

Jones Leads All Nominees For 24th Grammy Awards

LOS ANGELES — The recordings of multi-talented composer/arranger/producer/artist Quincy Jones garnered a total of 14 nominations to lead the pack of contenders for the 24th annual Grammy Awards, which will be telecast from the Shrine Auditorium in Los Angeles Feb. 24 on CBS-TV.

Jones earned a total of 8 nominations, including three as an artist, three as a producer and two as an arranger, for his efforts on the A&M album, "The Dude." And while he was not personally nominated in all 14 categories, he is up for Grammys for "The Dude" in the album, pop instrumental (the "Velas" track), R&B group, instrumental arrangement and instrumental arrangement for accompanying vocal categories.

Jones, who told **Cash Box** in an interview earlier this year that his final album ("The Dude") for A&M was "the best LP I've ever done for the label and not the usual obligatory contract LP," also gained nominations in the R&B song ("Ai No Corrida"), best engineered recording and R&B female vocal performance (Patti Austin's "Razzmatazz") categories.

Foremost among other Jones-related nominations were the pair of nominations earned by Lena Horne's "Live On Broadway" LP, which he produced, and the three nominations brought in by "The Dude" vocalist James Ingram for best new artist, pop male vocalist and R&B vocalist.

Another multi-talented producer/artist, Lionel Richie, was second to Jones in nominations with seven. Richie's collaboration with Diana Ross, "Endless Love," garnered four nominations, and he also picked up two as a member of the Commodores group and one for Producer of the Year. "Endless Love," the theme to the film starring Brooke Shields, is nominated for Record and Song of the Year, as well as pop duo and Best Motion Picture Score LP.

Lennon Garners Five

The late John Lennon's "Double Fantasy" album, a collaboration with wife Yoko Ono, also received a strong share of nominations. Lennon's five nominations include producer and performer for both Record of the Year and Album of the Year, and Best Male Vocalist. Ono, herself, received a nomination for Best Female Rock Performance.

Other leading names included last year's big Grammy winner, Christopher Cross,

Bad Weather Curbs Business, Closes Stores Across Nation

LOS ANGELES — Inclement weather, ravaging many regions of the U.S. in recent weeks, has caused some record retailers to close their stores. In other cases, where dealers stayed in operation, many reported substantial drop-offs in customer traffic.

In the last two weeks, much of the Northeast, Northwest, Midwest and parts of the South have been plagued by some of the worst snow in years; while parts of the West Coast and the deep South, areas where severe winter weather is unusual, have been affected by cold and rains that curbed retailers business and, in many cases, caused closure of the stores.

Retailers operating in those regions where temperatures dipped far below zero due to unusually severe snowing, were forced to close stores due to a dearth of store traffic and/or the inability of staff to travel to and from work.

In areas where bad weather is normal in winter, dealers more often reported that rain or snow slowed sales momentum, but in only a few instances, caused outlets to close because of poor business. Some of those dealers contacted in a **Cash Box** survey reported that mall locations fared better than free-standing outlets.

"We had only one day, Monday (Jan. 11) where we had to close our warehouse and one-stop," reported John Grandoni, vice president at Cavages, based in Buffalo, N.Y. "It really didn't hurt business, but it hasn't improved it all that much either. We had a good rebound Tuesday. People felt

so cooped up from those days that they had to come downtown and go to the mall."

Stores Closed

Record Bar district supervisor Gene Kaudel, who is based in Greensboro, N.C. and supervises stores in North Carolina, West Virginia and Virginia, said that all the stores in his district were closed or in the process of closure last week, despite the fact most are located in malls.

John Marmaduke, president of Amarillo-based Hastings Books/Records/Video, also reported that many of the mall-located stores in southern Texas were doing little business because of the cold temperatures there. He added that "it rained a lot and the rain turned to ice." The slow traffic as a result of such dangerous road conditions caused many of the malls to shut down.

Some record retailers shut down their operations after other businesses in the area deemed such a move necessary.

"No businesses are open here," reported Alan Levenson, president of the Turtles chain in Atlanta, Ga. "There weren't even any banks or grocery stores open, so ain't nobody in hell going out to buy records."

Levenson said that his stores closed on Tuesday (Jan. 12) and would probably not open again until Monday (Jan. 18) morning. "We're out of business, and it's gonna take some act of God to melt all the snow," he said.

Areas Hardest Hit

Two of the hardest hit areas, according to the survey, were the Nashville retail community and the Northern California Bay Area.

In Northern California, retailers reported that operations at their stores were either impaired or halted due to torrential rains that flooded the area New Year's weekend and the following Monday and Tuesday.

The rains caused a historical milestone in the San Francisco area — closure, for the first time ever, of the Golden Gate Bridge. The bridge shutdown caused many retailers in the South San Francisco and Marin County areas to close outlets during the heaviest days of the storm.

While many stores in the city reported drop-offs in store traffic due to the rains, many of the suburban outlets also cited damages to store facilities and surrounding retail outlets.

Noting that three days of business "went down the drain with the rains," Jeff Howard, manager of the Corte Madera, Calif. Warehouse, said that all stores in the strip where his store is located also closed, primarily due to flooding of the center's parking lot.

The hardest hit areas during the rains in San Francisco were San Rafael and Santa

VSDA Votes To Become Separate Division Of NARM

LAS VEGAS — The Video Software Dealers Assn. (VSDA) officially became a division of the National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) during a post-Consumer Electronics Show (CES) meeting here Jan. 11.

According to Noel Gimbel, president of SoundVideo Unlimited and chairman of the VSDA advisory board, it was decided at the meeting that the initial goals of the VSDA, under NARM, will include the establishment of a toll-free (800) number to serve as a video anti-piracy hotline; a bonding program for VSDA member dealers to cover security deposits for the various software rental programs they choose to become involved in; holding a national VSDA convention in September in Chicago; association endorsement and support of rental surcharges on pre-recorded video software; the establishment of a monthly VSDA newsletter; and the collection of dealer business information and statistics.

A NARM spokesperson stated that, over the course of the next two weeks, it will be actively involved in a membership drive, sending out applications to pre-recorded video software dealers across the country. In addition, NARM executive vice president Joe Cohen is presently searching for an executive to oversee administrative duties for the organization.

The VSDA was originally formed as a trade group separate from NARM during a Nov. 16, 1981 meeting of video dealers in the Chicago area (**Cash Box**, Nov. 28, 1981). At the time, however, Gimbel, speaking for the VSDA as temporary advisory committee chairman and co-host of the meeting (along with NARM's Cohen), stated that he didn't rule out the possibility of

B/C Tops N.Y.; AOR Leads L.A. In Fall Arb Book


NEW YORK — The urban contemporary format continued to dominate the New York radio scene and AOR remained a favored format in Los Angeles, among contemporary music stations in the Fall 1981 Arbitron survey, according to preliminary figures released here last week.

While New York powerhouse news/talk station WOR, an RKO station, led the list with a 6.2 share, fellow RKO outlet WRKS, which on Aug. 1 switched its format from Top 40 to urban contemporary, rose from a 3.3 share in the Summer book to a whopping 5.6, making it the #4 station in the city. Similarly-formatted WKTU, #1 last summer with a 7.5 share, declined to 6.1 this time around, and competitor WBLS fell from 6.2 to 5.9 to occupy the #2 and #3 overall positions, respectively.

In Los Angeles, the ABC O&Os carried the day, as all-talk KABC-AM led the pack with an 8.0 share and AOR KLOS-FM topped contemporary music stations with a 4.7 share, beating traditional rival KMET, which followed with a 4.5 share. Interestingly enough, the *Los Angeles Times* recently named Tom Hedges, the KLOS PD, the Program Director of the Year. In addition, progressive rock outlet KROQ, rose from 1.8 last summer to 2.4 perhaps as a result of PD Rick Carroll's decision to add more new wave music to his station's playlist.

In New York, the management of WXLO last summer decided its Top 40 station

Cornyn Urges United Effort By Industry To Stop Hometaping

LOS ANGELES — A summit meeting of the representatives of the chief music industry trade and labor organizations on the dilemma of audio hometaping, held in New York and Washington Jan. 14-15, was viewed by Stan Cornyn, senior vice president of the Warner Communications Inc. Record Group, as the "first step" in battling the potentially damaging right-to-tape bills that have been introduced in Congress since the U.S. Circuit Court's Oct. 19 reversal of the Betamax decision.

"Hometaping is as harmful and against the law as shoplifting," said Cornyn at a

Tax Picture Dim For Musicians From Canada

OTTAWA — There seems to be little hope the federal government will revise income-averaging changes in the Nov. 12 budget, but Canadian recording industry representatives plan to meet again with federal officials this week to plead their case.

Last month, pop music managers complained that measures in the Nov. 12 budget to restructure the system of income averaging would force them to seek refuge with their clients in other countries (**Cash Box**, Dec. 19, 1981).


Although the federal government announced modifications to the sweeping budget on Dec. 18, the measures had little if any effect on the gist of the arguments presented by entertainers — that the fluctuant nature of their income is such that it is necessary they have incentives and protection during their prosperous years so they do not face poverty in leaner times.

A meeting late in December failed to resolve the issue, said Canadian Recording Industry Assn. (CRIA) president Brian Robertson.

Instead, industry representatives have commissioned a financial portrait of the "typical Canadian musician" over a period of 21 years. Robertson said association accountants will apply the portrait to the old and new income-averaging schemes to show federal officials that the Canadian performer will be seriously hurt by the new measures.

But if Robertson is being outwardly optimistic, others in the business community have long since given up hope for revisions to the budget. Indeed, many are hoping to weather the storm until another budget is handed down, likely at the end of the year.

Under the new income-forwarding scheme, income-averaging annuity contracts will no longer be purchased. An improved taxing structure and higher tax rebates will offset the elimination of income deferral, government officials say (**Cash Box**, Dec. 19, 1981).

Jan. 12 gathering of the California Copyright Conference here. "It's big, costly and growing, and we (the record industry) are defenseless." It is estimated that home taping costs, the record industry in excess of \$1 billion worldwide and \$350 million in the U.S. alone.

The Washington and New York meeting was primarily organizational in nature with the ultimate goal, according to Cornyn, being the alignment of the audio and motion picture industries in their lobbying efforts against hometaping.

Attending the summit, which was organized by the Recording Industry Assn. of America (RIAA) and the National Music Publishers Assn. (NMPA), were members of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP), Broadcast Music Inc. (BMI), the National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers (NARM), the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences (NARAS), the American Federation of Musicians, The AFL-CIO, the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA), the Country Music Assn. (CMA) and the Black Music Assn. (BMA) among others.

Cornyn conceded that the Motion Picture Assn. of America (MPAA) was concerned that extending the home taping fight to include the audio recording cause would "muddy the waters and ruin the base" of its effort. However, he maintained that the audio industry "can not stand by and let the battle be confined between machine makers and used movies. Washington will hear the problem out this year, but I doubt if they'll want to next year."

Cornyn pointed out that the audio industry would have to amass and mobilize a concerted lobbying effort by September in order to fight the consumer electronics industry's Right To Tape Coalition, whose campaign is already in full swing. He added that "the battleground" would be the proposed DeConcini Bill (S. 1758), which Congress will resume hearings on in March.

Cornyn also revealed that new statistics on the penetration of home taping would be disclosed in Washington D.C. in three weeks. And while he failed to give out any of the findings, he said that people "would be astounded at how widespread it is, and that the information would document billions of dollars lost because of home taping."

On the suggestion of imposing a royalty fee on blank tape to compensate rights holders for income lost through blank taping, Cornyn called the added fee "a decent form of relief." On the other hand, he said the proposal was "almost a defacto license to tape."

In closing, Cornyn urged that the movie and music industries unite in the fight against the "right to tape," which he said was more of an alluring phrase than the right of "intellectual property." And he urged that the two factions join in a "symbolic march on Washington" for the cause.


Academy Awards Cuts Back On Music Oscars

LOS ANGELES — The award for original score and its adaptation (or best adaptation score) will not be presented at the 54th annual Academy Awards because of an insufficient number of qualified submissions. As a result, only two music awards, original score and original song, will be made this year by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts & Sciences.

The decision not to present an Oscar for original score and adaptation was made by the Academy's board of governors upon the recommendation of the music branch.

Nicknamed "Those Bad Boys From Boston" when their first album came out in 1971, EMI-America recording group J. Geils Band has remained true to that phrase for the more than a decade, staying truer to the lowdown blues rock genre than any American band extant. The allegiance to the harmonica-squealing, R&B-fused boogie has paid off as the band is currently experiencing its highest charting album ever with "Freeze Frame."

Oh, the album, which is currently at #10 bullet on the **Cash Box** Pop Album chart, may be a bit more adventuresome and '80s pop-sounding than when the group came roaring out of Beantown in the early '70s with "Looking For Love" and "First I Look At The Purse," but the sextet has, for the most part, been true to its original roots.

And its 1981 winter tour, on which it opened several shows for the Rolling Stones, reaffirmed the group's status as one of the rowdiest, nastiest and most electrifying performing bands in rockdom.

Originally formed as The J. Geils Blues Band in 1967, the group dropped the "Blues" and added keyboard player Seth Justman in 1969 and has remained unchanged since.

Led by howling, scowling lead singer Peter Wolf, producer/keyboardist Justman, guitarist and band namesake J. Geils and enigmatic blues harp player Magic Dick, the band also features the cornerstone rhythm section of bassist Danny Klein and drummer Stephen Bladd.

While it remained one of America's most volatile and hard working bands through the early- and mid '70s, the band got its second wind when it signed with EMI America in 1978 and released the gold-selling "Sanctuary" LP.

Capitalizing on the momentum, the "bad boys" returned in 1980 with the platinum-certified tour de force, "Love Stinks," which featured such radio hits as "Comeback," "Just Can't Wait" and the jilted lover's anthem of a title cut.

And judging from the chart action on "Freeze Frame" and its irresistible first single, "Centerfold," which is currently at #3 bullet on the **Cash Box** Pop Singles chart, the J. Geils Band is on a roll that doesn't look like it's going to stop.

"Our goal is to appeal to everyone from the kids who want to party down to the funky butt stuff to the sentimentalist adults who prefer the lovey dovey ballads," says Butch Bonner, guitarist for contemporary R&B newcomer Zoom.

His street vernacular pretty much says it all as the eight-man, L.A.-based aggregation is one of the more versatile B/C-funk acts to emerge from the City Of Angels in some time. The band's debut LP for Polydor is evenly split between a side of riotous, hard grooving funk and a flipside of sweet, airy ballads.

The band's heavy rhythmic style has been groomed to funk perfection by famed R&B session drummer/producer James Gadson, who is responsible for the musical direction on debut release, "Saturday, Saturday Night."

"Being a drummer, Gadson understands the basic rhythmic foundation of the band," says Bonner, "but he's also allowed us to project our own atmosphere and attitude which comes across more directly when we play live — instant funniness."

"Everybody on down from our lead singer (Noland Semco), who does the funniest voice impersonations this side of Richard Pryor, to the drummer strives to bring a little bit of zaniness and happiness to the city people. You can hear it in songs like 'Saturday, Saturday Night' and 'Raid.'"

Consisting of guitarist Bonner, keyboardist Todd Duncan, vocalist Semco, keyboardist Marcus Robinson, bassist John Haynes, woodwinds player Henry Prejean, trumpeter Darryl Williams and drummer George Mitchell, the band was founded by Mitchell in 1979.

Mitchell collected four members of P.L.U.M., one of L.A.'s hottest performing R&B groups at the time, with some of his favorite out of town session men in forming Zoom. The octet went on to hone its chops at a small house in Inglewood, Calif.

"You'd be walking down the block and hear this tremendous sound coming out of a tiny neighborhood home," says Bonner. "The house sounded like a little amplifier."

After establishing its musical persona, the band set about deciding on a name. Having come up with several possibilities, they polled neighborhood children on names, and the resounding favorite was Zoom.

"I think we have an appeal for everyone, but the children are very important to us," says Bonner. "That's why in a song like 'Raid' we advocate getting out and having fun, but not to the point of going overboard when we sing the Zoom theme, 'Crime does not pay but the funk is here to stay.'"

Constantly at work on projects in and outside of the studio, the band, which prides itself on having enough backlog material to cover three albums, is fresh off year end performances at the Circle Star Theatre in San Francisco.

And while Zoom's short range goals consist of spreading its uplifting funk sound in concert and garnering airplay for the "Saturday, Saturday Night" LP, the long run plans are rather ambitious.

"We have our own production company (Zoom Musical Prods.), which not only concerns the band, but hires members out as studio musicians as well," explains Bonner. "Eventually we hope to handle sound, lighting, management and our television productions."



Lamont Cranston Band

After 11 years slugging it out on the Minnesota club and college circuit in one form or another, it is sadly ironic that talented Minneapolis blues 'n' rock aggregation the Lamont Cranston Band has been as well known on a national level as its namesake, the alter ego for early radio's phantom-like hero The Shadow. However, a series of events in the last few months have begun to change all that. Following the release of its fifth LP, the driving "Shakedown" on the Waterhouse label, the group received a call from the Rolling Stones to open a series of dates for them in Minneapolis, St. Louis and Cedar Rapids, Iowa. So impressed were the Stones with the band's performances, that they invited the boys to rejoin them for an additional Buffalo date at the last minute. While Lamont Cranston was unable to make the gig, by that time word had already spread, and after years of toiling in the near-obscurity of America's cold heartland, the band is finally receiving well-deserved recognition.

According to guitarist Charlie Bingham, talking from the sub-zero climes of the Land of a Thousand Lakes recently, a warming trend has been developing for the band of late. The prestigious booking agency ATI recently inked the group for representation, beginning with a West Coast tour swing opening for Molly Hatchet, and two major labels have been bidding for long-awaited contracts.

"It's very heartening for us, all this attention after so long," said a somewhat slightly dazed Bingham from his home as he struggled to fight off a cold. "We broke up for two months last summer and, as it turned out, it was probably the best thing we could have done. (keyboardist/vocalist) Bruce McCabe, (drummer) Jim Novak and I put together a band at that time and did some new material, much of which ended up on 'Shakedown'. When we all got back together we were refreshed, confident."

That confidence shows. "Shakedown" fairly bristles with a contemporary blues/rock intensity that compares favorably with the best of the J. Geils Band, while sacrificing none of the authenticity that has marked bands like the Fabulous Thunderbirds. In fact, Bingham says that, like the T-Birds, Lamont Cranston started as "a straight ahead Chicago blues band."

"(Vocalist/harp player) Pat Hayes had an acid rock band called The Moon about 12 years ago, and when that broke up, he, my brother Bob, his brother (guitarist/vocalist) Larry, Jim and myself formed Lamont Cranston. We all came from a similar background, where blues greats like Little Walter, Sonny Boy Williamson, John Lee Hooker, Slim Harpo and Albert King had been our biggest influences."

Lamont Cranston's first few albums reflected that blues orientation almost exclusively, from "Lamont Cranston Band" to "Specials Lit" and finally "El C Note," half of which was recorded live and had a more uptempo feel, with a stronger rock approach. But the fourth album was admittedly a letdown ("we didn't have much of a direction"), and the band had to re-group.

"On 'Shakedown' we went for more of a contemporary, good rockin' blues sound, and we were, I think, successful. A lot of people have this idea that the blues has to be depressing, which is a total fallacy.

EXECUTIVE PROFILE

Dick Griffey: Spotting Talent Is Key To Solar's Successes

LOS ANGELES — In the Solar Galaxy of Stars, Dick Griffey shines the brightest. As the patron star in this galaxy, Griffey heads a complex of companies that form the nucleus of a diverse entertainment empire sprawling from his highly successful Solar Records label to the operation of a stable where race horses are bred and trained.

Starting out with his Dick Griffey Productions, the 40-year-old record company president built a solid industry reputation to the point where he now directs a record company, an artist management company, music publishing firms and a fledgling film company.

But despite his adherence to modern business principles in developing his empire, Griffey does not cite intricate corporate systems for providing the energy that makes his multi-faceted operation go. He is most likely to note that his companies are a creative family comprised of experienced, qualified industry professionals.

With Griffey at the helm, a cadre of music industry professionals make each segment of the creative family operate independently.

Overseeing all activity for the Griffey Group of Companies, in addition to handling all legal affairs is attorney Virgil Roberts, executive vice president of the group and general counsel.

Heading up the marketing and promotion functions for Solar is Edna Collison, vice president of marketing and promotion for the label. Margaret Nash, vice president of creative services for Solar also heads activity in Griffey's publishing companies — Hip Trip (BMI) and Spectrum VII (ASCAP).

Heading up Dick Griffey Prods. is long-time associate Clyde Wasson, who serves as vice president of concert production. Carolyn Ali, executive director of Griffco Management, handles the artist rep operation for Griffey. The Solar Stables are under the direction of George Webb. To date there is no sole head over Griffway Films.

As Griffey puts it, "There is no need for me to be involved in development of every detail. I have confidence in the people who work in each area of company business."

One area Griffey has yet to entrust someone else with is A&R, which is a role he fulfills as much through instinct and gut feeling as he does through business acumen.

"If I have a talent, it is recognizing the talent of other people," Griffey told **Cash Box** recently. "I don't sign tapes; I sign acts."

"The Whispers were already a great singing group when I signed them," Griffey continued, adding, "I found some people who had been together for 10 years and just helped them become successful at what they already do well."

A&R Approach


Elaborating on his approach to A&R (when asked about Solar's A&R department, Griffey will say, "You're looking at him."), the label chief said, "I think that A&R people have a responsibility to send genuine talent out to the public."

"I think it's unfair to take a mediocre talent into the studio and create a great record when you don't have great talent... You've got to perpetuate what you started in the studio," he added.

Griffey said A&R would remain his function "until I feel I've found someone who can do it as well as I can."

While Solar staffers like Leon Sylvers III and William Shelby would appear to have the inside track toward that spot, Griffey said that each Solar act is self-contained and capable of self-development.

The Solar roster is full of names quickly becoming mainstays at R&B and pop radio,

including, The Whispers, Carrie Lucas, Shalamar, Dynasty and Lakeside. New additions to the Solar galaxy include Midnight Star, Klymaxx, The Sylvers, Collage and, under an agreement with the Whisper's production arm, Leroy Hudson.

Expanding Goals

It was the desire to further the career of these artists and expand the company's involvement in each phase of entertainment, according to Griffey, that led him away from his distribution arrangement with RCA Records and into a similar arrangement with Elektra/Asylum Records and the WEA fold.

"RCA did a great job for me and I suspect they have the best black marketing team in the country," said Griffey. "But black music is not just for black people."

"The advantage of moving to E/A is that I was with an entertainment-oriented company," he added, continuing that he felt that WCI was perhaps one of the most innovative and complete entertainment corporations he had ever encountered.

He further said that "they (WCI) operate



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

LOS ANGELES — Kenny Rogers Prods. Inc. has filed suit against The Able Art Co., also known as Aardvark Art, and Gerald McGlothlin in U.S. District Court, Northern District of Illinois, for misappropriation of right of publicity and for false designation of origin over a poster of Rogers produced by Aardvark Art.

The production company sued for injunctive relief, the defendant's profits and damages of at least \$100,000.

The poster, which is an artist's rendering of Rogers in four action poses, includes two poses, which, the plaintiff's claim, appear to be based on photographs taken from the Rogers' album covers.

"We will prosecute this matter vigorously," said attorney Eric Wurst, whose firm, Milsson, Robbins, Dalgaard, Berliner, Carson and Wurst, is representing the production company.

Fields Management Set

LOS ANGELES — Judi Barlowe Fields has formed the Judi Barlowe Fields Management. The new company will represent comedian Harry Anderson, singer Bill Medley and actor Danny Wells.

The firm has announced that upcoming projects for Medley include a new single release and a syndicated cable TV show originating from the singer's nightclub, "Medleys"; that Anderson will be appearing on *Saturday Night Live* and in Francis Coppola's *The Escape Artist*; and that Wells will be continuing his role in the television series, "The Jeffersons," and will also be entering into a development deal with Viacom Productions for a new television series.

NEW YORK — Danny Strick has been named vice president of creative activities at United Artists (UA) Music. In this capacity, he will continue to work with young writers and teach them how to develop musical properties. He will be based in UA's Los Angeles office.

ABKCO Reports Loss

NEW YORK — ABKCO Industries, Inc. reported revenues of \$7,261,329 and a net loss of \$1,032,972, or 90 cents per share, for the year ended Sept. 30, 1981. Operations for the fourth quarter, which ended last Sept. 30, resulted in a net income of \$177,799, or 15 cents per share, compared with a loss of \$41,285, or three cents per share, for the same period in 1980. Net income for 1981's fourth quarter was due in part to a tax benefit of \$222,251 stemming from the operating loss. Fourth quarter revenues for 1981 amounted to \$1,762,337.

On Dec. 31, 1980, ABKCO ceased operations of Chips, its independent wholesale distribution division. The ensuing loss of wholesale revenue was reportedly the primary cause of the revenue decline. The firm also reportedly lost money on a Broadway production entitled *It Had To Be You*.

Shanachie Inks U.K.'s Greensleeves For U.S.

LOS ANGELES — Shanachie Records has completed a deal with England's Greensleeves Records to manufacture and distribute the entire Greensleeves line, making its reggae catalog available in the United States at domestic prices.

The catalog, which includes more than 25 LPs and 60 disco 12" 45s by such artists as Black Uhuru, Wailing Souls, Augustus Pablo, Heptones, Scientists and others, will be made available in its entirety.

Greensleeves-USA will be distributed by Shanachie's independent distributors, including Release Records, Richman Brothers, Tone, MJS, Action, Progress, Old Fogey and House.

MCA Endorses NARM 'Gift Of Music' Ad Blitz

LOS ANGELES — MCA Records recently became the latest major record company to announce endorsement of the National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) "Give The Gift Of Music" institutional ad campaign.

The NARM ad plan is scheduled to officially commence May 9 (Mother's Day) and be employed on subsequent gift-giving days, like Father's Day (June 20) and during graduations in June.

MCA joins 14 other large and small labels that have pledged support of the NARM plan, which calls for record companies to forward to the trade association one half cent from each record sold for use in a TV blitz during the spring. The campaign will emulate other gift-giving campaigns used to promote flower or greeting cards.

Light and catchy enough for broad AM pop play, the tune sports Beatlesque harmonies and a memorable melody yet Stephen Dees' vocal is gruff enough for AOR.

With the addition of new lead singer Henry Small, who recorded one LP for Columbia with his group Small Wonder, veteran Canadian rockers Prism hit a rock groove that few AOR outlets will be able to turn down. Melodic riff rock, with a Foreigner-like bent, it's a pick to click on pop, too.

The soft, harmony-laden pop of this entry from Canada's China should appeal instantly to the lighter pop and A/C-oriented stations. Dave Teig has departed as general manager of Atlantic Studios in New York. **FROM THE NEWS DESK** — An appearance by **Fingerpritz** will be the first prize in a New York City School's Drug Rehabilitation Program being co-sponsored with the IDRC DJ pool and radio station WRKS (Kiss-FM). Two-months worth of drug education curriculum presented in City jr. high schools will be followed by a city-wide exam. The school scoring highest on the test will play host to a concert by the group . . . **B.B. King** has donated his record collection, including some 7,000 rare and not-so-rare recordings, to the University of Mississippi Center for the Study of Southern Culture. A spokesman for Ole Miss said the collection also included a good deal of jazz, rock 'n' roll and gospel (no surprise since King once ran his own gospel label), as well as an outstanding sampling of post-World War II blues. The donation was in support of a three-year Challenge Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the collection will be appraised in the near future. . .

Carmine Appice, fresh from his inking with Pasha/CBS, has been travelling around the country hosting drum battles and drum clinics in support of UNICEF. Appice brings his clinic to Long Island this week, and will then host a show at the Savoy in New York again in support of UNICEF. While guests on the bill will not be announced in advance, **Billy Joel**, **Pretender Chrissie Hynde** and the **Garbage State's Favorite Son Bruce Springsteen** are considered good bets, as is a **Vanilla Fudge** reunion. Sponsors for the extravaganza include WNEW-FM, MTV, David Knight and the Savoy and the Source Radio Network, which will record the show for future broadcast. . . Those Beats for the eighties, **J. Walter Negro** and the **Loose Jointz**, are in the studio putting the finishing touches on their debut LP for **John Hammond's** Zoo York Records. Twelve-inch collectors no doubt cherish the group's single, "Shoot The Pump," which was the label's first release. An auspicious start, but alas, apparently released too late in the summer to cash in on the record's seasonal theme. Be on the look out for a graffiti show by J. Walter and company at a downtown gallery . . . "Piano Players," a video documentary on New Orleans R&B piano by **Stevenson Palfi** will soon air on the CBS cable network. Among the artists highlighted are **Allen Toussaint**, **Tuts Washington** and **Professor Longhair**, with footage from Longhair's funeral reportedly included. . . The rest of the country finds out about the **Waitresses** this week when PolyGram/Ze releases their first LP, "Wasn't Tomorrow Wonderful." Also coming is a re-issue of the girls' first single, "Boys Are Such Creeps" . . . While mentioning Ze, our apologies for reporting last week that Ze was distributing **Alan Vega's** "Collision Drive" on Celluloid. The record is on Ze, distributed by Celluloid. Sorry . . . Drummer **Gil Moore of Triumph** was recently arrested in Cincinnati for violating the city's fire code when he exhorted the crowd to light matches and cigarette lighters. Seems its against Cincinnati law to display an open fire in a concert hall . . . The **Rolling Stones** reportedly took in between \$40 and \$50 million on plus-profit items alone on their recent tour . . . Geffen Records says that work is progressing on the debut album by **Asia**. The group features **Carl Palmer**, **Steve Howe** and former members of **King Crimson** and the **Buggles**. Look for a March release . . . **Clarence Clemmons** and **Miami Steve Van Zant of E Street Band** fame are in the studio with solo projects . . . Excerpts from the reunion of **Eric Clapton** and **Jeff Beck** in London that took place awhile back will be featured on Island's forthcoming "The Other Secret Policeman's Ball" . . . Did anybody notice that Max's Kansas City finally closed? The shuttering took place about three weeks ago, following many months of rumors that the famed club was ready to go belly-up . . . This year's United Cerebral Palsy Telethon will feature a live broadcast from the Lone Star Cafe with **Don McLean** and **Lynn Anderson**. Also appearing from Gotham will be **Kiss**, **Peter, Paul and Mary** and **Tom Chapin** . . . **Nick Garvey**, formerly of the **Motors**, has formed a new, as yet unnamed group featuring former Motor-mate **Bob Hendry** . . . Nigerian superstar and personal fave **Fela Anikulapo Kuti** has finally been released from jail. The man frequently referred to as Africa's most critically-acclaimed artist was arrested in Lagos in December and charged with robbing the country's 7-Up bottling plant and stealing a car . . . **Todd Rundgren** has won his suit against the British Musician's Union. Rundgren began action three years ago when he was denied permission to broadcast live over radio and TV to England and Europe from a performance at the Venue in London. The settlement is expected to clear the way for musicians to do live radio and television broadcasts from Great Britain without interference.

STAYIN' LOOSE WITH DUNN & BRUCE — No doubt black contemporary fans recognized some old friends with a new name last week when **Dunn and Bruce Street** came onto the B/C Singles chart with "If You Come With Me." The duo is none other than veteran writers/arrangers/producers **Dunn Pearson, Jr.** and **Bruce Gray**, who first met when **Jim Tyrrell** brought them together to work on **Patrice Banks's** solo LP. Separately, their credits are impressive, with Dunn entering the field in the sixties as part of the **Ponderosa Twins**, handled by east coast vet **Joe Robinson**. He followed that up with a seven-year stint with the **O'Jays** as keyboardist, eventually producing some of their tracks. Recent arranging projects have included the new **Spinners** LP and work with **Teddy Pendergrass**, as well as forthcoming albums by **Lou Rawls** and **Stephanie Mills**. Gray's history includes songwriting and production duties with the likes of **Eddie Kendricks**, the **Trammps** and **Linda Clifford** and together the duo has just penned a single for **Handshake's** **Revolution**. Their own Dunn and Bruce Street project is characterized by Pearson as "a little something of our own." Strongest radio response has been from Chicago, Cleveland and Boston, with Gotham now hopping on the bandwagon via WRKS and WNJR adds. "We're really trying to get the pop cross-over working now," said Pearson, adding that an LP is in the works. Keep your ears peeled.

Named for the last song that the late blues rock legend ever recorded with Big Brother & The Holding Company, this album is a must for anyone who cares about the history of rock 'n' roll. It's the Holding Co. material that's really of interest here, as Janis and the band are caught in their '60s West Coast rock 'n' roll glory. A song with the Paul Butterfield Blues Band, "One Night Stand," is probably the tightest track on the record, but Joplin's searing, gravel-voiced blues is at its best on live tracks like "Catch Me Daddy" and "Farewell Song." True blues for rockers.




STANDING HAMPTON — Sammy Hagar — Geffen GHS 2006 — Producer: Keith Olsen — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Mr. Trans Am has always been one of those rock 'n' rollers on the brink of superstardom. Past efforts like "Red" and "Turn Up The Music" are classic examples of formula AOR, but his new album is going to break him as one of the FM rock stars of the year. His gripping style of riff rock is paced by a gem called "I'll Fall In Love Again" and a torrid version of the old Big Brother and the Holding Co. classic "Piece Of My Heart." Helping out the crunching guitar and Hagar's hard rock growl is the expert production of Keith Olsen. Ideal hard rock.

Cara was not only the star of the hit movie, but she made the two most lasting contributions to the soundtrack of *Fame* with the title track and "Out Here On My Own." She has a young energetic vocal style that comes across as more heartfelt on ballads than on uptempo numbers like the title track. Luckily she's found a producer, Ron Dante, who can direct lush Manilow-like ballads, as well as more uptempo synth/dance numbers. A searing remake of the Motown classic "Reach Out, I'll Be There" and the poppy "Wha'd Ya Want" are other highlights of this excellent debut for Network.

Franks lazily sensual vocals and mellow jazz pop musical stylings have long made him a favorite of young romantics and the upper demographic females. The Gauguin painting on the album cover pretty much describes the music — literate, tropical and ever so sexy. The group stands as one of the wittiest and most appealing denizens of the new rock, and songs like "The New Stone Age" and "Souvenir" prove it. A little darker than past efforts, but the use of keyboard and choir are outstanding.

This veteran Northern California musician has relocated to L.A. and become one of the city's most in-demand songwriters. He also proves that 15 years of music in and outside the Son Of Champlin have given him a knack for making heartfelt, straight ahead, horn-filled rock. Elements of the Doobies, Boz Scaggs and Loggins and Messina can be seen in his style, but he has a loose, soulful blues approach that is refreshingly non-glossy. Goodtime West Coast rock from a guy who paid his dues and learned. For AOR.

RIDIN' SHOTGUN — Jessi Colter — Capitol ST 12185 — Producers: Randy Scruggs and Waylon Jennings — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Jessi Colter has one of those voices, that, once you develop a taste for it, you can't get enough. The same is true of her prolific and often profound songwriting. Her latest album reflects an intensity and maturity that her big pop/country hit, "I'm Not Lisa," suggested. Although all the cuts are enjoyable, there is one particular cut that features husband Waylon Jennings and daughter Jennifer Farness that is particularly refreshing.



This Akron, Ohio-based sextet came to national attention via a quirky little bit of female titillation called "I Know What Boys Like." Led by lead guitarist/producer Chris Butler, formerly of Tin Huey, the band's songs are immersed in the female psyche and are sung ever so teasingly by lead vocalist Patty Donahue. Many of the songs do express the modern day high school viewpoint and are augmented by the band's jerky, new rock jam style. Best cuts are "No Guilt" and the title.

FINALLY — T.G. Sheppard — Warner Bros. BSK 3600 — Producer: Buddy Killen — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

Still reeling from the great success of his last album, "I Love 'Em All," T.G. Sheppard comes back hard and strong with a new album that is even more pop-influenced than the last — which isn't to say it won't appeal to country audiences, because it certainly will. Sheppard fans have come to expect quality country cum pop renderings from the recording artist, and he disappoints no one with songs like "Only One You," "We're Walking On Thin Ice" and "All My Cloudy Days Are Gone."



JUKE BOX DURY — Ian Dury & The Blockheads — Stiff America USE 17 — Producers: Various — List: 8.98

Kudos to Stiff America for putting this greatest hits package together. The album contains the best material from Dury's early Stiff days, and it proves him out as a major musical mirthmaker for the working class. His cockney music hall style and Chas Jankel's eclectic jazz honky tonk arrangements have supplied some of the most engaging moments in new wave music. Contains such classics as "Rhythm Stick," "Sex and Drugs..." and "Sweet Gene Vincent."



SATURDAY, SATURDAY NIGHT — Zoom — Polydor PD-1-6343 — Producer: James Gadson — List: 8.98

This eight-man contemporary B/C act from Los Angeles offers up an album of half party-time funk and half lovey dovey ballads on its debut for the Polydor label. Produced by famed session drummer James Gadson, the album particularly shines on the more rhythmic, in the hump funk side. Songs like the title track and "Raid" stand up alongside anything Kool & The Gang has delivered of late. Strong debut for B/C lists.

HOT ASH — Wishbone Ash — MCA MCA-5283 — Producers: Wishbone Ash — List: 8.98 — Bar Coded

This veteran British rock band was one of the originators of the twin harmony guitar sound, and between 1969 and now, it has logged a lot of great licks, as well as personnel changes. This live album recorded at various stages of the band's latter day career ('78-'80) proves just how volatile a force it has been in rock. The solid mainstream rock classics on this LP are best represented by "Blowin' Free," "Doctor," and "No Easy Road." An AOR must.



RODNEY ON THE ROQ, VOL. 2 — Posh Boy PBS 123 — Producer: Robble Fields — List: 5.98

This is the second in a series of compilation albums featuring Los Angeles-based bands played on Rodney Bingenheimer's infamous KROQ radio show. And if you think it's a collection of garage punk bands, you're sadly mistaken. Side one does have its share of hard core slam bands like Black Flag and Agent Orange, but side two features such strong new music entities as Gleaming Spires and Geza X. Tasty package for adventuresome AOR.



Dick Griffey: Spotting Talent Is Key To Solar's Success

like I operate; they have a kind of family corporation although they do big numbers every year.

"From where I'm trying to go as an individual and from where I'm trying to take my company," Griffey said, "the relationship with WCI is more complementary to Solar Industry's aspirations."

Aspirations

Since he was a youngster, Griffey aspired for a career in the music business, with his mother, veteran gospel singer Juanita Hines, serving as the initial and deepest inspiration toward that goal.

The young Griffey played in several Nashville high school age R&B bands until he enrolled at Tennessee State University where he played football for a time. In 1958 he left school to join the Navy, touring several posts until he settled in Los Angeles in 1961.

In 1966, Griffey renewed his interest in a music career when he and former L.A. Laker star Dick Barnett opened a nightclub in the Crenshaw district of Los Angeles, where Griffey was responsible for booking talent.

After some false starts as an area promoter of black talent, Griffey hit his stride in 1970 when he claims he was selling out "five or six shows a year at the Forum."

With a firm reputation beneath him, Griffey later teamed with *Soul Train* creator and producer Don Cornelius as talent coordinator for the show.

It is with Cornelius that Griffey made his first foray into the business of producing records.

At Griffey's urging, the two black entertainment entrepreneurs formed the Soul Train Gang from the youngsters who came and danced on the show each week. A studio single using sessionists, had already been cut and Griffey shopped the record, a remake of the show's theme, titled, "Soul Train '75," to every label.

"We went to every major label in the business and they told us 'hey, you're a great concert promoter and Cornelius is a great TV producer, but what do you know about making records?'"

A friend told Griffey that RCA Records was looking to get into the black music business and with the help of RCA's Mel Illberman Soul Train Records got \$5,000 for its single. The record was a top 10 soul chart success but only a moderate success on the pop chart.

Illberman hung with Soul Train and offered the outfit an associated label deal and

\$200,000 calling for the new company to deliver four LPs.

In addition to the Soul Train Gang, Carrie Lucas, and a group of youngsters named Shalamar, Griffey managed to firmly secure RCA's good blessing with the acquisition of veteran R&B group The Whispers (whom he managed) from the Chess/Janus label, outbidding other labels interested in the group. Griffey ultimately paid \$50,000 for their recording contract.

Although RCA had advanced money to the young company, Cornelius and Griffey jointly went \$500,000 in the red, leading Cornelius to ask out of the record business in 1977. The TV producer sold his interest to Griffey, who vowed to continue working with the artists.

Solar Formed

"I believed in the label and I was responsible for signing those artists," recalls Griffey, adding, "I didn't just want to abandon them with RCA."

"They had very little chance at RCA with me," he continued. "Without me, I felt they had no chance."

In 1978, Griffey changed the name of the company to Solar Records and renewed the recording deal, with special provisions that RCA would pay overhead and studio-related costs.

The label president recalls that he made a major coup when now defunct ABC Records dropped a group named Lakeside, another group managed by Griffey, from its roster.

ABC's mistake was Solar's gain, according to the record label chief.

"I'll always beat those big guys at what they do because I get out there and find out what's going on with a band instead of trying to make them conform to some popular image," said Griffey.

The only area of conformity that he insists upon is that everybody associated with Solar Records be working toward making hit records — and he will settle for nothing less.

Today, Griffey allows members of his staff to forge ahead in their respective areas of expertise, merely overseeing their work, and providing confirmation where necessary.

"The most successful guy is the one who surrounds himself with qualified people who can do the job without someone telling them how," said Griffey. "I'm convinced that Solar has that kind of business and creative family right now."

First off is his announcement that he has agreed to star opposite the lovely **Catherine Deneuve** in the film version of **Whitley Streiber's** best seller, *The Hunger*. Bowie will aptly play a vampire. Filming is scheduled to begin in New York and London in March, with **Tony Scott** directing . . . On the musical front, Bowie has just finished waxing the theme to **Paul Schrader's** new film, *The Cat People*, with techno pop wiz **Giorgio Moroder**. The single is called "Putting The Fire Out With Gasoline," and it will be included in the MCA soundtrack, which will be out shortly before the film's release in March . . . And finally, Bowie has completed the EP he recorded to accompany his starring role in the BBC version of Bertolt Brecht's *Baal*. RCA will release the record in Britain in March to coincide with the teleplay's air ate. No U.S. date is scheduled as of yet.

MICK & MUDDY — If you're wondering whatever happened to the film of that blues jam that the **Rolling Stones** staged with **Muddy Waters** and friends at **Buddy Guy's** Checkerboard lounge in Chicago earlier this year, stop being curious. The Nov. 22 show before a hundred or so folk in Chi-town's southside will become part of a **Hal Ashby**-directed Stones movie. The hour-long clip was going to be part of the Stones Dec. 18 broadcast, but **Mick Jagger** felt it was such classic footage that it is going to be included in the big picture. The Stones rented the club for the evening, so it wasn't exactly impromptu, but a crack film crew, as word has it, caught one smokin' jam. Lead guitar trade offs between **Buddy Guy** and **Keith Richards** are said to be scene stealers. But we can't wait to see a band consisting of Muddy, Mick, Keith, Buddy, **Ron Wood**, **Ian Stewart** and **Junior Wells** doin' it after midnight.

URGH!: A PROTRACTED MUSIC WAR — On paper or in mind, we suppose, the idea seemed utopian, perhaps even radical. London stage and film impressario **Michael White**, whose credits have included such successes as *Monty Python and The Holy Grail* and *The Rocky Horror Show*, decided to take a smattering of bands representing almost every conceivable socio/political bent and musical style in the prickly new music spectrum, give each act a relatively equal amount of time on screen, cut out the wretched excesses of past performance films (i.e. incomprehensible and meandering backstage interviews, lengthy crowd shots, etc.) and keep the focus on the music itself. The result, a 112-minute compilation that moves ceaselessly from the avant garde (**Klaus Nomi**, **Pere Ubu**) to the mainstream (**Go-Go's**, **Devo**

and **The Police**), from the ridiculous (**Oingo Boingo**, **Skafish** and **Surf Punks**) to the sublime (**Au Pairs**, **Magazine**) with no apparent rhyme or reason. Trimmed to 29 performances from an original 34 with some of the more obscure bands cut (**Athletic Spizz**, **John Cooper Clarke**, **John Otway**, **Invisible Sex**, **Sploogness Abounds**), the film has had some problems getting released up to this point . . . and we can see why; it has limited (at best) commercial potential. The film does contain some high points, such as **The Cramps'** punk rockabilly version of "Tear It Up" with hilarious lead singer **Lux Interior**, his tight pants threatening to fall to his knees, swallowing the microphone. But these scenes are few and far between, and their effect is diminished by such silly sequences as **Gary Numan** looking pretentiously serious as he rides around his amusement park stage set in a modified golf cart. And the movie, while tightly directed by **Derek Burbridge** in London, Paris, New York and California club and concert locales, falls prey to the same drawback that dogged *Dance Craze*, the ska film with which *Urgh!* has much in common; it tends to bog down in showing one performance after another without interruption. Unlike *The Decline Of Western Civilization*, it has no center and very little the viewer can react to, one way or another. And with **Miles** and **Ian Copeland** as "creative consultants" (Ian, as head of Frontier Booking, helped with the tour logistics, while Miles provided his prized Police as the commercial ace-in-the-hole to open and close the film), there is a natural bias towards I.R.S.; not counting the Police, a full eight of the 29 acts are either I.R.S. or I.R.S. (and A&M) associated. That however, is a small gripe in comparison to the numb feeling one leaves with when the film concludes.

CLOSER TO HOME — **Billy and the Beaters** have disbanded. Leader **Billy Vera** will continue pursuing a career with his keyboardist and horn players, but he has fired his rhythm section. Vera isn't worrying though, he got the **Muscle Shoals Rhythm Section** to play behind him on his new **Jerry Wexler**-produced LP . . . The Central is not just a good place for rock veterans to get together and jam, it's now a reasonably priced rehearsal during the days. **John Mayall** and his re-grouped **Bluesbreakers** and **Spencer Davis'** new band have been making use of the venue's mixing board and fine P.A. system in the afternoons. **Evan Hosie** has left Epic Records' publicity staff. She can be reached at (213) 936-1566.

GRAMMY ODDITIES — While the nominations for this year's 24th Grammy's presentation were their usual predictable selves, we did manage to find a few odd choices among the 59 categories this year though. We were most amused by the best new artist category that featured local girls made good the **Go-Go's** and new romantic dandies **Adam and the Ants**, along with hot R&B/pop vocalists **James Ingram**, **Luther Vandross** and **Sheena Easton** . . . The field for Best Rock Vocal Performance — Female was not surprisingly headed up by **Nicks** and **Benatar**, but the inclusion of **Yoko Ono's** "Walking On Thin Ice" single, **Donna Summer's** "Cold Love" track and **Lulu's** (Yes, we said Lulu) "Who's Foolin' Who" track make it one of the strangest grabs for the Grammy this year . . . It was also a pleasure to see that the Rock Vocal Performance—Male category opened up wide enough to embrace **Rick James'** hard pumping "Superfreak" this year . . . One of the strangest entries in the usual staid field of Rock Instrumental Performance is **Robert Fripp's** "League Of Gentlemen." Glad to see someone appreciates a forward thinker . . . If people are shocked to see Irish new rockers **The Undertones'** name in the Grammy Awards this year, it's simply for the album graphics to the "Positive Touch" LP . . . And finally, the most displaced act we could find this year was **Joe Cocker** with the **Crusaders**, who have been nominated in, of all places, Best Inspirational Performance in the Gospel Field.

SOUND VIEWS

AND WHAT A CES IT WAS — The numbers tell the story. More than 67,000 people attended this year's 1981 International Winter Consumer Electronics Show (CES) in Las Vegas Jan. 7-10, and for this, the 25th CES, the record-breaking figure symbolizes a new chapter in the growth of what many say is "the industry of the '80s." To say, as CES vice president **Bill Glasgow** did, that show organizers "never expected such a strong turnout" would be a mild understatement in view of the depressed economy. EIA/CEG vice president **Jack Wayman** conjectured that the massive dealer influx this year was due to the fact that "retailers early in the Fall generally bought against a plan for a sluggish holiday selling season," which, indeed, started off slow but then "accelerated in some stores." The result,

Wayman felt, was that by the beginning of the new year, many retailers' inventories had been depleted and they came *en masse* to the CES to place orders for the first quarter. But of course there were other reasons. The boom in home video games, detailed in a *Time* Magazine cover story last week, brought swarms of those who came to buy, or perhaps just ogle at, the latest programs from industry leaders such as Atari and Mattel, while others were lured by the promise and potential of new video cassette recorders, especially stereo models, and videodisc units. There were also those dealers who came to the CES to vent their feelings, mostly negative, on video software suppliers' rental programs (see separate item) . . . A few companies, such as Sony, were not on the floor at the Winter show with full exhibits, opting instead to go with their mammoth displays at the Summer show because, traditionally, it was the better attended of the two (up until this year). In addition, as Sony Consumer Products president **Joseph Lagore** noted, the Summer show is also more important to the company because "it follows, by one month, our new product line introduction" and therefore makes more sense to exhibit at that time. From Sony's private suite at the Hilton Hotel, where the company was showing off its new SL-2500 ultracompact, state-of-the-art Betamax as part of a component audio/video system, Lagore praised the CES, calling it "very valuable in giving the whole industry a hype," and characterized it as "anti-recessionary." Of the industry in general, Lagore called it "soft right now," predicting that "there will be some dumping in the Spring" due to "over-capacity" but, like some of his peers, felt that it would rebound by year end. Sony's hi-fi component business, like its competitors, was not seeing the tremendous growth it once was, according to Lagore, although it's still "ahead of '81," and he predicted "the next big shot hi-fi will get will be from the Compact Disc (CD)" which they expect to intro in first quarter '83. Despite a "relatively slow start," Lagore indicated that Sony "has not written off the (video) disc business," and the firm is "still holding (its) options open."

VID SOFTWARE DEALERS DECRY RENTAL PLANS AT CES — The sign on the press room message board said "Open Meeting on Jan. 9 . . . for retailers involved in sale or rental of cassettes/discs . . . If you have other conflicting appointments, we urge you to cancel them and attend this meeting — the only dealer meeting to be held at the CES . . . This is your future. GET INVOLVED NOW!" What we found when we got to the meeting was a hostile crowd of some 200 or so dealers who were mad as hell at video rental programs and weren't going to take it anymore . . . and the straw that broke the camel's back was Warner Home Video's newly-revised plan, "Dealer's Choice." Organized by a couple of Chicago-area dealers, the 90-minute "meeting" was more like a free-for-all of individual grievances that at times had the appearance of a lynch mob or the French Revolution. We half expected to see Bugs Bunny hanging in effigy from a noose while Madame LaFarge unwound spools of *Superman*. Compromises were shouted down as quickly as they were recommended and those that raised their hands when asked for a show of who joined what program were hooted at. A Salt Lake City dealer whipped the anger of the crowd up by noting that the suppliers were going direct to "grocery stores," while another said that in Chicago "MGM (CBS Home Video) is going into Sears, J.C. Penney's, Montgomery Ward's and 7-11 stores," adding, "If we don't get together and they start special deals . . . through those outfits, we're dead." Another dealer incited the crowd's anger to new heights when he mentioned that his brother in the pay TV business had told him that nine of the movies in WHV's rental plan would appear on pay television over the course of the year. It had all the earmarks of a scared, desperate gathering. While those who attended voted to throw their full support behind a national dealers association, they generally had disdain for the present VSDA. Calling it "distributor-oriented" and were suspicious of possible NARM influence. Now that the VSDA is officially a separate division of NARM (see separate story), the group may be in for a tough time in obtaining support from the majority of dealers . . . One company that is "keeping things simple" is MCA. According to MCA Distributing president **Al Bergamo**, the company is hiking prices effective Feb. 1 (**Cash Box**, Jan. 16), but won't be calling it a surcharge. "Paramount calls it a surcharge, we're just calling it a price increase," said Bergamo at the MCA booth at CES. "The business is still new and relatively small and you can't confuse people. We had a very good year last year, and we're not interested in a rental plan," Bergamo beamed as irate dealers stormed the WHV booth across the walkway.

VIDEO SOFTWARE NOTES — CBS Video Enterprises (CVE) presenting **Shakespeare** on Broadway? That's right. In association with **Barry** and **Fran Weissler**, CVE will make its Broadway production debut with a new version of *Othello*, starring **James Earl Jones** and **Christopher Plummer**, in a five-week limited engagement at the Winter Garden Theatre in N.Y. beginning Feb. 3. CVE plans to tape the show at the closing of its run on the Great White Way. This new venture follows close on the heels of its announcement that MGM/CBS Home Video will release the Royal Shakespeare Company's presentation of Charles Dickens' *Nicholas Nickleby*. . . From the Bard we segue into a more contemporary pop cultural phenomenon, rock music, and one of its leading lights, namely **The Who**. RCA SelectaVision has announced that it plans to release in May a videodisc of the Who's film *The Kids Are Alright* in what is reportedly the first American home video deal made by the band. We can probably expect the film *Quadrophenia* to follow in the months to come, and there is a good chance that RCA will have that one as well. **michael glynn**

Record Attendance At CES Spurs 'Best Sales Show Ever'

LAS VEGAS — With total attendance at a record-high 67,782 by the close of its four-day run here, the 1982 International Winter Consumer Electronics Show (CES) Jan. 7-10 proved to be the largest of the 25 shows by the Electronics Industry Assn./Consumer Electronics Group (EIA/CEG) since 1967. According to Bill Glasgow, CES vice president, many of the more than 900 exhibitors that came also considered it one of the most successful shows in terms of sales.

Sony Files For Supreme Court Betamax Hearing

LOS ANGELES — Sony announced Jan. 13 that it will file for a Supreme Court hearing in hopes of overturning the Oct. 19, 1981 decision by the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, which ruled that off-the-air home videotaping of TV programs was in violation of federal copyright laws. The Appeals Court had earlier turned down Sony's request for an en banc review of its decision in the copyright case which dates back to 1976, when MCA, through its Universal Studios, and Walt Disney Productions filed suit against Sony, its ad agency, a number of retail corporations and a private individual over the manufacture and sale of the Betamax video cassette recorder (VCR).

"We have to file within 90 days but there's no telling when, or even if, they would hear the case," said Bill Baker, Sony vice president of corporate communications. "The Supreme Court only hears maybe 150 out of some 5,000 cases each year and they'll have to fit it into what is undoubtedly a very long schedule."

Although there is legislation currently pending in both the Senate and the House of Representatives that would create a home use exemption for videotaping, Baker stated that Sony is treating the legal and judicial actions as parallel yet separate.

"We have to proceed as if there was no legislative action taking place," noted Baker. "We will continue to fight for reversal of that decision."

future affiliation with NARM, adding "it hasn't exactly been decided where NARM fits in."

Last week at his company's headquarters in Niles, Ill., Gimbel said, "Out of the meeting the VSDA became a separate division of NARM. We simply felt that NARM would best set up events, bylaws and generally lend a professional organization to a new and growing industry."

John Marmaduke, president of NARM and Hastings Books/Records/Video, noted that this most recent development between VSDA and NARM points to the fact that many dealers have now resolved initial doubts about the utilization of NARM as an effective trade body to represent them.

"I think that it was more emotional than factual," said Marmaduke. "Those outside the business now realize that thousands of video dealers are already members of NARM; look at the Musiclands, the Camelots, the Hastings and others. A lot of people just got bogged down in semantics. I don't want to exclude anybody from the organization and neither does NARM. Under this new set-up, the VSDA will have the benefit of all expertise and experience NARM has to offer while remaining a separate division."

"It was without a doubt our biggest show ever, and a lot of exhibitors said it was their best show ever," enthused Glasgow. "The conferences were better than well-attended, with people at many of the sessions spilling out into the hallways. In fact, they were packed right up through the personal computers/video games conference on Sunday, the last day of the show, which is generally a pretty slow day for us. We never expected such a strong turnout."

Jack Wayman, senior vice president of the EIA/CEG stated that the show's success, in view of recessionary economic conditions, was a "clear indication that consumer electronics is the growth area of the '80s."

Glasgow said that the CES exhibit area, which covered 532,000 net square feet of space, will pick up an additional 140,000 square feet in the Las Vegas Convention Center next year for added displays as a result of present construction.

The CES vice president also said that the Compu-Match system was "well-used" in its CES debut, as more than 360 exhibitors with products and services available for export were included in the multi-language computer program. And the Right To Tape booth, a first for the show, also attracted more than 2,500 attendees, who, for three dollars, were able to send messages to their legislators supporting pending home taping bills.

Audio Advancements

Despite the fact that video attracted the lion's share of attention again at the show, manufacturers of home and personal audio equipment continued to stress the importance of capitalizing on sale opportunities offered by products that recent technological advancements in the field have made possible. In his keynote speech at the CES Audio Conference Jan. 8, U.S. JVC Corp.'s Harry Elias referred to the growing "mini" and "micro" revolutions afforded by new circuit technology, as well as such current best-selling articles as "boom boxes," and portable components or stereo headsets, saying that sales on the latter have become "perhaps as large in one year as the entire industry in the mid-'70s."

The message from the panelists to dealers, though, was that they should make themselves thoroughly familiar with new, high technology — get acquainted with the products, and by understanding them better, they might sell more. "Promote and sell the benefits of the industry's high technology," said Yamaha's Don Palmquist, "and be enthusiastic."

U.S. Pioneer Electronics Corp.'s Frank Leonardi concurred, noting that new technology was the force that would propel the industry forward and allow it to remain competitive.

Summer CES Set For June 6-9 In Chicago

LOS ANGELES — The 1982 International Summer Consumer Electronics Show (CES) has been scheduled for June 6-9 in Chicago. The largest Consumer Electronics Show of the year, which draws more than 60,000 attendees over its four-day run, will again take place at McCormick Place, McCormick Inn and the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Cruz, where some retail outlets reported up to five feet of flooding and massive power outages.

Breaking the norm of only having snow once a year, Nashville's retail community reported up to five or six inches last week, causing several traffic accidents and stranding people at jobs and schools.

Most retailers reported that business was very bad and that it was difficult for employees to get in to work from their homes.

Store Damaged

Bill Stevens, manager at Discount Records' Harding Mall shop, arrived at work after the first day of the storm to discover his roof leaking in two separate locations, but no damage had been done to the merchandise.

Stevens further noted that the store was shutdown near the end of the day due to a total drop-off in store traffic. "It was a slow day all around because of the cold, but once the snow started, matters worsened. People were just not concerned with buying records and tapes."

Mary Jones, assistant manager of Camelot Records in the Rivergate Mall, one of the iciest parts of town, noted a similar sales pattern, with business off about \$800. The following day, she reported that no sales had been made by 1:00 p.m. The store is located in the busiest and largest mall in the city.

Some retailers in traditionally inclement regions of the country were not worried because of harsh weather.

J&R Music World's Jazz Market store in lower Manhattan reported a slow week, but

CBS, E/P/A Set Promo Drive For New Appice LP

LOS ANGELES — CBS/Pasha is launching an extensive promotion campaign in support of the debut solo album and 20-city tour by noted rock drummer Carmine Appice.

The promotion drive is being geared toward radio and print, and a special inter-company familiarity campaign has also been enacted in order to increase awareness of Appice's long musical career.

"Carmine has been around since rock 'n' roll as we know it today was conceived," said Epic/Portrait/CBS Associated Labels (E/P/A) West Coast director of merchandising Larry Stessel. "He was with Vanilla Fudge in '66 and then graduated to Cactus, Beck Bogart and Appice, and Rod Stewart. We believe he's as important to rock history as a (Pete) Townshend or (Jimmy) Page, and we're treating the release of his album as such."

The Epic AOR department is staging a promotional blitz at the radio level and has already mailed out a special package containing a special audiophile cassette version of the self-titled LP, which shipped Jan. 11, and cassette version of a one-hour interview of Appice by ex-Doors keyboardist Ray Manzarek. A second mailer to key radio stations is already on the way and features an Appice sampler LP and a historical package featuring classic Appice photos.

Point-of-purchase displays keyed on the album include LP flats and 2x3 personality posters. Print ads will be tied in with Ludwig drums, the make of drums that Appice plays and endorses. Pasha ads containing Ludwig endorsement will be featured in such magazines as *Creem*, *Hit Parader*, *Modern Drummer* and *Musician*, *Player And Listener*. In turn, Ludwig print ads will feature mini photos of the Appice LP.

Additionally, many concert appearances along the Jan. 5-24 national tour will focus on Carmine Appice/Ludwig drum battles and clinics. The Seattle show will feature a drum contest judged by Heart's Michael Derosier; the Detroit battle will be judged by Ted Nugent.

The promotional campaign for the Appice album began with the administering of a unique "care package," — a 10-minute videocassette interview of Appice with air personality Raechel Donahue, a cassette copy of the LP, a cassette of the Appice/Manzarek interview, a drumbook authored by Appice, a pair of drumsticks, a copy of the 1973 "Beck, Bogart and Appice" LP, press book and a copy of the rare "Beck, Bogart and Appice Live At Budokan" double LP — to regional and local promotion staffers.

"We really believe that this LP could become one of the top 10 AOR albums this year and that Carmine could eventually join the ranks of an Ozzy Osbourne or Molly Hatchet with this new product. It's simply not a whim," Stessel concluded.

WHAT'S IN-STORE

NARM NOTES — The exhibit center at this year's National Assn. of Recording Merchandisers (NARM) convention, convening March 26 at the Century Plaza Hotel in L.A., will place more emphasis than ever on plus-profit items. Citing an "increasing need in these trying economic times for all retailers and wholesalers to explore the viability and profitability of additional product lines," NARM executive vice president **Joe Cohen** pledged that audio and video accessories, sheet music, posters and apparel items such as T-shirts, pins and belt buckles will be widely represented this year. Responding to retailer fears of over-shrinking profit margins on prerecorded music and expanded floor space due to stock cuts, Cohen offered that "many of these items provide the kinds of profit margins which can substantially bolster a merchandiser's bottom line profit." This year promises more soul-searching for record retailers, as they seek to find their place in a rapidly changing economy. All national surveys indicate that high-ticket premium product sold best for non-record retailers in '81, but our market has typically been one predicated on impulse buying of relatively inexpensive product.

THE PROMOTION THAT REFRESHES — CBS Records and 7-Up will unveil a "\$1,000,000 Music Match Up" promotion this spring. Soft drink buyers will have a shot at winning free albums and will receive one dollar off the purchase of 51 selected CBS titles. Bottles of 7-Up and Diet 7-Up with specially tagged game cards will be the vehicle, with winners redeeming their prizes directly from CBS. Record retailers will receive 40 x 50 posters to advertise their tie to the contest.

TEST 'TUBE' MARKETING — MTV, the 24-hour stereo cable channel owned by Warner Amex is distributing display materials nationally through CBS's merchandising division for use in record and hi-fi stores in areas that receive the network. Promotional items include counter cards and posters listing upcoming MTV concerts. The link with CBS Records, which has been mailing out the materials through its "computer-pak" mailing system, is based on the inclusion of several CBS acts in the present concert series, including **Blue Oyster Cult**, **ELO** and **Garland Jeffreys**. Aside from the CBS mailing, MTV's affiliate relations department has been coordinating distribution of posters and display cards through mailings to subscribing cable companies. Both companies gave indication that this would be the first of many cooperative ventures, with CBS's director of customer merchandising **Giselle Minoli**, terming it "an excellent opportunity to exploit a new medium by cross-merchandising with the new releases and catalogs of our own featured artists." **John Sykes**, director of promotion for MTV, added that the promotional venture is "an indication to the music industry that MTV has an active interest in cross-promoting in-store."

VIDEO DISC CHAMPS — RCA recently announced the winners of its \$50,000 national videodisc display contest for best in-store and window displays. The company awarded \$2,000 apiece to four first place winners, \$800 apiece to 12 second place winners, and \$500 each to 32 third place winners. The distributor sales reps for each winner also received a cash prize equal to half of the retailer's award. The first place winners of the contest, designed to heighten retail visibility of RCA disc software during the company's national fall advertising and promotion campaign, were: **Western Appliance** of Boise, Idaho; **Video Dynamics** of Mt. Prospect, Ill.; **Yarbray TV** of Greensboro, N.C.; and **Cornell-Stone TV** of St. Petersburg, Fla. Commenting on the promotion, **Thomas Kuhn**, division vice president, RCA "SelectaVision" VideoDiscs, stressed a correlation between availability of disc titles and sales of hardware, saying it's "no coincidence that our contest winners all have enjoyed strong sales of videodisc players and discs."

TAPE TALK — Here's one for all you accouterment collectors: BASF has just introduced a series of baseball jackets, T-shirts, polo shirts, roll bags and ballpoint pens to be used as sales incentives for retail employees. Jackets and shirts have the BASF logo screened on the front, and dealer logos may be custom imprinted. Minimum order for each item is a dozen, and may be charged against accrued co-op advertising funds. . . . BASF has also just introduced a new floor-standing display bin suitable for use with all BASF cassette product. The five-foot high dump bin holds hundreds of cassettes and features a permanent header reading "Try BASF. For the best recordings you'll ever make" . . . Nortronics, manufacturers of tape heads and tape recorder maintenance products, has repackaged its Video Maintenance Series. The new packaging is silver with black and royal blues type. The Minnesota company has also just hit with a new point-of-purchase counter display for its drop-in video cassette recorder cleaners. The catchy header suggests that "If you're not using Nortronics' Video Cleaner you ought to have your heads examined." The company has also unveiled new merchandising racks for multiple product display. The free-standing or mountable pegboard racks come packed with a variety of Nortronics product including head cleaners, demagnetizers, bulk erasers, and dubbing cables.

EDDIE GETS HIS WISH — In what promises to be the hottest keyboard collaboration since Mary Lou Williams met Cecil Taylor, Latin piano firebrand Eddie Palmieri will realize a long-time dream when he meets McCoy Tyner at Carnegie Hall on Feb. 20. Palmieri has always credited Tyner as one of his major influences on the instrument, and it would be hard to imagine two more like-minded stylists. Both pianists will appear with their bands, as well as meeting head-to-head, and discussions are under way for the inclusion of saxophonist Arthur Blythe as an added attraction. Columbia jazz A&R vice president George Butler described his label as "interested" in recording the concert for release as an LP, adding that no deal has as yet been discussed with producers Art D'Lugoff, Jack Hooke and Ralph Mercado. Recorded or not, the concert promises to be an outstanding event.

LITTLE FETES — As mentioned a few weeks back, New York club veteran Blaise DiDio has opened a new venue in the heart of the Village. Dubbed Lush Life, the club bowed last week with Cecil Taylor playing to a packed week-long engagement. The club threw a little housewarming party last week on the coldest day of the year, but had no trouble drawing a sizable crowd of well-wishers. Among the celebrants were Johnny Hartman and Jon Hendricks, who performed in front of a trio featuring Kenny Barron, Ben Reilly and Buster Williams. Among the audience we noted Muhl Richard Abrams, Amina Claudine Myers, Chico Freeman, Jimmy Ponder and Jabbo Smith . . . The following evening Stereo Review paid homage to Benny Goodman at the St. Regis Hotel. The swank affair was in honor of Goodman being the recipient of the eighth annual Stereo Review Certificate of Merit. Goodman showed a lot of class by coming to New York's Arctic-like climate to accept when he could have just as easily stayed home in the Bahamas. Also honored by the mag were Chico Freeman, Al Jarreau and Helen Humes, who each received "Record of the Year" awards . . . Although the affair was thrown at the height of the year's worst snow storm, Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI) managed to attract some heavyweights to a celebration for the publication of a special jazz issue of the in-house organ, *The Many Worlds of BMI*. Titled *The Evolution of the Jazz Composer*, the magazine features articles by BMI's Burt Korall and Dan Morgenstern of the Rutgers University Institute of Jazz Studies, and is well worth more than a casual perusal. Among the celebrants were BMI members George Russell, Gil Evans, Carla Bley, Chuck Mangione, Dave Brubeck, Sy Oliver, Manny Albam and David Amram. Not bad for the middle of a snow storm.

SWINGIN' THE BLUES — On Feb. 3, the Public Broadcasting System will air *Goin' To Kansas City*, the first of a four-part series on jazz entitled *Swingin' the Blues*. The hour-long program will be hosted by Billy Taylor and feature segments on Count Basie, Jay McShann and Mary Lou Williams, who will each be spotlighted in the subsequent programs. An historical overview will reconstruct how the city became a major focal point in the jazz world, with special emphasis of course placed on the Pendergast era when the city was wide open and K.C. became the jump-off point for big-bands touring the Southwest. Check local listings for broadcast time.

RECORDS RECORDS RECORDS — CBS is promising a big push for new LPs by Ramsey Lewis and Wynton Marsalls. Radio stations, especially in college markets, will be serviced with interview/selection records . . . Warner Bros. has just released a Full Moon reunion album featuring Buzz Feiten and Neil Larsen. The re-constituted group is a quartet sans horns and hopefully will find the proper audience this time around. Other new releases from the Brothers Warner include "Sleepwalk" by guitarist Larry Carlton and "Objects of Desire" by Michael Franks. The Franks LP is loaded with all-stars, including the Breckers, Mark Egan, Victor Feldman, Steve Khan, Harvey Mason, Bonnie Raitt, David Sanborn, Luther Vandross and Buddy Williams . . . David Amram has just completed a Latin/jazz fusion album for the Elektra Musician label with Tito Puente and Machito . . . Leroy Jenkins and David Murray have just delivered new albums to Black Saint.




TOGETHER (AGAIN)... FOR THE FIRST TIME — Jack Reilly — Revelation 35 — Producer: Jack Reilly — List: 8.98

A re-issue of Reilly's 1968 "Blue-Sean-Green" album for Carousal, the warmth and expanse of this recording make it an excellent choice for reprinting. Accompanied by drummer Joe Cocuzzo and Boston bassist Jack Six, Reilly lays down a date as seamless as one might hope for. A debt to Bill Evans is paid with "Waltz For Fall," but the spritely "Halloween" and shifting "Blue-Sean-Green" show that Reilly is no follower of fashion. Very satisfying.



JAZZ PATTERNS — Joe Henderson and Woody Shaw — Everest FS 363 — Producer: not listed — List: 5.98

Although we suspect this was a live Joe Henderson date when it was recorded, trumpeter Woody Shaw is given leader status. Beyond the inclusion of Shaw, Henderson also proves his taste in musicians with the inclusion of pianist George Cables, bassist Ron McClure and drummer Lenny White. Henderson is a powerhouse on this one.



FORGOTTEN MAN — Lou Donaldson Quartet — Timeless SJP 153 — Producer: Alberto Alberti — List: 9.98

A very tasty quartet date. Despite the title, Donaldson is hardly a forgotten man; rather, he is one of the alto's most accomplished practitioners, and this LP proves it authoritatively. Pianist Herman Foster is resourceful and creative, while bassist Geoff Fuller and drummer Victor Jones provide a solid yet swinging bottom.



NIGHT AND DAY — Red Rodney with Ira Sullivan — Muse MR 5274 — Producer: Bob Porter — List: 8.98

One of the hardest working units around these days, this studio session offers listeners a fine chance to get acquainted with the Rodney/Sullivan band. The group splits its attention between standards and material penned by drummer Jeff Meyer, with the leaders alternating between sax/trumpet and double trumpet leads courtesy of Sullivan's multi-instrumental capabilities. Outstanding tracks are "Dial-A-Brew" and "You Leave Me Breathless."

RADIO

AIR PLAY

GAZIN' AT THE CRYSTAL BALL — No revolutions will occur in radio in 1982, and current trends will continue for the most part, although satellite-fed networks are expected to grow by leaps and bounds. Such was the consensus of a **Cash Box** survey of radio program suppliers, consultants, network officials and program directors. "We don't see anything revolutionary happening," said **Kent Burkhardt**, the Atlanta-based radio consultant who recently launched the Satellite Music Network (SMN). "We'll continue to see the black/urban format do well, and we'll see AOR hold its strength. Country will increase a bit, and MOR will continue its fragmentation." Not uncoincidentally, Burkhardt and his partners in SMN last fall introduced two new formats for the web — one B/C and the other MOR. Both **Toby Arnold** and **Pat Shaughnessy**, respective presidents of Toby Arnold Assoc. and TM Prods. of Dallas, reported marked increases in clientele for their *Unforgettable* and *TM-O-R* programming packages. "The way I see it is that the aging of America is going to pull radio into targeting for an older demographic," says Arnold. "This older demographically-targeted programming may be AM radio's saving grace." Such is the philosophy of syndicator **Al Ham**, whose *Musical of Your Life* format is sold only to AM stations. (**Cash Box**, Oct. 3, 1981). Echoing that sentiment is **James Kefford**, president of Drake-Chenault. "What we're seeing is a need for AM radio programming," he says. His firm reportedly has a programming plan in the works. "It will be closer to a special than a major format, but it is targeted for 40." Consistent with these ideas is the predicted rise of talk radio this year. **Rick Sklar**, ABC Radio's programming maven, predicts that talk radio will this year emerge on the national level and is putting his money on it as well. "I think national talk will be big," he says. "There are not that many good personalities available, and it will be salvation for AM stations." Sklar is, of course, now involved in getting ABC's Superadio talk and music formats off the ground. Both Sklar and **Frank Cody**, director of affiliate relations





(Try telling **KROQ/L.A.** or **WBCN/Boston** that it ever died.) On the other hand, **Dave Garlano**, associate consultant with **John Sebastian**, believes AOR will become the next mass appeal format. "I'm looking for it to take commanding shares as (Boston station) **WCOZ** did," he says. "I think this experience shattered everyone's concept of how well album rock can do." Regarding tight playlists, there was also disagreement. "I don't know how much tighter it can get," says **Scott Muni**, PD at **WNEW-FM**/New York. "I think the problems they're having in the record industry have a lot to do with it, but the future probably belongs to those groups who are consistent, such as the **Rolling Stones**." And **Larry Berger**, PD at **WPLJ**/New York, pretty much agreed with Muni, but was quick to add that his station has been loosening its playlist gradually and expects to continue to do so. "We were playing more new music in 1981 than we did in 1979 or 1980," he asserts. But whether he'll continue, "depends on what product we receive."

STATION TO STATION — On the anniversary of **John Lennon's** violent death, progressive rock outlet **WBCN/Boston** began circulating petitions to have his birthday (Oct. 9) declared an international holiday and "day of peace." The station has been asking its listeners to send in self-addressed stamped envelopes requesting petition blanks and, reportedly, has already received a few hundred back. The station also wants to bring this campaign to other cities via radio stations. "We want to spread this the only way we know how which is through radio," **WBCN** general manager **Tony Berardinelli** told **Cash Box**. "We've gone to all the trades and all the tip sheets," he explained. "We'd like this to come from radio." The deadline for the petitions is tentatively set for Oct. 8, 1982, the day before PD **Oedipus** plans a march to New York to present the petitions to the United Nations. "Of course we'll have to make appointments before hand," says **Priscilla Sims**, assistant to the program director. "You can't just walk in and give them the petitions." . . . International opera star and RCA recording artist **Placido Domingo**, in New York Jan. 12 for the taping of an NBC-TV show, stopped by country-formatted **WHN** and played "guest DJ" between 3 and 3:30 p.m. to support his album "Perhaps Love," which he cut with **John Denver**. Among his actions during the half hour, Domingo premiered Epic recording artist **George Jones'** new single, "Same Ole Me." When asked how he liked working as a jock, Domingo reportedly replied, "It's harder than working at the Met". . . Minnesota Public Radio (MPR) becomes the nation's first radio station to equip itself with a digital multi-track recording and editing system. The system, manufactured by 3M, was installed in MPR's 24-track production studio where the soundtrack for *Raiders of the Lost Ark* was mixed and where the National Public Radio (NPR) weekly chamber music concerts are broadcast each Sunday morning. This new system will reportedly aid NPR's national broadcasts over satellite. . . And in its year end review, the Los Angeles *Times* named **KLOS**/Los Angeles air personality **Frazier Smith** Personality of the Year and dubbed PD **Tom Hedges** Program Director of the Year. In spite of such kudos, the journal decided to name all-talk **KABC** Station of the Year, although **KLOS** was a runner-up. In addition, **Rick Carroll**, PD at **KROQ**, was given an honorable mention for his efforts at mixing new wave music with his standard fare.

needed a change, going to urban contemporary and changing its call letters to **WRKS**. It hired **Barry Mayo** from B/C station **WGCI/Chicago** and named him assistant PD. In addition to changing the station's sound, Mayo brought some community-involvement techniques he had learned in Chicago to the station, which apparently paid off in the Fall book.

Contrasting to the pattern in Los Angeles, AOR fared somewhat dubiously in New York this time around. While **ABC O&O WPLJ** rose from 4.1 in the Summer to 4.5 in the Fall, **Metromedia's WNEW-FM** declined to 2.4 from 2.6, and **WPIX** fell to 0.8 from 1.3.

Meanwhile, in Los Angeles, country music was another format in which the traditional leader was replaced. **KLAC**, the longtime leader in this field, fell from 2.9 to 2.7, while **KZLA's** unique easy country format cornered a 2.5 share on the FM station and .4 on the AM for a 2.9 total this time, rising from a combined 2.0 AM and FM summertime share. **KHJ** remained steady at 1.8. On the other hand, in New York, country seemed to be on something of a downswing. While FM station **WKHK** held onto its 1.5 share, AM country music leader, **Mutual's WHN**, fell from 2.8 to 2.1.



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



Following a series of company policy meetings, time was given to 13 of the 15 labels distributed by the company for presentation of upcoming product releases. Those labels participating included Refuge, Lamb & Lion, HeartWarming, Paragon, Star Song, Impact, NewPax, Pilgrim/America, Hope Song, Milk & Honey, Home Sweet Home, New Dawn and Greentree.

Gentry McCreary, Benson's new international black music marketing manager, who will also be general manager of Benson's in-house black gospel label, and D.J. Rogers, general manager of and artist on Hope Song Records, introduced the marketing representatives to the history of black gospel music during one session.

Two definite goals set by the company were to have the album "Alleluia: A Praise Gathering for Believers" certified platinum through special promotions. The album has already sold more than 850,000 units. Another goal is to have the album "Dallas Holm & Praise... Live" certified gold.

During the conference, the Benson Company named Morris West Record Marketing Representative of the Year for his work in the Georgia and northern Alabama territories. Bill Robison was named Benson's Regional Record Marketing Manager of the Year. He manages the upper Midwestern portion of the country for the company. Others recognized included Mark Hollingsworth, promotion and marketing representative in the Chicago area and Loren Balman, Merchandiser of the Year.

Benson Holds Int'l Sales Conference In The Bahamas

WACO — With its entire sales staff, the East and West Coast A&R departments, regional promotion directors and marketing and promotion departments, as well as seven foreign distributors in attendance, Word Records and Music recently held its annual sales conference at the Hilton Hotel here. Foreign distributors included representatives from Canada, England, Australia, Norway, South Africa, New Zealand and Holland.

The sales conference was highlighted by a presentation of upcoming product releases, including an album titled "Miracle" by B.J. Thomas, and a performance by some of the label's artist roster, including Al Green, the Bill Gaither Trio, Russ Taff, Bobby Jones and New Life, Dana Scallion and Thomas.

Keynote Address

The keynote speaker for the conference was Word's newly promoted executive vice president, Stan Moser, who commented, "Three years ago we had the biggest roster in the business. Now, we have pared down our outside arrangements, concentrating on careers and ministry." According to Moser, the challenge for 1982 is to "take care of the existing family of artists," adding that rather than build on an already existing roster, the company will put all of its efforts into enlarging the current markets.

"Our new venture into video, church films and regional promotion are indicative of the push towards a greater artist development approach to artists rather than quantity," he said. "A very significant point that can be made is that for the first time our marketing staff is equal to our sales staff in numbers. From the strength of the title cut through the sensitivity of "Foreign" to the contemporary flow of "Give a Little Bit of Your Love," Michael James Murphy convinces the listener he has mastered the variations of gospel music. Wayne Boosahda's production further enhances this LP, which features everything from synthesizers to saxophones to convey its musical message.

YOU HAVEN'T SEEN ANYTHING YET — Bridge — Brentwood Records R-5018 — Producer: Billy Crockett — List: 7.98

Whether singing the uptempo "I'm Blessed" or the tender "His Touch," Bridge displays a unique understanding of choral harmony. With majestic voices lifted high, the sincerity of Bridge touches the hearts of listeners. The depth of each voice is apparent in such cuts as "I Know Where I'm Going" and the title cut, as the group shows us what we haven't seen yet.

Country Music Campaign Waged By Warner Bros.

LOS ANGELES — "Deep In The Heart Of Country," a major marketing, advertising and promotion campaign Warner Bros. Records plans for its new and established country artists, will begin at the end of January. Artists to be featured in the campaign include John Anderson, Emmylou Harris, T.G. Sheppard, Frizzell and West, Con Hunley, Gail Davies and newcomer Gary Morris.

The first phase of the campaign will involve a variety of merchandising aids along with extensive print and radio advertising focused on four LPs. They include Anderson's "I Just Came Home To Count The Memories," Harris' "Cimarron," Sheppard's "Finally!" and Frizzell and West's "The David Frizzell And Shelly West Album."

Merchandising aids will consist of header cards featuring Harris, Sheppard and Frizzell and West along with 24x26 posters. Also planned in the campaign is a specially designed logo that has shipped to radio, retail and WEA branch personnel.

A "Deep In The Heart Of Country" sampler LP will ship Feb. 10, containing fourteen cuts by the featured artists, WEA local and regional staffers in addition to key retail and radio. Catalog sets on the featured artists will also be available for selected country radio giveaways.

Running from mid-March through April will be the second phase featuring the above programs, plus cover blow-up posters for Davies, Morris and Hunley LPs due from the label.

Special impact sales programs and catalog product on all the "Deep In The Heart Of Country" artists will also be part of the ongoing campaign.

Cedarwood Enters Agreement With Leonard Publishing

NASHVILLE — The Cedarwood Publishing Co. here has signed a three-year print deal with the Hal Leonard Publishing Corp. The agreement, which covers reprint rights to Cedarwood songs for sheet music, folios, educational publications and other print outlets, will greatly increase the visibility of Cedarwood's catalog, according to Bill Denny, president of the company.

"Hal Leonard is very strong in the educational field, which is an area Cedarwood has never been exposed in before," said Denny. "The company also has new merchandising ideas in the pop and country areas that interest us greatly."

Keith Mardak, executive vice president of the Leonard company, said the company published owner's manuals for 90% of the organs sold in the United States and added that Cedarwood songs would "lend themselves well to such books." The 35-year-old firm boosted its involvement in pop publishing about two years ago, according to Mardak, and has seen a big response in sheet music, personality books and piano/vocal folios in that field. Additionally, Leonard has developed a series titled *Back Pocket Lyrics*, a pocket sized publication that offers words and chords to songs on hit albums.

The arrangement is the first across the board exclusive print deal for Cedarwood, which has about 7,000 songs in its affiliated catalogs.

Hal Leonard also represents the music of publishers, including Chappell, Hill and Range, RSO, MPL and the Entertainment Company, as well as songs by Paul McCartney, Tom T. Hall, Johnny Cash, Pink Floyd, Elton John and others.

STATION PROFILE

WQYK-FM/St. Petersburg Bolsters Ratings Via Female-Oriented Format

NASHVILLE — Since the Suncoast Stereo Corp. purchased WQYK-FM/St. Petersburg in the summer of 1977, the firm has worked steadily to transform what Rod Brosig, vice president and general manager for the station, termed a "toilet" into a respectable country outlet that leads its market in audience share of 25-54 adults. Brosig indicates that the transformation was made by attracting women first and pulling the men over by the women's skirt tails.

"We wound up finding this facility, which was really a toilet," comments Brosig, in reference to the 1977 search by Suncoast, which also owns KENR and KRBE in Houston, after one other purchase in Florida had been rejected by the Federal Communication Commission (FCC). "The equipment was awful, the facility was awful, and the format was worse. The general attitude here, with the exception of a couple of guys on the sales department and a lady that is still our office manager here, was 'hide, here comes the boss; if he doesn't see us we won't get fired.' There was a survival instinct here."

Brosig hired Joe Patrick, a jock from Fort Lauderdale who had never been a program director before, as PD, pulled a sales manager from WGMA/Fort Lauderdale and designed a format that would appeal initially to female listeners aged 20-40. (Patrick is now program director for WNOE/New Orleans).

Slow To Change

"The object," notes Brosig, "was that if a woman 35-years-old finds a song that she likes, then eventually, a man is going to like it, too. Men are a lot slower to change. Once a man selects 'Brand X' he'll stay with 'Brand X' forever and a day. Women are not like that — like fashions and hairstyles — a woman's going to go for the new thing and a guy is going to wear the same haircut until someone really starts ridiculing him, and we found that was true with musical tastes, too."

Brosig indicates that, according to Arbitron, WQYK's female listeners tune in the station an average of 14 hours and 50 minutes a week. Likewise, males, too, listen to the station an average of about 12½ hours, patterns Brosig compares to those of a typical beautiful music station.

Targeting men has been more difficult than the beginning push for women. "We found in this radio station that you can't judge a man's musical taste by his pocket-book," says Brosig, "i.e. the people that are

listening to our radio station run the full gamut of middle Americana. We don't just have guys wearing bibs and hammering boards together; we don't just have shop mechanics. When we were out doing some station involvement contests — giving money away on the street — we had people chasing us down in Mercedes 450SLs."

One method WQYK has used to gain and hold its listeners is to concentrate on music and limit the number of commercials it plays. "We had to admit to the fact that greed was one of the things that would set us back desperately fast," comments Brosig, "so we put a maximum of 14 units on the air — a unit being any length of commercial time — which works out generally to 8½-9 minutes of commercial time (per hour), and we found that was a very acceptable level to our listeners. We also adopted the universal attitude within the station and sales department that if we did not sell a commercial that wasn't really all that bad, that it was a good opportunity for us to play another piece of music for the listener. We're getting in 19 records an hour."

Expansive Library

The station has also assembled an oldies library that Brosig hails as "the envy of the industry." It stretches back to include early country material by Ernest Tubbs, Faron Young, Bob Wills and the Texas Playboys, Hank Thompson, Hank Snow and Red Sovine, and, while the station tries to give the file plenty of airplay, the format doesn't

Presley's Estate Set At \$31 Million; Tual To Appeal

NASHVILLE — The late Elvis Presley's estate was recently valued by the Tennessee Department of Revenue at \$31 million, a level that would give the state \$2.8 million in state inheritance taxes. Representatives for Lisa Marie Presley, daughter of the late singer, indicate that they will contest the state agency's figures.

Blanchard Tual, attorney and legal guardian for Presley's daughter, felt the \$31 million figure was in excess, noting that it included income made by the estate following Presley's death in August 1977. Tual holds that the estate should not be subject to an inheritance tax on revenues accumulated following Presley's death. The valuation includes estimates on the 13-acre Graceland estate and other profitable property in addition to the movie, recording and television royalties.

An original estimate by the Internal Revenue Service last year valued the total estate at \$25 million. The IRS is seeking \$14.5 million in federal inheritance taxes in a similar case currently being processed in U.S. Tax Court.

The Presley estate may file an appeal of the decision with the Tennessee Board of Equalization or within the state's court structure.

Fricke Added To Bill For '82 Alabama Tour

NASHVILLE — Columbia's Janie Fricke will join RCA's Alabama on the first phase of the group's 1982 Mountain Music Tour, which will include 38 dates. Following a Jan. 8 date at the Greenville, S.C. Memorial Auditorium, the tour will continue throughout the Southeast, Southwest and Midwest regions of the country and include major venues in Asheville, N.C.; Montgomery, and Birmingham, Ala.; Atlanta, Ga.; Chattanooga, Tenn.; and Jackson and Biloxi, Miss.

DeWitt Replacement Sought By Statlers

NASHVILLE — The Statler Brothers announced last week that member Lew DeWitt has suffered a relapse from a severe stomach disorder and that the three remaining members of the group — Harold Reid, Phil Balsley and Don Reid — are currently in the process of auditioning singers to temporarily replace DeWitt so that the group can fulfill concert and television commitments. Some appearances this month will be postponed, but the group hopes to resume its touring schedule in late January.



YOU ARE INVITED — Last week was definitely a week of receptions in Nashville. Elektra Records kicked it off with a fete for **Conway Twitty** and his debut label release, "Southern Comfort." Twitty was on hand to greet members of the print and television media, as were label representatives from both the Nashville and Los Angeles offices. By the way, Conway's last single for MCA, "Red Neckin' Love Makin' Night," moves to the #1 position on the **Cash Box** Country Singles chart this week. Now the big question concerning Twitty since he is now at Elektra: will he and **Loretta Lynn**, who is on MCA, continue their successful duet relationship? If you ask Conway, he says he's all for it, and it's just up to MCA. The label's official response is they're all for it, it's just up to Conway. So, perhaps once it's settled exactly who it is up to, we will hear more Conway and Loretta duets. . . . And from the other side of the globe, RCA Nashville hosted a reception in the Music City Music Hall Studio last week for its Italian counterparts, including Italian artist **Luclio Dalla** and members of the New York International Department. Dalla, who is one of Italy's top recording artists, was in Nashville filming an hour-long television special for Italian TV, which will air before an expected audience of 27 million. Dalla was accompanied by a new, young Italian artist named **Ron Cellamare**, who will also be involved in the television special, in which several country artists will be interviewed. During the reception for the Italian recording artist, the Country Music Assn.'s **Jo Walker-Meador** gave an "official" welcoming speech on behalf of Music City USA, for Dalla, Cellamare, RCA Italy representative **Susan Duncan-Smith** and RCA New York International Department reps **Judy Cornelli** and **Jorge Pino**. RCA's Nashville-based artists turned out in full force to welcome their Italian peers. Some of the artists present included **Ray Stevens, Charley Price, Randy Parton, Earl Thomas Conley, Sue Powell, Eddy Arnold** and others.

WQYK-FM/St. Petersburg Bolsters Ratings Via Female-Oriented Format

go overboard on the oldies as the station is concerned with "audience fatigue."

WQYK has also taken painstaking measures to assure maximum audio quality. "A record on our radio station," boasts Brosig, "through FM, sounds better than if it was played on a guy's set at home, and we've heard that comment over and over and over. We're very, very concerned about quality and audio processing, and when we went back into the library and started pulling out those old records by Faron and some of those guys, we had a heck of a time trying to get the audio quality up to par."

The station also makes a major promotional effort. In addition to the usual use of billboards and bumper stickers, WQYK recently spent \$26,000 to blitz a TV campaign, "There's A Little Bit Of Country In Everybody," in just a few days. Last Halloween, the station sponsored a concert at the fairgrounds with "people nobody had ever heard of at the time," including Roy Head, George Strait, Lee Greenwood, Kippi Brannon and a few local acts. The show brought 26,000 people and a traffic jam that spread itself two miles in length. Except for one ad in the Clearwater Sun, a suburban newspaper, the only publicity for the event was through the Tampa-St. Petersburg station. The station has also produced a unique "super sticker," a window sticker

designed for the back window of a pickup truck. Six inches high and 26 inches long, the sticker, which costs 57 cents per unit to manufacture, bears a slogan, "Proud To Be Country," which also appears on the station's t-shirts.

While WQYK showed an audience increase in its last book of 65%, it is not the lone country outlet in the Tampa-St. Petersburg market, a market that covers three counties. WSUN-AM, in the marketplace since 1927, when combined with WQYK, boasts a listenership larger than the combined populations of Shreveport and Macon, Ga.

Said Brosig concerning competition between the two stations, "It's keen. We've always been competitive since we flushed the toilet and got this thing operational."

Whereas WQYK emphasizes the music, WSUN is heavy with news and information. "They have an entirely different concept in radio broadcasting," continued Brosig. "They try to be a full-service radio station, which is excellent, and it's very commendable — it's also very expensive to do. They're the oldest radio station in the United States — they have the largest audience of 65+ people of anyone in the United States — WSUN used to be owned by the city, and the call letters stand for 'Why Stay Up North?' It was a Chamber of Commerce promotional thing back in those days of the '20s and the '30s when those people were taking those train trips down here. The heritage of the station is antiquity; their audience, primarily, is made up of antiques. I'm not belittling them at all because those old people number something like 800,000."

Currently, WQYK's lineup includes program director Pete Porter, who came to the station in 1981 from WJJD/Chicago, music director Bill Pyne, afternoon man Jeff Ryan, night personality Mike Baron and late-night mainstay Doc Edwards. Dave Banks, who held the morning slot at 99 on the FM dial, left the station Jan. 14 for a position with an adult/contemporary outlet in his hometown of Philadelphia.

THE COUNTRY MIKE

EARLY ARB REPORTS SHOW COUNTRY SLIPPING IN NEW YORK — The advance numbers for the fall quarter (Sept. 24-Dec. 16) show country slipping in New York. **WHN** dropped from a 2.8 share in the summer book to a 2.1 audience this last survey period, while **WKHK-FM** held steady at 1.5. While many feel that the book signals the end of popularity for country music in New York, several other factors may have aided in the decline. (1) **Ed Salamon** left the former station to form the United Stations satellite network, music director **Pam Green** the unenviable task of handling both the PD and MD roles through the book at one of the nation's largest country outlets. (2) **WKHK's** signal tower is located atop the Empire State building, along with 11 other stations. According to **John Brejot**, the station's new MD, the Empire State facility is undergoing renovation, and only three of the 11

stations that use the building gained in their rankings, as they were forced to operate at 50% power. On the L.A. side of the continent, mainstay **KLAC** slipped again to 2.7, down from a 2.9 share, while **KZLA-FM** closed the gap, moving a half-share up to 2.5. **KHJ-FM** also jumped a half-point to 1.8. Total market share of country in L.A. climbed from a 6.2 to 7.4.

PERSONALITY PROFILE — **Mark Thomas** studied sociology and speech at John Carroll University in Cleveland while gaining valuable on-the-air experience with college radio station, **WUJC-FM** a Top 40 station. Upon graduation in 1975, Thomas found part-time employment with **WNCR/Cleveland** doing the weekends at the country station. Approximately a year later he moved to South Bend, Ind. to take over the night shift for **WJVA**. Then in 1977, Thomas headed further north to do the afternoons with **WKQC-FM**, another country station in Saginaw, Mich. Late in 1977 he was hired as operations director for **WNRS/Ann Arbor, Mich.**, under **Ernie Winn**. Thomas began at **WCXI/Detroit** in June of 1981 as assistant PD and music director. On Jan. 12, Thomas was elevated to the position of program director for the Detroit country powerhouse.

'HISTORY OF COUNTRY MUSIC' POSTPONED — According to **James Kefford**, president of Drake-Chenault Enterprises, Inc., the 52-hour special *History of Country Music*, will be postponed. The program, scheduled to air on four consecutive weekends beginning in April, has been shelved due to "severe and prolonged illnesses" of two members of the production team. In making the announcement, Kefford stated, "Drake-Chenault is known in the industry for our extremely high quality work. Because of factors totally beyond our control, we reached a point where we had to choose between quality and time. We would never compromise our standards, so we were forced to postpone the air date. . . to allow our first team to complete the project." Airdates for *History of Country Music* will be announced as soon as information is available.

SANDERS PURCHASES WNOX — **Mack Sanders** of Nashville recently purchased Tennessee's oldest radio station, **WNOX/Knoxville**. The sale is subject to FCC approval. In making the announcement, Sanders stated, "I am very proud to add one of America's most prestigious facilities to our broadcasting chain. WNOX has as much history as any radio station in the country; being the springboard for such legendary entertainers as **Roy Acuff, Chet Atkins** and many more. I am looking forward to being directly involved with the civic and business leaders of Knoxville." Sanders is presently applying the the FCC to increase WNOX's power to 50,000 watts. Asked if he envisions further expansion, Sanders stated, "We are constantly looking at other markets and radio stations. I would think it is entirely probable that we will announce other major market purchases in time." The Sanders chain also includes **WJRB/Nashville** and **WVOK/Birmingham, Ala.**, all programming modern country music.

WHK HOSTS ANNUAL 'TOUCH-A-THON' — Coinciding with the opening of the Great Lakes Recreational Vehicle show, Jan. 6, **WHK/Cleveland** hosted the third annual RV Touch-a-Thon. BIRTHDAY WISHES — So. Enough "mainstream" journalists finally got interested enough in all the noise over Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday becoming a national holiday that they decided to invite Stevie Wonder, a major proponent of the birthday effort, to speak at a National Press Club luncheon. The National Press Club is attended by some of the nation's most regarded print and electronic news scribes with headquarters in Washington, D.C. The newsmen, who normally invite heads of state or politicians of public note (or notoriety) to the luncheon talks, heard Wonder Jan. 13 as part of the artist's second MLK memorial march in the capital to make King's Jan. 15 birthday a federal holiday. Focus of the march was to support passage of federal legislation that would make the late civil rights leader's birthday a day for all to observe. The law proposals, being sponsored jointly in the House by Rep. John Conyers (D-Mich.) and Peter Rodino (D-N.J.) (H.R. 800) and in the Senate by Sen. Charles Mathias (R-Md.) with S.93, will be heard during the upcoming legislative sessions. Last year, more than 100,000 marchers joined Wonder and other celebrities in a demonstration at the Capitol, and more than two million signatures were collected as a result of the march last year. Joining Wonder at the NPC luncheon was Rep. Conyers and Congressional Black Caucus chairman Walter E. Fauntroy (D-D.C.). As part of Wonder's march schedule last week, the artist stopped in Harrisburg, Pa. to participate in a gubernatorial proclamation declaring King's birthday a state-wide holiday. Currently 17 states and the District of Columbia observe King's birthday. Several radio stations carried coverage of the Washington march live by satellite via WLIB (Inner City Broadcasting) in conjunction with KJLH-FM/Los Angeles and National Public Radio.

BACK IN BLACK — Black Talkies on Parade will present its fourth annual Film Festival: "A Salute to Black Women on the Silver Screen" during the upcoming Black History Month celebration, in Los Angeles Feb. 1-6 at Trade Tech College. Sponsored by the Black American Cinema, rare films such as Lena Horne's *Stormy Weather*, Dorothy Dandridge and Harry Belafonte's *Carmen Jones*, as well as other black films like *Leadbelly*, *The Spook Who Sat By The Door* and *Green Pastures* will be viewed. Also to be featured during the proceedings will be the Western States Black Research Center and BAC's First Annual Film Grants Contest, which was created to support and encourage black filmmakers.

MULTI-TRACKING — Michael Jackson recently returned from England where he was writing and recording with Paul McCartney for the ex-Beatles' next LP. Flipping the coin, McCartney will also provide writing and recording for Jackson's next solo Epic LP, which will go into production under the guidance of mixmeister Quincy Jones next month. It was the team of Jones and Jackson that created the multi-million seller "Off The Wall" LP.

FINDING GOLD IN HARD TIMES — Warner Bros. artist George Benson has managed to achieve a feat that many in the industry will not be able to emulate during the first half of 1982. Benson, who has made a habit of releasing aptly balanced R&B, jazz/pop music of mass appeal, has managed a gold award for his double-set "best of" LP, "The George Benson Collection." It is Benson's sixth consecutive gold-selling LP (all the LPs have also been certified platinum) and the third double album certified gold.

CAMERON CAN-CAN — Paris' hottest discos got a taste of Salsoul artist Rafael Cameron's soul as he recently visited the city of romance. Cameron, in the city to support his "Funtown U.S.A." single from his "Cameron In Love" LP, performed at local clubs and for radio with the sole aid of tapes from the LP's instrumental tracks. Word has it that listeners couldn't tell the difference between Cameron's dubbed live show and the disc mix. Hmmm.

CARRY ON JOAN — The U.S. will be treated to a 26-date concert tour by Brit rock diva Joan Armatrading. The tour is scheduled to start Jan. 20 in Portland, Ore. and end Feb. 21 in Boston. Armatrading, who will be out in support of her latest A&M LP, "Walk Under Ladders," will be backed by a rowdy and diverse bunch of Brit new rockers. Local Acts, Indies Top '81 U.K. Charts

LONDON — An increasing demand for homegrown product and a shift away from that spawned directly by the major international labels in the U.K. during 1981 was amply illustrated in the year end charts published by the British Phonographic Industry (BPI).

Using the criteria of place of birth rather than current home to determine nationality (making John Lennon British and Julio Iglesias Spanish, for instance), the year end Top 100 singles chart featured 73 by British acts, 14 by Americans and 13 by others; and the final Top 100 albums listing contained 68 British, 22 American and 10 by others.

The highest single by an American act, "One Day In Your Live" by Michael Jackson on CBS, reached #6; while Neil Diamond's soundtrack to *The Jazz Singer* on EMI checked in as the highest American album at #9. Top single overall was Soft Cell's "Tainted Love" on Sire with Adam & The Ants' "Kings Of The Wild Frontier" on CBS the top rated LP.

Adam & The Ants topped all individual acts with singles at #2, #3, #28 and #40 on the year end chart, as well as the top LP, plus #14 and #62. Shakin' Stevens, also on CBS, followed with singles at #4, #10 and #18, and LPs at #4 and #26.

In spite of the success of the CBS acts, significant gains were registered by independent labels in the year end chart, with 51 out of the top 100 singles and 49 of the top 100 albums. Soft Cell's #1 single on Sire and the BBC Records soundtrack LP of the Royal Wedding highlighted the successes of independents in 1981.

television programming from Canadian satellites.

In a far-reaching decision that soon could lead to a nationwide satellite radio network, Communications Minister Francis Fox said radio broadcasters will be able to apply for licenses to carry satellite programming.

Until now, only cable television companies, TV broadcasters, provincial communications authorities and such telecommunications carriers as telephone companies were permitted to operate earth stations to receive satellite transmission.

However, the relaxation of certain stringent federal regulations did not extend — as some thought it would — to permit public use of earth stations, the sophisticated, dish-shaped antennae that pick up programming from the United States.

The government said it will allow resource camps, such as those engaged in logging, mining or petroleum exploration in remote areas of the country, to operate earth stations to receive radio and television programming from Canadian satellites. These camps will not have to apply to the federal Department of Communications for licenses, as had been required.

But individuals and organizations will be allowed to apply for earth station licenses to receive non-programming signals from such sources as news agencies, stock markets, weather bureaus and other business services.

The federal announcement means individuals will be allowed to own earth stations to receive the service. The federal government had been attempting to crack down on illegal operation of the dish receivers, but an estimated 700 of them are thought to be in operation in the country.

Fox also said he will consider requests to open negotiations with the United States to allow reception of American satellite programming in isolated or underserved communities.

OTTAWA — From the several-weeks-late-but-indulgence-knows-no-deadline dept., my favorite discs of 1981 were (in order) releases by **The Jam**, **Steve Winwood**, **The Psychedelic Furs**, **Dexy's Midnight Runners**, **Luther Vandross**, **The Rolling Stones**, **Gang Of Four**, **Stevie Nicks**, **Garland Jeffreys** (studio) and **Soft Cell**. My fatal error has been to separate Canadian from international product, and in 1981, there were some phenomenally good recordings to come from this country. Among them: second albums from **Rough Trade**, **Bryan Adams** and **Eddie Schwartz**, **Loverboy** proved there is a burgeoning generation of high-caliber rockers, while **Rush** and **April Wine** showed that the old guard can still rattle a few sabres. **Red Rider** shouldn't be overlooked, either, when Juno-ballooting comes up this month and next. When will English Canada pay attention to **Dianne Tell**? When will Eastern Canada pay attention to **Doug and the Slugs** and **Payolas**? When will everyone stop saying "take off, eh?" . . . It bears repeating, but the **Jon and Vangelis** disc, "The Friends of Mr. Cairo," continues to sell well and is hovering on the double platinum mark. PolyGram also reports that **Dire Straits** guitarist **Mark Knopfler** is featured on a song on the forthcoming **Kate and Anna MacGarrigle** disc due this spring . . . The initial printing of the *Encyclopedia of Music in Canada* (selling briskly during the Christmas season at \$65 each) has been depleted. A second printing of the 1,100-page tome (likely to cost about \$100 now) is set to roll . . . Belated congratulations to **Gordon Lightfoot**, who became the proud father for the third time. **Lightfoot** and **Cathy Conley** became parents of a yet-unnamed son Dec. 31, just in time to promote dad's next disc, due out shortly.

The New Morning adventure started in Geneva in 1977 as a tiny club. They turned the tiny New Morning adventure into a big New Morning festival in two years, and in 1980, it became a reputable festival called the first jazz festival of Geneva. Already in competition with the most important Jazz Festivals in Europe, it hosted **Tony Williams**, **Billie**

Cobham, **Pharoah Sanders**, **Archie Shepp**, **Kenny Burrell**, **Dave Liebman**, **George Coleman**, **Art Pepper**, **Johnny Griffin** and **Don Pullen**. Among the international guests that New Morning Paris will host in December is **Billy Cobham**. This is Cobham's third visit to Paris this year. Recently settled in Switzerland, he is working on two projects — one an educational Children's tape on video, to teach the kids first steps in percussion; the other a compilation album of his unreleased material produced by his own production company, Manchild Sitcomm Ltd. ALBUM REVIEWS

PETR KOTIK WITH TEXT BY GERTRUDE STEIN: MANY MANY WOMEN — S.E.M. Ensemble, Petr Kotik conducting — Labor LAB6/10 — Producer: Heiner Stadler — List: 39.98 — Five Record Set

From the very opening, it is obvious that Kotik intends to rearrange the dimensions of new classicism. Using full, forboding undercurrents and steady tension, Kotik fabricates a sound scene that evokes the darkest of tonal colors and, conversely, the most resilient effects. The rhythmic textures of John Cage compositions and the hypnotic drone of Gregorian style chants are equally elusive and captivating.



The music sensibilities that made Schub the grand prize winner of the 1981 Van Cliburn Competition are on display through this fine debut recording, which features Schub's fine technique, but also his emotional attentiveness. Both the Brahms and the Liszt pieces helped him earn his gold medal in the competition and the performance here should also earn him the attention he deserves as a recording artist.

Extended contrapuntal and unison lines highlight this work, whether it be the first thematic presentation or the final capitulation, Mozart's Sonata in C Major K. 296 and his Sonata in D Major, K. 306 maintain rhythmic and tonal balance.

These collected works by the late blooming Faure show his capacity for emotional range in a duet setting. The music is deftly structured as a personal conversation, sometimes strident, sometimes joyous. Bobesco provides nimble violin work throughout the Allegroquasi passages, while Genty finds Faure's modular niches for piano.

ITC Ruling Backs Midway Fight To Protect Copyrights

CHICAGO — On Nov. 16, 1981, an administrative law judge of the International Trade Commission, in an 86-page opinion, issued a Recommended Determination to the Commission that Section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930 was being violated by the unauthorized importation and sale of copies of "Pac-Man" video games in the United States, according to Midway Mfg. Co. After a contested hearing in Washington that lasted for more than a week, the judge found that the articles complained of infringed Midway's copyright and common law trademark in Pac-Man. The judge further found that this infringement had "the effect or tendency to injure substantially, causing immediate and substantial harm to an efficiently and economically operated industry in the United States."

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



'Pac-Man,' 'Rally-X' Copies Are Seized

CHICAGO — Midway Manufacturing Co. has announced that it filed a civil action against Tuni Electro Services and other defendants in Seattle, Wash. on Nov. 24, 1981, for alleged infringement of its copyrights in the Pac-Man and Rally-X video games. On Nov. 30, the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington issued a temporary restraining order, expedited pretrial discovery and impoundment orders against the defendants. On Dec. 3 and 7 the U.S. Marshal conducted the impoundments.

The Marshal seized the following games as infringing Midway's copyrights: seven Puckman games and two Desert Chase games

from Galactic Madness, Inc. (Vancouver, Washington) and two Gobbler games from Goldies Two, Inc. (Alderwood Manor, Washington).

Midway said it would continue active enforcement actions against all infringers of the copyright and trademark rights in its video games "Galaxian," "Pac-Man," "Rally-X," "Gorf," "Wizard of Wor," "Omega Race," "Galaga" and "Bosconian." According to Midway's counsel in Chicago, the defendants may be liable for damages, operating profits, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs.

Nice chatting with **Tony Yula** of Mondial in Springfield, N.J. who noted that business is going along quite well and that Gottlieb's "Black Hole" pinball machine is indeed one of the hottest selling pieces he's got. Gottlieb's forthcoming "Haunted House" is currently on test, with "excellent results" and Tony said he can't wait to get delivery. Other good sellers at Mondial include Atari's "Tempest," Gremlin's "Frogger" and Exidy's "Mouse Trap" — with the brand new Taito America "Grand Champion" being readied for test and "lookin' good". Latter piece just arrived on the showroom floor and is attracting lots of attention.

AMOA's executive vice president **Leo Droste** noted that the association staff is knee-deep in first step efforts towards the complete computerization of the headquarters office here in Chicago and preparatory work for this year's Expo. At this point they are starting to convert the membership records to data processing. AMOA will be setting up a meeting of show exhibitors in the near future for selection of booth space at Expo '82, since this will be the convention's first year in the Chicago Hyatt Regency and space allotments will be based on a point system. . . On the Singles Scene: **Gus Tartol** of Singer One Stop For Ops called to tell us about a few singles he feels will be among the first jukebox hits of 1982. Sides include "Everybody Loves A Winner" by **Dickey Lee** (Mercury) for pop/country locations and "Perhaps Love" by **Placido Domingo** and **John Denver** (Columbia), which was requested since last summer as an album cut and was recently released as a single. Also, "Bobbie Sue" by the **Oak Ridge Boys** (MCA) which, Gus feels, could be bigger than "Elvira"; a two-sider "Sharky's Theme" (from the Burt Reynolds movie) on Warner Bros. with **Eddie Harris** doing an instrumental on one side and **Sarah Vaughn** a vocal on the other; and "Seasons Of Gold" by **Gidea Park** (Profile). Latter is a medley of **Four Seasons** hits from the sixties including "Sherry," "Big Girls Don't Cry," "Dawn," "Working My Way Back To You" and others, which should do well in just about any type of location.

New Equipment

Pac-Man's Side-Kick

"We've developed a fun and challenging follow-up piece in 'Kick-Man,'" noted Stan Jarocki, vice president of marketing for Midway Mfg. Co. "It's a great side-kick to 'Pac-Man' . . . players will get a kick out of 'Kick-Man,' high stepping video recreation with colorful



and special effects that are sure to attract new and steady play action."

The game involves Kick-man, a clown/acrobat who pedals a unicycle back and forth across the screen in an attempt to burst or catch balloons and other objects for score. The player controls the movements of Kick-man with a rolling ball, which spins in either direction to position Kick-man under the randomly falling balloons and other objects. Should Kick-man miss, the player can hit the Kick button, which activates the clown's feet to kick the object back up for another chance.

After pressing the 1 or 2 player start button for game credits, the first screen display tells the player that he can get directions on the object of Kick-man and how the game works by pressing the 'Kick' button. Each time the player hits the 'Kick' button, additional information is displayed.

The game proceeds through many phases as Kick-man feverishly pedals back and forth trying to collect a stack of eight falling balloons. At times the famous Pac-Man appears to help the player increase his score. When Pac-Man descends and he is caught by the Kick-man, he gobbles up all the balloons on the clown's head for immediate score. The first Pac-Man caught is a 200 point bonus; the second is worth 400 points; the third, 800 points and the fourth 1600 points. There are different color balloons that fall in varying speeds and occasional fast-falling Pac-Man monster creatures appearing in the balloon formation that are also worth extra points.

A special challenge rack is another feature of Kick-Man. Balloons are tossed from the balconies which Kick-man attempts to catch on his head, and bombs are tossed which must be avoided. The player is not penalized when he misses a balloon, but the challenge rack ends, and all that is lost are the balloons collected.

In regular racks, should Kick-man miss, he falls off of his unicycle and another unicycle will continue play. The player has three chances before the game is over.

Midway's pioneering electronic development, "light years ahead of its

time," according to Jarocki, provides a completely new diagnostic package that's easy to use with the flick of a switch inside the cash box door. With this system, there is no need to climb and crawl into the back of the machine to perform many valuable tests.

Once the self-test switch is on and the 'tilt' switch activated, the game will go through a series of color patterns. If the ROM or RAM are malfunctioning, the screen will give a written message as to the location of the problem. A diagnostic menu appears on the screen, and by following the instructions indicated, the operator can conduct many valuable test functions including sounds; player input to test switches and devices; bookkeeping with time and score reports, and machine set-up.

The new model is available in standard arcade, Mini-Myte and cocktail table models.

Pick Your Pool

"Tri-Pool," a new coin-operated electronic video game, is currently being marketed by Gametecniks of suburban Schiller Park, Ill. The factory announced that the game is available for immediate delivery.

Tri-Pool contains one of the industry's largest computer memories, which permits player selection of any of three remarkably true-to-life pool games, namely, straight pool, nine ball or snooker.

A unique feature of the game is the "phantom spot ball" which is used to line up shots and deliver amazingly precise ball action and control. One or two can play Tri-Pool and players can select left or right English, forward or back spin, or centerball striking of the cue ball.

In addition to the variety of spins attainable, the cue ball may be struck by the player's choice of speed to faithfully simulate live pool action. To speed up the game and increase the excitement the player must execute his shot within 20 seconds.



Scoring is similar to conventional table pool rules, although "lucky" pockets add bonus points and all pockets become electronically smaller as the game progresses. Coins inserted within five seconds of expiration will extend play until the game is completed.

Tri-Pool is available in both standard upright and cocktail table models.

ITC Ruling Backs Midway Action To Protect Copyrights

Midway filed its complaint with the ITC on April 17, 1981, seeking a temporary and permanent exclusion order and an expedited hearing. The Commission instituted its investigation on July 1 after issuing a permanent exclusion order in favor of Midway in its earlier case involving copies of the Galaxian video game. Midway had named 35 respondents in its complaint and, thereafter, 20 additional respondents were added on Sept. 21. After the issuance of the Recommended Determination, the Commission heard arguments with respect to the temporary exclusion order on Dec. 11, and a decision is expected this month.

Midway said it intends to continue the vigorous enforcement of its copyrights and trademarks against infringers by seeking exclusion orders against the importation and sale of copies of its video games, as well as by bringing actions in the federal courts.

Time Story Spotlights Video Game Industry

LOS ANGELES — The cover story of the Jan. 18 edition of *Time* magazine is a feature entitled "Games That People Play" and consists of an eight page in-depth article spotlighting the video game boom. The story also features sidebars on R&D and home units.

ASCAP, BMI Agree On Cable, Juke Fees

NEW YORK — The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) and Broadcast Music Incorporated (BMI) have reached voluntary agreement on the distribution of compulsory license fees for cable through 1981 and on compulsory license fees for jukeboxes through 1982.

These fees are paid by cable and jukebox operators for the right to perform copyrighted works in accordance with the 1976 copyright act. This agreement reportedly resolves any differences between the two competing licensing agencies in proceedings over royalty payments now underway in the Copyright Royalty Tribunal (CRT). No details of the agreement were disclosed.
