

The story really began before Christmas, when writer Pete Anders called Bobby around 4 o'clock in the morning, and played the beginning of a melody over the phone.

Ordinarily, Peter writes with Vinnie Poncia and Bobby writes with John Lince. But this was so different they decided to combine their talents.

Now, three months later, the job is finished.

According to John "the release date of March 13, is a week and a day before Spring. Thirteen is my lucky number, and it's also my mother's birthday."

Perfect

Bobby said: "Sometimes a song comes so easy, you could write it - the melody and words - in an hour. But not with this one.

Even before they had finished writing it, all four knew that Bobby was the only one who could possibly sing it.

Studio time was booked, and the recording and mixing took hours longer than they had planned.



"We just kept going and going," said Bobby. "We had worked so hard in the preparation we all agreed the final job had to be perfect."

No doubt about it-you're going to go for this number. It's a basic, quiet-morning-on-the-beach treatment of a song that is bound to make the top charts.

THIRD MAN THEME

Tennessee Guitars

No matter how you play this song (it's a gass with a zither!) it's got to sound great. Actually, this is a very good treatment; ever notice how there are always a few instrumentals hanging around the charts? Well, this'll be a favorite for a long time to come.

Spyder Turner I CAN'T MAKE IT ANYMORE

There is definitely a trend toward an easy-going sound lately, started by Keith's "98.6", and picked up by nearly all of the American pop artists. Now Spyder Turner's giving it a try.

You can chalk this one up as another success for this amazing performer, for one hearing should be enough to convince anyone that here is an extremely commercial number.

The Shaggy Boys

I like it, even if it IS following the lead of "GOOD VIBRATIONS". The voices are strangely like The Four Seasons but, anyway, the two styles go well together.
