

Protecting The Franchise

Any good sports executive will tell you that a superstar is the cornerstone of his franchise. That is, if he's got a superstar under contract. If not, you can bet he's trying to land one. Interestingly, two developments of major import in the music business this year were previewed in baseball's off season with the signing of Catfish Hunter to the Yankees for what most people called a ridiculously high figure of \$3.7 million.

The critics contended that no individual could possibly be worth that much money to any organization. We disagree entirely.

Motown's signing of Stevie Wonder last week to a \$13 million seven-year deal represents the first law of corporate survival: hold on to top talent, no matter what the cost. The Wonder deal is one that should be looked upon with pride, not apprehension. Certainly MCA didn't hesitate in giving Elton John an \$8 million contract covering five years and judging from the label's 'fantastic' profit picture for the first six months, it's hard to argue against their decision.

The superstars of the music industry are worth every penny of the big contracts they sign with their labels. More than accounting for a significant percentage of their company's overall sales, they represent the image of the label and are readily identified as musical trend setters. Figures in excess of \$1 million may seem high, but not unreasonable in the context of the unit sales these artists bring home. Stevie Wonder will easily account for \$13 million worldwide over the next seven years. Considering that Wonder's last six albums in a row are all \$ million sellers (three of them have sold approximately 5 million units), it's safe to say that Motown was thinking of the franchise and acted accordingly to maintain it.

A label has to have talent to stay in business and the most successful record companies have been built around strong artist rosters. When an Elton John or a Stevie Wonder nears the end of his contract, you can bet that the competition starts thinking about the possibility of signing him. It is only natural that the label do everything in its power to keep this kind of superstar around. Either of these giants could literally 'make' a new company or revitalize a slumping one. It's a pleasure to see that labels are showing the foresight to spend the kind of money that will ensure the perpetuation of the franchise. Obviously, it doesn't always work and stars will, from time to time, be lured away by more lucrative offers. Suffice it to say that when the prestige and image of a record company are on the line that company will do everything in its power to protect them.



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MCA 6-Months: Super Profits

HOLLYWOOD — MCA Records has released its highest ever semi-annual earning reports, figures covering the first six months of 1975.

Most substantial increases occur in the areas of operating income for records

and music publishing divisions. A total of \$19,130,000 is reported for the six months ending June 30, 1975 compared with \$16,409,000 for the same period in 1974, representing a 16.6% increase from 1974.

Six month revenue of the same divisions ending June 30, 1975 amounted to \$65,875,000, against \$56,561,000 for the 1974 period — an increase of 16.5%.

MCA Records' president Mike Maitland credits economic foresight as the key to this corporate milestone. Citing current industry conditions, a proud Maitland commented: "Fortunately, we were able to anticipate the difficult economic times and, by making operational changes in advance, MCA was able to adjust to the marketplace."

His real name is Baldemar G. Huerta but he pulled the name Fender off his guitar and added the alliterative Freddy to reach the gringos in his audiences. And, only two decades later, after picking and singing his way through the Marine Corp., Angola State prison (three years for marijuana possession), and an endless string of Chicano dances and Texas beer joints he has become an "overnight success," reaching that wider audience with his number one pop and country single "Before The Next Teardrop Falls." Produced by Texas legend Huey Meaux for his Crazy Cajun label, the single was picked up by ABC-Dot and the album, of the same title, followed.

After all the hard times, Fender identifies totally with the earthy "born loser" tunes he writes and sings, but there is no bitterness in his manner. His Tex-Mex music, sung in both Spanish and English, has always given him an unshakable bond with his Chicano and country audiences.

In recent months his popularity has extended into other areas through his frequent television appearances on such shows as The Tonight Show, Mike Douglas Show, Dinah Shore Show (four times), Nightdreams, American Bandstand, and a Dean Martin Special (to be aired Sept. 6).

The fervor with which Fender is received by both his longtime and newly-won fans is increasing. "Wasted Days And Wasted Nights," the second single from the "Before The Next Teardrop Falls" album has reached number one on all three country charts and is currently number 18 on **Cash Box's** pop chart.

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Epic Pacts Azoff's Full Moon Records

NEW YORK — The association between Epic Records and Full Moon Productions — which handles Minnie Riperton, Dan Fogelberg and REO Speedwagon — was taken a step further this week with the announcement of a label arrangement between Epic and CBS Custom labels and Full Moon Records.

Full Moon Productions is the production organization that has been connected with Epic for several years. All product on the Full Moon label will have a joint Full Moon/Epic logo.

The first album under the new agreement, made between Ron Alexenburg, vice president and general manager of Epic and Custom Labels and Irv Azoff,

principal of Full Moon Productions will be Dan Fogelberg's album, "Captured Angel," followed by a debut album by Bonnie Koloc. Jeffrey Comanor will also be part of the Epic/Full Moon deal. Artists managed and produced by Full Moon but not part of the deal include the Eagles, Denny Henson, Tom Kelly, Joe Walsh and producer Bill Szymczyk.

Named vice president and a&r head for full moon are Joe Walsh and Dan Fogelberg. Joe was producer for Fogelberg's earlier album, "Souvenirs."

Irwin Segelstein, president of CBS Records, stated that the label had made "a major commitment" to Full Moon Records.

NARAS N.Y. Seeks New HQ; Set Awds

NEW YORK — NARAS' New York chapter is to seek larger premises as one effort to focus attention on the local recording scene. Another is the setting up of New York awards — for the best New York record company, producer, engineers, promotion man, etc. — that will be channeled through the NARAS New York headquarters.

Said chapter head Al Steckler: "Psychologically the studio scene in Manhattan has lost the glamor it once had. There is still a tremendous amount of recording taking place but it is our feeling that in the last two or three years New York has been snubbed by the rest of the country in favor of apparently more fashionable recording centers such as Los Angeles.

"The work, the excitement, is here in New York but psychologically people don't think it is.

"NARAS New York, with some new governors and other outside and interested parties want to get the people coming back to the city to work."

\$10 Million Polygram Offer To Stigwood, Warners Out

NEW YORK — Negotiations between the Robert Stigwood Organization and Warner Communications have ended — the result of an offer made to the Stigwood company by Polygram Group.

The offer to Stigwood guarantees the company income from music publishing and recordings over the next five years of not less than \$10 million.

Stigwood and Warners were talking following a Warners' conditional proposal to offer to acquire the whole of the

issued share capital of the Stigwood group at \$1 per share. A spokesman for Stigwood stated that the group no longer considered the proposals in the best interest of their shareholders.

Polygram and Stigwood are discussing a closer working relationship in the U.S. and further joint activities. Meanwhile Atlantic Records (part of Warner Communications) will continue to distribute the Stigwood record line, RSO Record in the U.S.

Stevie Wonder And Motown Reach 'The Highest Ground'

HOLLYWOOD — Stevie Wonder has come to terms with Motown Records over what that corporation reports to be the largest recording contract in the history of the industry.

The agreement, according to Motown, calls for guarantees to Wonder, over a seven year period, of an unprecedented \$13,000,000.

Respected by fans and peers alike, Wonder is philosophic about the historic deal. "Of course I'm happy about it, but there is something perhaps even more important involved," he said. "I'm staying at Motown because it is the only viable surviving black-owned company in the record industry.

"Motown represents hope and op-

portunity for new as well as established black performers and producers. If it were not for Motown, many of us just wouldn't have had the shot we've had at success and fulfillment. In the record industry we've all seen many cases where the big companies eat up the little ones and I didn't want this to happen to Motown. I feel young black children should have something to look up to.

"It is vital that people in our business — particularly the black creative community including artists, writers, and producers — make sure that Motown stays emotionally stable, spiritually strong and economically healthy."

Ewart Abner, president of the Motown Records division of Motown Industries

was the man who commanded the negotiations for the company. "It is difficult to translate Stevie's special kind of creative genius as an artist, producer and writer to a dollar sign," Abner said.

Indeed, Wonder's last six albums have all gone solid gold, as have more than seventeen of his single releases. Over the last two years he has won nine Grammy awards, and earlier this year was the recipient of the National Association of Record Merchandisers' Presidential Award. For the latter award, Wonder was the youngest and first black honoree.

Wonder is currently in the studio, working on a two-record album.

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'Bi-lingual'-Salsa Urged To Promote Music's Acceptance

NEW YORK — Radio stations "who are reluctant to play anything in a foreign language" are holding back the mass development of salsa music, the Latin hybrid of Cuban, jazz and rock music that has become identified as a particularly New York sound.

That is the opinion of Larry Harlow, for 10 years leader of Orchestra Harlow and closely identified with the growth of the salsa sound.

"Frankly I'm very skeptical of the music getting mass acceptance in its present form in this country," he stated. "I can sell 150,000 albums a year and so can several salsa bandleaders. We can see our product in the main department stores in the cities with a strong Spanish population but there is nothing on radio apart from a very few stations catering to Spanish speaking people.

"And yet the Latin-salsa sounds are being heard in the discos — every three

or four tunes is straight salsa in New York — and myself and other musicians are getting calls for record dates that would never have considered us years ago. Motown has picked up on the conga sound, Stevie Wonder uses a lot of salsa on his sessions. I played on Kenny Vance's album" (Harlow is a pianist and percussion player) "and will be doing a Janis Ian session."

But the main thrust of Harlow's campaign will be to attempt some kind of crossover sound, a single aimed at the program director as well as the public. "Maybe something along the lines of a bi-lingual lyric — one line Spanish, one line English. One word, even, but something to broaden the scope without compromising the music," he said.

Harlow has been an active campaigner in the salsa field for some time. As a former governor of NARAS he asked for three Grammys to be awarded to Latin

music. The academy offered one. "I was very happy about that," stated Harlow. "Now I just hope it doesn't go to Freddy Fender!" (the country singer who also sings in Spanish.)

Harlow, along with most New York salsa bandleaders finds plenty of work in the ethnic centers. He can work five days a week for nine months in New York, branch out to the west coast for a month and then spend another month in the Caribbean for carnival season. He will play three or four times a year in the Chicago area but claims that Miami, despite a large number of transplanted Cubans, is "the worst market in the states — the older people don't want to hear salsa and the kids are into rock."

Despite steady work in New York however, Harlow maintains that the pay scale for salsa musicians is very low, commenting that for most of his Manhattan dates he and his 12 piece band most-

ly break even. Most money comes from out of city gigs and records sales. Harlow records for Fania Records — he was the first artist signed to the Latin music complex although he is currently in litigation with them.

Claims Harlow: "The mid-west, Des Moines, Spokane, Bosie — that's a wasteland for salsa music simply because there is no airplay. Sales could be more than doubled if program directors would listen. Even in San Antonio, with its big Mexican population, salsa is unknown. A couple of New York bands went down there last month for a Latin coalition convention and found the Mexicans did not know the music."

Harlow gets critical of the Mexican record companies themselves claiming that "with millions of Spanish speaking people there" they do little to import or promote salsa.

Anti-Piracy Action:

Tapes Seized In N.Y., Ca. First Convictions In Tex.

NEW YORK — In three separate developments last week, pirated tapes were seized in New York and California, and guilty decisions were passed on three men in Texas under that state's anti-piracy law.

In what are believed to be the first convictions under the Texas anti-piracy law, three men were fined in County Criminal Court in Dallas after being found guilty by a jury of a misdemeanor of selling unauthorized duplications of sound recordings. Charles S. O'Quinn was fined \$2,000, the maximum for a first offense, and Milton E. Broyles and William A. Richardson were fined \$1,500 each. They were convicted of selling pirated versions of James Taylor's "Sweet Baby James" released by Warner Bros. Records. The three men were arrested last Feb. after selling tapes to undercover police officers. After the arrests, police seized more than 3,000 tapes. The tapes were made in Norman, Okla., and sold for \$2 each.

In another development, more than 17,000 pirated 8-track tapes valued at

upwards of \$120,000 were seized by FBI agents in a basement storage area at 2775 Jerusalem Ave. in No. Bellmore, N.Y.

In Compton, Calif., police raided a distributorship and three retail outlets. The locations raided included: Woolford Products, Unlimited, at which more than 200 tapes were seized and Frederick Woolford was arrested; Soul Explosion, where police found close to 1600 tapes and arrested Charles Moore and Doris Edmonds; B&B Music House, at which more than 250 pirated tapes were taken and Brenda D. Williams was arrested; and Sights & Sounds, Unlimited, where 30 tapes were confiscated and Sandra Reed was arrested.

Chappell Buys Hill & Range Cat.

NEW YORK — Chappell and Co. has acquired all songs in the Hill and Range catalog, plus Anne-Rachel Music, Dolfi Music and Noma Music — a total of over 20,000 songs. Hill and Range is the publishing company started by Jean and Julian Aberbach.

Not included in the deal are Elvis Presley Music and Gladys Music. These however will be administered by Chappell.

Steppenwolf Makes An Epic Move

HOLLYWOOD — Steppenwolf will embark upon a U.S. tour, beginning Aug. 16 at the Boston Gardens. Tour coincides with personnel reorganization and a new label.

Keyboard player Andy Chapin has joined members John Kay, George Biondo, Jerry Edmonton, Bobby Cochran and the group (having formerly recorded for CBS Custom Label Mums) has begun a new association with Epic Records. Epic is currently readying an lp titled "Hour Of The Wolf," produced by Steppenwolf and mixed by Roy Halee.

RCA & CBS Set For Musexpo; U.S. Travel Packages Available

NEW YORK — RCA Records and CBS Records are among the major American firms that have finalized their plans to attend Musexpo '75 in Las Vegas this September. In addition, Musexpo president Roddy Shashoua has announced the availability of special travel arrangements for U.S. participants.

Arista Success Running Counter To Industry — Davis

NEW YORK — With a 600 percent operating profit increase in the first financial year and "more than a \$3 million turnaround" Clive Davis is pleased with the way it is at Arista Records. Apart from the balance sheet he also takes pleasure in establishing Arista, of which he is president, as "a new company."

He commented: "We never viewed ourselves as an outgrowth of Bell. When Arista started I had the opportunity to take what I wanted from the Bell roster."

What Davis actually retained were only two artists, Melissa Manchester and Barry Manilow and about 10 percent of the label personnel.

Davis joined Arista with a \$10 million capital contribution from the parent company, Columbia Pictures, plus some

lucrative foreign and tape licensing deals worldwide. "It gave us a substantial financial base to work from," he commented. "And I take a lot of pride in the number of new artists that Arista has broken — particularly at a time when artists are notoriously weak in getting broken."

Davis views the Arista success as running counter to the industry, citing other labels laying off personnel, reporting domestic sales drops and closing offices in major centers. "Too many people though are interesting in sounding the death knell — I think Arista's success in this economic climate shows the positive side," he said.

As having the biggest sales impact for Arista Davis talks up Melissa Manchester ("her new product, Arista broke"), Barry Manilow ("his first album sold 15,000 at first, now he has his third top ten single out of that lp") Gil Scott-Heron and the "Funny Lady" soundtrack album.

"Scott-Heron is certainly emerging as a major spokesman for black people and his first Arista album has so far sold 250,000. In this field, the signing and finding extensions for an artist's career, Arista is going to be very strong. The

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Sedaka Establishes Himself As Contemporary Not 'Oldy'

NEW YORK — Ten months after the release of the "Sedaka's Back" album, Neil Sedaka considers himself established and accepted as "a contemporary performer." His own words those, and part of a conscious effort by the singer-songwriter to erase his oldies image.

"Of course it's really impossible to do that completely," he states. "But the album and all the other artists doing songs from it established what I wanted to do — to be accepted as a contemporary performer. I feel that it is very important for me at this time to work towards this."

"For instance I have had offers over and over and for very good money to do some of the rock revival shows but I turned them down. It's not the direction I want. I've cut down the oldies portion in my act to six minutes — the rest is all new material. I love the oldies — as a listener — but I never want to get locked into that kind of thing. It was another era and although the old songs for me are an annuity (I'm still getting songwriting royalties from them after 17 years) I want to get into the contemporary market."

A veteran of some 700 songs — he writes four hours a day, "very disciplined" when not on the road performing — Sedaka classes the current suc-

cess of his album as his biggest career thrill so far.

"I retired from 1963 to 1970, just devoted myself to writing for people such as Peggy Lee, Andy Williams, the Fifth Dimension, Tom Jones, David Cassidy, and Nancy Wilson. So this is a comeback for me really," he says.

"And for me it appears to be the right time. There seems to be some melodic singers around and I write melodic songs."

For this Sedaka should indeed be thankful. Seven of them (the Carpenters, Captain and Tennille, Bo Donaldson and the Heywoods, Maria Muldaur, Andy Williams, Helen Reddy and Bobby Sherman) have taken material from Sedaka's Rocket Records album, which has sold 300,000 for him, according to the singer.

The album marks the initial association between Sedaka and Elton John (Rocket Records is his own label) and the first step on the comeback trail for Sedaka. It was a deliberate move on his part to launch himself from Britain into the U.S.

He comments: "There is a lot of loyalty from the public in Britain. They remember as far back as my London

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A&M A&R Dept.: 'Open For Business'

HOLLYWOOD — In keeping with the label's open door policy toward new talent acquisition, A&M vice president Kip Cohen has lauded the promotion of Roger Birnbaum to the position of director of contemporary a&r. Broadening the scope of the staff, Cohen introduced Birnbaum as a man "at my right hand for the last two years having been responsible for attracting important talent to the label as well as guiding many recording careers with foresight and intelligence."

Birnbaum stressed his personal accessibility to independent parties seeking a listening ear for new material and talent. A constant bottleneck with many companies, the area of reviewing unknown talent is a vital one in Birnbaum's estimation. Consistent with the A&M philosophy, he emphasizes the need to keep an "ear to the street" in order to remain conscious of musical directions, and vows to provide a fast turnover in terms of attention and feedback of reaction to any tapes which reach the A&M.

While the essential purpose of the company's a&r department will remain, as ever, to marry A&M artists with the

right blend of material and the correct producer, Birnbaum elaborated on an experiment which has proven successful over recent months, that of purchasing masters of single product for release. Notable coups for the label in this area include "Love Will Keep Us Together," by The Captain and Tennille, and Bazuka's "Dynamite."

As if to heighten the drama of the set, John closed the show with a touching version of "This Old Guitar" which he played alone. Few club debuts have been so memorable.

One of the unsung heroes of our industry, Jerry Weintraub of Management III, arranged the 'first' in nightclub entertainment combining the talents of Denver and Sinatra in one evening. The gala at Harrah's will doubtless be in great demand and we heartily look forward to a return engagement. We must also salute Jerry Weintraub's imagination and creativity in bringing this concept together.

ATV Music: Building With 'Trust' And 'Love'

HOLLYWOOD — ATV Music Corporation, as it exists today, represents a conglomerate of publishing firms whose reputation and recognition within the music business has stemmed from one of its most prestigious catalogs, that of MacLen Music, publishing firm under which John Lennon and Paul McCartney registered virtually all of their compositions while the Beatles were in existence.

President Sam Trust and vice-president Steve Love, however, are quick to emphasize that although the firm is justifiably proud of the MacLen catalog, ATV is engaged in other activities and responsibilities that they hope will be foremost in the minds of industry people whenever the initials "ATV" are mentioned.

Although MacLen formed the basis of ATV, the firm's history dates back to 1969. When Dick James formed Northern Songs, Inc., ATV was a subsidiary, originally begun as a television production firm. It was in '69 that ATV became a publisher, joining with Don Kirshner (ATV/Kirshner) until that relationship terminated in 1972. In April 1973, the decision to bring ATV to the United States was made, and with it came the appointment of Sam Trust as its first president.

Through the acquisition of new catalogs, such as Nat King Cole's Sweco publishing catalog, and two country-western catalogs (Comet and Welbeck), ATV today represents over a dozen publishing firms, and is actively engaged in promotion of writers and their product, as well as those of independents.

Artists and songwriters, the ATV president stressed, are often not fully qualified to administrate their own publishing companies, and alignment with ATV br-

ings with it an association with an active staff of promotion people and the opportunity for foreign publishing and recording deals for that artist's compositions.

Steve Love emphasizes that the relationship between publishing companies and record company a&r departments is an important function of any publishing operation. "The most vital part of a successful record is a good song," Love said. "I personally am in constant touch with a&r departments both domestically and internationally, as well as managers and artists, seeking out new material. I am always on the lookout for songwriters who can supply tomorrow's hits. Somewhere in L.A., I believe, there is someone pounding out songs in a basement, or a shabby little studio, that have the vitality and commerciality to be hits on the level of an Elton John. Finding those people is another question, but we're looking."

In terms of American originated copyrights that belong to ATV, Love sends, on a selective basis, songs that have hit potential in Europe, and receives a great

Wayne said that he will include 'unofficial' visits to NARAS chapters in Memphis, Nashville and New York promoting the idea and indicated he has already received some favorable responses from other NARAS officials across the country. He noted that he was optimistic about the response: "Nothing changes overnight, especially with large organizations, so what we're contemplating is nothing new. It's nice to see NARAS express an interest in self-improvement. The Grammy screening system has worked well all these years and it would be easy for us to be complacent, but we're not. We're looking to get better."

Washington Promoter Combats Bogus Ticket Sales

HOLLYWOOD — Counterfeit tickets for pop concerts have become a big business in the Pacific Northwest, but promoter John Bauer of John Bauer Concerts in Bellevue, Wash., took a giant step to combat that evil for a recent sold-out Rolling Stones show at the Seattle Coliseum.

For several days before the show itself, Bauer was on various radio talk shows with police, security and staff personnel from the coliseum, talking about security inside and outside the building, and warning of counterfeit tickets.

The day of the show, Bauer brought in six representatives from Globe Tickets, who went through the lines with micrometers, reevaluating every ticket.

In all, 3000 spurious ducates were spotted. Some of the fans had paid up to \$50 per ticket. Those youngsters were weeded out of the lines, and police informed them to "find the guy who sold you the ticket, and take care of him yourself," Bauer related.

NEW YORK — Burlington/Felstead Music Corp. has closed down all creative and professional department activities in both New York and Los Angeles. The corporation is the publishing arm of the London Records organization.

Captain And Tennille Score Gold For 'Love'

HOLLYWOOD — "Love Will Keep Us Together," the album by the Captain and Tennille, has been certified gold by the RIAA.

Delmark Acquires United & States

NEW YORK — Delmark Records, the Chicago based blues and jazz label, has purchased masters and the trademarks from the defunct United and States labels.

United and States were a 1950s blues, r&b and jazz line owned by the late Leonard Allen and based in Chicago. The purchase brings Delmark blues product by Junior Wells, Memphis Slim, Roosevelt Sykes and others, jazz product by Tab Smith, Jimmy Forrest and others as well as r&b and gospel material.

Jazz from the United and States catalogs will appear on the Delmark line, blues will be released on Delmark's Pearl label and r&b on the revitalized States label. The company has no plans at present to release gospel, country and pop product from the United and States labels.

Fox Pub. To J.W. Pepper

NEW YORK — J.W. Pepper and Son, Valley Forge, Pennsylvania have been named exclusive agents for the Sam Fox publishing company. The Pepper firm is a retailer of educational sheet music serving schools in a 30 state area east of the Mississippi.

Fox's educational publications will be stocked in Pepper's four retail outlets and will be warehoused at the Pepper plant in Valley Forge.

Harry Fox, vice president, based in Santa Barbara and running the west coast operation will continue activities for the Fox company.

Laurie To Distribute Fraternity Single

NEW YORK — Laurie Records will distribute Fraternity Records' current release, "Anthem" by Sonny Flaharty and Bob Norris. Fraternity is a Cincinnati based record label.

"Funny Lady" album, contrary to popular opinion did not come to us as a matter of form from Columbia Pictures who made the film. There was competitive bidding and we outbid everyone else.

"Every lp that we have paid for the recording of, has been a chart hit," added Davis.

Other artists in the Arista fold are not designed for quick commercial success, Davis noted. "Our product from Anthony Braxton (the jazz saxophonist, part of Arista's avant garde jazz label, Freedom) are not going to be a tremendous commercial success but the other side of the coin is that there is no economic risk in making them either. Julian 'Cannonball' Adderley Dead At 47

HOLLYWOOD — Julian "Cannonball" Adderley, one of jazz's greatest saxophonists, passed away last Thursday night in Indiana, after having been in intensive care for a stroke he suffered last month. Born Julian Adderley in 1928, he was dubbed "Cannonball" during his adolescence. Actually, the nickname was "Cannibal," an affectionate reference to his voracious appetite. Later the nickname stuck, but in its present form.

London Sets Aug. Release

NEW YORK — London Records reported last week that it is releasing eight albums in August. Heading the list is the best-selling hits LP from 10 cc, entitled "100 cc." This will be followed by an instrumental debut LP called "Sometimes Words Just Get In The Way," from Orion, a five-man group from upstate New York. The Orion disk marks the first time that a rock LP has been released on London's Phase 4 custom label.

Mid-August releases will include a new LP from Bernard Herrmann, entitled "The Mysterious Film World of Bernard Herrmann." There will also be three classical packages: "Rimsky-Korsakov: Scheherazade," "Gershwin: Rhapsody In Blue" with Ivan Davis and the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra, and "Pachelbel: Kanon And Other Baroque Favorites."

At the end of the month, there will be two releases on the Hi label. The first is a new studio lp from Al Green, entitled "Al Green Is Love," and the second is "The World's Greatest Honky Tonk Band" by the Bill Black Combo.

Cannonball was born to a musical family, his father being a prominent coronet player, and as Julian grew up with the family in Florida, he studied sax. From Ft. Lauderdale, Julian entered the army, where he played in various bands from 1948-55, and with the army musical detachment in Washington, D.C. By the time he reached New York in the summer of 1955, his reputation had preceded him, and he was greeted with rave reviews. He later formed a group with his brother Nat, a coronetist, and returned to N.Y. in 1957 to play in a now-famous ensemble with Miles Davis and John Coltrane. Later he formed his own quintet, which from 1959 to the early sixties was considered the definitive jazz ensemble in the world. An admirer of Charlie Parker, Adderley wrote essays, appeared regularly on television, and during his performing years attracted such other jazz luminaries as Sarah Vaughn, Milt Jackson, Bill Evans, Charles Lloyd and Yusef Lateef to his own spotlight. He also won a Grammy Award in 1967 for his composition, "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy."

A spokeswoman for Fantasy Records, Adderley's label, informed **Cash Box** that Cannonball's brother, Nat, had received word of his brother's improved health status, and had flown to Berkeley to do banding on a new lp to be released within the coming month. To be entitled "Big Man," the title comes from a statement Julian Adderley made during his last press interview, given on July 7. "I don't consider myself a big man. I'm all too human. Besides, a big man is evaluated by others, not by himself." We at **Cash Box**, as well as all his friends all over the world, realize what a truly big man he was, and we shall miss him.

It took Harrison a week to make up his mind to let it go. **Alan Klein** gave them a rate as did Bolan, and Lewis who gave them the material for free. EAST COASTINGS — Atlantic Records has signed a worldwide deal with **Paul Kossoff's** new group, **Back Street Crawler**. **Kossoff**, formerly the power guitarist behind **Free**, had his 1973 album, also titled, "Back Street Crawler" released by Island Records a couple of weeks ago. The lp, which is essentially a series of studio jams features people like **Paul Rodgers**, **Jess Roden**, **Andy Fraser**, **Simon Kirke**, **Trevor Burton**, and **Alan White**. His new group, which has received rave notices for their recent U.K. tour, is comprised of young musicians which **Kossoff** has scouted . . . Rumors are that **Kraftwerk** will be going to Capitol. Meanwhile, Mercury will be issuing an old album, "Rolf and Florian." The album is completely instrumental and was recorded two years ago for the German market.

Klaatu, the Canadian group who had an excellent, albeit overlooked single on Island a while back called "California Jam," have released the follow-up, "True Life Hero" on the Daffodil label out of Toronto. The song is a spirited rocker with an infectious beat and brisk vocals. A great record. Speaking of Island, the label has just released a single by **Arthur Louis**, "Knocking On Heaven's Door." If you think that it's a coincidence that another reggae version of the song should be released a week after **Eric Clapton's** cover of the **Dylan** tune, try this on for size — **Clapton** is playing guitar for **Louis**. An interesting cover battle should result, but one thing is for sure, **Clapton** can't lose.

From Columbia/Epic, we hear that **Michael Murphey** is recording his next at Caribou Studios with **Bob Johnston** producing. **Mott**, the group formed when **Ian Hunter** and **Mick Ronson** formed their own band, will have their lp, entitled "Drive On," ready for September release. **Dave Mason** will likewise have his next album out in Sept. It's to be called "Split Coconut." Also in September will be the first release on **James William Guercio's** "Caribou" label. It will be an lp from the group, **Gerard**, with horn arrangements by Chicago's own **James Pankow**. All in all, there will be more than 40 albums released by Columbia and Epic between now and October 1!

The Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. has commissioned **Oscar Brand** to write and stage their bicentennial show, "Sing, America, Sing," which will run Sept. 8-21. The show will feature singers, dancers, soloists, a chorus, and an orchestra. The theme will be an eye witness report of the history of America in song. **Brand** is the author of 11 books on American music . . . **Florence Warner**, who has an album coming out on Epic can be heard on the Sealy Posture Pedic and the RC Cola ("Me and my RC, me and my RC") TV commercials. . . . **Ted Nugent**, who was once guitarist with the **Amboy Dukes** likewise has a debut Epic release forthcoming. **Nugent**, we are told, kills all his own meat with his trusty bow and arrow.

KC & the Sunshine Band did their first U.S. concert last week before a hometown crowd in Virginia Key after returning from a successful tour of England. The group, considered to be one of the forces behind the TK sound is led by **H.W. Casey** and **Rick Finch**, who wrote, produced, arranged, and played on **George McCrae's** "Rock Your Baby" . . . **The Atlanta Rhythm Section** played to an overflowing crowd of more than 6,000 at Atlanta's Chastain Park when they teamed up with a 90-piece symphony orchestra. The show, which was opened by the orchestra, was followed by a portion where the group joined in to play selections from their new album, "Dog Days." The group then did their own set, which caused most of the older people to head for the exits while younger fans flocked down to the front.

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Fox: An Open-Minded Animal

How do you go about putting a band together? Now I'm not talking about your ordinary, run of the mill garage aggregation whose destiny lies no further than the pap served up at pick up bars. I'm talking about a band that's creatively in it for the kill. A band that's serious about what it's doing.

A band that's **Fox**.

Fox, whose initial recording effort centers around the exotic vocals of **Noosha Fox**, has taken a long hard look at what it takes to be creative in a field that is all too often known for its derivativeness.

"The members of the band are very open-minded," stated Noosha. "It's very easy for a band, especially in the beginning, to get into one particular kind of style and not be able to get away from it. There's a whole lot of different styles and influences incorporated within the context of Fox and on the first album this little bit of everything showed."

Noosha went on to state that, given enough time, the band will ultimately come up with a distinctive musical style. "Sure, after a time Fox will most likely have a sound or style that will be totally theirs but the creative and diverse aspects of the music will always be there."

Whether or not you care to believe in the seriousness of the musical art; the dedication of a musician to his music is pretty much universal. But, according to Noosha, there is a loose dexterity that allows for a less stringent outlook.

"We've got a laidback approach to our music. It can get difficult if you think about the music too long. When we create, things just kind of fall into place, and as a result the whole concept of making music is that much more enjoyable. The music is freer when you don't think about it."

While Noosha's voice (with more than a hint of the forties influence) took center stage on Fox's debut album; she was more than adamant in stating that the band was a group in more ways than one.

"Fox isn't just a bunch of pickup musicians. All members are skilled musicians with talents in the areas of playing and songwriting. When it comes time to decide what material the band will do it becomes a decision of the band and not just one or two people.

Fox is a band with a pedigree; displaying the talents of former members of **Them** (Van Morrison's blast from the past), **Stealer's Wheel**, the **Herd** and **Ronnie Lane's** band. These wide ranging and veteran capabilities along with the imaginative production and an all out campaign to bring back the potential from imaginative and progressive music in this land.

There are tales of experience in every musical fiber of the band that transcend momentary success to something lasting that will go on just a little bit longer. Obviously, Fox has a tremendous advantage being with Ariola America. The new Lasker/Stark run label distributed through Capitol has decided to work each piece of product relentlessly. Towards this end the Fox LP is already taking off around the country and some markets, like the Atlanta area, are showing remarkably strong reorder patterns on the group's single.

"My gig isn't just banging on my drum kit. If it were I wouldn't be in this band."

Jim Frank's comment was laidback yet forceful. But above all, positive in its intention. Frank (Fox's drummer) is a seasoned veteran of the songwriting-session wars and was assured of big bucks on a regular basis in that situation. Instead he chose to leave this womb for a chance at fleeting stardom. Why?

"It's not so much the stardom thing as it is the chance to get together with some damned good musicians and make some creative music. I mean the experiences and influences of this band are not to be believed. There's everything from **Dr. John** to **Eric Clapton** to **Wes Montgomery** wrapped up in this band. The musical possibilities of this band are almost limitless. Anybody that would pass up a chance to play with this band would have to be crazy."

The fact that the nucleus of Fox has a lot of session years would seem to dictate a faceless backing unit. Frank was quick to comment that nothing could be further from the truth.

"You're dealing with professionals. When professional musicians get together there is a creative give and take. Ideas flow and in the resultant give and take a definite music is formed. Given a bit more time Fox will be a tight working band with everybody showing their skills at particular points in a performance."

In that inevitable search for style and acceptance a good many groups fall into the chuckhole of predictability; powerless to break the mold of an audience's desires. In describing the band's future musical bent Jim went into detail as to how Fox would avoid being creatively shot.

"The band is not afraid of becoming predictable. If you're into a particular sound you're going to do it. I don't think we have to worry about becoming slaves to our audience. They won't dictate the direction of our music."

Frank continued, "We're already doing a lot of things that will ensure the music of staying fresh. Instrumentally the music is developing a much ballsier feel to it. We're also starting to experiment with Noosha's vocals as they relate to the music. In certain instances her voice can be used as an effect or on some songs as another instrument."

Proving a more than effective guiding light for Fox's initial forays is producer **Kenny Young**. Young, who also dabbles in the songwriting trade (as witness his composition "Under The Boardwalk") pens musical pictures and lyrical tales. A dimension most attuned to this Foxfire.

Ken describes his founding Fox efforts in the same tones that spark his compositions.

"My idea was to get some established musicians, try to break in a group and then build a show around them."

"We want girls with big boobs in the band. Or better still guys with big tits. Instead Noosha floated in from down under and as fair a floozie as you'd hope to meet on Bondage Beach."

Young's enthusiasm might seem a bit overboard but when the belief is there can success be far behind?

Fox is getting what you need.

Gil Scott-Heron: Aware and Involved

With the release of his LP "The First Minute Of A New Day" **Gil Scott-Heron** created a lot of excitement in the music world with his poetic lyrics and moving music. When I asked Gil about mixing politics and music he said that his music is not that politically oriented. Gil said, "I don't know how you can sing songs about life on this planet and not really say anything about politics. It's really almost impossible, it's hypocritically absurd to what lengths you have to go in this country from being labeled political. Now **Brian Jackson** and myself, I would say, have written between 100 and 120 songs and what is and of about politics is very little in essence. However those that have political overtones have an almost instant identification with the public because these are the most overt pressures that are on everyone's lives these days. You can't talk about life as being a 360 degree experience and not talk about politics. Because every time they pass a law, I could say I don't care, but if I break it, that's my ass. So I would say that I am concerned about things, things that are constantly changing and are determining my life. I can't see myself ignoring it, just like I can't see myself ignoring children, or alcoholism, or drugs, or ignoring it just because it would be better for the mainstream of society. I still feel there is a need for songs like I sing because there are people who share the vibration and value the lifestyles that I value."

Gil doesn't see his songs as universal in concept because he said "right now there are people out there that don't share the values I have. The reason for this is that people out there don't have the same priorities that fit my 360 degrees. I personally think it is more important that everyone have something to eat rather than maintain our vested economic interest abroad. It all comes down to priorities and what you've established as tangible or intangible. I think a lot of the problems introduced onto civilian society have been induced from the military and the politicians. People who don't give a damn about people in general and what their lives are all about, even though these people are the constituents."

When I asked Gil about his tune "Winter In America," a message song Gil said he wrote along with Brian in response to what time it is. "It could be ninety degrees out there but the song and things that we were dealing with musically and lyrically are something that is not resolved but hangs there like America is hanging, Gil gestured with his hands. I'm not personally political, I'm not even into birthday parties. I don't swing that way but when I see the effects on what's going on when I walk down the streets, I feel I have to respond to it aggressively and legislatively attack. Just like when you are physically attacked. If you don't do anything about it you will get the tire end of it. Certain individuals say that my band and I are throwbacks of the late sixties of protest and all that type of shit. Like my understanding of someone being committed to something was that you hung with it until it was over. Now we fought a whole lot of battles in the sixties but the war is not over because things that we were arguing about and trying to get straight aren't straight. And one of these things is justice and who's going to jail and why. The microcosmic population of the U.S. who were diggin' upon the essence of justice still have bitter complaints on how the justice trip still runs. It's like if you have a dollar you don't go to jail, but if you have no dollars you do. It's just like monopoly," Gil laughed. "If you get the money you can get out of jail but if you don't you got to roll the bail. And that's very ridiculous in this day and age that we should still have so many overt views continuing towards judicial imbalance and the racist type of justice just happening."

Regarding Watergate Gil sees what happened as good for the country but it was similar to Miami because it staved off the inevitable. "The man (Nixon) had so thoroughly abused things that those jelly spines (the ones in Washington), (and I come from Washington and I know), couldn't do anything. These people have no spines whatsoever. They are bloodsuckers, those congressmen and senators or whatever you call them. They are only propped up there because of their ability to kiss-ass and not make any waves between the power-mongers and the money folks. It took them a long time (the money folks) to let him go. Finally the word came down that it was all right to let him roll because they couldn't keep him in office any longer without looking stupid themselves."

"I'm not sure what they have planned for 1976, but the brakes are off and the trip is out of control. The people's response to pressures put on their lives by the economic hogs will be the inevitable clash in terms of America's long sought after confrontation."

Gil also said that blacks have been trying to tell the middle class about these types of things for a long time but they have a hard time accepting the truth because it was coming from somebody else rather than their own kind. "This is the truth anyway. But white people have a defensive thing about America. But this America is not the one we've read about in the textbooks as being the land of milk and honey. And the reason for this is because all these things have been betrayed. But, they (the middle class) remain defensive because they are in love with the ideal even though pretty soon they will have to admit that the ideal never really existed. When the band sings "Winter In America," we're singing about what if we won the war. I feel nobody would know what to do with it even if we won. If Ford left tomorrow and it was given to the people to run they would say no thanks because the country has already been run so poorly that the situation is about hopeless. I see hope through cooperative action. It can work if we decide to do it together. But another problem lies in the fact that the brainwashing trip is so heavy. Additionally the murders in 1970 at Kent State, Jackson State and Augusta were tremendous stop signs to any kind of dissent. People assumed they had the right to dissent because they read it somewhere, but when they saw all those dead people they realized that the only way to argue in America was with a gun. A lot of people in this country didn't want to do that so they gave up and became ostriches. However, when the ostrich puts his head in the sand it makes it easier for whoever you are to kick his ass. You got to put your whole trip under there or you better stick with it up there and deal with it. Nobody stands up anymore. I don't know if it is balls or desire but it's no relief to me. The people that were assassinated in the sixties were not really saying anything to anybody. My only fear in speaking my mind is in the fear in silencing myself and giving up. That would be defeat for me."

"I have been approached about toning down my trip before and have been told the only thing keeping me back from being a star was in the fact that I refused to be quiet. My whole thing is that I would rather be whatever I am and keep the respect the people have for me. And finally I know who I am and know that I have kept my integrity intact."

On the west coast dates, they will be joined by the horn section of Tower of Power, with surprise guests being announced for other dates as well. The American tour extends through Oct. 25, including outdoor dates at Roosevelt Stadium in New Jersey on Aug. 22, Cleveland Stadium

on Aug. 23, Anaheim Stadium in California on Aug. 30 and Balboa Stadium in San Diego on Aug. 31.

Flower Hour Sets Harrison Special

HOLLYWOOD — "The King Biscuit Flower Hour" will present a new special audio-documentary on its 176 station outlets on Aug. 17. The program, "A Conversation with George Harrison," is a two-hour long study in-depth of Harrison in both words and music. New York air personality Dave Herman (of WNEW-FM) spent several hours interviewing Harrison in Los Angeles, and the results of that conversation together with actualities and music make up the heart of the program.

Alice Cooper's Dept. Of Youth To Clean Up N.Y.C. Parks

NEW YORK — Atlantic Records last week reported the start of the "Department Of Youth" parks clean-up campaign for the city of New York. Named after Alice Cooper's current single, the program has been organized in conjunction with the city of New York's V.I.P. (Volunteers In The Parks) organization. The clean-up activity will commence on Tues., Aug. 12, at noon in lower Riverside Park.

The V.I.P. program, run by New York's

parks, recreation and cultural affairs administration, will supply 200-300 neighborhood "Department Of Youth" clean-up workers with sun visors, arm bands, and plastic collection bags for the clean-up operation, as well as rakes, shovels and brooms. Materials are being donated jointly by Atlantic Records and Alice's Alive Enterprises.

It is expected that the campaign will go into similar operation shortly at other parks in the New York metropolitan area, and plans are being made for operation in other major cities in the U.S. through the rest of the summer. The clean-up campaigns are all coordinated by the Atlantic Records publicity department in New York.

BILL GRAHAM'S 'DAY ON THE GREEN' #3 — OAKLAND COLISEUM, CA. — Bill Graham has proven that the day of the large outdoor concert venue has not ended, that it is in fact just beginning to experience a resurgence. Bill and his staff, over the years, have boiled down the variable factors that can go wrong at a large-scale outdoor music show to a science, and when someone buys a ticket for a day of concert music under his aegis, they get their money's worth with a minimum of effort and hassle. In addition to medical spotters positioned around the arena to spot sun-stroke victims (the temperature during the concert was in the nineties) the staging for the 60,000 fans was a treat — designed by the San Francisco Opera Co., the motif was that of an old English castle, concealing neatly the sound and stage equipment from the audience's view. Union Jacks flew from the turrets, and upon Robin Trower's entrance, a drawbridge was lowered over the moat, and royal guardsmen escorted the Chrysalis Records' guitarists to stage center.

The theme of the concert, "The British Are Coming," was carried through successfully beginning at 9:30 a.m., when the already-filled-to-capacity crowd was introduced to Gary Wright, whose Warner Bros. album is gaining strong response. From his synthesizer-laced, punctuated themes, Warner artists Fleetwood Mac delivered one of their strongest performances in recent memory, featuring selections from their latest lp for Warners, simply entitled, "Fleetwood Mac." Strong songs in the set, in addition to their oldies "Station Man" and "Spare Me A Little" included "Sugar Daddy," "Say You Love Me," and "World Turning," which all delighted the partisan San Francisco audience.

Columbia Records' Dave Mason, whose current tour is not geared towards the promotion of any product, nevertheless always presents a fine show, drawing on his Blue Thumb material "Shouldn't Have Took More Than You Gave," "World In Changes" and "Can't Stop Loving," in addition to material from his last Columbia lp. Mason's songs mellow with age, and his guitar technique is unequalled.

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**Ten Years After
Slade**

LONG BEACH ARENA, L.A. — The realm of popular music is a fleeting thing. It's the stuff that musical one shots and stillborn rockers are made of. It's the rare forger of rock and metal that survives to tell his tale. That rarity is Ten Years After who at their recent Long Beach venue showed the chops that have allowed them to survive and thrive eight years on.

Ten Years After (Columbia's around a while) has turned the basics of boogie and blues into a science. The concise professional groundwork provided by Leo Lyons, Ric Lee and Chick Churchill is the block from which Alvin Lee does his now classic lead contortions.

The inherent predictability of a band that's been doing it for a while was overshadowed in TYA's case by some deft chord progressions on Lee's part. LOS ANGELES — He's never really been out of circulation. He's certainly not hurting for money. You figure the guy could sit back on his suntanned aura until Las Vegas freezes over.

So the question nagged me all the way to the Greek Theatre — Why *would* Paul Anka go out on the road . . . even for a week?

"Because he loves it," you say?

You may just have a point.

Yes, he enjoys the return, but love is a reciprocal arrangement. Give the man the respect he deserves. This reporter will certainly commit to the proposition that he is a giver as much as a taker.

The mechanics of his performance were smooth as silk. There's really no need to relate that Anka is a seasoned performer who can and does sing from his heart. He's got the punch, and I'll be damned if I can find anything wrong with what he laid out the other night in that capacity.

But that's only part of what impressed me. You see, it's not just that he knows what the audience wants. He pays the people a higher compliment by refusing to separate himself as "star" from what he knows is an equal responsibility — that of being a person, like everybody else.

This attitude solidly permeates Anka's approach. From his highly inspirational lyrics, spontaneous melodies and warm rapport with the crowd — a kind of all-inclusive confidence that makes everybody else confident, that's Paul Anka.

Of course, it goes without saying that this kind of artist surrounds himself with positive energy, not the least of which appeared with him on the bill in the very formidable form of Odis Coates. After

HOLLYWOOD BOWL, L.A. — A near sell-out crowd was on hand at the Bowl last Sunday evening to kick back and listen to Warner Bros. recording stars, America, and to welcome George Martin's first live appearance here in the states.

Martin is probably best known and respected for his scoring arrangements and production work with the Beatles. He most recently produced America's latest album, "Hearts." The Hollywood Bowl Orchestra was the vehicle Martin used to conduct a pleasant set of old Beatle favorites spanning the Sgt. Pepper/Yellow Submarine days. A symphonic rendition of "Live And Let Die" (Martin produced and scored the orchestral arrangements for Wings) was also included with various pop and classical interpretations.

After a brief intermission, Dewey Bunnell, Dan Peek, and Gerry Beckley, who collectively comprise America, made their stage entrance to the orchestra introduction of "Miniature." America is strictly a top notch commercial band with an impressive track record of single hits.

They gave the fans what they wanted to hear with "Tin Man," "Muskrat Love," "Lonely People," "I Need You," "Ventura Highway," "Sister Golden Hair," and their new single "Daisy Jane," bulleted this week at 40 on the **Cash Box** top 100 chart.

While America's recording success continues straight ahead, their live presentation lacks in certain respects. In a set that consisted of over twenty songs, there was little variation in tempo or style. The one tune that stood by itself, "Woman Tonight," sported a funky reggae beat and afforded the group good solo opportunities. It would be nice to hear a few more uptempo numbers like this one. Together, their vocal harmonies were impeccable, but not quite strong enough to really fill the vastness of the Hollywood Bowl.

America's approach to music is pure, light and very easy going. It would probably be to their advantage to perform in smaller concert halls or clubs where their homey touch can best be appreciated.

WATERLOO VILLAGE, STANHOPE, N.J. — There has been much talk in the New York area about Dolly Parton 'crossing over' — several of the media people are talking her up this way. But actually Ms. Parton remains unchanged (which is as it should be) and possibly it is the media people who are doing the crossing.

Be that as it may, the RCA artist's appearance in this 230 year old village was part of a mini festival that appears to have been sewn up by RCA. It was a pure country show, pure Parton and basically a parade of the lady's greatest hits (all self-written). It showed Ms. Parton off for what she is, a major country talent which in the final analysis also means a major American music talent. The Parton style is simplicity and root emotion and even when the stickiness sets in ("Me And Little Andy" is definitive Victorian sentiment with girl and dog both heading heavenwards) Ms. Parton has the authority to override it and the honesty that allows belief to be suspended.

She must also be a joy to promote — apart from the string of releases performed, after the show long lines of autograph seekers and handshakers, each a potential buyer, were tended to.

Gary Stewart, also on RCA, was into rockabilly, trots out Hank Williams and bar songs (including what has to be a genre classic. "She's Acting Single, I'm Drinking Doubles") in between urgent patter. The urgency may have been because he was poorly served by sound and his backup was pickup. Enough came through however to establish him as one of the better country talents and one where the word crossover could be applied.

Produced and arranged by John Worsley, this highly-commercial, harmony-laden disk is heavily laced with brilliant studio and musical artistry in a top 40 bubblegum vein. Strings, high lead vocal by John, and superb rhythm tracks make this sure to soar as Ariola's second U.S. single release. Flip: No info. available.

THE JAN DAVIS GUITAR (Ranwood R-1023)

Gypsy Fox (2:11) (Laurabob/Ranwol/BMI — J. Davis)

With a heavily disco-inspired clavinet bottom and rhythm tracks, Jan Davis delivers a melodic tune that reminds one of Mason Williams' "Classical Gas" of a few years ago. Could be as huge a hit for Jan. Flip: Child Of Jude (Danny's Theme).

COASTERS TWO PLUS TWO (Chelan CH-2000)

Searchin' '75 (3:04) (Tiger/BMI — Jerry Leiber — Mike Stoller)

Taken from their upcoming LP on Chelan, "Reunion," this Leiber-Stoller classic gets a fresh updating as produced by the trio of Bumps Blackwell, Dan Howard and Greg Niemann. Should be a hot influence in reviving a fine group. Get on it immediately. Flip: Young Blood.

CHARLIE KULIS (Playboy 6044-A)

Save A Rose For Me (2:45) (Midsong Intl. Ltd./ASCAP — Groscolas — Robbins)

Produced by John Miller and Neil Portnow, Charlie delivers a fine vocal delivery of a beauty top 40 ballad that could bring a top ten position to the rabbit hutch! Must go strong MOR, top 40. Flip: No info. available.

PHYLLIS HYMAN (Private Stock PS 45034)

Leavin' The Good Life Behind (5:05) (Desert Moon/Wesaline/BMI — A. Darling)

Produced by George Kerr, arranged by Bert Keyes, and mixed by Tom Moulton, this hot uptempo soul ballad can't help but hit behind fine orchestration, background vocals and rhythm tracks that set it all off with class. A fine production. Flip: No info. available.

MAGIC DISCO MACHINE (Motown M 1362F A)

Control Tower (3:18) (Jobete/ASCAP — D. Daniels — T. McFaddin)

A monster disco smash comes to us courtesy of a tremendous production effort by Frank Wilson. Eerie, tight, and hot between the grooves, watch for this to be a special success for the Motown folks. Flip: No info. available.

ANTHONY WHITE (Phila. Intl.-CBS ZS 3574)

Never Repay Your Love (3:49) (Mighty Three/BMI — B. Hawes)

Produced by Bruce Hawes and arranged by Jack Faith, this soul ballad is beautifully produced. Anthony's voice is sensitive, inspired, and should be responsible for sending this disk zooming up the r&b charts. Good feeling to this, go with it. Flip: No info. available.

SABOTAGE — Black Sabbath — Warner Bros. BS 2822 — Producers: Black Sabbath and Mike Butcher — List: 6.98

The musical history of Black Sabbath is one that goes beyond heavy metal carnage. The earliest rumblings of downer rock have given way to a new maturity that embellishes the basic blast furnace riffs with new concept and identity. "Sabotage" is a creative combination of the two as cranium shaking riffs and lyrics combine with subtle acoustic and keyboard shadings for an intellectual go at causing ground swells. "Sabotage" is proof positive that dinosaurs still rule the earth.



HONEY — Ohio Players — Mercury SRM-1-1038 — Producers: Ohio Players — List: 6.98

The Players are back 'in the bedroom of the world' with this provocative collection. The group has distinguished itself with hit singles from each of its last three LPs and odds are that "Fopp" will be first out of the gate off this disk. Initial radio response to the album has been strong, though predictable. Mellow ballads combine with the raw funk that is the group's trademark for a dynamic listening experience. The artwork on this LP would have been banned in Boston in the old days, but, like the music on the record, it's designed to get the juices flowing. This album is in heat.



PROCOL'S NINTH — Procol Harum — Chrysalis CHR 1080 — Producers: Jerry Leiber and Mike Stoller — List: 6.98

The music of Procol Harum has always been likened to a majestic pedestal; accessible but seemingly, at times, just out of reach of mortal man. With "Procol's Ninth" the band has dropped the highbrow facade and has musically joined the common man. The pop rock and soulful influences are more discernible and the economics of each composition allows for further exploration of these venues. Top cuts include "Fool's Gold," "I Keep Forgetting" and "The Final Thrust." "Procol's Ninth" finds Procol Harum becoming one of the boys.



EARTHBOUND — The Fifth Dimension — ABC ABCD 897 — Producer: Jimmy Webb — List: 6.98

The soulful sound of the Fifth Dimension is a malleable precision instrument. You can pair it with any kind of musical accompaniment and the result will always be satisfying to the human ear. On "Earthbound" the backing is rooted deep in the soil of funk and high in the layers of the clouds. This liaison of sound and music gives the group a chance to vocally stretch out and this they do with style. Top cuts include "Speaking With My Heart" and "Walk Your Feet In The Sunshine." "Earthbound" has a feeling that is strictly life.



CHAIN REACTION — The Crusaders — Blue Thumb BTSD 6022 — Producers: Crusaders and Stewart Levine — List: 6.98

The middle ground of soul borrows from many a musical influence; with particular emphasis on the closely aligned shades of jazz. Of this bent The Crusaders are most potent and on "Chain Reaction" the best of these musical worlds is brought to the fore. Riffs and runs are cross-matched with precision movement as the strains weave an enticing web of sound. Top cuts include "I Felt The Love," "Give It Up," and "Sugar Cane." The Crusader's "Chain Reaction" is anything but a weak musical link.



LAND OF MONEY — Hydra — Capricorn CP 0157 — Producer: Johnny Sandlin — List: 6.98

Ten seconds into "Little Miss Rock 'n Roll" it's going to dawn on you that Hydra isn't your normal Capricorn stablemate. The band that rocks with a savage fire that goes well into the area of aggressive while dancing the precipice of hostile. The likes of "The Pistol" and "Land Of Money" are muscle rock in the finest sense of the word. Hydra is deep south rock and roll that's cruising for a bruising. Be warned though; Hydra is the kind of band that doesn't stop for pedestrians.

DOG DAYS — Atlanta Rhythm Section — Polydor PD 6041 — List: 6.98

For a long time America has been praying for a counterpart to the endless march of English boogie machines. Well, with "Dog Days" the Atlanta Rhythm Section has taken of the mantle of the great white hope. Some of the strongest boogie-blues ever spewed forth from the bowels of the distressed soul is on this disk. Be it rock, the occasional ballad or the all out blues for breakfast variety of stompers; the Section is more than capable of doing it all. "Dog Days" is unleashed on an unsuspecting world.



RITCHIE BLACKMORE'S RAINBOW — Ritchie Blackmore — Polydor PD 6049 — Producers: Blackmore, Birch and Dio — List: 6.98

The presupposition that Ritchie Blackmore's Rainbow would be a vehicle for the guitarist's solo stardom has, with the release of this disk, been proven false. Blackmore's alignment with the nucleus of Elf has produced one of the most cohesive group efforts to come out in quite a while. All members are given a blow within the context of rock and spacey blues while Blackmore's solo outings are a monument to taste and restraint. Group is the magic word here for, as a group, Ritchie Blackmore's Rainbow will most certainly thrive.

7-6-5-4-3-2-1 BLOW YOUR WHISTLE — Gary Tom's Empire — Pip PIP-6814 — Producers: Rick Bleiweiss and Bill Stahl — List: 6.98

With the glut of disco music making the rounds it's nice to know that there's more to the music than merely doing the bump and, in the case of Gary Tom's Empire, there is definitely more. This disk takes just enough bump and adds to it a mixture of pop and soul that makes it a two way street for listen or body mover. Top cuts include "7-6-5-4-3-2-1 Blow Your Whistle," "Feel The Funky Groove" and "You Are The One For Me." The Gary Tom's Empire is a blow against the musical lethargy that lurks within.



FIRE ON THE BAYOU — The Meters — Warner Bros. MS 2228 — Producers: Allen Toussaint and The Meters — List: 6.98

Funk is tight. It's a rhythmic bass and lead riffs stretched to a wire thinness over bombastic percussive balance. "Fire On The Bayou" by The Meters is a continuation of this construction as the out of the cave primitiveness of the music lays ever so gently on vocals spawned from the street and the bush. Top cuts include "You're A Friend Of Mine," "Out In The Country" and "Can You Do Without." The Meters wax progressive while being true to their roots with "Fire On The Bayou" the best argument in the world for selling music by the pound.

MEMORANDA — Marcia Waldorf — Capricorn CP 0159 — Producer: Paul Hornsby — List: 6.98

It's a strong voice that carries Marcia Waldorf on this album in a most literal sense. Marcia's vocals straddle the McGovern style of singing in fine style with the result being a polished cross between pop and the Las Vegas mold. Instrumentals remain subdued and thus provide the proper support for Ms. Waldorf's treatment of pop and ballad material. Top cuts include "The Rhythm Of The South," "Everything I Have Is Yours" and "Why Can't We Both Try At The Same Time." Savor this album like a fine old wine.



HUB — Hub — Capitol ST 11439 — Producer: Hub — List: 6.98

Lost in the earliest Rare Earth incarnation's tendencies to kick out the jams was the fact that Peter Hoorelbeke can succeed beyond that of a white blues belter. With Hub that potential for diversification is reached as his vocals power the group through many and varied outings. Be it the stirring straight ahead approach to "Anyone Who Had A Heart" or a dip into the funky stuff on "Ooh Honey Honey" the band proves, in a word, infectious. Hub spelled backwards is Buh. Hub spelled forwards is what good music should be.

KING HARVEST — King Harvest — A&M SP 4540 — Producer: Jeff Barry — List: 6.98

King Harvest is a little bit of everything. There's a little bit of rock, a dash of pop, a slapdash of country and the list goes on and on. On this album the band proves more than capable of keeping a handle on their influences as this bumper crop of styles combines for a highly listenable sound. Top cuts include "Little Bit Like Magic," "Country Pie" and "Rue Du Four Rag." Solid, professional bands are a sure bet to grow old gracefully and, based on this effort, King Harvest will do just that. Music and a half.



ROY CLARK'S GREATEST HITS — Roy Clark — Dot DSD 2030 — Producer: Jim Foglesong — List: 6.98

The genius of any musician can only be measured through the strength of his music and, in the case of Roy Clark, said genius is justified. On this greatest hits package the two-fold talent as a picker and singer make their impact on up-tempo and ballad material alike. Top cuts on this blast from the past include "Yesterday When I Was Young," "Thank God And Greyhound" "Roy's Guitar Boogie" and "Somewhere Between Love And Tomorrow." When you've been around long enough to have this many hits you've got to be good and Roy Clark certainly is.

COLUMBUS MANN — Columbus Mann — ABC PLP-59221 — Producer: Lee Young — List: 6.98

The music of Columbus Mann carries with it a kind of quiet musical pride and strength. There are thoughts and feelings within his soulful stance and on his debut lp they are put up for all to see. Mann's vocals are the perfect vehicle of projection and with his timbre the musical point is driven home in no uncertain terms. Top cuts include "It's Wonderful To Be Free," "What Are We Going To Do" and "Don't Worry Now." Columbus Mann puts it together with feeling.



A NEW DAY — Loving Sisters And Love Act — Peacock PLP-59220 — Producer: Gladys McFadden — List: 6.98

Gospel and soul aren't necessarily strange bedfellows but it is a rare case when the two go together well. On "A New Day" Loving Sisters And Love Act do a strong job of mixing the two with the result being a high degree of emotional pitch and feel. Top cuts in this cross musical pollination include "I Have Found The Way," "Help Is On The Way" and "We Are One." If you're into music that's sparked revival meetings for centuries on then Loving Sisters And Love Act is where it's at for you.

comedy picks

IS IT SOMETHING I SAID? — Richard Pryor — Warner Bros. MS 2227 — Producer: David Banks — List: 6.98

To say that Richard Pryor's brand of humor is blue is to grossly understate. It's comedy that succeeds not so much as parody as it does as a mirror of a lifestyle and a particular state of mind. Pryor's stacatto approach captures the essence of his material on this live disk as just the right amount of relevance seeps through. Top slices of life humor include "When Your Woman Leaves You," "New Niggers" and "The Goodnight Kiss." The truth may set you free but only the strong will be able to handle this truth.



LOOKING GOOD — Freddie Prinze — Columbia PC 33562 — Producer: Ron DeBlasio — List: 6.98

Comedy, with an emphasis on the ethnic, has rapidly become a overcrowded avocation and so it is a real treat to find somebody like Freddie Prinze who can handle the genre so well. On "Looking Good" Freddie hits on a number of areas, ethnic and otherwise, with ragged barbs of laughter inducing. Top yocks include "They Never Tell It Like It Is," "We're All The Same" and "Hunga Rican." Talk about tickling your funny bone; Freddie Prinze gives your laughing tibia the once over in spades.

deal of foreign copyrighted material as well. "It is difficult to judge what material will sell in the European market," Love said. "There must be a constant communications flow from a publisher to foreign markets. A foreign cover of an American song can often yield tremendous rewards. We are grateful for the relationships we've established with foreign companies, through MIDEM and other meetings. Out of those relationships have come first options on material like "Vado Via" which was a huge hit in Europe. One of our staff writers re-wrote the lyric as "Lovely Lady," and Bobby Vinton recorded it with Bob Morgan producing. Such options are an important part of what we do." ATV also has a "permissions" department responsible for granting the use of lyrics within their catalogs to writers who wish to quote a lyric in a book, report, or other publication.

ATV Music is actively involved with some innovative experiments in the publishing field, among them the exploitation of the educational market. In this field, president Trust stated, the print medium in publishing becomes an important revenue-gaining force: "Our 'recital encore' series takes the idea of pop music's great popularity and extends it to arrangements for small ensembles like junior high and high school bands and orchestras. An arrangement of 'Lady Madonna' for example, will yield high sales for such performing groups, and will continue to sell sheet arrangements because of the succeeding generations of musicians that enter the performing age group."

Trust continued, "Because of mechanical rights, the success of a recording is of crucial importance to any publisher. ATV, however, has developed its own staff of promotional people, and actively pursues covers for its copyrights."

"If we believe in a particular song," stated Love, "and it doesn't hit the first time around, we'll stick with it until it does. Since we are actively pursuing songs for foreign covers, and in some cases for purchase of publishing it becomes vital to us that we receive as much help as possible from labels in terms of receiving product. In my opinion, the strength of the a&r-publisher relationship can only be maintained through a constant exchange of material."

Recent acquisitions by ATV include the Return catalog of Billy Joe Shaver. His material has been recorded by Johnny Cash, The Allman Brothers and Johnny Rodriguez. ATV administers the catalog of John Lennon, who has offices in ATV's New York headquarters. ATV additionally has acquired the Bobby Bare catalog, and has Vicki Lawrence's next single on Private Stock Records, "The Other Woman." "Acquisitions are another important part of publishing. Very often one cannot see any financial income from a publishing deal until 12-24 months after it's been signed. Acquisitions of existing catalogs ensure a quicker return, enabling a publisher to concentrate on a long range projects," said Love.

Love emphasized that listening is one of his most important activities, as well as keeping abreast of happenings within the industry through the trade publications. "If a particular cut of music on an LP appeals to us, we'll go after it. Quality records make publishing at all levels work. Additionally, sheet music in music stores create additional demand for recorded product, and we'd like to impress upon the recording community the importance of developing our relationship to the fullest extent possible."

On the initial day of each of the **NAB/RAB Regional Radio Conventions**, the NAB will sponsor programming seminars conducted by **Bob Henabery Associates, Inc.** Henabery was director of program development for the ABC-owned AM stations between 1968-1974 and was consultant for network-owned FM stations between 1971-1973, helping to develop the ABC-FM "Rock 'n' Stereo" format.

The seminars are not "workshops"; the speakers do not profess to unveil the perfect format for all markets. The seminars are designed, according to **Burns Nugent**, the NAB's station relations vice president, to provide a forum for programmers to exchange ideas and methodology, to air problems and discuss possible solutions, and to share the success of some of those highly regarded for their innovative programming.

The seminar's morning session will deal with a specific hypothetical/actual programming situation; participants will be involved with programming a New York City radio station after all others have been forced to leave the air. The lone broadcaster would essentially be confronted with the same problems encountered by a station in a very small market. Considerations explored will include how to determine a station's market position, how to program to different or diverse audiences, why listeners tune in and out, managing a commercial format, and how to assist the development of on-the-air talent, among others of particular interest to small and medium market stations.

Afternoon sessions will feature nationally-known management/program director teams which have been successful in their respective markets. In Atlanta on Oct. 13, **Warren Potash**, manager at Ft. Worth's **WBAP**, and **Bob Harper**, program director at Buffalo's **WKBW**, will discuss "The Creative Team." In Boston on Oct. 16, "The News Team" will feature **WINS** news director **Bill Scott**, **WBBM** news director **John Hultman**, and **WERE** program director **John Webster**. In New Orleans on Nov. 10, **KSD-St. Louis**' manager **Ed Newsome** and program director **Scott Burton** will discuss "The Management Team." Three days later in Chicago, "The News Team" is discussed by **WRC** news director **Frank Barnako**, **WCBS** news director **Lou Adler**, and **WJW** program director **Ed Ripley**.

In Denver on Nov. 17, **WLS** manager **Marty Greenberg** and program director **John Gehron** will peruse "The Management Team," and in San Francisco Nov. 20 "The Creative Team" will be discussed by **RKO's** national program director **Paul Drew** and national promotion director **Harvey Mednick**.

RCA Uses Kinks 'Soap Opera' Film As Radio Promotion

NEW YORK — Currently being shown around the U.S. is a one hour black and white film version of the Kinks concert-musical "Soap Opera," made available to radio stations by the Kinks' label, RCA Records.

The film was produced by RCA product manager Steve Kahn when the British group played at the Beacon Theater, New York on May 7 this year.

Explained Kahn: "We had some problems with bookings for the Kinks that made it difficult for them to put together a real tour. So we had to get them exposed in other ways because the 'Soap Opera' album was being released.

"The idea of the film was a last minute one and I explained it to Ray Davies (leader of the Kinks) who went along with it.

"It was videotaped using four cameras and a switchboard and we blew it up to 16 mm for cinema showing. It's no Otto Preminger production but it did capture what went on onstage. We had a little trouble at times with the sound because the crowd outside — it was a sellout

performance — pulled out the cables a few times but that was cleaned up.

"The next step was to offer it to radio stations to use for promotion — **KSHE-FM** in St. Louis was the first one to go with it and so far about 15 stations around the country have made use of it. We get our bonus in the airplay of the album, of course.

"Generally the reaction has been good although there has occasionally been a bad reaction. But as I say this is no major production, just what went on onstage. All the performances of the film are free.

"On some occasions we have thrown in Harry Nilsson's film, 'The Point' to make a package deal of it.

"I'm sure there are more uses for film in this way — it helps the group and it helps the record."

And the cost?

Said Kahn: "You wouldn't believe it. Pennies. Videotaping with the four cameras cost around \$200 and then there was the cost of transferring it to 16 mm and making five or six copies that we ferry around the country."

N.Y.C.'s WRVR Jazz To R&B Format Switch Being Fought

NEW YORK — The decision to sell New York's only jazz radio station, **WRVR**, to the Sonderling Broadcasting Corp. is being met with opposition from the city's jazz fraternity.

WRVR was sold recently, subject to FCC sanction, and the Sonderling Corp. announced that the format would be "some jazz combined with black pop music." The earliest date for a **WRVR** format change would be Jan. 1, 1976, according to sources.

Meanwhile Don Friedman, New York jazz promoter who co-promotes concerts with the station, is mobilizing opposition to the changeover. He told **Cash Box**: "We have no specific tactics — we just want to influence people against this change. We don't care if the station reverts to the old management or if the new management can be influenced. We want one all-jazz radio station at least in

the city."

Friedman's organization has been collecting signatures for a petition to be presented to the FCC and will be contacting other jazz promoters, heads of record companies involved in jazz and jazz musicians to fight the Sonderling move.

At a Friedman-WRV Latin music function on Monday last week Friedman collected 700 signatures in support of his actions. "We may have to — we will certainly have to — organize some benefit or fund raising function to support our cause," he said.

Friedman stated that he was employing attorney Chris Glenn to act for them. Glenn was the attorney concerned in the case of New York's classical station, **WNCN** which was sold and changed format. A successful plea to the FCC reversed the original decision in this case.

In continuing with Jerry Boulding and the "Black Cue Format," another area Jerry touched upon was eliminating the negatives in radio. Jerry said, "For example, it's not good to say it's 'partly sunny' or 'partly cloudy.' In other words, in high energy radio, the cup is never half full or half empty. What the jocks have to do is present a positive image and broadcast positive vibes." Jerry added this also pertains to commercials. "Sometimes djs do not understand radio has to serve the client (advertiser) as well as the listener. DJs sometimes treat commercials as nuisances, and throw away tag lines or mumble words together. Jocks sometimes don't realize how hard sales people fight to get these ads and how important they are. People in the radio business must understand that commercials are as equally important as the music."

Another problem Jerry found through his studies was in the area of music rotation. He found that the records which should be played really depend on your market. More times than not he found stations playing too many records, usually marginal records which were unfamiliar. "This type of situation turns away listeners," Jerry said. "The way to help research records is through reading the trade papers," He noted. "Even though the trades aren't the bible, at least the programmer can get a clear picture of what records are doing in other markets. The trades also show what kinds of records are crossing over and tell the programmer ways of evaluating records. They can make sure that when they get a record, it won't turn out to be a stiff," he said.

Jerry also delved into ways black radio can market records. "One thing black radio has done to improve itself, and be viable competition with top 40 radio, is to know its marketplace better." He said there's a different audience between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m. than between 3 and 6. "Housewives who listen to the radio during the day run on a different metabolism than kids after school. Your nocturnal audience is also different. Weekends are different, in that audiences usually can listen in for longer periods of time. Also, stations have to be geared for the use of radio outdoors. On the weekends, people are usually in cars or at the beach; so there are technical aspects you have to know so you can still sound loud and clear, even though you're competing in noisy environments."

In comparing the jocks of today with those of yesteryear, Jerry said there is no comparison. "The jocks today are much better and brighter. In order to stay around, they have to be real thinkers and communicators, and have a good command of the English language. The jock today cannot split an infinitive or drop verbs. The kids today won't accept mistakes or excuses. The kids feel that he should be good, or he shouldn't be on the air. The days of rhymer and jivers are gone. Today, the jock has to know how to communicate about the music and the artist. He has to know his target audience, and zero in on them with a small-bore rifle. He can't talk down to them, but he must talk to them so they believe what he is saying."

Jerry also noted that even the news has to be programmed in this manner. "The people who listen to music also want to be informed about, let's say, what's happening to Sly Stone, for example. The hot stuff will be in the papers and on tv. I'm not saying that radio should exclude the heavy news, but if there is anything happening, the listeners should know about it."

"For years," Jerry added, "black people were sometimes embarrassed by their own stations, but now the situation is reversing. Black stations are now becoming good predictable sources of quality entertainment."

Regarding automated radio, Jerry does see a trend in that direction. "It's going to happen. It solves problems because it cuts costs. You can make money and still have complete control. I think that now it is in an interim period; you can't use it during the day because of the number of events that usually happen. Also, there is a spontaneity that is missing. But once these kinks are worked out, I see it working out quite well. I believe it will be used more in FM than in AM."

Jerry also noted that "Crossover product still is a sticky question because there are different schools of thought on what black radio should do and not do. However, integration has caused many black kids to look into other kinds of music. Black kids are now going to rock shows, which also changes their record-buying habits. In terms of radio, the trick is learning to program this music, so that it blends in with the other kinds of music. If a black station can get into this, it can hold not only its black listeners but probably will pick up a great many white listeners."

"There has been much talk the last few years about the 360 degrees of music, but I really don't see 360 degrees as a good format. When you get into that approach, I feel you fragment your audience too much. Nobody is happy. The audience listening to Gil Scott-Heron doesn't really want him followed by a Jackson Five record, or vice-versa. The 360-degree format could work, but only if you were the one black station in your market. If you are in a multi-station town, though, you really have to target in on your audience to get the maximum."

"Radio has really changed since I started in the business, but one thing I found through my studies is that black radio is improving every week. The people going into the field today are brighter, more knowledgeable and doing more research in black music. And, finally, the reason for the rise in black radio's popularity today is that it's just plain good radio."

The Atoka Chamber of Commerce has endorsed the festival; Emmy-award-winning producer Ray Clevenger has been engaged as the festival's technical director in charge of sound, staging, lighting, and on-site specifications.

The festival will include a Sunday morning gospel sing, and a 100-ft. long hickory-smoked barbecue pit will be set up for concert-goers. Camping facilities will also be provided at the site, according to the sponsors.



"Don't Take It All Away" is currently breaking in the U.K. charts and an album is expected in Nov.
