

CONNIE FRANCIS (MGM 12995)

Lark's long hit chain shall soon be adding another smash link in "Breakin' In A Brand New Broken Heart." It's a touching, country-flavored affair that Connie puts across with telling effect. Can go all the way. Splendid Stan Applebaum showcase. Cliff Parman's ork colorfully assist on the bright rock coupler.

"DANCE THE MESS AROUND" (2:20)

"GOOD GOOD LOVIN'" (2:25) [Lois BMI—Brown, Shubert]

CHUBBY CHECKER (Parkway 822)

The teen-dance-master, whose "Pony Time," is still sweeping the country, comes thru with another exciting terpsichorean delight for the kids. This time Chubby wants 'em to "Dance The Mess Around." A sure-fire sales-sizzler culled from his current "Pony Time" LP. The other end is a house-rockin' revival of the old r&b favorite. Sensational double-decker.

"MAMA SAID" (2:10) [Ludix BMI—Dixon, Denson]

THE SHIRELLES (Scepter 1217)

The gals, whose current smasher is "Dedicated To The One I Love," should soon be busting loose with "Mama Said." It's an inviting, rock-a-cha-cha thumper that has that top-ten look. Companion piece is a heart-felt romancer, tabbed "Blue Holiday," carved out with beat-ballad sincerity.

Take your pick here. The pic-TV-disk star has two more potent efforts that the youngsters'll go wild for. One side, "Travelin' Man," is a fetching teen beat cha cha tale 'bout a fella who has a gal in every port. He's devoted to one gal, however, on the enticing, quick moving "Hello Mary Lou" portion. Both are sure to run neck 'n' neck in the race for chart honors.

"BIG BIG WORLD" (2:18) [Studio BMI—Nelson, Burch, West]

JOHNNY BURNETTE (Liberty 55318)

Burnette doesn't have to look too far for a hit follow-up to "Little Boy Sad" as he searches for his gal in this "Big Big World." It's a crying towel romancer set to an easy-goin' shuffle beat that Johnny and chorus wax with loads of feeling. The thrilling, fast moving western coupler's inspired by (but not in) the current hit pic "One Eyed Jacks."

FREDDY CANNON (Swan 4071)

Cannon, whose recent coin-catcher was an oldie—"Muskrat Ramble," should soon be reaping in the profits of two newcomers. One's a happy-go-lucky shout-filled rockin' handclapper labeled "Buzz Buzz A-Diddle-It" while the other, "Opportunity," is a sparkling shuffle-rocker decked out a la "Personality." Terrific choral-ork support on both sessions.

"AN ANGEL CRIED" (2:55)

ANITA BRYANT (Carlton 547)

The lark can score heavily with both ends of her new Carlton duo. They're both country-styled, dual-tracked performances that Anita delivers with telling effect. "An Angel Cried" is taken for a soft beat cha cha ride while "I Can't Do It By Myself" moves along at a brisk, upbeat pace. Count on heavy airplay here.

FRITZ JOOL (Warwick 635)

(B+) "GLADIATOREN - DIXIE" (2:30) [Piccadilly BMI—Fucik, Siegel] Whacky German import in which Jool comically sings the familiar circus tune against a lively Dixielandish sound. May be a left-field laff click.

(B) "DAS LIED VON DER GLATZE" (2:12) [Town & Country BMI—Ludwig] Same sort of zany sounds here.

MARTY VINE (Mastermade 101)

(B+) "ROSEMARY" (2:00) [Republic BMI—Lane, Clare] Vine does a teen-wise vocal on the pretty teen sentimental, cut sometime back by Brian Hyland. The performer's stint is backed by a fine rock-a-cha sound from the combo-chorus. Well-worth big-beat programming. Label headquarters in Brooklyn, N. Y.

(B) "CHERYL" (2:10) [Vinmar BMI—Levine] Vine again displays rock vocal finesse in this easy-beat romantic.

DON CORNELL (Roulette 4355)

(B+) "THE FLYING TRAPEZE" (2:18) [Words & Music ASCAP—Stein] Vet vocalist bows on the label with a hip-styled swing version of the ancient ditty. Bobby Darin-like swing arrangement from Stan Applebaum. Many jocks should be interested.

(B) "WISH I WAS" (2:55) [Planetary ASCAP—Tepper, Bennett] Performer invitingly displays the lovely folk-type romancer.

THE PRINCETONS (Skylark 104)

(B+) "AYE" (2:35) [House of Sound & Bachelor BMI—Hogen, Hogen] Folk-type songsters and combo have lots of color in this portrayal of the folk tune. Could attract attention.

(B) "YES I'M IN TROUBLE" (1:50) [House of Sound & Bachelor BMI—Hogen, Hogen] Bright calypso sound from the boys.

JIMMY FEAGANS (Howard 501)

(B) "SATURDAY NIGHT" (1:45) [Howard Short BMI—Short] Good blues-styled belt from the singer against strong percussion-sax sounds. Plenty of beat here.

(B) "NO MATTER" (3:11) [Fego BMI—Curry] Artist offers an unhurried blues-ballad essay.

ANDY & THE LIVE WIRES (Liberty 55321)

(B) "YOU'VE DONE IT AGAIN" (2:12) [Peter Jan BMI—Anderson] Interesting teen-beat sounds from the musicians in this vocal-instrumental outing, a master purchase from the Applause label.

(B) "MAGGIE" (3:04) Peter Jan BMI—Arr. Anderson] All-combo sock stint on the familiar tune, better known as "When You and I Were Young Maggie Blues." Two deft teen sides.

GARY "SPIDER" WEBB (Bamboo 504)

(B) "THE CAVE" (Part 1) (2:25) [Pattern ASCAP—Howard] Effective rock-beat novelty which features a fine bluesy combo sound with zany boy-girl statements. Could get around.

(B) "THE CAVE" (Part 2) (2:28) [Pattern ASCAP—Howard] Same well-done stuff here.

JORGE MOREL (Decca 31242)

(B+) "THEME FROM 'ROMAN-OFF AND JULIET'" [Northern ASCAP—Nascimbene] Tuneful Italian-flavored ditty that serves as the main-title of the pic version of the successful stage play is pleasingly fashioned by South American guitarist Morel and a full Dick Jacobs-directed ork-chanting chorus.

(B) "VENUS" [Rambled & Lansdale BMI—Marshall] Same musical sound leads the way in an attractive ork-chorus version of the pretty awhile back Frankie Avalon hit. Tune seems to be passing the time test.

JACK JONES (Kapp 380)

(B+) "BIG TIME" (2:19) [Peter Maurice ASCAP—Bart] Singer Jones, son of vet artist Alan Jones, effectively essays the swinger with a hard-boiled theme, and gets a robust band sound under Billy May's direction. Looks like solid deejay stuff.

(B) "SHE'S MY DARLING, SHE'S MY HEART" (2:37) [Garland ASCAP—Morris] Off-beat May arrangement in another hip-styled swinger

GOGI GRANT (Liberty 55316)

(B+) "THAT ONE KISS" (2:07) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Loudermilk] Pro talent does a colorful job on the strong upbeat romantic, receiving a strong rock-a-string stint in the setting. Might add-up to a chart stand for Miss Grant.

(B) "ADRIFT ON A STAR (Barcarolle)" (2:35) [Chappell ASCAP—Offenbach, Harburg, Adpt. DeCormier] An attractive ballad reading of a pop re-write of Offenbach's "Barcarolle," heard in the new musical based on the composer's melodies, "The Happiest Girl In The World." Guitar offer good-sounding soft rock sounds.

DICK DIA ORCH. (Audio Fidelity 081)

(B) "GUAGLIONE" (2:37) [Accordo ASCAP—Fucini, Nisa] Guitars are a good-sounding feature of this cheerful instrumental view of the old Italian ditty. Happy listening.

(B) "NON DIMENTICAR'" (2:44) [Hollis BMI—Galdieri, Dobbins] More sentimental sounds in this stint on another Italian favorite.

ABBY HOFFER'S TRUMPETS (Amy 819)

(B+) "TRUMPET IN PARIS" (2:12) [Gil BMI—Isaacs] Catchy continental-type ditty serves as the vehicle for a lively Latinized band-chorus outing. Bright programming idea.

(B) "FIRE IN THE FLESH" (2:14) [Reynolds ASCAP—Greene] More colorful Latin sounds from the ork.

THE COUSINS (Chancellor 1074)

(B+) "WHAT'D I SAY" (2:48) [Progressive BMI—Charles] The old Ray Charles hit, currently having a new chart run via outings by Jerry Lee Lewis and Jack Eubanks, gets a persuasive sock version, cut at a concert and heard in an LP, "Wild! Wildwood." Exciting rendition.

(B) "BOSTON HOP" (2:12) [Rambled BMI—Di Agostino] Another lively "live" stint from the LP.

"LIFE'S A HOLIDAY" (2:30) [Jat BMI—Wallace, Coe]

"I CAN SEE AN ANGEL CRYING" (2:32)

JERRY WALLACE (Challenge 9107)

Wallace is in a happy "Primrose Lane" frame of mind as he etches this sunny follow-up to the tearful "There She Goes" click. It's an easy-goin' shuffle delighter, titled "Life's A Holiday." "MAYBE I'M A FOOL" (3:15) [Omell ASCAP—McFarland]

ARETHA FRANKLIN (Columbia 41985)

The fine talent, who already owns chart-makers in "Today I Sing The Blues" and "Won't Be Long," can make it three-in-a-row with "Are You Sure." Tune (not to be confused with the Allison's current hit), is the tantalizing, tongue-in-cheek affair from "The Unsinkable Molly Brown," treated here to a striking, gospel-styled performance by Aretha and the Ray Bryant combo. Artists do rolling-blues justice to the "Maybe I'm A Fool" side. Both winners are culled from her "Aretha" package.

"CONTINENTAL WITH ME BABY" (2:09) [Arc BMI—Vibrations]

"THE JUNKEROO" (2:26) [Arc BMI—Hall, Vibrations]

THE VIBRATIONS (Checker 974)

After singing and dancing their way up the hit lists, with the "Watusi," the Vibrations should follow suit with their current Checker slice. "Continental With Me, Baby," is the crew's version of the new dance craze and the kids are sure to pick up on it real fast. "The Junkeroo" is another rhythmic new step that can also make the grade.

Strong ork support by the Lennie Martin crew. Very pretty treatment of the standard flipside.

LITTLE JUNIOR PARKER (Duke 335)

RICHARD BERRY (Flip 321)

(B+) "LOUIE LOUIE" (2:10) [Limax BMI—Berry] A still solid-sounding re-issue of Berry's year-back noise maker. Songster is supported by an infectious rock-a-cha arrangement. Might get important coin anew.

(B) "ROCK ROCK ROCK" (1:43) [Limax BMI—Berry] Berry and the combo-chorus whip-up a fine upbeat rocker.

BILL & DOREE POST (Crest 1079)

(B+) "THE LONELY WIND" (2:39) [American BMI—B&D Post] One of those haunting instrumentals (with wordless chorus) that now-and-then make chart noise. Sound here could be in the latter class.

(B) "HAW, JACK" (2:42) [American BMI—B&D Post] Complete turnaround as a songster offers a lively country-styled novelty.

GARY HAINES & THE FIVE
SEQUINS (Kapp 383)

(B+) "TSETSE FLY" (2:20) [Kryder BMI—Haines, Johnston] Haines' narrative-like comments plus a strong combo-chorus sound should interest teen listeners. It's a driving rock-novelty that could mean chart business.

(B) "BALLIN' THE JACK" (1:50) [E. B. Marks BMI—Smith, Burris] Bouncy teen-directed version of the old dance tune.

DORIS DAY (Columbia 41993)

(B+) "GOTTA FEELIN'" (2:13) [Daywin BMI—Prince] Very likable shuffle-beat date from the star, culled from her "Bright and Shiny" LP. A good-natured sound that could make noise.

(B) "TWINKLE AND SHINE" (2:15) [Artists ASCAP—Dunham] Lass offers another cheerful track, the tune coming from a pic of the same name.

BRUCE HAYES (Op's 108)

(B) "ACE IN THE HOLE, I I WONDER WHO'S KISSING HER NOW, HOT TIME IN THE OLD TOWN TONIGHT" (2:28) Juke-box operators should note this brisk chorus, headed by songster Hayes, reading of the good-old oldies. Label is located in New Milford, N.J.

(B) "HEART OF MY HEART, MELANCHOLY BABY, BAND PLAYED ON" (3:19) [Shapiro-Bernstein ASCAP] Same approach to three more durables.

THE SENIORS (Decca 31244)

(B) "BABY, SAY THE WORD" (2:10) [Champion BMI—James] Teen-beat vocal attraction gives-out with a pro no-let-up novelty rocker which relies heavily on gimmick vocal bits. Lots of rock vitality here.

(B) "WHEN WILL I FALL IN LOVE" (2:10) [Champion BMI—James] Complete change-of pace as the lead does a dramatic job on the plaintive.

RONNIE SAXON (Coral 62259)

(B+) "TURNING TO YOU" (2:06) [Tippy BMI—Keyes, Smith] Catchy rock rhythmic from the vocalist and combo-chorus. Bright-beat stuff that could prove a hefty noise-maker.

(B) "DREAM BOOK" (2:10) [Aim BMI—Ruben, Keyes, Smith] Saxon has a cozy touch on the inviting teen affectionate. Nice flute sound is part of the setting sound.

TONY CASTLE (Gone 5105)

(B+) "THEME FROM GONE WITH THE WIND (Tara's Theme)" (2:12) [Remig ASCAP—Steiner] Famed pic theme gets a good-sounding rock-a-string pose, with a guitar mostly upfront. A version of the opus that could figure in solid teen sales.

(B+) "YOU TOOK ME FOR GRANTED" (2:09) [Lar Bell BMI—Larson] Catchy hard-beat bouncer from the singing femmes. A bright sound that could figure in some action.

(B) "I DON'T WANNA PLAY IN YOUR YARD" (2:37) [Lar Bell BMI—Larson] Gals receive an infectious combo sound in this agreeable light-beat warble.

JOHN LEE HOOKER (Lauren 361)

(B) "MOJO HAND" (2:49) [Freda BMI—Hooker, Besman] The country blues vet turns up on this label in a violently passionate musical discussion of the Louisiana voo doo cult. An especially potent offering for certain markets.

(B) "BALLAD TO ABRAHAM LINCOLN" (2:52) [Freda BMI—Hooker, Besman] A tribute to the great president is worked out in soulful blues statements. Another stirringly displayed stint.

RON JEFFERSON (Nedward 1001)

(B) "THAT WONDERFUL GIRL OF MINE" (2:15) [Supreme ASCAP—Gallop, Jacobs, Olshanetsky] Jefferson gives a bluesy pop account of an English version of a popular Yiddish song, "Beltz." Backing the vocal is a good rock-a-string arrangement, also blues-styled. Worth airtime. Diskery is a New York out-fit.

(B) "DON'T DON'T TAKE YOUR LOVE FROM ME" (1:49) [Effy-Lou BMI—Small] A jumping blues-pop sound that also deserves teen programming.

Miss Hopkins big chart break can come from her stellar reading of "I Don't Know You Anymore." It's a beautiful ballad-with-a-beat lover's lament that Linda projects with touching sincerity. Backing, "Happiness," is a sparkling change-of-pace thumper.

Songster puts his heart into his delivery of the beat-ballad coupler.

BOBBY BARE (Fraternity 878)

Chances are Bobby Bare will have a hit going for him in the weeks to come. Chanter's Fraternity chart bid is a rock-a-cha-cha powerhouse tagged "Book Of Love" (not the same as the Monotones' while-back click). Very pretty tune with Bunny Botkin's crew in a fine, string-filled assist. The poignant Civil War opus, "Lorena," is warmly aimed at the two-market, pop-country coin.

"MISS FINE" [Figure BMI—Scott]

"(AT NIGHT) DREAM A LITTLE DREAM" [Figure BMI—Scott]

THE NEW YORKERS (Wall 547)

Look for the New Yorkers to make a big splash all across the nation with their words about "Miss Fine" on the new Wall label. Sock bongo intro for the newcomers' dandy rock-a-cha reading. It's loaded with those ultra-commercial sounds. Get with it! Things slow down to a fetching beat-ballad pace on the romantic undercut.

BOBBY DOMINO (Donna 1339)

Watch for Bobby Domino to break thru in the weeks to come. Artist, ably assisted by a vocal group, is in a money-making beat-ballad pose as he softly and sincerely tells about his love for his old flame, "Marilyn." Side has a flavor of the oldie, "Jo Ann." Coupler's also from the ballad-with-a-beat romantic school.

WAYNE SHERWOOD (Aurora 1982)

(C+) "CLOSER THAN KISSES (Asia Minor)" (2:06) [Loena ASCAP—Fodor, Litkei] Sherwood offers a ballad vocal of the famed Grieg melody which is also used in the current Kokomo hit, "Asia Minor." Session is handled by the Vista label.

(C+) "OUR LOVE IS YOUNG" (1:29) [Loena ASCAP—Fodor, Litkei] A beautiful Chopin Etude tune becomes a pop romantic here.

MARTY GINO (Wink 103)

(B) "TIME AND PLACE" (2:25) [Audicon & Midnight BMI—Laudani] Songster Gino heads an intriguing teen-beat ballad take. Tune is exotic and percussion-led combo-chorus sound takes interesting advantage of it. Jubilee distributes the label.

(B) "LIVE AND LEARN" (1:55) [Audicon & Midnight BMI—Bonura, Ceroni] Lively rock doings from the artist and accompaniment.

ROSCOE SHELTON (Excello 2198)

(B+) "I WAS WRONG, PLAYED WITH LOVE" (2:03) [Excellorec BMI—Shelton] The southern blues vet turns in another of his powerfully moving performances. Tune's a quiet, earthy ballad that Shelton chants with gently tender emotions. Guaranteed market for this artist.

(B+) "BABY! IT'S TRUE LOVE" (1:56) [Excellorec BMI—Shelton] On a vigorous upbeat stand, Shelton wallops a shouting blues in a rocking combo setting. Strong sides for the market.

THE SPIDERS (Imperial 5739)

(B) "WITCHCRAFT" (2:36) [Commodore BMI—Bartholomew, King] Team lead nicely reads the amiable light-blues jumper they had awhile-back. (Not the Sinatra oldie.)

(B) "(True) YOU DON'T LOVE ME" (2:23) [Commodore BMI—Glenn, Albert, Cottrell] A deliberate-beat ballad stand by the lead and remaining singers.

LALE ANDERSON (King 5478)

(B+) "EIN SCHIFF WIRD KOMMEN (A Ship Will Come)" (2:57) [BIEM—Hadjidakis, Busch] Star German thrush offers a pretty German-lyric of "Never On Sunday," one of Germany's hit versions of the popular pic tune. Male voice opens the session with an English narrative. (Lark herself has a German narrative about half-way down).

(B) "MANCHMAL TRAUM ICH VOM KORNFELD (Sometimes I Dream About the Cornfield)" (2:42) [BIEM—Nowa, Wilke] After another male narrative opening, thrush goes into a German reading of a pretty sentimental.

THE ADMIRATIONS (Apollo 753)

(B+) "JUST LIKE A BABY" (2:01) [Georgal BMI—McNeil] Songsters and combo join in a solid busy-beat R&B-flavored sound. Lead is particularly effective in his semi-shout role. Pro issue for R&B-pop audiences.

(B) "MY BABY" (1:50) [Georgal BMI—McNeil] Boys have a rapid-fire blues blend, and the musicians keep-up nicely with the vocal rushing.

DICK POWELL/LINDA WELLS (RPC 501)

(B) "THE WONDERFUL TEENS" (2:12) [Cadenza ASCAP—Leahy, Stewart] Actor Powell, a star pic singer in the Thirties, warbles a sentimental number that stems from an LP of the same name.

(B) "THAT CERTAIN PARTY" (1:43) [Bourne ASCAP—Kahn, Donaldson] From the same LP, lark Linda Wells heads an apt Twenties-styled upbeat arrangement of the Roaring 20's hit. Diskery operates out of Hollywood.

JACKIE DUNN (Kenco 5013)

(B) "PLAYBOY" (2:39) [Belleclaire BMI—Harris, Harris] Songster Dunn nicely relates the catchy teen rhythmic and gets a pro rock-a-string setting. Good upbeat romantic.

(C+) "WHAT GOES WITH A ROSE?" (2:16) [Belleclaire BMI—Latimer] A softie teen attraction with strings.

TONY ABBOTT ORCH. (Wye 1005)

(B) "SURRENDER" (2:33) [Elvis BMI—Pomus, DeCurtis] Tune, Presley's smash version of "O Sole Mio," becomes a cha-cha vehicle via a polished sound from the Tabbot orch.

(B) "SIDEWALKS OF NEW YORK (Cha Cha)" (2:45) Slow cha-cha translation of the ancient.

LEE TALBOYS (Palladium 609)

(B) "LADDER OF LOVE" (2:29) [Suffolk BMI—Talboys] Vocalist Talboys does a swinging stint against a good steady upbeat arrangement from the combo.

(C+) "IN A LITTLE SPANISH TOWN" (1:59) [Feist/Warlock ASCAP—Lewis, Young, Wayne] Appropriate cha-cha account of the evergreen.

DAVE GARDNER (RCA Victor 7876)

(B+) "COWARD AT THE ALAMO" (2:22) [Film & TV Unltd./Johnstone BMI—Bowman] The best-selling LP comic does a singles stint ala "Mr. Custer." Gardner's hip-styled humor alternates with a tom-tom combo-chorus sound. Should get solid laff spins.

(B) "YOU ARE MY LOVE" (1:35) [Milgard ASCAP—Meyer, Jones] Artist is "serious" in this light-beat country-styled romancer.

(B+) "SOMEWHERE ALONG THE WAY" (2:37) [United Music ASCAP—Adams, Gallop] The fine old Nat "King" Cole hit gets an attractive rock-a-string outing, with Preston turning-in an understanding ballad warble. Deck could figure in important exposure.



THE FIVE SATINS (Cub 9090)

(B+) "GOLDEN EARRINGS" (2:40) [Paramount ASCAP—Young, Livingston, Evans] Group hauntingly serves up a strong, teen-angled beat-ballad up-dating of the evergreen. Deck has that hit look. Can be a big one.

SOFFICI-MAGONI (Kip 224)

(B+) "THAT'S THE WAY WITH LOVE" (2:45) [Southern ASCAP—Viggo Nell/Infkito] Very attractive rock-a-string stylings on the order of the recent Percy Faith smash, "Theme From A Summer Place." This deck could get strong chart coin. Label is based in New York.

(B) "VALLEY OF MY HEART" (2:03) [Peer-Int'l BMI—La Valle Del Cielo] Pretty full ork sound on a lovely "western"-like theme.

ANGELA MARTIN (Portrait 101)

(B+) "GUAGLIONE" (2:36) [Fred Raphael ASCAP—Fanciulli, Nosa] Newly formed N.Y. label bows in engaging rock fashion, with the lark essaying the famed Italian ditty (in both Italian & English) against a jaunty combo sound. Might have a chart go.

(B) "MY LOCKET LOST A PICTURE" (2:15) [Darnel BMI—Regney, Arthur] Songstress pleasingly handles the pretty plaintive. Good-sounding sax sound spotlights the setting sound.

THE INTERNATIONAL POP ORCH. (Cameo 188)

(B+) "IF YOU LOVE ME (Really Love Me)" (2:30) [Duchess BMI—Monnot, Piau] Label's new ork attraction, comprised of 110 musicians, delivers a lush, keyboard-led reading of the beautiful evergreen. Big chorus has a soft sans-lyric role. Solid mood session from the ork's first LP.

(B) "THEME FROM CARMEN (Habanera)" (2:01) [Lowe ASCAP] Famed "Carmen" tune is colorfully rendered by the ork-chorus.

LESTER LANIN ORCH. (Epic 9444)

(B+) "BOW AND ARROW" (2:00) [Joli BMI—Lanin] Surprise! No society beat here as the Lanin heads a potent rock-a-string romp on the "William Tell Overture," known popularly as the Lone Ranger theme. Lanin could follow theme. Lanin could follow in the Top 100 footsteps of Lawrence ("Calcutta") Welk with this exciting rock date.

(B+) "BELLS" (2:08) [Peer Int'l BMI—Almeda, Kampfert, Moesser] More rock-slanted sounds, this time featuring an appropriate light-beat chimes gimmick.

LITTLE ANTHONY (Apollo 755)

(B+) "THE FIRES BURN NO MORE" (2:10) [Bess BMI—Gourdine] From the popular teen songster's Apollo association comes a strong lost-love statement. Tune and interpretation could get this portion big chart recognition.

(B) "I KNOW (Lift Up Your Head)" (2:18) [Bess BMI—Gourdine] Performer and combo offer a good attack here.

LES PAUL & MARY FORD (Columbia 41994)

(B+) "JURA (I Swear I Love You)" (2:16) [Iris-Trojan BMI—Sinho, Arr: Paul] Team could make a chart comeback with this sprightly portrayal of a tuneful ditty. Mary employs her famed "echo" sound while hubby Les supplies his usual effective guitar sounds. Eye it.

(B) "IT'S BEEN A LONG, LONG TIME" (2:45) [Edwin H. Morris ASCAP—Cahn, Styne] Nice easy-go, no-gimmick reading of the pretty evergreen.

DICK ROMAN (Epic 9442)

(B+) "JUST FOR ME" (1:44) [B. F. Wood ASCAP—Manning, Germano] Teeners get solid rock sparkle via the fine songster's multi-tracked belt of a catchy tune against an exciting rock-a-string (& chorus) setting. Might have a chart go.

(B) "DON'T TELL ME WHY" (3:03) [Bourne ASCAP—Shanklin, Sherman, Magental] Performer appealingly handles the cozy plaintive.

ELTON ANDERSON (Mercury 71777)

THE HEIGHTS HIGH MEN'S CHORUS (Decca 31243)

(B) "THEY CALL THE WIND MARIA" (2:06) [Chappell ASCAP—Loewe, Lerner] Chorus, under Clair T. McElfrish's direction capably catch the folk drama of the great number from Lerner-Loewe's "Paint Your Wagon."

Album Reviews

POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

"RING-A-DING DING!"—Frank Sinatra—Reprise R-1001

The first package from Reprise is naturally a Sinatra session and in it Sinatra reprises some of his big performances of years-back as well as adding a couple of more songs to his all-encompassing repertoire. With jazz-oriented Johnny Mandel providing the vibrant swinging arrangements, Sinatra offers up his best on such treasures as "Let's Fall In Love," "The Coffee Song," "A Foggy Day," "You And The Night And The Music" and "I've Got My Love To Keep Me Warm." What better beginning for a new label?

"I'LL BUY YOU A STAR"—Johnny Mathis—Columbia CL 1623

Mathis never swung as well as he does here for he now has the experienced arranging-conducting hand of Nelson Riddle to guide him efficiently through the ropes. The upbeat is embraced best on the title tune, "When My Sugar Walks Down The Street" and "Ring The Bell." Ballads, of course, are the Mathis forte, and here he offers his finely sensitive stylishness to "Stairway To The Stars," "Smile" and "Love Look Away." Undoubtedly, a sales bonanza.

"THE TOUCH OF YOUR LIPS"—Nat King Cole—Capitol W 1574

A program of twelve love ballads are portrayed with deep-feeling tenderness by the artist. Singing such warmers as "I Remember You," "Sunday, Monday Or Always," "A Nightingale Sang In Berkeley Square" and "Illusion" (his latest single release), Cole luxuriates in plush string atmospheres created by Ralph Carmichael. An immaculate production in the great Cole tradition. Huge selling potential.

"EMOTIONS"—Brenda Lee—Decca DL 4104

A treasury of varied emotions are surveyed by the young thrush with feelings belying her years. "Emotions," her current in a long string of hits, leads off thrillingly and leads into a rocking "Just Another Lie," the bristling novelty "Crazy Talk," a warm and tender ballad reading of the chestnut "When I Fall In Love," and an earthy bluesy treatment of "Georgia On My Mind." Others of equal interest abound here. Exciting showcase for a versatile talent.

"HAWAII"—Santo & Johnny—Canadian-American CALP 1004

The two guitar-playing youngsters offer their fans a teen eye's view of the 50th State via a dozen performances of Hawaiian and similarly associated melodies. Backstopped by Hutch Davies' rock-a-string ork direction, they contribute readings of "Adventures In Paradise," "Hawaiian War Chant," "Now Is The Hour," "Sweet Leilani" and others. Has strong teen appeal.

"DICK GREGORY IN LIVING BLACK & WHITE"—Colpix CP 417

The most sensational new comic to come along since Bob Newhart, Dick Gregory has the entire country (except maybe the south) awaiting this disk. It was cut live during his engagement at Chicago's plush Playboy Club and the realism of an in-person performance is so exact it even includes Gregory putting down a heckler. Gregory's style is similar to Mort Sahl's in that his repertoire is based upon current events. But Gregory's delivery is less intense, more relaxed and good-natured in its kidding. Most importantly, Gregory concentrates on the integration problem and Negro life—the first of his race to approach so delicate a situation. Album is a sure-fire winner!

"THE WHAM OF SAM"—Sammy Davis Jr.—Reprise R-2003

The entertainer is posed here in two completely different attitudes. Side one, with Morty Stevens' swashbuckling arrangements for big band, is a walloping, shouting Sammy on such sides as "Back In Your Own Back Yard," "The Tender Trap" and "Out Of This World." Side two is Sammy better than he's ever been on records. Marty Paich's subtle, clever arrangements (with small band) gently push Sammy (rather than shove) through six other top standards. Here is where the singer proves his big talent. A grand set of performances.




"BRIGHT AND SHINY"—Doris Day—Columbia CL 1614

The cheerful Doris Day musical personality is further enhanced by this splendid program of sunny songs which are surveyed in the usual relaxed, engaging Day manner. Neal Hefti helps out importantly with a set of orchestrations to match the mood. Among the tunes are "I Want To Be Happy," "Singing In The Rain," "Make Someone Happy," "Clap Yo' Hands" and "Happy Talk." The power of positive thinking in song.



"COZY"—Eydie Gorme & Steve Lawrence—Ultra Audio WWS 8509

Everything has been done to make this the coziest session yet, from the gently swinging backdrops (featuring guitar, vibes, muted brass and woodwind voicings) by Don Costa to the choice of material ("Blue Room," "Would You Like To Take A Walk," "Two Sleepy People," "It's So Nice To Have A Man Around The House") to the controlled singing of Steve and Eydie. It's an extremely pleasing, easy-on-the-ears, indeed "Cozy" date. Stereo is used effectively, with each voice emanating from different speakers, yet achieving a feeling of room movement.




"THINKING OF YOU"—Andre Previn, his piano and orchestra—Columbia CL 1595

Previn assumes triple threat proportions here in simultaneous roles as arranger, conductor and principal soloist. As pianist, he weaves an intriguing mood through the cleverly conceived arrangements, which vary from lush lilting strings to bouncy rhythms, oftentimes within the same song. Selections include "What's New," "Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me," "Hello My Lover, Goodbye" and "P.S. I Love You." Tasteful instrumental package.




"BLUE MOON"—The Marcels—Colpix CP 416

First album for the group that smashed its way to prominence via its unique treatment of the standard "Blue Moon." The five boys blend their voices in excellent rock 'n roll harmony and prove equally adept at ballads and rockers. But, considering the unusual sounds they achieved on "Blue Moon," they fall short here in unadventurous and undistinguished re-creations of past rock 'n roll hits, mimicking the original versions. Selections include "I'll Be Forever Loving You" (El Dorados), "Two People In The World" (Little Anthony & Imperials), "Sweet Was The Wine" (Jerry Butler & Impressions) and "Most Of All" (Moonglows).




"MORTY CRAFT AND THE SINGING STRINGS IN PERCUSSION"—Warwick W 5004 ST




"SOME LIKE IT HIP!"—Pat Harrington, Jr.—United Artists UAL 4088

Pat Harrington, Jr., also known to Jack Paar TV audiences as Guido Panzini, has gone into the niteries with his act. Here, during a stay at New York's Blue Angel, he has been recorded in performance in six pieces from his repertoire of which only one short bit is done as Guido Panzini. The humor is real hip and is delivered in fast talking Mort Sahl-manner. Lots of quick laughs for those in the know. Could be a good seller.



"CONCERTOS IN PERCUSSION"—The Warwick Symphony Orchestra—Warwick W 5005 ST

Ten famous pop revamps of classical themes are played in the heavily dramatic, full ork manner with melody of prime concern. Percussion is kept to a minimum, thankfully, and the superior music is allowed to flow freely. A solo violinist is featured and the effect of a strolling violinist is achieved by the movement between speakers. Selections include "Full Moon And Empty Arms," "Tonight We Love," "I'm Always Chasing Rainbows" and "Till The End of Time." Tops in musical entertainment.





Album Reviews

"DANCE BY THE LIGHT OF THE MOON"—The Olympics—Arvee A 424

The Olympics have racked up an impressive string of hits. Here in their second LP they perform hits "Dance By The Light Of The Moon," "Shimmy Like Kate" and "Little Pedro," their current chart success, and several new hard rock originals. An infectious, contagious session by one of the better proponents of the teen beat idiom.

"SPECTACULAR PERCUSSION GOES LATIN"—Roger King Mozian and his Orchestra—MGM E3921


The arranger-conductor-trumpeter shattered speakers first with "Spectacular Brass," then took it to the cha cha cha, and now ventures forth in a sparkling Latin concert. Various rhythms (easily accessible for dancing) set the pace for bristling lively treatments of "Put On A Happy Face," "The Sound of Music," "Softly As In A Morning Sunrise" and "What's New At The Zoo" among others. A contagious interplay between the brass and percussion keeps things zinging along at a sunny clip.

"THE MUSIC GOES 'ROUND AND 'ROUND"—Leo Addeo and his Orchestra—RCA Victor LSA-2353

Indeed, the music goes 'round and 'round, for Victor's engineers have made it so for this "Stereo Action" release. Addeo's unusually-instrumental ork features his harmonica, four ocarinas, four guitars, a bass accordion plus assorted rhythm and percussion. In total they produce an unusual ensemble sound that makes merry with such selections as "Let's Take A Walk Around The Block," "You'd Be Surprised," "Then I'll Be Happy" and "Don't Fence Me In."

"GIRLS OF MY DREAMS"—Frank Barclay & Harry Arnold—Atco 33-127

The cocktail-ish piano mannerisms of Frank Barclay is superimposed over the fragrantly romantic settings of Harry Arnold's ork in a liquid expression of sentimentality. Mood music lovers will treasure this session as one of the best in recent months. Selections include "Laura," "Ramona," "Louise," "Linda," "Cecilia" and "Nancy."



"BIG BRASS"—Benny Bailey—Candid 8011

From the sounds of this album, Benny Bailey is sorely missed on the American jazz scene. (He resides permanently in Europe.) He is extremely articulate, relying on a variety of natural devices for expression. His tone, open and muted, is well controlled and there is a completely relaxed naturalness in all his work. Though not intense and searching, he manages to be thoroughly original and inventive in his conceptions. Accompanied by sextet of top jazz musicians, he plays "Hard Sock Dance," "Alison," "Topsy" and "A Kiss To Build A Dream On." A delectable change of pace here.



"A RARE BATCH OF SATCH"—Louis Armstrong—RCA Victor LPM-2322

A dozen Louis Armstrong recorded performances from the early Thirties have been dug up by Victor and re-packaged here. The numbers, recorded with three bands—Chick Webb's, Mike McKendrick's and a pick-up group—shows Louis in various settings as an outstanding trumpeter, a great singer, a showman and sometimes comic. In all, it's a look at the entire personality of one of the greatest. Selections include "I Gotta Right To Sing The Blues," "Basin Street Blues," "High Society" and a rare, informal session, "Laughin' Louie." Collectors will be interested.




"THE HAP'NIN'S"—The Gigi Gryce Quintet featuring Richard Williams—Prestige/New Jazz 8246

A solid swinger with an uncompromising venturesome outlook on whatever he does, Gigi Gryce has been recorded here with his quintet in a vibrant blowing session. Trumpeter Richard Williams is featured and together, Gryce and Williams cut a neat figure on the ensemble passages as well as establish their fervent blues approach in solo work. Selections include standards "Frankie and Johnny," "Lover Man," and "Summertime."



"THE WARM MOODS"—Ben Webster—Reprise R-201

The most satisfying ballad artist in jazz for many years has been Ben Webster. His fat, warm, fog horn-like tone is a sheer delight on the moodier pops. Here he once again displays this forte in a program that includes "Stella By Starlight," "Time After Time," "It's Easy To Remember" and "Nancy." The string quartet accompaniment provided by arranger Johnny Richards is excessively saccharine and muddles the session but Webster manages to cut through the smog and emerge on top.



"THE CONTEMPORARY JAZZ CLASSICS OF THE PAUL MOER TRIO"—Del-Fi DFLP 1212

This album intros the fresh pianistic and writing talent of Paul Moer. He is extremely economical in his playing, seemingly choosing only the choice notes for expression, and favors understatement in setting the mood. With brass and drums accompaniment according to his sparse style, he offers improvisations of "I Love Paris," "We'll Be Together Again," "Azure Blues" and a handful of original compositions.

JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK

"EVOLUTION OF THE BLUES SONG"—Jon Hendricks—Columbia CL 1583

Jon Hendricks earned international accolades for his performance of "Evolution of the Blues Song" at last year's Monterey Jazz Festival. An original rhyming narrative directed basically at children for effect but actually a pointed lesson for adults, the work traces the beginnings of music through the spirituals, gospels, blues and jazz. Specific points are illustrated by performances by Hannah Dean, Big Miller, Pony Poindexter, Jimmy Witherspoon, the Ike Issacs Trio with Ben Webster and Hendricks himself. Over 44 minutes of stimulating listening and learning.

"THE SOUL OF JAZZ PERCUSSION"—Warwick W5003

Unlike previous attempts to mate jazz with percussive effects, this album comes off as an excellent jazz session, with percussion from the normal range of instruments enhancing the music in the same way that any fine jazz drummer dresses up a band with more than just timekeeping. Three different groups play a series of seven specially composed numbers (plus two others). Don Ellis and Pepper Adams contributing superb solo work. Finally, a superior stereo production for the jazz fans.

"SHADES OF REDD"—Freddie Redd Quintet—Blue Note 4045

Redd earned accolades for his music for the long-running off-Broadway hit, "The Connection." Here, with Jackie McLean (also of "Connection" fame), Tina Brooks, Paul Chambers and Louis Hayes, Redd contributes more of the earthy blues passion that stood him in good stead for the show. The ensemble passages are stirring portrayed in one-ness by the front line thespians and each displays a searching, soulful view solo-wise. Tunes are all Redd originals and include "Thespians," "Shadows," "Just A Ballad For My Baby."




CLASSICAL PICKS OF THE WEEK

"THE FOUR BRAHMS SYMPHONIES"—Otto Klemperer conducting the Philharmonia Orchestra—Angel 3614 D

An ultra deluxe package (similar to the Soria productions) houses an equally outstanding set of four disks on which are recorded Otto Klemperer's superb interpretations of the four Brahms symphonies. It is a masterful achievement in every aspect as Klemperer once again displays his penetration of Brahms' work. The "Tragic" and "Academic Festival" overtures fill out the deck nicely. A choice classical item.

GILBERT & SULLIVAN: "Iolanthe"—The D'Oyly Carte Opera Company—London OSA 1215

A complete new recording of G&S's "Iolanthe" by the D'Oyly Carte obsolesces the old mono version in the London catalog by the label's excellent use of stereo movement techniques in the recording. The complete work is offered on two disks plus complete libretto. G&S fans will delight in this new package.









Baker (Guaranteed Sales Co., Denver, John Billinis (Utah Sundries, Salt Lake City), Larry Rosmarin (Record Distributing Co., Houston), and Ken Sachs (Merchants Wholesale Co., Detroit).

Malamud announced the acceptance, by NARM's board of directors, of seven labels, bringing NARM's associate membership to thirty-five. They are: MGM, Kapp, Reprise, Cameo, Colpix, Vee Jay and Treasure.

In addition to the business agenda, many social activities are planned, topped by the NARM Awards Dinner-Dance. Recording artists will be present to accept awards for themselves and other recording artists of the same label. The announcement from Glen C. Becker, chairman of the awards and entertainment committee will be forthcoming shortly.

Weiss expects to make the trip in four weeks, returning to Paris early in May. Following his Paris return, he will plane to London for meetings with WB licensee, Decca/England, to discuss immediate plans for new singles promotion plus the scheduling of LP and EP product for the fall season.

During the time of his Burbank visit, Weiss reviewed all international matters with president Conkling, and they outlined future operational plans in the continued expansion of the label via its foreign manufacturing and distributing organizations.

See FTC Action To Dismiss Remaining Payola Charges

NEW YORK—Dismissal of Federal Trade Commission payola complaints against labels and distributors are in the works, according to FTC lawyers.

Thinking is that the recent amendment of the Communication Act, one of the results of the payola-TV quiz investigation by Congress in 1959, now makes undercover payments to deejays and stations a Federal crime, punishable by fines up to \$10,000 and a year in prison, and thus complaints

lodged before the amendment was made law would only result in minor convictions if the FTC proves guilt.

It was announced last week that FTC lawyers moved to dismiss payola charges against Capitol Records Distributing, Columbia Records, Dot Records and Interstate Electric Co., a New Orleans distrib.

In addition, the original FTC charges, which began in Dec. of 1959, includes complaints of disk freebies to stations, now OK under the amendment.

Other firms which, either by consent or dismissal, would be in the immediate future involved in FTC action to settle payola complaints are Decca Distributing, Roulette Records, Chess, Checker, & Argo, Bigtop, Mutual Distributors, of Boston, Apex Producing, of Chicago, and Era Records, of Hollywood.

The FTC has brought action against 103 companies, of which about ninety-two have been settled.

Mercury Names Davis Denver Distrib

NEW YORK—Mercury Records has appointed Davis Sales, of Western Appliances, as its distrib in the Denver area. Western recently opened a disk division as part of their wholesale appliance distribution set-up.

The deal was set through Kenny Myers, Mercury veep in charge of sales for Mercury and Don Thron, general manager of Davis, who was formerly western regional sales manager for Mercury under Myers until his move to Davis last summer.

The move takes place April 15, with Davis setting up a separate sales and promotion force to handle the Mercury line, with Mercury salesmen retaining their positions with Davis.

20th Fox To Issue French Disks Here

NEW YORK—20th Century-Fox Records has just concluded a deal with Ray Ventura's Versailles Records, of Paris, France, for the release of two LP's a year, including singles, by Caravelli and His Magic Violins. The first album, due this month, contains current European favorites.

Caravelli is a new arranger-conductor, discovered by vet producer-band-leader Ventura, and was the recent recipient of the Saint Germain Award for arranging and conducting, given under the auspices of the French Government by Andre Malraux, French Minister of Culture.

The Caravelli contract was set between Henry Onorati, 20th-Fox President and Duke Niles, Ventura's U.S. rep.

Frey Back From Brazil; Notes Success There

NEW YORK—Sidney Frey, president of Audio Fidelity Records, and George Demko, comptroller for the firm, recently returned from a six week business trip in Brazil to review the operation of Audio Fidelity do Brazil, which is reportedly the only U.S. indie in Brazil. In its first fifteen months, the firm has met with "great success," the label said.

AF artists reported as meeting with success in Brazil include Jo Basile, particularly with an LP tagged "Rio With Love," Johnny Puelo and Mohammed El Bakkar with his "Port Said" album.

During his stay, Frey cut two albums due for release here soon, one with Brazilian carnival and march music, the other consisting of jazz interpretations of typical Brazilian rhythms.

Frey last week received a "good will ambassador" award from Raul Smandek of the Brazilian Consulate, who presented the award to Frey last Friday (8) at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, where Frey was attending the Hi-Fidelity Show.

ASCAP Mails Ballot For Amendment Vote

NEW YORK — ASCAP President Stanley Adams announced last week that ballots have been sent to the writer and publisher members of the Society for a membership vote on an amendment to the Articles of Association. The amendment, which is unanimously sponsored by the twenty-four members of the board of directors and the sixteen members of the writers advisory committee, would change the existing bylaws to enable an amendment to be carried if it is supported by two-thirds of those who actually vote.

In his letter to the membership sent out with the ballots, Adams pointed out that this would do away with the present system under which votes which are not cast are counted as negative votes. Under present rules, which the proposed amendment seeks to change, the Articles of Association cannot be amended unless two-thirds of the potential votes are cast in favor. Previous mailing failed to achieve this vote.

Ballots which were sent out March 31 must be returned to the society's offices not later than midnight April 21.



Songs By Rodgers & Lerner To Have B'way Bow In '62 Musical

NEW YORK—The announcement last week that Richard Rodgers and Alan Jay Lerner would collaborate on a musical for presentation in the fall of 1962, seems like an ideal match from an LP sales standpoint. Each has been responsible for some of the industry's biggest-selling packages. Rodgers melodies are heard in such original-cast LP bonanzas as "Oklahoma!," "South Pacific," "The King & I" and "The Sound of Music," while Lerner's lyrics are heard in three all-time album sellers, "Brigadoon," "Gigi," and "My Fair Lady."

The Rodgers & Lerner team has a lot to live up to. In a seventeen year association with Oscar Hammerstein, ended by Hammerstein's death last summer, Rodgers, 58, wrote the music of such standout shows of the early Forties and Fifties as "Oklahoma!," "Carousel," "South Pacific" and "The King & I" and "The Sound of Music." Before the Rodgers & Hammerstein bow with "Oklahoma!" in 1943 Rodgers was already established as a top Broadway composer, having written with the late Lorenz Hart twenty-seven musicals, including "The Garrick Gaieties," the 1925 review that was the team's first big success, "A Connecticut Yankee," "Babes In Arms," "The Boys from Syracuse" and "Pal Joey," probably Rodgers & Hart's greatest effort. Hart died in 1943, ending Rodgers' exclusive association with Hart of almost twenty-five years.

Lerner, 44, who since 1943 has written mostly with composer Frederick Loewe, is the lyricist and librettist (with Loewe's melodies) of "My Fair Lady," which may prove to be the most successful musical of all time. Other hit Lerner & Loewe collaborations include "Brigadoon," "Paint Your Wagon," the film "Gigi" and the current "Camelot." Loewe recently announced that he was quitting the rigors of show music writing for about eighteen months.

Out of three book possibilities, Rodgers & Lerner last week revealed only one: a musical based on the life of Gabrielle (Coco) Chanel the French dress-designer.

Before Rodgers & Lerner songs are heard, the public will listen to tunes

with both music and words by Rodgers himself. After Hammerstein's death, Rodgers announced he would write both the music and words for new songs to be part of a new film version of the 1945 Rodgers & Hammerstein pic musical, "State Fair." In addition, Rodgers last week announced that he would go it alone on songs for a new musical, particulars on which he would not reveal.

Capitol Cuts Christian Bros.

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records has recorded The Christian Brothers, the internationally famous radio quartet of the Church of God, under an exclusive recording contract announced by Alan W. Livingston, vice president for creative services.

The hymn-singing quartet is scheduled for its Capitol album debut in May. They record under the supervision of Executive Artists-&Repertoire Producer Ken Nelson.

Consisting of four ordained ministers of the Church of God, the Christian Brothers have been featured on radio's Christian Brotherhood Hour for over eight years. The program is broadcast on more than 200 radio stations throughout the world.

Although the group has toured extensively, they spend a great deal of their time at separate widely-scattered ministerial assignments: first tenor Ron Patty in Phoenix, Ariz.; second tenor Doug Oldham, Indianapolis, Ind.; baritone Paul Clausen, Long Beach, Calif.; and bass Ernie Gross, Chicago. They gather periodically in Chicago to make tape recordings for the radio programs.

NEW YORK—The Professional Music Men (PMM), the non-profit association of song pluggers and publishers' promotion men, will have its annual outing at Shawnee, Pa. on June 14 & 15, it was announced last week.

Capitol Issues "2,000 Years" LP on Own Label

NEW YORK—Capitol Records this week (10) is releasing on its own label the click LP, "2000 Years with Carl Reiner & Mel Brooks." All rights to the LP were purchased by Capitol last month from the World Pacific label.

Del Shannon was born in Grand Rapids, Michigan, December 30, 1939. It wasn't until he was 14 that he showed musical inclinations. At that time he began playing the guitar and singing. After high school graduation in 1957 he entered the Army. Stationed in Germany as a radioman, he auditioned for and won a spot as a guitarist on the 7th Army's production of "Get Up And Go," in Stuttgart.

After discharge, dates at local clubs and dances kept him busy until he was spotted by disk jockey Ollie McLaughlin of WHRV in Ann Arbor. McLaughlin arranged an audition for Shannon for Harry Balk and Irving Micahnik of Embee Productions, an indie producing firm in Detroit. Immediately, a record session in New York was set up for the lad which resulted in "Runaway," a smash on the Big Top label.

Gene McDaniels



After attracting attention to his talents via single recordings of "In Times Like These" and "Green Door," Gene McDaniels has broken into the national spotlight with the smash "A Hundred Pounds of Clay." Two Liberty albums ("In Times Like These" and "Sometimes I'm Happy, Sometimes I'm Blue") also attest to the youngster's vocal ability.

Born in Kansas City, Kansas, Feb. 12, 1935, Gene's strongest early influence was his father, a Reverend. At 13 he joined and toured with a gospel group. During high school in Omaha, he played sax in the school ork and excelled in basketball. After HS he formed his own quartet which included everything from gospel to jazz in its repertoire. While touring with the group Gene found time to attend Omaha Univ., Nebraska Univ. and the Omaha Conservatory of Music. Upon signing with Liberty Records, Liberty's president then, Si Waronker, now chairman of the board, was moved to comment, "Gene McDaniels has a future as exciting and far-reaching as his unusual talent."



Artia Sets Mid-April Issue Of 10 Albums

NEW YORK—Artia Recording Corporation announces ten new LP's as its mid-April release. Five of these will appear on Artia and five on Parliament, Artia's \$1.98 line.

Another stereo recording, of Dvorak's Slavonic Dances, coupled with excerpts from Smetana's Bartered Bride, is a specially priced two-record "demonstration" edition. Rounding out the release is a recording of Polish Folk Songs and Dances, introducing to American audiences the Polish Army Chorus.

The Parliament release contains recordings of Handel's Water Music, Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 5, Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 5, the "Emperor," and two collections of light classics.

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



Bolet has cut two Everest albums on release, both containing Liszt music, and a third LP, set for August release, will benefit from a special promotion by Everest.

president, FTC attorneys have asked the Commission to dismiss the complaint, indicating that they consider prosecution of the matter "an unnecessary expenditure of time, effort and funds . . ."

Commenting on the FTC action, Maitland said:

"The Commission apparently now concurs with CRDC's continuing belief that giving records to radio stations for normal broadcast use does not violate any Federal law. Naturally, we are extremely pleased at this vindication of our company's position. At the same time, we can only regret the adverse publicity that is inevitably connected with a complaint of the kind originally filed by the FTC."

On July 22, 1960, at the time of the FTC's initial action, Maitland issued the following statement:

"CRDC is surprised and shocked by the FTC complaint charging that it has engaged in the practice of 'payola' . . . We have always taken great pride in the integrity of our operation. As a matter of company policy, we have not and do not indulge in the practice of 'payola', and we deeply regret that the Commission has put us in the position before our colleagues in the recording and broadcasting industry, and before the public, of having conducted our business in a manner which the FTC deems questionable."

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

ENGLAND

A healthy upward trend in the sales of records is revealed by the Board of Trade figures for 1961. Valued at 1,643,000 pounds, sales were 20 per cent more than in the first month of last year and 3 per cent more than the previous highest January sales achieved in 1958. However, export sales continued to decline and were 6 per cent less than in January 1960. While 8 per cent more 45 r.p.m. disks were produced than in January last year production of 33 r.p.m. disks remained unchanged. Production of 78 r.p.m. disks continued to drop by 38 per cent.

Pye Records has launched a new label on the British market—Piccadilly. Borne of necessity owing to the enormous growth of the Pye label. Piccadilly will be treated entirely independent with a separate exploitation team headed by Ian Ralfini. Although most of the artists and material for release on Piccadilly will be taken from leased tape produced by independent production companies individual artists will later be signed. First single releases are "Crazy Mixed Up Kid" by Joe Brown and "Code Of Love" by Ronnie Hall. Release date is April 14.

Louis Benjamin, assistant general manager of Pye, returned from his American trip much impressed with the enthusiasm and activity of stateside independents, particularly their exploitation methods. He much appreciated the interest shown by American executives during exchanges of ideas concerning our two markets and now has a much clearer idea of American thinking. Benjamin feels that any progressive English company would always find plenty of scope for business with the States. As a result of his trip the following British recordings will be released in America. "Samantha" by Kenny Ball and "Dream Harbour" by Gary Mills—both on Jamie; Petula Clark's "Something Missing" and Joe Brown's "Shine"—both on Warwick, "Midi-Midinettes" by Joe Henderson (Kapp) and "Warpaint" by The Brook Brothers (London).

Sid Nathan, president, and Hal Neely, general manager, of King Records of America, together with the company's attorney and station relations manager, Jack Pearl, and Saul Halper, were in London via Paris and Frankfurt. On the continent they had meetings with Bernard Taylor (Odeon)—King's French distributors; Paul Montoya (Eurpac)—representatives of King Records to the U.S. Forces in Germany; Ted Cross of Pathe-Marconi (EMI Group) and Rudi Revil of Editions Tropical which looks after King's publishing interest in France. They were joined in Paris by Dr. Veder and Conrad Wirtz of Electrola—distributors for King in Germany and Austria. A highlight of their London visit was a specially convened meeting, under the chairmanship of Mr. R. Dawes, at EMI's Manchester Square headquarters. Those attending were L. G. Wood (managing director), Roland Rennie and A. M. Smith, of EMI; P. F. Gardiner Hill, G. Alexander and Harry Walters of EMI international division, Hank Stibbe (Holland), John Paul (Denmark), Ivan Nordstrom (Sweden) and Emile Garin (Belgium) who handle the King and Bethlehem repertoire in their respective territories. The European tour was designed to develop closer liaison and co-ordination of functions with members of the EMI group and to more effectively expose the King repertoire. As a result of the visit, King will release certain material, both singles and albums, from EMI's U.K. and Continental companies in the States. King's European music publishing outlet, Lois Ltd., is handled in the UK by Jimmy Phillips of Peter Maurice.

Harry Walters, of EMI pop repertoire international division, recently returned from six weeks in Africa investigating the effectiveness of their pop operation there. Of the record scene generally, Walters reports that in a market wide open for expansion a major problem is that, despite an all out effort, manufacturers have so far failed to bring about a switch in sales from 78 r.p.m. to 45 r.p.m. disks. Distribution also presents a major difficulty in view of the long distances involved and to minimize the cost of breakages it is virtually important that 78's should be superseded as soon as possible. Another problem is the lack of any authoritative hit parade. This, at present, is based on requests received by dj's of the local stations and Walters urged the industry to instigate a hit parade based on dealers returns of record sales. Recordings by top American and British artists of the caliber of Elvis Presley, Cliff Richard and Connie Francis are in great demand. These artists realize sales of 12,000-15,000 in a territory where 8,000-10,000 is normally considered a good sale. It is hoped that the success of the present Cliff Richard-Shadows tour will encourage African consolidated theatres to consider inviting more top line British artists. Walters, via The Cash Box, extends his thanks to members of the industry whom he met for their wholehearted co-operation during his visit.

It was a pleasure to meet Peter F. Baumberger of RCA Victor's international division, New York, during his recent visit to London. He was later joined by vice-president J. Reist, and after discussions concerning future plans of RCA Great Britain Ltd., the two men left for Rome and Bombay. They plan to return to London at the end of April.

While in New York earlier this year, Harold Fields of Fields Music London, concluded a deal with Mickey Glass and Dee Belline of Perry Como's Roncom Music to represent them in England and the continent of Europe. Having been associated with Roncom Music for several years Fields has acquired the copyrights of much material recorded by Como. This will now be transferred to the newly formed Roncom Music Co., establishing a catalog of some 80 songs. First numbers to be handled under the new agreement are "When You And I Were Young, Maggie" and "Especially For The Young" both from Como's latest LP "For The Young At Heart," to be released here on RCA.

Noel Rogers of Dominion Music currently in the States for discussions with Mike Stewart of Dominion Music, New York, and the personnel of United Artists whose catalog he handles in the UK. Rogers is also visiting Hollywood for the 33rd Annual 'Oscar' show of AMPAS for which "Never On Sunday," published here by United Artists, has been nominated. Rogers has recently acquired the American song "Little Lonely One."

Felix Stahl, musical director of Stockholm Musik Produktion in London for discussions with English publishers including Harry Lewis of Marlyn Music, publishers of "Are You Sure," for which Stahl has the Scandinavian rights.

Tin Pan Alley Music has the American hit, "100 Pounds Of Clay," via Gil Music. With the lyrics of the original version banned by the BBC, Craig Douglas has waxed two versions—both released on Top Rank. Agent and manager Bunny Lewis possibly bringing Johnny & The Hurricanes to London in September.

Teddy Holmes of Chappells, publishers of "Exodus," looking forward to meeting the composer, Ernest Gold, arriving here from the States for the film's London premiere May 9. The number currently released here by Ferrante & Teicher (London), Semprini (HMV), Mantovani (Decca), Michael Freedman (Orion), International Pop Orchestra (Columbia) and Pat Boone—vocal version (London). RCA releases the original LP sound track in May. An LP by The Hollywood Studio Orchestra on London due in June. Chappells handles the fast-climbing "On The Rebound"—original Floyd Cramer waxing issued on RCA with a cover version by Ken Jones on Parlophone. Forthcoming musicals

Mariano Rapetti, manager of pop music of Ricordi-Milano, visited Editions Altona, Amsterdam, and congratulated Wim van Vught on the wonderful Dutch recording on the Polydor label of "Mais Oui," waxed by well-known Marcel Thielemans. Although this title is recorded all over Europe, Rapetti preferred the Dutch version in spite of the fact that he only could understand these two words: "Mais Oui!"

Music publisher **Joop Portengen** rejoices on the fast growing international interest in his Dutch production: the song "Amore Mia (Wann Kommst Du Wieder)" was recorded by Scandinavian top-star Siw Malmkvist last week; "The Amsterdam Waltz" was inserted in the French motion picture "Marche Ou Creve (Go Or Die)", which will be released all over Europe. Meisel Verlag, Berlin and Southern, London, bought the rights of another Portengen-hit, "Ay Ay Caballero," both publishers expecting great possibilities on this song.

Both winning numbers of the Eurovision Song festival are published in Holland by Editions Altona. "Nous Les Amoureux" will be recorded in Dutch by Jan van der Most for L.C. Phonogram. A & R-manager Jan de Winter has chosen the big German title "Jenny" for the flip-side. This title is also a publication of Editions Altona. The original recording of the winning song "Nous Les Amoureux" by Jean Claude Pascal was brought on the market by L.C. Bovema within two days after the Cannes contest. "Are You Sure," Englands winner, number two in Cannes, is already released by L.C. Phonogram and A & R manager Jan de Winter is preparing a Dutch cover record by a new young couple. The song will be recorded in German by the famous Blue Diamonds. "Non Je Ne Regrette Rien," published in Holland by Editions Altona, is climbing up in the charts. The original Edith Piaf recording doing solid sales. Dutch cover recordings were made by Corry Brokken and Rie Helmig, and both are getting action.

The old German hit song "Erst Schwört Man Treu (The First Oath Is Fidelity)" will be republished by Bassart in a new version. Bassart has many of these old German evergreens on its repertoire and once republished in a new version, they seem to have great possibilities. Artone purchased the Laurie master "Little Lonely One" by The Jarmels for immediate release.

Phonogram Director **Theo Van Der Meer** just left for Milan. Old timer Pee Wee Erwin with The Dixie Strutters go "Down By The Riverside" on his new LP on the London label. Wonderful versions of "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot," "When The Saints Go Marching In," "Careless Love," "Just A Closer Walk With Thee" and some other steady favorites are on this jazzy LP (L.C. Phonogram). On "Great Golden Hits," Billy Vaughn and his orchestra swing the great instrumentals of the late thirties and early forties. Quite a different sound for those who know Billy from "Sail Along Silv'ry Moon" and other hits with his sax gimmick. Favorites from the band books of Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, Glen Gray's Casa Loma Orchestra, Tommy Dorsey and Charlie Barnet are included, such as "Little Brown Jug," "Opus One," "No Name Jive" and "A String Of Pearls" (London).

Three records with selections from famous operettas were released last week on the Decca label: "Gräfin Mariza" by **Emmerich Kálmán**, "Der Betelstudent" by Carl Millöcker and "Der Graf Von Luxemburg" by **Franz Léhár**. These operettas are still beloved in the low countries and are released by L.C. Phonogram.

A happy swinger in the Warner Bros. repertoire is "Swing Fever" by Hammond organ-player **Buddy Cole**. "I certainly expect to get a lot of demand for this album," says C. Pompe, Bovema's Warner Bros. label manager.

Bovema was the first in Europe to release the Dutch (national) version of the current German success "Drei Weisse Birken," sung by **Uschi und Peter** on the Imperial-label. New releases of the Imperial-label in Holland are "Parijs Ligt Aan De Seine" by **De Vrolijke Zangers** and the Dutch version of the well-known hit "Sucu Sucu."

Pete Felleman, manager of Funckler Records—a division of Artone—told The Cash Box that his current top-selling singles include: "Kili-Watch" (The Cousins), "Hava Nagila" (The Barry Sisters), "You Talk Too Much" (Joe Jones), "Kana Kapila" (The Cousins), and "Tumbala-Lika" (The Barry Sisters). **John James Vis** told The Cash Box that Artone's top five singles include: "Sucu Sucu" (Eddy Christiani), "Carolina Dai" (Rocco Granata), "The Story Of My Love" (Paul Anka), "Vaya Con Dios" (The Virtues) and "Al Di La" (Milva).

Hot news from Bovema's Columbia-label: **Edith Piaf's** "Non Je Ne Regrette Rien" reaching the 60,000 sales figure **Robert Oeges**, Columbia label manager, believes that the record will beat the results of "Milord," which was Piaf's big hit one year ago.

Famous Dutch comedians, **De Wama's**, have a new record that is bound to become a big seller: "Doet U Mee Met De B.B.?" and "Striptease Blues," on the Decca label. Also on Decca is a new 45 single record of the now world famous **Blue Diamonds**. Two more good old songs in the Diamonds way, with orchestra directed by their coach **Jack Bulterman**: "In A Little Spanish Town" and "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles." Another "Ramona" is expected and Dutch record buyers will soon make this record the number one seller on the Best Sellers is the general belief.

Teenage music is always present on the London label. "Baby, Oh Baby" by The Shells and "Wait A Minute" by The Coasters are among the latest additions. This week we welcome **Eydie Gorme** on the London label, who joins her husband in "The Facts Of Life" and "I'm A Girl, You're A Boy." Other single releases worth mentioning are "Theme From Exodus" by Ferrante & Teicher and "The Exodus Song" by **Pat Boone**.

Artone's A & R Chief **Lion J. Swaab** just recorded **Rijk de Gooyer**, one of Holland's prominent radio- and tv-personalities for the label. Rijk de Gooyer is currently active on the German movie scene.

In this years' internationally famous festival at the little village of **Blokker**, the following artists are expected among others: **Rex Gildo**, **Jan & Kjeld**, **Louis Armstrong All Stars**, **Heidi Brühl**, **The Blue Diamonds**, **Conny Froboess** and **Connie Francis**. In the near future, jazz-concerts will be given in Amsterdam by the **Thelonious Monk Quartet** (15th April) and **Mahalia Jackson** (22nd April). The **Cannonball Adderley Quintet** recently appeared there.

There's an extremely great demand for the full-color Capitol-catalog, which was offered by **Mr. Hundepool**, Bovema's Capitol-captain, for Dutch consumers. Thousands of cards and requests were received at Gramophone House.

Frank Visser, MGM's label manager for Bovema, told The Cash Box that **Mark Dinning** is making a wonderful comeback with "Top Forty, News And Sports" in the novelty field. MGM's newest release is the mono-and stereo-version of **Leroy Holmes**, LP, containing his own composition "Tara Lara." Holland also releases a Dutch manufactured **Conway Twitty** hit, "Sorry" with "Pretty Eyed Baby" on the flipside.

Latin-American singer **Carmela** made a wonderful impression when she sang recently at the International Culture Centre in Amsterdam and on Dutch TV the following day. Her first LP, just released, is already in high demand; it is released by L.C. Phonogram, on the Fontana label.

"Paris Jam Session," a live recording (December 18th, 1959) of **Art Blakey's Jazz Messengers** with **Bud Powell** and **Barney Wilen**, is a welcome new release for all modern jazz fans, on Fontana (L.C. Phonogram).



ITALY

All the European representatives of Philips convened two weeks ago in Milan for the annual meeting of this international record company. Attending were, Mr. Langenberg of Holland, Mr. Van Der Meer of Holland, Mr. Meyerstain of France, Mr. Lebbink of Belgium, Mr. Gould of England, Mr. Scharde of Germany, Mr. Lofberg of Sweden, Mr. Sampedro of Spain, and Mr. Baron of Italy. I had the opportunity of seeing them at the Palace Hotel and talked in particular with Mr. Langenberg who told me, "First of all, I wish to express my gratitude to the publishers of **The Cash Box** for the help they give us in the record business and mainly for their efforts in getting all of us of the music world together. This year, for the first time, we meet in Italy, which we consider a particularly enjoyable position because of strict cooperation between music and record producers. Each of our representatives in Europe has a domestic cast of singers and we are trying to select those who have real possibilities for international success." They were a little surprised to learn that the Italian record business is not as prosperous as they thought, as the general opinion abroad is that Italy is enjoying a period of prosperity. Therefore, it is thought that records are selling well here. I had the pleasure of finding out that some of our singing artists such as, Mina Celentano and Peppino di Capri were well known by the people I met.

Connie Francis, who keeps the number 2 position on the Italian chart with "Jealous Of You," visited Milan and was feted by Milan's music world at a cocktail party held at Terrazza Martini. Connie enjoyed good popularity here after the publication of her above mentioned hit record. Gene Moretti of MGM accompanied her and told us she has waxed "Lili Marlene" in Milan, the well know German tune which was a hit during the last war. Before her stay in Milan, she stopped in Rome appearing on the Winter Garden TV Show, the main music show aired each Saturday night.

Ivan Mogull, New York publisher stopped in Milan for four days. He sold the rights to "Pony Time" to music publishing house Durium, which also will have it waxed by Little Tony. The song will be recorded by Colin Hicks on Italdisc as well. The original hit version by Chubby Checker on Parkway, will soon be distributed by Mr. Sugar of C.G.D., who also appreciated "You Can Have Her" (the other song which Mogull brought to Europe) and means to give the song to Dorelli or Betty Curtis for an Italian recording. Mogull was accompanied to the most important Italian music publishers in Milan and to some record producers by the Italian rep of **The Cash Box**. He is visiting Milan for the second time and all the music people here know and like him for his dynamic personality. He has also acquired a lot of Italian materials to be waxed in the States.

Mr. Casetta of Bluebell, who just returned from the States, had a conference with me and stated, "We will immediately release "Blue Moon" by The Marceles on Colpix, currently number 1 in the States, and we are sure it will have great success in Italy as well. To promote it, we mean also to picture the page of **The Cash Box** Top 100, where it appears as number one and distribute 2,000 copies to the record shops in Italy. The other strong record I brought from the States is "I've Told Every Little Star" by Linda Scott on Canadian American. I was in New York and Los Angeles primarily to visit the people I represent in Italy (Chancellor, Canadian American, Colpix and others) who expressed their satisfaction in cooperating with me. Very soon some others will be added to these, as I secured the representation of new record lines. I wish to thank the publishers of **The Cash Box** which, especially with its international reporting, offers the possibility of more and more cooperation among the various countries. I noted that the importance of the European markets grew much in the States where, for instance, I found there is a serious lack of good new melodies, and possibly for this reason many big recording names prefer to pick old songs of the European catalogs, ("It's Now Or Never," "Surrender," "Jealous Of You," etc.)."

Alfredo Rossi, publisher of many Italian hits, visiting the States for the first time. He left Milan on March 30th and will spend ten days in New York.

Art Talmadge, when in Milan recently, also contacted Ladislav Sugar, and decided to give him the Italian representation of the United Artists label. Mr. Sugar recently got the Verve label as well.

Peppino Di Capri, one of our best selling singers, has waxed the old tune, "Parlami D'Amore Mariu" (Speak To Me Of Love, Mariu). The recording is expected to be a hit.

Nilla Pizzi, who now waxes for the Titanus record house, left Rome for Mexico City, where she is due for a series of concerts.

Johann Michel's 30th Year

MUNICH—Johann Michel celebrated 30 years as a music publisher last month. He is head of Melodie Der Welt, Francis Day and Hunter, Progress Music and J. Weinberg KG Publishers.

Michel began his publishing activities in his home town of Vienna, Austria. He came to Germany in 1953, beginning anew, and in the short span of seven years built up his firm into one of Germany's biggest publishing companies. Recently, Michel added the United Artists catalog to his files of leading German, European and American compositions.

In addition to his publishing activities, Michel also owns Reco One-Stop, one of the largest suppliers of records to juke boxes in central Germany.



GERMANY

The question that we brought up a few weeks ago about Lale Anderson and her award winning performance at the German Pop Festival has been answered. In order to preserve her present hit "Wenn Du Heim Kommst" ("When You Come Home"), she has yet to record her Festival winner.

The film "Pepe" has opened in Germany with the greatest promotion ever afforded a film and the song "Pepe" has moved to the top position on the Best Sellers at the same time. Dalida had the first recording on the market and is still in a leading position in sales, but the very popular Caterina Valente is close behind. Willy Hagara's Philips has closed a contract with Columbia Films to have his recording played exclusively in the theatres where "Pepe" is shown and his record is also over the 100,000 mark. Metronome also reports top sales on the Colpix album from the film.

Just to show what can happen to a tune when it becomes a world hit, music publisher Rolf Budde reports over 100 different European versions of "Calcutta" on the market.

It seems that a sure way to success is to record a song about Sailors and the sea. Right now, Peggy Brown is riding the charts with her "sea" number and Margot Eskens as well as Freddy have new tunes on their way to hitsville with the same basic theme.

Jacqueline and Lucienne Boyer have their first German recording on the market. Producer Nils Nobach of Electrola did a fine job with the mother-daughter team from France and the recording is beginning to show on a few charts.

Werner Mueller has done the only German recording of "Spanish Harlem" but as an instrumental! It's a sensational sound and could make noise in the international market. Melitta Berg is looking for another hit with her German version of the Italian San Remo winner "Al Di La." The German version reads "Du Bist Da" (You Are Here). Teldec reports that Elvis Presley's recording of "Surrender" is already past the 200,000 mark.

Publisher Karlheinz Busse reports that the newest sensation from the pens of Werner Scharfenberger and lyricist Fini Busch, "Harbor Ballad" by Peggy Brown hit the top of the Frankfurt hit parade run by DJ Hans Roth, and the top of the Stuttgart hit parade run by DJ Elmar Zimmer. In Stuttgart, the record got 35% of all the requests sent in. The number which was written by the same team that turned out Lolita's "Sailor" could also become a top hit. Watch for it!

Ted Herold's newest hit "Lonely" finished 3rd on the Frankfurt charts after only a few weeks of exposure.

Jean "Toots" Thielemans is still in Europe and doing well. Along with promoting his newest Polydor LP, he's set for a TV shot and a big show at RIAS, the American owned radio station in Berlin.

Peter Stephen, the new singer whose first record "Di Di O Day" is already topping charts all over the country, is working hard to promote his career. He's on the telephone personally with every top DJ and journalist in Germany thanking them for their help. It may cost plenty of loot, but watch the boy's next record zoom!

Pardon the Slip Department: The charming Miss Hilla Steidtner, who heads up the Atlas Music Publishing house in Berlin, called to let me know that she bought out her partnership with Will Meisel over 8 months ago, but we continued to list Atlas in connection with the Peter Meisel publishing house. The publishing firm is all Hilla's and the songs belong just to Atlas including the current Gus Backus smash "Da Sprach Der Alte Hauptling." The newest record from the house is "Why Not Cha Cha" recorded by Bert Kaempfert. Hilla and her publishing firm just moved to Munich from their present Berlin home.

Polydor orchestra leader Erwin Halletz has a new musical running for him in the Deutschen Theater in Munich. It's called "Dream Of Luek" and stars Marikka Roekk.

The top pop music-film magazine for teens, Bravo with readership of over 800,000 each week had its yearly contests to find the top male and female favorites in the pop field. The male winners were: 1. Freddy 2. Peter Kraus 3. Rex Gildo. Foreign singers represented in the top 30 were: 4. Elvis Presley 8. Gus Backus 9. Jan & Kjeld 10. Cliff Richard 12. Pat Boone 13. The Blue Diamonds 14. Paul Anka 15. Roeco Granata 17. Saeha Distel 18. Frank Sinatra 22. Dean Martin 23. Bill Ramsey 25. Harry Belafonte 26. Chris Howland 27. Vittorio 28. Laurie London.

In other words, 16 of the top 30 were foreigners and we didn't count Swiss born Vico Torriani as that is still a German speaking country. Freddy got 73,067 votes to capture first place.

Of the 17 in the list, 11 have made records in the German language. On the female side of the picture, the first three places went to: 1. Caterina Valente 2. Heidi Bruhl 3. Conny. Foreign females on the top 30 list were: 4. Connie Francis 7. Doris Day 8. Jacqueline Boyer 10. Edith Piaf 11. Melina Mercouri 13. Dalida 15. Nina & Frederik 16. Siw Malmquist 17. Brenda Lee 24. Ella Fitzgerald 26. Mahalia Jackson. Once again statistically 11 of the top 30 females were foreigners and we didn't count Italian born Caterina Valente, who has made most of her career here, Swiss born Lys Assia, who finished 21st, and Zarah Leander, who is also considered a "German" star.

Once again it is interesting to report that of the 11 winners from foreign lands 6 have made German language recordings. Caterina Valente needed 53,780 votes to get first place. Internationally, we're trying to point out that it's very interesting to make records in Germany even if you can't speak the language. If you don't believe it, just ask Connie Francis, who sold over 600,000 of her first German language release and Elvis Presley, who put just 2 eight bar phrases in his recording of "Wooden Heart" in German and has sold well over 1 million records of this song in Europe.

CANADA

ENGLISH NEWS

The new television independents in Canada have created new opportunities for Canadian artists. When Canada's board of broadcast governors decided to license independent TV stations in 1959, the big, publicly owned CBC faced the new competition with a smile. Now that the initial results from the independents are proving to be financially successful the CBC is beginning to feel a lot less comfortable about the experiment. With eight stations on the air, the oldest only seven months in operation, the independents can boast an unexpectedly quick audience acceptance. The programs being offered by the stations are a mixture of low budget local programs, along with movies and taped U.S. shows. These local programs play a significant role to the attributed success of the stations. Most of these local programs offer the viewers new Canadian talent in various fields of entertainment. This new found medium for the Canadian artist has added new hope of success to the struggling artist. In checking the ratings of the CBC against those of the new stations in Montreal & Toronto, the CBC is out-pollied by the independents. Since television today has the largest audience of all the mediums such as night clubs, movies, etc., we will witness in the next few years a fantastic growth of Canadian stars. This will certainly influence the Canadian record industry, in so far as producing these new found stars on record.

Bill Kearns, of Packaging Merchandising, starts off April with two album promotions for Quality Records. One on the Time 2000 Series and the other on Mercury's Perfect Presence Series, both aimed at offering the consumer better buying in premium merchandising.

Don Passerby, of All Star Attractions, recently back in Montreal after a one week promotion job in Quebec City. The promotion concerns the big show coming to the Show Mart in Montreal on the 14th & 15th; and the 16th in Quebec City at the Coliseum. The show head lines **Bobby Rydell** with **Freddy Cannon**, **Del Shannon**, **Bobby Comstock** and **The Counts**, **Michel Louvain**, **Muriel Millard**, **Dante**, **Piere Senecal**, and **Pierre Noles** and his Orchestra. Don will be returning to CFOX Lake Shore Radio after a two month leave.

FRENCH NEWS

Many letters from all parts of the world have been mailed to **The Cash Box** in Canada, requesting information concerning the French Canadian record industry. I will attempt to answer a few of the questions. Firstly, it is important to note that the French Canadian record industry does not exist outside the Province of Quebec, which automatically eliminates more than two thirds of Canada's population. Yet, small as the population figure may be, the industry has a stable record buying public. A ten thousand seller is considered a moderate hit, and a twenty-five thousand seller is considered a big record. Forty thousand sales is considered a "million seller." These companies are presently active in French Canadian record production: **Aladin**, **Alouette**, **Apex**, **Columbia**, **EMC**, **London**, **Fleur De Lys**, **Meteor**, **RCA Victor**, **Rusticana**, **Select**, **Trans-Canada** and **Varietes**.

There are other Canadian producers, but they are not as active as the above mentioned. It is very rare to see these other companies with a Top 40 record. Also there exists, in the Canadian market, some important labels from France. These labels are either imported or leased and then pressed in Canada by Canadian concerns. The largest of these companies are: **Barclay**, **Columbia**, **Epic**, **Pathe** and **Vogue**.

Once an artist hits the Top 10 on the French hit parade, he is a star. Unlike the United States, an artist needs only one big hit to make him a permanent chart fixture. This is the remarkable fact which makes the industry so stable. To illustrate a few examples let us study a few cases. **Michel Louvain** was acclaimed as the number one artist after the release of his first record. Now riding on his 8th consecutive hit record, he still holds that crown. **Fernand Gignac**, **Andre Leseune**, **Claude Vincent**, **Yoland Guerard**, **Les Jerolas** and many others, after having one hit record were given star billing. They, like **Louvain**, have been consistent chart-makers. These artists, of course, do not rely on their disk earnings for their livelihood. The records keep their names in the limelight so that they can draw larger purses from clubs, television and personal appearances.

The future looks even more promising. Every year, since 1955, the industry has sold more records than the preceding year. This is the reason why recordings now have reached near perfection in their quality. Musicians, musical arrangements, orchestration, sound engineering, etc. have combined through the past five years to create these great changes in sales.

FRANCE

With not a minute to lose, **Cote** has had her cut "Le Gout De Toi" and "Pull-over." **Vic Tahar** is sure that these tunes will please the public. The arrangements are by **Robert Chauvigny**, who is **Piaf's** arranger. **Gloria** will also wax "Come Rain or Come Shine" with a big band. The singer began a stint at **Brussel's Aux Anciennes Belgigue** on April 5.

A new **Bourvil** song on the **Pathe** label is "La Terre." The well-known television show, "Cinq Colonnas a La Lune" will help promotion by devoting a sequence to the studio session as well as to **Purcell**, **Guetary**, **Deguelit**, and **Horner**, all **Pathe** stars who are including the song in their repertoire.

MGM announced release of "C'est Si Bon" by **Conway Twitty**, "Succu Succu" by **Eddie Christian** and "Wonderland by Night" by **Eddy Calvert**. **Capitol** is readying the **Paris** appearance of **Jackie Gleason** and his orchestra. **Gleason** will stay here 17 weeks in all and will be working in the movie "Gigot" during his stay. When he reaches **Paris' Gare St. Lazare**, he will be welcomed by **Jerry Mengo's** orchestra, by **Purcell**, **Claude Dauphin**, et al. There may even be a big jam session at the station. . . . Speaking of stations, the **Bobby Hackett** 12-inch album headed by "Take the A Train" is now available here.

Madame Breton is still in the US but the work goes on at **Breton Publishers**, **Paris**. Firm's "Les Bohemiens" will be recorded by **Decca's** newest singing recruit, **Andree Bertin**. Lyrics are by **Marc Fontenoy**. **Patachou's** version of "Voyage de Noces" is on the market and **Patachou** has added this one to her permanent repertoire, as well as one of **Manouchka's** numbers, "Tu M'en Dis Trop." All this and then she's off to **New York!** **Huguette Ferly** at **SEMI Editions** is convinced of the possibilities of "Kana Kapila." Excellent rendition of this can be found on the **Bel-Air-Palette** label interpreted by **Les Cousins**.

Another tune which seems to be catching on in **France** is the number 2 winner of the **Eurovision** contest, "Are You Sure" (sung by **The Allison's**). **Tutti** has publishing rights here and **Ythier** will pen the lyrics for the French adaptation, called "Soeur Anne." The original version on **Fontana** is selling like hotcakes. **Tutti** has another **Manos Hadjidakis** work on the grill. It's "Tu N'est Plus La," first prize winner in the **Athens** song festival. **Candido** will wax this one. New chapter in the **Albinoni "Adagio"** story: **Tino Rossi** has now recorded the vocal adaptation, "Tout Le Bonheur Du Monde." **Rocky Volcano** has waxed, from the **Tutti** files, "Personne Comme Moi," **Aber's** adaptation of "Nobody Loves Me Like You."

Let's talk of **Edith Piaf** a little. The great artist has had to interrupt her music-hall performances due to a bout of "grippe." Most of all, **Edith** is exhausted. Unbelievable that she should have undertaken such a strenuous program after her long and serious illness, combining work in both music hall and recording studio. It might be said that she has recorded even too much, for scarcely a week goes by without another **Piaf** disk and these are not all equally successful. **Piaf** works for others, too, and is at present helping to arrange the singing tour of her favorite composer, **Dumont**. Rumor has it that he may record for **Pathe**. Why not?

Flashes from the **Music Halls**: "The West Side Story" has taken over the stage at the **Alhambra**. More on this later. **Harold Nicolas** is heading the bill at the **ABC**. **Edmond Tillet**, who just finished at the **Bobino** as part of the **Greco** line-up, won over the public every night.

French Music has left its offices on the **Rue de Douai** to set up on the **Champs Elysees** in a building in which one part is reserved for the diverse business interests of **Charles Aznavour**. New address—124, rue La Boetie, telephone: **BALzac 80-30**.

New **Spring** promotion underway at **Philips**. Firm calls it "Le Printemps de la Chanson Francaise." The gimmick: a series of 9 disks featuring a variety of artists such as **Les Freres Jacques**, **Jacques Brel**, **Anne Silvestre**, etc. The covers have been designed by the famous **Peynet**. No change in price either unless we count the 5% rise which is already a thing of the past. Let's wait and see how these **Spring** flowers grow. Speaking of prices, it is evident that records sales in **France** are passing through a period that one might term as disagreeable. Whatever the reason, gross revenue is falling. Is the answer really to be found in price hikes when falling sales seem to be due to decreased buying power? One proof of this seems to be the popularity of the low-price series (low price but not low quality) such as **Vogue** has introduced on the market. **Barclay** seems to be conscious of this fact, for while not creating a low-price record, **Barclay** has maintained old prices with no increase.

Phil Boutet of **Barclay Editions** is back from **Prague** where he accompanied **Nicole Barclay** and **Jacques Souplet** on a business trip. Things must have gone well because **Phil** brought back an option on a big **Czechoslovak** catalog including both classic and pops. He ceded a similar option for his firm's **French** catalog to the **Czechoslovak** composers' and author's society. No difficulties in sight as far as monetary exchange is concerned in view of the contracts between **BIEM**, **SACEM** and the **Czech** society. In **Prague**, **Phil** was struck by the tremendous popularity of the **French** chanson as well as of **American jazz**. The fans go for **Gerry Mulligan**, **Stan Getz**, etc. as they do elsewhere. It might be said that music has succeeded where other efforts have failed in making a few cracks in the **Iron Curtain**, slowly and surely and isn't this because the music in us all knows no frontiers or boundaries?

SCANDINAVIA

(Stockholm)—EMI recorded four titles from Arne Sucksdorf's new feature film "The Boy In The Tree." The music for the film is composed by Quincy Jones, who also was the bandleader during the recording session. The record, an EP, will be released in Sweden and abroad at Mercury label.

(Stockholm)—Anders Burman's Swedish EMI recording of "Ah Marie, Jag Vill Hem" (Mary Don't You Weep) is not getting TV promotion in Sweden. While Swedish radio is airing the Columbia recording very often, SBC-TV has banned it since the so called cultural standard is not considered high enough for the TV executives. Originally, this old song reached Denmark, where it topped the Best Sellers last fall. Now it is in the top on the Norwegian Best Sellers, and also the Swedish version seems to have good sales appeal.

(Copenhagen)—The Danish song "Angelique," Denmark's contribution to Melodi Grand Prix in Cannes recently, seems to have chances of becoming a continental hit. Already a top seller in Denmark, the song has been on the Swedish Best Sellers for at least three weeks, too. Published thru the EMI chain, the song has natural possibilities to succeed in most countries in Europe and America where EMI operates. There are a Danish recording with Dario Campeotto on Sonet, a Swedish version with Carli Tornehave on HMV and an instrumental with Lill-Jörgen on Columbia.

(Stockholm)—Ingvar Eriksson, head of publicity of Philips-Sonora, told The Cash Box the other day that the firm has noted a growing sale of 45 rpm singles, particularly in the big cities where many record buyers seem to have started to buy singles instead of EP's.

(Helsinki)—Levytukku Oy has presented the first releases on its new domestic labels Broadway and Manhattan. The new labels have a repertoire with special appeal to teenage disk buyers.

Levytukku has contracted three new names, all newcomers on records in Finland. They are Aila Pulakka, Vuokko Hejo-oja and Jukka Loukiala. The latter has a brother, popular rock 'n' roll singer Pekka Loukiala, who is under contract in Fazers.

(Stockholm)—Sales now look better than ever, reports Lars Billeng, head of AB Philips-Sonora. "We have been very lucky and noted several top sellers during the last six or seven months," Billeng said. Among the records which helped Philips to a good season are "Romantica" with Trumpet Boy (Philips), "Ramona" with the Blue Diamonds (Fontana), "North To Alaska" with Johnny Horton (Philips), "Green Fields" with The Brothers Four (Philips). "Baby Sittin' Boogie" with Buzz Clifford. "Are You Sure" with The Allison's, both Fontana is coming up very strong. Another ace is Owe Thörnqvist, who signed contract with Philips recently and who will wax his first EP one of the first days in April.

(Copenhagen)—Karusell Records (Karusell means Merry-Go-Round) has again changed distribution channels in Denmark. Originally cooperating with Metronome Records here, Karusell became its own last year, and recently the distribution was handled over to IS Dansk Grammofonpladeforlag (DGF). Karusell handles the following labels: Karusell, Joker, Verve, Top Rank and Ariola. DGF already handles among others Sonet, Storyville, Roulette, Colpix, Ecco and other labels. Karusell Records is a Swedish company headed by Simon Brehm and Karl Nirén.

(Stockholm)—The song "Wedding Cake" was written for Siw Malmkvist, the Swedish Metronome artist, in America by Addy Baron and Bernice Ross. The arrangements were made by Dick Wolfe, who also arranged the recording of the music background in New York. The tape was sent to Sweden and Miss Malmkvist has so far recorded the song in Swedish, Danish, German and English. This was reported to The Cash Box by Börje Ekberg, export manager of Metronome and personal manager for Siw Malmkvist. The English version will be released in the U.S. by Kapp and in Great Britain by Columbia. However, the name Siw Malmkvist is not considered commercial enough for the English speaking market and they are now busy finding a new name for Miss Malmkvist to print on the label. This has to be soon since the release day for Britain is fixed to April 14th. Two days later, Miss Malmkvist will be in London to promote the record on radio and TV. She might also go to the U.S. if the record does well in the American market. The German version ("Danken Für Die Blumen") is already very popular and radio station SWDR in Stuttgart has the record as number one on their Radio Hit Parade, reports Eckberg. It's possible that Miss Malmkvist will record the song also in French and Italian during her trip to the Continent this month.

(Oslo)—The Norwegian song "Pengegaloppen" was well liked by Eddie Calvert, who recently appeared in Oslo. He will record the song under the English title "Penny Points Polka," reports Iversen & Frogh, Norwegian EMI distributor. The song is written by Vidar Sandbeck and has been a top seller in Norway and Sweden last year.

Ivan Nordström of Edition Odeon, Stockholm, back from biz talks with the EMI people in London. . . . Owe Thörnqvist, just contracted to Philips, back for combined biz and holiday visit in the U.S. . . . Anders Holmstedt, head of EMI in Stockholm to London for business talks in middle of April. . . . Börje Ekberg, export manager of Metronome Records, back behind his desk in Stockholm for a couple of days after a promotion tour in Germany with Siw Malmkvist. He left for the continent immediately after the Easter holidays. . . . Simon Brehm and Lill-Babs home again from Cannes and Melodi Grand Prix. . . . "Cannonball" Adderley's ork back in Sweden for concerts on April 10. . . . Mahalia Jackson in Stockholm's Concert Hall on April 20. . . . Frankie Avalon to Sweden for concerts this summer. . . . Bertil Englund back from a tour in Finland just in time for his marriage on March 29. . . . From Copenhagen it's reported that Grethe Sönck has been invited to Paris to appear in Jacques Duval's TV show. . . . Finland reports that singer Seija Lampila now appears in Barcelona, Spain with a tour in Israel next on her schedule. . . . Marketta Joutsu back from Berne, Switzerland, and a three months engagement with Mario Weber's Ork.

(Oslo)—Iversen & Frogh A/S (EMI in Norway), which advertised in a daily and invited those composers who got their contributions to the Norwegian Melodi Grand Prix refused by the jury to send the songs to them, reports that so far they have got more than 200 songs. Many of them are commercial and can be used, reports the company, which expected to be able to have more definite news after the Easter holidays.

AUSTRALIA

Some eighteen months ago, following representations from interested organizations, the Federal Government appointed a special four-man committee to make a thorough examination of the copyright laws of Australia. For about twelve months, this committee examined and sifted through representations received from many organizations and individuals who have been and are affected by some form of copyright. The most recent move by this committee has been the preparation—in printed form—of its recommended alterations to the present Act and copies of its recommendations have been circulated to all interested parties. APRA and the Australian Record Manufacturers Association have closely examined the report and are now making additional suggested amendments. An enormous amount of controversy has been aroused over some of the alterations suggested by the Government Review Committee and it appears that there will be a great deal of heated discussion in Parliament before the new act becomes law. Many top executives in the music and record industries believe that the amended copyright act will definitely become law before the end of this year. The Cash Box will give further reports as developments take place in this matter.

Shock announcement this week that top 2UE disk jockey Tony Withers left 2UE at the termination of his contract on April 1 to join the Macquarie Network through 2GB Sydney. It is said that he will become the highest paid DJ in Australia and will be featured in many nationwide hook-ups. Current 2GB disk jockey Ken Sparks will carry on as before and collectively these two are expected to swing the Macquarie policy towards pop music. Plans have already been announced for a "Big 60" hit parade promotion which will feature artists in preference to songs. Withers will begin on April 12 with a nationwide TV show for MCA entitled "Juke Box Jury." Withers will be monitor for the show, set to be channelled through six major TV stations with a 7:30 p.m. mid-week time spot. 2UE answered the Withers announcement with the news that it will vary its policy of "no 2UE staff on television" by employing ace pop-music TV personality Brian Henderson to replace most of the Withers shows. Henderson will maintain his Saturday afternoon national TV show "Bandstand."

Australian Record Company (Coronet (American Columbia) and Warner Bros. labels) has begun issuing singles from American independent companies —this material is being issued on the Coronet label. First release under this deal is "I Wanna Love My Life Away" by Gene Pitney, which is making some sales noise here. ARC has also just acquired the rights to the American Chess, Checker and Argo labels and have started its releases with the current big singles of "But I Do" by Clarence "Frogman" Henry; "At Last" by Etta James and "Watusi" by The Vibrations. These moves by ABC are most interesting because until the take-over by Columbia U.S.A. it was the policy of ARC to release material from the Columbia label exclusively. This present association with Chess, Checker and Argo is the largest move by ARC in its plans to press and distribute material from American indies.

Publishing house of Boosey & Hawkes (Australia) Pty. Ltd., with Australian headquarters in Sydney, report good success with "Never On Sunday" which they control for this area. George Cooper of B&H advises that eleven versions of this outstanding film title song have been released and firm expects this song to be one of its most successful for the year. Boosey & Hawkes also advise that they control the music of "The Misfits" for this area—the Don Costa single of the title tune has already been released and the film is now showing in some Australian states.

EMI has released—on Decca—a 10" LP of "Strictly For Grown-ups" by Pally Roberts. This is the material that has been high up on the best-selling lists for so long in England. It is one of the very few 10" LPs being released in this country. Col Joye is still in doubt about his next record release having been off the charts for over three months, he has announced an agreement with Channel 9 for four TV spectaculars a year—at a price that places him amongst the top television personalities.

Elvis Presley is holding down the two top spots in our best-selling list this week. "Wooden Heart" is in No. 1 position for the second week in a row and "Surrender" has jumped into the second spot on its first appearance on the chart. Another new entry this week (into No. 10 slot) is Roy Hamilton's "You Can Have Her," which is released here on the Philips label which handles the Epic catalog in Australia. Judging from the way our DJ's are taking to "You Can Have Her," it looks like being the big challenge to Elvis for the key position on our national best-seller chart.

Leeds Music—after a quieter time in the pop parades—are revelling in the rapid climb of The Everly Brothers' "Walk Right Back" to top fame. Their "One Hundred Pounds Of Clay" shows all the right signs also. With hot new items including June Valli's "This World We Live In" and Jimmy Rodgers' "I'm On My Way," Jack Argent's day would be complete except that his secretary-assistant Irene Bell left to seek new fields in Victoria—she will be sorely missed by the entire trade in Sydney.

handled by Chappells include "Sound Of Music," opening Palace Theatre May 18 with British recordings lined up by **Petula Clark, Gracie Fields, Ted Hockridge, David Hughes, Ivor Emmanuel, Mantovani, Joan Regan, Dickie Valentine** and **David Whitfield**. **June Bronhil**, who will play the lead in the Australian production, is to record an EP of four numbers from the show for EMI for Australian release. Another show under the Chappell banner, "Ballad of Dr. Crippen" (based on the famous murder case) written by **Wolf Mankowitz** and **Monty Norman** opening at Strand Theatre on May 4.

Sales of **Cliff Richard's** "Theme For a Dream" on Columbia have reached a quarter million. Meantime EMI released his waxing of the hit U.S. tune "Gee Whiz (Look At His Eyes)" for the overseas market. **Cliff's** fans heard about it and dealers have been besieged with orders. With no plugs and no publicity EMI has been forced to issue the platter for the home market.



JAPAN

This is the first column from Japan. Weekly news will be sent in from Tokyo, the city of 9,740,933 population. The Cash Box is the first trade paper in the music industry to have a correspondent covering news in Japan.

Fifty different labels are available in this country at this time, through 9 firms that are all members of Japan Phonograph Record Association. **Victor**, (Victor Company Of Japan, Ltd.), has 16 labels: **Victor, Camden, Dot, Imperial, Philips, Fontana, Roulette, Top Rank, United Artists, Vox, World Pacific, Atlantic, Seeco, 20th Fox, Montilla, and Colpix**. Its president is ex-Foreign Minister, **Kichisaburo Nomura**, and vice-president is **Hitoshi Momose**. President **Nomura** also served as an Ambassador to the United States. The firm has established 11 branches throughout the nation.

Columbia (Nippon Columbia Co. Ltd.), of which **Yonezo Hata** is president, issues **Columbia, MGM, and Verve** labels. It boasts a network including 17 branches and offices scattered in many cities. **Columbia** and **Victor** are the oldest record companies in Japan.

Japan's King (King Record Co. Ltd.), under the presidency of **Shozo Muto**, sells 11 labels: (Japan's) **King, London, Mercury, King International, ABC-Paramount, Telefunken, Vanguard, Command, The Ace Of Clubs, Grand Award, The Bach Guild**, **Japan's King** has nothing to do with **King Records of Cincinnati, Ohio**. This label is available through **Toshiba Musical Industries, Ltd.** under the Angel name. Selling big and doing well is the newest label—**Toshiba**, (**Toshiba Musical Industries, Ltd.**). The firm became independent last December, separating from its parent company. Labels released by **Toshiba** are: **Toshiba, Angel, Capitol, Kapp, Medallion. Moto-O Otani** is president.

Grammophone (Nippon Grammophone Co. Ltd.) puts out **Coral, Polydor, Deutsche Grammophon, Archiv**. Recently the firm started to issue many down to earth Argentine tango disks by special contract with **T. K. (pronounced Tekka)** of Argentina, but this label is treated as **Polydor** by the company.

Teichiku (Teichiku Record Co. Ltd.) has its center in Nara City, Western Japan, while above mentioned are all located in Tokyo. President is **Shigeji Nanko**. **Teichiku** issues three labels—**Teichiku, Decca** and **Fonit**.

Westminster (Nippon Westminster Co. Ltd.), distributed by **Columbia**, has 4 labels: **Westminster, Voix-D'or, Pye, Disneyland**. **Masaichi Kanishi** is president.

Ni'Chiku (Ni'Chiku Industrial Co. Ltd.) is also relying on **Columbia** for its distribution. **Ni'Chiku** is selling **Epic** and **Warner Bros.** labels. **Hisao Adachi** is President.

Shinsekai (Shinsekai Record Co. Ltd.) features mostly all Russian disks. Its president is **Kei Hoashi**, and **Victor** is handling its distribution.

Let's turn to the outlook of figures during 1959 season as compiled by Japan Phonograph Record Association. 24 million copies, amounting to \$322,940 million at a producer price (tax excluded from figures). This is the biggest outcome that the nation's record industries have ever enjoyed. Sales have been extended to three times these five years ago.

56.4% out of all was given to 45 RPM's, 30.8% to 33 1/3 RPM's, 12.8% to 78 RPM's, and only 87 copies (0.0%) were available last year on 16 2/3 RPM's. Production rate of LP's was raised, while that of EP's has become lower. As to 33 1/3 RPM's, 10" LP's are still more popular than 12" LP's. Out of 5,616 copies released 59% were those which were recorded by foreign artists, and the remaining 41% were those which were recorded by Japanese artists. People bought more disks recorded by foreign artists, and jazz, Latin American, screen music were among the best loved, showing a tremendous upsurge in retail statistics. The most important problem to solve for any record firms this year will be the setting up of counter measures against possible free-trade policy by the government. Import of phonograph records has been strictly regulated by the governments trade policy. This restriction is expected to be lifted soon. Such a situation, if it comes, will lead to giving record firms a big blow, so Japan Phonograph Record Association demands this agenda be under full study from now on.

Capitol now in an all-out push for the tune . . . So is Mercury for Claude Gray's re-titled "I'll Just Have A Cup of Coffee" which is slowly gathering momentum. . . . Hank Snow's newie, "Beggar To A King," was penned by the late J. P. Richardson (Big Bopper) and already witnessed hit

If the disk succeeds wonder if Jimmy Brogden (who books Rose) and Claude Caviness (who books Buck) will be teaming the two for personals? . . . Joe Allison, reflecting on future plans for Liberty, discloses that intended signings include another female artist, a blue grass group, a duet act and a big western swing band (all strings-no horns). Said Allison, "We're moving close to the end of our first year and certainly things have happened fast . . . that our biggest dreams were never this big." Allison extended his thanks to everyone for helping make Liberty "a small part of such a big business." . . . Curley Gold and his Texas Tune Twisters swing band recently put on a three-hour show at the Trader Lewis Park in San Jose, Calif., drawing 3,000 country music fans. . . . Moriss Taylor has terminated his contract with Key Records (Hollywood) and is now looking for another association. Moriss also deejays at KPAY-El Chico. . . . Paul Simpkins, key platter twiler on WBAM-Montgomery, Ala., keeping busy on the p.a. trail. Recently did two days in Albany, Ga., and Dothan, Ala. with Marty Robbins, skedded to appear with Roy Acuff, Don Gibson, Ray Price, Skeeter Davis at the big "Opry" show for the Fraternal Order of Police in Montgomery, April 21.

"Big H Jubilee" producer Wayne Henderson notes that country music is moving full speed ahead in the Houston area with Gene Crawford featured star of the "Gulf Coast Jubilee" TV'er Sundays on KTRK-TV and Gene doing a two-hour Saturday radio stint from KRCT's new studios in downtown Houston. In addition, Gene just inked a pact with Circle Records, scheduled to cut a session in Nashville later this month. For the show, which also features Utah Carl and a special weekly guest, Gene needs records as well as artist id's. . . . Then, Billy Deaton writes from KMAC that our music is also blooming big in San Antonio. Bill, a fine singer in his own right, has invited guests in the last month such as Jim Reeves, Ray Price, and Ernest Tubb, all drawing capacity crowds at dances in the area.

Beverly Mae Wilson, fully recovered from an illness that had her out of commission for a while, returned to the music scene last week in a series of personals in the Los Angeles area. . . . Jim Denny once again has set a star-studded lineup for the annual Phillip Morris pre Kentucky Derby show. This year's extravaganza, set for May 3 at the Fairgrounds Coliseum, will headline Marty Robbins, Jimmy Dean, Ferlin Husky, Johnny Burnette, Carl Perkins, Lonzo & Oscar, Marijohn Wilkin, Norma Jean, the Dakota Cloggers and Pee Wee King and the band.



Time For A Do-It-Yourself Attitude

A do-it-yourself craze which recently swept this nation evidently stopped short of the coin machine industry where a public relations program has been picking up steam with each passing day. Unfortunately, regardless of CMC's accomplishments, and they are many, the Coin Machine Council is not getting the support it deserves. Evidently most coinmen are waiting for "the other guy." This tactic could prove costly. What CMC needs is a do-it-yourself attitude on the part of each member in the coin machine industry. The resultant financial support in the form of individual membership checks in amounts ranging from \$5 to \$50 from operators and larger sums from distributors and manufacturers would add needed power and drive to the current PR program.

CMC will officially be two years old on July 27. To date only half of the manufacturers are members. About 10% of the operators have joined CMC. The distributor has evidently carried the brunt of the program with his support—CMC reports a 90% distributor membership which is certainly a wonderful showing of interest and organization.

However, future achievements of CMC cannot be attributed to any individual nor any group of individuals. If CMC is not an industry-wide program with large representative support from all levels, there will be no achievement. It's as simple as that.

Last week, the nation's press carried a United Press International news release (*The Cash Box, April 8*) which represented a major breakthrough for the industry. The article which was submitted to UPI by CMC through personal contact referred to a "better credit situation" for coin machine operators due to proof submitted to banks and moneylenders which pointed to a "spotless bankruptcy record," "rising coin machine stock values," and "the use of coin machines as big sales boosters." All facts. All true. True not only last week, but last year and the year before, when these same newspapers featured headlines of a different sort. The kind you don't repeat. The change in attitude on the part of the nation's press can be summed up in two words—public relations. CMC can be credited with an 'E' for excellence.

CMC cannot continue forever unless it receives the support of every member in the coin machine industry. If \$5 or \$50 is too much, look at the proposition on a strictly business basis. Nation's Coinmen View Current Signs Of Increased Spending and Production; Look To Upswing In Location Business

NEW YORK—Nobody's going to go all out and say that the recession has ended but most business surveys by the "experts" last week certainly gave every indication that it has at least slowed.

As a matter of fact, after checking steel production, automobile sales, and of course, the stock market, the general consensus was that business in general was picking up. A key segment of the nation's economy, the department and retail store sales, went over the top of any estimates when families spruced up for the Easter holidays. There was no sign of dollar shortage in the retail outlets across the country.

But all in all, with every sign pointing optimistically to an end to bad business and a rise in the nation's economy, the businessmen as a group were still waiting for the public to start spending. The retail store business was eyed sharply as a periodic increase at holiday time. But the market gave every indication that the nation's economy was on the upswing.

The coin machine operator, meanwhile, took close notice of such indications as extended unemployment checks in vital areas in the country, seasonal upswing in employment, and a lowering of interest rates which was announced just at the close of last week.

New York City, the center of the entertainment dollar, was flattened last week when millions of tourists came upon the metropolis to view the sites during the one-week school holiday. Local newspapers splashed pictures of the crowds (10,000 at the Radio City Music Hall Theater!) across front pages with stories indicating a revamping of the entertainment budgets. Coinmen fortunate to have machines operating in the immediate areas of course, enjoyed a brisk business.

But New York doesn't reflect the nation, whether its coin machines collections or whatever. However, the manufacturers in Chicago took note of an increase in shipments to distributors while wholesalers themselves were suffering from a crucial shortage of late model equipment.

Many areas indicated that operators had long since taken the bull by the horns and instituted new merchandising techniques to get the most from

the present investment. Others had taken advantage of the slowdown in location business to call on stops and increase present facilities while the locations were interested in the extra income.

All in all, no one was shouting with

glee over the amount of business being done, but an optimistic outlook was very much in evidence with reports from practically every known indicator pointing to a recovery period that showed every sign of leading to more normal operating times.

Japanese Take To US Arcade Games



TOKYO, JAPAN—Arcade owners here reported increased interest in US made arcade and amusement equipment after importing the machines from various exporters of coin machine equipment in the States. The Japanese family has taken to the arcade as an all-night activity with many arriving after dinner for an extended evening of play. Many of the nation's leading amusement machine exporters have found Japan to be a growing market for equipment with strong indications of growth due to new locations opening regularly.
