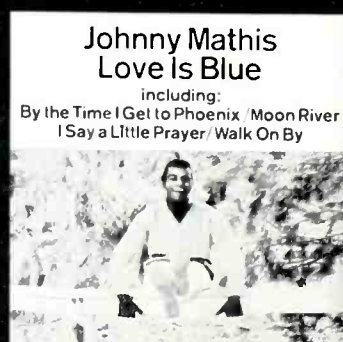
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## The Price Of Doing Business

Price change never seems to come easy in the record business. By what immutable law of economics does this industry operate with some kind of self-consciousness when, as a whole or individually, it decides on an upward adjustment of the cost of its product? We have no idea how this all came about, but there would seem to be something sacred about keeping records at a fixed cost to consumers. Under this false stability, the record industry is supposed to be immune to the outside world, where the cost of doing business—at the pace of spiraling inflation—is ever on the increase, and increased price scales are a rather ordinary fact of life.

These thoughts come to mind as a result of the new pricing schedule announced by RCA Records for its pop and Red Seal album lines. The new pricing—not affecting singles or the company's economy-priced LP's—is a modest 4%, bringing the list prices of the product involved to the point where they were three years ago when the industry passed on to consumers the savings that came with the removal of the excise tax.

Cynics might point to the death of the mono record as essentially a price increase, since consumers could no longer buy a mono disk at \$3.79 (list price, to be sure) and were forced to

go stereo at \$4.79 (list price, to be sure). But, the trade knows that the changeover to all-stereo proved a costly burden to many labels—yet who dared to suggest a price increase, even at RCA's 4% adjustment?

To illustrate once more the industry's self-consciousness in making price adjustments, some companies have set higher prices for certain albums, such as original cast product. Quite often, this has been accompanied by something "extra," mainly in the nature of elaborate packaging, including booklets, photos, posters, etc. So higher prices are justified by obvious increases in cost-factors to produce the set! But, the consumer should also be aware that the "hidden" cost-factors climb, too. Like the greatly increased income by artists from labels, the cost of studio time, the increase in studio time to produce more entertaining LP's, labor costs at all levels, etc.

It was recently suggested by Clive Davis, president of CBS Records, that the industry charge for its product on the basis of what the traffic will bear. Like Broadway, night-clubs and concert arenas that engage super-stars. This is fair in our view.

It is also fair that the business make general adjustments when the economics of doing business can no longer accept the price status-quo. This is only fair, too.

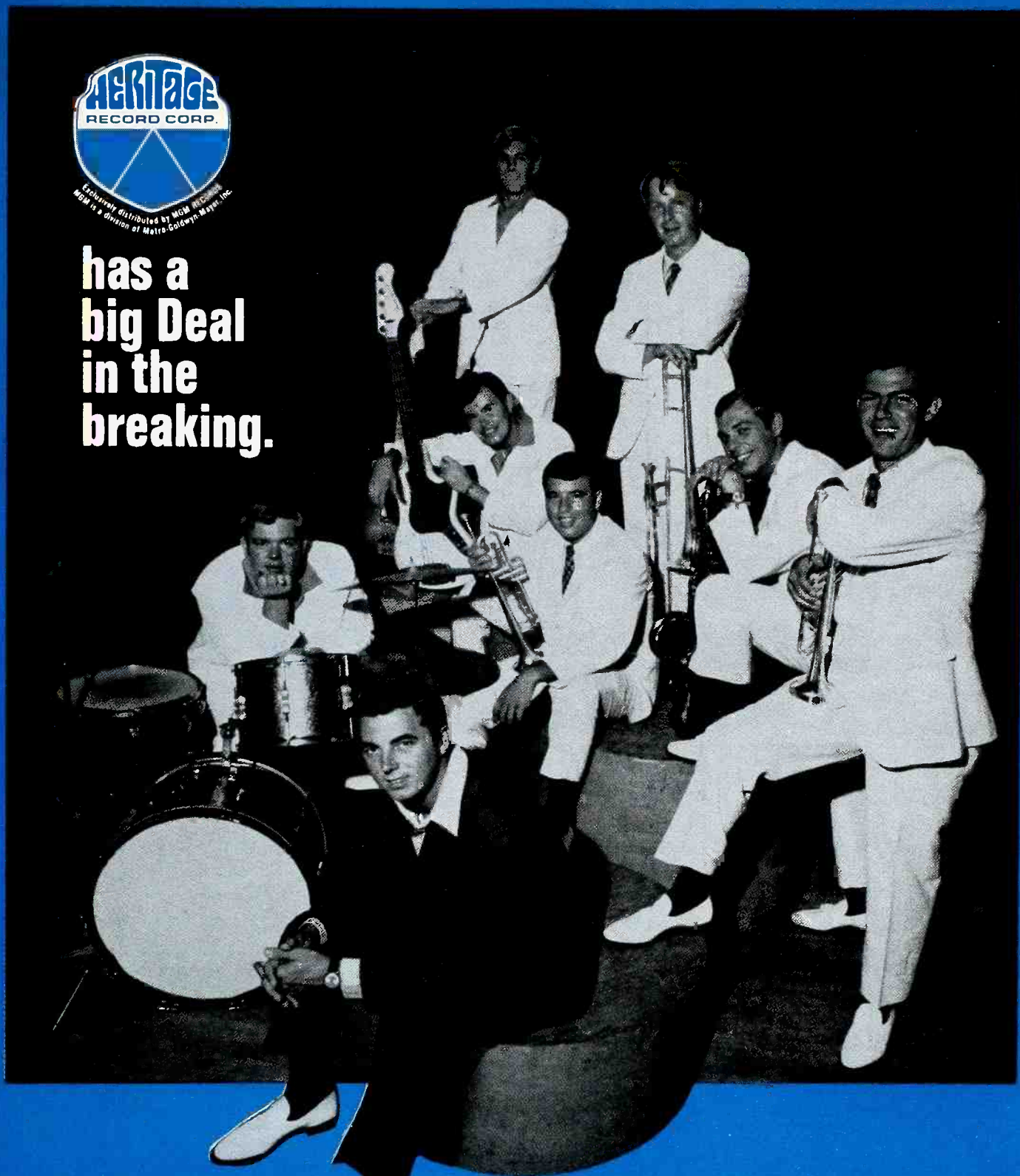

## What The Trade Can Expect At MIDEM '69 Meet

LONDON—MIDEM 1969 takes place at the Hotel Martinez, Cannes, from January 18th through 24th. A host of top executives from the world's record companies, music publishers, radio, television and general show business enterprises numbering 4,500 and representing forty countries will assemble for the third annual meet of what has become the major event of the yearly entertainment industry calendar.

MIDEM—Marche Internationale du Disque et De L'Edition Musicale, International Record and Music Publishing Market for those who have forgotten the full version of the abbreviation—will house the host in 350 office-auditoriums occupying five floors of the huge Hotel Martinez, each one fully equipped for listening to records and tapes, receiving visitors and conducting business.

There will be ten presentation auditoriums with monaural and stereophonic equipment for records and tapes, two film projection rooms, and

a hall with a seating capacity for 150 to permit special promotion on particular artists and groups.

New features of MIDEM 1969 will be international seminars for record company and music publishing representatives, providing a forum for opinions, suggestions, discussions and solutions to mutual problems and difficulties. The seminars will be attended by commercial, legal, technical and artistic experts, and will be held in specially equipped premises with projection and simultaneous translation facilities. All sessions will be taped for future reference and use by participants.

Another innovation will be COJIDEM, an international juridical committee for records and music publishing, comprising leading specialist attorneys in this field under the chairmanship of M. Pierre Riviere. The committee will examine common problems of international law affecting the industry.

International super-variety galas

will replace the national galas of MIDEM 1968 which, with very few exceptions, were major disasters of presentation. The new-style galas will be held in the evenings at the Palais des Festivals, further along the Croisette sea front from the Hotel Martinez, and each will run for ninety minutes. MIDEM talent scouts and artistic specialists have been traveling internationally to secure the services of top stars and the most promising newcomers for these galas.

## Bell Grets 70% Sales Increase With Expansion Of Headquarters

NEW YORK—Bell Records celebrated a dynamic sales showing in '68 with 70% higher yearly sales. The record sales mark, and Bell's bright year were capped by last week's move into larger space in a suite at the same address.

The new offices occupying the entire fourth floor of 1776 Broadway were called "a tribute to our operative theories, our artists, the independent producers that we utilize and our hard working and dedicated executives and staff" by label president Larry Uttal.

The relocation climaxed a record breaking year during which Bell and its distributed labels accounted for 39 chart singles and 7 album best sellers which helped establish artists such as the Delfonics the Box Tops and Merilee Rush. Another of the important features of '68 history for the label was its establishment of international channels which provided "trans-Atlantic traffic" to put Bell's logo on the best seller lists in England, France and Germany.

Inroads into the country & western market was another of the year's projects, as were moves into underground, easy listening and "pop-

country" areas with product by James Bell, Spooky Tooth, Mel Carter, Bobby Russell and Cilla Black. At the same time, Bell maintained its hold on rhythm & blues sales with hits from the Delfonics, Al Greene, James & Bobby Purify, Lee Dorsey, James Carr, the Masqueraders and others.

### Biggest Week Ever

Bell's growth was best reflected in the May 6-10 period which proved the label's biggest ever with shipment of 400,000 singles in the five day stretch.

Expansion in the indie producer roster was highlighted by attraction of Bobby Russell (author of "Honey") as a producer and artist with Elf Records, Bobby Darin with his Direction label and Larry Page's Page One Records with the Dick James Music organization for distribution in the U.S. Bell also maintains its agreements with Bones Howe, "Papa Don" Schroeder, Chips Moman, Tommy Gogbill, Dan Penn, Dale Hawkins, Mike Stoller, Allen Toussaint and others.

The year's growth was also reflected in promotion for Irv Biegel who became vp in charge of sales; Allan Cohen, now vp of finance and produc-

## Gulf & Western Sales Up In 1st Qtr

NEW YORK—Gulf & Western Industries, the conglomerate owner of Dot Records and the Stax-Volt setup, in sales and earnings during the period ended Oct. 31. The company's report just issued reflected gains of over the same period a year earlier. 38% in earnings and 21% in sales.

No financial breakdown was given in the statistics which were adjusted percentagewise to reflect businesses acquired through subsequent transactions.

Net earnings for the first three-months of the fiscal year were \$23,523,000 for G&W (\$1.10 a share); and net sales rose to \$368,603,000.

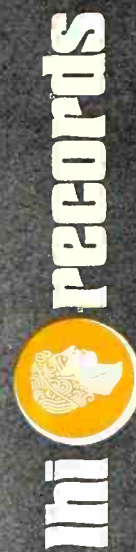

## Bubble Gum Music Brings K-K An 85% Sales Increase

NEW YORK—Filling the best seller lists with "bubble gum" hits that kept them on the charts for 80 consecutive weeks, the production team of Jerry Kasenetz and Jeff Katz racked up an 85% increase in revenues over their previous year. The money figured in this rise was accumulated through the pair's record production, music publishing and management enterprises. Gross retail sales reached \$25,000,000 for 25 chart singles (six of them certified for gold records).  
 During the last two months the indie producers have been riding high with four singles on the top 100: "Chewy Chewy" by the Ohio Express, "Goody Goody Gumdrops" from the 1910 Fruitgum Company, the Kasenetz-Katz Super Cirkus' "Quick Joey

Small" and "Shake" by the Shadows of Knight.  
 Their success has also established producer-writer careers for Artie Resnick, Kris Resnick, Joey Levine, Bo Gentry, Ritchie Cordell, Reid Whitelaw, Billy Carl, Sal Trimachi, Elliot Chiprut, Bob Spencer and Chuck Trois.  
 Kasenetz-Katz Associates inaugurated two new concepts during '68: administration of affiliate production companies such as Levine & Resnick and Big Kahoona to free creative producers for concentration on production solely; and an "indie management" resigned to bring young people into the music business in an executive capacity.  
 This year saw K & K launching two new labels, both under exclusive distribution deals with Buddah Records. Team Records was immediately initiated with the Shadows of Knight's hit "Shake," and Super K Records was introduced last month with the first product coming from the K-men singing as "Jerry & Jeff" with "Sweet, Sweet Lovin' You."

### Mascari Exits Merc; Opens Own Complex

CHICAGO—Eddie Mascari is exiting Mercury Records, after a 10 year stint, to open Stereo Sonic Recording Corp., an 8-track studio at 528 North Michigan Ave. Mascari is partnered with Ed Cody in the firm, which is expected to go into operation by Feb. 1, 1969.  
 Mascari has also opened Ivanhoe Records, and two music publishing subsides, Bob-Cor (BMI) and an unnamed ASCAP firm. Ivanhoe is currently negotiating production deals with a variety of labels and is currently signing writers and artists. Foreign publishing deals, etc. will be announced shortly.  
 During his stint with Mercury, Mascari served as director of licensing and copyright, general manager of publishing division, and was responsible for writing and producing the Mark IV's "I Got A Wife," a big chart item for Mercury in 1959. He was also responsible for bringing Major Bill Smith into the Mercury fold, which resulted in such hits as "Hey Paula" and "Hey Baby." Mascari also created the successful Mercury Storyteller Series, and his most recent discovery was Madeline Bell, who scored with "I'm Gonna Make You Love Me."

The twosome said that the new year will concentrate on diversification of product with entries into the adult pop, modern country, r&b and easy listening fields. There is also to be a greater emphasis placed on album releases which will offer "not only greater sales, but also give Kaskat Music writers greater strength for the promotion of their material."  
 Recent realignments in various groups to increase proficiency and in-person appeal has also established several K&K acts for a campaign to be opened shortly for the teams as stage performers.

**Separate Showings For Command, Probe**  
 NEW YORK—The Command and Probe labels will make separate presentations at the product meeting of the entire ABC family which is being held in Miami Beach at the Eden Roc Hotel from January 5 through 8. Joe Carlton, vice president and general manager of the Command/Probe division, said that this was in keeping with ABC Records president Larry Newton's concept of autonomy for label subsidiaries.  
 The command and Probe presentations, which will be attended by promotion men, salesmen and distributors, will be led by Carlton and Command's national sales manager, Charles Trepel. At that time they will discuss seven upcoming Command LP releases, and three singles and an LP slated for release on the Probe label.  
 This will be the first meeting of this sort for the newly formed Probe label. Probe, which was formed by Carlton, is aimed specifically at the youth market (the slogan reads, "Records with a good, good feeling"). Probe's first release was an album by the Soft Machine which is currently seeing chart action. The soft machine LP features "moving-parts" packaging, a concept which Carlton intends to use on other albums. Probe's new singing duo, Guy & David, will have their first single, "Brooklyn Roads," penned by Neil Diamond, released in mid-January. The record was produced by Al Capps who has worked as arranger on disks by Mason Williams and Gary Puckett and the Union Gap. Scheduled to appear on the Joey Bishop Show at approximately the same time, Guy and David are expected to debut their record on that appearance. Bishop has been instrumental in launching the careers of Guy & David. He featured them on his show some months ago for five consecutive nights.

### Ganim Leaves Liberty

HOLLYWOOD—Liberty Records national promotion director Dennis Ganim has resigned his position, effective last week. Ganim will make his future plans known after a brief vacation.  
 Ganim has held his post with Liberty since May 1967, during which time he implemented several major promotional efforts, including the highly successful Canned Heat campaign. He was also instrumental in bringing back several old-time Liberty acts, including Bobby Vee, Vikki Carr and Gary Lewis. Vee's "Comeback When You Grow Up" had been out for nine months before Ganim started with the company. He was also associated with the Victor Lundberg hit, "Open Letter To My Teen-age Son."  
 Before joining Liberty, Ganim worked as local promotion man at M.S. Distributors, Cleveland; regional director of sales and promotion for Kapp Records; head of the Congress label; and head of his own company, Claridge Music. In addition, he has done some independent record production for Kapp and Roulette and has been involved in personal management.

### Rascals Protest

NEW YORK—The Rascals, following the philosophy expressed in their most recent single hits, "People Got To Be Free" and "A Ray Of Hope," have decided not to appear in any concert unless half the acts on the bill are black.  
 Speaking for the group, organist Felix Cavaliere said that "We can't control the audience, but we can be sure the show is integrated. So . . . from now on . . . half the acts will be white, and half will be black, or we stay home."  
 Cavaliere also said that the Atlantic group will not be appearing on any "establishment" television shows, a policy in effect since they cancelled an Ed Sullivan stanza in November. "We think there are things more important than money now, and quite frankly, we're tired of seeing producers come at good groups and tell them to do a fast three minutes, then split," said said Cavaliere, Educational TV and the Smothers Bros. show fall outside the establishment category.

## CBS' Goldmark To Open NARM's '69 Meet

NEW YORK—NARM, the record retailers group, has selected Dr. Peter Goldmark, president of CBS Laboratories and its director of research, to address the Opening Business Session of its Eleventh Annual Convention, on Saturday morning, March 1. Dr. Goldmark, renowned for his research in the field of electronics, is the inventor of the long playing phonograph record.

Dr. Goldmark was also responsible for building the first practical color TV system in 1940. His latest success is the development of EVR (Electronic Video Recording), which utilizes a cartridge in a home entertainment unit, unveiled several weeks ago.

In keeping with the theme of the 1969 NARM Convention, Dr. Goldmark will address the group on the effect of technological and scientific discovery on the recorded entertainment industry in the "Billion Dollar

Era"—the convention theme. He is the first speaker from the field of research ever to address the record and tape industry group.

Dr. Goldmark was born in Budapest, Hungary, in 1906, and became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1937. Listed in "Who's Who" under the professional identification "Physicist", Dr. Goldmark holds a B.S. and a Ph.D. in Physics from the University of Vienna, and an Honorary Doctorate of Science from Fairfield University. He started his career in electronics as department head of TV Engineering for Pye Radio, Ltd. in England in 1931. His more than 30 year association with CBS began in 1936, when he was named chief engineer of CBS Television Department; in 1954, he became president of CBS Laboratories.

## Chuck Graham Named To Epic Sales Mgr. Post



NEW YORK—Epic Records has named Chuck Graham manager of western regional sales. The announcement was made last week by Gene Settler, Epic's national sales director.

Graham will be directly responsible to Settler for all sales activities in the western region. Headquartering in Los Angeles, Graham will have direct contact with Epic distributors and will make periodic trips to coordinate sales and promotion in the western region. In addition, he will provide Epic's management with information pertaining to all distributor and market developments in his region and will take an active part in recommending sales programs and policies.

Graham entered the record business when he joined American Distributing in Cleveland in 1962. From February, 1966, until joining Epic, he was with the Columbia Records sales branch in Cleveland.

## Beverly Sills To ABC With Westminster Label

NEW YORK—Beverly Sills has signed to record with ABC-Westminster Records. One of the most publicized opera stars of the year, Miss Sills' contract calls for a schedule of recordings which will include both solo recitals and complete opera performances.

Her pacting at the office of ABC president Larry Newton was the culmination of discussions which began prior to release of the coloratura's first Westminster disk "Bellini & Donizetti Arias." She is scheduled to perform "Lucia di Lammermoor" for the upcoming Boston Opera season and in Canada. She will appear in New York next year with the NYC Opera and at Carnegie Hall. During the spring, Miss Sills will make guest performances at La Scala in Milan.

## Capitol Has 'Celebration'

NEW YORK—The cast album rights to the soon-to-open "Celebration" have been secured by Capitol Records.

The play, which opens at the Ambassador Theatre Jan 22 after previews from Jan 10, features book and lyrics by Tom Jones and music by Harvey Schmidt. Jones and Schmidt are the team responsible for "The Fantasticks" (now in its ninth year off-Broadway) and "110 in the Shade" as well as "I Do! I Do!"

## Tetra Raises LP Price

Ed Barsky, executive vice-president of Tetragrammaton Records, has announced that all Tetra product will carry a \$5.79 retail price tag beginning Jan 1.

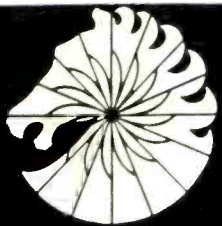

## Columbia Offers Simultaneous Mkt. Of 8-Tracks & LP Counterparts

NEW YORK—Columbia Records initiates a policy next month of releasing 8-track cartridges simultaneously with selected album counterparts.

First move of what is described as "definitely . . . a continuing practice" will involve six new releases by the Electric Flag ("The Electric Flag"), Johnny Cash ("The Holy Land"), Blood, Sweat & Tears ("Blood, Sweat & Tears"), the Taj Mahal ("The

Natch'l Blues"), Johnny Kay & the Sparrow ("Johnny Kay & the Sparrow") and Carl Butler & Pearl ("Honky Tonkin'").

Columbia feels that dealers will have the advantage of the initial excitement on the part of the consumer for the new product and will be able to have their in-store displays feature both the tape and the LP. Furthermore, the music buyer, the label adds, will have both products available to him at a time when the excitement is the highest.

## Doyle Named Tape Exec At WB-7 Of Canada

MONTREAL—K. N. Middleton, vice president and general manager of Warner Bros.-Seven Arts Records of Canada Ltd., last week announced the appointment of M. W. (Mike) Doyle to the new post of national product manager of the tape division.

According to the announcement, the appointment is indicative of the importance the firm places on the rapidly growing tape share of the music business.

Doyle, who has been in the record industry and allied fields for 10 years, assumes his new post immediately. He is responsible for the direction of the sales and merchandising of all tape products and reports directly to Ken Middleton.

In addition, arranger-members will receive a supplementary list of close to 400 recommendations in their field.

Another innovation this year shifts the first round of voting in three further craft categories—engineering, album covers and album notes—from the general membership to special committees, composed of Academy members within each of the categories.

Deadline for initial ballots is Mon., Jan. 13. The 1968 Grammy winners will be revealed on March 12 at concurrent awards presentations in the Academy's four chapter cities, New York, Los Angeles, Nashville and Chicago.

## Picks of the Week

**JR. WALKER & THE ALL STARS** (Soul 35055)

Home Cookin' (2:58) [Jobete, BMI—Moy, Cosby, Willis]

Back from a trip to "Hip City" and brewing up "Home Cookin'," Jr. Walker & the All Stars keep their hit string moving forward on a winning line. This outing works with a pulverizing rhythm line and frantic vocal power that makes a hearty difference in many of the Walker instrumental-emphasized sides. Heavy seller here. Flip: "Mutiny" (3:51) [Jobete, BMI-Cosby]

**JOE TEX** (Dial 4089)

That's Your Baby (2:33) [Tree, BMI—Tex]

Soul chuckler with the signature of Joe Tex. This new track is another of the cuties that has given J. T. a singular place among the blues artists. Topic this time is a poke at a prospective paternity suiter, and the delivery gives Tex a hefty shot at explosive sales showings. Flip: "Sweet, Sweet Woman" (3:02) [Same credits.] Softer, smoother blues ballad.

**CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVIVAL** (Fantasy 619)

Proud Mary (3:07) [Jondora, BMI—Fogerty]

First came "Suzie Q," and now after "I Put a Spell on You" comes the newest and most solidly blues based Creedence Clearwater outing yet. Side is a steady moving mid-speed chunk of funk and rhythm that will make itself felt in both pop and underground spots. Fine side with commercial power to spare. Flip: "Born on the Bayou" (3:42) [Same credits.] Louder side that could add further sales to the "Proud Mary" outing.

**MADELINE BELL** (Philips 40582)

Step Inside Love (2:25) [Maclen, BMI-Lennon, McCartney]

A recent side from Cilla Black, "Step Inside Love" returns with the impact of a grittier vocal from Madeline Bell and the reputation of a more solidly founded American performer. Track remains a splendid soft-samba ballad from the Lennon & McCartney team, and this time round should prove the song's sales power. Flip: "What'm I Supposed to Do" (2:09) [MRC, BMI-Jones, Bell]

**THE DUPREES** (Heritage 808)

My Love, My Love (3:33) [Travis, BMI-Haymes, Acquaviva]

The Sky's the Limit (3:33) [Legacy, BMI-Marchand, Green]

Two attractive ballads give the Duprees a double-edged effort which adds power to the team's comeback drive. The near-standard "My Love, My Love" is the more familiar track and one which will see both easy listening and pop acceptance. But, "The Sky's the Limit" coupler is another strong effort with very good teen prospects.

**THE BONZO DOG DOO-DAH BAND** (Imperial 66345)

I'm the Urban Spaceman (2:23) [Dick James, BMI-Innes]

Cute novelty rock side that arrives via a trip on the English best seller lists. The Bonzo Dog Doo-Dah Band has been working toward U.S. recognition and should arrive with this effort. The side is likely to attract instant notice on both AM and FM pop shows to start a sales landslide. Flip: "Canyons of Your Mind" (3:01) [Dick James, BMI-Stanshall] Another novelty, this time a take-off on the old Presley.

## Best Bets

**JIMMY ROSELLI** (United Artists 50480)

Why Did You Leave Me (2:13) [Roncom, ASCAP—Kaye, Nelson] Extremely fine ballad performance on the newest Jimmy Roselli recording should endear the side to easy listening programmers and the artist's regular fans. Flip: "My Heart Cries for You" (3:20) [Massey/Gladys/Anne-Rachel, ASCAP—Sigman, Faith] Standard whose title will attract adult jukebox location attention.

**PERCY FAITH** (Columbia 44734)

Zorba (2:24) [Sunbeam, BMI-Ebb, Kander] Stunning instrumental version of the title theme from Broadway's "Zorba." The glistening styling of Percy Faith is sure to capture the easy listening circuit and branch into young adult playlists. Flip: "A Quiet Day" (3:30) [Marpert, ASCAP-Maxwell, Faith] Easy drifting side with chorus vocal.

**PETE FOUNTAIN** (Coral 62557)

Les Bicyclettes de Belsize (2:21) [W-7, ASCAP-Reed, Mason] Pretty rendering of the Humperdinck hit which should see plenty of one-stop juke-box stocking sales and a good many easy listening replays. Flip: "Puddin'" (1:58) [Fontaine, ASCAP-Serpas, Stebbins, Lang]

**GRADY TATE** (Skye 458)

And I Love Her (2:48) [Maclen, BMI-Lennon, McCartney] Slow, almost mournful interpretation of the while-ago Beatles track. Jazz artist (drummer) Grady Tate vocalizes with able accompaniment on this fine reading of the ballad. Flip: "Don't Fence Me In" (2:17) [Harms, ASCAP-Porter]

**MAXINE BROWN** (Epic 10424)

### JUDY COLLINS

CARNEGIE HALL, N. Y.—Judy Collins has long been hailed as the #2 queen of folk music, right behind Joan Baez, but obviously not content with being number two, she branched out into the contemporary music field. Now she's number 1, and riding on the crest of the Top 10 "Both Sides Now," she's currently enjoying heavy pop fame also.

By now, Judy's fans are used to her upbeat accompaniment, consisting of piano, bass and drums, but the songstress threw in an extra treat with the addition of Steve Stills, ex-

Bufallo Springfield, on guitar.

Although Judy's still performing material from the Joni Mitchell and Leonard Cohen songbooks, she has become increasingly active as a writer herself, and is using much of her own material, some of which can be found in her new "Who Knows Where The Time Goes" album on Elektra.

Her repertoire has been changed from the last time we saw her, but her delivery has remained the same, professional and enjoyable, provoking well-expressed admiration from the full house.

### CREEDENCE CLEARWATER REVIVAL DEEP PURPLE JAMES COTTON

FILLMORE EAST, N.Y. — There were no super-stars at the Fillmore East last weekend (20,21), but there were three very competent and diverse acts and sometimes that can be just as rewarding. In this case it was, to us and to the audience.

James Cotton runs a tight blues band, filled to the brim with enthusiasm. Although the sound comes from the south side of Chicago, the songs come from other areas, giving his group a potentially much wider appeal than some of the other 'real' blues organizations. At the same time, Cotton's group is held back by the lack of a top-rate instrumentalist, which is ironic in that Buddy Guy, Cotton's former lead guitarist, is held back by the lack of material appealing to a large, white audience. "I Got You" and "Tighten Up" were two of the songs which Cotton used to stir up the Fillmore audience, although his strolling up and down the aisles with a wireless mike also helped.

We got the impression that much of the audience was as pleasantly surprised as we were at the performance of England's Deep Purple. The

group relies mainly on gimmicky re-workings of known songs, but for some reason (probably talent) their gimmick doesn't wear thin. The group is not quite ready for super-star status, but they are fully capable of taking advantage of the fame their hit records have brought them, and they more than satisfy in person. "Hard Road" (from their new "Book Of Taliesyn" LP) was the only original tune on a set that included "Hush," "Help," "Paint It Black," "Hey Joe" and "I'm So Glad."

Creedence Clearwater Revival headlined the show, and again, while their sound was not pulling people out of their seats towards the stage, it wasn't sending them the other way either. No mean feat in these days of gawd-awful-group proliferation. The group basically uses a hard rock sound with a blues influence, which was heard to best advantage on their "I Put A Spell On You" and "Suzie Q" chart-riders. "Born In The Bayous" and "Walk On The Water," two presumably group penned efforts, came over well also.

stock.

The acquisitions involve several separate transactions. Included in the cash transaction are Chess Producing Corporation, Midwest and Midsouth Record Pressing Companies, Ter Mar Recording Studios, and Aristocrat Records. The companies to be acquired for GRT stock are Chess, Checker and Cadet Record Companies, Heavy Music, Inc., and III C Tape Corporation. The cash transactions were closed by Bayley and Leonard and Phil Chess and Russell Fratto, principals of the Chess group. According to Bayley, it is anticipated that the stock transactions will close shortly after January 1, 1969. Chess' L and P Broadcasting interests are not included in the acquisition by GRT.

#### Sales At \$6 Million

The Chess group's estimated sales for the 12 months ending January 31, 1969 are in excess of \$6 million, Chess said, with pretax earnings expected to be more than \$850,000. GRT reported sales of \$2,292,730 and earnings of \$156,048 for the quarter ending September 28, 1968. This represented earnings of 39 cents per share on 400,514 average shares outstanding during the quarter, Bayley said. For GRT's fiscal 1968, ended June 30, the company reported sales of \$5,760,942 and earnings of \$401,924 after taxes.

Leonard, Phil and Marshall Chess and Russell Fratto will remain in their present positions under employment contracts, Bayley said. The Chess group will function autonomously, and no personnel or management policy changes are contemplated. The company, founded in 1947, employs 200.

Among the recording artists and groups under contract to the companies are Ramsey Lewis, Muddy Waters, the Rotary Connection, Soulful Strings, Pigmeat Markham, the Dells, Little Milton, Etta James, and the Violinaires.

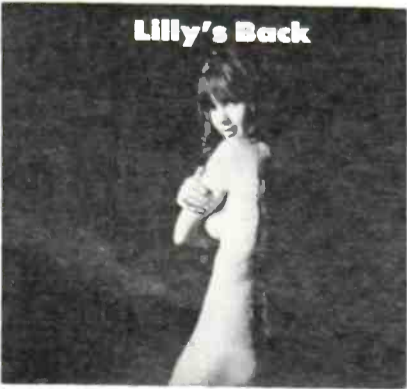

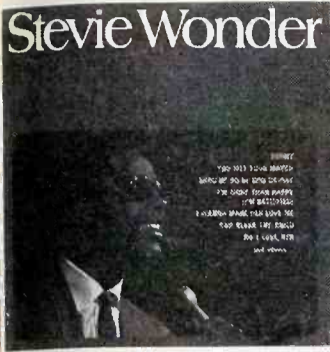

### FOR ONCE IN MY LIFE—Stevie Wonder—Tamla TS291

Three top hits, including the title tune (a recent #1 disk), "Shoo-Be-Doo-Be-Doo-Da-Day," and "You Met Your Match," should make this set the biggest Stevie Wonder package yet. Stevie has attained a new musical maturity as a vocalist, and it is more than amply demonstrated on such tunes as "Sunny," "I'm More Than Happy (I'm Satisfied)," "God Bless The Child," "The House On The Hill," and "I'd Be A Fool Right Now." Plenty of programming here.

### WONDERWALL MUSIC BY GEORGE HARRISON—Apple 3350

First major solo effort from Beatle George Harrison is the soundtrack music for "Wonderwall," a soon-to-be-released film. Recorded in India and utilizing musicians from both East and West, the album provides a varied assortment of familiar and unfamiliar sounds. The set is already on the charts and looks as though it's going to develop into a really big item. Watch it.



### BLOOD, SWEAT AND TEARS—Columbia CS 9720

A slight change in personnel and an improved sound marks the second LP from BS&T, and sales should quickly top their "Child Is Father To The Man" debut, an early 1968 chart success. Top airplay selection for FM's is "Smiling Phases," (a Traffic tune), with "Blues-Part II" a close second. AM outlets can live their fare with "Spinning Wheel," "More And More," "You've Made Me So Very Happy," and "God Bless The Child." Group's blend of rock, blues and jazz is highly effective the first big excitement of 1969.



### HELP YOURSELF—Tom Jones—London PAS 71025

Titled after and including his recent single hit, Tom Jones' latest LP is a powerhouse effort that's bound to pull in heaps of spins and sales. The chanter is really at the top of his form on this set, and his fans should turn out in force for him. In addition to "Help Yourself," the set includes "Laura," "Elusive Dreams," "The House Song" and 9 others. Stock heavily.

## Pop Best Bets



### JOANNA—Original Soundtrack—20th Century S 4202

Best-selling poet Rod McKuen has written the words and music for "Joanna," a film about a girl's adventures in swinging London. McKuen's music is rich in variety; he has employed jazz, bossa nova, and waltz rhythms, as well as a number of ballads and blues. He also sings on this soundtrack LP, rendering a lovely ballad entitled "I'll Catch The Sun." Admirers of McKuen's work will want to own this album. Arthur Greenslade, who conducted the music, also wrote excellent arrangements.



### GALLERIES—Young Tradition—Vanguard VSD 79295

The Young Tradition is comprised of three Brits—Heather Wood, Royster Wood, and Pete Bellamy—who sing traditional English folk songs. A number of the songs are done without instrumental accompaniment, and the a cappella harmonizing of the tradition is extremely interesting. "The Barley Straw," "The Husbandman And The Serving Man," "Upon The Bow," and "The Agincourt Carol" are among the selections.

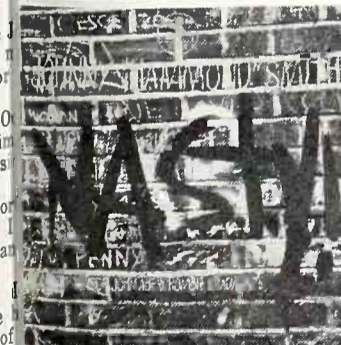
### THE SCAVENGER—Nat Adderley—Milestone MSP 9016

Cornetist Nat Adderley once more steps to the front to lead his own ensemble thru a highly professional and pleasing set. Joe Sawinul (piano), Victor Gaskin (bass), & Roy McCurdy (drums) make up the rhythm section on all the cuts, while horn men Mel Lastie & Joe Henderson and flutist Jeremy Steig make appearances when needed. 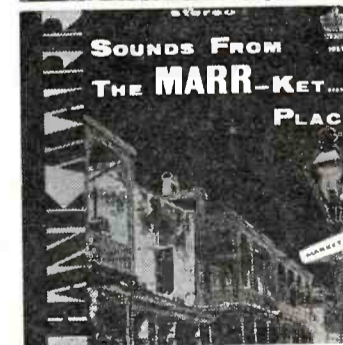
### CARAMBA!—Lee Morgan—Blue Note BST 84289

Lee Morgan is both an excellent trumpeter and an excellent composer, as this album proves. The artist and Bennie Maupin (tenor sax), Cedar Walton (piano), Reginald Workman (bass), and Billy Higgins (drums), playing with a sensitivity rarely found in jazz these days, offer five of Morgan's compositions. This is really good music, groovy without being far-out, eminently listenable without being "music to eat your dinner by." Listen.



### NASTY!—Johnny "Hammond" Smith—Prestige PRST 7588

Organist Johnny "Hammond" Smith serves up a scintillating brew of six jazz sessions. The title tune and "Four Bowls Of Soul" were written by Smith; the other selections are "If I Were A Bell," "Song For My Father," "Speak Low," and "Unchained Melody." Smith's rhythmic, wailing performance is ably abetted by Houston Person, tenor sax; John Abercrombie, guitar; and Grady Tate, drums. Jazzophiles should snap this one up.



### SOUNDS FROM THE MARR-KET PLACE—Hank Marr—King KS 1025

The "Sounds From The Marr-ket Place" are the soulful jazz sounds of organist Hank Marr. Marr penned all ten tunes on the set, and, among the melodies he renders in fine style are "The Marr-ket Place," "Soup Spoon," "Down In The Bottom," "Come And Get It," and "Get On Down." This LP could see heavy action in both jazz and R&B markets.

## Classical Picks



### OPERATIC HEROES AND VILLAINS—Norman Treigle/Vienna Volksoper Orchestra/Vienna Akademie Chorus/Jussi Jalas—Westminster WST 17145

On this album, famed American bass-baritone Norman Treigle is showcased in brilliant characterizations of a number of operatic heroes and villains. The selections are taken from operas by Offenbach, Massenet, Charpentier, Rossini, Verdi, and Boito. Two of the highlights on an album filled with highlights are Treigle's Don Quixote (in Massenet's "Don Quichotte") and his Mephisto (in Boito's "Mefistofele"). Should be very well received by opera fans.



### SCHOENBERG: PIANO CONCERTO, OP. 42/PIANO PIECES, OP. 23/FANTASY FOR VIOLIN AND PIANO, OP. 47—Peter Serkin/Ozawa/Chicago Symphony/Arnold Steinhardt—RCA LSC 3050

Young pianist Peter Serkin (son of the famed pianist Rudolph Serkin) here offers excellent interpretations of three works by Arnold Schoenberg (1874-1951). Serkin proves himself a fine soloist under three different sets of conditions: playing with an orchestra—the Chicago Symphony, directed by Seiji Ozawa—on the Piano Concerto; playing alone—on the Five Piano Pieces; and playing a duet—with violinist Arnold Steinhardt—on the Violin Fantasy.

Artur Rubinstein and Van Cliburn are featured soloists on two of the Red Seal sets, with Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra taking the full spotlight on the other four.

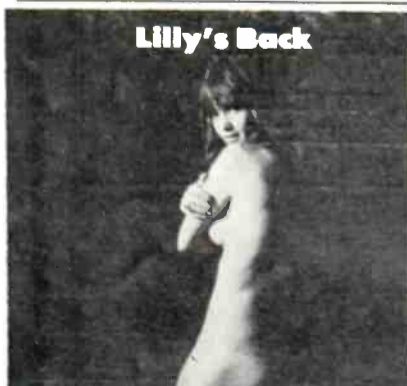
Listening to the new Limelighters LP is like having a vodka gimlet in a dark room with an old flame. The lime is still there. But the light has gone out.

# Talent On Stage

## CARLA THOMAS-EDDIE FLOYD

VILLAGE GATE, N.Y.—The Soul Show at the Village Gate last Monday night (23) spotlighted two highly professional practitioners of the art—Carla Thomas and Eddie Floyd—each of whom displayed a distinctively personal approach to the form.

Carla Thomas, wearing a form-fitting dress with sparkling sequins, offered her songs in a sly, sexy style. She delivered some pointers on how a woman could please her man in "Baby," and gave a vital, supercharged reading of "Where Do I Go," from "Hair," the artist's latest single. The songstress also rendered "Steal Away" and "I've Fallen In Love With You" in compelling fashion. "Gee Whiz," the lark's first recording, which she wrote, was performed most

appealingly.

Eddie Floyd's brand of soul is a potent brew indeed. His dynamic, exciting stage presence delighted the crowd, which responded with enthusiastic hand-clapping. The artist opened his segment of the program with a driving rendition of "If I Had A Hammer," swung into an ebullient "I've Never Found A Girl (To Love Me Like You Do)," served up a powerful, full-throttle performance of his latest chart single, "Bring It On Home To Me," and closed the Soul Show with his biggest hit, "Knock On Wood," in which he was joined by Carla Thomas.

## GRATEFUL DEAD-COUNTRY JOE-SPIRIT

SHRINE, LOS ANGELES—It was like World War III last Saturday evening at the Shine, with three rock groups, The Grateful Dead, Country Joe and the Fish, and The Spirit. The Spirit, a jazz-inspired rock band, simulated the sounds of marching soldiers, gun battle, and an air-raided siren during their numbers.

Ed Cassidy (he used to be Cass Strangedrum with the Rising Sons) is hip beneath glowing baldness and an unbelievably good drummer. Heavy on the tin, his foot creates crashes and banging solid beats. Each musician plays around the talent of Cassidy, and he sits, like the Mr. Clean of Musicland.

The Grateful Dead, whose live performances used to be disappointing, were excellent. The double drummers create an unusual, interesting sound, which distinguishes the San Francisco based group. The lead singer, a small

Buffalo Bill wailer, somehow manages to sing above the throbbing beats of the seven members group. Oblivious to the audience, sadistic indifference) they seem to be performing for themselves. But their self-satisfaction brings great delight to the young crowd, decked out in rented costumes, grooving on the chairless floor of the huge auditorium.

Country Joe and the Fish are neither unusual or individual. Country Joe and Banana, the only stars of the group, given what would otherwise be a dull performance. But when left alone, the rest of the group functions as a lifeless automatic unit, free from singular identity. Billed as the starring group, Joe and Fish were the last performers. By this time, the crowd, which wasn't large to begin with, dwindled rapidly and seemed just as bored by the Fish as the group was about their performance.

## TIM HARDIN

CAFE AU GO GO, N.Y.—Tim Hardin has already made his mark as a songwriter, and in a limited way, has scored as a performer's well, picking up a great many totally devoted fans. However, every performer wants to gather as large a potential audience as possible, and this seemed to be

Hardin's goal during his recent opening at the Cafe Au Go Go.

Hardin's voice has always been strong, but his overall performance has suffered in the past due to his fondness for occasionally lapsing into Ornette Coleman-type avant-garde riffs on his guitar. Happily, his head seems to be in more comprehensible places these days, making it possible for less musically hip people to appreciate his talent, without in the least impairing his communication with long time fans.

Actually, Hardin did three sets in one. The first, featuring Hardin alone, accompanying himself on guitar, was the least satisfying musically, although the songs, "Danville Dame," "The Last Sweet Moments" and "If I Were A Carpenter," were strong in themselves. A broken guitar string caused a switch to piano, which showed Hardin at his best on "Hang On To A Dream" and "Song To Lenny," the latter written to Lenny Bruce. The last part of the set featured Hardin back on guitar with piano backup by Warren Bernhart on "The Lady Came From Baltimore," "The Moonshiners," "Don't Make Promises" and a new version of "Red Balloon."

Now with Columbia, Hardin could well become one of the most popular contemporary artists. He is certainly one of the most important.

## Roulette Plans Push For 'New Bag' Album

NEW YORK—A full-scale college, consumer trade and radio campaign is being planned by Roulette Records for Tommy James and the Shondell's "new bag" album, which is titled after the group's current single hit, "Crimson And Clover."

Roulette president Morris Levy said that advance-orders on the LP are already in excess of 100,000 units, and that the single has sold 700,000 units since its release four weeks ago.

For the album, which is due out immediately, Roulette plans national advertising spots on both AM and FM radio through distributors on a co-op basis, plus insertions in campus publications following a mailing to college radio stations.

The LP will be named "Album of the Month" by the J.M. Fields chain and will be featured in all their 67 stores across the country. Family Bargain stores will also feature the album.

Dispensing with the "bubblegum" sound in favor of an "adult contemporary" sound, James produced and arranged the album himself and wrote eight of the nine songs either alone or in collaboration with Shondell's Mike Vale, Peter Lucia and Eddie Gray.

The LP includes an expanded version of "Crimson & Clover" running over five minutes, plus the recent hit "Do Something To Me," in addition to "Kathleen McArthur," "I Am A Tangerine," "Crystal Blue Persuasion," "Sugar On Sunday," "Breakaway," "I'm Alive" and "Smokey Roads." In addition, the tracks are separated by short "shock" cuts running from ten to thirty seconds.

Early in February, WKYC-Cleveland will change its format from rock to middle-of-the-road tunes and a more extensive use of newscasts. The announcement came from Dino Ianni, general manager of the outlet. The programming change will leave the hard rock market in Cleveland to WIXY in that city. Said Ianni: "Actually our ratings have improved substantially in recent months. But we are looking to the future and we feel that this is the best course for the station." WKYC has been a rock outlet since the late 1950's when the license was acquired by the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. The National Broadcasting Co. took ownership in 1965 and continued the rock programming. Ianni revealed that WKYC will expand its news operation, with 10-minute newscasts on the hour during the "drive times" of morning and evening rush hours. The general manager added that network news personalities will also be featured, and that Monitor may be aired on AM (it is now broadcast on WKYC-FM) later next year. Some of the deejays currently with WKYC will be retained, Ianni said, but others, more distinctly oriented to hard rock programming, will be released.

All cards were then sent to hospitalized youngsters to bring holiday cheer to the young shut-ins. The previous contest, which ended recently, presented diamond wristwatches to three winners. Mrs. Anne Fine won First Prize—a His and Hers Diamond Wristwatch Set. Mrs. James Starbuck and Ed McManus took Second and Third Prizes, respectively, with both winners receiving a diamond wristwatch each. William Wolf, audience promotion coordinator for KNX has been in charge of the contests.

Norton Garfinkle, president of

Brand Rating Index, introduced New York advertisers and their agencies to "the ultimate in local broadcast research data" at a series of luncheons hosted by WABC-New York on December 11 and 12 at the St. Regis Hotel. BRI has developed data for the New York market which gives radio outlets the ability to measure their delivery of marketing targets for each specific advertiser. As Garfinkle puts it, "We can now translate a radio audience into the number of bars of soap used or number of cans of soup consumed." WABC is reportedly the first local station in the U.S. to have this kind of marketing information available. The whole thrust of media buying in recent years has been in two areas: local and national, handled separately by agencies. Local activity has so increased that it now represents almost half of the total effort. Therefore, BRI has spearheaded a drive to integrate local and national marketing data and efforts. Achieved in conjunction with the ABC Owned Radio Stations Division, this "ultimate marketing weapon" is a final step in a long-range project that has been conducted by BRI for some time. Other stations in the division, in addition to WABC, are using earlier stages of the data. The full project operates as follows: 1. Development of core data about each market and what it is worth to the marketer of a given product (i.e., the budget allocation problem). 2. Development of local demographic data to measure the characteristics of heavy users and users of various products in that particular market. 3. Finally, measurement of the product usage patterns of the audience of specific radio outlets in the market. Harold Neal, Jr., president of the ABC Owned Radio Stations, states that all seven stations have the "stage one" data. Stage two data consisting of demographic information about local product users is being used by New York, Chicago, and San Francisco. At the New York luncheons, Don B. Curran, vice president and general manager of WABC, announced his station's arrival at stage three.

At the same time, Howard Lepple, director of engineering operations, was elected a vice president of Avco Broadcasting.

### "Brooklyn Bridge"



The Brooklyn Bridge, a Buddah recording act, was constructed in 1968. The group is composed of 10 young men and one pretty girl, who aim to bridge the generation gap by playing "blue-eyed soul," hard rock, the most progressive of contemporary sounds and everything in between. The Bridge players are Johnny Maestro solo vocals; Fred Ferrara, Les Cauchi, and Mike Gregorio, solo vocals and harmonic backing; Tom Sullivan, bandleader/arranger/saxophonist; Carolyn Wood, organ; Jimmy Rosica, bass; Richie Macioce, guitar; Artie Catanzarita, drums; Shell Davis, trumpet and piano; and Joe Ruvio, sax. The Brooklyn Bridge, a complete, self-contained show band was formed when four singers, each from different groups, wanted to create a totally unique musical organization. The four vocalists heard the first audition of a newly-formed seven piece band, liked what they heard and the Brooklyn Bridge was built. The group's current single, "The Worst That Could Happen," is number 29 on the Top 100 this week.

### "Creedence Clearwater Revival"



Formed in San Francisco about ten years ago, the Creedence Clearwater Revival advanced from a local high school group (called the Blue Velvet originally) to a musical team (the Golliwogs) which played teen club dates at various military bases, and finally into the Revival act that hit the Top 10 with "Suzie Q." Formed initially while in school, the Creedence Clearwater Revival grew by developing a blend of psychedelic electronic sounds with a firm blues base. Much of the material that was included on their first Fantasy album was original, penned by John Fogerty of the team. The set also included the major hit, and its follow-up charmer, "I Put A Spell On You," which is number on the Top 100 this week. The Creedence Clearwater Revival consists of Fogerty and his brothers Tom, Doug Clifford, and Stuart Cook.

## Dot Signs Anita Kerr As Artist Producer

**NEW YORK**—Dot Records has signed Anita Kerr to a multi-faceted artist-producer deal, which calls for three Anita Kerr Singers albums per year—in which she will perform as artist-producer—plus six LPs per year of her own creation as an independent producer.

Dot executive vp-general manager Dick Pierce, who personally handled the negotiations, also disclosed that Miss Kerr will also provide the label with a steady flow of singles.

Two of the albums under the new package deal will be released in January. These include "The Anita Kerr Singers Reflect (On Bacharach and David)" and "Yestergroovin."

The Memphis-born composer-arranger-conductor, initially gained fame in Nashville, where she originally formed the Anita Kerr Singers, who became nationally known on Arthur Godfrey's various radio-TV shows in the mid-1950s. After moving to the West Coast in 1965, she has won several Grammy Awards, as well as several additional nominations for the NARAS honor.

Since her migration to California, she has worked with such artists as Brenda Lee, Rosemary Clooney, Pat Boone, Eddie Fisher, Burl Ives, Perry Como, Al Hirt and Bobby Vinton, among others. As an indie producer, her product has been released by Dot, RCA Victor, Capitol, Liberty, ABC and Warner-Reprise.

**LOS ANGELES** — Rick Landy has been appointed program chairman for the fourth annual Academy of Country & Western Music Awards Show. Annual event is slated for March 3 at the Hollywood Palladium, according to Herb Eiseman of BMI, chairman of the Academy's board of directors.

**HOLLINS, Va.**—Music City Records will begin handling its own distribution this week (1), it was announced recently by the label. At the same time it was announced that Music City had signed Billy "Crash" Craddock to a recording pact, with a single by the artist due for release in January.

According to promo director Dave Shearer, the growth and acceptance of the Music City line, which was formerly distributed by Stop Records, has made the new distribution setup necessary. Distributors should contact Shearer at P.O. Box 7175 Hollins, Va.

Craddock, who most recently recorded for the Chart label, will cut all his sessions in Nashville, and will be produced by Carlton Haney.

## Lin Buying LD?

**NASHVILLE**—Negotiations are reportedly under way for the purchase of Little Darlin' Records by Lin Broadcasting, Cash Box has learned from informed sources.

Lin Broadcasting, the Nashville-based communications complex, has taken large steps into the country field in the past year, and now owns Starday Records, as well as two important country radio stations, WIL-St. Louis and WJRZ-Hackensack.

Although Cash Box has yet to receive details of the negotiations, it is believed that Little Darlin' is being represented by Aubrey Mayhew, while Starday management head Don Pierce is reportedly representing Lin's interests.

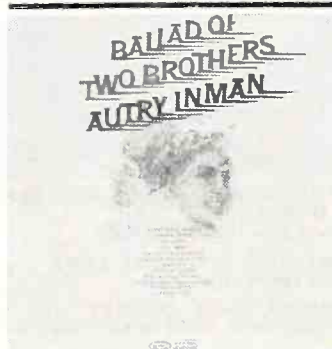
## Halsey Inks Husky

# Great Britain

The controversial "Two Virgins" album by John Lennon and Yoko Ono on Apple continues to suffer a stormy passage. EMI Records, Apple's distributors, refused to handle it weeks ago, not only because of its participants' nudity in the sleeve photographs but also because of its content. Track has started handling it at normal trade price by mail order, but the Gramophone Record Retailers Committee of the Music Trades Association has warned disk dealers about the declaration on the order form which makes the dealers solely responsible for stocking the record and exonerates Track and Apple from any legal liability. Dealers are also informed they will be allowed no discount or granted any returns allowance on the LP which can only be ordered by means of the official order form. The former Apple boutique in Baker Street is being utilized to pack and despatch the album. It has been pointed out in the trade that it is an offense under a section of the Post Office Act of 1953 to send indecent material through the mail. Several dealers have already refused to handle the LP on account of its sleeve photographs and its material, described by Track boss Kit Lambert as "experimental" and a "dialogue of sounds." Lambert says his company feels there is nothing intrinsically objectionable about the sleeve, and the record is being handled "in the interests of artistic freedom."

The World Record Club has been reorganized into three divisions with effect December 1st. They are marketing, customer services and finance and administration. A marketing manager will be appointed early this year, and the repertoire, recording, creative services, copywriting and record progress and stock control departments will report to him. He will also liaise with the Club's advertising agents and various EMI service departments. Administration manager L. H. Philpott has been named customer services manager, and financial controller J. Parris becomes finance and administration manager with special responsibility for the computer functions within the Club. Norman Lonsdale is moving the Bookplan and World of Learning operations away from the WRC set-up with effect January 1st, but these two enterprises participated in the integrated Christmas mailing shot with WRC. The latter is being managed by J. T. Becher until his departure at the end of January when the new general manager Colin Hadley takes control.

MGM Records managing director Ian Ralfini has named 26-year-old Martin Wyatt as the label's A&R controller. Wyatt will be responsible for all house productions and independent productions issued on MGM, and John Snell will continue as A&R co-ordinator. Wyatt will liaise closely with music publishers, artists and writers in the development of local product to increase MGM's share of British hits. Wyatt has worked for Pye and Robbins Music in the past as well as being British representative for Petula Clark and Sacha Distel. Ralfini told Cash Box that his appointment marked the formation of a new wing of MGM's British operations, and a focal point for new talent and producers.

Radio Luxembourg begins a live program policy January 6th, running from 7:30 p.m. to midnite each evening. The new schedule will feature staff disk jockeys Tony Prince, Dave Jensen, Paul Burnett and Noel Edmonds, and the only recorded show will be Alan Freeman's sixty-minute program. Luxembourg's earlier new look launched last October has given it a 48.5% boost in audience since May last year, according to a poll survey. This represents a nightly increase of one and a half million listeners, making the total average audience 4,900,000. The poll also disclosed that 72% of radio listeners between the ages of 12 and 24 tune in to Radio Luxembourg.

Songwriter Les Reed has been asked to pen four numbers by Caterina Valente. One will be her next single for the South American market, and the others will be included in an LP she starts recording soon. Reed is also engaged on two major movie scores, one a science fiction story being shot at Pinewood Studios. He will write the main theme for the next Hayley Mills movie, and she will record it for single release. Reed's "Crossplot," written for the TV series of that name, is being recorded for world-wide release by Mireille Mathieu, and Engelbert Humperdinck's next American single will be Reed's "Marry Me," following the singer's success with it on a recent New York telecast. Reed is recording TV compere Simon Dee for his Chapter One label in another version of his song "Julie" from the "Bicyclettes De Belsize" movie. This song has been covered in the States by Frank Sinatra who has accepted several Reed compositions for his upcoming album to be recorded here in London with Tony Hatch.

Roy Pitt has sold his Mark Music catalog to Immediate and been named administrative chief of Immediate's subsidiary label Instant. The current Instant release, "Happy Miranda" by the Excelsior Springs, is a Finesilver and Kerr composition published by Immediate Music.

Morgan Records has launched a Blu-Town series aimed at the pop market. Initial releases will include disks by Jeff Gill and the Academy group. Morgan has put two samplers on the market in the shape of "Preview," featuring extracts from earlier Morgan LPs and "This Guy" showcasing sax player Duncan Lamont.

French singer-songwriter Gilbert Beaud was in town last month for TV dates and a sell-out concert at the Royal Albert Hall December 14th. Beaud recorded an album for Decca during his visit under the supervision of Marcel Stellman, and Decca released a single of his own composition, "Love Train," to coincide with his visit.

Coordinating this new activity will be a committee of three, consisting of Phil Sammeth, who headquarters at the Disney Studio in Burbank; Alberto Goldberg, long time Disney merchandising and music representative, headquartering in Buenos Aires, Argentina; and Carlos Bustamante, Disney's merchandising and music representative in Mexico.

The three year program will involve a large amount of new recording, some of which will be done in Mexico City, as in the past, under the supervision of Edmundo Santos, who has for 25 years been responsible for the dubbing of Disney films and television shows into Spanish.

## New Group Formed By Traffic Members

LONDON—Three former members of Traffic have joined with Mick Weaver (known professionally as Wynder K. Frog) to form Mason, Capaldi, Wood and Frog. # Japan

Japan Disc Grand Prize 1968 was awarded to Jun Mayuzumi, Toshiba songstress, for her recording of "Tenshi no Yuwaku," written by Rei Nakanishi and composed by Kunihiko Suzuki. According to Toshiba, this record has sold 1,700,000 copies since release in May, '68. This title of the most promising new male vocalist was won by Ken Yabuki (Teichiku), and the most promising new female vocalist was Kaori Kumi on Nippon Columbia, while the most promising new group was Pinky & Killers (King). The group was founded modelling on Spanky & Our Gang (U.S. Mercury), and has been keeping a long-run sales with the debut single "Koi no Kisetsu" since the end of summer.

It has been a trend in the local pop scene in '68 that, as a counter-movement against westernized "group-sounds" supported by the enthusiasm of teenagers, soft-beat sentimental songs started to regain the hit charts by appealing to grown-up generations. Several soft vocal groups made their success. Among them are Los Primos (Crown), Tokyo Romantica (Teichiku), who won the prize for the best performance on records, and Colo-Latino (Columbia). These groups have frequently made their way to the central hit charts by being featured on the wire broadcasting in local districts. The wire broadcasting in local districts. The wire broadcasting service has recently become a very important part in the local hit scene, and the Wire Broadcasting Prize sponsored by the wire service association was awarded to Sinichi Mori (Victor) as the most programmed singer. At the same time, female solo singers have been very active during the year, especially Yukari Itoh (King) and above-mentioned Jun Mayuzumi.

Trio K.K., a leading audio-products maker, has announced that the company will initiate producing open-reel pre-recorded tapes and releasing records. Trio has been an import distributor of Charlin Records of France for the past four years, and now they intend to launch more positively into the music business. To start with, the company has made an exclusive contract with German label Wergo Records which is exclusively devoted to contemporary classical music. The initial release of the Wergo catalog include two albums, "Sonatas of C. Debussy" and "Works of G. Ligeti." They are priced at ¥2,600 (\$7.22), 30% higher than the normal prices of LP records. The release of the 4-track open-reel pre-recorded tapes has just initiated with the recording of Concertgebouw Chamber Orchestra which were taken during their Japanese tour last September, and a Charlin recording of Japanese traditional music. Trio's record sales route has at present about 300 dealers and they intend to obtain 400 dealers more in the first half of this year.

The total output of prerecorded tapes during six months between April and September, '68, has been announced by the Japan Music Tape Association as follows: cartridge tapes, 2,900,673 pieces; musicassettes; 375,295 pieces; open-reel tapes, 76,997 reels. Comparing these figures to those of the previous period (October, '67-March, '68), cartridge tapes have increased by 84%, and the output of musicassettes shows a most remarkable increase, 600% over the previous six months. But the output of open-reel tapes has decreased by 8%. Recent development of musicassette market can be attributed to the initiation of release of EP cassettes by record makers in the latter half of 1968, and the market still promises a great expansion in the new year.

Nippon Grammophon has announced that during the three months between October and December, '68, "The Dock Of The Bay" by Otis Redding has sold approximately 400,000 copies; "Hold On" by Sam & Dave, 250,000 copies; "Purple Haze" by Jimi Hendrix, 100,000 copies; and other successful items have been "Amen" by Otis Redding and "People Got To Be Free" by the Rascals.

English group Dave Dee, Dozy, Beaky, Mick & Tich was signed for a three-week tour in Japan in February by Kyoko Kikaku Agency.

## EDITORIAL: *New Year's Resolution 1969*

Salesman or buyer—which are you? Like it or not, you the operator are a salesman. Question is whether you are a good salesman or a poor one. It's common knowledge that one's success in this music and games business depends in large part upon his financial ability to give a prospective location "X" amount of dollars . . . in the form of a loan, advance or bonus. But landing a location in this manner is not really "selling". Plain and simple, it's a purchase.

The American Marketing Association defines selling as: "the personal or impersonal process of assisting and/or persuading a prospective customer to buy a commodity or a service or to act favorably upon an idea that has commercial significance to the seller." Realizing that the loan/bonus cancer grew from out of stiff competition among operators, it is at least theoretically possible for you to stop "out buying" your competition and start "out selling" them. But before you can accomplish this you must learn how to sell yourself, your firm, your ideas and your service to location owners. They will buy . . . but first you must sell.

Selling your services to a location depends largely upon how you handle its ownership, for the ability to handle people is the basis of leadership in any field of endeavor. B. C. Forbes, a very wise gentleman, once

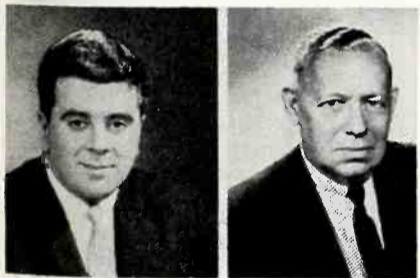
said: "to succeed in business you must learn how to get people to do what you want them to do. Success is largely salesmanship."

Point is, salesmanship is nothing more than the ability to handle people.

You might say, "why should I try to sell a location when Harry can buy one by slipping the owner a few bucks?" Unless you can afford to slip the owner a few bucks more than Harry, then you better learn how to sell if you want to be successful. Harry really isn't going anywhere . . . unless you consider pricing yourself out of business is admirable. Our economy has been built largely on the basis of private enterprise and free competition. Competition is here to stay and it is the persistence on this competition which makes salesman necessary and the good salesman a valuable specialist.

What this article boils down to is this: it is **not impossible** to rid this business of the loan/bonus cancer. With each passing day we are becoming a more professional industry . . . an industry that needs men who make their mark by their wits rather than the wallet. It's time we all started acting like professionals . . . time locations were earned with talent—not money. And that's our suggestion for the trade's New Year's Resolution for 1969.

Charles Bailey, who has been deeply involved in Fischer's day-to-day management for several years, has accepted the position of president and general manager. No other management changes are anticipated, the announcement said.

## East Meets West at SEGA Enterprises

TOKYO—If any individual could be singled out for laudable accomplishment within, and on behalf of, the coin machine industry during 1968, that gentleman would unquestionably be David Rosen, the man whose courageous and imaginative blending of the products and tastes of East and West have resulted in the highly profitable mixture today known the world over as SEGA Enterprises, Ltd.

Rosen's role in literally creating the Japanese coin machine industry was crowned with his development of several games whose acceptance around the globe, including the U.S.A., has defied the world's resistance to operating anything other than American-made machines. How did he do it . . . why did he try? His thoughts on the subject are inspirational and through his own words we'd like to share the Rosen philosophy with tradesmen everywhere.

"Many American firms which have attempted to do business in Japan have not been successful because they have paid insufficient attention to the true conditions existing here. On the other hand, many Japanese companies are not as successful as American enterprises because their efforts are not channeled advantageously. With these points in view, we are adapting the good features of American management techniques to Japanese business practice."

David Rosen, a youthful appearing company executive who has established a company here as an American, speaks slowly but with fervor and conviction on the way he administers his corporate operations.

"Our most important administrative objective is the development of managerial personnel. In this task we take what is applicable from American management and adapt it to the situation here in Japan." Mr. Rosen indicated.

As the firm is achieving a growth rate in excess of 30% a year, qualified management level people are constantly in demand. Naturally, this (developing of managerial personnel) has imposed a considerable burden on the president, himself. It has been an essential precondition for him to establish workable systems allowing the assignment of early responsibility to the persons he has caused to be trained.

Hasty and large-scale recruitment of manpower in the American way has been precluded because the confusion this would have caused among key personnel would have resulted in a decrease in efficiency. With this in view, efforts have been directed to "hard training" of talented people within the company. Similar to other progressive Japanese firms, salary and wage administration have been carefully based upon a flexible seniority system.

Although Rosen is a chief executive of American nationality, he has not only established his own firm here but pioneered his lines of business in Japan. His business had a formal start in the 50's when he first imported and began operating or leasing American equipment. He was 25 years old at the time his business was launched and had visited Japan several times. Advice was received from his father—who was in the import/export business — and from other friends.

Bank financing was not easy at first because of (Rosen's) American nationality. He has wisely made no major change in banks in the intervening years, preferring to use his original two banks. This was done, he explains, for the primary reason of establishing firm relations and of mutual confidence with the banks. In this manner, he has created an excellent and smooth working relationship with his selected financial institutions.

The company now grosses approximately 5 billion yen annually in machine sales and lease income. There was, in practical terms, no leisure industry in existence when the venture

was started. The coin-operated phonographs, amusement machines, bowling centers and so forth initiated by Rosen were all new or unknown in Japan.

Naturally, the profits realized have been substantial. (Continued next page)

en large. However the initial decisions to go ahead in these new lines required great courage. They also required detailed studies and investigations with unique techniques of his own creation.

Helping him in his work has been a good knowledge of the U.S. leisure industry. A number of industries have been set-up in Japan following the American format. The leisure industry is one example of this phenomenon. Amusement machines imported from the U.S. by Americans have, in the past, seemed to have been more suitable for the amusement concepts they have served than similar machines made by Japanese following the American pattern. This familiarity with overseas amusement concepts cannot be overlooked as an important factor in SEGA's growth. "Success in the leisure industry depends upon the successful development of ideas" Rosen stressed emphatically. He has, therefore, established a company program for systematically developing and evaluating ideas. This is one area where success has resulted from the incorporation of American management techniques.

SEGA's Research & Development Department coordinates weekly conferences between sections to obtain and use good ideas.

SEGA's successful emphasis on managerial creativity is not restricted to new designs and mechanisms; ideas are constantly sought for improving the company's administration.

One example of an idea which was unprecedented in this country was that of the leasing of vehicles for business operation. SEGA wanted to lease vehicles in 1960, but close investigation revealed that the concept was unknown here. Consequently, Rosen approached automobile manufacturers with specific proposals. After explaining the American system of car leasing to executives in allied fields, he achieved his goal and started leasing in 1960. At present SEGA leases more than 200 vehicles.

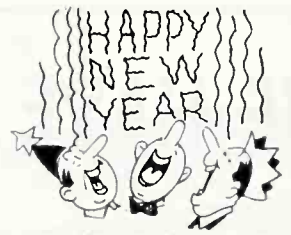
Rosen explained that for reasons of efficient service and management, he finds his action in leasing a vehicle fleet fully justified. "I knew that the auto lease business would become popular in Japan" he indicated.

Rosen expressed the importance of planning for the future. As an example, he states that "with travel to the moon probable by U.S. astronauts in the next year or two, it is reasonable to consider developing new games incorporating lunar or space-walk designs and motifs."

"In Japan," he commented, "ideas

developed by others are not always fully respected. In fact, they are frequently copied." However, in his remarks on international business ethics, he displays a placidity or reserve worthy of the pioneer of the leisure industry: "if our machines are imitated, we will develop still more challenging designs."

"Pioneer of the Leisure Industry" has become a motto of SEGA Enterprises, Ltd. The company is known to have initiated the leasing of coin operated phonographs and machines in Japan, as well as the regular commercial exploitation of bowling centers. The company is also foremost in the leasing of amusement machines on department store roofs and in amusement parks.



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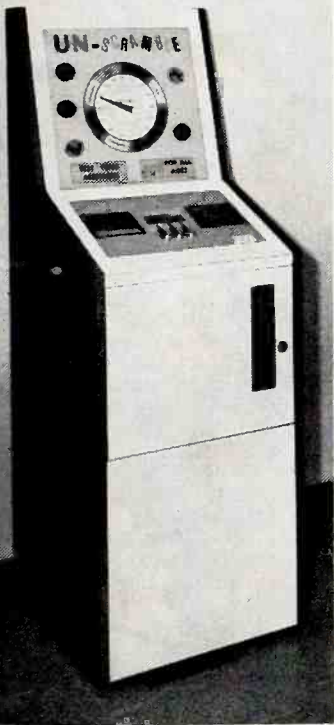

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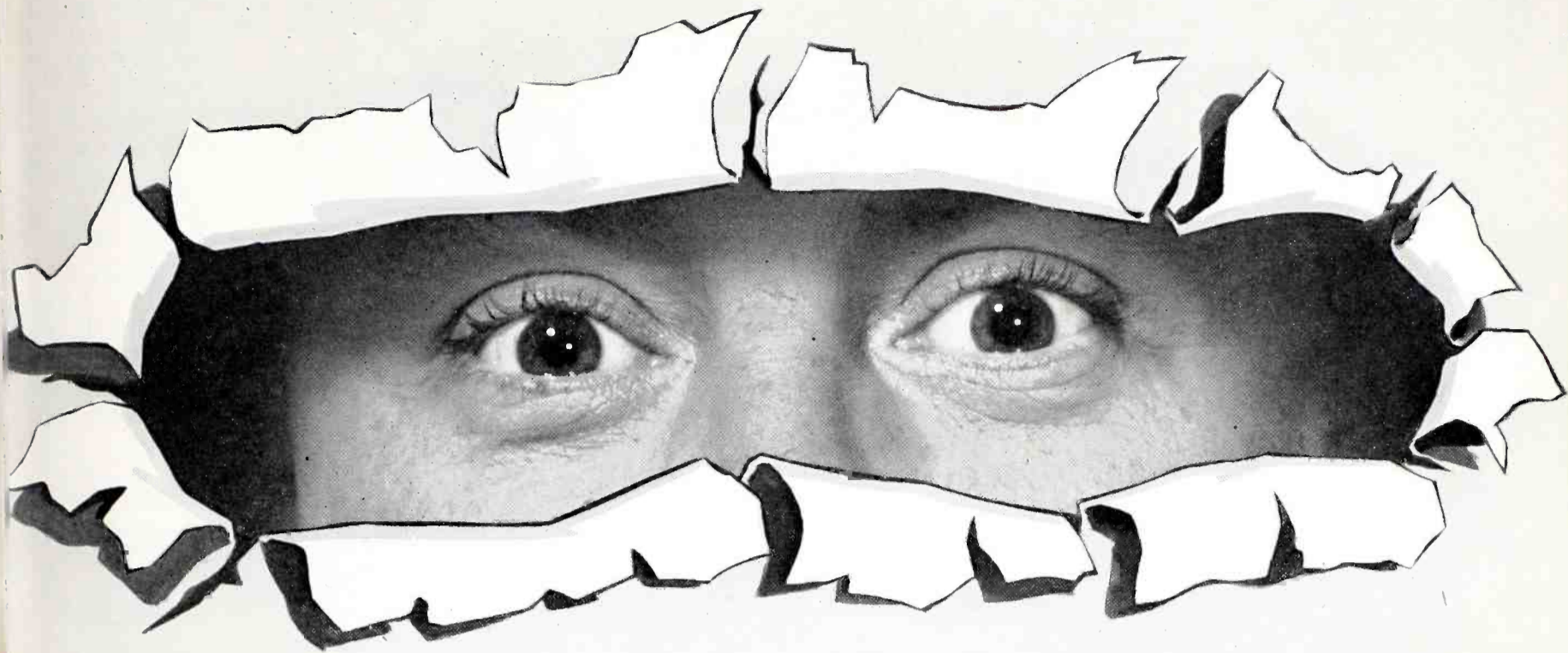
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
