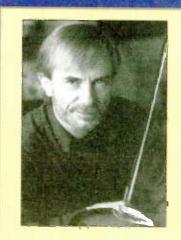

Buffalo Springfield's Monterey cuts stank

I read Tom Messer's Please Mr. Postman letter in the Aug. 24, 2001, issue of Goldmine regarding the new Buffalo Springfield box and his amazement that the Springfield's live set from the Monterey Pop Festival wasn't included.

One significant reason it's not included is that, of course, since Neil Young was principally responsible for compiling the box, and he wasn't at Monterey, the set might have been left off for his personal reasons. But there's actually a much more likely reason the Monterey set is AWOL: It's awful. Like Messer, I've heard it, and yes, it's historical, yes, it's Crosby with the Springfield, but yes, they were really having a bad night.

One of the things that, live ommissions and the redundant fourth disc aside, is so delightful about the Buffalo box is that it's really entertaining. The demos and alternates, along with the commercial versions of the songs, are all high quality, totally enjoyable. While the purist in me somewhat agrees with Messer, the music fan in me would believe that including lousy performances of this less-than-greatly remembered band would do the whole project a slap. It's better that this retrospective box shows the Buffalo in their best light, both on the record and behind the scenes. There's little reason for a box, aimed at the mass market, to show that from time to time, the group stank. The editor's note after Messer's letter, though, suggests to me that maybe Rhino's Handmade imprint might try to wrestle those Monterey tracks out -- that's the proper place and the proper purveyor for them.

Which brings up a point we serious collectors need to remember. Just because something is, as Messer says, "noteworthy" doesn't necessarily mean it is actually worthy. I think we need to step back and realize that there is usually a very good reason something is unreleased. Because something exists on tape doesn't mean it's palatable for the mass public. We should be quite grateful that artists are noticing that there is a niche market for outtakes and other unreleased material. But the artists and labels obviously must balance the commercial potential of the project against the limited market desires of the cognoscenti. By and large, I think they do a fine job at this. Had they put on those burn live tracks on the Buffalo box, for example, a great many people would be hitting the "forward" button on their remotes. Young, Rhino, et al surely realize that those who really want those lousy live tracks, like Messer and I, probably already have them on those nasty bootlegs.

Much more revealing are those wonderful demos that are included in the box. That shows better the musical genesis and depth of Buffalo Springfield. By leaving out the warts of their history, is that revisionist? Who cares - it's their box! This ain't a democracy, and getting the vast amount of material in this set is quite admirable.

It's not a perfect world, and no matter what artists and labels put out from their archives, there will always be a cadre of purists that'll gripe to high heaven. So be it. But I think we should swallow our enlightened indignation and be a little more grateful that we get this stuff handed to us, well-produced and nicely packaged, instead of always relying on the bootleggers and their spotty quality control. I am anyhow.

Well, Goldmine covers such a wide range of music, that I don't always care to read it all when I get my new issue. But I find that I often discover a group years later, and it's so cool when I find I have a bunch of old articles buried in

There is so much music out there to explore, whether it be picking up rare blues 78s such as the Blind Joe Reynolds 78 mentioned in Grapeleaves this issue, reissues of some long-forgotten band or a new band with a great new sound. It's all out there to explore.

Wonders about pricing for Fats Domino 78s

Thanks for Bill Dahl's fine overview of Fats Domino's career in Goldmine #546 (June 29, 2001). Goldmine writers sure are great! (OK, I'm one myself.)

I wonder, though, about some of the values listed in Tim Neely's discography for the Domino 78s. Take the first and last 78s. My recent winning eBay bid for a gorgeous

(certainly near mint) copy of "The Fat Man" (listed by Tim at \$400) was a mere \$22.50 (plus \$5 for shipping). Last year I won "Whole Lotta Lovin" (listed at \$150) for \$9 (although it was only VG+). (Incidentally, there's an even later Fats 78 — "Telling Lies" on Imperial 5569, which I got for \$4.75 - 1 can only imagine a list price for that one.)

I don't want to turn this into a plug for eBay, which certainly can afford its own publicity, but I've consistently found that winning bids there are far lower than the prices I used to pay at record shows, from which I assume Neely's values are derived. Take Chuck Berry 78s. The few I've seen lately at shows are pegged at \$50-\$100, but the same items rarely fetch more than \$20 online. You would think that an international audience of thousands of potential bidders would drive e-auction prices sky-high, but that hasn't happened.

As someone who loves record shows, this troubles me. There's nothing like the human interaction, the thrill of finding an unexpected treasure and the immediate gratification, but I truly think that the online auction sites have largely redefined the economics of record collecting. The fact remains that over the past year or so I've found far more exciting items online than at shows — and at far better prices. I could wait a lifetime (and wind up paying a mint) for most of the items I've bought online.

I'd love to assume that my collection is worth the values listed in the standard price guides. But while it sure would be nice to peddle my copy of "The Fat Man" for \$400,

(Tim Neely replies: "What you should do is pat yourself on the back for finding some good bargains. Basically, you've found a niche on eBay that is tailor-made for finding bargains - 78 rpm records. There are several reasons for this:

- 1. Even today, eBay's audience skews young. Its audience generally doesn't collect 78 rpms. Its audience collects newer material and out-ofprint CDs, the latter of which tend to go for way more than the discs are worth outside of eBay.
- 2. Most people who post 78s on eBay aren't dealers and have no idea what they're worth in a more narrowly concentrated market.
- 3. Most 78s posted on eBay are the ones that are essentially worthless - recordings of '40s and '50s Big Band and pop vocalists. Even with a good search engine, many hard-core 78 collectors don't want to wade through the Bing Crosby list ings to find the ones that are really interesting.
- 4. Some hard-core 78 collectors don't ever use typewriters, much less computers.

There are many other variables that cominto play when dealing with eBay, too. Fo people who use it a lot, there's a tendency to us it as the source for current market values. Bu it's only one source and a relatively minor one of that. The comparison I made in my new Recor Album Price Guide, 2nd Edition, would be you judged the state of the U.S. economy b looking only at the price of gasoline. It mean something, but lots of other things mean some thing, too, if not more."

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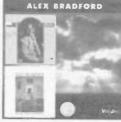
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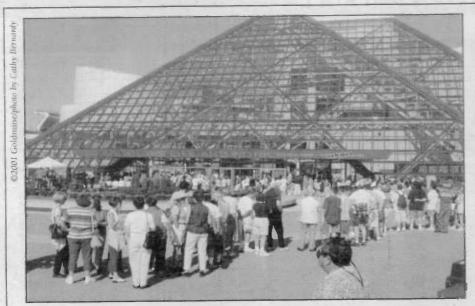

## 12,000 attend second National Record Show™ at Rock Hall

Goldmine's second National Record Show held Aug 4-5, 2001, at The Rock And Roll Hall Of Fame in Cleveland was a hit with dealers, collectors and music fans. Attendance was double the number who attended the first show held last September. 12,000 showed up this year for the two-day record show, which also had for the first time presenters talking about a wide range of collecting and music topics from The Beatles to collecting music posters. ## Spirit In The Sky album gets a makeover with seven bonus tracks

Most artists would probably chafe at being called a one-hit wonder, but for Norman Greenbaum, who penned the ever-ubiquitous "Spirit In The Sky" more than 30 years ago, it's a moniker he's learned to embrace. So much so in fact, that he and veteran producer Erik Jacobsen recently oversaw the production of a gloriously gussied-up reissue of the 1970 album that shares its title with the four-minute pop masterpiece.

"Spirit In The Sky' is an albatross, but it's one I can live with," said Greenbaum, speaking by phone to *Goldmine* from his home in northern California. "It's a good albatross to have, although things were all downhill after that. The song was too big, too strong, too heavy, and there was no possibility it could be topped. Any way you looked at it a follow-up was going to be weak. Over the years I've tried many different ways to do something more, but it's just not the same."

Although several songs from the original Spirit In The Sky LP have appeared on various CD compilations, until now the entire album has never been available in the format. Besides sporting a superbly remastered sound, the CD features seven bonus tracks, the most notable of which is an acoustic country-blues demo of the title track. According to Greenbaum, the

song had its genesis in a '60s TV show hosted by Porter Wagener

"It was a 'country' program, but Wagoner always did a gospel song about halfway through the show," he said. "I was always a fan of country-blues, but I started thinking, 'You know, I've never written a gospel song.' The tyrics weren't hard to come by, because I figured if anyone's going to relate to it, it should be about Jesus, as opposed to Buddha, for instance. But as far as the music went, that evolved over a long period of time." He added with a laugh, "The demo on the new CD is close to what the final version became, but then I made it 'industrial when we got into the studio."

Following the original release of Spirit In The Sky, Greenbaum recorded two more albums for Warner Brothers, but by 1972 he had faded from the public eye. After operating a goat farm for a few years, he returned to L.A. in the late '70s to attempt a comeback, but no one was interested. Eventually he settled in northern California, where through the years he has occasionally explored the idea of getting back into recording Meanwhile, he receives reams of e-mail from fans who say his classic song has touched their lives in profound ways.

World's rarest blues record picked up for \$1: What may possibly be the world's rarest blues record was recently purchased at a Tennessee flea market by an Ohio school teacher for \$1. The 1929 Paramount label recording by Bl nd Joe Reynolds is considered priceless by music historians. Sought by collectors since the 1940s, "Ninety Nine Blues" backed with "Cold Woman Blues" has not been seen until now. This 78 rpm record is now in the hands of longtime blues record collector and dealer John Testeller, owner of The World's Rarest Records based in Grants Pass, Ore. With an hour to kill before catching a flight home from a school conference, teacher Bruce Smith wandered into the Nashville Flea Market and found the record in a stack of old 78s. Unaware of its value, he purchased it simply because it "looked interesting.

In searching the Internet, Smith found a reference to a long-lost Blind Joe Reynolds 78. Realizing he had stumbled upon a rare find. Smith contacted Teiteller for an appraisal but ended up selling it to him for an undisclosed amount. As it is the only known copy to exist, Teiteller now refers to "Ninety Nine Blues" as the crown jewel of his collection. Richard Nevins of Yazoo Records, the largest distributor of reissues of classic blues and country music from the 1920s, called "Cold Woman Blues" a "masterpiece." Both sides of the recording have now been remastered and will soon appear on a Yazoo label compilation CD.

"Sometimes songs can be long-lost for good reason — they are not very good and didn't sell well because of it." Tefteller explained. "But not so in this case — this is a great record. Reynolds plays a mean slide and really mumbles his way to immortality on 'Cold Woman Blues.' The significance of this record is mind-boggling! It may not be as important to blues history as finding the long-lost Son House Paramount recording of 'Clarksdale Moan,' but it's real close!"

Legendary blues guitarist Eric Clapton idolized Reynolds and covered one of his other songs, "Outside Woman Blues," while a member of the group Cream on their 1967 album Disracli Gears Tefteller predicted that the record will become a favorite of blues fans worldwide and that someone, maybe even Clapton, will record a new version of it. He has uploaded both sides of the record onto his Web site (www.tefteller.com), and they can be heard there. "I'm just glad to be able to share it with the world," Tefteller concluded.

New Goldmine books back from printers: Several new Goldmine reference books have just been released. Goldmine Record Album Price Guide, 2nd Edition, by Tim Neely

contains nearly 60,000 listings - 50 percent more than the previous edition -- with prices listed in three grades for vinyl albums released from 1948 to 2000. Warman's American Records 1950-2000 - Identification & Price Guide by Goldmine's Collectormania! columnist Chuck Miller is designed as a primer for beginning record collectors or antique and collectibles dealers who only dabble in the format and are looking for basic information as well as longtime collectors looking for information not often presented in other record price guides. The book contains 700 photos plus 16 color pages depicting rare and hard-to-find 45s, 78s and albums. There are chapters on more than 50 collectible genres, record labels and artists, with a price guide listing three grades accompanying each chapter. Music-related books on tap from Goldmine/Krause for later this fall include Standard Catalog Of American Records, 1976-2000, by Neely, a new title that lists vinyl 45s. EPs and albums in three price ranges for more modern artists. The new book is a companion to Standard Catalog Of American Records, 1950-1975, now in its second edition. Also due this fall is Motown. The Golden Years by Goldrune writer Bill Dahl, a complete history of Motown Records with many photos of Motown artists, sheet music and records More information on the latter two books will be published in a future issue of Goldmine. All Goldmine/Krause titles are available at most book stores and many record stores or directly from the publisher (1-800-258-0929: ww.krause.com or www.goldminemag.com).

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## Steppenwolf's John Kay returns to his musical roots

For John Kay, his newest album, Heretics & Privateers, was a decidedly unhurried affair. Speaking to Goldmine from his home base in the hills of Tennessee where he has lived for the past 11 years, Kay described the record's formation as coming together "piecemeal," a process, said Kay, that took two and a half to three years.

Drawing from his early blues and folk influences (which range from Lightnin' Hopkins to Tom Paxton) the record reflects Kay's strong socially conscious bent, which has him writing from a "what's on my mind, what moves me now, what's important to me in my life at this stage" viewpoint. (Something that Kay's wife Jutta clearly recognizes: "She said, 'That album is more you than anything you've ever done,' and I think that's about right," Kay stated.)

Though Kay's image as Steppenwolf's frontman may be a bit on the macho side, he pronounces himself a fan of female performers among his favorites are Shawn Colvin and Rickie Lee Jones — whom Kay sees as imparting "a point of view in their lyrics which is sorely needed and often lacking from the male perspective." Highly opinionated and wellversed on the issues of the day ("I've always had a great interest in history... [and] in current affairs" he stated), Kay is a staunch nonconformist who sees nothing "inherently lowbrow" about people who "have a need to be part of something greater and larger than themselves" yet admitted that "from early on I always felt like I was a loner in terms of my pursuits that if I found like-minded souls who were... going in the same direction of my travels, I very much enjoyed that. By the same token, if I couldn't find anybody, I went on my own."

Passionately outspoken, Kay includes

among his beefs that of mindless consumption, pointing out that young people have been "victimized by having been raised in a mass-consumption society, and they have been plopped in front of the television since they were not even able to speak yet and have been raised with this attempt to imbue them with a permanent sense of dissatisfaction."

Kay, who goes on to describe himself as "somebody who is the very horror of what marketing and promotion and advertising people would like us all to be" is heartened by those who also are able to resist a

structure based on "waste and consumption" and can essentially say, "Less is OK with me, but leave me my life. I do not want a Dilbert cubicle existence. I do not want to perpetually chase the carrot and not have an inner life."

For those who, like himself, are more discriminating in their tastes, Kay advises going beyond the general shallowness of the mainstream media in order to find programming of substance, or more gratifying music for that matter. (For those willing to make the effort, Kay assured, "There's tons of good music out there.")

As for his latest solo material, Kay said he intends to incorporate those songs into Steppenwolf's sets, and he remains understandably proud of his band's influence on fans that



stretches beyond enduring classics such as "Born To Be Wild" and "Magic Carpet Ride" to include select Wolf songs that touch a particular individual in a positive way, whether it's a Vietnam vet relating to a certain lyric or a history teacher letting Kay know that he uses Steppenwolf songs to connect with his troubled students. "For me as a songwriter," said Kay, "those are perhaps my greatest treasures."

## Rare version of Head East's first LP picked up for \$1

Not too long ago I was hitting the garage sales on a Saturday morning. One place had several large boxes of albums. In the last box, there was a copy of the original Head East album Flat As A Pancake on the Pyramid label. I asked what the price on the albums was, and the lady said, "50 cents each." I gave her a dollar and told her to keep the change.

Not long after that Head East was playing in the area, so I took the album cover and a Sharpie® marker, hoping to get it autographed. I was able to catch Mike Somerville right after the soundcheck, and he signed. I had to wait until after the show to get Roger Boyd. When he came out several girls surrounded him and started talking to him. I held up the cover to where he could see it. When he did, his eves widened and he said, "Brother, I will be down to see you in a minute.'

When he came down he took the record and said that he didn't even have one of the original records. He said, "This is what it was supposed to be before A&M came along and screwed it up." The original album had a drawing with a pancake and a pat of butter. He told some of the others standing around that the pancake represented Illinois because of the flat land and that the pat of butter was the Assembly Hall at the University Of Illinois. At the time they recorded the album, they were based out of Champaign, Ill.

He said he had heard that in the bigger cities people were paying \$200 for that very record. I told him that I had seen them play as a local band. I was at McKendree College in Lebanon, Ill., when they played, not long after signing with A&M and going national. He said he remembered that night because A&M people were there, and they were trying to tell them how to perform. We talked for some time, and I told him that a friend of mine had sung backup for him for several shows some years ago.

For a \$1 investment, I think I have gotten some great return on my money already.

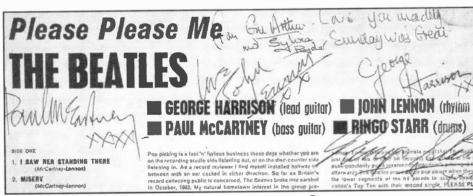

## Beatles rarities up for auction

An autographed Please Please Me album sleeve signed by all four Beatles in 1964 while at a concert in Middleton, Manchester, England is one of the items up for auction at the annual Liverpool Beatles Auction, which takes place Aug. 25, 2001, at the Paul McCartney Auditorium at The Liverpool Institute For Performing Arts. The album sleeve — the back is partially pictured above with the signatures - has an estimated value of £2,500-£3,000 (\$2,800 to \$3,500).

Another auction item is a rare, lownumber (No. 027) U.S. edition of The Beatles' White Album with posters and pictures. Estimated at £2,000-£2,500 (\$3,500 to \$4,000), this particular copy of the White Album was given to Bryn Charlton of Decor Finishes by John Lennon after the Apple Studios were refurbished in 1970.

These two items and others are being offered by The Beatles Shop in Liverpool, which puts the auction together as part of the Beatles Convention held during the August Bank Holiday weekend.

According to The Beatles Shop's Stephen

Bailey, other items in the auction include Beatles concert tickets and programs. Up for auction are a Beatles Juke Box Jury program and ticket stub, each is estimated at £300-£350; a handbill for the Beatles Fan Club night at The Cavern Club held April 5, 1962, estimated at £1,000-£1,200; Mersey Beat Vol. 1, No. 13, January 4-18, 1962, which is The Beatles Pollwinners issue, estimated at £350-£400. There are other Beatles items priced much lower for more casual fans.

"As this is Liverpool, we have lots of original [Beatles] fans from Liverpool who place items into the auction," Bailey commented to Goldmine. "So the auction is ideal for anyone into the early Beatles."

Bailey offered a free copy of the auction catalog to the first 100 Goldmine readers who call or e-mail The Beatles Shop, otherwise the catalogs cost \$5 including postage and packing. he never made any claim to be a jazz musician in the first place and almost never used the term "jazz." So, as Armstrong's centenary is observed, let's revise the revisionists and take a look at him in the way he saw himself and in the way most people saw him during his lifetime.

Whatever Armstrong's accomplishments as an improvising jazz trumpeter (and they are indisputable), his life story is one of nearly unbelievable success that dwarfs the Horatio Alger myth. Born into extreme poverty in New Orleans Aug. 4, 1901, he left an estate worth more than half a million dollars a little less than 70 years later on July 6, 1971. Despite being relatively uneducated, he achieved international renown as a musician, but that was only the beginning. He probably influenced at least as many vocalists with his singing as he did musicians with his trumpet playing, and the combination of the two, along with his ebullient personality, projected his career in other directions: He appeared in 36 films between 1931 and 1969; he was featured in a couple of Broadway musicals; he made frequent guest appearances on radio and television and briefly had his own radio show; and he wrote and published two books and many newspaper and magazine articles. At the same time, he maintained a grueling personal appearance schedule eventually taking in the entire world. Such accomplishments are made all the more remarkable given that he was born an African-American at a time and place in which racial restrictions were extreme. By his example and as a result of his efforts. many of those restrictions were eased.

As such, one is tempted to turn Collier's and Giddins' remarks on their heads and say that if Armstrong had not played a note before 1928 or 1933, his extraordinary impact on millions of lives would be virtually the same.

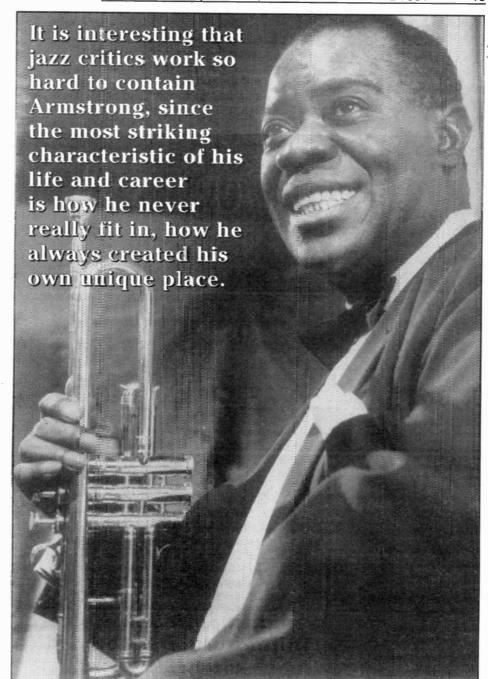
Except, of course, that he had to make it through the first 30 or so years of his life to get there. It is interesting that jazz critics work so hard to contain Armstrong, since the most striking characteristic of his life and career is how he never really fit in, how he always created his own unique place. The circumstances of his early life appear utterly unlikely to lead to the career he had. He was born the illegitimate son of teenagers William Armstrong, a factory worker, and Mary Albert, a domestic worker and possibly a sometime prostitute; his father abandoned the family shortly after his birth, though he didn't leave the neighborhood and made occasional reappearances in his son's life. The accounts of Armstrong's youth, naturally, come mainly from Armstrong himself, and they are anecdotal and sometimes contradictory. He attended school only as far as the fifth grade, enough to learn to read and write but not much else. He turned to music early, singing in a vocal quartet on street corners and, at some point, probably around the age of 11, began playing a tin horn. The first important date in his biography after his birth comes on New Year's Eve/New Year's Day, 1912-1913, when he was arrested for publicly firing a pistol belonging to his mother's current companion and sent to a reformatory, The Colored Waif's Home For Boys.

It is at this point that the story of a poor

black boy growing up in the South in the early years of the 20th century begins to diverge from the typical. Armstrong straightened out during his time at the Waif's Home largely because of the hand, in which he began to become proficient on the cornet. When he came out of the reformatory in June 1914, the 12-year-old had the beginnings of his musical career in his hands. He seems to have spent the next few years largely outside music, however, working primarily on a coal wagon. But he also found occasional work playing his cornet in Kid Ory's band, and he came under the tutelage of cornet player Joe "King" Oliver. In 1918, he appears to have lied about his age, pretending to be a year older than he was when he registered for the draft during World War I, probably, suggests Giddins, to give him false evidence of being old enough to play in clubs, not to become a soldier. For the rest of his life, he claimed to have been born on July 4, 1900, while historians often theorized that he had been born earlier. (His correct date of birth came to light due to a christening record discovered in the 1980s.) At the time of the Armistice, having already replaced Oliver (who had gone north to Chicago) in Ory's band and also joined The Tuxedo Brass Band, he turned to music full time. During this period, he married a prostitute. Daisv Parker. From the winter of 1919 to the fall of

1921. Armstrong regularly worked in pianist Fate Marable's orchestra on a riverboat that went up and down the Mississippi River, an experience he remembered as notable since he learned to read music during this period. He spurned offers to work in Los Angeles and New York, but in the summer of 1922 he accepted Oliver's request that he come to Chicago and join his band, leaving New Orleans by train on Aug. 8. His entry into King Oliver's Creole Jazz Band is a good example of the wav in which he made his own place in a band rather than occupying an existing slot. Jazz bands of the time did not usually employ two cornet players, and Oliver, of course, already played cornet in his own band. Scholars have pondered why he sent for Armstrong at all, not coming up with any better explanation than Armstrong's own - that he was Oliver's protégé. If he had no apparent place in the band's arrangements, he soon found one, working out unison passages with Oliver that thrilled listeners. He also began to attract attention on his own as a soloist. He was encouraged by the band's pianist, Lillian Hardin, whom he married on Feb. 5, 1924, after divorcing his first wife. (This marriage, too, ended in divorce in 1938 and was followed by a third marriage, to Alpha Smith, 1938-42, and a fourth, to Lucille Wilson, that lasted until the end of his life.)

He had made his recording debut with Oliver for Gennett Records in April 1923 and continued to record with the band through October. According to chart researcher Joel Whitburn's book *Pop Memories* (1986), which projects chart positions for the early decades of the 20th century, two of Armstong's recordings with Oliver were commercially successful enough to have reached the charts in 1924, if there had been charts to reach: "Dipper Mouth Blues" (#9, Jan. 19, 1924) and "High Society Rag" (#15,



Jan. 26, 1924). Both had been recorded in Chicago in June 1923 and were released by the independent "race" label OKeh Records. (OKeh was acquired by Columbia Records in November 1926.)

In June 1924, on the advice of his wife. Armstrong quit Oliver's band and began playing with another Chicago bandleader. Ollie Powers: in September, he accepted a draft from bandleader Fletcher Henderson and went to New York. He remained with Henderson for a little over a year, and while he was in New York he appeared as a sideman on a number of recordings. By Whitburn's estimate. several of these recordings are would-be chart entries: "Everybody Loves My Baby (But My Baby Don't Love Nobody But Me)\* (#10, April 4, 1925) and "Cake Walking Babies From Home" (#13, July 25, 1925) by Clarence Williams' Blue Five on OKeh; "The St. Louis Blues" (#3. June 13, 1925), "Careless Love" (#5, Oct. 31, 1925) and "I Ain't Gonna Play No Second Fiddle" (#8, Nov. 28, 1925) by Bessie Smith on Columbia; and "Sugar Foot Stomp" (#8, Oct. 10, 1925) and "Carolina Stomp" (#10, March 20, 1926) by Henderson and His Orchestra on Columbia. Despite all this recording, and even though it sounds odd for a musician to leave a name band with a major label recording contract, Armstrong quit Henderson and returned to Chicago in

The move may not have been as odd as it

sounds. Armstrong was never cut out to be a section man in a Big Band; he was always going to be a soloist or nothing. In New York he had attracted enough attention to himself that within days of his arrival back in Chicago ne was recording under his own name for OKeh, which suggests that the deal was in the works already. Finally, he cited among his complaints against Henderson the bandleader's refusal to let him sing on record (though he apparently allowed it on stage). Such a refusal was understandable at the time. Not only was it unusual to let your trumpeter start singing for anything other than novelty purposes, but also Armstrong had anything but a conventionally pretty singing voice, even in 1925. Yet he wanted to sing, and this desire is a key to understanding his ambition to achieve recognition beyond his ability to play trumpet. Collier, though clearly disapproving, accurately identifies this as an important moment for Armstrong: "...I am persuaded that he very quickly discovered that his singing, more than his cornet playing, drew applause from ordinary audiences. Musicians may have held him in awe for his jazz choruses, but the audience of popular music fans out to dance, drink, and have a good time found his hot singing novel and exciting, and they applauded and shouted for more."

That said, the series of recordings on which Armstrong embarked upon his return to Chicago, many of them featuring his

vocals, are nevertheless the most celebrated of his career among jazz fans. Significantly, although Armstrong now had his own recording contract and had established his name, the band he led in the studio, Louis Armstrong And His Hot Five, was organized only for recordings, while he continued to play live in various bands in Chicago. If he wasn't a section player by nature, neither was Armstrong a bandleader.

The period of 1935-1945 is remembered as the swing or Big Band era, but large ensembles of 10 or more musicians playing jazzy dance music actually had been the dominant configuration for popular musicians since 1920, when bandleader Paul Whiteman scored his first hit. Many bandleaders were also excellent musicians, while some were excellent businessmen and others were singers or other well-known personalities who merely "fronted" their bands. Armstrong was really none of these. He was a soloist who required a backup band to provide musical context and to spot for him now and then so he could take a breather. He made no bones about lacking interest in being a conventional bandleader in either the musical or business sense, throughout his career relying on other musicians and on his managers to

provide, and provide for, his band.

The Hot Five (and later Hot Seven) recordings differed from this formula in the sense that they did employ ensemble playing, at least at first — though as time went on they featured more and more of Armstrong and less and less of his bandmates. At the first session, on Nov. 12, 1925, the group consisted of Kid Ory on trombone, Johnny Dodds on clarinet, Lillian Hardin Armstrong on piano, and Johnny St. Cyr on banjo in addition to Armstrong on cornet. (Shortly afterward, he began making the permanent transition to playing the trumpet.) As criti-

cally acclaimed as the group's recordings are, it is also worth noting that they were also quite popular. Armstrong, writing in his first autobiography, Swing That Music (1936), claimed that they sold about 40,000 copies each. Collier qualifies this, saying of what appears to have been the third disc to be released, "Heebie Jeebies"/"Muskrat Ramble" (OKeh 8300), "It sold, according to various reports, 40,000 copies in a matter of weeks - an excellent sale at a time when a 5,000copy sale was adequate and 10,000 was good." This is the first Armstrong disc to be listed in Whitburn's book (#8, July 17, 1926, charting for two weeks), and it is notable that Whitburn lists the instrumental (and soonto-be standard) "Muskrat Ramble" but not "Heebie Jeebies," the famous Armstrong vocal that supposedly gave birth to scat singing when he dropped the lyric sheet and kept singing anyway.

Whitburn lists eight more Hot Five or Hot Seven recordings as chart items: "Big Butter And Egg Man" (#13, April 9, 1927); "Keyhole Blués" (#16, Oct. 29, 1927); "Potato Head Blues" (#12, Dec. 10, 1927); "Hotter Than That" (#10, May 12, 1928); "Struttin' With Some Barbecue" (#14, July 14, 1928); "West End Blues" (#8, Sept. 15, 1928); "A Monday Date" (#19, Dec. 1, 1928); and "St. James Infirmary" (#15, May 4, 1929). During this period, Armstrong played in various bands in Chicago, though by early 1927 bands were essentially being formed around him in a manner that would continue for the rest of his career.

In the spring of 1929, Armstrong, accompanied by the members of his current band, moved to New York, where he appeared in the Broadway musical Hot Chocolates, singing "Ain't Misbehavin'," which became his next chart single (#7, Sept. 28, 1929, four weeks). The show had opened June 20, and it ran for 219 performances. Simultaneously, he was appearing with his band at the nightclub Connie's Inn in Harlem. After Hot Chocolates closed and the club engagement ended late in the year, he went out on tour with a band organized by pianist Luis Russell. In July 1930, he traveled to Hollywood, where he fronted a band at the nightclub Sebastian's Cotton Club. He returned to Chicago in March 1931 and spent the better part of the next year touring the country. In March 1932, he made a return visit to Hollywood, and he spent July to November in England, his first overseas visit. During this period, he continued to record for OKeh (switching to the main Columbia label in late 1931) and to score occasional chart entries, though since the record business overall was in such dire straits due to the Depression, his records can't have sold much. Music journalist Robert Donaldson Darrell reported in 1931 that his records had sold more than 100,000 copies up to that point. In the first quarter of 1932, his records started to sell much better, with "Chinatown, My Chinatown," "You Can Depend On Me" and "Love, You Funny Thing" all reaching the Top 10 and "All Of Me" going all the way to #1, according to Whitburn. It may have been this increased popularity that led RCA Victor to poach him from Columbia in May; it certainly led Columbia to continue issuing archival releases that resulted in the Top 10 hits "Sweethearts On Parade" and "Body And

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until June 1935.

It was in 1935 that Armstrong took the steps that transformed him from a successful jazz-oriented recording artist and performer into a major star. After a period of bad management, he hooked up with Joe Glaser, who handled him for nearly the rest of his life. Glaser organized his backup bands and got him a new recording contract with the recently formed Decca Records. His debut disc for the label was the double-sided Top 10 hit "I'm In The Mood For Love"/"You Are My Lucky Star" in the fall of 1935, and he continued to place singles in the charts consistently through 1940, including the Top 10 hits 'Lyin' To Myself" (1936), "Public Melody Number One" (1937) (from the movie Artists And Models, in which Armstrong appeared) and "When The Saints Go Marcning In" (1939). Armstrong admirer and movie star Bing Crosby was Decca's top recording star, and he began to arrange for Armstrong's appearances in feature films, starting with his own Pennies From Heaven (1936). On Nov. 7, 1936, Armstrong's first book, Swing That Music, was published.

This was, of course, the swing era, and the argument can be made that Armstrong's sense of swing in his playing helped birth the movement. But his own work remained individual. He was not interested in constructing elaborate swing arrangements for a Big Band or in sharing solo space. Rather, he wanted o play popular songs, hewing to their melodies at first and then taking subtle excursions in melodic line and rhythm with his trumpet before singing the words in his nimitable growl. All of his performances, in all media, were, as they had always been, expressions of his personality; the content

Armstrong's appearances in the charts ecame only occasional after 1940, but they tept coming. In 1946, he returned to the Top 0 in a duet with Ella Fitzgerald on "You Won't Be Satisfied (Until You Break My Heart)." The najor change in his musical approach during he period came in 1947 when, in keeping with he decline of the Big Bands, Glaser disbanded he large ensemble used to back Armstrong for ver a decade and instead formed a small unit. lubbed The All Stars.

Armstrong's recordings, meanwhile, were nade with various backings. In 1946, he had witched back to RCA Victor, but again his tay at the label was unproductive, and he eturned to Decca with another five-year ontract in 1949. His LP Satchmo At ymphony Hall hit the Top 10 in June 1951. ecca seemed primarily interested in treatng him as a pop vocalist, in keeping with urren: trends, and he returned to the Top 0 of the Singles chart backed by Sy Oliver's udio orchestra singing "(When We Are ancing) I Get Ideas." The B-side of the ngle, "A Kiss To Build A Dream On," which rmstrong introduced in the film The Strip, so got into the charts and would become a

perennial favorite, returning to public notice in the 1993 film Sleepless In Seattle.

From the mid-1950s on, Armstrong and The All Stars increasingly toured overseas, primarily Europe and the Far East, though in 1956 he performed in Africa for the first time, and in 1957 he went to South America. Glaser allowed the contract with Decca to expire in 1954 and then took a highly unusual action that has not earned the attention it should have in the record business: He refused to sign Armstrong exclusively to any lahel but made individual deals for specific recording projects. Obviously, one had to be a star of Armstrong's magnitude to make such a deal work, but it is interesting that such a policy has been followed so rarely. (Crosby, however, did the same thing when his Decca contract ran out two years later.) Columbia Records agreed to meet Glaser's price and got the acclaimed Louis Armstrong Plays W.C. Handy as a result, followed by Satch Plays Fats (Waller), which became a Top 10 hit in October 1955. Columbia also had Armstrong cut "Mack The Knife," which rose into the Top 40 of the Singles charts in early 1956, giving him his biggest hit in more than three years. That fall, he was back in the Top 40 with a version of "Blueberry Hill" originally recorded in 1949 for Decca and reissued in the wake of Fats Domino's hit cover of the song.

For record company executives, the good thing about Armstrong's unaffiliated status was that you could record him and that he'd do whatever you wanted him to do. Norman Granz, head of Verve Records, made a series of recordings with Armstrong alone and with Armstrong and Fitzgerald, including the LP Ella And Louis, which reached the charts in December 1956. In an interview with this writer conducted 40 years later in preparation for the reissue of this material on the box set The Complete Ella Fitzgerald & Louis Armstrong On Verve, Granz explained how the sessions came about.

"Louis was coming into Los Angeles to do some shows," he recalled, "and I called up Glaser and said I had an idea of recording Louis with Ella, and how much did he want and what kind of royalties did he want. It was a business transaction. Joe, at least on whatever I did with his artists, rarely got into the aesthetics of it. He didn't say, 'What is he going to do, what's the material?' or anything like that. He simply concerned himself with the economics of it."

The bad thing was that Armstrong was on the road perpetually, which meant he was often tired and didn't have much time.

"I think I literally might have only a day or two days to do an album," Granz noted, "which wasn't Joe's problem. He simply said [for example], 'Well, he's available June the 10th. You can have him June the 10th."

Decca Records producer Milt Gabler overcame these disadvantages by paying extra. When he planned to record the four-LP box set Satchmo: A Musical Autobiography Of Louis Armstrong, on which he had Armstrong re-record many of his old songs, he booked Armstrong and his band with Glaser as if they were playing a series of gigs for the multiple recording sessions in December 1956 and January 1957, rather

than just getting them on an off day.

The recording of the biggest hit of Armstrong's career was more typical, however. In 1963, Jack Lee, who worked for publisher E.H. Morris and was a friend of Glaser's, hired Armstrong to record a demo of the title song for an upcoming Broadway musical, Hello, Dolly!. He dutifully cut the track Dec. 3, 1963, in New York and immediately went back on the road. Under the mistaken impression that Dave Kapp, a former executive at Decca who now ran his own Kapp Records, had released Armstrong records in the past. Lee took the tape to Kapp, who agreed to release it. It appeared in January 1964, the same month that the show opened, and it took off. hitting #1 in May. Kapp qu ckly rushed Armstrong into a studio to cut enough tracks to make up a Hello, Dolly! LP, and the album was #1 in June.

Something similar happened three years later with Armstrong's last major hit, "What A Wonderful World." The song was written by record producer Bob Thiele and George Weiss, and Thiele, who then worked for ABC-Paramount, made the usual deal with Glaser, getting Armstrong for the union scale of \$250, he recalled. As he told this writer in an interview for Goldmine published on Dec. 11, 1992, the president of the record company turned up at the session Aug. 16, 1967, and questioned Thiele's judgment in having Armstrong record a ballad after he had had a hit with the up-tempo "Hello, Dolly!.' He even wanted to call off the session and was only dissuaded by Thiele. When his nemesis criticized the record again at a marketing meeting, Thiele quit the company in anger. Nevertheless, ABC-Paramount released "What A Wonderful World," which went on to become an international hit, reaching #1 in the U.K., for example, on April 27, 1968. Now, of course, ABC-Paramount, like Kapp earlier, wanted enough tracks for an LP. Glaser's asking price? A markup multiple of 100 to \$25,000. Oddly enough, "What A Wonderful World" did not hit in the U.S. for 20 years, when it was featured in the period movie Good Morning Vietnam. Then it rose into the Top 40. A version with an overdubbed saxophone solo by Kenny G reached the Singles sales charts in 1999, extending Armstrong's chart span to 75 years. (If you include the jazz charts in



this estimation, his span is up to 77 years, including 2001.)

In 1969, Armstrong went to London and recorded "We Have All The Time In The World," the theme song for the James Bond movie On Her Majesty's Secret Service. In the fall of 1994, after it was used in a Guinness beer commercial on British TV. the 25-year-old recording climbed into the U.K. Top 10.

Arnistrong worked less frequently in the late 1960s, as his health deteriorated. But he insisted on working as long as he was able, completing an engagement at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York only two months before his death from kidney and heart failure.

It can be the fate of true innovators, if they live long enough, to be overtaken by their own innovations, now codified. Armstrong, or a ghost writer, titled the opening chapter of his first autobiography "Jazz And I Get Born Together." But he actually predated jazz, and if his improvisational

expressiveness — exemplified by an amazing ability to restructure melodies and toy with rhythm on the spot — served as a catalyst in the development of jazz, nevertheless Armstrong never observed the rules his jazz followers claim he helped write.

As jazz evolved over his lifetime, through swing, bebop and increasingly radical styles — its practitioners always claiming him as a fountainhead — Armstrong not only failed to fall in step, he sometimes made fun of the successive changes. His lack of interest in keeping up with the latest trends in the music he partially began was mirrored by his disaffection for the increasingly militant political stands of fellow African-Americans who viewed his ingratiating manner as servile.

Though he could express anger over racial injustice when he felt it — famously, over the integration battle in Little Rock, Ark., in 1957 — as with music, he came from an earlier generation than the one that

was protesting, and he was not interested in its methods, even if he shared its goals. But beyond this, he simply didn't fit in. He couldn't be part of a political movement any more than he could be part of a musical movement. His genius lay in his ability to stand apart without offending. It didn't seem to matter whether a trumpet solo worked subtle variations on a melody or consisted of a run of high C's, whether his deep, gravelly voice found new meanings in lyrics or just scatted nonsense syllables. What mattered was the creation of a unique performance that was pleasing to listeners.

Armstrong scholars often note (some of them disparagingly) his desire for applause and approval. If that was his true goal, it was one he met right up to the end of his life and well beyond.

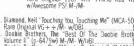

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# Jazz Sides

Tean-Luc Ponty has had no rivals in creating a role for the violin in progressive rock and fusion. Frank Zappa flaunted Ponty's unique sound by using him on Hot Rats and Overnite Sensation, later producing Ponty's solo effort, King Kong in 1970.

Ponty's work with Mahavishnu Orchestra and string of solo albums over the last three decades has established him as jazz violin's most noted player since Stephane Grappelli. Life Enigma, Ponty's first studio album of original material since 1993's No Absolute Time, revives the sound of his two most popular albums, Enigmatic Ocean and Cosmic Messenger, though a strong African influence evident on other Ponty projects is also prominent. Ponty is releasing the album on his own label, JLP Productions.

Do you still live in France?

I'm based in both New York and France. Whenever I tour in Europe I stop at my base over there, but for the first time in many, many years I've started to spend more time there.

How did your interest in African music come about?

When I was touring Europe in the late '80s, I visited France. I was really disconnected from the scene there, having lived in

California since 1973. The local scene was

when I started in the mainstream jazz circles playing bebop. When I got interested in jazz back in the late '50s, beloop and hard bop were the styles I listened to. It was hardedged, more intricate music than what Stephane Grappelli and all the swing players were doing. I never was a student of Grappelli or swing music. I was able to adapt my playing to bebop's phrasing and harmonic improvisation, but there was some prejudice from those players who didn't see an amplified violin being as valid as the trumpet or saxophone. I had no choice but to amplify the instrument. If I wanted to play like a horn player with a rhythm section, with a drummer, that establishes a volume an acoustic string player cannot overcome. So, I was more welcome among the progressive rock and fusion players who were playing amplified music.

So who were your influences, if not violinists such as Grappelli?

My influences were horn players, starting with Clifford Brown and the '50s- and '60s-era Miles Davis, also Thelonious Monk and Bill Evans. There were no modern influences who played the violin. My biggest influence on violin would have to be Stuff Smith, who didn't have the technique of Grappelli or Joe Venuti, but he had such a punch, such a hard

drive. He'd hit notes on the violin like vou'd hit notes on a trumpet. My interest wasn't in doing what the previous swing players had done, adapting the

Jean-Luc Ponty music to the

instrument by playing in a string environment at soft volume - like Grappelli's Hot Club of France, with all acoustic string instruments and no drums. My interest was in going the other way, to force and push the violin, to mold it into another instrument so it would have a more aggressive and powerful sound.

How did your album King Kong go over when it came out?

I think it made a very strong impact. At the time it was recorded I was still living full time in France, so after recording it in California I went back to France and had absolutely no clue of what was going on in the states. But when I came back in the early '70s, everyone I met in the business - the radio programmers, the record companies everybody was mentioning King Kong. It sold pretty well for the time.

What are your recollections about playing with Mahavishnu Orchestra?

It was a thrill to work with John McLaughlin's band. George Duke and I had collaborated with Frank Zappa in '73, because he wanted some strong instrumentalists in his band. Zappa had an intricate style of music to perform. But after a while



he was losing his audience and he had to eliminate most of what he was doing and come back to what he was known for - the satire and the rock crowd. So when John called with an offer, I was interested. In fact, he told me he had considered me for the first band lineup, but I was living in Europe then. He had no money at the time, no budget, no guarantee that the band would go over, so he couldn't afford to bring me over. So he chose Jerry Goodman, who I though: did a great job. But when John saw that I was in the U.S. with Zappa, he contacted me. With him, I was in the right place because the band exclusively played instrumental music. But it was his band and his compositions, so after a year I was itching to release a lot of my own material that I'd accumulated. When I got a record deal, I decided to take a chance with my own group.

Did McLaughlin come to know your playing through hearing you in Zappa's band?

No, he knew of me before then. Being British, he read the English jazz magazines that wrote about all the European jazz performers, and he listened to European jazz radio. I met John when he was with Tony Williams. Right after Williams left Miles Davis, he started Lifetime. He had seen McLaughlin play in England, and he flew him over to play with him. That's when I met them both. I saw them playing in New York in '69, when I was making the King Kong album. I stopped in New York actually to check out the band. I introduced myself, and Tony Williams invited me to join Lifetime. But I had to fly back to France because I had some engagements I couldn't get out of. Later, when I was with the Mothers Of Invention, we did a whole U.S. tour with the Mahavishnu Orchestra, and that was when John found out I was living in the states.

Why did you start your own label?

It was done to guarantee that I have total artistic freedom for the few years I have left to be productive. When I started in the '70s, I had complete artistic control. I was young and inexperienced, but I had a budget given to me and I didn't have to consult anyone about what I recorded. I just handed the tape to the record company. Twenty-five years later, even after selling a few million albums, I have to seek the approval of a label's A&R

Jazz is an American music, right? Guess again. Two new albums suggest that the music not only resonates far beyond U.S. borders, it is different when made overseas. The first case in point is Somewhere Else Before by E.S.T. (Columbia CK 85834), the domestic debut of a Swedish piano trio. The second is Gigi (Palm P2A 2068), the Palm Pictures debut of Ejigayehu "Gigi" Shibabaw, a stunning Ethiopian singer whose album boasts a gaggle of jazz luminaries under the umbrella of world beat. Neither album could have been made by an American; the E.S.T. record is strikingly non-bluesy (there's nary a minor chord to be heard), and Gigi's album, though intensely rhythmic, is at least as Asiansounding as it is African.

I don't know exactly what to make of E.S.T.'s Somewhere Else Before, a recording that was done acoustically by pianist Esbörn Svensson, bassist Dan Berglund, and drummer Magnus Oström, then overlaid with effects. It's intriguing, if not particularly swinging; hypnotic, if not quite compelling. It contains the occasional groove ("Dodge The Dodo" and "Spam Boo Limbo" are pretty damn snappy), a heavy dose of the rhapsodic (the title track and "Pavane [Thoughts of a Septuagenarian]"), some cool effects and indisputable musicianship. The titles, too, are provocative, particularly "From Gagarin's Point Of View" and "The Return Of Mohammed." But I suspect that E.S.T., despite being a crossover product with deep geek appeal, may not connect that well with the jazz fan. It's a tad polite and a tad cold, despite likeable tunes such as "The Wraith" and the pretty "The Face Of Love." Nevertheless, it's a curious work, collecting the best of E.S.T.'s last two Swedish albums (they've recorded six there) and spicing them with a "hidden," unnamed final track that lingers in the memory. The tunes are open-ended, even eccentric, the playing imaginative; the way E.S.T. layers processed bass and programmed drum is intriguing, suggesting the group is the missing link between straight-ahead jazz and jam bands who don't know when to stop. Worth hearing and worth thinking about.

Gigi is a decidedly more diverse affair. Produced by ubiquitous studio atmosphericist Bill Laswell, it consists of 13 tunes sung in Shibabaw's native Amharic, a language that seems inherently melodious. Her voice is rangy and supple, her phrasing embracing, her touch light. Horn-laden tracks such as "Tew Ante Sew" and the roaring, frenetic "Zomaye" swing like mad; others traverse high-life, hint at reggae and are always soulful. Complicated, too, which isn't surprising considering Gigi gets help from a trophy cast of modern jazz players including saxophonists Wayne Shorter and Henry Threadgill, guitarist Nicky Skopelitis and percussionists Ayid Dieng and Karsh Kale.

Amharic isn't the most common language, but Gigi's music speaks in the universal tongues of jazz.

## On the racks

THELONIOUS MONK Monk In Tokyo Columbia/Legacy (C2K 63538)

Live At The Jazz Workshop — Complete Columbia/Legacy (C2K 65189)

The Columbia Years '62-'68 Columbia/Legacy (C3K 64887)

There are qualities in Thelonious Monk's artistry that have no parallel in any other jazz musician's work. His odd style perfectly represents the pianist's eccentric personality (he was noticeably impaired by mental illness), yet his dissonant chords and quirky phrasing are so succinct that even jazz novices can appreciate, rather than tolerate, his angularity. Monk could be pensive and unhurried ("'Round Midnight") or nursery rhyme-simple ("Blue Monk"), both characteristics generally at odds with the fierce sensibilities of bebop — the jazz style with which he is associated - making him a peculiar figure among the peculiar stable of bop players. So iconoclastic is his style that it's obvious who's playing literally two bars into any Monk recording.

Columbia/Legacy gives us nearly 70 of his cuts on these three releases - Monk In Tokyo, Live At The Jazz Workshop and The Columbia Years - almost a third of the material either previously unreleased or available here for the first time in unedited form. Tokyo was recorded in 1963, a year after Monk had signed with Columbia, during his first tour of Japan. The appreciative audience fueled Monk, tenorman Charlie Rouse, bassist Butch Warren, and drummer Frankie Dunlop into some extended takes far more satisfying than the studio versions. "Straight, No Chaser" runs nearly 10 minutes, "Hackensack" 11, and "Blue Monk" more than 13 minutes. Jazz Workshop, recorded the following year in San Francisco, is also a double-disc set. Monk and Rouse are accompanied by Larry Gales and Ben Riley on bass and drums, the two having come up from L.A. for the engagement. (Rouse traveled with him to each date, but Monk's contract required that a rhythm section be hired at each stop.) Though the program is less energetic than Tokyo, there is an engaging intimacy in the material, as if the band was entertaining itself, oblivious to the audience. Columbia Years is the release of greatest benefit to those whose shelves are lacking Monk titles. The triple-CD set offers 31 tracks that, as opposed to the impossibly brief The Essence Of Thelonious Monk released by the label in 1991, much more thoroughly represents the pianist's catalog of songs and variety of band formats.

BOBBY BROOM Modern Man Delmark (DE-530)

Though guitarist Bobby Broom has a hell of a résumé — performing with Miles Davis, Sonny Rollins, and Art Blakey for starters — his earlier recordings give few clues as to why Broom had been called upon by the aforementioned jazz deities. The answer is right here in *Modern Man*, where Broom, organist Dr. Lonnie Smith, baritone saxman Ronnie Cuber and drummer Idris Muhammad churn out some dark and intense interpretations of some unlikely material. Alongside Broom's compositions are introspective versions of

Stevie Wonder's "Superstition," Burt Bacharach's "I'll Never Fall In Love Again," and, best of all, the Eric Clapton staple "Layla," which works so well when read as a bluesy, hardbop piece that it's a wonder no one thought to try it before.

GREG OSBY Symbols Of Light (A Solution) Blue Note Records (7213 5 31395 2 0)

Saxophonist Greg Osby, always up for a new angle, here couples his sax/piano/bass/drums quartet with the equal weight of two violins, a viola and cello. Unlike the way strings and jazz usually work together, the latter quartet doesn't support, they interact. Sometimes the results are slightly outside ("The Keep," "Social Order") and bring to mind Ornette Coleman's Skies Of America, and other times the interaction is as attractive and intricate ("M," "Wild Is The Wind") as the Stan Getz/Eddie Sauter project, Focus. One of Osby's best outings since his days in the M-Base movement.

people. And, frankly, I don't want to go through that. There was a major company who liked my new album very much and offered me a major deal. It was a difficult decision to make. It's not easy to take a risk and put it out yourself. But I want to do the projects I want to do without any interference. At my age, I don't know how long I'm going to be able to go, not only for physical reasons but also because I'll only go on as long as I feel the creative juices still flowing. If I'm not feeling inspired, I'd rather retire.

Does that make you feel hopeless about the future of unique music?

Well, to begin with, I don't blame the A&R people. They're scared for their jobs. It's greed that drives all these megacompanies. Jazz and classical music means nothing to these monster organizations. But there are technologies coming about, like digital radio where you have a choice of a hundred stations, that will allow all styles of music to be represented. This should allow young musicians to create and play their best without having to worry about fitting into a commercial format.

What is your assessment of what you see going on in jazz today?

I see two different movements, one being what some call the neo-bebop movement. But I also see a new trend, what they call electrojazz, that's going very strong in Europe. These are young jazz musicians who have understood and absorbed the jazz language but they are using the tools of today - like sampling. Not all of the new music coming out in Europe is necessarily taking the best way to go, but at least they are experimenting. Jazz is so much a part of the American culture - it was born here, and there are still incredible players coming out of this country. But because of so many exceptional musicians coming out of Europe, jazz is becoming more of a universal kind of music.

## **Obituaries**

Ron Townson, The 5th Dimension

Ron Townson, portly founding member of the pop group The 5th Dimension, died of renal failure at his home in Las Vegas, Nev., Aug. 2, 2001, after a four-year battle with kidney disease. He was 68.

Born in St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 20, 1933, Townson began singing as a youngster in church choirs, eventually touring with the renowned Wings Over Jordan for eight years. He subsequently attended Lincoln

University in Jefferson, Mo., working his way through school by conducting university and church choirs.

Townson moved to Los Angeles in 1957 to pursue a career in music. Early on, he toured with Dorothy Dandridge and Nat King Cole, appeared in the film *Porgy & Bess* (1959) and conducted his own acapella choir, The Celestial Choir Of 35 Voices.

In 1965, Townson and childhood friend Lamonte McLemore formed a singing group called The Versatiles, recruiting Billy Davis Jr., Florence LaRue, and Marilyn McCoo to fill out the lineup. At the suggestion of Townson's wife, they changed their name to the hipper-sounding 5th Dimension and signed with Johnny River's Soul City record label.

Blending pop, jazz, gospel and soul with heavenly harmonizing, The 5th Dimension won Grammys for Best Performance By A Pop Group as well as Record Of The Year in both in 1967 (for "Up-Up And Away") and in 1969 (for "Aquarius/Let The Sunshine In"). Other significant hits included "Stoned Soul Picnic," "Wedding Bell Blues" and "One Less Bell To Answer" (in all, they reached the Top 40 on the Pop chart 20 times between 1967 and 1973).

Lead vocalists McCoo and Davis left The 5th Dimension in 1976 to record as a duo. Continuing on with replacements, the group would eventually go through numerous personnel changes, with Townson leaving for a while in the late '70s to form Ron Townson And Wild Honey. Declining health forced Townson to retire permanently from The 5th Dimension in 1997.

Townson is survived by his wife of 44 years, Bobette, and a son, Kyle.

David Lee Gilbert, rock 'n' roll singer

David Lee Gilbert, the colorful vocalist in the Detroit hard-rock quintet Rockets, died Aug. 1, 2001, from cirrhosis and liver cancer at Waterford, Mich. He was 49.

Born in Pontiac, Mich., Gilbert sang with several rock bands in the area as a teenager. In the early 1970s, Gilbert joined the Rockets, a group that also had several former members of Mitch Ryder And The Detroit Wheels. The group scored three Top 100 national hits, "Oh Well" (#30), "Can't Sleep" (#51) and "Desire" (#70), which led to a national tour with The Who. After a decade together, the group disbanded in 1983. Gilbert then sang with a succession of Michigan groups including Roadhouse.

Gilbert is survived by a wife, son and daughter.

## Spirit In The Sky review

NORMAN GREENBAUM Spirit In The Sky Varèse Sarabande (302 066 229 2)

Only the most ornery of contrarians would dispute the fact that Norman Greenbaum's "Spirit In The Sky" is one of rock's most enduring golden nuggets. If for no reason other than that, then, it's preposterous that the album that featured the song has never been available on CD in the U.S. - until now. In addition to sporting the requisite remastering, this lovingly packaged reissue of Greenbaum's 1970 solo debut adds three "non-album" singles and three previously unreleased demos, with an early radio promo ad tacked on for good measure. The most notable of these perks, an acoustic country-blues rendition of the ever-ubiquitous title song, probably warrants the price of the CD in and of itself.

Revisiting the album, it's clear that Greenbaum deserved a better fate than the one-hit wonder status to which he was relegated. Though nothing on the remainder of Spirit In The Sky approaches the elegant, haiku-like simplicity of the title track (after all, what could?), several songs evidence the sort of pop smarts that should have made for a lengthy career.

High points include the horn-fueled, funk-lite excursion "Junior Cadillac," the psychedelic-synth laced "Alice Bodine" and jugband ditty "Milk Cow," but many fine moments occur on the bonus tracks as well. "Children Of Paradise," for instance, sounds like vintage Todd Rundgren tackling a Broadway tune, while the gritty "Canned Ham" (the follow-up single to "Spirit") boasts a hook that brings to mind the work of John Sebastian in The Lovin' Spoonful.

Not surprisingly, hovering over the lot is the sort of drippy-hippy vibe that was indigenous to the times in which *Spirit In The Sky* was conceived. Nonetheless, there's enough substance here to merit a reconsideration of Greenbaum's one-trick pony reputation. Great as "Spirit In The Sky" (the song) is, you can't help wonder what Greenbaum might've gone on to accomplish had he not been saddled with that albatross.

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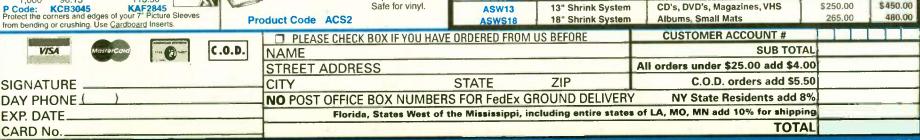


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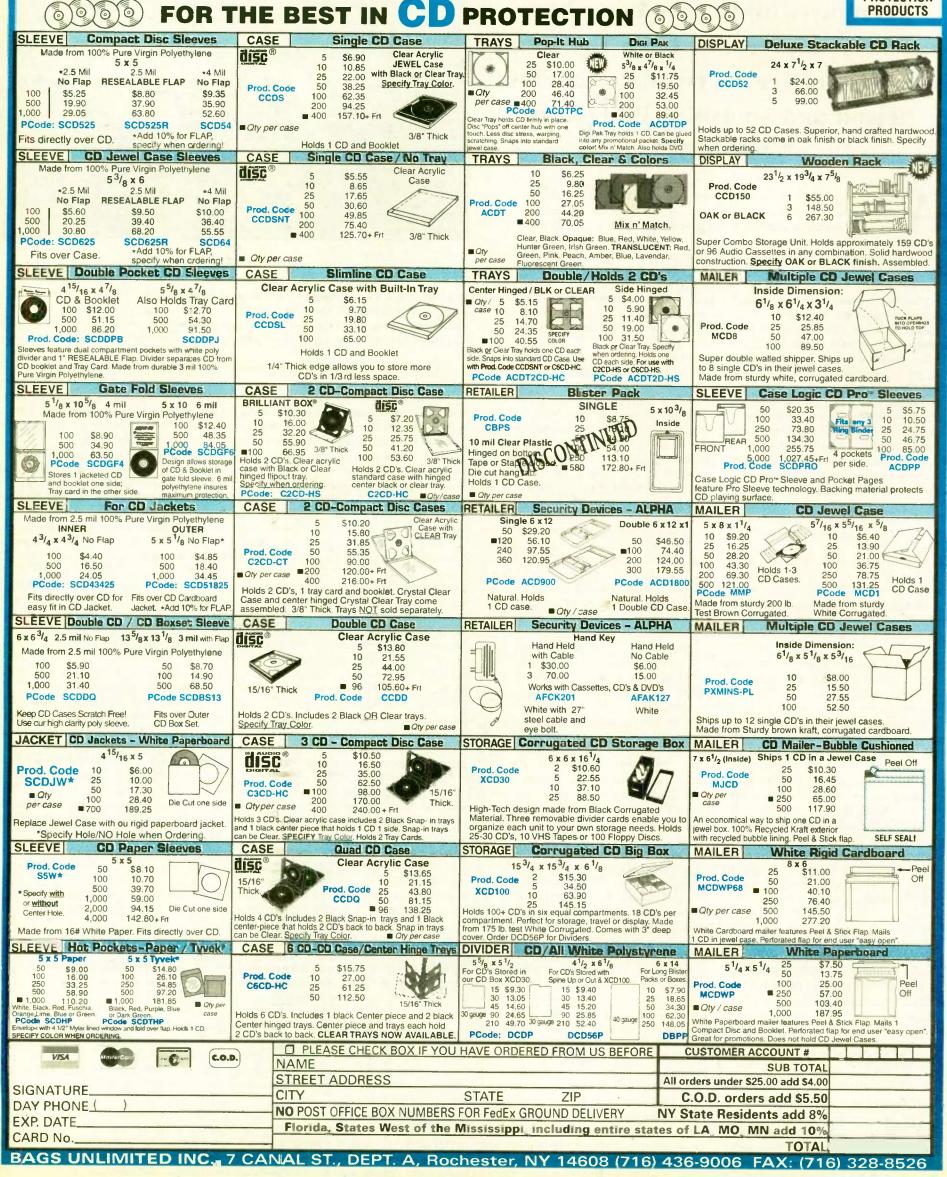


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## Arif Mardin

## Grammy-winning producer has worked with everyone from The Young Rascals and Aretha Franklin to Willie **Nelson and Smashing Pumpkins** by Bruce Sylvester

major mover behind the scenes, producer/arranger Arif Mardin has garnered six Grammys, 15 Grammy nominations and more than 40 gold and platinum records since the '60s. His #1 records range from The Rascals' "Good Lovin" to Average White Band's "Pick Up The Pieces" to Bette Midler's "Wind Beneath My Wings." The man seemingly can work in any genre at all and enjoy it.

Born in Instanbul, Turkey, March 15, 1932, he graduated from Instanbul University and attended the London School Of Economics before jazz brought him to America and then to Atlantic Records (cofounded by Ahmet and Neshui Ertegun, sons of a Turkish diplomat). After 38 years, he's now a senior vice-president at Atlantic with a contract allowing him to produce for other labels too. Relaxed and gracious, Mardin tells Goldmine about his early jazz thrills, his evolving career at Atlantic, his philosophy in the studio and how he deals with divas.

Goldmine: Going from Aretha Franklin to Barbra Streisand to Jewel to Smashing Pumpkins, what have you done consistently, and what has been specific to individual acts?

Arif Mardin: I don't have a signature sound like Phil Spector did in the '60s. Every artist is different. I like to maximize their potential. I rehearse with the piano player and select the best key for the artist so he or she will shine with energy; low keys give you lethargy — it becomes la-de-da rather than energy. Young artists often need guidance. When you work with divas, it's different. Aretha and Barbra Streisand already know how to maximize their potential. I respected their genius. My secret is that I respect the artist's creativity and they respect me.

You've said that you won't work with an artist whom you don't respect. Is mutual respect crucial in producing records?

Definitely. We talk about minor details which could be very important in a song: Should this interlude be eight bars or four? That's important because you may lose the audience by making something too long. Or it might be a fantastic enhancement.

Where exactly is your thrill at work?

The thrill is to work with great singers. I don't think I've worked with anyone I didn't like — those great ladies [mentioned above], Patti Labelle, Willie Nelson, John Prine, the late Donny Hathaway. They're all artists in their own right.

Who's the best act you've ever worked with? [Laughing] Do you want me to be killed by the others?

You've said that the most important thing is to get 200 percent from the artist. How do you do that?

Most artists give that to me. Geniuses give it to me without my saying anything. Bette Midler

will explore every avenue because she approaches a song from its character since she's a great actress. "What is the song saying? How can I express the power of the lyrics?" she'll ask herself. I don't have to say anything because she's already doing it. I'm looking for vocal energy, not to the point of a screech. Aretha knows exactly what she's doing. If she's not happy, us mortals will say, "Oh, what a vocal!" and she'll say, "No, no. I have to do it again."

Are there limits beyond which you shouldn't push an artist in the studio? Do their performances lose their soul after too many takes?

Definitely. In the old, old days, we'd do the track three or four times with the artist singing with the band. You'd choose the best take in terms of the vocal. If there was a guitar mistake, you'd correct it. Today the vocalist still sings with the band but does three or four more vocals to make it more correct or more inspired. I never do 20 or 30 vocal tracks. They mean that the artist isn't good. Today you may have a beautiful girl or handsome young man who has charisma with the record-buying public but isn't a good vocalist. Before modern technology, those people had to do a lot of vocal tracks. Today digital corrections and automatic pitch control make these people sing in tune.

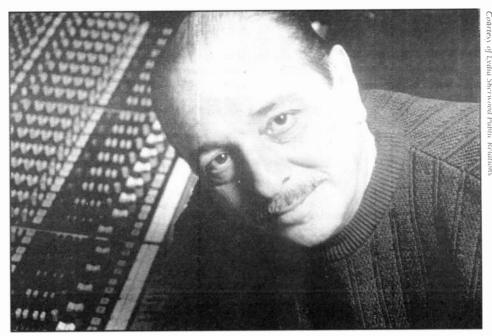
Where do you get your musical ideas?

I read and listen to the lyrics. For me, every song is like a minute film. The lyrics tell me what orchestration I should use. Go with the song, with the lyrics. I have to know what genre I'm working with. Is it a R&B market or country or pop? Are 14-year-old girls buying the record? To whom am I selling this record?

Is it a struggle to produce in so many genres? Not for me. If an artist is sincere, I can do it, be it Willie Nelson or Chaka Khan. I can work with steel guitars, hip-hop technology, whatever.

What were your musical origins? How did Dizzy Gillespie get one of your compositions in 1956?

His orchestra was on a State Department tour of the Middle East. When they came to Instanbul, I became a jazz groupie, traveling with them from city to city. I wrote an arrangement and asked him to play it. He did it in a rehearsal. He gave me pointers. It was incredible to have my composition played by this wonderful orchestra. I made friends with Quincy Jones, who was its arranger and trumpet player. I watched him arrange in his hotel and thought, "Wow, what a guy!" When the orchestra returned to the States, I was emboldened by this friendship and wrote four pieces, arranged them, copied them myself and sent them to a friend at Voice Of America and asked him to contact Quincy Jones. Quincy got a great team including Art Farmer and Hank Jones to do a transcription of them for broadcast by Voice Of America. It wasn't

an actual record. Then Quincy sent the tape to the Berklee School Of Music in Boston, which had a scholarship in his name. He said, "I've found the recipient for my scholarship."

Did being Turkish help you in getting hired at Atlantic?

Well, yes and no. It was a Turkish club there. Neshui followed my career, watching me grow, but I didn't know. He heard my compositions played by The International Youth Orchestra at a Newport festival. I think he arranged for me to get a scholarship to a three-week music seminar in the Berkshires, in Lenox, Mass. The late John Lewis headed the faculty. Max Roach and Lee Konitz taught there. Neshui heard the faculty play a piece I'd written and realized that I had jazz arranging skills, so he invited me to work at Atlantic. He was a great guy, a jazz enthusiast, a

I started at the bottom as a gopher, an assistant to Neshui. Slowly I was given chores like cataloging the backlog of unreleased jazz tapes. Next I had to learn to mix — which then meant from multitrack to mono — by watching Tom Dowd, a legendary engineer. Then as studio manager I got involved in booking sessions, quality control and pressing plant issues. They knew I was an arranger, but nobody used me as one then. One day they heard my work played at a BMI award ceremony and were surprised, so I got my first arranging gig writing string and horn arrangements for Atlantic acts.

How did you get your first pop production assignment with The Rascals?

The Rascals wanted somebody with a music education and engineering skills. Atlantic said, "Well, Arif's a Berklee graduate. He can help you with your arrangements." So The Rascals and I became a team. When their first record I was involved with, "Good Lovin'," became #1, I was bitten by the pop bug, so jazz went to the back burner. I was associate producer with Jerry Wexler on some of Aretha's records. Then we branched into three-way production with acts we'd bring to Muscle Shoals or Memphis, as on Dusty Springfield's Dusty In Memphis.

Why might an album have more than one producer?

The uniformity of the sound has to be guaranteed by the mastering engineer by equalizing the record when a team of producers work on one record. Let's compare it to songwriting by Gamble And Huff or Motown's Holland-Dozier-Holland or Lieber And Stoller. One writes the lyric, the other the music. They have

different strengths. There's a division of labor. In coproducing, one might work with the vocalist while the other does the arrangements. Jerry Wexler, being a senior producer, had a lot of say in picking songs, which is the most important aspect of the production. You commission a song or you speak to publishers or you cover other people's songs. For Aretha Franklin, he told Carole King, "Write me a song about being a natural woman." He gave her the title "A Natural Woman."

In these situations I'd generally be in the studio, pencil and paper in hand, notating how Aretha's left hand was playing a bass line. The bass player would look at that and duplicate her piano playing. For the guitarist, I'd look at her right hand to see how she's playing the chords. Usually with Aretha, the arrangements stemmed from her gospel piano playing. The band became an extension of her hands. My job was to put everything together. I'd have on headphones and communicate with Jerry in the control booth, who'd say, "The tempo isn't right," and Tom Dowd at the controls would give his opinion. It was definitely a joint effort.

As a jazz man, have you sneaked jazz elements into non-jazz discs?

Not only jazz. Also weird avant-garde things that nobody would dare do but in the end, they added to the records' commerciality. I wrote a little interlude in 7/8 or 7/4 that's repeated in The Bee Gees' "Jive Talking," so the beat gets turned around, but it was catchy, so it was fine. I've used modern jazz chords for coloring here and there. As long as it's within the context of a pop or R&B record, it's good.

Have you ever stuck any Turkish music into a track?

Once years ago in some arrangements with Herbie Mann. I don't, but maybe I should.

What would be your dream project?

Maybe to have a concert or record with all the divas I've worked with. It would be like chronicling my life's work.

What do you do for Jun? What do you sec yourself doing in your retirement years?

I'm writing my memoirs. I've composed a one-act opera. My wife is taking me to the fiords in Norway. We have a lot of friends, party a lot, go to the theater.

For what do you want to be remembered after you've retired?

I'd like to be respected.

THE MOCKERS Living In The Holland Tunnel One Eye Open (OEO-0609)

Six years is a bit too long to wait between albums, but Living In The Holland Tunnel, the second full-length release from Virginia Beach's phenomenal pop combo The Mockers, does prove worth the wait. While the group's 1995 debut, Somewhere Between Mocksville And Harmony, was a pretty nice album to begin with, Living In The Holland Tunnel is its superior, an authoritative effor: driven by jangly urgency and a compelling sense that maybe the listener should just turn his/her stereo up a little bit louder and revel in its pure pop glory.

As should be expected from a group that takes its name from a line in A Hard Day's

Night, The Mockers are a pop group through and through, their music produced with an overt awareness of The Beatles (both pre- and post-Sgt. Pepper), The Kinks, Todd Rundgren and '70s power pop. Yet nothing is surrendered to mere retro revival; no move is by rote, no moment seems calculated to pander to cultish nostalgia. Not a single note is played with anything less than absolute conviction in the here and now. The Mockers draw partial inspiration from the past, but no one could ever mistake Living In The Holland Tunnel for anything other than a contemporary work.

Coproduced by the band with alt-pop granddaddy Mitch Easter (plus two songs coproduced by Brad Jones, another Name To Reckon With in underground pop circles), the overall sound is terrific: Guitars, bass and drums punch you in the gut, where they

should, and more subtle instrumentation envelops you when that's more appropriate.

The songs — all Mockers originals, each written by either rhythm guitarist/ keyboardist Seth Gordon or bassist Tony Leventhal - employ the expected pop traditions (soaring choruses, irresistible harmonies, the prerequisite big-ass hooks) while remaining defiantly individual.

"More Important Things" kicks the album off with a suitably forceful statement of intent ("Man, I'm sick of all this garbage... I'm gonna spend my time right now on more important things"), and the 11 songs that follow deliver as promised.

The insistent riff of "C'mon Over To My Side" (reprised from The Mockers' 1997 Smells Like Spain EP) recalls the early Kinks. but without resorting to any actual nick of "You Really Got Me," "All Day And All Of The Night" or "I Need You."

Best of show is the album-closing "Sunflowers," a delightful explosion of self-determined optimism. Along the way, we're treated to a winning array of happy-sounding ruminations on unhappiness, tales of break-ups, rejections of conformity and Moral Majority hypocrisy, even a titular one-up on The James Gang with "Funk # 50" (which, of course, sounds nothing at all like The James Gang but which might have been appropriate fodder for another Cleveland group, The Choir).

The whole thing is captivating as hell, and Living In The Holland Tunnel is headed for this writer's year-end Top 10 list. Mods? Rockers? Pfui! Who needs 'em when we've got The Mockers?

(Oh yeah, bonus points - Leventhal's publishing company is called Shocked And Stunned Music, a name sure to tighten the trousers of all who fondly recall Rutlemania. LEE ROY PARNELL Tell The Truth Vanguard (79589-2)

Lee Roy Parnell has switched labels and has returned to his Texas roots with his new album Tell The Truth. No steel guitars or fiddles on this recording. It seems that Parnell is finally making the album that he has always wanted to make, one with that bluesy edge.

Recorded in Muscle Shoals, many of the tunes were cut while retaining the live vocals and solo guitar work. "Right Where It Hurts" is a rockin' melodic song with some fat, tasty Texas-style guitar work. Parnell tells a true story with his coming-of-age rocker, "Crossing Over." This features his brother Rob Roy on harmonica dueling with Lee Roy's signature slide guitar. "Breaking Down Slow," the bluesy duet with Bonnie Bramlett, has a haunting melody with a nice vocal blend along with a deep Hammond B-3 organ and overlaid tremolo guitar. Another guest vocalist and Texas cohort, Delbert McClinton, sings with Parnell on a subject that they both know. "South By Southwest" fits those two

Coming Aug. 28 is blues-rock slide guitarist Eric Sardinas' Devil's Train (Evidence), which includes a duet with legendary Mississippi bluesman Honeyboy Edwards on Edwards' "Gamblin' Man Blues"... Also due Aug. 28 is Austin's Butthole Surfers' Weird Revolution, their debut on Hollywood/Surfdog Records, and Odetta's Lookin' for A Home (Thanks To Leadbelly) (M.C. Records), a tribute to blues great Leadbelly that features guest appearances from Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown, Henry Butler, and Kim Wilson... Due in September from King Biscuit Flower Hour is Marshall Crenshaw's I've Suffered For My Art... Now It's Your Turn: Live From The Stone Pony Feburary 16, 2001. The set includes many of his hits as well as two covers never recorded by Crenshaw previously -- "Walk Away, Renee" and "Endless Sleep"... Coming Sept. 11 is Beulah's third album, The Coast Is Never Clear, the first release on the new Velocette Records, which was started by Capricorn Records founder Phil Walden... Also due Sept. 11 is John Hiatt's The Tiki Bar Is Open (Vanguard), his first album reunited with The Goners in more than a decade. ## Indie label spotlight

OH SUSANNA Sleepy Little Sailor Catamount Records (CCR 008)

What should one expect from an artist who takes her name from a Stephen Foster song? Even after listening to Sleepy Little Sailor, the third effort - and U.S. debut - from Massachusetts singer/songwriter Oh Susanna, it's somewhat hard to get a handle on her.

Initially, Oh Susanna - real name, Suzie Ungerleider - sounds like so many other waifish rockers — fragile and vulnerable one moment, angry and defiant the next. Drawing from rock, folk and R&B influences in equal measure, she offers a set of songs with modest melodies and spare arrangements. However, despite her unassuming persona and delicate vocals, Oh

Susanna is an intriguing performer with a lofty lyrical bent. She revels in tortured tales and sad laments; on songs such as "All That Remains" and "Sacrifice," her narratives are positively poetic. She weaves intimate tales of desperate longing and wistful romance, all punctuated by bittersweet barbs. When she tackles the album's one non-original. "I've Got Dreams To Remember," she invests it with an emotional urgency that's both credible and compelling.

No, Oh Susanna isn't crying for me... or anyone else for that matter. Still, her wistful reflections mark an artist who sings from a personal perspective. While she still needs to define her style, Sleepy Little Sailor is navigating in the right direction.

The title cut is a slow ballad enhanced with National Steel guitar for that acoustic slide opening lick and solo. Parnell's buddy Keb' Mo' joins in on the "Southern back-porch style" acoustic blues "I Declare." "Brand New Feeling," a total "rockin' the church" gospel tune written by Parnell, Dan Penn, and Gary Nicholson, will have you passing the plate when he's joined by The Mississippi Mass Choir.

Slowing things down again is the pretty arrangement on "Guardian Angel." Parnell's smooth vocal style is highlighted on this number. Former Allman Brother Jack Pearson cowrote "Takes What It Takes," a swingin' blues tune, and he also helped out on the Hammon B-3 organ and exchanges guitar

It appears with Tell The Truth that Parnell has moved on or actually returned to what he does best - playing guitar and singing with that Texas connection.

**VARIOUS ARTISTS** Songcatcher: Music From And Inspired By The Motion Picture Vanguard (79586-2)

Director Maggie Greenwald's fiction film Songcatcher tells of a northeastern college professor on a 1907 Southern visit. There she discovers the roots of American popular music in the ballads brought over generations earlier by Scottish, Irish and English settlers and preserved deep in the isolation of Appalachia's verdant hollers. A sort of retrohillbilly Lilith Fair, Songcatcher presents seven tracks from the film, including Iris DeMent's primal "Pretty Saro," Emmylou Harris' "Barbara Allen" (the musical bed for

the closing credits), and Hazel Dickens, David Patrick Kelly, and Bobby McMillon's terrifying "Conversation With Death."

Dropping some other songs in the film, the acoustic CD adds newly recorded folk and folk-tinged ballads from a bevy of Americana songstresses. Dolly Parton tenderly duets with the movie's ingenue, 13-year-old opera singer turned backwoods actress Emmy Rossum. Allison Moorer offers a dusky "Moonshiner." Julie Miller gives "All My Tears" a ghostly acoustic treatment unlike its charging electricity on her Broken Things.

Purists may knock the CD for deleting so many field recordings in the film, yet the resulting album has its own rough-edged integrity, as the real McCoys of rural Southern music (DeMent, Dickens, Parton, and Patty Loveless) stand in unity with country converts such as Harris and (with David Rawlings and David Steele) Gillian Welch. Rosanne Cash of the first family of country opens the disc (but not the film), setting its tone with the time-honored lament "Fair And Tender Ladies" - a fit intro for this wildwood flower of female folk music.

**ASS PONYS** Lohio Checkered Past (CPR024)

Chuck Cleaver has given up on the mainstream. After leading his band Ass Ponys to a major label in the '90s and not being able to get the public to drink from their well of rustic, organic rock, he has abandoned whatever commercial notions he may have had and is back to making uncompromised records.

That's not to say he has given up on pop. There are some fine melodic moments on Lohio, Ass Ponys' latest album, and Cleaver structures it more tightly than he has any of the group's past efforts. It may not be their best album, but individual songs are among the sharpest they've written.

It's the pain and twang of Cleaver's voice that brings them to that point. He aches naturally, so that, on the ominous "Last Night It Snowed," as the song builds around him, you sense the doom lurking on the white horizon. Even the lighter tracks, such as the combo celebrity punch of "Kung Fu Reference" and "Donald Sutherland," point to some deeper wound inside Cleaver than mere words can possibly relate.

Lohio is conceptual, too - something about living in Ohio and the semi-desperation to pull some life out of its very ordinariness. On the closing "Nothing Starts Today," Cleaver says, sighing, "Every time I try to find it, it isn't there." It's resignation at the end of the road, a casual shrug of indifference toward the masses, the public and the world in general. But Lohio is no downer. Bathing the songs in Americana-approved mandolins, Moogs, harmoniums and banjos, this is Ass Ponys' declaration of survival, no matter how defeatist it may seem. It's a thin line - and precisely the point.

LOUIS ARMSTRONG — IN HIS OWN WORDS, SELECTED WRITINGS Edited by Dr. Thomas Brothers Oxford Press (Hardcovder, 255 pages, \$25) (ISBN 0-19-511958-4)

Louis Armstrong - In His Own Words, Selected Writings, edited by Dr. Thomas Brohers, is the latest collection of Louis Armstrong writings, essays and autobiographical material. It offers the reader even more than The Louis Armstrong Companion, the earlier but similar book by Joshua Berrett. Where this book differs and excels is that it focuses on the actual words written by Armstrong rather than opinions by fans and peers. Although this new tome is similarly titled as other popular music biographies on The Beatles, John Lennon, Bruce Springsteen, and Jimi Hendrix, those biographies were each compiled from spoken interviews, so the "words" were actually prompted replies to the press. Here the phrase "In his own words" is a more literal description in that Armstrong wrote these words to fans and many were actually drafted for eventual publication to complete his autobiographical portrait.

A professor of music at Duke University, Dr. Thomas Brothers book was cited as required reading at the April 2001 Jazz Symposium in Chapel Hill, N.C. Aithough it took six years to prepare this loving and enlightening collection, Brothers hepes to produce a follow-up volume that would center around the original manuscript of Armstrong's autobiography, which is kept at Rutgers University.

A heavily edited version of that manuscript called My Life In New Orleans was published in 1954, but a complete "uncensored Centennial" edition deserves consideration. In the meantime fans can relish the many letters and other selected writings in this highly recommended collection of "his own words." As Armstrong himself often wrote, "It's a gasser."

the floor toms race ahead to join with a rumble of guitar and bass, a kind of tribal entrance music for singer Ian Curtis.

Curtis sings as if he scarcely occupied a place in the corporal world, and yet on songs such as "Shadowplay" and "Transmission" there is a physical and directive quality to his voice, as if it was being leveled at the listener upon having come back from somewhere else. He is both seer and interloper on "Love Will Tear Us Apart," the most arch and abrasive of response songs; Captain And Tennille have their "Love Will Keep Us Together" and, over three minutes, Curtis proves that, no, it will not.

The remainder of Les Bains Douches consists of tracks culled from two other Joy Division shows, one from Amsterdam and another from Eindhoven. As for the Paris

performance, the concept of a Joy Division radio broadcast is still a difficult one, as I cannot imagine any kingdom, province or outlying territory — even in hell — where "Build Me Up Buttercup" is followed by "Atrocity Exhibition" over the FM wire.

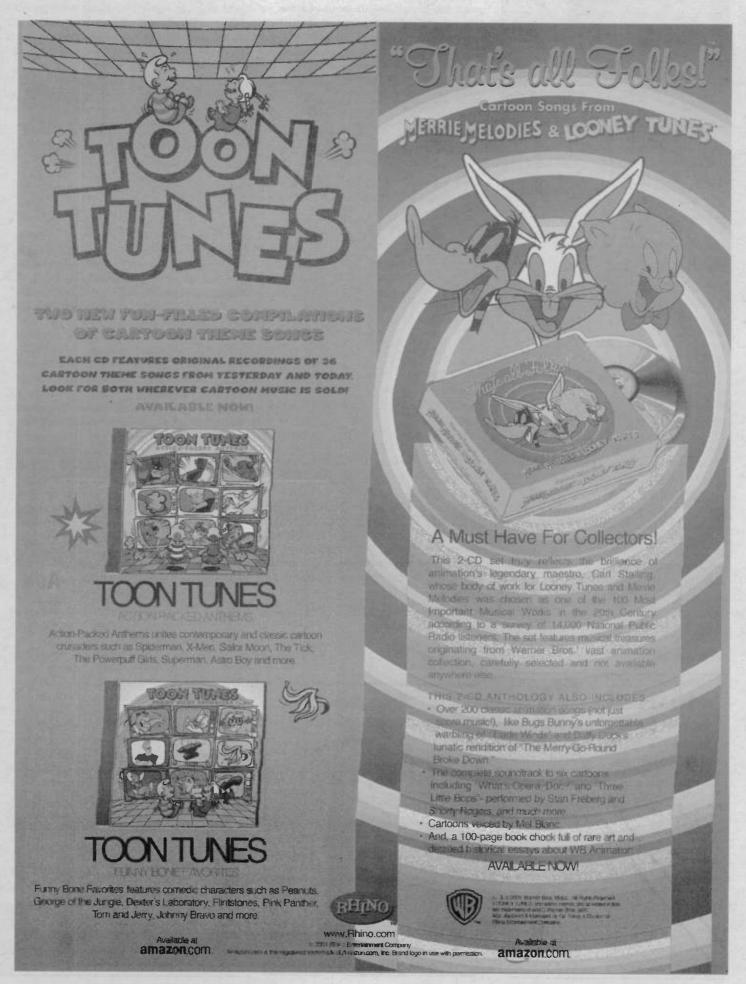
Accordingly, the members of Joy Division proved themselves perhaps no more suited to their own group. Curtis hung himself five months after appearing at Les Bains Douches, and the survivors of Joy Division went on to form New Order, everybody's favorite guitar dance band of the '80s, a retreat as desperate and natural as any that Joy Division seem to inspire.

#### CHARLES SAWTELLE Music From Rancho deVille Acoustic Disc (ACD-44)

There have always been two sides to bluegrass music. They're as different as night and day, yet they get packaged together at concerts and on records without a second thought.

The high-energy side shows up in pyrotechnics — pickin at the speed of light, racing though chord changes and ringing as many notes as the fingers can find. Bluegrass becomes what the old jazz guys used to call a cutting contest; it's like the ghost of Bill Monroe is being chased by the ghost of Charlie Parker. If this side of bluegrass is all about chops, then the other side is all about feeling, the sensitive side to bluegrass. There's a lot

less of it out there than the hot-picking approach, which typically draws young musicians. When you find the gentler side of bluegrass, it's worth sitting on the porch a spell and listening. That's what we have — and then some — on Music From Rancho deVille.

Charles Sawtelle was something of an enigma. Never a front-liner, he labored in the shadow of other musicians for most of his career, loved and respected but shunning the spotlight. For more than 20 years he was a member of the Hot Rize bluegrass band. When Sawtelle died recently, many of the musicians who appreciated him over the years banded together to complete this project. Sawtelle had begun the album at his Rancho deVille studio but simply grew too weak to finish it. The results are uniformly wonderful and, at times utterly transcendent.

Not surprising, this is all acoustic music, although the range of styles is wider than one might expect. The notes describe the music as "spare, soulful, dynamic, and reverent of tradition." It's hard to dispute any of those calls. In broad categories, that reverence shows up for bluegrass, Cajun, Tex-Mex and old-timey music. But at some point, the pigeonholes seem less relevant than the sheer feeling of what's being played.

For example, "Aragon Mill" is a view of life in a decaying mill town. Sawtelle's vocal on this track makes one wish he had been able to sing more as his health waned.

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Several tunes ("My Life Is In Your Hands" and "I Will Always Love You") are Sawtelle's original instrumentals and just cry out for lyrics. There's more unfinished business: "Chez Seychelles" is a beautiful and sparse Cajun instrumental featuring the fiddle of Michael Doucet. "Mom And Dad's Waltz" is a lovely reading of the Lefty Frizzell classic, rendered by fiddle player Vassar Clements. Clements' vocal is described in the album notes as "craggy and tender," as apt a phrase as can be found.

All in all, this project just radiates love and attention to detail. The liner notes and tributes offer such an evocative picture of Sawtelle that you wish to know more. The vintage photos help. Sawtelle was a man who seemed to inspire great affection. When you finish listening to the hour of music on this CD and reading its notes, you'll wish you had known Sawtelle or someone like him. Even if you leave the liner notes in the jewel case, the music is still a hell of a ride. What better tribute to an artist can there be?

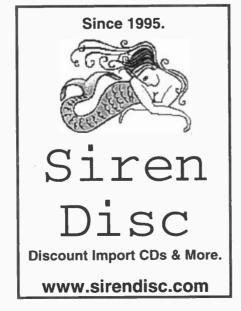

UNDERTAKIN' DADDIES Post Atomic Hillbilly Caribou (CRCD 012)

Purely Canadian. Along with Sergeant Preston (and his wonder dog King), Caribou Records may be the best thing to come out of the Yukon. Quietly, this label based in Whitehorse, Yukon, Canada, is turning out a nifty line of local music for the rest of the world to savor. The Yukon is a pretty intense breeding ground for music and art - connected to the outside world by telephone and Web, yet firmly lost in a time warp. The insularity and rather extreme weather conditions are what make the music special. When you've only got a few months of normal light-dark cycles, there's an urgency to life. Maybe it speeds up the creative process, compressing it into short periods of manic activity. Whatever the reason, a few moments at the Caribou Records Web site (www.caribourecords.com) might be well worth your time.

I received an earlier release by Kim Barlow for *Goldmine* last year and was impressed by her powerful and quirky music. Now comes *Post Atomic Hillbilly* by Undertakin' Daddies. While not as off-center as Barlow's take on life, these guys are delightfully lost in some kind of hillbilly zone. If you need pigeonholes to appreciate music, the Daddies are close to being a bluegrass band. Close, but it ain't a direct hit, although at their best they sound eerily like

SATCHMO — LOUIS ARMSTRONG Legacy (UPC 746449024-9) (1.5 hrs, DVD and VHS, \$20)

Satchmo — Louis Armstrong is the only

Louis Armstrong documentary currently available worth buying, unless you want to spring for Ken Burns' 10-volume Jazz. Gary Giddins produced Satchmo back in 1986, and there is also an excellent companion book titled Satchmo. In



addition to many interviews with people who worked with Armstrong, there is an abundance of rare footage on *Satchmo* from television broadcast and performances as well as home movie footage. The sound-track was digitally remastered and sounds much better than the laser disc or VHS version. The DVD also contains a couple of bonus audio tracks as well as a memorabilia gallery and a discography.

JAZZ ON A SUMMER'S DAY New Yorker (UPC: 1711916504) (Two hours, \$30, DVD and VHS)

This is Bert Stern's documentary of the 1958 Newport Jazz Festival and is being reviewed for this issue because it includes a half-hour of Louis Armstrong performing that day. Other artists performing include Chuck Berry, Dinah Washington, and Thelonious Monk.

It was digitally remastered for DVD, and the DVD version includes many bonus features including interviews with Bert Stern and reflections of the artists.

This is also one of the few DVDs to include excellent liner notes. Any traditional jazz fan and all Armstrong fans would enjoy this release.

THE WONDERFUL WORLD OF LOUIS ARMSTRONG Winstar (UPC: 720917312927) (One hour, \$25, DVD and VHS)

The latest Louis Armstrong documentary, The Wonderful World Of Louis Armstrong, pales in comparison to other loving documentaries such as Gary Giddins' Satchmo or the wonderful American Masters series on PBS, which featured Louis In New Orleans, or even Ken Burns' Jazz.

The irony is that the same company that released this hour-long waste of time already released the excellent Ella Fitzgerald: American Masters on DVD. In fact, earlier this year I contacted Winstar to inquire whether a Louis Armstrong: American Masters DVD would follow the excellent Fitzgerald DVD since both programs were shown on PBS some years ago. I was told that instead a new Armstrong documentary was coming out. It's unfortunate that despite the higher list price and rich DVD format, the program is an hour with no bonus information. Instead of giving an hour of unreleased interviews or footage beyond what is offered in previous documentaries, this DVD relies largely on narration and extended background scenes.

Although many new recordings, letters and memorabilia have come forth since the benchmark Satchmo documentary was released in 1988, this DVD does not offer

any further info or material beyond what is already commonly known and available.

The approach here is similar to those rehashed Beatles documentaries that have been done over the years. This DVD is very light on Armstrong content of any kind and heavy on quick/slow editing of non-Armstrong backgrounds during various non-Armstrong interviews and the narration by Danny Glover.

A similar but toned-down approach was done when Glover narrated a Robert Johnson documentary a few years ago, but the difference is that there are only two photos and no footage or interviews existing for Johnson. In contrast Armstrong has hundreds of hours of



audio and video that he recorded himself as part of his autobiography (check out the Armstrong archives at Queens University, Rutgers or in New Orleans) in addition to the thousands of hours he recorded for other people. The bizarre

slow-motion and fast-motion backgrounds used thoughout this documentary seem disrespectful and insensitive to the subject or at least non sequitur distractions.

In addition to the excellent American Masters show, another classic Armstrong documentary was the 1956 Edward R. Murrow film Satchmo The Great, the sound-track of which was recently re-released on CD with several bonus tracks. Releasing Satchmo The Great on DVD would be an excellent tribute since the original broadcast could be featured in addition to including the bonus segments on the DVD. The Wonderful World Of Louis Armstrong really belongs in a \$5 bargain bin along with the hack Beatles documentaries.

Fans should instead seek out the early Armstrong showcase movie New Orleans, Jazz or A Summer's Day. Even The Gentle Giant Of Jazz narrated by Hugh Downs (available only on VHS) is better than The Wonderful World Of Louis Armstrong. Ironically, the Goodtimesvideo company, which puts out the some of the bad Beatles documentaries, also distributes Gentle Giant.

The movie New Orleans features more Louis Armstrong acting footage than any other movie he did during his career. He plays the beau of Billie Holiday in this 1947 story of the closing of Storyville in New Orleans. Although Armstrong is the star,

he does get fourth billing and probably enjoys more than a fourth of screen time.

Long unavailable, New Orleans is an excellent snapshot of Armstrong and Holiday's talents right after WW II and the lifting of the recording bans. I hope a remastered version of this soundtrack will eventually be released domestically — with all of the wonderful bonus tracks available on the import release created from the original 16-inch film soundtrack acetates.

## **DVD** Review

PAUL McCARTNEY Live At The Cavern Club! Image Entertainment (ID0384MPDVD)

On the evening of Dec. 14, 1999, Paul McCartney returned to The Cavern Club in Liverpool, England, for a very special performance — his first since The Beatles' final appearance at the club Aug. 3, 1963 — before an intimate gathering of 300 lucky fans, friends and family members, along with a worldwide audience estimated in the millions via the Internet.

This momentous event is now available on an absolutely stunning DVD release from Image Entertainment. Paul McCartney: Live At The Cavern Club features the 13-song, 45-minute concert, presented in 1:78:1 widescreen format and Dolby digital 5.1 surround-sound, generously augmented with nearly 50 minutes of related bonus material.

Originally intended as a promotional vehicle in support of his then-recent Run Devil Run album — 11 of the show's 13 numbers hail from the Run Devil Run recordings — McCartney delivers a knockout set; propelled by a combination of the historic venue, the electricity generated by the hometown Liverpool crowd and the obvious, teenage-like enthusiasm and deep affection McCartney harbors for the rock 'n' roll classics of his youth.

McCartney is solidly backed by the same core of veteran musicians with whom he recorded the bulk of Run Devil Run—Pink Floyd's David Gilmour, Deep Purple's Iam Paice, Mick Green, and Pete Wingfield. The band rips through 10 first-rate rock 'n' roll covers, paying tribute to Little Richard ("Shake A Hand"), Larry Williams ("She Said Yeah"), Chuck Berry ("Brown-Eyed Handsome Man"), Ricky Nelson ("Lonesome Town"), Gene Vincent ("Blue Jean Bop" and "Twenty Flight Rock" [the latter previously recorded in 1987 for McCartney's Choba B CCCP: The Russian Album), Johnny Burnette ("Honey Hush")), and of course, The King Elvis Presley ("All Shook Up" and the encore "Party").

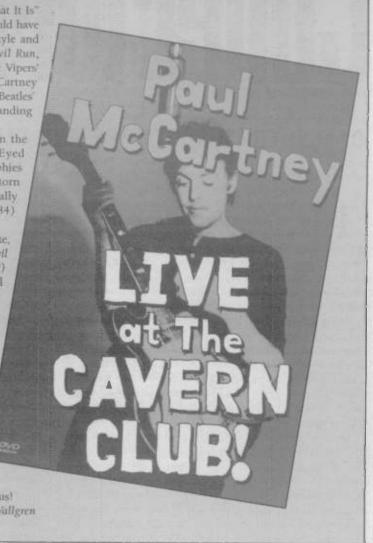
A pair of newly penned McCartney originals, "What It Is and "Try Not To Cry," easily sound as though they could have been written in the 50s, effectively emulating the style and spirit of the vintage compositions. As on Run Devil Run, McCartneys emotionally charged performance of The Vipers "No Other Baby" is the hands-down standout. McCartney closes the set with a crowd-pleasing homage to The Beatles' Cavern days with the show-stopping "I Saw Her Standing There."

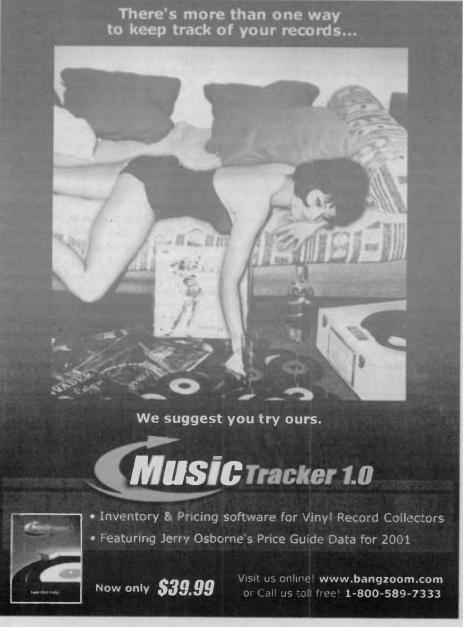
DVD bonus material includes the rarely seen (in the U.S.) top-flight promotional videos for "Brown-Eyed Handsome Man" and "No Other Baby," band biographies and a history of The Cavern Club (the original was torm down in 1973). McCartney's performance was actually held in the "new" Cavern Club (reopened in 1984) within a stone's throw of the original site.

Also featured, two McCartney interviews: a 22-minute, 1999 promotional interview on the making of Run Devil Run (previously issued to the press as McCartney Rocks!) intersperse recording session footage of McCartney and the band at Abbey Road Studios, plus snippers of the Sept. 18, 1999, PETA Awards afternoon soundcheck and evening performance in Los Angeles. The second interview, titled Our Paul, is a 17-minute chat in which McCartney discusses the Cavern concert, the song selections and Liverpool.

Image Entertainment's DVD release of Paul McCartney: Live At The Cavern Club reaffirms the added value and superiority of the DVD format. It offers an otherwise commercially unavailable live performance in superb digital sound and pristine picture quality, amply supplemented with bonus footage. ## COLLECTOR'S SOFTWARE AND CLEANING PRODUCT TESTS by Chuck Miller

From time to time, I test various record collecting care and storage products and make the results available to readers of this column. I may not have the fastidious reputation of Consumer Reports — heck, I'm probably about as qualified as your local "gadget gizmo guru" on the 6 o'clock news — but I hope that within my column, I can share information about collecting-related products that will provide you with an educated discovery process.

Today I review three items designed for improved maintenance and inventory of your music collection. Two of the products are CD databases, one called CD Trustee (available at www.base40.com) and one called Music Collector (available at www.collectorz.com). The third product is the Groovmaster Label Saver<sup>158</sup>, a device designed to protect your record labels from fluid damage while you clean them (wmsar@home.com, 401-941-9347).

OK, it's now time for the gadget guru to get to work.

I first downloaded and installed Music Collector. Installation of the product seemed quick enough, as it opened without any problems on my computer. A few notes about my personal computer setup — I own a Hewlett-Packard Pentium III processor with 19GB of hard drive space. My computer has two CD drives (one is a CD burner that I use for archival purposes), and I have disc drive access for 3½-inch discs and 100MB Zip\* discs. All my internal software runs with Windows 98, and I operate mostly in a Corel-based environment (in other words, I try to stay as far away from Bill Gates' products as humanly possible).

The Music Collector program is compatible with the online "Compact Disc Database" (CDDB), so it helps to have an online connection when using this feature. I first tested the program with a common CD; Boston's Don't Look Back album. I placed the CD in my CD-R tray and clicked the CDDB link. Instantly the program contacted the CDDB database, and within seconds the track listing had been downloaded to my computer. It also had no problems picking up the info on Hootic And The Blowfish's Cracked Rear View (even adding the title to the hidden track "Sometimes I Feel Like A Motherless Child").

Sure, Boston and Hootie were easy — but don't forget, I have a varied and unique record collection.

So I dropped in a few more titles, including Blotto's Collected Works, Power Salad's Force Doesn't Work On A Crustacean and as many oddball and unique items as I could find. As long as the album was available on the CDDB, the album tracks would be instantly listed. But when adding a various artists compilation, for example, The Heritage-Colossus Story (containing hits such as Shocking Blue's "Venus," The Dreamlovers' "When We Get Married" and "Check Yourself" by The Italian Asphalt & Paving Co.), Music Collector brought all the songs in but credited each track to "Various Artists." I had to go into the file and manually add each artist's proper credit, which did not make me happy.

This program is designed only for CDs and MP3 searches. It will not organize 45s, LPs, 78s or any other vinyl or shellac-based materials. The program itself is easy to use and learn and will help users put those CDs in your collection in a more "orderly" format. On my 45 rpm adapter scale of one to five, with five being perfect and one being crapola, I give Music Collector three adapters.

I next installed CD Trustee. Installation took approximately 30 seconds on my system, and registration was simple (type in an alphanumeric key to authenticate purchase and an infinite CD storage library — trial versions limit the user to the storage of 30 CDs). Like Music Collector, CD Trustee uses the CDDB, so to get the most use out of this program, users should be connected to the Internet.

Instead of checking each disc one at a time, CD Trustee allowed me to pop CDs into my drive consecutively, then asked me to click a button before it searched the CDDB. So I tossed in a few choice treats from my own personal collection — Damn Yankees' debut album, a K-Tel various-artists CD, a best-of Dickie Goodman CD, Mike Oldfield's *Tubular Bells*, a various-artists heavy metal collection called *ECW:Extreme Music*, two albums by New Zealand vocalist Marc Hunter and my scuffed-up copy of Oasis' (What's The Story) Morning Glory?

Of the nine CDs I inserted into the program, CD Trustee was able to add the title and track listings for eight of them (it could not find the information for the K-Tel CD). All the other tracks were listed as correctly as the CDDB could provide — even the rare imports that I thought the program might not be able to find.

CD Trustee does also allow the user to add songs manually, so if there is a disc that hasn't been added to the CDDB or if the user finds there is a typo in the CDDB's holdings, he or she can correct that anomaly locally. The program also allows a user to print jewel box inserts and has selections for inventory storage. Unfortunately, the alphabetizing is under the mercy of the CDDB's informational holdings — while they had Mike Oldfield alphabetized under "O", they had Dickie Goodman alphabetized under "D." Yikes.

Still, this is a great program to help organize a CD collection, and although it does rely on the CDDB, it does have the flexibility to let users correct and adjust errors in song titles and other pertinent information, (including allowing users to decide how an artist should fit in an alphabetical setting — making sure, for example, Jethro Tull isn't alphabetized under T) as does Music Collector. I give CD Trustee four adapters.

Our final product on the testing block is the Groovmaster Label Saver. This product purports to allow record collectors the ability to clean their 45s, LPs and 78s without getting those records' labels wet. The record is placed between two plastic discs, and each disc contains a rubber O-ring. The discs are tightened together with a center screw that threads through the record's center hole. The rubber O-rings create a tight seal around the perimeter of the record label, keeping moisture and dirt out while the user cleans the record grooves with the appropriate liquid solution.

The Groovmaster Label Saver™ even suggests a person can clamp a record between the unit's plastic discs, then actually wash the record in the kitchen sink, without the label feeling moisture. I had to try this one.

Now where did I put that Elvis Sun 45? Damn, I know it's here in this house somewhere....

Oh well, since I can't find that one, I guess I'll just have to use this old, beat-up copy of Samantha Fox's "Naughty Girls Need Love Too." I unscrewed the unit and separated the plastic discs. The record fit snugly inside, the rubber rings encircling the label perfectly (the unit comes with a foam center hole, so that 45s stay centered). I tightened the unit's top screw to make sure the record was tightly ensconced — creating a plastic-and-rubber Fox sandwich. Hmm...

I took the record to my kitchen sink and turned on the water. After making sure whatever crud and gunk was washed away, I turned off the water and used a cloth to dry the vinyl. I then separated the plastic discs to see how it all turned out. The grooves were certainly cleaner — cleaner, in fact, than Fox's lyrics — and the label stayed dry and moisture free. However, there was a thin ringlet of water around the runout grooves, in the area where the rubber O-ring pressed against the vinyl. This took another wipe with the cloth to clear away the moisture (I also had to wipe the O-rings as well, so that the next record would not have water trapped inside the clamped discs).

This product would be most beneficial if a collector happened to acquire a few hard-to-find vinyl pressings that had heavy dirt and dust coatings in the grooves. For a few tiny dust hairs on the vinyl, a simple Discwasher® brush or velvet cloth will remove the offending materials without any trouble. And one should take care to not wash core-laminated 78s or Edison Diamond Discs with tap water.

I give the Groovmaster Label Saver™ three adapters.

Collectors who have discovered a product or software that has made their record collecting upkeep and archiving easier should please let me know, so I can share this information with other music collectors out there. My address and e-mail are at the end of this column.

#### Letters

I received lots of response to my column on Queen's "Bohemian Rhapsody" being the first 45 I ever purchased with my own money (as opposed to being a gift from a relative or a Disney/Cricket/Peter Pan children's record).

This e-mail came from Allen Chapman of Stafford Springs. Conn.: "My first record I ever bought was Foreigner's "Hot Blooded." I think I was about seven or eight at the time right around there. I don't really remember why I liked it so much at the time. I know I didn't understand the lyrics at all. The first records I ever heard were my fathers old 45s from the '50s and '60s, "Sixteen Tons," "Young Love," "Right Or Wrong" etc. I thought these were all new songs (this was like 1975!). I had a little battery-operated record player that played only 45s. After I got "Hot Blooded" (which, yes, is still in my collection) I bought other current hits, "Hot Child In The City," "Kiss You All Over" (another song that made no sense to my seven-year-old mind!), "Escape (The Piña Colada Song)" etc. I have all of these still. My musical tastes have varied over the years from country to rock to pop to metal to bluegrass to standards to whatever. But all those songs from my childhood can take me right back there in an instant."

Another e-mail came from John Casey of Indianapolis, Ind.: "The first record I ever bought was Johnny Cash's 'What Is Truth' back in 1970. I was nine years old. The first LP I bought was This Is Tom Jones (same year). I hadn't really discovered radio yet, but I watched a lot of TV. Both of these singers had their own variety shows then. I was greatly disappointed when I played the Tom Jones LP because it didn't have 'It's Not Unusual,' which was what he sang to open his show every week (I didn't know the name of the song, but I assumed it would be on the record. Both the LP and the TV show had the same title). The Beatles' "Let It Be" was both my second 45 and second LP. These were the records I would admit to as a teenager as being my firsts. I still have the Cash 45, although I think it's pretty unplayable. 'What Is Truth' is on the Essential Johnny Cash box set, and I still like that song. I used the Tom Jones LP for target practice with a BB gun as a teen, but I did buy another copy (from an ad in Goldmine) more than 15 years ago! I play it every once in a while."

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# Footnote Archives

## SLEEPER'S (BRIEF) HOLD ON BRIT-POP

t barely seems possible, but it's almost exactly 10 years since the words "Brit" and "pop" first started moving together to describe the exciting new musical force lurking in the backwoods of the British underground. It was late 1991 when Blur, fresh home from a quite disastrous American tour, commenced the body swerve in the direction that would lead to the prototypical Modern Life Is Rubbish album, which in turn begat the quintessential Parklife; and, while the true peak of the movement would not be reached for a little while longer (1995-96 is generally seen as the apogee of the Brit-pop movement), still one cannot help but wonder where so many hopes and dreams lie now.

A few of them are, apparently, still bubbling. Last summer, the news came through that Louise Wener, formerly the figurehead of Sleeper, was finally preparing her solo rebirth; in February of this year, it was reported that she's set to publish her first novel next year. The silence has lain unbroken since then, but still it's hard to repress a fission of excitement at the thought. For, across three years and two albums smack in the middle of the 1990s, Sleeper posited a future for Brit-pop that none of the movement's better remembered heroes ever envisioned — and that despite

being utterly opposed to the pigeonhole.

"For me, Brit-pop's just another media term," Wener shrugged. "There's a lot of different scenes gone on over the course of the two years we've been together, and we've had them all. We were New Wave Of New Wave a couple of years ago. What British bands have done is rediscover the concept of a tune, the art of songwriting. If Brit-pop's anything, it's that. I think it was Brian Epstein who said that the next big thing is a good song." Wener just happened to have a lot of them.

Singer/guitarist Wener was born July 30, 1968, in Gants Hill, east London. It wasn't an environment she necessarily cherished. "It's not only on the outskirts of London," she said, "it's on the edge of everything. There's something about growing up in the dregs, the badlands, away from it all... you're not even a suburb. It's no-man's land. It has its very own set of images."

She got out as quickly as she could, enrolling in college to study English and politics in the northern city of Manchester. It was there that she met guitarist John Stewart in 1992, and the pair formed their first band together soon after. They'd both been in groups before, but Wener reflected, "for a long while, all the bands that I was in, everyone else did the songwriting and I barely played guitar at all. Then I thought, 'Shit, I'm gonna have to learn because I'm sure I can do this better,' and I sort of took over the whole thing and it really began to flourish from that."

The pair moved back to London the following year, recruiting Somalia-born bassist Diid Osman and drummer Andy McClure, a man whose résumé included The Crawl and the 10-piece ska orchestra The Mable String Quartet.

The quartet began gigging that summer under the name Surrender Dorothy but changed it, Stewart explained, after discovering "there are about a dozen Surrender Dorothys in America." By late 1993, already signed to the independent Indolent label on the strength of a demo of the song "Stay," the band debuted as Sleeper with the single "Alice In Vain."

February 1994 bought the follow-up, "Swallow"; while May delivered "Delicious," the cue for Wener to unleash her own brand of sexual philosophy onto a nation lulled into soporific mateyness by the singing electricians elsewhere around the Brit-pop firmament. Tours opening for Manic Street Preachers and, even more impressive, Blur, confirmed Sleeper's ascendancy — for audiences gathered reverently to hear about girls doing boys like they're girls. It was one thing for Damon Albarn to tell them to cut down on their pork life

("Get a bit of exercise."); it was quite another for Wener to chastise them, "you're so dirty... make it dirtier." Sleeper need not have made another record; Wener was making headlines on her own — and the band's first album was still to arrive.

When Smart finally arrived, it was an utter revelation. The most eagerly awaited album of the year became the first to actually eclipse the hype, hope and hubris that attended it even if the tabloid press did spend most of its time searching for details of Wener's mid-sessions split with boyfriend Stewart. Of such things, of course, Big (Fleetwood) Mac rumors could be wrought, but regret and bitterness were confined to just one song, the birds 'n' blokes-flavored "Inbetweener," an epic of suburban angst camouflaged as a tough-talking tale of modern birds 'n' blokes.

"Lady Love Your Countryside," a dig at SMASH's less ecologically minded song of a similar name, "Delicious" and "Alice In Vain" were the primary points of entry; former singles one and all, they allowed one to chart Sleeper's growth at the same time as marveling at their speed; by the time you hit "Inbetweener," the band's first U.K. Top 20 hit, Smart was

enshrined as much an induction as an introduction.

Defying media predictions that Sleeper (like so many other emergent bands of the era) were unlikely ever to repeat the Smart experience, Wener lost no time debuting new material at the same time as playing down the personal preeminence that had hit the headlines before. She even retired the "Another Female Fronted Indie Guitar Band" type T-shirt she used to wear with such belligerent pride.

The press leaped on one line ['we should both go to bed til we make each other raw'l from one song ['Delicious,' Sleeper's third single] and tried to make that define me for a whole year. I thought the whole thing was quite bizarre, and 'Lie Detector' [a new song scheduled for the next album] is a bit of a response to that, and the way women in particular are caricatured, like you're not really allowed to be funny and clever and write good tunes."

Summer 1995 saw Sleeper make their first trip to the U.S., debuting on American TV with a six-song showcase on the late-night Beat Zone. "I spent six months in the States when I was at college, lived in and around Boston, went down the whole East Coast," Wener recalled. "But it was strange to turn up in places like L.A. and San Francisco, which seemed such a long way away and have people queuing up to get into our gigs and knowing all the words to our songs."

It was the same story in Japan, Sleeper's next port of call. "Japan was brilliant. I think I've never been anywhere so similar and yet so foreign at the same time. It was a very weird contradiction. Incredibly polite people, but there's a very repressive feel about it. It's very strange.'

Another British tour followed; another single, "Vegas," kept the band in the U.K. Top 20. But it was a fall 1995 Radio One session that truly proved Sleeper's follow-up potential. Four new songs included "What Do I Do Now?" possibly the most painfully perceptive mid-break-up narrative ever to be

disguised as a pop single. By the time Sleeper brought former Smiths/Morrissey producer Stephen Street in to supervise their next album (a hit re-recording of "What Do I Do Now?" among them), the doubters had long since buttoned their lips.

Wener laughed, "I remember people were saying, 'Ah, you'll never do anything,' and then saying, "Inbetweeners" will be the last thing she ever does,' and then, 'Oh no, now she's done "Vegas," and then, 'Oh no, now she's done "What Do I Do Now?" 'Oh no....' There was a lot of skepticism about us, I think.'

Marveling in the mundanities of life but without the exaggerated eccentricities of Blur and Pulp, with musical bases slipping from classic Blondie to mid-period Beatles but avoiding the twin traps of affectation and retro posturing, The It Girl positioned Sleeper firmly on the brink of a major breakthrough.

'It is a lot more confident," Wener reflected at the time. "I think we really found our feet with this one. It almost felt like the first album paved the way for it. This is also the first time we've had a long period to sit down. I locked myself away and just wrote and had the best time writing it. And now, I can sit and listen to it and really enjoy it, as if I'm not connected with it, which is really weird because I've never done that with anything I've written before. I just like to put it on because I love the songs."

The singles "Sale Of The Century," "Nice Guy Eddie" and "Statuesque" all breached the U.K. Top 20, while an American tour with Elvis Costello in 1996 not only earned the group the maestro's applause, but also a B-side on his own latest single. Sleeper's cover of Costello's "Other Side Of The Telescope" backed the "Useless Beauty" 45, while a dramatic reworking of Blondie's "Atomic" was a key addition to the cult movie Trainspotting soundtrack.

It all came tumbling down with Sleeper's third album. While the U.K. media jokingly savaged Wener's newfound public preeminence, relegating the remainder of the band to the status of mere "Sleeper blokes," the group fell apart during sessions for an album that Wener insisted was to be called Cunt London but

that eventually emerged as Pleased To Meet You.

Osman was sacked in June 1997 to be replaced in the studio by Madder Rose bassist Chris Giammalvo, and with the album sessions dragging on, Sleeper canceled a scheduled appearance at the Reading Festival. Pleased To Meet You finally emerged that fall, but unfortunately, few people were. Wener's face alone appeared on the album cover, and despite entering the U.K. chart at a high of #7, it was swiftly apparent that sales of the record were never going to approach the peaks of its predecessors.

The problems were apparent from the outset alas, poor Louise, we loved her too much.

Gone was the abrasive sexual scratchiness that was the band's original calling card; gone was the raw bollock-blasting that was the sound of Sleeper in heat. In their place came the belief that "real songs" are "smooth songs," that ballads were somehow more lasting than rockers, that sensitivity was superior to gut emotion. Growing old before the band had even grown up, Pleased To Meet You was the kind of record bands make after they've sold out to Middle America, and it really didn't matter how highly Costello rated Wener's songwriting talents. His latest work wasn't exactly anything to write home about either.

With Dan Kauffman now on bass, a distinctly out-of-sorts Sleeper toured Britain through the fall of 1997, but three successive singles fared increasingly poorly — "She's A Good Girl" scraped to #28, "Romeo Me" to #39, and "Motor Man" bottomed out altogether. 1998 then opened with Wener angrily denying split rumors — only for Kauffman to quit in February.

Giammalvo came back for a poorly attended second British tour, but news that Sleeper's U.S. label, Arista, had canceled the Stateside release of Pleased To Meet You hit the band's future plans hard. So did the closure of the Indolent label in July, and five months later, on Dec. 30, 1998, Wener announced Sleeper's demise. Stewart relocated to L.A. and joined a new band, UFO Bro; Wener and McClure announced plans to form a new band.

The story ended there, and for a long time it seemed that the book was finished as well. Now it seems that there will be further chapters, and no matter how disappointing that final Sleeper album may have been, track back to the two that preceded it, and Wener's return isn't simply something to look forward to. It's worth much, much more than that.



## WHAT ARE UNIT SPACE ADS?

Unit space ads are an affordable option for the small dealer or for the private collector who has a few items to sell. They are based on 8-1/2 x 11 sheets that you create. They are "camera ready," in other words, the ad will look in print exactly how it looks when you send it in, only smaller. We will reduce the sheets to fit the ad space. Optionally, at no extra charge we can create a heading for your ad. We will typeset your name, business name (if any), address and phone/fax numbers on your ad if you so request. The two types of ads are:

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- 5. Clearly identify whether your ad is a set sale or auction.

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- Avoid mixing the two in the same ad; if you must, have separate sections for set-sale and auction items.
- Include your name, address, and telephone/fax number (and when you will be available to take calls on the ad) and all ordering information, including postage and shipping fees.
- 7. Put your listings in a logical order. If you have several formats in the same ad (LP, CD, 45, etc.), group your items by format. You also may wish to group items by type of music. As for the listings themselves, alphabetically by artist usually works best.
- If you have any questions on how to set up your ad, contact anyone from the GOLDMINE advertising staff.

## SET SALE GUIDELINES FOR BUYERS

- First, make sure you are replying to a set sale and not an auction. If an ad mentions minimum bids and deadlines, it's not a set sale.
- 2. Follow the advertiser's directions on how to reply. If the ad says to write first to reserve an item, do it. If the ad says that money orders only are accepted, don't write a personal check. And never send cash through the mail!
- If you write or call to reserve an item and the advertiser still has it in stock, send your payment for the item promptly.
- 4. Set sale ads are "first-come, first-served," so the sooner you reply, the more likely you are to receive what you order.
- 5 If you receive the item and it is not as advertised, don't hesitate to complain. Reputable advertisers take complaints seriously and try to do right by the customer. But don't take advantage of this, either; complain only when you have a legitimate reason for doing so.

### SET SALE GUIDELINES FOR SELLERS

- Only advertise items you have. Because of ad deadlines, some dealers will assume they will have new material based on release dates given by record companies. In the long run, it's better to wait until you actually have an item to put it in your ad.
- State all your policies in the ad. Examples include method of payment, whether (and at what times) you will accept telephone calls, and whether to reserve items or send money immediately.
- 3. Send the items promptly after they we been paid for. Federal Trade Commission regulations state that you must ship your items within 30 days.
- 4. Charge only what you pay to send the package. Or charge everyone the same amount, knowing you will lose money on large packages, but will make up for it on smaller ones. If your stated postage rates are unusually high, state why! (Insurance, special handling or packaging, etc.)
- 5. Take complaints seriously. An unresolved problem is usually a lost customer.

## **Auction Guidelines For Buyers**

- 1. First, make sure you are replying to an auction and not a set sale.
- 2. Note the minimum bid, and don't bid less than that. Also, don't say "I will top all bids" unless the auction allows it and, of course, you really mean it.
- 3. Mail in all bids unless the ad says phone-in bids are acceptable.
- 4 Remember the deadline. If none is stated, then the auction closes one month from the date on the cover. For example, if the auction is in the GOLDMINE dated October 15, the sale closes November 15.
- 5. If mailing bids, allow 1-2 weeks for your bids to arrive. And after an auction ends, allow 1-2 weeks for notification. If you haven't heard 14 days after the end of an auction, assume you won nothing unless the ad says that all bidders, win or lose, would be notified.
- 6. Honor all winning bids! If you are notified that your bid has won the item, send the money for your items within a week. Bidders reneging on their winning bids is the No. 1 complaint from those who run auction ads, If you can't honor your bid, at least have the courtesy to notify the advertiser.
- 7. Allow 2-4 weeks for your winnings to arrive.

## Auction Guidelines For Sellers

- 1. Set minimum bids on any item you won't sell for less. You also can set an auction-wide minimum; different minimums on different parts of the auction; or no minimums at all. Avoid "Ridiculous bids will be rejected" or similar phrases; you can't assume that everyone knows what a "ridiculous bid" is. Instead, take the time to set minimums.
- 2. Run an honest auction. Don't advertise items you don't have; don't artificially force bidders to bid more by claiming there's a counterbidder when there isn't one; don't overgrade your items; and sell all items that meet your published minimum and are the high bid, even if the bid is far below "book" value.
- 3. Notify winners within the first week after your deadline passes.
- 4. Send the winners their items promptly upon payment. (It's OK to wait for cnecks from unfamiliar customers to clear, which takes no more than a week. If it takes longer, get a new bank.) Federal Trade Commission regulations state that you must ship your items within 30 days.
- 5. Don't use your auction as a way to compile a mailing list unless you state that in your ad.
- 6. In sum: Treat your customers as you would want to be treated if you were the one bidding.

The Country Gentlemen. There's also a late-50s country feel (the era when Ray Price was cranking out monthly hits for Columbia) and more than a nod to the sound of western swing. Most of the latter is provided by Nathan Tinkham's fine steel guitar work.

A lot of these songs are rich in narrative detail. Tales about mine disasters; duplicity and imaginary prison breaks are all on display here. All members of Undertakin' Daddies (Kevin Barr, Bob Hamilton, George McConkey, and Nathan Tinkham) have credentials for their work as sidemen and producers on other people's albums. They've done well in this anonymous role, supporting Canadian artists such as Ian Tyson and Cindy Church. They've flirted with and even won Juno Awards the Canadian equivalent of the Grammy. This is their first solo shot. I'm not sure if they tour in a hearse, but they sure dress the part of undertakers. The 11 tracks on this CD are split between country/bluegrass standards and original material. Some of the originals have a wonderfully mordant streak running through them. "Pushin' Up Daisies" is sung from the viewpoint of a dead guy, who watches his ex and her new boyfriend visit his grave. He's sorry he can't manage a bouquet of roses for her. The best he can do is the daisies he's pushing up, literally. Only in Canada, eh? (Available through Festival Distribution, 1-800-633-8282.)

LITTLE RIVER BAND Where We Started From We Two (008)

Little River Band, one of the finest harmony groups of the '70s and '80s, is back with what could easily be their best album of all time. Given the plethora of major hits these guys have brought us, from "Happy Anniversary" and "The Other Guy" to "Reminiscing" and "The Night Owl," that is quite a bold statement. However, after a few spins of Where We Started From, I believe listners will agree.

The trademark harmonies that caused John Lennon to once call them the "best harmony group recording" are still securely intact, and having recently seen the band live, I can attest to the fact that they can still pull it off live with flying colors. No studio trickery here, folks.

Opening with one of several incredible new tracks, the title cut, "Where We Started From," kicks things off with the chorus so we can immediately experience that familiar sound, unmistakable to anyone who listened to this Australian pop-rock band during the '70s. These are wellwritten songs, packed with punch and melody, just like in the past. I don't know what it is with radio, but many times a would-be classic album like this gets overlooked because the band is looked upon as retro. Well, this is as fresh as it gets, Mr. DJ. Nobody deserves your air time more.

"This Place," "Magazine Girl" and "American Way" should all aspire to Top 40 status, and the ballad "Who Made The Moon" is absolutely beautiful. If that one doesn't tug at your heart strings, have your pulse checked.

The band pulls out two of their old favorites for rearrangement in an acoustic format, and both are very well done. "Cool Change" sounds like a brand-new tune with just enough of that old sound to draw you into a nostalgic daydream. "The Night Owls" is a remake of one of Little River Band's best tracks ever.

The hit machine has been pulled out of storage, is well-oiled and is cranked and ready to roll - and rock. Turn it up to 10.

**SPANIC BOYS Torture** Checkered Past (CPR021)

The father-and-son team of Tom and Ian Spanic has been making roots-rock records for more than a decade now, each one applying a similar formula of decades-past rock 'n' roll mixed with ringing vocals. Fans shouldn't expect much change from these guys, despite their numerous label jumps over the decade, and Torture, their seventh album, pretty much sounds like every other Spanic Boys release.

Which means there are plenty of rock 'n' roll joys to go along with the duo's limitations. This isn't particularly inventive or original music, and the grooving harmonies tend to sound like an

aged version of other family acts' blends (The Everly Brothers is the most obvious). Combining everything from jangly folk-rock to psychedelic, Beatles-esque rave-ups, Torture is a summation of a career guided by nostalgia.

The best songs here — "When You Fall" nods to The Byrds and the pretty, acoustic "She's The Kind Of Girl" recalls '70s-era alt-country — are familiar with rock's history. That's Torture's, as well as the Spanic Boys' main flaw: It knows its roots too well. Whatever ragged inspiration was initially there has been stripped and replaced by the need to sound authentic. Torture wants to sound like a classic rock platter — desperately. The production is rugged (although this may be more out of financial necessity than design), the feeling is loose, and the songs are hooky in all the right places, but there's something hollow about it all. Dressing this up like a vintage Chevy doesn't necessarily make it one.

MARK DOYLE Out Of The Past Free Will (FW 515)

Instrumental whiz Mark Doyle first achieved notoriety in the early '70s as the guitarist for Jukin' Bone (formerly Free Will), a solid rock group that released some records on RCA but never could snag the big-time brass ring.

Doyle went on to a number of studio gigs, both as a producer and a player; his résumé includes work with Meat Loaf and The New Kids On The Block, and he co-wrote a song called "Five Personalities" for The Richards (a song also on the next album by The Flashcubes). He has also worked extensively with former Jukin' Bone singer Jumpin' Joe Whiting in a variety of live and studio projects and has begun issuing solo albums, exploring and expanding his craft as a studio multi-instrumentalist.

Doyle's second solo effort, Out Of The Past, is an instrumental workout on the idea of gettin' your kicks in 1966. Doyle uses a mix of covers and original tunes to interpret the vibe of mid- to late-60s rock 'n' roll, with roots stretching back to the '50s. Although there is only one Yardbirds cover ("Still I'm Sad"), it's the spirit of that group that most clearly pervades Out Of The Past, its tracks subtly recalling the work of Yardbirds guitar god Jeff Beck even when Doyle is playing The Doors' "Crystal Ship." For those of us less-than enamored with Jim Morrison — a minority opinion, sure — Doyle's take can even be considered an improvement on the original.

The album opens with Doyle's cover of The Doors' "Moonlight Drive" and concludes with his take on the Tommy Edwards hit "It's All In The Game." Doyle's own title tune is both the album's simplest track and its most effective, conjuring the fuzz-tinged image of great mid-60s singles, LP tracks and B-sides with remarkable, delightful efficiency. A medley of The Rolling Stones' "Paint It, Black" with The Beatles' "Eleanor Rigby" works far better than you'd expect, and Doyle's version of The Beatles' "Tomorrow Never Knows" simply soars. Alongside these rock nuggets, Doyle eclectically places covers of The Jazz Crusaders' "Young Rabbits" and Nat King Cole's "The

#### DONNIE McCORMICK Hell Of A Note B Productions (2002)

When you spend your days wading through he sea of CDs that surround your desk like 1 do, it's really a great thing to slide a disc in that timulates your senses as mush as the new Donnie McCormick Hell Of A Note does.

"Fishbone Joe" is a great story song, writen by McCormick, as the bulk of these tunes ire. His voice has the power of Bobby Whitock blended with some real old Delta Missisippi blues vocal strains. Having listened to he CD several times, I keep going back to hese first two tracks, although the entire lbum is as fresh as a summer breeze.

Atlanta's McCormick first made a name or himself as singer in the seminal Southern oogie band Eric Quincy Tate and has since eleased some mighty fine solo music. Hell Of Note may be his best yet — 14 big tracks nd not a filler in the bunch.

The album also features a great shuffling lues number, penned by former bandmate Wayne Sauls, called "Let's Go Into Town" and real country track, "The Whiskey," that is raditional country injected with a whole lot f soul. "Spit In A Black Cat's Eye" is a ockin' blues number, and the set closer, Life Is Good (I Woke Up Today)" is a fast ocker with exceptional lyrics.

Grand Street Cryers would seem to have it all - solid songs, riveting arrangements and a radio-friendly focus. It's disappointing, then, that the band didn't get more mileage from their final effort, the self-titled Grand Street Cryers (Rainmaker Records RR79811-2), a driving, dynamic set of melodic rockers loaded with commercial credibility. While not quite as distinctive or instantly memorable as Steady On The Shaky Ground, the group's debut disc, songs such as "Blackout," "Gone" and "Home At Last" soar with anthemic authority. The Pernice Brothers are about guitars, darkling, provocative lyrics, smooth beds of strings and lushness and precision embodied in dreamy harmonies. Like Cardinal, Teenage Fan Club, and Superdrag, the Pernice Brothers reinvigorate '60s pop with their own distinctive and memorable sensibility.

Now that R.E.M. has embraced electronics and lost their relevance, it's heartening that the Pernice Brothers are raising the pop standard high, honing accessible, fully realized music that's particularly welcome - and rare - in our niche era.

#### VARIOUS ARTISTS

Down The Dirt Road: The Songs Of Charley Patten Telarc Blues (CD-83535)

Charley Patten was a generation older than Robert Johnson and Muddy Waters. He recorded his first song in 1929 and died in 1934, leaving the music world 50 original songs. Telearc Records put together this tribute of various artists to one of the architects of the Delta Blues.

'Elder Greene Blues" features Steve James, who also wrote the liner notes, on a sparse arrangement for the authentic sound of Patten's music. The rest of the contributing artists follow suit as Graham Parker plays and sings "Poor Me" accompanied only by his guitar. Charlie Musslewhite does the same treatment to "Pea Vine Blues." "Pony Blues" sounds as if it were recorded in the early '30s, as does all the material here. There is a beautiful rendition of "I Shall Not Be Moved" by Paul Rishell and Annie Raines. "Some of These Days" lifts up spirits with Levon Helms on drums and T-Bone Wolk on banjo and mandolin. Joe Louis Walker stretches out for more than seven minutes on the traditional "Sugar Mama." A cool guitar arrangement by Dave Van Ronk clicks on "Mississippi Bo Weavil Blues." "Moon Going Down" rocks along under just two minutes but makes its point.

A tuba — that's right, a tuba — joins Steve James' old-style blues voice and banjo for the happy-go-lucky "Shake It And Break lt." The very pretty instrumental blues of "Some Summer Day" smoothly fits in with Kid Bangham's sweet electric guitar work, supplemented with piano and organ by Dan Mckinney. "Down The Dirt Road/When Your Way Gets Dark" has Collen Sexton's vocals along with Gregg Hoover's slide guitar for a melodic ending. All these recordings, although recent, capture the sound - and possibly the spirit - of Patten.

GONZALO RUBALCABA Supernova Blue Note (7243 5 31172 2 1)

An extraordinary blend of imagination and authority, Rubalcaba's seventh Blue Note album effectively plaits Rubalcaba's African, Cuban and classical influences in music of the highest, most swinging order. Sparked by dazzling technique and aggressive melodicism, Rubalcaba's trio plays as if of one mind. Upright bassist Carlos Henriquez pops and arcs with aplomb (check his counterpoint on

The tunes span two versions of the title track that form a kind of an inner suite; a recasting of the Mexican "Alma Mia" as Cuban son; the daunting, rhythmically

"La Voz del Centro"), while drummer/"rain-

maker" Ignacio Berroa crafts remarkably

complicated original, "The Hard One"; and the most vivid of all, "El Cadete Constitucional," a danzon Rubalcaba's grandfather wrote some 100 years ago. Recast as a courtly shuffle, "Cadete" conjures images of elegance and order, like the plazas of Old Havana. The Ouintero brothers, Luis and Robert, flesh out Cadete" and the similarly visual "El Manicero" ("The Peanut Vendor") with congas, timbales and guiro, a gourd-based percussion instrument.

Rubalcaba generally hews to the acoustic piano, occasionally deploying synthesizers to make his modernist point. An astonishingly virtuosic player, his style simultaneously evokes Franz Liszt, Lennie Tristano, Fats Waller, and Thelonious Monk, yielding a muscular stylistic soufflé and a memorable album.

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# EVIS News

### A WORLD OF ELVIS MATERIAL

oreign releases dominate Goldmine's Elvis News this month, with some excellent entries. It always seems our American hero is more appreciated overseas than here, and that fact never sits right with me. He's ours forever, and we should never forget that — he's a blessing.

Japan's new series *Rock And Roll* — *The Greatest Years* is a winner with the first three volumes including the King ("Heartbreak Hotel," "Don't Be Cruel," "Blue Suede Shoes" and "Love Me Tender"). The covers show multiple stars, and a picture of Elvis on *Stage Show*, Tommy and Jimmy Dorsey's variety show, is among them. I agree with certain selections included — Paul Anka's "Diana," Neil Sedaka's "Calendar Girl" and Nancy Sinatra's "Boots" — but not Michael "Wacko" Jackson's "Ben" and The Carpenters' "Jamabalaya." The selections are not all '50s, which I would argue with anyone as the greatest years for everything — especially music.

Remember when the first set of 20 Japanese paper sleeves came out? Well, there was a promo vinyl extended-play record available, very limited and rare. The cover was exactly like our *Heartbreak Hotel EP*, but it has no back cover. I believe, as many other collectiors do, that all Elvis material from Japan is rare, especially vinyl. Have you seen the prices that are on Japanese Elvis vinyl? Buy a Caddy instead.

China has a compilation out this month, *Greatest Oldies Collection*. But with a scene from *Gone With The Wind* and Beatles pics on its cover, it's only a curiosity, as is the selection of tunes — Andy Williams (!), "Exodus" by Pat Boone (I really liked that song before this) Elvis' "L.M.T." and "High Noon" sung by Frankie Laine (I'm partial to Tex Ritter's version).

All The Great Songs I Love (a product from the Far East) parts two and three include "Can't Help Falling In Love" and "Wooden Heart." This is a VCD tribute to great movie songs and also includes Casablanca and James Bond tunes. Another new product from that area includes Power Love Song Station — 1970's with the man's "Shoppin' Around" and "If You Asked Me To" (among others). Remember when Natalie Wood traveled to Memphis and rode on Elvis' bike wearing that velvet-collared sport coat? If yes, a picture of that is on the cover. She was a gorgeous woman, and I don't think she traveled there for a bike ride or a good night kiss only.

A karaoke VCD (?) Songs Popularized By E.P. has all the basic hits, but why include Hank Williams' "Your" Cheatin' Heart"? Thailand also has some VCDs — both karacke — In The Style Of Elvis with drawn pinups on the covers. No need for these at all. Another Eastern title, Golden Oldie Of The Century (VCD) includes "Hotel" and some original footage, but "Funky Town" and "Sky High" are long-forgotten hits by one-hit wonders. (Since "Funky Town" made it to #1 and #6 for two one-hit wonders, does that make it a twice-hit wonder? — Ed.) People in this region have already booted 3000 Miles To Graceland — that was fast! — and included Chinese subtitles.

Korea (or China) chose an interesting title that got me— Best Love Songs Of 30 Years Before (a box set of five discs with Elvis tracks on four of them). It has some great pics but is odd also. You'll reminisce as I did on the neglected great songs of the '50s and '60s that are never included on any hits package. Ever notice that most of these various artists hits albums seem to choose biggies, but they're all the same selections?

Want to hear an ultra-weird combo two-CD package? James Brown And Elvis — new from south of the border. Elvis' disc is a boring, redundant Hayride compilation, but Brown, the "hardest working man in show business" does his stuff. Although he is no great singer, you have to admit he is a real performer, unlike a boring Tony Bennett, who I walked out on during a concert. Brown is in a class by himself. Listen to "Try Me." Try to find this set, even though it might be difficult since I don't think it sold well. Usually an Elvis guy would not

go out and buy one of Brown's albums. I bought it for Elvis, but Brown was the interesting part.

Elvis And Friends, a new version, has our guy doing seven '50s numbers and a cover with Fats Domino, plus Jerry Lee Lewis and that Boone guy again. Are they doing this just to annoy me and my fellow Elvis people? Besides that very poor "Tutti-Frutti" by the pure one, Carl Perkins does nice versions of "Hound Dog" and "Jailhouse Rock." but it's not even close to the real thing.

An album by Patty Loveless (I was always intrigued by her name, and if this is a stage name, her real name must be very bad.), I Try To Think About Elvis, has the lyrics on the cover. He's on her mind all the time? Smart girl. {Her given name was Ramey. Her first husband's last name was Lovelace but I think she changed it to get away from the Linda Lovelace Deepthroat connotation. — Jim Bagley, Goldmine Country Junction editor.}

Watch out for two new titles, Hound Dog and Heartbreak Hotel, as they both contain Hayride shows again. We've had these titles already. Fellas, cool it with the Hayride material.

Elvis Party Time (a brand-new edition) has an Aloha picture and a sexy '50s pose on the cover and disc. Danny Mirror ("I Remember E.P.") and The Jordanaires supply the music. If you buy this one, don't play it. Just look at the great cover.

Elvis: The Concert is going back to Australia again and to other areas also. I hope the rumor that the tour will appear at Madison Square Garden is true. I'll be there with my expensive stub, seeing that great show and remembering that it was there I saw Elvis in '72. Don't start me talking about that show! That was one of the greatest shows of all time. Elvis was not that popular in N.Y. until everyone heard and saw what he could do — everything!

That Rio guy has a gospel album out called the Voice Of Elvis. Need I go on?

In the late '80s, Songs Of Bob Dylan, deleted a long time ago, became popular, especially to Elvis folk, because it includes "Tomorrow Is A Long Time," which I know is underrated. Now, the album is sort of rare. Volume two came out last week with a subtitle, May Your Songs Always Be Sung Again. I have no problem with Mr. Zimmerman's music — 100 percent better than today's "hits." And they thought Dylan's lyrics were hard to bear back then. You translate rap to me and I'll give you a reward. So, Elvis does the same song, along with Harry Belafonte, Etta James, and Melanie. It actually is a birthday tribute to Dylan on his 60th — doesn't that make you feel old?

Stars Of Las Vegas: Nobody Does It Better depicts Elvis, Jose Feliciano (love his cover of The Doors' "Light My Fire") and Dolly Parton (no comment) on the cover — nice artwork. "That's All Right Mama" is Elvis' contribution, (very odd choice for a Vegas-inspired album — true?) along with Dean Martin, Nat King Cole, Bobby Darin, Liberace, and Frank Sinatra. Lots of talent here, with an inclusion of an insert telling about Vegas' past, starting with Bugsy Segal. A nice package with a low cost — buy it.

That Follow That Dream foreign series (the U.S. has lost out big time on this one) has Easter Special with Elvis in a tux on the cover. Check out the back and tell me our pretty boy didn't live up to his reputation — he looks fantastic. From material from the 1957 March Of Dimes awareness campaign (Elvis was involved) to "There Is No Gods But God," "Run On" and many other gospel titles. The song set is nice, but the cover is better. Speaking of the March Of Dimes, many years ago I bought the two versions of the 16-inch transcription discs from the campaign, {One disc is an interview disc, and the other has Elvis singing "Love Me Tender" and also has music from other performers, according to archivists at Graceland. — Ed.) which I could not play, as I know about their rarity. The guy from whom I purchased them also threw in a glossy press photograph of Elvis and the polio child with the huge lollypop. If you get this issue, look under the disc to know exactly what

photo I mean.

BBC Radio Europe put out a two-CD set, *Voices Of The Century*, containing "Suspicious Minds" along with songs by greats such as Buddy Holly, Roy Orbison, Al Jolson, and Bing Crosby. No big thing here and a dull package. Put this one on your least-wanted chart.

I reported on an album called *Good Rocking Tonight* some moons back. There are many with this title, but this one, by Rockatoon, has a cartoon cover and a poster bonus. The company's latest Elvis album, *Hayrides And Gambling Halls*, deals with the *Hayride* shows and songs recorded when Elvis got out of the army ('56-'61). "Fever" is always worth a listen. John Lennon once said, "Elvis died in the army," but that was proven wrong many times over, especially in the 1968-69 performances. Lennon was great musically, but this brilliant statement is almost as bad as when he said The Beatles were more popular than Jesus.

The Elvis fan club in Denmark celebrated the 10th anniversary of its Elvis convention with a CD, Funny How Time Slips Away, which has a classy glossy gatefold cover picturing Elvis being interviewed. The cover also has the straw hats background from Aloha. Reading the liner notes is not possible for a non-Danish speaking guy such as me and probably many fans reading this. An old boot, Alternate Aloha, has this cover also. Elvis Unlimited Production is the compilier, and it's a nice club to join, even if you have to deal with my old friend Henrik (who you'll learn to like, as I did). The release includes a message from Graceland executive Patsy Anderson, among introductions and talk from Elvis' crew and even a farewell. Buy this one. Also purchase Press Interview - a black gatefold two-CD set with royal choices for the enclosed photos, which date from '56 to '72 and include shots from Vegas, Texas, Hawaii, etc. The beautiful parcel got me, but I'm easy.

In The Shadow Of A Legend, yet another Danish job but a promo, has a nice cover, but it uses one of those unflattering pics. There are photos of Elvis, Vernon, and Gladys and even audio of a telephone call Vernon had after his son's death. Vernon also talks in interviews about Elvis' early days and other topics, highlighted with material from that classic '56 interview from Tupelo, some army interviews and a N.Y. clip. Lots more chat is included, and it's nice to have it all in one set.

I managed to obtain a CD of *Live Greatest Hits* with an interesting press release quoting Lennon's statement, "Before there was Elvis, there was nothing." The album, with exciting (but redundant) live performances, is a companion to Europe's 50 Greatest set that sold 700,000 in the first six weeks. So, what about releasing it in America? Ireland even has a new CD and booklet in a hang-up pack, using the cover of Japan's Mega Elvis album, but it's called Elvis Live. Very unusual song picks — "Spanish Begun" and two medleys from Vegas. This has very novel content. Try to find this one.

Elvis' Greatest Hits (two CDs) uses the same cover of the past-reported Swedish set. The insert on this one shows picture sleeves of the past. Don't forget to get the promo single "Are You I onesome Tonight" (laughing version) for this CD.

If you go for tributes, as I do, Ronnie McDowell honors the King (a Danish album), talks about his hit, "The King Is Gone," and performs the regular Elvis hits.

Elvis At The Movies has that Andy Warhol Elvis painting from Flaming Star. This release has 10 songs and is produced in the U.K. but has a sticker that says, "Made in Italy"! The insert for this one has titles and pictures relating to each song Nice inexpensive buy.

On a TV station in Europe, there recently was an ad to buy an album, Film Hits — 40 Best Film Music with a cover that pictures Elvis, Marilyn Monroe, Martin, and Lee Marvin (?) This BMG Special Products CD contains "Teddy Bear." (absolutely love the scene where his perfect hair is falling and it looks great. He's wearing that satin Western shirt that would love to own. It resides in a fan's house in the Midwest who wouldn't take a million dollars for it. She was a contestant on the old Groucho Marx TV show You Bet Your Life Don't ask me how I know this fact because I don't remember. Martin sings a song from his TV show (film?), Chuck Berry performs "You Never Can Tell" from Pulp Fiction and Casablanca's Dooley Wilson does "As Time Goes By," a classic song from my all-time favorite film.

Next month I'll review the new RCA releases. I know you will not be disappointed in them — well, only in their cost!

There have been Roy Orbison boxed sets before — but certainly none on this spectacular scale.

Seven jam-packed discs contain everything the Big O cut from 1955 to "Ride Away," his first MGM hit a decade later. The set encompasses previously unreleased acetates of "Ooby Dooby" and The Clovers' "Hey! Miss Fannie" (shipped off to Columbia Records, never to be heard again until now); his ultra-rare, pre-Sun Records coupling of "Ooby Dooby" and "Trying To Get To You" for the tiny Texas-based Je-Wel label; considerably different alternates of a slew of well-known Sun titles (including three more extremely similar "Ooby Dooby"s and a spoken-word rendition of the terminally wimpy Bill Justis-penned "Chicken-Hearted" that must have horrified Orbison upon playback); previously unreleased renditions of "An Empty Cup" (covered by Buddy Holly) and "Cat Called Domino" (choppier than the ominous Sun version, with a Tex-Mex drive) from a '57 session at Norman Petty's studio in Clovis, N.M.; and four duet demos from the turn of the decade by Orbison and songwriting partner Joe Melson (three ballads and the rocking "She's Okay").

The packaging is sumptuous, in typical Bear Family fashion — Colin Escott's fascinating essay on Orbison is housed in an LP-sized hardcover book blessed with more vintage shots of Orbison than have been likely gathered in one spot before. The book also includes a detailed Orbison sessionography.

Though retroactively painted as a reluctant rockabilly, the bespectacled Texan sounded anything but on his first sizzling single for Sam Phillips' legendary Memphis-based Sun label in 1956. His initial hit (you guessed it!) "Ooby Dooby" was coupled with the equally incendiary original "Go! Go! Go!" Both cuts enjoyed tough support from The Teen Kings, the combo Orbison fronted in west Texas.

Along with his Sun encore pairing "Rock House" and "You're My Baby" (again with The Teen Kings), these are the purest studio examples of Orbison's stinging rockabilly attack and showcase his exceptional and often overlooked lead guitar work, peppered with two-string slides and brisk bottom-end boogie riffs.

The Kings didn't dig it when Orbison ended up top-billed on "Ooby Dooby" and soon departed, but Orbison cut some snarling rockers with Sun's house musicians in '57 ("Mean Little Mama," "I Like Love," "Problem Child") and a dud or two (the aforementioned "Chicken-Hearted").

Disc three will be a revelation for anyone not in possession of its single-CD incarnation on Fuel 2000: Orbison and The Teen Kings roaring through 16 rockers on their locally aired Texas TV program in the spring of '56 (whoever thought they'd hear the Big O cut loose on "Rip It Up," "Brown-Eyed Handsome Man," "Lawdy Miss Clawdy" or "Blue Suede Shoes" — especially with sound quality this crisp and full?).

A 1958 dalliance at RCA Victor under the recently deceased Nashville honcho Chet Atkins' watch produced four fairly dreary items and the wonderful Orbison-penned rocker "Almost Eighteen." But Nashville proved Orbison's salvation once he signed on the dotted line at Fred Foster's then-established Monument Records. His first '59 session for the company resulted in lots and lots of takes of "Paper Boy" and the storming "With The Bug," none deemed usable. But after that, little he cut for Foster wasn't revered. With Music Row's "A" Team (including bassist Bob Moore, yakety saxist Boots Randolph, guitarist Hank Garland, pianist Floyd Cramer, and drummer Buddy Harman) at Orbison's behest, his staggering pipes confidently soared heavenward on a thrilling blanket of strings and voices, as he delivered some of the most heartbreaking ballads ever devised for pop consumption (most of them written by Orbison with Melson and later Bill Dees).



Beginning in 1960 with the shattering "Only The Lonely and extending through "Blue Angel," "I'm Hurtin'," the paranoid "Running Scared," an incomparably suicidal "Crying," a picturesque "Blue Bayou," the fragile "In Dreams" and "It's Over," Orbison established himself as the principal pop-rock balladeer of the early '60s. (Outfitted in a black-dyed pompadour and mysterious shades, his reign was challenged only by Gene Pitrey.) There are up-tempo smashes too — the bluesy "Dream Baby" and "Candy Man," a jackhammer '63 cover of Elvis Presley's "Mean Woman Blues" and his immortal '64 chart-topper "Oh, Pretty Woman," which at least momentarily held the British Invasion at bay with a fascinating storyline peppered with Orbison's saucy trademark growl and "Mercy!" exclamation.

One of the side benefits of this box is the chance to revisit all the Monument album tracks and B-sides that haven't been reissued as extensively - the verdant "Blue Avenue," the frisky "Loneliness" and "Dance" (the latter sporting a sizzling Randolph sax break), chilling 1960 renditions of Don Gibson's "(I'd Ee) A Legend In My Time" and Boudleaux Bryant's tremulous "Love Hurts," dynamic arrangements of Shirley & Lee's "Let The Good Times Roll" and Ray Charles' "What'd I Say" and plenty of rare alternate takes. Even on the sweetest violin-drenched ballads, Orbison's magnificent voice is never less than spine-chilling; he even renders fascinating the 11 Coca-Cola radio spots closing the last disc.

This lavish collection merits the ultimate accolade: It's as sensational as Orbison's voice itself. (PO Box 1154, D-27727 Hambergen, Germany)

Luther Vandross is a sweet soul singer of the highest order. In the '80s, you couldn't touch him. He is smooth, suave and sophisticated, and he writes, produces and arranges his own material. Coming from a well-documented and studied session/studio career in the '70s (most notably a Juicy Fruit gum commercial and David Bowie's "Young Americans"), Vandross was already a made man by the time his debut solo album, Never Too Much, was released in 1981 (there was a failed attempt by Vandross at a guy-group thing in the '70s).

Since then, he's been — like his much-tallied weight — up and down. He has recorded a couple genuinely classic R&B albums, several #1 soul songs and a catalog full of good intentions (mostly something to do with keeping the spirit of

honest soul music alive). Listened to today, Vandross' albums (four of which - Never Too Much; '82's Forever, For Always, For Love; '86's Give Me The Reason; and '91's Power Of Love - have recently been remastered) reveal an artist rooted in the past, playing in the present, and looking toward the future.

That structure often left him open to stumbles. Never Too Much, the best of the bunch and, next to '85's The Night I Fell In Love, his most satisfying work, plays by contemporary rules (the R&B rhythms are a bit stiff, trying to work out a post-disco groove) but it still feels a bit rigid. However, Vandross soars over the songs — the title tune, "Sugar And Spice (I Found Me A Girl)" and "Don't You Know That?" were both hits - bringing it all together with compelling style and tone.

Yet Vandross is only as good as, or maybe a little better than, the material (Never Too Much began Vandross' obsession with the Burt Bacharach-Hal David songbook, which he still dips into; his latest album includes two Bacharach compositions). Which makes the following year's Forever, For Always, For Love sound like a bit of a knock-off, playing within the same territory as Never Too Much but never quite building to that landmark. Only the canny medley of "Bad Boy/Having A Party" is really worthy of the singer.

By '86's Give Me The Reason, Vandross was back in the groove. Pre-Pro Tools engineering, the studio-generated hum lends the album an unwanted clinical sound but still offers the singer in prime voice. "Stop To Love" and "There's Nothing Better Than Love," his kinda-dippy duet with Gregory Hines, are highlights. Power Of Love is more of the same, Vandross effortlessly working his "loverman" persona, and despite achieving mixed results, "Power Of Love/Love Power" is a deserving #1 R&B song.

These four reissues emphasize both the beauty and flaws of the recordings. Vandross wisely balances club grooves with ballads on these decade-spanning albums. The songs are simultaneously sexy and soulful, both a nod to his past and a wink to the future. Taken together, they chart the first part of the career of an artist dedicated to professionalism and sweet soul music.

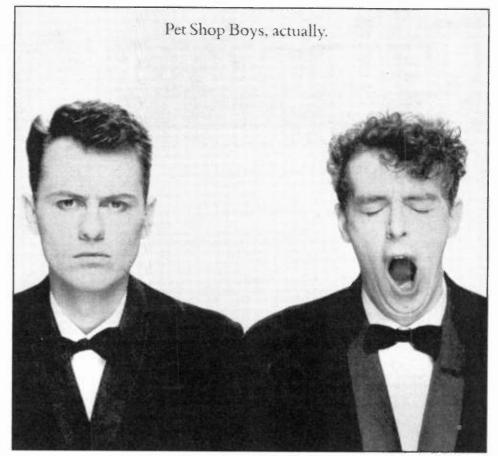

The camp inherent to the Pet Shop Boys catalog is not only intentional, it's the point of their records. If the idea of recording Village People's gay anthem "Go West" with a lumberjack-like men's choir bellowing the chorus doesn't strike listeners as absurdly funny, then Pet Shop Boys' main joke — brilliantly played up on their first five albums - will probably make these '80s-era albums sound positively dated. It's heavy, gay-themed club disco, but the satire, irony, and bored cynicism at the root of the albums make them so much more.



Five limited-edition reissues of the Pet Shop Boys' seminal work - Please ('86), Actually ('87), Introspective ('88), Behaviour ('90), and Very ('93) - are packaged as two-CD sets, a remastered version of the original on one disc and a bonus disc filled with Bsides, remixes and unreleased tracks. Titled Further Listening, these collectors' extras sort through a decade of material (each bonus CD

fits the time period and album it accompanies) and pretty much gather the bulk of the Pet Shop Boys' non-album recordings.

Most significantly, they bring together a series of singles — including "Always On My Mind" and "Where The Streets Have No

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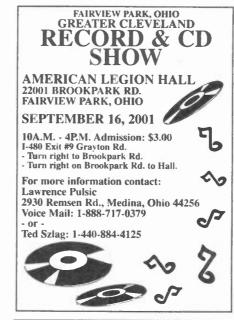
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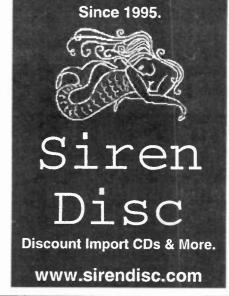

Name (1 Can't Take My Eyes Off You)" that never found a place on the proper albums (excluding other compilations, and there have been several)

The heart of these reissues, however, is the original quintet. The developing line through the work (Please is weak, Very is their best piece) can be traced just as readily as the Pet Shop duo of Neil Tennant and Chris Lowe's infatuation and infiltration of club culture. The British boys adopted U.S. house music for their most discooriented work, Introspective (six songs expanded to album length), sucked it all in and rolled it back out as a big dance party on Very. Only the debut Please lacks focus. Yet, it does contain their best, and breakthrough, single, "West End Girls."

With Actually, they mined a sublime balance of radio-ready singles ("What Have I Done To Deserve This?" with Dusty Springfield, "It's A Sin") and thematic album tracks ("One More Chance," "King's Cross"). It's a formula that continued, successfully, all the way through Very (after that, Pet Shop Boys became more insular, and subsequent albums sound hollow and impersonal).

The singles fuel the repertoire — "Domino Dancing" and "Left To My Own Devices" (Introspective), "So Hard" and "How Can You Expect To Be Taken Seriously?" (Behaviour),

"Can You Forgive Her" and "Go West" (Very) - but there are plenty of other smart and subversive things going on within the grooves.

Each set comes with a 36-page book containing interviews, lyrics and exclusive photos. They cover the basics as well as some revealing tidbits (Lowe admits he's a Beastie Boys fan, catching even longtime partner Tennant off guard). Tennant repeatedly references classical music as starting points for many of his songs but acknowledges his catering to club tastes, as well as the soaked-in humor that also served as catalysts. Acute listeners, though, already know that. These beautiful remasters merely dust off the nostalgia.

GOLDEN FARRING The Devil Made Us Do It Universal (549 149-2) (Four CDs) (Dutch

They had a thang. Switch on oldies radio any time of the day or night and sooner or later it'll come frolicking through the ether - "no more speed I'm almost there " one of the greatest songs in motorvatin' history, Chuck Berry and "Roadrunner" and "Autobahn" all rolled into one, "we got a thing called Radar Love." Mention Golden Earring to the average English-speaking rock fans, and "Radar Love" will be the first thing they think of. Probably the last as well.

True, they are one of the stars of Nuggets II; true, too, they scored a miner U.K. radio hit with "Sleepwalkin" a couple of years after the smash. But specialists and lunatics alone care for such minutea. No matter that the Dutch rockers have a 35-year career that stretches back to the Beat Boom era - no matter, either, that they have released more putatively classic albums than any other band of their era. Golden Earring might be the biggest band on their homeland scene. but once the tulips and windmills fade from view, so does all sense of perspective. They had a thang - and they're stuck with it.

Four discs tell the Golden Earring story, three running through their career highlights in strict chronological order, a fourth sweeping up sundry rarities and oddities for the sake of collectors everywhere. We open, then, with "Please Go," The Golden Earrings' (as they were then called) first Dutch hit from September 1965; we close with "Yes We're On Fire," from summer 2000; and, in between times, we experience some almost shockingly unexpectedly exhilarating highs. 1971's "She Flies On Strange Wings" is a seven-minute epic of Who-like proportions, singlehandedly serving up proof that "Radar Love" was no fluke. The band had been great

Of course Golden Earring have had some lows to match the highs. The late 1970s punk movement dealt their equilibrium something of a blow, as the band suddenly discovered that high-octane rock and organic liquid riffing were suddenly no longer the mood of the moment. In common with virtually every classic rock band of the age, they then spent the 1980s in fairly dire straits, nodding toward whichever foul flavors were in vogue at the time and quite forgetting the personable uniqueness that had allowed them to survive in the first place.

"Something Heavy Going Down " from 1984, was a minor classic, but the second

THE LATE GREAT JOHNNY ACE AND THE TRANSITION FROM R&B TO ROCK 'N' ROLL

by James M. Salem University Of Illinois Press (Paperback, \$19.95)

The more recent publication of the paperback edition of The Late Great Johnny Ace calls for a review, as the hardback did not get Goldmine's attention back in 1999. James M. Salem does two things in this book - tells the story of one of the most famed R&B figures in history, Johnny Ace, and then shows how his career represented the emergence of rock 'n' roll in the mid-1950s. He must face formidable hurdles in both, and that he succeeds is testament to the depth of his research and the

thoughtfulness of his arguments. Ace is virtually unknown by

the mainstream audience. He is one of those acts who unfortunately has slipped through the cracks of long-term appreciation - because his career ended just as rock 'n' roll emerged in that key year of 1955, and his balladheavy repettoire is not something today appreciated by rock critics and blues critics (a self-

inflicted mental malady of these professions, alas). A few blues reviewers of this book, for example, lacking a critical ear, have failed to distinguish Ace's solidly R&B work from Nat

King Cole's pop repertoire.

Salem removes Ace's obscurity by masterfully showing how this Memphis singer experienced one of the most meteoric careers in R&B, where in little more than two years August 1952 to December 1954 - he recorded eight Top 10 R&B hits for Don Robey's Duke Records (three of them hit #1). He shows how Ace was such a phenomenon n the black community that much of his recording legacy is still remembered by that

audience today and has been often reprised by other artists.

Ace's hit songs are "My Song" (#1), "Cross My Heart" (#3), "The Clock" (#1), 'Saving My Love For You" (#2), "Please Forgive Me" (#6), "Never Let Me Go" (#9), "Pledging My Love" (#1) and "Anymore" (#7). (Interestingly, the lowest charting song, "Never Let Me Go," is the Ace song that has been most recorded by other artists, notably by The Impressions.) Then he ended his career - stupidly, not tragically - by shooting himself to death while playing Russian Roulette on Christmas Day

Salem removes Ace's obscurity by masterfully showing how this Memphis singer experienced one of the most meteoric careers in R&B, where in little more than two years — August 1952 to December 1954 — he recorded eight Top 10 R&B hits for Don Robey's Duke

Records (three of them hit #1).

1954. (Despite everything you've read, the "suicide" took place on Dec. 25, not Dec. 24, as Salem shows.) "Pledging My Love," released subsequently, became Ace's first and only record to cross over into the pop market, reaching #17 on the Pop chart.

Salem successfully argues how Johnny Ace's "Pledging My Love" became the most significant black crossover record in the emerging rock 'n' roll revolution. To do this, he demonstrates how the year 1955, above any other, was the significant transitional year in the emergence of rock 'n' roll. Salem's work represents how academic history can bring greater insight and greater accuracy to

the recording of popular music history.

By accuracy, I mean in terms of getting the true story. There are some minor factual errors that distract only a little from this excellent work. For example, the Lee Andrews And The Hearts' "The Clock" is not Ace's song, Billy Ecktein should be spelled Billy Eckstine (notwithstanding some trade ads that said "Eckstein"), and Johnny Otis discovered not Mel Evans but Mel Walker. Also, Salem makes it sound as though St. Clair Alexander recorded only one single, in 1986, when in fact he recorded a number of singles in the early

In accessing the influence of Ace, Salem has overlooked the strong presence of Ace

in the body of R&B music that is appreciated by Mexican-Americans, who loved his heartfelt balladry, notably "Cross My Heart" and "Never Let Me Go.

Salem has made extensive use of the published record on Ace and Duke Records and has interviewed some key people, notably Duke Records executive and booking agent Evelyn Johnson, engineer Bill Holford,

producer David James Mattis, and family members St. Clair Alexander (brother), Lois Jean Alexander (wife), and Norma Williams Alexander (sister)

Salem is an academic - he is a professor and chair of American studies at the University Of Alabama - but readers will not find in this book dry, mind-numbing, jargonfilled prose that infests so much of academia. The Late Great Johnny Ace is a terrific read and keeps you turning the pages, even when you know how it ends. This is the most exciting book on popular music that this reviewer has read in the past few years.

# Steady stream of Beatles-related material means there's always something new to collect

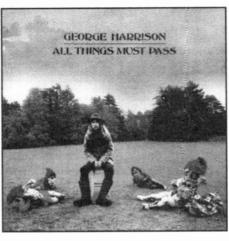
Individual members of The Beatles never are idle, with reissues of solo projects and new guest appearances hitting shelves recently. That constant stream of product means that there are always more recordings (promos, imports and variations thereof as well) to track down on both sides of the Atlantic. This article is the first of a series, because Goldmine knows that collectors want all the minscule details when it comes to The Beatles and Apple-related releases.

#### All Things Must Pass — 30th anniversary

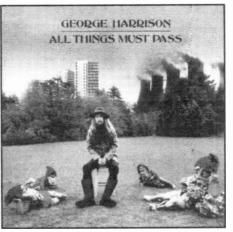
The quiet Beatle spent the latter half of 2000 preparing the re-release of his triumphant 1970 three-LP set, All Things Must Pass (Capitol CDP-7243-5-30474-2-9). The set is neatly packaged in a replica of the original box set — though slightly updated. The original Tom Wilkes/Barry Feinstein cover photo of George Harrison with his garden gnomes has been colorized with watercolors. Both of the CDs in the package now comes in its own pouchette, each (along with the cover of the 20-page booklet) showing different, incremental encroachment of the outside world on Harrison's beloved Friar Park. The booklet itself features lyrics, track notes by Harrison and outtake photos from both the cover shoot and that used for the "My Sweet Lord" picture sleeve. The album's freebie original poster, showing Harrison near a window at Friar Park, is shown in the booklet - along with an updated version of Harrison in the same spot, taken by his son, Dhani. The set was released Jan. 23, 2001, delayed from an initial release date of Nov. 21, 2000, as that date didn't provide ample time to prepare proper marketing for the release, following a quick announcement by Harrison of its impending issue.

David Costa, who has designed all of Harrison's/Traveling Wilburys' sleeve art since Cloud Nine (with the exception of Live In Japan, which was designed by Rick Ward) as well as layout for the recent Beatles Anthology book, noted that the cover is not a scan of the original but was rebuilt using the original photograph. The cover font, an unusual one selected originally by Wilkes in 1970, is not one commonly found in computer graphics programs. "We found it in a font book and had to scan it, letter by letter, to reproduce it," said Costa. Regarding the humorous updated sleeve design, Costa, who has known Harrison since the '60s, noted, "He does have a very Python-esque

The disc labels feature a gnome in purple, the gnome being the mascot of this reissue. One will also notice, besides the Capitol logo, a logo for another record label, written as "gn\_" followed by the "Om" symbol. Put them together, and it's - "Gnome" Records. Costa notes that there is no such entity -"It's something we hit on together and decided to use.









The outside world is encroaching on Friar Park on George Harrison's All Things Must Pass: from the cover (top left) to the CD pouchettes to the booklet cover (bottom right).

The bar code wasn't designed into the back of the box art, so the various EMI labels around the world had to produce small bar code stickers to adhere to the shrink wrap on the back. On the front can be found a purple and black elliptical product sticker.

A pair of CD-R discs were prepared by Capitol Mastering as advance CDs, issued

One rare and very collectable item was produced which, unfortunately, not many fans have seen. Though Paul McCartney was the first Beatle to issue a 3-D lenticular cover commercially, Harrison was actually the first to put one out this year. Kodak Digital Imaging manufactured about 1,000 lenticular plastic cover stickers for Harrison's use in promoting the All Things Must Pass reissue - that's 1.000 for worldwide distribution. making them extremely rare. The sticker, depending on how it's tilted, brings in or removes approximately 20 individual image elements - those pictured on the CD pouchettes and booklet (bridge, gas station, etc.). They were originally to be distributed already placed onto an All Things Must Pass 30th anniversary box cover, but most, it appears, if found at all, are loose, still with their paper backing.

EMI in England also issued the new rerelease on vinyl LP. The set comes, again, in a fine replica/update of the original LP box (minus the spine printing). Like the CDs, each LP comes in its own sleeve - though, as you may have figured, there are three "inner bags" (U.K. term for album sleeves) instead of the two in the CD set, since there are three LPs, making the third sleeve unique in design (it adds in a rowhouse structure behind the gas station). The side split for the tracks, by the way, is also unique on the LP set. On the CDs, disc one features the first two LP sides, plus the five bonus tracks; disc two has sides three and four, plus the Apple Jam (retitled Original Jam). On the LP reissue, the original LP sides are more accurately reproduced, adding one bonus track per side at the end of each. The Original Jam appears on the third LP, as the Apple Jam did, though in Harrison's new chronological order, as it appears on the CDs. The eight-page booklet also features an additional photo of Harrison not found in the CD booklet, showing him holding an umbrella while with his gnomes.

Both Capitol and EMI issued an identical eight-track CD sampler from the All Things Must Pass reissue (EMI's with a Parlophone logo), titled All Things Must Pass - Special Advance Sampler. The Capitol disc (Capitol DPRO-7087-6-15912-2-4) was released Jan. 4, 2001, the U.K. one (Parlophone CDLRL-043) shortly afterward, on Jan. 15, 2001 (and, no, the -043 selection number doesn't mean anything special — it's just one in a series of EMI promo discs). Featured are: "My Sweet Lord," "What Is Life," "Isn't It A Pity," "Ballad Of Sır Frankie Crisp (Let It Roll)," "Wah-Wah," "Beware Of Darkness," "All Things

Must Pass" and, added as an "Additional Track," the updated "My Sweet Lord (2000)."

The disc comes in a standard lewel case. with a full-color, two-sided, single-sheet front insert (the back side has info about the upcoming reissue) and a white-on-black tray card, with spot purple on the "Gnome" logo. The disc label is identical to the commercial CD set labels, with the purple gnome.

Capitol issued a second promotional CD to accompany the release two months later, titled A Conversation With George Harrison (Capitol DPRO-7087-6-15950-2-4). Harrison had been at the Capitol Tower on Feb. 15, 2001, participating in a pair of online chats (his first) in the company's ninth floor conference room. After that, he and publicist Elizabeth Freund went downstairs to one of Capitol's vintage studios to record an interview, using questions provided by musicologist Chris Carter (Carter then skillfully replaced Freund with his own radio-friendly voice, making it appear as if it were he asking the questions). The disc was promptly put on the Capitol production schedule the following week and released a month later, on March 26, 2001.

The package comes in a standard jewel case, with an eight-page booklet. The booklet contains the script for the interview, with individual tracks for both questions and answers (a total of 13 such Q&As). The front cover has a modified Harrison-with-umbrella shot (someone has drawn in some blue fringes on the umbrella): the back cover features the fullcolor modern shot of Harrison in front of his hallway window, with a mini of the reissue cover. The disc label features the same lightpurple image as the background from the CD booklet lyric pages, with label copy in white. Slightly more than 4,000 of the discs were produced - a great item to own, with a happy, conversational Harrison.

Prior to the reissue, Capitol released a seven-inch promotional single featuring "My Sweet Lord" backed with "My Sweet Lord (2000)" (Capitol 7PRO-7087-6-15930-7-5, released Jan. 17, 2001). The disc comes in a beautiful picture sleeve, a replica of the original sleeve issued in November 1970. As Costa did, Capitol's art department had to recreate the sleeve font by scanning and piecing it together - incredibly effective. The sleeve was printed by Shorewood, who produced many of the Beatles LPs and seveninch sleeves in the '60s. The back features the same picture of Harrison in front of his hallway window as on the interview CD back, with sleeve copy to its right. The disc has a plain white backdrop with black label copy, printed by the disc's pressing plant. Specialty Records. The disc was cut by Capitol's Ron McMaster in mid-December. A total of approximately 5,800 singles were manufactured and distributed for promotional use.

half of the decade disappears in a mere four songs - and hurrah to that. The 1990s brought about a rejuvenation of savage proportions. The Bloody Buccaneers album was Golden Earring's best in 10 years; the Naked Truth live set put the then-fashionable "unplugged" approach to fine use; and the Love Sweat covers collection unveiled some defiantly dynamic material. Unfortunately, just one cut from that set, Bob Dylan's "This Wheel's On Fire," makes the box, but if you can find the rest of the album, do so.

The rarities disc, subtitled From The Treasure Chest, is, predictably, the most inconsistent of the four, its contents ranging from a 1966 Coke commercial through to cuts from various band members' solo albums and side projects. A few out-takes and B-sides from the band's own career make it in as well, though, including the blistering "I Need Love," an almost comical "rock remix" of 1986's "Gimme A Break" and the aptly titled closer, a live "Last Blast Of The Century."

In fact, the only real downfall to the entire package is that, as a Dutch import, the bulk of the information in the 48-page booklet is, naturally, written in Dutch. Song titles and writing credits, of course, readily translate, while a generous collection of pictures and record sleeves need no captioning. The wealth of further text, however, will probably remain a mystery to the uni-lingual reader. Thankfully, the music itself knows no barriers.

**ECHO & THE BUNNYMEN** Crystal Days 1979-1999 Warner Archives (R2 74263) (Four CDs)

For one perfect moment Echo & The Bunnymen threw their shadow across the world, and the earth stopped spinning to bask in their glory. OK, maybe not, but the band once really had that kind of effect on people, and, at their best, for sheer exhilaration, innovation and entertainment, the Bunnies couldn't be beat.

The Bunnymen story is told for the first time here across the four stuffed discs that encompass Crystal Days. The first three are arranged chronologically, kicking off with the group's debut (a track on the 1979 Street To Street Liverpool compilation album) and ending with a pair of tracks from their last album.

Wisely, disc one and two are given over to their early glory days (1979-1984) and are filled with seven-inch and 12-inch singles, album cuts and, for collectors, a pair of previously unreleased recordings done for Radio One DJ John Peel.

Disc three finishes the story and includes

### Book review

THE COMPLETE BOOK OF THE BRITISH **CHARTS: SINGLES AND ALBUMS** by Tony Brown, Jon Kutner & Neil Warwick Foreword by Paul Gambaccini

Omnibus Press (1,250 pages, trade paper-

back, \$24,95)

For more than half a century, record collectors in America and Britain have shared a mutual fascination regarding one another's musical tastes. Nowhere is the tell-tale evidence of the always-changing trends in pop music more glaring than in the U.S. and U.K. record charts. These weekly rankings have long served as the accepted barometer of public opinion, whether reflecting an international consensus (e.g. Elvis Presley, The Beatles, David Bowie, Queen) or accentuating the provincial disconnect over musical artists whose degree of commercial success never fully translated across the Atlantic (e.g. the lengthy chart careers in Britain for Cliff Richard, Cilla Black, Ultravox and Kylie Minogue; corresponding chart runs stateside for Johnny Rivers, Young Rascals, Jim Croce, and The Guess Who.)

The Complete Book Of The British Charts: Singles And Albums presents a comprehensive listing every single, EP and album to hit the British charts since 1952. The bulk of the data (1960-2000) has been drawn from the authoritative Record Retailer-Music Week charts. Essentially, this is the U.K. counterpart to Joel Whitburn's excellent Billhoard-based chart books in the U.S.

Artists are listed alphabetically (beginning with the British pop act "A" and concluding with the U.S. rock trio ZZ Top) with each entry providing title, record label, date of chart entry, highest chart position and total weeks spent on the chart. Soundtracks, various artists and hits compilations

are similarly detailed. Wisely, the authors have included complete indexes, making the search for an individual record extremely easy.

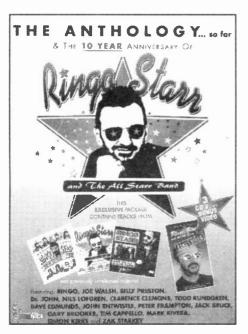
Not to be discounted is the book's outstanding economic value: what previously required the purchase of two separate volumes (one book for the singles, another for the albums) has been combined into one massive edition. The Complete Book Of The British Charts: Singles And Albums is without question the reference source of choice for record collectors, music historians, journalists and casual music fans wishing to examine the unique world of the British hit

chipped another cool jukebox single into the fray (EMI-Capitol Music Special Markets S7-7243-8-58983-7-2, released March 20, 2001). This one features "My Sweet Lord (2000)" backed with "All Things Must Pass," pressed on nice Apple-green vinyl. (The label had proposed to the Harrison camp the original "My Sweet Lord" backed with the album's second single, "What Is Life," but Harrison and Company preferred the updated version.) Approximately 5,000 discs were made — making this single actually slightly more rare than the promotional seven-inch mentioned above.

By the way, jukebox-single collectors will notice a slight addition to the "For Jukeboxes Only!" disclaimer on the disc label (a standard Capitol purple label with silver print). "Not For Sale" appears beneath that legend as well. No, this is not specific to the Harrison disc. A Special Markets spokesman said that it is a new addition to all jukebox singles, Harrison's simply being among the first.

#### Ringo's All Starr Band Anthology

The drumming Beatle also had a release earlier this year, though, until recently, not in the U.S. In Europe, Ringo Starr issued a fine three-CD collection chronicling his years as the leader of the All-Starr Band. Ringo Starr And His All-Starr Band — The Anthology... So Far was issued in Europe by Eagle Records (Eagle EEECD-0011) Feb. 5, 2001.

Starr had announced the coming of the set at the launch of his fifth All Starr Band tour — two years earlier, in February 1999 — for release later that summer. At the time, the album was to have encompassed performances from the first four All Starr tours, with a total of 44 tracks. But as the usual production and approval process stretched out, two more All Starr Bands had made the rounds, so adjustments were made prior to release to include songs from the fifth and sixth All Starr tours, as well.

Track selection was made by Starr and the tours' promoter, David Fishof {profiled in Goldmine #550, Aug. 24, 2001. — Ed.} and assembled in England at Hatch Farm

Studios, by none other than Nick Smith, son of Norman Smith, The Beatles' original Abbey Road recording engineer!

The set was originally to have been sold in Europe on television (via TV Shop, a European Home Shopping Channel-type) and was to include a 25-minute video featuring highlights from the tours, but that arrangement never materialized. Starr also filmed an infomercial for the set, recorded on July 22, 1999, at the home of Eagle Records Chairman Terry Shand (who lives near Starr's home in Sussex). The U.S. release, without the video, was to have come via California-based Pyramid Records. Eventually, however, both deals were canceled.

Interesting to note, art was prepared for that original release, with the title appearing as: THE ANTHOLOGY ... so far & The 10-Year Anniversary Of Ringo Starr And The All Starr Band. The cover design is similar to the art used on Blockbuster's 1997 Ringo Starr And His Third All Starr Band, Vol. 1, featuring a yellow background and a drawing of Starr but including poster images from the represented tours' posters below. Each disc was to have been housed in its own pouchette (as in the All Things Must Pass reissue), with a 12page booklet featuring liner notes by The Hollywood Reporter's John Lappin. The cover was redesigned in September 2000, with the addition of tracks by Eric Carmen and Dave Edmunds, and the individual pouchettes

The set comes in a full-color box-set slip cover, with a three-CD multi-disc "clam box" jewel case inside. The booklet has the same full-color image of Starr on the front and back, with black and white text and photos (including Lappin's notes) inside. The disc labels are a dark blue, with light blue label copy.

The album was released in the U.S. July 24, 2001, on Koch Progressive. The label also issued a small supply of three-disc advance CDs and possibly recorded a 10-track sampler, some things to keep an eye out for.

#### Paul McCartney meets lan Dury

McCartney contributed a track to a tribute album to the late new-waver, Ian Dury, an all-star remake of his classic LP, Brand New Boots And Panties (East Central One NEWBOOTS 2CD), released only in Britain (so far) April 9, 2001. The set contains tracks by the likes of Robbie Williams, Sinead O'Connor, and others, for the most part backed by Dury's original band, The Blockheads.

Such was the case for McCartney, who recorded a fiery version of "I'm Partial To Your Abracadabra." McCartney taped his dynamite vocal Sept. 26, 2000 at Helicon Mountain Studios, the studio of Jools Holland, old friend to both Dury and McCartney, best-known to Beatles fans for his Fab interviews in *The Beatles Anthology*. McCartney hit the nail on the head on the first take (though he did four or five), kindly adding some guitar as well, when asked.

The disc comes housed in a clear jewel case, with a full-color 16-page booklet designed by none other than Peter Blake (of Sgt. Pepper and Liverpool Sound Collage fame), with graphics by Gordon House (who worked on The Beatles' White Album and McCartney's own Red Rose Speedway). The cover drawing of Dury is by Humphrey

Ocean, who contributed an illustration to McCartney's 1976 LP release, Wings At The Speed Of Sound. Each page features the song's lyrics, along with Polaroids taken of the artists during their sessions (the Polaroid camera was sent around as a cost-saving measure, said an East Central One spokesman, in lieu of a photographer).

For vinyl fans, the album was also released in that format. The disc (East Central One NEWBOOTS 2LP, released April 30, 2001) comes in a single-pocket sleeve with a double-sided custom inner bag, though none of the lyrics or Polaroids are reproduced. The LP was issued in a limited-edition run of gold vinyl (actually clear vinyl with a gold-colored paper flat sandwiched in between, like a picture disc) of about 1,500. Actually, 2,000 black vinyl LPs were manufactured in error before the mistake was caught, making the gold version even more valuable.

McCartney's track was the single released from the album — to radio, that is. A rare (about 2,000 made) one-track promotional CD was issued with "Abracadabra" (East Central One NEWBOOTS 2 PRO1) March 1, 2001. The disc comes housed in a full-color pouchette, with a second Polaroid of McCartney (different from that featured in the CD booklet), spotvarnished over the photo image to appear like a Polaroid snap. McCartney has marked in pen "ABRACADABRA" around his own head, and autographed it "Paul McCartney, for lan."

The album is expected to be released on Gold Circle, on, of all dates, Oct. 9, 2001, John Lennon's 61st birthday. An advance CD was released by the label Aug. 6



#### The Very Best Of Badfinger

After nearly a year in planning and rescheduling, Capitol (actually EMI Music Distribution, or "EMD" as it is more commonly known, Capitol's catalog division) released *The Very Best Of Badfinger* (Capitol/Apple CDP-7243-5-26974-2-7) Sept. 12, 2000. The fall date coincided with the broadcast of a terrific VH-1 *Behind The Music* on the band. The disc replaces the 1995 Apple collection, *The Best Of Badfinger*, this time including not only their Apple recordings, but those made under their following Warner Bros. contract as well.

The album features 19 songs, 15 from the Apple era and four from Warner Bros. Tracks were selected by Capitol Executive Producer Paul Atkinson and Badfinger historian Dan Matovina. The disc was mastered in the spring of 2000 at Abbey Road and then remastered back home in 24-bit at Capitol by Ron McMaster. A 20th track, "Baby Please,"

written by Pete Ham, Mike Gibbins, and Joey Molland and recorded in 1971 by producer Geoff Emerick, was dropped from the lineup at the second go-round. Art direction for the package was by Phil Smee, who designed Apple's other reissue sets. Record Collector's Andy Davis provided his usually excellent liner notes for the full-color 16-page booklet, which also includes numerous previously unseen photos of the band.

The package comes in a clear-tray jewel case, with a double-sided inlay card. The disc label has yet another cool black-and-white band photo. Commercial products feature a 1½-inch yellow product sticker.

Initial promos were produced by EMD (released Aug. 31, 2000), though in a much smaller quantity than for Liverpool Sound Collage (only around 1,200). These are identified only by the strikethrough on the bar code — there is no "Promotional Use Only" legal disclaimer printed on the label, as would normally be found. Capitol Mastering also produced a small quantity (200-300) of CD-R-burned advance CDs. These discs have the typical Capitol Mastering inserts: a plain white front insert, with the artist, title and Capitol logo and a plain white tray card with the artist, title and track listing. Interesting to note on this advance CD is the presence of an "(RE3)" after the album title. "RE3" is short for "Remix 3" (a misnomer in this case), which indicates that the material on the disc represents the third master of the album - meaning the third try at finalizing the track listing. The date on the disc is "06/05/00," another indication of the delays in the album's release.



#### The Ultimate Christmas Album — Volume 5

Every year, without fail, somebody puts out a Christmas collection with one or both of our two perennial favorites, and last year was no exception. In 2000, it was Collectables Records' turn. *The Ultimate Christmas Album — Volume 5* (Collectables COL-2522) was released just in time for the Christmas season to begin, on Sept. 25, 2000. The disc features McCartney's "Wonderful Christmastime," among other Christmas favorites.

For those who wonder about such things, the album, like many such projects, was actually put together by BMG Special Products. Most labels, including Capitol, have a Special Products division, who, as in this case, not only do all of the A&R/track selection and licensing, but also manufacture the product on the owner's behalf. Thus, one will find BMG's selection number, BRC-125705, also on the package.

a hat trick of songs recorded during the original aborted sessions for the Bunnies' eponymous album. Deliberately omitted are Ian McCulloch's solo efforts, the Bunnies without the mighty Mac and Electrafixion material.

While these three CDs give a straight-forward recount of the group's career, a kind of extended best-of, disc four, is aimed directly at the fans. 13 of the 17 tracks were recorded live, mostly from a heavily boot-legged 1985 live broadcast. Although a few songs were subsequently released as B-sides, this is the rest's first official appearance, and a stunning lot they are. Equally spectacular are a pair recorded in 1983 at London's Royal Albert Hall (both previously unreleased), a 1987 Swedish live recording (ditto) and a song performed live with The Royal Burundi Drummers at the WOMAD festival in 1982.

The excellent booklet helps put all this material in perspective, with McCulloch and guitarist Will Smith commenting directly on many of the tracks along the way. Mick Houghton, the band's longtime publicist (and a former English music journalist), provides a concise and inciteful band history, which — unusual for an official boxed set — doesn't explode into a "gosh, gee, weren't they great" ramble. Instead, Houghton confronts the group's foibles head on, discusses band and personal dynamics and calls a turkey a turkey.

So it's not your typical box, but there again, the Bunnies were never your typical band. They ran counter to fashion and obstreperously refused to play the game (and when they finally did, it proved their downfall). They carved out their own little world, then opened the door to let us all in to marvel. Crystal Days captures all their magic, but appropriately enough, it's not all the Bunny you need. In fact, by the end, you'll be out searching for more.

There comes a point in every superstar's story when he or she ceases to function as a jobbing musician, cranking out new albums and jousting with the rest of the chart. Instead, the artist enters a rarified strata where statistics and pop placings simply don't matter any more, one where a new album is neither propelled by the strength or otherwise of its contents, by neither the whim of the critics nor the tastes of the public but by the existence of the superstar.

It's not an easy position to attain, but once there, the artist is laughing. Arguably, The Rolling Stones haven't made a decent album in almost 20 years because they haven't needed to. Ditto Paul McCartney, ditto (with the necessary chronological adjustments) the likes of U2 and R.E.M. And ditto Elton John, who might well have been the first solo artist to irrevocably elevate himself to this lofty plateau, somewhere around the early 1980s.

At the dawn of that decade, he released an album called 21 At 33 — titled, of course, for his achievement of releasing 21 albums by age 33. John's almost 55 now. Do you know how many more albums he released since then? Do you care?

By that token, the sequence of albums reissued here really shouldn't matter. But to shrug them off so blithely really isn't fair. John might be part of the furniture, but just as someone wouldn't throw out his or her dining room table, simply because he or she knows what it looks like, so we don't dump on Hercules because we know what he sounds like. Besides, amid the morass of dirge-like ballads and rent-a-hairstyle rockers that dominated the mid- to late 1980s, these three albums actually helped make the entire era vaguely bearable. They weren't, of course, comparable to the gems that John had dispensed so generously a decade or so before, but on each of the three there's a clutch of songs that not only echoed past glories, they also aspired to reawaken them

The One is the best. Released in 1992, on the back of its smash hit title track, it opens with "Simple Life," the latest in that long (but long since abandoned) line of faintly wistful, loosely nostalgic paeans for which John was once so renowned. "Whitewash County" and "The North" are similarly evocative, of both eras and albums long past, while the closing, "The Last Song," is as grandiose a heartbreaker as, again, any earlier epic.

From Reg Strikes Back, "Mona Lisas And Mad Hatters (Part Two)" is a worthy successor to the Honky Chateau classic of similar name; from Sleeping With The Past, both the title track and "Club At The End Of The Street" are fine reminders of how the writing team of John and Bernie Taupin once conquered the planet. Appended to all three, bonus tracks and remixes attest to John's seldom-flinching comprehension of the singles market. Shep Pettibone remixes may not be to everybody's taste, but time and place are everything. In its time and in its place, "I Don't Wanna Go On With You Like That" was a corker.

So is Greatest Hits 1976-86. An era that the memory insists was fairly fallow turns up singles the caliber of "I'm Still Standing," Guess That's Why They Call It The Blues," "Nikita," the improbably joyous "Don't Go Breaking My Heart" and the implausibly dramatic "Sorry Seems To Be The Hardes Word," Fully half of this 13-track album merits inclusion on any single disc summary of John's career. If there's any criticism at all in store, it's that a peerless roundup of his greatest singles somehow omits "Song For Guy" - the loveliest piece of piano playing in his entire ouvre and a U.K. #4 in 1979. That aside, however Greatest Hits is indeed great, and the three albums that followed its cut-off point weren' too shabby either. Now let's talk about Aida. Dave Thompson

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VARIOUS ARTISTS Hardcore Ragga Greensleves (GrewCD151)

In celebration of its 25th anniversary, the seminal British label Greensleeves is reissuing some of the best of its back catalog and making it available for the first time in the States. Greensleeves established its reputation for quality via its releases of Jamaica's greatest artists across the musical spectrum. Of course, back then, DJs ruled the roost, and the label was swift to pick up on the island's greatest talent, much of which is represented by these releases

Although Dr. Alimantado never gained the reputation in the U.S. that he garnered in the U.K., where he was feted by the punk scene, he released a host of memorable singles, the best of which are gathered up on Best Dressed Chicken In Town. Unusually, the DJ produced the recording himself. using deep roots rhythms courtesy of Channel One, Randy's, Black Ark, and King Tubby's studios. From the surreal (the title track) to the serious ("Poison Flour"), Alimantado's exceptional toasts were a tough act for anyone to follow, least of all a mouse.

A new generation of talkative talent came to the fore in the early '80s, and none captured Jamaica's imagination quite like Eek-A-Mouse. His new sing[ing]-[DJ]jay style swept the island like a tidal wave, while his strange multi-nonsense syllable catchphrases (boingy-boing was most popular) added to the uniqueness of his sound. Recording with producer Junjo Lawes, Mouse released a string of hits, which are bundled up on Wa-Do-Dem, titled after his first smash. A truly unforgettable experience.

Of course, dressing as a mouse helped him attract attention, something the albino Yellowman did simply by stepping up to the mic. Yellowman split his time there between sexual boasts and toasts revolving around everyday Jamaican life, most peppered with his wicked sense of humor. Mister Yellowman is arguably his best album, also cut with producer Lawes.

Clint Eastwood was a young up-and-comer, following in his older brother's (DJ Trinity) footsteps, when Lawes paired him with the U.K. DJ General Saint, which proved to be a popular move. The pair had a clutch of Jamaican hits, managing to place themselves in the U.K. charts, and Two Bad D.J. bundles up a batch of these. Although they never had the impact of Eek-A-Mouse or Yellowman, the pair remain totally entertaining and the rhythms cutting edge, which perhaps explains why this 1983 album remains one of Greensleves' best sellers.

Lawes established his production credits in the dance

### Book review

THE PHISH COMPANION: A GUIDE TO THE BAND AND THEIR MUSIC by The Mockingbird Foundation Miller Freeman (Paperback, 928 pages, \$22.95)

There's obsession, and then there's obsession. Following in the Birkenstock footsteps of their spiritual forefathers the Deadheads, Phish Phans trade, document, and analyze every fart recorded by "the biggest cult band in America" (so said Entertainment Weckly). They've been around 17 years and have performed thousands of songs before their temporary hiatus began in October of last year. The Phish Companion: A Guide To The Band And Their Music, compiled by The Mockingbird Foundation (a non-profit organization benefiting music education for children), details this recorded history in almost a thousand pages.

And, boy, is it obsessive. Set lists are indexed, crossindexed, and cross-cross-indexed. Song histories, jamming tune charts, and song stats are chronicled. And there are original poems and artwork, venue information, and a Phish dictionary. In other words, any information on the band a Phish Phan could want is here.

Its compulsive nature works, no matter what your feelings on the band (we think they're snooze-worthy showoffs). It's hard not to like the set lists and show stats sections (even Phish's very first show is kinda documented). The discography, which includes unreleased tracks and guest studio appearances by band members, is also helpful. As are the extensive song histories, band chronology, and trading and recording tips. Not so useful are the concert reviews (the authors are obviously biased) and essays written by Phans (The Mockingbird Foundation put a call out online; some of the poetry and personal recollections read like chemical-induced tomes simmering in their own amateur ramblings).

Still, it's a bit much if you don't get the obsession (in its defense, The Phish Companion is billed as being "written by and for Phish fans"). It's fun to read details of the band's fabled Halloween shows, where the quartet plays a classic album in its entirety (Quadrophenia, Remain In Light, and The White Album have all been honored), but the interviews and foreword by lyricist Tom Marshall offer no insight on what fuels the process. Like the band itself, this fanatical and huge history is best when it sticks to the particulars of the songs themselves.

halls, creating a signature rootsy sound that audiences adored, as the various-artists set Aces International proves. Recorded live by the producer at three sound system parties between fall '82 and winter '83, it captures much of the excitement, sound and pure creativity that are the heart of a sound system show. Besides Fek-A-Mouse and Yellowman (and his toasting partner Fathead), the album boasts a clutch of equally good but less well-remembered DJs, including Toyan, Buru Banton, Little John, Ringo, and for fans of modern dancehall, Beenie Man (at the time, a tender 10 years old).

Of course, Lawes wasn't the only producer working on the DJ scene. Prince Jammy also joined him there, to noticeable success. Although the producer was a protege of dub legend King Tubby, he left it to Lawes to corner the dread dancehall sound and instead turned to a lighter, more melodic style. This was a perfect match for one of his many DJ discoveries, the young Half Pint. The DJ had a charming voice and delivered his toasts in a clipped singing style, which dovetailed exquisitely with Jammy's own melody-driven arrangements. One In A Million gathers up a batch of Half Pint's early hits.

By 1990, the dance hall had been totally electrified through the rise of ragga, but producer Gussie Clarke brought a dread sound back into the style, with his big, phat beats, and stripped-to-the-bone arrangements. He was responsible for launching Shabba Ranks onto the international stage by pairing the DJ with J.C. Lodge on the worldwide smash "Telephone Love." Title track "Rappin' With The Ladies" is true to its title and features both "Telephone" and a host of

other hit duets Ranks recorded for Clarke

Several of these also appear on Hardcore Ragga, which compiles 16 of Clarke's greatest dancehall hits from the late '80s, with the likes of Gregory Isaacs, Deborahe Glasgow, Papa San, and Crystal, as well as a clutch of crucial duets and group efforts.

Taken together, these albums provide a mini-history of the dancehall scene from the late '70s to 1990 and a host of talent on both sides of the mixing board.

One of the most important and invigorating bodies of work in '70s rock 'n' roll music finally gets its due with these deluxe and expanded reissues of the first four albums by New York's phenomenal pop-punk combo, the Ramones. Previously reissued by Sire in the early '90s as a pair of two-on-one discs under the collective title All The Stuff (And More), the Rhino discs return the individual titles (with the original, distinctive artwork) to retail shelves, bolstered by a generous helping of bonus tracks and with improved sound quality that provides the sheer sonic force a proper "Blitzkrieg Bop" requires. Hey

The Ramones' legacy was largely (some

say entirely) built upon the foundation of these first four albums. The 1976 debut remains a stunning, pile-driving pop experience, presaged to some degree by The Stooges, The New York Dolls, and The Dictators but utterly new and unexpected in its street-savvy amalgamation of hard rock and AM radio-bred bubblegum. Listening to it the first time felt as if you had just been mugged by The Banana Splits. Punk rock begins with the release of Ramones, regardless of whatever other primordial events were

It's still a terrific record, an exuberant exercise in loud, fast rock 'n' roll music - The Beach Boys on speed. The Ramones' '60s pop roots are immediately evident in the album's lone cover, the Chris Montez hit "Let's Dance," but the group's innate pop sensibilities are, perhaps incongruously, equally evident in the grooves of twisted originals

simultaneously occurring to shape punk's

development: ultimately it all started here.

such as "Now I Wanna Sniff Some Glue" and Today Your Love, Tomorrow The World.

Weird lyrics about Texas chainsaw 'massacrees" and beating on the brat with a baseball bat could never hide the fact the Ramones were always proudly, defiantly, a pop band. Dee Dee Ramone has claimed that Bay City Rollers wanted to cover "I Wanna Be Your Boyfriend"; while the claim itself is suspect, it's not all that preposterous a match to consider. "Blitzkrieg Bop," perhaps The Ramones' signature tune, was itself inspired by the Bay City Rollers, its "Hey Ho, Lets Go!" chant derived from the Rollers' own "S! A! T-U-R! D-A-Y! Night!"

Bonus tracks on Ramones include the Marty Thau-produced demos of "I Wanna Be Your Boyfriend" and "Judy Is A Punk" (previously released as an archival single by Norton Records); previously unissued

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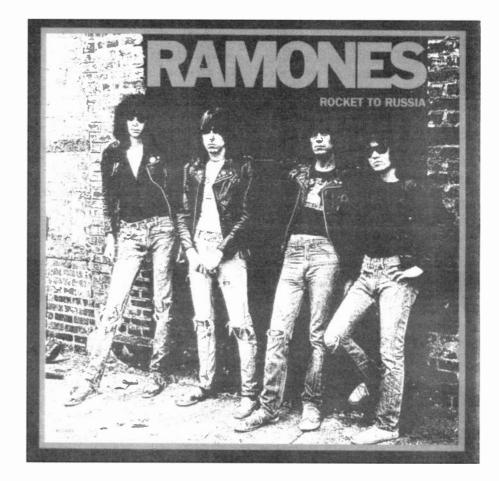

demos of "I Don't Care," "Now I Wanna Sniff Some Glue" and "You Should Never Have Opened That Door"; demos of "I Can't Be" and "I Don't Wanna Be Learned/I Don't Wanna Be Tamed" (previously available on All The Stuff [And More], Vol. One); and the single version of "Blitzkrieg Bop." Bonus tracks and all, the CD offers 22 tracks, totaling just over 45 minutes. Does that seem short? It's a freaking bargain, friends, and one of the most exciting debut albums in rock 'n' roll history.

1977's Leave Home refines the Ramones' approach without diluting it. It includes the group's first out-and-out bubblegum pop song ("Oh Oh I Love Her So"), another definitive cover of a '60s AM radio staple (of The Rivieras' "California Sun"), at least one classic, forgotten shouldabeen-a-hit-single ("Swallow My Pride") and a bunch of punky misfit tales of woe and/or glee, including "Glad To See You Go," "Gimme Gimme Shock Treatment" and "Pinhead," the latter providing the Ramones with their concert-closing "Gabba Gabba Hey!" catchphrase. The reissue returns the wonderful "Carbona Not Glue" to its rightful place on Leave Home. The song was included on the earliest pressings of the album but soon removed in response to threats of legal action from the manufacturers of Carbona Spot Remover — good to have it back where it belongs! Rhino has also included the sublime "Babysitter," one of the Ramones' best-ever power pop tunes, originally issued on the U.K. version of Leave Home and subsequently used as the non-LP B-side of the U.S. "Do You Wanna Dance" single in '78.

You want bonus tracks? Hey, how about a whole Ramones concert? Specifically, the reissue of Leave Home bolsters its original 14 tracks (15 with "Babysitter") with a complete, previ-

ously unreleased Ramones live show from 1976 at The Roxy in Hollywood. Although there has certainly been no shortage of live Ramones material on the market, this 16-song set dates from when the group was at the peak of its live rock 'n' roll prowess, and it rivals the incredible *It's Alive!* album as an invigorating document of a time when the Ramones were simply the most thrilling live band on the planet.

(Side question: Will we ever get a DVD release of The Ramones' live appearances on *Don Kirshner's Rock Concert* and *Musikladen*, two simply nonpareil rock-on-TV experiences just dyin' to be preserved for da fans?)

Also released in 1977, Rocket To Russia is the apotheosis of Ramonedom and one of the greatest rock 'n' roll records ever made by anybody at any time. Here, The Ramones' poppunk aspirations come to their fullest possible fruition, creating an irresistible, full-tilt thrill ride. From the opening chords of "Cretin Hop" through the fatalist bubblegum of "Why Is It Always This Way," Rocket To Russia never offers anything that is less than absolute rockin' pop perfection. The singles - "Sheena Is A Punk Rocker," "Rockaway Beach" and a friggin' incredible cover of the Bobby Freeman/Beach Boys(/Bette Midler) hit "Do You Wanna Dance" - distill all of The Ramones' AM radio influences into compact jolts of everything you've ever loved about pure, visceral rock 'n' roll, meant to be played far too loudly --- in a car that's going way too fast.

With the hit singles as linchpins (and they were hit singles, by divine right, their relative lack of sales success and radio airplay notwithstanding), the album delivers track after track of confident, accomplished music.

The frequently downbeat lyrics are delivered with keen wit, deadpan humor and, most important, the palpable sense that the music itself is of sufficient power to render all objections irrelevant, to make all opposing forces obsolete. "My future's bleak," Joey Ramone sings, "ain't it neat?"

Bonus tracks here include a genuine treat: a previously unreleased version of The Searchers' "Needles & Pins," a song that the group recut for their next album, *Road To Ruin*. This earlier version, cut with original drummer Tommy Ramone, is a revelation, a folk-punk

delight that is far more sprightly and compelling than the comparatively leaden version on *Road To Ruin*. Other bonus tracks include "Slug" (a demo previously released on *All The Stuff [And More]*, *Volume Two*) and single versions of "Sheena Is A Punk Rocker," "I Don't Care" and "It's A Long Way Back To Germany." The latter was originally a U.K. Bside and makes its U.S. debut here.

Inevitably, 1978's Road To Ruin is something of a let-down. Not that it's a bad album—it is, in fact, quite a good album—but it's certainly not as confident or as consistent a

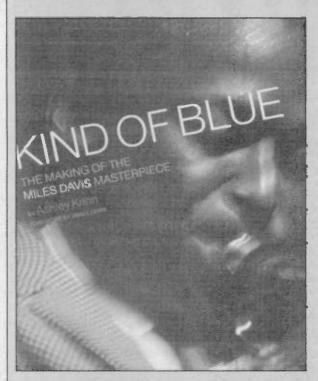
triumph as *Rocket To Russia*. The between albums departure of Tommy is a factor; whilh is replacement, Marky Ramone (nee Mar Bell, formerly of Dust and Richard Hell & The VoidOids), is a better drummer and would soon become an integral part of the Ramones; Tommy's lighter, minimalist toucle contrasts sharply with the overall heavines of Marky's percussive assault. That by itseligives *Road To Ruin* a sound that is dramatically different from the bubblepunk of the first three albums.

Still, Road To Ruin is not lacking in it great moments, commencing from the get go with the swaggering "I Just Want To Have Something To Do" and including "I Wann Be Sedated, the Ramones' way-fab interpola tion of an exhausted Ohio Express rewriting Alice Cooper's "Flected" as a brain-fried tou itinerary. Even the much-maligned "country tunes, "Don't Come Close" and "Question ingly," succeed as pure pop numbers, the latter a downbeat ballad and the former a bubblegummy as anything in the Joey Levine canon (and neither, incidentally, ever remotely a true country song). Much of the rest of the album succumbs to a banal same ness, an unfortunate case of sacrificing pop punk smarts for mere force - empt heaviness. A lot of subsequent Ramone albums would suffer the same fate.

Bonus tracks on Road To Ruin are mostly familiar: the Ed Stasium mixes of "Rock 'r Roll High School" and "I Want You Around (from the Hey Ho, Let's Go! set), the live medley from Rock 'N' Roll High School and the "Yea, Yea" demo from All The Stuff (And More), Volume Two. A demo of a song called "Come Back, She Cried (a.k.a. I Walk Out) is previously unreleased.

Ashley Kahn may have invented a new kind of biography by chronicling the making of the 1959 Miles Davis masterpiece, Kind Of Blue. The Dark Side Of The Moon of jazz, Kind Of Blue has never been out of print since its release and is selling ever more.

steadily; word is it's moving about 5,000 units a week these days. And well it should: One of the most beautiful albums ever made, Kind Of Blue is a jazz haiku whose elegance and simplicity broke ground at its debut and has since become synonymous with timelessness. Small wonder it's sold some five million copies.

Reading this brief book goes very quickly. Kahn writes sparely and informatively and is clearly in love with his material. Not only did he have unusual access to Sony's Columbia studios and archives, Kahn also was able to interview numerous people involved with the project then and now, including two who were in on the creation: drummer Jimmy Cobb and photographer Don Hunstein.

this book traces Kind Of Blue from conception to execution, interweaving Davis' relatively well-known life story with the fresh history of the record itself. Along the way, Kahn also sheds remarkable light on the making of jazz, the equally improvisatory nature of making records (it used to be far more improvisatory than it is now) and the vagaries of history.

The reader who reveres Davis will learn a great deal from Kahn, including the particulars

of the recording sessions that yielded such immaculate music, anecdotes about the interplay between Davis, saxmen Julian "Cannonball" Adderley and John Coltrane, keyboardists Wynton Kelly and the more influential Bill Evans, and producer Irving Townsend. Also, the reader will learn how Columbia discovered more than four decades later that the Kind Of Blue tapes were recorded at the wrong speed, rendering "wrong" all editions of this talismanic record until 1997, when Sony Legacy released it properly recorded, with an afternate take of "Flamence Sketches."

Along the way, Kahn discourses on modal jazz, free jazz, the influence Kind Of Blue has had on trance music and the way it still represents the pinnacle of small-group jazz. Not only has the album influenced everybody from Oscar Brown to Mark Isham to Jon Hendricks, for years it has symbolized the confluence of style, creativity and commercial clout that Davis embodied for so long.

In the church of Jazz, Kind Of Blue is one of the holy relics," Kahn writes. "Critics revere it as a stylistic milestone, one of a very few in the long tradition of jazz performance, on an equal footing with seminal recordings by Louis Armstrong's Hot Fives and Charlie Parker's belop quintets. Musicians acknowledge its influence and have recorded hundreds of versions of the music on the album. Record producer, composer, and Davis confidant Quincy Jones hails it as the one album (if that were the limit) that would explain jazz.

"Yet, Kind Of Blue lives and prospers

outside the confines of the jazz community. No longer the exclusive possession of a musical subculture, the album is simply great music, one of a very, very few musical recordings our culture allows into the category marked 'masterpiece.'"

Indeed. The first time you listen to Kind Of Blue is akin to your first view of a Charles Fames chair or these days, perhaps, an Apple Cube. What's so striking about the recording is its design, spanning the blues of "Blue In Green," the duende at the core of Flamenco Sketches," the funk, sass and snap of "So What."

Kahn ends his book on an anecdote from August '99, when he saw a 25-something woman zero-in on a jazz CD display at Tower Records, Kind Of Blue at its heart. The woman picked up a copy, prompting this reflection: Long after she disappeared toward the cashier, I thought to wonder how she had come to make her selection that day. Did she already know the album? How had she first come to hear about it? Was the purchase for herself or someone else?

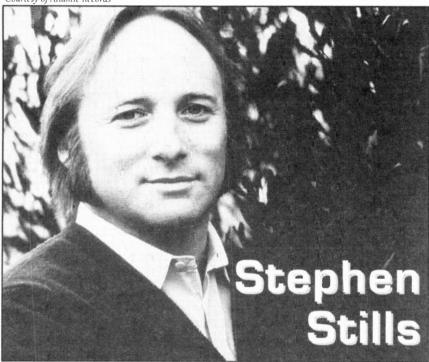
"But I was not interested in conducting a marketing survey — all that leads to a different kind of research and study. I prefer just to imagine that copy of Kind Of Blue finding its way into the hands of some first-time listener and working its magic."

Reading this book will lead you, too, to reminisce about the first time you heard Kind Of Blue and realized how much jazz had to offer.

[Glenn, We have done a number of stories on Jethro Tull/Ian Anderson, as well as reviews of most of their new releases and reissues, over the past two decades. We had a cover story with interviews in our Feb. 12, 1988, issue. We also published an interview with Anderson several years ago. They are one of my favorite bands as well (love last years J Tull Dot Com). We'll see what we can do about an update. Tull definitely belongs in the Rock Hall, along with Chicago and The Moody Blues. — Ed.]

Where have all the good remastering jobs gone?

In your April 20, 2001, issue (#541) in the review of the two-CD *Blind Faith* — *Deluxe Edition*, your reviewer stated "The new remaster is just a gassed up (louder) version... words that give me hope you could bring up the issue of 'remastered CDs.'"

Anyone that has a CD recorder or player that displays the recording levels of newly remastered CDs will notice the sound all falls in the loud distortion area; not all record companies are deceiving the public and altering recordings. Big exceptions include Sundazed and Sony/Epic on most releases.

The louder sound obviously forces you to lower the amplifier volume giving the *illusion* of better sound. But is it really better? For example, on a quick listen all the latest remasters of Jimi Hendrix's recordings, I hear nothing but distortion and prefer to listen to my LPs or the first batch of Warner Bros./Reprise CDs more faithful to the original recordings.

A great loss was the demise of Mobile Fidelity Sound Labs, for theirs was the best standard in "remastered sound." When I hear the new "Rhinophonic" sound of Rhino, it just makes me quite sad that the pioneer of oldies reissues has fallen into the same gimmick — "louder is better." How come MFSL issues seldom fell in the "red" and when they did, only for seconds? The same goes for most of the Sundazed and Sony/Epic products. Have the laws of physics for sound changed?

This is the third and last time I write to a periodical, as my efforts of exposing this with *ICE* and another periodical were ignored. Maybe I write badly, or the publications are afraid to take up the issue with advertising dollars at stake.

Whatever the case may be, all I can say to fellow collectors is keep your vinyl records safe. They may be the only way to listen to the music we love and grew up with without being manipulated and remastered into something almost unrecognizable.

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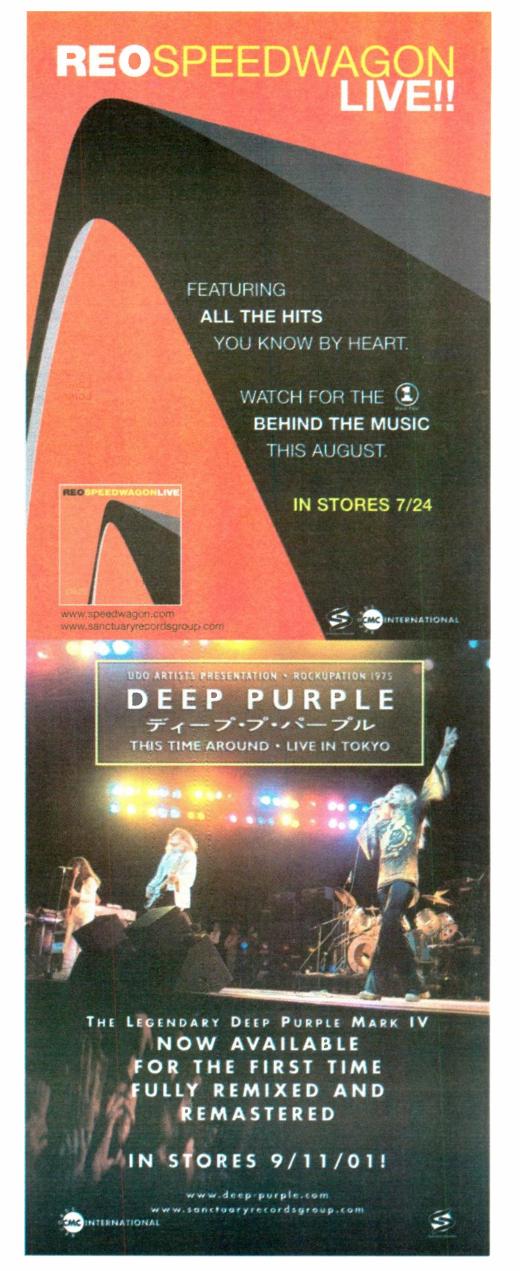
