





Album — Mick's **Birthday** Gift To Fans

On July 26, Mick Jagger's twenty-fourth birthday, the Rolling Stones will make a birthday gift to their fans with a new album.

Mick told GO's London correspondent, Richard Green, that the album will be titled "Beggar's Banquet" and feature Mick on guitar on many numbers. He has been studying the guitar recently so that he could play on record.

Eight of the twelve tracks for "Beggar's Banquet" have already been recorded with two waiting for finishing touches and two more being written by Mick. The tracks will be Jagger-Richard compositions.

In Britain the Stones have begun working on their first feature film, "One By One", directed by Jean-Luc Godard. The film's theme will be construction and destruction. The construction theme is represented by the Stones in a recording studio and

Yardbirds split--but the The Yardbirds, long popular name goes on both in America and in their native Britain, have broken up. Only Jimmy Page, guitarist, and

Chris Dreja, bassist, remain and the group will now be called The Yardbirds Featuring Jimmy Page.

In New York, at the end of The Yardbirds nine-week American tour which marked the last time they played together, Jimmy Page told GO: "We decided before the tour that we would split up at the end.

"I had only been in the group for about 18 months, but the others were in the Yardbirds for four or five years. They had lost all of their enthusiasm. Keith Relf, the singer, was fed-up for a long time and he was always threatening to leave."

Jimmy also told how the group couldn't agree on the kind of sound they wanted. According to him, the others wanted to do slow things similar to early Simon & Garfunkel numbers. As it stands now, Keith and Jim McCarty, the drummer, are going to get another group together.

Jimmy returned to Britain last weekend to fill out the new Yardbirds. He has a couple of singers and drummers in mind, but wants to try them out before he and Chris decide who will be the other two Yardbirds.

Jimmy kept the Yardbird name because he felt that people would be more familiar with it than with just his name. "Also," he said, "people have associated a type of sound with the name. It's a heavy beat sound and I want to keep that."

The sound, however, will have a difference, for Jimmy plans to add a mellotron to the instrumentation. He wants his singer to be able to play a keyboard instrument so that he will be able to handle the mellotron.

This instrument looks like an organ, but it has a system of tapes inside. The tapes have the sound of different instruments on hem, and you can dial the kind of sound you want and then press a note to get it. For example, it can sound like violins

or trumpets. The tapes are not a recorded melodic line, but sounds that have a fixed pitch and you can

play a scale on the keyboard.

Jimmy explained: "The whole idea is to get a new sort of collage of sound that is not the sound normally associated with a rock 'n' roll group. But, it will still have a beat backing... The mellotron will be there to give added interest, but the guitar will still be featured."

"Revolution", a new documentary about the hippie scene in San Francisco, comes a year too late. Last summer, the mass media over-exposed hippies to the point of boredom, so that when this new film comes along, all we can do is groan, "Oh no, not again!"

If the film had been done well, then perhaps we could have enjoyed it. But "Revolution" — with the exception of creative camera work and good music — is dull. Unfortunately, the film tends to glamorize the whole Haight-Ashbury milieu which, in reality, can be dreary and disease ridden.

Although there are interviews with doctors who point out the dangers from drugs and disease in hippieland, they are not identified during the film, so we don't know who's talking. Also, after the experts speak, the director and producer, Jack O'Connell, immediately puts his cameras on flower children who summarily dismiss the dangers.

Unfortunately, young people who see the film may be more inclined to believe the long-hairs, who are just rationalizing what they do, than believe the short haired doctors and experts who provide rational reasons for staying away from LSD.

The main problem with the film, though, is that flower children and their chatter are not interesting enough to fill up 90 minutes of film. The camera focuses mainly on a young lady named Today Malone who left home to hang out in the Haight. She is a pretty young girl, but doesn't have enough to say to warrant such exposure.

amusing to watch the freaks play will probably dig "Revolution". Also, as in "Hair", there are several nude scenes showing both men and women, so seekers of such thrills might sit through "Revolution".

But for most of us, "Revolution" is just a rehash of what we already know and what we've already seen last year. Ironically, what really is happening this year IS revolution — on campuses and in cities. The hippies jumping around amidst flowers seem rather lame compared to this year's real revolution amongst the young people of the country.

As long as we're on the subject of films, I must admit that I was the last one on my block to see "The Graduate". After hearing so many raves about it for so many months, the film itself was disappointing to me.

Although it was amusing and the photography, acting, and directing superb, the story is really stupid if you stop to think about it. Here's a college graduate who does absolutely nothing except get involved with an older woman. Then he falls in love with her daughter who, in the end, he whisks away from the altar after she has just married someone else.

The people surrounding the graduate – that is, his family and their friends – are all shallow victims

of the middle-class money/success ethic. The film exposes how ridiculous this scene can be, but the graduate himself doesn't have any strength of character either so there's no reason in the world why we should sympathize with him, or why the girl should run off with him. As a colleague of mine pointed out, the film represents the triumph of psychological immaturity. It's funny, at times poignant, but not great.

Gordon Lightfoot just completed one of his rare New York appearances at the Bitter End. He made up for all the mediocre

musicians, singers and songwriters we've had to bear during the long, cold winter, for Lightfoot is nothing short of superb.

On stage, there's just Lightfoot on guitar, John Stockfish on bass and Red Shea on guitar. Only the bass is electric, the two guitars are acoustic. The music is beautiful in its simplicity — no noise, no flashy playing, just good music.

Lightfoot's voice is richly masculine. When he sings his songs, he comes across with conviction, and gives every number the feeling – whether loving or ironic or humorous – that fits

Whether Lightfoot is writing about his first time in New York, as in "Cold Hands From New York" or about a lost love as in "The Last Time I Saw Her", he gets to the heart of what he says with poetic, meaningful lyrics.

Among the songs Lightfoot performed at the Bitter End were "For Lovin' Me", "Early Morning Rain", "Black Day In July" and "Does Your Mother Know". Every number proved that Lightfoot has not yet received the amount of recognition he deserves in this country. Listen to any one of his albums on the United Artists label and you'll see what I mean.

My favorite note of the week was included with a package of albums. "Today the following albums have been sent to you by messenger. If you have not received them, please call."

Modern day minstrels

If you don't listen to another album this month except for THE HANGMAN'S BEAUTIFUL DAUGHTER by THE INCREDIBLE STRING BAND on Elektra, your month will be well spent.

The Scottish duo - who use a variety of stringed instruments including oud, ducimer and sitar - come across as modern day minstrels weaving strange, fantastic tales. The voices of the two, Robin Williamson and Mike Heron, follow the convolutions of the lyrics and melody to reinforce the sense of enchantment.

What the songs remind us of are some of Donovan's magical, beautiful ballads like "Three King Fishers" and "Legend Of A Girl Child Linda". But the Incredible String Band are very much men of their own style.

Mike Heron's "A Very Cellular Song" is 12 minutes and 55 seconds of wonder and delight as you follow the changes in music and the lovely flow of lyrics.

Heron's "Mercy I Cry City", which has almost a Calypso feel to the music, a very effective and moving plea against the city's encroachment on

"The Minotaur's Song" by Robin Williamson, opening with a piano, sounds like a spoof on Gilbert and Sullivan. Williamson's "Three is A Green Crown" has an Oriental sound that perfectly blends with the theme of the

Crown" has an Oriental sound that perfectly blends with the theme of the lyrics.

Anyone who ignores The Incredible String Band is passing up the chance to explore a new world filled with wonder and beauty. INFINITE McCOYS by THE McCOYS (Mercury). After a long absence from the album scene, the McCoys have come back with a very interesting new one for their new label. The boys have progressed far from the simple "Hang On Sloopy" phase and are now experimenting with jazz and far-out rock. The result is a good album that shows the McCoys certainly are talented musicians.

THE TOM JONES FEVER ZONE by TOM JONES (Parrot). Get ready for another dynamic collection of songs from that Welsh power-house, Tom Jones. Included here are his current hit "Delilah", "Hold On, I'm Coming" and "Get Ready".

A NEW PLACE IN THE SUN by GLEN CAMPBELL (Capitol). The man whose voice put "Phoenix" on the pop map does a fine job with songs as varied as "The Legend Of Bonnie & Clyde" and "The Twelfth Of Never". His country background makes him a singer who knows how to get the most out of the lyrics he is singing. Campbell's new album will make good listening in the warm months ahead.

REFLECTIONS by DIANA ROSS & THE SUPREMES (Motown). Those three sophisticated singers from Detroit put their talent to work on songs like "Up Up & Away", "Ode To Billie Joe" and "What The World Needs Now Is Love", as well as some of their hit singles. Supremes fans will enjoy this one.

Gold for Stones

JUMPIN' JACK FLASH by THE ROLLING STONES (London). Back in a driving R&B bag, the Stones should qualify quickly for gold on this brand new one produced by Jimmy Miller.

THE FACE by THE HUMAN BEINZ (Capitol). The group have come up with a soft ballad sound that fits in with the relaxing mood of summer. YOUR MIND AND WE BELONG TOGETHER by LOVE (Elektra). The West Coast group should make the charts with this good sound. I'LL BE YOUR BABY TONIGHT by BURL IVES (Columbia). Dylan's song gets a good simple treatment by this veteran folk singer and everyone will dig it. MY FRIEND by STEVE ALAIMO (Atco). A very slow emotional R&B b allad that should bring Alaimo on to the charts. LOVIN' THINGS by THE MARMALADE (Epic). From Scotland comes a moving record backed with solid orchestration and it looks as if it's bound for lots of airplay. ALMOST PERSUADED by THE MAGNIFICENT MEN (Capitol). The song sounds a lot like "Stagger Lee", but the group give a fine performance. PEOPLE SURE ACT FUNNY by ARTHUR CONLEY (Atco). Once more, Conley has come up with a driving funky single sure to catch on fast. FOLSOM PRISON BLUES by JOHNNY CASH (Columbia). With the upsurge in interest in country music, Cash should have a pop hit with record recorded live at the prison. I NEED A LOVE LIKE YOURS by DEON JACKSON (Carla). This time around Deon sings a very pretty ballad that's headed for the charts. DARK IS THE BARK by LEFT BANKE (Smash). A nice sounding slow one from the group who haven't had a record for a long time. GROOVIN' IS EASY by THE ELECTRIC FLAG (Columbia). Certainly a catchy number from this very fine group.

OUTSIDE CHANCES

GONE by TIMOTHY CARR (Hot Biscuit Disc Co.). A nice R&B ballad that might possibly make it, but it needs to be heard more than once.







THE LONDON REPORT

The Bee Gees summer tour of America will play two of the biggest venues available plus appearances on two network TV shows.

The group leave London on July 31, after completing a TV spectacular for British TV and another in Paris. They open on August 1 in Sacramento, and the following day, play at the Hollywood Bowl.

Then they visit San Francisco (3) and San Diego (4). The Bee Gees then guest on a special edition of the Jerry Lewis TV series, then appear in New York's Forest Hills Stadium.

The group also play in Rhode Island, Boston, Iowa, Minneapolis, Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia and at the Ohio State Fair. From September 3-7 they rehearse and film a spot on "Hollywood Palace".

Two more dates have still to be set, but the Bee Gees are due back in England about September 12.

Their next single is being recorded this week for world-wide release later this month with their new album, "Idea".

THE FOUNDATIONS have cut short their

world tour and returned to Britain after a date in San Francisco They were to have undertaken a nine-country itinerary from Juhe 21. But sales of their last British single were disappointing and they will fly home to cut another, plus an album.

In mid-October, the group play at the Olympic Games in Mexico City and it is anticipated that they will visit Japan, Australia, Hong Kong, the Philippines, Singapore, Ceylon, Cyprus, Israel and Lebanon en route.

GEORGIE FAME has signed for a series of American club dates this month. He flies to Los Angeles on June 12 to select a group of American musicians to back him.

On June 19, Georgic guests at the Epic Records Sales Convention in Los Angeles, then begins the rest of his tour before returning to London in mid-July.

Most single records that are released have a very short time in which to make it

If the side doesn't get a lot of initial airplay and show signs that it is going to happen, the record company usually stops promoting it and writes it off as a miss. This is particularly true when the record is by an unknown group.

Occasionally, though, for one reason or another, several months after a record has been released it gets "discovered" and becomes a hit. Usually no on is more surprised than the artists th "Baby You Come Rolling Across My Mind" by the Peppermint Trolley Company is just such a record. Recorded last November and released in January by Acta, the record didn't happen. Almost half a year went by and then radio stations started playing it and people started buying it. It was on its way to becoming a large hit, and the Peppermint Trolley Company were becoming a name to be reckoned with.

What kind of a group are the Peppermint Trolley Company?

Well, they're good. Their sound has elements of folk, jazz and country in it, and it's primarily a vocal sound, using a lot of three-part harmony. The group feel that they have evolved since recording "Baby" and that they are now heavier, both instrumentally and vocally. They played me some unmixed tapes from the album they are currently working on, and I agree with them.

Chad Stuart, who heard them and liked their sound, has done some arrangements for them, and they hope to get the Acta album into the stores sometime in July. The members of the company are Casey Cunningham, drums; Greg Tournquist, guitar; Danny Faragher, keyboards; and Jimmy Faragher, bass. Danny and Jimmy are brothers; Danny Jimmy and Greg do the singing; and Jimmy is the lead singer. He also does a lot of the writing. Patrick McClure, who used to be with the group, now does a lot of writing for them. In fact, they wrote everything on their upcoming album, except for their current hit.

They've been together for about eight months now as a group, but most of them have known each other since they were kids. They practically starved for most of those eight months, because they weren't working gigs. They lived together and practised all day, working on getting their own sound. In fact, if it wasn't for their manager, Dan Dalton and his wife, who fed them a lot of the time, they wouldn't have lasted.

COAST JOTTINGS... Suzi Jane Hokom, a producer for LHI records, was invited by Lennon and McCartney to spend some time with them while they were in New York, because they dig her work. How's that for a compliment?... A local distributor reports that "Disraeli Gears" is the biggest selling album ever in L.A., except for "Sgt. Pepper" Who says Hollywood Itas bad taste?... Dick Clark is promoting the Ringling Bros. Barnum & Bailey Circus in Philadelphia, and served as ringmaster on opening night...Jean Peloquin, who sings for Decca and acts for Universal, has had a song that he composed, "Mr. Painter Paint My Dad", chosen as the official Father's Day Song... I keep going back to listen to Laura Nyro's Columbia album, it gets better with each spinning - if that's.possible.

"We all believe that, with this record, Glen Campbell has reached the ultimate in artistic performance."

The speaker was one of the top executives of Capitol Records. The record to which he was referring is Glen's new single "Dreams Of The Everyday Housewife".

Rarely, if ever, has a company gone so whole-heartedly behind any record. Capitol promotion men all over the country were alerted, and told that everyone believed "Dreams Of The Everyday Housewife" was THE big one for Glen.

Only days after its release, it was evident that the belief had not been misplaced. Orders began to pour in as one radio station after another began to play the record. It already seems to be a sure bet for a high spot on the charts.

Of the record, Glen himself said: "Only once in many, many months does an artist find himself with the opportunity to record a song in which he really believes. This is the case with 'Dreams Of The Everyday Housewife'.

"As soon as I heard it, I knew I could become really involved, really do a job with it.

"The act of recording it was a sheer pleasure for me, and I hope the listener will be able to feel this with me."





Twenty-three years - the average age of many pop groups. But twenty-three years is the length of time that Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs have been together playing country music.

Although Flatt and Scruggs have long been popular with country fans around the world, it was the film "Bonnie & Clyde" which made many younger pop fans aware of them. "Foggy Mountain Breakdown", written by Earl Scruggs in 1948 was used as the movie's theme song.

Mrs. Earl Scruggs, who serves as booking agent for Flatt and Scruggs, said that Warren Beatty had called her to find out if the pair would write the score for a movie he was producing in Texas. He also asked if they could perform in a few scenes in the movie.

A few weeks later, Beatty called back to say that he had a large collection of Flatt and Scruggs records and thought something like "Foggy Mountain Breakdown" would be good for his movie, "Bonnie & Clyde". As it turned out, that was the song Beatty decided to use for his movie theme.

Flatt and Scruggs hesitate to put any kind of label on their music because they play country, contemporary folk, blues and ballads. An example of their diversity is their "Changin" Times" album for Columbia which includes many Bob Dylan

As Earl Scruggs said to GO in New York recently: "We like songs that tell a story.

The universality of Flatt and Scruggs appeal was proved in March when they made their first Far Eastern tour. All their concerts in Japan were sold out weeks in advance. Autograph seekers, both young and old, beseiged the group in the manner of teenyboppers after the Monkees.

Scruggs said that although "many of the Japanese people couldn't understand the lyrics of the

songs, they understood the music". They discovered that there is a

very great interest in country music in Japan and over 800 blue grass bands in that country.

Lester Flatt told GO: " It was amazing to listen to them playing country songs. We met one boy who knew every song we sang. We sang with him and ended up doing the harmony.

Both Flatt and Scruggs feel that country music is definitely becoming more popular in this country. As Scruggs said: "It's picking up because it's now getting more exposure on radio. Country music is something listeners have been deprived of for a long time.

Lester Flatt, born in Sparta, Tennessee, began his professional career on a radio station in Roanoke.

Virginia. He had been singing since childhood. After Roanoke became boring to him, he spent five years travelling through North Carolina and Kentucky. In 1944 he arrived in Nashville, and a year later met Earl

Scruggs says that his family tells him he's been playing banjo since he was five years old, although he doesn't really remember. He was born in Flint Hill, North Carolina, where he grew up. He says that everyone in his family played and sang, but he "just coudn't give it up".

Scruggs is noted for this three-finger style of banjo picking which he started doing when he was about 12. The usual style of playing is two-finger picking, but Scruggs developed this style.

The other members in the Flatt and Scruggs group are Paul Warren, violin; Buck Graves, dobro guitar; E.P.Tullock, bass; Johnny Johnson,

ACTOR CUTS A RECORD--AND *A NEW CAREER...?*

"The only thing that scares me is boredom," said actor Christopher Jones on a recent trip to New York from his home in Los Angeles.

Chris could hardly be bored with acting roles that have had him playing Jesse James on the TV series, and the president of the United States in the just released film, "Wild In The Streets".

In addition to cting, Chris is planning to record for Equinox, the label of the Beatle's Apple complex in the U.S. "I cut one record for Terry Melcher, Equinox's producer, but I don't want to release it even though Terry and Apple in London ke it. I think it so like the Beach Boys," explained.

Chris says that he decided to record because Terry asked him. "I tried it," he explained, "and I dug it. It's really a great release if you really get into it. I want songs that have a lot of feeling and are very sensual. It takes a while to find a song that fits

The day we spoke to Chris, he said that he regarded singing as only a hobby. Then he confessed that the day before he had told someone else that a singing career was important to him. From the way he talked, it's evident that Chris hasn't really



decided how much recordinmeans to

As far as acting goes, he enjoys playing "rebellious characters" and doing "action pictures like Westerns or gangster films."

With the confidence that comes from acting experience in the theater as well as in films and television, Chris explained: " I can make such characters interesting because I can identify or feel for them."

Chris, though, doesn't label himself an outsider or a rebel. Instead

he just wants to be a man who does his own things without bothering someone else.

"A rebel just used to be a guy or a girl who went his own way," Chris said. "Now a rebel is associated with revolution.

"I believe in tolerance and allowing people to do their own thing and having them let me do mine... I don't understand the man with the crewcut who goes to work every morning at nine and leaves at five. But I don't attack him and he better not attack me...l just prefer long hair, to smile and be happy."

Because Chris wants leisure time so that he can sail to Tahiti if he is so inclined, he prefers sticking to motion pictures. The theater and television don't allow enough free

"In television there is not enough time to do anything," he explained. no chance to get into a role. They take a week to shoot an hour show and there is just too much pressure involved."

Directing a movie appeals to Chris. "I'd like to have control over something because I have pretty good instincts," he says.

"The trend in movies today is a negative or down end. Whatever happened to happy endings? Life is what you want it to be. If you want it to have a happy ending, it will."

Already well on his way to becoming one of Hollywood's most popular young leading men, Chris can look forward to a long and happy

WHAT STEPPENWOLF IS

Outspoken and passionate - that's John Kay, leader, organizer and songwriter of Steppenwolf, a five-man group from the West Coast. As Steppenwolf, Mike Monarch, Jerry Edmonton, John Moreve, Goldy McJohn and Kay have been together since last fall.

What Steppenwolf is all about and what I'm trying to do (and I've had some success)," says Kay, "is to combine music, which is instant communication because of its primitive rhythms, with lyrics which express my own feelings. As long as people take time to listen, then I feel we're accomplishing something."

Kay remembers from his days on the folk circuit listening to songs by people like Bob Dylan, Tom Paxton, Richard Farina "and even people who are really extreme like Phil Ochs," and thinking it was good to find out that other people thought the same as you.

"It's good to know that someone out there is saying these things on mass media," he told GO.

"I'm sure there are countless kids who have the ability to stand on their own two feet and think their own thoughts were it not for the pressures parents, school and society exerts on them. People like Dylan gave these kids a sense that it's worth it to remain individuals and think about things."

Continuing, Kay noted: "Almost everywhere we've been across the country, we've run into courageous attempts by kids to break away from the norm and these kids often have short hair and dress conservatively... The kids may not always be right or may do things because it's a fad, but it does take courage to be different. These people have the true ingredient of the old pioneer days.

Kay grew up in West Germany until he was 14 when he moved to Canada and then the U.S. with his family. What concerns him and what he writes about are the problems that face mankind like ignorance and poverty.

"Media may be in the position now to eradicate some of the ignorance in this world," John says."... everyone is getting more concerned. There may be hope and room for change in this world without too much bloodshed."

John emphasizes: "I am not speaking for anyone except myself. I'm just hoping to encourage individualistic thought... I'd rather be doing something, no matter how minute, within a framework I enjoy.

"The answer is not to walk away from problems to escape. There's just too many of us in this world."
