

The album jacket for the new Rolling Stones
LP is one of the most striking ever devised for
a pop group.

Featuring not only the Rolling Stones, but what also appears to be the Beatles, the full-color jacket has a three-dimensional effect.

In the center of the three-dimensional section of the front cover, the Stones are pictured wearing medieval costume. Mick Jagger is dressed like a court musician, and is wearing a long, pointed cap.

As the album jacket is turned, the threedimensional effect comes into full force and Charlie Watts and Keith Richard turn to look at each other. On the other side of Mick, Brian Jones and Bill Wyman do likewise.

The jacket, a double-cover foldout, also features a maze type puzzle on the inside, with the words "It's Here" in the center.

The entire graphic design of the cover was done by the group themselves although the actual production for the album will be done in this country.



Agents nab guitarist

Guitarist Rick Brand, a hired musician in the Left Bankes lineup, was arrested in New York last week on a narcotics charge.

Agents of the Federal Bureau of Narcotics arrested Brand and three other men. All later appeared in court, where they were arraigned on charges of illegal possession of marijuana. The total amount of narcotics involved was said to be worth \$500,000.

After his court appearance, Brand was released in bail of \$10,000. A spokesman for the Left Banke told GO: "We are all absolutely shocked, but intend to do everything we can to help Rick clear his name."

Talked to Herb Altman of the Danelectro Corporation the other day about the Coral Electric Sitar. More and more American groups are getting a hold of them and they are being used extensively in recording now. As Al Nichol of the Turtles puts it: "The beauty of the electric sitar is its familiar shape and tuning method and the fact that you don't have to spend a lifetime learning the instrument."

I must mention the fact that Danelectro has really moved out in front in the musical instrument business to become one of the leaders in developing new products.

Some of the artists now using the electric sitar include the Turtles, the Cyrkle and Richie Havens.* Tom Dawes of the Cyrkle feels that you can do more with the electric sitar than with the original by the way. Which is a strong statement, but he should know since

Vincent Bell, Decca recording artist, pioneered the idea of going electric with the sitar sound by the way. It took the Danelectro Corporation almost a year to make it possible for any guitarist to achieve the sound produced by the Coral Sitar.

The Editor Says...

It used to be that any group struggling to reach the top of the recording ladder would give their collective eye teeth to play one or more dates in New York City.

During the past months, however, several groups have found themselves wondering if the "big time" is really as wonderful as it is painted.

A sharply-increasing number of thefts and assaults aimed at groups and their members has now begun to worry the people behind the groups.

Recently, while appearing in New York, the Candymen discovered one of their guitars had "walked." Later the Left Banke, the Salvation and the Kaleidoscope were also hit.

The Left Banke lost all their equipment, and the other groups were completely cleaned out.

Group members have said that, when they come to New York they know to keep a very close eye on everything they own, but sometimes it isn't always possible.

Unless something is done — and quickly — to change the unfortunate circumstances which now become almost the order of the day, then New York fans are going to find that fewer groups will be prepared to perform for them.

Almost all of the major record companies have been spending vast sums of money recently to build new recording studios and renovate their present ones.

The main reason for this - apart from an increase in record sales — is that more and more groups are spending longer in the studio, trying to capture new and exciting sounds.

A group can reach a very high peak of professionalism by constant practice. But only in a recording studio can they discover exactly what they sound like, and how they can improve their

The effort going into the new studios will guarantee the record buyer even better quality on tomorrow's recordings.

The Survivors' followup to their million seller, "Expressway," will be "Explosion (In My Soul)" released this week.


Eric buys home on West Coast



BEATLES TELL

The Beatles' television special has been completed and, to date, offers have been received by them from TV networks in more than 40 countries.

In America, the successful bidder is expected to pay more than one million dollars for the rights to screen "Magical Mystery Tour."

The special is based upon the adventures of a bus-load of passengers on a Mystery

The additional title word "Magical" gives the Beatles unlimited scope for the introduction of fantasy — visual and musical — and "dream" sequences.

Despite the film's strong song content the main accent is on comedy, ranging from slapstick to sophisticated humor.

Six original Beatles numbers are performed in the show. These include four Lennon-McCartney numbers, one from George Harrison, and an instrumental theme written by all four. The instrumental is their first joint number and also the Beatles' first non-vocal composition.

The cast includes more than 200 extras, including teams of formation dancers who appear in the spectacular finale.

The Beatles used a totally unconventional approach to the production by relying as often as possible upon spontaneity rather than demanding that their cast should stick precisely to a written script.

To make the dialog as natural as possible, the actors and actresses were given situations and reactions upon which to build their own "lines" while the cameras were rolling.

During a question and answer session in London, the Beatles gave their own reasons for making "Magical Mystery Tour".

QUESTION: How did "Magical Mystery Tour" come about and why did you decide to handle your own production and direction?

JOHN: At the beginning of 1967 we realized that we wouldn't be doing any more concert tours because we coudn't reproduce on stage the type of music we'd started to record. So if stage shows were to be out, we wanted something to replace them. Television was the obvious answer.

the obvious answer.

GEORGE: The point is we can send a television show all over the world to be seen in countries we've visited and countries we've never played. Everyone everywhere can see "Magical Mystery Tour" while we're getting on with something else — our next LP album, for instance.

RINGO: It was Paul's idea to make a TV show about a bus tour. He thought it up as long ago as April, when he was having a week's holiday in America. 'He started to work out the song "Magical Mystery Tour" on the flight back to London. Afterwards we got down to talking about the thing

in detail.

PAUL: As we came close to the filming time we realized we all had very specific ideas about the show. The best way to make sure things came out just the way we were picturing them was to direct and edit ourselves, just hiring the essential technicians to do what we wanted them to do. So if we're not satisfied with anything in the finished film, we've only ourselves to blame!

QUESTION: This was your first experience of making a film. What were the problems?

PAUL: That was the marvelous thing — there weren't any real problems! For the first couple of days when we set out with this big bus full of people we took things easy, let the ice break slowly, let everyone get to know what it was all about. Things just came to-

gether after that. Of course we weren't using the right jargon when we talked to the sound men and the camera crew and they felt a bit strange to begin with. After a while they got to the stage, where they were as enthusiastic as the rest of us. The main thing was to get rid of all the traditional tensions and hang-ups, cut through the red tape and get everybody interested in the whole effort.

QUESTION: How much of

QUESTION: How much of the film is truly spontaneous and unscripted?

JOHN: Well, from our point of view, we knew most of the scenes we wanted to include but we bent our ideas to fit the people concerned once we got to know our cast. If somebody just wanted to do something we hadn't planned they went ahead. If it worked we kept it in. There was a lovely little 5-year-old-girl, Nicola, on the bus. Because she was there and because we realized she was right for it we put in a bit where I just chat to her and give her a balloon.

QUESTION: Did any one

QUESTION: Did any one Beatle come out as over-all director?

GEORGE: Not really although, if you want to be exact about it, I suppose John and Paul did more in that line than Ringo and I. On location we split the unit once or twice to do two scene at once. Paul

QUESTION: Is the show aimed at children or at your

own fans?
RINGO: It's aimed at the widest possible audience. There are different levels of entertainment in it. "Magical Mystery Tour" is for children, their grandparents, Beatle people, the lot. There are interesting things to look at and interesting things to hear.

QUESTION: Does this venture indicate that The Beatles want to move into film production?

PAUL: If "Magical Mystery Tour" is successful it means we'll use the same techniques to make The Beatles' next cinema film — and more television shows. It doesn't mean we want to direct non-Beatles films.

QUESTION: From beginning to end how much time did the production take?

JOHN: Although we had outline ideas months in advance all the real organization was done during ten days before we started to film. Filming took two weeks, apart from one or two odd extra bits we've put in at the last minute. Then for the past six weeks we've been working on the editing, sitting all day in a tiny room in Soho watching strips of film and cutting them about. Recordings were done at the same time.

Brenton Wood dropped by to give us a listen to his new single, "Baby You Got It." Have you heard, "Soul Is Takin' Over," by Henry Lumpkin on Buddah. Sounds like top 10 to me.

Giant Sunflower, Lou Adler's great new group, cut a tough one in "I See A Rainbow," probably their follow-up to "What's So Good About Goodbye."

The Rose Garden have finished their first album for Atco. The Union Gap cut some sides for their next album here and will continue in New York later.

DEBBI SMITH writes from LONDON...

Lights are touchy subject with some bands. Take away the Pink Floyd's "trippy lights" and the Floyd fall on their faces. Add them to Cream and there is magic. Add them to Eric Burdon and you get a freak-out.

But even the purists are having to admit that finally what you see does count — or what you don't see, depending on the strength of the stroboscope.

When lights were first introduced in England, we got blobs and swirls and color, which hold the attention span for about 60 seconds.

It began with UFO, who went all out to recapture the psychedelic mood of the West Coast. The effects were successful to a point, but there has always been a peculiar reserve about British freak-outs, and this showed in the techniques.

As summer wore on and people began feeling freer, ideas started to flow — bloppy shapes and amorphous symbols gave way to more startling effects. Mushroom clouds and faces and films of the band helped. So did controlled color — fewer rainbow effects and more angry red, moody purple.

The biggest advance in the use of lighting came when the initial

novelty wore off. Arthur Brown becomes a thing of evil, a messenger from the underworld when his lights go on.

Rays emanate from stage center. The air turns to red. Arthur creeps, and the audience are quietly counting their sins — and hoping.

For the Cream, lights mean a variety of things. Clapton admits that lights play a large role in the "packaging" of the act.

For the majority, Cream's lights provide the spark of fantasy, of unreality, needed to raise the excellent to the superb.

And the lights are excellent indicators of changing feeling, shades of meaning in the flowing music.

Perhaps no light men realize this as profoundly as Phil Rose

and Mike Lowe, who work the lights for Dantalian's Chariot.

A song with Latin flavor gets gold blobs on Mexican red. Blobs do hat dances joyously. When the mood is astral, universal, deep blue reveals tiny star — like spots that grow and pulsate gently. When the music gets too much, the colors whirl around in dizzying

It has usually been the case that light men were so busy squooshing color onto slides and "doing their own thing" that they weren't receptive enough to the bands' needs. Phil and Mike are. They have made it into an art.

LORAINE ALTERMAN writes from DETROIT...

When Canada's Paupers recently played the Grande Ballroom here they told the audience that of all the places they had played in this country—including the famed Fillmore Ballroom and Cheetah—the Grande had the best light show, best music and best people.

I've been to both the Fillmore in San Francisco and Cheetah in New York and agree. But I thought it was just because I'm at home in the Grande. Now the Paupers come along and echo my thoughts. The Cream were also knocked out by the Grande during their weekend gig there.

Only a little more than a year old, the Grande originally was the place where the big bands of the thirties played in Detroit. The Grande is a huge ballroom with big pillars surrounding the dance floor which can hold up to 2,000 people.

There are light shows on the walls, strobe lights, pots of fluorescent paint so kids can paint themselves to glow in the black light areas, movies and slides projected on two screens over the dance floor and a shop selling underground papers, posters, incense and other hippie paraphernalia. When the Grande first opened even its owner Russ Gibb wasn't sure it would be a going concern. People kept saying, "Kids won't go to such a bad neighborhood."

The ballroom is located in the inner city but kids from all over the suburbs flocked there anyway. So far there's been no trouble.

Daring the riots, in fact, when buildings near the Grande were burned or looted, the Grande remained untouched, for Gibb and his crew have built up a good relationship with people in the neighborhood

It's not the psychedelic gimmicks that have made the ballroom-a success. Kids-quickly tire of the novelty of these effects unless there's something more to attract them.

What the Grande has is good music and an atmosphere that doesn't put anyone uptight.

In too many teen clubs you feel that there are private cops constantly breathing down your neck, but not at the Grande. Gibb digs the whole current scene and the kids who realize that he's on their side.


