Koz Of A New Path

Do you tamper with budding stardom in the ever popular musical arena of contemporary jazz? Do you choose a path never travelled for a trapeze into new territory? If you're Capitol recording artist Dave Koz, you take your saxophone, find a co-producer that will help you massage some new musical ideas and run *Off The Beaten Path*, the title of his new 13-song collection. The album is a departure from his slicker urban sound that earned him gold with his *Lucky Man* album and made him the toast of NAC radio. The new album incorporates his distinct horn stylings with a more contemporary folkly-roots sound, an aromatic blend that, judging from early reaction at NAC radio, will preserve his core fan base and perhaps attract a wider audience. *Cash Box* editor M.R. Martinez talked with Koz about the new album's direction and with the record company about how they will advance down the path to success.

TVT Enters Distrib Pact With A&M Canada

TVT's entire catalogue and associated labels part of deal.

TVT RECORDS, A LEADING INDIE label, has signed an exclusive deal with A&M Canada for distribution in the Great White North, including the entire TVT catalogue and product from subsidiary labels—the industrial Wax Trax! Records and hip hop label Blunt Recordings. The deal also calls for A&M Canada to work releases from TVT's TVT Soundtrax.

The deal was consummated last week when A&M Canada released product by four TVT artists—Gravity Kills, KMFDM(Wax Trax/TVT), The Connells and Canadian group Spooky Ruben, which opened dates for Alanis Morissette. Gravity Kills' self-titled record has sold more than 200,000 copies in the U.S.

The TVT/A&M distribution pact does not cover the former's joint venture with Interscope Records for Nine Inch Nails and Nothing Records. But A&M will subsequently release TVT's entire catalogue featuring acts like Sister Machine Gun, Underworld, Chainsuck and Television's Greatest Hits Volumes Four And Five. Mortal Kombat, Grumpier Old Men, Hideaway, Seven, Two If By Sea and Heavy are titles A&M will distribute from the TVT Soundtrax catalogue. TVT also has the soundtracks to the films *Phat Beach*, *Walking & Talking* and *The Fan*.

Lauding the deal with A&M Canada, TVT president/CEO Steve Gottlieb said: "(A&M/Island/Motown Canada president) John Reid is force to be reckoned with. Having known him for 10 years, I'm quite pleased to be a part of his team. As for the rest of the A&M family, I had my first hit in Canada with the first Tee Vee Toons album in 1985, so in a way, it's just like coming home."

"We are delighted to be associated with Steve Gottlieb at TVT Records in this way," Reid commented. "I have admired his work for years and this presents a great opportunity for us."

RIAA Mid-Year Piracy Stats Told

Bootleg CDs surpass cassettes for first time.

THE RECORDING INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA (RIAA) has released its 1996 mid-year anti-piracy statistics and they reveal that seizures of bootleg music in the CD format have overtaken cassette seizures for the first time. The stats further reveal that Latin music piracy, though waning, still dominates counterfeit seizures; raw materials suppliers are court-bound; and the RIAA is re-directing its anti-piracy efforts toward the civil arena.

Law enforcement and the RIAA confiscated 896,594 illegal CDs and 449,733 cassettes in the first half of this year. RIAA executive vp and anti-piracy director Steve D'Onofrio, stated they hadn't expected the seizure quantities would be so massive initially and pointed to two record-breaking raids: April in Los Angeles, CA where more than 200,000 CDs were seized in conjunction with the International Federation of the Phonographic Industry's Asia Pacific Regional Office and another raid in June in Nassau County, New York where 425,000 CDs and 2.3 million insert cards were confiscated.

According to RIAA vp and associate director of anti-piracy Frank Creighton, the pirate CDs confiscated this year included many illicit compilations of Latin, Indian and Asian music and stated, "The RIAA's anti-piracy unit focuses on protecting all genres of music, and these ethnic music markets are heavily impacted by piracy."

A judgement of \$7 million was handed down in a landmark copyright and trademark case instituted by 26 record companies against Mohammad Abdallah and his company, General Audio Video Cassettes for knowingly assisting the activities of counterfeiters across the county by timing legitimate cassettes provided by the counterfeiters and then preparing corresponding blank cassettes "timed" to the exact length of the legitimate cassettes being counterfeited.

Another raw materials supplier case resulted in felony convictions for 17

COD ROCKS ON THE BEACH: It has become an annual tradition that once a year along Cape Cod's Atlantic sea front Indie Rock and the local Boston beachgoers meet for an evening of music on the half-shell. On Saturday the 17th in Wellfleet at *The Beachcomber* a handful of groups entertained the mixed crowd. Out of Beantown, *Come* was identified by many as the highlight of the festivities put together by *Dirt Records*. The foursome has had changing line-ups for quite some time, this evening saw a dual guitar attack with support from keyboards and a percussionist which stayed in the heavy blues-influenced area that the group has mined for years. Fellow citymates *Trona*, who won this year's *WBCN Battle of the Bands*, got the local crowd hollering with its Folk and Western sound that was highly reminiscent of early X. Out of New York, *Saturnine* plowed the college rock furrows following a more poppy trail than the band's previous efforts. *Pacific Ocean* continued to mature with its sound, which walks the line between ballad and rock. *Versus* ended the evening before the big bonfire on the beach with a blazing set that went in between smoldering and fiery. No doubt many had fond memories to take with them as they persevered the weekend traffic home.

TROPHY PIECE TIME: Bands similar to *Guv'nor* are few and far between. Though they could easily go the standard cute pop band route they take the road less traveled with off-the-road takes on what is expected of them. With the band's new LP *The Hunt* out on *Merge Records* the group shows more confidence in its abilities. A perfect example is the first single off the album, "Break A Promise," which has as many sweet hooks as is allowed by the FDA, but the group puts a great twist in the end as the lead singer *Charlie Gansa* lets his own voice break as he sings the final choruses. Throughout *The Hunt*, this New York trio shows that it's in love with a naiveté that accents the songs with a style that could come off ringing false if they didn't handle it with such ease. If given some close attention *Guv'nor* could well become big game.

SWEEPING MYTHICAL SOUNDS: Originality is not a byword for these musical days. Many groups are looking for a way to capture the spirit of previous bands without falling into their pitfalls. *Chimera*, from the Emerald Isle, is making a brave stab at it. Lead singer *Eileen Henry* sounds as if she went to the same high school as *Harriet* of the ill-fated *The Sundays*. The music is similarly reminiscent of that band and such groups as *My Bloody Valentine*, *The Cocteau Twins* on their debut for *Grass Records*, *Earth Loop*. One thing that does set this band apart is that it plays with some passion when on stage. This Irish band's showcase at *Brownies* last week was refreshing because it eschewed the tradition of trying to sound exactly like its recording and gave some verve to its performance. Whether this will spirit the band into orbit is a matter for forces weaker than gravity.

Fresh Path For Dave Koz

IT'S RISKY BUSINESS for an artist to transform his musical identity and run counter to the perceptions of the heavily format-driven recording industry, especially if the artist has developed a gold-selling fan base over a period of time, and is intricately associated with one of those tight format boxes that the recording industry constructs for marketing and promotion strategies. But the creative process, personal growth and an artist's divine craving to explore new territories sometimes will not be deterred, and the safe, hackneyed path is eschewed in favor of new artistic vistas.

Saxophonist Dave Koz, who mined gold with his 1993 Capitol Records album *Lucky Man*, a contemporary jazz chart hit, has stretched toward new artistic expression with *Off The Beaten Path*, released August 20. A departure from the slicker, more mechanized production that marked his two previous solo albums, this record is a compendium of rootsy arrangements that could very well expand an already solid fan base. The track "Let Me Count The Ways," which aptly represents the album's fusion of musical elements, already is a solid add at NAC radio, including L.A. contemporary/smooth jazz stations KTWV and New York City's WQCD.

In a recent interview with *Cash Box*, the affable, seemingly stoked Koz explained that the musical gear shifting coincided with life growth.

"It was mostly a conscious effort to do something different, but it wasn't change for change sake," the UCLA graduate explained. "I believe that my experiences, my life led me down this path. I was excited to do something different; this was a whole new landscape for me. I grew up working with machines (in the studio), and I was excited to work with a producer from a completely different background."

In album co-producer Thom Panunzio, whose credits include work with people like Bruce Springsteen, Roger Daltrey, Bob Seger, Tom Petty, Tracy Chapman, Fishbone and Reverend Horton Heat, Koz employed a producing partner that he says helped create a "blending of the strengths of contemporary jazz and the strengths of contemporary folk/roots rock."

Along with his brother Jeff, Evan Rogers & Carl Strunk, Jeff Lorber (for whom he was once a sideman) and others, Koz has crafted a 13-song package that he believes reflects his need for change, and his growing restlessness with the rigors of churning out albums to please the marketplace.

"I was so completely burnt out, I had to get out of L.A. (where he was born and raised). I decided to take a hiatus in Northern California for two months—and I haven't moved back," Koz recalls, noting that the environment provided room for him to discover some fresh feelings and explore those he had ignored. "I discovered myself; it occurred to me that I had been hiding on my last album and that it was time for me to peel away layers to see what was real. My hope is that people will hear that in the music on this album."

Koz says that the musicianship of his assembled studio band and playing live in the studio 80% of the time "helped make me a better musician," and surely the listener will recognize the distinct musicianship of his soulful saxophone work, which is the one constant held over from his last album. What is different is the level of emotional content invested into the playing. "This record is not about sticking to style, but (instead) trying to make an artistic statement.

"Sometimes the sound of the music while recording made me feel like my chest was wide-open," Koz laughs.

But delivering an album that transcends the character of previously successful releases can invite trepidation from an artist's record company. Not so in the case of Capitol, Koz says. "Capitol has been supportive of the project," he explains. "(Capitol president) Gary Gersh comes from a more alternative A&R background, and he was happy that I had decided to make an album like this."

Capitol's vp of marketing Faith Henschel agrees that this album could very well mean an expansion of Koz's audience, noting that the track "Let Me Count The Ways" should help build a fire under his core NAC fan base,

and the album's slyly titled "Don't Look Back" could earn him some attention at A/C and AAA radio. "I think it's evident that NAC was a number one priority, and the first two months will be spent getting back at his base, to really serve his audience. We believe that arms are still open there for his music," Henschel says. "Given the nature of the music on this album—more live, organized differently—we also have a chance to work this record to A/C, AAA and even urban radio."

It's a diverse task and challenging commitment for any record company, but Henschel says, "With Dave Koz, the best way to promote and market him is Dave himself."

His last album benefitted from a 132-show tour with Kenny Loggins and Michael Bolton before sell-out crowds, and a track from the *Lucky Man* album—"Faces Of The Heart"—was heard daily on ABC-TV's ageless soap opera *General Hospital* as the show's first new theme song in 30 years. He also became a regular guest of the *Arsenio Hall Show's* posse, with whom he performed nightly. He also made guest appearances on *General Hospital*, ABC's *Family Matters* and Fox-TV's *Beverly Hills 90210*.

For the new album, in-store appearances (he recently appeared at Borders Books & Music in Santa Monica) are planned along with the full array of standard retail promotion—i.e. point-of-purchase material, end caps and service to store listening stations.

But, oddly enough, the electronic mediums of television and radio might provide the most expansive exposure for the new Koz sound. He has been

booked on several local and national television programs, including the *KTLA Morning Show*, a performances on *Fox After Breakfast* and *Good Day New York*, and a special guest spot on the successful mid-afternoon program *Rosie O'Donnell Show*.

Henschel says that his EPK is being included on in-flight programming for most major airlines, including United, TWA and American.



But a natural promotional blitz for Koz was an interview that aired recently on the Sony/Worldwide Network syndicated radio web's "Personal Notes," a show the saxophonist has hosted since since 1995. During this cheeky segment Koz trades his host hat with special guest, comedian/actor/impressionist Phil Hartman (*Saturday Night Live*), who interviews the musician (as he voices Schwarzenegger, Sinatra, President Clinton and others) about the new album. The show was heard on about 180 stations.

Koz will commence a performance tour in late September, early October and says that he is excited again about the forthcoming travels because he will be journeying *Off The Beaten Path*. "I'm excited about it," Koz enthuses. "I couldn't have gone out and done the same show (as before). I won't have to."

■ TOM PETTY AND THE HEARTBREAKERS: "Walls" (Warner Bros. 9 46285-2)

Off the Petty-penned soundtrack to the new film starring \$100K *Friends* star Jennifer Aniston, *She's The One*, "Walls" is the sort of laid-back, anthemic track, replete with sweet harmonies, that every rock format will scoop up right away. The album was produced by Petty, Mike Campbell and Rick Rubin.

■ RUSH: "Test For Echo" (Atlantic PRCD 6853)

Returning for, like, album #28, the members of Rush have their sound down to a science: pretty, thoughtful, somewhat bombastic "thinking person's" metal that is more about intellect than than sweaty rock n' roll. This, the first single off the band's upcoming *Test For Echo* disc, should be an automatic add at classic rock and active rock stations across the board.

■ CARETAKER: "The Buddha" (Squeezing Cheeks music, 1-800-784-5669)

Off a fine, self-released bluesy disc, *In Tense and Purposes*, "The Buddha" is making inroads at AAA and college stations around the U.S. and no wonder. Gorgeously languid with great guitar tone, this is a very accessible track that might garner Caretaker a bigger, adult-person record company next time around.

■ FORESKIN 500: "Twisted" (Priority P2 50526)

Now that Priority Records is closing down its rock department and dropping all the bands, someone should rescue Foreskin 500, purveyors of the nastiest, weird-metal funk you've ever heard. (Imagine if George Clinton and White Zombie got together for a jam...) This infectious track is a modern rock instant-party gem that definitely deserves some attention, off the band's similarly cool *Starbent But Superfreaked* disc.



PICK OF THE WEEK



■ BETTER THAN EZRA: "King Of New Orleans" (Swell/Elektra 2-61944-P)

Better Than Ezra's combination of mellifluous hooks and quirky, instantly memorable songwriting made their *Deluxe* disc, with its hits, "Good," and "In the Blood," a platinum breakout. Back with their sophomore effort, *Friction, Baby*, Better Than Ezra has found its sound and is sticking to it—"The King of New Orleans" has the same trademark lilt and the same stick-in-your-brain-for-days catchiness. Predictably, the track went Top 10 commercial alternative in a little more than a week and shows no signs of slowing down as the band prepares to go on tour starting September 4th, with Satchel opening. "Down Together" was also added to regular rotation on MTV; Better than Ezra performed on Jay Leno last weekend.

■ RASPUTINA: *Thanks For the Ether* (Columbia CK 67504)

And the last time you saw a band whose line-up includes three cellos and no guitars was—well, you get the point. In a world where “commercial” and “alternative” are commonly used in the same sentence, Rasputina is *truly* an alternative, featuring an ethereal, haunting, gothic, vaguely ominous collection of very weird songs from weird-and-proud-of-it gals that’s absolutely fascinating. A record brave and inventive modern rock stations should pick up on right away.

■ LEAH ANDREONE: *Tijuana Hit Squad* (Cargo HED-059 CD)

Debuting artist Leah Andreone couldn’t have come along at a better time. Purveyor of soaring, often harrowing and angst-filled songs and a gorgeous, edgy voice that walks the line between Tori Amos and Alanis Morissette with aplomb, she could well be the next female vocalist to hit big. The morose groove of “It’s Alright, It’s Ok,” the darkly rocking, sarcastic “Happy Birthday,” and the tour-de-force vocals on “Will You Still Love Me?” all point to this as an album that could blow up given half a chance.



■ TYPE O NEGATIVE: *October Rust* (Roadrunner RR8874-2)

Nobody does truly gloomy, gothic doom metal more romantically than Type O Negative, who, despite its hardcore origins, has a lot more in common with British goth bands like Siouxsie and the Banshees and the Cure. *October Rust*, the band’s follow-up to its gold third disc, *Bloody Kisses*, fol-

■ PLUTO: *Pluto* (Virgin 41739)

Fun, accessible power pop from a Vancouver, B.C. band that’s just beggin’ to be on the radio. Songs like “Failure” and “Black Lipstick” sparkle with big, cool guitar sounds, vaguely ironic lyrics and a smooth, confident way around a hook. Pluto has previously opened for Everclear and Cracker, and has just commenced a U.S. tour that includes a stop at the CMJ convention this fall with Cracker. The entirely charming single, “When She was Happy,” is currently being worked to modern rock and college radio stations.

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
■ WHITE ZOMBIE: *Supersexy Swingin' Sounds* (Geffen GEFD-A-24976)

This collection of remixes of the material off White Zombie’s multiplatinum *Astro-Creep: 200 Songs of Love, Destruction and Other Synthetic Delusions of the Electric Head* disc is a wildly inventive sonic adventure—and one that contains any number of tracks that could cross over to the dance charts. The remixers on this ambitious collection include Nine Inch Nails member Charlie Clouser, The Damage Twins (who produced *Mortal Kombat: the Album*), The Dust Brothers (Tone Loc, Beastie Boys, Beck), John Fryer (Gravity Kills, Stabbing Westward) P.M. Dawn, and famed NY club DJ and producer Mike “Hitman” Wilson (New Order). All take off in amazingly complex, sampled, driving, weird flights of sound that unearth new cool details with each listen. Legions of Zombie fans have had nothing new to buy for a while, so *Supersexy...* should fly off the shelves.

ALBUM REVIEWS By Peter Miro

AL TARIQ: *God Connections* (Correct 10004-2) Producers: El Tariq, Les & Juju of The Beatnuts, Lucien, Vic, No I.D.



New York-based rapper Al Tariq aka Kook Fash, has made early radio believers of his new solo project in selected markets. Cities as diverse as Vancouver, BC, Pittsburgh, PA, Houston TX, Toronto, Tampa, Nashville, Miami, Baltimore and New Haven are appreciating the lethality index of Tariq's rhyme confederation. This 17-track collection has a range of jams, all deadly, crafty and wicked in syntax, beat structure and furious flows, ranging from low-key to "in-yo'-face." "Peace Akki," "Just A Lil Joint," "Sexy La "No Question," "Get Down Baby," "Crime Pays," "Spocacular," cover a mini hip hop spectrum where production is subordinate to the impact of the words spoken here.

MASS 187: *Real Trues Paying Dues* (Short Stop/Payday SAC 1239) Producer: Troy Bruntlet, Crazy C., Bruce "Grim Reaper" Rhodes.

While "Gangsta Strut," spliced onto Gil Scott Heron's ode "Angel Dust," is the popular advance single on this project, what's notable about it is that the regional loyalties of these rappers isn't apparent, so it flies in Chicago, Union City, CA, Santa Rosa, CA, New Orleans, Houston and Kansas City equally. Pulling no punches, Mass 187 raps about the hard rule of street law that all manhood within the radius of the living large zone abides by. "Down With My Nigga," "G's To Tha Heart," "68 Caddy," and "Under Dawg," all add material to the ongoing dialogue of ruffness, tuffness and die-hardness which may or may not be enforced with ammunition. It's still that way in some places, and that's where they will really relate.

"Whoot There It Is," and "Rodeo" by 95 South, "Me So Horny," by 2 Live Crew join "Big Butt & A Smile," by Mr. Mixx And Da Roughneck Posse and others on this hip-wriggling compilation, helping feed the summer bass music frenzy that is sweeping the Southeast. "Ooh Lawd (Party People)" and similar tunes promise nonstop continuous dance material for that genre, ripe for mixing with newer, emerging tracks of the same flavor.

AALIYAH: *One In A Million* (Blackground/Atlantic 92715-2) Producers: Jermaine Dupri, Timberland, Jay Dibbs, Vincent Herbert, Kay Gee, Jomo Hankerson, Michael Houghton, Craig Kallman.



Strong material from a self-assured young lady who is gripping her musical future firmly by the horns. Aaliyah addresses ballads and uptempo hip hop forms with equal skill. "A Girl Like You," is the urban bombshell that stacks up with "If Your Girl Only Knew," and "One In A Million," as tracks to watch on this project. Aaliyah's conversational interludes between some tracks convey some of her accessible, funky, sensuality before her stormy, steamy vocals take over. "Giving You More" is awash with maturity. Sweet-but-street is an apt description of this seventeen-year old's musical gifts. "The One I Gave My Heart To," is a bonus cut that adds to the R&B, pop, urban & churban playability of this deceptively oozing talent. Street date: August 27.

APPROACHED THE COMELY VENUS figurine in her full length black dress, with light caramel skin free of makeup, and mob of gold-frosted braids arcing randomly atop her head. Cigar smoke, in vogue with ladies and men these days, wafted through the air at West Hollywood's Book Soup Bistro Patio, and some fine California wines flowed for guests. The lady of the hour, Ambersunshower smiles demurely, and heads for a quiet corner to read the latest preliminary review of her *Gee Street/Island* debut LP *Walter T. Smith*, a project named for her late grandfather. She's apparently pleased that discriminating ears are feeling the poetry and originality in her music. Tall, slinky, big boned, unpretentious, Ambersunshower looks one in the eye, her handshake is firm. She's refreshingly real. "Her image is all her own, what you see is her," says manager Amanda Smith, whose other client happens to be Loud Records artist Yvette Michelle. Smith described the process of breaking Ambersunshower's debut on urban radio, which may be overly tied to mainstream hip hop convention with respect to her product. Advance airplay has been favorable overall, and listeners in the South have embraced her jazzy, minimalist lyricism tacked onto a folksy, hip hop soul canvas. Urban radio almost immediately thinks of her as an "alternative" artist. (Sounds like an *Alternative Groove* candidate. Mr. Scott, to the bridge.) So the label hopes the release of the fluid, PM Dawn-produced "Running Song" single should wake up urban pd's shortly. At the nearby Viper Room, Ambersunshower and her touring band livened up the dark enclave with a few numbers from her debut. Background vocalist Carol Cardenas fairly replicated the harmonic interplay laid in on the album. Radiating an earthy vibe, Ambersunshower scats and squeals her sensibilities. She becomes a maenad in a self-absorbed trance channeling notes and spirits through herself, a soulful medium in the dark. Over layers of sound and lyrics, her styling was the key. Her modest, monosyllabic bandmates consisted of musical director Tikk Takk, on keyboards and sampler, Sharrieff, keyboards, Cecil, on bass and Hitman on drums. These strong, silent types will accompany Ambersunshower on a tour with De La Soul, Goodie Mob and Fishbone next month. Washington, D.C. is the first stop. It will be interesting to see how her flavor is felt in the coming weeks.

ALLEYEZ ON TICKETS: A "dogg show" of massive proportions comes to 25 U.S. cities commencing October '96 when 2Pac, Snoop Doggy Dogg and The Dogg Pound begin their "All Eyez On Us" Tour. The Death Row Records triple concert threat plans to become an anticipated treat for large capacity venues nationwide. Cities, arenas, ticket prices and sale dates will be announced in the near future.

Presented by Daedalus Entertainment Finance Company, L.L.C. (Def Com), a renowned promotion company headquartered in St. Louis, chairman and C.E.O. Stephen M. Coleman and a crew of prominent industry professionals, are attending to the logistical and promotional challenge of staging the rap stars nationwide. "2Pac, Snoop and Tha Dogg Pound felt that we could handle three of the 'phattest' and largest rappers on stage in 20,000 seat arenas," says Coleman. "They knew we would handle the tour with utmost respect and professionalism." Coleman promises to validate his headliners' trust with a "smooth as ice" tour. Adds 2Pac, "It took a while, but we were finally able to come together. We always wanted to perform together in large arenas but couldn't find the right promoters that could handle the situation. Our fans are large and diverse. We didn't want to put a tour together unless we could guarantee that our dog pound would get the utmost experience." Snoop Doggy Dogg promises the tour "will be all that and then some. Nobody will be disappointed."

The tour comes in the wake of some brisk sales for the Death Row artists featured, bolstered by prominent video exposure. 2Pac's *All Eyez On Me* LP has sold over five million copies to date. Daz and Kurupt saw their *Dogg Food* LP debut at #1 on rap sales charts. Rawness and realism are the watchwords for the upcoming concert series.

IT'S A RACKET: Turns out British rapper/producer Tricky wrote the lyrics for the "Live With Yo Self" track, so artfully wailed by vocalist Stephanie on his Payday Records' EP *Tricky Presents Grassroots*. He comments on the present state of hip hop in comparison to his self-defined "strange smooth," "hard R&B" approach: "It's weird today because kids today are satisfied with a looped beat and lazy rhymes even if it ain't good. Back in the day, you had to get wreck everytime. You had to be consistent. It's not consistent anymore is it? Everyone has a song, and now everyone is a rapper. Record companies take hip hop and just go in one direction with gangsters running it; bad boys. But instead of cocaine, it's music."

■ **KOOL G RAP & DJ POLO: "Lifestyles Of The Rich & Famous" (Cold Chillin/Epic PROCCD 2065) Producers: Tyrone Williams, "Kool Ass" Lenny.**

Representing Queens, New York, this single excerpt from the new *Rated XXX* LP won't offend. It's simply two playas talking about their well entrenched megabucks stature, at least metaphorically. A R&B laced groove, that owes its keyboard flavorings to samples from Fonda Rae and Lost Boyz. This vocal version is clean enough for urban radio, with a Brass Construction feel, for those who remember that ensemble.

■ **SHYHEIM: "Shaolin Style f/Squig" (Noo Trybe 7087 6 11546 2 7 DPRO 11546) Producers: RNS, Guy Rouette, Gemma Corfield**

A remixed clean version off the *Lost Generation* LP, with ample underlayers by Method Man and Patrice Rushen on this Wu Tang Clan-flavored jam. Heavy hitting bass and keyboards on this reality-dropping track.

■ **NONCHALANT: "Until The Day" (MCA MCA5P-3727) Producers: Chucky Thompson for Chucklife Productions.**

Nonchalant raps onto a construct designed with samples of Stevie Wonder's "Always" mixed with a "Chucklife" New Jack beat. Guest rapper Quasim Baptiste helps drive this track which owes some stylistic homage to Bobby Caldwell. Comes with three edits.

Mahogany's Many Facets

KEVIN MAHOGANY DOESN'T WORRY about labels. He's happy just making good music. "If there are no labels on (the music), then it just comes right down to one thing—do you like it!" says the Kansas City native, whose debut self-titled album for Warner Bros. Records is a buffet of jazz, blues and contemporary flavors. "A lot of people have called me a good jazz singer after hearing me, but they really can't tell if this is a jazz album."

If there is one predominant vibe on this 10-track collection of mainly standards, its the blues—from opening track "Yesterday I Had The Blues" to the Fats Domino track "I'm Walkin'." But Mahogany's unique phrasing helps transcend the character of the material and brings an individual style to each track. The 38-year-old singer—he performs a turn as a Joe Turner-like character in the Robert Altman film *Kansas City*—says the beginnings of his musical style were probably honed while playing clarinet and piano in his early years.

Produced by Matt Pierson, the album is merely a calling card to Mahogany's live show, which is probably more jazz oriented, something evident during an engagement at L.A.'s Jazz Bakery, which is one leg of touring as part of the promotion for his album. In fact, Warner Bros. has plans to run the singer out of L.A. on a rail in the coming months to promote the record.

"We've developed a special promotion with Amtrak that will put him on the Starlight Coast line between L.A. and Oakland, where he will perform, just him and a piano," explains

Mary Lou Badeaux, WBR vp of product management, jazz. "I had been investigating a cross-promotion with Amtrak on some other projects and felt that Kevin was a natural for something like this. I discovered that Amtrak is after the more upscale leisure traveler, people that take trains for pleasure excursions, and that the demographics that Kevin's music could attract could be similar for both."

It probably didn't hurt the promotion's set-up that Mahogany had earned major kudos earlier in the year from major publications like *USA Today* and *Newsweek*, Badeaux says. Mahogany has been hailed as the best male jazz singer since Joe Williams.

Badeaux says that the Amtrak promotion, set for November 15, calls for the train company to create a special sales brochure touting the Mahogany trip and also do poster signage to promote the event. Badeaux says that she also will work closely with the West Coast publicity and promotion offices of Amtrak to seek alternative ways of promoting the event. A retail contest tie-in, where a contest winner will be invited to take the Starlight Coasters trip, is also in the works. She said at press time that there are also tentative plans brewing for Mahogany to deliver a listeners' concert at Oakland's Jack London Square that would be tied in with a local radio stations.

But the travel motif continues, as Mahogany will be featured along with other Warner Bros. artists on in-flight music programming, the Warner Bros. Records "Airspace Channel," two hours of music featuring the label's artists.

The singer additionally will be featured on a forthcoming segment of 24-hour cable channel *BET On Jazz*, where he will be joined by Larry Golding (who performs on Mahogany's album) and James Moody who also has a current album out on Warner Bros.

While Badeaux and company busy themselves with promotion and marketing strategies, Mahogany says that he concerns himself with the music, and the cornerstone for his success, he believes, has been the material which he has recorded. "Choosing good songs is the key to any success I've experienced," the singer says.

Listen Up! For McCann

THERE SHOULD BE NO PITY directed at legendary musician Les McCann, who was felled by a stroke more than a year ago while working in Germany. His latest album, *Listen Up!*, his 44th overall and second for MusicMasters, is testament to his persistent spirit, and the esteem to which he is held by his peers.

An early architect of soulful, contemporary jazz, McCann's music has been sampled as much as any funk act's and has become part of the pantheon of contemporary music, from his "With These Hands" to the ubiquitous collaboration with Eddie Harris, "Compared To What." Although he has not regained

full facility for playing (he does contribute voice and keyboard work on the title track and "When I Fall In Love"), the composer/keyboardist/producer has written for this album a selection of songs that speak to his creative vitality and have attracted an all-star cast to perform the music.

"I thank God every day for the chance to do what I've been doing since I can remember," he recently said. "I could go around feeling sorry for myself, but I'm still alive," adding that therapy has returned some of his prodigious playing skills, but that those he called upon to contribute to the album fleshed out his musical vision.

"Well," (the musicians) had been saying that they were fans and friends, so it was time for them to prove it," he says, punctuating the thought with his inimitable laughter.

Joining him on the album are George Duke, Billy Preston, Ernie Watts, Greg Phillinganes, Dori Caymmi, David T. Walker, Jeff Elliot, Andy Narrell, John Robinson, Steve Erquiaga, Nic ten Brock, Vince Denham and Abraham Laboriel.

Produced by Alan Abrahams, the album is the joyful noise that McCann has made famous—that mixture of rhythmically-rich, melodious tours of sound, mixed with adventurous textures topped with thick dollops of soul. The record features an apt remake of his "Little 3/4 For God & Co." and "Ruby Jubilation" is a personification of the style that he established as a template for jazz-soul explorations.

McCann says that he continues to improve, although he "isn't rushing anything." The creative process is his best therapy. The bassline that inspired the title track is something he practices to improve his digital dexterity; he continues his painting ("along with a little self-manipulation while in the shower") to enhance his hand control.

"I'm really blessed," McCann says. "I asked for another chance, and I got it."

■ **MICHAEL STUART:** *Cuentos Del A Vecindad* (RMM, 82029) Producers: Angel Fernandez & Juan Gonzalez. **SALSA.**

He's young, romantic, and versatile. Without question, Puerto Rican singer Michael Stuart signifies a fresh, new direction for the next generation in salsa music. The first single, "Imaginando Tu Amor," composed by singer-author Domingo Quiñones, is a dynamite song. Surprisingly the entire album, including the opening number, "Amor A Primera Vista," will send shock waves to aficionados and dancers alike. There are faint murmurs of fellow salsero Marc Anthony due to the involvement of same's producer, Angel Fernandez. Yet, Stuart's stout and assertive voice, along with well written material and innovative arrangements makes this debut album worth adding to your library.

■ **MARCELINO GUERRA:** *Rapindey* (Nubenegra-Institution, 3185) Producer: Manuel Dominguez. **TROPICAL-CUBAN.**

Marcelino Guerra, one of Cuba's greatest legends of Afro-Cuban music, died on June 30th, 1996, having left the world with this priceless piece of musical history. Guerra, whose nickname, *Rapindey*, came about because of his swift speed in accomplishing things, played a vital role in this genre, both as singer and composer. Fans of Cuban music will greatly appreciate this rare insight of a great icon who has made his influence known for the past seventy years! The seventeen numbers found on this recording renders it an immediate collectors' item. The autumn years of Guerra's rich career are captured for all of posterity to enjoy for years to come.

CURB'S CHRISTIAN CROSSOVER

CRUSADE: Call her the contemporary Joan of Arc, sans the burning ritual by uncouth heathens. Ok, forget the overly dramatic Joan image. The debut album by **Patty Cabrera**, *Always and Forever*, however, does signal an important milestone in the history of the Christian music market. It's the elusive crossover variety, however, that most in the biz dream about because it involves the ever-growing Latin music market. And it's Cabrera who holds the golden key for her expanding Nashville-based label, **Curb Records**. An English version was released this past March, distributed by **Warner Christian Distribution**. The Spanish-language version was released internationally several months ago through **WEA**. The first English-language single, "Always & Forever" was played on Christian radio stations. Plans by Curb have focused on later releases to mainstream radio.

Cash Box caught up with Cabrera for an interview while taping a promotional segment at **KCAL 9 TV**. When speaking about her music, Cabrera said, "First of all, it's not a matter of Christian versus pop with a Latin feel. Really, this is my music, what I'm bringing to the table. My music speaks about what I believe in. Just like any artist, whatever they do, whether they are creating, painting or writing, or in my case, singing, it's about what they are passionate about. The foundation of my life is God and my passions are family, romance and God. It works in a Christian market. That's how I kind'a see it. I didn't want a label...contemporary Christian artist...really I didn't want any kind of label, you know, like Christian contemporary artist; obviously people want to have an idea of what kind of music it is and I would say it's pop music with a Latin flavor. That's what it is. Then you take it home, you listen to it, you digest it. It's very clear where I come from. The lyrics are very clear, but without giving it a label it allows the person to take it in at their rate. So that's what I like to say is my music."

The 27 year-old Cuban-Puerto Rican singer is making statements in other ways as well. She was named one of the "50 Most Beautiful People in the World" of 1996 by *People Magazine*. Not bad for a young skinny tomboy as Cabrera describes herself, "They called me Pat the Rat, because I was so skinny." Today, the long-legged beauty with the smiling brown eyes seems to have the world at her beck and call. Cabrera recently "turned heads" at the Republican Party Organization where she was asked to be the convention's official "National Youth Chairperson" for the 1996 Republican National Convention in San Diego. She also participated in a major concert performance following Dole's candidacy announcement. Is this mixing politics with religion? Not really, explains Cabrera. Her intention is to share her gift of music with everyone, regardless of political or religious affiliation.

Her debut album for Curb Records is a delightful mixture of Latino culture in all of its colorful light. Add in Cabrera's refreshing, non-preaching message of Christian faith with her innate and creative musical talent. The inevitable result is a new release destined to reach the heavens. Says Cabrera, "With our first single in the Latin pop market "Te Oigo," with 36 radio stations picking it up, four in Puerto Rico...we'll see how that goes. Our next thing is to go to mainstream pop at the end of the year."

Both the English and Spanish versions of the album feature the accompaniment of the **Miami Sound Machine's** rhythm section and **Michael Jackson's** horns. Cabrera co-authored six of the ten songs with her producer **Bob Parr**. The material ranges in style from progressive rock and urban contemporary to rhythmic, yet velvety mid-tempo ballads.

Being a relatively new artist (her first album in 1991 was Christian-themed), Cabrera has made her own observations about the record music business. "There are different ways people like to market it (album) for the business sense of it. It sometimes pigeonholes me when people are pitching me a certain way; it's not the way I would introduce it." Meanwhile this is where Cabrera firmly believes she has her calling. "Not many people get to do for a career what they love. I'm very blessed and thankful for that. It's an industry, one that God has led me to. I've given my life over to Him, two years ago, and He's sort of just taken the ball where it goes. My part is just to take my craft and to make sure it's the best it can be in vocalizing (and) writing."

Cabrera is presently pursuing a Master's degree in Religion. She has also participated in **Metro Ministries**, a street ministry in Brooklyn for victims of abusive home and drug-destroyed families who are homeless. The singer will start an international tour in the fall.

Castle Rock's *Spitfire Grill* Is Quality

LEE DAVID ZLOTOFF is credited as "writer-director" of the *The Spitfire Grill*, being presented by Castle Rock Entertainment but produced by Gregory Productions in association with The Mendocino Corporation. "Written & Directed by," however, seems cold and impersonal when speaking of this film. Zlotoff didn't just write this—he romanced and loved it, lived it, laughed and wept it. Didn't direct it—he molded, shaped, crafted it. The result is that *The Spitfire Grill* is the first solid piece of pure beauty on screen of 1996.

Castle Rock picked up *Spitfire* after seeing it at this year's Sundance Film Festival, where it won the Audience Award. They reportedly paid \$10 million for the film and that's impressive. Yes, it was made as an independent film and, as such, it can

boast—as could last year's *Usual Suspects*—the freedom to explore characters outside the commercial realm and inside the realm of the heart and soul. *Spitfire* also wraps its characters in human values, human traits, longings and jealousy and like humanity itself, there are elements of mystery to it which Zlotoff reveals masterfully, slowly and deliberately.

Spitfire is Zlotoff's feature directorial debut, having come out of the television arena as writer-producer-director and having created the successful *MacGyver* series. If that's where he learned the art of storytelling perhaps more screenwriters should try it. Directors too. I think, however, Zlotoff chose the correct venue for this: his script is so beautifully crafted and then presented on film so precisely that another director handling it might have missed beats and moments which the creator is able to incorporate so nicely. This is a single person's vision from paper to screen and it is beautifully realized. Another strong *Independent* argument, like 1995's *Suspects*, for filmmaking to be left to filmmakers.

Shot on location in Vermont without effects, without pyrotechnics other than emotions, the budget was small enough that this can capture that dwindling audience of filmgoers who give a damn about story, character, emotions and feelings—people—and still turn a profit. And students of *storytelling* and the craft of *writing* will eat this up. *Spitfire Grill* has to be a leading contender for this year's Original Screenplay, further following in the footsteps of *Suspects*.

Not only are Zlotoff's script and direction superb, he has assembled a cast and other key elements, especially notable production designer Howard Cummings, D.P. Rob Draper, editor Margie Goodspeed and music composer James Horner.

The cast is headed by Alison Elliott, Ellen Burstyn and Marcia Gay Harden. Briefly: Elliott comes out of prison to the small town of Gilead, Maine where she is housed and put to work at *The Spitfire Grill* by its owner, Burstyn, and befriended by Harden, local sheriff Gailard Sartain and romanced by Kieran Mulroney while drawing suspicion from Harden's husband and Burstyn's nephew Will Patton and others. Small town divisions and suspicions occur, mysteries of both Elliot and townspeople reveal themselves until the climax. And it doesn't work out like you think it will. You want a treat, go see it. I guarantee you won't be disappointed, if you haven't been lobotomized by all the previous crash-bang and burners—but then, those droolers wouldn't understand this anyway.

Elliott is as rich in talent as any young actress working today. She reveals her character's feelings and emotions here heartbreakingly beautifully, always in the moment. It is a very real performance with a depth that may seem beyond her years, but not beyond the character's. She makes the audience feel everything her character feels.

Ellen Burstyn doesn't need to prove herself. Her credentials are well known. Here she simply adds to the luster, solidly moving herself into another arena of character work with the talent and depth that has seen her at the top of every area, stage or screen, she's gone into. A totally rich performance.

Marcia Gay Harden is more solid as she's ever been in the role of stepped-on housewife. She is touching in her longing to be accorded peer status and quietly wonderful when she gains her own strength. Will Patton is absolutely solid as a suspicious and jealous tight-lipped New England husband puffed up with his own small importance. Kieran Mulroney works his character very successfully on several levels, quietly but convincingly falling in love in a past-era manner while never losing sight of the time he's in. Gailard Sartain brings up a fine portrait of a small town sheriff, knowing everyone in town, convinced there is more good than bad in all he sees. Indeed, the entire cast, assembled by Marci Liroff, has a definite feel of New England to them. A first rate job all the way down the line.

Rob Draper's photography takes you into the territory, puts you in the room with the emotions and acts as a comforter around the shoulders, pointing up the warmth from the earth hues of Howard Cummings color designs. And James Horner's music gives the film a heartbeat which connects the souls of those on screen with the audience out front. Beautiful themes and touching, soaring moments are realized throughout.

From all concerned *The Spitfire Grill* passes to an audience all emotions humans are prey to, but it also displays the love, kindness, honesty, hope and caring of which humans are capable. It's a film of spirit. Please, let's not lose these.

Post And Pro Bono Wants (Gasp!) Experience!

Y'EVER HEAR THE OLD SAYING, "worn as an old shoe?" Or "kicked like an old tin can?" How about, "worthless as an old tire." General Douglas MacArthur said, "Old soldiers never die, they just fade away."

Right now there are powers in all areas of entertainment that are wishing some of those old occurrences on their old soldiers, i.e.; actors, directors, musicians, writers, etc... The so-called marketing demographics have zeroed in on the 18 to 40s something to sell to and therefore the majority of entertainment material is being created to, ostensibly, appeal to that age bracket's "buying power."

In the quest for those dollars television networks and the production companies feeding them, mainstream movie studios and record companies reach out to "hot new talent" for their material. And what they get, basically, are ideas, stories and approaches to creativity that those "hot news" have seen come from those "old tires." Essentially they dumb the ideas down to a couple scatological gags in the recycling, ad some computer tricks and are paid big bucks.

Right now the "hot news" smilingly tell the old worns to fade away, forgetting that in a couple of years their demographic number will be up, if current trends hold.

But will they? Some old soldiers are choosing not to fade away, at least not quietly. Ted Post is 78 and, after directing such Clint Eastwood hits as *Magnum Force* and *Hang 'Em High* and over 1,000 episodes of TV series, is choosing to fight rather than fade.

In 1994 Ted Post took part in a panel sponsored by the Screen Actors Guild and AFTRA, a seminar which has become an annual affair whereby ranking members of the entertainment industry, such as Post, gather with actors over a certain age; those who are feeling the pinch of less work, rise in insurances rates and/or loss of insurance package altogether, loss of pride and self-respect because of doing the unthinkable in Hollywood—aging. Post left that '94 meeting and wrote an article for his Directors Guild of America magazine in which he set out his standard—much like Orson Welles stated the creed for his newspaper in *Citizen Kane*—"This is a declaration of war on the mindless youth cult that has our time in its grip—demoralizing us, weakening our system, depleting our energy..." and he's since formed **Pro Bono Productions**. The intent of the company is to make use of some of those old shoes, cans and tires who aren't done with their creative usefulness.

In speaking with *Cash Box* Post expressed a feeling that "Every Guild should start their own production company" in order to put members to work. For that to work "all guilds (should) get together and work together" toward that end.

Post and Pro Bono look toward utilizing the wealth of talent sitting in the shadows of the unemployment line. The director has gathered together some of his peers and others with highly-successful track records such as Clint Eastwood, John Frankenheimer, Norman Lear, Jack Lemmon, Gregory Peck, Angela Lansbury, Karl Malden and Norman Corwin for an advisory board and is currently seeking financial backing for the venture. His company plans are for WGA members to put new spins on adaptations of public domain classics (Shakespeare, Moliere, Sophocles) for projects. He's spoken with KCET-TV's president/CEO Albert D. Jerome regarding the concept and Jerome has expressed enthusiasm, willingness to help and has offered the station's facilities. Hopefully, more will follow.

In New York James McGowan has recognized essentially the same trend as Post and, at the same SAG-AFTRA over-50 seminar earlier this year that Post attended in '94, revealed formation of **Prime Life Network** which he plans to air on cable television beginning with six hours of original programming akin to what is widely-regarded as television's "Golden Age" during the days of such classics as *Playhouse 90* fare.

There are other indications, however subtle some may be, that older Americans are gaining some sort of recognition as a group to be pitched for money (the ultimate in TV kudo tossing) in something other than a telephone Ponzi scam. In particular are the current series of Infiniti car commercials in which the company appears to realize that, while the youth market might buy Bud six packs, Gap jeans and White Diamond scent, the older market purchases cars, houses, refrigerators. Infiniti is using Jonathan Pryce, with his receding hairline and grey hair as spokesperson, mature members within the spots and ad copy which actually asks viewers to "think."

Music, in certain genres and areas of the country, according to sources (see *Cash Box* Blues columns by John Rhys 8/10/96 & 8/24/96) is seeing a return to melody and lyrics with a gentler approach to the art of songwriting and recording. In TV QDE Productions (Quincy Jones and David Salzman) and Ryscher Entertainment are entering *Naomi*, with Naomi Judd—who's not a twentysomething—hosting, as a "Positive" themed talk show in the daytime TV market. Rumbblings are being heard more and more from across the country about the quality of music, movies and TV and certain forces in government are looking to get into the act (it is an election year, lest we forget), so it doesn't feel like simply a passing fad, this looking for some quality and somewhere. And if Post, McGowan and QDE are correct, quality is most likely to be found through those experienced minds and talents of persons who are familiar with the road traveled because once you've been down a treacherous path, you're not likely to step in deep, wet, cold and forbidding holes if you know where they are.

SWINGIN' WITH THE VIRTUAL NIGHTCLUB: Music and electronic games in the last 15 years have developed more mutually beneficial ties—growing from the arcade pieces through electronic home games to the latest incarnations in cyberspace. Philips Media Music has envisioned and produced a multimedia

game that combines cutting edge music with sharp technology for a particular appeal of the nocturnal pub crawler in search of fun and games.

Virtual Nightclub (VNC) is the title of the futuristic, 3-D club environment that features musical appearances by the likes of Herbie Hancock, Stereo M.C.'s **PM Dawn**, **Redman**, **Joe Henderson** and others alongside murky members of the nightlife club-culture featuring a cast of characters out for

News From The United Kingdom, Ireland & Europe

TOP UK SINGLES: Spice Girls' "Wannabe" still holding onto top spot followed by newcomer 3T Featuring Michael Jackson's "Why" and Backstreet Boys join us on three with "We've Got It Going On." Los Del Rio's "Macarena" moves down to four and OMC's "How Bizarre" moves up to five. Dodgy's "Good Enough" holds onto six while Eternal's "Someday" drops to seven. Pet Shop Boys come to tell us on eight that "That's The Way Life Is" while Bone Thugs-N-Harmony move up to nine with "The Crossroads" followed by newcomer Ant & Des' "Better Watch Out" on ten.

Alanis Morissette's *Jagged Little Pill* is still the top selling album in the UK and the UK's top music video seller is again Bill Whelan's *Riverdance—The Show* followed by Bill Whelan's *Riverdance—A Journey*. Top video rental is again *Seven* and coming on top in the sales department is *Star Trek Voyager: vol. 2.8*. Jumping back in the computer game rentals both at Mega Drive and Super Nintendo is *Atlanta '96—Olympic Games* and it didn't take a crystal ball to predict that Fox's *Independence Day* would hit the top at the boxoffice in its UK opening. Fugees' "Killing Me Softly" is again killing the competition as it wins top European singles race by leading in Germany, Holland, Denmark, Italy, Finland, Switzerland, Yugoslavia, Macedonia, Austria and France. Gary Barlow's "Forever Love" leads in Spain, Lithuania and Croatia. Fugees's album *The Score* is the leader in Europe, topping charts in Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, Germany and Holland while the rest of the albums are leading in only one country each.

For a music read, try Eugene Masterson's *The Word On The Street: The Unauthorized Story of Oasis (Mainstream Publishing)*. Another music read is James Lester's *Too Marvelous For Words: The Life and Genius of Art Tatum (Oxford University Press)*. For a Hollywood mystery thriller there's Steven Humphrey (Bacall) Bogart's *As Time Goes By (Macmillan)*.

Moving up on the hardback bestseller non-fiction list is Patrick Cordingley's *In The Eye of the Storm (Hodder)* while still heading the fiction list is Ben Elton's *Popcorn (Simon & Schuster)*. Bill Bryson's *Notes From A Small Island (Black Swan)* tops the paperback non-fiction while Nicholas Evans' *The Horse Whisperer (Corgi)* heads the fiction list, its 11th week in the top ten. And BBC comes out with its audiobook, *Murder In Mesopotamia* by Agatha Christie.

MAINLY UPS as Thorn EMI ended its listing in London at £17.73, up 0.5% and PolyGram's £38.62 (Nlf 2.566) rose 2.4%. On the downside is Rank Organization going for £4.62, down 0.2%.

IS IT HALF FULL OR HALF EMPTY? The British Phonographic Industry says that record sales are slowing down, reporting that this year's second quarter was up 2% (£209 million) compared to last year's second quarter's £205.01 million. However, since this year's first quarter showed exceptional strength, the rate of growth has slowed down and annual sales figures to the end of June were up 7% from last year's £1.04 billion. Album sales increased 0.4% to £179.99 million and leading with second quarter album sales were Alanis Morissette's *Jagged Little Pill* trailed by George Michael's *Older* and Take That's *Greatest Hits*. Singles market was up 11% over last year, with second quarter sales at £28.57 million, led by Platinum winners The Fugees, Gina G, Mark Morrison and Baddiel, Skinner & The Lightning Seed CD sales are taking some 78% of the market with cassette sales hitting under 55 million units.

TAKE THE A TRAIN, but stop off to do some shopping as British Rail is working on turning railroad stations into miniature malls resembling airport shops. First on line is London's Liverpool Street station which now has pubs, game rooms, restaurants and a health club, soon to be joined by multiplexes and virtual reality centers. It's reported that lunchtime at the station is even busier than rush hour and the dinner and recreation traffic is also building up.

ABRIL SHOWERS: Brazil's Abril Group has sold 50% of its MTV Brazil station to MTV Networks, a subsidiary of Viacom. MTV earlier this year split its Latin American services into two parts, with one channel aimed at the Caribbean and Central America and the second at South American countries. In Asia, MTV expects to expand its India service to five hours of daily programming. And in Europe, MTV Europe is regionalizing its programming so that advertisers can target a specific area, rather than the whole continent.

SMURF-IT: Oasis hit back at The Smurfs who had planned to add their version of "Oasis' "Wonderwall" to the compilation album, *Smurfs Go Pop*, which as recently released "Wondersmurf" was to be the lead song, but threatened legal action by Oasis and label Sony forced the producers to pull the song. Other pop artists, including Bjork were reported pleased to be included on the album.

THORN-Y WEATHER as shareholders in Thorn EMI voted to split the company into two companies, both of which will be listed in the London's stock exchange listing of the top 100 companies. Some analysts questioned the timing of the nearly £5 million earnings in share options received by CEO Sir Colin Southgate and finance director Simon Duffy. There were also questions about bonuses received by top senior executives. However, Sir Colin said its bonus packages were standard for senior executives in the U.S. music industry. Both men also have "golden parachutes" in case EMI is taken over shortly, which is widely talked about in the market.

DISCORDANT SOUNDS as the British Academy of Songwriters, Composers and Authors said that some 50 of its members have joined in a claim that they are owed considerable sums of money in unpaid foreign royalties by EMI. Most were signed up with UK publishers which were taken over by EMI. Under their original contracts, any royalties earned in the UK were split equally between composer and publisher. In foreign countries, rights were handled by so-called "sub-publishers" who kept half the royalties and the remaining 50% was divided equally between the composer and the publisher. BASCA said that after EMI acquired the independent UK publishers, it took over handling foreign rights through its own subsidiaries. The composers and BASCA claim that since EMI was handling their works internationally, they should continue to receive 50% of the proceeds, instead of the current 25%. PolyGram and Warners have agreed to the composers' claims. However, EMI has thus far declined to comment.

THERE MAY BE TROUBLES AHEAD in the Northern Ireland situation, but that's not stopping artists from both sides of the line in Ireland to keep on makin' music. The Ulster Theatre Company is coming to the Cork Opera House in the Republic of Ireland with their production of—*Oklahoma!* It'll be followed by another "Irish" musical—*The Roy Orbison Story*.

WHAT DO YOU BID FOR ELVIS PRESLEY's white gabardine performance suit or Jimi Hendrix's autographed lyrics for "Ain't No Telling" or for a Paul McCartney letter? Well, you'll find out what someone else paid after Bonhams in London auctions off a lot of pop memorabilia.

WHERE HAVE ALL THE LITTLE GIRLS GONE? You know, the 10- to 14-year olds who scream every time a pretty boy starts to sing, and spend millions and millions on their heartthrobs. Well, the music industry is looking for them. The last time the girls hit the market spending big bucks was when Take That was still going strong as the "boyband" of the moment. Since they broke up, companies have been pushing groups like Boyzone, East 17 and Peter Andre to take Take That's place, but none of the groups have lighted up the sparks that spell megastar. The girls are looking for young, handsome, clean-cut male singers who they can dream about, and while some of the groups have a following, it's not like the old days. And former Take That stars Robbie Williams and Gary Barlow have gone 'upmarket' and are aiming their songs at the older teenagers and early twenty crowd, a field already occupied by Oasis, Blur and Pulp.

MAYBE THE LITTLE GIRLS WEREN'T BORN: In the UK at the present time there are some 1.5 million less 10-14 year-olds than ten years ago, and the numbers in this age group are expected to decline for at least another ten years. And it's being reflected in both television and publishing. The top TV music program, *Tops of the Pops* has dropped from 5 million to some 2.6 million viewers and other music programs report dropping figures. And the bi-weekly teen music magazine, *Smash Hits* has seen its circulation drop from 300,000 to 200,000 and it is continuing to drop. Solution seems to be—more babies.

SPINNING IN VINYL: Old LPs are selling in the UK for around £5 per album, and even higher for original pressings of groups like The Beatles and Rolling Stones. They're going for up to £25 each and even higher for the rare or bootleg items. Even Oasis has seen their old LP singles selling for up to £20 in the used market. Record companies currently release a limited number on vinyl for one-time promotion and are used as a marketing tool rather than a mass market sales item and vinyl accounts for less than 10% of the music market.

PLAY RECORDS—PLAY BALL seems to be the motto of Chrysalis' Chris Wright as he swings from music to football without stopping for a breath. He just bought London's football club the Queen's Park Rangers and as the legal time limit is approaching as to when he will be allowed back into the music business after the sale of Chrysalis Records to EMI several years ago, Wright's working on setting up his new label, Echo.

AND DRIVING ON is Charles Levinson, a director of Chrysalis Group and non-executive chairman of SCI Entertainment who has joined the board of Dagenham Motors Group, the UK's largest Ford dealer. Levinson was also associated with Virgin Broadcasting.

REMEMBER LAST AUGUST when Britpop was all the talk and the big news on television, radio, magazines, newspapers and books was the battle between Oasis and Blur. Both groups fought it out for six months as to who was going to be the top group and the insults flew all over the place? Well, Oasis is currently on a roll, playing to more than 250,000 in two days in the UK and sold out concerts in Ireland and their albums up on the charts. And Blur—well, they were last reported in Iceland working on their new album and aside from a few European festival concerts, they've remained pretty much out of sight—and news.

NO LONGER PERFORMING IN NEW YORK is Alistair Hunter, former British counsel general in that city. He's now a non-executive director of the Performing Rights Society in the UK. PRS collected about £170 million in royalties last year and its latest reports indicate that this year's music royalties have gone up to £178.5 million.

Clark, Twain, Brandt Lead CCMA Noms

TERRI CLARK, PAUL BRANDT AND SHANIA TWAIN are the leaders in nominations for the 15th annual **Canadian Country Music Awards Show**, to be broadcast live from Calgary's Jubilee Theatre on Monday, September 9.

Mercury Nashville's Clark garnered the most nominations of any artist—seven—all from her self-titled debut album. Clark is up for Female Vocalist of the Year, the Vista (rising star) Award, Album of the Year (*Terri Clark*), Single of the Year ("Better Things To Do"), the NCN Fans' Choice Entertainer of the Year, SOCAN Song of the Year ("Better Things To Do," written with Tom Shapiro and Chris Waters), and Video of the Year for "When Boy Meets Girl."

Clark's labelmate Shania Twain earned six nominations from her record-breaking album *The Woman In Me*: Female Vocalist of the Year, NCN Fans' Choice Entertainer of the Year, Single of the Year ("If You're Not In It For Love") I'm Outta Here"), SOCAN Song of the Year (again for "...I'm Outta Here," written by Twain and "Mutt" Lange), and two nominations for Video of the Year ("You Win My Love" and "...I'm Outta Here").

Reprise artist Brandt is the top male nominee, with six CCMA nods: Album of the Year (*Calm Before The Storm*), Male Vocalist of the Year, the Vista Award, Single of the Year ("My Heart Has A History"), SOCAN Song of the Year ("My Heart Has A History," written by Brandt and Mark D. Sanders), and Video of the Year ("My Heart Has A History").

Actor Paul Gross will host the CCMA ceremony and country superstar Garth Brooks will present the award for the NCN Fans' Choice Entertainer of the Year Award live via satellite

from the stage during his concert in Saint John, New Brunswick. In addition to Clark and Twain, Charlie Major, Prairie Oyster and Michelle Wright are nominated for the Fans' Choice Award.

The 15th annual Canadian Country Music Awards will be rebroadcast in the United States on TNN: The Nashville Network at 8 and 11 p.m. (CST) Saturday, September 14.

The nine-hour program will run continuously from 1 p.m. Saturday with repeats at 10 p.m. Saturday and 7 a.m. Sunday. The special returns Monday from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. (EST).

MINDY MCCREADY'S DEBUT ALBUM *Ten Thousand Angels* has been certified gold. The album has been one of the biggest sellers of 1996, having been released just three months ago, and is currently #5 on the *Cash Box* country album chart.

BIG KAT TAYLOR, country blues singer/songwriter, signed to **Step One Records**. Taylor's *Scattered* CD will be released later this month, with the title cut being the first single.

THE COUNTRY RADIO BROADCASTERS will bring some of Nashville's top talent to Kansas City for their third regional event Sept. 20-21. CRS Midwest will feature artists **Steve Azar, Deryl Dodd, Tammy Graham, John Berry, LeAnn Rimes, Gary Allan, 4 Runner, Sky Kings, David Kersh** and **James Bonamy**.

TOM CUDDY WAS PROMOTED to vp of music programming for the **Capital Cities/ABC Radio Division**. Cuddy will also continue to carry the title of vp of programming at WPLJ-FM.

BILLY RAY CYRUS ACHIEVED the status of best-selling debut album by a country artist. Cyrus' *Some Gave All* has reached the nine million mark, according to the **Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA)**, making him only the second country artist to have an album at that mark. In other RIAA news, country veterans **Alabama** had an eighth multi-platinum album certification with *Christmas*, which hit two million. Alabama has the most gold, platinum and multi-platinum titles of any duo or group in country music history.

VINCE GILL AND FRIENDS helped raise more than \$250,000 at the fourth annual VINNY golf tournament in Kingston Springs, TN. Gill's team won the celebrity round, a modified scramble, with a 30-under par.

RUNDI REAM WAS APPOINTED southeast regional director of the **Songwriters Guild of America (SGA)**. Ream was formerly a publicist with Margaret Ann Warner Public Relations and most recently worked with Rick Alter Management.

PAM TILLIS, TIM DUBOIS, AND TSU COACH ED TEMPLE announced **MUSICITY CARES**, an event to benefit Nashville CARES (an organization for Tennesseans living with the HIV virus and AIDS). Musicity Cares includes a community AIDS walk and a concert featuring Tillis, **Kathy Mattea** and **K.T. Oslin**.

THE STARSTRUCK ENTERTAINMENT CREATIVE Services Dept. won three awards from the Printing Industry Assn. of the South. 
■ TY HERNDON: *Living In A Moment* (Epic EK 67564)

Herndon's sophomore album finds him towing the line. There aren't any tunes that allude to a boy's night out or the wild side of life. He's totally playing it safe, a tactic that could be criticized, were it not for the presence of some absolutely great songs. Nashville's songwriters must have given Herndon the pick of the litter, for *Living In A Moment* contains several well-crafted, schlock-free works of artistry ("Don't


Tell Mama," "I Know How The River Feels," "Returning The Faith"). Herndon sings every cut with sincere gratitude.

■ THE BEACH BOYS: *Stars And Stripes Vol. 1* (River North 51416 1205 2)

Ready for some fun in the sun? How about a Beach Boys tribute album featuring country music's finest? Technically, *Stars And Stripes Vol. 1* can't be called a tribute—The Beach Boys themselves are heard prominently throughout the album, which is perhaps the reason why this whole idea works. With Junior Brown burning through "409," T. Graham Brown putting his country blues touch on "Help Me Rhonda," and Lorrie Morgan crooning "Don't Worry Baby," these classics and others take on a new shade of nostalgia. In addition to country artists, contemporary Christian singer Kathy Troccoli sings "I Can Hear Music" and Eagle Timothy B. Schmit ethereally does "Caroline, No."



■ RANDY TRAVIS: *Full Circle* (Warner Bros. 9 46328-2)



As the liner notes in Travis' album state, country music goes in cycles—away from country music and back to country. Since his neotraditionalist debut, Travis has traveled a straight course with country of the stone cold kind. Although the debut single from *Full Circle* ("Are We In Trouble Now") seems to negate that contention, the rest of the album is Travis in his element. He's always been able to bring a listener down to the lowest level of pain ("I Wish It Would Rain," "Long On Lonely (Short On Pride)" and "Future Mister Me"); but on this album, Travis completes the circle by showing a bit of verve ("Highway Junkie," "Would I" and "If It Ain't One Thing It's Another). There's even a relaxed cover of Roger Miller's "King Of The Road." The project ends with a tender ballad ("I Can Almost Hear Her Wings") and a philosophical take on life ("Ants On A Log"). With *Full Circle*, Travis covers all bases and subsequently hits a homer.

PICK OF THE WEEK

■ TRISHA YEARWOOD: *Everybody Knows* (MCA D-11477)

Trisha Yearwood could sing the worst gimmicky song ever written and it would still sound sophisticated. Commercially, she's one of the most underrated contemporary singers; critically, she's praised (rightfully so) for her selection of quality songs. Unfortunately, "quality" doesn't always translate into "radio hit," a problem that plagued Yearwood's last effort. *Everybody Knows* appears to be the solution. Yearwood relies on her womanly strength and supernatural pipes to convey real emotions, real concerns and the various trials encountered in everyday life. She's strong on "Hello, I'm Gone," righteous on "A Lover Is Forever," comforting on "It's Alright," and reflective on "Under The Rainbow." For the perfection of the title cut alone, Yearwood should win every award and acknowledgement for which she's eligible. There's not a woman on the planet who hasn't licked her wounds over a failed relationship who can't relate to the exclamation, "I don't want a shrink/Don't even want a drink/Give me some chocolate and a magazine!"

Big Turnout At 'Valley Gold' Championships

CHICAGO—The Tenth Annual Valley North American Championships (7/11-7/13) at the Sahara Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas, attracted hundreds of qualified darters from twenty-three states and, for the first time, from Canada as well.

Thousands of players competed in the regional qualifying tournaments which began in the fall of '95 and concluded in the spring of '96. Each qualifier who made it to the championships received free travel and lodging, with the winning foursome (two men and two women) going on to the international match in the Netherlands, in September.

When the last dart was thrown at the conclusion of the finals on Saturday, July 13, John Mielcarek of Milwaukee, Wisconsin; John Kuffer of Janesville, Wisconsin; Meradith McGee of Orlando, Florida and Helen King of Edmonton, Alberta, Canada entered the winner's circle as the 1996 "Team U.S.A."

Six other men and six women were finalists, as well. These included Tom May, Tim Tegel, Russell Burgoyne, John Uraime, Ed Sekaquaptewa and Colin Sim for the men. Carolyn Nessman, Sharon Sonntag, Pam Dischler, Ellen Rice, Kristi Schanke and Alice Brooks were the women finalists.

Each of the four winners, who make up Team U.S.A., received an appropriately inscribed green marble plaque.

The entire state of Wisconsin should take pride in the performance of its championship players. Both male members of Team U.S.A. are from the "Badger" state, as is one of the alternates. Wisconsin also supplied both women alternates and one other finalist, for a total of six finalists out of sixteen. Florida also performed well, with one of the women members of Team U.S.A. coming out of that state, along with a men's alternate and a women's finalist.

This annual event officially got underway on Thursday, July 12 with some 300 finalists from regional qualifying tournaments registering for the competition. Activities kicked-off with the traditional "Chips-n-Suds" welcoming party, which brought everyone together in a social environment.

The agenda saw many special activities including four mini-tournaments, which were spaced over the three-day period to allow players who were not in competition at the moment to both relax and also hone their skills for the next championship match.

Climaxing the festivities was the Awards Banquet where more than 300 attendees enjoyed a buffet dinner. Thousands of dollars in cash awards plus prizes were presented during this function.

The fact that nearly 100 operators were represented by entrants at the championships demonstrates the growing popularity of the tournament/league concept.

defendants and brought closure to the biggest counterfeit cassette criminal case in RIAA history. In that case, displaced sales based on the blank cassettes set the loss estimate to the music industry at \$96 million.

Alliance With Red Ant

ALLIANCE ENTERTAINMENT has entered a definitive agreement with Red Ant Entertainment, the company recently formed and headed by industry veteran Al Teller, who will become co-chairman and CEO of Alliance. Red Ant was recently bowed by Teller and the merchant banking firm Wassarstein Perella. The company, which boasts \$20 million of equity capital, has already signed several acts and is in negotiation for a number of others.

The deal could create another full service artist development and distribution company to shoulder in on the acknowledged "Big Six" companies which include BMG, EMI/Capitol, MCA Music, PolyGram, Sony Music and Warner/Elektra/Atlantic.

Alliance plans issuance of 6.7 shares of newly issued common stock, plus an additional 3 million shares based upon certain performance targets mapped out over the next four years as a consideration for the acquisition.

Wassarstein Perella has purchased 1.9 million shares of common stock from Alliance, making it the second largest shareholder in the company.

Noting that the transactions will accelerate Alliance's strategy of building both proprietary content and international components of its business, Alliance chairman/CEO Joseph J. Bianco (who becomes co-chairman) called Teller a "great leader in the music industry."

"With his background as CEO of MCA Music and president of CBS Records (now Sony Music)—two of the 'Big Six' music companies—he is the ideal person to guide Alliance's future," Bianco commented. "He has the ability to grow Alliance into a major music powerhouse and to guide it into new frontiers of technology."

Starting out as a privately-owned music distributor, in the last six year Alliance has grown to capture \$720 million of the market in 1995. The company, full-fledged distributor of music and music related products, owns more than 75,000 music master copyrights.

"Alliance has in place the components upon which to build an important international record company," commented Teller. "We intend to accelerate the growth of Alliance's content business through Red Ant, while building an international distribution system that complements Alliance's existing operation, much like we did at MCA and CBS Records."

VOLCANO TO BLOW: Volcano Entertainment, LLC, a full service recording company, will mark its debut with the acquisition of Zoo Entertainment from BMG Entertainment North America and the creation of a new Hip-Hop division led by Chris Lighty, announced company founder/CEO Kevin Czinger.

Czinger formed Volcano to produce and distribute music and video entertainment. BMG Entertainment NA has a 10% interest in Volcano and distribution for the company's releases will be provided by BMG Distribution.

Lou Maglia, Zoo president, will serve as president of Zoo/Volcano while Lighty will be the new Hip-Hop division president. Both will report to Czinger. Upcoming releases include Tool, Matthew Sweet, Dogstar and Akinyele. The company will have headquarters in both N.Y. and L.A.

7UP CYBERBATTLE: This fall 7UP will unveil a new program which will link Internet technology, college campuses, modern rock and young adults. Titled 7UP New Music CyberBattle, the program will be a music competition utilizing the 7UP.com (<http://www.7UP.com>) website. The contest will award a TVT Records recording deal to an unsigned band which will be nominated by college radio trailblazers and 7UP.com browsers, who will ultimately decide who wins the deal. The CyberBattle entry process kicks off September 6.

Ian Parmiter, 7UP marketing v.p. said, "CyberBattle takes the familiar 'battle of the bands' concept that everyone has seen at college and puts a new twist on it...letting Internet users on our website choose the next 'hot' alternative band."

The voting period runs from mid-October through mid-November. The overall winner of the contest will be selected entirely upon the Internet voting results.



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
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
