THE

TEEN BEAT

As a trade paper representing the dynamic record industry, *The Cash Box* is a clearing house for suggestions and methods of improving our business. In most cases ideas are offered that will benefit a small segment of the industry. But last week a wonderful idea that could be of great benefit to all came to us via Australia.

Lee Gordon, a leading entrepreneur in Australia who books some of the most prominent teenage record stars from around the world for appearances *Down Under*, has changed the title of his shows from "Rock And Roll" shows to "Teen Beat" shows. The reason for the move is to get away from the taint long associated with the term rock and roll.

It is extremely difficult, maybe even impossible to ask an entire nation to give up a phrase that has become as popular as bread 'n' butter. But we feel that a concerted effort on the part of the entire industry, especially the many thousands of dee jays, could only serve to benefit the business. And if "Teen Beat" were to become sufficiently popular as the term describing the rhythmic music which appeals so to the teenagers, perhaps the realms of material by reporters digging for something to write

about, and always finding rock and roll a juicy subject merely because of its name, would subside.

In essence, the rock and roll music popular today, is a far cry from the material that was issued some six years ago when the phrase became popular. "Teen Beat" is far more fitting for the majority of "beat" items on the charts today. The raucous sides hitting today are just a small fraction of what was clicking when the new beat craze began.

We also feel that it is extremely unfair to term some of the beautiful songs on the charts today as rock and roll simply because the arranger and artist designed the presentation so that it would be danceable for the majority of the record buying market. Such new smashes as "Theme From A Summer Place", and such great standards as "Where Or When" "Among My Souvenirs" and "Harbor Lights," to name a few, are, in our opinion, needlessly referred to as rock and roll hits merely because of the back beat or triplets which may be in their arrangements.

We are well aware of the difficulty of making such a suggestion a reality. But we feel it can be done and should be done.

"Teen Beat" is much more appropriate for today's music than "Rock And Roll".







House "Payola" Hearings Begin

NEW YORK — The House began payola hearings last week and, for the most part, the investigation centered in detailed accounts of payments to deejays and diskery expenses at the 959 deejay meet in Miami.

Former KYW-Cleveland jock Joe Finan admitted to investigators that he received \$16,100 from 16 labels over a 2-year period, 1958-59. He said, however, that with the exception of one label, the payments he received were for giving the labels advice on the commercial potential of various releases. Finan was dismissed from his \$40,000 a year job at KYW for "violations of company policy" by the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company, owners of the outlet.

The House probers learned that \$117,665 was spent by 18 diskeries for their part in the 1959 deejay meet in Miami. This information was learned as a result of records of the Americana Hotel—site of the meet—subpoenaed by the investigators.

Other highlights of last week's hearings: WBZ-Boston deejay Dave Maynard said he received \$6,000 in cash and gifts from distributors, but not for giving disks airtime. Maynard's testimony was described as "considerably

less than frank" by a member of the House committee, Representative Samuel L. Devine, Republican of Ohio; WBZ-manager Paul G. O'Friel admitted he instructed two WBZ jocks to go to New York to get free albums from distributors for the station library. The investigators valued the 1,000 LP's received at ten and fifteen thousand dollars [the actual figure is probably much less]; Norman Prescott, former WBZ and New York deejay, was the opening witness, but he chose to give testimony behind closed doors. He had that privilege on the ground that his testimony might have tended to defame, degrade or incriminate him or other persons. Committee chairman Oren Harris said that Prescott had been "very cooperative" in his 2-hour testimony; society ork leader Lester Lanin said he collected only \$400 of a \$1,000 bill owed him for performing at a WBZ "Charity Ball," on Sept. 26, 1958 in Brocton, Mass. The bill—to cover the pay to his musicians at union scale—was owed by Don Dumont, a Boston distrib. Representative John E. Moss, Democrat of California, termed the WBZ ball "as clearly a record promotion."

Handy, Jr. (of Handy Brothers Music Co., Inc.), Arthur Israel (Famous Music Corporation) and Leonard Whitecup (Leonard Whitecup, Inc.); and in the standard division: Charles Foley (of Charles Foley) and Harold Flammer, Jr. (of Harold Flammer, Inc.).

The writers nominating committee consisted of: Harry Warren, chairman; Harold Adamson; Eubie Blake; May Singhi Breen; Harold Orlob, and Norman Dello Joio. The publishers nominating committee consisted of: Abe Olman, chairman; Leo Talent, and Donald Gray.

Enrica LP By Don Ellis

NEW YORK—Enrica Records has announced that it has scheduled an LP release by jazz trumpeter Don Ellis this week. Teddy MaRae, president of Enrica and Rae-Cox Records, said that several new artists—names to be disclosed later—have been signed by both companies.

Rendezvous Signs Glenns

HOLLYWOOD—Rod Pierce, president of Rendezvous Records, has signed the Glenns male quartet to a long term contract, and will record them this week. They will record standard ballads at the session, with release to be within the next two weeks.

Marshall & Ziffer Part

NEW YORK—It was announced late last week that the firm of Marshall and Ziffer composed of Paul Marshall and Felix Ziffer had been dissolved. Marshall and Ziffer, attorneys, had represented several record companies and had also been active with the Top Rank International Cooperative.

Paul Marshall was appointed sole attorney and manager for Top Rank International Cooperative. He will direct its activities all over the world and will continue to search out American hits for release through the Cooperative's members.

Felix Ziffer will continue to practice law in the music field.

Dinah "Woman of Year"

HOLLYWOOD—Four hundred and sixty-seven television critics and editors voted Dinah Shore TV's "Woman of the Year" and "Female Vocalist of the Year" in Radio-Television Daily's 18th annual All-American Awards Poll.

It was the fourth consecutive time that the hostess of "The Dinah Shore Chevy Show" had been named "Woman of the Year" and the sixth year that she had taken off with the vocal honors. No one else has won the vocalist award since its inception in 1954.

Miss Shore has received one or more Emmy's from the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences every year since the awards were initiated in 1955. In 1958, the Gallup Poll named her one of the 10 most admired women in the world.

Her first single for Capitol Records (she already cut two LP's) was released last week. Sides are "Things To Do Today" and "When The Sparrows Learn To Fly."

WB Names Indies To Handle Label

NEW YORK—Hal Cooke of Warner Bros. Records last week announced the names of the independent distributors who will handle the label in territories where the line was formerly distributed through company owned branches.

In Boston, Herb Dale, who formerly supervised WB's company owned Boston branch, has set up Dale Enterprises, 790 Commonwealth Ave., a new independent operation.

In New York, the line will be handled by Alpha Distributing headed by Johnny Halonka and Harry Apostoleris.

In Pittsburgh, it's Ben Herman's Standard Distributing Company.

In Chicago, Jack White, formerly manager of the diskery's Chi branch, has formed Summit Distributing, located at 1345 W. Diversey Pkwy.

In Detroit, Barney Ales has set up Allied Music at 7600 Intervale St. Allied is also an equipment distributor.

In San Francisco, the line goes to C & C Distributing.

In Los Angeles, where WB had a company owned branch as well as Sun State Distributing splitting the territory, from now on Al Lotuska's Sun State firm will be handling the line exclusively.

The three new distributors will also be handling other lines and are currently negotiating for the same.

Hal Cooke and Vic Chirumbolo will supervise distribution on the east coast. Bob Summers will cover the Midwest as a regional director. Fran Howell will cover the far west.

The appointment of new distributors for Warner Bros. becomes effective immediately.





POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK




"SOLO ENCORES"—David Carroll and His Orchestra—Mercury SR 60180

The label's music director again offers a highly danceable instrumental album to compete for chart honors. In this session each of the fourteen selections spotlights a different instrument in solo against full ork backing. The selections include "Autumn Nocturne," "Speak Low," "Misty," "Nola" and "Sometimes I'm Happy." Stereo is used to fine advantage. Pretty dance package.




"MARVELOUS MARV JOHNSON"—United Artists UAL 3081

Removed from the confines of pop singles, Johnson goes a long way in proving his capabilities as a performer of legit material, superior pop songs. In this area he contributes convincing renditions of "September in the Rain," "Summertime," "I Can't Get Started" and "Almost Like Being in Love" among others. Five tracks are rock and rollers, and include his hit, "You've Got What it Takes." Should do well in light of the singer's pop attraction.



"THANK HEAVEN FOR MAURICE CHEVALIER"—Maurice Chevalier—RCA Victor LPM-2076

Vintage and delightful Chevalier dates cut between 1930-35. The sides remarkably indicate how little the entertainer's style has changed over the years (a listen to same songs from his recent MGM LP's will prove it). Most of the Chevalier-associated favorites are here: "Mimi," "Louise," "Valentine," and "Hello Beautiful." Should be around for nostalgia seekers.



"VOICES AND BRASS"—The Four Freshmen—Capitol ST 1295

In their tradition of coming up with the unusual for their disk sessions, the Freshmen here pit their voices against a trombone choir, as they've done before with trumpets, saxes and even trombones. This time Pete Rugolo was on hand to offer his inventive arranging talents completing the Kenton-like atmosphere of the deck. The tunes are all standards and feature "Stella By Starlight," "Candy," "I'm Glad There is You" and "Route 66!" For Freshmen fans.



"LOSERS, WEEPERS"—Kay Starr—Capitol ST 1303

A change of scene for Kay Starr finds her in one of her most sentimental disk moods yet. Backed by the rich Van Alexander string orchestrations, she is an exhilarating essayer of these lost love ballads. Included are "I Should Care," "I'm A Fool To Care," "I Miss You So" and "When a Woman Loves a Man." A beautiful new direction for the songstress.




"CHET ATKINS' TEENSVILLE"—RCA Victor LPM 2161

Titled after the guitarist's current click, this album presents Atkins in compelling teen performances of recent pop hits. This is infectious music, with a definite beat, but not lacking in tasteful musicianship. Assisting Atkins is a hot rocking combo and a chorus which sometimes sings, sometimes hums. Selections include "White Silver Sands," "Take A Message to Mary," "Come Softly to Me," and "Till There Was You." Look for big sales here.



"KEEP FIT/BE HAPPY"—Bonnie Prudden—Warner Bros. B 1358

One of the nation's leading physical fitness exponents, Bonnie Prudden reaches millions weekly through her regular spot on the Dave Garroway show. On this disk she attempts to get her message to disk buyers by narrating a complete series of exercises set to appropriate musical backgrounds. Single disk, with double fold cover containing exercise photos, notes and charts leaves nothing to be desired, but a willing patient. Garroway show exposure assures healthy sales in this dept.



"SHOW BOAT" & "PORGY & BESS"—Edmundo Ros and his Orchestra—London LL 31

With almost every ork offering its version Broadway scores, Edmundo Ros does the same but in pulsating Latin tempos, giving it his personal touch and setting the disk apart from usual ventures of this sort. Six selections from each classic show are featured and the dance are varied, more so than any other Latin ork. There are baians, mambos, a guarachi, a val creole, etc. Odd wordless vocals pop up to Very enjoyable date, with infinite interest for the dancers.



"THE OLD SWEET SONGS"—Frank DeVol and his Rainbow Strings—Columbia CL 1413

Thirty songs in this "sweet" category, spread over twelve tracks, are given their nostalgic due by DeVol. The accent is on strings, and the sound soor or shimmer accordingly, to the appropriateness of the songs' settings. Such evergreens as "Let the Rest of the World Go By," "I Love You Truly," "Annie Laurie," "When You Were a Tulip" and many more in this vein provide light mood music. An irresistible "swing" down memory lane.



"ALONE WITH YOU"—Connie Russell—United Artists UAL 3063

Miss Russell falls right into the romantic mood with sultry readings of a dozen sentimental ballads. Lightly swinging, muted jazz-like comb backing is the right accompaniment for her sensuous delivery. The selections include "Close Your Eyes," "All I Do is Dream of You," "The Old Feeling" and "You'd Be So Nice to Come Home To." Good pop mood-setter.




"THE MILLION/AIRS"—Coral CRL 57310

Coral has come up with a collection of million sellers in its catalog that almost dwarfs the recent hit-collection albums being issued by many labels today. Each tune was a huge smash and the record speaks for itself: "Til I Waltz Again With You" & "Ricochet" by Teresa Brewer; "Sincerely" & "Sugartime" by the McGuire Sisters; "Sentimental Me" & "Rag Mop" by the Ames Bros.; Jackie Wilson's "Lonely Teardrops"; Buddy Holly's "Peggy Sue." Crossing various areas of taste, the album can achieve big sales.



"SUDDENLY IT'S SWING"—Si Zentner and his Orchestra—Liberty D-LST-7139

This is a band that swings with a fire and vigor reminiscent of the old swing era crews. Even on the ballads there is a noticeable marked restraint from breaking loose all over the place. The arrangements are crisp and tightly knit, and although there is very little solo space (for lack of good soloists), the well-paced ensemble playing keeps things moving briskly. Selections on the band's third Liberty album include "Dream of You," "I'm Glad There is You," "I've Found a New Baby" and several good Zentner originals.



"FROM ST. LOUIS TO SEVILLE"—Carlos Montoya—RCA Victor LSP 1986

Against a standard jazz rhythm section, Montoya unleashes his furious flamenco guitar upon a bill combined of American pop tunes and various Latin melodies. It is a meeting between two very different kinds of music and the bridge is successfully crossed owing to the artistry of the participants. The jazzmen remain unidentified. Not the first such venture into American music for Montoya, this album should find many new fans for the fiery brand of music of which he is one of the world's finest exponents.



"THE WORLD FAMOUS LECUONA CUBAN BOYS PLAY FOR DANCING"—ABC Paramount ABC-316

Although the group's biggest attraction of showmanship at personal appearances is lost on disk, the pulsating Latin music they expound is still a big enough draw for the cha cha cha addicts. The repertoire crosses many music divisions related by the common denominator of danceability. Selections here include "Just One of Those Things," "Granada," "Mambo Sevillano" and "Shein Vi De Levone." Vocals are an added treat on several tracks.

Album Reviews

"ITALY TODAY"—The Roman Strings—Musidisc MS 16005

Ten popular Italian songs are given the full lush string treatment with the additional Old World charm of such instruments as a mandolin, etc., in solo melody roles. The beat varies but stays mainly in the Latin category. Among the selections are "Volare," "Piove," "Anema E Cuore" and "Non Dimenticar." Excellent stereo sound is a factor. Fine mood album.



"TONY RANDALL"—Imperial LP 9090

This album is a composite picture of Tony Randall as a serious singer, comic singer, and comedian. There are 17 tracks in this album, which is enough to depict Randall sufficiently in each role. He comes across best as a comic singer, offering his own lucid interpretations of "Laugh, Clown, Laugh," "Nature Boy," "Little Sir Echo," "My Little Grass Shack in Kealahakua, Hawaii," "Baby, It's Cold Outside" (with Joyce Jameson), "Kiss Me Again" and "Fanny." Other tracks include commercials and monologues. But the best are the songs.



JAZZ

"PETE FOUNTAIN AT THE BATEAU LOUNGE"—Coral CRL 57314

This is exciting traditional jazz, played with heart and the excellent technique that isn't often present in many Dixieland exponents. Fountain has previously shown he is an original jazz musician and this in-person performance finds him with the added spark of audience encouragement that is so necessary to heighten what is usually tired men playing tired melodies. The tunes are all standards and include "Deep River," "After You've Gone" and "Little Rock Getaway." A prime package for this market.



"PERSONAL APPEARANCE"—The Sonny Stitt Quartet—Verve MG V-8324

Stitt plays with an intense directness. He has passion and warmth which immediately communicate and convince that he has something important to say. This is hard blowing of a highly unbeatable nature. Of his sidemen, pianist Bobby Timmons is of the same fabric as Stitt; both are steeped in blues and jazz traditions. The selections are mostly standards and include "Autumn in New York," "You'd Be So Nice To Come Home To," "East of the Sun" and "Avalon." Stitt deserves a wider audience than he has at present.




"STAR BRIGHT"—Dizzy Reece—Blue Note 4023

First heard in London and Paris by touring American jazzmen, Kingston, Jamaica born Reece recently came to the U.S. and one of the first things he did was to cut this session. Working with Hank Mobley, Wynton Kelly, Paul Chambers, and Art Taylor, he shows a well controlled technique and is not at a loss for original improvisation ideas as might be expected from European jazzmen. His trumpet tone is full, somewhat like Donald Byrd's. He is growing, and could develop into an important artist. Definitely a "Star Bright" on the jazz horizon.



"LAST OF THE GREAT BLUES SINGERS"—Lightning Hopkins—Time T/70004

Hopkins might not be the "Last" but he is indeed of the very few remaining blues artists retaining the tradition of the greats. These performances are from 1950 and 1951 and are examples of the poetic beauty Hopkins is capable of producing in his stirring laments. He accompanies himself on guitar. Tunes include "Hello Central," "New Short Haired Woman," "Freight Train" and "Dirty House Blues." This is pure blues, undiluted by the commercial r&b influences found in most blues singers today. Of important jazz interest.



"DIXIELAND DINNER DANCE"—Red Nichols and the Five Pennies—Capitol ST 1297


Unlike the music he played in the Twenties and Thirties, Nichols now sticks to the commercial end of things, playing watered-down musically unimportant dixieland that is well-suited for the average pop music fan. There is nothing adventurous or exciting for today's jazz lover here. The tunes include "Johnson Rag," "My Funny Valentine," "September Song," "What's New" and "American Patrol." The Nichols name should interest the public and the music is OK for dancing.

CLASSICAL PICK OF THE WEEK



OFFENBACH: "Gaité Parisienne"; BIZET: "Carmen" (Highlights)—Andre Kostelanetz and his Orchestra—Columbia ML 5429

The music from these two works are among the most popular classical works outside of classical circles, and with Kostelanetz' appropriate light reading they take on even more attractiveness for the essentially popular music fan. The "Gaité" is the familiar Manuel Rosenthal arrangement for the Ballet Russe. The highlights from the Bizet opera are those more familiar ones. Excellent addition to the huge Kostelanetz shelf.



BEETHOVEN: Symphony No. 3 in E Flat Major "Eroica"—Georg Solti conducting the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra—London CS 6145

The "Eroica," the second most-recorded Beethoven Symphony, is an experience of exciting listening; sensuous, powerful, with an almost-foreboding outlook. One of the finest works of art in the symphony catalog, each conductor of note has tried his hand at bringing its inherent feelings to the fore and Solti has succeeded quite well. His approach is subtle and well-controlled. Should fare well in stiff competition.



RIMSKY-KORSAKOV: "Scheherazade" — Sir Eugene Goossens conducting the London Symphony Orchestra—Everest LPBR 6026

Having been recorded by every major conductor, Goossens adds his name to the long list under "Scheherazade." His direction is broad and sweeping, making full use of the work's brilliant orchestral colors. A bold and dynamic interpretation serves the piece well. Fine new addition to the shelf.



PROKOFIEV: Symphony No. 5 in B Flat Major — Sir Malcolm Sargent conducting the London Symphony Orchestra—Everest SDBR-3034

A powerful and deeply moving composition, the Fifth Symphony is Prokofiev's best work in this medium. In it, despite the lack of program notes, can be detected smatterings of the temper of the times it was written (1944). Witness the overbearing and turbulent coda. Sargent is his usual composed self with the baton, working it out with striking vividness. One of the best of the available versions.



A PIANO INVITATION TO THE DANCE"—Ann Schein—Kapp KCL-9042

Miss Schein, who amazed critics with her brilliant technique on her previous Kapp albums, takes to a lighter vein on her latest session. The dance rhythms and melodies she plays here are no less demanding of her facility and even more so of her timing, pacing and rhythmic sense. She plays pieces by Chopin, Bartok, Bizet and Rachmaninoff, among others. The young girl continues her climb to the top.

During the summer of 1958, he and his wife, Eydie Gorme headlined their own hour-long show on NBC and in the fall of 1959, they starred in a spectacular, "The Golden Circle" over ABC.

NEW YORK—Leonard Salidor, director of publicity and promotion for Decca, Coral and Brunswick Records, has been concentrating on an ambitious travel campaign to make the acquaintance of deejays across the country. Visits have already been made on a weekly basis to several major cities in the Eastern area, with extensive plans to fully cover the East and Midwest before heading to the West Coast. Salidor assumed his present post in June of 1959, coming from Decca's Los Angeles headquarters. Thru his current travel plans, he hopes to become better acquainted with programming procedures and various local trends and their effect on the national pop music field.

King & Queen Of Hearts



NEW YORK—Bobby Darin and Connie Francis were chosen as King and Queen of Hearts for the 1960 Heart Fund. Announcement was made of their selection by Dick Cook of KSFO-San Francisco and Alan Dary of WBZ-Boston, co-chairmen of the American Heart Association's National Disk Jockey Committee, which conducted a poll of more than 4,000 deejays to determine the "foremost male and female pop vocalists." The Committee is spearheading a special effort to "Turn the Tables on Heart Disease" through a concerted appeal for all-out support of the current Heart Fund Campaign, which continues through Feb. 29.

This is the second successive year as Queen of Hearts for Miss Francis and first-time honor for Darin. They will be making Heart Fund appeals throughout the month, winding up the campaign with an appearance on the Ed Sullivan show, Feb. 28, when more than two million volunteers will conduct a coast-to-coast residential collection for the fund.

Esquire Records have just put out on their Starlight label a single of "Screamin' Boogie" backed with "The Fish" by Rhythm and Blues pianist, Sonny Thompson. Esquire chief, Carlo Kraemer states that there is a growing demand for this kind of material in Britain. He anticipates considerable response from the immigrants throughout the country and thinks that it is a 'natural' for juke boxes. Also on Starlite is Dr. A. A. Childs' "Healing Prayer", a two-sided gospel-rocker. Kraemer expects to follow these with further R & B singles, and has several titles under consideration.



JERRY LORDAN

Paddy Crookshank, Director of Robbins Music Corporation, last week attended the 10th San Remo Song Festival and reports as follows: "The contest developed into a battle between Domenico Modugno and Renato Rascel. Renato Rascel, long time favourite with Italian film the theatre audiences, entered his ballad "Romantica" against the noisy dramatic song "Libero" of Modugno's. In some ways this Festival was a contest between the rock singers and the old time crooners so typical of Italian light music in the past. Stand out performances by Nilla Pizzi singing "Colpevole" (Guilty), Julia de Palma singing "Romantica", were a feature of the contest.

"Notte Mia" (My Night) and Tony Dallara singing "Romantica", were a feature of the contest.

"Tony Dallara, who made "Come Prima" in Italy, looks like he will be one of the most important singers in the coming year. By previous years the general standard of songs was low and much of the material was completely unsuitable for the American market. Attendance this year by representatives from all countries was larger than ever although prices were higher. Apart from the publishers, many continental artists, heads of record companies and A & R men attended.

"British publishers were represented by Roy Berry of Campbell Connelly and Jimmy Philips of Keith Prowse. The winning song was "Romantica" sung and written by Renato Rascel, well known in Italy as a film comedian and also as the composer of "Arriverderci Roma".

"Domenico Modugno leaves for the United States on February 14th for appearances on "The Dinah Shore Television Show".

As previously announced in *The Cash Box* the first heats of The Eurovision Song Contest took place this week. Winners of the first heat were Lita Roza with "Unexpectedly", David Hughes with "Mi Amor" and Malcolm Vaughan with "Each Tomorrow". Winners of the second heat were Dennis Lotis with "Love Me A Little" and "Girl With A Curl" sung by Ronnie Carroll tying for first place, second came "Looking High High High" by Bryan Johnson and in third place "When The Tide Turns" sung by Teddy Johnson and Pearl Carr. All these winners will compete in the British Finals to be televised this Saturday. The *Cash Box* representative will be present to report the winners selected to represent Great Britain in the Final on March 29th.

Jerry Lordan, singer-composer of "A House, A Car And A Wedding Ring" and the Anthony Newley hit "I've Waited So Long" has just written and recorded a new number "Who Could Be Blue" on the Parlophone label. The disk has a strong accompaniment by Johnny Spence, Bert Corri, General Manager of Francis Day & Hunter who publish the song, tells me that his company have signed Jerry Lordan to a long term contract entitling them to a first refusal on all his compositions. Corri has also received a letter from George Pincus in America to say that Larry Hall (currently in the charts with "Sandy") has recorded Jerry's "I'll Stay Single" shortly to be released in the States. As reported in *The Cash Box* last year Corri considers Lordan to be this country's biggest find composer-wise for many years.

Bill Ward of Lawrence Wright Music Publishing Company is the happy publisher of the Earl Shuman-Mort Garson number "Starry Eyed" by British artist Michael Holliday on Columbia currently high in the British record and sheet music charts. Other Lawrence Wright songs are "Way Down Yonder In New Orleans" by Freddie Cannon on Top Rank and the still popular Connie Francis "Among My Souvenirs" on M.G.M. Surprise entry into the charts is "Summer Set" by Acker Bilk on Columbia. This jazz type instrumental in the vein of "Petite Fleur" is published by Essex Music. Cromwell Music, a subsidiary of Essex have two new instrumentals "Shanks Pony" and "Blondie" by Ken Morris on H. M. V.

Francis Day & Hunter will also publish the music of the new Julian Slade-Dorothy Reynolds musical "Follow That Girl" which succeeds their record-breaking music "Salad Days" at London's Vaudeville Theatre early in March.

Norman Newell, A & R Manager for E. M. I. told *The Cash Box* that he will make an L. P. of the show with the original cast and the release date is planned to coincide with the opening night.

The American musical success "The Most Happy Fella" is to open at London's Coliseum Theatre on April 21st. Music and lyrics by Frank Loesser who was also responsible for "Guys And Dolls" and the British hit "Where's Charlie".

Joe Henderson, composer-pianist and Pye recording star flew to the States on February 11th for a four-week trip. He will visit Bob Thiele, President of Hanover-Signature Records.

Tony Brent, Columbia recording star, leaves shortly for a 15,000-mile five-week tour of Bahrein, India and Ceylon. Tony is scheduled to give a minimum of thirty-six concerts.

The latest recording star to be signed up by A.T.V. is Alma Cogan (HMV) who this week was contracted for one year calling for fifteen appearances, the first of which will be this week-end in "Saturday Spectacular". Also in the bill will be American singing star, John Raitt.

Decca's latest recording find twenty-year-old Alex Murray has just waxed his first disk for the label "Teen Angel" (the Mark Dinning version currently topping "The Cash Box 100 Charts", which is released here on M. G. M.)

From R. C. A. comes the Hugo & Luigi recording of "Just Come Home" still showing in "The Cash Box Top 100"

Resulting in a visit to California last year by Pye recording star Petula Clark and A & R men Alan Freeman and Michael Barclay, the company has just released a new L.P. entitled "Petula Clark In Hollywood". Backing is supplied by three different orchestras--Billy May, Don Ralke and Pete King. Two of the tracks "I Love A Viole" and "Mama's Talking Soft" are also released as singles.



AUSTRALIA

Following the overwhelming box office success with his just completed touring show—consisting of Crash Craddock, Duane Eddy, Santo & Johnny, Johnny Restivo, Floyd Robinson and Johnny O'Keefe, it seems certain that Lee Gordon will continue to bring acts to this country for teenage attraction only. Craddock and company broke every attendance record for a one-week show for Gordon. In two days in Sydney the show pulled 55,000 customers to The Stadium which has a capacity of 11,000. Alan Heffernan, from the Lee Gordon office, tells me that the reaction in each state to this show was nothing short of fantastic. On their last night in Melbourne at least 5,000 people were turned away.

All this excitement seems to prove beyond doubt that this "teenbeat" style of packaged show will be the strong feature of Lee Gordon's importations for 1960. Alan Heffernan feels that "teenbeat" is a more suitable term for this type of entertainment than "rock 'n roll". It is possible that "teenbeat" will come into general use in future Lee Gordon promotions of teenage-aimed shows. While the present demand for teenage shows continues so strongly Lee Gordon is not interested in bringing adult attractions to Australia; it is noticeable, however, that more adults are attended these teenage-style bashes. Lee Gordon's next big show, which is being planned for early in March, will bring Rod Lauren, Johnny & The Hurricanes, Freddy Cannon and other hit record names. This group will walk into a tremendous ready-made market setup by Craddock, Robinson, Restivo, Santo & Johnny, Eddy and O'Keefe.

Internal staff changes in the huge E.M.I. outfit here have resulted in Joe Loufer being appointed manager of Castle Music Pty. Ltd., the E.M.I. publishing company. Kevin Ritchie has filled the position of Record Promotion Manager formerly held by Joe. Kevin was formerly in the record sales division.

Had an interesting note from Chris Vaughan-Smith, chief of Southern Music in Australia, to the effect that an overseas tune with little history entitled "Where My Baby Goes" has been developed by Southern into an up-coming hit under a record released on Festival by local star Warren Williams. This one is tipped for great success on the local market and could well be released overseas.

Another hot one being handled by Southern in Australia is "Mr. Rainbow Man", the big New Zealand hit by Vince Callaher. This one enjoyed tremendous success in New Zealand and should do well here where the original disk has been released on the Leedon label.

Before Alan Dean left Australia at the conclusion of his television season he cut some sides in Sydney for E.M.I. to be released on its H.M.V. label. Two being issued now are "The Big Hurt" c/w "Autumn Affair". Castle Music published "The Big Hurt". It seems most unlikely that the popular Toni Fisher original single of "The Big Hurt" will ever be issued here. Alan Dean was backed by The Manhattan Quartet and The Graduates on "The Big Hurt" which was produced for E.M.I. by Joe Loufer.

Coronet Records has just issued two of its hottest singles, from the American Columbia label, namely "Tracey's Theme" by Spencer Ross and "Theme From A Summer Place" by Percy Faith. Both of these should enjoy a good run of popularity. Other main singles going into production include "Tender Love And Care" by Jimmy Rodgers on Roulette, Lloyd Price's latest "Lady Luck" on the W & G label and "The Village of St. Bernadette" on London by Andy Williams.

Other singles slated for rush release are "My Little Marine" by Jamie Horton from the Joy label, "Memories" by The Playboys from ABC-Paramount together with Johnny Nash's single "And The Angels Sing" and "There'll Be Some Changes Made" by Steve Lawrence, all of these being issued in Australia under the W & G label.

SCANDINAVIA

The recording ban was lifted beginning February for a period of three months, during which time record companies in the Northern countries, the NCB-area, could continue making new records. The future situation, however, will depend on the agreements in the rest of Europe between the record companies and BIEM in Paris. If no agreement was reached by May 1st, there would be a new halt in the NCB-covered countries (Sweden, Denmark, Norway, Finland and Iceland). The preliminary solution didn't last very long, however. Already after five days, members of the Swedish Musicians Unions declared a strike against cooperating with any company belonging to GLF (Record Manufacturer's Association), as the negotiations for raised payment failed. The new strike started February 6. The new situation however is reported causing less troubles for the involved companies than the former trouble with NCB. Most of the GLF-affiliated companies have branch-offices in the other Scandinavian countries, and the musicians in, for instance Norway or Denmark, are not striking.

This year, Norway joins the Eurovision Song Festival, which is to be held in London in the end of March. In a semi-final held by Norwegian radio on Feb. 4, a jury of ten persons chose six melodies which will be presented in the final competition to be televised in Norway on Feb. 20th.

Siw Malmkvist has been chosen by Swedish Radio and TV executives to sing the Swedish melody, "Alla andra far varann" (Everybody Else Gets Each Other), a slow foxtrot by Ake Gerhard and Eric Källqvist, in the Eurovision festival in London on March 29th. The final choice of the Swedish melody for this Song Festival was made Feb. 2nd, and resulted in a scandal that has been in the headlines during the last few days. (More about this Swedish song festival in a separate article.)



GERD PERSSON

Gerd Persson, RCA recording artist, at the Berns' variety scene during February, did very well at the opening on Feb. 2nd. She is billed along with the international artists The Charlivels, and the Spanish dancer Carmen de Santa Cruz. Miss Persson seems to be one of Sweden's most "international" artists of today, with several international successes behind her. Last year she participated in one of the Italian song festivals and won. She has also been singing jazz and pop tunes in URSS as member of a Swedish artist troupe which toured Russia in exchange for some Soviet artists who toured Sweden.

Warner Bros. Records will be distributed in Sweden by Telefunken Sales Organization, according to a bulletin issued by Sixten Erikssohn, president of Telefunken in Sweden and James B. Conkling of Warner Bros. Records in Hollywood. Sixten Erikssohn is also president of Gramofon AB Electra, representing RCA in Sweden. The bulletin was issued during the recent visit of Robert B. Weiss, European Manager of WB, in Stockholm. A special sales-drive for stereo records will start in Sweden in middle of February, and since WB has all its records issued in both stereo and mono versions, Telefunken wanted to have the new label ready for this sales promotion drive.

The Scandinavian tour of Chris Barber's Ork. is now settled. The Storyville arrangement includes concerts in Copenhagen and Stockholm, the latter city to be visited on Feb. 25th.

Well known New Orleans musician George Lewis (clarinet) returns to Sweden and Denmark in April for a tour with Danish Papa Bue's Viking Jazzband. There will be a concert in Stockholm on April 3rd in connection with the annual meeting of the Swedish Jazz Clubs.

Sonet (Scandinavian Record Co.) has signed a contract with Dan Häggkvist, president of Gazell Records about handling the distribution of the Gazell records. The latter label has American-Swedish trumpet-player Ernie Englund and Italian singer Gianni Boncompagni under contract, among others.

Crash A Smash

According to reports from Coronet, which releases Columbia Records down under, Craddock's tour proved to be one of the most sensational for a visiting artist. His recording of "Boom, Boom Baby" is currently number 1 in Australia and "I Want That," his latest release, has just moved into the charts.



BENELUX

The well known Dutch Swing College Band (Philips) with leader-clarinetist Peter Schilperoord, is making a world trip, which began in Germany last January. In Europe the record sale of the Dutch Swing College Band is big with the buyer of traditional jazz. All over the world the records of this popular Dixieland orchestra are considered ambassadors for Dutch jazz. The band will visit, among other countries, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, France and there are plans that the orchestra will go to Australia as well as South America.

For years the big Dutch record companies have been publishing monthly their own music magazines with the latest repertoire (popular and classical music), interesting interviews with its artists, attractive photos, reviews of famous critics, etc. L. C. Phonogram, Amsterdam, publishes "Disco Discussions", under the guidance of the eminent Rolf ten Kate, one of Holland's best journalists and publicity manager of L. C. Phonogram. The music magazine, "Gramophone House", a publication of L. C. Bovema, Heemstede is edited by publicity manager, Huub H. Jacobse and one that appears every few months is "Artone Hitparader", published by Johnny J. Vis (A & R manager) of Artone Gramophone, Haarlem. The edition of L. C. Phonogram is the oldest and most popular one in Holland.

Delahay Record Company, The Hague, has just released a record by Dolf Brouwer. The disk is titled, "Cell 2455". The awful history of Caryl Chessman is told on this record, and his lot in the San Quentin prison (California), etc. Mr. Kellerman, one of the two directors of Delahay, thinks that the Dutch people like such records and he expects a good sale of this single.

Delahay Record Company discovered the forty year old singer Bart Deligne, formerly a well known name in the Dutch sport world. His first record is a grandiose one, "Mijn Hart In Portugal" ("My Heart In Portugal"). The record company will coach this very fine singer and critics in Benelux think that we'll hear more from him.

Theo. Uden Masman, disk jockey and for more than 34 years founder and leader of the famous Dutch orchestra, The Ramblers, has his own radio program of American top hits for the VARA Broadcasting Corp. every fortnight. For the last few weeks Masman has been using The Cash Box Top 100 for his "Hits Aan De Spits", the latest American top ten.

"Telephone Baby", by Johnny Otis on the Capitol label, (Managed by L. C. Bovema, Heemstede), has been popular for about a month here. Six months ago, the record was released here and the sale of it was very poor. Now the recording is one of Capitol's best selling singles for February.

Edith Piaf very ill at present. Her newly released record "Melord" on Columbia is a best seller, and nearly 100 EP's a day are purchased.

"Send Me The Pillow", by Lydia still going up in popularity. Because Lydia sings in a C & W style, American records of such C & W artists as Hank Snow, Hank Thompson and Sonny James are selling very well.

Belgium published its 8 best selling LP albums for last year. They are: 1—"Troebadour Van Het Heilig Hart", Decca; 2—"10 Jaar Bobbejaan" Decca, Bobbejaan Schoepen; 3—"Come Prima", RCA, Mario Lanza; 4—"What A Night. . . With the Chakachas", RCA; 5—"Hier Ist Oberbayern", RCA, Toni Witt; 6—"Porgy And Bess", Philips, The Soundtrack Recording; 7—"De Champetter", Philips; 8—"10 Jaar Ray Franky", Decca.

Leo Boudewijns, Philips Label manager, has just returned from important discussions with the Paris-Philips organization.

Mr. Klaassen, sales manager of L. C. Phonogram, will speak to the German Decca organization about the new coming repertoires on February 3. After Klaassen visits Hamburg, he will immediately fly to London to discuss Decca releases.

Some days ago Philips released a new LP album by Frank Sinatra, "Sensational Sinatra".

In our last bulletin we mentioned the first record of "The Village Of St. Bernadette" by Rie Helmig, in Dutch, as well as from singer Andy Williams, who made a topper of this song. Now the English version has appeared on the Philips label, sung by Anne Shelton.

C. Solleveld, Director of L. C. Phonogram, and Nico Boer, program manager, have just returned from the Song Festival in San Remo, Italy. On Sunday, January 31st the AVRO, one of the five Dutch Broadcasting Corporations, announced the result of this Italian competition with a special program, in which our famous Dutch singer Willy Alberti sang the prize song, "Romantica". Philips released this song with another ace of the San Remo Song Festival, also sung by Alberti. The songs of Willy Alberti, which he sang before December 31, 1959 have been put on the market as an LP.

Artone Gramophone has also organized an audition to discover talented teenagers, just as L. C. Phonogram, L. C. Bovema and Delahay Record Company did some weeks ago. Everyone who thinks that he or she has a good chance can enter. The interest seems to be a very big one.

On February 27, Norman Granz' Jazz At The Philharmonic will visit Brussels in the Palais Des Beaux Arts at 8 o'clock, and Amsterdam in The Concertgebouw at 12 o'clock in the evening. The concerts will be given by Ella Fitzgerald, Roy Eldridge, Shelly Manne and His Men, The Jimmy Giuffre Trio, Paul Smith Quartet.

A few weeks ago we wrote that Nat "King" Cole will probably visit our countries. Now we know for sure that Cole will not come, as his wages are too high, namely 40,000 a day, (\$10,600). In Benelux such ages are never paid to an artist.

Delahay Record Company has signed a contract with Alberto Sanvitale, for three years. In the world of light music there are few important figures whose interests and achievements extend far beyond that of their own field. Such a man is Santivale, because he is a painter, composer, singer, etc. Harry Jansen told The Cash Box, "This man is one of the seven wonders of the world this century. I see nationwide hits in his songs. The always active director, Harry Jansen, has released the compositions of Alberto Sanvitale by soloists, chorus and orchestra, and arrangements by Pierre Biersma. The numbers will appear on records and are called, "Bambina d'Amsterdam", "Chiano Chiano", "Frullarella", "Tu Soltanto Tu", "Cara Bambina Amor", "Io Grido T'ano", "Uffa Uffa Fa", and "Luntanu".



ITALY

MILAN—The tragic death of Fred Buscaglione in a car accident on February 4th in Rome, was the big news in Italy this week. Fred was as famous as Modugno, but was not yet well known abroad. He had created a manner of singing and a manner of presenting the tunes which all Italians liked. Fred had already starred in some pictures and was in Rome to take part in a new one. He often appeared on Italian television screens. After many years, in 1959 he finally became very popular. He recorded on the Cetra label (Tourin) and the titles of his hit songs are, "Eri Piccola Così", "Che Bambola", "Che Notte", "Quarda Che Luna", "Whiskey Facile". He was also one of the top singers played on the juke boxes. Last summer his "Pity Pity" (by P. Anka) was one of the most played songs. We can measure how popular he was in Italy as all dailies dedicated half of their front pages to Buscaglione. He was sincerely beloved by all of the Italian public.

The 1960 San Remo Festival was not a quiet, artistic competition between two well known composers, Modugno and Rascel, but rather a match, not only musical, of a great tussle between the two leading Italian publishing firms, Curci and Titanus. At San Remo there was on one side Titanus (publisher of "Romantica" by Rascel), and RCA Italiana (pressing on record Rascel's "Romantica" sung by Rascel himself). On the other side, Curci (publisher of the tune "Libero" by Modugno) and Fonit (pressing on record Modugno's "Libero" sung by Modugno himself). Probably the best earnings will be had by Mr. Gurtler who has singer Tony Dallara in his cast of artists. At San Remo the first winning tune "Romantica" was sung by Rascel (RCA Italiana) and by Tony Dallara (Music). The tune has a romantic and sentimental flavor and while Rascel sang it that way, Dallara gave us a modern interpretation, crying it a little.

Monday, February 1st, I visited some big record shops of Milan's centre and I learned that the song "Romantica" sung by Dallara is a best seller, while that sung by Rascel is not. As to "Libero" the second winner, this tune was presented at San Remo by Modugno and by Teddy Reno. The disk by Modugno is a best seller, while that by Reno is not. The third winning song, "Quando Viene La Sera" penned by Carlo Alberto Rossi, was sung at San Remo by Joe Sentieri (Juke Box) and by Wilma De Angelis. The best selling disk is that of Joe Sentieri. These three tunes, as you can read on the Italian chart, are already toppers a few days after the Festival. This means that the San Remo Festival is a tremendous release for the winning songs and explains the efforts to win. Many millions of Lira are involved in this Festival, so many Italian dailies and weeklies report. The comment on a picture, showing Rascel and Dallara embracing, says, "An Embrace of Millions". Mr. Gurtler is happy foreseeing a boom sale of "Romantica" by Dallara.

I also visited the record firm, Juke Box, for which company Joe Sentieri records. Manager Maestro Carlo Alberto Rossi, author of "Quando Viene La Sera", is very busy these days. Joe Sentieri was applauded at San Remo for his verve and his cheerful way of singing.

GERMANY

The German song by Little Gabriele and Louis Armstrong titled "Uncle Satchmo's Lullabye" was recently released in America. The song "Morgen" was originally a hit in America and then became a hit in Germany, and maybe the opposite will happen with "Uncle Satchmo's Lullabye". It has had much success in Germany and now maybe it will be a big hit in the U.S.

In 1959, nearly 20,000 records by ski star Toni Sailer were sold in Japan. Peter Kraus will sing his three very successful songs, "Sugar Baby", "Wunderbar wie du" and "Tiger" on a TV show in Brussels on February 14th. He was also engaged for a program on television in Denmark on February 20.

The Honey Twins, recently successful with their newest title, "Nur nicht Jmschau'n" are now on tour throughout Austria with young star Ted Herold, said to be the best imitator of Elvis Presley.

Bill Ramsey, young American who lives in Frankfurt now, a hit on his last tour throughout West Germany. His humorous song, "Souvenirs" on Polydor has been on all best seller lists for weeks.

Vico Torriani, singer from Switzerland, now sings one on Decca that has big chance for success. It is titled, "Donna Maria". Vico has a two-week engagement in Hamburg and will go on tour in the beginning of May which will include Moscow and Peking.

Rocco Granata, composer and original interpreter of "Marina", will appear on German television for the first time on February 27th.

The record by Louis Armstrong and Danny Kaye from the film "The Five Pennies" has a real chance to become a big hit in Germany.

Record stars from three European countries will sing in Munich on February 13th. From Greece comes Jimmy Makulis; Tony Sandler is out of Flaners; Vera Magnani and Carla Codevilla together with the orchestra of Bruno Martelli, called Musikbox-er, out of Italy. They all now live in Germany and record for Ariola.

The Spanish combo, Los Espanoles, after a long stay in Amsterdam and Oslo, are now coming back to Germany. In April they have an engagement in Hamburg. Also Ines Taddio, blonde Italian singer is back from Greece where she had great success with "Capitano d'amore" on Polydor.

Attention is being centered on the newest song of young film and record star Heidi Bruhl titled, "Mr. Love" on Philips. This song looks like it can make the German best seller lists.

Band leader Kurt Henkels, who came from the East a year ago to West Germany is very successful here and will go on tour throughout West Germany.

In the middle of February, Freddy Quinn will start a new film in Berlin titled, "Freddy's Melodie der Nacht".

All four titles by Ivo Robic, "Morgen", "Aay, Aay, Aay Paloma", "Muli-song" and "Rhondaly" now on an EP on Polydor. Since Ivo's success with his newest song, "The Happy Muleteer", American TV is again asking for him.

Horst Jankowski, Germany's leading jazz pianist and winner of the "Jazzodium Poll" in 1958, is now on Electrola. Titles are "So wie ich eben bin" and "Bye, Bye Baby, Goodbye". Horst is a pianist, composer and arranger, too, and he is often engaged in films, radio and television.

Eddie Constantine's newest film, "Bomben auf Monte Carlo" (it will appear in Germany on March 15th) brings two original songs which will be released on Ariola. They are German evergreens titled, "Eine Nacht in Monte Carlo" and "Das ist die Liebe der Matrosen".

More than one million "Marina" with Rocco Granata on the original and Will Brandes on the German version have been sold.

Sweden Picks Festival Bid After Contest Scandal

STOCKHOLM—The 1960 Eurovision Song Festival to be televised from London March 29 has resulted in a big scandal here as far as the Swedish contribution to the festival is concerned.

Last Autumn, the Swedish Broadcasting and Television Co. (SBC-TV) announced a song competition, with the winning tune going to the festival. One of the stipulations of the contest—open to both professional and amateur writers—was that each contribution be signed with a pseudonym and the actual writers be included in an enclosed envelope. Idea was that the names of the writers not be known until the envelopes were opened after the finals.

More than 1000 songs were received, and SBC-TV ran a weekly elimination contest. By last Dec. 28, four songs were left for the finals, scheduled for airing Feb. 2, but pre-recorded before Christmas.

The deadlock between the International Federation of the Phonograph Industry (IFPI) and BIEM over royalties came into play. Fearing that the deadlock would mean their songs would not be recorded after the IFPI-BIEM contract was up for renewal Dec. 31, the writers sent their final songs to diskeries for recording before the deadline. Result was that the evening papers on Feb. 2 carried an ad from Decca Records which said: "buy the Decca recordings of the songs played on radio and TV tonight." The records had already been released and the writers' names were on the label. Thus, by the time the secret envelopes were opened, the writers' names had already been known hours before. Next day, the embarrassing situation was played up big in the newspapers.

SBC-TV held a meeting and then announced that the winning song, "Everybody Else Gets Each Other" by Ake Gerhard, would remain as the Swedish entry in the festival.

Busy Tour Abroad For Joni James; 5 LP's Result

NEW YORK—Joni James is on the last leg of her eight week European junket during which the singer had a heavy schedule of personal appearances, recording sessions and promotion work.

The MGM recording star and her conductor-husband Tony Acquaviva, have made stops in London, Paris, Berlin, Rome, Milan and Brussels. She has recorded fifty out of the sixty songs on her schedule. She has been cutting six sides at each session.

The tunes which will make up five LP's have 100 string backing and one album will also use 100 voices.

The singer, who is a favorite of European record buyers and d.j.'s has been feted in every city she visited by local recording execs and d.j.'s. While in London, a delegation of Indian recording brass from New Delhi flew in to meet her and present her with a gift of six saris.

In Rome, the Acquavivas had an audience with the Pope, before leaving for Hamburg, Amsterdam and Luxembourg for more recording sessions and promo stints.

Hanover-Signature Intros New Merchandising Idea with "Double Play" Squirrels Disk

NEW YORK—The Hanover-Signature follow-up to the smash Nutty Squirrels single "Uh-Oh" will be neither a single, an EP, nor an album. The new release is being called a "Double Play" record, by the company.

The release will feature four new songs by the Squirrels called "UhHuh" (not to be confused with "Uh-Oh"); "Salt Peanuts"; "Ding Dong"; and "Zowee". That the new disk has the same number of sides as what the trade calls an extended play record, is the only similarity between the "Double Play" disk and the EP.

But that is where the similarity ends. The "Double Play" disk is designed to sell at the same price as a single, for 98¢. It will feature only new material by the artist. And will be promoted and serviced strictly as a single. The success of the initial "DP" will determine whether future Hanover-Signature releases by name artists and by artists following-up hits will be released.

The "DP" will come in a soft four-color sleeve displaying a photo of the Squirrels. To further promote the disk, 5000 counter displays, free of charge,

will be sent out to dealers across the country—the displays clearly indicating that the consumer gets four songs for the price of a single. 6400 copies of the "DP" will be sent to deejays and 1700 copies of a special promotional single, will be sent to a special list of jockeys. The special promo disk will couple the push side of the "DP", the "Uh-Huh" number, with a flip side featuring a thank you message to jockeys from the Squirrels for the d.j. response to their first release.

Bob Thiele, president of the diskery, and Irv Stimler, nat'l sales manager, also announced that 100 TV films for disk jockeys of the Squirrels performing "Uh-Huh" will be distributed to TV jockeys.

It was also announced that Flamingo Films, a film producing company, has purchased 150 cartoons featuring the Squirrels which it will sell to various TV channels. These films are designed to introduce kiddie TV shows.

Thiele and Stimler expect the "DP" to meet with exceptionally strong approval from rack jobbers and juke box operators.

Capitol Names Three To Phonograph Posts

HOLLYWOOD—Wallace T. Powell, Eugene J. Sapak, and Bert V. Teeger have been appointed to newly-created Capitol phonograph posts, it was announced last week by M. D. "Bud" Schuster, CRDC Vice President in charge of distribution. All three men will report directly to Schuster.

As sales coordinator, FDS stereo phonographs, Powell will be responsible for the coordination of all FDS stereo phonograph sales promotion, advertising and dealer-information programs. Powell came to Capitol in July, 1959, as administrative assistant to Schuster. A former district sales manager for the Philco Corporation, he has been active in phonograph sales management for over twelve years.

As phonograph product coordinator, Eugene J. Sapak will be responsible for the coordinating of CRDC's FDS stereo phonograph and portable phonograph activities with the manufacturing and engineering operations of Capitol Records. His responsibilities include the areas of product design and development. Sapak joined Capitol in July, 1957, as an FDS stereo phonographs district sales manager. He became a regional sales manager in January, 1959, and national sales manager for portable phonographs in November of the same year. From 1955 until 1957, he served as a district sales manager for Columbia Records in Cleveland, Ohio.

As FDS field sales manager, Bert V. Teeger will be responsible for the sale of FDS stereo consoles to franchised FDS dealers throughout the United States. His responsibilities include the training of field sales representatives. Teeger joined Capitol in February, 1959, as an FDS regional sales development manager. Previously he was associate district representative with the Philco Corporation's San Francisco distributorship.

All appointments are effective immediately.

Adonis Retains Freeman

NEW YORK—Joe Gottfried, head of Adonis Records, reported last week that the label has taken on Barry Freeman as a West Coast representative. Freeman—son of Ticker Freeman, musical director of the Dinah Shore TV'er—was formerly with Coral Records.

In the continued expansion of Adonis, Gottfried said that he has taken over the national distribution of Shure Records. The first Shure record he will handle is Eddie Ventura's "With All The Love I Have" and "Hey Little Girl."

All-Disc Gets Vito LP Line

NEW YORK—Lou Fagon of All-Disc distributes here announced last week the acquisition of the Vito Records' LP's, which includes "The 3 Musketeers of the Opera," featuring Cesare Siepi, Cesare Valetti and Fernando Corona. Fagon also said that the Audio Fidelity Records' Prepak #2 was well received by the trade and "the orders are pouring-in because of the new Louis Armstrong, Dukes of Dixieland, Jo Basile AF albums."

Carl Haverlin Cited

NEW YORK—Carl Haverlin, president of BMI, has been cited by the Council of the American Association for State and Local History for his contributions to encouraging "Americans to take a greater interest in their history." Under Haverlin, BMI has sponsored public service history programs.

Push on New Sid Ramin LP

NEW YORK—RCA Victor Records is planning a big promotion on the new Sid Ramin LP, "Love Without Tears." Campaign includes ads, brochures and a personal letter from Ramin to over 3,000 jocks, librarians and program directors.

Ramin—who provided the orchestrations for the current B'way smash, "Gypsy," and co-orchestrated "West Side Story,"—received very favorable reviews for his initial Victor album, "Love Is A Swingin' Word."

Roulette "Operation Clean-Up" Dealer LP Plan

NEW YORK—Roulette Records will offer dealers a new sales plan tagged "Operation Clean-Up" from Feb. 15 to March 15. The salient points of this plan are: for every \$5 worth of Roulette album merchandise the dealer purchases, he will be entitled to return \$1 worth of any record labels' singles or LP's. The dealer's returns will not be confined to just Roulette merchandise, but under the provisions of the plan, will permit him to return any and all record labels depending, of course, on the amount of Roulette albums he buys during the course of the program.

The dealers' purchases may be made from the Roulette catalog as well as from the new February-March album releases. The plan also includes all album products of the diskery's divisions, Roost, Tico, Forum, and Gee Records.

Roulette has already started shipping its February-March albums which are part of the new sales program. The releases include: "Once More With Feeling"—Billy Eckstine with Billy May and his Orch.; "Woo-Hoo"—the Rock-A-Teens; "Island Paradise"—

William Keahola; "A Thousand Miles Away"—The Heartbeats; "On Stage"—a comedy album by Alan Gale (recorded live at Jack Silverman's "International" in New York); "Salute Italia"—guitarist Al Caiola; "Polka! Polka! Polka!" by Kenny Bass and his Polka Poppers.

The Roulette "Birdland Series" of jazz albums will feature "Dance Along With Basie"; "That Kind Of Woman"—Joe Williams and "England's Ambassador Of Jazz"—Johnny Dankworth Orch.

Tico Records will have one LP released, "Leroy Anderson In Latin America"—Marco Rizo his piano, and His Orch. Roost Records will have one release with "My Dear Little Sweetheart"—Johnny Smith, guitar and orch.

"Operation Clean-Up" will be backed with a "strong" advertising and promotional campaign including full page trade paper ads, direct mail advertising to dealers, four color mounted easels of album covers, full disk-jockey coverage and co-op mats for local newspaper advertising.

"Jazz Word" Paperback

NEW YORK—Three record executives with long experience in jazz writing have collaborated to produce a new paperback on jazz. ("The Jazz Word" by Dom Cerulli, Burt Korall and Mort Nasatir; Ballantine Books).

The book, through both previously written pieces and specially commissioned works, presents a composite picture of jazz writing today, including fiction, poetry and art. The contributors number among jazz's most distinguished names.

The most enlightening work in the book is Gary Kramer's serious study of the narcotics problem in jazz. It is a clear, psychologically concise picture of the problem. Its appearance in print is a revelation among much nonsense that has been written on the subject recently. This section alone is worth the price of the book and since it, unlike a lot of the books' contents, is not available elsewhere, should provide the catalyst for a successful publication.

For the new jazz fan this book can be of considerable aid in understanding the current scene.

Hot Lawrence-Gorme LP

NEW YORK—The first duet album by Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, "We Got Us", on ABC-Paramount is getting off to a "tremendous" start, it was announced by Allan Parker, director of album sales & merchandising.

From January 4th thru 12th the company brought in its distributors to New York to preview the new releases for 1960. During this time advance orders for the album were taken in the amount of between 75,000 to 100,000.

Seeco To Distribute Lost Label

NEW YORK—Mort Hillman, general manager of Seeco Records, announced last week that he has made a distribution deal with Lost Records, headed by Jerry Stadin. New label's first release is "Why Can't You Love Me" by the Four X's.

Silver Slipper Diskery Formed

HOLLYWOOD—Robert O. Schulze, owner of the Silver Slipper in Las Vegas, announced the formation of a new record company to headquarter in Hollywood, the Silver Slipper Recording Co. Schulze will act as president of the new diskery and has appointed Hy Broughten as general manager and head of A&R.

Silver Slipper's initial release is scheduled to hit the market next month and will feature a vocal group called, The Silvertones, doing "Sentimental Memory" b/w "You Gotta Change Your Ways."

The new diskery will also act in the management capacity for artists in the recording field.

Crystalette Adds To Roster

HOLLYWOOD—Carl Burns, president of Crystalette Records, is continuing the expansion of the label by adding to his talent roster and stepping up his schedule of single releases.

Newest artists on Crystalette are the Optimists, an all-girl group which debuts with "Lift Up The Latch" b/w "I'm Laughing At Myself." The Optimists are the third new group to appear on Crystalette within a month's time. Others are the Spinners, a teenage instrumental sextet. ("Slave Chain" b/w "Boomerang"); the Revelaires ("New Kind of Gold" b/w "Rockin' The Tease").

The Optimists' deck is Crystalette's third release in four weeks. Burns previously had announced a schedule of one single per month.

Omegatape Gets Tape Rights

HOLLYWOOD — Leasing agreements with record companies for the tape rights to their LP catalogs will provide Omegetape with an additional source of artist material for forthcoming releases.

Omegetapes' Feb. release of 32 4-track and 30 2-track tapes will include packages from the Carlton, Golden Crest, Winn and Pip catalogs. Artists include Monty Kelly, Vincent Lopez, Anita Bryant, George Libera, Art Mooney, the Ink Spots, Charlie Barnett, Ted Weems, Shep Fields, Sister Rosetta Tharpe, and Dick Haymes.

David Hubert, the label's executive vice-president, is currently looking for possible tape releases from other labels and expects to close some "important deals" of this type in the near future.

AF's Pre Pak #2

NEW YORK — Audio Fidelity launched its Pre Pak #2 on February 15, 1960. This Pre Pak contains ten releases including "Satchmo Plays King Oliver" featuring Louie Armstrong; "Piano Ragtime With The Dukes of Dixieland"; "The Happy Sound of Ragtime", with Harry Brewer and Orchestra; "Arthur Tracy, The Street Singer"; and others.

The dealer will receive ten free Stereo LPs when he buys 20 Monaural and 20 Stereo LPs.

To aid the dealer in his efforts "To Sell Up With Audio Fidelity", there has been, and will continue to be, heavy trade and consumer advertising campaigns.

"Ritchie Valens Month"

HOLLYWOOD—Over one hundred of the Ritchie Valens Memorial Fan Clubs will be especially active this month which has been proclaimed "Ritchie Valens Month." Special parties and record hops are planned throughout the nation and in Europe, Australia and the Orient. Valens' "latest" single, "Cry, Cry, Cry" and "The Paddiwack Song", his new EP "Ritchie Valens," and his album, "Ritchie," will be the releases the clubs will "sponsor" for the month. Del-Fi prexy Bob Keene said that all club presidents will receive the Valens' single and EP.

A "Ritchie Valens Memorial Dance" will be held at the El Monte Legion stadium here on Feb. 20, according to sponsors Frosty Harris and Jimmy O'Neill of station KRLA.

In addition to his production duties, Don will host a daily 9:10 to 11 A.M. stint which will put the spotlight on WSM's live talent: Hank Garland, Buddy Harmon, Chet Atkins, the Jordanaires and the Glazer Brothers were on hand for the first week which began Feb. 1. . . . Capitol Records introduced a new group from Holland, Lydia and her Melody Strings. First sides for them, released last week, are new versions of country standards "Send Me The Pillow" and "Take These Chains From My Heart". . . . Also new on records is

Columbia's Roy Rivers, the label's latest addition to its roster of country stars. Roy is 20 years old and hails from Arkansas. For the last few years he and his cohorts have been heard weekly over KWAM-Memphis. His first coupler is "Heartbeat" and "Hello Again". . . . Hal Southern, in his Country-Western column in "Overture," the official monthly journal of musicians local 17, gets on the soapbox berating the extensive use of electronic music—records. He advocates support for those who support live music, to increase the percentage of live music being aired so that the kids "will have some idea of a musical culture that was tremendous and could be again." Hal calls it a musician's fight for economical survival.

"I Don't Have Time To Cry!"

"I don't consider myself a juke box operator. The music operating business just isn't that simple anymore. The actual selling of phonographs starts with the manufacturer and ends when I buy my machine from the distributor. I sell *music* not phonographs. The entire concept of providing music for locations has changed—and my operating procedures have changed accordingly."

These are the words of a music machine operator who has spent more than twenty-five years in the coin machine business. Today, he operates approximately 200 music machines in addition to a game route, in a territory that could never be classified as a good operating area. The taverns in his town have sold for as low as \$3500. There are about 300 people for every tavern in town. There are too many bars in business. In order to earn a living operating music machines in this town an operator must conduct his business with a high degree of efficiency. This operator does just that and here, in his own words, are some of his ideas on successfully operating automatic music machines today.

"The latest changes we are making, from one end of the route to the other, is the installation of auxiliary speakers. We have surveyed each of our locations and the result is that many of them now carry up to six speakers in the one location. The reason for this is that we are primarily music salesmen. The machine is an attractive supplier of this music but the public must hear what they consider to be pleasant sounding music before they patronize the machine. Several tests earlier last year proved that a location with music at the same volume for *everyone* in the place regardless of where he is in the spot, invariably increases the play on the machine. Furthermore, the high fidelity and stereo sound of machines and records today permits the finest music available. The customers may now *enjoy* the music. To capitalize on this advantage is a simple matter of logic. I believe the bartenders and waitresses in my locations are responsible for a large portion of the increased play. Whether they play the machine more, or promote it more than they formerly did I don't know. I do know that with our auxiliary speaker program nearing completion collections have increased as much as 50% in approximately 30 to 40 locations. I doubt if it's all a coincidence.

"We are constantly on the alert for new locations, not only to improve our overall business but to offset the constant loss of locations due to bad business, deaths, and other reasons that are normal on every route in the country. If there is no time to solicit new business then, in my own case, I would assume that the route itself is not being operated in an efficient manner. There should be time for new business.

"In addition to improving the route through new locations, we have improved our present route without leaving the old locations. And this brings us back to the auxiliary speaker program which has stimulated collections in locations that were formerly neglected. An old or regular stop can be surveyed for additional speakers, remote control facilities, possibly a new machine, with the result bringing a happy location owner, more money in the box for all concerned, and in many instances, more business for the location itself. This is not theory, it is a fact, at least on my route. The good will that comes about after an interest is taken in most locations is worth a lot

more than the actual cash profit that results. I don't know how many locations I might have lost to competition if we didn't take this interest. I don't have the time to think about it.

"Incidentally, with all of the interest today in our industry's public relations I honestly feel that while I improve the music and thereby the collections in my locations, I am also helping to do away with the term 'blaring juke box' which has been used with every article I've ever read in the local newspapers. I can understand this situation when you go back about ten or fifteen years, but with today's highly technical equipment there's no need for it.

"I believe that the introduction of stereo more or less forced the speaker issue since operators had to use more than one speaker. Actually, in my case anyway, it enabled me to channel a better musical sound throughout the location. This spurred our idea of auxiliary speakers on most locations, by the way.

"While a great majority of my locations are of a lower class tavern, in a sense, they all have individual tastes, and while this is very interesting to discover, it is also more expensive to service. However, if the location isn't programmed properly you might just as well take the machine out.

"In my area, a 50-50 location owner agreement is out of the question. I'd never be able to pay for the equipment. I find that a front money agreement, a minimum, or in some cases a guaranteed minimum, is necessary. Speaking of the guaranteed minimum which we use on the poorest spots, I was amazed to discover a couple of years ago that 50 locations on our route, which was larger then, brought a net profit to the firm of about \$75.00 each week! Upon figuring the cost of the equipment on this route I found that I could sell the machines for \$4,000. We pulled them out. There wasn't that much money in all of the locations put together. I put the \$4,000 into equipment on the present route and the dividends have been paying off ever since. Now we trade easier and I guess you could say the new equipment actually costs less.

"We have a 50% turnover of equipment on location in the course of one year. 15% of the route is replaced with new equipment each year. We move the machines down the line improving each location as we see fit. This takes time, it takes men, and it takes part of the profits. But it is 'working the route' for peak profit. It's necessary. And it is more profitable.

"I would say that less than 5% of my locations actually ask for a better piece of equipment in the course of a year. We're in with the machine before they have to ask. But only on the locations that merit a better machine. They show up immediately upon looking at the books. It would be silly not to change the machine.

"The music machine operating business is a bread and butter business. But we enjoyed the best year in our history last year. That's taking in a lot of years. So you ask, 'How's business?' It's never been so good. We're making it pay off and it takes every day of the week to keep it paying off. I don't have time to cry."

London's 16th Annual A. T. E. Sets Record As 2,000



LONDON — The 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition, held in New Royal Horticultural Hall, February 2 through February 4 set an attendance record when more than 2,000 visitors attended the coin machine convention, arriving from the United States, Germany, Holland, Belgium, France, Luxembourg, South Africa, India and Australia, in addition to a large representation from all levels of the coin industry in the United Kingdom. The many months of preparation and mounting interest which preceded this trade event were wholly justified. 125 exhibit booths were sold out to the participating 64 exhibitors almost one month before the coin show started.

Exhibitors were seriously handicapped by the one day strike called by members of London Transport (Underground) Workers on Monday, causing the largest traffic jams ever recorded in this city, delaying the arrival of equipment and the work of setting up the record number of stands, by many hours. Special "heavy gangs" were working until midnight to ensure that preparations were complete by 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday. Had the strike continued it might easily have affected attendance figures, but by Tuesday, the start of the convention, trains were running normally.

Coin men from all over the world travelled to London to attend the Convention and for three days the New Royal Horticultural Hall became the International centre and focal point of the coin machine industry. The

International atmosphere, which was a highlight of the Exhibition, was apparent not only by the number of overseas visitors, but by the enormous amount of foreign equipment which was to be seen exceeding expectations both in quantity and quality. Much of the material was being shown for the first time.

The opening up of the industry resulting from the recent relaxation of the Import restrictions in this country, making for a much more highly competitive market, was an undoubted factor in the increase of overseas interest in the Exhibition.

As reported earlier, there were more Exhibitors than in previous years necessitating some of the larger organizations to limit their requirements. Nevertheless they vied with each other to capture the eye of prospective buyers and the standard of display and showmanship was higher than at any former Exhibition. Many of the stands had soundproof listening rooms, luxuriously carpeted and comfortably furnished. In this convivial atmosphere old friendships were renewed and new contacts made. Early reports indicate that business-wise, an all time high was reached and the organizers are to be congratulated on the success of the 16th Annual Amusement Trades Exhibition which can claim to equal or surpass its counterpart in any capital city throughout the world.

Dominating the right hand side of the Exhibition was the large Phonographic Equipment (1958) Ltd. display, featuring all the latest Wurlitzer equipment. During the three days of the Exhibition the firm received many complimentary remarks from overseas visitors about the efficiency and cooperation of the company's enterprising directors, Cyril Shack, Gordon Marks and Max Fine. As this country's main distributors pride of place on the stand was naturally given to the latest Wurlitzer boxes. Also on show were Williams and Gottlieb game lines. President and vice President of the Wurlitzer Company, R. C. Rolffing, Sr., and his son flew over specially to be at the Exhibition.

Gordon Walker, Director of Ruffler & Walker, sole agents for Rock-Ola, reported that his main impression of the Exhibition was the enormous interest being shown in "Spielers" in anticipation of the new Gaming Bill which it is hoped will be in before the season is through. Business, in fact, was good in all types of pay-out machines.

The new Rock-Ola "Tempo II" was well received and liked better than its predecessor. Particular interest was shown in the dual-purpose aspect—stereo for the same price as monaural. The changes made from the older model have met with approval. During

the Exhibition, Alfred Adickes, Nova Apparate-Gesellschaft, European Distributor for Rock-Ola, flew to visit the stand.

Norman Lever, general manager of the Ditchburn Organization whose stand was one of the most attractive at the Exhibition was delighted with the reception given to the new Seeburg "100" and "160", both on show for the first time in this country. Of the two, the "160" was proving the most popular. Another good seller was the Music Maker, "30" selection model. Lever said he was also very pleased with the way his offer, to advise customers of various means of getting over their supply difficulties of 78 rpm records, has been received. He also wished to extend his appreciation to the Organizers on the success of the Exhibition. Ditchburn Vending Machines Ltd. were also demonstrating their Hot-Spa and Cole-Spa Drink Vendors.

One of the leading Continental Exhibitors, making their first appearance at the Exhibition were Beromat of Germany. The stand featured the new "Harmonie" stereo phonograph, 200 and 120 selections, as well as the 120 "Wall Mount" Phonograph. All proved popular. Mr. Koeke, Director of Beromat and also of Gunter Wulff, told The Cash Box that while in this country he was negotiating with a British Distributor to handle the "Harmonie" over here. Mr. Koeke was impressed by the high standard of the exhibition and commented on the fact that it was the only one of its kind in Europe devoted solely to coin machines.

Another German firm exhibiting was The Fanfare Company of Bingen-on Rhine, one of the largest juke box factories on the Continent. S. Longstaffe, sole importer and distributor in this country reported excellent sales with particular interest in the stereo "100" Selection model, remarking that its small compact size, 52" high, 26" deep and 30" wide, with a net weight of 242 lbs. made it ideal for installation in smaller coffee bars, etc. Herr Herbosch, Sales Manager for Bingen, came over for the Exhibition and spent much time on the stand.

Charles Henry, Managing Director of Chalwest, Ltd., main distributors for Chantal, Ltd., expressed satisfaction with the trend in business. Main features were the Chantal "Meteor" 200 selection, both monaural and stereo versions.

United Music Corporation of Chicago were represented by Music Systems, Ltd. of Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk, sole importers in this country. J. Sanderson, Managing Director, told The Cash Box that business had been wonderful. A major factor in promoting sales was the new servicing arrangements for United operators plus the fact that United equipment can be bought at a price including indepen-

dent, guaranteed, comprehensive free service whether one or more machines are purchased.

Situated immediately in front of the main entrance was the impressive stand of Automatic Musical Instruments (GB) Ltd., exclusive manufacturers licensed by A.M.I. Inc. of the United States of America, of the A.M.I. Phonographs and exclusive importers and distributors for all U.S.A. A.M.I. made phonographs. Mounted on the roof of the stand permanently revolving were two vast AMI boxes with the slogan "Way Out On Top". On hand to give advice to the many interested customers were Managing Director, Cecil Jones, Bob Roma, Chief AMI European Engineer and Peter Simper and David Laren, A.M.I. Distributors.

At another stand W. Smith, Managing Director of Koromatics Ltd. was displaying the latest Bally games now being made in this country by A.M.I. (GB) Ltd.

Many distinguished visitors called at The Cash Box stand during their visit to the exhibition. Among them, Si Redd, president of Redd Distributing Company, U.S.A. who flew in specially to cover the Convention and meet friends both old and new. Si was most impressed by the overall picture. On Thursday he flew to Antwerp to discuss plans for the expansion of his company's export division and hopes to call in London again before returning to the States.

EASTERN FLASHES



Prices may be very widely divergent. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, and condition of equipment must be taken into consideration. (Some equipment offered by outstanding firms, having a reputation for shipping completely reconditioned machines, will be offered at higher prices than others, due to the added cost of reconditioning.) "The Cash Box Price Lists" reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: "The Cash Box Price Lists" should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price quoted for the week; Second price listed is highest price quoted.




