\$7.98: The Dead Issue

One of the hottest issues in the record business has now become a dead issue. It's all over but the when and the where. \$7.98 list albums, at least initially on established artists but perhaps in the future across the board, are here to stay.

All that remains now is which companies are moving to \$7.98 and on which albums, and what accounts will be charging for \$7.98's (see separate stories on page 7). But at this point, complaints from retailers on why \$7.98 isn't viable are moot.

WEA took the lead this time around, as W and E announced \$7.98 list. CBS soon followed. And if WEA and CBS, with their combined strength and marketing clout, decide \$7.98 is the price, \$7.98 is the price. Now RCA has joined the ranks, and it seems only a matter of time until the rest of the industry follows.

There are two other issues remaining. First is whether the industry will return to selective pricing, raising established artists to \$7.98 and keeping newer artists at \$6.98; or will the industry go \$7.98 across the board on new releases, and then raise the catalogues to the same level? Then there is the question of tape. Right now, manufacturers are holding tape prices at \$7.98 rather than going up to \$8.98 the way prices were increased a few years ago. But will tape go up too? Only time will tell.

One interesting phenomenon resulted from this tussle. A number of record retailers, particularly in the Pacific northwest, attempted to protest the higher price. Their protest, though short-lived, showed the manufacturers that retailers have more spunk than they might have thought, and even though their attempts at stopping the \$7.98 list price did not succeed, they stood up for what they believed in. And for that, we commend them.

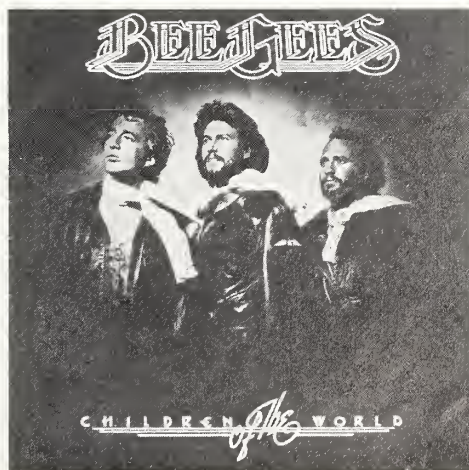

BASF Corp. Leaves Music Business; Polydor Acquires Popular Division

NEW YORK — BASF Corporation of Germany officially terminated its involvement in the music/records business as of December 31, 1976, having sold off portions of its records/tapes division to various purchasers, though all acquisitions have yet to be finalized.

According to sources at BASF in New York, Polydor International has purchased BASF's entire popular division, comprising some 1,000 titles, in addition to signing many of the company's major artists, including Cindy & Bart, Peter Rubin and Bata Illic.

Classical Line

Future distribution of BASF's classical division, Harmonia Mundi, and the jazz label MPS was yet to be resolved at press

time, despite supposition that MPS will possibly be acquired by Ariola Records of Germany, which is tied in with Ariola domestically. The future of BASF Records' operations outside Germany, including BASF's American distribution agreement with Audiofidelity Enterprises, was also in doubt at press time.

Contacted in New York, William Gallagher, president of Audiofidelity Records, stated that he had received "no official word" on the details of BASF's exit from the music business. Before he was named Audiofidelity's president in May 1976, the services of Gallagher's consulting company had been employed by Audiofidelity in securing the U.S. and Canadian distribution of BASF Records and Tapes.

Average Price Of \$7.98 LPs To Be \$5.92 At Most Stores

LOS ANGELES — Record retailers across the country will be selling \$7.98 single disc albums for an average regular price of \$5.92 with some current releases and major artists' albums having an average sale price of \$5.03, according to a **Cash Box** survey of 40 distributors, one-stops and retail outlets.

Many of those questioned said they feel it is still too early to determine what prices they will settle on. Many quoted the price they are asking for the new Queen LP or what they charge for \$7.98 list soundtrack albums or two-record sets.

But most said they may revise their figures once more albums carrying the \$7.98 tag are released, and after they have had a chance to gauge public response to

higher prices.

Results of the survey show sale prices starting at a low of \$4.34 and going to a high sale price of \$6.98. Some cities having record "price wars" have stores selling the Queen album for \$3.99.

Non-sale prices in a few stores go as low as \$4.88, but more often fall in the \$5.99 to \$6.99 range.

West Lowest on Sale Prices

Lowest sale prices in the country occur on the west coast, particularly the Southern California region, where the average sale price is \$4.93. Sale prices in the west range from \$4.59 to \$5.98.

The average sale price on the east coast is \$5.01, with a spread of \$4.34 to \$5.99. The median price of LPs on sale is \$4.99.

Right behind the east coast come the northern states, selling \$7.98 records for an average sale price of \$5.02, with a median price of \$4.99. Bottom price is \$4.53 running to a high of \$5.99.

Average sale price in the south is \$5.17, a median of \$4.99 and a range of \$4.54 to \$6.24.

Regular Prices Lowest in North

Non-sale prices averaged lowest in the north, at \$5.72. Price spread in the northern states is \$1.11, from a low of \$4.88 to \$5.99 at the top. The northern median is \$5.89.

The regular price on \$7.98 LPs for the east coast is \$5.78, starting at a low of \$4.99 going up to \$6.99 as the high. The eastern median price is \$6.53.

Not far behind the east coast price is the west coast average non-sale figure of \$5.87, a median of \$5.93 and range of \$4.88 to \$6.98.

The southern states came in with the highest average regular price at \$6.33. However, it is the only area having the median price (\$6.22) lower than the average price for non-sale prices. Low price in the south is \$5.33 and a high of \$6.99.

For the entire country, the most commonly named sale price, or mode price, was \$4.99, occurring 31.5% of the time. The mode of the regular selling prices was not as clearly defined as that of the sale prices.

Most frequently chosen as the non-sale price was \$6.99, having been named by 16.7% of those surveyed. The prices of \$5.96 and \$5.99 each occurred 10% of the

Print Ads Drop Off After Holiday Season; Dallas Retailer Battles Strong Competitors

NEW YORK — With the holiday selling season concluded, the number of retail print ads for records and tapes declined dramatically this week. Ads for cutouts and budget releases occurred frequently, but not as often as they did last week, when they dominated retail record advertising across the country (**Cash Box**, January 8.)

This week, ads for these low-priced releases appeared in nine of the 23 major markets surveyed; at Super X Drugs and Franklin Music in Atlanta; at Woolworth's and Super X Drugs in Cincinnati; at Woolworth's in Cleveland and Detroit; at Target, K-mart and Woolworth's in Houston; at Turn Style, Woolworth's and Super X Drugs in Indianapolis; at King Karol in New York; at Woolworth's in Pittsburgh; and at Discount Records and Book Shop in Washington, D.C.

Other retail price developments included the following:

- 45s advertised at unusually low prices
- Washington, D.C. retailer runs all-label "rock" sale
- \$2.99 price for current release in Dallas
- Boston's Lechmere chain takes price

initiative.

Ads promoting sales on singles are not too common, and ads for 45s at general merchandise chains are rare indeed. Nevertheless, singles were advertised by three mass merchandisers this week: in New Orleans, Woolco promoted them at three for \$2; they were 77¢ each at Robert Hall Village; and in Indianapolis, Turn Style advertised them at two for \$1. In each case, this was the lowest price at which 45s had ever been sold at the chain involved.

Woolco in New Orleans normally sells singles for 94¢. According to Millard Sowers, division manager of Woolco's Gretna store, "This sale is not unusual. We do it a couple of times a year. We take a loss on it, but it helps get people into the store." Sowers added that singles comprise between seven and eight percent of the unit's total record stock.

Only "top 40" singles were on sale at Robert Hall in New Orleans; these usually retail for 89¢. Neither "oldies" 45s, normally priced at \$1.29, nor children's singles were included in the sale. Mary Bernadette Klotz, camera and audio department manager at one of the chain's area stores, stated that the singles promotion had been run in conjunction with the opening of a new Robert Hall outlet. She believed that about 20 percent of her store's record inventory consists of 45s.

At Turn Style in Indianapolis, singles are promoted on the average of once every six months. Only "oldies," which normally sell for \$1.09, were included in this particular sale. Although Turn Style is usually racked by ABC Record and Tape Sales, the singles for this promotion were purchased from J.L. Marsh.

Marsh also racks Robert Hall in New Orleans. However, a spokesman for the rack jobbing concern stated that there was no connection between the simultaneous sales at Robert Hall and Turn Style.

Classical Shop Promotes "Rock"

In the Sunday *Washington Post*, Discount Records and Book Shop advertised an all-label "rock" sale for \$3.83, an unusually low price for the market. In addition, unspecified rock albums were offered at seven for \$10. Steve Whelton, record manager at one of Discount Records' two area stores, explained all the LPs in the latter group were cutouts. "I wish the ad had specified 'selected' rock albums," he said, "because two or three customers were confused. They thought all rock albums were seven for \$10. But they'd be a hell of a lot angrier if we didn't have something else to give them, like a \$3.83 (on other rock

albums). That's a lot cheaper than any place else around town."

Regarding the \$3.83 sale price, Whelton stated, "That's low for us. We've had \$3.79 sales on a lot of special items and new releases, though." He added that the sale had been run for two reasons: "One, of course, to get people in the store; and second, I suspect, because we have a lot of stock left over from Christmas."

What was meant in the ad by "rock" albums? "That's a very good question," Whelton responded. "We made a few definite and arbitrary decisions, but generally the rule is that the customer is always right. Wagner's 'Die Meistersinger' is definitely not rock 'n' roll! But if there's a flicker of justification for calling it rock, we do." **Lechmere Takes Initiative**

In recent months, several retailers in the Boston area, including Strawberries, the Coop and Lechmere, have advertised current releases for below \$3.50. This week, however, Lechmere was the only retailer to do so in either the *Boston Phoenix* or the *Boston Sunday Globe*. The four-unit chain advertised 22 CBS releases, including Boston's and Burton Cummings' debut albums and the latest LPs by

LOS ANGELES — CBS and RCA have announced \$7.98 suggested list prices for selected albums following similar statements from Elektra/Asylum and Warner Bros. "Animal" by Pink Floyd on CBS and "Low" by David Bowie on RCA are the first single album, non-soundtrack releases by the respective companies carrying the new tag. They follow "A Day At The Races" by Queen on Elektra and "In Flight" by George Benson on Warner Bros. into the higher list price category.

RCA, in addition to announcing in a press release that Bowie's new LP will carry a higher suggested list, stated that the recommended list price of \$7.98 would apply to its Red Seal line, which is the company's top classical offering series. Red Seal joins the RCA-distributed Pablo jazz label at the higher suggested list.

An informed source at RCA added that "Bowie fans are going to probably buy the album regardless of what price is asked. If the price were three dollars they'd buy it,

Mercury Firms Company Goals For '77 At National Promotion Conference

by Julian Shapiro

MEMPHIS — Phonogram, Inc./Mercury Records held a series of national promotion meetings here last week on the eve of Mercury's 30th anniversary as a record company. The two-day sessions were dubbed "Bionic Promo" by the company, and if the projections outlined by corporate officials are to be met, that tag will have to be more than a slogan.

Addressing the gathering, I.H. Steinberg, president of Phonogram, Inc. (which includes Polydor and RSO Records) outlined short and long term goals for Mercury. Of immediate concern in 1977 will be to elevate three acts to the position where each sells in excess of 500,000 units each per release. "Plans we had for 1976 (for Mercury) did not materialize," he stated.

Three Acts Each Year

"We want to break three acts each year," explained Jules Abramson, senior vice president of marketing for Mercury. In 1976, we didn't break three acts into gold status, but we started to establish a number of acts, and that's a good beginning." He cited Thin Lizzy, Rush and Graham Parker

as artists most likely to help Mercury meet its goal for the year.

Projecting further into the future, Steinberg touched briefly on a 10-year growth plan for Phonogram, Inc. that would give the record group 15% of the total market by 1986. Currently it enjoys a 7% share, according to Steinberg. As far as the 10-year plan is concerned, that's definitely within the realm of possibility," commented Abramson. "We (Phonogram/Mercury) want to do 50% of that." Polydor would be expected to account for the remaining 50% with RSO.

Charged Up Staff

As for the pervading atmosphere of the meetings, the consensus of company executives was that they served to set a positive feeling for Mercury as it begins 1977. "It (the meetings) accomplished precisely what we wanted to accomplish," noted Abramson, "and that was to get our promotion staff charged up right at the beginning of the year." David Carrico, vice president of national promotion, echoed that sentiment focusing particularly on the

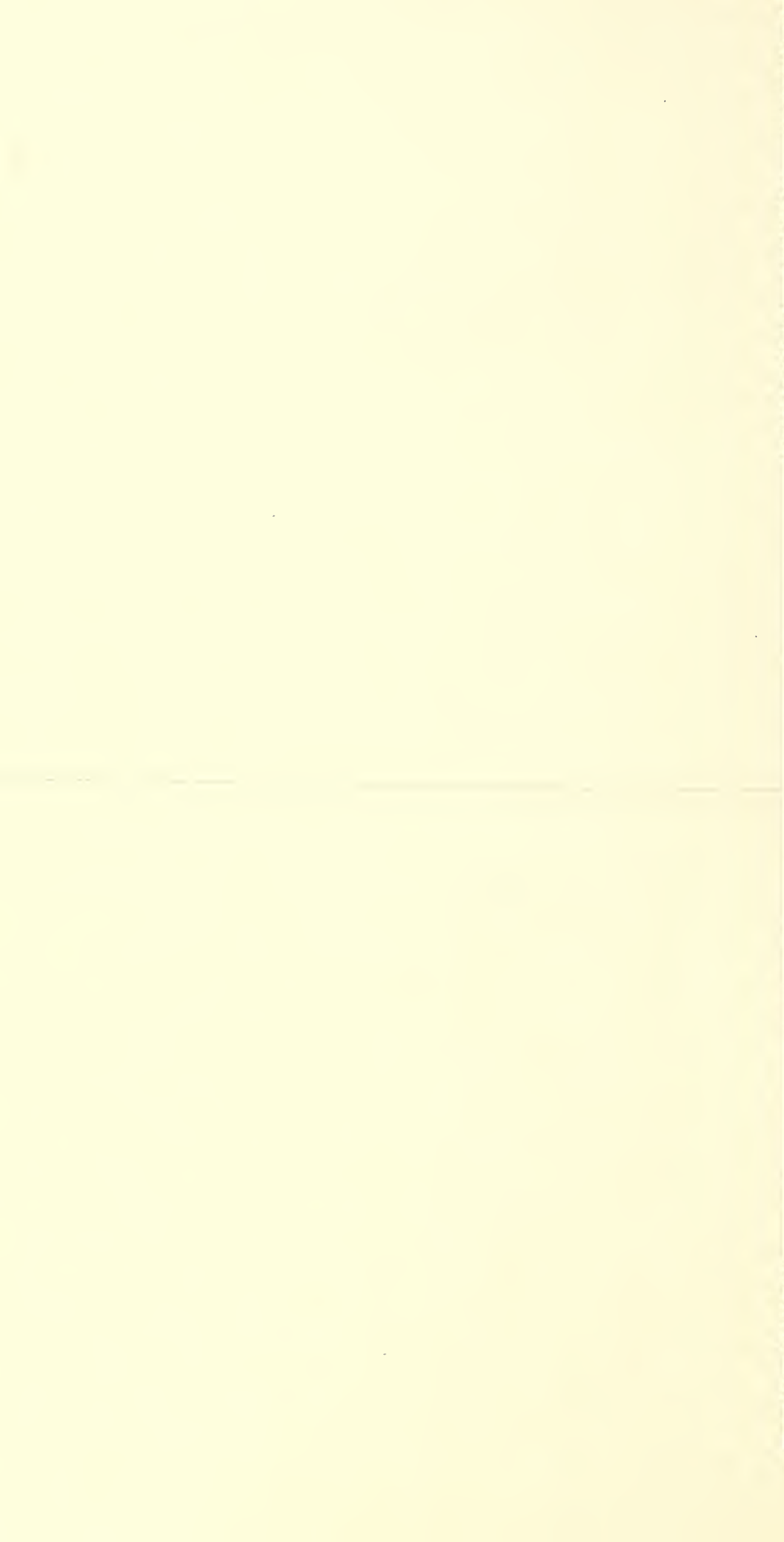
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Al Bell Forms New Soul/Gospel Label In D.C.

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Springboard Sets Warwick Albums; Suit Threatened

NEW YORK — Springboard Records, which distributes Dionne Warwick records manufactured from masters acquired through Scepter Records in 1974, will continue to manufacture and distribute Dionne Warwick product despite a recent arbitration which determined that Scepter had not lived up to its agreements with Burt Bacharach and Hal David's Blue Jac Productions, owner and producer of all Dionne Warwick masters.

In a prepared statement, Springboard vice president of business affairs George Port stated, "Our purchase of the Scepter catalog is firm and binding. We are of the opinion that the recent arbitration award in favor of Blue Jac Productions, which pertains to only a small portion of the Warwick material and which comes some two-and-a-half years after our agreement with Scepter, is, in any event, not binding upon us and does not affect our rights." Blue Jac was awarded \$430,000 dollars (see **Cash Box**, December 18, 1976) through arbitration, after it was determined that Scepter had failed to meet payments required by the September 1, 1966 licensing agreement allowing them to manufacture Warwick records from Blue Jac masters.

Contacted in New York, Lee Eastman of Eastman & Eastman, the firm that represented Blue Jac in the arbitration, commented on the Springboard statement, "If they continue to distribute Dionne Warwick records, I will bring suit against them immediately, and anybody dealing with them does so at their peril. All rights belong to Blue Jac."

Executives of Springboard Records refused further comment on the issue.

Springboard recently released "Only Love Can Break A Heart," a Dionne Warwick album on Musicor Records, and has previously released ten Warwick albums on various labels.

First Regulations Due 'Very Soon,' Says Copyright Office

WASHINGTON, D.C. — When the House passed the copyright bill last year, general counsel for the Copyright Office remarked, "Now the hard part: implementing it."

The Copyright Office has already begun the long task of implementing, and interpreting to a certain extent, the new law. It is due to issue the first in a series of regulations "very soon," said a spokesman.

Opening Proposed

November 15 the office proposed opening its public records to allow public broadcasters and copyright owners negotiating compulsory licenses under the new law to file their agreements. This proposed regulation meant that the broadcasters and owners could get together voluntarily before the Copyright Royalty Tribunal organized itself to set compulsory rates.

At the same time, the office proposed accepting termination notices before the January 1, 1978 date specified in the new law. The year difference — that is, if someone filed termination notice December 31, 1976 — is important to copyright owners.

Comments on the proposals were due December 13. As of today, the Copyright Office received some 13 comments. Whether or not 13 comments is a big response isn't known, since the office "didn't know what to expect," according to a spokesman.

Ten of the thirteen comments dealt in whole or in part with the termination

Slow Leisure Industry Growth Rate In 1976, Forbes Magazine Study Reveals

LOS ANGELES — Although still growing in 1976, America's leisure industry is still faced with the familiar consumer complaint: not enough time, not enough money, according to the Forbes magazine 29th annual report on American industry.

While record industry statistics are not separated from other divisions of the leisure industry in the report, the Forbes analysis of the overall leisure dollar picture provides an illuminating account of past trends. Known as the "Forbes yardstick," the annual report is a compilation of statistics measuring stock market performance, debt/equity ratios, net profit margins, growth in sales and earnings, and profitability on stockholders equity and total capital of the 963 biggest public companies — those with sales over \$250 million.

Ominously, two trends are immediately apparent — the lack of growth in leisure time and the shrinking of the disposable income. According to Forbes, there has been virtually no change in the length of the average work week since World War II. But more importantly for the record industry, there was also less money to spend in 1976. Forbes says that the average American worker had only \$91 a week to spend on leisure products and activities last year (after adjustments for taxes & inflation) compared to \$96.64 in 1972.

Highly Competitive

The leisure industry continues to be highly competitive. With limited time and resources and an infinite variety of choices and personal demands, today's consumer can be very discriminating and often quite fickle. What follows is an account of how the consumer's marketplace decisions affected six of the giants of the record industry.

Of the six corporations with record divisions, CBS led second place MCA by only 1/10 of 1% in the return on equity category, measured over a five-year period. Following in respective order were RCA, Warner Communications, Twentieth Century Fox and Columbia Pictures. MCA was the

leader in five-year earnings per share of common stock with a 34.2% average. Individual corporate statistics for each of the six follow.

CBS

Of the six corporations, CBS was the first in five-year average return on equity with 21.7%, and had a 24% figure for the latest 12 month period. The corporation had a 19% five-year average return on total capital, and 24.2% for the past twelve months. It had a debt/equity ratio of .2 and a net profit margin of 7.1%. Sales growth for the five-year period was 9.7%, and CBS recorded an 11.8% earnings/share ratio for the same period.

MCA

MCA's five-year average equity return was 21.6%, with a 24.8% mark for the latest 12 month period. Its five-year average return on total capital was 19%, with a 20.2% line for the last recorded year. It enjoyed a 0% debt/equity ratio, and a net profit margin of 11.5%. Five-year sales growth average was 16% with 34.2% earnings/share ratio for the same period.

RCA Records Closing & Consolidating Studios

NEW YORK — RCA Records is closing its recording studios in Nashville and Hollywood this month. The company still is considering closing its studios in New York.

"In recent years," said a company spokesman, "more and more recording artists, groups, independent producers and outside labels have demanded more artistic and technical control over their recording projects. To grant them these freedoms, it has become increasingly necessary for companies with studio facilities to have greater flexibility in operating those studios."

"We have not had the flexibility which would make continued use of our studios economically feasible. We have sought but have been unable to obtain relief in negotiations with the union representing our recording engineers (NABET). More and more artists have been recording elsewhere, with the result that our studios have had limited utilization. Their continued operation, therefore, has become a financial burden rather than a necessity. At the same time, the proliferation of independent studios which permit flexibility has made it feasible to rent these independent studios for our recording projects."

Jethro Tull In Benefit Performance For Los Angeles Music Center On Jan. 16

LOS ANGELES — Rock music is not new to the Music Center here, but the Jethro Tull concert to be held at the Center's Dorothy Chandler Pavilion on Jan. 16 will be the first time a rock group has volunteered to aid in the endowing of the three-theatre complex's future operations.

In a luncheon announcement on Jan. 4, Terry Ellis, president of Chrysalis Records for which Tull records, said the single benefit performance may earn \$30-35,000 for the Music Center, which annually operates at deficits that have to be met by private donations raised by a committee headed by Dorothy Chandler, the principal original donor of the Pavilion.

Ellis said that while the primary reason for the performance will be to help the center make up its annual deficit, the concert would also satisfy Tull group leader Ian Anderson's desire to play smaller venues. As part of a concert tour that will include both larger arenas and smaller capacity auditoriums, the upcoming Pavilion appearance represents the culmination of talks between Ellis and Mrs. Chandler that began a year ago.

Early on, Ellis said, Mrs. Chandler had expressed to him a concern that the pop record industry wasn't playing an active enough role in the Music Center. Ellis said last week his feeling at the time was that the pop record industry "was not felt a part of the Music Center's activities" by many persons. "My concern," he said, "was why there hadn't been more rock and roll at the Music Center. The main reason was that there had been a feeling that rock and roll didn't belong there." Ellis said his belief at the time was that "the rock and roll people had to be encouraged and welcomed" at the Music Center.

As a result of the discussions between Ellis and Chandler, Jethro Tull was invited to be the first rock band to perform for the benefit of the pavilion. "Ian Anderson is interested in a wide range of the performing arts," said Ellis, who added that "Jethro Tull is a good advertisement for (the music) industry."

Declining specifics, Ellis also said last week that other artists had expressed interest in future benefits for the Music Center.

Coryell Attacks Vanguard Over Old Album Release; Label Head Responds Letter To The Editor:

December 30, 1976

Dear Friends,

I would like to bring to the attention of the industry and particularly the people who buy records, my total lack of participation and, in fact, knowledge of yet another Vanguard release (Larry Coryell/Basics) that I personally rejected, that is to say canned, many years ago. It is unfortunate that due to extensive litigation, my previous ties with the same company have yet to be legally severed; consequently, I have no artistic control over what is released. Therefore, I can only say that the quality reflects the taste of Vanguard and not myself at this time in my life when I would have possibly chosen a different direction. Once again the artist is exploited by forces he cannot seem to control and his only defense, a verbal attack of sorts.

Vanguard's reply: In response to the statements in the above letter, Maynard Solomon, president of Vanguard Recording

Society, Inc., commented, "The album is composed of recordings which Coryell made for us in 1968 and 1969, and it's our feeling that they represent him at the peak of his playing abilities at that time. The album clearly identifies the dates of the recordings; in other words, there's no attempt to palm these off or present these as new recordings."

"We feel that it's a good record. We would not have released it if we did not feel it met Larry's standards of performance. In order to guarantee that, the record was produced by Danny Weiss, his (Coryell's) personal producer, who produced about six or eight of Larry's most popular albums, including all of his recordings on Vanguard over a period of six or seven years."

Solomon denied categorically that Coryell had ever asked Vanguard not to release any of the material on "Basics." — Ed.

Bennett May Purchase Calif. Distrib. Stock

LOS ANGELES — At press time, **Cash Box** learned that Al Bennett, the founder of Liberty Records, was in negotiations to purchase 100% of all the outstanding stock of the California Record Distributors. California Records is an independently distributed operation in Glendale, Calif. whose principals are George Hocutt and Ray Avery.

Zodiac Label Bows With 1st Six Releases

NEW YORK — Zodiac Records will release its initial recordings in January, to be distributed under a new agreement with Springboard Distributing Company, a division of Springboard International Records, Inc.

"Fairy Tales" by Larry Coryell highlights the three album releases, which also include a debut album by Dan Williams and a new release by Phil Harris. Singles by Billy Mize, Janie Brannon and the DeCastro Sisters are Zodiac's 45 releases.

Len Levy, president of Zodiac, said the company's objectives include a "combination of contemporary pop and country product."

Capitol To Release Harley's New Album

LOS ANGELES — "Love's A Prima Donna," a new EMI album by Steve Harley & Cockney Rebel, will be released by Capitol Records on Jan. 10.

CBS Gets 11 Platinum, 42 Gold RIAA Certifications In 1976

NEW YORK — CBS Records was awarded a total of 11 platinum and 42 gold records by RIAA during 1976.

Columbia Records accounted for eight of the platinum certifications, while Epic Records was awarded the remaining three platinum records. Columbia albums which achieved the million-unit plus sales mark included "Desire" by Bob Dylan, "Rocks" by Aerosmith, "Chicago X," "Beautiful Noise" by Neil Diamond, "Silk Degrees" by Boz Scaggs and "Spirit" by Earth, Wind and Fire. Epic's platinum album certifications were for the debut albums by Wild Cherry and Boston.

Columbia's singles "Disco Lady" by Johnnie Taylor and "Kiss And Say Goodbye" by the Manhattans went platinum in 1976, and the single "Play That Funky Music" by Wild Cherry on Epic also achieved RIAA platinum certification.

CBS Records' gold certifications were delineated as follows: 29 gold for Columbia, seven for Epic, five for Philadelphia International and one for T-Neck.

Anti-Piracy Raids In L.A., Kentucky Highlight Nationwide FBI Sweep

NEW YORK — FBI confiscation of over 65,000 pirated recordings in Los Angeles and Kentucky last week highlighted the agency's self-described "current assault" on record and tape piracy. The FBI seized nearly 80,000 allegedly bootlegged recordings in the course of their nationwide crackdown.

In Los Angeles, 33,500 unauthorized albums were seized by FBI agents during raids on an unidentified distributor and several unidentified retailers. Many of the confiscated albums were reported to contain live recordings of a Wings concert which took place at the Forum in Inglewood last June.

In Kentucky, over 33,000 allegedly pirated 8-track stereo tapes were appropriated by the FBI in coordinated raids on more than 150 retail stores throughout the state.

Unauthorized tapes were also seized in Brooklyn, Oakland and Pennsylvania last week. FBI agents confiscated 6,000 pirated 8-track tapes in Brooklyn, among which were included illegally duplicated recordings of "A Love Trilogy," by Donna Summer, "Wings At The Speed Of Sound," "Silver Convention" and "Barry Manilow II." Approximately \$8,500 worth of duplicating equipment was taken during the Brooklyn raid.

2,500 allegedly bootlegged tapes were appropriated during an FBI raid on stores in Oakland and Richmond, California, reported to be operated by Bernard Adams. In Pennsylvania, 1,500 tapes were seized by the FBI at the Silver Springs Livestock Flea Market stand operated by James A. Converse. Converse had been previously convicted and fined in 1975 for selling infringing tapes.

'Tejas' Tops London's January Release List

NEW YORK — "Tejas," the fifth album by ZZ Top, leads London Records' January releases. The new album contains the single "It's Only Love," which has been released in advance of the album.

London also has scheduled January releases for the following albums: "Feels Good, Feels Right" by Bing Crosby, "Hot To Trot" by the Olympic Runners; and "It's Honky Tonk Time" by the Bill Black Combo on London's Hi label.

UA January Albums Feature New Artists

LOS ANGELES — United Artists Records is spotlighting albums by five new artists with the company's January releases. Steve March's "Lucky," produced by former Crusader Rik Pekkonen, Isis' "Breaking Through," produced by Len Barry and Canadian performer Keath Barrie's "Reach Out" will be included in the label's releases. Also coming out with new LPs are Jorge Dalt with "Chevere" and Windy City with "Let Me Ride."

Buddah Releases LP For 'Next Man' Film

NEW YORK — The soundtrack album to the film "The Next Man," with an original score composed by Michael Kamen, has been released by Buddah Records.

Arbitron & Golden Triangle, Inc. Reach A New Copyright Consent Agreement

LOS ANGELES — A consent agreement has been reached between Arbitron Radio and Golden Triangle Broadcasting, Inc. (owners of WEEP AM/FM, Pittsburgh) over the use of Arbitron data and the results of Arbitron studies. The agreement, reached after months of litigation between the two firms, states that WEEP (a non-subscriber to Arbitron services) will no longer use or summarize Arbitron data. Arbitron had claimed that the chain's use of its material was "an act of copyright infringement, constituted unfair competition and violated its proprietary rights to its data."

Golden Triangle president Myron Jones told **Cash Box**, "We have made a consent agreement with Arbitron not to use any of their data in the future. We were not found

guilty of anything; we just agreed to cease using the information." Jones said Golden Triangle had been supplied with the data by a former national rep for the firm.

Army, Keystone Radio Sponsor Awards Pgm.

LOS ANGELES — The U.S. Army, in coordination with Keystone Broadcasting, is testing a scholar-athlete recognition award program to honor athletic and academic excellence in American youth. Under the anticipated program, the Army will sponsor a portion of local high school sports, principally basketball, in broadcasts over stations of the Keystone high school sports network. In each school whose athletic schedule is carried on the sponsored broadcasts, two outstanding scholar-athletes, one man and one woman, will be selected and awarded the American Scholar-Athlete Recognition Certificate. Plans are for the program to be implemented in more than 200 markets and take place over the course of the season.

London Debuts 'Collector Series'

NEW YORK — London Records will release in January the first five albums of the London Collector Series, a compilation line. Included in the initial release is the "Best of Savoy Brown." Other groups represented in the series are John Mayall, Tom Jones, Thin Lizzy and Them, featuring Van Morrison.

London has also scheduled a January debut for 11 albums on the newly-formed Phase Four Stereo ethnic music series, which includes recordings from Uganda, Germany, Spain and Israel.

RIAA Begins Market Expansion Project

LOS ANGELES — The RIAA Recording Industry Market Expansion Project launched in May 1976 will shortly enter the initial phased research program, according to Stanley M. Gortikov, RIAA president. The project is intended to retain current buyers as they advance in age, to recapture former buyers, and to gain new recording purchasers, in order to extend industry markets and growth.

RIAA has engaged Response Analysis, Princeton, N.J., to investigate consumer practices and motivation, as well as industry expertise. Initially interviews with recording company execs, retailers, radio and press will help the firm define priorities and marketing strategies.

Response Analysis will then contact consumers in an attempt to determine their behavior and attitudes, and what motivates people to buy recorded product. Both group interviews and in-depth household studies comprise this phase of the research.

picks of the week

BILLY PRESTON (A&M 1892)

I've Got The Spirit (3:10) (Irving/WEP — BMI) (Preston, Jones)

In this edited track from the "Billy Preston" album, the artist brings his gospel roots together with the sound of modern funk. The song is built on a simple riff, concentrating on non-stop energy and Preston's whimsical vocal inflections.

ROD STEWART (Private Stock 130)

Shake (2:48) (Kags — BMI) (Cooke)

From the label's current LP of reissued vintage Rod Stewart material, here is a rocking arrangement of Sam Cooke's song that features dancing drums and blaring brass. Not up to ultra-modern pop production standards, but the music is right where it should be.

ABIGAIL BROWNE (Private Stock 127)

Guava Jelly (2:40) (Cayman — ASCAP) (Marley)

Abigail Browne may not be well-known here, but the songwriter is Bob Marley. In an arrangement that does not rely on reggae novelties for its appeal, both the beauty of the song and the talent of the performer emerge. Sumptuously textured strings and a key change make this a memorable record that could be played on any station willing to listen.

ROSCOE & MABEL (Chocolate City 007) (Dist: Casablanca)

United We Stand (3:26) (Belwyn-Mills — ASCAP) (Hiller, Simmons)

The Brotherhood Of Man's sixties hit here receives the Medress and Appell production treatment in an arrangement that definitely takes a different view on the song than the original. The chorus/hook is used in a fresh way, and the verses are styled along R&B ballad lines.

DEXTER WANSEL (Phila. Intl. 3611)

Together Once Again (4:04) (Mighty Three — BMI) (Wansel, Barrett)

Velvet synthesizer effects introduce this song, a gently vocalized ballad. The instruments are tastefully understated in their arrangement, serving only to bring out the nuances of the vocal. For R&B programming where the softer touch is needed.

ALPHONSO JOHNSON (Epic 50324)

Love's The Way I Feel 'Bout 'Cha (3:30) (Embamba — ASCAP/My Kids — BMI) (Johnson, Bailey, Walker)

From his second solo album "Yesterday's Dreams," this young jazz-trained bassist offers a highly commercial record that features the urgent vocals of Dianne Reeves. The arrangement does have that stretched-out feeling that provides the clue that jazzmen are at work here. Could appear on many kinds of playlists.

HARVEY MASON (Arista 0222)

K.Y. And The Curb (2:58) (Masong — ASCAP/Golden Corn Flake — BMI) (Mason, Peters)

From drummer/bandleader Mason, we get what we would expect — a jazz-influenced, commercial instrumental with a pointed emphasis on rhythm and percussion. The music is danceable, smartly arranged and includes a sugary guitar solo. For varied airplay situations.

ROCKY MIZELL (Drive 6255) (Dist: TK)

Hey Sexy Dancer (3:24) (Sherlyn — BMI) (Mizell, Clarke)

A toe-tapping, straightforward R&B record marked by double-tracked voices and flitting backing lines from the brass section. Disco music that doesn't rely on big-city slickness, yet full of that all-important primal energy.

COOTER CROW & MAGIC (Arista 0226)

Polka Band Hits (3:15) (Buns Up — BMI) (Clouthier)

Don't take out your dancing shoes: this fine ballad uses the image of "polka band hits" to recall the feelings of a young person growing up in the midwest. A classy production with a blended instrumental texture, this record is good fare for AM or FM.



BEE GEES (RSO 867) (Dist: Polydor)

Boogie Child (3:30) (Stigwood/Unichappell — BMI) (Gibb, Gibb, Gibb)

The latest successor to two gold singles from a platinum album, "Children Of The World" would be hard to challenge under any circumstances. This one, with a Sly-influenced lead vocal, incredibly crisp instrumentation and several emotive choruses, takes its funk in stride, but will certainly find its way to the pop and R&B charts in a hurry.



ORLEANS (Asylum 45375) (Dist: Elektra)

Reach (3:58) (Siren — BMI) (Hall, Hall)

As the top ten excitement of "Still The One" barely begins to wane, Orleans is reluctant to pull the punches. This single, from the "Waking And Dreaming" LP, exhibits harmonic similarities to the last, substituting a funky beat for the shuffle. Steadily growing success is guaranteed by this group's individual instrumental/vocal sound.



NATALIE COLE (Capitol 4360)

I've Got Love On My Mind (4:20) (Jay's Enterprises/Chappell — ASCAP) (Jackson, Yancy)

From her forthcoming album, here is a song Ms. Cole featured on her last tour. The song is slow-paced with heavy accents, and the hesitating rhythms give her the room to really fly away in her vocal interpretation as the record builds in intensity. Pop and R&B airplay are a certainty here, with the charts not far behind.



JOHNNY GUITAR WATSON (DJM 1020) (Dist: Amherst)

Ain't That A Bitch (4:39) (Vri-John — BMI) (Watson)

The title track from the versatile Mr. Watson's latest album has already received play as an LP cut, and those unfamiliar with the tune should be informed that it combines a jazzy chord progression with a slinky rhythm and an unusual lyric line. For pop and R&B airplay.

RHYTHM HERITAGE (ABC 12243)

Theme From "Rocky" (Gonna Fly Now) (3:00) (United Artists — ASCAP/Unart — BMI) (Conti, Connors, Robbins)

The group can claim several TV theme successes, and the movie theme is currently popular. This version takes the melody at a slower tempo than the releases on other labels, and is basically instrumental, with some vocal ornamentation. Short and to-the-point, for pop and easy listening formats.

GLEN CAMPBELL (Capitol 4376)

Southern Nights (2:58) (Warner-Tamereane/Marsaint — BMI) (Toussaint)

An Allen Toussaint song performed by Glen Campbell might seem an unusual pairing, but the apparent disparity at the surface results in a freshness that neither individual element could provide. An upbeat feeling, bouncing guitars and banjo, and pleasant harmonies make this a fitting record for pop or easy listening play.

MIKE POST (Epic 50325)

Theme From "Baa Baa Black Sheep" (2:59) (Leeds — ASCAP) (Post, Carpenter)

The "Rockford Files" man returns with the theme from one of TV's new programs. A marching beat and dulcet brass arrangements distinguish this production, along with a set of bizarre guitar solos that are really "something completely different" where slick theme music is concerned.

CROWN HEIGHTS AFFAIR (DeLite 1588)

Dancin' (3:44) (Delightful/Cabrini — BMI) (Anderson)

The title says it all here, and the group keeps the scat-inspired vocal style that brought them attention at the outset. Really a delicate record by disco standards. For R&B airplay.

ATLANTA RHYTHM SECTION (Polydor 14373)

So In To You (3:19) (Low-Sal — BMI) (Buie, Nix, Daughtry)

A single from their latest album "Rock And Roll Alternative" pinpoints the talents of this still underrated group of fine musicians. This one joins catchy riffs with a subtle vocal line, for a solid mainstream pop song put across with ease. For AM and FM formats.

CATE BROS. (Asylum 45370) (Dist: Elektra)

Where Can We Go (3:20) (Big E Little e/Cate Bros. — BMI) (Cate, Cate)

This group's strong soul influence is more pronounced than ever with this single from their "In One Eye And Out The Other" album. The introductory guitar riff builds suspense in a manner that calls "You Keep Me Hangin' On" to mind. Applicable to varied formats and some disco play.

HAROLD MELVIN & THE BLUENOTES (ABC 12240)

Reaching For The World (4:24) (Simi — BMI) (Floyd)

Here is Harold Melvin's first single since signing with the label. He's back to handling lead vocals as well as production, and the level of quality will end the doubts of all skeptics. The arrangement is powerful, and the emotional quality that distinguishes Melvin's music is all here. For disco, R&B and some pop play.

BETTE MIDLER (Atlantic 3379)

You're Movin' Out Today (2:56) (Divine/Begonia/Unichappell/Fedora — BMI) (Midler, Sager, Roberts)

Ms. Midler's voice is recognizable only at rare points in this record, a song which combines influences of show and pop music. The situation-comedy lyrics and spoken words are an attractive point. For top 40 and easy-listening play.

L.T.D. (A&M 1897)

Love To The World (3:39) (Alruby — ASCAP) (Mizell, Mizell, Mizell)

Following up a number-one R&B single, this fraternal group returns with a disco-oriented record that is distinguished by a strong lead vocal and a delicate instrumental arrangement. Sound and momentum will carry this one to the R&B playlists.

RAMONA WOLF (Midland International 10832) (Dist: RCA)

Save The Last Dance For Me (3:15) (Unichappell/Trio — BMI) (Pomus, Shuman)

Ms. Wolf is one of the ladies of Silver Convention, and the song was originally a hit for the Drifters in 1960. Though the incisive European production is undoubtedly tailored for disco play, all the verses are here, and the song's intrinsic qualities ring through. Open to varied airplay routes.

ANNE MURRAY (Capitol 4375)

Sunday School To Broadway (3:41) (Mandy — ASCAP) (Hice, Hice)

This song was a minor country hit for Sammi Smith last year. This time it's paired with an artist with a respectable track record, and her interpretation of the memorable tune has strong pop airplay possibilities.

JOE TEX (Epic 50313)

Ain't Gonna Bump No More (With No Big Fat Woman) (3:28) (Tree — BMI) (McGinty, Killen)

Tex experiences the laws of physics in his first single for a new label. The beat stays steady despite the upsetting experience he describes. The lyrics here are the major focus of attention, along with an unmistakable voice.

Magazine Analysis Of Leisure Industry

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20th Century Fox

20th Century had an 11.2% five-year average return on equity with a 7.7% mark for the latest 12-month period. Return on total capital for 20th was 6.8% for the five-year mark and 5% for the latest 12-month span. Average sales growth for the five-year period was 9.2%. There was a net profit margin of 2.6% and a debt/equity ratio of .8. Forbes magazine did not report a five-year earnings/share figure, as 20th had recorded a deficit to profit shift.

Columbia Pictures

Return on equity for Columbia Pictures for a five-year period was 10.4%, with a 94.2% return for the latest 12-month period, according to Forbes. A spokesman for Forbes commented that this figure was "a statistical aberration," in that the company had not enjoyed a particularly good period preceding the one year span. Hence, the unusually high percentage figure. This is reflected in the .7% five-year average for return on total capital. The same category for the most recent 12-month period enjoyed an 18.1% figure. Five-year average sales growth was 4% and Forbes did not record an earnings/share figure due to a profit to deficit slip by Columbia. Net profit margin for Columbia was 7.8% with a debt/equity ratio of 4.4.

RCA

Return on equity for RCA in the five-year span was 14.1%, and 13.3% for the latest 12-month period. Return on total capital was 19% and 24.2% respectively. The RCA debt/equity ratio was .9 and RCA had a net profit margin of 3%. The sales growth average for the five-year period was 7.1%,

with an earnings/share ratio of 8.9 for the same span.

Warner Communications

Warner Communications recorded a 12.5% return on equity for the five-year average, with a 6.8% figure for the latest 12-month period. Their total return on capital was 7.9% for a five-year measurement, and 4.8% for the latest 12-month period. The debt/equity ratio was .9 with a net profit margin of 2.2%. Sales growth for a three-year period was 14.5% with an earnings/share ratio of -15% for a similar time.

to reclaim exploitation rights to their material. All an author has to do is file a termination notice with the Copyright Office not less than two, nor more than ten years before the termination is to become effective. Congress said, however, that these notices could not be filed before January 1, 1978.

For copyrights due to expire in 1962, and extended by Congress from year-to-year, the extra year is crucial. A copyright that should have lapsed in 1962 has only four more years left. And with the two-year notice period before effective termination, that means an author has only two years left to use his copyright.

Out Soon

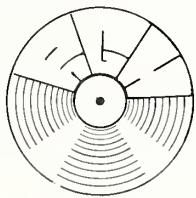
The Copyright Office will be publishing its regulations on public broadcasting and termination soon. Both proposed regulations would give copyright owners an extra year of time.

The regulation will most certainly not be the last the music industry hears from the Copyright Office. The office will be publishing "a whole wall" of regulations in the future. "There are a number of regulations to be issued to implement the new law," said the spokesman.

Some future regulations will be on copyright deposit and registration; placement of copyright notice; reporting of mechanical royalties; and reporting of cable TV royalties.

EAST COASTINGS — The upcoming inaugural festivities in Washington, D.C. will feature more rock and roll than ever has been seen at so dignified a national affair, though the entire program is planned to provide a representative cross-section of American music and American arts in general. At the six "parties" to be held at various times, dance music will be provided by the traditional orchestras (**Peter Duchin, Mercer Ellington**), as well as bands such as **Marshall Tucker, Sea Level, Charlie Daniels, Booker T. & The M.G.'s** and **James Talley**. The grand concert, to be held January 19, will begin with **Dobie Gray** singing the national anthem with the National Symphony led by **Leonard Bernstein**. Among the acts performing will be **Stevie Wonder, Linda Ronstadt, Paul Simon, the Alvin Ailey Dance Company** (full production), **Beverly Sills, Shirley MacLaine, and Clamma Dale** and **Donnie Ray Albert** of Broadway's "Porgy and Bess." Hosting and lending performing talents other than the musical will be a number of stars including **Joanne Woodward, Paul Newman, Redd Foxx, Chevy Chase, Bette Davis, Hank Aaron, James Dickey, Lily Tomlin, Sidney Poitier** and **John Wayne**. Proceeds from the sale of broadcast rights to CBS television will be donated to foundations supporting the arts.

STARS TO BE — The **Beatles'** Hamburg tapes, recorded at the Star Club in 1962 by **King Size Taylor** (who was appearing at the club with his band, the **Dominoes**), will be released by **Buk Records** in England as a two-record set, after the tapes were turned down by nearly all the major U.K. record companies. Tracks will include early versions of "I Saw Her Standing There," "Roll Over Beethoven," and "Long Tall Sally," as well as "A Taste Of Honey" and **Marlene Dietrich's** "Falling In Love Again," performed solo by **Paul McCartney**. The **Beatles'** late manager **Brian Epstein** refused to buy the tapes from Taylor in the mid-sixties.

BOXING DAY BONANZA — A single announcement, made over WPLJ-FM on December 26, 1976, resulted in two sold-out concerts for **Jethro Tull** at Radio City Music Hall in New York. The engagement is part of a six-date tour of small venues that was promised by **Ian Anderson** when the group played Shea Stadium here in the metropolitan area last summer. **Billy Fields**, who co-produces rock concerts at Radio City with **Sid Bernstein**, informed us that the 12,000 seat sellout, which took place over a period of about 48 hours, was completely orderly and without disturbances of any kind. Meanwhile, Tull scored a top 30 single in the U.K. with "Ring Out The Solstice Bells," and will be beginning their first British tour in nearly two years this February. Jethro Tull is expected to return to the U.S. to play larger halls later in the year. Back in New York, Tull's Radio City dates are January 22 and 23. Renaissance has been booked for February 19.

WHO DO YOU LOVE? — Man Watcher's Inc., a women's group with some 2,000 members in the U.S., Great Britain and Canada, recently took a poll within the organization and came up with a "10 most watchable men in the world" list. The only legitimate rock star to show was **Kris Kristofferson**, although a singer, **John Davidson**, and sometime vocalists **Richard Harris** and **Chevy Chase** were included. Interestingly, the only person to top **Elton John** in a poll taken by the Ladies' Home Journal, in which youngsters were asked to name their hero figures, was the same person to top this poll as well, **O.J. Simpson**. . . . **ELO** will play Madison Square Garden February 11, supported by **Steve Hillage**, whose touring band includes drummer **Clive Bunker** of the original Jethro Tull. . . . **Led Zeppelin's Robert Plant** and **John Bonham** will rejoin the group they left to help form Zeppelin for three special shows in January, all of which will be benefit shows for the relatives of Possessed, a British band recently killed in an auto accident. The group is named **Band Of Joy**.

GO WEST, YOUNG PERSON — **Cash Box's** dedicated research staffers are not alone in their migration to southern California. Also making the move in connection with their work this past week were **Gordon Bossin** of UA, **Pete Mollica** of A&M and **Herb Corsack** and **Amanda Schuster** of Island.

DO YOU LOOK LIKE WE DO — At press time, director **Carl Reiner** and producer **Jerry Weintraub** of the upcoming Warner Bros. film "Oh God" were searching for a John Denver look-alike for the filming of a special scene on January 10. Denver makes his screen debut in the film, co-starring with **George Burns**. Our question: What is it he wants someone else to do that he wouldn't do himself? Or is he being cloned? . . . In Newsweek's special January 3 issue, "Pictures of '76," **Peter Frampton** and **Bob Marley** were the two pop stars who rated photographs. Also on guitar was **Elizabeth Ray**. The music business was hardly out of things this year, though. Of all the cover photos for the Newsweek issue, only Chairman Mao was passed over as a pop music subject during the year. All the rest, including **Nadia**, the **Bicentennial** and **King Kong**, furnished some sort of pop music inspiration in 1976. Of **Jimmy Carter** we need not go into further details. . . . At a party given recently in Montreux, Switzerland by **Claude Nobs**, European artist relations director for WEA International, guests in attendance included **Ahmet Ertegun, Mr. & Mrs. Jon Anderson, Mr. & Mrs. Steve Howe, David & Angela Bowie**, and Jethro Tull's **Martin Barre** and **John Evan**. . . . The **Sylvers** have been named National Youth Ambassadors for the March of Dimes. . . . NBC television will televise **Irving Fields** and his trio on January 12, marking the group's 25th year together. . . . **Arnold G. (Gerry) Dorsey**, known to most people as **Engelbert Humperdinck**, reminded America's foreign born residents that they must report their addresses to the U.S. government in January, when he reported in to the Immigration and Naturalization offices in New York last week. Humperdinck, who took his stage name from a 19th century composer, was born in Madras, India 40 years ago. . . . **George Pincus**, head of the Gil-Pincus music publishing companies, will host an open house along with **John**

SWEET SOUL MUSIC — Jose Feliciano — Private Stock PS 2022 — Producers: Jerry Wexler and Barry Beckett

Seeking a new direction for his music, the prolific Jose Feliciano headed south to the Muscle Shoals Studios in Alabama. Every indication on this album is that the trip was well worth it. There is something here for every musical taste and the LP has cuts that should make the playlists of FM, AM and MOR. Jerry Wexler, who produced this album, has not worked with Jose before, but his troupe of southern studio musicians are what give this album its distinctive sound, with especially strong support from the Muscle Shoals Horns. Strongest cuts for this LP should be "Sweet Soul Music," "Marguerita" and "Funny/Night Life," a new arrangement of two Willie Nelson tunes.

LOW — David Bowie — RCA CPL 1-2030 — Producers: David Bowie and Tony Visconti — List: 7.98

Always difficult to categorize or label as belonging to any one bag or stance, David Bowie still seems to stay out in space on one entire side of his latest release, which leans heavily towards electronic effects. Synthetic strings, Arp, and mini-Moog play prominent roles on a number of tunes. Side A contains seven tracks with an average play time of 2:40 for each cut, just enough time to make a brief statement and for Bowie to make a mark.

STILL CAN'T SAY ENOUGH — John Lee and Gerry Brown — Blue Note BN-LA 701-G — Producer: Skip Drinkwater — List: 6.98

Wow! John Lee and Gerry Brown can cook up a storm by themselves, but they add a group of real heavies and provide a party. This release sits right on the jazz/funk border and combines outstanding instrumentals with a variety of vocal shadings. "Freeze It Up" should "go" in both R&B and jazz markets. Ernie Watts lays out some sweet sax lines on "Down The Way," a surprise that will receive jazz and disco coverage. Altogether a winner.

THE WINTERS BROTHERS BAND — The Winters Brothers Band — Atco SD 36-145 — Producers: Joel "Taz" DiGregorio and Sam Whiteside — List: 6.98

"The Winters Brothers Band" is an album of southern-rock much in the tradition of the Allman Brothers and the Charlie Daniels Band. In fact, Daniels plays his fiddle on two cuts. Nine of the album's ten songs are upbeat and all are well performed by brothers Dennis and Donnie Winters, who co-wrote all the songs and share vocals on the album. "I Can't Help It" and "Devil After My Soul" are both particularly inviting tracks with AM radio potential.

PARKER McGEE — Parker McGee — Big Tree 89520 — Producer: Kyle Lehning

A sensitive singer/songwriter with exceptional arrangements and a stable of talented background musicians make this a winning release from Big Tree. "Goodbye Old Buddies," "Talkin' 'Bout Loving You" and "Got That Feeling" are all faintly country-style tunes that could receive FM airplay, but the entire LP bespeaks a real care for the lyric and the complicated sounds that make up the meanings of words.

LOVE BROKE THRU — Phil Keaggy — New Song NS 002 — Producer: Buck Herring

Take a talented composer/arranger with a beautiful voice, assemble a premier backup bunch, throw them together with immaculate production and you have a winner. The lyrics might put the release to a difficult test, for although they are well written, there is a definite slant towards the religious. Then again, "Jesus Christ Superstar" did not do too badly, and Keaggy manages to bring life to the mode, so commercial acceptance may follow.

SYMPHONIC SLAM — Timo Laine — A&M SP 4619 — Producer: George Semklw

Timo Laine has an interesting combination here: his expressive voice, the effective backings of John Lowery, drums and voice, and David Stone, keyboards and voice. Add to that Bob Easton's 360 Systems Polyphonic Guitar Synthesizer, an electronic system that allows a synthesizer for each string of the guitar, and you have a feast for the electronics freak, not unlike some Pink Floyd efforts.

GINO CUNICO — Gino Cunico — Arista AL 4117 — Producer: Vini Poncia — List: 6.98

Easy listening programmers, as well as top 40 people, will go for some of the cuts here, on an even production that features lush instrumentals and some great guests on backup (how about Melissa Manchester, vocals, and Jim Keltner on drums?). "Can't Hold On Any Longer" is an uptempo tune that will find a way into the AM market, but the tender "Emptiness" may get there first. Cunico's vocals are clear and effective, and showcased well on "Don't Get Around Much Anymore."



ARRIVAL — Abba — Atlantic SD 18207 — Producers: Benny Andersson and Bjorn Ulvaeus — List: 6.98

Abba, the gone-gold European four-piece that specializes in tight harmonies and a top 40 sound, should make the mark again with this, their strongest and most consistent album to date. "When I Kissed The Teacher" and "Dum Dum Diddle" are good AM bets, although the latter tends a little too much towards the younger ear. Programmers may have a little difficulty in deciding which cuts to play, simply because the offerings on this release are so evenly matched, but "Tiger" and "Knowing Me, Knowing You" should also find a way onto playlists.

RED HOT — Don Harrison Band — Atlantic SD 18208 — Producer: Don Harrison Band

Most of the tunes on this fine new LP may be too long for AM airplay but FM programmers should welcome this new arrival. The album's instrumentation is primarily supportive of Harrison's vocals, which is probably as it should be since Harrison's well written lyrics should not be buried in electronic amplification but listened to attentively. Best cuts are "Red Hot (Ready To Go)," "This Ol' Guitar," "Rock 'N' Roll Lady" and especially "Baby, Don't Change Your Mind."

THERE'S MUSIC IN THE AIR — Letta Mbulu — A&M SP 4609 — Producer: Herb Alpert — List: 6.98

A superb album in concept and execution with flawless backing for a woman who is both versatile and precise. The variety of styles and languages all seem like home for Ms. Mbulu, who manages to bring a wide emotional range to the complex demands of this recorded repertoire. "This Lovin' Feeling" may well be the best version yet. The beautiful vocals both tease and enchant on this fine production that will find a way to enter a variety of playlists.

KIM CARNES — Sallin' — A&M SP 4606 — Producers: Jerry Wexler and Barry Beckett

This debut album by one of the best looking newcomers around establishes Kim Carnes as an artist to watch — and listen to. Although her voice and repertoire suggest a soft country rock sound, there are several cuts here which could have wider play — especially "Let Your Love Come Easy" and "Last Thing You Ever Wanted To Do." Carnes wrote all but two of the songs on this LP and the raspy edge in her generally smooth vocal delivery complements nicely the soft love songs in this first offering.

BOYS WILL BE BOYS — Rabbit — Capricorn CP 0175 — Producers: Patric Van Bleak, Trevor Rabin and Julian Laxton

This first effort by Rabbit is surprisingly varied for an opening shot, featuring a mixture of soft harmonies, hard rock and even a touch of progressive jazz. Rabbit's interpretation of Jethro Tull's "Locomotive Breath" is especially noteworthy but other strong cuts include "Hard Ride," "Something's Gone Wrong With My Baby" and "Looking For The Man." FM airplay most assuredly, but "Baby's Leaving" could break into AM charts as well.

SEAWIND — Seawind — CTI 5002 — Producer: Harvey Mason — List: 6.98

Pauline Wilson's voice is a definite plus for this jazz-influenced group that moves in the realm of the musical understatement. Never really moving into "rock," Seawind furnishes gentle melodies that charm and cajole. Rather than con the listener with a lot of solos, Seawind picks and chooses, preferring a cohesive unit-oriented approach. Sometimes similar in sound to Sergio Mendes' better works, Seawind has possibilities for varying markets. "The Devil Is A Liar" should be good for FM play, and "Seawind," a haunting progressive instrumental, featuring two first-rate solos (Ken Wild on electric bass and Kim Hutchcroft on soprano sax), may notch a good spot in both jazz and FM rock playlists.

IN THE LAND OF MAKE BELIEVE — Elliot Fisher — Dobre 1003 — Producer: Elliot Fisher

This unusually affecting album features Elliot Fisher on the electronic violin, a little used instrument more closely identified with television theme and background music than with contemporary rock. The eerie sounds produced lend a haunting backdrop to the rock-jazz arrangements done by Benny Golson, and while there are some familiar tunes here, the interpretations of identifiable melodies are unlike any you have ever heard. FM programmers should find some interesting change-of-pace material here.

DISCO INFERNO — The Trammps — Atlantic SD 18211 — Producer: Ronald Baker

The Trammps come off with some lively cuts, all six minutes or more long, including a 10:54 mark on "Disco Inferno." T.G. Conway's arrangement of "Don't Burn No Bridges" should get good play in R&B MOR circles, and the hot "Body Contact Contract" by Norman Harris, Bruce Gray and Jimmy Hendricks will find its way onto disco request lists. Full-bodied instrumentals (the production lists 13 musicians other than the Trammps themselves) characterize the album, and there are three women backing the Trammps with vocals to provide even more sound shadings. "Starvin'" could see airplay in R&B and dance circles.

Classical Radio Stations Seek Larger Share Of Natl. Ads

NEW YORK — Commercial classical radio stations have recently begun banding together to present their case to large national advertisers, and the results so far have been encouraging.

Up until now, local advertisers have accounted for nearly 90% of these stations' revenues. National advertisers by and large have preferred to invest in popular music stations, which have most of the listeners. As a result, many classical stations have bordered on the brink of insolvency, and several of them have switched to progressive rock or MOR formats.

But the protests from citizens' groups which resulted from some planned switchovers, including those of WNCN (New York) and WEFM (Chicago), have demonstrated that the classical audience is not one with which to be trifled. Consequently, classical broadcasters have taken heart and have become increasingly aggressive in their quest for increased sales.

Consumer Profile

One of the most tangible signs of this changing attitude emerged at the annual meeting last August of the Concert Music Broadcasters Association (CMBA), which claims 80 member stations. At this convention, Ray Nordstrand, past CMBA chairman and president of WFMT-FM (Chicago), presented the results of extensive listener surveys conducted by Target Group Index, a market research group. The data collected in the 40-volume TGI report proved conclusively that classical music listeners are usually better educated, more affluent and more inclined to purchase many types of products than those who tune in to rock, country, R&B or MOR stations.

According to Nordstrand, who mailed selected portions of the TGI study to a number of prospective customers on behalf of WFMT-FM, "This has opened the eyes of a lot of advertisers who have found that the classical consumer is sometimes three, four or five times as likely as the average consumer to buy a particular product. And we have found that some new advertisers have come to us as a result of this."

National Rep Firm

Along with 11 of the other 30 commercial stations that belong to CMBA, WFMT-FM now seeks national advertising through Concert Music Broadcast Sales (CMBS), a rep firm which was formed shortly after the last CMBA convention. All of the stations represented by CMBS are CMBA members, and several of them are among the largest classical stations in the country. According to Peter Cleary, president of the New York-based firm, "No one has ever put as many of these stations together as we have. No one rep firm has ever had more than five or six of the major classical stations before. And no rep firm has had (the big stations in) Chicago, Philadelphia and New York at the same time before."

"There is no other company in existence that provides the type of service we provide. We were formed specifically and exclusively to generate national sales revenue for this group of radio stations."

As a consequence of this specialization, Cleary said, "We will do better at the buying level than the average rep firm. We don't have to worry about other formats, so just by definition we will be more effective at the sales level."

Nordstrand agreed with this view. "Instead of stations like ourselves being sold with scores of other stations of all kinds of different formats, we now have a sort of single voice, at least those of us who are represented by CMBS. Since they only sell classical radio, they don't have to talk out of both sides of their mouth about different formats, and they can present the classical story very effectively."

Speaking For Network

Cleary said he expected that by the mid-

dle of 1977 CMBS would be representing "at least" 15 classical radio stations. These will not, however, probably include KFAC in Los Angeles, KKHI in San Francisco or WCMS in Washington, all represented by firms which the radio stations themselves own.

Nevertheless, Cleary noted, CMBS has an "informal relationship" with the commercial classical stations which it does not directly represent. "When we go after a whole new category of client who is not using the medium at all, we include every station in the country, whether or not we represent them, as part of our classical network."

As an example of a type of national advertiser which is not making full use of the classical radio medium, Cleary mentioned the airlines. "Virtually every airline in the country ought to be using classical music (stations) as a matter of course. No airline should make a buy in any market without placing a modest percentage of its budget against the classical audience. Because, in terms of every market research study ever done, our audience is at least two or three times more valuable than almost any other format. And that includes all-news and other formats which you might normally think of as very strong for airlines."

Institutional Ads

In addition to ads for specific products and services, Cleary said, "We feel that one of the big areas for potential growth for classical radio stations is corporate (image) advertising. We have the same people listening to our group of stations nationwide who read publications like *Smithsonian*, *Harvard Business Review*, *Forbes* and *Fortune* — the real up-scale books that appeal strictly to a higher socio-economic group. And when you put all these stations together, we have a larger circulation at a lower cost than either *Forbes* or *Fortune*." Cleary added that within two or three years he expected institutional advertising to be as important a source of revenue for the clients of CMBS as product advertising.

During his firm's first 90 days in business, Cleary asserted, "We have already exceeded the entire prior year's national advertising revenue for several of our stations. We would expect a minimum of a 50% increase in national revenue for every station (affiliated with us). And there are some where we expect significantly greater increases than that."

Of course, as Cleary readily admitted, "Most of these stations are running nicely in the black almost exclusively on the strength of their local sales efforts. So what we will do for them in the next couple of years is going to be all gravy."

Stations Comment

Nordstrand was enthusiastic about the initial efforts of CMBS to increase ad revenues for WFMT. As a result of both his own mailings and CMBS representation, he said, "There has been progress toward creating more awareness by national advertisers of our format." In addition, WFMT's ad revenues during the last quarter of 1976 rose 30% over the prior-year period. "It has really been a phenomenon, starting this fall, of enormously increased interest in our format without any drastic change in anything (related to the format). I think the (TGI) research has helped and that CMBS has helped, too."

One of the largest and oldest classical radio stations represented by CMBS is WQXR-AM and FM in New York. Bob Krieger, the station's vice president of sales, echoed Nordstrand's assessment of the rep firm's potential. "I think there was a need for a service that would just sell the classical music concept. And these men are well qualified and I'm beginning to see some activity already. So I'm confident it's going to work."

WCRB-FM (Boston), one of the country's biggest classical stations and the syndicator of Boston Symphony broadcasts, elected not to be represented by CMBS on a national level. John Donofrio, national sales manager for both WCRB and WHET, its MOR-oriented AM affiliate, said he felt

that the CMBS approach to corporate image advertising made sense; however, with regard to product advertising, Donofrio stated that a major station like WCRB has more than enough leverage to fend for itself. "I feel very strongly that New York time buyers have given WCRB a very fair shake over the years," he added.

Classical Reviews

GASPARD DE LA NUIT and SERENADE GROTESQUE by Ravel; LES CINQ DOIGTS, VALSE POUR LES ENFANTS and PETROUCHKA: 3 SCENES by Stravinsky. Idil Biret, pianist. Finnadar SR 9013 — List: 6.98.

Despite her technical skill, Biret delivers a rather tired, flaccid reading of Ravel's "Gaspard" on this recording. "Serenade Grotesque," Ravel's first piano composition and Stravinsky's "Les Cinq Doigts" and "Valse Pour Les Enfants" should not have been included here at all; coming from the pens of these great composers, their triviality is almost embarrassing. Biret's playing springs to life in her interpretations of the first two scenes from "Petrouchka," but her version of the third scene suffers from excessive rubato.



MESSIAH by G.F. Handel. Ameling, Langridge, Reynolds, Howell, the Academy and Chorus of St. Martin in the Fields, Neville Marriner, conductor. Argo D1803 — List: 20.94

Combining elements of the earliest extant versions of "Messiah," the score for this performance is not exactly the same as the one with which most concertgoers are familiar. Nevertheless, the score employed on this recording does not differ markedly from the more commonly used one. Marriner's crisp, forceful direction brings the great choruses into unusually sharp focus and the solo numbers also include some notable interpretations.



EIN HELDENLEBEN by Richard Strauss. New York Philharmonic Symphony, Willem Mengelberg, conductor; Scipione Guidi, solo violin — RCA AVM 1-2019 — List: 3.98

Recorded in 1928 and sonically cleaned up for re-issue, this album doesn't sound as good as Strauss's 1944 recordings of "Ein Heldenleben" and his other tone poems (Vanguard SRV 325/29). Still, Mengelberg was the conductor to whom Strauss dedicated the work and his interpretation of it has few rivals among today's recorded versions. Aficionados of Mengelberg's long-maligned "romantic" approach to conducting should flip over this LP.



THE FOUR SEASONS by Vivaldi. London Philharmonic Orchestra, Itzhak Perlman, solo violin and conductor — Angel S-37053 — List: 6.98

It is unusual to see a recording of "The Seasons" in which the soloist is a musician of Perlman's stature. While Perlman's virtuosity occasionally sticks out a bit too much in this reading, the other string players are fully equal to the not inconsiderable demands placed on them by Vivaldi's score. Angel's engineering faithfully reproduces the subtleties of the solo part while also providing a rich, sonorous ensemble sound.



Arbitron Fall Reports Will Utilize Improved Quality Control Procedures

LOS ANGELES — Arbitron Radio has begun mailing the fall 1976 local market reports to its clients. The reports, which cover a three week period from October 28 to November 17, are being sent to 75 markets, according to company spokesmen.

Additional diary security procedures and a more efficient call letter editing policy were utilized in compiling the October/November survey, says the rating firm. Arbitron's field staff has been instructed to call back all households scheduled to receive radio diaries to ensure that people selected for the sample have received their

diaries. The editing policy has been revised so that every distant or non-existent call letter is examined during editing for the purpose of flipping (giving credit to the proper station even though a diary may give an incorrect call letter, for example, KNCN for KCKN). The examination will give Arbitron the opportunity to flip erroneously recorded call letters to the logical station.

Four additional markets will receive October/November reports, Arbitron said. The markets listed for the reports are Albuquerque, Anaheim-Santa Ana-Garden Grove (Orange County, Calif.), Huntington-Ashland and Tucson.

Classics In Concert

NEW YORK — To celebrate the centenary of the late Pablo Casals' birth, the 60-member New York String Orchestra and some of its alumni gave an eclectic and often absorbing concert recently at Carnegie Hall. In addition to the orchestra's performances of works by Bach, Casals, Ginastera and Beethoven, the recital also featured a rendition of the cellist's "Sonata In D Major For Violin And Piano" by Isaac Stern and Eugene Istomin, two of Casals' close associates.

Naturally, there was a world of difference between the seasoned interpretations of these two great musicians and the playing of the String Orchestra's members, none of whom are more than 22 years old. Similarly, it would be difficult to compare the Stern/Istomin collaboration with the efforts of the three young guest soloists in the String Orchestra's performance of Beethoven's "Triple Concerto."

Nevertheless, violinist Schlomo Mintz, pianist Yefim Bronfman, 18, and cellist Yo-Yo Ma, 21, did a more than creditable job with their virtuoso parts in the "Triple Concerto." Of the three, Ma was the standout, especially in the work's largo, where his beautiful tone paid fitting homage to Casals' memory.

The String Orchestra, conducted by Alexander Schneider, another of Casals' colleagues, also produced some very fine sounds. Its spirited version of Bach's Third Brandenburg Concerto, for example, showed the orchestra's excellent dynamic control and sense of rhythm. Complex rhythmic interactions were also handled well in Ginastera's semi-parodic "Glosses: Sobre Temes de Pau Casals" for String Orchestra and String Quintet." And the strongly stated bass line in Casals' own

"Sardana" assured this listener that the famous cellist's art is far from dead.

At a recent New York Philharmonic concert in Avery Fisher Hall, Vaughan Williams' "Fantasia On A Theme By Thomas Tallis" was rather poorly treated. Conductor laureate Leonard Bernstein drew a shockingly pedestrian performance from his orchestra on this occasion.

Poulenc's "Gloria," sung by the Westminster Choir with Judith Blegen as soprano soloist, fared much better. One of the French composer's later works, "Gloria" is a strange blend of jollity and religiosity. Among the performance's highlights were Blegen's singing and some of the orchestral interludes, which recalled both Prokofiev's music and Poulenc's own "Aubade."

Chorus, orchestra and soloists more than made up for the Vaughan Williams debacle with a stirring presentation of Haydn's "Lord Nelson" mass. While the reading at times verged on opera, as if this were Verdi's "Requiem," the grandeur of Haydn's conception came across. Underlining the "symphonic" nature of the mass, the quartet of soloists artfully wove in and out of the choral fabric. Among these four vocalists, bass Simon Estes made the best impression, particularly in his powerful solo in "Qui Tollis Peccata Mundi."

N.Y. Phone Vs. N.Y. Radio The Call-In Fight Resumes

LOS ANGELES — After five months of delay, the fight between New York Telephone and New York radio stations over who should bear the cost of radio station contest call-ins resumed last Wednesday (5) in New York City. Various witnesses representing the telephone company, several New York radio stations and the Public Service Commission began a series of cross examination hearings and testimony before administrative law judge Harold Colbeth, according to Francis Rivett, a PSC spokesman. Rivett indicated that it could take as long as ten weeks before any decision could be reached.

The hearings had been delayed because both telephone company and radio station interests had been required to file pre-hearing testimony on behalf of their respective arguments in October (**Cash Box**, Nov. 6). The pre-hearing, according to Rivett, determined the rules and procedures that are being used in the newly begun proceedings.

The dispute began in August 1976 when the telephone company proposed "tariff revisions" providing for "special call-in service" to those customers, especially radio broadcasters, who generated mass calling by the public to a particular telephone number (**CB**, Aug. 28). The phone company had specifically sought to relieve network congestion by asking that radio stations be required to install automatic answering equipment capable of terminating vast

numbers of "loser" calls by telling listeners via a recorded message that they did not win, to hang up and not try again.

The American Broadcasting Company had been spearheading several New York stations' arguments that the phone company could possibly generate "millions of dollars of additional revenue for itself" under the proposed plan, because customers would now be charged a local call message unit rate where they previously got a busy signal for free. Specific stations involved in the hearings are WABC-American Broadcasting Company, WNBC-National Broadcasting Company, WXLO-RKO Radio, WHN-Storer Radio and WWRL-Sonderling Radio, which will be represented in the hearings by Norm Leventhal, a Washington, D.C. lawyer. According to Leventhal, each group has reserved the right to speak for itself but he will be the group's primary spokesman.

New York Telephone's legal advisor Melvin Cohen, who will represent the phone company in the hearings, told **CB** the proceedings would most likely involve "discussions about the service that was to be provided, how much the service would cost and who would have to pay those costs."

PSC spokesman Rivett noted that after all testimony and cross examinations were in, Judge Colbeth would then recommend his decision in the matter to the New York State Public Service Commission, who in turn would make the final decision in the case.

AFTRA — Mutual Negotiations End; New Contract Imminent

LOS ANGELES — At press time it appeared as if a settlement had been reached in the negotiations between the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) and the Mutual Broadcasting System over a new contract. The talks, which had been on a "day-to-day" basis, had been extended until January 3, 1977 so that a New Year's Day strike could be avoided (**Cash Box** Jan. 8.) January 1, traditionally a big sports day for the Mutual network, saw broadcast operations continue as usual because of the decision to extend the talks past the January 1 deadline.

Memo Issue

In a memo issued Thursday (6) to AFTRA board members and locals across the country, AFTRA national executive secretary Sanford I. (Bud) Wolff alluded to the settlement of negotiations. The memo read: "Having alerted you to the very real probability of a strike at Mutual Broadcasting System's radio network, I thought it best to send this update. When I left Washington last night (5), Ms. Evelyn Freyman (Washington-Baltimore AFTRA executive secretary) had successfully negotiated out of a very bad situation. It appears that all that remains is the writing of an agreement. The network abandoned entirely its retrogressive efforts." Wolff's reference to "retrogressive efforts" apparently summed up AFTRA's earlier contention that the company (Mutual) was insisting on elimination of the eight-hour workday, elimination of severance pay provisions and emasculating of other provisions that have been in the AFTRA-Mutual contract for the last 25 years (**CB** Jan. 1.)

Mutual Drafting Agreement

Henry Fitzgerald, Mutual's attorney, was drafting the new agreement when contacted by **Cash Box** on Thursday (6).

Fitzgerald noted, "We got what we wanted. The thing they were objecting to turned out that they didn't have as much objection to it after all and they agreed on it. We wanted an exception to the 12-hour turnaround rule (time between leaving work on one day and reporting back to work on the next) and exception to the five-day notice of change of staff stretch in cases of emergency beyond the company control. They said we were trying to steal their turnaround time and notice of staff stretch under the guise of emergency. That was what the dispute was over."

"We told them that it didn't make that much difference," Fitzgerald continued, "and finally they recognized that it didn't so the contract is going to provide that there's an exception to the 12 hours and 5 days in case of emergency beyond the company's control . . . without paying overtime." Fitzgerald said the next step was for Mutual employees to ratify the new contract and mentioned that he expected the new contract "to be completed as quickly as possible."

Bartell Buys KDEO

LOS ANGELES — **Cash Box** has learned that KDEO, El Cajon, California (a San Diego suburb) has been sold to Lee Bartell, who will assume control of the station on January 16. According to acting PD Larry Himmel, KDEO's AOR format was changed to top 40 last Wednesday (5) and a call letter change is now pending before the FCC for approval. Himmel noted that KDEO's new call letters would be KMSK with an on-air logo of "Music 91."

Kevin O'Brien, former program director at WNOE, New Orleans will become KMSK's new PD, according to Himmel. Jeff Salgo and Associates, based in Los Angeles, will consult the station, the spokesman added.

forte, developing unknown talent," he said. Stax brought a number of major soul artists to national attention.

'Strong Album Market'

Washington, said Bell, "is a logical distribution point. Washington-Baltimore is also a very strong album market. It allows me to concentrate (sales) here and get LPs broken a lot earlier. With that, it's easier to spread them nationally.

"Talentwise, it's essentially virgin territory. I want to concentrate on develop-

ing talent in Washington as well as Memphis." Bell said the Lucas release has sold over a hundred thousand copies, mostly in Philadelphia and Chicago. An album by Lucas is planned.

As at Stax, Bell plans to push a sound heavy on rhythm and horns and light on strings — a backup that Bell feels puts the listener's attention on the artist's vocal style.

Presently, I.C.A. (which stands for Independent Corporation of America) has four people in its Washington office, and

nine others doing marketing and promotion across the country. Bell said he plans to bring in "many" of the marketing, promotion and finance people from Stax but "I'm going to do it step by step."

Independent Distribution

About financing, he said, "It's not requiring that much money to get back into it — I've got a lot of credit and a lot of friends."

Looking back at Stax, he said, "I have no ill feelings as it relates to Memphis. I think I was a victim of circumstances, but that's life and I'm a big boy. My regret was that I was not given the opportunity (to try to save) the

company."

Bell is now commuting between Memphis and Washington with plans to move his family within a month. He once worked at a Washington radio station, WOL, as a disc jockey.

Kiss' 3rd LP Sells 2M

LOS ANGELES — Kiss' third album, "Kiss Alive," a two-LP set, has sold in excess of two million copies, according to Casa-blanca Record and FilmWorks, in effect qualifying the album for double platinum status.

Lynyrd Skynyrd/New Riders

SPORTS ARENA, LONG BEACH, CA. — Lynyrd Skynyrd is still labeled by many people as a "country rock" group, which is unfortunate because the tag turns off many would-be listeners. Granted, the serious audiophile is always looking for fresh sounds, and the dyed-in-the-wool rock fan constantly searches for a band with a fresh stance, but those who were turned off by the politics in "Sweet Home Alabama" largely stayed turned off. A shame, because in their Long Beach performance they were not at all political.

The audience, restless from the two groups and the two-hour wait that preceded the headliners, greeted the boys from down south with prolonged cheering, and Lynyrd Skynyrd responded with a no-holds approach to volume and pace that was just what the pickup truck ambience demanded. Opening with "Working For MCA," the band rocked through three up-tempo selections, then settled the crowd with a couple mellow numbers which seemed to disappoint the customers, but demonstrated the flexibility and cohesiveness so necessary to a top act. If the band is big on "rebel rock," it nevertheless dishes it

out with finesse as well as power. While the subtleties of harmony and balance were, for the most part, lost on the largely alcohol-influenced audience, they were still components of a well-rounded musical offering. Say what you might about the southern stance, this is a talented, volatile bunch of accomplished musicians.

Ed King was hard and mean in a series of Stratocaster lines that were deceptively simple-sounding, while Ronnie Van Zant laid out clear and powerful vocals. Bob Burns' action on drums was tight and to the point. Give them credit. They tied up Long Beach in heavy metal barbed wire, just perfect for a roundup south of the Mason-Dixon, and the crowd literally stormed the front yelling for more.

New Riders of The Purple Sage preceded the headliners in a set that showcased their country rockin' style effectively, and the Alpha Band opened in a smooth set, but the two acts produced a wait for which the audience was unprepared and obviously disliked. Bad planning from the promoters.

Sparks Van Halen

SANTA MONICA CIVIC — Seconds before midnight on New Year's Eve, the houselights dimmed and all eyes turned to the gaunt figure outlined by a single spotlight. It was, of course, Ron Mael leading the crowd through a New Year's countdown that went strangely awry after zero, when Ron's fingers started responding to an inner beat that only he was aware of. The nearly full house cheered wildly while Ron remained expressionless. Sparks was back in town.

Rumor has it that this bizarre group of musicians is ready to shed the punk rock image by adding more of a hard rock edge to their performances. And if the opening song ("Nothing To Do") was any indication, Sparks just may succeed in joining more mainstream rockers. But the Sparks loyalists who showed up this evening came to hear what they already knew and seemed pleased that most of the set contained works from previous albums.

Most of the old favorites were here. "Something For the Girl Who Has Everything" brought the crowd to its feet as did the infamous "White Women," which Russell sang atop Ron's piano. Throughout the set, Russell's strong vocals were dynamically supported by a heavily amplified, but not overpowering band, including Sal Maida on base, Jim McAllister on rhythm guitar, Luke Zapparini on lead guitar, and high-energy drummer Hilly Boy Michaels.

It was a well-paced show building to a crescendo with high-energy familiar tunes including "Equator," "This Town's Not Big Enough For Both Of Us," "Amateur Hour" and "Big Beat." By now the frenzied crowd

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Flo & Eddie Jimmy Spheeris

BOTTOM LINE, NYC — Flo & Eddie must have one of the most unusually varied histories in pop music. As leaders of the Turtles they were responsible for some giant hits in the sixties. They re-surfaced with the beginning of the next decade as lead vocalists with Frank Zappa and the Mothers, amplifying their notoriety for gross-out and off-color humor. After splitting from Zappa and beginning to operate under their own flag, Flo & Eddie (Mark Vollman and Howard Kaylan) put together a live show that combined the best of tightly arranged music, non-stop gags and rock 'n' roll history, of which the preceding story is but one part.

The heavyweight pair (Kaylan by rock-star standards, Vollman by any standard) emerged through strobe lights and fake fog, much as they did on their last tour. The routines were endless and one funnier than the next. There was a rock stars' ad agency, with Fleetwood Mac singing the Mac-Donald's jingle to the tune of "Rhiannon." For "It Ain't Me Babe," a song the Turtles had performed, the entire band donned "Bob Dylan Scotchguarded babushkas" in honor of the composer. As a Wings number went sour, Kaylan yelled, "Linda, you said you'd learn the chords!" The group tore further into rock stars with parodies of Kiss and ZZ Top; and of course, the year's biggest star could not go unscathed. For Peter Frampton, each band member stuck a tube into his mouth for a rendition of "Show Me The Way" (to the bank).

Members of the audience may have been laughing too hard to notice that the music, humorous and otherwise, was performed by a tightly knit ensemble of expert musi-

Singer-songwriter Harry Chapin has been honored by the U.S. Jaycees as "one of the ten outstanding young men of America in 1977." Steve Miller Band heads back out on the road this month for a series of concert dates in major "arena-size" venues. Miller's last tour was held mostly in smaller auditoriums, but the Capitol recording artist's singles and albums successes have made larger halls necessary to meet ticket demands... Papa John Creach has been signed to a record production contract with Little Bear Productions. All product will be released on DJM Records, with negotiations under way for production of the first LP by Jack Richardson of Nimbus 9 in Toronto... New LPs to look for in January — Pink Floyd's "Animals," Minnie Riperton's "Stay In Love" and the Miracles' "Love Crazy"... Word is that the Rolling Stones' new live album, due out this month, won't be released until April... One of Chrysalis' newest groups, the Babys, have debuted on the American scene amid a flurry of activity prior to their first LP release. Seems the excitement was fueled by the presentation by the label of a 16 minute videotape of the group shown to press and radio reps in seven major cities. A seven-foot-wide screen was used for the showing and the presentation was so well received that Eyewitness News in Philly ran the tape in a segment of their newscast. In airing the Babys, reporter Judy Bloom described the televised event as "the first time an act has been introduced on a major TV news broadcast"... Terry Rhodes, executive vice president of the Paragon booking agency, has resigned his position. Rhodes, who had been with Paragon for four years, said, "I'm gonna go sit on a stump with a fishing pole for a month and think about it," when asked about future plans... New Casablanca group called Stallion has an album scheduled for release at any time. The LP shows a variety of styles and the cuts to watch for are "Woman" and "Love Is A Game"... Attorney Rick Witte, in association with the Nederlander family, has formed Thunderpurr Productions and The Leading Edge. The production/management combine is focusing all its attention on a new group (as yet unnamed) led by former Blue Cheer member Kent Housman.

BY THE BOX: Atlantic recording artists Manhattan Transfer stopped by Cash Box this week looking forward to their upcoming European tour and giving guarded hints about their third LP scheduled for June release. Said group member Tim Hauser, "We can't tell you exactly what to expect, but there'll be plenty of surprises." Hauser alluded to "new directions" for the group and strongly suggested that the upcoming LP will be more commercially appealing. Shirley & Squirrely Marketing Push Succeeds During Holiday Season

NASHVILLE — Christmas being the time for children and special packages, GRT Records recently developed a product with both in mind entitled "Shirley & Squirrely." The characters sold a quarter million of a debut single of the same name last summer, and the disk was a heavy phone request for radio stations. Upon urging by many program directors for a follow-up, the squirrel characters conceived and produced by Bob Milsap led to a Christmas album and a merchandising campaign oriented toward the children's market.

Working against time and the odds of launching a new project in the Christmas rush, Tom McEntee, national promotion director for GRT, reported that from a Friday to Monday in late November the album was recorded, and the cover artwork, promotional graphics, slicks and posters were designed and printed and in the mail. Orders and airplay were solicited from distributors, retailers, major chains and radio stations as GRT attempted to blanket as many shops as possible. "It was a vicious circle," McEntee commented. He and Dick Herd, vice president and general manager of GRT, were the creative minds behind this holiday blitz to make Shirley & Squirrely regular additions to every household.

"The distributors, one-stops, rack jobbers — essentially the wholesale part of the industry — were reluctant to touch the album because there was no airplay and it was a new project. The radio stations didn't want to commit to airplay because most of them didn't want to begin Christmas airplay until well into December, which would be too late to put out product to sell by Christmas," McEntee explained. "No one wanted to make the first move so we tried to get it done simultaneously."

Dick Herd solicited 34,000 and 100,000 single orders and GRT was committed to some airplay, and then things stepped up after Thanksgiving. Because of the late starting date, GRT felt the special merchandising techniques would be too late to be 100% effective so this year was considered a test year for "Shirley & Squirrely" as a Christmas package.

Gusto Releases New Albums And Catalog

NASHVILLE — Gusto Records' January releases will include three new albums on the Starday label and an updated reference catalog for all Gusto products. The Starday albums feature Red Sovine, Mike Lunford and Wilma Lee and Stony Cooper. The new Gusto catalog will have pictures, song titles and names of artists on Gusto's Starday, King, Power Pak and Golden Treasures labels.

Nashville was the major test market although many other areas were heavily involved with album and t-shirt give-aways and consistent airplay. GRT also distributed albums to kindergartens in the area as a way to gauge their appeal to children. "Some people reporting back say it's a great babysitting album. The kids put on the earphones and you won't hear anything from them until it's time to turn it over," McEntee said. "And all they want to do is flip it over and over. Those who have listened with an open ear found it a very charming package. Even adults can sit through it."

A second innovative approach to test the album's appeal was to mail copies to the attention of music directors' children at home. "Every time I talked with a music director I'd ask if they had kids and how old the kids were, then we sent them an album," McEntee said. "Everyone has said it's incredible with kids."

Fan Club

Each album included an application to the Shirley & Squirrely fan club which originated with the album, and forms for mail order album purchase were printed on the inside album sleeve. A similar order form accompanied the single released last summer, and GRT continued to tag each radio, television or print ad with a mail order offer. McEntee reported a good response from children throughout the country to join the fan club and order albums. "Some of these merchandising techniques are new and some are basic, but the fact that we are trying them all together is new. There's usually very little airplay for kiddie product. When you do get a novelty, most are geared for adults but kids love them because they love novelty."

Using such techniques as in-store displays and promotions through Camelot Records, T's and Tops, Ernest Tubb Records and 7-11 stores, McEntee reported "good movement" on the album in Nashville, which gives GRT a positive feeling about a full campaign next year. Future plans also include putting the squirrels on tour this summer with live broadcasts from participating radio stations and appearances in shopping malls, children's hospitals and orphanages. "We also plan to cover kindergartens via promotional albums or singles, tie-in radio and television and we're discussing work with merchandising companies who manufacture special products like Shirley & Squirrely lunch boxes, pencils, dolls and even peanut butter if there's a market for it," according to McEntee.

GRT's merchandising campaign is based on a special incentive program which will get the kids involved by having them do something to involve themselves.

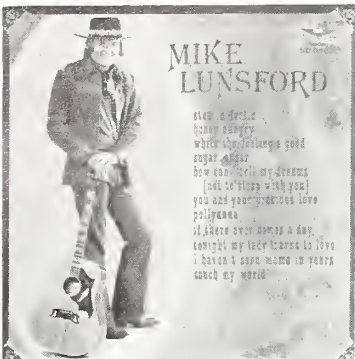

Willis Alan Ramsey has built quite a cult following in the last three years by being on the road more than a Greyhound bus. His small club and college hall appearances largely throughout the deep south and southwestern states have created the demand for this album, a reissue originally released in 1972. Willis is a gifted writer, who performs the original versions of such songs made popular by other artists as: "Ballad Of Spider John" (Jimmy Buffett), "Muskrat Love" (Carpenters) and "Satin Sheets" (Allman Brothers). Sitting on this tasteful LP are Leon Russell, J.J. Cale and Elliot Mazer.



MIKE LUNSFORD — Mike Lunsford — Gusto Records SD 969X — Producer: Tommy Hill — List: 5.98

This release features the considerable vocal abilities of Lunsford, aided by the capable production work and songwriting contributions of Tommy Hill. Uncredited string arrangements also help to make this a very comfortable LP. Lunsford's at home with ballads as well as up-tempo pieces, but the former is more represented here. "Stealin' Feelin'" is helped along with a tasteful piano backing, and "While The Feeling's Good" puts forth a nice smooth feel. "Sugar, Sugar," the pop hit, is successfully countryfied, and "Pollyanna" rounds out side one with an interesting lyric story. The Glen Campbell-sounding "You And Your Precious Love" is a highlight on side two.



SOMEDAY SOON — Kathy Barnes — Republic Records R-6019 — Producer: Dave Burgess — List: 5.98

Kathy Barnes is one of the more tasteful singer/artists to emerge recently, and this album features clean vocal highlights and bright production work. The hit "Good 'N' Country" is included here, as are other upbeat tunes like "One A Day Heartaches." Barnes sings a versatile selection of sometimes bouncy, often reflective, songs. Included, of course, is Ian Tyson's classic "Someday Soon" and an interesting version of Donovan's "Catch The Wind." A nice piano backing highlights "Come To Me," and the string arrangements by Bergen White complement the traditional country instrumentation.

JOHNNY RODRIGUEZ (Mercury 2-52435)

Desperado (3:16) (WB Music/Kicking Bear Music — ASCAP) (D. Henley, G. Frey)
The treatment Rodriguez gives to this Eagles record is both sincere and with feeling. Steel guitar work and full orchestration combine with Rodriguez' lyric interpretation to assure this record's chances for both country and MOR play. A stone smash!

DANNY DAVIS AND THE NASHVILLE BRASS (RCA PB 10871)

Country Disco (2:51) (Daydan Music — ASCAP) (Bill McElhiney, Barbara Bernier)
Country disco had to happen. Davis and the Brass utilize strong piano and brass in this up tempo instrumental which deserves to be programmed by stations in more than just a "filler" capacity. The tune's midsection (a jazzy version of "It Wasn't God Who Made Honky Tonk Angels") and the full orchestration provided by the group make it a definite choice for not only AM/FM airplay but jukebox locations as well.

STATLER BROTHERS (Mercury 2-52480)

The Movies (2:59) (American Cowboy Music — BMI) (Lew DeWitt)
In the traditional Statler Brothers style, the boys take time out to thank those movie stars who have "given us the times of our lives" with their movies. The song is very cleverly penned and typifies the group's usual success at capitalizing on one of the identifiable trends of the day — drifting off to escape in the world of cinema.

BILLY THUNDERKLOUD AND THE CHIEFTONES (Polydor PD 14362)

The Wanderer (2:20) (Schwartz Music Co. Inc./Rust Ent. — ASCAP) (Ernest Maresca)
Sounding just like Elvis in the '50s, Thundercloud captures that same feeling with this '62 Dion classic. Hit records of the past, especially when done by artists who have experienced the track record this artist has, seem to be an in thing for almost any format or jukebox.

VERNON OXFORD (RCA PB 10872)

A Good Old Fashioned Saturday Night Honky Tonk Barroom Brawl (2:12) (Sweet Dreams Music, Inc./Arabella Music, Inc. — BMI) (John Ragsdale, Tim DuBois)
The rednecks and the roughnecks pour into town for this little ditty from Vernon Oxford. In the strong country fiddle opening, Oxford tells what happens when the cowboys drink and dance and "some fool starts in with the fight." Steel guitars, fiddles and even a Jew's harp make for a strong blend to back his colorful vocals.

REBA McENTIRE (Mercury 2-52474)

(There's Nothing Like The Love) Between A Woman And A Man (2:53) (Mandy Music — ASCAP) (Ruby Hice, Danny Hice)
Strong entry! This simple love song comes to life with McEntire's vocals enhancing nice up tempo instrumental work. In fact, it seems that the emphasis of production was more on the rhythmic aspect of the record rather than the vocal. McEntire bounces back with several key lines though, one supported by a backup group clapping to her claim that "there's nothing like the love I've got."

FAITH ALLEN (Denim DR 1006A)

Baby Blue (2:56) (Veronica Music, Inc. — ASCAP) (J. Bouwens)
A new female country entry, Faith Allen will capture a lot of country programmers' ears with this tune. Her vocal work, juxtapositioned with a fiddle on several short staccato phrases, highlights the song's potential for hit status. "Baby Blue" also contains a nice harmonica ending that's quick and catchy.

On Sunday, January 2 **Charlie Daniels Band**, **Dicky Betts**, **Marshall Tucker** and **Willie Nelson** gathered at Austin's Municipal Auditorium to play a benefit for **Scotter Herring** who was indicted for drug possession following the testimony of **Gregg Allman** in the spring of '76. In addition to the aforementioned groups, members of **Asleep At The Wheel** took the stage in Texas fashion.

Charlie Daniels, **Marshall Tucker**, **James Talley** and **Jimmy Buffett** are just a few of the groups who will play at **Jimmy Carter's** inaugural festivities on January 20.

To return the favor, **Jimmy Carter** has been invited to the **Charlie Daniels Volunteer Jam** on January 8, which has been officially declared **Charlie Daniels Day** in Tennessee by **Governor Ray Blanton**.

Willis Allan Ramsey opened a new studio in Austin named **Austin Records, Inc.** The 16 track facility was designed by **John Storich** and was made possible by Ramsey's tune "Muskrat Love," hitting for both America and the **Captain and Tennille**.

Hank Aldridge has assumed managing responsibility of the **Armadillo World Headquarters**, which has been in a worrisome financial state for some time. **Aldridge's** attempt to reinstate the club's original atmosphere of Austin's communal spirit may depend upon new investments to save it from the fate of folding like **Castle Creek** and the **Alliance Wagonyard**, both of which were popular music spots.

Linda Hargrove recently taped a video interview with **Don Kennedy** for "Celebrity Spotlight" on channel 36 in Atlanta. In the interview she discusses her experience being a woman songwriter/performer making it in Nashville. Ms. Hargrove handles her own booking and is currently looking for a manager to fit her specifications.

RCA recording artists **Tennessee Pullybone** will spring with a single they've had around awhile but new to us entitled "Richard and the Cadillac Kings." The **Ace Cannon** instrumental of **Willie Nelson's** "Blue Eyes Crying In The Rain" is being reservised following heavy requests to **WUNI** and a consequent #1 listing on the station, plus its number one position in sales in Mobile. The record was first released in July '76 but **Willie Nelson's** own hit and the feeling that instrumentals aren't hit material were cited as why most stations ignored it then.

Tammy Wynette recently completed a **British tour** including engagements in twelve major cities. Ms. Wynette hosted a four-part **BBC television special** while in Great Britain to become the first country female entertainer to host a major **BBC network program**.

JazzAlbumPicks

A SECRET PLACE — Grover Washington Jr. — Kudu 32 — Producer: Creed Taylor — List: 6.98

This is a surprisingly laid back effort from Washington. The four-tune program consists of two originals by Grover, one by Harvey Mason and one by Herbie Hancock. Mason, Dave Grusin, Ralph McDonald and Eric Gale contribute tellingly to the session while Grover plays tenor and soprano. A favorite performance would be the ballad "Not Yet" which has fine and mellow tenor from the leader. The artist seems to project a lot of inner maturity with his playing on this album.



ALL STAR BAGS — Milt Jackson — Blue Note 590H-2 — List: 7.98

Three separate sessions covering the years 1952 to 1958 are represented here. On the earliest, alto man Lou Donaldson is added to the personnel that eventually became The Modern Jazz Quartet. The middle session is a rather dull date considering the fact that Art Blakey and Horace Silver are involved. It was originally issued under Hank Mobley's name. The final session is 5/6th of an album featuring Art Farmer, Benny Golson and a good rhythm section. This is the best session and serves to elevate the set to more than mere status as a historical curiosity.



HANK CRAWFORD'S BACK — Kudu 33 — Producer: Creed Taylor — List: 6.98

This is some fine funky stuff from the veteran alto man. In fact this may be Crawford's finest Kudu outing because the material allows him to express his soulful lyricism without the rest of the band running away from him. Two standards, two originals and a stickout version of "You'll Never Find Another Love Like Mine" comprise the music. Eric Gale and Richard Tee add some fine solo moments and Dave Matthews contributed the outstanding arrangements.



JOURNEY TO CAPRICORN — Stan Kenton — Creative World 1077 — Producer: Bob Kurnow — List: 6.98

Stan Kenton will be sixty-five years old next month and he continues to fight the good fight via his own highly personal brand of big band jazz. This most recent cutting features his current nineteen piece crew playing arrangements by Alan Yankee, Hank Levy and Mark Taylor. Taylor's chart of Stevie Wonder's "Too Shy To Say" is a highlight of the album. The only soloist on the track is Kenton himself. Sad to say but he is the only soloist in the band with a distinctive individual personality.



MY SPANISH HEART — Chick Corea — Polydor 2-9003 — Producer: Chick Corea — List: 9.98

This album is an especially brilliant display of Chick Corea's talent. He composed all eleven selections. They range from the minute and a half title track to the four part "Spanish Fantasy" that takes up all of side four. The album title refers to a recent trip to Spain which "reinspired" Corea's interest in flamenco music. On a good portion of the album he plays acoustic piano with little accompaniment and it is here that he shines most brightly. Overall the album is a singular creative achievement and one that should be among the best selling albums of the year.



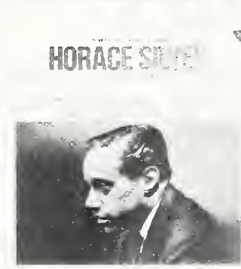
HERE TO STAY — Freddie Hubbard — Blue Note 496H2 — List: 7.98

Those who know Freddie Hubbard from his CTI or Columbia records don't really know him. Much of Hubbard's work for the past decade has been of a commercial nature but these two dates from 1961 and 62 present the pure musician in Hubbard. Cedar Walton and Philly Joe Jones are common to both dates and Jones plays beautiful drums throughout. The music is fiery in the Art Blakey tradition that Hubbard was raised in. A must for trumpet fans as well as Freddie's normally huge following.



THE TRIOS SIDES — Horace Silver — Blue Note 474H2 — List: 7.98

During the fifties and sixties when Horace Silver was working his excellent quintet he used to include an occasional trio track in his LPs. Blue Note has seen fit to collect those little gems and couple them with Silver's earliest Blue Notes which were also trio items. Four of the 1952 sides are new to LP and the fact that there is a track from as late as 1968 makes this set a panoramic potpourri of pianistic prowess from one of the finest. Silver will be celebrating his twenty-fifth anniversary with Blue Note this year making that (as well as this) some kind of record!



WEA Adds 10 LPs To 'Jazz' Series

NEW YORK — WEA International has added 10 albums to the 20 already released in its "That's Jazz" series.

The release includes LPs by Milt Jackson with Cannonball Adderley, Art Blakey, Horace Silver and Oscar Pettiford A.O.; the Charles Lloyd Quartet with Keith Jarrett, Cecil McBee and Jack De Johnette; Sonny Stitt with John Lewis, Jim Hall, Richard

Davis and Connie Kay; Chick Corea with Joe Farrell, Woody Shaw Jr., Steve Swallow and Joe Chambers; Lee Konitz and Wayne Marsh; Freddie Hubbard; and the Art Ensemble of Chicago, all on Atlantic. On Jazz

We write today of a little man who died Sunday January 2. He wasn't a man we knew or in fact had ever met, yet his loss is especially hard to bear. It is always tough to lose a giant and with the exception of physical stature **Erroll Garner** was a giant of jazz in every way.

Born and raised in Pittsburgh, Garner came to prominence in New York on 52nd St. The Street, as it was known, had a whole cluster of jazz clubs between Fifth and Sixth Ave. and Garner, first with **Slam Stewart's** trio, and then on his own worked in most of them at one time or another. Legend has it that he once worked three different clubs simultaneously!

In 1944 Garner began his recording career. It was an insane period for records because Columbia and RCA were still hassling with the AFM and only Decca had come to terms with the union. Literally hundreds of independent labels leaped into the marketplace while the two giants sat it out. Garner made the most of his opportunities. He made sessions for at least nineteen different labels from 1944 to 1951 as a leader!

In 1950 he began an association with Columbia which to many fans produced his finest works. Two early LPs stand out in our minds: "Erroll Garner Gems" and "The Most Happy Piano." Yet in September 1955 he recorded an album that put him into orbit: "Concert By The Sea." This became

one of the biggest selling jazz LPs of all time.

Garner had always been a popular artist. His 1945 recording of "Laura" on Savoy was his first hit and his own composition, "Misty," is one of the most popular songs of the past twenty years. "Misty" was not only a hit for Garner but also a smash for organist **Grove Holmes** and country singer **Ray Stevens**.

Beginning in 1958 Garner was booked by the **Sol Hurok** organization — the first jazz artist to be handled by the late impresario. This move effectively transferred Garner from the major leagues to the all star team. His feisty personal manager **Martha Glaser** always saw to it that he remained there.

Later record affiliations were with Mercury, ABC, Reprise and MGM and at one point Garner had his own label Octave. His last LPs were issued on London.

For an artist as popular and prolific as

Silver Album Heads Blue Note Releases

LOS ANGELES — Blue Note Records has eight albums scheduled for release in January, including Horace Silver's "Silver 'n' Words" marking his 25th year with the label. Also to be out this month will be the new album by Bobby Hutcherson, the new John Lee and Gerry Brown recording and reissues by Silver, Milt Jackson, Freddie Hubbard, Booker Ervin and Randy Weston.

Jessie Jackson Seeks Lyric Censorship; Artists Analyze

LOS ANGELES — The National Association of Broadcasters code board has recently asked broadcasters to screen new product more carefully, due to what they call an increased amount of "suggestive materials" reaching the airways. Reverend Jessie Jackson, head of Operation PUSH, has joined the bandwagon in a sense by seeking to create a rating system for records. Rev. Jackson will then seek to ban all "X-rated" product from the airways, because he feels that it influences black children to behave in an immoral fashion. Jackson cited such tunes as Johnny Bristol's "Do It To My Mind," Donna Summer's "Love To Love You Baby," Johnnie Taylor's "Disco Lady," K.C. & The Sunshine Band's "Shake Your Booty," Leon Haywood's "I Wanna Do Something Freaky To You" and The Four Tops "Catfish" as songs that lead the pack as highly suggestive materials.

Study Of Songs

A study of 337 best selling black-oriented songs from 1962-1973, conducted by a New York School of social research (Cash Box, July 12, 1975), shows black product to generally emphasize vigorous, assertive behavior, joy of life, love and most of all people. The study also showed black product had a greater incidence in a drive for group self-respect reflected in the lyric content. A conclusion of the survey was that black-oriented tunes generally refer to life's everyday trials and tribulations.

Dirty Minds

In speaking to several writers of what have been termed "sex rock" lyrics, one writer who preferred to remain anonymous told CB "there is more dirt in the minds of the people who say some songs are dirty than there is in the lyric content of the songs themselves."

Leon Haywood, who wrote and sang "I Wanna Do Something Freaky To You," voiced his respect for Rev. Jackson, and told CB "my lyric content implied love and nothing filthy was intended. I have children of my own, and I certainly wouldn't want to subject them to something that would have a negative effect on their morals. Therefore, I would not write anything that I felt would affect them in that manner. Many times lyrics are subject to misinterpretation, as in this case, but it cannot be helped."

Harvey Scales, co-writer of "Disco Lady," agreed by stating, "'Disco Lady' refers to dancing and has nothing to do with sex. The song was originally sung by my group a few years ago, Harvey Scales and the Seven Sounds, and was titled 'Shake It Up, Shake

It Down.' At the time, there was a dance out called the "push and pull" of which the movements were 'in and out,' which was captured in the lyrics. The song was tagged 'Disco Lady' because of the popularity of discos. I am very against songs that discuss crime and drugs, as I do believe that they do influence children, and reflecting back on the Superfly craze, 'that was one of the biggest influences remembered.'

K.C., of K.C. and the Sunshine Band, who wrote "Shake Your Booty" cited the fact that in the Florida area several radio stations were giving away prizes they were calling 'Booty' prizes, as in a pirate's booty. "I didn't have any sex related ideas in mind with relation to any of the songs I have written, only dancing. Booty is a word that children use, and I never felt that it was dirty."

And finally Johnny Bristol defended the lyrics as being poetic and romantic, and I am a bit irritated that someone would attach a meaning to the lyrics of my tunes that was never anticipated or intended." Bristol also noted the fact that sex is discussed freely and in its rawest form throughout the pages of the Bible, but no one dares to voice criticism of that.

LOS ANGELES — Diana Ross' new two-record set, "An Evening With Diana Ross," recorded live at Los Angeles' Ahmanson Theatre last year, is among 10 albums scheduled by Motown Records for release in January. Other major artists to have LPs out this month include Smokey Robinson, Syreeta, Jerry Butler, the Originals and Valerie Simpson. Albums by Michael Quatro, Wendel Adkins and the Ju-Par Universal Orchestra are also scheduled to be released on Motown subsidiary labels.

War will have a series of six albums to be released on ABC Records of previously unreleased materials recorded from 1969 to early '70s. Nevada Gaming School Offers Varied Instruction For Games Mechanics

LOS ANGELES — The Nevada Gaming School, a Las Vegas-based educational and training facility for coin machine mechanics, is a unique institution in that it's the only such school in the country to be accredited by the National Association of Trade and Technical Schools located in Washington, D.C. Because of the accreditation, the school is able to secure grant monies and other funds for over approximately 50% of its students. The result: an attractive place for students to learn a trade and gain placement in an industry that experiences growth with each successive year.

According to Hank Percell, director of administration and admissions at the school, over 150 students aged from 20 to 70 presently attend classes, and about 2,000 graduates have completed the program since the school's founding in 1969. With 25 full-time staff members, 11 instructors, and guest lecturers and teachers from various games manufacturers, the school offers training in the mechanics of slot machines, pinballs, video and arcade pieces.

"We have a continuous enrollment system," Percell explained, "and students are staggered at various stages in the program so that different students are completing the course at various times. It's a program that allows the individual to progress more or less on his own."

Day And Night Classes

Classes are offered days and nights. Day classes begin every Monday and are taught five hours per day, five days per week for 26 weeks. Evening classes also begin every Monday, but are taught four hours per evening, five evenings per week for 32½

weeks. Each student receives at least 650 hours of instruction. The classes include lessons in the basic theory of schematics, circuitry, troubleshooting, soldering, meters, Ohm's Law, and mechanical operations of various machines.

Students learn by working on different kinds of coin operated games built by a variety of manufacturers. However, most of the games used as teaching aids are made by Bally.

"We're an independent school," Percell explained, "but we also serve as a training school for Bally, which refers many of our students to us. We also use games by Williams, Chicago Coin and others, but about 75% of our games are by Bally. We recently had a Bally representative, Bernie Powers, here for a week as a guest teacher," Percell continued, who said lessons and lectures by manufacturer reps are frequently given and are important to the overall instruction.

Cost

The cost of attending the school, until recently, had been \$1,900 per program, but the Nevada State Board of Education recently authorized a fee hike to \$2,500. The registration fee is \$50.

The Nevada Gaming School has not only been successful in teaching the mechanics of coin operated games, but also in placing its graduates. The school maintains two full-time staff members who are responsible for finding jobs for program completers. "We have been able to place over 90% of our graduates," Percell said, "and we've placed them in a variety of locations. Not only do some of our students come from different places around the world, our graduates get placed around the world."

Cruise Ship, Jobs

Percell said the school has trained people for the Atlantic Maritime Service, with graduates taking jobs aboard luxury liner cruise ships outfitted with on-board casinos. "Two years ago," said Percell, "we trained 28 people for the Puerto Rican government to work in the state-owned casinos and gaming rooms there." Plans for the future, Percell said, include a train-

Newly Formed Stern Electronics, Inc. Purchases CDI/Chicago Coin Assets

CHICAGO — Stern Electronics, Inc., recently established Chicago-based firm, entered into an agreement with two local banks for the purchase of certain assets formerly owned by Chicago Dynamic Industries, Inc., noted amusement machine manufacturer which did business as Chicago Coin. The purchased assets were acquired by the banks at a foreclosure sale held this past December.

Stern Electronics will be managed by Sam Stern, prominent coin industry figure, and his son Gary, both of whom left similar positions at Williams Electronics, Inc. early last year. The firm is expected to commence production of pinball machines in the near future.



Sam Stern

Sam Stern began his career in the coin machine industry in 1931 as an operator in Philadelphia, subsequent to which he formed a distribution company he maintained in that city until 1946 when he became a co-owner of Williams Electronics, Inc. (then known as Williams Electronics Mfg. Co.). Stern and members of his

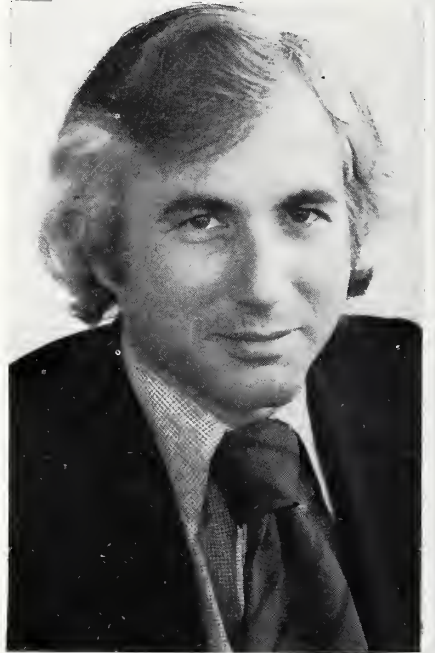
family ultimately became sole owners of the company.

During his lengthy tenure at Williams, Stern concentrated his efforts on managing the company's business as well as directing the design of the firm's games equipment.

Williams was sold to the Seeburg Corp. in 1964 and for a brief period in 1969-70 Stern served as executive vice president of Bally Manufacturing Corp.

Gary Stern joined Williams in 1973 after practicing law for several years and held the position of assistant to the president. After leaving Williams he and Stephen Kaufman formed Kiss Amusement Machines, Inc., a company which imports and exports coin machines.

Chicago Dynamic Industries, long considered one of the industry's major manufacturers of coin operated amusement equipment, was founded about 48 years ago by the late Sam Wolberg and Sam Gensburg, who remained active in its operation until the bank's foreclosure.

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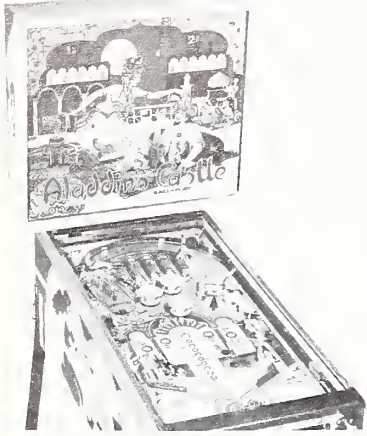

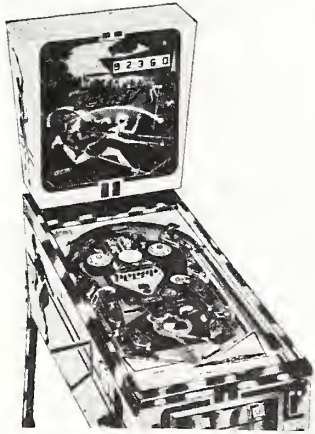

Chicago, Neil Diamond and Boz Scaggs, for \$3.48.

"There have been so many records priced this low by Strawberries and everybody else that we wanted to assert that we're still in the market," explained a spokesman for Lechmere. "We also came out with the Wings album for \$5.14 (a couple of weeks ago) in a full-page ad. It's just to get back the impact. Everybody's talking 'Strawberries,' so we're trying to show that our prices are as good as theirs."

The spokesman predicted that Lechmere would continue to promote albums for less than \$3.50 on a regular basis. "It may be once a month, but it won't be every week. I think you'll see it mostly on new releases. The catalog and everything else will be at its regular price (\$4.88)."

Will record prices begin rising again in Boston at some point in the coming months? "When the list price goes up, which it's going to," the spokesman replied. "I don't know what our price structure's going to be then. Right now for \$7.98 list albums it's \$5.88, but that's going to be a little too high."

\$2.99 Price In Dallas

L.P. Goodbuy, a five-unit retail chain owned by All-Label Distributors of Fort Worth, Texas, recently advertised the lowest record price and the lowest price for an all-label sale which has been observed in Dallas since the **Cash Box** Retail Price Survey began seven months ago. At Goodbuy's location in north Dallas only, all \$6.98 list releases were promoted for \$3.49/\$4.49 tape, and Brick's debut album on Bang Records was advertised for \$2.99.

Chuck Olson of All-Label Distributors stated that this was the first time a current release had ever been advertised for \$2.99 at a Goodbuy store. However, the chain has run all-label sales for \$3.49 at least twice before, and once within the past year. In addition, Goodbuy's shelf price was lowered two weeks ago from \$4.99 to \$3.89 for its \$6.98 list albums.

According to Olson, Goodbuy's major competitors in the Dallas-Fort Worth area are Sound Warehouse and Peaches, which opened a store in Dallas last September. Neither retailer has promoted current releases for under \$3.95 within the past seven months, although Sound Warehouse has been offering 40 rotating releases for

\$3.45 since August. Shelf prices at both Sound Warehouse and Peaches are more than a dollar above Goodbuy's regular store price for current items.

Asked why Goodbuy was undercutting these other retailers, Olson insisted that "we're just trying to meet them. They've come in on top of us every time we've opened up a store, and we're just trying to accumulate the sales and get the customers back that have left us and gone to them." Olson added that while he didn't know whether or not Goodbuy would maintain its \$3.89 shelf price for a long period, "I figure it's probably just a temporary thing."

'Intense' Competition

Goodbuy is not the only retailer in town which has sold a current LP for \$2.99. Sound Town, which has several stores in Dallas, has done the same thing on occasion, each time with one or two releases. In addition, Sound Town has run all-label sales for \$3.49 at some of its outlets.

Sound Warehouse, too, once offered a new album for less than \$3. According to Tracy Donihoo, one of the chain's store managers, "We sold Nitsinger's 'Live Better Electrically' (20th Century) for \$2.95 when he had a concert here at the store." However, Sound Warehouse has never run an all-label sale for \$3.49; its usual sale price is \$3.95/\$4.95 tape.

Donihoo said he didn't even regard L.P. Goodbuy or Sound Town as competitors. "Peaches is the only competition we have. The people that shop at Sound Town are the people who are out at the mall buying clothes. They'd just as soon buy their records while they're out. We're not after that kind of people. We're out for the record shoppers, the people who buy a couple of times a month or weekly. And our (everyday) prices, with the selection we have, is a lot better than anything they (Sound Town) could turn out." Asked for his reaction to Goodbuy's sale, Donihoo replied that he wasn't even aware of it.

Three blocks away at Goodbuy's Dallas store, on the other hand, manager Charley Bates seemed well aware of what was going on at Sound Warehouse. "They may be more competition than Peaches," he said, "because their prices seem to be a little better."

How strong is the competition in Dallas? "I'd say it was intense," Bates answered.

and if the price were \$7.98 they'd probably purchase it. It will be interesting to see what happens when other selected albums are released at the new price."

A Columbia spokesman added that the new Pink Floyd price "follows what we consider to be a longtime variable pricing concept, pegging an album at its proper price level."

No Hike On Tapes

WEA, making official information known for some time, issued a press release announcing a one-price policy for all configurations on specific releases that carry a \$7.98 LP list. CBS' will have identical list for tape versions of Pink Floyd's latest, and RCA follows suit with Bowie.

While citing the mounting costs of album production, however, WEA noted that "WCI labels have enjoyed the benefits of economies in the cost of tape manufacturing."

WEA president Joel Friedman commented that it was "WEA's policy to attempt to pass on these savings to our customers" and "attempt to fill a need that dealers and rack jobbers have been asking be filled for some time." Friedman added that "a long-playing record is still priced at less than the

admission of two or more family members to a single performance of most other entertainment attractions."

'Selective'

A key word used in statements and releases by WEA, CBS and RCA is the term "selective." Officials from the three firms were unanimous in their insistence that across-the-board hikes on LPs were purely conjecture at this time. RCA emphasized that some LPs may be priced lower than industry observers might expect. "In line with selected suggested list pricing," RCA stated, "a new deluxe two-record set celebrating 10 years of Jefferson Airplane, 'Jefferson Airplane: Flight Log 1966-1976,' will carry a special low suggested list price of \$10.98."

Boycott Till February

The Portland-centered boycott of \$7.98 list price LPs will go on until the end of January, according to Tom Keenan, president of Everybody's Record Company. Music Millennium was also involved in the Queen LP boycott, but company spokesmen were unavailable for comment due to a sales meeting in San Francisco. In the face of other manufacturers' breaking \$7.98 list LPs, and without the boycott spreading to other areas, it appears the "revolt against Queen" has failed.

ABKCO Posts Loss For Its 1976 Fiscal Year

NEW YORK — ABKCO Industries, Inc. lost \$628,403 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 1976; in fiscal 1975, it posted earnings of \$39,383. During 1976, the company's revenues dropped to \$7,180,144 from \$8,676,775 in the previous year.

ABKCO incurred expenses during 1976 of \$1,200,000 which were connected to litigation with the Apple Companies. During

the previous year, such expenses totaled approximately \$840,000.

The company's operations for the fourth quarter ended September 30, 1976 resulted in a loss of \$174,008, as compared to a loss of \$170,054 for the prior-year period. Fourth-quarter revenues increased to \$1,984,559 from \$1,711,022 for the same period in 1975.

O&H Entertainments Seeks Global Foothold In The Leisure Industry

LONDON — A recent arrival here on the leisure industry scene is O&H Entertainments. Founded by two former record company marketing men, Olav Wyper and Geoff Hannington, the company is funded by Marshall Cavendish, a major public company in magazine and part-work publishing.

O&H is the umbrella for Logo Records, Logo Music, Logo Management and Logo Entertainments, the constituent divisions of the Wyper-Hannington enterprise.

Logo Music is the publishing arm headed by Robb Gold, a classically trained pianist and songwriter formerly with Island Music. Logo Records has signed Meal Ticket, Dave Skinner, Jackdaw, Michael Price and Vana, and Logo Entertainments holds the rights to various stage, television and film properties that Hannington and Wyper have developed individually during the last 12 months.

Partnership

The partnership of Geoff Hannington and Olav Wyper was first mooted in 1969 when both of them were employed by Phonogram. At one time they discussed leaving the company to start their own business along present lines, but the notion didn't progress beyond talk primarily because of the success of the progressive Vertigo label with which they were both closely involved.

Subsequently they both departed for RCA, where they again discussed starting their own company. As it happened, Wyper left RCA to join the TRO Essex organization, where he remained for four and a half years, and Hannington stayed at RCA, eventually becoming managing director.

"By the time he left RCA and started on his own, I was on my own," said Wyper, "and it seemed reasonable to get together

and do what we'd been talking about. Marshall Cavendish approached us to start a leisure-based company. Ninety percent of our time is occupied in the music scene at present, and Geoff and I do everything together in business terms. Our first priority is to get the Logo label established, and we're also contemplating a licensing deal of some kind."

They are thinking in global terms rather than merely a UK deal, and Hannington describes the process as "a jigsaw puzzle." They have been impressed by overseas reaction to their venture, and disappointed by local apathy.

Germany Quickest

Germany was quickest off the mark with trips to London by several executives of various companies. America and other European countries have also been attentive, but the UK as a whole has taken little notice to date.

"On the subject of a label deal, we've made it very clear that if both parties are interested, we must go around the major territories and do a product presentation to make sure those territories are also interested because otherwise it won't work," said Wyper.

"The major problem for small independent labels is putting the jigsaw together," added Hannington. "It has to be done on a global basis. Most majors are only interested in a global or semi-global deal, but we're not happy about that unless their overseas companies say they want the label and are prepared to work on territories of the world.

"The people who have come through the door since we started operations and asked if we can do anything for them have been an eye-opener for us. Some of them are quite big acts near the end of their present contracts and wanting a change."

CBS Canada Finishes Strong Year With Gold and Platinum Releases

TORONTO — A year-end ad placed by CBS Canada in one of the domestic trade papers disclosed that the label had chalked up an "average of one gold or platinum record every three days."

The fact of the matter is that CBS Records in Canada, as elsewhere, is one of the best selling labels at present. The past year-end quarter's sales were very high, and the twelve month period overall last year showed impressive and healthy gains. On the average, the label issued a gold or platinum record every eight days during 1976.

The first platinum single in the label's history in Canada came from Tina Charles and "I Love To Love," while debut albums from Boston and Burton Cummings turned gold within weeks of release.

Sales Patterns

With the significant sales patterns arising from past year it is necessary to assess the relative strength of the label's operation in Canada. Aside from the corporate name change from Columbia Records of Canada Ltd. to CBS Records and CBS Disques (French division) Canada Ltee., expansion took place in marketing and A&R departments, as both operations grew in terms of office space and personnel. The label also instituted a full-time manager of press relations for the first time this past year.

Casablanca And Bellaphon In Pact

LOS ANGELES — Casablanca Record and FilmWorks has concluded a licensing agreement with Bellaphon Records of Frankfurt for the release of Casablanca product in Germany, Austria and Switzerland, it was announced by Mauri Lathower, vice president, international affairs. The deal was negotiated by Dick Etlinger, Casablanca's director of business affairs and Branco Zivanovic of Bellaphon.

The Bellaphon agreement is one of several that the label expects to conclude in Europe within the near future. Others will be negotiated at the MIDEM convention.

International Executives On The Move

Tee Vee Int. Appointment — Dave Harding has been appointed vice president-general manager at Tee Vee Int. of Toronto, Canada. Dan LaRoche has been named general manager of the newly created Tee Vee Int. American division, headquartered in Nashville.

Quality Records Tabs Winslow — Harold Winslow has been named executive assistant to Jack Vermeer, vice president marketing at Quality Records in Toronto. Winslow will be responsible for national sales and promotion activities.

Bibby Names Richards — Scott Richards has been appointed vice president marketing for MCA Records (Canada). Bob Johnson has been named national promotion manager in Canada, replacing Richards. Johnson had previously been the MCA Montreal/Ottawa branch manager for the past four years.

Movement To End Service-Ticket System In Japan Will Continue

TOKYO — The movement to abolish the so-called "service-ticket" system at the retail level in Japan is growing throughout the country. And at the forefront of the effort is Japan's Record Retailer's Union (JRRU), whose target is complete elimination of the practice sometime this year.

Retail Prices

As reported by *Cash Box* (Sept. 11, 1976), the retail prices of records and tapes in Japan are mutually set by manufacturers and retailers according to contractual agreement. With no discount sales as such, retailers are left to compete with one another through publicity, display advertising, and after-service policies. This has been the established commercial practice since the music industry began in Japan, and both manufacturers and members of the retailers' union are reportedly eager to preserve the contract system.

However, this system has been violated

Campaign Is Launched For ZZ Top Release

MONTREAL — London Records has launched an important retail and trade promotion campaign to announce the release of ZZ Top's new album, "Tejas."

The campaign includes a 4' by 6' three-dimensional standup of the group; divider cards that will double as mobiles; posters, stickers, t-shirts, streamers; ZZ Top styro-foam letters, and jigsaw puzzles. A dealer and racker incentive is also being offered on the entire ZZ Top catalog.

To consolidate and unify the whole CBS Records Canada operation, both the A&R department and April-Blackwood Publishing, with Wayne Patton as director, moved into the head office of CBS in Toronto.

The formation of CBS Disques Canada Ltee., with John Desjardins as marketing director and John Williams as A&R director, reinforced the CBS presence in Quebec. The accelerated interest in its development was confirmed by the announcement that Joe Dassin had signed a long term contract with CBS Disques, after a period of absence since 1971.

Signing

Also signed in the past year was Quebec's Harmonium, whose first album for the label, a double set, went gold within three weeks of release, in addition to Sequin and Gilles Valiquette.

Michel Pagliaro, Fosterchild and Jackson Hawke also signed and met with success; Pagliaro is on the verge of becoming a major box office draw in France. Jackson Hawke, meanwhile, has had three top 40 singles from the debut album "Forever," now released in the U.S. through CBS Records, Inc.

In 1976 CBS Records in Canada issued 14 gold singles, 1 platinum single, 19 gold albums and 10 platinum albums.

April Wine Kicks Off Major Tour

MONTREAL — Canada's April Wine kicked off the first major concert tour of the new year Jan. 4 in Cornwall, Ont., in support of their latest Aquarius Records album release, "Forever For Now."

The tour is being staged in three legs, the first covering central Ontario and western Canada. Label president Terry Flood recently returned from a major U.S. promotional tour, coordinated by London Records to gather information on the group's recent "Whole World's Goin' Crazy" album which is now on international release. The album, released in Canada in the early part of 1976, proved to be the Montreal act's bridge to stardom at home, as it was shipped platinum and achieved total album sales of 150,000 units before year end, a figure that translates into platinum plus gold in Canada.

The new tour is being backed by London Records in Canada at the retail level, while Aquarius has bought radio spots in all major markets and is placing billboard album ads in at least two major markets, including Toronto.

Aquarius has culled the title track as the first single from the album.

Back In The U.S.S.R.; Beatle Double Album And Rock Music For Soviets

LOS ANGELES — Rock music, surprisingly, is somewhat alive and relatively well in the Soviet Union these days, and is no longer regarded with the disdain formerly accorded it. At various levels within Soviet society, long hair and rock music are going legitimate with a degree of approval that was not to be found even a few years ago.

As reported recently by the Associated Press, government stores in Russia will soon feature a two-record album by the Beatles, and the LP is believed to be the first western rock music ever sold legally in the country. The album, imported from EMI records of Britain under the Soviet Melodia label, will sell at the fixed government price for light music of \$2.86 a disk, according to the wire report.

In the past, Soviet newspapers claimed that Beatlemania had no influence in the country, while black market Beatle albums sold underground for \$50 to \$100 each. The Communist party mouthpiece Pravda once called Beatle music "giggles and yells" which played a "major role in turning men into beasts."

However, recent Soviet newspaper accounts have gone so far as to quote Paul McCartney, who is reported to have said of the Soviet people regarding a rumored Wings tour of the Soviet Union, "We'd like to come and see you. Music plays an important role in the contemporary world. The fact that it unites people with each other is extremely important."

Soviet authorities believe the worst

western music violates the ideals of music as a political tool to present "humanistic and profound democratic content... the Leninist theme," as Pravda has stated.

Rock music that uplifts so-called Soviet ideals is acceptable, however, and Soviet officials have been active screening music for entry into the country. Country artist Roy Clark recently completed a successful tour of Russia, as did Britain's Cliff Richard last fall. The door is now being opened, apparently, and Russian culture is no doubt in for a change.

Brazilian Sales: A Local Emphasis

BRAZIL — Adiel Macedo de Carvalho, president of the independent Copacabana Records Label (Som Industria e Comercio) of Brazil, recently announced that 80 percent of the company's record sales is now Brazilian product, and that the figure represents "a nationalistic drive of the local market, especially in the north and northeast of the country, where the company has a strong distribution."

The company locally distributes artists Benito di Paula and Wando, among others; as for its internationally oriented activities, Copacabana distributes United Artists, Casablanca, and numerous independent European and American producers.

Contacted by **Cash Box**, Carvalho reported that 1976 was a "particularly good year for LPs and cassettes, which are having much more expansion than singles." Asked about the company's plans for the upcoming year, Carvalho said he wants to be able "to press 1.7 million records monthly and to expand his cassette duplication facilities. We are also studying the possibilities of getting more international exposure for our own artistic productions." He said the major problem presently facing the Brazilian music industry was a shortage of raw materials and high prices for that which is available. He added that he didn't see "an immediate future for videodisc or videocassette technology, because of government restrictions on the importation of hardware." He said LPs would remain the dominant product in the country for the immediate future.

Watanabe Productions Completes New Studio

TOKYO — K. K. Sound City, a subsidiary company of Watanabe Productions, has completed its newest recording studio. The facility occupies approximately 1,910 square meters and includes five separate studios along with dubbing, film developing and optical-recording rooms. Total cost of construction was reportedly \$2.8 million.

Argentinian News

BUENOS AIRES — Sergio Denis, for several years one of the top teen artists in the country, marked his comeback to the music business ten months ago with a new single and an LP, and most recently starred in a network television special aired the last week of December. The artist, who previously recorded for CBS, is now on the TK label, and there are strong promotion plans regarding the other Spanish-speaking countries of Latin America.

Juan Marcelo, another artist recently returned to recording, has also switched labels. Formerly with RCA, Marcelo now records with CBS, and is again active as a teenage artist occasionally involved in music for television and other special projects.

Satisfaction

Cabal Records manager Edmundo Calcagno reported to **Cash Box** his satisfaction regarding the results of the recent promotion and sales convention held in Cordoba, one of the biggest regional markets in this country, and also discussed expansion plans for 1977, which include new sales forces in provinces not adequately covered previously.

Microfon's president Mario Kaminsky has returned from a two-month trip to Europe and the U.S. in which he held talks with executives of the Spanish label Hispavox.

Cat Stevens To Record

MORIN HEIGHTS, QUE. — Cat Stevens recently returned to Le Studio to mix his new A&M album. Stevens' last album, "Numbers," was also recorded at Le Studio.

Following Stevens' departure will be Ian Hunter who will record a new CBS album produced by Roy Thomas Baker.

Miller Pulls Platinum

ONTARIO — Steve Miller's "Fly Like An Eagle" album will be awarded a platinum album on January 26, when Miller stops in Vancouver for a concert appearance.

Nine-Month '76 Audio-Video Imports Up 100% Over 1975

LOS ANGELES — Imports of audio and video products registered in the nine month period from January 1976 to September 1976 increased 100 percent over that same period in 1975, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce. The import totals, which include transceivers and video tape equipment, totaled \$2.52 billion as compared to \$1.25 billion in the first nine months of 1975.

Imports from Japan led the increase, accounting for 80 percent of the additional \$1.25 billion registered during 1976. The imports from Japan were paced by major gains in color and monochrome TVs, auto citizens' band radios, stereophonic equipment and auto radios.

Color TV imports rose sharply from 766 thousand to just over 1.9 million units, a 154 percent increase, with about 90 percent of the shipments originated in Japan. Imports of monochrome TVs were up 42.5 percent to 3.1 million units. Taiwan, with shipments of 1.8 million sets, or 59 percent of the total, remained the leading foreign supplier.

Auto Radio Imports Increase

Automobile radio imports totaled 4.6 million units, a 72 percent increase over the 2.7 million units posted for the first nine

months of last year. The two leading importers recorded were Japan, which registered an increase of 131 percent to 2.3 million units, and Brazil, up 78 percent to 1.3 million units.

Imports of auto radios from Canada, recorded as the leading foreign supplier through 1974, dropped almost 40 percent, from 719 thousand to 434 thousand units. The bulk of imported auto radios from Canada entered the U.S. duty free as part of original motor vehicle equipment under the provisions of the Automotive Products Trade Agreement of 1965, according to the Commerce Dept. report.

Transceivers increased 311 percent to \$664 million, with automobile CBs leading that increase. Auto CBs showed a gain of 1.3 million to 8.7 million units.

Major unit import gains were also registered in enclosed loudspeakers, up 129.7 percent; phonographs/record players/turntables, up 95.1 percent; tape recorders/players, up 68.7 percent and home type radios, up 30.6 percent. Imports of video tape equipment including both recorder/player combinations and players, showed an increase of 55.6 percent to 196 thousand units.

Retailers Project Their Shelf & Sale \$7.98 Prices

time. Following closely behind those were the figures \$4.99, \$5.97 and \$6.49, each receiving 7 1/2% of the total response.

Retailers are expressing mixed feelings about how they think \$7.98 list LPs will sell and the measures they are taking to see the public through the transition to higher prices. The following comments by store owners, distributors and executives typify the comments of retailers throughout the country.

Steve Libman, vice-president of Atlanta's S.G. Records, which runs nine Music Scene stores, and Emerald City Records, which owns and operates one Oz Records store, said those stores will sell \$7.98 LPs at a regular price of \$5.97 and on sale for \$4.97. "If nobody breaks that mark, I can live with it," Libman said. "Unless somebody starts playing around with that price and selling them for \$3.99, we should have a pretty stable market here in Atlanta."

Albums carrying the \$7.98 retail price will be selling for \$4.49 to \$4.59 on sale at

Mushroom Records in New Orleans. Fred Banes, assistant manager and buyer for Mushroom, said, "We might go as low as \$4.29, but we'll wait and see what our competition is doing." Banes said he thinks a sale price of \$4.99 is higher than he will go because "you usually don't run a sale to make money. You have a sale to promote the store, so we are going to go as low as we can without losing money."

'Retailers Can Stop Crying'

With the advent of the \$7.98 single disc; "retailers can stop crying and singing the blues and finally start making some money," commented Dale Dingman, who serves nearly 500 stores through the Mile High one-stop in Denver. "The consensus is that we're not going to see any great increases from the wholesalers, so the real test will be to see how the public reacts." Dingman said the stores he deals with have pretty much settled on \$4.99 as the sale price of the albums, and \$5.89 to \$5.99 as the most common regular price.

Gary's Records in Richmond, Va. is currently offering \$7.98 list albums for \$6.98. Although no sale price has yet been agreed upon, Martin Gary, vice-president of the four-store chain, said, "If we get co-ops from the manufacturers we'll be able to sell them for less than \$6.98. Hopefully they won't go as low as \$3.99, which is what we charge for those." He also commented, "We might be able to offer the bigger artists for less, but we'll have to see what everyone else does."

John Netter, manager of Rocky Mountain Records and Tapes in Boulder, said his current regular selling price of \$5.98 may be reduced if customers are reluctant to buy the higher priced LPs. He is presently selling the Queen album at his normal \$7.98 sale price of \$4.99, but said that may change too. "If they (record companies) come out with a lot of \$7.98 list albums, I think we're going to have to lower prices, at least for a little while, to get the customers to buy them," Netter said.

Copyright Blamed

Bob Heinlein, owner of Record Wholesalers in Orange, said he thinks part of the reason for the increase in retail list prices is because of the new copyright law which pays artists higher royalties for their albums. "Now they (recording artists) are getting 2 3/4 cents instead of a penny, the price of oil went up 10 cents and there you go." Heinlein doesn't think the public will protest as much to this increase as they did when the list price went to \$6.98 from \$5.98, because it is being done gradually rather than all at once. "The thinking in the industry is that if the new Stevie Wonder album cost \$20 it would still sell a million."
