or three times in a couple years. But it was a great way to start traveling and getting used to being on the road and meeting different people. It was tons of fun. It made up for me not going to college, I think [laughs]. You get the "college experience."

How do the songs you write now compare to the older ones?

Oh hell, they're a lot better. I'm two or three, or in some cases four years older than I was when I wrote the songs on *Australia*, and two or three or four years better. And just from a songwriting point of view and lyrically and musicianship-wise, I'll blow myself away. That's what I'm hoping to do.

So are you excited about doing this Jeep tour?


Yeah, I am. It'll be my first tour with a bus. That's like the holy grail of early touring life. It's like "Someday we're going to have a bus and everything's going to be OK! We're not going to have to do anything!"

How many watts is your station? How many people do you reach?

3,000 watts. We have a broadcasting radius of over 30 miles, so if everyone that could listen to us did, we would have over 40,000 listeners. We are working on brainwashing techniques to get everyone to listen to us at the moment. As a second plan, we are getting some of our bioengineering majors that work at the station to create an army of cybernetic monkeys to do our bidding.

How long have you been and will you be MD? How do you abuse your power?

I started this January and before that I was doing the RPM and Hip-Hop charts. I will be MD at least for all of next school year. I have not really abused my power yet — mainly just the normal stuff, like "first grab" at freebies and such. Maybe I should start making outrageous demands to people that ask me to play their records; I should try having fishbowls filled with only green M&Ms mailed to me.

What do you do to build your station's audience?

This semester we got an ape costume to be our new mascot. We've been running around *Jackass* style, jumping on/humping people and giving away stickers — we've been getting some good responses. We post lots of flyers and list our program schedule in the university's weekly newspaper. We throw a spring concert every year, and as of this year we've been trying really hard to liven up the local music scene by getting bands to play at the WSBF compound (our Program Director's living room). We've had a house show there almost every weekend since the fall. Last semester we had a taco eat-off event, at which we invited people to

join teams and go head-to-head against the station's team. We won by about 30 tacos. Matt, you are the man!

Are you on the air? What kind of show do you do?

I do a rotation show in which I play dance, hip-hop, some jazz, and the newest CDs in rotation that I like.

What's the most fucked up thing that ever happened to you while you were on-air?

The funniest thing happened this year actually. I was training an intern on how to use all the equipment in the studio. A friend of mine IM'd me at our station IM name (wsbf881), asking me to be an "MD gone wild." I kept my audience happy and showed my tits on the webcam. After I did this, my intern decided to tell me that she had told her family to listen/watch the show over their computers. Her dad called within a couple minutes. Good times.

What was your most embarrassing radio-related moment?

I was interviewing a really cool band last summer, and about halfway through the interview, I found out I had forgotten to turn on their microphones.

Does your station still play vinyl?

Hell, yeah! I love vinyl. It is so cute going around and around and around. Anyway, let me put it this way — by the end of exam week we have gotten 1,094 CDs/albums in the mail. That is not counting extra copies or CD singles. We have gotten roughly 80 vinyl albums this semester. All the vinyl we receive goes into rotation. Whereas, there is no way all the CDs go into rotation.

What would you like to see at this year's CMJ Music Marathon? Who are you going to be there with?

I would like to see the Baldwin Brothers, Soul Hooligan, Beta Band... wait, those are just bands — I would like to see a discussion group on the DMCA and the future of web streaming. I'll be up in New York with Tim Fuchs, our Program Director, and a couple of specialty-show DJs.

Why did you go into college radio? Free CDs?

A friend I met during lectures in my Chem 101 class was a DJ, so that is how I got introduced to college radio. Getting free CDs has not helped much.

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

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COPE WITH IT

While riding in the car with Twist & Shout's Paul Epstein a few weeks ago, I was treated to an album that, although I'd never heard before, sounded very familiar. The songs blew me away—what great music and players. What threw me was that I knew the guitar and voice. Finally, Paul told me we were listening to the new album from Jorma (pronounced Yorma) Kaukonen called *Blue Country Heart* from our friends at Columbia Records.

Let's stop here for a brief history lesson to those who either weren't around back then or who just haven't yet cared. Jorma has been (and remains) one of the most amazing, yet underrated guitarists in the business. I'm a little prejudice because I began listening to his work in '66 when he made the Jefferson Airplane's seminal *Surrealistic Pillow* (check out "Embryonic Journey"). I then continued to imbibe Jorma's acid-dripping, wah-wah-peddled leads from *After Bathing At Baxters* and *Crown Of Creation*. I also couldn't get enough of Jorma absolutely ripping through a live *Bless Its Pointed Little Head* and the other Airplane classic, *Volunteers*. During this time he and Jefferson Airplane bass player, Jack Cassidy, formed a side band called Hot Tuna (the record company passed on their first name, Hot Shit.) Hot Tuna's been together since the late sixties and has played as many different incarnations as they have shows—Jorma and Jack, though, have been the one constant. Jorma, who is now going it solo, said his goal for this album was "to go to Nashville and record great, old country

songs with some of America's finest bluegrass musicians." And that, my friends, is exactly what he's done. With a band comprised of Sam Bush, Jerry Douglas, Byron House, and Bela Fleck, Jorma has really accomplished something. *Blue Country Heart* is a fine Americana Country album from some of the finest players around. You owe it to yourself and your customers who bought *Oh Brother Where Art Thou?* to turn them onto Jorma Kaukonen. If they get there early they might even snag the three track unreleased value-added disc that includes the Hot Tuna classic, "Hesitation Blues."

With all the current interest surrounding Americana music, I wonder when the true innovators are going to get their due. We have at least two still with us today: Pete Seeger (Woody Guthrie's friend who wrote "Where Have All The Flowers Gone," then was subsequently blacklisted from TV for political reasons) and Doc Watson. These two are to Americana music what Muddy Waters, Willie Dixon, and John Lee Hooker are to the Blues. It would be nice to see them get recognition and due while they're still on this planet. I can truly say that after seeing Jimi Hendrix, Eric Clapton, Jeff Beck, Peter Green, Stevie Ray, and many other great guitarists, Doc Watson remains the best guitar player I have ever witnessed (Jorma is still in the Top 10). Support *Blue Country Heart*. It will just make you feel better about yourself.

As we all sit at our desks staring at computers all day, our day-dreaming sometime turns to sand, sea, surf and late night music shopping. Nowhere are these four items combined better than at Uncle Sam's Music in Florida. Our "dear old Uncle" opened the first store in Pompano Beach, FL in 1985. In subsequent years, Uncle Sam's opened locations in Miami Beach and Lauderdale, eventually closing Pompano Beach. Uncle Sam's has two. The owner is Donald Vernon Jr., and the manger, who has been there from the beginning, is Lisa Teger-Zhen; she's been with the company 17 years and opened each location before finally settling in Miami Beach. She's also the Miami Beach buyer/manager and CIMS representative.

One of the interesting things you discover when opening new locations, is that many of your pre-conceptions about the genre/product mix may be incorrect. Uncle Sam's at Miami Beach was supposed to be "alternative" when it opened, but no one anticipated the dance scene that was about to explode. Uncle Sam's has been fortunate enough, to have an excellent dance buyer who is extremely knowledgeable and who has now been with the company 12 years.

Uncle Sam's has large sections of independent, punk, goth, pop, hip hop, latin, world, reggae and more—dance, though, is their specialty. The Miami Beach location does a brisk 12" and import business and other domestic releases of every kind. The

Lauderhill has recently upgraded their dance section and in addition to carrying just about everything customers would need. They also have a dedicated punk/goth following.

Uncle Sam's have had some great instores: they've hosted Marilyn Manson (hometown boys), NIN, Mighty Lemon Drops, Apoptygma Berzerk, VNV Nation, DJ Rap

and even Sandra Bernhardt among others. The Marilyn Manson show in Miami Beach was, interestingly enough, a very cool acoustic show.

Customer service and personality make Uncle Sam's unique; accordingly, the stores buy separately. Uncle Sam's has listening booths, displays, P&P, instores, signings, great front windows, midnight sale and more. The Miami Beach store is open late until 2am every night and 3am on Saturdays. Uncle Sam's is a proud member of the Coalition of Independent Music Stores (CIMS).

What do you collect?



This week's cover story gives us a great look at what Caroline Distribution is all about. But we wanted to take an even closer look at the man behind Caroline's curtains, Rick Williams. Recently, we sat down with Rick (ok, we were at our respective computers and telephones) to find out more about his life in the biz and his 14 years at Caroline.

CMJ Q&A with Rick Williams

Rick, would you give us a little background?
I was born in Aylesbury, Buckinghamshire, England and came to the U.S. in 1974. I lived in Detroit for four years where, when I first stepped off the plane, the local papers headline read: "Detroit, Murder Capitol U.S.A." I almost got back on the plane. I grew to love the people in Detroit and met some great people there, although I wasn't sad to leave (most of them moved eventually too). You meet many people all over the country who are proud to say they are from Detroit. Before I lived here in New York, I lived in Los Angeles.

What was your first music business job?
If you mean non-musician job, I worked for MS Distribution in LA. I was an order-puller.

It seems every person working in the biz either was or still is a frustrated musician, what's your story?

Actually I think there is a lack of people with musical backgrounds in our business. I don't know if I would say I was a "frustrated" musician. I gave it my best shot and it's how I earned my living in the days when I was young enough to not be so concerned

about eating. I joined my first band when I was sixteen and our first gig was at a mental hospital. That's pretty much how it went for the next 12 years.

You were in a band called Ankh for a time, what did you do?

I was a singer. Ankh was actually the last band I was in before I moved to the U.S. We were signed to a record label but got dropped during the "vinyl crisis" of the early 1970s. I guess our label thought they stood a better chance with Black Sabbath. Boy did they get it wrong.

Did your mental hospital debut help prepare you for your future in the biz?

Definitely. The name of that band was Mad Dwarf by the way. Our guitar player was 4'6" tall and man he could play. Pretty funny really, a band with that name playing at a mental hospital.

Any funny music business stories you can share?

Well I could tell you some stories about when Mark Cope and I worked at MS together, but that would probably put us both in jail, so I think it's best I let that sleeping dogs lie.

Let's get to the music then. What's your current favorite record?

Soilwork's *Natural Born Chaos*.

All time favorite album?

Next to impossible to answer, but if I could only listen to one album for the rest of my life it would be Free's *Fire and Water*.

All time favorite b-side?

Not a B-side aficionado.

First record bought? Where? When?

In a place far away and a time long ago I bought The Beatles' *Lady Madonna/Penny Lane*.

Favorite Weekend Party Disc?

Deep Purple's *Best Of...*

Favorite Sunday morning disc?

Pink Floyd's *Dark Side Of The Moon*.

First concert attended? Where? When?

I saw Free, Deep Purple and Steeleye Span in Blackpool (UK), 1969 (maybe).

Best concert attended? Where? When?

Ankh at the Amethyst Club in Preston (UK), 1973.

What artist (past or present) would you like to see live?

Jimi Hendrix.

Currently reading?

Sports pages.

What do you collect?

Dust.
