The actual presentation ceremony will be delayed until Dionne has sufficient free time in her busy schedule.

"As far as the city of East Orange is concerned, the key is ready to be presented to Miss Warwick," the Mayor's office told GO last week.

"We had a date all set up, but she had a call to go to the West Coast and we'll just have to wait until she gets back."

The original idea of the honor came from Mrs. Thelma McFall who was Dionne's eighth grade teacher.

"Dionne hasn't changed at all over the years except for developing her talent," Mrs. McFall told GO.

I like about her. She's the same out-going, whole-hearted person she always was.

"She did a summer program for me last year and all the children at the school dedicated May 5th as Dionne Warwick Day and we had a party for her.

"That is when the idea for giving her the key to the city came up. I spoke to Mayor Kelly and we arranged the whole thing for her."

Dee Dee Warwick, Dionne's sister, said: "I'm really thrilled that this has happened to Dionne. Mother is walking on air."

A LESSON BY TOMMY

Tommy James gave many upstart groups a lesson in gratitude last week when he renewed his exclusive recording contract with Roulette Records.

In most cases, the group will ask either for a cash advance, or a minimum guarantee on earnings under the new contract.

Tommy did neither. He signed the contract for himself and the Shondells, and asked for nothing in return.

Why did he take this attitude? Tommy told GO: "A great deal of the credit for the success of Tommy James and The Shondells is due to Roulette Records for the outstanding job of sales and promotion they have done.

"This is my way of saying thanks to the company."

Mr. Morris Levy, president of Roulette Records, told GO: "This only goes to emphasize how great a person Tommy James is. Many people in his position would have taken an entirely different attitude, but Tommy said he was very happy with the way things were going."

On the eve of Tommy's signing, he received news that a new single would have to be rush-released. It is "I Like The Way". from his latest album.

RCA record pressing plants closed at midnight on Sunday, June 4, when 32,000 union employees were affected by a strike arising out of a wages dispute between electrical workers and company officials.

The electrical workers union rejected a proposed new contract, and a strike began.

All RCA plants, including their New Jersey, Indiana and California operations, were affected. RCA Records was not the only label affected by the stoppage because the pressing plants turn out records for many other companies, including dozens of small labels.

Colgems, the label under which the Monkees recordings are released, was one of the affected companies.

Officials of several of the re-

cord companies concerned were reticent about commenting on the strike and how it would affect them.

One said: "Everyone concerned is hopeful that this strike will be of very short duration."

At the time of going to press, company and union officials were still trying to reach an agreement.

Wheels, Mitch survive parting

The former Detroit Wheels have shown they can go it alone. Now calling themselves simply The Wheels. They have just signed a long-term recording contract with Impact Records.

Mr. Harry Balk, president of Impact, told GO: "They are extremely talented boys and, when someone has talent, you can't hold them down.

"We have just released their first record by themselves. It's called 'Dancing In The Street' and initial response has been overwhelming.

"This side of the release gives drummer John Badanjeck the opportunity instrumental — and

everyone knows The Wheels are good musicians."

Mr. Balk said that the parting between Mitch Ryder and The Wheels had been on the very best of terms.

He added: "But, of course, when the boys do a show, some people are still a little confused about the whole thing. They wonder why Mitch Ryder isn't there.

"But once The Wheels start their show, they please everyone who hears them. They have been playing dates all over the mid-West — in Chicago, Ohio, Texas and Oklahoma — and the response to their performance has been very exciting.

"I know they have a tremendous future and we are looking forward to a whole string of hits."

MITCH RYDER, now a solo artist, has just returned from two weeks in England. "It was a combination visit and promotional tour," he told GO.

During his stay, Mitch really found himself drawn into the swinging London scene. He stayed at the plush apartment of top British songwriter Lionel Bart, who threw a party in his honor.

A few days later Brian Epstein, who will be producing Mitch's tour of Britain this fall, also threw a party for Mitch at his country home and invited the Beatles along.

"I was really struck with the friendliness shown me by many of the big names in England," said Mitch. "I spent great evenings with people like Eric Burdon, Dave Clark and Jeff Beck."

Mitch set the fans cheering in one London club when he made a guest appearance.

On Carnaby Street Mitch bought several Edwardian-style jackets and at one male boutique "Dandie", he met the Beatles again.

"I also spent a great deal of time at the new "Speakeasy Club'. Everyone there seemed to be wearing either Edwardian or Indian gear.

Now that he's back in the States, Mitch is finishing his new single "Joy", the first song he has written himself.

The new Beatles album was barely in the stores before the call started to pour into the Capitol Records offices. Everyone wanted to know only one thing . . . who are all the people portrayed on the front of the album jacket?

The Capitol bosses decided the best way to get the information across would be to have a key to the picture prepared. This will not be mailed to individual enquirers, but will probably be sent to disc jockeys and magazines all across the country.

By the way, how many well-known faces did YOU identify?

The record world keeps getting more and more involved in other fields. Country Joe and The Fish, who bounced high with their own "underground" release and now record for Vanguard, are working out a deal with Marvel Comics concerning some new songs.

Met Owen Richards, lead guitarist for the Royal Guardsmen, the other day and he mentioned he was flying into New York recently when the plane hit a rough spot. Owen was so shaken up he fainted.

He was given a quick whiff of oxygen and soon recovered. Wonder what Snoopy would have done in the same situation?

Keith tells me he's heading back to England for another "promotional" tour. But, from the glowing reports of life there he gave after his last trip, it looks like he just can't stay away.

Mario Conti, international manager of music publishers Peer-Southern, is all smiles that the New Vaudeville Band's latest "Finchley Central" is doing so well in Britain. He tells me he's sure it will meet with the same response here as "Winchester Cathedral".

TIP FOR THE TOP

Decided to steal a little of the thunder from our record reviewer because I was so taken by a single I received. It's "Take Me As I Am" by Freddie Paris, on RCA. This boy can REALLY handle a song. I'm tipping him for the top before long.

Unlike many artists, Sam The Sham tells me he just loves to go on tour, and may one day disappear for ever on one of his South American jaunts. He speaks fluent Spanish and even sang some of his hits in the language last time he was in Latin America.

The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band are, naturally enough, delighted with the response shown to their debut LP. They are just completing recording sessions on the coast for their next album. Also busy sessionwise in the California sunshine are the Jefferson Airplane.

Mark Lindsay finished his recording stint for Columbia's upcoming release from Paul Revere and the Raiders, then drove in the early a.m. in his bright red Ferrari to Boise, Idaho, for a two-day rest before meeting the rest of the group at Lafayette, La., for their opening night of their mammoth tour.

The stars turned out in force when Universal Studios held a special screening of the Paul Jones-Jean Shrimpton flick "Privilege". Among the carefully-selected audience were The Byrds, Gene Clark, Cass Elliot, Brandon DeWilde, Peter Fonda, P. J. Proby and Hugh Masakela.

Tracy Tweed, America's answer to Twiggy, has had several tempting offers from record companies. If her voice sounds as good as she looks, she really has it made.

Terry Knight is one of the busiest young men in the pop field at present. As well

as turning out hits of his own, he has just signed an exclusive writer's contract with Merlin Music. The company is also busy vetting several film scores submitted with Terry in mind.

TROUBLED

The five guys known as The Vagrants are one of the highest-earning groups in the country, yet their record success has been conspicuous by its absence. East Coast fans have thrilled to their excellent stage shows but, when it comes to the recording session, this excitement seems to be lacking. The boys are wondering how they can get round this impasse.

Carla Thomas, who captured the hearts of our fighting men in Vietnam, has won another victory. She has captured Washington with the "Memphis Sound". Carla and Otis Redding, who is with her on Stax's "King And Queen" album, journeyed to the capital to present a special gold record to Senator Howard H. Baker Jr. of Tennessee, who wrote the LP's liner notes.

The MGM bosses have decided to start a drive to capture some of the Gospel album business and have issued four albums by Clara Ward, Lloyd Reese, Professor Frank Baylor and Professor Robert Banks.

The same company is bowing its new Greek line, Lyra Records, and two of the new label's first albums will interest "withit" pop fans. They feature the sounds of the bouzouki, which has been adopted by several pop groups. The acknowledged master of the instrument, Vivi Zambetas, is on these LPs.

Debbi Smith called from London to say that The Tremeloes are so excited about their U.S. tour they all have their cases packed already! The boys, already on the charts with "Here Comes My Baby" and following up fast with "Silence Is Golden", kick off the 23-day tour at Youngstown, Ohio, on June 30.

The Pacific Northwest area has been the birthplace for several big, big groups like Paul Revere and The Raiders, The Kingsmen, The Ventures and Don and The Goodtimes. My spies there tell me The Springfield Rifle are following in their footsteps. The group's fans in the region have been clamoring for some time for a record by their favorites, and the release is a reality now with Jerden's "It Ain't Happened". Everyone, of course, is hoping it WILL happen.

Busy man these days is Tom Springfield, brother of Dusty and composer of "Georgy Girl". He's working on the music for the Bing Crosby flick "The Great Saint Bernard", which goes before the cameras in Europe this summer. Tom will fly in to the States in the early fall in conjunction with the film.

Up to New York from the south comes Fiorenza Saffirio, who discovered the song "Mas Que Nada". Miss S. brought a whole new bundle of Brazilian copyrights with her, so don't be surprised if soon we hear a lot more of the Latin American sound over the airwaves.

A KICK AT THE SLOBS

Eric Clapton of The Cream was recently credited with saying that the average adult middle class American was "a slob who didn't want to think and didn't want to worry".

Strong words which will doubtless win Eric no friends among the adult middle class.

He didn't stop there. He added that today's young people are giving today's older generation a kick in the stomach in order to waken it to the fact that the young want to, plan to, and will at all costs, enjoy life and treat one another as human beings.

Eric's is a voice crying in the wilderness, because there is precious little chance of his angry outburst being heard by those who criticize today's youth.

The criticism stems from those who are unable to comprehend the music, the clothes, the hair styles and the philosophy that is all part of today's young world.

One prime example is the number of "jokes" and cartoons picturing a bewildered adult trying to tell whether the object of his attention is a boy or a girl.

At first, there was room for amusement and, without question, young people too were able to join in the laughter. But of late the humor has paled. Yet still the jokes are made and the cartoons printed ad nauseum.

The answer to why this is so is simple.

If you don't understand something and, therefore, are afraid of it you nervously joke about it and hope it will go away.

The thing adults must realize is that never have so many people made an art form a way of life. Pop — and all that it encompasses—is not going to shrivel up and fade away just because those who don't understand it don't like it.

The reports flooded into GO's offices with bewildering rapidity.

"Thirty-six thousand copies sold in New York on day of release."

"Number One record in France only two days after first copies went on sale."

"Number One in Switzerland three days later."

"British record stores complain they can't get enough copies".

These reports came in NOT on the Beatles new LP - although that is selling with expected rapidity — but on a record by a group which is barely one month old.

The record is "A Whiter Shade Of Pale". The group is Procol Harum.

And the frenzy the record has generated has seldom been equalled in the whole of pop music's turbulent history.

The man behind Procol Harum is Denny

Cordell, who flew to New York for rush talks and took time out to talk to GO about the phenomenon with a Latin name.

"I felt at first that 'A Whiter Shade Of Pale' had all the ingredients of a hit for two reasons", said Denny.

"First, the whole thing was constructed like a hit, and secondly I considered that the English kids were ready for this particular sound.

"But I must admit we're all pleasantly surprised by the way the record has taken off everywhere".

The man who molded "Pale" is Keith Reid. Of him, Denny

"Keith is a true poet. His lyrics are sheer beauty. Taken out of their musical context they are still works of art."

That England's record buyers are ready to listen to the spells Keith weaves with his words is easily shown by the response they have shown to the group's personal appearances.

On their first public perform-

ance at London's new Speakeasy Club, 40 people watched their show. Several of the 40 were top names in the English chart scene.

They told their friends, and the word spread like wildfire. On the next evening, a Saturday, the crowd had more than doubled.

By the Sunday, lines of people waited in the street until they could all be admitted.

The group has been built round Keith's writings. And each member of the group was carefully selected to fulfil the total aim.

Organist Mathew Fisher, for example, studied for five years at London's Guildhall School of Music.

He was the fourth man to take the test for organist and.

after the opening bars of the music he had been asked to play, Denny Cordell knew he had found the man he was searching for.

"The organ is very impor-

tant". Denny continued. cause it gives us the cathedral sound we need on this record.

"This first single is really only an introduction to Procol Harum whose name, by the way, is Latin for Beyond These Things. The group has much, much more to tell than we could ever get across on a single.

"The stage performance they give, for example, is more of a recital than a show."

Denny said that, unlike other groups who wait to see if the first single clicks before dashing back to the studios to record album tracks, Procol Harum's debut LP is already com-

"So far there about a dozen copies owned by people outside the organization.

"The Beatles asked for copies as soon as they heard the group play and Brian Jones of the Stones also asked for one for his collection.

"The present single is, in fact, taken from the album. But although the single is more than four minutes long it's only part of the whole song.

"On the album 'A Whiter Shade Of Pale' is 121/2 minutes long because there are another two verses to the song".

Denny was quietly confident that the group have already taken the initial steps to carving themselves a secure place

in the future.

"They believe in the performances they give and in the music they play", he said. BLEND

"They present a collection of individual sounds blended together by a mutual sympathy and respect".

Excited though he was by the reception the record was receiving on this side of the Atlantic, Denny said he wanted to tell us that something just as big - perhaps even bigger - was on the way.

THE "SOMETHING" IS A YOUNG MAN CALLED DEN-NY LAINE.

Denny (Cordell) said: "I believe that, once every two or three years, a superstar comes along. I also believe the next will be Denny."





The lion is an animal of strength—and is generally regarded as king of the jungle!

Nine miniaure porcelain lions sit along the front of the desk in Mort Nasatir's office in MGM's skyscraper headquarters on Manhattan's Avenue of the Americas.

The lion is Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's symbol and mascot and the records division that Mort Nasatir heads is one of the kings of today's record industry.

He told me: "Today's disc-business is a young person's world. As I grow older I try to make my ears grow younger and that's the secret of the business!

"I've been in this industry for 20 years and, during this time, there has been a tremendous development. It's been a good and refreshing development particularly in regard to performers' material.

"However, there are two definite areas that concern me about today's scene.

"I am violently opposed to the whole idea of seeing the influence of drugs playing a part in music. There is no need for people to write songs that contain hidden references to such stimulants. CAREFUL WATCH

"As responsible people in the record industry we are policing this effectively. I have personally instructed all of our a&r men to keep a very careful watch for this.

"As the record division of a company well-established and well-respected for its values of entertainment for the family through television and movies, we have no intention of allowing this type of behavior.

"I don't think it is necessary for radio stations to demand to check lyrical content of all records before playing them over the air.

"We are responsible people in a responsible industry and this negative factor is not one that I am going to allow upset or harm the reputation of our business.

"It is possible for any critic of our industry to look into titles and words of any song and find something bad by twisting metaphors and the language.

"I do not believe that artists and producers deliberately try to bring in questionable material under a disguise. MGM will never be accused of this."

OUTRAGE

Mr. Nasatir stood up behind his desk to emphasize the points he had just made. He remained silent for a few seconds to choose his words and then continued:

"It is dangerous for adults to generalize in anger and say that all folk-music is a protest against laws and life itself.

"Music has in fact turned almost a full revolution of its own wheel, progressing through the years to encompass folkrock and into today's psychedelic areas.

"There were cries of outrage from adults when Bill Haley and Buddy Holly were the top stars on disc. And yet, MORT NASATIR, KING OF THE POP 'JUNGLE', SAYS:

It's dangerous for adults to generalize in anger and say that all folk-music is a protest against laws and life itself

This is the first of a new in-depth series in which leading executives of the record industry meet with GO's publisher, Robin Leach, and discuss music today.

It is the first time that record company executives have been given a first-hand opportunity to talk directly to GO readers as today's record

Our first guest is Mort L. Nasatir, president of MGM/Verve.

despite these feelings by adults, the record business has won a tremendous respect.

"As the president of a major record company I am not going to allow our industry to lose this respect by allowing anybody to level criticism at us saying that we endorse such experimentation.

"Here at MGM we are a family organization that is totally against hidden or open mentions of immoral and undertone activities."

Mr. Nasatir quickly moved on to cover the second part of his objection to today's scene as he sees it.

"I am honestly concerned over the aspect of opinions held by many of to-day's young people. Youth is moving towards a non-involvement in everything.

"I find this attitude to life a very puzzling one because it becomes a nonpersonality. It means non-participation, non - individualization and withdrawal from life itself.

"Young people who don't face up to their own responsibilities in today's society are becoming non-people. Their whole approach is negative.

"There is nothing wrong in young people having long hair until everybody has long hair. It was like when everybody had crewcuts because they were all the rage.

"Then it just becomes conformity. People, particularly young people, should want to be creative and express themselves instead of conforming to what just a few of them say.

"That's why pop-music is so vital. It moves, it creates and it changes from one year to the next. I am very happy about the state of the record world.

"Our MGM and Verve labels embrace all tastes. If we released only discs by The Animals, The Blues Project, Every Mothers' Son and Herman's Hermits we would be in a very sorry position.

"A record company produces for all aspects of vocal and musical entertainment and we cover such greats as Connie Francis, Stan Getz and Astrud Gilberto.

"We have such fine male artists as Johnny Tillotson and Roy Orbison. But it is my personal wish to bring a male singer onto our label to rank alongside Lainie Kazan who records for us.

"We're looking for another Andy Williams, a Tony Bennett or a Sinatra. It is important to us — and we are lacking in this one respect at present.

"As a record company we are always working towards giving your readers and our public a better product and new artists involved in new approaches.

"That's just one of the reasons that I personally created our Blue Verve label and brought The Righteous Brothers to us. Ultimately Blue Verve will be America's finest jazz label and already it is abounding with tremendous talents.

THE CRAZE

"Unlike other major companies in the States we depend mainly on independent producers in Britain for our English acts. People have said that talent coming out of Britain on record is slipping.

"I disagree, because I feel that the same excellent young talent that is appreciated worldwide from British theater, literature and the arts is still very apparent on record.

"But I'm also pleased to say that the craze that went on two years ago when anybody with a Northern English accent and a guitar was an overnight hit is over

"Today it does take talent and creativity — and because of this I don't think that Los Angeles and San Francisco are the centers of today's recording breakthroughs.

"Memphis and Nashville are still extraordinary top centers and it has been very encouraging to me to see just how far the appreciation for our Country-and-Western music is catching on in Europe.

"New York is also a very important center. The public benefits from the tre-

mendous enthusiasm and the sense of competition that exists.

"Another reason why the disc business is in such a healthy state: the finished disc today is of the highest quality and is still relatively inexpensive to produce.

"I can never get out of my mind the picture of our pressing plants stamping out new releases just as if they were cookies.

"I am very happy that the growth of music has been such a healthy explosion. People often ask how long rock and roll will last.

STUPID

"It really is a stupid question because basic rock and roll is still evolving. Janis Ian has long been a favorite artist of mine. I often listen to her records and find them haunting and very beautiful.

"But it is only now that her 'Society's Child' has become accepted even though it was released several months ago. I also find the sound of Eric Burdon very excellent and he himself will be the last to tell you that he is a rock artist.

"I think that as he continues to grow in stature as a total musician he will really create great songs. His single 'When I Was Young', I believe, is the turning point of his career.

"We all feel here at MGM that this year is going to see tremendous advancement for us. Every Mothers' Son is a very important act to us. The Blues Project is a very talented group and Sandy Posey will establish herself as a major star this year.

"MGM has alwas been a great believer in the artists we sign. We pioneered the complete approach of establishing an artists or a group in introducing them to the public and on our own trade and retail ends.

"In the record industry we know that 'outside' records can start in such places as Dallas or Minneapolis. That's often the reason why we'll work hard on a record in a regional area.

"I know that disc-jockeys and program directors of radio stations have a tremendous responsibility to their listeners and each week they are faced with the terrible decision of choosing records from so much available product that's been released.

PERSONAL ROLE

"Many times fans of groups, small or big, have said that their favorites get lost in the shuffle. The Buckinghams hit the jackpot with a seven-month-old record that got picked from a pile as an oldie.

"But let me say this about such circumstances. There is an essential justice to such groups. I hope this company never signs an artist without a commitment to promote them.

"If an artist is good then recognition will be given . . . if not with the first or the second record, then it will be with the third. We don't allow records to get lost in the night.

"Personally I don't think it is right to throw records against the wall and just hope that one of them sticks. As the president of MGM I take a very personal role in the direction of our division.

"That direction comes from me. I believe in what I feel is right and then we all follow it right through. This is very important because only in this way can our artists, our employees and our audience connect in the very best way."

HIS RECORD: SUCCESS

At the age of 41, Mort Nasatir is considered one of the most successful record executives in the recording industry.

In his two years with MGM/Verve Records he has piloted the company to a highly commanding position.

His many years of experience in marketing and merchandising and implementing efficient campaigns in all areas of pop, jazz and classical music were put to work when he joined MGM's recording division in June, 1965.

After attending the Art Institute in Chicago and Columbia University's Graduate School, Mr. Nasatir held executive positions with two national companies before joining Decca, Coral and Brunswick Records as merchandising director in 1949.

In 1960 he became vice-president and

account supervisor with an agency which handled the overall MGM account, covering records, television and telestudios.

Four years later he became director of the merchandising services division of the agency. Twelve months later, Mr. Nasatir joined MGM.

In addition to authoring two books, "Jazz Word" and "A Brief History of Carnegie Hall", Mr. Nasatir is a frequent contributor to such publications as Music Week, Printers Ink and Advertising Age.


