THE SPOKEN WORD

In many of our past editorial columns we have referred to the record industry as an industry without limitations or boundaries; a business which can attain heights that today may seem impossible.

In the past dozen or so months we have seen further evidence of this in the tremendous growth in popularity of a field which was considered almost completely extinct — the SPOKEN WORD recording.

At present, two of the nation's top ten albums are in this category—namely Shelley Berman's two Verve albums. And there are many others which, although not top best sellers, are enjoying steady success over a surprisingly long period of time.

In recent weeks, announcements from many record companies have indicated that we can expect to see a great deal more comedy spoken word product.

Currently the search is on for comics with fresh and off-beat material because comedy has proven so successful on records.

But the field of comedy may only be the beginning of a trend toward wide public acceptance of other types of spoken word recordings. The fact that so many people will sit and listen to dialogue probably has started many industry people thinking that perhaps now there is a wider market waiting for other types of spoken word recordings such as: excerpts from famous

roles of the screen; famous speeches; radio's greatest moments; classic performances from the theatre, etc., etc. Perhaps this thinking seems "far out" today. But we're sure that the first person to think of comedy succeeding on albums was also looked upon as "far out" only a few months ago. And there is always the Ed Murrow "I Can Hear It Now" series of albums, one of the all time best selling series of recordings, to prove that there can be broad acceptance of spoken word recordings which are not in the comedy category.

Non-comedy spoken word albums such as those mentioned above are not new, but until now they have been issued with a limited market in mind.

Perhaps now, as indicated by the success of comedy disks, a broader market is ready to accept a varied assortment of serious spoken word records.

Spoken word recordings have a tremendous advantage over many other forms of recording in that, in most cases, the cost of producing such pressings, since they involve no musicians and often no elaborate studios and equipment, is not too high.

With comedy spoken word disks proving so successful, you can be certain that many of the keen minds in our industry, who leave no stones unturned, are already examining other broad commercial uses of spoken word material which will add other avenues of income to the record industry.

"THIS IS DARIN"—Bobby Darin—Atco 33-115

Having arrived on the scene as a legit performer with definite adult appeal, the dynamic Darin comes up with another thoroughly exciting album. And again Richard Wess is the guiding light behind the clever but effective arrangements, noticeably on the swinging version of "Clementine" and the pulsating "Caravan." The selections are mostly standards and include "Black Coffee," "Down With Love," "The Gal That Got Away" and "I Can't Give You Anything But Love." On both ballads and swingers Darin makes an indelible mark. Top album seller.




"LATIN ALA LEE!"—Peggy Lee—Capitol ST 1290

The song stylist takes a batch of Broadway show tunes, wraps them in contagious Latin settings, and sells them vivaciously in her accustomed manner. Jack Marshall is the man behind the Latin beat, prodding Miss Lee to swinging heights on "Hey There," "The Party's Over," "C'est Magnifique" and "I Enjoy Being A Girl" among others. An exciting session with sock saleability.



"WHEN THE SPIRIT MOVES YOU"—Jimmie Rodgers—Roulette R 25103

With folk music his basic medium, Rodgers is right at home with this collection of spirituals and gospel numbers. This is the real folk music! Joe Reisman's ork and chorus back up the singer on such beloved items as "Goin' To Shout All Over God's Heaven," "Joshua Fit the Battle of Jericho," "Just a Closer Walk With Thee" and "Standin' in the Need of Prayer." The approach is strictly for pop tastes, and Rodgers' following there is immense.




"THE MANCINI TOUCH"—Henry Mancini and his Orchestra—RCA Victor LSP 2101

Having established himself on the pop market as a jazz composer, Mancini offers more music with jazz overtones, but directed at the pop buyers. In a direction opposed to his "Peter Gunn" sessions, he directs a large string and brass ork in light, listenable, dance themes utilizing good jazz soloists and some jazz tunes (included are four new Mancini pieces). Soloists: Vic Feldman, Ronnie Lang, Bob Bain, Shelly Manne and others. Tunes: "Like Young," "Robbin's Nest," "That's All" and 9 others.




"ALWAYS"—Roger Williams — Kapp KL 1172

A program of "melodies that will live forever" is the latest series of vehicles for the delicate Williams touch. The music's indestructibility is due to the fact that most of it comes from the classical literature, and Williams never loses sight of their beautiful melodies: "Stranger in Paradise," "Traumerei," "Moonlight Sonata," "Till the End of Time" and "Brahms' Lullaby" among others. Frank Hunter's and Pete King's orks supply the lush string backdrops. It all adds up to a memorable experience.



"MR. PERSONALITY SINGS THE BLUES"—Lloyd Price — ABC Paramount ABC 315

Price belts his way through a dozen driving numbers, some of which are in the true blues idiom. Sid Feller's orchestral accompaniment embodies soaring strings and heavy rockbeat. It's a powerful package that should be picked up on quickly. Tunes include "Ain't Nobody's Business," "I Cover the Waterfront," "Sittin' Here and Rockin'" and "Feeling Lowdown."



"SOMEBODY LOVES ME" — Dinah Shore — Capitol ST 1296

A dozen of the most memorable sentimental ballads are essayed warmly and intimately by Miss Shore. She is aided immensely by the lush string and woodwind orchestrations created by Andre Previn. Among the tunes are "It's Easy to Remember," "Something to Remember You By," "Always," "My Buddy" and "I Only Have Eyes For You." It's a rewarding session for the vocalist, who invests each song with utmost personal sincerity. Can go far.



"HIGH SPIRITS!"—The Four Lads—Columbia CL 1407

As with most pop singers (or group in this case), the Four Lads are no exception in cutting an album of religious songs. The Lads have chosen a dozen high flying gospel jubilee songs smoothed down their rough edges to make them palatable to pop tastes, and deliver them in their usual infectious manner. Billy Dennison's ork romps along with them on the shuffle beat rhythms. Selections: "Great Gettin' Up Morning," "Way Down In Egypt's Land" (actually "Go Down Moses"), "Ring Them Chimin' Bells" and "Rock My Soul." Their fans will love it.



"BIG SONGS FOR LITTLE PEOPLE"—Jerry Lewis—Decca DL 78936

The comedian serves up a delightful session of songs aimed at the younger set; songs such as "Hit the Road to Dreamland," "When You Wish Upon A Star," "Over the Rainbow," "Little Man You've Had a Busy Day" and "Little Sir Echo" songs which will enchant numerous adults as well as the "little people" they're directed at. An album loaded with sincere warmth and bubbling over with charm. Should be extremely well received.



"R.F.D."—Tab Hunter—Warner Bros. W 1367

It's Tab Hunter's turn to take a crack at some of the wonderful country songs that have been kicking around for years. In semi-country orchestrations set up by Grady Martin, which make full use of the guitar, Hunter offers performances of "Bummin' Around," "Oh Lonesome Me," "It Makes No Difference Now" and "I've Got A New Heartache." Outing could be a big success.




"I LOVE TO SING"—Betty Bennett — United Artists UAS 6070

A return to the disk scene for the former band vocalist with Woody Herman, Claude Thornhill, Charlie Barnet and Charlie Ventura. Miss Bennett is in the Anita O'Day/June Christy school of singers: crisp clear phrasing, slightly throaty voice, toeing the line between jazz and pops depending on the particular material. In this album her choice of material is commendable including such tunes as "Like Someone In Love," "All At Once," "Who Cares," "Down With Love" and "Then I'll Be Tired of You," all lesser-heard tunes by the songwriting cream. Andre Previn is a sympathetic accompanist. A much-welcome return for Miss Bennett.



"IF YOU WANT TO GET TO HEAVEN . . . SHOUT"—Gogi Grant—Liberty LST 7144

A collection of spirituals are taken the pop vocal route by Miss Grant. She is an expressive essayer of this material, with Billy May's exciting arrangements and a chorus tying it all up into a neat package. Selections include "All God's Children Got Shoes," "Deep River," "Wayfaring Stranger," "I'm Going to Live the Life" and "Can't No Grave Hold My Body Down." Fine expression in this area.



"THE BEST OF PETER GUNN"—Ray Ellis and his Orchestra—MGM E3813

Henry Mancini's dramatic background music for the TV'er is here in the hands of Ray Ellis, whose arrangements and ork direction compare favorably with the best-selling Mancini originals. Ellis has selected a dozen pieces and does dramatic jazz justice to them, lots of percussion, striking brass lines, etc. Though late on the "Peter Gunn" scene this album merits attention.



"I WISH YOU LOVE"—Felicia Sanders—Time 70002

Since her fame-getting performance on Percy Faith's hit disk of "The Song From Moulin Rouge" several years back this lovely thrush has matured considerably through her many nitery dates. Time Records is the fortunate owner of this set of twelve tender love portraits so capably painted by Miss Sanders. She glosses sensuously over the tender lyrics of "I Wish You Love," "When the World Was Young," "Warm All Over," "Anyone Would Love You" and other oft-neglected superior pop and jazz tunes. A welcome disk by a talented female.



Album Reviews

"THE ALL TIME TOP TANGOS"—Stanley Black and his Orchestra—London PS 176

Despite many changes in popular music taste over the past years, Black continues to dispense some of the best Latin music for dancing available on disk. This latest set finds the English maestro surveying a dozen popular tangos, designated as the all-time top. Using an accordion soloist liberally, Black moves sweetly through "La Cumparsita," "A Media Luz," "Jealousy," "Adios Muchachos" and "El Choclo." Another excellent offering from Black.

"BEST LOVED JEWISH SONGS"—Jan Bart—Request RLP 8038

A regular performer on the WMGM-N.Y. "Jewish Caravan of Stars," Bart offers, on his initial Request LP, a program of familiar Jewish melodies. These are the songs of Jewish tradition, songs of various European origin dating back many years. They are sung with the reverence they deserve with light instrumental accompaniment that puts the accent on strings. Bart is well-known in his area; his fans will cherish this album.

"THE EXCITING ARTISTRY OF WILL HOLT"—Elektra EKL-181

Singer-guitarist Holt is a folk-bred artist who has mostly chosen theatre composers as the source of his material here. Side one—devoted to five striking items by Kurt Weill and Bertold Brecht—comes-off best, with Holt's vocals and instrumentation (and three other string players) giving the material an authentic touch. On the flip side, the lovely "When The World Was Young" is sensitively portrayed. Other tunes include "I Love Paris" and "Blues In The Night." Artist's various TV-nitery stints should get sales this way.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK

"WORKIN' WITH THE MILES DAVIS QUINTET"—Prestige PRLP 7166

The third album to come out of the late 1956-early 1957 (approximate) sessions which produced the previously released "Cookin'" and "Relaxin'" LP's. The quintet is or was, one of the greatest in jazz history, each man a master of his trade: Coltrane, Red Garland, Paul Chambers, Philly Joe Jones. The eight tracks include the understated, introspective "It Never Entered My Mind," the riffing "Four," a pungent Garland on a trio track, "Ahmad's Blues" and two takes of "The Theme." A must for the jazz collector.

"FESTIVAL SESSION"—Duke Ellington and his Orchestra—Columbia CL 1400

A new Ellington album is always a happy event and this one is no exception. With power to spare the Ellington men drive through the compositions they introduced (or re-introduced) last summer during its festival appearances. This is a surging, rocking band, spurred on by two drummers. As usual the standouts are Johnny Hodges, Harry Carney, Clark Terry and the tingling arrangements. Selections are "Perdido," "Things Ain't What They Used to Be," "Copout Extension," "Duel Fuel," "Idiom '59" and "Launching Pad." One of the most exciting jazz LP's in a long while.

"OSCAR PETERSON PLAYS THE COLE PORTER, IRVING BERLIN, GEORGE GERSHWIN, DUKE ELLINGTON, RICHARD RODGERS SONGBOOKS"—Verve MG V-2052, 2053, 2054, 2055, 2057

Following the label's five disk Ella Fitzgerald set, it comes up with another five disks that almost equals the former in ambition but far exceeds it in scope. The Peterson Trio offers a huge panoramic view of the American popular music scene of the last thirty years (or so) by playing the great music of our greatest composers. The approach is completely improvisational; relaxed, swinging with an amazing intensity and maintaining an extremely high level of good taste. Set is a re-make of a similar series Peterson cut for Granz several years back (now unavailable). A must for the jazz collectors—yet with definite pop appeal.

JAZZ PICKS (cont.)

"BOOKER LITTLE 4 & MAX ROACH"—United Artists UAS 5034

Actually this is the Max Roach Quintet, one of the finest in modern jazz. The arrangements are Little's and they, along with his sharp, lyrical trumpet playing, display the continual advancement being made by him. Of course Roach's drumming is the feature, always amazing and continually sparking the soloists. George Coleman on tenor is another youngster that has come a long way since joining the group. Tunes are "Milestones," "Sweet and Lovely" and "Moonlight Becomes You." Electrically stimulating session.

"RELAX'N WITH CHICO RANDALL"—Roulette R 25092

The Chico Randall Trio is the kind of group you run into at smart supper clubs. Randall sings in a soft, husky, intimate voice and his piano playing is in complete sympathy with his vocal style. Bass and drums assist in a rhythmically assured role. Listeners will relax to the sounds of "When I Fall In Love," "It Might As Well Be Spring," "Willow Weep For Me" and "If I Were A Bell" plus eight others. Auspicious debut for the youngster.

"FIORELLO!"—The Leon Merian Jazz Quartet—Seeco CELP 459

Trumpeter Merian has a pleasant sound and swings easily. The other three members of the quartet fall into this same category. If not distinguished or imaginative, they play in a pleasant, easily-assimilated manner. Taking 10 tunes from the smash Broadway musical they read them with vigor. This is jazz for the average pop music fan.

CLASSICAL PICKS OF THE WEEK

DEBUSSY: "Images For Orchestra" (Complete)—Leonard Bernstein conducting the New York Philharmonic—Columbia ML 5419



The three pieces, "Rondes de printemps," "Gigues," and "Iberia," combined form the complete Debussy "Images," some of the most visual impressionistic music on record. The "Iberia" has become a major orchestral piece in itself and this unique recording by Bernstein, is one of the few of the complete "Images." The direction is bold and striking, taking full advantage of the sweeping Debussy scenes. An important release.

"THE MASS"—Canon Sydney MacEwan and the Choir of the Church of Santa Susana—Columbia KL 5311

Columbia is to be commended for the production of this album. The recording is of the Mass of the 21st Sunday after Pentecost, "Orbis Factor," sung in Gregorian Mode and recorded in Rome. Accompanying it is an elaborately produced, 39-page booklet containing illustrated articles on "The History and Meaning of the Roman Catholic Mass" by Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, and other highly informative articles in both Latin and English texts. Excellent teaching aid; significant release.

RONCALLI: Four Suites—Charles Byrd, Guitar—Washington WR 429

Charles Byrd is an exemplary guitarist who has achieved recognition in both jazz and the classics. Here he demonstrates his amazing artistry by performing four remote baroque guitar suites by the little known composer. It is through music like this that one realizes the classic beauty of the instrument, beauty that cannot be diminished by the rough treatment accorded the instrument in today's pop music. An album worthy of special merit.

Victor To Issue Basic Grade School LP Library

NEW YORK—RCA Victor will institute a new RCA Victor Basic Record Library for Elementary Schools under the title "Adventures in Music," with the first volume, "Grade 3, Vol. 1," due this month, it was announced by George R. Marek, Victor vice-president and general manager.

"Grade 3, Volume 1" will be followed by an album for "Grade 6, Vol. 1," scheduled for release in early summer 1960. Plans are for the comprehensive series to be completed within the next three years.

The new library will contain ten albums—one album each for grades one and two, and two albums each for grades three through six. Each album will be available in stereo as well as monaural in 33 1/3 and 45 rpm speeds.

Because the albums will serve parents interested in home instruction as well as school systems, RCA Victor will make the recordings available at all record retail outlets.

The National Symphony Orchestra, under Howard Mitchell, will be heard in the series. The Washington, D. C., Symphony has a long history of varied educational programs for young people in the nation's capitol.

Gladys Tipton, Professor of Music Education at Columbia University, and also co-author of a series of texts titled "Music For Living," is the editor of the new RCA Victor Basic Library. Miss Tipton, a contributor to the nation's educational journals, is co-editor of booklets, "Notes for Teachers," which will accompany each library volume. Working with her is Eleanor Tipton, a music supervisor of the Philadelphia Public School System. This booklet will serve to guide instructors in planning ways to focus attention on the various recorded selections in areas of background information as to music and composer; and in analysis of rhythm, melody, form, texture, instrumentation, and dynamics.

Consultants to Miss Tipton in the project, in addition to Miss Eleanor Tipton, are Miss Wilma Schell, music consultant, public school system of Baltimore, Md.; Miss Alice Gallup, supervisor of music, public school system of Long Beach, Calif.; and Charles Walton, instructor of music education, Teachers College, Columbia University.

This Basic Library is designed, a statement said, as a dramatic program to give elementary school children a "well-balanced, musically stimulating experience in listening to, responding to, and becoming familiar with a variety of music representative of master composers of many periods and styles." The recordings will consist of movements of outstanding compositions by composers from Bach to Copland, and will "enable classroom teachers, with or without special musical skill, and music supervisors, to guide children to comprehensive and stimulating musical experience. The series will also provide students with appropriate insight into the correlation between music and poetry, music and art, as well as other subjects in school curricula."

RCA Victor established its first educational program in 1912 (then

HOLLYWOOD—Bob Stephens, veteran A & R man and recording consultant, has been named A & R chief for Dot Records' eastern operation. Dot President Randy Wood, announced last week.

Stephens is associated with such hits as "The Music Goes 'Round" and "Round," "Sunrise Serenade," "I The Mood," "A Tisket, A Tasket," "Paper Doll," and "You Always Hurt The One You Love" while with Decca Records.

Stephens started in the music business as a professional musician and entered the recording field with Oke Records. During his tenure there, the new Dot A & R chief was responsible for the original recordings of The Dorsey Brothers and contributed to the recordings of Bix Biederbecke, Joe Venuti, Eddie Lang and Louis Armstrong.

In 1934 Stephens joined Decca and subsequently helped guide the workings of such artists as The Mill Brothers, now on the Dot label, The Casa Loma Orchestra, The Dorsey Brothers, Chick Webb, Ella Fitzgerald, Johnny Long, Carmen Cavalleri and Ted Weems, among others.

In his new A & R spot for Dot Records, Stephens will headquarter in New York, where he will supervise recording sessions for the label, search for new talent and material.

Sun And Phillips In Heavy Five Disk Push

MEMPHIS, TENN.—Bill Fitzgerald, general manager of Sun and Phillips Records, is currently on a tour of the Southwest and Midwest visiting distributors and disk jockeys in behalf of five hot Sun and Phillips releases. The disks being pushed heavily are Carl Mann's "Some Enchanted Evening," Johnny Cash's "I Love You Because," Charlie Rich's "Lonely Weekend," Tracy Pendarvis' "100 Guitars" and Mack Owens' "Someone Just Like You."

Cecil Scaife is covering distributor and Disk jockeys in the East and Southeast for the same records. Both Fitzgerald and Scaife plan to be on the road until February 15.

Sam Phillips, president of the diskeries, also announced last week that he is offering distributors a 15% discount on the entire Sun and Phillips catalogs.

Uttal Spearheads Madison Drive For "Someone Loves You, Joe"

NEW YORK — Madison Record personnel have taken to the road for the label's new waxing of "Someone Loves You, Joe" by the Singing Belles.

Columbia Releases 13 LP's In Feb.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records' Feb. LP release totals thirteen classical & pop albums. These include three masterworks releases, seven popular, and three jazz.

Masterworks releases include Glenn Gould's performance of Beethoven's third Piano Concerto, with Leonard Bernstein and the Columbia Symphony Orchestra; Andre Kostelanetz's recording of Offenbach's "Gaité Parisienne" and Bizet's "Carmen Suite"; and "The Mass", performed by Canon Sydney MacEwan and the Choir of the Church of Santa Susanna in Rome, with illustrated articles and bilingual texts.

Popular albums include Ray Coniff's "Concert in Rhythm—Vol. II";

"High Spirits!" by The Four Lads; "Sir Charles Thompson and the Swing Organ"; "Greatest Western Hits No. 2," an anthology of performances by Carl Smith, George Morgan, "Little" Jimmy Dickens, Ray Price, Marty Robbins, and Lefty Frizzell; "The Old Sweet Songs" by Frank De Vol and His Rainbow Strings; "Happy Days!" by the Buffalo Bills and "Themes from the General Electric Theatre", with Elmer Bernstein and His Orchestra.

Jazz releases include Duke Ellington's "Festival Session", an album of new Ellington compositions premiered on the jazz circuit last summer by his orchestra; "Rushing Lullabies" with Jimmy Rushing and a six-piece combo; and "Happy Time!" by the Al Conte Quartet.

\$500 ASCAP Grants To Ten Symphony Orchs.

NEW YORK—Ten major symphony orchestras have been awarded grants of \$500 each by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, ASCAP President Stanley Adams announced.

The grants go to the following orchestras: Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Detroit Symphony Orchestra, The Cleveland Orchestra, Symphony Society of San Antonio, Boston Symphony Orchestra, St. Louis Symphony Society, Denver Symphony Society, Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra Society, Inc., Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and Kansas City Philharmonic.

The ASCAP Awards Committee, appointed by the Major Orchestra Manager's Conference, consisted of William C. Herring, Manager of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Chairman, and George Morgulis, Manager of the Kansas City Philharmonic. The Committee considered applications from the twenty-four major symphony orchestras of the United States. In announcing the awards to the orchestras, the Committee stated that applications must be for projects "that relate directly to the presentations (and/or the repeat performances) of contemporary music and/or composers."

In commenting on the award Adams said, "It is the belief of the Society's Board of Directors that performances of contemporary music in the symphonic and concert field should be encouraged. While the Society recognizes that a grant such as ours is only a small step in stimulating American creative talent, we are hopeful that his action will prompt other organizations to provide similar recognition."

ASCAP Director and Chairman of the ASCAP Symphonic Committee Dr. Douglas Moore announced that the Award Committee decided that ten grants of \$500 each was the most equitable method of allocating the Society's Grant.

Pop To Country Switch

NEW YORK — With their latest single, "China Doll," the Ames Brothers have done an about face on the current trend of country music going pop. The RCA Victor recording artists waxed the tune written by Cindy Walker, who has had several hits in the country field, and the label is shipping it to D.J.'s on its country list as well as its standard pop list. This marks the first time an Ames Brothers record has gone to country D.J.'s, and indicates how closely-allied the country and pop fields have become in the singles market.

WB To Release Crosby's "Sing Along" Album

HOLLYWOOD — Bing Crosby's "Join Bing and Sing Along" LP, which was independently produced through his own record company, Projects Records, Inc., has been released through Warner Bros. Records. The album is the first such effort by Crosby.

The WB release is packaged with lyrics to the songs both on the inner-sleeve and on individual inserts. Orchestral arrangements for the set are by Bob Thompson; the chorus and orchestra are conducted by Jack Halloran.

The Bing Crosby Sing Along album is the second set to be merchandised by Warner Bros. for Projects Records. Earlier this month, The Trapp Family Singers' "Sound of Music" album was rushed onto the market by the two companies.

Goldner Forms Goldisc Label

NEW YORK — George Goldner, president of Gone Recording Corp., has announced the formation of a new label called Goldisc Records. The first release will be by the Temptations "Barbara" b/w "Someday."

An "elaborate" promotion campaign to kick off the new label is being set up by promotion manager Jerry Simon, and his field promotion men, Saul Star in Detroit, Fred Salem in Chicago and Irwin Zucker on the west coast.

Roulette Purchases Hot Elgin Master

NEW YORK—Roulette has made a master purchase of "I Believe I Love You" and will release the disk on Gee Records, a division of Roulette. The song, written and recorded by Jimmie Mack and the Watts was initially released on the Elgin label.

According to Roulette, the record has been stirring strong sales activity in the Connecticut area where it was first released. Clarence Drum of the Drum Recording Co. and owner of the Elgin record sold the disk for an undisclosed sum.

The deal for Roulette was handled by Joe Kolsky, executive-vice-president of the firm. The Gee record was rushed into production and is already in the hands of Roulette distributors.

Roulette Extends 10% Discount Until Feb. 15

NEW YORK—Roulette Records announced last week an extension of the label's Jan. "Soundsational" 10% cash discount plan for all dealers. The plan, which was scheduled to end Jan. 31 has been extended until Feb. 15th. The 10% discount is based on all album purchases during the duration of the plan and includes both catalog merchandise, as well as the new LP releases for Jan.

Joe Kolsky, executive vice-president for the diskery, is currently out on the road visiting the distributors concerning among other topics, the Jan. program. The sales reaction and hefty orders, according to Joe Kolsky has prompted this extension of the sales plan. He reported that the leading albums in sales among the new releases are: "More Songs For Adults Only" — Pearl Bailey; "When The Spirit Moves You" — Jimmie Rodgers; "Mr. Dynamo" — Ronnie Hawkins and a couple of "sleepers" in "The Mark of Fredricks" — featuring Mark Fredricks, His Piano and Orch., and "Illinois Jacquet Flies Again." Jacquet is currently appearing at the Birdland jazz nitery in New York.

Kolsky concluded that the "Soundsational Sales plan will give Roulette their biggest Jan. album sales since they have been in business." He stated: "The additional two weeks extension of the plan will give our distributors and their accounts a chance to cash-in and realize an even greater profit from our Jan. releases and the 10% cash discount benefit".

NEW YORK — Allan Freed this week (beginning February 5th) takes a show into Harlem's Apollo theatre for a one-week stand. In his initial trip "uptown," the Freed revue will feature Bo Diddley and Big Maybelle Smith.

Novy has been named vice president and musical director for the firm.

NEW YORK—Decca Records has announced the purchase of a master by C&W songster Elmer Snodgrass, "Until Today," from Jubilee Records. The diskery added that the deck would get "prominent" promotion thru the country-wide network of Decca branches.

Jane Morgan Title Changed

NEW YORK—The title of the new Jane Morgan single on Kapp, "My Love Love Doesn't Love Me At All," has been changed to "The Ballad Of Lady Jane." Former title is now the tune's subtitle.

Champ Butler To Crosby

LAS VEGAS—Signing of a long-term contract with Champ Butler was announced here last week by Stanley Skiba, president of Crosby Records.

The contract calls for a minimum of eight sides per year, according to Skiba, who said the company was planning immediate recording sessions in Los Angeles in order to release the first Butler platter in February.

The Crosby company, incorporated in Nevada in 1958, recently started to build a talent roster, which already includes Carrot-Top Anderson, the Four Tunes and Tommy Graham.

Butler, who formerly was under contract to Columbia, also has current records and albums in release by Tops and Keen labels.

At the invitation of R. Dawes, Director of E.M.I.'s Records and International Division, The Cash Box representative visited the Division's Headquarters at Hayes, Middlesex. The Records and International Division was formed in May last year as a result of the continued growth in recent years of E.M.I.'s world wide activities in the field of recorded music and consumer goods, in order to co-ordinate more closely the activities of all the groups, companies and associates, by bringing together into one division all their overseas records and consumer good companies i.e. E.M.I. Records Ltd. (their English record marketing company) and English Record Production Facilities together with the various head office units which advise and service different parts of the world record operation. The exception to this grouping is Capitol Records, its American associates, who continue to be responsible to the Board through President, Glenn E. Wallichs, a Director of the parent company. One of the Divisional General Managers, E. G. Hurst told The Cash Box that he was leaving the next day on a four-week tour of Pakistan, India, Singapore, Hong Kong and the United States to look at the future development of E.M.I.'s business, particularly in the record field.

Hurst explained that all these areas are growing territories and ready to be exploited. In America Hurst will confer with Glenn Wallichs when policy regarding the suitability of the classical repertoire in relation to both the United States and Europe will come under discussion. Hurst also said that E.M.I. recently acquired a juke box licensing business in Denmark. The success of this first venture may well lead to further expansion in this field.

It was a pleasure to meet another visitor to Hayes—Dr. Veder, Managing Director of Electrola and Carl Lindstrom, who flew in from Germany on a two-day visit.

The visit to E.M.I. also presented an opportunity to meet again Malcolm McGrady, who last year helped successfully to launch the Top Rank label throughout the world and who has now joined the International Division of E.M.I. Although his immediate duties are not directly concerned with the record side of the business it is hard to believe that someone who made so great an impact on the record industry in so short a time, will not make some further contribution from within E.M.I.

Oriole Records is delighted with the success of its latest artist, Maureen Evans, whose second record for the label, "The Big Hurt" (competing with Toni Fisher on Top Rank and Joan Small on Parlophone) has been judged "The Record Of The Week" by Radio Luxembourg, and a unanimous hit by B.B.C. TV's high spot disk program Juke Box Jury. Top disk critic Richard Attenborough also chose it as his "Record Of The Week".

It is the policy of Oriole Records to be very selective in relation to the singles market—feeling that too many inferior singles are released which is bad for the retailer, exploitation man and disk jockey. Plans are well advanced to fulfill its desire to broaden the field of the pop market and evolve new trends by imaginative selection of material.

Oriole also plan an orderly developemnt of its L.P. and E.P. material based on perennial and established favourites in all fields, at the same time striving to improve relations with the retail trade by giving them good records and speedy service from its own plant and to supply dealers with ample literature and support in every way.

The latest Oriole release is recorded music from the new Jack Hylton musical "When In Rome" now playing at London's Adelphi Theatre. The stars of the show, Dickie Henderson and June Laverick, have cut an E.P. and three singles—backed with orchestra and singers conducted by Billy Ternent. The big number is a delightful duet "Simpatico".

One of this label's greatest successes has been the L.P. by the original cast of the Julian Slade-Dorothy Reynolds musical "Salad Days" which on Thursday of this week became the longest running musical in British history, passing the previous all-time record of 2,238 performances set up by "Chu-Chin-Chow". On January 30th it will pass the world record for musicals exceeding the 2,248 performances of "Oklahoma" in New York.

Bernard Ness, General Manager of the Rank Organisation's International Record Division, announces the appointment of P. A. L. Skinner as Marketing Manager of Rank Records Ltd. In his new capacity Skinner is responsible for co-ordination of Top Rank's advertising, publicity, sales and exploitation and will be directly responsible to the label's Commercial Manager, Bob Roberts. Skinner has been Advertising Manager of Rank Records since February 1959. He has been with the Rank Organisation for nine years.

Sandy King (Saunders Kurtz), General Sales Manager of Hansen Publications, Inc., is on a six-week survey of the current emphasis in music publishing by various European houses. King's itinerary will take him to Paris, Geneva, Zurich, Vienna, West Berlin, Hamburg, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Amsterdam, Brussels and London. While in the Scandinavian countries he will work with the Metronome publishing combines on expansion of its jazz materials which already include copyrights of Quincy Jones, Billy Taylor, Horace Silver, Julian Adderly, from various affiliated Hansen catalogues. Additionally, in Paris, King will meet with Barclay Editions.

Advance bookings for M.G.M.'s "Ben Hur" at London's Empire Theatre has now surpassed the all-time record previously held by "My Fair Lady". Its total takings in the first weeks of its twelve world wide situations now amount to \$2,000,000. John Burgess of M.G.M. Records reports that sales of the wonderful L.P. "Musical Highlights" of the Niklos Rozsa score by The Symphony Orchestra of Rome, conducted by Carlo Savina, have far exceeded expectations. Ron Goodwin is to record the love theme from the film on Parlophone which will be available for release in the States on Capitol.

E.M.I. threw a party this week at London's Satire Club to welcome the divine Sarah Vaughan, here to star in A.T.V.'s "Sunday Night At The London Palladium. After an opening concert at London's Festival Hall Sarah embarked on a 16-day tour of major cities throughout the country. Her latest record release here is the attractive "You Are My Baby" and "Eternally" on Mercury.

Another singer to arrive on the same plane as Sarah Vaughan was Columbia artist Ronnie Hawkins to appear on A.B.C.'s "Boy Meets Girls". His current record release here is "Southern Love" (What'cha gonna do) and "Love Me Like You Can".

Parlophone star Adam Faith, currently topping the charts with his "What Do You Want" has been signed for a new film "The Moment Of Truth" starring Peter Sellers and Richard Todd. His latest disk "Poor Me" backed with "Reason" is just released. Also on Parlophone is the original Larry Hall version of "Sandy" currently high in The Cash Box 100 chart.

Maurice Woodruff, well known clairvoyant and astrologer gave a cocktail party at the Wellington Club, London to celebrate the release of the first three disks in a unique Zodiac series issued on the Pye label. The idea is to give record buyers five minutes of their own personal horoscope on one side of the record, narrated by Neal Arden, well known journalist and broadcaster,

and five minutes of musical entertainment with Neal Arden's "Quiet Rhythms" containing selections from the Pye 'Golden Guinea' series on the flip side.

These Zodiac records are the first colored records to be manufactured in this country and are in a "night sky" blue material. Another enterprising innovation is that the record labels are printed in the lucky color of each Zodiac sign with a special Zodiac record bag. The first three releases cover subjects born under Aquarius, Pisces and Aries. Future Zodiac records will be released at a later date. The records retail at five shillings each.

Latest disk by 'The Golden Boy of 1959'—Bobby Darin entitled "Beyond The Sea" was released simultaneously both here and in the States on London Darin, together with fellow London recording artist Duanne Eddy, is due to open a three-week tour of British theatres on March 18th. Also from Decca comes news that Tommy Steele's "Little White Bull" has passed the quarter million sales and there is every possibility that this disk will reach the half million mark. As previously reported in The Cash Box Tommy is donating the royalties of this record to the Variety Club's Fund For A Cancer Research Unit for Children.

Philip's recording artist Anne Shelton leaves for a variety tour of South Africa on February 4th. On the same date her latest record "Angels Lullaby" backed with "Where Can I Go" is due for release.

Owing to television commitments the Stateside visit of Philip's star Marty Wilde has been postponed until March.

From Fontana comes news of another Marty—Marty Robbins—currently high in The Cash Box Top 100 charts with "El Paso". Plans are well advanced for Robbins to visit this country in May this year.

Now that the extensive holiday season is over, most record companies and publishers are back in business for what they all anticipate will be one of the most successful years the music business has experienced in this country. ready major labels and publishers are turning out a great deal of local material of tremendous potential.

Lee Godon's Leedon label has released new singles of **The Delltones** (Johnny O'Keefe's regular vocal group) with "Yes Indeed" and "Tell Me What You Care", following up with the disk debut of **Dale Wayne**, a seven-year-old newcomer, singing "Juke Box Bop" and "I'm Lonely Now", two of Wayne's own compositions. **Johnny Rebb** looks set for success with his newly released single of "Highway of Love" which is from Rebb's EP of the same title.

Jack Argent of Leeds Music is very happy about the success of two more Australian compositions that are currently doing business here. They are "Teenage Baby", written by ace disk-jockey **Tony Withers**, recorded by popular **Col Joye** on Festival and **Frank Ifield** on Columbia. Ifield is flying the Australian flag in England at the moment, and according to reports is doing well. The other song pleasing Jack Argent is "Turn The Lights Out Johnny" which was written and recorded by **Johnny Devlin**. This one is reportedly to be released in the Benelux countries, Germany and Italy.

The first Australian ever to star at the Nichigeki Theatre in Tokyo is singing stylist, drummer and entertainer **Larry Stellar**. After several months in Tokyo, Okinawa and Hong Kong, Larry returns to take up again at Melbourne's Chevron Hotel.

Television personalities **Elaine McKenna** and **The Hi-Fi's** vocal group are among the artists who have been signed to appear with **Hugh O'Brian** when his "Wyatt Earp Western Revue" opens at The Princess Theatre on 4th February for a three-weeks season. Elaine McKenna will sing duets with the popular Hugh O'Brian.

Steve Lawrence looks set for the top here with his W & G release of "Pretty Blue Eyes" which is making a lot of sales noise across the nation. This one will be followed with his album "Swing Softly With Me". Steve Lawrence and **Eydie Gormé** become very popular here as a result of their TV series which replaced the Steve Allen show. Lawrence also did well here with his previous single "I Don't Care (Only Love Me)".

There is tremendous interest in Australia in **Stan Freberg's** "The Old Lady Roll Blues" which has been the subject of some solid radio exposure. When released, this one should reach a ready-made market.

Another one that seems assured of success in the top group is **Bobby Darin's** "Beyond The Sea". Even though Darin's "Mack The Knife" was never released here on a single (EP only), it did well on hit parades throughout Australia.

In a surprise move that upset several strong rumors, Festival Records is releasing "Mr. Blue" by **The Fleetwoods**, which comes from the Rank organization. It was believed some time back that the Rank material would be handled by another major label. There are already a couple of cover versions of "Mr. Blue" on the local market with a start of several weeks over the original by The Fleetwoods.

In a special release to tie in with his current (22nd January) visit to Australia, **Coronet Records** has issued an EP of **Crash Craddock** singing "Sweetie Pie", "Ah Poor Little Baby", "Lulu Lee" and "Am I To Be The One". Craddock is about the hottest disk property in this country at present with his "Boom Boom Baby" which is the best selling single throughout the nation.

Another interesting Coronet release is **Duke Ellington's** "Anatomy Of A Murder", the title score from **Otto Preminger's** film production. As this has won several overseas awards it is assured of good sales action.



While in the Scandinavian countries he will work with the Metronome combine on expansion of its jazz material which already include copyrights of Quincy Jones, Billy Taylor, Horace Silver, and Julian Adderly, from various affiliated Hansen catalogs. Additionally, in Paris, King will meet with Barclay Editions. Sandy King has a long time career as a theatre batoneer before entering the publishing industry and joining Chas. H. Hansen a dozen years ago. Hansen Publications has offices in New York, Miami Beach and Hollywood. Sandy King will stay in Hamburg, Germany, on February 9-11 at the Hotel Reichshof.

"Benny Goodman 1937 '38" is the title of the jazz album that MGM will publish in February. It includes 36 not yet published titles of the "King Of Swing". This album has stars like Harry James, Teddy Wilson, Lionel Hampton, Gene Krupa, Jes Stacy and Charlie Christian. When Benny Goodman was in Germany the last time, he said that this album was better than his Carnegie Hall Concert.

It seems Ivo Robic, in the very near future, will get 'Goldene Schallplatte' from Polydor for his successful "Morgen". Together with the sales in foreign countries, this disk will soon reach the million selling mark. In its original German text, the U.S.A. called it a hit. When this happened "Morgen" was sold in all the foreign countries and last but not least, in Germany too. Polydor has released two new titles by Ivo Robic.

Electrola has signed the famous soprano Lisa Della Casa, who was born in Switzerland and guest of famous operas in Vienna, Mailand, Zurich, Buenos Aires and New York. The contract is for several years. Her first records on Electrola will be, "Ariadne auf Naxos" and "Tosca".

The newest songs of Lale Anderson, who became world famous with her "Lilli Marleen", are titled, "Das Lied der Schwane" and "Au Revoir, Marcel" on Electrola.

The first European Juke Box Poll is by the German coin machine magazine the Automatenmarkt. In its tenth anniversary issue, Automatenmarkt published the results: Female Singer—1, Caterina Valente; 2, Dalida; 3, Connie Francis; Male Singer—1, Peter Kraus; 2, Freddy; 3, Peter Alexander; Vocal groups—1, James Brothers; 2, Nilsen Brothers; 3, Kingston Trio; Orchestras—1, Billy Vaughn; 2, Chris Barber; 3, Perez Prado. The three songs, which in 1959 were most chosen in German juke boxes were, 1, "Die Gitarre und das Meer", Freddy; 2, "Am Tag als der Regen kam," Dalida; 3, "Tom Dooly," Nilsen Brothers.

Gus Backus, young singer on Polydor, a hit with his first appearance in Vienna. His records have been sold out in all the Vienna music shops.

More and more the German film industry is using record stars who are successful in Germany to help make the film a success, too. In 1959 the industry used Freddy, Little Gabriele with Louis Armstrong and Danish singers Nina and Frederik, Fred Bertelmann and Bibi Johns.

Paul Siegel, Berlin publisher and writer, is currently sick with pneumonia. Siegel recently made the front cover of the German trade paper Automaten Markt on the basis of his hit "Big Ben". The deck will soon be released in the United States on MGM. Shapiro Bernstein is the American publisher of "Big Ben".

Mr. Bonacina told me that just during these days, the Red Record is celebrating its first anniversary and he showed me, with pride, the plans for his new seat where a large recording room will be built.

I visited Mr. Giannini (CGD) who just returned from Rome where he met MGM Records President, Arnold Maxim. Maxim stressed to Giannini his personal satisfaction about the MGM records released in Italy by CGI. The MGM best sellers in Italy are, "Mona Lisa" by Conway Twitty, and "Danny Boy" by Conway Twitty. Giannini is releasing "Stampede", backed with "Music Man" by D. Valentini.

NEW YORK — Though Italy's famed 150-year-old Ricordi publishing firm is best known for its noble catalog of music by the likes of Verdi and Puccini, the past 6 years have put the firm in an important role in the pop music field.

The man currently guiding the destiny of Ricordi's world-wide pop enterprises (five publishing houses) is a 48-year-old, one-time lyricist and cafe pianist, Mariano Rapetti. Rapetti—a 31 year music business vet—recently visited with Ricordi's offices here and now back in Ricordi's home-base (and his hometown), Milan.

Rapetti was recently appointed supervisor of Ricordi's pop interests throughout the world. This includes pop-gearred offices in such countries as Germany, France, Brazil, Argentina and other South American countries and, of course, the U. S. Assisting Rapetti in handling such a wide operation is his 24-year-old son, Julio, who—like his father—is regarded as an

astute music man.

Ricordi formed his own diskery in Italy two years ago. The firm, Dischi Ricordi, is at this time a domestic product only, but there are plans for expanding the risky to other markets, according to Ruth Roland, Ricordi's New York office.

The Ricordi office here functions as a representative of the home firm. Its job is to place songs here and get U. S. for Ricordi abroad. As an example of the latter, material written by star rock 'n roller Conway Twitty is represented abroad by Ricordi. Ricordi is also the European representative of such prominent U. S. publishers as Music Holding Company, Famous Music, Shapiro-Bernstein Music and Columbia Pictures Music.

In the classical area other than opera, Ricordi publishes such material as symphonic and choral material, educational publications and one of the world's largest catalogs of guitar music.

The great Dutch singer, Rita Reys, who uses her voice in a way that a confident and talented musician used his instrument, has just recorded a single for Philips (managed by L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam) in the Dutch language titled, "Zon In Scheveningen" and "Venus Bespied". Rita Reys is a singer of excellent taste, who is convinced that performances of light music must have something fresh about them, combined with an approach that draws listeners to enjoy the music without feeling that it "attacks" them.

In the U.S.A. Rita Reys is well known for her two tours and for the records she made with The Jazzmessengers. On the above recording, she is accompanied by the famous Pim Jacobs Trio, one of the most fabulous jazz combos in Benelux. Insiders call this latest recording a real sensation, especially because Rita sings the songs in Dutch.

C. Solleveld (director of L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam), and R. Klaassen (sales manager), have just departed for Brussels where a meeting will be held of the advisory committee. After this visit, Solleveld will continue his journey to Paris to meet some people of the French Philips Company.

In a few weeks there will be the big carnival festivals in the Benelux. Every year at the same time the festivals are organized here and on this occasion L. C. Phonogram will release on Decca the Cologne Carnivals-Schlager 50, "Jedem Dierche sie Plasierche".

For the benefit of sending out the Dutch Olympic Group to the Olympian days this year, one of the five Dutch Broadcasting Companies, The AVRO, has organized a popularity contest for light music records in Holland. The first time a record by Eddy Calvert, famous English trumpeter called, "Morning" (on Columbia, one of the labels of L. C. Bovema, Heemstede, Holland), was chosen.

L. C. Bovema's modern records factories at Heemstede also make paper records for puff purposes. At this time, L. C. Bovema has a fully automatic machine which produces more than 1500 records an hour. Their revolutionary recording studios show unique acoustical qualities. In spite of the EM conflict, these studios are working steadily for commercial radio and television stations and prominent film industries.

Cole Europe Tour In Spring

HOLLYWOOD—Nat "King" Cole will make a month-long concert tour of Europe from April 18 to May 20, 1960. Tour will mark Cole's first professional appearance in Germany and Italy.

Cole hasn't been in Europe since 1954. He made a triumphant tour of South America last Spring, however, and is blueprinting another tour of that continent, where his Capitol LP's, "Cole Espanol" and "A Mis Amigos" (the latter in both Spanish and Portuguese), are hits.

Cole recently wound up an engagement at the Sands Hotel in Las Vegas. He appears at Miami's Eden Roc and the Hotel San Juan in Puerto Rico prior to leaving for the European Continent. His dates in Europe are currently being worked out by his long-time manager, Carlos Gastel.

ATV May Star Jo Stafford

NEW YORK—Great Britain's Associated Television, England's major commercial television outlet, has reportedly made an offer to Jo Stafford to become the first American singing star of a series of 39 half-hour musical programs, to be filmed in London.

ATV has earmarked \$1,250,000 for a project which would kick-off with a Jo Stafford show, titled possibly "Jo Stafford Sings," in addition to programs starring English continental and other stellar American talent in competing with Hollywood as a main center for the international film-for-television market.

Miss Stafford's selection arose from her popularity overseas, in turn, having arisen from her participation of the Voice of America, on Radio Luxembourg since 1949, and her internationally high record sales. ATV would present Miss Stafford in a major drive to capture the European television programs starring vocalists with the exception of Perry Como.

Miss Stafford would retain American distribution rights in addition to part ownership throughout Europe and Asia.

WWOL-Buffalo Begins Basic Format Of Foreign Music

NEW YORK—A variety of Continental music is now the basic format of Buffalo radio station WWOL. Beginning this week (1), "Don McNeill's Breakfast Club" stands as the only Monday through Friday feature directed at a general market.

The outlet is basing its new programming on "mass appeal," taking into account that 32% of its potential listening audience of 1,915,408 is either European, foreign-born or of foreign parentage. In addition, 76% of WWOL's "foreign" listenership is either Polish, Italian, German or Ukrainian. Figures are based on the 50 U. S. census.

For much of its programming, the station relies on foreign charts printed each week in *The Cash Box*. Programs which make specific use of such information include "Continental Hit Parade," "Italy's Top Tunes" and "Germany's Top Tunes." Arnold Johnson, WWOL's general manager, who originally conceived the idea, has made arrangements—using *The Cash Box* as his guide—with European diskeries for the servicing of their disks to WWOL. Other foreign-gear programs throughout the week include "Continental Showcase"; "Stan Jasinski's Polka

Party"; "Polka Beehive"; "Mid-Morning Polkas"; "German Family Hour"; "Emilino Rico's Neapolitan Serenade"; "Nel Pikul's Polanaise."

On Saturdays and Sundays, WWOL offers basically the same type of programming, except that several feature shows are produced in a foreign language. For example, Saturday's Rico and Pikul shows are done entirely in Italian and Polish, respectively. The Sunday "Irene and George Lawriwsky Ukrainian Hour" is broadcast in Ukrainian and Ernest Rettenoerf does the "German Family Hour" in German.

WWOL is a 1,000 watt outlet operating on the clear channel frequency of 1120.

Trinidad Likes Lauren

NEW YORK—The first recording by RCA Victor's new young artist, Rod Lauren, "If I Had A Girl," is one of the fastest-moving singles in Trinidad, it was reported by Dick Broderick, manager, record export marketing, RCA International. The single is a hit here.

Diskery Signs LaRosa

NEW YORK—Dave Kapp, president of Kapp Records which commenced action in the Supreme Court of New York against CBS, General Electric and Leland Heyward, producer of the telecast "The Fabulous Fifties", announced last week that the action was settled prior to its coming to court.

Kapp claimed that the show was using the "Fabulous Fifties" title which was his property—a title he used on the smash Roger Williams album and a number of others. In settling the complaint, CBS, GE and Heyward agreed to acknowledge that Kapp Records had given the show permission to use the "Fabulous Fifties" title and will make mention of the album.

Kapp also announced last week that he has signed vocalist Julius LaRosa to a long term pact. The singer's first single will be issued in the near future and Kapp is planning an intensive promotion behind the lad.

Nick Venet Forms Pubberies

HOLLYWOOD—Nick Venet, A&R director of World Pacific Records and ASCAP writer, has formed his own ASCAP and BMI firms.

Venet has recorded two artists, Stan Ross and the Gamblers. Both records will be released on the World Pacific label and published by Ridge Music, ASCAP, and Niven Music, BMI.

The publishing firms will be located at 8255 Sunset Blvd.

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records has announced the release of 19 pop, 8 classical (plus one stereo version of a previous monaural release) and 3 "Capitol"-of-the-World LP's for Feb. The new pop albums include dates by the Stan Kenton, June Christy, Four Freshmen, Kay Starr, Guy Lombardo, Billy May and Mickey Katz.

Columbia "Stereo 7" Action

NEW YORK—Sales of "Stereo Seven," a Columbia innovation presenting stereophonic sound on a 7-inch, 33 rpm disk, are "booming," the diskery reported last week. Sparked by heavy air play of a special sampler recording coupling, Percy Faith's "Theme From A Summer Place" and Johnny Mathis' "The Best Of Everything", mounting consumer demand has led to Columbia's announcement of an expanded release schedule supported by strong trade advertising, the label added.

A significant indication of "Stereo Seven's" market potentials, Columbia feels, is the announcement by Seeburg, one of the nation's largest jukebox manufacturers, that standard equipment on all its 1960 models includes a dual-spindle automatically adjustable to both 33 1/3 and 45 rpm spindle sizes. The same company has also perfected a special adapter mechanism for pre-1960 models.

Balboa Issues Compatible Single

VAN NUYS, CALIF.—Balboa Records, this city, has issued its first stereo/monaural compatible disk, a 45 RPM single. Sides are "Squad Car Theme" and "Jug-A-Roo" by Larry Lawrence and the Band of Gold. Label head Larry Fontine said the disk was mastered under the Neumann System of "compatibility."

New Am-Par Albums Filled With Firsts

NEW YORK—The group of new albums released by ABC-Paramount last week represents a number of firsts both from the standpoint of artist and company history.

The first commercially available duet album by husband-and-wife Ste Lawrence and Eydie Gorme is entitled "We Got Us". Ferrante & Teich are represented by their first album non-gimmick piano duets for ABC-Paramount, entitled "Ferrante Teicher Play Light Classics". Llo Price sings for the first time with string section in his first album blues songs, "Mr. Personality Sin The Blues". "Cliff Sings," the first album released in the United States by England's teenage star, Cliff Richard, coincides with the young singer's first visit to this country.

Other albums are firsts by artists new to the ABC-Paramount album catalog: "Emery And His Violin Love"—the first Am-Par LP to feature solo violin; "Married I Can Always Get," by Micki Marlo; and "Presenting The Golden Trumpet Of Ed Calvert".

Connie Haines Record Sides For Dot

HOLLYWOOD—Connie Haines, former featured singer with the late great Tommy Dorsey Orchestra, hewed her first tunes since "comin' back" on the Dot Records label, "The Corner," "Search For A Son," and "Old Man Mose."

Miss Haines, now under contract with Dot Records, next works on complete album of tunes she made popular while singing with the late Tommy Dorsey.

HOLLYWOOD—The Board of Directors of Capitol Records, at its meeting January 27, elected Joe Csida the newly-created office of vice president for eastern operations, it is announced last week by Capitol president Glenn E. Wallichs. Csida will assume this post on March 1.

Ed Burton Buys Csida Stock In Pub. & Mgt. Firms

NEW YORK—Ed Burton last week purchased for an undisclosed sum the entire stock interest of Joe Csida in Csida, Burton Associates; Trinity Music, (BMI); Town Music Corporation (ASCAP) and several other affiliated firms owned jointly by Csida and Burton, thus becoming sole owner of the operations. Csida sold out his interests in the companies to join Capitol Records, as Vice President for Eastern Operations.

The Trinity-Town-Csida, Burton firms were organized in June of 1954 and in a little more than five years had established themselves in the publishing-talent management fields. Among their hits were "Green Door" and "Talkin' to the Blues" by Jim Lowe; "Santa Baby" by Eartha Kitt; "I Dreamed" and "The Little Blue Man" by Betty Johnson; "That Do Make It Nice" and "I'm A Good Boy" by Eddy Arnold; "The Battle of Bokamonga" by Homer and Jethro; "Sleep Walk", "Tear Drop" and the new hit lp by Santo & Johnny; "It As I" and "Fancy Nancy" by Skip and Flip and numerous others.

Csida, Burton has managed established stars and young new talent including Eddy Arnold, Bobby Darin, Johnny Restivo, Jim Lowe, Santo and Johnny, Skip and Flip, Norman Leyn and Jamie Coe. The firm continues to manage all of these with the exception of young Darin, with whom it now has a recording operation, Madison Records and a music publishing firm, Music Development Corporation.

Apart from Csida's departure the entity, Towne, and Csida, Burton operations and personnel will remain completely intact.

Bob Davie will continue as musical director and supervisor of talent and recording. Irwin Schuster continues as general professional manager of both the Trinity and Towne firms and Bob Steinberg continues as financial administrator.

In his capacity as senior executive for all of Capitol Records' Eastern Operations, Csida's duties, in addition to general administration, will specifically embrace public relations, artists and repertoire and special events and projects, as directed by the President.

Csida for the past five and a half years has been president of his own firms in the combined fields of recording, talent-development-and-management, and music publishing, including Trinity Music, Inc., Towne Music Corporation and Csida, Burton Associates, Inc. Csida has divested himself of all interest in these firms via their sale to his partner, Ed Burton.

From 1934 to 1949 Csida was with The Billboard Publishing Company in numerous capacities, including those of music editor and Radio editor. For approximately the last years of his tenure with the magazine he was editor-in-chief.

In 1949 and 1950 he worked for Radio Corporation of American, initially as assistant to John West, Vice President for Public Relations and Advertising, and then as Director of Artists and Repertoire in charge of Popular, Country and Western, Rhythm and Blues, and Children's Records for the RCA Victor Division. Upon leaving RCA in 1950, Csida returned to The Billboard as editor in chief. He left the magazine in 1953 to organize Trinity Music. In the six years then, he expanded the operation to include the firms mentioned earlier.

In announcing Csida's appointment, President Wallichs said: "In accepting this new position in the Capitol organization, Mr. Csida fills a need that has existed since the company's inception. His extensive experience in almost every aspect in the music business, with his intimate knowledge of the important activities in New York, should prove invaluable in rounding out Capitol's executive group. Mr. Csida will coordinate all east coast operations as directed by the respective vice presidents in Hollywood, and will assume direct responsibility for publicity and public relations. Brown Meggs, Hollywood-based Director of Public Relations, will report to Mr. Csida."

Columbia Signs Schippers

NEW YORK—Thomas Schippers, the young American conductor, has signed a long-term contract with Columbia Records, according to an announcement by Schuyler Chapin, executive coordinator for Columbia Masterworks A&R.

Schippers, who is on the conducting staff of the Metropolitan Opera, a regular guest conductor of the New York Philharmonic, and artistic director of the Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy, will make his first Columbia recordings in New York this Spring. He will record both symphonic and operatic repertoire for Columbia.

Earlier this season, Schippers, who this spring celebrates the 10th anniversary of his professional debut, appeared with the New York Philharmonic, the Boston Symphony, the Detroit Symphony, the Minneapolis Symphony and the Montreal Philharmonic. Following the conclusion of his Metropolitan Opera season, he journeys to Europe for further concerts and the third Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto. He is scheduled to conduct both at the Metropolitan Opera and La Scala in Milan next season.

Levy also announced that Hibbler's first album set is now being mulled over and is tentatively scheduled for release in April or May.

United Artists also reports three other albums released with the Johnson package, "The Persian Room Presents Diahann Carroll", Georgie Auld's "Manhattan With Strings" and Don Costa's "Shing Along With Ush" are doing exceptionally well. An extensive promotion and advertising campaign is supporting the push on the albums.

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The 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition opens this week in London at the New Royal Horticultural Hall and for the first time coin operated equipment from all over Europe and the United States will be displayed to what is expected to be a record attendance.

Reports as early as several weeks ago advised that exhibit space was completely sold out with every inch of available space being contracted for. The larger exhibitors were requested to limit the number of booths in order that as many exhibitors as possible be accommodated.

This coin machine convention which starts February 2 and runs through February 4, will undoubtedly be the largest A. T. E. show in its history. The first post-war show in 1945 offered no new equipment due to the shortage of materials at that time. About five years ago, a slight relaxing of restrictions permitted the display of new German equipment. In the ensuing years as much new equipment as was possible under the government laws was exhibited. This year, however, the A. T. E. will feature coin operated equipment from all over Europe and the United States for the very first time. Britain's lifting of import restrictions during the Fall of 1959 has opened the doors wide to foreign countries and the result will be the greatest array of coin operated equipment ever displayed under one roof. European and American phonographs, 1960 models, will be displayed with most of the new models introduced for the first time. Most makes of amusement games and a large variety of vending machines will also be on display.

The number of exhibitors, the record attendance expected, and the drama that comes with the introduction of equipment never seen before, all makes for an excitement that will lend to this trade convention the perfect atmosphere for doing business.

The success of the A. T. E. rests with its sponsors, members of the Amusement Caterers Association and the Amusement Trades Association. Through the years this organization has built a sturdy and healthy convention that has attracted the European coin machine industry serving as a clearing house for ideas. The result has been constructive progress. Growing as it has, this year the United States will help to continue this success and progress.

The Cash Box has regularly pointed to the European coin machine market as a most important outlet for the sale of coin machines. With the start of this most important A. T. E. it appears that there is a likelihood of Europe and the U.S. interchanging not only ideas but possibly equipment, in the years to come. Up until now it has been a one-sided affair with Europe the recipient of approximately \$12 million in phonographs, amusement machines and vending equipment annually from the U.S. With the introduction of European manufactured equipment displayed side by side with American equipment to a common market in England the potential looms larger than ever before. As previously mentioned it does not seem remote that the future could hold the export of European equipment to American shores.

In keeping with its policy of reporting the world news to the international coin trade, *The Cash Box* will exhibit at the A. T. E. where copies of this special A. T. E. issue will be distributed to the thousands of expected visitors. From all indications, coin machine interest all over the world, and especially in the United States, is running high. We believe that news coverage such as will be found in this issue and subsequent issues serves the industry in a constructive manner.

We salute the 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition and wish it the very best of success. We believe that England and all of Europe will benefit greatly from this exchange of equipment and ideas. We hope that the United States plays no small part in the future growth of the European coin machine market. Both markets have much to offer each other. It is only a matter of time before the entire industry is truly international in its everyday thinking. This can only lead to even greater potential for all concerned. Trade conventions such as the A. T. E. will help the industry achieve this goal.

AMUSEMENT TRADES EXHIBITION OPENS IN LONDON; RECORD ATTENDANCE EXPECTED

New U.S. Coin Equipment To Be Displayed At A.T.E. For First Time

Music, Games and Vending Equipment From U.S. and Europe Expected To Attract Thousands Of Coinmen

LONDON—The stage has been set for the largest Amusement Trades Exhibition ever to be held in London. The 16th Annual A.T.E. will start Tuesday, February 2, at the New Royal Horticultural Hall and will continue until Thursday, February 4. The lifting of government import restrictions several months ago was seen as the prime reason for an expected record attendance. New coin operated equipment from the United States will be displayed in Europe for the first time. European equipment from all over the continent will also be exhibited during the three-day convention which expects to attract several thousand coinmen.

Last minute decisions prompted many leading coin machine distributors in the United States to schedule

trips to London in order that they attend the convention and also visit with the European market during and after the coin show.

Exhibit space was reportedly sold out several weeks ago and prompted many exhibitors to arrange for special showings at local hotels. Due to the large demand for space, many exhibitors contracted for space on the convention floor to be supplemented with additional space at local hotels and showrooms.

Complete details of the 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition will be published in forthcoming issues of *The Cash Box* through permanent facilities in London, and also from first hand coverage during the show from The Cash Box booth on the convention floor.

Wurlitzer 9-Month Net Highest Since 1954-Dec. Figure Highest In 12 Years

CHICAGO—Net earnings of The Wurlitzer Company for the month of December, 1959 were the highest of any year for the past twelve years, and for the nine months' period ended December 31, 1959, the highest of any year since 1954, advised R. C. Rolwing, president.

Sales for the third quarter (Octob-

er, November, December) were \$11,869,825, up 24% from \$9,561,234 in the same quarter last year. Net earnings were \$364,272 or 41¢ per share. This compares with net earnings of \$239,153 or 28¢ per share for the same quarter last year.

Sales for the first nine months (April to December inclusive) were \$28,602,090, up 24% from \$23,150,873 last year. Net earnings were \$632,618 or 71¢ per share on 886,210 shares, compared with \$255,658 or 30¢ per share on 860,525 shares for the same period last year.

At December 31, 1959 the Company had the largest backlog of orders for Wurlitzer products of any year in the last ten years, according to Rolwing.

"All divisions of the Company are currently operating at record levels and we expect sales and profits for the fourth quarter (January, February, March, 1960) to be good. The Company is continuing to expand its research and engineering program in the field of electronics, and is currently negotiating for government work totaling approximately \$10,000,000," said Rolwing.

At a meeting of the Board of Directors held January 22 a 20¢ dividend was declared payable on March 1 to holders of record February 11.



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
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**Cyril Shack Appears On

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

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
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
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
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A.T.E. Show Spurs Several Coinmen To Last Minute Trips



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England's P. O. A. Starts Fourth Year

LONDON, ENG.—The Phonograph Operators Association came into being in 1956 by which time the industry over here had become sufficiently strong to make desirable the formation of an association to protect the interests of operators throughout the country. Prior to this time the phonograph—or juke box—had been slowly establishing itself in England over a number of years. Before 1935 it had only appeared in a few fun fairs but gradually more firms entered the trade installing equipment in clubs, licensed premises and other places where music could be used as an amenity to trade. The biggest boost to popularity came with the war when Americans came over to open service clubs for their forces where juke boxes were featured. British service clubs like The Nuffield Centre and the N.A.A.F.I. followed suit.

Much of the credit for the formation of the P.O.A. is due to Mr. Cecil Jones, Managing Director of Automatic Musical Instruments (GB) Ltd. who became its first Chairman which position he held until his resignation two years ago. The present Chairman is Mr. Bernard Briggs of Modern Enterprises Ltd. As Honorary Secretary

of the Association Mr. Jones was fortunate in securing the services Mrs. Lilian Shaw—whose experience as a phonograph operator dates back to the early 30s—and who has remained as Honorary Secretary ever since.

In an interview with The Cash Box Mrs. Shaw outlined the Association policy. She said "Our aim has always been to consolidate the industry that operators throughout the country may be given guidance as to the most suitable methods of siting, maintaining and operating their boxes". A vice and assistance is given to members on problems as diverse as insurance, income tax, licensing and the handling of legal battles involving court actions. The high esteem which the Association is held may be gauged from the fact that in nine cases out of ten the result has been in favour of the operator.

The Association, which is open to all, is government by a council consisting mainly of operators. The annual membership fee, which may vary, is five guineas for Operators, ten guineas for Distributors and five guineas for Manufacturers. Membership, like the industry, has grown considerably and now numbers about 70 of this country's operators.

Monthly meetings are held in London to which members travel from all over the country. The next meeting is in March. Area meetings are also held in various parts of the country which are attended by local operators.

Of the future Mrs. Shaw says "Music is something which all of us enjoy and providing care is taken to control the volume and to programme the boxes with tunes which cannot possibly give offense, juke boxes are playing an important part in the relaxation of the masses. The trade is now producing all types of machines—hideaways as well as visual machines—and in the better establishments the hideaways are gaining considerable popularity. There is a tremendous future for the industry and it is the aim of the Association to see that it progresses in a way which will give offense to nobody but which will become part and parcel of the natural way of life."






British Capital Outlay To Rise 16% In 1960

LONDON, ENGLAND—To members of the coin machine industry, particularly when they are this week attending their 16th Annual trade show, Amusement Trades Exhibition, and are planning for the future, a report by the Board of Trade is of the utmost importance.

British industry as a whole is expected to increase its fixed capital expenditure by 16 per cent in 1960, according to figures published by the Board of Trade. They show that private industry and business now plans to spend 14 per cent more than in 1959 on fixed assets for use in manufacturing industry, and about 20 per cent more on assets for other industries and services. It is estimated that the iron and steel and the motor vehicle industries now expect to spend half as much again in 1960 as in 1959.

This information is highly important to the coin machine industry, as with increased spending throughout the nation, the patrons of the industry's equipment will spend its proportionate amount on entertainment. 

Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.

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
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
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
