FILM MUSIC

Just as spoken word comedy ma-
terial was the rage of 1960-1961
album season, film themes seem to
be the rage thus far in 1962.

As we approach the "Oscar" sea-
son each year and columnists de-
vote unbelievable space to their
choices for best this and best that
as well as best song, albums dealing
with the subject of Motion Picture
Themes seem to reach their annual
high. Then the remainder of the
year sees occasional releases deal-
ing with this subject.

But ever since November of
1961 we have been literally inun-
dated with albums dealing with
film music. One can, of course,
never point to any one specific
package as the cause of this trend,
but we do feel the success during
1961 of the "Exodus" film track
on Victor from a non-musical
movie, the huge showing made by
"Great Motion Picture Themes"
featuring a variety of artists on the
UA label, the tremendous showing
of the "Never On Sunday" track,
another non-musical pic, also on
UA, and Mantovani's powerful
showing with "Exodus" and other
film themes on London, all acted
as the foundation for the wealth of
film LP's currently being issued.

About a half dozen years ago the
great degree of failure of back-
ground music tracks from dramatic
films resulted in almost no such
albums being released for a period
of time. But with interesting jazz
scores being featured in more films
during the past half decade, certain

tracks were hand-picked and issued
with greater frequency. Last year's
success of some of the above men-
tioned LP's from non-musical films
set the stage for the release this
year of the tracks from almost
every important film, as well as
some from not so significant pics.

Of course a number of people
will be badly burned for issuing
film tracks which seemingly have
no good reason for being released.
But in this "who can tell what will
and won't sell business," the tre-
mendous profit which a hit film LP
of any type may reap lures many
into taking a crack at a movie LP.
For example, of last year's six big-
gest LP's, four dealt with movies:
"Exodus," "Great Motion Picture
Themes," "G.I. Blues," by Elvis
Presley, and "Never On Sunday."

It goes without saying that the
film-track of a musical movie al-
ways has tremendous potential and
usually enjoys a great sale. Evi-
dence of this can be noted by the
huge success of "West Side Story,"
"Blue Hawaii," and "Flower Drum
Song" currently sitting in the one,
two and six spots on the album best
seller list.

But with "Breakfast At Tif-
fany's," Mancini's exciting score,
hitting so tremendously this year
added to the success of last year's
tracks plus the sales racked up on
"Great Themes" ideas, we can ex-
pect to see a continuous flow of
film merchandise during the re-
mainder of 1962.

Duane Eddy To Cut For RCA Victor

NEW YORK—The strong teen-market sounds of guitarist Duane Eddy will now be heard on RCA Victor Records, it was announced by Robert L. Yorke, commercial creation department veep.

Eddy's sessions will be released on Victor through Camy Productions, which also produces dates by Paul Anka, recently pacted to the label.

Since making his debut in 1958, the former Jamie performer has received 15 gold disks, three for EP's and four for albums. His singles hits have included "Moovin' & Groovin'," "Rebel Rouser," "Ramrod," "Cannonball," "Detour," "40 Miles of Bad Road," "Because They're Young," and "Pepe."

Eddy is also establishing himself in other areas, having appeared in two feature flicks, "Because They're Young" and "Thunder of Drums" and TV's "Have Gun—Will Travel."

In his announcement, Yorke stated: "Duane Eddy is unquestionably one of the foremost instrumentalists and popular personalities in our industry today. His potential for future global stardom and recording sales is untapped and unlimited."

Marek was recently set as a featured speaker at next month's Miami meet of the National Association of Rack Merchandisers (NARM).

The luncheon will also see the "coronation" of the Music Queen of 1962, who will be selected by a panel of celebrity judges, including Bing Crosby, Mitch Miller and Jose Melis. Among her prizes will be an all-expense trip to New York, \$2,000 worth of merchandise being contributed by music firms and a tiara and medallion from NAMM.

Chairman of the luncheon will be Ted Korten, NAMM president.

Riverside Keeps Name In Foreign Expansion

NEW YORK—Bill Grauer Productions, parent company of the Riverside Jazzland, Wonderland, Washington, Offbeat, Battle and Popside labels, plans to further build the Riverside name abroad by releasing all material from its various catalogs under the Riverside banner.

Under a recent agreement between Interdisc, the European distributing organization representing BGP abroad, and N. V. Philips' Phonographic Industries, Riverside will now be distributed and promoted throughout the world by the Philips' organization.

Grauer noted that under the Interdisc set-up, his earnings abroad have tripled during the past two and one-half years he has been represented by the Swiss-based firm, and the exec predicts an even more dramatic rise in sales as a result of the new move. The agreement with Philips' calls for the major part of the present Grauer catalog, over 750 LPs, to be merchandised as it has been with Interdisc, with Philips' concentrating on the items with major sales potential and some of the present Interdisc distributors concentrating on the more specialized catalog items.

Handling the four months of negotiations necessary to conclude the Riverside segment of Interdisc's agreement with Philips' were Grauer, Philips' commercial manager Tony Van der Haar, Herman Cats of the Fontana label and Alan Bates of Interdisc.

Philips' is expected to draw heavily on the Grauer and other Interdisc lines to broaden the jazz repertoire of the Philips' and Fontana catalogs. Riverside will maintain label identity throughout the Philips' territories.

A considerable portion of Philips' past volume has been with jazz material so it is expected that both PPI and Interdisc will put full promotion behind Riverside's modern and classic jazz catalogs and its contract artists such as Cannonball Adderley, Milt Jackson, Bill Evans, Wes Montgomery and many others.

As a result of the agreement, Riverside will work closely with Philips' to launch a comprehensive recording program in each of the countries, putting local talent on wax for release in the individual country or to be simultaneously released on Riverside in the U.S.

ASCAP vs BMI Rate Dispute Far From Settlement

NEW YORK—After two weeks of meetings and statements by the factions involved, there were strong indications by last week's end that ASCAP's move to end broadcasters' ties with BMI—via a reduction in rates (about 16½% over a 10 year period)—would not be resolved before sometime to come.

Mum was the word for all the parties contacted last week. A meeting here last Thursday (22) of the All-Industry Television Station Music License Committee, authorized to accept or reject the offer for 369 TV outlets (radio is not involved in the pro-

posal), produced no results one way or another.

Though Hamilton Shea of WSWA-TV-Harrisonburg, Va., chairman of the TV committee, said last week that there was "quite a discussion" at the gathering, also attended by BMI officials, he could not reveal "anything at this time."

Herman Finkelstein, ASCAP's counsel, said that ASCAP had planned "no further meetings" on the subject and that the clearing house preferred to "make statements in court."

However, the controversy will probably be brought up at this week's (29) east coast general membership meeting of ASCAP in the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Astor, this city, starting at 2:30 PM.

The proposal for a new rate schedule came from Chief Judge Sylvester J. Ryan of the U.S. Southern District Court, who is handling the rate plan after the failure of ASCAP and the TV committee to reach a settlement.

Counsels for ASCAP and BMI are scheduled to appear at a hearing with Judge Ryan on April 25.

Sparks are almost certain to fly when the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB) convenes in Chicago next week (April 1-4).

The dramatic issue between ASCAP and BMI has led to an analysis of which clearing house has the best of the other in the programming of material.

It has been learned that in radio exposure, BMI provides 49% of all radio music, while ASCAP music accounts for 41% (the remaining 10% comes from PD music or from other clearing houses).

Figures for TV are unavailable, but it is believed that the breakdown is the same as that of radio.

BMI has reported other statistical information: BMI and ASCAP are about equal in the amount of TV network evening time devoted to background music licensed by the two clearing houses; ASCAP is ahead of BMI, about 5 to 4 in the area of background music on TV networks on an all-day basis; ASCAP runs 2 to 1 ahead of BMI in the performance of feature music on the networks.

BMI also reports that seven out of every 10 pop singles contain material licensed by BMI. There are no figures on album exposure.

The standing in yearly revenue from broadcasters puts ASCAP way out front. The total revenue by both licensing organizations is \$45.8 million, with ASCAP getting \$33.1 million (or 72%) and BMI pulling in \$12.7 million (or 28%).

Besides the reduction in rates offered BMI, under the proposal, would operate in a manner similar to ASCAP. It would thus also be under a consent decree, signed by ASCAP after the Federal Government had initiated anti-trust litigation against ASCAP, and its fees would be set by Federal courts.

Six Month LP Discount From Cameo/Parkway

NEW YORK—A six month discount program on LP's has been announced by the Cameo/Parkway setup.

Feature of the plan, which began March 1 and ends Aug. 30, is a 12½% discount on any of the 80 assorted albums contained in a pre-pack, including releases by Chubby Checker and Bobby Rydell. Also available to qualifying dealers is 90 day dating.

Backing up the program are free sales and merchandising displays, including four-color floor browsers, two interchangeable four-color back displays and artist divider cards.

Chirumbolo Heads Verve Album Sales

NEW YORK—Vic Chirumbolo has been upped to national sales manager of albums for Verve Records.

Chirumbolo, who previously was east coast regional sales manager, will function under the direct supervision of Andy Miele, director of marketing for MGM/Verve, and will only handle Verve product.

Sales of all singles on MGM, Verve, Cub and Choreo will remain under the jurisdiction of Lenny Scheer.

In another move, Joe Fields has joined Verve as eastern field representative. Fields comes to the label after serving as national sales manager for singles at London Records. Before that, he held a sales post at Columbia. He reports to Chirumbolo.

Harden Heads Capitol's Custom Services

HOLLYWOOD—Bud Harden has been appointed director of Capitol Records' custom service department.

Harden, who has been with Capitol for 14 years, will be in charge of the company's entire custom service program, including premium records and the pressing of disks for other record companies. He will continue to make his headquarters in the Capitol Tower, Hollywood.

Harden has been with custom services since August, 1958, and has been the department's production manager since September 1959. He will report to George Jones, general manager of Capitol's manufacturing and engineering division.

Brenda Lee Off On Tour Abroad

BEVERLY HILLS — Brenda Lee, Decca's star thrush, left for England last week for her special appearance at the London Palladium this Sunday (30), to be followed by a two-week series of one-night stands in key English cities. She will then fly to Germany for a similar two-week tour. The performer will also cut several numbers in German on the Deutsch-Gramophon label for distribution in Europe. Then it's back to the U.S. for nitery engagements starting in Boston and New Jersey.

"Changing Role" of Rack-Jobber To Key NARM's Miami Meet

PHILADELPHIA — "The Changing Role of the Record Merchandiser" will be the theme of the upcoming (April 8-12) fourth annual meet of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM) at Miami Beach's Eden Roc Hotel, and will serve as a guide for the business sessions at the meet.

A highlight of the business session of Tuesday, April 10, will be a Workshop Presentation, prepared by Dr. Alton F. Doody, assistant Professor of Marketing at Ohio State University, who has done a great deal of independent, academic research in the marketing of records. He will discuss the opportunities for growth that are available to the record merchandiser, and the problems accompanying these opportunities. Doody will also discuss

the proper perspective of the field of rack-jobbing as it fits into the scope of the entire record industry.

By including on the program a marketing expert from outside the industry itself, in addition to the manufacturers and rack jobbers who will participate, it is felt that a complete view of record merchandising will be presented, and will give those attending the convention an over-all and thorough picture of the rack-jobbing field.

Assisting Dr. Doody in preparing his presentation were the co-chairmen of the workshop committee, Edward M. Snider of Edge, Ltd. in Washington, D.C., and James J. Tiedjens of Musical Isle Record Corp. in Milwaukee, Wis.

NARM Meet To Hear Complete Rack Study

The LP was set to be cut last Sunday (25) under the supervision of Goddard Lieberson, the label's president.

In addition to the cast album, the label has already released a Duke Ellington version of the score, "All-American—in Jazz," and next month there will be the release of "Music from 'All-American' Played by the All-Stars," featuring selections from the score as performed by various Columbia artists. These include Andre Kostelanetz, Les Elgart, The Dukes of Dixieland, Lionel Hampton, J. J. Johnson, Bobby Hackett, Marlowe Morris, The Banjo Barons, Art Van Damme and Jerry Murad's Harmonicats.

Writers of the score, Charles Strouse and Lee Adams, are represented on another Columbia cast LP, "Bye Bye Birdie."

ARMADA Convention To Continue Label-Distrib Meets

NEW YORK—The Annual ARMADA Convention, which will be held at the Fountainebleau Hotel, Miami Beach, June 28-30, will again make time available to a limited number of manufacturers for sales meetings with their distributors.

The meetings will be permitted before and after the actual convention, and must be cleared through ARMADA. The hotel has agreed to make space available at special rates for these meetings, it was pointed out, and because of space and time limitations, the meetings will be scheduled on a first-come-first served basis.

Art Talmadge, ARMADA prexy, said that those manufacturers who desire to hold their distributor meetings in conjunction with the convention should contact Jordan Ross, AR-

MADA executive secretary as quickly as possible.

Exhibit booths will again be made available to suppliers. Talmadge stated. Because of the physical layout of the Fountainebleau a special area has been assigned for the exhibits. To assure maximum attendance at the exhibits a number of special events will be held in the area throughout the convention. Talmadge also pointed out that as exhibit space was limited, those firms desiring to participate should also contact Ross as early as possible to assure their space.

Cameo 35mm LP's To Retail At \$3.98

NEW YORK—Cameo Records has added a 35mm line of "sound" LP's to its catalog which retails at \$3.98 in both the stereo and mono versions.

The label's tag for the series is "4 on 35mm." It refers to the technique of recording on four channels on the wide magnetic film.

Four albums bow the series: "If The Big Bands Were Here Today" with the Bernie Lowe Orchestra; "An Exciting Evening At Home" with the International Pop Orchestra; "Soul Of Hawaii"; and "Soul Of Italy."

RIAA Gives Endorsement To Detroit Sound Fair

NEW YORK—Further industry support was given the International Sound Fair last week with the endorsement of the Recording Industry Association of America. The RIAA is the eighth trade association to support the Sound Fair which will be held July 25-29 in Cobo Hall, Detroit.

Henry Brief, RIAA Executive Secretary, said that the RIAA executive committee had adopted a resolution endorsing the objectives and program of the Fair.

"The Committee feels that RIAA has a mutual interest with you in insuring that this enterprise is successful since it could render a significant contribution to the entire industry," Brief told Fair president Coleman Finkel and executive director Hal Cook.

He said RIAA would appraise its full membership of the importance of the Fair and urge full participation and cooperation of members to make the Fair an "outstanding success" that will benefit the entire industry. The Fair has the endorsement of the leading trade organizations. In addition to RIAA, other trade associations which are supporting the Fair are: Society of Record Dealers (SORD); Country Music Association (CMA); Institute of High-Fidelity Manufacturers (IHFM); American Record Manufacturers and Distributors Association (ARMADA); Magnetic Recording Industry Association (MRIA); National Academy of Recording Arts and Science (NARAS) and the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM).

In another Fair development, two regional representatives for the event have been announced.

Donald Mackay, formerly with ASCAP and Record Source, Inc., has been named east coast representative, working out of Fair headquarters in New York, and Peter Heine, active in the sound field, has been made coast representative, operating out of Los Angeles and San Francisco. A mid-west representative is expected to be named this week.

Cole's KC Label Makes Official Bow On Coast

HOLLYWOOD—Coinciding with the celebration of his 25th year in show business, Nat King Cole has announced the official unveiling of his own record company, K. C. Records.

The new label became incorporated last week in California with Cole as president, Jack Gale as vice-president and general manager, headquartering in New York. Dick La Palm is vice-president in charge of national sales and promotion, headquartering in Chicago.

While Cole will continue his long time association with Capitol Records, his company will set up its own distribution apparatus in the near future under La Palm's supervision.

First releases for the company have been pressed and will be ready for distribution this month. They are "Tiger Twist," hit song from the Italian film "Tropico di Notte" recorded by Armando Sciascia's orchestra b/w "Bi-A-Bi-Chuca" and Chuck Dallis singing "Come On, Let's Go," b/w "The Image Of You."

Sue Raney has also been signed by the new company and will record four sides.

Plans of the company include concentration on the development and promotion of new young artists in which campaign Cole, himself, will actively participate. Recordings of all types of pop material, including rock 'n roll, will be released by the new company.

Singer Barbara MacNair, who co-starred with Cole in his successful "Merry World Of Nat King Cole" show last summer, will record a single this week for the K label. The Nite Lites, an instrumental group, have also been inked for a K. C. single.

During the current winter and spring period, Cole continues on his most extensive nightclub tour in his career playing some 15 nighteries before touring his tent show entitled "Sights And Sounds" for seven weeks during the summer straw hat season. "Sights And Sounds," produced by Ike Jones, head of Cole's Kell-Cole Production Company, will kick off July 24 at the Seattle World's Fair.

To further highlight his quarter of a century in show business Nat will return to the screen in Oct., filming "The English Teacher," co-starring Dolores Del Rio in Mexico. Jones will also produce this film in association with Mexican filmmaker, Miguel Zacharias.

Pick of the Week

"OPERATOR" (2:15) [Sylvia BMI—Elgin, Rogers, Jones]

"I'LL TRUST IN YOU" (2:44) [Fast BMI—Robinson, Williams, Dunn]
GLADYS KNIGHT & THE PIPS (Fury 1064)

Gladys Knight & the Pips, who are still cashing in with their big pop-r&b outing, "Letter Full Of Tears," can do more of the same with this new Fury session. Side, tabbed "Operator," is a heartfelt rock-a-cha-cha opus that the artists put across with telling effect. The beat-ballad-with-strings coupler, "I'll Trust In You," also has a healthy chart outlook.

"ANY DAY NOW" (3:20) [Plan Two ASCAP—Bacharach, Hilliard]

"THE PROPHET" (3:28) [Lloyd & Logan—Dixon, McCoy]

CHUCK JACKSON (Wand 122)

Chances are Chuck Jackson will make another trip to hit territory aboard his latest Wand slice. Side to watch is "Any Day Now (My Wild Beautiful Bird)," a captivating romancer that Chuck spins in emotion-packed fashion. Stellar cha cha beat, choral-ork arrangement by Bert Keyes. "The Prophet" makes for a lovely, soft cha cha-ballad companion piece.

"TANGLEFOOT" (2:42) [Piccadilly BMI—Drake, Diamond]

"CHARLIE'S PROGRESS" (3:13) [Piccadilly BMI—Drake, Diamond]
CHARLIE DRAKE (United Artists 437)

Drake, who did bang-up sales business with his UA bow, "My Boomerang Won't Come Back," can easily repeat with this one. It's a pull-out-all-the-stops twist'er, dubbed "Tanglefoot," that oughta zoom up the hit lists in no time flat. Sensational choral-ork support from Johnnie Spence outfit. Humor jocks'll go wild for the delightful sounds on the "Charlie's Progress" talk bit. Watch 'em both.

"I'LL TAKE YOU HOME" (2:30)

[Sunflower, Annie, Earl ASCAP—Hugo, Luigi, Weiss]

THE CORSAIRS & JAY "BIRD" UZZELL (Chess 1818)

The Corsairs, with Jay "Bird" Uzzell in the featured slot once again, come thru with a potent follow-up to their current Chess-distributed Tuff slice, "Smokey Places." It's a haunting, slow cha cha beat romancer, tabbed "I'll Take You Home," that sports an attention-getting percussive bits. The undercut's a dandy from the pounding rock-a-cha-cha school.

"COUNT EVERY STAR" (2:32)

"LAND OF STARS" (2:01)

LINDA SCOTT (Canadian-American 133)

The thrush can make a chart stand with either end, or both, of this pairing cut during her hit stay with the diskery. It's an oldie-newie combination that finds Miss Scott in top ballad form. The evergreen, "Count Every Star," takes a beat-ballad route while the newcomer, "Land Of Stars," is from the lilting-ballad category. Two lovely, Hutch Davie-string-filled showcases.

"I'M GONNA SIT IN TILL YOU GIVE IN" (2:12)

[Lion BMI—Clark, King]

"YOU ASK ME" (2:08) [Beale St. BMI—Rae, Knight, Davis, King]

B. B. KING (ABC-Paramount 10316)

Vet blues performer B. B. King, who's currently making territorial r&b-pop noise with his Kent waxing of "Gonna Miss You Around Here," can have a real sales-sizzler with his ABC bow, "I'm Gonna Sit In Till You Give In." It's a potent rock-a-twist'er that makes romantic use of today's news. Solid support from Maxwell Davis. Backing's a winning beat-ballad hip-swinging that also rates attention.

THE VOLUMES (Chex 1002)

This red-hot Chex master, out of Detroit, has been picked up for national distribution by the Jay-Gee outfit. It's a quick-beat delighter, dubbed "I Love You," that could prove to be the 'stepping stone' for the Volumes. There's ultra-commercial gimmicks galore here. Group switches to a beat-ballad pace for the "Dreams" stand.

JIMMY BELL (Hickory 1168)

(B+) "YOUR SKIES OF BLUE (Will Turn Gray On You)" (2:37) [January BMI—Neil] Bell's well-done down-and-out vocalizing is backed by a striking dirge-like beat from the combo. Interesting plaintive performance for the kids.

(B) "TOMORROW IS A-COMIN'" (2:01) [January BMI—Pitney] Happy philosophical lovey-dovey in this end's grooves.

"KEN" KENNINGTON

(Confederate 130)

(B) "IT GOES WITHOUT SAYING" [Perry BMI—Sandifer] Busy rock-a-billy doings from the songster and his combo-chorus support. Label is based in Macon, Ga.

(B) "A MILLION TEARS" [Perry BMI—Sandifer] Things aren't going well for the heartsick fella here.

HARVEY (Tri-Phi 1010)

(B+) "SHE LOVES ME SO" (2:25) [Birdsong BMI—Fuqua, Gordy] Songster, who formerly warbled for The Moonglows and The Spinners, nicely conveys the sentiments of the soft affectionate. He also employs a good-sounding sans-lyric bit. Might get around.

(B) "WHISTLING ABOUT YOU" (2:36) [Fuqua BMI—Kanar, Gave] Bouncy, good-natured blues-styled go.

PIERRE LE BON (Amy 838)

(B) "SH-BOOM" (2:15) [Hill & Range BMI—Keyes, Feaster, Feaster, McRae, Edwards] Cute French angle for the early rock hit. Artist, with a French dialect, warbles against a cheerful combo-femme chorus sound.

(B) "CESARINA" (2:52) [Ark-La-Tex BMI—Pomus, Shuman] Sprightly continental-sounding tale of a lost-love.

ELLA FITZGERALD (Verve 10248)

(B) "WHAT IS THIS THING CALLED LOVE" (2:01) [Harms ASCAP—Porter] From the performer's first series of "song books," devoted to Cole Porter songs, label has culled a swingin' version of one of Porter's big ones.

(B) "CALL ME DARLING" (2:30) [Joy ASCAP—Dick, Reisfeld, Fryberg, Marbot] The cozy Ella here. Fine for those after-hours spins.

DAN BROCK (Colonial 1031)

(B) "WE'RE ON OUR WAY" (2:55) [Bentley BMI—Lester] Joyful folkish tale that salutes U.S. astronauts, including, of course, Glenn, Shepard and Grissom. There's honest cheer here.

(C) "I'VE BEEN GENTLE" (2:01) [Bentley BMI—Weaver] A folk ballad.

LOUISE LEWIS (Skyway 132)

(B) "NOBODY BUT ME" (2:10) [Skyway BMI—Lewis] Lark warbles the good-natured affectionate against a reliable upbeat rock sound from the combo.

(C+) "FOOLISH BROKEN HEART" (2:45) [Skyway BMI—Lewis] Heavy triplet sound is part of the lark's backing on the wistful.

CORNELL BLAKEYLY (Rich 1747)

(B+) "YOU BROKE MY HEART" (2:35) [Jobete BMI—Holland, Bateman, Gorman] Vocalist hands-in a strong performance on the rhythmic blues plaintive. Gal chorus and combo provide a good, busy-beat backdrop. The Mercury label handles the diskery.

(B) "DON'T DO IT" (2:09) [Jobete BMI—Stevenson] Male songsters back the artist in this upbeat pose.

JUDY & JO (Capitol 4731)

(B+) "TATTLETALE JOE" (2:20) [Beechwood BMI—Ross, Wolfe] Gal decides she's going to play her former boyfriend's own game in this busy upbeat rocker from the lark duo. Catchy teen color.

(B) "PICTURES DON'T LIE" (2:10) [Beechwood BMI—Ross, Wolfe] Femmes ease-up on a theme about a chick who discovers that her flame has been playing the field.

QUARTETTE TRES BIEN

(Gaslight 402)

(B) "ALWAYS ON SUNDAY" (2:18) [Missouri BMI—Thompson] Slick jazz combo does a relaxed swing stint on a ditty whose title doesn't heed the advice of its famed counterpart, "Never On Sunday." Good hip listening.

(B) "LOVER COME BACK TO ME" (2:44) [Harms ASCAP—Romberg] The schmaltz is gone from the old operetta number in this unhurried display.

HONEY (Val 202)

(B) "YOU ARE THE ONE" (1:58) [TNT BMI—Welch] Male songster & The Teardrops are showcased in worthy teen-ballad fashion on the pro teen romancer. Diskery works out of Victoria, Texas. Deck could make some noise.

(B) "LEAVE ME SOMETHING TO REMEMBER YOU BY" (2:18) [TNT BMI—Welch] Boys have a more deliberate rock-ballad approach here.

BUDDY ACE (Duke 346)

(B+) "WHAT CAN I DO" (2:18) [Don BMI—Brown, Malone] Looks like Buddy Ace could have a fast click with this hard-driving danceable r&b opus. Tune has an infectious beat and a top-flight lyric. Spinners should take to this one quickly.

(B) "SCREAMING PLEASE" (2:25) [Don BMI—Brown, Malone] Here the songster reads a fine blues ballad with an enjoyable folk-styled lyric. Good wax.

THE LIEBER-STOLLER ORCH.

(United Artists 441)

(B+) "CAFE ESPRESSO" (2:12) [Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller] In their bow as artists for the diskery, the indie producing team comes up with a pro import-sounding display of a catchy tune. Likely to get important station airtime.

(B+) "BLUE BAION" (2:06) [Trio BMI—Gonzaga, Teixeira] More continental-flavored charm here.

ROBERT GALLO (Ford 109)

(B+) "THE BACK STREETS OF VIENNA" (1:45) [Papaleo BMI—Gallo] Offbeat guitar comments highlight this striking instrumental-rock outing. Label, based in New York, could have something here.

(B) "ROBIN'S THEME" (2:05) [Papaleo BMI—Gallo] Rich baion sound here.

Best Bets

JOHNNY & THE HURRICANES (Bigtop 3103)

(B+) "SALVATION" (2:12) [Vicki BMI—King, Mack, Morris] Artists display their winning instrumental ways as they up-date the famed religious piece, "Bringing In The Sheaves," for today's teen market. It's an infectious rock-a-cha-like performance that rates close attention.

(B) "MISERLOU" (2:14) [Colonial BMI—Tauber, Wise, Rubanis, Leeds] There's lots of twist-ability to this re-fitting of the Jan August classic.

THE HALOS (Trans-Atlas 690)

(B+) "VILLAGE OF LOVE" (1:56) [Trianon BMI—Brown, Mayer] The Halos, who clicked a short-while-back with "Nag," come thru with a fabulous cover of UA's Nathaniel Mayer-Fortune master. Solid stomp-a-twist performance that could be a big winner in the final sales sweepstakes.

(B) "MEAN OLD WORLD" (2:26) [Selma BMI—Crier] Backing's a fetching rock-a-shuffle entry.

THE RIVINGTONS (Liberty 55427)

(B+) "PAPA - OOM - MOW - MOW" (2:25) [Beechwood BMI—Frazier, White, Wilson, Jr., Harris] As the title indicates, this is a whacky, chant-featured outing by the blues-oriented vocalists. This uninhibited novelty affair could break out.

(B) "DEEP WATER" (3:01) [Beechwood BMI—Frazier, White, Wilson, Jr., Harris] Boys settle down to a tearful take.

JOE RENE & ORK (Epic 9510)

(B+) "AL DI LA" (2:20) [M. Witmark & Sons ASCAP—Drake, Donida] Joe Rene's instrumentalists bow on Epic with a superb reading of the oft-cut pic theme from "Rome Adventure." It's a beat-ballad-with-triplets beaut, a la "Theme From A Summer Place," that could step way out in chartsville.

(B) "TRAVLIN" (2:28) [Ben Bloom BMI—Brown, Weiricu] This half's an easy-goin' string-filled lovely. Jocks'll dig both stands.

THE FASCINATORS (Trans-Atlas 688)

(B+) "YOU'RE TO BLAME" (2:04) [Selma BMI—Craft] The Fascinators could have a first-time-out smash on the Trans-Atlas label as they shuffle-rock their way thru an all-instrumental outing. Side's loaded with big hit potential.

(B) "REVIVED" (2:20) [Selma BMI—Fascinators] Lots more top teen-shuffle sounds on this end. Solid fare for the hoofers.

LITTLE WILLIE JOHN (King 5628)

(B+) "MISTER GLENN" (2:49) [Lois BMI—Toombs, King] The latest in the disk tributes to our man in orbit is this gimmick-filled rock-a-cha-cha delighter. Opening segment is an actual description of the flight. Side has that hit sound. Keep close tabs on it.

(B+) "UNTIL AGAIN MY LOVE" [Pandora BMI—Sandler, Reid, Kosloff] This Latin-beat romancer is also loaded with the chart goods. Could be a big double-decker for Little Willie.

THE ALLISONS (Smash 1749)

(B+) "LESSONS IN LOVE" (2:20) [Duchess BMI—Soloway, Wolfe] The English teen favorites, who made noise here on the London label with "Are You Sure," could come through with this very Americanized, Everly Bros.-type speedy-beat romantic. Strong sound.

(B) "OH, MY LOVE" (2:15) [Alice BMI—Allison] Lusty folkish outing by the boys.

BOB CONRAD (Warner Bros. 5267)

(B+) "KEEP IT UP" (2:25) [Sherman & DeVorzon BMI—DeVorzon, Chandler] Conrad, star of TV's "Hawaiian Eye," could be a featured chart artist with this distinctive semi-belt stint about a gal who's a runaround. A trumpet is part of the strong rock setting.

(B) "NOAH'S ARK" (2:33) [Sherman & DeVorzon BMI—DeVorzon, Burnette] A milder, but colorful teen-slanted sound for catchy opus about the famed Biblical story.

FOUR COINS (Jubilee 5419)

(B+) "COME A LITTLE BIT CLOSER" (2:18) [Valley & Trio BMI—Leiber, Stoller] Kids are sure to be interested in this original-sounding upbeat romancer. Vet songsters warble the strong, folkish ditty against an exciting, percussions-led rock backdrop. This Leiber & Stoller production can make it.

(B) "WINDOWS OF HEAVEN" (2:14) [Quartet ASCAP—Bacharach, David] Boys smoothly render an inviting affectionate.

FRANK SINATRA (Capitol 4729)

(B+) "FIVE MINUTES MORE" (2:34) [Melrose ASCAP—Cahn, Styne] Fine Sinatra swing attitude on the oldie. Track, from the performer's "Come Swing With Me" LP, has ork backing by Billy May. It's got solid air-time potential.

(B) "I'LL REMEMBER APRIL" (2:46) [Leeds ASCAP—Raye, dePaul, Johnston] The lovely evergreen gets the Sinatra ballad sound. Source is another album, "Point Of No Return."

THE BLUES BUSTERS (New Orleans 727)

(B+) "THERE'S ALWAYS SUNSHINE" (2:25) [Melder BMI—Campbell, Jones] The new label, based in Chicago, was formed by singer Joe Jones, and it could do important business first time out with this contagious medium-beat stand by the song crew. Watch it.

(B) "DONNA" (2:12) [Melder BMI—Campbell, Jones] Boys have a catchy sound here. Tune is not the late Ritchie Valens success.

HUGO MONTENEGRO ORCH. (Time 1048)

(B+) "TARANTELLA TWIST" (2:03) [Brent BMI] This is joyous cut that has been edited down from its LP source, "Montenegro In Italy" (titled on the LP as "Ah Marie—Taratella"). Throughout the full ork display, voices are heard in good cheer. Makes for refreshing spins.

(B) "NENELLA BELLA" (2:08) [Admont ASCAP] Trumpet tops this pretty offering from the same package.

JEFF GORDON (Decca 31375)

(B) "PETER GUNN" (2:37) [Northridge ASCAP—Mancini] The jazz hit is brought back with solid sock-rock value by the instrumental crew. Growling sax is featured against a steady hard-beat rhythm. Lots of teen-market color.

(B) "FREEWAY" (2:22) [Champion BMI—Sprzelecki] Much the same romp here.

BOBBY GLENN (Gone 5126)

(B+) "YOUR CHEATIN' HEART" (2:04) [Acuff-Rose BMI—Williams] This is beltin' teen view of the great item from the Hank Williams catalog. Songster and his combo-vocal assist speak in pro teen terms.

(B) "I DON'T STAND A CHANCE" (2:01) [K&S—Groccia] Glenn is heard in a plaintive rock format here.

ED TOWNSEND (Challenge 9144)

(B) "YOU WALKED IN" (2:30) [Beechwood BMI—Townsend] Vet songster goes after the R&B-teen markets with a lively blues-styled tale of love-found. Happy rockin'.

(B) "I LOVE TO HEAR THAT BEAT" (2:22) [Beechwood BMI—Townsend] Another stint with good rock feeling.

DELORES WARE (Sharon 501)

(B+) "FALLING IN LOVE" (2:35) [Prigan BMI—Baptiste] An impressive moody vocal by the lark. She's got a feelingful number to work on, and her full ork setting is a pretty soft-spoken affair. Date is going to interest lots of jocks. Diskery is a New York outfit.

(B) "STRANGE" (2:04) [Earl & Lloyd & Logan BMI—Lloyd, Logan] Infectious gospel-type belting here.

LORD SUPERIOR (Cab 2012)

(B) "CALYPSO TWIST" (2:45) [J&H BMI—] The performer offers funny lyrics while the full ork does a slick calypso-twist stint, which also includes a jazzy clarinet. There's an engaging way about this offering from the N.Y.-based diskery.

(B) "MEET ME IN TRINIDAD" (2:40) [J&H BMI—] More good-humored calypso doings.

THE LA RELLS (Liberty 55430)

(B) "I GUESS I'LL NEVER STOP LOVIN' YOU" (2:30) [Corpo BMI—Avery] Mostly R&B-market slow-beat plaintive work by the song crew, which benefits from a distinctive-voiced lead. Overall sound is striking.

(B) "SNEAKY ALLIGATOR" (2:12) [Lily BMI—Otis, Benton] There's a romantic angle to this bouncy blues novelty.

JIMMY TY (Bella 607)

(B+) "TWISTIN' LINDA" (2:02) [Elgil BMI—DeMarzo] Solid rapid-fire twist romp from the vocalist and his combo-chorus backing. Twist excitement that the kids will want to hear. Hometown for the label is Peckville, Pa.

(B) "MARY-JANE" (2:30) [Elgil BMI—DeMarzo] Good bouncy teen blueser.

BILLY ENGLISH (Gizmo 004)

(B) "INDIAN SUMMER" (2:48) [Staid BMI—English] Pleasing romantic, not the oldie, is attractively handled by the songster and string ork-chorus accompaniment. Label is based in Cambridge, Mass.

(C+) "I GOT OVER" (2:35) [Staid BMI—English] This end sounds something like the Jerry Butler click, "He Don't Love You."

VINCE EVERETT (ABC-Paramount 10313)

(B) "SUCH A NIGHT" (2:27) [Raleigh-Elvis Presley BMI—Chase] The one-time Elvis Presley hit revived with a pro upbeat shuffle sound, headed by the Presley-sounding songster.

(B) "DON'T GO" (2:04) [Nite-Time BMI—Benefield] Folkish blueser is done with a busy-beat touch here.

MARY PETTI (RCA Victor 8015)

(B+) "THE EDGE OF THE WORLD" (2:35) [Travis BMI—Bruno, Bellini] Intriguing tale of disenchantment from the songstress, who is backed by a haunting rock-a-string chore. Offbeat issue.

(B) "THE PASSING PARADE" (2:15) [Sheldon BMI—Anisfield] Though the idea of the ditty is that of guy who has done the gal in, it's presented with an infectious rock-a-billy approach.

DANNY OWENS (Imperial 5826)

(B) "WHATCHA GONNA DO IN '62" (2:00) [Travis BMI—Owens] Cheerful blues-oriented item about a fella who plans to make a "brand new start" in '62. Amiable whistle bit is included.

(C+) "TWO ARMS, TWO LIPS" (1:45) [Travis BMI—Owens] Offbeat uptempo blueser.

JOAN SHAW (Colpix 625)

(B) "YOU MADE ME LOVE YOU" (2:29) [Broadway ASCAP—McCarthy, Monaco] Label's lark newcomer nicely eases-over the evergreen while Don Costa supplies a bluesy rock-a-string setting. Deejays will dig.

(B) "THAT'S WHAT I GET FOR LOVING YOU" (2:41) [Arch ASCAP—DeMetrius] Even more of a torchy touch from the lass and her backdrop.

THE CHAMPS (Challenge 9143)

(B+) "WHAT A COUNTRY" (1:58) [Morley ASCAP—Adams, Strouse] The popular rock combo has taken the unusual step of recording an LP of the score of the new musical, "All-American." The crew & a chorus get the sunny picture of a joyful item from the show.

(B) "I'VE JUST SEEN HER" (2:17) [Morley ASCAP—Adams, Strouse] Intimate sound from the crew and male chorus on a pretty affectionate that's also part of the "All-American" score.

CLYDE PITTS (Everest 20002)

(B) "MISTER ME" (1:46) [4-Star Sales BMI—Pitts] Diskery, now operating out of Los Angeles, comes-up with a good rock-a-billy sound, delivered by songster Pitts and a snappy combo-chorus.

(B) "HEARTBROKEN" (1:47) [4-Star Sales BMI—Pitts] This portion also moves quickly in rock-a-billy fashion.

Best Bets

THE STRING-A-LONGS (Dot 16331)

(B+) "TWISTWATCH" (2:02) [Dundee BMI—Torres] Distinctive guitar-led team, which made Top 100 news with "Wheels" on the Warwick label, might also get places with this easy, grow-on-you twist sound. Well-worth eyeing.

(B) "SUNDAY (Salve Regina)" (2:19) [Dundee BMI—Verlane] There's a European slant to the tune here.

JIMMY WILDE (Chelsea 1006)

(B+) "I HAVE CRAZY EYES FOR YOU" [Sidney BMI—Hamilton, Schlaks] Wilde gives a strong teen-market account of the solid teen romantic. Setting sound is spotlighted by a very good-sounding trumpet chorus. The N.Y.-based diskery could have a big item here.

(B) "BONNIE, BONNIE" (2:07) [Pacemaker BMI—Orofino] Quick-beat tale of a lost-love.

FRANKIE LAINE (Columbia 42383)

(B+) "A WEDDED MAN" (2:45) [Chappell ASCAP—Dubey, Karr] "We Take The Town," about Pancho Villa, didn't make Broadway, but some of its songs have been cut. This one is a gay novelty and its surveyed with a fine sunny air by Laine and his ork-chorus backing.

(B+) "WE'LL BE TOGETHER AGAIN" (2:35) [Marmor BMI—Laine, Fischer] Laine, co-author of the evergreen, offers a solid ballad sound here. Both ends have strong deejay appeal.

KEELY SMITH (Dot 16338)

(B+) "CONFIDENTIAL" (2:14) [Prestige ASCAP—Morgan] A pretty hymn-to-him is feelingfully portrayed by the songstress, who is backed by a soft backbeat setting from the combo (sans-lyric chorus is included). With sufficient airtime, this take could move.

(B) "HOW DEEP IS THE OCEAN" (2:47) [Irving Berlin ASCAP—Berlin] The evergreen is heard in a first-rate romantic light.

ROD McKUEN (Jubilee 5420)

(B+) "OLIVER TWIST MEETS THE DUKE OF OIL" (2:00) [Zizane ASCAP—McKuen, Shelley] McKuen follows-up his recent Top 100 item, "Oliver Twist," on the Spiral label, with another laff twister that also takes advantage of the "Duke Of Earl" success. Can be another active side for McKuen.

(B) "STEEL MAN" (2:50) [Canada BMI—Martins] Artist's folk background comes in handy in this spirited session.

AL HIRT (RCA Victor 8016)

(B+) "AL DI LA" (2:17) [M. Witmark ASCAP—Mogol, Donida] The trumpeter warmly handles the recent Italian hit, now being heard in the new flick, "Roman Adventure." Looks like an active deejay item.

(B+) "TALKIN' 'BOUT THAT RIVER" (2:12) [Progressive BMI—Charles] Livelier sounds in a gospel-blues vein.

FAUSTO PAPETTI (London 10502)

(B+) "JUST THE SAME OLD LINE (La Ragazza Con La Valigia)" (2:40) [BIEM—Trovajoli] The saxist does a pretty job on an attractive theme, while percussions and a well-defined triplet sound highlight the setting. An import that could see some action here.

(B) "AL DI LA" (2:16) [M. Witmark ASCAP—Donida, Mogol] Papetti is again spotlighted in a nice showing for the Sam Remo hit.

LITTLE MILTON (Checker 1012)

(B+) "SATISFIED" (2:18) [Arc-Lycio BMI—Campbell, Sain] Little Milton reads a top-notch fast-moving rollicking beat opus with his expected superior range and pitch. Chanter's potent delivery and the tune's hard-driving melodic line rank this as one of Milton's most enjoyable efforts.

(B) "SOMEONE TO LOVE" (1:45) [Arc-Lycio BMI—Campbell, Sain] This time out the songster renders a familiar-sounding r&b tune with a rockin', shuffle beat sound. Side has a good chance of getting airplay.

THE CRAFTYS (Elmor 310)

(B+) "ZOOM ZOOM ZOOM" (2:20) [Selma BMI—Hays, Jackson] This teen oldie could be a chart-maker for the Craftys, who stomp it out in money-making style. Musical accompaniment is by the Raging Storms, who are currently making noise with "Dribble Twist."

(B) "I WENT TO A PARTY" (2:33) [Selma BMI—Crier] Fellas give out with some more teen-appealing shuffle-rock sounds on this handclapper. Label's handled by the N.Y.-based Atlas Performers.

RICK & LANCE (Bigtop 3105)

(B+) "WHERE THE FOUR WINDS BLOW" (2:15) [Rumbalero BMI—Batchior, Roberts] Folk warblers do a poignant stint on the haunting folk-romantic. Soft harmonica sound is featured in the instrumental accompaniment. Inviting end.

(B) "GOOD BUDDY" (2:34) [Vicki BMI—Shorter] Spirited chain-gang session.

BETTY EVERETT (One-derful! 4806)

(B+) "YOUR LOVE IS IMPORTANT TO ME" (2:58) [LaMaja BMI—Austell, Bland] Blues lark puts lots of feeling into this expression, a tribute to a guy's standing in his gal's life. Effective, mostly R&B-market entry.

(B) "I'VE GOT A CLAIM ON YOU" (2:27) [LaMaja BMI—Everett] Performer does a good beltin' blues job here.

DEBBIE DEAN (Motown 1025)

(B+) "EVERYBODY'S TALKING ABOUT MY BABY" (2:35) [Jobete BMI—Gordy] Storyline about a gal who believes in her boyfriend, despite the feelings of others, is handled with a good-sounding upbeat touch by the songstress and her combo backing. Could get some action.

(B) "I CRIED ALL NIGHT" (2:29) [Jobete BMI—Bradford, Wylie] Slow-beat affair.

DONNA LOREN (Crest 1095)

(B) "HANDS OFF" (2:08) [American BMI—Page] Pro rock cheer from the lark and rock-a-string setting. Storyline, set to an enraging tune, tells of a gal who knows better, but is still charmed by a Don Juan.

(B) "I'M SO LONELY" (1:57) [American BMI—Jackson, Campbell] Brisk Latinish affair about the parting of a chick and her G.I.

ALTECS (Pamela 206)

(B) "HAPPY SAX" (2:10) [Monrovia & Petco BMI—Grijalba, Aguayo, Grijalva] A "laff" gimmick rock showing from the instrumental spotlights the sax work in this wild outfit. Label is located in Monrovia, Calif.

(B) "TIA JUANA STOMP" (1:45) [Petco & Monrovia BMI—Aguirre, Millsap] Musicians have that "Tequila" sound here.

RAY RUFF (Norman 508)

(B+) "LOVE MADE A FOOL OF YOU" (1:45) [Nor-Va-Jak BMI—Holly, Montgomery] Both the songster and his combo-chorus backing display reliable rock-a-billy zest here. Pro teen-beat stuff.

(B) "MY WISH IS YOU" (2:15) [Norman BMI—Tharp, Schooler] Latinish lovey-dovey from the performer.

PETE TERRACE (Colpix 628)

(B+) "NIANA" (3:25) [Peter Schaeffer's BMI—Hadjidakis] The lovely tune, written by Manos ("Never On Sunday") Hadjidakis, is attractively styled by the ork-chorus, including an appealing trumpet solo. This is an instrumental that could get hot exposure.

(B+) "YOU ARE MY SUNSHINE" (2:42) [Peer International BMI—Davis, Mitchell] A brighter cut that leans toward the Bob Moore "Mexico" side. Also has big airplay potential.

JUNE McKNIGHT (Jeannie 1225)

(B) "TWIST ME HENRY" (2:36) [Starflower BMI—Medley] Lark and her combo-chorus companions go twistin' with a basic-blues format. Label does business from N.Y.

(B) "WHY DON'T YOU COME HOME" (2:40) [Starflower BMI—Medley, Steward] Performer cries her heart out for the plaintive.

THE CORDELLS (Bargain 5004)

(B) "THE BEAT OF MY HEART" (2:02) [Y plus X BMI—Young, Gordy] One of those busy, chant-gimmick R&B-ballad stints done more often a few years ago. It stands-up very well to today's teen sounds.

(B) "LAID OFF" (2:18) [Y plus X BMI—Gordy, Osborne] Whacky sans-lyric ideas are also included in this novelty about a fella who's out of a job.

THE DICK HYMAN TRIO (Command 4018)

(B+) "DOWN HOME MELODY" (2:52) [Mills ASCAP—Hyman] Pianist and his rhythm section offer a catchy, gospel-type item. Jocks may take to it and give it chart-hitting play.

(B) "LOVE FOR SALE" (3:01) [Harms ASCAP—Porter] Cole Porter's great lament gets a swingin', again gospel-type survey.

SHARI DRAKE (Hilltop 1877)

(B) "PLEASE BE MINE" (2:16) [B-W BMI—Drake] Lovey-dovey is presented with a brisk Latin-rock sound by the lark and her combo-chorus setting.

(C+) "WHY DID YOU DO THIS" (2:22) [B-W BMI—Drake] Slow-beat romancer for the kids. Label is based in Ashland, Ohio.

JOHNNY MENDELL (Jamie 1214)

(B) "PRETTY LITTLE RITA" (2:04) [Pasco BMI—Layne, Mendell] This cheerful rock date goes back to earlier teen-beat days, but it does have a catchy upbeat way. Deserves exposure to the kids.

(B) "PLEASE BE MY LOVE" (2:32) [Pasco BMI—Layne, Mendell] Tender teen expression by the performer.

CARMEN McRAE (Columbia 42376)

(B) "HOW DOES THE WINE TASTE" (2:15) [Chappell ASCAP—Dubey, Karr] The fine lark is heard in an easy-swing format on an attractive romancer, about a girl who ponders what the world of romance is like, from the incoming song-and-dancer, "We Take The Town." Lots of airtime due this track.

(B) "NIGHTLIFE" (2:45) [Morley ASCAP—Adams, Strouse] Gal has already lived in this brighter swinger. Tune is from another new musical, "All-American."

THE LATONS (Port 70030)

(B) "SO IN LOVE" (2:45) [Benell BMI—Goldsby, Browne] Generally striking deliberate-beat blues romantic from the team's lead. Other fellas softly chant in the calm setting.

(B) "LOVE ME" (1:40) [Benell BMI—Goldsby, Browne] Catchy, though familiar-sounding upbeat, chant-highlighted work.

GARY McFARLAND ORCH. (Verve 10272)

(B) "I BELIEVE IN YOU" (2:32) [Frank ASCAP—Loesser] Standout item from the "How To Succeed . . ." score gets a fine big-band outing, mostly topped by a smoothly swinging trumpet. Side is from an LP on the show's tunes.

(B) "HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS WITHOUT REALLY TRYING" (1:40) [Frank ASCAP—Loesser] Cozy Latinish handling of the title song.

THE STRINGMEN (Epic 9503)

(B) "POW WOW" (2:03) [Jimskip BMI—Buzzeo, DeFelice] Indians are musically taking-it-over in this driving rocker, featuring striking electric guitar comments and percussions. Solid sock stuff for the kids.

(B) "DENISE" (2:17) [Jimskip BMI—Kiriakis] A Spanish feel to this catchy, full-bodied teen-beat affair.



Radio Active Chart— How It Operates

In an effort to keep all facets of the record industry informed about activity in every area of the business, Cash Box last month introduced a new feature called "The Radio Active Chart," a feature designed to indicate which new records key radio stations in every important market throughout the country have added to their play list during the preceding week.

In order to fully appreciate the weekly findings of the "Radio Active" survey, we will offer an explanation column for the next few weeks so that our readers can clearly understand how the results are derived and the method used in reporting them.

The list is, in essence, a simple compilation based on information submitted to us each week by program directors of key radio stations in every important record market throughout the country.

Every week, each key station's program director informs us of all the new records his station is planning to play during the coming week. Each station may list as many new titles as it is adding each week to its play list, whether it be just two or forty titles. Each station is given equal weight in the survey and the results are reported in percentages.

For example, if half of the stations reporting in one week's survey list a hypothetical song "I Have Dreamed" by John Smith, then the song will be given 50% in the column titled "% OF STATION ADDING TITLES TO PROG. SCHED. THIS WEEK." If Smith happens to be the hottest artist in the country and one might expect him to have 100% acceptance in the first week, some consideration must be given to the fact that a record sent to stations from the east coast takes a bit longer to reach stations on the west coast. And a station reporting to us may not yet have received his pressing of the Smith record when he submitted his report to us. In this case, however, chances are the following week's report will make up for the time lag. If in the second week another 40% of the stations list the Smith record (a second listing of the Smith record by a station which listed him in the preceding week is not used again) then Smith's disk is listed in the 40% spot. To keep the reader aware of the record's action during preceding weeks, in the column on the right, "TOTAL % OF STATION TO HAVE ADDED TITLES TO PROG. SCHED. TO DATE," Smith's record will show a 90% figure—50% from last week and 40% from this week, making the 90% total. Some records may add a few stations at a time over a period of months. This action will be indicated as the record progresses.

For a song to be listed in large type on the chart, it must receive more than ten percent acceptance in a one week period. A song will be carried in this section as long as it adds 10% or more of the stations each week.

Other titles showing less than 10% acceptance but more than 5% in any week will be listed in smaller type at the foot of the chart and will be posted there as long as they fall into this bracket. Should they exceed 10% in the next week, they will then be posted in the bold face section and their previous week's percentage will be noted on the right. A song will fall off the chart as soon as it gets less than 5% of the stations in the new week's tally.

All stations used are key radio stations and each area in the survey is a key record market. The list of stations were compiled with the cooperation of a large number of important regional and national promotion men throughout the country who listed three stations in order of strength in each of the markets they considered most important to pop records. In almost every case, the leading station in an area agreed to offer its assistance in the "Radio Active" survey. Every major record market is covered in our survey.



RADIO ACTIVE CHART

Ike & Tina Turner



The current deck of "Tra La La La" (#74 in this week's Top 100) looms as another big hit for Ike & Tina Turner who recently scored with "Poor Fool."

It all started when Tina, the featured vocalist with Ike Turner and his Kings of Rhythm for the past three years, cut a demo for one of Ike's tunes—"A Fool In Love." When the scheduled artist didn't appear at the session Juggy Murray of Sue Records decided to cut Tina instead. It proved to be a wise move for everyone concerned as the song rocketed the duo to success.

Ike, 27, and Tina, 20, reside in East St. Louis, Illinois, working that area in personal appearances. Ike is a prolific songwriter, numbering among his compositions "Rocket 88," a rhythm & blues hit several years ago. He is featured on guitar with his band.



PLATTER SPINNER PATTER

Proof of the important instant value of radio was dramatically pointed up March 2nd. On that Friday evening all but one car of the Northern Pacific passenger train, the North Coast Limited, left the tracks six miles north of Athol. The diesel units plunged into Granite lake carrying the fireman and engineer to their deaths. Six of the cars were overturned. About that number left the tracks but remained upright. Eighty-four people were injured, six of them critically. By the time reporters reached the area at one in the morning, all stations except KNEW-Spokane were off the air. Thus, it was up to reporters Woodward and Hough to tell the story not only to the inland empire but to interested stations across the country, from New York to Seattle, who called for word of what could have been a major tragedy. Periodic reports were made from the scene, then from area hospitals. By seven in the morning of March 3rd the story was told with names of the injured and the dead crewmen released. Al Huber, public relations manager for Sacred Heart Hospital, where most of the accident victims were taken, called KNEW with thanks for its exclusive coverage. Said Huber, "We listened to you all night. From your reports we geared our disaster procedure and were ready when the injured arrived."

St. Patrick's day will never be the same again. Ron Raven, popular personality on WLOB Portland, was told by station officials that no Irish music would be played on March 17, St. Patty's day. Raven went into the control room at noon and locked the door. He then proceeded to play his favorite Irish tune, "My Wild Irish Rose" for five hours and forty-five minutes. The response from the listeners was overwhelming with better than 5000 calls flooding the station's switchboards acclaiming his feat. The comments ranged from "Don't fire him . . . feed him," to "Let him stay after he has had psychiatric treatment." Some listeners even turned poet and composed "Raven poems." After the binge was over Raven commented, "I always wanted to take over a radio station. . . . Maybe next time I'll even sell the tower."

Through a KDKA-Pittsburgh Radio handwriting promotion, listeners have learned a lot about themselves and the station has learned anew how responsive its audience is. The results were staggering when KDKA Radio personalities recently offered a free character analysis by Andre, noted graphologist of Dayton, O., to anyone sending a 25-word handwriting sample and a stamped return envelope. The mail count had reached 24,325 in 12 days when the volume made it necessary to discontinue announcements, according to promotion manager June L. Buzzelli.

WINS-New York recently announced that the winner of the station's "Income Tax" contest will be chosen by Rudy Vallee, star of the Broadway show, "How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying." Vallee will draw the winning card from a drum containing over 10,000 cards which were submitted to WINS.

The station will arrange to have the winner's 1961 income tax return made out—and if the government is owed any money, WINS will pay that amount up to \$500. If a refund is deserved, WINS will match that up to \$500.

WWDC-Washington, D. C., has been presented with an "Award of Merit" by the American Optometric Association, for its "consistent cooperation, achievement and devotion in the interests of good vision," and for its contributions to the "public welfare with its efforts to inform and educate." Presentation was made by Dr. John Greenwood, president of the Optometric Society of the District of Columbia, to Ben Strouse, topper of WWDC. Other officials of the Optometric Society took part in the presentation ceremonies.

Over \$3000 worth of free advertising time will be given to 25 winning salesmen in WERE-Cleveland's present "Hats off to Salesmen" contest. The contest began March 19, and will continue through Wednesday, March 28 when all the winners' names will have been announced. The audience is asked to mail a postcard to "The WERE Salesman." On the postcard is to be listed the name and address of a salesman, what he or she sells, and where it is sold. Entries may be male or female, and a person may register him or herself. Each winning salesman will receive five free spots on WERE to sell his or her product during the month of April. Part of each spot will consist of the salesmen identifying themselves and their products.

Direct English broadcasts of Radio Moscow recently began over WIP-Philadelphia. Excerpts of the Russian interpretation of American news developments are broadcast by WIP every hour on the hour, daily from 7 A.M. through 11 P.M. The station tapes the Moscow broadcast direct from the short wave band of 71.50 megacycles during their broadcast time, which is between 7 P.M. and 1 A.M. our time, for selection of excerpts to be broadcast the next day during WIP newscasts.

Following a week's stand, in which he starred in "Send Me No Flowers," at the Sombrero Playhouse in Phoenix, KHJ-Hollywood jockey Robert Q. Lewis has returned to spinning records at the station.





POPULAR PICKS OF THE WEEK

BOBBY DARIN Sings Ray Charles

"BOBBY DARIN SINGS RAY CHARLES"—Atco 33 140

Bobby Darin successfully gets in a finger-popping groove with this lively session of tunes associated with Ray Charles. The chanter does not attempt to imitate or emulate Charles' potent folk-jazz style but offers a melodic musical tribute to Ray's forceful approach. Darin kicks things off with "What'd I Say," his current chart-rider and dishes up eleven other items with superb range and pitch. Some highlights of this top-notch outing are "I Got A Woman," "My Bonnie" and "Ain't That Love." Set looms as a sure-fire hit.

"HEY! BABY"—Bruce Channel—Smash MGS 27008

Bruce Channell cashes in on the success on his current number one smash "Hey! Baby," to name this premiere album effort. The chanter's distinctive vocal style coupled with some superior arrangements of pop tunes makes for an enjoyable sales-laden, power-packed session. In addition to the title tune the songster delivers first-class readings of "Chantilly Lace," "Love Me," and "Dream Girl." Disk should score heavily.

"ELLA SWINGS BRIGHTLY WITH NELSON"

—Ella Fitzgerald, Nelson Riddle—Verve V-4054
Lyrics sung by Ella with some swingin' backing by Nelson Riddle is an almost unbeatable alliance of words and music. These two musical greats combine their talents in a bevy of tunes penned by such notables as Goodman, Ellington, and Kern. All twelve tracks are first-rate and should send this LP straight to chartdom. Included on this enjoyable set are "Love Me Or Leave Me," "I Hear Music," and "The Gentleman Is A Dope."

"LET'S GET TOGETHER WITH HAYLEY MILLS"—Vista BV-3311

Hayley Mills, an engaging youngster with a double-barreled talent, uses her first hit "Let's Get Together" as a title tune for her first LP and surrounds it with a selection of novelty tunes aptly suited to her infectious teen-age delivery. With a background of tinkling pianos and ragtime rhythms she sings "Jeepers Creepers," "Sentimental Sunday," and "Cobbler Cobbler." Included on disk is her current chart hit "Johnny Jingo" which should help the album to step out quickly in the sales department.

"COME ON IN"—Santo And Johnny—Canadian-American CALP 1006

Santo and Johnny unleash their potent instrumental talents full-blast on interesting flock of Hutch Davie-arranged items on this, their fourth LP. The boys best-selling form carries them in good stead as they render the plaintive strains of "Spanish Harlem," their recently-released single effort. Other good tracks here are "Brazil," "Goodnight Irene" and "Hop Scotch." Disk should zoom to the upper reaches of chartdom.

"STRANGER ON THE SHORE"—Mr. Acker Bilk

—Atco 33 129
British clarinetist Mr. Acker Bilk cashes on the success of his hit single "Stranger On The Shore" to tag this initial album venture. Bilk has assembled a wide variety of tunes for the session including originals, jazz ballads and sturdies. With the pleasant backing of the Leon Young String Chorales he offers remarkably sweet renditions of "Sentimental Journey," "Greensleeves" and "Mean To Me." Disk has all the necessary built-in sales ingredients to score heavily in the coin department.

"WALK ON THE WILD SIDE"—Original Soundtrack—Elmer Bernstein—Choreo A 4ST

Ace flick composer Elmer Bernstein has come up with a potent and compelling score for the currently-in-release Laurence Harvey starrer. The music perfectly captures the turbulent, seamy life of New Orleans during the Depression. Bernstein's score keeps pace with the film with delicate ballads, uptempo hard-driving pieces and a couple of first-rate jazz bands. Highlights of the score are "Rejected," "Oliver" and "Iron Rings." Disk has loads of sales potential.



"SWINGING ALL THE WAY WITH FRANCES FAYE"—Verve V 6 8434

With a straightforward honest, distinctive approach Frances Faye kicks off top-drawer Verve package by rendering the Duke Ellington-penned "Do Nothin' Till You Hear From Me" in the crystal clear manner that has long been her hallmark. The lark is in superior form as she offers eleven other Marty Paich-arranged sturdies with swingin' enthusiasm and humor. Some highly enjoyable bands here are "So In Love," "More Than You Know," and "That's All."

"BLACK TIGHTS"—Original Soundtrack—RCA Victor International FSO-3

This quartet of ballets, taken from the original soundtrack, are gay, light-hearted, and unmistakably French. As in the film, all are introduced by Maurice Chevalier who sets the mood for each performance with his witty and incisive commentary. The package of four includes "The Diamond Cruncher," "The Merry Mourning," "Carmen," and "Cyrano De Bergerac." The music is rich and warm and should provide fine listening for devotees of classical music and the ballet.

"HAPPY SOUNDS"—Pearl Bailey, Louis Bellson—Roulette R 25167

Pearl Bailey (Mrs. Louis Bellson) teams up with her drummer-orkster husband for a delightful, swingin' session of beautifully-essayed evergreens. The first side has the thrush singing tunes like "That Certain Feeling" and "Let There Be Love" with her distinctive wide-range lyrical voice. The second six bands showcase the talents of Bellson rendering such popular items as "Sophisticated Lady" and "A Foggy Day." Although top kudos go to Pearl, the set is completely enjoyable throughout.

"HEARTY AND HELLISH"—Clancy Brothers And Tommy Makem—Columbia CL 1771

The infectious good spirits of the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem carry them in good stead on this listenable disk of Gaelic folk item recorded live at the Gate Of Horn in Chicago. There are a wide variety of tunes including a group of tradition-oriented drinking songs, a clever satire of England called "God Bless England," and a yock-filled Irish-Jewish song tagged "Mr. Moses Ri-Tooral-I-Ay." The appreciative applause of crowd gives the session a warm, spontaneous flavor.

"SATAN IN HIGH HEELS"—Original Soundtrack—Mundell Lowe—Charlie Parker PLP 406






Mundell Lowe has composed a vibrant, effective score on a mostly jazz-based theme for the new Meg Myles-Sabrina starrer. With the professional piano accompaniment of Franz Rupp, the beautiful Anderson voice is showcased on "Sometimes I Feel Like A Motherless Child," "Scandalize My Name," and "Behold The Star." LP is sure to make some noise.

"BO DIDDLEY'S A TWISTER"—Checker LP 2982

The fast-moving, hard-rockin' Bo Diddley sound comes on strong on this jumpin' session of the chanter's past hits and noisemakers essayed with a potent twistin' beat. There are plenty of terpsichorean delights as Diddley dishes up high-spirited arrangements of "She's Alright," "Doin' The Jaguar," and his biggie "Bo Diddley" tagged after himself. LP should score with all the songster's many fans.








"DANCE TO MUSIC FROM HOLLYWOOD AND BROADWAY"—Wayne King—Decca DL 74232


JAZZ PICKS OF THE WEEK



"JIMMY McCRACKLIN SINGS"—Chess LP 1464
 The versatile r&b talents of Jimmy McCracklin are swingingly showcased on this spinnable session of a dozen popular self-penned tunes. The chanter's delivery is sincere and feelingful with enough listening pleasure to attract a wide variety of record buyers. Disk includes the songster's past smash of "The Walk," "I Know," and "I Am The Blame." Session's contagious tempo coupled with some hot instrumental bridges rank it as a top-rung r&b-blues disk.



"IT'S ABOUT TIME"—Joe Morello—RCA Victor LPM-2486
 Joe Morello, who is the star drummer with the Dave Brubeck Quartet, spreads his wings for his premiere album outing on this session of medium and ballad tempo pieces from Victor. Phil Woods, who is featured as sax soloist, and Manny Albam have come up with some imaginative arrangements for the versatile Morello talents. Gary Burton on vibes rounds out the group. Every track here of both standard and original selections has time in the title. Morello shines as he reads "Time After Time," "Just In Time" and "Fatha Time."



"GYPSY ROSE LEE REMEMBERS BURLESQUE"—Stereooddities CG 1
 Gypsy Rose Lee re-creates all the excitement and color of her by-gone burlesque days on this original musical revue written by Eli Basse with music composed by Bobby Kroll. Disk consists of a group of funny blackouts and typical vaudeville routines. There's plenty of nostalgic memories here and Gypsy and crew go through their paces with a rib-tickling professional delivery. Definitely not a kiddie wax, a great deal of the material is pleasantly blue, adults should find many yocks to be had here.



"A TOUCH OF SATIN"—J. J. Johnson Quartet—Columbia CL 1737
 J. J. Johnson and his quartet are in their usual first-rate form for this enjoyable session of warmly-essayed newies and standards. The trombonist leads his boys through their paces with his authoritative and highly polished jazz style. Best listening bets here are "Flat Back," "Gigi" and a rousing rendition of "When The Saints Go Marching In."



"JOSE MELIS PLAYS HIS TV FAVORITES"—Mercury SR 60683
 The 88'er, in a subtle blending of pop tunes done in classic style, gives proof of his sensitive feeling for both types of music as he plays the sturdies along with some original compositions. Among the standards, his arrangements of "I'll Remember April," "The Breeze And I," and "You Stepped Out Of A Dream" are indicative of his keyboard artistry. LP has interesting stereo effects. Melis' quality performance makes the set excellent programming fare.



"HERE WE COME"—Three Sounds—Blue Note 4088
 The Three Sounds who consist of Gene Harris on piano, Andrew Simpkins on bass and Bill Dowdy on drums are not innovators or new-wave experimenters but superior exponents of free-flowing, easy-listening jazz. This Blue Note entry showcases the boys rendering seven sturdies and one original with dignity and lyrical melodic lines. The group turns in swingin' performances on "Summertime," "Just Squeeze Me" and "Our Love Is Here To Stay."


"LET YOURSELF GO"—Pied Pipers, Jerry Gray—Warner Brothers WS1446


"TEN GREAT SINGERS"—Various Artists—RCA Victor LM 6705





Mercury is keeping the original two-part reading on release. The new issue is backed with "Joey."

NEW YORK—The Lettermen, the Capitol label's big teen attraction, will leave Hollywood April 8 to attend Capitol's distribution and sales convention at Miami Beach, Fla. in connection with the convention of the National Association of Rack Merchandisers (NARM).

Following an appearance at the convention, the trio will do a concert at Converse University in Spartanburg, S. C., on April 11. Two additional concerts are also set at Mt. Pleasant, Mich., on May 11, and Bowling Green, Ohio, on May 12.

Group's LP, "Songs For Young Love" is number seven on this week's mono chart, 13 in Stereo. A cut from the LP, "Come Back Silly Girl," is number 20 on this week's Top 100.

Big Town Distribs Formed In Cleveland

NEW YORK—The third Big Town distributing outlet has been formed in Cleveland by Henry Droz and John S. Kaplan.

The new distributorship will handle the United Artists, Ascot, UA's subsid, VeeJay, Reprise, Stereo Fidelity and Vanguard labels.

Jim Toppel has been named sales manager of the outlet, and Henry George, general manager.

Droz is also head of Arc Distributing, Detroit, and Kaplan also operates Jay Kay Distributing in Detroit.

Other Big Town outlets are located in New York and Chicago.

Angel Exclusive Label In U.S. For de los Angeles

LOS ANGELES—Victoria de los Angeles, the famed soprano, has signed an exclusive new contract which guarantees the release of her recordings in the U.S. on the Angel label for the next five years.

The contract is with the International Artists Department of Electric & Musical Industries, Ltd., London, with which she has been associated since 1945. Her recordings have been issued in the U.S. on the Angel and Capitol labels since 1958; henceforth, all new American releases will be exclusively on Angel.

Among the first items on de los Angeles' recordings agenda are complete versions of "La Boheme," "Barber Of Seville," and "Cavalleria Rusticana," all of which are scheduled to be recorded in Rome during July and August. Also on her schedule are two albums of Spanish songs and an LP of French songs. One of the Spanish recordings, "Spanish Songs Of The Renaissance," is scheduled for a June 4 release.

Jay-Gee Gets Master From Detroit

NEW YORK—Jay-Gee Records has acquired for world-wide distribution a master out of Detroit, "I Love You" by The Volumes on the Chex label.

Murray Deutch, Jay-Gee veep and national promotion director, recently made a rush flight to Detroit to make the deal. Sales in the Detroit area alone are reported at 8,000.

Big Advance On "Darin Sings Charles" LP

NEW YORK—Atco Records has good reason to believe it has Bobby Darin's best-selling LP yet in "Bobby Darin Sings Ray Charles." The label last week reported advance sales at 100,000, a reception that shapes up as Darin's strongest LP stint to date, according to Len Sachs, the label's director of album sales and merchandising.

Joe Beiderman of Universal Distributors, notified the label that the firm had already sold out its entire allocation of the LP prior to receiving the merchandise. Dumont Distributing in Boston re-ordered an additional 5,000 copies of the packages based on orders solicited in its territory before getting its initial allocation.

Sales should be greatly stimulated by the success of a single, "What'd I Say (Parts 1&2)," taken from the album. In its first Top 100 showing this week, the deck holds the number 71 spot.

Extensive promotion and advertising is planned for the package. Included are trade ads and consumer coop ads, a varied assortment of window displays, special printed announcements (mailed to every retail outlet in the country) and mailings of the LP to deejays.

In addition, Darin is taking time out from his heavy filming schedule to make personal calls across the country.

Hank Levine Gives Dolton Big-Band Sound

HOLLYWOOD — Arranger-conductor-producer Hank Levine has been signed to an exclusive artist's contract by Dolton Records, Liberty's subsidiary label. Levine, who just completed his initial wax sessions for Dolton, will front a big band playing his arrangements.

Signing of Levine marks Dolton's entrance into the big band field a la Liberty's Si Zentner. Levine's pact will allow him to continue free-lancing as an arranger-conductor for other artists at various labels. His initial Dolton disk, "Soupy Sales Theme," has already been issued.



Both the Gordy and Workshop Jazz labels will be under the direction of Irv Biegel.

"Fans" Salute Philips

The Philadelphia Orchestra will soon begin a six-week transcontinental tour, with 36 concerts in Ohio, Michigan, Wisconsin, Illinois, Kansas, Colorado, Utah, Washington (at the Seattle World's Fair), Oregon, California and Nevada. Included in their schedule will be the recording of Brahms' "German Requiem" with the Mormon Tabernacle Choir in Salt Lake City.

Nat Tannen Dies

NEW YORK—Nat Tannen, who for more than three decades was involved in various music publishing activities, died here of a heart attack on Sat., March 17, at the age of 53.

Tannen, as head of Tannen Music, formed in 1953, was one of the first publishers to specialize in country music. In this area, he was closely associated with establishing the careers of such star country performers as Shorty Long and Grandpa Jones.

Tannen, born in Woodbine, N.J., joined Irving Berlin Music in 1931, and eventually served the pubbery as general manager. He left the Berlin firm in 1946 for Bourne Music, where he headed Bourne's sheet music department.

In 1950, he formed Keys Music, which distributed sheet music for smaller pubberies. Later, Tannen sold Keys to Hansen Music, which now operates as Keys-Hansen.

From 1951 until he formed Tannen Music, Tannen was general manager of Frank Music, Frank Loesser's pubbery.

Tannen is survived by his wife, three sons, his mother and a brother. His son Paul will continue to operate Tannen Music.

Billie Holiday Benefit Set For Carnegie Hall

NEW YORK—A Memorial Jazz Tribute to the late Billie Holiday has been set for Monday, May 7, at Carnegie Hall.

Sponsor is the West Side Narcotics Committee, headed by Leonard Cohen, recently appointed New York Deputy Commissioner of Marine & Aviation, and proceeds from the concert are to be used for the benefit of a city administered social therapy and rehabilitation center, the first of its kind in the country.

Diskeries are contributing in various ways, such as offering artists for performances, most of whom, though not announced yet, have been associated with the late jazz stylish in various ways.





Sinatra World Tour To Benefit Children

NEW YORK—Frank Sinatra will begin his World Children's Charities Tour on April 16 when he leaves Hollywood for Tokyo. The tour is a personal project of Sinatra's and is not under the auspices of any governmental or United Nations agencies.

Following a benefit in Japan, Sinatra is scheduled to make appearances at military installations in Korea and Okinawa. He will then do benefits in Hong Kong, Greece, Israel, Italy, Monaco, Spain, Great Britain and possibly South Africa. The Monaco benefit will be under the sponsorship of Princess Grace.

Sinatra will not only entertain, to raise money locally for underprivileged children, but will also visit farms, schools and residential areas via helicopter and auto. He will be accompanied on the tour by a group of musicians, still and motion picture photographers, a sound man and several assistants. The cost of the entire six-week junket is being borne by the performer.

Film footage of this personal "people-to-people" project will be incorporated into one or two television shows to be used in the U.S. to raise money for underprivileged American children.

Sinatra is currently completing "The Manchurian Candidate," which his Essex Productions is making in partnership with George Axelrod and John Frankenheimer for United Artists.

"Town" Named Top Song By H'wood Press Group

NEW YORK—"Town Without Pity," the hit pic tune that's up for an Academy Award as the best-song, has already won a prize.

It has just been adjudged the Best Song of 1961 by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association and a Golden Globe Award was presented to Christine Kaufmann, who starred with Kirk Douglas in the flick of the same name.

Gene Pitney, who sings the song on the soundtrack and has the smash version on the Musicor label, appeared at the Golden Globe Award Dinner in Hollywood and sang the tune.

Written by Dimitri Tiomkin and Ned Washington, "Town" was cut by Pitney in English, German and Italian.



FRANCE

France won the Eurovision Song Contest! (See separate story in this issue.)

Among the awards made by the Academie Charles Cros figured, in addition to the best-male-pop-singer prize won by Joel Holmes which we mentioned here last week, an award for a Decca disk, "Chansons insolites" recorded by the Trio Chantecler. "Les Noces" by Stravinsky and "Le Tricorne" by Di Falla conducted by Ernest Ansermet also won prizes—in other words, two awards for the famous conductor. More on the numerous other prize-winners later.

Camillo's "Sag Warum" sung in German has rung up big sales here in France and that really is something! Perhaps he shall even have a successful career in France—unless, of course, the little fish grows up to be a big one!

Regis Tahar, Tutti Publishers' contact man, is most pleased with the success he's had where the disk jockeys are concerned with "Le Tourbillon" (from the film track of "Jules and Jim" composed by Delerius and Bassiak). Tony Perkins is impressive on his first platter, sung in French, and just released by EMI.

Newest Guy Beart waxing is from the movie "La Gamberge" "Au bout du chemin." Rivegauche and Valentino have written a cute tune—"Fifi"—especially for Lucette Raillat (it figures on her first EP for the Bel-Air label). Good news from Wolfsohn (Alpha Publishers). It seems that "Je chante doucement" by Clark, Gauray and Petousky, is really doing all right saleswise. Note that this is a strictly French composition. Also, Petula Clark has waxed it (for Vogue), accordionist Aimable has added to his recorded repertory and P. Dorsay's orchestral version is also available. The latter artists are also Vogue folks.

Also take note of a tune which bids fair to become a standard here in France. It's "Souvenirs, Souvenirs," recorded ages ago for Vogue by Johnny Hallyday, and which still sells just as it did in the beginning. By the way, Hallyday is leading all the singing stars in record popularity these days. Even the success of the twist on the French market is due to Hallyday. His version of "Viens danser le twist" has headed all best-seller lists for months. The young singer really has reached a position where he can sing what he pleases and impose what he pleases on the market.

News from Artec Records brings us again to the Charles Cros Academie Awards. The series of "Armstrong VSOP" recordings featuring all of Louis' record work between 1925 and 1931 and reedited here by Odeon (same firm as Artec) received one of the Academie's grand prizes. And congrats went to Kurt Mohr for having supervised these reissues. Another recent Odeon issue is "Twist and Freeze" by Orlie and The Saints.

Henri Marchal of Pathe Editions reports that he has acquired the rights to a San Remo prize tune, "Passa Il Tempo"; the French title will be "Je Te Le Dois." Pathé's Les Chats Sauvage will wax two Gene Vincent tunes in French versions, and they are "I'm Going Home" and "The Love Of A Man" which ought to find favor on the market here. "Mandolino," known in French as "Tu N'es Pas Un Ange" has been recorded for Polydor by the famous Kessler Sisters as well as by Bernard Stephane. Other waxings are scheduled.

A new Festival group is "The Twistin' Tigers," who have just waxed "Je Chante Doucement," mentioned above. Every Frida Boccara disk should be closely listened to and her latest featuring "Le Ciel Du Port" is no exception. The tune is an excellent one. Accordionist Verchuren has borrowed a Johnny Hallyday creation—it's "Retiens La Nuit" and the Verchuren version will certainly be a sure seller. A newcomer to Festival is Jean Valtay, whom we have mentioned here before as composer. He sings his own "Voyage De Noces" on his latest Festival saide. Following in the footsteps of Aznavour (Barclay), Nino de Murcia and Los Maticoco (Bel-Air), whose waxings of "Esperanza" are all doing extremely well. Marie Jose has now recorded the tune.

Le Vautours—in case we should forget them—have up and recorded "Ya Ya Twist." Lucky Blondau, another twist singer (Fontana), has waxed "Je Bois, Je Dors Et J'oublie."

Latest Barclay "discovery"; Gary, L'Ange Noir, et Ses Demons. Their first recording is "Ya Ya Twist." An excellent issue on the Barclay label is the new Andre Ekyan disk, "Une soirée chez Maxim."

A few words on "Crazy Twist," a pop label release and sung by Jack Hammer, Vogue's prexy, Leon Cabat, predicted big things for this tune. Latest EP by the Everly Brothers includes "Temptation Twist" and Chris Barber gives with an excellent version of "Majorca."

From the film "La Fayette" Aimable has cut the tune "Monsieur La Fayette."

JAPAN

JPARA, Japan's diskery organization, is pressing the government to permit more imports of magnetic tape for the fiscal year of 1962, which starts April 1. Reasons given by JPARA were: the demand for more records; the increase in the number of stereo releases; and the need for tape itself for three channel recording.

For the first time, three Japanese received GEMA's Richard Strauss Awards. They are: Yaso Saijo, head of JASRAC, the composers-authors rights society; Dr. Joshihiko Kido and Dr. Masa'aki Katsumoto. The award, established in 1953 in the memory of the late composer, is given for distinguished service to music copyrights. Presentation ceremony was observed March 12 at Tokyo's Imperial Hotel under the chairmanship of Dr. Schurtze, GEMA's head.

Yves Montand's tour of Japan is set to begin on May 1 in Tokyo. His orchestra, directed by Bob Castro, will also make the trip.

Mie Nakao, 15, has signed to an exclusive pact by Victor. Her debut disk is a new version of "Come On, Dance."

Teichiku is opening another distributing branch in Sendai, the largest city in the northern part of Japan. The new office, which opens April 1, will handle distribution for four neighboring towns.

JPARA has released the quantities of various kinds of disks released last Jan.: LP's-827,050, of which 382,643 were domestic, and 444,407 were from abroad; EP's: 68,520, of which 59,765 were domestic, 8,755 international; singles: 1,689,677, of which 1,142,624 were domestic, 547,053 were international; 78's: 81,036, all domestic.

France Again Wins

France was again triumphant in the Eurovision Song Contest Grand Prix 1962 which took place in Luxembourg on Sunday, March 18th.

This was France's third victory since the inauguration of the contest in 1956, having won at Hilversum in 1958 with "Dors Mon Amour" and in London with "Tom Pillibi" in 1960.

This year's winning song was "Un Premier Amour" (A First Love), composed by Claude Henri Vic with lyrics by Roland Valade. Typically French in style the number, a slow expressive ballad was sung by Isabelle Aubret. The Musical Director was Frank Pourcel.

Isabelle Aubret is 23 years old and records for Philips for whom she has been under contract for 12 months. During this time she has waxed eight singles, the biggest success being "Reve Mon Reve," which also won her the first place at the Festival d'Enghein in Paris last year. She has also appeared in cabaret in Paris and recently appeared there at the ABC Music Hall with Sacha Distel. Negotiations are under way for her to appear in TV in England, Holland, Belgium, Germany and Denmark. "Un Premier Amour" is published by Fantasia.

The song won easily with a total of 26 points, awarded by 12 of the 16 countries voting. Second with 13 points came Monaco. The song "Dis Rien" (Don't Talk) composed by Henri Salvador with lyrics by Rene Rouzaud was sung by Francois Deguelle. Third came Luxembourg with 11 points for "Petit Bonhomme" (Little Man) composed by Jacques Datin, lyrics by Maurice Vidalin and sung by Camillo Felgen.

As the winners of last year's contest with "Nous Les Amoureux," sung by Jean Claude Pascal, it automatically fell to Luxembourg to play host to the representatives of the 16 countries taking part in this year's event—the seventh since 1956 which was won by Switzerland. Subsequent winners have been Holland in 1957 and 1959, France 1958 and 1960, Luxembourg in 1961.

The Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, although one of the smallest states on the continent of Europe, is all important disk-wise, being the center of Europe's largest commercial station Radio Luxembourg, formed 30 years ago and now beaming 150 hours of record programmes a week in five languages to an audience of 50 million listeners.

The event which was televised 'live' from the concert hall of the Luxembourg Symphony Orchestra, specially converted into a TV studio for the occasion was transmitted to the countries of the 16 participants via the Eurovision link-up reaching more than 50 million viewers.

The purpose of the contest is to encourage the output of original songs by the various countries bringing about rivalry between authors and composers through the International comparison of their works.

None of the songs entered were published before February this year and were presented at Luxembourg for judging by the European Jury after winning the national heats in their respective countries. The European jury comprised 16 National Juries of 10 each, appointed by the participating countries.

Having watched the program on TV, each jury voted for every song, except its National entry, selecting the three songs it considered best—awarding 3, 2 and 1 points respectively. These votes were transmitted to Luxembourg to be added centrally, giving a grand total of 96 points.

Much importance is attached to the order of presentation—this was determined by drawing lots three days before the contest. France was centrally placed at No. 9 with Monaco and Luxembourg favorably drawn at No. 16 and No. 14. Great Britain and Yugoslavia who came fourth with ten points each were also well drawn at No. 13 and No. 12.

The songs entered ranged from the full blooded Viennese waltz submitted by Austria to the toe tapping up-tempo contributions from Finland and Germany, Sweden and the U.K.

Eurovision Song Festival's Grand Prix

Ballads were plentiful and popular, notably the first three songs of France, Monaco and Luxembourg as well as the entries from Denmark, Norway, Switzerland and Yugoslavia. Surprisingly there was a complete absence of Rock and Roll and The Twist. The sexes were evenly balanced with eight female and seven male singers, the only duo being the 'Spelbrekers' Huug Kok and Theo Rekkers from Holland.

Two artists not making their first bid for the European trophy were Fud Leclerc of Belgium, who competed at Hilversum in 1958 and London in 1960, and Jean Philippe, who represented Switzerland at Cannes in 1959.

Several well known conductors from previous festivals took the rostrum once again including Frank Pourcel of France, Raymond Lefevre of Monaco, Cedric Dumont of Switzerland, Kai Mortensen of Denmark, Georges de Godzensky of Finland and Jose Privsek of Yugoslavia.

The successful composer and author team of Jacques Datin and Maurice Vidalin, responsible for last year's winning song once again represented Luxembourg with "Petit Bonhomme." Geo Voumard and Emile Gardaz, composer and author of the Swiss entry "Le Retour" last year came third with "Nous Aurons Demain" and in 1956 won the first Eurovision Grand Prix with "Refrain." The 36 piece orchestra made up of members of the Luxembourg Symphony Orchestra augmented by selected musicians from Paris was under the direction of Jean Roderes. The program was composed by Mirelle Delannoy of Tele Luxembourg and the awards, solid silver medals, were presented to the winning composer, author and singer by last year's winner Jean Claude Pascal.

Representatives from many of Europe's Record companies and publishing houses arrived in Luxembourg for the contest including A & R Manager Johnny Franz and Paddy Fleming from Philips London. A & R Manager Norrie Paramor from EMI London. Jack Heath of Good Music publisher of the British entry "Ring A Ding Girl" also came from England, as did publisher George Seymour of Cinephonic.

From Germany came Herr Ittenbach, director of Electrola and Heinz Geitz and Herr Igner from the production department of Electrola, the recording company of the German entry, Conny. Her song "Zwei Kleine Italiener" (Two Little Italians) came fifth with nine points and has already sold 300,000 in six weeks.

Dr. Fauch came from Telefunken and publisher Dr. Alfred Schacht of Aberbach in Hamburg, who has the German rights of the Swedish and Finnish songs was also present.

A strong contingent came from Paris including Philips A & R manager Jacques Canetti, Mr. de Froberville and Mr. de Roquefeuil of Pathe Marconi, Mr. Seignette of Polydor. Publishers were represented by Mr. Denis Bourgeoise of Bagatelle, publisher of last years winning song and this years Luxembourg entry. Mr. Georges Roquiere of Chappells who handles the rights for the Monaco and Spanish songs.

From the Scandinavian countries came Mr. Anders Holmstedt, president of Skandinaviska Grammophon of Sweden, and his A & R manager Ivan Nordstrom. Mr. K. G. Sigurth represented the Swedish TV company. Swedish publishers included Felix Stahl, Managing Director of Stockholm's Musik Productions who has acquired the Scandinavian rights of the British song. Also from Stockholm Mr. Ake Gerhard composer and publisher of the Swedish song.

From Finland came Mr. Aano Walli, Television producer and Mr. Jaakko Borg, manager of the Record Dept. of Editions Misik Fazer. Mr. Kjell Karlson composer and publisher of the Norwegian song came from Viking Musik A/S of Oslo.

Dr. Riccardo Navarro, Secretary General of Fonit and Cetra came from Milan. Two versions of the Italian entry "Addio, Addio" are currently high in the Cash Box Italian charts. One by the composer Domenico Modugno on Fonit and one by Claudio Villa on Cetra.

Other visitors included Mr. Stamer from the public relations office of Decca in Holland, publisher Mr. J. de Boeck of Ardmore & Beechwood in Belgium, Mr. Volmer Sorensen of Danish TV who also wrote the lyrics for the Danish entry and Mr. Frank Tappolet, Director General of Swiss Television. Also from Switzerland conductor and publisher of the Swiss entry "Le Retour" Cedric Dumont of Editions Coda in Zurich.

ENGLAND

FINLAND

Herman Sjöblom, 67, managing director and president for Oy R. E. Westlund Ab, died suddenly on March 13. He had been head of this EMI company since 1940.

Finland's Eurovision Song Festival song of 1962, "Tipi-tii," has been sold to Italy, it is reported. As this is written, nothing is yet known from the Song Festival at Luxembourg, except that Marion Rung will be the first artist performing the Finnish song.

DENMARK

Bobby Rydell, now on a world tour, visited Copenhagen on March 1 and taped two songs, "Mammy" and "The Door To Paradise," for the Danish National TV. These songs will be televised later this month. Rydell spent two busy days in Copenhagen before he left for Milan, Italy.

Chubby Checker's "Let's Twist Again" proved to be very strong in Denmark and according to Kurt Hviid Mikkelsen of Skandinavisk Grammophon A/S (EMI in Denmark), the company expects another gold-mine with the same artist's new release, "The Twist"/"Twistin' U.S.A." According to Mikkelsen, the best thing that could happen for the future record sale would be a personal visit of Chubby Checker in Scandinavia. Mikkelsen also told Cash Box that the firm has just released Dave Appell's "Happy José," titled "Ching Ching" here. Another EMI artist, Connie Francis, is expected to make her first personal appearances in Scandinavia in May.

As expected, the song that was banned from joining the national Danish song competition this year, "Jeg Snakker Med Mig Selv" (I Am Talking To Myself), has proved out to be the biggest sales hit. The recording with Gitte, who was the one who should have sung the song in the local competition, this week appears in the 6th spot on the charts, with "Carissima", another of the Festival songs (not the winning one, however) appearing in the 10th spot. The winning song, "Vuggevisse," is not yet on the sales lists. On the other hand, Sweden's Luxembourg entry, "Sol Och Vår," in a Swedish recording by Inger Berggren appears in the 9th spot on the Danish charts this week.

NORWAY

Doing well in Norway with her Norwegian recording of "Don't Read the Letter" is Siv Malmquist, the Swedish songbird, who already recorded the song—with very good success—in Swedish and Danish. This week, her Norwegian version appears in the 11th spot on the Norwegian charts.

Norway's contribution to Luxembourg 1962 does not yet appear among the Top 20 on the local charts. On the other hand, the song "Nå har jeg gjort hva som gjøres kan" (Now I've Done What Can Be Done), also recorded by Inger Jacobsen on Columbia, this week holds the 12th spot. The song was one of the songs in the local competition.

SWEDEN

One can always be sure that something happens around Sweden's Song Festival songs. The latest is a dispute between two composers about whether the Swedish winning song is a plagiarism or not. According to STIM (the performance collecting society) another composer, Fritz-Gustaf Sundelöf, has claimed that "Sol Och Vår" is too much like his song "Nya Fågelsången" (The New Bird's Song), a song on a local Swedish song competition a couple of years ago. STIM has declared that there is no court which will make any decisions, but they will keep the money coming in on "Sol Och Vår" until the two parties solve the problem. Ake Gerhard, composer of "Sol Och Vår," has no comment since he prefers to wait until Ulf Källquist, the co-writer of "Sol Och Vår," is back in town. However, Ake Gerhard declared that he did not steal the idea. From the publisher's points of view, this might create a strange situation since "Nya Fågelsången" is published by Europa-Produktion, Ake Gerhard's private publishing company, which also is the publisher of "Sol Och Vår."

Stig Anderson, composer and publisher, head of Sweden Music, Bens Music, Spanka Music and Ivan Mogull Music for Scandinavia, tells Cash Box that Paul Anka's "Love Me Warm and Tender" looks like it will be hit here. The same goes for "Walk On By" with Leroy Van Dyke on Mercury, a song which has done very well in Norway and Denmark, and now is going strong in Sweden. Anderson is publisher of "Zwei Kleine Italiener" (Two Little Italians), Germany's contribution to the Luxembourg Festival this year, and reports great interest in Scandinavia with not less than six different local recordings. Another song Anderson believes has great possibilities here is the Belgian song, "Twist Twist," which, among others, has been recorded in Sweden by Lill-Babs on Karusell. Anita Lindblom includes the American song "I Know" on her next Fontana recording, according to Anderson, who was the publisher of "You Can Have Her," for which Miss Lindblom recently got a gold disk in Sweden.

Within weeks of launching its 'New Look' program, Oriole Records may have its first chart entry with "Fanlight Fanny" by Clinton Ford. The label has another strong seller in "The Method" by Gary Edwards, which registered 8,000 sales in one week. Twist-wise Oriole follows its successful single "Kissin' Twist" by Jack Hammer, currently high in the Belgian charts, with an LP "Hammer Plus Beat Equals Twist." A former member of The Platters, Hammer is also a dancer, actor, drummer and composer of many hits including "Great Balls Of Fire" recorded by Jerry Lee Lewis.

Carlo Kramer of Esquire Records, specialist jazz label, recently acquired several well known American catalogs of country music which will be issued on the Starlite subsidiary label.

Singing star Diane Todd has been cast as a night club singer in the George Raft film, "Two Guys Aboard."

EMI Records hosted a reception for Jeri Southern and The Four Freshmen in this country for a nationwide tour. On March 25, they joined British stars Matt Monro and Danny Williams in The Charlie Chester Music Hall on ITV. The Four Freshmen have a single "Teach Me Tonight" and an LP "Stars In Our Eyes," both released by Capitol.

World famous cellist Pablo Casals is featured on three low-priced LP's issued by Philips. In the Schubert String Quartet in C and the Brahms String Sextet he joins forces with violinist Isaac Stern. In the third release is the hitherto unissued recording of Beethoven's Trio No. 6 (Archduke). This and the Brahms were recorded at the Prades Festival in 1958.

Agent and manager Lyn Dutton has arranged for singer Dinah Kaye to represent Great Britain in the 2nd International Song Contest in Warsaw in July. Dinah will subsequently make a 12-day concert tour of Poland. Last year Dutton was responsible for British jazzman Ronnie Ross taking part in the International Jazz Festival in Warsaw.

Britain's youngest professional jazz band, The Dauphin Street Six are on the threshold of international success. Just back from a sellout tour of Denmark negotiations are under way for them to record in London for Emile Knudsen, head of the Storeyville label in Denmark.

Jim McHarg's Scotsville Jazz Band, formed three months ago, make their debut on Pye Jazz with a trad version of "Forgotten Dreams." McHarg, no newcomer to the jazz scene, formed his first band The Clyde Valley Stompers ten years ago. Since then he has toured Canada playing with such well known names as Earl Hines, Muggsy Spanier, Willie (The Lion) Smith and Ruby Braffete. Prior to forming his latest group, McHarg was one of Dick Charlesworth's City Gents. Already established as a standard, "Forgotten Dreams," by Leroy Anderson, is published by Mills Music. Firm also publishes "Nicola," composed and recorded by Steve Race on Parlophone. "Nicola" is the signature tune used by Steve for his dj programs.

Argo, specialists in Spoken Word recordings, continue to forge ahead with the complete cycle of Shakespeare's plays recorded by The Marlowe Dramatic Society supported by leading actors and actresses from the English theatre. Meantime, to meet the large demand, particularly by schools, for records of Shakespeare containing key scenes and speeches, the company launched the new Argo DA label. Featuring highlights taken from the complete series, the four releases comprise "The Tragedies Vols. 1 & 2"; "The Comedies Vo. 1" and "The Histories Vol. 1."

Board of Trade figures show that manufacturers' sales of records in Jan. were valued at £1,659,000. This was 1 per cent more than in January 1961. Home sales were 1 per cent less but export sales were 16 per cent more. There was a substantial fall in export sales in 1961. Production wise 77 per cent of the total number of records produced were 45 rpms—an increase of 12 per cent over January 1961. Production of 33 1/3 rpms was up by 27 per cent while the output of 78 rpms continued to fall and was 21 per cent less than a year earlier.

Noel Gay Music delighted with the success of "Hole In The Ground." Written by two young revue writers, Ted Dicks and Miles Rudge, and recorded by Bernard Cribbins on Parlophone, this unusual comedy disk continues to make steady progress in the charts. Sheet music sales are also reported to be good.

"Twistin' Time" is the title of a new six-week series for BBC sound radio. DJ Tony Hall acts as compere and the program will feature singer Doug Sheldon and The Earl Guest Group.

Mark Wynter just took part in a recording session with a difference at The Decca studios. Adopting American procedure, former British pop star Johnny Brandon with American writer Stewart Weiner penned four numbers specially for Mark and also handled the entire session. Four tracks were cut "First Date," "Cinderella," "I Love You Still" and "Angel Talk," for release as two singles both here and in the States.

On April 1 a new pop independent label will appear on the British market. The label, Salvo, is a subsidiary of Emperor Records formed only a few months ago. Initial release—6 singles and 4 LP's—all drawn from independent American catalogs but future issues will include British material. First titles "Long Black Stockings" by Tony Butala (Topic), "My Own True Love" by Karen Chandler (Strand), "Blue Moon Beams" by The Jokers (Lin), "No Way Out" by The Mighty Men (Duchess), "I Love An Angel" by Johnny Dot (Vaca) and "Lipstick And Rouge" by Jerry Fuller (Lin). All the LP's are from the Strand catalog including "The Art Of Glenn Miller" by The Bill Leavitt Orchestra. Future issues will be made monthly retailing at 6/9d single (95¢) and 27/6d LP (\$3.85). In charge of the new label Clive Selwood (promotion executive) and A. J. Kosky (sales manager)—both were previously with Philips Records Ltd. A weekly Radio Luxembourg disk show, "Sounds Like Salvo," began March 19. Clive Selwood is the host.

Singing star Alma Cogan left London for Australia where she will appear on TV there. A new Granada TV series, "Swinging Along," features singer Marion Ryan and The King Brothers.

ITALY

Philips Italiana has started distributing the Mercury Records' line in Italy, formerly represented in Italy by Gurtler and then by Ricordi. RAI, Italy's only radio and TV station, decided not to play "The Peppermint Twist" by Joey Dee, but Ricordi, which handles Roulette Records in Italy, has made it a hit despite the loss of broadcast exposure. Reason for RAI's move is not known.

Philips Italiana is attempting to enlarge the disk buying market with a campaign, from Jan. to Oct., among members of the National Body of Assistance to Workers to get them to buy a selected record repertoire at a special low price. Previous ideas along this line have come from RCA Italiana, in cooperation with Reader's Digest, and by VCM, which has a special offer under the name of Club del Disco.

"The Best of Duke Ellington," an LP featuring 10 dates by the famed pianist-maestro, has been released by VCM. The label has also released a 45 rpm Nat King Cole single, "Sucu Sucu (Step Right Up)," already famous here, and "Brazilian Love Song."

Nini Rosso's smash recording of "Ballad Of A Trumpet" is being used on the soundtrack of the film, "I Nuovi Angeli (The New Angels)," now showing in Rome.

The Champs, of "Tequila" fame, are now represented in Italy with "Tequila Twist" by way of Decca Italiana's London label. Decca has its own twist single, Caterina Valente's "Twistin' The Twist." Pat Boone's U.S. hit, "I'll See You In My Dreams," to be released in Italy in the near future.

Tullio Gallo (Philips) has recorded "When, When When" and "Tango Italiano," Italy's numbers 1 and 2 songs, respectively, in the manner of Ray Conniff, and sales are reportedly doing well.

Top prizes at the recent song festival at Viareggio went to: "Per Noi Due (For Us Two,)" by Umberto Bindi, which was given the Golden Burlamacco, and "Le Case (The Houses)" by Mr. Meccia, awarded a Silver Burlamacco. Both tunes are published by Ariston.

Durium has high hopes for Kenny Ball's "Midnight In Moscow," the English and American smash.

While in Rome for the opening of RCA's studios, Cash Box paid a visit to the Italian office of Aberbach, the publisher, whose Italian offices are represented by Franco Fedeli. Fedeli announced that this month would mark the first publication of original Italian music under the firm. After a year and half in Italy, Aberbach has established an impressive reputation in Italy's music field.

MEXICO

Frankie Avalon will debut in México very soon at the Terrazza Cassino, the night club now presenting Puerto Rican singer Bobby Capo. He will probably make some appearances on Mexican TV.

RCA Victor has a new label named Camden Regional, part of its subsidiary RCA Camden, which will only issue folk music to be sold mostly in the Northern part of the country. This new label has artists like Ducto Los Conejos, Beto Partida, Los Naipes, Pedro Yereña, Pepe Crow, Las Lupes, Los Huracanes de Terán, El Tacuarinero and many others.

Mariano Rivera Conde, International A&R man at RCA, is at the moment in Argentina supervising new recordings and systems. He will go to Montevideo, Brazil, Lima, Quito, Medellín, Venezuela and by the end of May return to México.

Reprise's manager Mo Austin in México with his wife, arranging the representation here of Frank Sinatra's label. It is very possible that Columbia Records will take it, but at the moment, there is nothing definite.

RCA announced that seven of its 15 best sellers are folk music records and only three twists among them. RCA's best sellers at the moment are Jose Alfredo Jimenez, Amalia Mendoza, Miguel Aceves Mejia and Gilberto Valenzuela. This label also announced the releases of Elvis Presley's "Good Luck Charm" and "Anything That's Part Of You" and Paul Anka's "Love Me Warm And Tender." This last song has also been received as sung in Spanish by Paul and will be issued very soon. Popular folk singer Veronica Loyo will travel to Puerto Rico, Argentina and Spain to perform in night clubs, theaters, on television and make recordings. Before she leaves, Veronica will record the songs "Déjame Así," "Temo Pensar" and "Todo."

Another one who is going to leave México is Lucho Gatica, who for the second time recently became a father. Lucho will appear in New York and Chicago for a short season.

Rafael Camacho, secretary of the Radio Industry Union (STIR) will fly to La Paz, Bolivia to assist in the first assembly of the union in that country.

"Capullito de Alheli" and "Magic Moments" have been recorded at Peerless Records by the singer of the "new wave" Arturo and the Dany Orchestra. "Magic Moments" is now very popular via the Al Suarez version.

Peerless issued a Brazilian album with the choir and orchestra of Elcio Alvarez.

Edgardo Obregon and Chuck Anderson, A&R and arranger and conductor of Columbia Records, are selecting new songs for the fourth Enrique Guzman's LP.

Cuarteto Havana is the name of a Cuban group who is recording the tropical twist for RCA, the company is promoting this new combination that may have tremendous success in all the Latin American countries.

Max Koslowsky, international manager of popular Italian composer Domenico Modugno, declared that Modugno will be here at the Festival Mexicano de la Canción (Mexican song's festival) and will give the prizes to the winners. At the same time, it is possible that Modugno will perform in a night club and also make a picture with Miguel Zacarias' Productions.

Peerless announced the release of two LP's recorded by Telefunken with Rudy Risavy's string quartet. The Mexican company is to release many German recordings here.

Pepe Leon, Terrazza Cassino's owner, is very interested in getting Caterina Valente to perform at his night club, opening June 22.

RCA will release Italian music sung by Nico Fidenco. The songs are "Legata a un granello di sabbia" and "Su nel cielo," his big Italian hits.

HOLLAND

Preceding his guest appearance on the Teddy & Henk Scholten TV show, "Zaterdagavond Akkoorden," British singing star Frankie Vaughan paid a visit to Van Hoorn's famous shop for angler's equipment in Amsterdam, together with Piet Beishuizen of Philips' Phonographic Industries in Baarn and manager Dick van Gelder. Angling is one of Frankie's hobbies. On TV, Frankie Vaughan, of course, sang his most recent success "Tower Of Strength" (Philips, L.C. Phonogram).

Around the 1st of April, Dutch singing idols Ria Valk, The Candy Kids, (both Fontana, L.C. Phonogram) and The Fouryo's (Decca, same company) are set to appear before German TV. Also during April, Philips-star Anneke Grönloh will be seen on TV in Hamburg.

On March 17 Sender Freies Berlin in association with KRO-Hilversum in Holland, presented a German version of the famed "Teddy & Henk Scholten TV-show." Same day viewers in Holland saw "Hotel Viktoria" with Vico Torriani, featuring Philips-star Vivi Bach and Dutch Blue Diamonds (recording for same—Decca—label as Torriani).

Sunday, March 11 The Blue Diamonds were present at the showings of the German musical film "Ramona," in which they sing the title song, at the Roxy Theatre, Amsterdam. There were crowds and crowds of fans to meet and greet these top Dutch idols. Their latest single has the years old "Rio Nights" and new hit parader "Dream Baby," selling very well.

At the request of Singapore, which she recently visited, Anneke Grönloh recorded "Ma, He's Making Eyes At Me" and "When The Saints Go Marching In" (Philips).

Jan de Lang, who contributed to many fairy tales recorded for Philips, suddenly died of a heart attack. He was 57.

De Spelbrekers (of "Katinkafame") took the parts of The Blue Diamonds (who enter military service) in The Vico Torriani Show, filmed here at the end of March.

"Walk On By" by Leroy Van Dyke is Phonogram's best selling Mercury single at this moment. "Time Further Out" by The Dave Brubeck Quartet is the best selling Fontana LP here just now.

Bovema's Gerry Oord told Cash Box that his record company welcomed several important guests recently. Among them were Jimmy Bayles and Hoyt Klinec, international Directors of Dot-records and Jacques Beverie, supervisor of EMI. "This was a very important visit," Oord said. "Mr. Bayles as well as Mr. Klinec paid a great interest in the activities of the Dutch record-market and we had extensive and useful discussions on several matters."

Bovema's Liberty-label released the "Stars Of Liberty" LP, covering the best items of 12 well-known Liberty-artists, including Bobby Vee, Troy Shondell, The Ventures. Another important release was David Seville's "With The Chipmunks Around The World"—EP.

Robert Oeges, Columbia-label manager, announced the big news that Cliff Richard's first visit to Holland will take place on April 7 & 8. Cliff will give personal performances in Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague. His famous accompanying group The Shadows will be with him, too. The Columbia department is now taking all necessary steps to prepare a great deal of publicity around this forthcoming teenager-highlight.

The great piano-virtuoso from Chile, Claudio Arrau, who was here on March 9, will perform again in Holland on April 18. Then he gives a solo-recital in the Amsterdam Concertgebouw.

BELGIUM

It looks like the LP record by Soeur Sourire (Sister Smile), a Sister of the Dominican Order of Missionaries, who recorded her songs for Philips-Belgium, will become the record of the year. Sales are unique in the history of the Belgian LP, since the disk is selling at a rate of 700 per day.

Lammy Van Den Hout reported to Cash Box that Philips is expecting much of Henri Salvador's newest single. This famous Franch singer hits the road again with his version of "The Lion Sleeps Tonight": "Le Lion Dorme Ce Soir."

Fonior-Brussels reports its best selling disks of the month. Here they are: "Mexico" by Bob Moore (1), "Violetta" by Bobbejaan Schoepen (2), "Oh! La La Louise" by Eric Genty (3), "In Iedere Droom" by Bobbejaan Schoepen (4) and "Lecon De Twist" by Caterina Valente (5). The RCA people here are really giving fast releases these days. Their most recent speed performance was applied to Elvis Presley's "Good Luck Charm," which was dispatched to radio stations and disk jockeys to coincide with the American issue. Side is already enjoying tremendous sales here and will soon be climbing all over our national charts.

It looks as though the local recording industry has a king-sized problem on its hands as a result of the recent increase in musicians' recording fees, advice of which was circulated to recording companies, advertising agencies and the like a few days ago. These new rates virtually amount to a hundred per cent increase in musicians' recording fees. In the past the accepted fee has been seven guineas per three-hour call with the usual adjustments for section leaders etc. The new schedule calls for a seven guinea payment for a ninety-minute call, which brings a three-hour call to fourteen guineas. It seems certain the executives of The Association of Australian Record Manufacturers will soon meet with Musicians' Union executives to discuss the new fees and perhaps put forward suggestions for the solution of the deadlock that is likely to arise over the new rates.

Jim Staples, of Viking Record Co. Pty. Ltd., has advised Cash Box that it has secured the rights for the Chancellor, Congress and Canadian-American catalogs for Australia and New Zealand. Viking already issued the Linda Scott singles, "Bermuda" and "Yessirree" and other releases from these labels will follow soon, including album productions.

Talented local lass Lana Cantrell has an interesting new single on the Festival label, topside is "Moscow Nights," a vocal adaptation of the tremendous instrumental smash "Midnight In Moscow." "Moscow Nights" is catching strong air-play and could easily take off for Lana Cantrell.

Barry Stanton, a local boy recording for Festival's Leedon label, has a new single which has "Back In Your Arms" (a local composition) as the "A" side. This one is a fine follow-up to Stanton's previous chartrider "Beggin' On My Knees." Both these titles are worthy of overseas release, in fact it's surprising that they haven't been snapped up for foreign release.

England's Tony Brent, who is reported to be at present residing in Sydney, has his first single release out for Pye Records here: "What's The Reason."

RCA made a rush release of the album "Descond Blue," which is the first RCA package featuring famous alto player Paul Desmond of The Dve Brubeck Quartet. The Brubeck group is very strong on disk here and it is reasonable to predict that Paul Desmond will corner a good market with this issue.

Joe Halford of Castle Music is very excited about Castle's current batch of hit songs; they include "Don't Break The Heart That Loves You" and "Drop It Joe" (Connie Francis—MGM); "B'wa Nina" and "Weeping River" (The Tokens—RCA); "Do Re Mi" (Lee Dorsey—Parlophone and Dig Richards—Festival); "Happy Jose" (Dave Appell—HMV and Jack Ross—London) together with local titles "Baby Loves Me" written by Elaine Goddard and recorded on HMV by The Allen Brothers and "Stay Away From Him" written and recorded by Bobby Royal.

APRA (Australasian Performing Right Association) in conjunction with EMI produced an album entitled "Holiday Bound," which has been released on the Columbia label. The package consists of eight local orchestral compositions played by The Sydney Light Concert Orchestra conducted by Hal Evans. The cost of this recording has been underwritten by APRA and the album has been designed to promote interest in local compositions.

ARGENTINA

Regarding the changes that took place recently in his company, Peter de Rougemont, head of Columbia Argentina, informed Cash Box that all the posts that were left vacant have been already fulfilled: Douglas Taylor will be the sales manager, Orlando Luis Rosenberg head of the press and publicity department and Ricardo Pereira, promotion chief. A new post has been created: Stanko Jerebic will be in charge of artist relations. Taylor and Pereira were previously manager and promotion man of Orfeo, a Columbia subsidiary; now, both companies will be unified. De Rougemont also added that he will direct more personally the company in the next months.

Mrs. Ralph S. Peer, president of Southern Music Publishing Co. and Miss Provi Garcia, manager of the Latin-American dept. of the organization, will arrive in Buenos Aires May 7, as part of a Latin-American tour of fifteen countries. R. P. Iversen, vice-president of Southern Music, will meet them here May 11. They will stay in Buenos Aires about thirteen days, studying the work of Edami, their representative, and seeing the possibility of increasing the operation of their company in this part of the world.

Disc Jockey Records is sending tapes of most of its local recordings to King Records of Japan, which has shown big interest on its catalog, and is already releasing some of them. Besides, label is planning to release some King records here.

Los Santos will return to Argentina March 25, finishing their European tour, which lasted about eight months, and included: Italy, Spain (they performed at the Pasapoga, Biombo Chino, and in Bilbao, Barcelona, Leon and Alicante), Paris (ABC Music Hall), Sweden and Lisboa. In Buenos Aires, they will take part in a special TV show, on Channel 7, and will record some European tunes for Orfeo. In 1963, they will return to Europe, as they have contracts in Finland, Norway and Germany to fulfill.

More news from Disc Jockey: Palette Records has released in Europe records cut here by Rosamel Araya and the Mac Ke Mac's; thus, these waxings will be through all the world very soon. (Araya's waxings are already available in New York). Disc Jockey has also invaded the language record field, releasing three English language courses, recorded by Conversa-phone in the US: "English for Children," "Learn Today, Travel Tomorrow," and "General English." These sets have been very well received by the customers; they cost about \$10 less than other language courses.

Dimsa Records announced it will release new LP's by Los Peregrinos, (folkloric group), Cesar Costa (Mexican teen singer), Miltinho (Brazilian), Conjunto Indoamerica (Paraguayan songs) and Mexican Mariachi Silvestre Vargas. There are also some new artists, recently inked: Los Marrupeños, Los Vidaleros, Los Panamericanos and well known tango singer Hector Pacheco.

Jorge Cesar Esperon, topper of Tonodisc, reports that he has made arrangements with Jubilee Records, Atlas Performers (Warwick) and Time Records of the U.S. to represent them in Argentina, Uruguay and Chile. First releases will start in April. Esperon will go to Chile soon, to arrange releases in that country.

The Teen Tops (Mexican rock 'n rollers) completed their performances in Argentina, Uruguay and Chile, and are already back in Mexico, where they will work in the Paco Malgesto TV'er, and record new twist tunes. Their last record, "Popotitos," is running very well in Argentina.

RCA announced the release of the first Paul Anka record handled by the label. The titles in Spanish will be "Quiereme Tiernamente" and "Yo Quisiera Saber." It is also said that Anka will visit Argentina in a few months. Ricardo Mejia, RCA's A&R, plans to start a big promotion plan on Presley, Anka and Neil Sedaka in April. "They sell very well," he told Cash Box, "but we expect even more from them." Another interesting release is "Crei" and "Te Deseo Amor," cut in Mexico by Mike Connors, the TV star, and "Tied To A Grain Of Sand" by Nico Fidenco.

Jose Ruzo of Edami reports that "Ritmo de Chunga" has already fourteen recordings in Argentina: Carlinhos (Odeon), Leticia Estrada (Odeon); Tito Alberti (Philips); Perez Prado (RCA); Chico Novarro (Record); Bingo Galante (Serenata), Trio del Plata, Dany Montano (Music Hall) and others. The tune has been played very much at dance parties, during the last Carnival holidays.

News from Fermata: The publisher will start a promotion campaign for the latest Paraguayan tunes that were contracted by Mauricio Brenner during his last visit to that country. In the tango field, Paula Gales will record for RCA "A Bailar Este Tango"; the same tune will be also cut by Raul Cobian, "Tanguito." Oscar Sola is looking for good places to shoot a new picture that will be starred by Antonio Prieto.

Neumann (Downey) Publishers informs that Andy Russell will arrive in Buenos Aires in a few weeks, to begin a new TV show on Channel 7. The company is now promoting "Moon River," which has already been cut by Frank Ferrar (Waldo de los Rios) for Columbia. The Mac Ke Mac's have cut for RCA, two tunes that are considered hits-to-be: "Por Favor" (Please) and "Esto Es El Romance," written some years ago by Rodgers & Hart.

Gigi Gallo, of Promotora Sudamericana de Grabaciones, reports that Microfon Records will release an LP with the best songs of the San Remo Song Festival of 1962. The artists are Luciano Tajoli, Myrian Delmare, Jenny Luna and others. This album couldn't be released in Italy because these artists belong to different labels; however, Gallo has negotiated the rights of releasing such a selection in South America. Gallo also informed Cash Box that Columbia will start releasing Tony Dallara's waxings. The first record is "Bambina, Bambina," first prize of the Canzonissima contest.

Music Hall will start releasing Copacabana Records in Argentina. Copacabana is a Brazilian label, of much prestige in its country. Next Music Hall releases will be LP's by Pablo del Rio, Mavis Rivers, Calvin Jackson, Los Huehleros (folkloric group), Los Cantores del Alba, and Sammy Davis. The label has also inked Amelita Vargas, well known "vedette," who will start recording very soon.

GERMANY

It's always interesting to look at the record sales figures year to year in each country and draw a picture of the market and the direction that the market is taking. The complete figures for 1961 are now in and here's how it looks. Single records sales took a dip of 750,000 for the year, EP's increased 50,000 over 1960, 10" LP's which seem to be on the way out, remained constant with 1960, and the 12" LP sold 300,000 more than 1960. That means that 1/2 million less records were sold last year than the year before, but since the LP's bring in more cash, the market moved upward in dollar sales. In 1961, 49.5 million records were sold in Germany. The most interesting figures show that record import decreased 250,000 pieces, but record export increased by 100,000. Overall, it's a sign of maturity and independence for the German record market. We hope that it continues in the year to come. It's still basically a singles market where a million records of a hit can be sold, but the LP is finding its way into the homes of more and more buyers daily.

Germany is still talking about Paul Anka's visit here, and the fine impression that he made. Before he even arrived, he sent the following letter to the Hamburg, Germany press. "I was most concerned to hear about the terrible floods in Hamburg. Therefore, I asked Teldec, my record company in Germany, to abstain from an excessive promotional campaign on my arrival at the airport. I presume that actually the people of Hamburg have more important things to worry about. However, I am looking forward to my first visit to Germany and my press conference with the German press."

Ralph Maria Siegel reports great action on the Mr. Acker Bilk recording of "Stranger On The Shore" which is taking off on the charts here. His publishing firm is also working on new recordings of oldies "The Beer Barrel Polka," "El Rancho Grande" and "Paper Doll" as well as the German version of "Jimmy Martinez" by Gitta Lind.

Radio Luxemburg reports that the following foreign records (not German) are in its top 10. "The Young Ones" by Cliff Richard is in 4th place, "Mexico" by Bob Moore—5th, and the Connie Francis German waxing of "Lili Marlene" is 3rd.

Karl Breuer, the general manager of Sikorski Music, will make his first trip to the U.S. on March 25 and will stay for 3 weeks at the St. Moritz Hotel in N.Y. He is there for talks with A & R men and publishers. Karl brought the tapes of the English version of the European hit "Ivan Ivanovitch" by Swedish songstress Anna Lena which was released in the U.S. on Jamie Records. Right now, Karl is busy working on his many hit records in Germany.

Paul Siegel is now celebrating his 3rd anniversary as DJ for Radio Berlin. Paul is also doing shows for Radio Hamburg. He needs taped greetings from record artists in the states which can be sent to him in Berlin at 16 Tauentzien Str. Paul is also happy about his production of "It's A Long Way To Tipperary," which has been released by Seeco Records in the States.

Theo Seeger from Peer Music reports that a German version has been made from the English hit "The OO-Wee Song." Pirko Manola has recorded it for Teldec here.

The twosome's sincere country delivery coupled with the tune's hand-clapping beat give the wax a good chance of zooming to the charts. In "Have Faith In Me" the couple offer a fine tradition-oriented gospel item with a moving mid-deck recitation. Wax could pull plenty of loot.

Shortage Of Men And Machines Should Spur Early Arcade Opening Plans

Spring may not be in the air judging from where you're sitting but it's definitely on the calendar and has been since last week. All of which leads us into the arcade season once again, a business that buys and sells thousands upon thousands of amusement machines each year in preparation for the fair-weather customer, the pleasure seeker who visits amusement parks, beaches, playlands and resorts during a period that is bounded roughly on each side by Decoration Day in May and Labor Day in September—a day that signals the return of much equipment used during the summer months.

If you operate an arcade which will open its doors for this 1962 vacation crowd then you should be aware of two factors that may hinder your enthusiastic approach to the business at hand. The first obstacle is a shortage of equipment, a situation which has come about because of two reasons—lack of new arcade machine production at the manufacturing level, and an export market that absorbed great quantities of used machines during the past six months. Throw in the fact that not that much equipment is either on hand now or was actually traded back last fall.

The second major obstacle which has long since reared its head in other areas is the shortage of skilled mechanics and servicemen available to get the present wholesaler inventories in shape for operator openings.

Since machines, and men to keep 'em working, are the most important ingredients in an arcade, the situation may seem desperate. It can, however, be overcome by early planning. It is not too early to begin ordering equipment for '62 arcade openings. The sooner you order the sooner present inventories can be dipped into in order to supply your firm with the necessary number of games. Under-staffed wholesalers can get a jump on the reconditioning end of the business in order to have the equipment ready for your opening date.

With the exception of several new baseball games and new guns, no mass-produced equipment coming off the lines today is specifically earmarked for arcades. The standard shuffle-bowler-pingame inventories, while used in most arcades, are not manufactured particularly for the arcade. Several new golf games have been reported on the market but no success stories have been reported in these areas, although it may be a little too early to report. One or two efforts with radical ideas designed for arcades have not brought about any great response from ops, according to our sources. That leaves us with the new standard machines coming off the lines, and what's left of the used machines now in warehouses awaiting reconditioning by understaffed crews.

Better start ordering early to insure delivery when you need it—the day you open your doors.

Berger Names 3 Distributors For Precision Line

NEW YORK—Harry Berger, national distributor for Precision Metalcraft Inc., manufacturers of compact vending machines, announced last week the firm's first distributor appointments since being named national factory representative two months ago.

The distributors named are as follows: Bilotta Distributing Company, Newark, New York coin machine firm with branches in Syracuse and Albany, and with upstate territorial sales rights to the Wurlitzer, Williams, Smokeshop and other coin-operated lines; Scott-Crosse Company, Philadelphia firm headed by Abe Witsen, Bally distributors in the Pennsylvania area; and First Coin Machine Exchange, Inc., Wurlitzer distributors in Chicago. Additional firms presently signing franchises with Berger are expected to announce the agreements next week.

Precision Metalcraft is a subsidiary of E.M.I., a publicly owned Minneapolis manufacturing firm. Precision is the vending division of the firm which also makes surgical instruments and electronic components.

The line includes a cigarette, cookie, cigar and laundry supply machine. Plans for sandwich machines, drink machines (hot and cold) and a complete bank called the "Snack-A-Teria" are currently ready for production and are expected this Spring.

Berger recently returned from a Minnesota trip where plans which include European sales were discussed by Berger and EMI executives.

The machines are being located in New York City bowling alleys with much success, according to Berger, and a concentrated sales program for one month has resulted in the sale to operators of "several thousand" machines according to Berger, and production for April and May has been reported at figures above the February-March volume.

Berger has plans for approximately thirty distributors in the nation but states that until such time as a wholesaler agrees to place the proper amount of emphasis on the Precision line, no appointment will be made in a particular area. "We are not looking for wholesalers with major lines who cannot devote the attention we insist must be given to our sales program," said Berger during an interview last week.

Foreign Trade Plans May Stimulate Liberal Depreciation

NEW YORK—President Kennedy's Foreign Trade Program which is currently being studied by legislators after a week-long introductory session conducted by members of the Department of Commerce and other leaders in Washington might be the wedge which opens the door to a more liberal depreciation on industrial equipment as written off on corporate tax returns in the future. As it stands, this program appears to be the only way in which such a revision in the present inequitable arrangement may ever come about.

Coin-operated equipment, long a shining example of the antiquity of today's tax laws, is depreciated over the years in about as many ways as can be found. While Philadelphia operators benefit from a 50-25-12½-12½% system, as presented years ago by a forward-thinking trade association, coinmen in neighboring locales suffer from less equitable arrangements because this system is not recognized nationally. Outlined in many complaints received here, operators tell us that the initial depreciation system used by them is the one to which they must adhere to this day, according to IRS agent decrees. There is no uniform depreciation system on the books which has been approved by the Treasury Department. Other industries suffering from write-off problems, may have uniform systems but the arrangements may be considered inequitable. In all instances, industry is in dire need of a change and the sooner American industry receives the benefit of a more equitable arrangement, the better.

Should President Kennedy's Foreign Trade plan go through as written, lower tariffs here on imports will prompt greater competition among certain industries and the Government's program expects to counteract this situation with more liberal depreciation on industrial equipment thereby permitting quicker write-offs and increased expansion, which is expected to come about once the tax situation is resolved.

After many years of waiting, the coin machine industry (and the nation's business world) can look forward to a possible breakthrough in an area that has gone too long without attention — the depreciation bottleneck which is stifling expansion plans for many.

Parks Men Vote To Retain PR

CHICAGO—The National Association of Amusement Parks, Pools and Beaches, parks association located here, announced last week that its members have approved a Public Relation Works Committee for the '62 season.

The parks men, who are eager to start the new season off, expect the PR program to resume its relationship with Communications Counselors Inc. which won strong endorsement of its 1961 program efforts at the recent Convention.

ChiCoin Releases New Bowler "Gold Crown" To Trade Big Ball Bowler Features Quiet Action

CHICAGO—Mort Secore, director of sales at Chicago Dynamic Industries, of this city, last week unveiled Chicago Coin's newest large coin-operated bowler to the coin machine trade, while he simultaneously rushed sample games to the firm's far-flung distributor organization.

This new amusement game—Chicago Coin's "Gold Crown" big ball bowling alley features several particular revisions in the cabinetry to offer the players considerably more comfort, and performance, plus attractions.

One of the foremost innovations, Secore indicated, assures much quieter play action as the patron bowls the ball down the playfield.

"As you probably know," Secore said, "there is a layer of cork just below the highly polished flooring on the playfield. Now, our designers have further devised a method whereby there is still more pliability, and, of consequence, more facile and still quieter delivery on the alley.

"This excellent innovation was accomplished," he added, "by covering the screws used under the alley with rubber. As a result the playfield is cork lined and rubber mounted. This is easily one of the notable improvements in this type of equipment.

"Other comfort and convenience innovations players are certain to delight in are evident on the cabinet at a mere glance. The very front of the playfield (where the player leans his legs against the shin rail) is completely padded in soft, pliable rubber. This is indeed, the very first such 'Padded Rubber Shin Guard' ever offered in large, coin-operated bowling alleys.

"Also," Secore continued, "the cash box which also contains the various game selector buttons and a large deluxe ashtray, was moved over to the left side of the alley. This offers an added convenience to right-handed bowlers, since the ball stand for the ball return track is more easily available.

"These various innovations, along with the most beautiful, attractive large bowler, are merely part of the overall appeal in Chicago Coin's 'Gold Crown' big ball bowling alley.

"The play is the thing (in the words of the immortal bard, Shakespeare)

and that is where this exciting amusement game out-strips all other coin-operated bowlers."

Secore went into detail to explain the six bowling scoring games in ChiCoin's "Gold Crown" bowling alley. He spelled out the fact that operators practically demanded these most popular games.

He was fairly poetic in his word description of the "Red Dot" bowling game, which he said is easily considered by many at Chicago Coin Company, and among the firm's distributors everywhere, as the most thrilling game to bowl.

In "Red Dot" one "Red Flashing Dot" (illuminated on the pin hood) scores 500 points on the strike and 300 pins on a spare. Two "Flashing Red Dots" net the player 700 pins for a strike and 400 points for a spare. In graduating, three "Flashing Red Dots" are good for 900 points on a strike and 500 for a spare. In the event that no dots appear (flashing) strikes are worth 300 points and spares 200.

In "All Strike" bowling the player bowls for strikes only. This game is loaded with action and thrills. In "Super Strike" bowling the player has the privilege of going for "Strike or Bust" by simply depressing the "Strike or Bust" button. The "Super Strike" scores 600 points. If the player misses on "Super Strike" he scores only the normal pin count. The normal strike counts 300 and the spare scores 200 points.

"300 Champ" has 20-30 scoring. It is a continuous strike feature, and easily one of the favorite games in ChiCoin bowling equipment. Another game constantly in demand in Chicago Coin's games over the years is "Regulation" bowling, according to Secore. It is played in accordance with American Bowling Congress (ABC) rules. The perfect score is 300 pins.

"Flash-O-Matic" is an exciting, high scoring bowling game featuring all the thrills in skill shooting, and expert timing in shooting for the pins as rapid-moving tiny lights flash across the bottom of the backglass. Players usually have considerable fun with "Flash-O-Matic" in competition. Chicago Coin's "Gold Crown" is a 6-player bowler.



CHICAGO—Visitors to the American Institute of Laundering Annual Convention here at McCormack Place today saw the latest innovation in making the American Way of Living a good clean life with the showing of the first Hoffman "Valet-eria." The "Valet-eria" is a unique type of self-contained unit which consolidates fully automatic coin operated washing and dry cleaning units with the professional dry cleaning and shirt laundering services.

Hoffman also announced that Valet-eria service centers initially will be installed in New York, New York; Chicago, Ill.; Pittsburgh, Pa.; Cleveland, O.; Miami, Fla.; Oakland, Calif.; Raleigh, N. Carolina; Birmingham, Alabama, and Ft. Worth, Texas. In all, between 75 and 100 will be installed within a year from coast to coast. We also will provide professional guidance in all phases of design and engineering, including layout of equipment and traffic flow, to create the most efficient handling of every possible facet of the business—even the design and strategic location of signs and posters—is included in our extensive program to provide operators with the means for operation at maximum profits right from the start, he added.

Stephenson added that financing arrangements require a 10-20 per cent down payment, with the balance to be paid out of profits over the next several years. NEW YORK—The Lefrak organization has equipped four of its Brooklyn apartment houses with a "first" in tenant services.

The builder/realtor firm has placed drug and sundry vending machines in the buildings to provide tenants with 24-hour availability of essential items such as aspirin and headache remedies, antiseptics, band-aids, ointments for burns, razor blades, antacids and throat lozenges, etc.

This unprecedented service for apartment house dwellers will make these common home items available for emergencies and should prove of great value especially when all other sources of supply are inaccessible or closed, according to Automatic Cafeterias for Industry, the firm which installed and will service the machines.

Lefrak has installed the specially designed vending machines at 2775 East 12th Street, 3235 Emmons Avenue, 2800 Coyle Street and 2750 Homecrest Avenue.

Nine selections will be changed regularly to determine those items for which the tenants show the greatest preference. The items are specially packaged and are vended for 25 cents. The company pointed out it will be working with more than 3,000 available items.

This is the first full-scale placement of drug vending machines in apartment buildings, according to the vending machine operator. The firm, whose offices and plant are in Westbury, L. I., believes that there is a definite need for a new supply source for proprietary drugs and sundries. Up to this point, these items are usually sold over-the-counter in drug stores and super markets.

Last fall, Automatic Cafeterias pointed out, field test installations were made for these drug vending machines. Acceptance was such that the company is now entering full scale the multi-billion dollar drug and sundry market with its automatic vending machines in apartment houses.



Distrib For Golf Game Named

JENKINTOWN, PA. — Investment Development Associates, located here, has been appointed distributor in the Middle Atlantic and New England States for the Nail Tone "Hole-In-One" golf putting machine. Nail-Tone is located in Miami where the coin-operated game is manufactured.

Putting green of the automatic scoring machine is three and one-half feet wide and eleven feet, four inches long. An elevated contoured "green" features simulated grass, reportedly designed to track a golf ball in the same way that genuine grass would. Three holes in the green open in sequence. Four players may play nine holes in three rounds.

Balls are automatically delivered

to putting position, eliminating the necessity to bend down. Scoring console at the far end of the machine, in a cantilevered position, indicates each score.

Paul Cooke, vice-president of Investment Development, advises that the game can be played in less than two minutes. Nine balls are issued for either 10¢ or 25¢ depending on the optional coin mechanism. Crated, the unit weighs 460 lbs.

Muzak Names Director For European Plans

NEW YORK—Muzak prexy Charles C. Cowley announced last week that Neil Margerison, formerly director and general manager of Planned Music Ltd., Muzak's franchiser in London, has been elected to the new post of Managing Director of the European Division.

Two years ago Muzak expanded to the Continent and now expects to add to its presently developed background music systems which operate in public places by entering European industrial outlets. The music heard in Europe is the same as that used in Muzak systems here.

Last year Muzak added Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, Peru, Australia and Finland to its present foreign division.

Margerison was with Philips Electrical Ltd. for ten years before joining Muzak. He will survey market potentials and available means of transmission of programs for the firm.

Right Distrib, Wrong Label

Eastern Flashes

Ever wonder what ever happened to the scale business? Remember, the good old days, when practically every retail store of any consequence had a weighing scale outside, chained to the gate, or door, and for one penny you received your weight plus your fortune? Well, there were 32,000 scales in one nationwide operation at one time and the Peerless Weighing and Vending Co. in Long Island City was the operator. Today, Peerless specializes in parking lot vendors, meters, etc. but in those days, before the penny was doomed, scales were big business. Today, not too many do that well. A caller on Tenth Avenue, Jim Crosby, worked for Peerless for twenty years, and related some of his stories from those days as listeners sat-in during a coffee-klatch in the Mike Munves showroom last week.

* * * * *

"One scale on State Street in Chicago, placed outside Saturday and taken back in Monday morning was capable of taking in from \$30-50," stated Crosby. The average scale drew about \$10-15 weekly, according to the former scale man. Buyers at the coin machine shows spoke of routes with thousands of scales. It was big business. Watling, American, Peerless, and several others whose names don't mean much today, were the manufacturers. "The machine with the sliding weight will still perform well," said Crosby. But the good old days are gone for the one-penny scale.

In the first place, the penny can't stand the cost of operating as it once did. Secondly, too many bathroom scales at home killed the business. Finally, a nickel didn't go over and of course, with most weight concious people today, they know their weight every waking moment, thus the need for scales is diminished. 
