PATTI PAGE (Mercury 71059)

● Patti Page, who has been clicking with the pretty waltz tunes of late, ("Allegheny Moon" and "Mama From The Train") changes the pace on this powerful coupler as she belts out two sensational sides with a beat. "A Poor Man's Roses" is a potent pop, rock 'n' roll arrangement of a hot tune out of

the country field. The canary is aided by a thrilling instrumental and choral backdrop. Terrific lyric makes the tune an all-around threat. "The Wall" is an equally stirring display of top grade vocal work by Patti on another emotional blues beat opus. The kids'll go wild over both halves of this Patti Page sure shot.

● Last week, on NBC-TV's "Kraft Theatre" show, Tommy Sands played the title role in a play called "The Singin' Idol"—a story about the trials and tribulations of a young country rock and roller who is skyrocketed to fame overnight. The part was a juicy one for a newcomer and Sands did a tremendous job in the acting department as well as in the singing department. The theme music for the show was Tommy's belting rendition of "Teen-Age Crush." It was

heard throughout the show and was seen being recorded in a Capitol studio. The song must have made a tremendous impression on the teenagers who will be running to their shops for this disk. Potent item we'll be seeing on the charts in a matter of days. Flip, "Hep Dee Hootie" is another exciting rocker performed during the show. Swinging dance deck with a solid beat. Tommy has a commercial sound and style. The TV spot was just the break he needed to make the grade.

The songstress is absolutely great on "I Cry For More" a stirring, beautifully executed new ballad with a potent lyric set to a top grade melody. Sylvia's delivery of

this dramatic opus is penetrating. Dee jays love the gal and they'll be spinning this one often. Equally exciting is another excellent production arrangement of a big romantic ballad dubbed "Nearer My Love To You." Tune stems from the forthcoming film production "Shark Reef." Two top notch Syms performances.

● It was well worth waiting this long for Vince Martin's follow-up to his outstanding initial smash "Cindy, Oh Cindy." The Glory people have had time to decide on the best piece of material for the gifted youngster and they've come up with a prize package that should extend Vince's hit string to 2 for 2. The song referred to is "1-2-3-4 Anyplace Road." It's a fragile romantic

opus set to a lovely waltz tempo, and it's perfectly suited to the crooner's wistful voice. Side has a charming folk-flavoring plus a wonderful lyric and melody. Fans awaiting this new one will be greatly pleased by the results. Flip, "Katie-O" is a heavier folk ballad chanted with intense expression. Lovely companion piece. Top half will lead the way.



Barry Frank Signed As Sammy Kaye's Vocalist

NEW YORK — Bandleader Sammy Kaye has signed Barry Frank, who will be featured with the Kaye orchestra on Columbia Records and "in-person" engagements. The young singer's first record with Kaye will be "Mountain of Kisses," a waltz, which will be released in Mid-February. Some of Frank's predecessors on the Kaye bandstand, many of whom have since gone on to fame, include Don Cornell, Lola Fisher, Jeffrey Clay and Tony Alamo.

Frank's experience includes work with the chorus of the radio-TV show, "Rainbow House." He has since performed in TV, vaudeville and nightclubs. In addition, before joining Kaye, Frank recorded on more than a dozen labels.

Flair-X Records Has Hit

NEW YORK — Two days after she took over the presidency of Flair-X Records Kappy Jordan found herself with an unusual hit on her hands. The record is "The Man In The Phone Booth" and was recorded by The Wanderer.

The song was recorded twice with slight variations of lyrics, so that the sub-titles include "Hello Mama", and "Hello Baby". The Flair X brass felt that both sides had turned out so well that it was debatable which one to release. It was finally decided to put both out back-to-back and let the public make the final choice.

A few boxes of records were sent out to distributors before disk jockey records were shipped, and the sales response was almost immediate on both sides, so they are being labeled Part I and Part II. Over 50,000 records were reported shipped within a week.

Decca Plans Promotion For "Midnight Series"

NEW YORK — Decca Records has announced plans for an extensive promotion on its new series of albums: "The Midnight Series." The seven LP's that comprise the series are: "Manhattan At Midnight," featuring Ellis Larkins; "Paris at Midnight," featuring Skitch Henderson; "Rome At Midnight," Carmen Cavallaro; "London At Midnight," Skitch Henderson; "Rio At Midnight," Dante Varela and Orchestra; "New Orleans At Midnight," with Marvin Ash and His Dixie Blue Blowers; and "Hollywood At Midnight," featuring Andre Previn. Each of these includes instrumental recordings of the music associated with each city.

Decca's promotional plans for the series are slanted toward disk jockeys, dealers and consumers. To get radio exploitation, the company has prepared a sampler which includes selections from each of the albums and is packaged in a specially designed sleeve. Point of sale display material, which will be sent to dealers, includes mounted lithos and streamers. Decca is planning a heavy advertising schedule on the albums in both trade and consumer publications, and consumers will also receive, through dealers, a special mailing piece illustrating and describing the series.

U. S. Country Music To Make Debut In Europe

NEW YORK—A "Concert in Country Music" will tour Europe for the first time in music history this Spring it was announced by Steve Sholes, veteran Chief of the Country & Western Department at RCA Victor. The troupe of Victor artists will begin the tour April 1.

Sholes said the idea originated with a two-way request from the U.S. Army and the Victor distributor (International Mercantile Co.) in Frankfurt, Germany, for American country artists to appear in person to accommodate the widespread popularity and demand for country music in the overseas PX's. According to the Army, Country & Western record sales far exceed pop in military outlets.

Dick Broderick of RCA Victor's International Department will handle the itinerary in cooperation with the U.S. Army. Tentative arrangements call for 21 Army shows and approximately 15 civilian shows in the following cities: Frankfurt, Nurnberg, Munich, Stuttgart, Heidelberg in Germany; Metz, Verdun, Paris, Chateauroux, Orleans and Basec in France; Sidi Slimane, Port Lyautey and Nouasseur in French Morocco. Additional dates are now being set up in Italy, Belgium, Holland and the Scandinavian countries plus a possible appearance in England.

The "Concert in Country Music" show will feature Jim Reeves, Jim Edward, Maxine and Bonnie Brown, Hank Locklin, Del Wood, Janis Martin, Little Red Hayes, The Wagon Masters Orchestra and M.C. comic

Dick O'Shaughnessy. Jim Edward, already enlisted in the Army and stationed at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, will obtain a leave of absence for the tour. Before the European trip begins, the entire troupe will do several domestic dates in Toledo, Akron, Pittsburgh, Richmond plus a special appearance on the network segment of the Grand Ole Opry emanating from Nashville, March. 30.

Elektra Records Lists 7 Albums For Release

NEW YORK—Seven new LPs make up Elektra Records' February and March album release. The seven include: a recording by Sabicas, flamenco guitarist; "Susan Reed Sings"; Josh White; "Tenderly" with Norene Tate; "Songs of the Old West," Ed McCurdy; and The New York Jazz Quartet, (Herbie Mann, flute-clarinet; Whitey Mitchell, bass; Joe Puma, guitar; and Mat Mathews, accordion). Elektra's first pop singles will be out by mid-February.

Sales during January, Elektra reports, were the highest in the company's history due, in part, to distribution changes. New distributors include Sunland Music Company in Southern California and New Sound in Northern California. Elektra has also formed a subsidiary division, Elektra Music Publishing, which is affiliated with BMI.

CHARITABLE TRUSTS

The current high tax rates, the present inflation of values and incomes, and the holding period required to create capital gains, have prevented us from having sufficient capital to make the distributions we'd like to make to charitable organizations.

Yet, we do not have to be limited to the 10% plus 20% charitable contribution rate in any one year. We can create a charitable trust to overcome this hiatus and thus have our cake and eat it too.

We often make pledges to charitable organizations and then find that when the year rolls around, we cannot meet these obligations without being penalized tax-wise because the amount we pledged is in excess of the amount currently allowed us for charitable contributions. Thus, we give and are taxed on part of what we give.

The 1954 Code has offered us an out. We can create a charitable trust for a two-year or longer period, by placing capital into a trust fund and allowing the income therefrom to be distributed to the special charities named, tax free. In this way, we still have our own allowable personal charitable deductions, as well as the Trust contribution tax-free and without limitation. At the termination of the trust period, our Capital reverts back to us.

All of this can and may be done, but how? Care in the formation of the Trust and, strict compliance with tax law must be exercised. We will attempt to outline for you, the creation of a Charitable Trust, its operation and possible pitfalls.

The Committee Reports distinguished between "simple" and "complex" trusts, yet, when it came to write the 1954 Code, these two terms were omitted. The probable purpose of having these two distinct classes of trusts is to ease the task of the fiduciary of the simple trust, the one most commonly used. In the "simple" trust the fiduciary is required to distribute all of the income earned during the taxable year—but he does not distribute corpus or other amounts. The income of the "simple" trust is deductible by the fiduciary and is taxable to the beneficiary whether or not the actual distribution was in fact made.

Comparable rules exist for "complex" trusts which may accumulate income, pay out of corpus or pay or set aside income for charities. As in the case of "simple" trusts, the amounts taxable to the beneficiaries are limited to the distributable net income, including extraordinary dividends and taxable stock dividends. These amounts are also the maximum

which may be deducted by the fiduciary.

The same statute does not prevent a fiduciary either by express direction or acting pursuant to a discretionary trust, from allocating tax-exempt interest or long-term capital gains to particular beneficiaries.

The 1954 Code is full of exceptions. The one basic exception to the ten-year rule provides that the trust income will not be taxed to the grantor despite a short term reversionary interest, provided that the income is irrevocably payable under the terms of the trust, for a period of at least two years beginning with the date of transfer to certain designated charitable organizations.

These designated charitable organizations are:

1. A church or a convention or association of churches.
2. An educational organization which normally maintains a regular faculty and curriculum and normally has a regularly enrolled body of pupils or students in attendance at the place where its educational activities are regularly carried on.
3. An organization, the principal purposes or functions of which are the providing of medical or hospital care or medical education or medical research or agricultural research.

This article concerns itself only with the new 1954 Code and its operation. We are therefore purposely eliminating historical background as well as the outdated rules, regulations and cases. People have always been reluctant to permanently divest themselves of all rights and interests in property so as to effect tax savings.

The method of handling trusts today is the natural outgrowth of this conflict between the grantor's desire to shift income to a lower bracket and his obvious reluctance to relinquish control forever. While control is vested in a fiduciary or trustee, the grantor can still remain on the scene in an active capacity.

It is important that the income producing property to a trust be taken out of the hands of the grantor and that ownership be transferred to a trustee for the duration of the trust. In this way, a new entity is created. The way the transfer is made determines whether or not the grantor has shifted the income to a new entity for tax purposes. The extent to which the grantor has divested himself of ownership determines who will be taxed.

Dot Records Names New A & R Directors

HOLLYWOOD—While in the process of finalizing the deal with Paramount Pictures for the acquisition of Dot Records, president Randy Wood is again expanding Dot's activities by enlarging the label's Country and Rhythm and Blues departments.

Announcing the appointment of veteran Dot recording artists Mac Wiseman as A&R chief in the C&W field, and Lee Hazelwood to a similar post in R&B, Wood stated: "Dot Records has always been primarily interested in giving the public that music which people have shown a decided preference for. We are faced with an increasing popular demand for Country and Western and Rock-and-Roll music. Actually, we feel at Dot that these two categories of music not only overlap each other at times, but fall into the pop field as well. Therefore, we plan to produce a middle-of-the-road type of music that could be classed equally as pop. C&W, or Rock-and-Roll, with less distinction between the three divisions than their names suggest. The simple, almost folkloric emotional appeal of C&W, and the rhythm excitement of Rock-and-Roll music will be given the pop treatment on the Dot label."

Mac Wiseman, in addition to his new duties, will continue as a Dot recording artist. He is at present a disk jockey on radio WRVA in Richmond, Va. Lee Hazelwood has functioned successfully as an independent producer in Phoenix, Ariz., having brought out for Dot release Sanford Clark's "The Fool," "A Cheat" (both of which he composed) and Clark's current Dot platter "9-Pound Hammer."

Hazelwood and Wiseman will headquarter in the Dot offices at Sunset and Vine in Hollywood.

Williams Album Best Seller For Kapp

NEW YORK—Kapp Records, last week, announced that the instantaneous sales reaction to the label's two-record "Songs of the Fabulous Fifties" album, by Roger Williams, had, in less than two weeks from its date of release, catapulted the package into the number one all-time volume disk-ing for the label.

The recording features 25 of the greatest songs of the period from 1950 through 1956 and includes "Picnic," "Love Is A Many-Splendored Thing," "Blue Tango," "Three Coins In a Fountain," etc. Pianist Williams is accompanied by full orchestra highlighted with lush strings.

Jay Lasker, Kapp sales manager, predicts that, without any question, "Fabulous Fifties" will hit the number one spot on the best-selling charts and will mark the first time that this has been done by a two-record 12-inch album.

National Institute Adds Toch

NEW YORK—Ernst Toch, composer of the Pulitzer prize-winning composition: "Symphony No. 3," has just been elected to the membership of the National Institute of Arts and Letters, the only composer to be so honored this year.

Mills Music has recently entered into an exclusive contract with Toch and will make his compositions, including his prized symphony, available throughout the United States.


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Decca Acquires "Around The World" Sound Track

Newly situated on the fifth floor of the circular office building are the Industrial Relations, Production Planning, Market Research, Records Retention, International Production, and Credit Departments. Now the 14-year-old major record concern occupies nine of the 13 floors of the building. Tenants lease space on floors 4, 6, 7, and 8.

From Writer To Singer

NEW YORK — Dorian Burton, young hit tunesmith who last week received a BMI Achievement Award for his many money-making songs of the past year, makes his vocal debut this week on the Neil label with two originals: "I Want You" and "One Little Kiss."

Dorian's vocal demos of his own songs, "A Tear Fell," "I Can't Love You Enough," "Still," "A Lonely Fool," "Mom-O-Mom" and "Two Innocent Hearts" got him hit records by such top artists as Teresa Brewer, Lavern Baker, Fontaine Sisters, Ruth Brown, The Clovers and Ginny Gibson.

Several weeks ago, Pete Kameron and Monte Kay of Acorn Music Corp. recorded Dorian singing his two newest songs. These demonstration records were played for Jack Angel of Neil Records, who was so impressed with Dorian's performance and material, he decided to release the records.

"I Want You" has already been recorded on the King label by Bonnie Lou.

ABC-Paramount Buys Masters

NEW YORK—ABC-Paramount, extremely successful with "A Rose And a baby Ruth," by George Hamilton IV, a master purchased last year from the Colonial label, last week announced the purchase of three new masters.

Two are again from the Colonial diskery: A novelty item titled "Hospitality Blues" and a new coupling by Johnny Dee, "Sitting In the Balcony" b/w "A-Plus In Love." The other master features blues singer Lloyd Price on a tune called "Just Because." Price is Best remembered for his smash R&B waxing, "Lawdy, Miss Clawdy."

ABC recently took over the original master of "Almost Paradise," by the Norman Petty Trio.

Music's one-man show, Leonard Bernstein, contributed an outstanding, and, for Broadway, an unusual score for the musical adaptation of Voltaire's classic, "Candide". Borrowing from operatic techniques and musical comedy itself, Bernstein produced a score of integrity and melodic beauty. The principals on this Columbia release, Robert Rounsville, Barbara Cook and Irra Petina, superbly perform the music and the witty Richard Wilbur-John Latouche-Dorothy Parker lyrics. Max Adrian, the Irish star, cleverly sings the role of Dr. Pangloss. This distinguished recording belongs in every musical home.

PRETTY-EYED BABY; HOW LONG BLUES; SENT FOR YOU YESTERDAY; I'LL NEVER BE FREE; I'M GONNA MOVE TO THE OUTSKIRTS OF TOWN; SHAKE A HAND; LOTUS BLOSSOM; EVERY DAY; I WANT TO BE LOVED; I MISS YOU SO; TROUBLE IN MIND; SO LONG.

This Columbia issue comes on the heels of Johnnie Ray's two "big beat" successes, "Just Walkin' In The Rain" and "You Don't Owe Me A Thing". Backed by the forceful arrangements by Ray Ellis and Ray ("S'Wonderful") Coniff, Ray sizzles through 12 numbers belonging to the "belting-out" song area. There's plenty of single entry possibilities (i.e. "How Long Blues" and "Every Day") in addition to deejay programming in the entire album. Mr. Ray has a real sales winner in this one.

"TONY"—Tony Bennett—Columbia CL 938 (1-12" LP)

IT HAD TO BE YOU; YOU CAN DEPEND ON ME; I'M JUST A LUCKY SO AND SO; TAKING A CHANCE ON LOVE; THESE FOOLISH THINGS; I CAN'T GIVE YOU ANYTHING BUT LOVE; BOULEVARD OF BROKEN DREAMS; I'LL BE SEEING YOU; ALWAYS; LOVE WALKED IN; LOST IN THE STARS; WITHOUT A SONG.

There are 12 trusty examples of Tony Bennett, the careful stylist, in the singer's latest Columbia package. Bennett has chosen tunes to his own liking (all standards) and performs them with assurance and an excellent rhythmic spark. Bright orchestrator and conductor, Ray Conniff, provides the support on all the numbers with the exception of "Lost In The Stars", in which Percy Faith takes over. Major stock material.

"MELACHRINO ON BROADWAY"—Selections From My Fair Lady And Other Great Show Hits—The Melachrino Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1307 (1-12"LP)

SHOW ME; ON THE STREET WHERE YOU LIVE; I COULD HAVE DANCED ALL NIGHT; WOULDN'T IT BE LOVERLY; THE RAIN IN SPAIN; I'VE GROWN ACCUSTOMED TO HER FACE; WITH A LITTLE BIT OF LUCK; A WOMAN IN LOVE; HELLO YOUNG LOVERS; WHATEVER LOLA WANTS; I LOVE PARIS; SOME ENCHANTED EVENING; HEY THERE; IF I LOVED YOU.

Victor is currently on a big promotional push for mood music maestro Melachrino. This package spotlights 7 selections from the musical comedy rage, "My Fair Lady" plus seven other numbers from various show hits (i.e. "Hello Young Lovers" from "The King And I" and "Hey There" from "Pajama Game"). The Melachrino touch, most notably in the "Lady" songs, shows wit and inventiveness. Important stock choice considering Victor's promotion, Melachrino and the "My Fair Lady" binge.

"BELLS ARE RINGING"—Sammy Kaye—Columbia CL 960 (1-12" LP)

IT'S A PERFECT RELATIONSHIP; IS IT A CRIME?; HELLO, HELLO THERE; I MET A GIRL; LONG BEFORE I KNEW YOU; MU-CHA-CHA; JUST IN TIME; SALZBURG; DROP THAT NAME; THE PARTY'S OVER; I'M GOIN' BACK.

Columbia's instrumental representation of its original cast disk of "Bells Are Ringing" is the dance floor arrangements of the score by Sammy Kaye. The ork, which turned a similar trick with "My Fair Lady", plays the Julie Styne compositions with a happy and sentimental touch. The waxing should grab sales that go with a hit show and its performance by the long-time capable Kaye crew.

"LOVE SEQUENCE"—Morris Stoloff And His Orchestra—Decca DL 8407 (1-12" LP)

MOONGLOW AND THEME FROM PICNIC; THESE FOOLISH THINGS AND LOVE COMES BUT ONCE IN A WHILE; WRAP UP YOUR TROUBLES IN DREAMS AND THERE WAS A TIME; SENTIMENTAL JOURNEY AND TO YOU, SWEETHEART; YOU CAN'T RUN AWAY FROM IT; SAVE YOUR SORROW AND LAST NIGHT; EXACTLY LIKE YOU AND WANNA GO BACK TO YOU; OUR THEME AND COUNTER THEME; PRISONER OF LOVE AND DREAM AWHILE WITH ME, DEAR; MANHATTAN ROMANCE AND SWEET SUE, JUST YOU; ROSETTA AND IT WAS A BEAUTIFUL DREAM; WALKIN' THRU A RAINBOW.

Nine of the selections by Morris Stoloff And His Orchestra contain the device used in the recent disk success, "Moonglow" and "Theme From Picnic". That is, one melody in counterpoint with another. Each piece with the counterpoint gimmick uses a well known standard and a Stoloff-Duning composition (i.e. "Exactly Like You" and "Wanna Go Back Home"). A Johnny Mercer-Gene DePaul tune "You Can't Run Away From It", the title of a film, is one of the 3 songs played straight. "Moonglow And Picnic" is one of the selections. Solid mood offering.

"A VISIT WITH THE FONTANE SISTERS"—Dot DLP-3042 (1-12" LP)

VAYA CON DIOS; GOT YOU ON MY MIND; HONOLULU MOON; THE OLD PIANO ROLL BLUES; HOW SOON I UNDERSTAND; OH WHAT IT SEEMED TO BE; SAVE YOUR SORROW; THE WALTZ YOU SAVED FOR ME; RAGTIME ROCK AND ROLL; I DON'T KNOW WHY; WHISPERING HOPE.

The Fontane Sisters introduce their first LP in which the material has been recorded specifically for the package. Singing in polished harmony, the group goes smoothly over a number of Tin Pan Alley favorites that have been neglected of late; such selections include "I Don't Know Why" and "Oh What It Seemed To Be". Other items such as "Got You On My Mind", and "Ragtime Rock And Roll" find the girls rhythmically in tune with the current rock 'n roll craze. Strong pop set.

"DESMO SINGS DESMOND"—Johnny Desmond Singing His Own Songs With Orchestra Conducted By Tony Mottola—Coral CRL 57073 (1-12" LP)
HELLO HONEY; SHE'S A GOOD WOMAN; EVER SINCE YOU SAID GOODBYE; HOW MUCH WILL I MISS YOU; YOU'RE THE ONE; I WON'T RESIST; MISS LIZ IS; OH! MY DARLIN'; PLEASE DON'T FORGET ME, DEAR; SOFTLY; YOURS IN SONG; THE WALKING SONG.

Johnny Desmond is cast in the unusual role of a singer singing his own material. The vocalist wrote all of the tunes on the disk, a collection of rhythm (i.e. "Oh! My Darlin'") and ballad (i.e. "Ever Since You Said Goodbye") items. Desmond performs his compositions with taste and is skillfully backed by an ork conducted by Tony Mottola. Peanuts Hucko (tenor sax) and Urbie Green (trombone) get a few licks on "Ever Since You Said Goodbye" and "You're The One" respectively. Desmond's fans should give the set a good sales acceptance.

"MANHATTAN BANDSTAND"—Richard Maltby And His Orchestra—Vik LX-1068 (1-12" LP)

MANHATTAN BANDSTAND; JUST YOU, JUST ME; I SEE YOUR FACE BEFORE ME; THE ROCKIN' GHOST; BALLAD FOR TWO ALTOS; LONG ISLAND FLING; MANHATTAN SERENADE; TARA'S THEME; BLUE MOON; FORLORN HORN BLUES; THREE BLIND CATS; LOVER COME BACK TO ME.

This offering from Vik features Richard Maltby and His Orchestra in 12 first-rate band creations. With some fine solo work in the proceedings (Buddy Weed, piano; Joe Lenza, alto sax), the pattern of driving swing and swing in a sentimental vein comes over with authority and polish. Standards and several originals fill the bill. Quality band sessions.

"A TOUCH OF CUBA"—Luis Tiramani And His Orchestra—Epic LN 3311 (1-12" LP)

An Epic "Hit Of The Month" for January is this musical touch of Cuba featuring a native ork. The brass-inclined orchestra strikes some provocative rhythms as it presents a combination of original and well known Latin orchestrated melodies. Arrangements are soft and provide interesting mood music qualities. Latin and mood music lovers have a distinctive entry in their class.

Young Metropolitan Opera soprano Roberta Peters cut these famed and demanding arias while in Italy. The program includes several pieces from works in which Miss Peters performed at the Met plus other operatic staples. "The Bell Song" from Delibes' "Lakme" is a selection sung with particular beauty by Miss Peters. Dealers will find the package an excellent attraction for their serious music traffic.

DEBUSSY: La Mer—RAVEL: La Valse-Valses Nobles et Sentimentales—St. Louis Symphony Orchestra—Vladimir Golschmann, Conductor—Columbia ML 5155 (1-12" LP)

This is a Columbia Buy-Of-The-Month for February (\$2.98 price tag) and one of 3 disks introducing the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra and its conductor Vladimir Golschmann on Columbia. Two great French impressionists, Debussy and Ravel, are the composers of the works here and Mr. Golschmann and orchestra perform the pieces with delicacy and grace. Fine sound. Good coupling. Excellent catalogue item.

JAZZ

"WHIMS OF CHAMBERS"—Paul Chambers Sextet—Blue Note 1534 (1-12" LP)

OMICRON; WHIMS OF CHAMBERS; NITA; WE SIX; DEAR ANN; TALE OF FINGERS; JUST FOR LOVE.

Paul Chambers is a 21 year bassist who has seen service with the crews of Miles Davis, J. J. Johnson and Kai Winding among others. Heading a combo that includes such formidable jazzmen as Donald Byrd (trumpet) and Horace Silver (piano), Chambers plays counterpoint with spirit and good inventiveness. The 7 sessions are themselves expert jazz excursions. Original material was composed by Byrd, Chambers and John Coltrane (tenor sax). Fine jazz entry.

"THE CHARLIE PARKER STORY"—Savoy MG-12079 (1-12" LP)

BILLIE'S BOUNCE; WARMING UP A RIFF; NOW'S THE TIME; MEANDERING; KOKO.

On November 26, 1945, five jazzmen, including Charlie Parker (alto sax), assembled for a most memorable modern jazz session. Savoy has released the entire recording period which included a number of retakes on each piece with the exception of "Meandering". The mistakes, the improvements on later cuts attest to the reputation and striving for worthy jazzmanship of the late Parker. The combo included Miles Davis (trumpet), later replaced by Dizzy Gillespie; Bud Powell (piano); Curley Russell (bass); Max Roach (drums). The jazz coterie will find these revealing jazz scenes something to treasure.

"DIZZY GILLESPIE AND HIS BIG BAND"—GNP-23 (1-12" LP)

EMANON; OOK-YA-KOO; 'ROUND ABOUT MIDNIGHT; STAY ON IT; GOOD BAIT; ONE BASS HIT; I CAN'T GET STARTED; MANTECA.

This is a concert pressing that featured Dizzy Gillespie and His Band. It is an exciting essay of modern jazz applied to a group larger than the small combos normally associated with the jazz form. The sessions are richly harmonic, playful and in at least two numbers, "Round About Midnight" and "I Can't Get Started", velvety smooth. The latter two pieces display Gillespie's trumpet in its most expressive moments. Highly interesting work here.

Tommy Sands' Capitol Disk Gets TV Push

CHICAGO—With national critics' reports in, looks like young Capitol Recorder, Tommy Sands, scored a hit in his first net acting roll on "Kraft TV Theater," January 30.

Title of play was "Singing Idol," and revolved around the life of a young singer who had caught the teenage public's eye and was riding the crest of success. It portrayed the inner struggles of a young singer, wanting to be great, against his moral beliefs and inner emotions.

Following the TV show, Sands embarked on a national deejay promotional tour to exploit his first Capitol disk, "Teenage Crush," backed with "Hep-Dee-Hootie."

Joe Cerami, local Capitol sales mgr., reports, "Sales way up and growing."

National Tea Supermarkets Feature LP Line

CHICAGO—National Tea supermarkets, this city, has advised *The Cash Box* that they will carry an LP line, "Competitively designed for a mass market audience," according to A. Santschi, sales promotion manager of National Tea Company.

"This is the result of over two years of planning," Santschi explained, "as well as trial and error attempts to bring about a smooth running rack operation.

"As with all rack sales in supermarkets," Santschi continued, "there are two big problems to overcome.

"The first," he pointed out, "is service. We do not have the time nor the manpower to service our racks with the numerous labels and the constant hits.

"The other problem," Santschi stated, "is experience. We are, primarily, in the food business. We knew nothing about records or music. There was a definite need by us for a firm who would service us with what the public wanted."

Continuing on this line of thought, George J. Perkins, of National Tea, said:

"The Remington people offered us the exclusive right to handle their 'Masterseal' records and to sell these at \$1.49 each.

"We first tested the records. We noted that they were pressed of vinyl. We also noted that they featured attractive multi-colored jackets. Everything about the records, it seemed to us, spelled what the housewife could afford and what she would be attracted to."

First release to be featured by the National Tea chain here will be Lanny Ross' "My Fair Lady" LP.

This will be followed by a Tschai-kowsky piano concerto. Strauss waltzer. Organ solos. Rock and Roll. In all, the firm reports: there will be two new albums featured each month.

Jay-Jay Releases 2 LPs

CHICAGO—Jay-Jay Records, this city, announced the release of two twelve-inch LP's with the New Year.

A commercial, almost pop, type polka album entitled "Li'l Wally's Hi Fi New Sound In Polkas" and "Polish Polkas" make up this first release.

"Sales on these two LP's should be great," predicts Li'l Wally, "cuz we're hitting the road on numerous on-enters promoting as we travel."

Encyclopedia of Jazz To Tour United States

NEW YORK—A jazz concert bearing the title of jazz critic Leonard Feather's book "Encyclopedia of Jazz" will start a tour of the United States, October 14.

Leonard Feather, author of the "Encyclopedia of Jazz" and the recently published "Encyclopedia Yearbook of Jazz," will tour with the show as narrator. Stephen Rose, who is producing the package, left for Europe January 29 to set up a continental tour for the group in the spring of 1958. The U.S. tour will be booked by the William Morris Agency and will be the first jazz package ever handled by this office. The tour is expected to last at least six weeks.

"The show will, in effect, bring the book to life," says Feather, "representing every phase and style in jazz history, and will be geared to appeal to college audiences and to those interested in both the entertainment and historical value of jazz. Jimmy Giuffre and others will write special music to be premiered in the show."

The personnel comprises Jimmy Giuffre trio with Giuffre on clarinet, tenor and baritone sax, Jim Hall on guitar and Ralph Pena on bass; Don Elliott on trumpet, mellophone, valve trombone, vibraphone and bongos; Jimmy McPartland, trumpet and violin; Lucky Thompson, tenor sax, flute and clarinet; Sonny Stitt, alto, tenor and varitone sax; Bob Enevoldson, bass, tenor sax, clarinet, valve trombone; Osie Johnson, drums, tenor sax, trumpet, valve trombone; and Dick Hyman, piano, Hammond organ. Vocalists will be Jimmy Rushing, who will double on piano, and Joan Shaw.

The unit will tour most sections of the U.S. and Canada and may make its debut in a special television presentation. Horizon Press, publishers of the Encyclopedia and the Yearbook, and Decca Records, whose four-volume record version of the Encyclopedia of Jazz was issued recently, will tie in on promotion at each city.

Monarch Records Sets Label's Plans

LINDEN, N. J.—Joseph Liebowitz, of Monarch Records, this city, has signed Emil Coleman and his orchestra to record an LP album of the songs Coleman played for President Eisenhower's Inaugural Ball. The title of the LP will be "Strictly for Dancing."

Liebowitz is also readying for a quick-trip to the West Indies to sign Calypso groups for one of his varied recording projects, seeking authentic talent for the theme. He is also going to the West Coast to conclude contractual arrangements with several key artists previously conferred with for future recording releases. The Coleman album will be available shortly.

Top Musicians To Teach At New School of Jazz

LENOX, MASS. — A new music school called The School of Jazz, staffed by top ranking jazz musicians, will start its first session next summer, at the Berkshire Music Barn, in Lenox, Mass., according to John Lewis, executive director of the school. Lewis is also musical director of the Modern Jazz Quartet. The School of Jazz is being incorporated as a non-profit organization and is located next to Tanglewood, home of the Boston Symphony summer festival and school.

Enrollment in the intensive three week session, which starts August 12th, will be limited to forty musicians and twenty auditors (non-playing students). Musicians will be required to pass auditions or to submit attested tapes or recordings to qualify for entrance.

Instruction will include rehearsal in both a large ensemble and in a small group, composition, arrangement and history of jazz. Each musician will also be required to take a minimum of two hours a week of individual instruction in his instrument. The number of students for each instrument will be strictly limited to make a desirable balance in the ensemble groups.

In addition to the regular courses and the jazz concerts scheduled at the Music Barn, there will be special demonstrations by musicians of differing schools of jazz and representative folk musicians from other parts of the world. Also scheduled are talks by jazz leaders and lecturers such as Duke Ellington, Wilbur de Paris, Lennie Tristano; Joachim Berendt, German Jazz critic and author; Norman Granz, founder of "Jazz at the Philharmonic"; Langston Hughes, poet and authority on jazz; Professor Willis James, musicologist; George Russel, composer; Gunther Schuller, first French Horn at the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra and composer in both jazz and classical idioms. Panels of booking office representatives and musicians will discuss the practical problems facing the jazz musician today.

Living quarters for men will be at Wheatleigh, the estate of the Boston Symphony Orchestra where men students attending the Symphony's summer music school are housed. The symphonic students leave on the 11th of August and the jazz students will move in on the 12th. Arrangements for the use of the Dormitory were made through Thomas D. Perry, manager of the Boston Symphony Orchestra. Faculty and women students will be housed at the nearby Music Inn.

Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the School of Jazz will be Philip Barber. Other trustees will be Whitney Balliet, William Coss, Jr., Nesuhi Ertegun, George Avakian, John B. (Dizzy) Gillespie, Stephanie Barber, Jimmy Guiffre, Nat Hentoff, André Hodeir, Leonard Feather; J. J. Johnson, Willis James, John Lewis, Horst Lippman, Wilbur de Paris, Oscar Peterson, Max Roach, William Russo, Jr., Gunther Schuller, Jack Tracy, Barry Ulanov, Marshall W. Stearns and John S. Wilson.

Announcement of the faculty will be made within the next month, Lewis said.

The School of Jazz, Incorporated, is an outgrowth of the seven years of "Folk and Jazz Roundtables" held at Music Inn since 1950, at which panels of anthropologists, musicologists, jazz historians, sociologists, folklorists and many of the top jazz musicians studied the origins, development and styles of jazz and their relation to other folk musics of the world.

Much of the material formerly covered by the Roundtables will be covered in the special evening programs.

KIMO Gives Full Time To Country Music

INDEPENDENCE, MO. — A radio station broadcasting one hundred percent Country music made its debut in the Mid-America area Monday, January 21, when Radio Station KIMO, this city, signed on the air.

Bill Hardt, station manager-program director, announced this change in programming. The station had been devoting about three-fourths of its broadcast day to Country music for the past ten years, with the remaining time taken up by Popular music records.

Hardt stated that he felt a station broadcasting Country music all day long was definitely in demand in this area, and he reports this new change is being well received by the Country music lovers throughout the metropolitan area.

In addition to Country music, KIMO also broadcasts a total of 18 news and weathercasts daily, and has complete world wide and local news facilities, and carries many feature shows, as well as a daily safety show, featuring Mike Westwood, safety officer of the Independence police department.

Another special feature show is a teenage program produced by Fred Kellerman, a Rockhurst College senior, and heard at 12 noon each Saturday.

Don Sullivan, veteran cowboy singer, is heard weekday mornings on KIMO, and Tiny Tillman, another Country music artist is heard daily at 5 o'clock.

The KIMO announcing staff remains the same. Balin' Wire Bob Strack, Jimmy Dallas, a Country entertainer and disk jockey, with Dave Dean and Ted Cramer round out the staff.

A daytime station, the sign on time is sunrise throughout the year. The station signs off the air at sunset, and broadcasts on an assigned frequency of 1510 kc. with 1000 watts power, and this year celebrates ten years of broadcasting.

Station KIMO is affiliated with the Daily News and Pictorial Shopper and is owned by Craig Siegfried.




CINCINNATI CUT-UPS

Three excellent group arrangements of the song include the Browns on Victor, Al Terry with Rusty & Doug on Hickory, and Judy & Odie on Chic.

The tune is a lilting, tear-jerker that deals with the root of all evil, "Money." It's the sad, sad tale of what misspent money, nitelife and women can do to a person.

The Browns turn in a class performance worthy of their 1956 ranking as the "Top Country Vocal Group" in *The Cash Box* Juke Box Ops poll. The backing, "It Takes A Long, Long Train With a Red Caboose," is a slow, rhythmic blues

that the threesome polishes off in smooth style.

Hickory comes up with another winning combination as they follow up their successful pairing of Rusty & Doug and Wiley Barkdull with an Al Terry-R&D trio. Al takes the solo spotlight on the under half as he handily decks out a carefree, happy-go-lucky bouncer tagged: "If I Win, I Win." Jody & Odie, the laugh-provoking stars of the "Grand Ole Opry," should end up with a hit platter on their second effort for the diskery as they, too, hand in a splendid harmony job on the tune. The "Country Cousins" assume their more familiar comedy roles on the lower lid as they delightfully etch an enticing, quick-beat love novelty labeled "Unpuckered." Keep an eye on all three versions of the tune. Each one has the goods.

One half, labeled "Your True Love," is a pulsating, romantic jolter that Perkins wraps up in sensational fashion. On the flipside Carl pile-drives his way through a hard-hitting, blues rocker tagged "Matchbox." Tremendous vocal and instrumental backdrop on two great money-makers for the ops and dealers.

"DON'T FORBID ME" (2:31) [Roosevelt BMI—C. Singleton]

ERNEST TUBB

● Take a current pop smash, refit it with the inimitable vocal stylings of a top Country artist and chances are you'll wind up with a deck that's gonna suit the tastes of many Country music lovers. The case in point is Ernest Tubb's top drawer Country cover of the current Pat Boone clicker, "Don't Forbid Me." And it looks like Tubb will head way up there with this one. It's his most commercial offering in quite a while. The flip slicing, "God's Eyes," is an inspiring slow-moving religious-flavored item that Tubb renders with the utmost sincerity. Two strong chart contenders. Ernest is at his best.

"BABY LOVES HIM" (1:59) [Central BMI—W. Jackson]

"CRYIN' THRU THE NIGHT" (2:57) [Robbie BMI—M. Levand]

WANDA JACKSON

(Capitol 3637; F3637)

● A new pair of tunes that have all the earmarks of a grade "A" success hit the Country wax market this week via the Capitol label. And the star of this double-barreled coin-catcher is 1956's "most promising female artist," Wanda Jackson. One end, "Baby Loves Him," is a solid-driving, rhythmic, house-rocker that the chirp belts out in captivating style. A colorful instrumental backdrop enhances the platter. Wanda changes the pace on the flip as she beautifully projects a tearful, middle-beat romantic weeper labeled "Cryin' Through the Night." It's a twin-threat. Either end can take off.

DEL WOOD

(RCA Victor 20-6817; 47-6817)

B+ "AFTER FIVE" (2:30) [By-Nash of Nashville BMI—R. Biggs, M. Biggs, W. Meader] Here's one that sounds like it was recorded right in the barroom. And everyone is having a good time, especially Del Wood who can be heard via her wonderful rinky-dink piano work.

B+ "ROCKIN' 88" (2:03) [By-Nash of Nashville BMI—D. Wood] On the under portion the female wizard of the ivories receives a swingin' instrumental showcase as she colorfully pounds out an exciting boogie woogie item. Two "musts" for the ops in all markets.

C+ "TREASURED SOUVENIRS" (2:30) [Westport BMI—J. Dallas] Dallas goes it alone on this end as he handles a moderate paced lover's weeper with heart and sincerity.

BILLY BARNETT

C+ "ONE DAY NEARER HOME" (2:20) [Robbie BMI—Mason, Barnett, Levand] Billy Barnett puts a great deal of feeling into his delivery of this moderate paced, religious-flavored affair. A moving performance on a deck that should find a good response among the "bible belt" enthusiasts.

C+ "TIRED OF YOUR HONKY TONK LOVE" (2:35) [Robbie BMI—M. Levand] Barnett does an "about face" on the flip as he dishes up a "rockabilly" treatment of an infectious blues item. Ronnie Brooks' Sons of the West ably support on both halves.

DUSTY OWENS

B "HEY HONEY" (2:15) [Acuff-Rose BMI—D. Kershaw] An intriguing, up tempo rhythmic ditty with cute love lyrics gets treated to a most appealing reading by the smooth-toned Dusty Owens. His Rodeo Boys lend an attractive musical assist.

C+ "OUR LOVE AFFAIR" (2:30) [Deo BMI—D. Owens] Taste-fully backed up by the gang, on the vocal as well as the instrumental end, Owens neatly glides over a feelingful, quick beat romantic opus. Good two-consider for the platter spinners.

RAY PENNINGTON

C+ "FANCY FREE" (2:12) [L&R—C. Ingram, F. Silcox] Ray Pennington, along with a refreshing musical support by his Western Rhythm Boys, sends up an easy-on-the-ears reading of a pleasant little rhythmic bouncer.

C+ "YOU'LL WANT ME BACK BUT I WON'T CARE" (3:05) [L&R—C. Ingram] On the bottom deck Pennington slows down the tempo as he warmly waxes an easy-goin' romantic weeper.

THE OSBORNE BROTHERS & RED ALLEN

B+ "HO, HONEY, HO" (2:20) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Osborne, Sutton] The Osborne Brothers and Red Allen literally "tear up the pea patch" as they race over a delectable love novelty in a sparkling, back-country, vocal and instrumental fashion. It's a fast moving biscuit that has the potential to really step out. Watch it closely.

B "DOWN IN THE WILLOW GARDEN" (2:20) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Monroe] This end is an enchanting, old, sentimental ballad that the boys do up in their stellar "pure-country" style. Top notch pairing.

BOBBY DEE & RHODIE SUMMERS

C+ "DON'T SWEETHEART ME" (2:20) [Advance ASCAP—C. Tobias, C. Friend] Newcomers to the country ranks, Bobby Dee and Rhodie Summers engagingly team up on a dandy, high-flying revival of the delightful old favorite. The Tennessee String Dusters add a fetching instrumental touch.

C+ "WILL I EVER FORGET YOU" (2:22) [Pepper BMI—B. Dee] On the reverse etching Dee turns in an impressive solo performance as he tenderly wends his way through a soft, subdued, slow paced lover's lament.

B "WHO KNOWS RIGHT FROM WRONG" (2:15) [Cedarwood BMI—Butler] Bill and Mary Reid get their message across with touching sincerity as they prettily blend on a meaningful waltzer with heartfelt love lyrics.




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Financial Report:

Here and There

NEW YORK—For those few music operators still operating old juke box equipment, we refer back to a story which appeared in last week's issue of *The Cash Box* headed "Early Demise of 78's Seen as Victor Issues Certain Disks At 45 Speed Only." Victor, the pioneer of 45 rpm records says that the sale of 78 rpm records now totals less than 10% of the single record market. W. W. Bullock, manager of Victor's Single Record Department, said, "It is our belief that virtually all of the old 78 phonographs in the United States will be replaced by modern 45 rpm or 3-speed turntables within the next year. That means that by the end of 1957 practically all of our single record production will be at the 45 speed." So, to those juke box operators who think they still can operate with old equipment, we say: "Get rid of all your 78 rpm juke box machines as quickly as possible, because you won't be able to buy records very shortly."

NEW YORK—Dime play was a long time coming. *The Cash Box* has been on a continuous long-time campaign of over 10 years plugging for this changeover. Now, it wouldn't be incorrect to say that most juke boxes operate on a dime, with those still on a nickel soon to follow. However, it's admitted that a dime still isn't the answer. *The Cash Box* at this time is advocating a new procedure—"Dime Play Plus". It's sure to come—but as usual, some progressive, intelligent operators will once again have to take the initiative. Then the scoffers and the cautious will eventually follow the lead. Reminds us of a story we recently heard. A child's mother wrote a letter to his teacher: "My Claude is so sensitive. Don't ever punish him. If you think he needs punishment, just slap the boy next to him. That will frighten Claude."

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Regardless of certain conservative, or even pessimistic, statements recently regarding business prospects for 1957, we are happy to report that the Steel Industry (a basic industry and one which is a pretty good barometer of business conditions) advises it is planning to invest a record-breaking \$1.7 billion in new equipment and construction in 1957. It is pointed out that it is 42 per cent larger than the \$1.2 billion invested in 1956.

Our 1956 income was up 7.4% above 1955 but our net was down by 10.6%. While our income was higher, this did not offset greatly increased costs of doing business.

This financial report arrived with the statement:

"This is probably only one such similar financial report of a great many you have seen or heard about for 1956."

A very great number of operators are, probably right at this moment, puzzling over similar such reports that are being placed before them by their bookkeepers or accountants.

Many operators didn't realize, during 1956, as they noted greatly increased income receipts, that costs were also zooming upward. In fact, costs of doing business, were spiraling up faster than intake.

The result is that, as they now check their final financial figures for 1956, many a puzzled frown, many a muttered disbelief and many a frightened outlook for the future takes place.

That is why so many operators have already written to this publication advising that they are "in full agreement" with *The Cash Box*' plan of: "10c Play Plus Front Money And/Or A More Equitable Commission Basis".

That is also why more and more operators are reading *The Cash Box*' "10c Play Plus" editorials and articles at their association meetings. And urging that either "front money" or "a more equitable commission arrangement" instantly be placed into effect by all.

Noted association leaders have asked, and are asking *The Cash Box* for reprints of one or another of its editorials and articles on "10c Play Plus". So that they can mail these to members, and even non-members, of their associations.

By the way, regarding the above financial report, which was mailed to *The Cash Box*, it is not that of any operator in this industry.

The report does definitely indicate that this firm will, without any doubt, quickly do something to cure this situation which came about, "because of wage increases, higher labor and materials costs", by probably raising prices to offset these increases.

Though this financial report is similar to those of many of the members of this industry, it is the annual, 1956 report of the International Harvester Company.

Ops Believe In Switch To:

CHICAGO—The past few weeks have seen a switch in the belief of many of the nation's operators regarding whether "front money" (also likened to "minimum guarantee" by many) or whether "a more equitable commission basis" is best to adopt under present conditions.

Operators have come forth to state that, in their honest opinions, it is easier to "sell" the location owner on a "minimum front money guarantee" than on a "60%-40% or a 70%-30% commission basis".

The claim is that the location owner understands, and will agree, when the operator approaches him and advises that the new machine the location desires is going to cost him (the operator) a great deal more money and that, because of this, he definitely requires a "minimum front money guarantee".

One well known operator, probably speaking for all others, put it this way:

"The fact remains that the storekeeper is also paying more for everything he buys to do business. Therefore," he claims, "when I tell him that we, too, must pay much more for the

new machine, whether it's a phonograph or a game, he is inclined to agree. He realizes that this is the truth.

"This gives me the opportunity", this operator states, "to arrange for a minimum front money guarantee. I've had 10c play working for over four years.

"With the minimum guarantee", he adds, "and I have been successful in obtaining \$20 per week off the top for a brand new 200 selection phonograph, I can then split the balance on a 50-50 basis. This has been helping us to continue profitably in business.

"I'm in 100 per cent agreement with you and The Cash Box that the operators must get a more equitable share of the gross intake or they just can't remain in business on a profitable basis.

"I want to congratulate you and The Cash Box because yours is the one and only publication that has come forth with logical, constructive and progressive plans for all the operators.

"As far as I'm concerned, The Cash Box is really 'The Operator's Bible'. It's the only trade magazine we have."

Canadian Music Ops Object To New Effort of CAPAC to Collect Royalties on Juke Box Music

New Proposed Tax Would Assess Each Operator \$3 Per Month Per Machine


MONTREAL, CANADA—Music operators in this country, like those in the United States, have had to combat the efforts of CAPAC (Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada, Ltd.), who like ASCAP in the United States, has been pressing for payment of fees for use of music in juke boxes. Canadian law also exempts payment at this time.

The Canadian Music Operators Association on December 4 issued a protest in behalf of its members. The new proposed tax would assess each operator at \$3 per month per machine. The objection read:

lected by Composers, Authors and Publishers Association of Canada, Limited (hereinafter called "CAPAC") during the next ensuing calendar year in compensation for the issue or grant of licenses for or in respect of performance in Canada of Dramatico-musical or musical works in which CAPAC claims authority to issue or grant performing licenses as the same appear in the statements published in the Canada Gazette under date of Tuesday, November 6, 1956.

"Objection is taken to the approval of Tariff No. 16 relating to Music Systems.

"This tariff item appears to be a new one designed to apply to all premises not included in any of the other tariff items and not expressly excluded by the said Tariff No. 16. The tariff,

as proposed, is broad enough to include payment of fees by operators of coin operated gramophones which are exempt from payment under the provisions of Section 50 (7) of The Copyright Act, R. S. C. 1952, Chapter 55 and by the decision of the Privy Council in Vigneau v. Canadian Performing Rights Society, Limited (1945) A. C. 108.

"It is further submitted that the tariffs, as approved for the year 1956, ought not to be changed until such time as the Royal Commission on Patents, Copyrights, Trade Marks and Industrial Designs presided over by Chief Justice Ilsley has made its findings and recommendations."

Robbins Defines Distributors' Status In Industry

CHICAGO—Joe Robbins, sales manager of Empire Coin Machine Exchange, this city, took time out from his very busy day to write *The Cash Box* in an effort to define the distributor's status in the industry.

"The role of the distributors in the coin machine industry," Robbins advises, "has been misunderstood, blasphemed, and little effort has been put forth to clarify their position. At times, the very necessity of their existence has been questioned. Almost always, their margins of profit are a target of operator criticism.

"The distributor is an integral link in the chain of manufacturer—distributor—operator relations. The distributor is responsible for selling the equipment and in so doing must provide a sales force and obtain essential financing. Adequate financing is a must in order to do a proper sales job. In addition, the distributor must provide and stock a parts department. The parts stock of the average distributor will range from \$10,000 to \$50,000 in value. The service department is usually staffed by several mechanics who provide inside and outside service. A good distributor takes pride in his service department and recognizes its intrinsic value in sales and customer relations.

"The operator, generally speaking, must trade in equipment and the distributor must perform this function. Here again the service and parts departments are called upon to properly recondition the equipment for resale.

"The shipping department is required to do the necessary crating, loading and other related tasks.

"Lastly, a distributor will generally engage in advertising, sometimes quite extensive and expensive, in order to bring his offerings to the attention of the operators.

"He, therefore, performs a myriad of tasks which the manufacturer cannot possibly perform. A brief perusal of the above facts will make evident the need for the distributor. They also reveal clearly that the distributor's cost of doing business or overhead will, of necessity, be quite high. In some cases these costs have become so high that they have forced distributors into the operating phase of the business. This, of course, is a source of much controversy. But, pro or con, one cannot help but feel that if distributor profits were generally higher those that do operate would leave this phase of the business.

"In view of all this, it is sometimes incredible to hear the criticism directed at the distributors and their pure profits. Many operators would be sincerely amazed to really learn how small the mark-up of the distributor really is. In most cases, it is dangerously small and many distributors are in a constantly precarious financial position. Another fact frequently

overlooked is the big sales by a distributor of one particular item. There must be sufficient profit accumulated in the sales of these hot items to provide for the all too frequent dry spells in between.

"The fate of manufacturer—distributor—operators is one and the same. One cannot successfully go without the other. Each must be strong and on solid ground. This interdependence is recognized by some and must in time be recognized by all concerned."

Best Roadside Play Action For 1957

With Over 6,500,000 Autos in '57 in Hands of World's Travelingest People, Coinbiz Assured Best Roadside Location Action in History

CHICAGO—The year of 1957 may see the greatest roadside play action in all the history of the industry.

In the first place, and as has been reported by this publication in many of its past issues, there are, today, more motels, more taverns and roadside restaurants, more supermarkets and shopping centers on the nation's great highways, than ever before in all the history of this great country.

All this, as can be easily understood, has been brought about by the tremendous sales of autos to the most travelingest people in the history of the world, the U. S. citizens.

With 6,500,000 autos expected to be on the nation's highways in '57, there is every possibility that roadside play action will be greater than ever before known in all of America's history.

What's more, this is only a beginning, because by 1965 there are expected to be over 8,500,000 autos roaming the new highways and toll roads now being constructed.

All this means more and more roadside business which, in turn, means more and still more roadside locations which, again, means better times for this industry. Especially during the summer season, when business is generally supposed to slacken off in cities. Instead, roadside locations can bring into being a very steady income flow for those operators who immediately take advantage of these facts.

With the varied types of products now available, operators can set almost every type of equipment in every type of roadside location. This ranges from music machines to coin operated TV receivers to vendors of all kinds, to amusements and everything else that the traveling public will desire.

It's sure to be a coin operated world the autoists of the nation will find as U. S. ops take advantage of the growing roadside play.

Suggest Light Dim System For Machines Similar To Autos

MONROE, LA.—Ed Lavender of Delta Automatic Music Company, this city, offers a suggestion which he believes would be a great improvement on all types of machines.

"The lights on most machines," Ed states, "are much too bright for some locations, such as cocktail lounges, dance spots, and so forth.

"We sometimes wrap them with colored paper," he reports, "but this fades.

"How about decorative slips over the bulbs to dim the lights?," he asks. And then recommends, "Better still, every machine should have a lights dimmer, just as they have on auto dashboards, so that operators could adjust the lights the way they want them to meet the demand of each location."

Lavender also makes a suggestion which has been one of the crusades of *The Cash Box* for a long time. That of equalized tonal volume for all records.

Ed advises, "The record companies should work out an agreement among themselves to arrange for uniform tonal volume for all recordings.

"Some records are too loud," Ed says, "and others are much too low. This causes the location owner to dash around and tone down one record while, the next minute, dash back to the volume control, to turn one up higher.

"The fact remains," Ed comments, "the tone levelers on the new phonographs work all right, but, are far from perfect."

Following the business session, the members partook of an excellent spread.

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
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C. M. Biz Index Follows U. S. Industries Trend

CHICAGO—Most interesting to the average old timer in the coin machines industry is how closely this business now follows the same pattern as set by all U. S. industries.

In former years a setback in general business usually brought about better play action for this industry.

Today, the pattern seems to have changed, with depressed general business having this same effect on the coin machines field.

Whereas, in former years, a recession of any depth whatsoever, usually brought about greater play action for the area where this occurred.

This past year the case was reversed. The Detroit area suffered a recession for a few months. Instead of operators here reporting better play action, when the huge Detroit labor

force had more time on its hands because of layoffs, they advised that the reverse was the fact.

In short, as the pattern of general U. S. business showed a downtrend, as in the case of Detroit, the coin machines field was also in a recessive condition.

This is also true of the drought areas. Ops in these areas report that their play action did not increase with the fact that people had more time on their hands.

In short, as the pattern of coin machines business now closely parallels the index of all U. S. industries.

Fastest Growing States:

Florida and California

CHICAGO — Population gain must be gauged according to what the population in each state is as against the percentage gained.

In short, with population in California at a high peak, the gain made by that state places it among the most populous states in the nation. The same is true of Florida.

These two, then, are the states where industry can look forth, eventually, to its greatest sales, especially for certain machines it now produces and will produce in the future.

The above statistics, in the sub-headline of this article, will give the members of this industry some idea of how the states have grown during

1956 and what this growth will mean to them for 1957.

A growth of 16% for Texas is a lot more people than a growth of 55% for Nevada. The same is true of the 18% growth for Michigan and the 15% growth for Ohio as compared to the 13% increase for Oregon, the 26% growth for Delaware and the 41% population jump for Arizona.

Regardless, growth does mean better business, whether the figures run into millions or thousands. And better business means more locations for the equipment of the industry with more people to enjoy the equipment which, in turn, means greater income for those operators who place their equipment wisely and on such a basis where they can show a profit.

More Ops Continue To Praise "10¢ Play Plus"

Ops Agree Move Is Necessary But Differ On Plan To Be Used

CHICAGO—As this publication has continued to report, week after week, operators from all over the nation acclaim The Cash Box' "10¢ Play Plus" plan.

It seems all operators are in agreement that an immediate change must come into being to assure them continuing on in business. This means that they must obtain a more equitable share of the gross intake from all of their machines.

There is complete agreement throughout the country for The Cash Box: "10¢ Play Plus Front Money And/Or A More Equitable Commission Basis".

Norman Morton of Pawtucket, R. I. believes that the best method operators can adopt is 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money.

Russ Caccamise of Jamestown, N. Y. believes that 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis is the best for his area.

Albert Koondel of Brooklyn, N. Y. is a believer in 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money.

Lewis Paulakos of Johnstown, Pa. is of the opinion that the operators should obtain 70%-30% commission in addition to dime play.

Fred W. Shay of Lebanon, Pa. believes that 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission is the answer. Cyrus L. Jacobs of Boston, Mass. agrees with him. So does John R. Gusic of Waynesburg, Pa. So does Romeo H. Rivard of Lewiston, Me. And Edwin H. Stanton of Auburn, N. Y. Also Charles E. Wilcox, Jr. of Pine Bluff, Ark.

Wm. F. Suesens of Long Island City, N. Y. is also a believer in 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis but adds to this, "With minimums".

W. R. Parish of West Columbia, S. C. believes that 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money is best.

Joseph Domitrowich of Allentown, Pa. believes in 10¢ play plus 75%-25% commission basis.

Harry Wasserman of New York, N. Y. doesn't specify how much front money an operator should receive but believes in 10¢ play plus front money.

Stanley C. Woznak of Little Falls, Minn. says that ops should adopt 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money, except, he adds, where 200 selection phones are concerned, then ops should get \$15 per week front money.

Wm. H. Larry of Cumberland, Md. is of the opinion that 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money would do.

Paul Hurst of Aikins, Ark. advises, "I operate on 5¢ play, 50-50 commission. I don't know what the answer is to 10¢ play and front money. I operate about 75 music machines and do very well. I live in a country town and operate in the country. I think there are lots of locations that don't need music machines and I try to set a limit that one has to take in."

Georgia Op Has Been On 10¢ Play Plus Minimum Front Money For Years

THOMASVILLE, GA. — For many years now, W. D. Bagnall of this city has been operating on 10¢ play plus minimum (front money) guarantees. He has proved that this can be satisfactorily accepted by all locations.

"We have been operating for many years", Bagnall advises, "on the following basis and it is acceptable to all of our locations."

"First", he states, "all of our machines are on 10¢ play."

"Second", he continues, "we have a minimum that we take out of the gross intake from each machine. This minimum ranges from \$6.00 to \$15.00 per week, depending on the type and amount of equipment used in the location."

"After deducting the required minimum", Bagnall explains, "the balance of the gross intake is on a 50-50 basis if the balance is double, or more than double, the amount of the minimum."

"All of our locations pay 50 percent of the cost of licenses, regardless of

whether they receive 50 percent of the gross intake from the machine.

"I fought for something like this", Bagnall goes on to state, "along with my brother during his lifetime for many years. Eventually, I started it alone, to prove that it could be done."

"I believe all locations will accept the fact that an operator has to have a minimum to cover his operating costs. I do not believe that the location will accept the words 'front money'."

"However, I feel that along with our above plan, our commission basis should be changed to 60-40, as soon as is feasible."

"I also believe that this plan could be accomplished very quickly if all operators thruout the United States would cooperate."

Bagnall concludes, "The Cash Box has my deepest appreciation and best wishes for its efforts in trying to promote such a plan."

John R. Gusic of Waynesburg, Pa. advises, "Actually front money would be equivalent to better commission for operators."

"In an area such as mine where, for the past number of years, commissions have been 50-50, it makes it impossible for a 10 year operator, like myself, to try to incorporate a 60-40 split."

"Older operators are afraid of new blood. Since the price of equipment has advanced to such great proportions it makes it rather difficult for ambitious operators to attain their goal."

"Locations insist, at least my locations do, on a 50-50 split. In fact, if they were aggravated enough, locations might buy their own machines. As a result I try to keep my buying of new boxes down to a minimum. Just enough to keep me at the present position. I shall continue this same policy until either the prices of juke boxes decrease or a better commission basis is established. Frankly, I feel that the latter is impossible."

Howard Berk of Bayonne, N. J. suggests 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money.

Stephen Sewell of Tavernier, Fla. likes 10¢ play plus 70%-30% commission basis.

Ruth Michaelson of Brooklyn, N. Y. believes in 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money. Otto Gage of Fayetteville, Ark. agrees with her. So does Ralph Elefanate of Brooklyn, N. Y.

Clinton E. Holden of Hartford, Conn. believes the answer is 10¢ play plus 60%-40% commission basis. Charles Stillman of Augusta, Me. agrees with him.

Stillman adds, "Naturally, every operator would be silly if he didn't agree with one suggestion or the other. But as long as we have renegade operators it will never work."

"In this territory, for instance", Stillman continues, "three of the operators got together and decided on 60-40 for all 100 selections or more. We had the area we operated in solid against all squawks from customers. Of course we tried, in every possible way, to give excellent service. It was paying off."

"Along came an outside operator", Stillman says, "nailed several of our best spots thru loans and 50-50 deals and the battle for survival was on. We are now back where we started. We now have this operator in our midst. Three years work shot to h---."

John E. Orman, Jr. of Russelville, Ala. suggests that operators arrange for 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money.

John D. Fuller of Albany, N. Y. believes in 10¢ play plus 60-40 commission basis, "With a minimum of \$20 per week to the operator if wall boxes are added to the installation".

H. D. Stitt of Opelika, Ala. offers the following suggestions: "10¢ play plus \$5 per week where collections are under \$10 per week, 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money for new machines. 10¢ play plus 60-40 commission where collections are under \$25 per week. Over \$25 per week, 10¢ 40 or 70-30 commission basis."

Thomas M. Welsh of New Orleans, La. suggests 10¢ play plus front money, but doesn't specify the amount of front money.

Frank Mager of Grand Rapids, Minn. believes in either of two systems, 10¢ play plus \$5 per week front money, or 10¢ play plus 60-40 commission basis.

Mercury Music Co. of Meriden, Conn. believes in three methods for operators. 10¢ play plus \$10 per week front money. 10¢ play plus either 60-40 or 70-35 commission basis.

More Firms Enter Export Field Larger Number of Manufacturers and Distributors Active in Export Biz

CHICAGO—There is no longer any doubt of the great and growing interest among U. S. firms for improving their export business.

More manufacturers and distributors have entered into the export field. All are of the belief that exports can become a very profitable division of their businesses.

Manufacturers are of the belief that added sales of new machines to the world markets are now necessary to continue volume production.

This, in turn, they report, also helps the domestic market. They point out that, as long as they can continue on a volume production basis, prices will remain stationary. This helps operators in the U. S. as well as importers worldwide.

Distributors, in turn, believe that an outlet for the used machines they take in trade, is of paramount importance for a successful distributing business.

Distributors have always attempted

to sell to the export markets. Few made a specialty of such effort. Today, this has changed. Many distributors are creating export divisions to handle the difficulties of language, coinage, and other matters relative to exporting equipment of all kinds.

Furthermore, and most appealing to the distributors as well as the manufacturers, is the growing import of the export markets.

Demand, during 1956, from all the world markets, exceeded anything since the postwar era. This, in itself, decided many firms to enter into the export division of the industry.

It is well known that many distributors are backlogged with export orders for late model used equipment. Most of these firms report that it is almost impossible to obtain equipment in any real quantity anymore.

The demand continues. Importers in various parts of the world are turning to new machines where late model used machines are unobtainable.

Asks Phonos Hold To 200 Selections

BLOOMINGDALE, MICH.—E. H. Stockham of this city comes forth with the plea that all phonos be held to 200 selections.

"As long as we now have 200 selections," Stockham says, "let's keep it that way for a while."

"We operators in the small towns just can't keep up with the operators in the big cities."

"Locations just don't realize this. The average location owner thinks that there are even greater selection phonographs in the big cities like Detroit or Chicago."

"He wants the same. Keeps making it miserable for the operators in the small towns."

"He seems to have only one thought, 'I've got to have a bigger juke box.' It gives us operators in the small towns a headache."

"I try to maintain the fact that if you program the phonograph correctly and keep the latest and best recordings in the machine that you'll get the play."

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CHICAGO — A cable received from Mons. Marcel Lucca, Tousjeux Nouveautes, S.A., Geneva, Switzerland, by The Cash Box offices here reads: "WANT TO BUY IMMEDIATELY AND EVERY MONTH HUNDRED AND MORE RECONDITIONED LATE GOTTLIEBS SINGLE PLAYERS NOT OLDER THAN EIGHTEEN MONTHS (STOP) PLEASE CALL ON RELIABLE FRIENDS CHICAGO OR NEAREST NEW YORK PORT HAVE THEM CABLE OFFERS BY LOTS OF FIFTY".

Offers Three Suggestions

NORFOLK, VA. — Hugh W. Minter of this city has three suggestions to offer which he feels will help everyone concerned.

"First", Minter suggests, "handles should be placed at the top of the back part of the phonographs and also on the front part of the bottom of the phonographs. Some of the phonographs have such sharp edges that, when you go to lift or move them, they'll cut your hands."

His second suggestion concerns itself with a more equitable commission arrangement for all operators.

"Where collections are \$25 or less, operators should get \$5 off the top (minimum front money guarantee). If collections are under \$50, then the operator must get \$10 off the top. Under \$75, he should get \$15. And under \$100 the operator should arrange for \$20 minimum. In every case he should then split the balance on a 50-50 basis."

Minter's third suggestion concerns itself with "customer relations".

"After the operator has finished checking the machine", he advises, "he should make it his business to spend a few minutes with the location owner."

"He should find out the location owner's hobby and discuss it with him for a short time.

"The operator should also make worthwhile and constructive suggestions to the location owner that will help the location's business."

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Export Market:

Demand Grows Greater For Used Equipment

Call for Games and Phonos In Record-Breaking Quantities

CHICAGO — Demand for used equipment from all the world markets has reached record-breaking proportions.

(Editor's Note: This issue contains a cable received from a well known firm in Geneva, Switzerland, asking for pinballs in hundred lots to be shipped each week.)

Never before, even this past year, when export business reached a new postwar high mark, has there been such tremendous demand for used and reconditioned games and music equipment.

Distributors who have been active in export for sometime admit that they are "backlogged with orders".

They also report that they do not believe they will be able to fill these orders.

Late model used games and phonographs are now down to the lowest quantity ever known in the industry.

There isn't a distributor's store-room or warehouse that has any appreciable number of games and phonographs, it is reported.

This is, without any doubt, one of the most unusual situations which has come about in the industry since the postwar period started.

Many attribute the lack of sufficient numbers of used machines to the dearth of buying which went on these past years.

These men claim that the industry did not produce, in any great quantity, the type of equipment the export market demands at this time.

Due to the lack of used machines, the manufacturers of new equipment are enjoying greater export business than they believed would prove the case.

Even the importers, in all world markets, complain that prices of the new machines "are much too high" for their countries, they are "forced to buy", they advise, because demand continues to grow greater.

In the meantime, many distributors in the U.S. are now quoting the highest trade-in prices they have ever offered, in an effort to obtain the equipment they need to satisfy their foreign customers.

Should this condition continue, and it seems very likely that it will, many of the manufacturers may discover that an ever growing share of their production is being shipped out of the country.

Amuse Trades Show In London Features Juke Boxes

LONDON, ENGLAND—The 13th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition sponsored by the Amusement Caterers Association took place in London last week.

Some sixty Exhibitors displayed merchandise, and although the Exhibition has not resumed its pre-war scale, it showed signs of improving strides. However, it is certain that this industry suffers from the lack of new machinery coming into the country.

Juke boxes were represented by Messrs. Phonograph Equipment Limited, who are main distributors for the BAL-AMI, and who are reporting very brisk business during the fair, and G. Whitaker, Blackpool, who are Wurlitzer distributors. These machines are at present manufactured under license in Germany and shipped to this country. Other machines on show are the Minstrel, still playing 78 rpm's and the Belgium Manufacturers Renotte exhibiting their machine, a 30 selection 45 player. It is obvious that the machine of the future in this country is the wide range selection 45 player.

Amusement games were practically non-existent compared to pre-war displays. It would not be fair to criticize the exhibition when one realizes that the main difficulty today is based on import restrictions and currency regulations. This country cries out for new games of every description. There is a very big market for them.

The position is now at a standstill and must be taken up at a higher Government level, and it is this publication's earnest desire to see the

How To Use "THE CASH BOX PRICE LISTS"

[Also known as the "C. M. I. (Coin Machine Industry) BLUE BOOK"]

FOREWORD: Many times, wide differences appear in the quotation of high and low prices of certain equipment. Like any true reporter "The Cash Box Price Lists" can only feature the market prices as they are quoted. "The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) REGARDING SELLING PRICES

IMPORTANT!

Reports received indicate that, in some cases, purchasers become upset due to the fact that they cannot, many times, buy equipment listed in the lower price brackets. Sometimes sellers of machines listed at from \$10.00 to \$25.00 ask from \$50.00 up to \$75.00 and even more for these very same machines. Purchasers of such equipment must realize that machines in the very low priced categories are much worn to be priced at these low figures. To completely recondition such machines, the reconditioner must add onto his price the cost of transportation to obtain these machines, the labor, parts and supplies needed to recondition the machines, plus the cost of cartons, crates and labor for packing and shipping of the machines, in addition to a decent profit which will, in most cases, raise the price of a \$10.00 to \$20.00 machine to anywhere from \$50.00 to \$75.00 and up. In the case of arcade and kiddie ride machines these may even be higher due to the fact that many of the parts have to be made by hand or contracted for at some machinist shop, since manufacturers of many of the old arcade machines and kiddie rides are no longer in business and it is impossible to obtain parts for reconditioning. Purchasers of such equipment should take these facts into consideration and, at the same time, should also realize that many buyers today have their own repair and reconditioning departments as well as experienced mechanics, such buyers will purchase machines "as is", at prices quoted by the trade at large, and recondition the machines themselves to meet their own operating standards.


