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

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EDITORIAL The Loading Zone

The trend of late to ship more and more product may be satisfying some egos, but the practice seems to be putting a strain on the manufacturer-retail partnership. Although the ongoing industry philosophy of insuring sales by shipping large quantities is valid, there is a point at which "loading" becomes a burden for all involved.

Retailers have commented recently they are willing to work with the labels, and even "bend" under pressure on specific projects. But they also said when stacks of over-shipped releases sit in their warehouses, they feel no push to return payment.

Labels, on the other hand, are pushing for heavier quantities to go out for greater industry exposure

and a variety of other reasons. Unfortunately, this does not always produce the desired results.

The psychological implications of this situation are not consistently working in the manufacturers' favor. For example as a store manager looks around to see huge numbers of a specific album, he loses sight of the fact that the LP may be selling well. Consequently, in some cases, reports to the trades are missed.

Some albums have enough industry anticipation that they demand large shipments, but fast and furious re-order patterns can generate more excitement in the business than massive initial shipments.





4,000 Converge On Nashville For Annual Country DJ Week

NASHVILLE — This bedrock community of country music is celebrating this week. With DJ Week and the 53rd Grand Ole Opry Birthday Celebration reaching the halfway mark, Nashville is swollen with the influx of music industry figures absorbing the best and brightest country music has to offer.

More than 4,000 country DJs, music executives, artists, songwriters, publishers, producers and journalists from around the world are swarming here and taking in the glitter and fellowship of the countless parties, receptions, meetings, and record company showcases which are running nearly around the clock.

All the hotels and motels are filled to capacity, and constant activity bustles in downtown Municipal Auditorium, The Grand Ole Opry House, The Opryland Hotel, The Hyatt-Regency and The Sheraton Hotel. Chamber of Commerce spokesmen have estimated more than \$1 million will be brought into Nashville this week because of country music week.

Record company heads from all major labels have flown in, and most companies have scheduled business conferences sandwiched in between the other activities.

The Country Music Association Awards Show, which normally kicks off DJ Week, was held one week earlier this year because of a conflict with the World Series telecast. The awards show was televised nationally on prime time by CBS-TV, and the CMA voted RCA's Dolly Parton its 1978

"Entertainer of the Year." Johnny Cash hosted the 90-minute special which also named ABC's Don Williams as its "Male Vocalist of the Year" and United Artists' Crystal Gayle as its "Female Vocalist of the Year."

The Nashville Songwriters Association, Int. (NSAI) actually opened country music week this year on Oct. 15 when the association held its 9th annual Awards show and elected Hank Snow, Tom T. Hall, Joe Allison and Don Wayne into the Songwriters Hall of Fame here. Wesley Rose of Acuff-Rose Publishing was awarded the prestigious "President's Award" for outstanding service to Nashville's songwriters.

Industry Move Toward \$8.98 List Price On Domestic LPs Would Boost Sales Of Imports

LOS ANGELES — Now that the move has begun toward more and more \$8.98 list albums, sales of import records will grow faster than ever as the price difference between domestic releases and foreign product continues to shrink, says Rick Lawler, general manager of Jem Records, the nation's largest importer.

"The closer the price of an import comes to the price of an American record," Lawler said, "the more incentive there is (for the consumer) to spend the small amount of extra money it takes to buy an import to get a higher quality piece of merchandise."

Since most retailers are selling \$8.98 list LPs in the \$6-\$7 range (**Cash Box**, Oct. 21), the increase puts those "selected"

CBS/Jet Injunction Lifted In Suit Against Promo, Levy

LOS ANGELES — A temporary injunction obtained by CBS Inc. and Jet Records, which would have blocked Promo Records and its president, Morris Levy, from selling any copies of Electric Light Orchestra's "Out Of The Blue" LP, was lifted Friday (20) in New Jersey State Superior Court.

The court granted the injunction two days earlier in response to a suit filed by CBS and Jet which seeks to prevent Promo and Levy from selling more than 1 million ELO LPs sold to Promo by United Artists Records. The suit will now continue through regular channels.

The suit alleges that Promo, a New Jersey-based cutout distributor, purchased approximately 1.2 million units of ELO's "Out Of The Blue" recording, including 865,519 albums, 32,816 cassettes and 348,641 eight-track tapes, from United Artists Music and Records Group (MRG) after MRG had already contracted to sell its entire inventory of that LP (along with its stock of certain other records) to Jet Records. It is also alleged that MRG and its co-principals, Artie Mogull and Jerry Rubenstein, had segregated these albums from the product that they turned over to Jet when that label switched its distribution from MRG to CBS.

Sold For Less

Furthermore, the suit contends, MRG sold these albums to Promo for much less than the current wholesale price for full-line LPs. Consequently, the suit states, Promo can resell the albums to dealers at a much lower price than Jet/CBS can, and the affected retailers would naturally return whatever they had bought from Jet for full credit.

Finally, according to the suit, "a substantial portion" of the records, cassettes and tapes that MRG diverted from Jet and sold to Promo are "warped or otherwise defective." Putting these copies on the market would result in "a loss of goodwill towards Jet as manufacturer and ELO as the performer."

CBS and Jet base their statement about the records' allegedly defective condition upon samplings of other "Out Of The Blue" albums in warehouses around the country. In addition, during the course of a separate suit brought against MRG by Jet last July in Los Angeles Superior Court, a witness for the prosecution testified that he had sampled ELO albums in a St. Louis warehouse and had found 41% of them to be defective. However, this finding was disputed by a witness for the defense, and a temporary restraining order which Jet had sought to prevent MRG from selling any of its "Out Of The Blue" albums was denied. The court suggested that both parties produce more evidence to support their arguments.

At this point in the California suit, both sides agreed to enter into negotiations for an out-of-court settlement. A "moratorium" was declared on sales of the ELO album; no new court papers were to be filed; and further investigation of the product's condition was suspended.

On September 18, discussions between the two sides broke down. The next day, according to the CBS/Jet suit in New Jersey, Promo signed a contract with MRG for the sale of the ELO albums. Citing a portion of that contract, the CBS/Jet suit charges that Levy bought the goods with full knowledge of the allegations that had been made in

CBS To Start Printing Bar Code On LPs In 1979

NEW YORK — CBS Records will begin to carry the printed bar coding system on some of its album jackets early in 1979, fulfilling a prediction made by Bruce Lundvall, president of CBS Records Division, at the 1978 NARM Convention.

CBS is currently in the process of developing an effective method of bar coding record albums, and the company has taken the position that bar coding can benefit manufacturers, as well as wholesalers and retailers.

A number of other major manufacturers have also applied for and/or received bar coding numbers. At press time, spokesman for Warner Brothers and Elektra/Asylum could not be reached for comment on the CBS move. Sal Uterano, vice president of national sales for Atlantic Records, said that Atlantic has not had recent discussions regarding implementation of bar coding.

not of our own making. We don't make our prices, they are subject to the prices we are charged by European manufacturers and also by international currency exchange rates. As most people know, that has been very unfavorable to the American dollar in the last six months or so."

Dollar Devaluation

Because the dollar has continued to slide in value in relation to foreign currencies, Lawler said it has cost Jem more to buy records in recent months and they had to increase their prices a few months back.

But since a domestic \$8.98 list LP is sold to dealers for \$4.50-\$5, imports, generally selling for \$5-\$5.25 on what they classify as an \$8.98 album, are back into competition.

Tower Records' Hollywood store carries a large number of import records and store manager Bob Delaney says a list price increase on American releases will make imports more competitive.

But he also said price is only one of

Farrell Forms Two Publishing Firms

LOS ANGELES — Wes Farrell, a 20-year veteran of the music publishing field, has formed two new, Los Angeles-based music firms. Westcraft Music Company (BMI) and Bullhorn Music Company (ASCAP). The formation of these two publishing companies marks Farrell's re-entrance into music publishing since he sold his music organization in June 1977.

In recent weeks, Farrell stated that he has staffed his new companies with a "complete staff of writers that have the gifted abilities to compose for all phases of the music industry."

To date, Westcraft and Bullhorn have acquired approximately 100 songs for records, motion pictures, television and commercials. Among the represented composers are Leslie Bricusse, Bob Merrill, Bradford Craig and himself.

The companies will be able to supply "artists and producers with a great variety of material," Farrell stated. The firms are also negotiating for various important catalogs, he added.

"We shall build a powerful company," asserted Farrell. "I believe that within this new venture, we will accomplish the building of a new company that will immediately embrace the interests of the entire music industry."

Kirshner And CBS Are Partners In Publishing Firm

NEW YORK — CBS Records group and Kirshner Entertainment Company have jointly formed a partnership, Kirshner/CBS Music Publishing, which encompasses the present Kirshner catalog and its staff on writers as well as all future activities of Don Kirshner Music (BMI) and Kirshner Songs (ASCAP). The enterprise, which is the first music publishing partnership in which CBS has been involved, will be managed by the Kirshner Music operation under the direction of Herb Moelis, executive vice president of Kirshner Entertainment Company, working in conjunction with Rick Smith, vice president and general manager of April Blackwood, the music publishing arm of CBS Records.

Walter Yetnikoff, president of the CBS/Records Group, commented, "This new agreement with Don Kirshner is the most important move we have made in the music publishing field and is a major part of our long-term plans for growth. Don Kirshner's extraordinary record of success in all possibilities that this collaboration will enable us to carry out."

Kirshner's two music publishing operations include over 600 compositions, including Kansas' "Dust In The Wind." Back catalog hits include the Archies' "Sugar, Sugar" and Frankie Avalon's "Venus." Kirshner has also worked with such top

Licensing Process For Plus Profit Items Grows Complex

NEW YORK — An essential aspect of much plus profit merchandise, and the one most closely connected with the record industry, is the reproduction of a recording artist's name and likeness on a product. Before that process can take place, though, an important legal document must be validated: the artist's license agreement.

In the agreement, the artist gives permission to a third party to exploit the artist's name and likeness on tangible goods for profit.

This legal agreement, however, is far from a simple giveaway at a 10-15% royalty rate. In the past five years, in fact, artist's license agreements have become, according to Dell Furano, president of Winterland Productions, "extremely sophisticated and complex. The deals are becoming more and more innovative."

The most important aspect of the agreement is still, of course, the amount of royalties that the artist will receive, and how that price is determined. Percentages range from 10% to 25%, and the percentage is usually derived from the average wholesale price of the item.

Licensing Period

The length of the licensing period is also an essential element of the agreement, as are the specific markets in which the merchandiser may sell the product. Also, the artist's quality control over the manufactured products has become an increasingly crucial area of license agreements. Lee Freidman, president of Boutwell, Inc., a Los Angeles firm that handles merchandising of Kiss products, stresses that every Kiss product "must be approved by myself and Bill Aucoin, Kiss' manager."

Artists are also demanding detailed accountability from merchandisers, according to Elliot Hoffman, a prominent record industry attorney and supervisor of

Star/Rights Co., an artist licensing company. "We want access to the manufacturer's books and records," Hoffman says. "In fact, we will not sign an agreement until we have first investigated the particular company. Then we want to make sure the product will be well handled, properly distributed, and completely accounted for."

Guarantees

Another aspect of the artist license agreement that is the subject of increasing controversy is the guarantee demanded by the artist from the manufacturer. Jim Bickhart, A&R supervisor for Warners Special Products, a division of the corporation that handles licensing for various artists, asserts that guarantees "may be the bane of license agreements now. Artists are trying to take advantage of them, but very often the manufacturers are getting hurt."

Winterland's Furano, though feels that the guarantee situation is beginning to level



NEW YORK — In a ceremony planned by the Carroll County Chamber of Commerce and CBS Records, Samuel Burger, senior vice president of manufacturing operations for CBS, broke ground for the company's new record and tape facility in Carrollton, Georgia. The Carrollton plant, expected to eventually employ some 300 people, is said to be the largest such installation in the world. According to a local spokesperson for the project, more than 500 persons will be employed during the peak construction periods.

The Universal/Motown film, "The Wiz," is based on the 1900 novel by L. Frank Baum, "The Wonderful Wizard of Oz," but director Sidney Lumet, producer Rob Cohen, scriptwriter Joel Schumacher, and a cast of other industry notables brought together an all-star cast including Diana Ross, Michael Jackson, Nipsey Russell, Ted Ross, Mabel King, Richard Pryor, Lena Horne, to transform one of America's classic fables into an urban fantasy.

The soundtrack, which shipped platinum and was #94 with a bullet on the **Cash Box** Album chart last week, seems destined to break wide open on the eve of the film's release, while the album's first single, "Ease On Down The Road," featuring Diana Ross and Michael Jackson continues to climb up the singles charts, last week reaching #40.



"I enjoy performing more than anything," says recording artist-songwriter Angelo. "I'm waiting for the day when I can play to my audience instead of having to win them over — and by the time I win them over and get warmed up, the show is over."

Judging by Angelo's first two albums on Fantasy, that day is not far off. Angelo is an excellent singer, a fine songwriter and a shrewd judge of songs to cover. His most recent LP, "Midnight Prowler," includes two Billy Joel songs and one each by J.D. Souther and John Fogerty as well as four written by Angelo and his lyricist, Anne Newton.

On his recent mini-tour Angelo opened for the David Bromberg Band. "It was hard to go on stage with no advance billing, with no name on the marquee," Angelo notes.

Even when his name is on the marquee it's a short one. Soon after Angelo moved from the east coast to Los Angeles in the early '70s to crack the music business, he signed with Sergio Mendes as a singer and spent the next few years touring with Mendes and his group. It was Mendes who suggested that Angelo drop his last name.

"Hooking up with Sergio Mendes was a great thing for me at that time," remembers Angelo. "We toured all over the U.S. and Japan. I was pretty green then and it was a great learning experience."

In 1971 Angelo put out a single on Atlantic called "Hey, Look At The Sun." The song was later covered by Mendes and Jose Feliciano.

Angelo's current label, Fantasy, was interested in him soon after he won the best vocalist award at the 1971 Pacific Coast Collegiate Jazz Festival, but Angelo threw in with Mendes instead. In 1975 Fantasy finally did sign him, after a deal with Bell Records that yielded no product. Angelo has now released two LPs for Fantasy, and third is on the drawing board for early next year.

When he first arrived on the west coast, Angelo was more a jazz musician. His early jazz influences show through on his self-titled debut album and in the players he has chosen to support him on his albums, such as Lee Ritenour and Randy Brecker. "In my early career I was a jazz drummer," says Angelo, "it wasn't until I came to California that I got into pop."

Now Angelo's music is closer in style to that of his brother, Bobby Arvon, another pop artist. Another brother, Pat, is part of Angelo's current band.

Pat isn't the only family member who works professionally with Angelo. His mother-in-law, Anne Newton, is his current lyricist.

"I love writing songs, writing good material," says Angelo, "but I hate to formulate lyrics — it drives me crazy. I've worked with a lot of different lyricists, but right now I'd have to say Anne's the best."

"We first wrote together as a fun thing, but I really liked her lyrics and we hit it off just great personally. So now when I want to work on new songs I go to Chicago where she lives and work with her there."

"I've also been writing some with Danny Seraphine, Chicago's drummer," adds Angelo.

Angelo has paid his dues and appears on the verge of a break in his career. An edited version of "I've Loved These Days" is going to be his next single, and many observers believe it could make Angelo Fantasy's biggest pop act since Credence Clearwater Revival.



Peter C. Johnson

It's not often that a newly signed recording artist is trusted by his or her record company to self-produce their debut album. And it's absolutely unheard of for a company to allow a newly signed artist to actually record their debut album, completely alone in a small apartment.

Yet that's exactly what happened when A&M Records signed Peter C. Johnson, a dropout seminarian from Harvard who had settled into the Cambridge folk scene. Johnson, who is now 32, began playing guitar 12 years ago "after I first heard Bob Dylan on the car radio."

After graduating from Trinity College, Johnson attended Harvard Divinity graduate school from 1968 to 1969. At the same time, he says, "I was playing in a bar down the street at Harvard Square." Johnson ended this conflict by choosing a career in music, and formed his first band, The Manic-Depressives.

The band lasted for three years and became staples on the early-seventies Boston club circuit, where they forged friendships with other local musicians, including Bonnie Raitt and Andy Pratt. The Manic-Depressives also went on the road, but, as Johnson relates, "it was a sleazy scene, with sleazy booking agents and lots of stages as big as desks."

Besides, Johnson adds, "we really were manic-depressives, so naturally the band broke up." After the split, Johnson says, he "was sick of imitating other people," and went out and bought himself a four-track recorder. The reason? "It provided an environment which I wanted to see what I could create in."

Johnson is quick to add, however, that "I am not a technician. In fact, Andy Pratt had to show me how to use the machine. What I'm basically doing is exploring with my own two ears, and trying to get my mood across. It's more of a conceptualist notion, rather than a flashy display of electronics."

For the next two and a half years, Johnson perfected both his knowledge of electronic equipment and his songwriting style. He then emerged with a show in Boston clubs which he called "Half Man/Half Tape," in which he accompanied his singing with tapes of himself playing.

"The reaction was one of love or hate," Johnson says, "with a certain amount of bewilderment thrown in. I don't know how many people really understood that what I was doing was presenting myself in multiples."

Fortunately, representatives from A&M Records were among the people who did understand what Johnson was doing, and last year they signed Johnson to a contract. In a most unusual move, A&M agreed to let Johnson record the album in his apartment, and the company also provided \$40,000 worth of equipment to aid Johnson's efforts.

Johnson again secluded himself, adding layer upon layer of sound to his album with occasional help from artists like Bonnie Raitt and Nils Lofgren. He emerged with an extremely personal album that combines rock, folk, and even elements of Caribbean rhythm. In addition, there is an oddball remake of Perry Como's "Catch A Falling Star."

While Johnson remains convinced that "performance has taken a backseat to sound," he does plan to assemble a touring band after the completion of his second album. Meanwhile, it's back to his Cambridge home — where the studio is.

Producers Series

Weber Heads Up One-Man Direct-To-Disc Campaign

LOS ANGELES — An avid collector with more than 110 direct-to-disc recordings in his library, producer Jeffrey Weber has launched a one-man campaign to heighten the market penetration and general awareness of this no-tape recording process.

"I believe in the capacities of direct-to-disc recording," says Weber. "Quite simply, it gets the listener as close to the music as possible. The price is no longer outrageous in comparison with regular pressings and the quality is much better. I think the future is very bright for direct-to-disc."

Direct-to-disc could also be called "live in the studio" because all musicians are present and everything played is cut directly onto a master lacquer. The process offers no chance for remixing, editing or overdubbing.

During the last four years, Weber has worked on 13 direct-to-discs, serving in various capacities and working for companies such as Discwasher Recordings, Sheffield Lab, JVC and Nautilus Recordings. Most recently, in conjunction with Discwasher, Weber has produced in the last eight months "Intensive Care" by jazz veterans Ray Brown, Paul Smith and Louis Bellson, "Note Smoking" with Bellson and the Big Band Explosion, and "Nostalgia Suite" by Roger Kellaway and the Cello

Quintet.

Weber describes "Intensive Care" as an album for jazz aficionados "as well as for folks who hate jazz." "Note Smoking" is an adventure in the contemporary big band sound while "Nostalgia Suite," Kellaway's first recording in five years, is "a journey into current jazz melodies while using the theme 'of yesterday.'"

No Fooling

"I exist on the creativity of the musician," says Weber. "My job is to create a musical

Steckler Worked In Textiles Before Becoming Manager

NEW YORK — Richard Steckler spent 22 years of his life as an executive in the textile business. Today, Steckler is teamed with veteran music man Don Arden, president of Jet Records, as the co-principal of a formidable new management firm, British-American Management Company.

Steckler began his career in the music business two years ago, he says, because "I had gone as far as I could in the textile business." He had met many people in the entertainment industry on the Los Angeles social circuit, and decided to switch careers when he heard of an opening at BNB, a large Los Angeles management firm.

After a year at BNB, Steckler formed a partnership with Allan Bernard, and early this year, the two men began to manage Epic recording artists Heatwave. The group toured heavily this spring and summer, and Steckler was forced to try out his newly learned managerial skills.

But the learning process didn't take very long, Steckler claimed, because of key similarities in the textile and music businesses. "They're not that different," Steckler stated. "The basic concepts of marketing and managerial expertise are essentially the same. You have to know how to deal with business people, banks, and attorneys on a day-to-day basis."

"Just change the names of the products," Steckler continued, "and the same kind of business situations apply to both fields. Contracts, for example, are so critically important in both areas. Once you're experienced at reading and understanding them, you're way ahead of the game."

While in England this summer, Steckler became re-acquainted with Arden, whom he had originally met in September, 1977. The two men discovered that their management theories meshed incredibly well, and, in September, they announced the formation of British-American Management.

Initially, Steckler said, the company will


display a strong multi-media thrust. "Stigwood proved it can be done successfully," Steckler said, "and with a highly visual group like Heatwave, we feel we have a strong basis to move into movie and TV tie-ins."

Also, Steckler emphasized that, while British-American will work closely with Jet Records, the new company has no plans to absorb management responsibilities for all Jet acts. "The most we want is six," Steckler said. "In fact, once you get over three active acts, it's very hard to control the situation. So we feel very strongly about taking a selective approach with our roster." Besides Heatwave, British-American has signed Les McCann, Trickster, and Magnum.

Steckler additionally stressed that British-American will concentrate on "much more of an international outlook than most other management companies." He cited a recent Heatwave tour where the group gave performances in Hong Kong, Manila, and Bangkok, Thailand.

"These countries are into Western music very heavily now," Steckler declared, "and the management of the future is simply going to have to know how to deal most effectively within a global framework. Not only are touring dollars going to be made on an increasing scale, but I believe you'll see the group's records move well also, and a manager is going to have to be prepared to deal with every aspect of that scene."

Asked to sum up his management philosophy, Steckler concluded, "I think it's very simple. We want to expand the artist's market in every way possible. If that means network TV in some cases, or Asian tours, or movie deals, then we have to be able to handle it, so any of our groups can get the kind of exposure that will serve to enhance and preserve their careers. We believe that the record business isn't saturated yet, by any means, and that creative tactics on a manager's part can still help to open up markets for his artist."







Label-Dealer Cooperation Maximizes Hits, Says Orleans

LOS ANGELES — "I don't want to be a part of a record company that isn't selective about every piece of product it puts out."

Arnie Orleans, vice president of sales and merchandising for ABC Records, was talking about the label's commitment to its artists — a commitment he feels should be emotional as well as financial.

"Most musically valid artists that don't happen," Orleans says, "don't happen because they are 'undermerchandised.'"

But this doesn't mean the acts are being shortchanged in terms of how many posters or radio spots they are allotted. Rather, he traces the problem to people at the record company who "don't believe strongly enough in the artist, or if they do, don't give the time and energy required to share that belief with the other people in our industry — namely, radio, wholesalers and retailers.

"When a potential hit record comes out of the recording studio, it's a matter of exposing it to as many people as possible so that the consumer can say, 'Okay, I know about it. I've heard it. Do I want to go out and spend this five, six or seven dollars to buy it?'"

Orleans, who joined ABC eight weeks ago, was formerly vice president of marketing for 20th Century-Fox Records. In his new position, he is responsible for sales, merchandising, marketing, advertising and creative services.

Create A 'Hook'

Orleans stresses the importance of creating initial consumer awareness of a record before moving in with additional merchandising and advertising dollars. The key, he says, especially for a company like ABC that uses both branch and independent distribution, is to come up with a "hook" that will get distributors and retailers behind the record.

"Quite often this is a matter of reaction," he says, "with the street giving you the hook you're looking for to say, 'We've got something going here, now is the time to go out there and buy those radio spots and point-of-purchase materials for in-store display.'"

"Until the consumer has an awareness base, there is no point in spending a great deal of money because advertising cannot create sales; it can only enhance sales."

While Orleans concedes that radio is still the primary means of exposure for recorded music, he says in-store activity at the retail level is becoming increasingly more important as an avenue of promotion.

"The retail explosion we've heard so much about of late is for real," he says. "There are more stores, and they are better merchandised, better staffed and better stocked than ever before. And this, along with certain areas of radio being maybe a little more inhibited than we as manufacturers would like them to be, has made retail exposure a significantly more vital force."

All of which, according to Orleans, points up the inherent partnership between

manufacturer and retailer. "We have to understand each other's needs, frustrations and problems," he says. "And part of that understanding is that neither side gouges the other."

"We have to understand that the retailer, because of today's pricing structure, is generally working on a small margin of profit. So we have to supply him with as much assistance at no cost as is humanly possible."

Costs Of Doing Business

On the other hand, he says, the retailers "must understand that they have certain costs of doing business" and should not expect the manufacturer to cover these costs. At the same time, retailers have "to be every bit as concerned as we are about breaking new acts," he adds.

In view of the current trend toward multi-platinum shipments of new releases, Orleans was asked how the label determines what the initial pressing for a given album will be. "You attempt to come up with the number or quantity that is the reasonable limit the marketplace can hold, to maximize that release at that time," he says. "Returns are there for the times our educated guesses are wrong."

Finally, Orleans pointed out that "to create artificial billing" by shipping more product than the marketplace will bear is "self-defeating." He explains, "You might be convinced that you have a double platinum album, but if you know the account can reasonably handle only five or ten pieces in his store, then what have you accomplished by making him take more?"

"No one gets paid until records get sold, so if they are sitting on the floor in his back room they are creating no revenues for anyone. All you've done is tie up a whole lot of people's cash and, more importantly, you have created a negative tone psychologically."

Big 3 Music Reaches Agreement With Disney

NEW YORK — The print division of United Artists Music, The Big 3 Music Corp., will produce and distribute music publications from the Walt Disney publishing catalog, Wonderland Music Co., Inc. and Walt Disney Music Co., in the United States and Canada.

The long-term agreement, which covers both current and future pop and standard music print, was signed at the Disney Studios by Gary Krisel, vice president and general manager of Walt Disney Music Co.; Vic Guder, director of the Disney music publishing organization; and Harold Seider, president of UA Music.

Negotiations were concluded as the Disney complex prepares to move into a major national merchandising support campaign in celebration of the 50th birthday of Mickey Mouse. The birthday theme and broad merchandising efforts will be fully implemented this fall in all of the Disney enterprise sectors, including television, movies, books, soft goods, hard goods and Disney amusement parks, as well as the record and music publishing areas.

The Disney emphasis on the music-record drive dovetails with recent policy statements from UA Corp. and its parent organization, Transamerica, that UA Music is considered a key growth division in its projections. UA Music's print operation has in recent years enjoyed a particularly substantial expansion, and now produces a substantial share of the industry's music books, sheet music and educational music publications.

Herman Steiger, executive vice president of The Big 3, noted that with the new acquisition of print from the Disney catalogs, The Big 3 now produces and distributes print material for some 40 outside music publishers.

EAST COASTINGS — **TRAGEDY AT THE CHELSEA** — The Chelsea Hotel is an old building on West 23rd Street in Manhattan. Some people call it seedy. Others find the hotel attractive because of its reputation as an artists' hangout. Among these artists are rock musicians like Sid Vicious, the 21-year-old former bass player for the Sex Pistols, who stayed in a room at the Chelsea with his girlfriend, Nancy Spungen. The couple, according to reports, were not in good shape. Their friends allege that they played with knives, and that they had nasty fights, and that Sid was a seriously ill methadone addict. On October 12, New York City police found the body of Nancy Spungen, lifeless underneath the sink of the room she shared with Vicious, whose real name is John Simon Ritchie. She had been

fatally stabbed in the abdomen. Sid Vicious was charged with murder. On his way to the police station, he looked pale and frail, but when photographers approached, he snarled and threatened to smash their cameras.

THE AFTERMATH — Sid spent the next five days at the drug detoxification unit of Rikers Island near New York. His mother flew in from London, as did Malcolm McLaren, the Sex Pistols former manager. \$50,000 bail was posted, and Sid is now out of jail, in McLaren's custody. McLaren says that a Sid Vicious album will be recorded soon to help raise money for Sid's defense fund. A defense fund drive has also been started in England, and there is talk that a film featuring Sid Vicious will soon be released.

MEANWHILE — Vicious' arrest took place the same day that MCA and Infinity Records hosted the new label's coming-out party amidst the marbled splendor of the New York Public Library on 42nd Street and Fifth Ave. That's right, the party was held in the entrance hall of the library, and the regal setting, sumptuous food, and lively crowd contributed to making the party one of the most talked-about of the year. Ron Alexenburg, of course, was the star of the evening and joining him were Infinity artists Orleans, Doble Gray, and Robert Johnson. Also on hand were Meat Loaf, who enveloped Ron with a giant bear hug; Lenny LeBlanc; Nona Hendryx; Garland Jeffries; Terry Cashman; Bill Aucolin; Ron Delesener; Nat Welss and 99X program director Bobby Rich, who mumbled through his drink, "who are these people, anyway?"

NAMES IN THE NEWS — Jon Landau, also in attendance at the Infinity affair, said that his main concern right now for Bruce Springsteen was to assemble a double live album "as soon as possible" . . . And while we're on the Bruce beat, reports are that the Pointer Sisters will be the next artists to cover Springsteen's "Fire" . . . Ex-Mahavishnu John McLaughlin has two new band members: bassist Fernando Saunders and drummer Tony Smith. Both played with Jan Hammer previously. Look for Earth, Wind and Fire to have their greatest hits package ready soon . . . Rita Coolidge and Scott Muni will host the second annual DIR Rock Radio Awards Show, set to air on November 22. Award winners will be announced at a press party at Elaine's November 2. The Sweethearts of Salt Lake City, Donny and Marle Osmond, will soon be punched out on TV spots — as part of their new Hawaiian Punch endorsements . . .

Stephanie Mills spectacular at her Grand Finale gig . . . Arlen Roth, scoring critical points with his debut album on Rounder Records, will tour with Tony Bird and Art Garfunkel until December . . . Move over Harlan Sanders — Raymond Froggatt has a single on Jet Records titled "Southern Fried Frog" . . . Gospel star Walter Hawkins will be the guest of honor at reception hosted by Word Records at the Warwick Hotel October 23 . . . Hot Long Island Band Freelance Vandals signed to UA. Retailers Express Concerns At NARM Regional In N.Y.

NEW YORK — Though the theme of this year's NARM regional meetings has been the "recognition" and "development" of middle-management retailers, the effect of wholesale price increases on sales of catalog items and the current pressing crunch were the key topics discussed at last week's session here.

The series of day-long regional meetings, which will have convened in 18 cities across the country when concluded later this month, are designed to bring NARM to the attention of mid-management executives and grass-roots industry workers who have never before participated in the association's activities.

Joe Cohen, executive vice president of the international organization, compared the regionals to a mini-NARM convention on a local level, where hundreds of retail personnel meet with their manufacturer vendors to discuss their specific needs.

"We're trying to prove to the industry that NARM is something more than an annual five-day convention," Cohen explained in an interview with **Cash Box** following the morning program, which featured a lecture by marketing consultant David Rachman on "Managing a Retail Store." Cohen added, "The thrust of the organization has always been to address itself to issues that confront the industry daily, and I think that these regional meetings are proof of that objective."

Bigger Attendance

With the addition of 130 new member companies in the last year, Cohen said that attendance at the regional meetings will have increased by an estimated 70-80% over last year's turnout of one thousand persons in 12 cities. Six new cities (Boston, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Kansas City, Minneapolis, and Denver) were added to the regional schedule this year, though conferences for the retailers with the manufacturers were not arranged in those cities.

Tulsa Int'l Festival To Be Taped For TV

LOS ANGELES — The second annual Tulsa '78 International Music Festival, which will be held Nov. 3-5 and hosted by Jim Halsey, will be taped for television by Osmond Television. The festival will attract performers, syndicated and major television and radio network producers, talent buyers, theatre, club and fair promoters and members of domestic and foreign press.

A V.I.P. banquet will kickoff the festival on Friday evening, Nov. 3, at the Williams Plaza Hotel in downtown Tulsa. Highlighting the event will be a live laser sky show produced by The Image People in association with AV-III. Also slated for the weekend event will be Country Music Magazine's presentation of its second annual Bullet Awards at the Mayo Hotel.

because it was the first time these markets had experienced regional meetings.

Cohen said that manufacturers may attend conferences in those six cities next May and June (when the regionals resume again), depending upon the size of the turnout in each city this year. He emphasized that he was particularly pleased by the crowds in Boston and Cincinnati.

He also speculated that the number of conference sites might be increased next year, but reserved comment on the exact number. It is expected, though, that the St. Louis and Kansas City meetings will be consolidated in 1979.

Pressing Problem

Representatives of the industry's major manufacturers said they were very pleased with the results of their meetings with the retailers. Sales managers and regional marketing reps agreed that the involvement of middle-level management personnel significantly enhanced the sessions. For instance, they felt that the meetings opened up lines of communication with assistant store managers that might not ordinarily exist.

After one-to-one meetings with retailers at the New York conference, a number of manufacturers noted that the prime concern among the dealers was the pressing problem and how the expected crunch would affect the availability of hit product in the coming weeks.

Ed Jarman, eastern region director for Polygram Distribution, said that he told his accounts that they would have to make certain adjustments on their end. "They were advised that, when they have the opportunity to order, they should put in for a 21-day supply as opposed to a 10-day period, for example. That way, if they're out of certain stock and it's taking us seven days to get to them instead of three, they will be prepared to meet their particular needs."

Jarman stated that he was happy to see the Sam Goody, Korvettes, and Harmony Hut chains bring their individual store managers to the meetings because "it seems that the record industry has no retail managerial training ground for these people. In promotion, we have radio. In management, we reach out into our sales and field forces. But in retail, it's not enough for store personnel to simply like music. It would be good if they had some business or marketing background, let's say."

Craig Smith, northeast sales manager for Warner Bros. Records, noted that "when you talk with a principal of a store or

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Man," as similar to his "Honky Chateau" LP of 1972, in that "it was just a fun album to make." Also at RCA, the position of western regional promotion manager has been dissolved, leaving the status of both **Allan Mels** and **Louie Newman** in question, although both apparently will remain with the company in new positions. RCA's official comment is that it has eliminated Anderson's old position. The reporting structure within the company also is said to have changed, calling for all promotion to report directly to label president **Robert Summer**, with the exception of A/C and trade liaison personnel, who reportedly will be responsible to **Joe Galante** in Nashville. Across town at CBS Records, **Jim Jeffries** has left his position as director of national promotion at E/P/A and may be heading towards Warner Bros. There had been talk that **Michael Abramson** would be shifting from RCA to Grunt Records, but confusion arose because he reportedly will now be working strictly with **Jefferson Starship** projects, but remaining with RCA. . . . And the **Gallanis** are rumored to be leaving ABC Records.

STREET KIDS — **Chicago** joined in the Los Angeles Street Scene celebration last week because the group members are supporters of the city and personal friends of L.A. Mayor **Tom Bradley**, who asked them to perform. The event was staged to promote the city and raise money for the arts (much of which was cut with the passage of Proposition 13).

The result is a debut album bursting with pop-rock vitality and studio savvy which showcases Bullens singing tight, thoughtful, self-penned material set against an inspiring, meaty production.

PATRICE — Patrice Rushen — Elektra 6E-160 — Producers: Charles Mims, Jr., Reggie Andrews and Patrice Rushen — List: 7.98

Patrice Rushen's first LP for Elektra is an attractive, versatile album which showcases her fluid, soprano vocals, solid compositions plus sparkling arrangements. "Patrice" includes several uptempo numbers which are suitable for the dancefloor, plus a few delicate, moving ballads. An array of top session cats contribute to the album, which features such tracks as "When I Found You" and "Hang It Up."

CHANSON — Ariola SW 50039 — Producers: David Williams and James Jamerson Jr. — List: 7.98







Currently riding high on the black contemporary album chart and featuring the bulleting single, "Don't Hold Back," the debut album by Chanson is a polished, highly danceable workout which is the first major disco/R&B success for Ariola. Spearheaded by the lead vocals and guitar playing of James Jamerson Jr. and David Williams, this album also spotlights crisp percussion work and first-rate horn and string arrangements.

FOR THE SAKE OF LOVE — Isaac Hayes — Polydor PD-1-6164 — Producer: Isaac Hayes — List: 7.98

On his second Polydor effort, Isaac Hayes has concocted a strong album which is deserving of disco, black contemporary and pop chart activity. "For The Sake Of Love" contains cover versions of "Just The Way You Are" and "Don't Let Me Be Lonely Tonight," plus four Hayes compositions, including a re-worked disco arrangement of "Shaft." Effective use of synthesizers and female vocals, plus sizzling disco rhythms highlight this LP.

LIVE AT LAST — Steeleye Span — Chrysalis CHR-1199 — Producers: Steeleye Span and Dick Glasser — List: 7.98

This is Steeleye Span's 11th and final album. "Live At Last," should emerge as a glorious testament to a band and a musical concept which more than shattered the barrier between the music of British antiquity and the Telecaster guitar. The cuts on the album all offer an excellent overview of this musical spectre called "British Folk-Rock," with the exhilarating exception of an anomalous studio rendition of the classic "Rag Doll."



WEEKEND WARRIORS — Ted Nugent — Epic FE 35551 — Producers: Lew Futterman, Cliff Davies and Tom Werman — List: 8.98

The Motor City Madman unleashes another set of slam-bam, hard-driving rock with "Weekend Warriors," his first studio album since his "Cat Scratch Fever" effort. From the opening cut, "Need You Bad," on through to LP's finale, "Name Your Poison," Nugent and his band pound out layer upon layer of slashing guitar riffs, rumbling rhythms and shouting, screeching vocals. Boosted by a striking cover illustration of Nugent shooting off fiery licks with his guitar-turned-shotgun, this LP is for AOR and pop formats.

ALL YOU NEED IS THE MUSIC — Neil Sedaka — Elektra 6E-161 — Producers: Neil Sedaka and Artie Butler — List: 7.98

This album should mark Neil Sedaka's return to steady Top 40 success. Leading off with the title track single, "All You Need Is The Music" is a lively, colorful pop-rock work which occasionally displays touches of disco. Containing 10 songs, all of which are composed by Sedaka along with his collaborators Howard Greenfield and Phil Cody, the LP abounds with catchy upbeat numbers plus a couple of tender ballads for a good change of pace.

MAIN EVENT LIVE — Herb Alpert & Hugh Masekela — A&M SP 4727 — Producers: Herb Alpert, Hugh Masekela and Mosa Jonas Gwangwa — List: 7.98

These two veteran horn men joined forces for an excursion into African-flavored jazz-rock last year, and now the duo has released its second project, a live album recorded at the Roxy. Besides the invigorating trumpet and fluegelhorn exchanges that highlight the LP, "Main Event Live" is also boosted by Mose Jonas Gwangwa's exquisite trombone solos, the bristling persuasion of Manolo Badrena and Buddy Williams, plus the enthusiastic feedback from the audience.

LOVE IS IN THE AIR — John Paul Young — Scotti Brothers SB 7101 — Producers: Vanda & Young — List: 7.98

Currently enjoying strong chart activity with his single, "Love Is In The Air," John Paul Young has released this promising debut album by the same name on the new Scotti Brothers label. Young possesses a slightly raspy, capable voice which easily handles this collection of upbeat, disco/pop numbers and tender ballads. Backed by a five-piece outfit, Young is deserving of steady pop and disco success with such tracks as "Lost In Your Love" and "Fool In Love."

BEST OF THE SYLVERS — Capitol ST-11868 — Producers: Freddie Perren and the Sylvers — List: 7.98

This greatest hits collection spotlights the group's early hits, including such familiar songs as "Boogie Fever" and "Hot Line." "Best Of The Sylvers" features the outfit's tight-knit, energetic lead vocals and harmonies, along with crisp, danceable rhythms, polished arrangements and expert production values. The LP also contains such tracks as "High School Dance," "Free Style" and "Another Day To Love."

OL' BLUE SUEDE'S BACK — Carl Perkins — Jet KZ 35604 — Producer: Felton Jarvis — List: 7.98

Over 20 years ago, Carl Perkins was one of Sun Records' leading artists and the composer of the legendary rock 'n' roll tune, "Blue Suede Shoes." Now in 1978, Perkins remains in peak form, performing this collection of '50s classics with the spirit and conviction of a true forefather of rock, which is exactly what he is. Produced by Felton Jarvis of Elvis fame, this LP contains such standards as "Maybelline," "That's Alright Mama" and of course, "Blue Suede Shoes." A real treat for rock fans of all ages.

TIMELESS — The Isley Brothers — T-Neck K22 35650 — Producers: Ronald Isley, Kelly Isley and Rudolph Isley — List: 11.98

Currently celebrating its 20th anniversary in the music business, this two-record set contains much of the Isley Brothers middle period material, including such hits as "It's Your Thing" and "Work To Do," plus numerous cover versions of late '60s and early '70s classics. "Lay, Lady, Lay," "Spill The Wine," and "Fire And Rain," among others, are given pulsing, crunching R&B treatments in the typical Isley's tradition on this noteworthy collection.

NO SMOKE WITHOUT FIRE — Wishbone Ash — MCA-3060 — Producer: Derek Lawrence — List: 7.98

Out of the progressive rock circus of the early '70s came Wishbone Ash. As the Yardbirds and the Who invented "feedback," so did Wishbone Ash with their swooping soaring dual lead guitar work. "No Smoke Without Fire" has Wishbone Ash making a strong, forceful bid for the contemporary AOR market which did, at one time, embrace their brilliant sound with open arms. Top cuts are "You See Red," "Stand And Deliver," and the "Phoenix"-like "The Way Of The World."


ROGUE WAVES — Terry Reid — Capitol SW-11857 — Producers: Chris Kimsey and Terry Reid — List: 7.98

BOB SEGER & THE SILVER BULLET BAND (Capitol P-4653)

We've Got Tonite (3:36) (Gear Publishing — ASCAP) (B. Seger)

This sensitive ballad is the third single from the highly successful "Stranger In Town" album. Piano, stark opening tambourine beat, strings and strong upward swell make this a time add for Top 40 playlists. Female backing singers contribute brightness. Seger is a great rock 'n' roll singer.



IAN MATTHEWS (Mushroom M 7039)

Shake It (3:10) (Steamed Clam Music — BMI) (T. Boylan)

Ian Matthews is a British singer/songwriter who has a sense of style. This first single from his "Stealing Home" album has a gentle grace and pleasant melody. Sax riffs, a stepping beat and swirling guitar work make this an appealing track for Top 40 playlists. Matthews' singing has a winning innocence.



CHRIS REA (United Artists UAX-1252)

Whatever Happened To Benny Santini (3:50) (Magnet Music/Interworld Music — ASCAP) (C. Rea)

Rea is an important new artist. His first single "Fool . . ." was a Top 10 record and this follow-up from his debut album deserves similar attention. Acoustic guitars are bolstered by slide guitar (ala Joe Walsh). Keyboards provide brightness. Rea's voice is rough and interesting. Sax fills are fine. Well-suited to the top of the pop pile.



ELECTRIC LIGHT ORCHESTRA (Jet/CBS ZS8 5052)

It's Over (3:38) (Unart Music/Jet Music — BMI) (J. Lynne)

"Out Of The Blue" has produced two big hits and supported a massive ELO tour this year. This fourth single opens with simple chording which opens to a strumming beat. Strings add panorama. The vocals are characteristically crystalline and soaring. Already a familiar tune, this is suited to Top 40 action.



STEVE GIBBONS BAND (Polydor PD 14516)

Chellita (3:15) (Eel Pie Pub. — BMI) (T. Visconti)

Another entry in The Year of the Sax, Gibbons' second single from "Down In The Bunker" champions a fine line between Springsteenian production and Dylanesque vocals. Final result transcends such comparisons and qualifies for good spins on AOR and pop formats.



LEE OSKAR (Elektra E-45538-A)

Before The Rain (4:01) (Far Out/Ikke-Bad — ASCAP) (Greg Errico)

Already a fave album on R&B, this mellow title track from harmonica man Lee Oskar has a fine string and rhythm arrangement with a West Indian flavoring. Great for a lead-in to features, this track would also be good for light AOR and pop lists.



GENTLE GIANT (Capitol P-4652)

Words From The Wise (2:58) (Alucard Publ./Friday Music/Red Admiral Music/ — PRS/BMI) (R. Shulman/D. Shulman/K. Minnear)

Layered harmonies and firm beat characterizes this single from the "Giant For A Day" album. Guitars and throbbing bass keyboards add flavor and texture to this vocally dominated number. Suited to pop lists.



COLIN BLUNSTONE (Rocket/RCA JH-11412)

Photograph (3:25) (Almo Music — ASCAP) (C. Blunstone/A. Phillips)

Blunstone is best remembered for his work with the Zombies. This first single from his "Never Even Thought" album is a ballad about needing a sign from a lover. Strings, jaunty beat, sparkling piano and guitar work make this worth a pop spin. Nice chorus.



SINGLES TO WATCH

AQUARIAN DREAM (Elektra 45534)

Play It For Me (One More Time) (4:01) (Aquarian Dream/J. Burvick)

Taken from the "Fantasy" album, this track has funky rhythmic undercurrents with excellent dance-oriented vocals and horns on top. The repeated hook has several strong non-verbal hooks ("wow wow wow"). This track has the potential to attract disco, R&B and pop interest.

RAY BARRETTO (Atlantic 3524)

What Part Of Heaven Do You Come From? (3:45) (Hot Stuff Music — BMI) (R. Barretto/R. Silva)

Is Ray Barretto the real Mr. Soul? His smooth as satin vocals on this heavily featured cut from "Can You Feel It" qualifies him for the contest. Watch for R&B bullets for this fetchingly orchestrated and highly listenable love song.

LOUISIANA'S LE ROUX (Capitol P-4651)

Take A Ride On A Riverboat (3:19) (Screen Gems/EMI Music — BMI) (J. Pollard)

Le Roux is noted for the use of fine soaring harmonies and strong melodies with a boogie influenced arrangements and this single is a good example. The lyric is about being stung by a Cajun woman. Guitars, moderate beat and harmonies dominate.

GLADYS KNIGHT (Buddah/Arista BDA 601)

I'm Coming Home Again (4:10) (EMP/Times Square Music — BMI) (B. Roberts/C.B. Sager)

Ms. Knight has been engaged in a legal battle with her label but the music goes on. This single is the first from her upcoming solo album titled "Miss Gladys Knight." Electric piano, strings and upward movement nicely build this sensitive ballad about coming home to yourself. Suited R&B and pop play.

PHIL UPCHURCH (Marlin/T.K. 3325)

Strawberry Letter 23 (3:25) (Kidado/Off The Wall — BMI) (J. Tropea)

Replete with a guitar lead which would make his former employer George Benson very proud, Phil Upchurch's remodel of the '77 Bros. Johnson hit features a piano/guitar break guaranteed to spread an epidemic of dancing feet. R&B formats.

PETER TOSH (Rolling Stones Records RS 19308)

(You Got To Walk And) Don't Look Back (3:43) (Jobete Music — ASCAP) (W. Robinson/R. White)

"Bush Doctor" is the name of Peter Tosh's new album and this first is a suitable potion if you got the reggae notion. Mick Jagger takes a few cracks at lead vocals and offers Tosh able support. Horns add brightness to the groove. Worth a pop spin.

MELISSA MANCHESTER (Arista 0373)

Don't Cry Out Loud (3:36) (Irving Music/Woolnough Music/Jemava Music/Unichappel Music/Begonia Melodies — BMI) (C. B. Sager/P. Allen)

Simple piano chording opens this story song about feelings utilizing the big top circus as a dominant metaphor. Supporting strings, steady easy drum beat and bittersweet lyric make this a good AC/MOR and pop add. Manchester sings in a full-throated powerful way.

ENGLAND DAN & JOHN FORD COLEY (Big Tree/Atlantic BT 16130)

Westward Wind (3:17) (Cold Zinc Music/Dawnbreaker Music — BMI) (D. Seals/J.F. Coley)

Soaring guitar licks, moderate acoustic guitar strumming and pleasant breezy vocals make this a good pop add. Taken from the "Nights Are Forever" album, this track has an easy and appealing feel.

THE BOYZZ (Cleve. Intl./Epic 8-50610)

Wake It Up, Shake It Up (3:15) (Dr. Dirt's Clinic/Burning River) (Ron and Howard Albert)

Why obfuscate? This first single from "Too Wild To Tame" rocks so hard, it will blow your speakers out of the dashboard. Heavy guitar and vocal chorus render this mucho-metallic rocker a solid pick for ballsy pop and AOR formats.

DARCUS (RCA JH-11392)

Who's Gonna Love You (3:37) (Song Tailors Music — BMI/I've Got The Music — ASCAP) (C. Ivey/T. Brasfield)

Darcus is a promising singer. This single opens with a gentle shimmering feel which moves up to easy funk. Muscular bass work and upfront drums and electric piano complement the earthy vocals. Flute duet and strings add texture. Darcus gets very funky at the fade.

SLAVE (Atlantic 44242)

Just Freak (3:45) (SpurTree Music/Cotillion Music — BMI) (D. Webster/S. Washington/M. Adams/M. Hicks)

"The Concept" is the name of Slave's album and the concept behind this track is good fast and funky rhythm work and a freaky good horn time. The similarity lyrically between this song and Chic's budding "Le Freak" may help this track. Suited to disco, R&B and pop play.

LYNDA CARTER (Epic 8-50624)

All Night Song (3:25) (Stone Diamond Music — BMI) (B. Siller)

Carter (aka Wonder Woman) has an album entitled "Portrait." This second single has a fine arrangement to back Carter's tender vocals. Strings, backing singers and guitar work make this a good add for AC and pop formats.

SPECIAL DELIVERY (TK 6311)

This Kind Of Love (3:30) (Sherlyn Pub./Tippy Music — BMI) (B. Beard/C. Fortune/N. Mann)

A funky, jaunty rhythm underlies the strings and upper register vocals on this single from the "Special Delivery" album. The singing is expressive and warm. Electric piano adds coloration. Suited to R&B and pop lists.

JESSE WINCHESTER (Bearsville 0332)

Sassy (3:15) (Fourth Floor Music/Hot Kitchen Music — ASCAP) (J. Winchester)

"A Touch On The Rainy Side" is the name of Winchester's new album and this first single has a gentle but spunky rhythm bolstered by ticking, clipping guitar work and percussion embellishments. Horns add a funky bluesy feel. Suited to a pop shot.

KENNY O'DELL (Capricorn CPS-0309)

As Long As I Can Wake Up In Your Arms (2:30) (Hungry Mountain Music/House Of Gold Music — BMI) (K. O'Dell/L. Henley)

This second single from the "Let's Shake Hands . . ." album has a gentle country feel which is well-suited to MOR/AC formats. O'Dell has had good country action, this track may expand his audience.

Disco Formats Take Hold In Top Markets Coast-To-Coast

by Joey Berlin

LOS ANGELES — After years of being labeled a fad, disco music has proven to be a viable and accepted musical style that can be programmed by itself or mixed into pop playlists. The best evidence of this is the rapidly growing number of radio stations switching to disco formats. A survey of major markets reveals that almost every one now has at least one programming primarily disco music, described by one programmer as "an energetic, moving, happy sound that you can dance to."

Many other stations are doing some disco programming, especially on weekend evenings. And as disco has gained greater acceptance on the radio, consultants, syndicators and automated programmers are hopping on the bandwagon and bringing their services to the burgeoning field.

Seeing the "Saturday Night Fever" craze and numbers of people going to discos, stations across the country perceived a demand in their markets for disco music and where no one was programming disco, stations jumped in to fill the void.

Tax Reform Bill May Help Reduce Industry Taxes

NEW YORK — A provision of the 1978 Tax Reform Bill, passed by congress on October 16, may save the record industry millions of dollars annually.

In basic terms, the provision would allow accrual-basis taxpayers to subtract the dollar value of returns received in the first four-and-a-half months of the year from their gross income in the preceding year for tax purposes. Among those who could benefit from this system of accounting are record manufacturers, distributors and rack jobbers.

Both the National Association of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) and the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) have been lobbying through their respective Washington law firms for this legislation since 1975. The paperback book and magazine industries have been independently lobbying for the same legislation.

President Carter is expected to sign the Tax Reform Bill, which has the support of the U.S. Treasury Department.

Eight-Page Booklet To Accompany Morrison LP

LOS ANGELES — Elektra/Asylum Records has prepared a special eight-page, four-color booklet to accompany the poetry album, "An American Prayer," by Jim Morrison, which is scheduled for release on Nov. 14. In addition to featuring the album's poems and lyrics, the booklet will contain several drawings by the ex-leader of the Doors, plus rare photos of Morrison. The booklet was designed by artist John Van Hamersfeld.

According to Bill Siddons of Siddons Associates, a spokesman for the project, the booklet was created because the largely spoken-word nature of the album necessitates easy reference to Morrison's poetry.

Suits Against RIAA Dismissed In L.A.

NEW YORK — Various anti-trust actions that were instituted against the RIAA by Pearl Music, National Music Corporation, Market Research Corporation of America, Consolidated Industries, Inc., Nordest Marketing Group, and Joseph Martin have been dismissed by Judge Andrew Hawk in Federal District Court in Los Angeles.

PVC Label Formed By JEM Records

NEW YORK — PVC Records, a new domestic label specializing in albums for collectors, has been formed by JEM Records. The label will be distributed to retailers directly through JEM warehouses in New York and California.

Initial releases by PVC include "Third" by Big Star and "Vital," a double live album set by Van Der Graff.

Other albums set for release on PVC include "Private Parts and Pieces" by Anthony Phillips; "Space Shanty" by Khan; and "Black Vinyl" by The Shoes.

AC/DC Issues Live LP

NEW YORK — Atlantic recording group AC/DC is currently in the midst of a lengthy headlining tour throughout Europe and England. In addition, the band this week released its live album titled "If You Want Blood, You've Got It." A 12-inch single entitled "Whole Lotta Rosie" is also slated for release.

The American release of the album, originally scheduled for early next year, has been pushed forward to the first week in November.

Pfeiffer Elected To RCA Board

NEW YORK — Jane C. Pfeiffer has been elected to the board of directors of the RCA Corporation.

In a separate action, the board of directors of the National Broadcasting Company (an RCA subsidiary) has elected Pfeiffer chairman of the board of NBC. She succeeds Julian Goodman, who was elected chairman of the executive committee of NBC. Goodman resigned as a director of RCA.

Pfeiffer has been a consultant to several major corporations, including RCA, since leaving International Business Machines Corporation in 1976 after 20 years there. She has been a White House Fellow and a member of several presidential commissions as well as various high-level government-industry committees. Pfeiffer is a graduate of the University of Maryland and a trustee of the University of Notre Dame and the Rockefeller Foundation.

The session is slated for 6-9 p.m. at the Edison Auditorium in the USC Graduate school of Business and will examine the record company, legal and criminal aspects and ramifications of record piracy in the music industry. Admission is free and the panel is open to the public.

'Sporting News' Ad Brings Bob Seger To New Audience

LOS ANGELES — In a time when "superstar" albums are selling millions of copies and going a long way toward covering the expenses of trying to break less established acts, Capitol Records has uncovered a new vehicle for advertising one of its strongest albums, Bob Seger's "Stranger In Town." The label took out a full-page ad in The Sporting News, a weekly sports tabloid, billing Seger as "a superstar in any stadium." Capitol is believed to be the first record company to advertise in the national sports publication.

The "Sporting News" ad is only one part of a large campaign that has been underway since the release of "Stranger In Town" in May. Other parts of the campaign have included extensive television, consumer magazine and trade press advertising, posters, standups and billboards. Thus far the album has sold approximately three million copies and a third single, "We've Got Tonight," has just been released.

Why 'Sporting News'

"Our advertising philosophy is quite open," says Dan Davis, Capitol's creative services and publicity vice president. "We place ads where we think they'll be most effective. At this time of year, in the World Series issue with the football season in full swing, and with an artist like Bob Seger, we think Sporting News makes good sense.

"Seger is a major superstar. His demographics are male-oriented and he tends to attract older as well as younger audiences. So with baseball and football fans tuned into the Sporting News the time was right to advertise Seger there."

Randall Davis, director of merchandising and advertising for Capitol, points out that the Sporting News ad was part of the label's plan to keep "Stranger In Town," currently #13 on the Cash Box Top 200 Albums chart, alive through the holiday season.

"After the initial rock press ads we asked ourselves what areas were left to hit," indicated Davis. "We went after the college crowd through Ampersand, and tried for middle America through People. Then we

MCA Slates Picture Discs Of Who, Elton

LOS ANGELES — MCA Records is planning to issue limited edition picture discs for consumer sales in support of the current albums by the Who and Elton John. The label will release 50,000 copies of the Who's "Who Are You" picture disc at a list price of \$15.98 in early December, with the issuing of Elton John's "A Single Man" picture disc to follow early next year. Also in the works are possible picture discs of Lynyrd Skynyrd and Olivia Newton-John albums.



Merchandising aids, an advertising program, a one-hour Rush radio special and a commercial picture disc have been slated by Mercury to provide exposure for the album, which is scheduled for release this week.

Two merchandising pieces for in-store display have been created, including a four-color mobile as well as a three-foot square color poster. Additionally, a four-color poster included in the album package will be made available for retail displays.

An advertising program has been developed featuring consumer and trade publications, plus local radio advertising spots. Also, a one-hour radio special, featuring interviews with the three members of the group, as well as music covering Rush's career, is being offered to radio stations.

Plans are underway for the introduction of Mercury's first commercial picture disc in conjunction with the album, which will carry a list price of \$13.98.

Also in support of the LP, the group is embarking upon a national tour which will begin in the northwest on Nov. 6.

ON JAZZ

Carmen McRae and Al Jarreau headlined the sold-out Irene Kral Memorial Concert Oct. 9 at Los Angeles' Roxy Theatre. Kral, who died of cancer Aug. 15, was a two-time Grammy nominee and one of those rare vocalists whose talent was on a par with the musicians she worked with. Other participants in the star-studded concert included **Willie Bobo, Monty Budwig, Alan Broadbent, Frank DeLa Rosa, Bill Henderson, Dave Mackay, Jack Sheldon, Mike Wofford, Nick Ceroll** and Irene's brother and one-time sister-in-law, **Roy Kral** and **Jackie Cain**. KBCA air personality **Jlm Gosa**, L.A. Times jazz critic **Leonard Feather** and drummer **Shelly Manne** were the guest MCs. Proceeds from the concert, which was sponsored by Musicians Wives, Inc., will be used to establish a scholarship fund for Irene's daughters, **Jody** and **Melissa**.

Grover Washington displayed his incredible lungs at a recent Santa Monica Civic performance that had the SRO crowd roaring its approval as if it was a rock 'n' roll show. Accompanied, as usual, by his superb six-piece band Locksmith, Washington proved once again that he is indeed one of the great contemporary sax players. It was only the second stop on his tour in support of his new "Reed Seed" LP on Motown, but the material sounded polished and the tour should increase Washington's already large following.

The festival season has come and gone but echoes still linger in a book, with the awkward title: "Dizzy, Duke, The Count And Me: The Story of the Monterey Jazz Festival" by **Jimmy Lyons**. The book, with many photographs and illustrations (by **David Stone Martin**), contains three sections of text devoted to 1) Lyons' own recollections of the festival 2) a recap of festival programs that lists all the performers in the 20-year history of the event and 3) critical reaction to the festival and its performances.

The book is an easy reading, with Lyons' own story told in a breezy, unpretentious style. Some of his anecdotes are quite funny, while others graphically illustrate the problems of dealing with great artists. MANHATTAN SYMPHONIE — Dexter Gordon — Columbia 35608 — Producer: Michael Cuscuna — List: 7.98



This one has been long awaited, since it showcases Gordon's travelling group of the past 18 months. Dex wails throughout the six-tune set, and the rhythm team of George Cables, Rufus Reid and Eddie Cladden lends lustrous support. "LTD" should get strong play, as should "As Time Goes By," another Gordon ballad classic. Dexter has been a solid sales item on Columbia, and this should continue that trend.

THANK YOU... FOR F.U.M.L. (FUNKING UP MY LIFE) — Donald Byrd — Elektra 6E-144 — Producer: Donald Byrd — List: 7.98

Jazz trumpet man Donald Byrd spreads his musical wings and heads for the land of funk on his first effort with Elektra/Asylum's Jazz/Fusion division. The eight cuts on the album find Byrd not only blowing his horn over highly-danceable background rhythms, but vocalizing as well. This conceivably could wind up with as much R&B airplay as it will jazz, as Byrd covers slow funk, medium tempo funk and fast funk, all with equal aplomb.

NIGHT TRAIN — Jimmy Forrest — Delmark 435 — List: 7.98

The title tune is one of the genuine classics of the past twenty-five years, but the entire twelve-tune set bristles with authority. Music stems from the early '50s, but this is the first time it has had LP exposure. Other strong items include "Hey Mrs. Jones," "Sophisticated Lady" and "Bolo Blues." Should be a solid programming item for jazz, R&B or oldie formats.



WE ALL HAVE A STAR — Wilton Felder — ABC AA-1109 — Producer: Wilton Felder, "Stix" Hooper and Joe Sample — List: 7.98

Woodwind man Wilton Felder steps away from the Crusaders for this, his first solo outing. Side one sets the tone for the album with its quiet, unpretentious title tune, featuring Felder handling bass and woodwind duties and Khabir Ghani on a fluid Stevie Wonder-ish vocal. With the emphasis here on melody, the album should follow recent efforts by George Benson and Chuck Mangione in gaining jazz, pop and R&B acceptance.

HOW LONG HAS THIS BEEN GOING ON — Sarah Vaughan — Pablo 2310 821 — Producer: Norman Granz — List: 7.98

Without question the best Sarah Vaughan LP in many years, this one puts her out front with the likes of Oscar Peterson, Joe Pass, Ray Brown and Louis Bellson. Ten titles (all good songs) and the exemplary support bring out the best in Sarah. Next time, how about some horns?

ALTO MADNESS — Richie Cole — Muse MR5155 — Producer: Eddie Jefferson — List: 7.98

Richie Cole is a young alto player of whom Phil Woods once commented, "There is no question in my mind he will contribute greatly to the music and to the alto sax." He lives up to that praise on this LP by exhibiting a technique matched only by his range of expression. These nine charts span straight jazz, avant-garde, swing, be-bop (on the particularly hot rendition of "Last Tango In Paris") and Latin-flavored ballads. His six-man combo provides top-notch support.





Retailers Express Concerns At NARM Regional In N.Y.

a chain, they're obviously giving you a broad overview. But an individual store manager will tell you his specific problems, whether it's a lack of display materials or production problems or trouble with the distributor. So any type of format that unites 12 to 15 of these people is not only productive but of overall benefit to the industry as a whole."

Echoing Smith's comments, Ron Piccolo, northeast regional vice president of marketing for CBS Records, said, "The chains that brought their department managers did a smart thing, because that's the involvement both CBS as a manufac-

turer and NARM as an organization are looking for."

Piccolo also noted that "sometimes we're overambitious in our attempt to supply the retailer with in-store materials when he has no room for them. So we use these meetings as a way of getting feedback to better define the individual needs of each store manager."

He added that executive retail management was particularly concerned that, if CBS' entire \$7.98 line increases one dollar, the consumer might be reluctant to pay a shelf price of \$7.49 or \$7.79 for a catalog item that is three or four years old.

Meanwhile, NARM is also continuing its

efforts to benefit the industry in other ways. Cohen told the New York gathering that considerable progress has been made on several major new programs that were announced at the last NARM convention in New Orleans. For example, he said, Dr. Rachman has nearly completed a manual for Retail Managers Certification Program. The five-day sessions in this program will apply modern marketing techniques to the training of store managers and their assistants.

Though an initial site for the program has not been set, classes will probably begin in late January or February of 1979 and will be staggered over several weeks time, ac-

ording to Cohen. This will allow for participants to work up case studies so that they can apply what they've learned in class to their specific store situations. "The program will involve some role playing — it won't just be a dry lecture series," he commented.

A limit of 25 places will be open to independent and chain store retailers in middle-management positions; general retailers who want to learn about merchandising records will also be encouraged to attend.

Noting that "the school will move wherever the demand is," Cohen said that he hoped the program will lead to the eventual establishment of a NARM Institute which would provide an on-going training ground for store management personnel. He feels that this is one area that is sorely underdeveloped.

"The biggest problem facing the industry right now is the development of qualified individuals capable of assuming leadership roles at the retail level," he argued. "That's why recognizing the importance of mid-management executives to the future of the industry and then developing their interest is so crucial today."

The clinic will cost each student approximately \$300. NARM is a non-profit organization, and the monies that are received by the clinic will be channeled back to members in the form of new programs. Once the certification program is established, Cohen said that he would allow for the possibility of renting Dr. Rachman's services to member companies that prefer the consultant to administer the text of the manual to personnel from a particular chain or store. This would enable Rachman to tailor the course to the specific needs of that company.

Rachman has been a consultant in the past to such general merchandise chains as J.C. Penney and to the Schwartz Brothers' Harmony Hut chain. He is currently a professor of marketing at the Baruch College of the City University of New York.

Another NARM project in the works is the preparation of bar coding brochures for the retailer and rack jobber that will explain what the Uniform Product Code (UPC) is as well as evaluating the cost and application to each category of members. The manuals are being written by Boston Associates under the supervision of Fred Humphrey and will be distributed to NARM members at the organization's upcoming convention in March. A formal audio-visual presentation illuminating the bar coding issue will be made at that time.

Cohen stressed that the slight differences in the texts of the brochures will be "based on need." For example, he pointed out that the rack jobber has no need for information concerning point of purchase since "the cash register is not his area of service. We want our membership to know all there is about bar coding at this point in time," he said, "which is why we're scheduling the regionals right after the convention, because we want retailers and distributors alike to see it as soon as possible."

NARM's committee on radio advertising (headed by Jim Tyrrell, vice president of marketing for Epic, Portrait, and Associated Labels, and John Marmaduke of Western Merchandisers) has also begun to meet and will present a film on the subject at the next convention. Cohen said that, instead of expanding on last year's "Marketing Music Through Effective Advertising Techniques" film presentation that highlighted the different "players" in the media mix, management decided to concentrate solely on the effectiveness of radio advertising. Future conventions will cover other mediums separately (such as television and print), so that NARM will eventually develop a library of films, available to both members and universities.

ALEC COSTANDINOS — **The Hunchback Of Notre Dame** — Casablanca NB 7124 — LP

Costandinos is the prolific composer/producer who has been responsible for an entire catalog of Casablanca releases, most recently "Paris Connection." Conceptually dedicated to the famous novel, this work is a collection of short interwoven passages with names such as "Phoebus" and "You Are Accused Before Us." The feel changes dramatically as from the strings, horns and steady beat of "The Pope Of Fools" to gentle Spanish feel of "La Esmeralda." Snatches of talk develop plot. Side Two has longer tracks. "Gringoire And The Duke Of Egypt" has a tambourine beat with guitar work reminiscent of the fast flurries of John McLaughlin. "The Attack" has a commanding synthesizer passage. A complicated work, this LP is already being compiled into a 12" remix.

CERRONE — **Cerrone IV The Golden Touch** — Cotillion 5208 — LP

Frenchman Cerrone, a hitmaker on both sides of the Atlantic, delivers a new sizzler. Side One: "Je Suis Music" opens with an uncluttered arrangement of pounding beat and synthesizer coloration. Additional layers of keyboard, guitars and vocals build the tension. Horns add punch. "Rocket In The Pocket" has an interesting airy texture with suspenseful

He feels "Saturday Night, Sunday Morning" will be a monster cut. The Waters do backup vocals. Motown is also putting out a 12" in several weeks which will combine Diana Ross with Bonnie Pointer on the flip side.

Look for the "Voyage II" album in late October on TK. "Souvenirs" is a likely cut to receive initial disco action. TK will release this week a 12" by Gregg Diamond with "This Side Of Midnight" b/w the LP title track, "Starcruiser." Marlin/TK will release a promo 12" by Boris Midney which distills the "Beautiful Bend" album. "At Midnight," a track from the new T. Connection album, is a likely choice for a 12". The Queen Samantha LP which features a Jim Burgess mix on "The Letter," should be out this week and the Fantasia "Sweet Sweet City Rhythm" LP will be out shortly on the TK distributed label Amazon. Finally, for TK, the new USA/European Connection LP will be out in November.

The second release on London's LeJoint label will be by the Beck Family. London also released last week a Zulema 12" with a Rich Rivera mix which brought up the tones and tripled the tambourine.

Prelude has set a Nov. 1 release date for the new Lorraine Johnson album, "I'm Learning To Dance All Over Again." "Feed The Flame" and the title cut are expected to be the hot initial cuts on the Moses Dillard and Jesse Boyce produced LP. Prelude also recently bought an LP by Lemon with Kenny Lehman producing and a 12" by Claire both of which will also be out in November.

STUDIO NOTES — Grey and Hanks are working on their new RCA album, tentatively titled "You Fooled Me." "Closer To Something Real" which features Melvin Webb and Eddie Brown on bongos and congas has a very strong rhythm groove. Look out for this one! Cell Bee is also in the studio finishing work on her new TK album.

PARTIES AND PEOPLE — Atlantic Records threw a party for Cerrone at Xenon in NYC on Friday the 13th (not to worry). Among the various fire-eaters, cone heads and pantomimists present were representatives from radio, record stores and the disco industry. Approximately 700 guests attended and danced until four in the morning. Cerrone videotaped the proceedings himself. . . . Audrey Joseph has joined MK Productions as the head of the New York office. Joseph used to be with ProMediaMotion and Arria Productions. . . . Roy Thode a DJ from the Ice Palace in NYC will be visiting LA to spin at various clubs. . . . Scott Talarico is organizing a group of DJs in Ft. Lauderdale and hoping to establish a "communications organization" to interface between DJs and the club owners. Jim Knapp of the Tampa pool was recently on an ABC-affiliate TV show, "The John Eastman Show."

SIGNINGS — The first two groups to sign to the new Howard Smiley label which will be a Mushroom custom label are called Thunder Bay and Pompell. A third group is unannounced.

strings and crowd noises. Guitar layers join and with the break comes horns and a rush of power. Side Two: On "Look For Love" a somber synthesizer opening brightens to a break with Cerrone talking/singing a love pop lyric. Strings sweeten. Moderate beat. "Music For Life" has a talkative keyboard line, percussion touches, moderate tempo without upfront kick drum.

MANU DIBANGO — Afrovision — Island 9526 — LP

Manu Dibango single-handedly transformed pop music in the summer of 1973 with his honking sax and pounding rhythms from "Soul Makossa." This new album has an exciting raw rhythm and lush horns and synthesizer from Frenchman Dibango. "Big Blow" opens with melodic sax work while the drums and ticking guitar provides funky backbeat. "Aloko Party" is another likely disco favorite. Both will be on a soon-to-be released 12". With a faster beat, it rides high. This is an album to check out for soaring instrumental moments.

ZULEMA — Change — London 3012 — 12" — 7:34

Zulema, formerly of Faith, Hope & Charity, has recently received several awards including "Most Promising New Artist" and this remix by the Queens, N.Y. resident shows why. An extended drum part and repeat for easy sequencing and the addition of clavinet played by Zulema mark the major differences from the LP cut. With several vocal passages dropped, the instrumental plays a most central role. Vigorous rhythmic undercurrents, flashing strings, punctuating horns and excellent singing make this a winner for the floor. 45 rpm.

CHARO — Ole Ole — Salsoul 202 — 12" — 8:17

Produced by Tom Moulton with John Davis, writer of the song, conducting and arranging this track features a fast beat of kick drum, flat rhythm strumming and funky keyboard work. At the hook, the guitars and castanets provide a Spanish feel. The instrument passage is hypnotic. Horns brightly led the way for the strings to rejoin the festivities. DJ promo copies are on candy pink vinyl. 33 rpm.

'Everybody's Doing It' Promotion Set To Air On WBOS

LOS ANGELES — "Everybody's Doing It . . . Who Does It Best" is the name of a nationwide disco promotion from Casablanca. Co-ordinated by Michele Hart, director of special projects for Casablanca, the project aims at maximum exposure for the label's fall disco releases through dance contests in 16 major cities throughout the country.

Casablanca is supplying the music and prizes for the dance contests which began in Atlanta on Oct. 15 and will run through early December. The Boston final of "Everybody's Doing It" will be aired Nov. 28 live on WBOS from the Future disco. Joe Carvello will deejay.

Contest kits for the discos include T-shirts, posters and the full line of records which are featured in the dance contests.

Grand prize winners in each city receive a year's disco record servicing from Casablanca, including 12-inch non-commercially available disco discs.

In arranging the contests, Hart received substantial assistance from local record pool representatives including Dale Pelegrino of BADDA, Frank Lembo and Frank Sestito from the Pocono pool and Artie Jacobs from the Southeast Record Pool in Miami.

'L.A. Disco' Opens At Palladium To A Crowd Of 2500

LOS ANGELES — More than 2500 people attended the first "L.A. Disco" event which was staged by Dave Kelsey and Audio Concepts Inc. at the Hollywood Palladium. For seven Friday nights, the Palladium is being transformed into what the promoters call "the world's largest disco" with a capacity for 4500 people.

Sunshine artist Delia Dance, JDC group The Glass Family and Ariola artist Deborah Washington, offered short lip-sync versions of their current hits.

The equipment set up which Kelsey cited as valued at \$250,000 included a 40,000 rms watts sound system with a theater instrument lighting show powered by a generator which helped power the California Jam.

DJs Brad Blair from L.A. and Tim Rivers from San Francisco handled the Bozak mixers powered by Spectrosonic "Card" amplifiers. Klipsch "Industrial" speakers were used.

Due to delays because of problems with union workers, Kelsey and his technical crew did not have time for a dry-run rehearsal and as a consequence several advanced light and sound techniques were not utilized. Kelsey plans to have these problems solved by the next "L.A. Disco." Admission is \$10 per person.



BMI Honors 122 Songwriters & 74 Publishers At Banquet

NASHVILLE — BMI citations of achievement were awarded to 122 songwriters and 74 publishers Oct. 17 in recognition of popularity in the country music field, as measured by broadcast performances for the period from April 1, 1977 to March 31, 1978. The awards were presented by BMI president Edward M. Cramer and Frances Williams Preston, vice president of BMI's Nashville office.

The ninth annual Robert J. Burton Award, presented to the most performed BMI country song, was given to "Here You Come Again," by Barry Mann and Cynthia Weil, and to Screen Gems-EMI Music, Inc., publisher. The award, honoring the late BMI president, is an etched glass plaque mounted on an aluminum pedestal. It is presented annually to the songwriters and publishers of the most performed BMI country song of the year. This occasion also marked the second time this year "Here You Come Again" and its publisher and writers have received a BMI citation of achievement.

Billy Sherrill was the leading country writer award-winner with five songs, followed by Larry Gatlin and Sonny Throckmorton with four awards. Dolly Parton, Wayland Holyfield, Chips Moman, Ben Peters and Even Stevens received three awards each, and two were presented to Paul Anka, Roger Bowling, Bobby Braddock, Jimmy Buffett, Hank Cochran, Bobby Emmons, Merle Haggard, Dallas Harms, Eddie Rabbitt, George Richey, Conway Twitty and Wayne Walker.







Presented by Cathy Martindal, the "Female Vocalist of the Year" Award was won by Joy Newman, band director for The Grapevine Opry — located in the town of Grapevine between Dallas and Ft. Worth.

Davis Bros. Top Group

"Group of the Year" Award went to The Davis Brothers. The Hager Twins, who also performed, presented the "Susie" trophy, which is named after Mrs. R.L. Slaughter. Known as "Aunt Susie" by patrons of The

Grapevine Opry, Mrs. Slaughter finances The Opry and is the guiding spirit behind the Opry's success.



Niece of "Aunt Susie" Childs is the sole owner of the Opry complex, which also houses a 16-track, in-house recording studio, a newspaper, a publishing company and a record company. The eight-piece Opry House Band entertained and backed-up visiting entertainers.


Williams Performs



Perhaps Cash's greatest talent is his intelligence, honesty and taste in picking material which moves him emotionally, regardless of its commerciality or subject matter.

This LP is truly a "greatest hits" package and includes "Broken Lady," "I Don't Wanna Cry," "Night Time Magic" and "Do It Again Tonight."

As long as we have Conway Twitty, there is no danger of country music losing its identity. Conway has been and is currently one of the classic country vocalists and writers of all time. He has forged an individual style which has won him a solid legion of fans across the world. If not his best, this new album ranks with Twitty's finest work over the past few years. "Julia," a ballad with unusual chord progressions, is a refreshing departure for Conway. "Boogie Grass Band" and "Your Love Had Taken Me That High" are also included.

In the late 60's and early 70's, Billy Swan was a running buddy of Kris Kristofferson and toured with him (still does). Then Swan wrote and recorded "I Can Help," which was one of the biggest country crossover hits of the 70's. Swan has never equalled the success of that record, but this album represents the best of the charming, soft rock 'n' roll which Swan handles so well. "Everything's The Same (Ain't Nothing Changed)" and "Number One" are strong cuts.

NSAI Songwriters Honored

NASHVILLE — The Nashville Songwriters Association, Int. (NSAI) kicked off DJ Week Oct. 15 with its ninth annual Songwriter's Awards Dinner and Ceremony and elected Hank Snow, Tom. T. Hall, Don Wayne and Joe Allison to its Hall of Fame. Attended by 450 music row executives and songwriters, the show was held at the Sheraton south here.

The President's Award, given each year by the current NSAI president for contribution to the NSAI goals, was presented to Wesley Rose by 1978 NSAI president Bob Jennings. The 1977 President's Award went to Hale Boggs, Jr., who assisted the NSAI in battling for the revision change in the music copyright law.

Songwriter/poet Billy Ed Wheeler acted as the main speaker and recited several of his poems, including "Songwriter and Town Drunk" and "On Growing Bald." The author of several country hit songs, Wheeler spoke of the friendship between Nashville writers. "When one writer has a hit, the other writers rejoice. They must say, 'gosh, isn't it wonderful that he took that old worn-out idea and made a hit out of it.'"

Each inductee into the Hall of Fame was presented the "Manny," a statuette bronze of a hand holding a pen.

Tubb Thanked

A veteran of The Grand Ole Opry and an RCA recording artist for 43 years, Snow has written and recorded countless classics, including "I'm Moving On." In his acceptance speech, he thanked Ernest Tubb for convincing Opry officials to hire him on the show. "For a solid year, Ernest took my

records out of his store to the officials of WSM and tried to convince them we didn't sound alike."

Nicknamed "The Storyteller," Hall has written such hits as "Old Dogs, Children and Watermelon Wine," "The Year That Clayton Delaney Died," "I Love" and "Harper Valley P.T.A." Hall was one of five country artists who entertained this year at a White House reception for the Country Music Association. Hall was in Texas and his wife accepted the award.

Composer of "He'll Have To Go" and a former executive at Capitol Records here, Allison accepted his award and said, "knowing who voted for this . . . this is one of the happiest moments of my life."

NASHVILLE — The SESAC Licensing Organization held its 14th annual Awards Presentation last week in Franklin, Tenn. near here and presented awards of excellence in 10 categories, including "Heaven's Just A Sin Away" (written by Jerry Gillespie) as the SESAC "Most Recorded Song of the Year."

A highlight of the awards was the presentation of the Paul Heinecke Citation of Merit to the Country Music Association "in recognition of invaluable leadership in the international promotion and exposure of country music as America's own musical art form." PROGRAM DIRECTOR PROFILE — WHK/Cleveland recently hired Russ Knight to program the Malrite-owned station. Knight had also worked at WHK as the morning drive jock in 1968-69 under different ownership. Just prior to his returning to Cleveland, Knight was operations manager at WAKR/WAEZ in Akron. Knight started broadcasting in the '50s, when he worked mornings at WAKR/Akron; KBOX/Dallas; KILT/Houston; WXYZ/Detroit; WQAM/Miami and WAKE/Atlanta. When you call an album, "The Very Best Of The Very Best," you've stepped out on the tip of the limb. But "The Gaither Trio" is not being ostentatious or pretentious. Bill and Gloria Gaither and Gary McSpadden are the very best. For the half-dozen or so Gospel music aficionados unaware of the Gaithers, you are in for a real treat. For their millions of fans, who know what to expect and who know that classics such as "He Touched Me," "The Church Triumphant," "There's Something About That Name," are timeless treasures, this album is a must. And The Gaithers have included a new gem called, "I Am Loved," that will take its place alongside the rest.

Regardless of personal preference concerning musical recordings, there is no debate relative to what method of mastering produces the highest quality. Direct-To-Disc recording does, however, present major problems. Essentially, the artist cannot make any mistakes or the entire process has to start over. Few groups or "stars" on today's electronic musical scene would even attempt such an endeavor. But the 19-member, award-winning group "Truth" has utilized this concept and conceived a remarkable record. Appropriately entitled, "Departure" is just that — a departure in that technical interference is minimized and a departure in that the sound is encompassing. You feel like you're front row center at a "Truth" concert.

Blacks Making Strides In Top Level Management Positions

by Cookie Amerson

LOS ANGELES — Prompted by an usual number of upper echelon record company management changes in the early part of last year, a **Cash Box** survey showed blacks to be considerably less mobile than their counterparts. (**Cash Box**, April 23, 1977) This year, however, movement by blacks seems to parallel that of their white counterparts in upper management levels, with a noticeable trend towards more label ownership by blacks.

Last year's survey revealed six black record company presidents: Clarence Avant, Taboo; Norman Whitfield, Whitfield Records; Gamble and Huff, Philadelphia International; Henry Allen, Cotillion Records; Cecil Holmes, Chocolate City Records and Al Bell, ICA Records. Joining them this year are Logan Westbrook who started Source Records; Hilary Johnson who started Source Records; Hilary Johnson who started Source Records with Tom Takayoshi; and Cecil Barker, who heads Venture Records.

From a sales standpoint, Whitfield Cotillion and Philadelphia International have been turning out gold and platinum records with regularity. Chocolate City and Taboo Records also have been posting consistent sales, with ICA Records being very quiet for almost a year.

Among the newer companies, Source and Hiltak Records have not released any product. But Venture Records, owned by Barker, an aerodynamics businessman from Washington, D.C., is jumping right out of the box with a single bulleting up national trade charts.

A number of blacks have left top level management positions to form their own companies. Hosea Wilson, for example, after a lengthy tenure at 20th Century-Fox Records, formed Zay Productions. Similarly, Richard Mack, a CBS Records veteran, left that label to form Natures Music.

Continuing to serve as label vice presidents are Noreen Wood, vice president of Atlantic Records, and Otis Smith, who returned to the industry after a several month hiatus to be Ariola Records vice president. In addition, Billy Bass was recently promoted to vice president of promotion for Chrysalis Records.

Black Sr. VPs

Another development this year has seen a move towards more blacks being elevated to senior vice presidential positions. Cecil Holmes attained the senior vice presidency of Casablanca Records. Harold Childs garnered the senior vice president

TAVARES/MARTIN COLLABORATION — A new single from the Tavares Brothers will be released the second week in November entitled "I Never Had A Love." The album entitled "Madame Butterfly" will be released after the first of the year, and was produced by Bobby Martin.

DASH-Ing — Former Labelle songstress Sarah Dash is gearing up for a promotional tour to support her recently released single "Sinner Man," and her new label involvement with Kirshner Records. Dash will tour starting next month with a short hiatus during the holidays after which she will resume by performing in some key cities. A European tour is being planned for Dash, to commence in February 1979. Negotiations are also presently under way for her to tour with a very well known super group.

TOURING — Columbia Records artist Cheryl Lynn has started a promotional tour, for her debut album "Cheryl Lynn." The tour is scheduled to end Oct. 27, and will cover eight cities.

NEW TO YOU — Al Green's new album will be released Oct. 27. Green's talent as a producer and guitarist will be brought forth on this album which was, of course, done in his very own studio in Memphis. Title of the album is "Truth N' Time," with a forthcoming single "To Sir With Love." Another LP cut, "Wait Here," will be released as a 12-inch disco single.

BENSON & FOSTER — George Benson will appear on two tunes of the new album released by Ronnie Foster entitled "Love Satellite." Stevie Wonder will also appear on the LP playing drums on "Happy Song," and Roy Ayers will play the vibraphone on "Midnight Plane."

California about their defective condition.

Six Counts

For relief of their complaints on six counts, the plaintiffs are asking the court to make several judgements against Promo and Morris Levy. First, CBS and Jet want a permanent restraining order to enjoin "defendants, their officers, agents, representatives, servants, employees and all persons acting in concert or cooperation with them, or any of them from selling, distributing or otherwise disposing of all or any portion of the 'Out Of The Blue' albums now in defendants' possession."

Second, the plaintiffs want an order requiring the defendants to return the "Out Of The Blue" albums to them. Third, they want the court to award them "compensatory and punitive" damages and the costs of the suit to punish the defendants for having entered into a contract with MRG which would hurt the plaintiffs. And fourth, they are asking "for such other and further relief as the Court may deem just and proper, together with costs of suit."

several factors for the increasing interest consumers are showing in imports.

"Imports often have higher quality pressings and packaging," Delaney said, "and with a lot of releases, we get the import three or four weeks ahead of the American release.

"Imports offer different songs in many cases that aren't contained on the American album," Delaney added, "and that also helps boost sales."

He said Tower buys large shipments of imports directly from England two or three times a year, but for week-to-week purchases deals primarily with Jem Records and a few other smaller importers.

Image Changing

Bob Say, who works in Jem's Los Angeles office, said in the last couple of years, the image of imports has started to change.

"A lot of imports used to be aimed directly at an esoteric market," he said. "But now I would say imports are slowly losing the mystique of being a specialty item and they are becoming more of a mainstream product that everybody is buying. We are finding some albums are selling thousands of copies, where before we might only sell a few hundred of any given album.

"There's a lot of stuff coming out overseas that doesn't show up here aimed at the middle market. For instance, 'Best of Donna Summer,' or the 'John Denver Live in London' album which was never released here," Say added.

Lawler said Jem would like to be able to do more advertising to further broaden consumer awareness of what imports have to offer.

"But we are just a wholesaler, not a manufacturer, of records," Lawler said. "So we don't have the revenue coming back to us from the records like the labels do, so we can't do that much advertising."

Retailers Cooperative

Some retailers, however, have been cooperative in doing their own campaigns highlighting imports, he said.

"When \$7.98's began to happen," Lawler said, "a number of retailers, on their own, did advertising, encouraging people to buy imports.

"It's been true for quite a while now that all kinds of stores carry imports," he said.

"There is such a wide variety of imports, they no longer consist only of esoteric, European progressive bands or punk bands or anything like that.

"There is any kind of popular music you care to name available on import, the kind of records any store can sell. It doesn't have to be a specialty store or import store anymore," Lawler said.

In addition to scattered advertising by retailers, Say reported there are a number of radio stations throughout the country which regularly program imports into their playlists, further helping to increase the profile of imports in the American record market.

While prices of some of the higher list-prices American releases is now virtually the same as many imports, Say said he thinks the labels are not concerned with the competition.

"I don't think the American companies are worried about competing with imports, because we still don't sell that much, when you compare 100,000 units of one thing to 1,000 units of an import," Say commented.

It's not really competition," he said, "it's just another alternative piece of music for those who want it."

of the promotion division at A&M Records, after being with the label more than nine years. Larkin Arnold recently moved from Capitol Records to Arista Records as senior vice president of the R&B division for that label.

Continuing to stabilize in their positions are divisional vice presidents of the major labels. LeBaron Taylor is in his sixth year as vice president of the black music marketing division at CBS, while Jim Tyrell is in his seventh year as marketing vice president for Epic. Others include Tom Draper, in his third year as vice president of black music marketing at Warner Brothers; Hank Talbert in his fourth year as vice president of R&B promotion for Arista; and John Smith vice president of R&B promotion for ABC, with that company for two years.

Two most recent additions in this area are Mike Abbott, vice president of R&B promotions for MCA Records and Don Mizell, general manager, jazz fusion division at Elektra Records.

Disco Formats Take Hold In Top Markets Coast-To-Coast

disco look. People wanted to go out and dress up and dance.

"We saw the demand and moved in," says O'Brien. "There was a lack of disco on the radio in this town and the Top 40s weren't even playing the crossover disco hits. Denver stations don't like to play 'east coast' music and most programmers here put disco in that category."

Other stations that were programming black formats had to make only minor adjustments to create disco formats when they saw the demand in their markets.

"Disco just caught up to black stations," says Bill Chatman, general manager of KNOK/Ft. Worth. "For us to go disco was just a subtle change from our previous black format."

Fore Runners

Many observers see the success of WBLS/New York as one of the early keys to the current growth pattern of disco radio. Programmer Hal Jackson made the station the most listened to FM station in the nation by mixing substantial amounts of disco with R&B, jazz and pop styles.

More recently, WKTU/New York has created a sensation in the Big Apple with its disco format, while KUTE in Los Angeles has been getting impressive ratings results with its disco format. The success of these high-profile disco stations has given encouragement to stations in almost every major market and many secondaries as well.

'Upward Trend'

"There is a definite upward trend in the growth of disco radio," reports independent disco promoter Tom Hayden. "The midwest is traditionally the last to get on the Bandwagon, but now stations like KFMX/Minneapolis are following the forerunners into the disco field. The midwest has discovered disco."

So has the rest of the country, if the number of disco stations popping up in recent months is any indication. Among stations now programming primarily disco music are: WJPA/Pittsburgh, WXYV/Baltimore, WKTK/Baltimore, WHRR/Memphis, WDLB/Marshfield, Wisc., WGCI/Chicago, WCAU/Philadelphia, WBOS/Boston, WGPR/Detroit, WKTU/New York, OK100/Washington, D.C., Studio 107/Miami, V103/Atlanta, KDKO/Denver, KNOK/Ft. Worth, KFMX/Minneapolis, KSFY/San Francisco, KHYS/Port Arthur, KXYZ/Houston, KXTC/Phoenix, KSET/El Paso, KHNY/Riverside, Ca., and KUTE/Los Angeles.

Many more stations have set aside special time slots exclusively devoted to disco, often airing these segments without commercials. Y100 in Miami is one station that has been particularly successful with this method.

Westwood One, the Los Angeles-based syndicator headed by Norm Pattiz, is planning to capitalize on disco's growing radio acceptance by distributing "American Disco." The three-hour weekly series, hosted by Kris Erik Stevens, has already signed up approximately 65 stations for the show's debut in early November. According to Pattiz, most of the stations set to air "American Disco" are rock stations looking for a block of disco programming for Saturday nights. Stevens has been hosting a similar program on Armed Forces Radio for the past year.

Studio West in Newport Beach, CA. is also moving into disco. The company is the first to offer a syndicated disco format to stations, supplying them with a disco library, weekly and monthly updates and customized station image packages. KHNY is the first station to subscribe.

Burkhart/Abrams

The person most frequently credited with

engineering WKTU's move into disco is Wanda Ramos, formerly of WBLS and now with the Burkhart/Abrams consultancy. Ramos is handling the company's disco consultant business, which now includes three southwestern stations, KNOK, KXTC and KSET.

KNOK is now airing a new disco show that may soon be heard around the country. It's called "Disco Connection" and it features the top three picks selected by leading disco DJs around the country. The show is produced by Dwayne Dancer and so far includes picks from Studio 54 in New York, Valentino's in Cherry Hill, N.J., Dr. Richards' Lab in Monterey, Ca., and clubs in Austin, Houston, Chicago, Montreal and Toronto.

While much of the music industry is battling the problem of tight playlists, disco stations have developed a reputation for exposing new product. In turn, record companies are putting out a steadily increasing stream of disco product, much of which is finding acceptance in the pop marketplace.

In fact, 15 percent of this week's **Cash Box** Top 100 Singles Chart is made up of disco-influenced records. These include #3 bullet "MacArthur Park" by Donna Summer, #15 "Boogie Oogie Oogie" by Taste Of Honey, #19 "Get Off" by Foxy, #20 bullet "I Love The Night Life" by Alicia Bridges, #34 "Themes From The Wizard Of Oz" by Meco, #39 "Ease On Down The Road" by Diana Ross and Michael Jackson, #41 bullet "Dance (Disco Heat)" by Sylvester, #60 bullet "I'm Every Woman" by Chaka Khan, #70 bullet "Instant Replay" by Dan Hartman, #74 bullet "Y.M.C.A." by Village People, #75 "Shame" by Evelyn "Champagne" King, #85 bullet "In The Bush" by Musique, #87 bullet "Le Freak" by Chic, #90 bullet "Do You Feel Alright" by K.C. & The Sunshine Band, #99 "Miss You" by the Rolling Stones and #100 "Hot Shot" by Karen Young.

But despite the growing impact of disco on the radio, many members of the fledgling disco industry believe that the style is just beginning to take hold.

Just A Baby

"Disco on the radio is just a baby right now," says Hayden. "But within a year at least one station in every major market will play substantial amounts of disco. The enormous sales generated by disco are showing up on store reports to stations and many are being forced onto disco records."

"There used to be outright hostility to disco records, but disco is no longer a dirty word."

Some programmers disagree with Hayden. Roy Perry, music director at WCAU which programs a disco-oriented "Rhythm Sound," says his station still doesn't use the word "disco" on the air. Bill Tanner, program director at Y100 where late-night disco shows have done very well, indicates that only recently has the word "disco" become acceptable on the air.

But whether they use the word or not, radio programmers today find it very difficult to hold out against the disco trend if they want their station to have mass appeal. The phenomenal success of "Saturday Night Fever," which has sold 15 million copies in the U.S. alone, and Top Ten singles such as "Miss You," "Shame" and "Boogie Oogie Oogie" have convinced most music people that disco as a musical style has arrived.

Manufacturers are simply not so quick to go into their pockets right off the bat as they used to be." Nonetheless, guarantees, which were once uncommon, have become an increasingly accepted part of license agreements, most managers and merchandisers surveyed by **Cash Box** agree.

Once the agreement is signed, however, the legal problems of artist licenses are far from over because of the widespread bootlegging problem. Bickhart cites the "futility" of prosecuting the bootleggers, who sell products without a license, because of their "gypsy-like" tactics. "They're all over the place," Bickart says, "and when you go after them they just scatter back to their basements. They're fly-by-night operations, really, and even if you catch them, they have no records or bank accounts. And also, if you catch one, there's others who will just take their place."

Private Eyes Hired

Furano, in an attempt to protect his concert merchandising rights, has taken concrete steps to eliminate the problem. At a recent concert in Cleveland, Furano hired a local private investigator company to map out a strategy to stop the bootleggers. "It worked well," Furano related. "The company went in a week ahead and met with the Cleveland police to find loopholes in the law, so we could crack down on the pirates."

And before the concert, our people physically went out and confiscated the shirts."

Elliot Hoffman opts for legal action against the bootleggers, and he has, in fact, instigated a number of successful suits against companies who have illegally used Peter Frampton's name and likeness. Yet Hoffman admits there is still a "feeling of resignation" toward the bootleggers in the industry. Hoffman believes that federal government intervention is the key to solving the problem. "The federal government has to get involved," Hoffman says. "They have to be as protective of name and license as they are of trademark and copyright."

'Limited' Licensing

While the industry agrees that pirates have to be stopped, the extent of artist license use varies widely from artist to artist. Vince Mauro, president of Bandana Enterprises, comments that the "limited" licensing of Peter Frampton's image is a deliberate move. "If you believe in someone as a long-term artist," Mauro says, "then you don't just want to capitalize and milk it dry, because in the long run, it just tarnishes the artist's image."

With Kiss, however, Lee Freidman feels differently, as is proven by the more than 150 products bearing the Kiss logo. "They're the biggest merchandised group in the world," according to Freidman, who continues, "we can afford to over-expose the group because there aren't enough outlets like radio to satisfy the fans, who are mostly between six and 18 years old."





Green Concerned About Relationships Between Promotion Men, Radio Execs

LONDON — In an article in a UK trade magazine, *Music Week*, **Derek Green**, managing director of A&M Records, this week expressed deep concern over the relationship between record company promotion men and radio executives. According to Green, "the relationship between record promo men and radio people seems to have reached its lowest ever point."

His article, directed towards the UK musicbusiness, cites both sides of an argument which has arisen from a situation causing constant friction between radio stations and record companies. On the one hand, radio executives are complaining heavily of the falling standards in promotional men employed by record companies. They see them as being "over aggressive, impolite and uninterested in the music."

To combat this agitation the radio stations have devised more formal systems for promotion men to conform to, such as making them wait in lines in corridors so the interviews would be short, as well as making them wear 'visitors' buttons and

EMI Profits Dip 50%

LONDON — Latest results of EMI Music Operation's profits indicate a slump of almost 50%. Pre-tax profits were nearly halved at 16.8 million pounds worldwide, compared to 32.7 million pounds worldwide last year.

At a recent press conference here, Sir-John Read, chairman of EMI, said that North American sales in dollar terms had increased by 8% and turnover of the majority of other companies worldwide had exceeded the previous year.

Read outlined the chief reason for profit loss as being caused by competitive pressures, mainly from U.S. repertoire. He also blamed rising royalty costs, lackluster sales in Australia; losses from territories that at one time produced high profits, such as France, Germany and Holland; new heavy investments in a new distribution center in France and a new manufacturing plant in Holland.

RCA Acquires Dylan Catalogs For Spain

LOS ANGELES — RCA Publishing International has acquired sub-publishing to all of the Bob Dylan music catalogs for Spain and Portugal. The Dylan catalogs from Special Rider Music, Big Sky Music, Ram's Horn Music and Dwarf Music, all Dylan companies, include compositions by Dylan as well as early works by the Band.

Administration of the publishing rights to the Dylan catalogs will be handled by Ediciones Musicales RCA, Spain.

restricting them to appointment visits only.

On the flip side, according to Green, the radio promotion men find these formal systems 'dehumanizing'. "The most dedicated people doing promotion have started to find their job distasteful," said Green. "They are treated badly so they react badly. It is a vicious circle. Soon only the worst kind of impolite, overaggressive pluggers will want to do the job."

At the close of the article, Green discussed a possible solution to the situation. "If there is a solution it is not in restructuring the organizational system of either the radio stations or the record companies — it is much simpler. It is in the individuals on both sides taking responsibility for their own professional disciplines and conduct — the use of common courtesies and mutual respect. Hopefully, this would encourage the development of personal and professional relationships with each other."

J.P. Young Named Top Vocalist In Australia

LOS ANGELES — Scotti Brothers Records recording artist **John Paul Young** has been named Top Male Vocalist in the annual King of Pop Awards, Australia's prestigious pop music awards presentation. In addition, the artist's recording of "Love Is In The Air" was named best Australian single at the presentation, held recently in Melbourne before a crowd of 15,000.

Presentation of the awards to John Paul Young was made by **Leif Garrett** and **Marcia Bush**.

John Paul Young had achieved four platinum albums and nine gold singles in Australia. The Scottish-born vocalist has also toured widely through Europe and South Africa.

John Paul Young's debut LP for Scotti Brothers Records, "Love Is In The Air," was released last week by the label.

MILAN — On Sept. 21 in Milan's Town Hall the Italian National Association of Record Critics held its 16th annual prize-giving ceremony for the best albums of the year. The jury, formed by 31 members of the association, covered all kinds of product released between April 1, 1977 and March 31, 1978, choosing 28 albums divided in six categories.

CBS Is Topper

CBS topped every other record company with five awards, followed by Phonogram with four, and by Decca, RCA, Fonit-Cetra and Editoriale Sciascia with three.

Among the artists who personally received the awards were Italian father-and-son jazz duo Lino & Gaetano Liguori and French singer-songwriter "Mama" Bea Tekielski who performed her first and only Italian concert the following day.

Gremlin Acquisition Boosts Sega Profile In U.S. Market

LOS ANGELES — The recent acquisition of Gremlin Industries by Sega Enterprises, Inc. signals a more aggressive manufacturing and marketing stance on the part of Sega, according to company president and chief executive officer David Rosen.

In an interview, Rosen outlined the reasons behind the Gremlin takeover, its impact in terms of product development and the marketing strategy for Sega-Gremlin. "We look upon the Gremlin acquisition as giving us, in addition to the manufacturing position we require in the area of research and development with our Japanese subsidiary," Rosen says.

Added Strength

"Sega of Japan is probably responsible for producing more electro-mechanical games in the past 15 years than the rest of the industry combined. And although we have developed significant strength in solid-state technology over the past four or five years, we felt that the Gremlin acquisition would give us added strength in this area while providing the electronic engineering support we require."

Under an agreement finalized Sept. 29, Gremlin became a subsidiary of Sega Enterprises, Inc., which is also the parent company of Sega Enterprises, Ltd. of Japan. Sega Center game rooms are a division of Sega Enterprises, Inc.

The agreement was a straight stock-for-stock transaction, according to Rosen, who said key Gremlin executives will remain in

place. These include company president Frank Fogleman, general manager Gene Candelore and Jerry Hansen, vice president of research and development-engineering.


"Gremlin Industries now takes over marketing responsibility for all Gremlin and Sega products," Rosen says. "This means that Sega of Japan-developed products will be manufactured by Gremlin for distribution here." *(continued on page 74)*

No complaints about the price tag, either, on these exceptional 200-selection machines, he added.

Present business is good, as we learned from **Jerry Marcus**, and he's very enthusiastic over the outstanding new pinball machines hitting the market — and the new Midway "Shuffleboard" and "Space Invader" video games.

BOB SHERWOOD of Meyer & Wenthe is putting the finishing touches to a specially designed medalion the firm will be offering as a give-away at the AMOA convention. It's called "Pinball Champ," appropriately enough, and from Bob's description it's quite an attractive looking piece. Additionally, Meyer & Wenthe will display a full assortment of tokens including some specialty items for arcades.

ON THE SUBJECT OF Midway's new "Shuffleboard," the factory's director of sales **Larry Berke** said "It's just the location game operators have been waiting for" — steady earnings, lots of play appeal.

In the games department, United's latest shuffle alley "Aristocrat" is a strong seller; Williams "Disco Fever" and "Contact" are the hit pins; O.B.A. foosballs have been generating quite a bit of interest and Sid reported a surge in sales of Mirco's pinball cocktail table. Jack Gordon, formerly based at Sega's Redondo Beach, Calif. headquarters, has moved to Gremlin's San Diego facility where he will oversee the expanded marketing operation. He will be assisted by **Bernie Shapiro**, formerly of Mirco.

Wider Product Spread

Rosen believes the synergism of Gremlin and Sega will result in a wider, more exciting product spread.

"Sega of Japan normally produces more than 20 different models," Rosen points out, "but in the past several years we have not had the opportunity to introduce a lot of these products to the U.S. marketplace. We now feel this will be possible, and with Sega's expertise in the electro-mechanical field and Gremlin's expertise in electronics, we should have a very wide range of products encompassing the best of both worlds.

"Sega operates some 30,000 pieces of equipment in Japan," Rosen continues. "This size operation, of course, gives us considerable expertise regarding the type of equipment that the operator needs and wants. Consequently, the equipment we produce is built with the operator in mind."

Rosen says that within 60 days the Gremlin facility will be equipped to handle all parts and service requirements for both Sega and Gremlin products.

framework and then allow the players free rein to express themselves. With direct-to-disc recording, we don't fool with creativity, limit it, edit it, technique it or bastardize it."

After gaining early experience with Sheffield Lab, pioneers in modern direct-to-disc, Weber developed a fascination for direct-to-disc which prompted a personal study of the various means of record pressing.

"Standard American pressings are a joke around the world. Technically, they are on par with pressings from Mexico. The surface noise level in many cases disturbs my appreciation of the music. The American industry addiction to quantity is so great that they simply don't care what the quality is. The attitude is ship as many as you can without regard to quality control. I don't think that is right. I think the customer is beginning to buy audiophile records to avoid the problem of poor quality pressing. Direct-to-disc offers me the chance to get back at my favorite enemy — American pressings."

Weber first decided to pursue producing a direct-to-disc recording after hearing a standard recording by Brown, Bellson and Smith in December 1977. At the time, Weber was a staff writer at **Cash Box**.

'Magic Words'

"This record came in and the music was great but the vinyl sounded terrible. I approached the musicians and they were interested. Then I proposed the project to several companies. Discwasher said the magic words — 'You do everything.'"

A firm believer in the adage "If you want it done right, do it yourself," Weber vigorously pursued all aspects of the project from developing the concepts of the musical framework to graphics of the album.

"My philosophy," says Weber, "is to treat the musicians, pressing people and plating people as the most important people. Because they are. An excellent recording

can be lost by an inferior plating job, that is why I take all my records to Jim Shelton of Europa Disc Plating in New York. He is the best.

"A lot of musicians and producers are scared of direct-to-disc because they rely to such a great extent on 'fixing it in the mix.' With modern computer recording techniques which help pull miracles from so-so musicians, some musicians are afraid of the requirements for direct-to-disc.

'Real Time'

"D-to-D recordings are done in 'real' time and cut a side at a time. The engineer has to react spontaneously with the musicians to ensure continuity over time for matters such as volume and the producer must have his ideas well in hand before going to the session. In the studio, I record six sides in a period of 12 hours and then seven or eight weeks later the album is released.

"Direct-to-disc is not sterile perfection but rather an exchange between the musicians. It emphasizes the performance."

Weber acknowledges that at this stage direct-to-disc does not afford large quantities of pressings. A run of 100,000 — 200,000 is considered "lucky" by Weber. He concedes that he does not expect direct-to-disc albums to go gold in the near future.

Weber is quick to point out that although his previous direct-to-disc projects have been with jazz artists, the process is not in the least restricted to jazz. His next direct-to-disc project will be a rock 'n' roll record, according to Weber. "I am interested in technical excellence but I am also interested in 'money music' and I think there are many pop artists whose careers could benefit from recording direct-to-disc."
