



And THE LEFT BANKE is bidding goodbye to Mike Brown, although he'll still work for them.

The news of Terry's decision came from the leader of the Pack when he called in at GO's New York offices.

"I think that as a group, the Pack and I were getting very limited in the material that we were doing," he said.

"It's not that I'm unhappy with the group - we have a fantastic drummer - but I do think it's about time to see if I can get my own act underway."

The group's last show will be on April 2, in Flint, Michigan.

'Very sad'

In Copenhagen, Denmark, brothers Muff and Stevie Winwood made their announcement of their departure from the Spencer Davis Group.

The announcement came despite earlier denials both in Britain and the U.S.

A spokesman for the group's U.S. record company said: "It is a very sad thing that a group with as much appeal as The Spencer Davis Group should have to announce a break-up, especially with 'Gimme Some Lovin' riding so high in the charts.

"The public should be reassured, however, that just because two members are going to leave, does not mean there will be no Spencer Davis Group.

"In fact, the group are still under contract to record, both here in America and overseas.

"Their latest Stateside single, 'I'm A Man' has just been released over here, and it has all the earmarks of becoming an even bigger hit than their first."

Unexpected

Chris Blackwell, the group's manager, said: "Both Muff and Stevie will not be leaving the group until the end of the Paul Jones-Hollies tour on April 2.

"Stevie wants to expand, musically, in one way, and the rest of the group another. So they decided to separate."

Muff Winwood's decision to leave comes as an unexpected

Most fans can understand Stevie's desire to break away from the group, to find something new, but Muff is getting out of pop completely, to handle what he terms "business affairs."

Formerly an accountant, he is becoming "sick of the rat-race and the touring".

"I'd rather stay out of the spotlight for a little while," he

"It's hard for me to say just what exactly I'll be doing, but I definitely feel it's time for a rest and a change."

Film themes

As for Stevie, he is faced with the decision of what to do next.

"I've been working at music since I was 11, and I've been with Spencer for four years," he said. "I have no thoughts of forming another group, although maybe that will come later on.

"I think that for the next six months I'm going to take it easy.

"I want to eventually earn a lot more money than I have been earning, and I'll have a better chance if I can go solo."

Stevie has already been contracted to write the title themes for two films, both of which will be British-produced.

Serious

Mike Brown of The Left Banke, also decided it was time for a change.

"You might say I was doing a sort of 'Brian Wilson routine'," said Mike after informing GO of his move.

"I had been in the middle of a Beach Boy tour when I realized I wasn't getting any time at all for doing what I really wanted to do - songwriting.

"I'd considered a change for quite some time, and the rest of the group members knew about my plans. I didn't want to say anything to anybody else, because the move wasn't definite.

"I'd rather be a serious writer of good music than a pop idol and, even if I wrote songs on tour, they weren't the 'works of art' they could have been if I'd had proper time to work them

"So I'm going to stay with the group and write their songs for them, but I can't take the touring anymore."

New songs

Fortunately, the group had time to hold auditions for a new harpsichord player and Emmett Lake won out.

While The Left Banke tour, Mike Brown will be based in New York, writing songs for them and other groups and solo

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WALKER BROTHERS IN NO HURRY TO

By now nearly everybody's heard of the Walker Brothers, that groovy-looking trio who left America to find fame and a considerable fortune in Britain.

One of the highest-paid acts, along with the Who and the Rolling Stones, the Walkers seem to be in no rush to take America by storm.

"I left America, and I'm glad," says Scott Engel, blond idol of thousands of screaming fans.

"Just before we were going to leave for England, we were offered a guest spot on Shindig. For awhile, we didn't know which road to take.

"I mean, it was a question of a reasonable amount of recognition in America, or uncertainty in England. But if we hit in Britain, we'd have whopping success, and we'd last a lot longer."

Headstrong

So off to sunny (?) England they went, only to find that life was not a bed of roses for three American folk-singers. Scott explained:

"We were headstrong. We'd arrived with everything very carefully planned among ourselves. We turned down small work because we would be gigantic or nothing.

"As we kept turning down work, people began to wonder whether we were frauds who couldn't sing a note!

This was quickly followed by their first Number One hit, "Make It Easy On Yourself".

Since that time, The Walker Brothers, who, incidentally, are not at all related, have had piles of hits in Britain and Europe. But not one single has ever "smashed" in America.

For although The Walkers would love to come back to America to live in their native California, they also know that their loot is in England, and they're taking no chances on that.

"Sure, we eventually would like to hit back home, but if we don't, it won't be any great tragedy," says Gary Leeds. "We're quite happy here in England, where we've made our homes.

"Still, it would be groovy to have a baked potato with sour cream and chives again," he sighed.

With three international hits last year, the name of Tommy Roe is now a major box office attraction in any man's language.





DAVE CLARK'S NOW A We all know Dave Clark BUSINESSMAN as a popular singer, drummer, song-writer, and just

plain all-round entertainer. But not everyone knows Dave from the financial viewpoint.

He is now a millionaire. Of all the members of his Dave Clark Five. Dave is the wealthiest, but that's not to say that the rest of the group are living in poverty!

In fact, each member has companies related to the music business, as well as sizable income from real estate.

Only a little over three years ago, Dave was living over a grocery store in London with his parents, and his only wish was to have enough money for a trip to Holland.

He decided to hold a number of dances, so that his entire soccer team would be able to compete in the matches by travelling to Holland.

Suddenly, Rex Oldfield of Britain's EMI, wanted to release "Do You Love Me?" Dave was talked into the deal, and instantly his Five were at the number one spot in the charts.

Manager

But Dave was not about to let things get out of his hands.

He still is the sole manager of the group, and he owns six different corporations, including Dave Clark London Ltd., which handles the group's earnings.

Dave himself selects the towns and dates at which his Five will appear.

If you've ever looked closely at the labels on Dave's discs, you'll notice that almost every song is composed by Dave.

To ease the worry of publishing them, Dave has formed his own music publishing firm, Spurs.

The company is a very successful one, but perhaps his most profitable enterprise is Eros, his releasing company.

He leases the master copies of his new records to Epic in the U.S. and Columbia in England, but when profits start pouring in, Eros gets a chunk of the money.

Films

Dave Clark's latest venture is a special company that produces his films.

If you saw the Ed Sullivan show a couple of months ago, you may remember the film that accompanied the Five's hit, "Nineteen Days."

The list of Dave's holdings scems endless.

Dave Clark Merchandising Ltd. handles a variety of Dave's schemes, such as a tiny microphone that operates inside of a saxophone which Dave invented.

He has also designed fashions, but he doesn't allow his name to be used, as a means of cashing in on his fame.

All in all, at 23, Dave Clark is a tycoon, as well as a handsome and very eligible bachelor.



It had been an ordinary day in May. The sun glowed softly in the still-foggy London skies, and the crispness of the air was just enough to keep weak-willed people indoors.

But Mike Hurst did not have time to look about him. He was completely fed up with the British pop scene, and he had already made plans to sail to America.

So why had his friend insisted on introducing him to this young folksinger named "Cat"?

Maybe Cat Stevens and Mike Hurst were destined to meet. Certainly they needed each other's help.

Cat had just left school and was not too sure what direction his life was going to take.

The only thing in which he took real pleasure was songwriting.

So the day that the "mutual friend" brought a disillusioned Mike and Cat together went down in pop history.

Says Mike: "'I Love My Dog' was the very first song he ever sang to me, and from that point on I knew that here was something different.

"It's an unusual song, from the composer's viewpoint. There's no need for psychedelic sounds or any of the frills, because the tune can basically stand on its own feet.

"And the follow-up, 'Matthew and Son' is just as strong, but in a different way.

"That's the amazing thing about Cat. He's an original."

Colorful

Cat has a colorful back-ground, no doubt about that.

Born Stephen Georgiou 18 years ago, he went to school in Sweden and returned to London, where his parents opened their Greek eatery in the middle of Soho — the throbbing "soul" of the city.

And with their amazing battery of instruments and talents, they should have little trouble carving a niche for themselves.



Guidance

An editorial style for the publication was chosen, discarded, resurrected and finally decided upon.

As the weeks slipped past, the pieces of the editorial jigsaw slowly began to fall into place.

Then finally in March, 1966, everthing was ready.

The first edition was pub-

lished for the Good Guys of WMCA in New York. Initial response from everybody throughout the area was fantastic - and the demand still runs high a year later.

This proved that there was a place for GO. It was wanted by young people with a lively interest in today's music.

So what was next? Obviously it would be good if GO could become a national publication read by hundreds of thousands of young people every week.

Back to the planning conferences, this time with a different end in view.

Much of the guidance on this came from business advisors Herman Finesod and Jerry Adelstein, our lawyer Alan Winick and publishing officer, Phil Flamm.

Later, more radio stations were contacted and now editions are prepared every week for WAKR in Akron, WONE, Dayton, WFUN, Miami, WPTR, Albany, WPOP. Hartford, WKBW, Buffalo, WMEX, Boston, WPGC, Washington, WLOF, Orlando and WNOE, New Orleans.

More will be joining the evergrowing family during the coming weeks until, soon, GO will be available all across the country.

Despite this, one very important point must be remembered. Each edition is different.

The edition in your area is designed for you with the help of your leading local station and brought to you each week exclusively by them.

Every Monday morning a new GO is begun.

The newest record releases are checked through and selected for special review. Record companies and public-relations offices are checked for news and gossip about the stars.

Photos are received, compared, then selected or discarded, Gerry Philips files his stories from London and Stan Zipperman brings us up to date on the news from the West Coast.

During the week, as the pages begin to take shape, earlier stories and features are dropped in favor of more up-to-date material but, eventually, the final editorial decisions are made.

Surveys

Then comes the turn of the

The staff of Precision Typographers in Long Island City, New York, know they are also working against the clock because, while the national news and features are being prepared, they will also begin work on the local station pages prepared by the disc-jockeys and our editorial staff.

By the following Monday, everything is ready — with one exception. The top-tune surveys.

The backbone of GO, these must be given special treatment, and this is where virtually every minute counts.


As each radio station calls in its lists of top records to GO's New York offices, the information is passed straight to the typesetter.

Within an hour the finished material has followed the other pages, which are already in the hands of GO's printers, Webco Printing in New Britain, Connecticut.

As each list of best-selling records is received from your local station, that edition is checked out and the final OK for printing is given.

Then, and only then, can the press begin to turn out the thousands of copies required for each area.

A Cottrell Web Rotary Offset Press is the one that does the job. Considered by many printers as the best for this particular kind of work, it churns

out papers by the thousand, keeping excellent four-color cover pictures in fine definition at all times.

As each edition run ends, another is ready to begin. Right through the night and on to the next day the press keeps running.

The crew tending the press changes at the end of each shift but the printing continues.

Distributed

Meantime, the earlier copies have been bundled and shipped and are already well on their way to Miami, Orlando and New Orleans

Within a matter of hours
they are distributed to the record stores in your area.

That's where we began the GO story . . . but this is not quite the end.
