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Talent Can Be Depleted As Well As Oil Wells!

On the theory that a person's physical assets can be depleted as fast—or possibly faster—than oil wells, Senator Thye of Minnesota has introduced a bill to permit athletes to deduct depletion allowances from their taxes just as owners of oil wells are permitted to do now.

We agree with Senator Thye. Our only reservation is that he doesn't go far enough.

It's about time that Congress took up the problem of the performer in every area of the entertainment world who may make a great deal of money one year and pay a huge income tax while the following year is likely to be bone dry.

Entertainment people occupy a peculiar place in our economy. We often read of tremendous incomes for the top few and are likely to assume that such incomes are the norm. Obviously they are not. The average performer — because of the nature of his work—probably makes less than the average factory worker until he receives a large measure of recognition. There is very little of the in-between ground for a performer. You either make it big and make a lot of money or you don't and virtually starve or get out of the business.

The problem is that even if you do make it, in most cases the number of years in which it is possible to earn a large income is highly limited. This is due to the changing tastes of the public and very often to the changing physical aspects of the performer. A performer—male or female—at twenty-five has a very different appeal than at forty. While his appeal at twenty-five may meet with a great deal of public acceptance, his appeal at forty can be another thing again.

It seems only fair therefore, that because of the peculiar nature of the business of performing, because it is in most cases a very short career, because physical appeal on which performers must very often depend is a fading thing, that they be given at least as much consideration as owners of oil wells are given.

Congress should see to it that a performer who makes a success by entertaining the public should be able to preserve some of his assets for the time when, through no fault of his own but through the very nature of our changing bodies, he is no longer able to convey the appeal on which so many performing careers depend.

PERRY COMO (RCA Victor 7202)

● One of the industry's most consistent hit makers, Perry Como, who has just added another gold disk to his huge collection via "Catch A Falling Star", follows thru with another tremendous two-sided disk that be up on the charts in short order. One side is a delightful novelty dubbed "Kewpie Doll". It's a happy bouncer with a cute lyric that should appeal to all age groups including the kiddies just as "Falling Star" did. And when the tots go for a disk, you can be sure the parents will account for a huge sale. Equally delighting is the coupling "Dance Only With Me". A tender love song set to a slow waltz tempo. Como warbles this one with the familiar warmth that makes his ballad efforts so charming. Tune stems from the up-coming B'way musical "Say Darling".

BOBBY HELMS (Decca 30619)

● Bobby Helms, the country songster who developed into a top pop star with "My Special Angel" and last year's only Christmas hit, "Jingle Bell Rock", has two potent new decks that should give him his first big single of '58. Both tunes stem from the forthcoming Columbia film "The Case Against Brooklyn". One half is a delightful, easy-going rock-a-ballad name-tune called "Jacqueline". It has a charming overall sound and a cute teenage lyric. Bobby handles the number wonderfully. Helms' country background is more in evidence on the titling companion deck "Living In The Shadow Of The Past". Pretty, sentimental opus that should do a bang up job in pop and country. Big two-sider to watch closely.

FONTANE SISTERS (Dot 15736)

● The Fontane Sisters hop on a tune that's beginning to make noise on the coast and come up with their strongest side in a long while—a disk that could be a huge money-maker for the gals. The number, tagged "Chanson D'Amour", is a smooth-sailing, lilting hythm romancer with a subtle R & R backdrop. The deck has a delightful sound and the contagious 'ra-ta-da-ta-da' gimmick sells the number. Save a high spot on the charts for this one. Flip, "Cocoanut Grove", is a cute rock-a-hula novelty with a steel guitar and ukelele supplying up-beat tropical setting. It's the top side all the way.



CBS Laboratories Develops New Stereophonic Record

NEW YORK—In a press conference at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel during the Institute of Radio Engineers convention, Dr. Peter C. Goldmark, president of CBS Laboratories, a division of the Columbia Broadcasting System, Inc., revealed that CBS Laboratories had developed a new stereophonic record.

Goldmark said the development would permit "a smooth transition" from LP monaural records to stereophonic records because the new records could be played on existing 33-1/3 rpm phonographs with "quality as good as the best LP record." Goldmark stated that he did not know when this development would be commercially available.

In the new system two signals are recorded as a single LP record groove. One is recorded by variations in the horizontal form of the grooves. This is the same as the signal now played on ordinary LP records.

The other signal is recorded by vertical variations of the groove. This, Dr. Goldmark reported, is a greatly digested signal that actually contains all the information necessary to give the hearer the full difference between the right and left loudspeaker signals used in the stereophonic recording.

Thus, he said, on any available stereophonic playing equipment a full stereophonic sound is achieved. When played with ordinary monaural LP equipment, he said, the new records have the same level and sound quality as the standard LP record.

The digested signal is made possible by use of an electronic computer technique. This extracts the essential stereophonic elements in the difference in signal between the right and left microphones used in stereophonic recording session.

Capitol Releases 11 Stereo Tapes

HOLLYWOOD, CALIF. — Capitol Records, Inc. announced a release of 11 new stereophonic tape packages for April which will be available throughout the country the week of March 31.

Five of the stereo sets are pop and include Keely Smith in "I Wish You Love", Stan Kenton and his orchestra in "Rendezvous with Kenton", Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians singing and playing "All Through the Night", Les Baxter and his orchestra with a package of original Baxter compositions, "Space Escapade", and Nelson Riddle and his orchestra in "Sea of Dreams".

The balance of six new Capitol stereo tapes for April feature classical music. In one, Leopold Stokowski

and the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra present Stravinsky's "Firebird Suite" and "Petrouchka", while in another, Carmen Dragon conducts the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra in "Chopin by Starlight". Dragon steps to the conductor's podium again to conduct the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra in "Fiesta".

Leonard Pennario, accompanied by the Concert Arts Symphony Orchestra conducted by Felix Slatkin, is heard in Khachaturian's "Concerto for Piano and Orchestra". Slatkin conducts the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra in the other two new stereo reels for April, Grofe's "Grand Canyon Suite" and "Mississippi Suite", and Offenbach's "Gaité Parisienne".

BMI Performance Logging Director To Chair Management Seminar

NEW YORK—Israel Diamond, director of logging at Broadcast Music, Inc., will be chairman of a three-day seminar of business leaders on "The Input Bottleneck: Recording Source for Automatic Processing" to be held on May 26 through 28 at the Sheraton Astor Hotel in New York City under the auspices of the American Management Association. Diamond recently made news by helping to achieve a breakthrough in automation equipment in the development of a new data input device for BMI which, for the first time, automatically handles both fixed and variable data. The new device, an electronic punch-tape processing machine, helps speed up BMI's automatic system for tabulating music performances and for paying songwriters, composers and publishers for their performances.

The seminar is part of the American Management Association's business executives' orientation program, and is open to all management personnel. Using the combined efforts of expert speakers and group discussions, the seminar will thoroughly investigate the problem of data input.

The speakers Diamond will introduce include Fred M. Biathrow, general project supervisor of the New

W. C. Handy Dies

NEW YORK, N. Y.—W. C. Handy, Composer, cornetist, bandmaster and publisher; born in Florence, Alabama, November 16, 1873, died at 3:00 Friday morning (3/29) at Sydenham Hospital, New York.

A member of ASCAP since 1924, educated at Slater High School and at home, Handy's father and grandfather were clergymen. He worked as a school teacher in his native town of Florence, and in the iron mills. He played in the Florence band and organized a quartet, and as cornet soloist booked his group at the Chicago Worlds Fair in 1893. Then he became a bandmaster in Henderson, Ky. and a musical director and cornet soloist with Mahara's Minstrels. In 1907 he organized his own band called "Handy's Band & Orchestra". He also organized the Pace and Handy Music Publishing Co. in 1913.

Among his compositions published by this company were, "The St. Louis Blues", "The Memphis Blues", "The Beale Street Blues", "Hesitating Blues", "Ole Miss", "Joe Turner Blues", "Harlem Blues", "Hager's Children Blues", "Careless Love", "Loveless Love", "Chantez les Ras", "Basement Blues", "Way Down South Where The Blues Began", "Big Stick Blues March", "Hail To The Spirit Of Freedom", "Aframerican Hymn", "There's A Red Glow In The Sky Above Vesuvius", and an anthem entitled, "They That Sow In Tears Shall Reap In Joy".

He was honored by Mayor Wagner on October 28, who issued a proclamation making the week of October 17th, W. C. Handy week. On November 17th, his birthday, he was a guest of honor at a big dinner at the Waldorf at which the chairman was Paul Cunningham, President of ASCAP. Many notable guests attended.

A dinner and trade press screening of Handy's life story, "St. Louis Blues", with Nat Cole playing Handy, was scheduled for April 2nd in Handy's hometown, Yonkers, N. Y. However, due to the famed composer's death, plans to go on with the affair, as of press time, were undecided.



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Csida Answers Charge Made By Lawyer At Smathers Bill Hearing

NEW YORK—At the recent Communications Sub-Committee hearings in Washington D.C. on the Smathers Bill, the following statements were among the testimony of attorney Seymour Lazar:

"Let us look to see how far BMI has gone in the field of artists. I know of a music publishing company called Trinity Music Company. In addition to their publishing operation, Trinity Music Company controls an artists-management company, which tells their performers what to perform and what songs to sing. I feel confident that Trinity Music's so-called advance or subsidy from BMI is larger than that normally earned by a publishing company with its volume because when Trinity performers perform, they are more often than not BMI tunes."

In answer to Lazar's remarks, Joe Csida, president of Trinity Music, Inc., and Csida-Grean Associates made the following reply:

"We have never met Mr. Lazar, nor have we ever heard of him. His statement to the committee concerning Trinity Music and its talent management affiliate, Csida-Grean Associates, displays most glaringly either a fantastic naivete and lack of knowledge concerning the music business and show business, or is a deliberate attempt by vicious innuendo to read sinister motives into legitimate and standard business operations."

"Of course my associates and I operate Csida-Grean Associates, Inc., a talent management firm, as well as Trinity Music, Inc., a music publishing firm, which licenses its performance rights through BMI. We operate these two firms as well as several other enterprises. Operators of music publishing firms have for more than twenty-five years to my knowledge, often also operated talent management firms, representing one or more performers. Similarly artists, themselves, (let alone their managements) often own music publishing firms, both ASCAP and BMI."

"If Mr. Lazar did not know this, I am happy to contribute to his education. If he did know it, he should know that his statement to the Committee is as silly as saying that Roncom Music is subsidized by ASCAP, because it is owned by Perry Como, and that Mr. Como plugs only ASCAP music on his very popular television show, and records only ASCAP songs on his RCA Victor Records. The truth is that Mr. Como records and performs on his TV show those songs which he believes are best suited to his talents and the show's format, and those he believes are most popular. Mr. Como doesn't care whether such songs are ASCAP or BMI, or even if they are Roncom Music."

"Similarly, the artists managed by Csida-Grean, such as Eddy Arnold, Jim Lowe, Betty Johnson and Norman Leyden record and perform on radio, television or live, at all times, those songs which are best suited to their talents, and which they and we mutually believe will best be received by the public. As the operators of Trinity Music we work very hard with talented songwriters to try to create a constant pool of excellent material for Csida-Grean performers to work with. If we create songs which are better for them than other available

songs, regardless of performance society affiliation, and the performers agree they are better, they perform such songs. If not they perform other songs, either ASCAP or BMI affiliated.

"Any analysis of the songs performed by Csida-Grean artists on records, via radio, TV or live will bear out the fact that they perform more ASCAP than BMI material, only because ASCAP has a vastly larger repertoire of highly popular standards, than BMI."

Csida-Grean artists are intelligent, free people and they resent the irresponsible statement by Mr. Lazar that their management tells them what to perform and what songs to sing. As conscientious talent managers we try to give them whatever aid and counsel our experience enables us to give them, in connection with their repertoire, just as we try to do with all phases of their activities as performers. But they themselves make the final decision as to what they will do, in regard to songs and all other phases of their careers."

Columbia Names Peppin West Coast Operations Manager

NEW YORK — Paul Peppin has been appointed West Coast Operations Manager for Columbia Records' branch operation, according to an announcement by Ken Glancy, General Manager of company-owned distribution centers. Long associated with Columbia Records as a District Manager, Peppin will headquarter in Los Angeles and will assist Norman Goodwin, Los Angeles Branch Manager, in branch administration.

Also announced last week was the transfer of Don England, Kansas City Branch Manager, to the Detroit Center. He will be replaced by Donald Morse, who has been a salesman in the Kansas City area for many years.

All appointments become effective March 31, 1958.







POPULAR




"GOOD NIGHT, DEAR LORD"—Johnny Mathis with the Percy Faith Orchestra—Columbia CL-1119 (1-12" LP)

The hot songster, follows his hit L.P. "Warm", with a collection of beautifully rendered inspirational songs. The consistent hitmaker, with the Percy Faith musicians providing an impressive string backdrop, gives his heartfelt portrayals of selections from all faiths. "Eli Eli", "Deep River", "Ave Maria", and "Where Can I Go", are among the items presented on this stirring set. Another tremendous package from Mathis. Definite chart attraction.



"GIGI"—David Rose and his Orchestra—M-G-M E8640 (1-12" LP)

The much-recorded music from the new musical is beautifully undertaken by the Rose musicians. The ork's smoothly blended brass and strings serve as a refreshing showcase for the tunes. With all the competition with the Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe score, this set stands out as one of the best entries. Another great album of music for Rose's many followers. Should get plenty of sales.



"SATCHMO'S COLLECTORS ITEMS" — Louis Armstrong and his Orchestra — Decca DL-8327 (1-12" LP)

Armstrong is heard in a compilation of some of his greatest recordings. Featured with the famous trumpeter are his orchestra, and vocal choruses. "Satchmo", in addition to his stirring trumpet work, offers his gravel throated vocal readings designed to delight. Two of the delightful oldies are "Jeepers Creepers", and "I Can't Give You Anything But Love". Due for a hearty welcome both deejay and sales wise.



"OH CAPTAIN!" — Members of the original Broadway cast with Eileen Rodgers — Columbia 01-5280 (1-12" LP)

The hit Broadway musical comedy is offered with Eileen Rodgers replacing Abbe Lane in the part of Bobo. The Jose Ferrer production makes for mighty enjoyable listening through the efforts of Jacquelyn McKeever, Edward Platt, Susan Johnson, and Paul Valentine. One enjoyable number is an amusing goodie called "Three Paradises", done by Tony Randall, as Capt. Henry St. James. Excellent production of a hit Broadway play. Chart stock—and a must for retailers.



"LET'S GET AWAY FROM IT ALL"—Ray Ellis and his Orchestra—Columbia CL-1097 (1-12" LP)

Ellis, who has provided melodic ork support for many top stars, takes his crew through a host of light romantic numbers. The musicians' smoothly blended brass and strings creates an excellent musical spotlight for the goodies. Some of the tunes the listener is treated to are "Moonlight Becomes You" "Long Ago," and "They Say It's Wonderful". Hot stock for the retailer. Nice display type cover.



"HAVE A WONDERFUL WEEKEND"—Mitchell Ayers and his Orchestra—RCA Victor LPM-1603 (1-12" LP)


Mitchell Ayers, while offering such familiar evergreens as "You Stepped Out Of A Dream", "A Kiss To Build A Dream On", "A Handful Of Stars", and "Taking A Chance On Love", displays a musically entertaining delivery. The ork's smooth brass and lush strings are combined to give the listener a program of items perfect for listening or dancing. Excellent deck that should meet the tastes of the youngsters as well as the adults.



"HIMS"—Anita Ellis Epic LN-3419 (1-12" LP)

Anita Ellis builds the album around a collection of selections bearing the names of men. Miss Ellis, on her sec-LP venture for the diskery, is accompanied by Hal Schaefer and ork. Some of the "Hims" receiving the artist's torchy delivery are "I'm Just Wild About Harry", "Danny Boy", "Good For Nothing Joe", etc. Nice set of vocals from a capable vocalist.

CLAIR DE LUNE



"CLAIR DE LUNE"—The Philadelphia Piano Orchestra conducted by Carle Knisley—Epic LN-3435 (1-12" LP)

The most unusual orchestra, comprised entirely of pianos, offers the popular and light classical selections with a refreshing new sound. The ork is made up of ten players at five pianos, and together they give a lyrical example of musical teamwork. Carle Knisley conducts the pianists through beautiful readings. Two especially enjoyable items are "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes" and "Rhapsody In Blue". Nicely done.



"SAIL ALONG SILV'RY MOON"—Billy Vaughn and his Orchestra—Dot DLP-3100 (1-12" LP)

Vaughn is sitting pretty with his chart effort, "Sail Along Silvery Moon", from which the name of the album is derived. The ork's inventive delivery gives the items, mostly evergreens, a new look. Two of the attractively treated numbers are items closely associated with the Glen Miller band, "Sunrise Serenade" and "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You". The ork leader and his crew have created a disk to please a variety of musical tastes. Should sell big.



"SPACE ESCAPADE"—Les Baxter and his Orchestra—Capitol T-968 (1-12" LP)

Baxter and his ork treat the listener to an array of original material tied to today's space thinking. The crew's always colorful and varied instrumental approach makes for some easy on the ears entertainment. The enjoyable sessions include "Somewhere In Space", "The Lady Is Blue", "Shooting Star", and "The Other Side Of The Moon". Again the successful ork leader has a disk destined for plenty of sales.



"AIN'T WE GOT FUN"—The Four Grads—Liberty LRP-3079 (1-12" LP)

The Four Grads offers a follow up to their first LP offering, "From This Moment On". The songsters have a delivery that is jazz inspired. Along with the okay ork backing of the Spencer-Hagen orchestra, the Grads do some beautiful blending. "Back In Your Own Back Yard", "Moon-glow" and "The Nearness Of You", are among the tunes receiving the cool readings. Tasty progressive vocal entry.



"PRECIOUS MEMORIES"—Bill Kenny of the Ink Spots—Decca DL-8683 (1-12" LP)

Kenny assisted by various groups and orchestras, interprets a dozen songs of faith and inspiration. The songster's familiar, high-pitched, yet warm, delivery is heard on "Somebody Bigger Than You And I", "The Lords Prayer", "Our Lady Of Fatima", and "Ave Maria". The song spinners quartet and choir are heard behind Kenny in the impressive portrayals. Will certainly please inspirational recording lovers.



"POPULAR GOLD ALBUM"—Various artists—Capitol T-972 (1-12" LP)

The issue is a collection of the diskery's finest pop artists. Twelve vocal and instrumental stars are presented offering items from their best selling albums. The line up includes Nat "King" Cole ("Love Is The Thing"), Les Baxter ("Simba"), George Shearing ("September Song"), and Jackie Gleason ("Once In A While"). The pressing will be helped saleswise by its top name value. Worthy offering.



"IN THE SPOTLIGHT"—Tony Martin — Decca D1-8366 (1-12" LP)

Martin turns in some fine vocals aided greatly by an excellent chorus. The popular songster, with the assistance of a number of orks backing him, capably handles the twelve standards. Tony Martin has a way with a tune, and he displays it when going over "September Song", "The Hills Of Rome" and "Sleepy Lagoon". Will delight the vocalist's fans.

"SAY IT IN SPANISH"—Capitol T-928 (1-12" LP)
"SAY IT IN FRENCH"—Capitol T-931 (1-12" LP)

Capitol offers two disks designed to teach the easiest and most used French and Spanish phrases. Each of the pressings, starting with the most used words, first has an English phrasing followed by the same word or sentence repeated in French or Spanish twice. The waxings can be a great help to the traveler as well as anyone who would like to learn a foreign language in the easiest and quickest way.



"HI-HO"—Mary Martin with Tutti Camarata his Trumpets and Orchestra—Disneyland WDL-4016 (1-12" LP)

The popular stage and screen personality presents the listener with a goodly helping of Walt Disney showtunes. Most of the items come from the children's classic "Snow White And The Seven Dwarfs", which is being brought back to the screen in re-release. Two inventive sessions are offered in Miss Martin's jazzed up versions of "Hi-Ho" and "The Magic Song". An extensive promotion campaign, along with the release of the movie, ought to insure lots of sales.



"PARADE OF HITS"—John Gart At the Conn Electronic Organ—Kapp KL-1073 (1-12" LP)


Gart, with a dozen pop favorites to work with, displays his versatile organ talents. The virtuoso takes great advantage of the instruments dynamic depth and range while playing the selections. Among the tunes are "On The Street Where You Live", "Canadian Sunset", "Poor People Of Paris", and "All The Way". Nice collection of well done organ stylings.



"THE ROAD TO ROMANCE"—Dorothy Lamour—Design DLP-45 (1-12" LP)

Miss Lamour has a good singing voice and uses it to good advantage on this album. Henry Russell and his orchestra provide a capable backdrop as the thrush comes thru with "Did You Ever See A Dream Walking", "Can't Help Loving That Man", "That Old Feeling", "Why Was I Born", and six others. The artist also receives good backing from the Crew Chiefs. Pleasing record.

JAZZ



"LADIES OF JAZZ"—Mary Lou Williams and Barbara Carroll—Atlantic 1271 (1-12" LP)

The two female jazz pianists render a host of top flight items. Each side showcases one of the artists with drum and bass. Miss Carroll lends her delicate delivery to seven numbers including "My Funny Valentine", and "Autumn In New York", while Miss Williams showcases her very musical approach with "From This Moment On" and "Swonderful". Should find a very receptive audience. Lots of deejay spins due.



"SWINGIN' ON BROADWAY"—The Jonah Jones Quartet—Capitol T-963 (1-12" LP)

Jonah Jones, whose "Muted Jazz" suddenly took off towards the charts, offers a follow up set spotlighting hit songs from great Broadway musicals. The quartet take off on the tunes with refreshing readings of the familiar melodies. One of the songs is Jones' current single "Baubles, Bangles And Beads". The trumpeter has a deck that will see lots of sales action from his growing following.



"THE FABULOUS BILL HOLMAN"—Bill Holman—Coral CRL-57188 (1-12" LP)

Bill Holman, known best for his composing and stints with the Kenton band, is front man on this LP. With a band including such standout jazz talent as Conte Condoli (trumpet), Charlie Mariano and Richie Kamuca (saxes), Holman takes his tenor through hard brass renditions of mostly original material. Two extremely impressive items are "Come Rain Or Come Shine" and "The Big Street". Ok set.



"THE ART TATUM-BEN WEBSTER QUARTET"—Verve MGV-8220 (1-12" LP)

The late Art Tatum, one of the most influential pianists of our time, is heard on a collection of sessions cut with Ben Webster. The previously unreleased items feature the two soloists with the able rhythm backing by Red Callender and Bill Douglas on bass and drums respectively. The tunes, mostly evergreen ballads, include "Gone With The Wind", and "All The Things You Are". Name value offers a big sales attraction.



"RELAXIN' WITH THE MILES DAVIS QUINTET"—Prestige 7129 (1-12" LP)

Once again Miles Davis' virile trumpet approach is showcased. Blowing along with Davis is the much respected tenor of John Coltrane. The quintet is heard spotlighting six tunes, including three durables. Supplying the rhythm is Red Garland on piano, Paul Chambers on bass, and Philly Joe Jones on drums. One groovy opus is "It Could Happen To You". A must for all jazz enthusiasts. Assured sales.

CLASSICAL



FALLA: Nights In The Gardens Of Spain—and music of Granados, Albeniz, Falla, and Mompou—Artur Schnabel piano—Enrique Jorda conducting the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra—RCA Victor LM-2181 (1-12" LP)

The great pianist and the orchestra combine for a brilliant reading of the "Nights In The Gardens Of Spain." One side is given to Falla's work, and side two programs six pieces including Mompou's "Cancero I Dansa", and Albeniz' "Suite Espanola, No. 3: Sevilla". Enrique Jorda leads the musicians with poise and authority. Top name value plus superb readings will prove a healthy sales stimulant. Top classical fare.



VICTOR HERBERT: Cello Concerto—JOHANN FRIEDRICH PETER: Sinfonia In G—Howard Hanson conducting the Eastman-Rochester Symphony Orchestra—Mercury MG-50163 (1-12" LP)

The orchestra offers its usual lyrical readings with the help of Georges Miquelle's expert violin work on "Cello Concerto". The popular Eastman-Rochester musicians, in beautiful response to their conductor's guidance, come forth with the kind of musical balance that makes enjoyable listening. The melodic compositions are given worthy treatments. Another exceedingly well done effort from the Hanson organization.



"CLASSIC GOLD ALBUM"—Special selections from Capitol's best selling albums—Capitol PAO-8426 (1-12" LP)

The record programs some of the greatest efforts from Capitol albums. The many selections include Debussy's "Clare De Lune", by Leopold Stokowski and his Orchestra; Nathan Milstein offering the classic "Flight Of The Bumble Bee", Carmen Dragon and the Capitol Symphony Orchestra doing Smetana's "Dance Of The Comedians", from The Bartered Bride, and eight others. A fine collection of classical masterpieces. A welcome addition to any classical shelf.



GRIEG: Peer Gynt Suite—Symphonic Dances—Elegiac Melodies—Sir John Barbirolli conducting the Halle Orchestra—Mercury MG-50164 (1-12" LP)

The magnetic Grieg compositions are always a delight and the Halle orchestra provides a wonderful showcase. Sir John Barbirolli does a strong directing job, especially on the most popular "Peer Gynt Suite". "Elegiac Melodies" is unique in that it features only the strings of the orchestra. The disk should find a nice place in the sales scene.

"Witch Doctor" Liberty's Biggest

HOLLYWOOD — Liberty Records' new single, "Witch Doctor" by David Seville looms as the biggest hit in the firm's history according to Liberty execs. Seville (nom de plume of Ross Bagdasarian) composed the music and lyrics and handles the vocal for the record. Liberty reports the disk has hit the 100,000 mark in its first week of release with orders from distributors and retail outlets flooding the company. Si Waronker, Liberty president, predicts the record will reach the one million mark in two months.

"This record is a shot in the arm for the entire industry," Waronker states, "since record sales for all companies in most instances have been in the doldrums in wide areas. Distributor and retail orders on this new single indicate it may become another smash like 'Davy Crockett'."

Sales to date on the record show it will far exceed the one million mark reached by Julie London's "Cry Me A River", previous biggest seller for Liberty.

In the Popular Publishers division, Richard A. Kuhn was elected with 12,874 votes; Joseph A. Santly with 12,482 votes. The runners up in this category were Hy Zaret with 4,473; George M. Cohan, Jr., 1,758; W. C. Handy, Jr., 1,368; Ernest Farmer, 1,218.

The writers in the Popular-Production Field elected were Abel Baer with a vote of 236,430 and John Redmond with 163,312. The runners up in this category were Leonard Whitcup, 74,797; Harold J. Rome, 70,504; May Singh Breen, 57,783; Philip Springer, 20,636.

In the Standard Field the publisher elected was Joseph A. Fischer with a vote of 14,701. The runners up were Harold Flammer, Jr., 1,319 and Walter Gould with 802 votes. In the Standard Writer category Virgil Thomson was elected with a vote of 150,924. The runners up in this category were Morton Gould with a vote of 131,713 and Paul Creston with a vote of 28,202.

Cowen announced his intentions to incorporate the new acting instruction enterprise under the name of H. H. Cowen Productions. The firm will operate out of New York.

Frank Mancini replaces Cowen as New York promotion manager.

Prior to joining Mercury, Cowen spent three years with Columbia Records' New York distributor, Times-Columbia. Before that he was associated with the Warner Brothers Music Publishing Companies for three years.



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Capitol's April LP Release

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records offers 31 new albums in its April release. The program consists of 14 new pop albums, 11 classical and six in the label's 'Capitol of the World' series. The entire program is themed to "HI-Fiesta on Capitol Records".

Artists with new pop recordings include Frank Sinatra, Les Baxter, Peggy Lee, Gordon MacRae, Joe Bushkin, Jackie Davis, The Andrews Sisters, Pee Wee Hunt, Ferlin Husky, Sonny James, the new Hawaiian music set presented by Webley Edwards, another in the label's "Just for Variety" album series, and the first album featuring Bob Bain and his music. Also included is a new album featuring the voices of Ferlin Husky, Sonny James, Tommy Sands and Gene Vincent.

The Sinatra entry is "This Is Sinatra (Volume Two)" in which the artist includes many of the songs he helped make famous. Among these are "Hey! Jealous Lover", "Put Your Dreams Away", "Time After Time", "You're Cheatin' Yourself" and eight others. This package marks the twelfth by Sinatra for Capitol.

Les Baxter, with a large orchestra featuring a variety of musical instruments not heard in the original production, offers selections from Rodgers and Hammerstein's "South Pacific".

Peggy Lee is heard in a package called "Jump for Joy". Among tracks in this package are "When My Sugar Walks Down the Street", "I Hear Music", "Old Devil Moon", "Cheek to Cheek" and others.

The all-time favorite encore songs of Gordon MacRae which he has sung to close many a concert and night club act, are included in his "Gordon MacRae in Concert" album on the new release. The orchestra is directed by Van Alexander.

One of America's top pianists, Joe Bushkin, offers a dozen tunes keyed to "Nightsounds".

"Jumpin' Jackie" is the new April album featuring Jackie Davis at the Hammond organ.

Dressed in the attire of the era on the cover of their new album, "The Dancing Twenties", are the Andrews Sisters who, with the Billy May orchestra, revive a number of hits of that era.

Pee Wee Hunt swings Cole Porter in "Cole Porter a la Dixie", featuring off-beat arrangements by Billy May, Sid Feller and Dave Cavanaugh.

Graphically illustrating on his new album cover that he's "Got the World on a String", one of the tracks in his new album, is Ferlin Husky's "Sittin' On A Rainbow".

In his new album, "Honey!", Sonny James takes his listeners on a musical journey through the many moods of love—happy, sentimental and sad.

In addition to their own complete albums, Husky and James join Tommy Sands and Gene Vincent in another new Capitol album for teenagers, "Teen-Age Rock!".

The star of the 23-year-old "Hawaii Calls" radio show, Webley Edwards, offers his sixth Capitol high fidelity album of Hawaiian music recorded on the beach at Waikiki, "Hula Island Favorites", featuring the "Hawaii Calls" orchestra, soloists and chorus with Al Kealoha Perry. The package includes a collection of some of the most popular hula songs of the islands.

Bob Bain, rock 'n roll guitarist, is introduced in his first Capitol album, "Rockin' Rollin' Strollin'", which includes melodies of great rhythms and blues tunes plus some originals composed by Bain himself.

"Just for Variety, Vol. 14" is introduced on the April release, including the artistry of Kay Starr, Nat "King" Cole, Harry James, Les Paul and Mary Ford, The Four Freshmen, Nelson Riddle, "Tennessee" Ernie Ford, Ray Anthony, Stan Kenton, Joe

"Fingers" Carr, Jackie Davis and June Hutton.

Capitol is backing up its pop program for April with a concentrated promotion keyed to the program theme "HI-Fiesta on Capitol Records".

Among devices used are full-color displays promoting "This is Sinatra (Volume 2)", a rock 'n roll display featuring the new albums of Sonny James and Ferlin Husky and the album "Teen-Age Rock", and "Rockin' Rollin' Strollin'", the Capitol debut album featuring Bob Bain's music, and a new window or counter card on Les Baxter's new "South Pacific" music album.

The company also introduces its "Pop Pyramid", which features 10 of Capitol's top pop albums for April in a new display; full-color cover reproductions are mounted on corrugated board and easily connected by dealers to metal stays. Through this device, many unusual display arrangements can be used for window displays by dealers. Capitol has distributed to deejays a new album preview package especially prepared for programming and national reviewer use.

Of the 11 classical albums on the release, five are 12 inch LP's (33-1/3 rpm) and the balance are 45 rpm albums. First of the LP's is "Chopin by Firkusny", featuring the pianist Rudolf Firkusny.

Nathan Milstein is heard in a violin performance of two Beethoven works, "Sonata No. 9 in A Major, Op. 47" and "Sonata No. 8 in G Major, Op. 30, No. 3" ("Kreutzer"). Pianist Arthur Balsam accompanies Milstein.

Another album in Capitol's FDS is a rendition by William Steinberg conducting the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra in Mozart's "Symphony No. 40 in G Minor, K. 550" and "Serenade for String Orchestra, K. 525, Ein Kleine Nachtmusik".

Inside an attractive full-color painted cover, Capitol offers an FDS album by Carmen Dragon conducting the Capitol Symphony Orchestra in "La Belle France". The fifth FDS high fidelity LP is Beethoven's "Quartet No. 13 in B Flat Major, Op. 130", played by the Hollywood String Quartet. This recording is being made available as a single from Capitol's deluxe set of Beethoven Quartets recently released as a five LP boxed set.

The six 45 rpm classical albums include "On the Trail" and "Theme from 'Rhapsody in Blue'" by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra conducted by Felix Slatkin and Leonard Pennario, pianist; "Clair de Lune" and "Blue Danube" by Leopold Stokowski; "Waltz of the Flowers", and "Waltz from Sleeping Beauty" by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra conducted by Felix Slatkin; "Jalousie" and "Dark Eyes", also by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony, but this one conducted by Carmen Dragon; "Fire Dance", "Sabre Dance" and Brahms' "Hungarian Dances No. 5 and 6" by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony; and "Prelude in C Sharp Minor", "Waltz in D Flat", "Malaguena" and "Ritual Fire Dance" by Leonard Pennario.

Among the half dozen new 'Capitol' of the World high fidelity albums on the release are Renato Carosone's "Blue Italian Skies" (recorded in Milan); "Honeymoon in Portugal", an album of fados and cancaos, featuring Carlos Ramos and Trio Odemira (recorded in Lisbon); "Sones Mexicanos", featuring the voice of Antonio Maciel and Los Agujillas and the Mariachi Mexico conducted by Rafael Carrion (recorded in Mexico); Luiz Bonfás, guitar virtuoso with "Brazilian Guitar" (recorded in Rio de Janeiro); (Georges) "Guetary Sings French Songs" with orchestra conducted by Jo Moutel (recorded in Paris); and "Pop Piano Concertos" featuring Semprini at the keyboard with the Abbey Orchestra of London (recorded in London).

RIAA Sets Standards For Stereo Disks

NEW YORK—At a meeting of the Board of Directors Record Industry Association of America, Inc. held on March 25, 1958, the Design standards for stereophonic disk records as outlined and recommended by the Engineering Committee of the Association on January 23, 1958, were approved and adopted as RIAA standards. These standards provide for recording by the so-called 45°-45° system. The Board also approved for stereophonic disk records the same Recording and Reproducing Characteristics and the same Dimensional standards as have previously been adopted for 45 RPM and 33 1/3 RPM records as outlined in RIAA Bulletins E1 and E2.

However, decisions on the use of approved standards are left to individual companies because the Board believes that complete independence in this respect leads to a healthy competitive spirit and makes available promptly to the public all engineering advances which may be developed within the industry.

Victor Ellington LP Wins Norway Jazz Award

NEW YORK — RCA's "In A Melotone" by Duke Ellington and his Orchestra has won the critics' award as the best jazz album released in Norway during 1957.

Eilif Meyer, general manager of NERA, representative of the Radio Corporation of America in Norway, was given a silver plaque commemorating the event at a recent dinner in the Newspapermen's Club in Oslo.

The album includes 16 of Ellington's most famous works, recorded at various sessions from 1940 to 1942. The selections, chosen by jazz critic Nat Hentoff, never before had been released on a long-playing record.

"We are delighted to have the multi-talented Roy Ross with us," commented Katz, "for his rich radio background, and his talents as composer, conductor, arranger and musician, place him well in the forefront among all Musical Directors."

Toshiko Returns

BOSTON—Toshiko, Japanese jazz pianist, who did a very successful stint at the Bradford Hotel's Carousel Room in Boston last January, plays a return date there April 9th for two weeks.

"When there in January, Toshiko was the first jazz attraction ever to have played the club, and the nitery's manager, Al Taxier reported that the 88'er drew the best business of the previous 12 months.

Toshiko is in Boston as a student at the Berklee School of Music in her third year on a four year scholarship.

The pianist and her trio are featured on two Storyville albums and on one LP under the Verve banner.

Publisher Willy Strecker Dies At 74

NEW YORK—One of the last links between the traditionally great composers of music and the modern masters was severed early this month with the death of music publisher Wilhelm Strecker, managing director of B. Schott's Sohne (B. Schott and Sons) of Mainz, Germany. Strecker died of a stroke on March 1 at his home in Wiesbaden, West Germany, at the age of 74. Strecker was one of the few remaining publishers of the old school, an imposing international figure who combined keen business sense with recognized taste and a flair for the discovery of new musical talent.

Strecker was born into the business of music publishing; he and his elder brother, Ludwig, were heirs to B. Schott's Sohne which was founded in the year of Beethoven's birth (1770). The Schott house published Beethoven and many other famous composers of the 18th and 19th centuries. Strecker's father, who as a partner of the firm encouraged and published the works of Richard Wagner, sent his young son, Willy, to serve as an apprentice in the best publishing houses in Europe and America. After finishing his apprenticeship, Willy became director of the firm's London office, Schott Sohne and Augener's. He remained in London through the first World War, and became a personal friend and inspiring influence to the foremost artists and composers of the time. Following World War I, he returned to Mainz.

His skill, energy and courageous and influential championing of the contemporary composers of his day resulted in much of the music that we now recognize as modern classics. He is credited with the discovery of Hindemith, Orff, and Hentze, for example, and has published works of most of contemporary music's famous composers, including Stravinsky, Schoenberg, Milhaud, and Martineau. In

many music circles he is credited with being the single most important influence of the "decisive years," the 1920's, which was the transition period between the dominance of the classic and impressionist schools and the growing influence of contemporary music.

"Ray Rayner Record Party" Bows

CHICAGO — WBBM-TV's new "Ray Rayner Record Party" debuted March 29, featuring a pop song contest, and fun in general centered around the playing of records. The hour-long show will concentrate on good pop records, according to Rayner.

Explaining the format more in detail, Ray said, "There'll be more of everything: more dancing, more music, more zany pantomimes featuring Mina Kolb and myself, and more record stars."

The contest will enable home viewers to compete for prizes of records, phonographs and wrist watches. Viewers are invited to send Ray postal cards, listing name, address and phone number—plus the titles of their three favorite records.

Ray will draw several cards during the show, from a hopper, and will phone the persons who sent them in to establish winners.

If the contestant identifies one song correctly, he receives four record albums. Two right answers net him the albums and a Columbia phonograph. Three correct answers give him the albums, the phonograph and a wrist watch. Even if he should miss all three questions, he'll still receive a record album, just for being called.

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Paul Cohen Named A&R Head of Coral-Brunswick

NEW YORK—Paul Cohen has been appointed to the position of Director of Artists and Repertoire of Coral and Brunswick Records, according to an announcement made by Leonard W. Schneider, Executive Vice-President of Decca Records.

Cohen, a veteran in the record industry, has been associated with the parent label, Decca Records, since 1934. At that time he joined the organization's Chicago Branch in the Sales Department. Later Cohen became Manager of the Decca Branch in Cincinnati, and, in 1944, he joined the National Office in New York in the Artists and Repertoire Department. Since that time he has been responsible for the discovery of many leading artists, in both the country and pop fields. Among the many hit recordings Cohen has been responsible for during his tenure at Decca include: "Tell Me Why" by The Four

Aces; "Chattanooga Shoe Shine Boy" by Red Foley; "He" by Al Hibbler and, recently, Bobby Helms' "My Special Angel." Cohen, who was born in Chicago, first entered the music business in that city when, in 1925, he joined the Sales Department of Columbia Gramophone Company.

Coral Records was first organized in 1948, and almost immediately began to make rapid strides, with a string of hit recordings that has consistently increased the Company's stature. Among the top artists on the company's roster under long-term contracts are Teresa Brewer, the McGuire Sisters, Lawrence Welk, Buddy Holly and the Crickets, Billy Williams and many others.

In addition to Cohen, who will assume his new post immediately, the Coral A & R staff consists of Dick Jacobs, George Cates and Sonny Lester.

Spier Music Forms Greenwich Records

NEW YORK—Larry Spier, Inc., veteran music publishing firm being run by Belle Nardone, Hal Webman, and Larry Spier, Jr., last week entered the record business with the release of its first dishing through its newly organized subsidiary, Greenwich Records, Inc. First release on the Greenwich label features the Chiefs, a vocal-instrumental group directed for the recording by Sid Bass, doing "Apache!" b/w "Dee's Dream".

Greenwich's Records is being A & R'd by Hal Webman, who recently joined the Spier organization after serving a stint in the recording department at Decca Records. In addition to the Chiefs, Webman has signed to exclusive recording contracts and has already etched other acts including a teen-age vocal-instrumental group called Ritchie and The Playboys and Buddy Thompson, a young country rock and roll balladeer from Louisiana.

The Spier triumvirate pointed out that their move into the record business was designed to expand its operation but that it in no way intrudes with its publishing interests and activity. The recordings which were made were of material peculiar to and/or written by the various performers, and not of the type which would ordinarily be submitted for recording by other artists on major or independent labels. The Spier firms currently are working on "Kiss And Make Up", recorded by the Crowns on the R & B label, "Mexican Rock And Roll" with Capitol and Dot recordings, "Just Say I Love Her", a standard with new recordings by Vic Damone and Joni James, "Strollin' Girl" recorded by Johnnie Ray, and others.

Greenwich currently is rounding out its distributors, having already lined up most of the east and mid-western markets. The diskery will handle its business through Greenwich Sales Corp. Both firms will headquarter at 1650 Broadway, Suite 408, New York 19, N. Y.

Jazz Critics To Meet At Newport Fest

NEW YORK — A conference of some of the nation's leading jazz critics will be held immediately prior to the fifth annual Newport Jazz Festival, at Newport, R. I., this summer. Scheduled for July 2nd and 3rd, the Symposium of writers, editors and authorities will be under the direction of Professor Marshall Stearns of Hunter College, Chaucerian scholar and jazz expert, who is a member of the Board of Directors of the Newport Jazz Festival.

The aim of this first annual jazz critic's meeting is to organize and pool the skills and ideas of the country's leading critics to advance the overall understanding of jazz as an art form, and to give critical writing on jazz more unity and direction.

"We hope," says Professor Stearns, "to minimize factional division and isolation by giving all music writers a change to get together and exchange ideas at our Symposium and, as an end result, to raise the standards of jazz criticism."

The Critic's Symposium is intended to be an annual event and Professor Stearns indicated it might undertake even more ambitious projects in the future, including: the publishing of a quarterly journal; holding regional meetings; and the establishment of an annual award for radio and TV shows and published works contributing to a better understanding of jazz.

Professor Stearns has been assisted in the venture by Eric Larabee, an editor of Harper's, and John S. Wilson of the New York Times. "Many critics until now have been isolated," notes Stearns, "and they have been writing about dixieland, or blues, or bebop or cool jazz—each in his own particular corner, without much concern for jazz as a whole. The Symposium will be dedicated to the proposition that the history of jazz consists of an ancient and integral tradition, to be studied without factional division. We feel that getting the publishers, editors and authors together to exchange ideas will give America's jazz writers a better understanding of where their

material should be submitted, and also indicate the type of material their readers are interested in."

Various musicians have been invited to address the meetings to express their ideas of what critics can do to help them. The critics themselves will have a final session of self-appraisal. Although not intended for the public, a number of guest auditors will also be invited to visit the Critic's Symposium.

Capitol Ups 45rpm Singles To 98¢

HOLLYWOOD—Effective April 1, Capitol Records Distributing Corp. will compute the dealer discount on Capitol 45 rpm single records on 98 cents, making the dealer cost price 60 cents, including federal excise tax. The announcement was made by Max K. Callison, Vice President and National Sales Manager of Capitol Records Distributing Corp.

5 Swedish Singles From Capitol

Five new single records slanted for the Swedish American market will be released by Capitol this week. All 10 sides on the release were actually recorded in Sweden.

The records include Sigge Furst with Jelvang's band in "Bonjazz" (Farmer's Jazz), "Te Dans Ma Karlstators" (Dance With the Karlstad Girls) on one disk, and "I Alla Fulla Fall" (Nevertheless) and "Livet i Finnskogarna" (Life in Finn Woods) on the other.

William Clauson, with orchestra conducted by Lillebrob Soderlundh, sings "Jag Blaste I Min Pipa" (I Blow My Horn), which is paired with "Vindarna Sucka" (The Winds are Sighing).

The fourth record on the new 'Capitol' of the World singles release features the Swedish Folk Dance Fiddlers' Orchestra playing "Polka Fran Varmland" and "Polka Fran Tuna". To complete the release is Karl Gronstedt's Dragspelsorkester playing "Vastgotasvang" (hambo, dance from Vastergotland) and "Svedala", also a hambo.

Angel Records Issues 8 New Classics In April Release

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records' April release of Angel classical albums is highlighted by Rimsky-Korsakov's "Scheherazade, Op. 35" performed by the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra conducted by Sir Thomas Beecham. There are seven other new Angel sets on the release. All eight will be available at record dealers' throughout the nation the week of March 31.

A second package on the release is Verdi's "La Forza del Destino" (highlights), sung by soprano Maria Callas, mezzo-soprano Elena Nicolini, baritone Carlo Tagliabue and Renato Capecchi, bass Nicola Rossi-Lemeni and tenor Richard Tucker, with Tullio Serafin conducting the orchestra and chorus of La Scala, Milan.

A third album on the month's release is a complete five-record set of Wagner's "Die Heistersinger von Nurnberg" in which 17 well-known serious music soloists are heard, together with the chorus of the Municipal Opera and German State Opera of Berlin, the choir of St. Hedwig's Cathedral, Berlin, and Rudolf Kempe conducting the Berlin Philharmonic Orchestra.

To complete the operatic portion of the new release, Eileen Farrell is heard singing excerpts from some of the great operas in the repertory in an album titled, "Eileen Farrell in Grand Opera", accompanied by the Philharmonic Orchestra, Thomas Schippers, conductor.

Otto Klemperer conducts the Philharmonia Orchestra in 2 new recordings of Brahms' "Symphony No. 4 in E Minor, Op. 98". In another set, Robert Irving and the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra present two popular ballets, Lecocq's "Mam-zelle Angot" (ballet suite) and Glazounov's "Birthday Offering" (ballet music).

Beethoven's "Violin Concerto in D Major, Op. 61" is performed by violinist Igor Oistrakh accompanied by the Pro Arte Orchestra, Wilhelm Schuechter conducting. Rounding out the release, the late Walter Gieseking, world-renowned pianist, presents Mozart's "Concerto No. 24 in C Minor, K. 491". Herbert von Karajan conducts the Philharmonia Orchestra on this record.

To introduce the new Angel albums for April, colorful displays have been prepared for dealer use on the new Beecham recording and the Maria Callas-Richard Tucker operatic highlights package. In addition, two four-page supplements on the great violinists and pianists heard on the Angel label are expected to do much toward promoting the entire Angel catalog of solo performances.

Two eased displays have been prepared to help promote the new "Scheherazade"-Beecham album and the "La Forza del Destino" set by Callas and Tucker.

"This is an indication of the strength of the catalog," said Kirstein, "in view of the widespread reports of a recession, and the fact that we have released only four LP's in the period."

"It is entirely possible the album will wind up as one of the all-time best-selling jazz LP's," Kirstein said.

"Our two other show albums," he continued, "Li'l Abner," by the Friends, and 'Pal Joey,' by Andre Previn and His Pals, are selling almost as well."

Among the other best-selling albums on Contemporary are "Sonny Rollins Way Out West," "The Poll Winners," Barney Kessel, Shelly Manne, and Ray Brown; and on GTJ, "Firehouse Five Plus Two Goes to Sea!" This album is being used widely as a hi-fi demonstration LP in audio shops.

B "SPACE RACE" (2:30) [Lowery-Bradley BMI — Bradley, Brown] The Allen Bradley Quintet ties a slow, rhythmic instrumental into the thinking of today (the space race) and comes up with an intriguing sound and mood. Deck moves nicely and should capture a good piece of airplay.

B "SLOW ROCK" (3:01) [Bradley BMI — Bradley] Another slow beat instrumental rock that comes out a pleaser. Nice swingy feeling for a modified Lindy.

THE LADDERS (Holiday 2611)

B "I WANT TO KNOW" (2:25) [Everlast BMI — Cooper, Robinson] The Ladders drift slowly with a slow beat romantic lilt. Easy presentation that the kids can shuffle to. Ok deck.

B "COUNTING THE STARS" (2:21) [Everlast BMI — Cooper, Robinson] The Ladders change pace and rock out a quick beat bouncer. A swinging waxing that sticks closely to the rhythm and beat demanded by the youngsters.

AL DOWNING (White Rock 1111)

B+ "OH! BABE" (2:28) [Mustang BMI — A. Downing] Al Downing drives out a driving reading of a quick beat jump done in the Little Richard style. Very strong beat and the singer's style give this a good chance to kick up a fuss.

B+ "DOWN ON THE FARM" (1:31) [Mustang BMI — A. Downing] Another swinging hard hitting quick beat jump. Wild instrumental backing helps generate excitement. Two pile-driving sides.

SCOTTY CARROLL (Gone 5023)

B+ "TWO YOUNG LOVERS" (2:22) [Moonmist BMI — Myles] Scotty Carroll turns in another tender performance. A slow, rhythmic ballad with a moving lyric devoted to the young lover. Theme and treatment strong commercially.

B "HEART STRINGS" (2:31) [Moonmist BMI — Myles, Brown] Scotty Carroll turns in a delicate reading of a slow ballad. Misty treatment makes it a pleasing two-and-one-half minutes of wax. An all-market deck.

HUTCH DAVIE (Atco 6110)

B+ "WOODCHOPPER'S BALL" (2:06) [Leeds ASCAP — Herman, Bishop] Hutch Davie and his Honky Tonkers rock out an infectious instrumental bouncer. Pleasing wax the kids can hop to. Watch this deck. It could happen.

B "HONKY TONK TRAIN" (1:58) [Shapiro Bernstein ASCAP — MeadeLux Lewis] Honky tonk instrumental deck that comes off strong. Flavery item that makes good programming. Two interesting sides.

JAY NELSON and His Jumpers (Hollywood 1088)

B+ "RAISE SOME SAN" (2:20) [Golden State BMI — Shuler, Nelson, Redlich] Nelson gets into the swing of things with a quick beat rocker the kids will understand. Deck drives with a hard beat—exciting and teenage flavored.

C+ "LOVERS PLEA" (2:19) [Golden State BMI — Shuler, Nelson, Redlich] Nelson wails a slow rhythmic blues with an easy approach. Deck is tender and tuneful. Ok waxing.

An exciting effort that should have the kids on its side right after the first play. The flip, "Saving My Life For You", is a pleasing slow beat folk ballad.

Willis is strong here—but we lean to "Rock And Roll Shoes" for quick and decisive action.

The flip, "I Had A Dream", is a slow beat blues done effectively and with emotional impact. Charles should find this side a strong entry in the r & b field.

The flip, "Just A Few Little Words", is a slow swaying beat with an easy, drift treatment. The duo handle it with a relaxed approach and it comes off a good coupler. It's "One, Two, Let's Rock" for the action.

SMILEY LEWIS (Imperial 5470)

B+ "I CAN'T BELIEVE IT" (2:10) [Commodore BMI — Bartholomew] Lewis slows down to a slow shuffle beat on the coupling. A rhythmic blues with fine Lewis treatment. Strong deck that should bring in sales.

B "ROOTIN' AND TOOTIN'" (2:10) [Reeve BMI — Bartholomew, King] Smiley Lewis rocks a quick beat jump with a zesty delivery that excites. Hard hitting, swinging rocker the kids can knock themselves out to.

THE CELLOS (Apollo 524)

B+ "WHAT'S THE MATTER FOR YOU" (2:30) [Bess BMI—Williams] The Cellos team on a quick beat rocker novelty. Deck has a swing and cute feeling that creates listener interest. Strong deck that could put the Cellos back into the charts. Watch it carefully.

B "I BEG FOR YOUR LOVE" (2:20) [Bess BMI — Williams] The Cellos couple with a slow beat ballad, tender and appealing. Easy listening. This side will appeal to the kids in the waning hours.

THE BARKER BROTHERS (Kent 302)

B+ "I'M IN LOVE WITH MY TEACHER" (2:05) [Taurus ASCAP—B. Blake] The Barker Brothers have a teenage piece of material in both sound, theme, and arrangement. Strong waxing that could capture a good piece of the current market.

B+ "HEY LITTLE MAMA" (1:59) [Gregmark BMI — Lee Hazelwood] The Barker Brothers have another very strong offering here. A quick beat jumper that is tailored for the current demands. The Brothers have that feeling and get it across with excitement and entertainment. Two hot teener sides.

B+ "NAUGHTY NAUGHTY BABY" (2:14) [Instant BMI — Burton, Keyes, Monte] Vinnie Monte sings an infectious quick beat bouncer loaded with vocal gimmicks and a hard hitting backing that makes this a deck to be watched. Item moves from the spirited beginning to the final note. Don't sell this deck short. It looks good from here.

B "I WROTE A POEM" (2:00) [Instant BMI—Monte, Rodriguez, Burton] Monte turns soft with a slow beat ballad pretty. A strong vocal job rendered with sincerity and emotion. Ok coupler.

THE TANGIERS (Class 2051)

B "DON'T TRY" (1:55) [Recordo BMI—Joe Jefferson] The Tangiers jump with spirit as they dish up the middle beat bouncer. Lead is strong and given good support. Good teener dance bait.

B "SCHOOL DAYS WILL BE OVER" (2:15) [Recordo BMI—Carl Green] The Tangiers give out with a theme near and dear to the hearts of all youngsters—soon school will be over. A slow, infectious bouncer. Good, instrumental portion in the break helps build the possibilities of the deck.

COUNT BASIE/JOE WILLIAMS (Roulette 4061)

B+ "FIVE O'CLOCK IN THE MORNING" (2:43) [Diane Basie Music ASCAP — Williams] Joe Williams wails a slow beat blues to the moody Basie background. Williams does beautifully, giving the blues a sincerity and feeling that is true to the story. Good deck that should get a strong reaction.

B+ "HOW CAN YOU LOSE" (2:39) [Planetary ASCAP — Edwards, Diamond] Williams and Basie cover the current Della Reese item and give it a strong, swinging treatment. Good coupler. Solid two sided entry.

BABY DEE (Zebra 120)

B "I CRIED THE LAST TIME" (2:34) [Fomark BMI—Bill Campbell] Baby Dee gives a rhythmic reading to a slow beat blues. It comes off in good style, but doesn't sound like what the teenager is buying.

C+ "YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE A FOOL (TO FALL IN LOVE)" (2:10) [Fomark BMI—Bill Campbell] Baby Dee backs with a slow, insinuating blues that is well done. Should appeal to the adult audience.

The Festival will again take place at the Timber Grove Club, adjacent to Hecksher State Park, in the township of Islip, Long Island—forty-eight miles from Manhattan under a huge circus tent seating 2000 which will be erected on the site.

would like to make the Festival an all-day outing, a sandy beach, the Great South Bay waters, cabanas and restaurant facilities are again available to ticketholders. The artists involved in the concerts and further details on the Festival will be announced shortly. Dorothy Ross, well-known publicist, has again been appointed Co-Ordinator of Publicity with John Ross again in charge of Press.

Robert Haberman, Rex Stewart, Francis Thorne, Wayne Horvitz and Carl Fick, the directors of the Festival, are currently planning the concerts which will feature top jazz names from the three schools of jazz—dixieland, swing and progressive. A main feature of the programming will be to leave plenty of time for all the jazz artists scheduled to create, invent and extemporize—a successful and exciting feature of last year's Festival. Another feature will be the commissioning of new works which will be heard for the first time at the Festival. The five concerts will be sponsored, as they were last year, by the Friends of American Jazz, Inc., a non-profit organization devoted to the creation of jazz scholarships and financial aid to jazz musicians.



\$30,000 Awarded To Student Composers Has Spurred Careers, BMI Finds

NEW YORK — Broadcast Music, Inc., which for the sixth consecutive year is sponsoring the Student Composers Radio Awards to further the creation of concert music, recently surveyed previous Award winners to learn what effect the Awards—which to date have totalled more than \$30,000—have had on their musical progress. BMI learned that its recognition of young composers has sustained many musical careers that might otherwise have been stifled for lack of encouragement and financial support.


The survey shows that the cash prizes, which have averaged nearly \$1,000, applied towards tuition and subsistence during further study, have permitted students to extend their education and interest in music. Winning the BMI Award has often stimulated students to try for and to win other competitions, awards and

scholarships. Thus encouraged, the student composers have gone on to benefit their communities and the nation by creating more concert music, by teaching music, by conducting orchestras and choirs and by writing music criticism.



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



ANALYZATION OF THE 4th QUARTER (OCT., NOV., DEC., 1957)

Export Sales For Full Year Of 1957 Show Astonishing Total Of \$26 Million. American Firms Have Shipped 95,731 Machines Thruout World.

With the compilation of export statistics for the fourth quarter completed, (October, November and December) we can now view the year of 1957 as a whole. An astonishing export sale of coin machines was recorded, both as to the number of machines shipped and their dollar value. For the 12 months of 1957, American firms shipped 95,731 machines to customers thruout the world, for a total value of \$26,121,313. In 1956 these foreign customers bought 67,111 machines valued at \$19,441,485. Increase in sales for the year totaled 28,620 machines, and \$6,679,828 more in dollars.

Analysis of the fourth quarter in comparison to the third quarter of 1957 shows a dropoff during these last three months in dollar value, but an increase in the number of machines shipped. The slump was caused by the decrease in sales of phonographs, both in quantity and dollar value. The decided increase in export of amusement machines brought up the total of units shipped, but couldn't make up for the decrease in dollars overall for the loss in phonographs. However, both the dollar volume and number of units shipped during the fourth quarter (October, November and December) was terrific compared with other years. American shippers sent out 24,644 machines, valued at \$6,399,256 in the fourth quarter, compared to 22,305 machines, valued at \$7,247,739. This condition was brought about by an exact reversal of conditions during this last quarter. Whereas it was difficult to obtain the amusement machines demanded in the third quarter, more of these games (many new) were available for export, whereas the better reconditioned music machines demanded by the importers still continue to be difficult to obtain in the U.S. Another factor in music is that more and more American name machines are being assembled in European countries and, of course, are not included in any export statistics.

Analyzing the various types of equipment, music machines, amusement machines and vending machines, exported for the 4th quarter, we find:

1) Phonographs: As stated in the general analysis, importers bought less phonographs, at less money, for the 4th quarter. In the 4th quarter, exporters shipped 5,833 machines at a dollar value of \$3,713,301. This compares with 7,767 machines valued at

\$5,000,385 for the 3rd quarter. One of the deciding factors in this decrease is that every American phonograph manufacturer has provided for assembly of their latest machines in Europe, as well as the difficulty in obtaining the better used machines. As in previous periods, Europe was the biggest purchaser of music machines, buying 3,245 machines valued at \$2,025,039, with Belgium the biggest importer, and West Germany next. The second largest area buying music machines was South America, with Venezuela, buying the greatest number of machines. Third biggest buyer of music was North and Central America, with Canada leading, and Cuba almost equal.

2) Amusement Machines: This division of the coin machine industry had its greatest export quarter, as well as its greatest year of all time. For the entire year of 1957, U.S. firms shipped 41,299 machines valued at \$7,470,597. For the fourth period alone, importers picked up 12,397 units, valued at \$2,185,340. This compares with the 3rd period of 8,129 machines shipped, valued at \$1,637,226. Reason for the great increase is attributed to the shipment of many new games to countries who hadn't bought any for years. As usual, Europe was the biggest customer of American firms, absorbing 8,049 machines, valued at \$1,580,903. Once again, Belgium was the best customer, buying 4,289 machines, valued at \$609,823. Second best buyer was Italy, importing 1,400 machines and spending \$408,492 (a great many new machines). Third European country was West Germany, which bought 1,029 for \$197,675. Altho Switzerland bought only 743 machines, importers here spent \$219,148. Second best buying area was North and Central America, with Canada buying more units than other countries, 2,413, for \$158,745, but spending less than Cuba, which bought only 485 machines, but spent \$242,769.

3) Vending Machines: Shipments of vending machines to foreign countries slipped slightly in the fourth quarter, compared to the third. In the fourth quarter, U. S. firms exported 6,414 machines, valued at \$500,615. This compares with 6,499 machines, valued at \$610,128 for the third quarter. North and Central America was the best buyer of vendors, spending \$300,253 for 3,590 machines, with Canada buying practically all the machines. Europe ran second in this division,

buying 2,490 machines, valued at \$176,093, with Sweden spending the most money for 124 machines, \$59,680; and the Netherlands close with \$58,282 for 216 machines. Altho Belgium absorbed the most machines, 1,942, it only spent \$25,010. One of the interesting developments in this division was the sale of 323 machines to the Union of South Africa.

Activities of the manufacturers during the past quarter (January, February and March)

AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan, introduced its new model "I" phonographs, featuring 200 selections in two types, an electric selector and a manual selector; 120 selections; and 100 selections.

Auto-Bell Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, continued with "Circus" and "Super Circus" and produced "Arrow Head", electronic upright F. P. games; as well as "Play Ball", a counter game.

Auto-Photo Company, Los Angeles, California, continued with its model "14" automatic photograph machine, which is one of the most successful ever produced.

Bally Manufacturing Company, Chicago, introduced "All-Star Bowler", a 5½ x 2 ft. game, and later followed up with "All-Star DeLuxe Bowler" as well as a Free Play model, and a match-score game called "Super Bowler". Other games produced by this firm during this period were "Target Roll", "Miss America" an in-line game; and "Toonerville Trolley" a kiddie ride.

Bally Vending Corporation, Chicago, still in production of its "587" model combination beverage vending machine, which dispenses hot and cold drinks, with 8 selections.

“INTERNATIONALE VIERTELJÄHRICHE EXPORTAUSGABE”

ANALYSE DES VIERTEN VIERTELJAHRES (OKT., NOV., DEZ., 1957)

Die export-umsätze für das ganze Jahr 1957 ergeben die erstaunliche gesamtsumme von \$26 millionen. Amerikanische firmen verschifften 95.731 automaten in alle welt.

Nach der Zusammenstellung der Ausführstatistik für das vierte Vierteljahr (Oktober, November und Dezember) können wir jetzt das Jahr 1957 als Ganzes betrachten. Wir haben Berichte vor erstaunlichen Exportumsätzen von Münzautomaten, und zwar was die Anzahl der Apparate wie auch was ihren Wert in Dollar betrifft. Während der 12 Monate des Jahres 1957 verschifften amerikanische Firmen 95.731 Automaten an Kunden in der ganzen Welt zu einem Gesamtwert von \$26.121.313.— Im Jahre 1956 kauften die Auslandskunden 67.111 Apparate im Werte von \$19.441.845. Somit haben sich die Verkaufsziffern für das letzte Jahr um 28.620 Automaten und um \$6.679.828 vergrößert.

Die Analyse des vierten Vierteljahrs im Vergleich mit dem dritten Vierteljahr d.J. 1957 zeigt während der letzten drei Monate einen Rückgang im Dollarwert, jedoch ein Ansteigen der Anzahl der verschifften Maschinen. Die Ursache dieses Rückgangs war eine Verminderung der Verkäufe von Plattenspielern, was die Menge wie auch den Dollarwert anbelangt. Ein entschiedener Anstieg in der Ausfuhr von Unterhaltungsautomaten vergrößerte die Gesamtzahl der verschifften Einheiten, konnte jedoch nicht die auf den Rückgang der Umsätze in Plattenspielern verursachte Abnahme der Gesamtdollarziffer wettmachen. Der Dollarwert und die Anzahl der während des vierten Vierteljahrs (Oktober, November und Dezember) verschifften Einheiten waren aber im Vergleich mit anderen Jahren stark in die Höhe gegangen. Amerikanische Vershiffen sandten im vierten Vierteljahr 24.644 Automaten im Werte von \$6.388.256 ins Ausland, verglichen mit 22.305 Apparaten im Werte von \$7.247.789 im dritten Vierteljahr d.J. 1957. Dieses war die Folge eines Umschwungs der Verhältnisse während dem letzten Vierteljahr. Während es im dritten Vierteljahr schwierig war, der Nachfrage nach Unterhaltungsautomaten Genüge zu tun, waren im letzten Viertel eine grössere Anzahl dieser Spiele (darunter viele neue) zur Ausfuhr erhältlich, doch waren die von den Importeuren nachgefragten, besseren, wiederhergestellten Musikautomaten immer noch schwer in den U.S.A. aufzutreiben. Was die Musikspieler anbelangt, so fällt noch ein anderer Umstand ins Gewicht, und zwar derjenige, dass mehr und mehr amerikanische Apparate jetzt in europäischen Ländern montiert werden; solche Automaten erscheinen aber natürlich nicht in der Ausführstatistik.

Die Analyse der verschiedenen Arten von Ausfuhrungen—Musikapparate, Unterhaltungsautomaten und

Verkaufsapparate—die im 4. Vierteljahr exportiert wurden, ergibt:

1) Plattenspieler: Wie bereits in der Generalanalyse erwähnt, kauften die Importeure im 4. Vierteljahre weniger Plattenspieler für weniger Geld. Im 4. Vierteljahr verschifften die Exporteure 5.833 Apparate für einen Dollarwert von \$3.713.301, im Vergleich mit 7.767 Apparaten im Werte von \$4.000.385 im 3. Vierteljahr. Einer der ausschlaggebenden Faktoren dieses Rückgangs ist der Umpolstand, dass alle amerikanischen Hersteller von Plattenspielern für die Montage ihrer neuesten Apparate in Europa Sorge getragen haben, ein anderer Faktor war die Schwierigkeit, bessere gebrauchte Apparate zu erhalten. Wie schon in früheren Zeitabschnitten war Europa der grösste Käufer von Musikautomaten: 3.245 Apparate im Werte von \$2.025.039 gingen nach Europa; Belgien war der grösste Importeur und West-Deutschland der zweitgrösste. Das in der Abnahme von Musikapparaten nächstfolgende Gebiet war Süd-Amerika, wo Venezuela die grösste Anzahl von Automaten kaufte. Der drittgrösste Käufer von Musikapparaten war Nord- und Zentral-Amerika; führend war Kanada mit fast denselben Zahlen für Kuba.

2) Unterhaltungsautomaten: Die Abteilung der Münzautomaten-industrie hatte ihr grösstes Ausfuhrvierteljahr, wie auch ihr allergrösstes Jahr. Im ganzen Jahr 1957 verschifften Firmen in den U.S.A. 41.299 Apparate im Werte von \$7.470.597. In der vierten Periode allein nahmen die Importeure 12.397 Einheiten im Werte von \$2.185.340 auf. Im Vergleich dazu wurden in der 3. Periode 8.129 Apparate im Werte von \$1.637.226 verschifft. Der Grund dieses starken Anwachsens wird darin zu suchen sein, dass viele neue Spiele nach Ländern gingen, die schon viele Jahre lang keine mehr gekauft hatten. Wie gewöhnlich war Europawieder der grösste Kunde der amerikanischen Firmen; 8.049 Apparate gingen dahin im Werte von \$1.580.903. Belgien war wieder der beste Kunde mit 4.289 Apparaten im Werte von \$609.823. Der zweitbeste Käufer war Italien, welches Land 1.400 Apparate importierte und dafür \$408.492 ausgab (darunter waren viele neue Automaten). An dritter Stelle in Europa stand West-Deutschland mit einer Einfuhr von 1.029 für \$197.675. Obgleich die Schweiz nur 743 Apparate kaufte, gaben die Importeure dafür \$219.148 aus. Das zweitbeste Kaufgebiet war Nord- und Zentral-Amerika, wo Kanada mit 2.413 Einheiten für \$158.745 mehr Einheiten als die anderen Länder kaufte, doch weniger als Kuba, welches Land nur 485 Apparate erwarb, dafür aber \$252.789 ausgab.

3) Verkaufsautomaten: Im Vergleich mit dem 3. Vierteljahr ging der Ausfuhrumsatz an Verkaufsapparaten im 4. Vierteljahr ein wenig zurück. In letzterem exportierten die Firmen in den U.S.A. 6.414 Automaten im Werte von \$500.615, im Vergleich mit 6.499 Apparaten im Werte von \$610.128 im dritten Vierteljahr. Der beste Käufer von Verkaufsautomaten war Nord- und Zentral-Amerika, welches Gebiet \$300.253 für 3.590 Apparate ausgab; Kanada kaufte fast alle diese Apparate. Hier stand Europa an zweiter Stelle mit 2.490 Apparaten im Werte von \$176.093; Schweden gab das meiste Geld aus, und zwar für 124 Apparate im Werte von \$59.680; die Niederlande folgten mit einer kaum geringeren Summe von \$58.282 für 216 Apparate. Obgleich Belgien die meisten Maschinen—1.842—aufnahm, gab dieses Land nur \$25.010 aus. Eine interessante Entwicklung war hier der Verkauf von 323 Apparaten nach der Südafrikanischen Union.

Die Fa. AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan, brachte ihren neuen Plattenspieler, Modell "I", auf den Markt mit 200 Auswahlstücken in zwei Arten, mit einem elektrischen Wähler und einem Handwähler; auch erhältlich mit 120 und 100 Auswahlstücken.

Die Auto-Bel Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, fuhr fort mit der Herstellung ihrer Spiele "Circus" und "Super-Circus"; sie produzierte auch "Arrow Head", die elektronischen, aufrechtstehenden F. P. Spiele, und "Play Ball", ein Zählenspiel.

Die Auto-Photo Company, Los Angeles, Kalifornien, verfertigte auch weiterhin ihren automatisierten Plattenspieler, Modell "14", der sich als einer der erfolgreichsten der Industrie erweisen hat.



“EDITION INTERNATIONALE TRIMESTRIELLE D'EXPORTATIONS”

ANALYSE DU QUATRIEME TRIMESTRE (Oct., Nov., Dec., 1957)

Les ventes d'exportation pour toute l'année 1957 atteignent le total étonnant de \$26 millions. Les firmes américaines ont exporté 95,731 machines à travers le monde.

Ayant complété les statistiques d'exportation pour le quatrième trimestre, (octobre, novembre et décembre) nous pouvons maintenant considérer l'année 1957 dans son ensemble. On a enregistré une vente d'exportations étonnante de machines à jetons, tant du point de vue nombre de machines expédiées que de celui de leur valeur en dollars. Pendant les 12 mois de 1957, les firmes américaines ont expédié 95,731 machines à leur clientèle à travers le monde, pour une valeur totale de \$26,121,313. En 1956 ces clients étrangers achetèrent 67,111 machines pour une valeur de \$19,441,485. Cela représente une augmentation dans les ventes pour l'année de 28,620 machines et \$6,679,828 en dollars.

En analysant le quatrième trimestre comparativement au troisième trimestre de 1957, on constate unediminution durant ces trois derniers mois en valeur dollars, mais une augmentation dans le nombre de machines expédiées. Cette mévente a été causée par la baisse des ventes de phonographes, en quantité et en valeur dollars. L'augmentation marquée dans l'exportation de machines de jeux fit monter le total des unités embarquées, mais ne put compenser la moins-value en dollars causée par la chute des ventes de phonographes. Cependant, tant le volume en dollars que le nombre d'unités expédiées durant le quatrième trimestre (octobre, novembre et décembre) a été formidable, comparé aux autres années. Les fournisseurs américains ont livré 24,644 machines, d'une valeur de \$6,399,256, pendant le quatrième trimestre, comparé avec 22,305 machines, d'une valeur de \$7,247,739. Cette situation a été causée par un renversement complet des conditions durant le dernier trimestre. Pendant qu'il avait été difficile d'obtenir des machines de jeux durant le troisième trimestre, ces jeux (dont plusieurs nouveaux) étaient disponibles en plus grand nombre pour l'exportation, cependant que les bonnes machines à musique remises à neuf, demandées par les importateurs, continuèrent à être difficilement trouvable aux Etats-Unis. Un autre facteur à considérer en ce domaine est que de plus en plus, des machines à marque américaine sont assemblées dans les pays européens et celles-ci ne sont évidemment pas incluses dans les statistiques d'exportation.

Passant en revue les différents types de matériel, machines à musique, machines de jeux et machines à distribution automatique, exportés pendant le quatrième trimestre, nous constatons ce qui suit:

1) PHONOGRAPHES: Comme il est signalé dans l'analyse générale, les importateurs ont acheté moins de phonographes, pour moins d'argent, durant, durant le quatrième trimestre.

Pendant cette période, les exportateurs ont expédié 5,833 machines pour une valeur de \$3,713,301. Ceci se compare avec 7,767 machines d'une valeur de \$5,000,385 durant le troisième trimestre. Un des facteurs décisifs de cette diminution est le fait que chaque fabricant américain de phonographes a organisé l'assemblage de ses machines les plus récentes en Europe; un autre facteur a été la difficulté de trouver des bonnes machines usagées. Comme précédemment l'Europe a été le plus important acheteur de machines à musique, en prenant 3,245 machines se montant à \$2,025,038, la Belgique figurant comme le plus important importateur, l'Allemagne Occidentale se plaçant second. La deuxième région en importance achetant des machines à musique fut l'Amérique du Sud, avec le Vénézuéla achetant le plus grand nombre de machines. Viennent ensuite l'Amérique du Nord et l'Amérique Centrale, avec le Canada en tête, suivi de près par le Cuba.

2) Machines de Jeux: Cette division de l'industrie des machines à jetons a connu son plus grand chiffre d'exportation trimestriel, de même que sa meilleure année. Pour toute l'année 1957, les firmes américaines ont exporté 41,299 machines d'une valeur de \$7,470,597. Rien que pendant la quatrième période, les importateurs ont pris 12,397 unités, d'une valeur de \$2,185,340. Ceci se compare avec la troisième période où 8,129 machines furent embarquées, pour une valeur de \$1,637,226. La raison de cette importante augmentation est attribuée à la fourniture de nombreux nouveaux jeux à des pays qui n'en avaient plus acheté depuis des années. Comme de coutume, l'Europe était le plus important client des firmes américaines, en absorbant 8,049 machines, s'élevant à \$1,580,903. Une fois de plus, la Belgique était le meilleur client, en prenant 4,289 machines pour une valeur de \$609,823. Venait ensuite l'Italie, important 1,400 machines et dépensant \$408,492 (dont un grand nombre demachines neuves). Le troisième pays européen était l'Allemagne Occidentale, qui en a acheté 1,029 pour \$197,675. Quoique la Suisse acheta seulement 743 machines, les importateurs suisses ont dépensé \$219,148. L'Amérique du Nord et l'Amérique Centrale occupèrent la deuxième place comme région, le Canada achetant plus d'unités que les autres pays, 2,413 pour \$158,745, dépensant cependant moins que le Cuba, lequel tout en n'achetant que 485 machines, les paya \$242,769.

3) MACHINES A DISTRIBUTION AUTOMATIQUE: Les exportations de machines à distribution automatique vers les pays étrangers ont baissé légèrement au quatrième trimestre, par rapport au troisième. Au quatrième

trimestre, les firmes américaines ont exporté 6,414 machines, d'une valeur de \$500,615. Au troisième trimestre ces chiffres furent 6,499 machines, d'une valeur de \$610,128. L'Amérique du Nord et Centrale ont été les meilleurs clients pour ces machines à distribution, dépensant \$300,253 pour 3,590 machines, le Canada les prenant presque toutes. L'Europe se place seconds dans cette division avec un achat de 2,490 machines, d'une valeur de \$176,093, la Suède dépensant pour sa part le plus d'argent pour 124 machines, soit \$59,680, suivie de près par les Pays-Bas avec \$58,282 pour 216 machines. Quoique la Belgique a absorbé le nombre de machines le plus élevé, elle n'y a dépensé que \$25,010. Un des faits saillants dans le développement de cette division fut la vente de 232 machines à l'Union Sud-Africaine.

ACTIVITE DES FABRICANTS DURANT LE TRIMESTRE PASSE (Janvier, Février et Mars)

AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan, a introduit son nouveau modèle "I", un phonographe ayant 200 sélections en deux types, un sélecteur électrique et un sélecteur à main; 120 sélections; et 100 sélections.

Auto-Bell Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, a continué avec "Circus" et "Super Circus" et a produit "Arrow Head", des jeux F. P. électroniques verticaux; de même que "Play Ball" un jeu de comptoir.

Auto-Photo Company, Los Angeles, California, a continué sa machine photographique automatique modèle "14", qui est une des machines les plus réussies qu'on ait fabriquées.

Bally Manufacturing Company, Chicago, a présenté "All Star Bowler" un jeu de 5 1/2 sur 2 pieds, suivi après par "All Star De Luxe Bowler", de même qu'un modèle Free Play et un jeu de marquage de but appelé "Super Bowler". D'autres jeux fabriqués par cette firme durant cette période furent "Target Roll", "Miss America" un jeu à alignement; et "Toonerville Trolley" pour les enfants (kiddie ride).

Bally Vending Corporation, Chicago, manufacture toujours son modèle "587" une machine combinée à distribution automatique de boissons, qui distribue un choix de 8 boissons chaudes et froides.

Chicago Coin Machine (Division de Chicago Dynamic Industries, Inc.) “EDICIÓN TRIMESTRAL INTERNACIONAL DE EXPORTACIÓN”

ANÁLISIS DEL CUARTO TRIMESTRE (OCT., NOV., DIC., 1957)

Las Ventas para la Exportación en Todo el Año de 1957 Registran un Asombroso Total de \$26 Millones. Las Empresas de los EE. UU. Despacharon 95.731 Maquinas a Todas Partes del Mundo.

Gracias a la compilación de las estadísticas de exportación correspondientes al cuarto trimestre (octubre, noviembre y diciembre) ya terminadas, podemos ahora pasar revista al año de 1957 en conjunto. Se registró una venta sorprendente de máquinas accionadas por monedas, tanto en el número de unidades exportadas como en su valor en dólares. Durante los doce meses de 1957, las firmas de los Estados Unidos despacharon 95.731 máquinas a clientes en todas partes del mundo, por un valor total de \$26.121.313. En 1956 estos clientes extranjeros compraron 67.111 máquinas valoradas en \$19.441.485. El aumento de las ventas en ese año alcanzó un total de 28.620 máquinas y de \$6.679.828 más.

Un análisis de cuarto trimestre, en comparación con el tercer trimestre de 1957, revela una reducción del valor en dólares durante esos últimos tres meses, pero al mismo tiempo acusa un aumento en el número de máquinas despachadas. La baja repentina se debió a la disminución de las ventas de fonógrafos, tanto en cantidad como en dólares. El indudable aumento ocurrido en la exportación de máquinas de diversión elevó el total de unidades despachadas, pero no logró compensar la disminución total en dólares a causa de la reducción de las ventas de fonógrafos. A pesar de ello, tanto el importe en dólares como el número de unidades despachadas durante el cuarto trimestre (octubre, noviembre y diciembre), fueron enormes en comparación con los de otros años. Los embarcadores de los Estados Unidos exportaron 24.644 máquinas por valor de \$6.399.256 durante el cuarto trimestre, en comparación con 22.305 máquinas valoradas en \$7.247.739. Esto obedeció a un cambio a la inversa de las condiciones durante ese último trimestre. Aunque era difícil obtener las máquinas de diversión pedidas en el tercer trimestre, se disponía de mayor cantidad de dichas máquinas (muchas de ellas nuevas) para la exportación en tanto que las máquinas musicales mejor acondicionadas que exigían los importadores apenas pueden conseguirse en los Estados Unidos. Otro de los factores, desde el punto de vista musical, consiste en que un número cada vez mayor de máquinas acreditadas en los Estados Unidos se arman ahora en los países europeos y por ello no figuran en ninguna de las estadísticas de exportación.

Si se lleva a cabo un análisis de las diversas clases de equipos, máquinas musicales, máquinas de diversión y máquinas expendedoras exportadas durante el cuarto trimestre, podrá comprobarse lo siguiente:

1) **Fonógrafos:** Según se consigna en el análisis general, los importadores compraron menos fonógrafos, por menos dinero, en el cuarto trimestre. En dicho trimestre, los exportadores despacharon 5.833 máquinas por valor en dólares de \$3.713.301, en comparación con 7.767 máquinas valoradas en \$5.000.385 durante el tercer trimestre. Una de los factores decisivos que contribuyeron a esta disminución lo constituye el hecho de que todos los fabricantes de fonógrafos de los Estados Unidos han dispuesto lo necesario para armar sus máquinas en Europa, así como la dificultad, en conseguir máquinas de segunda mano en buen estado. Lo mismo que en épocas anteriores, las casas europeas fueron las principales compradoras de máquinas musicales, adquiriendo 3.245 unidades por valor de \$2.025.039, siendo Bélgica el país importante y Alemania Occidental el segundo en importancia. La segunda región del mundo que compró más máquinas musicales fué la América del Sur, siendo Venezuela la nación que importó mayor número de ellas. El tercer lugar, en lo que respecta a la compra de esta clase de máquinas, fué ocupado por Norteamérica y Centro América, figurando el Canadá a la cabeza y Cuba casi a la misma altura.

2) **Máquinas de Diversión:** Esta sección de la industria de máquinas accionadas por monedas exportó mayor cantidad de éstas durante dicho trimestre y en todo el año, sentando un verdadero precedente. Durante todo el año de 1957, las empresas de los Estados Unidos despacharon 41.299 máquinas por valor de \$7.470.597. En el cuarto período solamente, los importadores recibieron 12.397 unidades valoradas en \$2.185.340, en comparación con el tercer período, en que adquirieron 8.129 máquinas por valor de \$1.637.226. Este notable aumento se atribuye al hecho de que se despacharon muchos nuevos juegos a países que no los habían importado por muchos años. Como de costumbre, Europa fué el cliente principal de las empresas de los Estados Unidos, ya que absorbió 8.049 máquinas por valor de \$1.580.903. Una vez más, Bélgica fué el mejor cliente, adquiriendo 4.289 máquinas por valor de \$609.823, seguida por Italia que importó 1.400 máquinas valoradas en \$408.492 (muchísimas de ellas nuevas). El tercer país europeo fué Alemania Occidental que compró 1.029 unidades por valor de \$197.675. Aunque Suiza sólo importó 743 máquinas, los importadores de ese país invirtieron \$219.148. En segundo lugar, como fuertes compradores, figuran Norteamérica y Centroamérica, siendo el Canadá el cli-

ente principal mediante la compra de más unidades que los demás países, 2.413 por valor de \$158.745, pero invirtiendo menos dinero que Cuba, la cual sólo importó 485 máquinas pero invirtió \$242.769.

Actividades de los fabricantes durante el último trimestre (enero, febrero y marzo)

3) **Máquinas Expendedoras:** Los embarques de máquinas expendedoras a países extranjeros fueron algo menores en el cuarto trimestre que en el tercero. En el cuarto trimestre las firmas de los Estados Unidos exportaron 6.414 máquinas por valor de \$500.615, en comparación con 6.499 unidades por valor de \$610.128 durante el tercer trimestre. Norte y Centro América fueron los mejores compradores de máquinas expendedoras, invirtiendo \$300.253 en 3.590 máquinas, siendo el Canadá el comprador principal de casi todas las máquinas. Europa ocupó el segundo lugar en esta división mediante la compra de 2.490 máquinas valoradas en \$176.093, pero Suecia invirtió una suma mayor al comprar 124 máquinas valoradas en \$59.680, seguida de cerca por Holanda que importó 216 máquinas por valor de \$58.282. Aunque Bélgica absorbió la mayor parte de las máquinas, 1.942, sólo invirtió la suma de \$25.010. Uno de los más interesantes acontecimientos en esta división fué la venta de 323 máquinas a la Unión del África del Sur.

AMI, Inc., Grand Rapids, Michigan.—Esta empresa introdujo sus nuevos fonógrafos, modelo “I”, provisto de 200 selecciones en dos tipos, de un selector eléctrico y de un selector manual; 120 selecciones; y 100 selecciones.

Auto-Bell Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois.—Esta casa, que continúa fabricando “Circus” y “Super Circus”, produjo el “Arrow Head”, los juegos electrónicos verticales F. P. y el “Play Ball” un juego de mostrador.

Auto-Photo Company, Los Angeles, California.—Esta firma siguió produciendo su máquina fotográfica automática, modelo “14”, una de las que más éxito ha tenido.

Bally Manufacturing Company, Chicago.—Esta empresa introdujo el “Al Star Bowler”, un juego de 5½ x 2 pies y luego empezó a producir el “All-Star DeLuxe Bowler”, así como un modelo de Juego Libre y un juego de tantos denominado “Super Bowler”. Otros juegos fabricados por esta firma durante este período fueron “Target Roll”, “Miss America” (un juego “in-line”), y “oonerville Trolley”, un juego para niños.

Bally Vending Corporation, Chicago.—Esta empresa sigue fabricando su máquina expendedoras de bebidas, modelo “587” de combinación, para expender bebidas frías y calientes, con 8 selecciones.

Chicago Coin Machine (División de la Chicago Dynamic Industries, Inc.), Chicago, Illinois.—Esta casa introdujo el “Bowler Lucky Strike” que se caracteriza por su dispositivo del repetición su decidad de interruptores para el cambio del “bowling” reglamentario. También fabrica el “Rocket Shuffle”, una nueva idea en juegos de “shuffle” en el cual figuran bolas cautivas que flotan en el aire e ingresan en las bolsas o cavidades de apuntes o tantos.



ANALISI DEL QUARTO TRIMESTRE (OTT., NOV., DIC., 1957)

Le vendite di esportazione per l'intero anno 1957 mostrano lo stupefacente totale di 26 milioni di dollari. Le ditte americane hanno spedito 95.731 macchine in tutto il mondo.

Con il completamento delle statistiche del volume di esportazioni per il quarto trimestre (ottobre, novembre e dicembre) possiamo ora fare la rassegna completa dell'anno 1957. Si è registrata un volume stupefacente di vendite di esportazione di macchine azionate a moneta, sia per quanto riguarda il numero di macchine spedite che per quanto riguarda il loro valore in dollari.

Per i 12 mesi del 1957, le ditte americane hanno spedito 95.731 macchine a clienti di tutte le nazioni del mondo, per il valore globale di 26.121.313 di dollari. Nel 1956 questi clienti stranieri acquistarono 67.111 macchine per il valore di 19.441.485 dollari. L'aumento di vendite per l'anno ha totalizzato 28.620 macchine e 6.679.828 dollari in più.

L'analisi del quarto trimestre a paragone del terzo trimestre del 1957 mostra un calo del valore in dollari durante questi ultimi tre mesi ed un aumento del numero di macchine spedite. Questa diminuzione è stata causata dalla riduzione ed delle vendite di fonografi per quanto riguarda la quantità ed il valore in dollari. Il marcato aumento dell'esportazione di macchine da gioco ha fatto aumentare il totale di unità spedite, senza però controbilanciare la diminuzione del volume globale di dollari dovuta alle perdite dovute dalla decresciuta vendita di fonografi. Comunque, sia il volume di dollari che il numero di unità spedite durante il quarto trimestre (ottobre, novembre e dicembre) sono stati notevolissimi a paragone degli altri anni. Gli spedizionieri americani hanno inviato 24.644 macchine, valutate a 6.399.256 dollari nel quarto trimestre, paragonato a 22.305 macchine, valutate a 7.247.739. Questo fenomeno è stato causato da un preciso rovesciamento delle condizioni durante questo ultimo trimestre. Mentre era difficile ottenere le macchine da gioco richieste nel terzo trimestre, un maggior numero di questi giochi (molti di essi nuovi) è stato disponibile per l'esportazione, mentre le macchine musicali meglio ricondizionate richieste dagli importatori continuano ad essere difficili da ottenere negli Stati Uniti. Un altro elemento determinante nel campo della musica è che un numero sempre maggiore di macchine di marca americana vengono montate in nazioni europee e, naturalmente, non vengono incluse in alcuna statistica di esportazione.

Analizzando i vari tipi di macchinario, macchine musicali, macchine da gioco e distributrici automatiche esportate nel quarto trimestre, troviamo che:

1) **FONOGRAFI:** Come affermato nell'analisi generale, gli importatori hanno acquistato un numero minore

di fonografi, per un volume minore di danaro, nel quarto trimestre. Nel quarto trimestre, gli esportatori hanno spedito 5.833 macchine per un valore di 3.713.301 dollari. Ciò a paragone di 7.767 macchine valutate a 5.000.385 dollari per il terzo trimestre. Uno dei fattori decisivi di questa diminuzione è costituito dal fatto che ogni fabbricante americano di fonografi ha fatto in modo che il montaggio delle proprie macchine più recenti fosse effettuato in Europa, come pure dalla difficoltà di ottenere le macchine meglio adoperate. Come nei periodi precedenti, l'Europa è stata la maggiore acquirente di macchine musicali, comperando 3.245 macchine valutate a 2.025.039 di dollari, con il Belgio in testa alla classifica per nazioni, seguito dalla Germania Occidentale. La zona che occupa il secondo posto nella classifica degli acquirenti di macchine musicali è stato il Sud America, con il Venezuela in testa alla graduatoria per nazioni. La zona che ha avuto il terzo posto nelle compere di macchine musicali è stata l'America Settentrionale e Centrale, capeggiate dal Canada e, quasi sulla stessa linea, da Cuba.

2) **MACCHINE DA GIUOCO:** Questo settore dell'industria delle macchine azionate a moneta ha avuto il trimestre più prospero per volume di esportazioni, come pure l'anno più florido di tutta la sua storia. Per l'intero anno 1957, le ditte statunitensi hanno spedito 41.299 macchine valutate a 7.470.579 di dollari. Solo nel quarto trimestre, gli importatori si sono accreditati 12.397 unità per il valore di 2.185.340 di dollari. Questo in confronto con un numero di 8.129 macchine spedite nel terzo trimestre, per un valore di 1.637.226 di dollari. Il motivo del forte aumento è attribuito alla spedizione di molti giochi nuovi a nazioni che non ne avevano acquistati alcuni per anni. Come al solito, l'Europa è stata l'acquirente massima delle ditte americane, assorbendo 8.049 macchine valutate a 1.580.903 di dollari. Ancora una volta, il Belgio è stato il massimo acquirente con il numero di 4.289 macchine, valutate a 609.823 dollari. Al numero due della graduatoria è stata l'Italia che ha importato 1.400 macchine spendendo 408.492 dollari (moltissime macchine nuove). La terza nazione è stata la Germania Occidentale che ha acquistato 1.029 macchine per 197.675 dollari. La Svizzera, sebbene abbia acquistato solo 743 macchine, ha speso un volume di 219.148 dollari. La zona che ha occupato il secondo posto nella classifica degli acquirenti è stata quella dell'America Settentrionale e Centrale con il Canada in testa alla graduatoria per nazioni con 2.413 macchine per il valore di

158.745 dollari, con una spesa inferiore, però, a quella di Cuba che ha acquistato solo 485 macchine, ma ha speso 242.769 dollari.

3) **DISTRIBUTRICI AUTOMATICHE:** Le spedizioni di distributrici automatiche alle nazioni estere sono diminuite leggermente nel quarto trimestre, a paragone del terzo trimestre. Nel quarto trimestre le ditte statunitensi hanno esportato 6.414 macchine per un valore di 500.615 dollari. Questa cifra è in confronto con quella di 6.499 valutate a 610.128 dollari del terzo trimestre. L'America Settentrionale e Centrale sono state le maggiori acquirenti di distributrici automatiche, con una spesa di 300.253 dollari per 3.590 macchine, con il Canada che ha praticamente acquistato tutte le macchine. In questo settore l'Europa si è classificata al secondo posto della graduatoria, comperando 2.490 macchine valutate a 176.093 dollari, mentre la Svezia ha speso la cifra più alta, 59.680 dollari per 124 macchine, seguita molto da vicino dall'Olanda con 58.282 dollari per 216 macchine. Il Belgio, per quanto abbia assorbito il numero maggiore di macchine, 1.942, ha speso solo 25.010 dollari. Uno degli sviluppi interessanti di questa categoria è stato la vendita di 323 macchine all'Unione del Sud Africa.

EXPORT DEMAND FOR USED EQUIP'T CONTINUES ABOVE SUPPLY

Late Model Used Phonos and Pinballs Lead in Demand from World's Importers

1957 May Be The Record Export Year of This Decade for Used Equip't. More World Importers are Now Buying New Equipment

CHICAGO — Many Exporters throught the U.S. report that demand for late model used equipment continues to outstrip the supply of this equipment.

The history of this growing demand for late model used phonographs and games of all kinds is shown in the accompanying graph.

Back in 1950, when *The Cash Box* began to feature a "Quarterly Export Edition", recognizing the fact that, eventually, manufacturers as well as distributors in the U.S. would require world markets for sales of their products, and with the great promotional efforts which were put forth by this publication, demand has continued to increase at a phenomenal rate for used machines.

Most in demand, as U.S. exporters know, are the late model automatic phonos and the late model five-ball games.

Since then, of course, late model arcade machines, as well as automatic merchandisers, have also been exported in ever-increasing numbers. In addition, kiddie rides, inline games and other equipment, including the new upright electronic scoring free-play games, as well as Bells, have also been shipped in larger quantity.

In 1950, from past records, it is computed that just about 30% of the available supply of used machines were being exported to foreign countries, with Canada and Europe as the leading importers.

By the first quarter of 1953, as indicated on the graph, demand had reached to about 70% of all used machines available being exported from the U. S. to foreign countries.

From that first quarter of 1953 the rise in export sales of used machines of all kinds was phenomenal.

By the first quarter of 1955, 95% of all the late model used machines then in demand by importers, were being shipped out of the country by more and more U. S. distributors who had eagerly entered into the export ranks.

In the first quarter of 1956, demand outstripped supply. The figure that, as computed at that time, reached to the 115% mark. In short, for every 100 late-model used phonos and pinballs there were, at that time, about 115 orders.

Beginning that year, distributors traded high, sent their salesmen out on the road, searched everywhere for used equipment and found that, regardless of all these efforts, they were beginning to be backlogged by the demand.

This backlog has continued. Distributors flew over to Europe and made contact with importers who were sending them regular orders. They arranged for quicker shipments of all the used machines they could obtain.

In fact, they were now selling machines that were not the latest models. But the demand continued at such a rate that the importers were also willing to now accept machines two, three and even four years old.

The year 1957 will probably go down in the history of this decade as the record export year. It was during the second quarter of 1957 when demand reached a computed 122% of supply.

Since then the drop began to be discernible. New machines were being shipped in greater numbers. Less and less late model used machines were available.

At the opening of the first quarter of 1958, the demand had fallen about 10% from the 122% peak to 112%. It has fallen again since then. And continues its downward spiral. It is now considered to be about 91% of possible supply.

Much of this drop is attributed to the fact that more and more of the world importers are buying new machines. It is reported that these men have found that they are better off with new equipment, wherever it is possible to sell such equipment, regardless of the price, than with used machines.

But from facts that have been gathered by visits directly to the leading importers in Europe, late model used equipment will always remain in high demand. The Asiatic market, as well as Latin America and even Canada, find that the lower price of late model used machines is more to their liking.

In the meantime, due to the lack of late model used machines, and in those countries where the dollar value can still be matched, new machines are being shipped at an ever-increasing rate.

The U. S. Government figures, which are contained in this issue, bear witness to the tremendous export growth, especially of new machines, which is indicated by the greatly increased dollar valuation of all exports.

It will be very interesting to note whether the downtrend will be halted by the fourth quarter of the year and whether the used machines market will, once again perhaps, reach its all-time high peak of 122% demand against possible nationwide supply.

"This was one of the greatest moments of my life," George A. Miller advised this publication, "to be so unanimously reelected and so greatly honored on the voting ballot of CMMA."



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
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Through The Coin Chute GREAT BRITAIN GOSSIP



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
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Music Ops Of Mass. Hold Meet

Discuss Legality of \$160 Yearly Fee For Juke Boxes, Identification Stickers to Prevent Jumping, Insurance Plan and Dime Play

BOSTON, MASS. — Status of the case being brought by the Music Operators of Massachusetts against the City and State in which the legality of fees of up to \$160 a year for juke boxes, tv sets and radios in public places is challenged was reported on by Arthur Sherman, counsel, at the March meeting of the Music Operators of Massachusetts following a social evening at the Bavarian Hofbrau, this city.

Both the City and the State must agree to stipulations, Sherman said, and so far the City has agreed, but the State has not. He said efforts are being made to get the State to go forward so that the case can come up before the court's summer recess. License payments for phonos are due October 31, and once the fee is paid, there is no way of getting the money back regardless of what might transpire, he said.

The suit is based on constitutionality of the state law which sets forth that fees should be charged commensurate with the amount of policing necessary. The Association charges that both City and State fees for phonos are "out of all proportion."

The test case, headed for the Supreme Court, once the stipulations are obtained, is the opening move in the battle undertaken by the juke box ops to cancel out the \$160 per machine per year fee for seven day op-

eration. They pay \$50 for a city license for weekdays; \$50 for a city Sunday license; \$50 for a State Sunday license; and \$10 Federal tax; total of \$160.

Another bill in equity charges that an attempt to license a phono by exacting a fee is a prior restraint on free speech. The fees are being attacked as excessive and excessive charge of services, that of policing the phonos.

The attorneys are contending that simply because an entertainment form is used it does not take it out of the category of something that should be protected by the guarantee of free speech. They also contend that playing of a record is a form of entertainment which does not detract the playing of it from the protection of the free speech guaranteed by the U. S. and State courts merely because a form of expression is used for purposes of entertainment.

A preliminary injunction asked by the Association counsel was denied in Suffolk Superior Court. The entire case for the phono ops hinges around the operators' contention that the constitutional guarantees of free speech and freedom of the press are applicable to automatic phono music.

In the meantime, the business of granting licenses for phonos, pins, restaurants, which used to be a part time job at city hall, is now a full

time job with the increase in the various licenses.

A bill has passed the House of Representatives to give the four licensing officials \$1,500 pay raises. The move to increase the salaries for the Boston Licensing Board's heads would give Chairman Clarence R. Elam \$10,500 and Commissioners Timothy F. Tobin, Joseph W. Fitzgerald and Executive Secretary Joel L. Miller, \$10,000. Executive secretary Miller said the board will collect an estimated \$1.7 million in fees this year.

At the meeting of the Music Operators of Massachusetts, a policy of identification of members' machines was adopted and numbered stickers were given out to the membership. The identification stickers will identify the machines on location as belonging to a member of the association, and the identification will be easily made certain by other members when visiting locations. This situation developed from complaints of inroad on territories by members unaware of other member's locations.

The identification method of tagging phonos is expected to help in alleviating this situation, David J. Baker, president, stated.

Forms for a new insurance plan were passed out to members for study. A discussion of 10¢ play was held, and it was reported that the dime is holding its own okay and rapidly growing, although there are some locations, which for reasons of economic depression, are not ready.

Announcement was made that the next meeting of the Music Operators of Massachusetts will be held at the Commonwealth Country Club on April 9.

"Forty-four companies have confirmed their exhibit space for the MOA Convention," revealed Miller, "and a number of others who have not yet confirmed with checks, will be announced at a later date. The MOA Convention is assured of a complete sellout."

Miller also advised that G. Norman Ditchburn of London, England, who spoke so successfully at the 1957 convention, will again address the operators. Also scheduled to speak will be "a very important figure from Hamburg, Germany, who will tell his story of the automatic phonograph industry and other amusement devices operated in his country.

"There will be good representation from Canada and from Mexico," continued Miller, "and we will notify these people to take part through one of their groups, should they desire to speak on the rostrum regarding their particular countries."

Also scheduled to speak will be

John Haddock, president of the Phonograph Manufacturers' Association; the Honorable George P. Miller; a speaker not yet named but in the same category as the entertaining and enlightening Mr. True, assistant professor of Notre Dame College, who spoke to the 1957 conventioners; a representative of the record industry; and a surprise guest, the Honorable Mayor of Charleston, West Virginia, who will be brought to the Convention by the West Virginia music operators.

Operators and guests from other countries who are expected to attend will arrive from such far-off places as China, Japan, Argentina and France.

"Operators will be well repaid for the time, trouble and expenses incurred by their attending the convention" stated Miller, by the information they will absorb at the forums. Every subject pertaining to taxes, licenses, copyright legislation, public relations, human relations, diversified operation, music programming, and many other subjects will be discussed.

"Bill and Cissie Gersh are sponsoring the Fashion Show Luncheon, and Cissie is going all-out to make the Fashion Show the greatest attraction at the convention. As an added feature this year, the ladies will be privi-

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leged to also witness a very beautiful fur show presented by one of the leading furriers in Chicago. Watch Cissie Gersh's column in The Cash Box." advised Miller, "for further information."

MOA Convention Headquarters have been changed this year to Suites 1227, 1228 and 1230 at the Morrison Hotel, Chicago.

Miller also calls attention to a life insurance plan to be unveiled at the convention by the California Life Insurance Company. Members, employees and associates of the Music Operators of America, Inc., under the age of 61 will be able to purchase a \$10,000 policy for \$10.50 per month. Past 61 years of age will entitle purchasers to obtain a \$5,000 policy for \$5.50 per month. This is a group insurance plan and neither doctor nor medical examination is necessary.



Kitt further stated that "Cine-Sonic" has tremendous market value for operators in their territories.



Amsterdam Coinman Reports On The Netherlands Music Machine Market

Advices Dutch Market Prefers U.S. Phonographs Over German

AMSTERDAM, HOLLAND—J. F. Siekman, managing director of N. V. Dureco, of Amsterdam, Holland, offers his impressions of the Netherlands music machines market in the hope that it will give The Cash Box readers an accurate picture.

"This situation is now rather confused", says Siekman as a result of the launching at the same time of the new models by Seeburg, Rock-Ola and Wurlitzer. Most potential buyers have been waiting for these new models before choosing their new music machines so that in the last two months there was not much activity on our market. Just in the old-fashioned models some transactions came to a final result.

"The activity on this market was also influenced by the Governmental credit restrictions policy in the aver-

age to fight the inflation appearances. This has created in Holland a dull, slow market, but there are expectations based upon the arising interest created by the new models, that sales will grow higher than last year's.

"In spite of all rumors, which are saying otherwise, the Dutch market is not so very willing to buy the German music machines since most of the German factories seem not able to make a real machine which can work for years without too much trouble. Up till now the American machines are preferred. This is in short a report of the present situation.

"I expect to be able to send you monthly a similar report about the development in the Netherlands concerning the music machines," concluded Siekman.

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

TRIESTE, ITALY — Mario Todeschini, whom the Allied troops of the 350th and 351st regiments knew as Mario of Mario's Bar, Trieste, is today an operator of games and phonographs.

Todeschini writes:

"I have been a modest operator for approximately 1½ years; before that, I was, for 30 years, the owner of Mario's Bar, located at 11 Via Carducci, in Trieste. In this Bar, I served right after the War—i.e. from 1945 to November 26, 1954—the Allied Troops stationed in Trieste. I waited especially on the members of the

'Blue Devils', of the 350th Regiment, and of the 'Trust', of the 351st Regiment; and I remember all of them with gratitude and great affection—I shall never forget them!

"Due to a long line of events which happened after 1954, I had, towards the end of 1956, a rather favorable opportunity to sell my old bar, but empty, without any furnitures and fixtures, as the premises were to be dedicated to other uses. Sadly I sold everything, thus destroying my labors of 30 years standing. I found myself, at that time, with little cash and with my old Seeburg, which I

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hired out to a bar. I had my operator's license which permitted me to place it in an establishment which the new owner called Bar Elixir, situated in a new building on one of the finest streets of Trieste: Via Gabriele d'Annunzio No. 27.

"This was my first step towards my new profession as an operator. In the Bar Elixir, I created, with the understanding cooperation of the owner, the 'Little Game Room'".

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Copyright Hearings Definite For Apr. 23-25

No Further Postponements Will Be Granted

OAKLAND, CALIF. — George A. Miller, national president and managing director of Music Operators of America (MOA), with headquarters in this city, received notice from Senator Joseph C. O'Mahoney, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Sub-committee, that the hearing dates on the Bill S. 1870 are definitely set for April 23-25, and no further postponements will be made.

Bill S. 1870 is the ASCAP sponsored bill which would grant performing rights organizations the

privilege of imposing a tax on music used in juke boxes. The Copyright Act of 1909 exempts juke boxes from paying royalties for the use of recorded music.

Miller had asked for a postponement from the above dates due to the fact that the MOA Convention being held at the Morrison Hotel, Chicago, May 6 to 8, was too close to the hearing dates, and would take up the time of MOA officials who have to make final arrangements for the Convention.

Reports And Developments Of Operating Conditions In Italy

By Dr. V. N. Franceschini

During the last few years, the operations of music boxes and of pinballs have taken shape in Italy, and we can safely state that the results obtained up to date have outstripped our highest hopes.

The first steps in this business were taken in the field of music machines by importers who indiscriminately sold or placed (mostly placed) juke boxes of the types requested by their customers.

During this first phase, the importers of music boxes (and of games of varied interest for the game rooms) had to acquaint the market with a new opportunity in introducing machines which were hired out for operation, and they did not hesitate in using all possible means for this purpose.

Some time has now elapsed and the success of their initiative has become clear today; it had not proven to be difficult for the importers to create a group of businessmen who showed great enthusiasm for these hirings, as many of their collaborators had an opportunity, during the experimental phase of the hirings, to ascertain the extent of future pos-

sibilities. Thus out of the personnel of the operators and with their full economic cooperation, was born an autonomous class of operator-mechanics. This class, helped at the beginning by the confidence of their former bosses, became increasingly independent, leading to modest (and sometimes very good) positions.

Once established, this class of operators—now endowed with its own distinctive features and under the impulse of a steadily rising demand for equipment—exerted an always increasing pressure on the importers. In this phase, the operators recognized that there existed an opportunity (now that their organization enjoyed the results of an intensive exploitation of the placings) to introduce another article which could complete the success achieved with the music boxes. Thus the first pinball machines appeared in Italy.

Since then, great strides have been made in this field.

The most modern pinballs have been placed today in the best business establishments in the great cities, while establishments in the suburban areas and in the country have also been equipped with these games in many cases with recent models as well.

The activities of locating pinball tables have, during the last few months, been somewhat arrested, due to a suspension (considered by everybody to be a temporary measure only) of the issuing of licenses by the Authorities on new applications filed. This suspension—according to the most reliable opinions—is motivated by the necessity to avoid an excessive crowding of games, in the name of a better public order.

The operators feel, however, confident that this limitation will soon be abolished, giving room to a new wave of expansion, due to the receptive possibilities of all newly established public places of entertainment.

In conclusion, we wish to say that, at the present time, there exists in Italy a well-established group of independent operators who are familiar with all angles of hiring, from the purely commercial problems (individual treatment and classification of the establishments in consideration of the type and quality of the games and music boxes to be placed, contacts with the customers, etc.) to the strictly technical problems (cleaning, checking, repairs, etc.). The securely established flexibility of this group interested in this business is a guaranty of a steady expansion in Italy of the activities connected with the hiring of phonographs and tables. Thus we can state in all confidence that in Italy, in spite of the relatively short time involved, in comparison with other countries, great strides ahead have been made on the road of an intelligent and progressive industrialization in the operating field.

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
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Chi Phono Bowl League Results


L. Albanese led the Garmisas to two for three over Western with a high of 502.

"The Cash Box Price Lists" act exactly the same as the market quotation board at the Stock Exchange—posting the prices as they are quoted for the past week, regardless of how much they may seem to be out of line. Some prices do not change for months. "The Cash Box Price Lists," rather than show no price, retain the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

FOREIGN BUYERS: To cover cost of packing, crating, shipping, etc., figure an additional \$20 to \$25 on Pin Games—and \$25 to \$30 on Phonographs.


