

"Naturally, I'd like to see as many people as possible in the audience, so why don't you come along tomorrow evening?


"It'll be a groove."

I often think that the hardest part of writing a song is the selection of a suitable title. In the past we've had some wild ones like The Stones' "Under Assistant West Coast Promotion Man" or Brenton Wood's "Oogum Boogum Song".

The award for wackiest record title of the week must surely go to the Statler Brothers for "You Can't Have Your Kate And Edith, Toe"

Talking about wacky happenings, must tell you about the latest signing by MGM. They have captured — if that's the word — a group from Greenwich Village called The Silver Eagle.

The group members are a sculptor, a dancer and a French teacher — and their first release will be "The Astor Disaster (The Tragic Ordeal Of Theodore Knobbs)".

The song is all about the first guy ever to jump out of a window of New York's Astor Hotel. Which, you must admit, is a novel subject for a song if nothing else.

Can a former bank supervisor make good in the record business? Well, RCA Victor have a new artist called Nilsoon whose songwriting ability, they feel, is approaching the genius level. Brian Epstein has already had such a comprehensive report on Nillson he wants to sign him to a management contract.

His first single "Without Her" will be reaching the stores any day now. It'll be interesting to see the reaction.

-Samantha Juste, top English fashion model and regular date of Monkee Mickey Dolenz, is the subject of a new song by an English group called The Spectrum.

The record is "Samantha's Song", which will be released by RCA here in the States, and the words tell about Samantha and her boy-friend.

There's a twist in the tail . . . The Spectrum will be doing a Monkees-type TV show on English TV next fall.

"Hey Joe" has been recorded several times by groups during the past year but, although the song is a good one, none of the versions has really caught on.

Now Cher is trying to succeed where others have failed. Her version is due for release shortly.

The Myddle Class have been getting some strange publicity during the last few weeks. First the boys were photographed for a New

York bank and the picture carried in an advertisement with the caption: "Where do rock'n'roll bands save their money?"

Next thing that happened was that Charley Larkey, the group's bass player, made the cover of Esquire on a feature about life in college.

Well, as they say, every little helps . . .

Herb Alpert has given up the idea of filming and starring in Ray Bradbury's "The Wonderful Ice Cream Suit", but Harry Belafonte has taken up the project as a musical. He plans to tour South America with it in "a year and a half".

Alpert had earlier announced that "Ice Cream Suit" would mark his entry into feature films. Since then, however, he has been so busy on tour and making records that he hasn't had time to do the show.

During the past few months, West Coast groups have been taking much of the limelight, and rightly so. Now, the Youngbloods may be the first East Coast group to break on the West Coast first.

After most groups reach the successful stage in their careers, they know what it's like to live in top hotels with plush carpets and room service.

The Left Banke have become used to hotel living so, when they had a three-day break recently they decided to do something different. They went camping.

They took all their equipment with them because, at the end of the three-day vacation, they were scheduled for an appearance in Minnesota.

The boys eventually arrived at their planned camping site north of Duluth and pitched their newly-purchased tents. Things were peaceful for the first 24 hours but, by the second day they were bored sitting around with nothing to do.

They had equipment manager Frank Bonlarron hook up an electrical device known as an inverter to their equipment truck's battery and plugged in their instruments and amplifiers.

It's probably the only time the squirrels and racoons in the woods north of Duluth have ever been entertained to a free concert!

EDITORIAL

The great guitar teach-in

A novel event in the musical world was scheduled to take place yesterday evening in New York's Central Park.

The organizers of the event lined up a whole series of experts to give anyone interested tips on buying, playing and caring for a guitar.

Other experts were set to talk on the differences between folk, blues and rock music, and GO correspondent Dominic Sicilia was to explain how a group should be formed and how play dates and a recording contract should be arranged.

The guitar teach-in, sponsored by a guitar manufacturing company, was a pilot project. If the organizers consider it a success, they are prepared to hold similar teach-ins in other cities across the nation.

The value of such instruction can hardly be measured, but opendoor conferences of this type can do only a world of good for every aspirant to recording

How many groups today in cities all over the country are struggling along without a helping hand to guide them? If likely mistakes are pointed out to them before they occur, time will be saved and enthusiasm sustained.

It would be nice to hope that other companies in the musical field — from instrument manufacturers to music publishers — will involve themselves in similar ventures.

The unknown groups today might well be the headline names of tomorrow. Any help given to them now would pay great dividends to all lovers of popular music in the future.

"We've got the right material and think the first 45 will be a gas," he said.

The newly-reformed Procol Harum have quickly settled down into their stride. All material earlier recorded by the original group has now been re-recorded.

The group are currently preparing to set out for a threeweek tour of Southern France and the Riviera. A hectic schedule of concerts and personal appearances has been arranged for them.

At the end of this month the boys return to England for a nation-wide series of concerts, which will probably tie in with the release of their new single.

An announcement about the release of the group's first album is expected in early September. Around the same time, details of their proposed visit to the States will also be revealed.

THE BRITISH influx continues . . . with the Cream flying in to San Francisco on August 22 to start an eightweek nationwide tour.

Meantime, Eric Burdon is displaying his new-look Animals in the London area for the first time prior to a provisional U.S. concert tour in October.

The others have come from home-grown stars.





And devout Cream, Alan Price, Who and Hendrix fanslike Yours Truly-occasionally find the slick, mass-appeal simplicity of the DDDBM&T and Raider bands a bit hard to take.

Still, I couldn't help bopping down to the Marquee to take a look at the situation. And it worked according to the rules.

There were the screamerslots of them -- waiting up front for Dave. And the suffocating, oppressive heat. No, not heat. Just a jingling, throbbing vacuum. Not void of sound. Of

Finally, when half the screamers had passed out from suffocation, Dave and the gang decided to emerge from the wings to give an entertaining show, complete with their hits-"Bend It", "Save Me", "Okay".

I couldn't help wondering why they're afraid to branch out and do something new. They're successful enough to be able to experiment now with little fear of losing their fans.

And, unless they progress, as most English artists are doing, they are doomed.

That's far into the future, though, and I can't see them packing it in overnight. And, like Paul Revere, their act is tailor-made for the screamies in the U.S.

After all, there are FIVE of Dave Dee and only four of the Monkees. Which is logical if you happen to be an eight-yearold record buyer in Boise, Idaho.



NEW YORK REPORT ... Dominic Sicilia

Out of the thundering past of New York's discotheque scene came The Rascals and, second only to them, The Vagrants. Outside of New York, you have only seen their name in some teen magazines, or the music trade magazines if you get

But in New York, almost everyone knows them and, literally, hundreds of thousands of kids have seen them perform live. They make lots of money, have a big fan club . . . do all the big star bits. The only big star thing The Vagrants haven't done is putting out a hit record.

This week, I saw the Vagrants cut their next single for ATCO. Felix Papalardi, who produced The Youngbloods and, now, the Cream, had them in Talent Masters studios and within three hours of locking the doors to visitors, the group left with dubs of the track (the first rough version of the music only) and the biggest smiles I've seen on their faces in months.

The music is weird but powerful and driving, a little Procol Harum, a little Cream, a little Vagrants. And lead singer Peter Sabatino has since finished the voice track . . . they tell me it's him, like onstage: soft, sexy, sensitive.
