

PETER QUITS the MONKEFC

PETER TORK HAS LEFT THE MONKEES. This news was revealed to GO by a source close to the Monkees in New York.

Tork has already left the group and is at present making plans for his future as a single artist. IT IS NOT KNOWN WHAT HIS PLANS ARE FOR FUTURE RECORDINGS.

As of now, all future plans for the Monkees are up in the air. There was to have been a European tour early this year - but there is no plan to do it now.

Sources close to the remaining Monkees, David Jones, Mike Nesmith, and Mickey Dolenz, are speculating that they will remain together as a trio, without looking for a replacement for Tork. However, the Monkees' office in Hollywood was reported saying that there are no definite plans as yet.

One thing that appears to be certain is that the Monkees will continue to record for Colgems without Peter Tork.

The Rascals, however, will do educational television shows and they also like the Smothers Brothers. As Felix put it: "At least they're trying.'

In another policy announcement, the Rascals stated that they will not appear in concert anywhere unless half the act on the bill are black.

"We can't control the audience," Felix said, "but we can be sure the show is integrated. So...from now on...half the acts will be white and half will be black - or we stay home."

DANNY SIGNS DISC DEAL

FORMER ANIMAL, Danny McCulloch has just signed a long-term recording-writing-production deal with Capitol Records.

His first single is "Wings Of A Man" and his first album for the company will have the same title and be released early in February.

McCulloch spent three and a half years with Eric Burdon and the Animals and wrote "Sky Pilot" for that group.

Before joining the British Group McCulloch had played with artists like Jerry Lee Lewis, John Lee Hooker and Jimmy Reed.

FRANK SINATRA will star in a Western which was just acquired by his Sinatra Enterprises. The original screenplay is "The Amigos" and it will be Sinatra's first period film for several years. The film goes into production in late spring.

GO's Pop News - A Round-Up In Depth

"OVER YOU" brought Gary Puckett and The Union Gap a fourth gold record. The Columbia Records group had already received gold for "Woman, Woman", "Young Girl", and 'Lady Willpower"

The Grassroots, Dunhill artists, received certification of "Midnight Confessions" as a million seller. This is their second gold record. The first was for 'Let's Live For Today".

THE IRISH ROVERS begin a three week concert tour at Brisbane's Festival Hall in Australia on January 18. This is their first trip to Australia where they have won two gold records.

After Brisbane the Rovers do concerts in Sydney, Melbourne, Hobart and Perth. The Decca group returns to the U.S. on February 3 where they will be doing TV and college dates.

BOBBY VINTON'S latest hit record gained him another gold record. The Record Industry Association of America (RIAA) certified "I Love How You Love Me" as a million seller. Bobby had his first gold record in 1962 with "Roses Are Red"

THE SPENCER DAVIS GROUP winds up its current extended American tour in Hammond, Indiana, on January 5. A fourth American concert tour for the group has already been set-up and it begins on February

The group will probably play a date in Prague, Czechoslovakia, late in January. After that they may do a tour of Australia and New Zealand before returning to

In 1966, the Monkees were actually formed. Put together from interviews, in an attempt to find an American Beatle group. In September of 1966 The

Monkees began a successful TV series which carried them to the top of the popularity charts. Their popularity quickly spread to England where their show was also seen on the BBC.

Recently the Monkees' released their first feature length film, "Head". The movie received mixed reactions from the public. In a what was probably the last thing the Monkees did as a foursome, they recently finished an hour TV special which is to be aired early in this year.

Iterman's Resolutions for 19

EVERY NEW YEAR brings new joys to the pop music writers MAYBE a great new talent to be discovered. UNDOUBTEDLY another new album from the Beatles for everyone to tear apart until the next one comes along. PERHAPS a brilliant new songwriter who doesn't insist on wearing love beads. ASSUREDLY thousands and thousands of new singles and albums.

Since everyone else makes resolutions at this time of year, there's no reason why I can't make some for the pop music scene and the people who are making it. HERE GOES WITH A LIST OF RESOLUTIONS THAT WILL MAKE YOUR YEAR A LITTLE BRIGHTER ...

RESOLVED that record companies pay more attention to quality and less to quantity. Instead of signing up hundreds of groups who sound like hundreds of other groups already on record, companies and producers would be wiser to listen more carefully for good, creative groups and singers. When a company releases in one season - as a major company did in its fall release - about 100 albums, ALL OF THEM CANNOT POSSIBLY BE GOOD. In fact, a few of them turn out to be even worth the effort of slitting open the outer protective wrap.

RESOLVED that groups concentrate less on copying Jimi Hendrix and/or Eric Clapton and more on having original stage acts. How many guitars can you see rammed through amplifiers? How much feedback can you bear? How much frizzy hair can you look at? It's about time young groups worked on their own acts - instead of venturing onstage already EXPERIENCED.

RESOLVED that there be another presidential campaign in 1969 so that Pat Paulsen can run again and have another testimonial dinner at Horn & Hardart's. Or, if this can't be arranged, at least let record companies giving big parties for new groups think of something a BIT MORE ORIGINAL than the usual wall-to-wall freeloaders exhaling clouds of smoke and hot

RESOLVED that publicity people and record companies spend less time billing new acts as another Rolling Stones or another Aretha Franklin and more time emphasizing the originality in a new group or artist. There can only be one Aretha, one Stones and one Beatles - AND THE LESS TIME SPENT LOOKING FOR ANOTHER, THE BETTER. The top acts got to where they are because they have unique talent and style, NOT because they tried to copy anyone else.

RESOLVED that we have to see and hear fewer British blues groups in 1969. I hate to be a chauvinistic snob but the blues as they should be done are pretty much the native American property of men like Albert King, B.B. King, Muddy Waters, Howlin' Wolf and artists like that. SO WHY ACCEPT ALL THE PALE IMITATIONS WITH SUCH FANFARE? Let's give the originators the credit they deserve and not see an American blues great get second billing on a show after a blues band that just happens to have a better publicity machine.

RESOLVED that songwriters who cannot sing do not make records but stick to writing songs. Granted we have great songwriters-singers like Joni Mitchell. Gordon Lightfoot and Tom Paxton - BUT TOO MANY WRITERS REALLY DON'T KNOW THE FIRST THING ABOUT SINGING. Keep them pushing the pens and keyboards, but don't let them

SINGING. Keep them pushing the pens and keyboards, but don't let them get behind a microphone just because they look under-30.

RESOLVED that pop groups make sure all of their equipment is set-up and functioning before a show is supposed to begin so that concerts start promptly. Nothing is more unprofessional for a group than to fiddle around with instruments and amps while the audience is waiting for the show to get started.

RESOLVED that there is less noise and more music. Although the psychedelic binge faded in 1968, it is still around in enough volume so that a certain segment of the audience mistakes loudness for music. Just because something is loud, doesn't mean that it's good.

RESOLVED that 1969 be a good year for pop music and we have alot

RESOLVED that 1969 be a good year for pop music and we have alot of creative music to write about and hear in the year ahead.

The Fleetwood Mac drifted into the room one by one. After about five minutes they were mostly all assembled, sitting in a semi-circle around Mick Fleetwood, their elongated drummer.

JEREMY SPENCER sat on the bed, legs crossed, smoking a cigarette, and falling asleep intermittently. JOHN McVIE sat next to Jeremy, occasionally looking wistfully at the street below, mostly just listening.

DANNY KIRWEN, the newest member of the group, was one of the most attentive. He sat in a straight backed chair, attentively listening for questions, and taking an active part in

PETER GREEN was another interested Fleetwood Mac. His attentive face popped up from the pillow with regularity as he answered questions. All through the interview he kept running his hands through his medusa-like hair, afraid perhaps that it might get away.

The leader of the group, Mick Fleetwoon was in the middle of this conglomerate of musical talent. Mick is the original 'skinny as a rail" kid. When you meet him, it's like someone is introducing you to a broomstick with a face. HE'S TALL TOO, AND HIS HEIGHT FURTHER ACCENTS HIS THIN FRAME.


Mick sat in the center of the group - like a king with his subjects all around him. Mick answered all questions and then the rest of the Fleetwood Mac were allowed to answer in any way they felt appropriate.

"American audiences are different from the European kind" said Mick, "... the Americans come to hear the concert. The Europeans sort of hear your music as an afterthought, between their beer and kippers. IT'S EASIER TO PLAY AMERICA BECAUSE YOU CAN DO EXACTLY WHAT YOU WANT TO. IN EUROPE YOU HAVE TO FEEL OUT THE AUDIENCE TO SEE WHAT IT IS THEY'RE IN THE MOOD FOR."

The rest of the Fleetwood Mac nodded their agreement. We're a blues band, you know? Blues is the thing. It's the greatest because it's real.

"Blues is about people. About their problems, their successes, their loves and hates. American soul music can be blues, but it isn't necessarily blues just because it's soul."

The Fleetwood Mac are currently in the middle of a

nationwide tour. The first tour they did took them to four cities. This tour will encompass 28 or 30 cities.

AMERICAN TOURS ARE BETTER THAN THE EUROPEAN TOURS BECAUSE THERE IS MORE MONEY TO BE MADE.

"Face it, in America there are so many more people and so much more money, that a tour here has so much of a better chance at financial success.

"We like to play to full houses, as long as the hall is full we'll play to it. It wasn't always like that though, especially in England. Sometimes we'd have twenty couples who didn't want to hear us anyway. But things have progressed from

The one big question which woke up the rest of the Fleetwood Mac concerned electric music, or the unreproducable sounds that sometimes find their way on to albums.

After lengthy debate, it was decided that " . . . A record is entertainment. No matter what's on it, it's entertainment. IT DOESN'T MATTER THAT THE GROUP THAT DOES STUFF ON RECORDS CAN'T REPRODUCE THE SOUND 🗱 ON STAGE IN A LIVE PERFORMANCE.

"The fact that the record is good, no matter what it takes to produce is it O.K. People buy the record - they don't expect to ever see the group that does it, do the same thing live. The entertainment value is the main thing."

Since the Fleetwood Mac have been in the United States 25 they haven't had much time for rehearsals. That isn't too important, as they do most of their practising on stage, while they are doing their show.

The Fleetwood Mac is a blues band which likes to specialize in entertainment. "AS LONG AS WE ARE ENTERTAINING * PEOPLE AND HAVING FUN, THAT'S ALL THAT'S IMPORTANT.

And the Fleetwood Mac went ambling down the hall with X Mick in the center, surrounded by the rest of the group, as a king might be surrounded by his retinue.

**** SURPRISE***

-SAYS LARRY*** "Actually a hit record didn't come as too much of a surprise to us," Larry

Raspberry, leader of the Gentrys, told GO Magazine. "We were all pretty cocky about everything then, you have to remember that we were just 17 at the time.' Larry was talking about the Gentrys success by Mike Gardener and Jimmy Hart, the group's

with their second record, "Keep On Dancing". which was a big record back in 1965-1966. He went on to explain just why they had all this youthful confidence: "We had just won a big band competition at a Memphis fair – fairs are very big in the South - and we felt all things were possible. Then we recorded our first record right after the contest and it was big IT AFTER THE HOLIDAYS." regionally, in fact we were upset that they didn't go in it nationally.

Our second record was "Keep On Dancing" and that took off; but like I said we sort of expected it. IT SOUNDS AWFUL NOW BUT WHEN YOU'RE YOUNG YOU THINK THAT WAY."

After the first national hit the doldrums seemed to settle in on the group. "As you know nothing much happened after that, though most of our records sold very well locally. We've been working all the time, doing mostly one nighters throughout the South," Larry said.

One of the problems has been repeated personnel changes within the group. Initially with a group of guys whose average age is 17, you have to expect some changes.

AFTER THAT THOUGH THEY HAD SEVERAL OTHER CHANGES AND IT IS JUST NOW THAT LARRY EXPECTS THE GROUP TO SETTLE. He still has to find a new organist and then the group will spend most of the month of January rehearsing and getting new material together.

Material has also been something of a problem. Larry explained: "It's always difficult if you don't have an internal source or someone who is writing just with the group in mind."

They are beginning to solve this problem to some extent with their latest release on Bell Records, "Midnight Train", having been penned

drummer and bass player respectively.

Larry himself shares the writing credits with Jimmy on the flip side.

Talking about the new disc Larry said: "It's a bad time, what with Christmas, and New Year. WE'RE JUST HOPING FOR SOME REACTION TO IT SO WE CAN RESERVICE

They aren't discouraged though and Larry feels, with mature confidence, that the group will re-establish themselves nationally.

He has several reasons for that belief: "We have built a reputation on our live performances and we try to generate a lot of excitment on stage.

"Then too I think we are learning all the time. You can learn a lot from watching people who have been in the business for a long time and are successful. THE TRICK THERE IS TO LEARN WITHOUT IMITATING.

"I think our studio work is better, we've atured and now realize that a great deal more emphasis is being placed on musicianship than in the past.

We all like working in the studio and feel that our efforts there have to equal what we do on stage. I think recording offers a great deal worth exploring - BUT YOU CAN'T BEAT THE SATISFACTION OF WORKING LIVE.

Larry got up to go and as he was slipping on his leather jacket he looked wistful for a moment and told us: "We're paying our dues now, it seems funny having a big hit and then paying your dues. But that's what happened to

"Sometimes I wonder if we wouldn't be better off if it worked just the opposite." The moment passed, he smiled and quietly drawled his goodbyes as he got ready to fly to Memphis.





JULIE DRISCOLL is a taller, better developed version of Twiggy. Her skin is the color of parchment. A slow, thoughtful aura surrounds her. She is the quiet fashion model

BRIAN AUGER is a rough and tumble British rocker gone mod. His looks are of the rough teddy boy of a decade ago. However, the look is tempered with a fierce concentration, and dedication to the music he makes, and the people he makes it with

THE TRINITY, which can logically be called the rest of the group, consists of Ambrose, another intense musician who has a devilish glint twinkling in his eyes, and Thacker, who is quiet but always there.

This collection of sometimes conflicting personalities, but always together musicians, has made quite an impression in Britain - AND IS ABOUT TO DO THE SAME THING IN AMERICA.

Brian is basically the spokesman for the group. When he talks, they almost always nod in agreement. "Our music can't be labelled as any one kind of thing.

"We experiment a lot, sort of creating a free form music. We must lie somewhere between R'n'B, pop, and jazz, but I'm not sure exactly where.

"Music is a growing thing, and it's growing worldwide. Things are being done all over the country and the world so that it sometimes seems like there is one big musical fraternity working on the same things.

Brian has one overriding ambition. "I'd like to write a pop symphony. You know, something that would be good. A lasting sort of thing that could still be played in a hundred years or so."

Brian's eyes became animated as he spoke of the role that the young people are playing in society today.

"The young can achieve peace in themselves through music, they can channel the revolution to their own outlets, rather than destroying a lot of stuff. IN THE END WE'LL ALL BE BETTER OFF. MUSIC IS, AFTER ALL, PART OF THE YOUNG SCENE."

This is the first trip to the United States for Brian, Julie, and Trinity. They haven't appeared on any stages for live concerts or shows.

What they did do, was a television show in Los Angeles. The show was taped for a later date, so you can't see it yet. The TV special was with the Monkees.

"The show is sort of a history of the Monkees' rise to popularity and fame, of course it's embellished upon with all sorts of good things, which I can't tell you about yet.

"Anyway, doing the show was really great. The people were real nice to us, and the Monkees are real together guys. THEY ARE MORE INTO WHAT'S GOING ON THAN

STUART GINSBURG

ANYONE GIVES THEM CREDIT FOR.

"We all have integral parts in the show, as actors, and then we have sort of a battle of the bands, which we play for a little while.

'The trip was originally planned so that we could do the show with the Monkees, and then go on the road and do some tours, but we had trouble with visas and customs and all that. So I guess we'll go back to

we can get the visas straightened

In England, the group has done TV and personal appearances. Of all kinds of work, they like doing college concerts the best. Basically this is because they can get closer to their audiences that way.

They think that audience participation is an integral part of any show AND THE MORE AN AUDIENCE RESPONDS THE BETTER THEY PERFORM.

EXPRESSWAY TO YOUR SKULL (Mercury)

Buddy Miles Express

Looking at Buddy Miles' sheer physical size, you'd think his voice would be a powerhouse, but it's not. He's not really much of a singer as you can tell by comparing Buddy's version of "Don't Mess With Cupid" with Otis Redding's original. The Express, while containing many good musicians, is not as tight as Blood, Sweat & Tears which is also a large group. There are some good solos on this album, but considering all the advance build-up on the group, it is a disappointing first album, for there is not much fresh or original about it.

SOULFUL STRUT (Brunswick)


