Preference

"COINTOONS"

One of the outstanding hopes of all those operators, who continued thruout the wartime period, was that when the war did end and the post-war period got under way, they would be given what might be called, preferential treatment, by the wholesalers.

This was to be expected. These men struggled thru the war years with whatever equipment they had. When the war started few believed that the wartime period would prove to be anything but profitable. The fact that it was profitable, and the further fact that many became financially strong for the first time, helped all the industry.

In the tile trade, to digress for a moment and jump to a field which is entirely foreign to that of the coin machine business, there is what is known in this trade as a "preferential list."

On this list are those tile setters who continued to do business thruout the war period. They are now given first choice and first delivery of all tile that arrives at the local wholesale firms with whom they dealt.

Many tile men, just as did many coinmen, jumped out of their trade and into another when the war came on. They saw no future in their industry. Now that they have returned they are not being given the same preference which is being shown to those tile men who stuck it out during the war years.

Perhaps a "preferential list" might not be a bad idea for the coin machines business. It might help assure many of those coinmen, who worked to continue this industry during the war period, that they do deserve a little extra consideration from the trade generally, and therefore encourage them to go ahead and expand in the manner in which they should — now that the post-war period is here.

Whatever the plans of those firms who are now in the selling seat of this field — they most definitely should first include the men who continued this business and, by so doing, built a strong and solid base for this industry to go ahead during the post-war years.

Few like to feel that there is any preference being shown — at this time especially. Machines are slow in coming off production lines as yet — and the men believe that whoever puts his cash on the line first should get first delivery.

This may be the one and only way to do business. Yet, among these men willing to put up the necessary cash are many who worked hard during the war years to keep this business going. Should or shouldn't they be given any preference at this time?

LEADERS SAY:

"MANY OPS MUST CHANGE METHODS IF THEY WANT TO STAY IN BUSINESS"

NEW YORK—For a long time now the cry has been heard that the average operator does not "merchandise" his business. He cares very little or pays very little attention to properly servicing his equipment or to the methods used by his servicemen and collectors and especially to the attitude of his employees to the location owners — as long as his route shows a profit.

If it shows a profit to him — then he is of the belief, leaders claim, that he is doing the right thing and that he will continue to be the leading coinman in his area. Many noted leaders in the field are upset over what they see as they once again begin to travel the nation.

They have found ops who care very little about the location owner's complaints regarding service, supplies, etc., etc. During the war period *The Cash Box* warned many ops that they had best change their attitude and their methods for that lush period would end sometime — and probably in a very hurtful fashion for a great many men.

Some regional distribs, who cover much territory, claim that they have presented such facts to operators about locations and they have simply been ignored. They have, they believe, presented ops with truthful

facts. They have shown them that they must now use the little courtesies which will cement them to their location owners. They have suggested they keep machines new and shiny looking, be sure that sufficient change is on hand in the location, and keep up a servicing schedule which will make the merchant proud and pleased to have such an operator.

These leaders now state that because this isn't being done in a great many instances they will have to do the job for the ops — by remote methods. In short, they will probably go direct to the locations with circulars telling storekeepers how good their machines are and the kind of service they get from the operators who feature their machines.

This goes right back again to the old location circular coverage and means that the ops are being pushed into something which they should do of their own accord.

The fact is that many an operator becomes blinded to everything else that he should do to continue a long-life business — but what he earns from the location. Some of the servicemen and collectors simply jump in and out of spots. Just count the money — pay off the location and hustle themselves right out — before

the storekeeper can even ask them any questions.

With business methods changing every day — with new men eager to enter into the coin operated machine field — surely, then, these men must change their tactics and their servicing system to remain in this business and, especially, to retain their locations.

The operator who works on the theory that the "war is still on" is surely going to lose out — and lose fast — as new men enter into his territory. Merchants have a peculiar way of spotting the man they want to do business with — as many an operator has learned to his sorrow.

They simply will not long tolerate the sort of treatment they were forced to endure during the war period, when nothing was available and everything went. Now, with things changing for the better every day — storekeepers are receiving more courteous treatment from their own wholesalers in their own line — and they are beginning to expect this same sort of treatment from everyone with whom they deal.

It is up to the operator who hasn't already done so to rapidly change his methods — if he desires to remain in this business.

“RENT THE SPACE” IS BEST IDEA OPS CLAIM

NEW YORK—A few weeks ago *The Cash Box* brought the trade a suggestion that, where a better commission basis was too difficult to arrange and where “front money” could not be managed, then the op still had the opportunity to “rent” the space which his machine occupied in the location — and by this method obtain a better percentage of the receipts.

In short, it might pay many ops to pay three or six or even more month’s rent in advance to the location owner — and arrange to lease the space on a regular yearly rental basis as concessionaires do at this time in many arcades and other locations. He could, by so doing, figure a rental which would average off the monies which the retailer received from him on a yearly basis.

Those ops who are using this system with certain locations claim that they have found it the best yet. These men stated that they believed this could be done by everyone of the coinmen without too much trouble and would eliminate long and windy arguments in regards to 70% commission or 1% of the gross installation cost or even \$5 or \$10 per week “front money.”

Since publication of this suggestion a great many letters have been received by *The Cash Box* stating that, in the estimation of the majority of these writers, this is the best suggestion which has yet been put forth.

One op writes, “Have just tried out the suggestion which appeared in your last issue and can tell you that

it worked fine. Went right in to the one storekeeper from whom we have been trying to get a better percentage basis and just figured out that he should receive \$500 per year for the space occupied by our machines.

“Not only did he agree,” this op continues, “when we handed him a check for half the amount in advance, but, he readily signed the lease that my lawyer arranged and from what we understand, according to my attorney, we now have a better arrangement with this location than we do with any other we have.

“This worked out so good we’re going to try and see whether we can’t get all of our spots on the same plan,” he says, “for we believe that this is the simplest and easiest way to make a deal with the merchants. They sure do like to get a nice big check in advance and they feel that they don’t have to worry about meeting the collector each week and going over the collections with him, etc.”

Other ops also had nice letters to write in regards to this suggestion. One of these men claimed that he was already using the same idea with some of his better spots and had been using it for a long time. Now, he planned to spread the idea all the way down the line, into everyone of his locations.

One op writes, “The nice thing about setting up a concession idea of this kind and paying rent, based on a yearly rental, is that the location owner feels that the machine is no longer his worry and that he doesn’t

have to even think about it from any standpoint except to phone us when trouble arises or when he needs more change or something goes out of order. This makes the idea of leasing the space especially attractive to the retailer and, at the same time, it gets us something really solid for we are signing five year leases with our locations and haven’t bumped into any real opposition as yet.”

The idea of the lease is, in itself, extremely worthwhile to every operator. The victories already won in court cases by the members of the California Music Operators Association of Oakland, Calif. featuring the lease, has spread its use thruout the trade since *The Cash Box* first reproduced it. (It has been reprinted three times in the past year by request.)

The operator arranges a regular yearly rental basis with the location owner and pays him three or six or as many months rent in advance or as much as he desires and, naturally, which best satisfies the location owner, therefore, whatever he earns from the location is all his — while the location owner, too, is satisfied with the arrangement.

There are some legal angles involved — as for example where the location owner himself is renting the store and his lease reads that he is not allowed to sublet any part of his place. But, these instances are rare and so far haven’t been met with by the operators who are adopting this type of method to better their commission set-up.

WHAT ABOUT NEW BLOOD?

What's Happened to the Flood of New Blood Expected to Enter the Industry?

NEW YORK—During the war the majority of coinmen feared that there would be a virtual "flood" of new blood entering the industry — the moment the war was over.

The war ended — and the new blood hasn't as yet flooded the trade. Many reasons were advanced for this phenomenon.

Among the most outstanding is the fact that there wasn't a sufficient supply of new equipment available to get these new men started.

Another reason that has been offered time and again is that the new men who desire to enter into the industry will not pay the prices now being asked for coin operated machines because they can't see their way clear to making such large investments without any profit guarantees.

These are the two arguments which are most outstanding. Many others have also been advanced — and new blood doesn't yet bust down the doors to get into this business.

Many have reported that they have been visited time and time again by these men desiring to enter into the coin machine trade but that, after consultations, these men usually sought other businesses or occupations.

It seems, of course, that certain Chambers of Commerce have also had their effect on the situation. These fine institutions have advised men who wanted to enter into the coin machine business to first be sure that they could obtain locations. The press has many times reported these

Chambers as stating that there "aren't locations available to the newcomers who purchase coin operated machines."

In the merchandising machine division of the industry there is no doubt, coin machine leaders state, that much new blood will soon become noticeable. They reason that this is one section of the trade which will, because of so many different new machines on the way, seek for newcomers to operate these units and that new blood will take more readily to this part of the business.

In the amusement machines field there has been no big influx of new blood. Some, here and there thruout the nation, have reported that they have sold small routes of used machines to new entrants to the trade — but nothing of a nature to excite anyone in this division of the field.

In the music machines industry there has been some new blood introduced here and there in various territories — usually thru the purchase of a complete route — but even this hasn't been of such a nature to upset operations already in effect in the territories where these men have started.

In short, then, what's happened to the flood of new blood expected to enter into the industry right after the war?

Jobbers and distributors discussed the fact that dozens upon dozens of people would be rushing to this field to enter it immediately the war was over. It seems that all these predictions have fallen flat. It also now

seems that it will be some years yet before any real influx of new blood is seen in the coin machine industry.

It's true that there aren't enough machines today to go around. The new machines have slowed down in production due to the lack of components. Used machines are pretty well worn and, in many territories, operators are seeking the new instead of the used because some new machines have already been introduced and this has excited the location owners. Therefore, these storekeepers will not accept used equipment. They believe that new machines are actually being held back from them. It's a problem for the coinmen in such areas, but they are ingeniously solving it.

What is most important, especially to many old-time operators, is the fact that the "flood of new blood" which was so much expected — has not materialized. It means that these men will continue to remain in control of their territories for sometime to come.

Eventually, of course, new blood will begin to slowly creep into the business as, here and there, ops will refuse to purchase more new equipment. This has happened in the past and will, without any doubt, also happen in the future. But, with the new type business men who are today in this industry — there isn't going to be that "rush" of new blood in the field, not unless a great many now in the trade decide to sell off complete routes of equipment to newcomers.

ONE MFR. ANSWERS: "Return to Early Type Replay Pin- balls to Offset High Prices"

NEW YORK—One noted manufacturer of amusement machines (who has asked that his name be withheld) answers the question advanced in this past week's (August 26, 1946) issue of *The Cash Box* as to whether the public has lost the thrill of pinball play because machines have become too intricate with, "The public has not lost the thrill of playing pinball machines."

He claims that tho the average player, in years gone by, could walk up to any machine (called "bagatelle" at the time) and simply shoot balls for certain skill-score pockets and then add up his score and play on or quit, is not gone and forgotten.

He insists that pinballs are receiving just as much play as they ever did and that the so-called "intricate scoring" principles now common in most machines have not lost their play appeal.

"This is the evolution of the pinball machine," he states. "Perhaps it has gone on ahead to be more of a 'scoring' machine than just a 'fun' machine," he continues, "but this was simply the manner in which the game developed.

"For example," he says, "in territories where re-play was not allowed and where novelty games went back into action, what happened?" He answers himself with, "Just ask any of the operators in such territories. The take dropped. The public wouldn't play the machines. They wanted that incentive which makes pinball play so alluring to the average man."

He also states, "Regardless of how

intricate and involved the scoring systems seem to be on the present games, and I'll admit that I can't understand a lot of them myself, yet the player is completely satisfied for, after all, the scores are always added up in re-plays for him. Therefore, whether he knows, or does not, know what he is doing — he still knows what he has scored at the end of the game — after his five balls are shot — because of the re-plays which appear openly on the scoreboard for him."


He insists, "In my estimation it's not the present intricate play of the pinball machine which has cut down on the operators' profits. On present models the operators get a big trade-in — comparative to the percentage of trade-in they received on machines which sold for \$100 or less in the old days. The real trouble is that the games are high priced to a point where the operator has to actually fight to get his cost out of them in a great many spots. This is not the fault of the producers of the games. This is something no one can halt right at this time. The cost of component units and materials as well as labor is so out of line that there is simply no comparison between today's costs and the costs we had when we could produce machines for \$100 or so."

This manufacturer does say, "I do believe that what should and probably what will happen will be a return to the early model re-play machines. The re-play unit is the key to the play appeal and to what the player wants. We can produce

simpler machines, but, they will have to feature the re-play unit. This, perhaps, will cut the cost down and will, perhaps, still get as much play on location."

Another thing he brings forth is, "I don't believe that if one of the really old models, which many called 'Bagatelle', was placed on a location right next to one of the new model pinballs — that it would get any play to speak of. I feel that the reason for the success of any present model pinball is in the re-play unit and that this will have to be continued. Therefore, this means expense in electrical mechanism all down the line. The savings will not be very much. But, perhaps, they may be enough, in many cases, to make it worthwhile to operate such machines in certain territories."

He also states, "I want to take this opportunity of complimenting *The Cash Box* for bringing this very important subject to the fore. There is no doubt in my mind but what your article will cause a lot of people in this business to put on their 'thinking caps' and it may result in bringing the trade something which it has needed to know for a long, long time. Such articles, as you published in your August 26 issue, is what helps an industry to better understand itself and to take stock of itself. This is the sort of thing, in my estimation, which is making your publication the most outstanding in this field. You are to be commended for this effort."

"Begin The Beguine" "Night and Day"

Russ Case and His Orchestra
(Victor 20-1940)

● Here's a platter which should net heavy coinage thanks to the heavy accent being placed on Cole Porter melodies as a tie-in with the new motion picture "Night and Day." But, in addition, the version offered here by the Russ Case orchestra of the well known "Begin the Beguine" is worthwhile in its own right. All instrumental on both sides, the Case crew add some neat arranging tricks to "Beguine," to make it top musical fare for listening and dancing, and it's the side for juke box money. "Night" is offered in too swingy a fashion to get much play from customers who remember the melody and want it as a slow tempoed ballad with vocal. But thanks to the "Beguine" side, the platter is very solidly a profit maker.

"Merle's Mood" "Memories of You"

Illinois Jacquet & His All Stars
(Apollo 760)

● Here's a pair of instrumental sides that should net interest and attention in locations where the demand is for jazz to be listened to and, perhaps, jumped to. "Merle's Mood" fits that category what with the Illinois Jacquet crew all on for a ride with the solid light-stomp melody. Flipped, they deliver "Memories of You," which is strictly a "race-type" blues that spotlights the mournful sax handled by Illinois. It's a listener's item, that should net heavy favor in the right locations.

"East Bound Freight Train" "Get Things Ready"

Grandpa Jones
(King 545)

● Here's a pair of sides fitted right for the hillbilly slots, and when their properties are considered, they have the stuff to score. "East Bound," as done by Grandpa Jones is in slow tempo and keyed right for the story of the lad who plans to go back home. The flip, "Get Things Ready (for me, Ma)" tells another home-sick story, but this time Grandpa tells his tale in a more sprightly mood. Backing him all the way are well handled guitars that'll draw favor from the customers. If you have the location for it, give this disk a listening.

"After All We Have Meant To Each Other" "The Way I Love You"

Henshaw Hawkins
(King 544)

● For a pair of folk songs done in a romantic vein, this pair done by Henshaw Hawkins is worth a listening. Backed by a string band, that

"Big Foot Sam From Birmingham"

Sam Taylor and His Alabama
Swingsters
(Queen 4126)

● Top choice as a nickel snatcher for this week is "Big Foot Sam From Birmingham," as contributed by Sam Taylor and his Alabama Swingsters. It's a "race" record, so we're told, but as a jump novelty it should find a place wherever they want good, solid jiveroo. And that Sam does provide. The melody and lyrics are simple, built around a few bars and a few words, but so was that other ditty you remember as "Hey! Ba-Ba-Re-Bop." And "Big Foot" is patterned from a like mold. It's Sam's show as he delivers the thumping lyrics, with the entire ensemble backing him up in chorus. It's good, it's catchy, and it's a commercial job they offer here, and it's a side that should get a big, profitable welcome from the customers. Flipped, the boys do "Bluer Than Blue," which is a pure instrumental blues with heavy accent on the sax. They do a superior job with the melody and if the type fits your route, this platter is a top notch bet. Hear it.

adds to the mood he creates vocally, Henshaw carries off the melodies, "After All We Have Meant To Each Other" and "The Way I Love You," in the style to which the customers for this brand of music will appreciate. At any rate, give the disk a listening. It may be that they are exactly right for some of your locations.

"South America, Take It Away" "Just The Other Day"

George Paxton and His Orchestra
(Majestic 7202)

● Here's another version of that money-making latin novelty, "South America, Take It Away," and, as it is offered here by the George Paxton Orchestra with Rosemary Calvin on the vocal, it's one of the better versions to be heard around. George's arrangement is spirited, and the warbling served by Rosemary is among the better performances we've heard of the ditty. Flipped, the crew offer "Just The Other Day," which is a bit dated for the boxes. On this side, the interpretation executed both by the Paxton crew and by Rosemary Calvin fall short when compared to other cuttings of the melody, but as a supplement to "South America," which is truly worthy, it passes.

"Haunted By The Blues" "What You Puttin' Down"

Effie Smith
(Aladdin 152)

● Once again up comes a pair of sides done by Effie Smith, who is a likely contender for a top spot among the boxes in "race-type" locations. On this platter she goes into a deep, somber mood for "Haunted By The Blues," which is a good melody, even if owners of a like pattern are a dime a dozen on the racks. So, what does carry this one off can all be credited to Effie — and the strong support she gets from Buddy Harper and His All Stars on the instruments. Flipped, they do "What You Puttin' Down," which is strictly intended to help keep the location jumping. Give this platter a listening for the benefit of your Harlem-type locations, it is at least worthy of that.

"To Each His Own" "You Might At Least Have Said Goodbye"

The Esquire Trio
(Rhapsody 109)

● Here's another version of the nation's No. 1 Melody, "To Each His Own." This one, contributed by the Esquire Trio, does offer something of interest to music ops with locations where the demand is for melody performed by small combos. Considering the platter from that aspect, it's a worthy offering. The Esquire Trio performs in lots better than ordinary fashion, and their style should be found of commercial value on the boxes. On the backing, "You Might At Least Have Said Goodbye," the trio, working their piano, bass, accordion and voices, register well with the fair torch ballad.

"The Hills of El Cajon" "I'm Changing Places"

The Esquire Trio
(Rhapsody 103)

● One of the more pleasant offerings of the week for locations where Western-Folk music is in demand is this performance of "The Hills of El Cajon" by the Esquire Trio. In addition to a neat melody and good lyrics, the trio add an interpretation that smacks of something Latin, and vocally and instrumentally they carry off the side in arresting fashion. Give it a listening, it's worth it. Flipped, the lads again come up vocally and instrumentally in interesting fashion and this time it's with "I'm Changing Places." The tune is cut from a pattern established in the twenties, and if your locations are seeking something of that flavor they may like this one.

● Etta Jones hands out a good blues number called "Osculate Me, Daddy." Her style is especially pleasing because she doesn't dig down too deep in the cellar before she settles down to work on the song. She does a nice job on "Mean To Me" by singing it fairly straight. The orchestra led by J. C. Heard switches to a fast pace after the first chorus and then goes into a slow drag for the finale. This disk is strictly for listening but will bring in a fair amount of coin.

"Just Give Me A Man"**"Do You Know The Game?"****Mabel Scott and Orchestra**
(Hub 3029)

● Mabel Scott's version of "Just Give Me A Man" comes out on the purple side. She sings with gusto and the orchestra is pretty much in the background all the time, but it's a good buy for the Harlem and Central Avenue locations. "Do You Know The Game?" is in the same vein with Mabel Scott warbling the vocal for all she's worth and the band beating it out in jump time. Head it for the spots that appreciate this sort of thing and it'll sell.

"There's A Rose That Grows In The Ozarks"**"I Was Wrong"****Eddie Dean and His Boys**
(Majestic 11001)

● Eddie Dean and His Boys give out with two better than average hill-billy songs and both will start the tears flowing in the beer parlors. "There's A Rose" and "I Was Wrong" are romantic numbers featuring Eddie Dean on the vocal. His boys furnish the accompaniment in what seems to be the accepted code of the hills—lots of guitar, fiddle and a steady beat. The locales strong for this type of music will give it a good play.

"Behind Closed Doors"**"I Know Who Threw The Whiskey In The Well"****Manhattan Paul and Orchestra**
(Hub 3027)

● For a little sweet and low down swing Manhattan Paul and his Orchestra go to work on a number entitled "Behind Closed Doors." Manhattan Paul softly sings about how nobody knows what goes on behind closed doors and how nice the whole situation is. The instrumental portion of this side of the disk is pretty well restrained. "Whiskey in the Well" has a lot of fast jive and an even faster vocal done up as a spiritual chant. Paul is aided by the band on the vocal. Both sides will wear smooth faster in the race spots than any other place.

SLEEPER OF THE WEEK**"Twilight Song"****Claude Thornhill and His Orchestra**
(Columbia 37065)

● Claude Thornhill is a past master at presenting smooth, serene, relaxing music and that's just what the maestro has to offer on this week's Sleeper. "Twilight Song" is a perfect accompaniment for dancing, dreaming, or even an afternoon coke. The disk opens with some of that easy-to-take Thornhill piano and blends fluently into the tune itself. Buddy Hughes dishes out a well sung vocal giving it just enough romantic treatment. The band earns the prize money on this spin though. "Under The Willow Tree" is the running mate and it has a lot of bounce. Good dance tempo. Hughes again handles the lyrics. Listen for the abrupt ending. Good double feature bargain for all locales.

"The Curse of An Aching Heart"**"The Golden Links Are Broken"****Beatrice Kay**
(Columbia 36939)

● It's about time the tunes of the Gay Nineties were put on wax and Columbia has now done it featuring Beatrice Kay. There are eight sides altogether but space prevents us from reviewing all of them. Included are such gems as "Saloon," "If I Was A Millionaire," "And Yet I Don't Know," and "Steamboat Bill." Miss Kay is well-known to all because of her radio show and the sob in her voice plus all her other tricks are right here. She's assisted by the Elm City Four and Paul Baron's Orchestra. These disks will be received enthusiastically by the young crowd as well as by their elders since they're good for lots of memories and laughs. They'll spin their way into the pay dirt everywhere.

"Nothin' You Can Do"**"Effie's Boogie"****Effie Smith**
(Aladdin 151)

● Effie Smith pours all the anguish she can muster up from the depths of her tortured soul on "Nothin' You Can Do." It's about as blue as they come and she gets right in the mood on her vocal. She's assisted by Buddy Harper and His All-Stars and they do pretty well by her. The pace would probably seem slow even to a snail, but on this type of a song it's all right. The reverse brings "Effie's Boogie" to the top. It's all vocal with a few brief instrumental breaks to give her a breather. The biggest business will come from the race locations.

"Somewhere In The Night"**"One Love"****Frank Sinatra**
(Columbia 37054)

● The way Frank Sinatra sings these two romantic ballads, you'd think they were written for him alone. "Somewhere In The Night" has everything to make it a smash hit—pretty melody, nice lyrics, lots of nostalgia, etc. Then add Mr. Sinatra and Axel Stordahl's Orchestra and it just can't miss. If you like this side, flip it over and get some more of the same on "One Love." This is very smooth, appealing music and it's guaranteed to pull in profits in all locations.

"Paradiddle Joe"**"Makin' Whoopee"****Tony Pastor and His Orchestra**
(Cosmo 500)

● The fans addicted to stomp will rush the jukes to play and replay "Paradiddle Joe." The band is good and hot, and the drum work by Henry Riggs is terrific. Tony Pastor injects a vocal chorus between the scorching solos on the skins but the record belongs to Riggs. The flipover is "Makin' Whoopee." The lyrics are definitely on the suggestive side, so it would be wise to keep it out of hearing distance of the strait-laced crowd. "Paradiddle Joe" is worth the price alone though—so give it a try in the jive spots.

"I Ain't Talkin' "**"He Didn't Ask Me"****Pearl Bailey**
(Columbia 37068)

● Whether she's singing on the stage, in a night club, or from a juke box, Pearl Bailey captivates her audience with her own inimitable style. In "I Ain't Talkin'" she sings of a broken love affair, but instead of lighting a torch she just smiles with her voice—maybe it's even a smirk. But anyway the effect is good. "He Didn't Ask Me" is a cute number too and she winds it up with a few well spoken words as usual. The instrumental backdrop is ably furnished by Mitchell Ayres and his Orchestra.

Music Ops Ask More Title Strips

NEW YORK—Results of the recent request made by *The Cash Box*, that music operators air suggestions thru which record manufacturers could promote better relations with the juke box trade, disclose that in many territories thruout the country, title strips for records bought for phonos are not being supplied. In addition, many ops report, where title strips are supplied, they are not being distributed in sufficient quantities to be placed in wall boxes.

"Title strips are just as beneficial to the record manufacturer as they are to us," wrote one leading operator, "and it's difficult to understand why some of the record manufacturers are apparently so negligent in making them available to us.

"In the last few months we have been receiving quantities of strips from some of the labels, but others, who provided this service prior to the war, are giving us nothing.

In the matter of wall boxes, it was pointed out by many, ops often require as many as fifteen or twenty strips per record, and to have printed title strips for these installations represents a substantial saving in time and money currently used in typing the required information.

Others pointed out that the printed title strips made a neater display on the equipment, and provided customers with information that would assist them in making their selections.

Frozen Food Buying Habits Studied

Are of Interest to Coinmen Who Want to Place Frozen Food Venders

NEW YORK — With many coinmen planning to purchase the first frozen food venders which will be placed on the market, a study just made of the habits of frozen food buyers in the various income groups, just completed by the industry's packers, will prove of great interest.

Frozen food sales for last year were placed at 600,000,000 pounds. Sharpened competition and other factors have brought predictions that the frozen food business will be trebled in three years.

With this study, it is reported, the packers are understood to be preparing against the time when they are able to offer a more varied selection of products and the market becomes a buyer's one.

In an income breakdown it was learned that more than 42% of the frozen food purchasers were in the \$2,000 to \$4,000 income bracket; 48% between the \$4,000 and \$5,000 group and 10% in the \$5,000 plus class.

65% of the housewives responding to the survey stated that frozen food prices are "about right" while 35% complained they were "too high."

Regarding the reasons for patronizing the brands they are buying: Easy to get, claimed 37%; Regularity of quality, said 30%; always fresh, 15%; 5% bought on the clerk's advice.

Those answering where they purchased their frozen foods gave the following answers: Grocery or delicatessen 48%; supermarket 16%; frozen food specialty store 16%; department stores 13%; chicken shops 6%; and dairy stores. 1%.

The frequency with which frozen foods are served received the following replies: Twice or once weekly 58%; 9% serve the products less than once per week. None serve them daily. 4 to 6 times weekly averaged 19%; 3 times weekly 14%.

Six-helping packages were said to be preferred by 57% of those responding, while two-help packages were favored by 43%.

About 77% found no fault with the present size packages.

It will be noted from the above survey that there are as yet a great many problems confronting the producers of frozen foods prior to a more "standard" product.

The vending machine operators have stated that one of the reasons they believe that frozen foods are as yet far from perfected for vending operation is due to the fact that packages have not as yet been standardized as they are in the cigarette machine field. This is one thing which all coinmen interested in the frozen food venders hope will soon come about.

More national advertising is also needed, some coinmen state, to more greatly popularize frozen foods to all housewives. Variety is also needed.

In general, the frozen food producers have as yet a long way to go to make their product acceptable to the average vending machine operator.

Noted Doctor Finds Music Proves Helpful to Hospital Patients

NEW YORK—The physiological and psychological benefits of music for hospital patients are described in a report just released by the Russell Sage Foundation and written by Dr. Willem van de Wall.

After surgery for fractures, it is reported, music is a helpful aid in corrective exercises, restoring muscle tone and preventing joints from stiffening and muscles and tendons from contracting. Dr. van de Wall said

that music prods tired tissues into movement and encourages the patient to stick to what otherwise might be a boring grind.

In the majority of cases the effects are psychological, according to the Doctor. He mentions two aspects of listening to music that makes it especially useful in hospitals. First, it is a “pleasurable activity” and second, it strengthens the ill and the weak against a tendency to preoccu-

pation with their ailments.

Dr. van de Wall claims that music can be most helpful to persons suffering from mental disorders. It releases emotional tensions, he reported, as a first step toward elimination of abnormal modes of thought and conduct.

Certain precautions must be taken, he stated, and musical activities must be under medical direction and control.




Omaha Paper Publishes Federal Tax List



Vendo Coin Changer in St. Louis Dept. Store



ST. LOUIS, MO.—The Vendo coin changers (which received much publicity in the Saturday Evening Post sometime ago) appeared in the Famous-Barr department store here, and attracted much attention from the press.

Two of the machines are located on the third floor, near the telephone booths, and, according to department store officials, have more than offset their rental of 35c per day by eliminating hundreds of requests for small coins made daily of clerks at counters adjoining the phones.

The machines are manufactured by the Vendo Co. of Kansas City, Mo. and, according to the Universal Distributing Co., this city, distributes the machines, they rent for \$8 per month or sell outright for \$125. Universal report that they have already placed 25 of the machines in this city in stores, bowling alleys and manufacturing plants.

(Coin changers are also manufactured by Bell Products Company, Chicago, Ill. and the Bell Aircraft Corp., Buffalo, N. Y. These two are electrically operated, whereas the Vendo is manually operated.)

New Nickels Jam Coin Chutes

NEW YORK—Reports being received from coinmen all over the country are to the effect that the new "nickel" nickel is jamming coin chutes on all types of equipment.

These men complain that servicemen are having their headaches for the new nickel is slightly thicker than the wartime nickel-less nickels and their heavier edges are therefore creating coin chute jamming.

The Government announced, last month, the new nickels work the same as any others in coin machines, but they don't work the same in machines that aren't equipped with plungers. Most of the tie-ups are in juke boxes and other machines where the nickel works on the gravity theory.

These new nickels, according to ops, are the biggest headache since the copper-less wartime pennies.

Mints are now turning out strictly pre-war nickels, which are 25% nickel and 75% copper. They don't get that yellowish look which the wartime nickel got after a short period of usage. The wartime nickel consisted of 35% silver, 56% copper and 9% manganese.

Those ops who haven't yet come up against the new nickels are warned to obtain some and change their gravity feed chutes accordingly before their areas are flooded with them.

Press Takes Note of 10¢ Juke Box Play

PASSAIC, N. J.—The Herald-News of this city took immediate note of the fact that the juke box play here was being changed from 5c to 10c per record, 2 for 15c, 3 for 20c and 4 for 25c, with a headline in its August 10 issue reading, "Art Frowns on Lowly Jitney As Juke Box Prices Take Flight."

According to the press, "First it was the nickel beer that went. Now the nickel is becoming obsolete in the garish contraptions they call juke boxes and telephone music machines.

"The price is going up for filling spas with the dulcet music of 'Cement Mixer' and 'Arabian Menu.' It's going to cost more to ask the tel-music operator, that disembodied voice, what's she doin' tonight, hm, baby?"

"Prices are up, say the juke box dealers, because of rising costs. Girls who used to get \$16 a week are now

being paid \$38 to \$40. Records once cost 35c each; now they run from 79c to \$1."

(The action is in keeping with the MGA news release (Music Guild of America, organization of the juke box ops in this state) wherein the music coinmen in the northern part of the state are changing their telephone music to 10c per play and all commission arrangements where the 5c play is being maintained to 75%-25% commission basis. The telephone music ops also revealed that they, too, in addition to changing their machines to 10c per record are also cutting their commissions to the locations to 25%. In this community, music ops have been paying about 30% to 40% commission for some time and have also been obtaining "front money" from all locations. All changes are to be in effect by Labor Day.)





Some of the commissioners, who have been questioned, stated that they would back up Chief Crowther's request. Others have remained quiet.



Judge Jaroscak is reported to have stated, "These machines definitely are gambling devices."



With telephone music and single channel studios going up faster than

Many juke box men earned some nice profits during the war period making factory installations of hidden units with speakers, amplifiers and controls for the personnel manager.

U.S. Puts "Telequiz" in \$10 Tax Category

CHICAGO — Joe Beck of Telequiz Sales, this city, is mailing photostat copies of the letter which the firm received from Adelbert Christy, Acting Deputy Commissioner of the Internal Revenue division of the U.S. Treasury Dept.

The Deputy Commissioner's letter is interesting to the trade from the following standpoint: "You state the machine may be operated in one of three ways: 1) As an amusement device; 2) As a free play machine; 3) As a cash award machine. Advice is requested as to the proper rate of tax with respect to the maintenance of the device.

"The machine known as 'Telequiz,'

regardless of whether prizes are offered for correct answers or not, is considered a coin operated amusement device within the meaning of Section 3267 of the Internal Revenue Code and every person maintaining for use such a device is liable to a special tax of \$10 per year per machine."

It will be interesting to coinmen to note that the machine "regardless of whether prizes are offered for correct answers or not" is still placed in the \$10 category as an "amusement device." Also note the fact that Telequiz Sales asked what the tax would be if the game was operated as "a cash award machine."





Patents 2-Arm Record Player That Holds and Plays Discs Standing Up on Edge



J. A. DARWIN

WASHINGTON, D.C.—An automatic phono that holds records up edge-wise while it plays them, instead of laying them flat, is the invention on which Patent No. 2406355 has just been granted to Joseph A. Darwin, East Orange, N. J. and Robert Robertson of Kearny, N. J.

Instead of one tone arm this phono has two with oppositely placed needles. First the record is turned in one direction, while one side is being played, and then the record is reversed, the right hand needle is set in the playing groove until that side is played. Both tone arms are then disengaged and at the same time the pivot bearing arms that have held and rotated the record release it and move on to pick up the next.

The records stand on edge with separating sheets between them. The automatic selecting mechanism flips them open at the desired spot and stands up the record to be played so that the mechanism can engage it.

The unit can play one record right

after the other, if no particular selection is desired, then start back and play them all again in reverse order. It can also be stopped at any point desired.

J. A. Darwin is at present eastern regional director for Packard Mfg. Corp. of Indianapolis, Ind. He is well known to the automatic music field having been with the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company prior to his present connection.


