How to Place Calls

For technical reasons, the calls must be originated by the serviceman overseas rather than a member of his family at home. Because of the heavy traffic at the Christmas season, it is of the utmost importance that the serviceman who wishes to take advantage of this offer should make arrangements in advance with the MARS operator on his base and then have the operator notify Mr. Altomonte. The following information is vital: date and time of the call; and call letters and frequency of the station.

Families of servicemen should keep in mind that scheduling of calls is frequently influenced by atmospheric conditions. Because of international time differences, calls must be set up by Mr. Altomonte and MARS operators. The A. F. of M. will pay telephone charges for any call sent through the Mansfield, Ohio, station between 12:01 A.M. Eastern Standard Time, December 24, and 12:00 midnight EST, December 26.

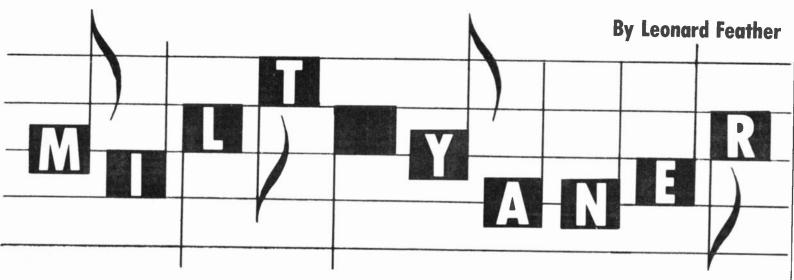

F. of M.

Meanwhile, the Federation has requested the underwriter to return any inquiries or applications from any members and to return any payments submitted. You will shortly receive appropriate advice as to where such coverage may be obtained in your area.





Milt Yaner

If the success of an artist can be judged by the company he keeps, there can be no doubt that the career of Milt Yaner is one of exceptional distinction. The list of orchestras with which he has been associated over the past forty-five years has ranged from the New York Philharmonic and Toscanini's NBC Symphony to dozens of name dance bands: the Dorseys, Goodman, Herman, Shaw, Beneke, Billy May, Ray Conniff, to name just a few; and he has recorded with the pantheon of vocal stars Sinatra, Como, Andy Williams, Sarah Vaughan, Ella Fitzgerald and scores of others.

Milt Yaner, however, doesn't have to rely on success-byassociation. Proficient on saxophones, clarinet, bass clarinet, flute, piccolo and oboe, he has been respected by fellow musicians as one of the most brilliant and sensitive lead alto saxophonists in the business. For the past seven years he has been manager and lead alto player with Si Zentner's orchestra at the Tropicana Hotel in Las Vegas.

For a man of such impressive credentials Yaner has an unusual background. His family was not musical, and he Bend, Indiana, he acquired his association with him, most of grade, played in bands all through high school and was a professional at fourteen.

"I never really had any musical education," he says, "I just learned the hard way.'

After working with local bands in Indiana and Wisconsin, he wound up in New York. "I first started recording in 1929 and I have kept a pretty I've made. "My first big band job was with Isham Jones, from 1932 to 1935; then I went with Ray Noble. This was when Ray had come over from England and formed an all star American band with Glenn Miller, Charlie Spivak and Bud Freeman among others. We opened the Rainbow Room in New York and were together over a year, sharing the kicks of a great band and a very exciting time in music.

Next I accepted an offer from Richard Himber. He was very big then, doing things like the Hit Parade and all kinds of commercial radio work.'

Yaner left Himber to join the Benny Goodman orchestra early in 1938. The job was shortlived, since Milt idolized Jimmy Dorsey, and an offer to go with the latter's band proved irresistible. He remained at the head of the Dorsey reed section until 1943.

An interesting interlude followed, when he joined a pioneering interracial band, the first of its kind ever to work network radio. This was Raymond Scott's staff orchestra at CBS. Among the black members during Yaner's incumbency from 1943-4 were Cozy Cole, Israel Crosby, Jimmy Nottingham, Charlie Shavers, Ben Webster and Trummy Young. The band played many sustaining (nonsponsored) series but unfortunately made few record-

"Toward the end of the Raymond Scott period, I started doing the Chesterfield program with Paul Baron's orchestra three times a week. Then Gordon Jenkins, with whom I had worked in a musical show back in the '30s, himself was self-taught. For almost fifteen years Yaner continued freelancing in New York. Of the countless experiences, he recalled with greatest pleasure his intermittent relationship with Louis Armstrong. During the 1950s Yaner was called in to play in Robert Russell Bennett's arrangements of some Gershwin pieces for the New York Philharmonic. "When I worked for Toscanini at NBC, I was scared to death; I had no idea what the job was, until I walked into the studio and suddenly realized it was the symphony. I had a little alto solo in the Porgy and Bess medley.

The busy freelancing and contracting years lasted until 1959, when Milt ran into Charlie Barnet. "I had always admired Charlie, and after all those years in New York I thought it would be fun to go out on the road and do a tour with him. I enjoyed it immensely.

"After the death of Jimmy Dorsey in 1957, Lee Castle had taken over leadership of his orchestra. Shortly after I came off the road with Barnet, I went out with Lee for six months, playing both the Jimmy and Tommy Dorsey books. One reason I went with Castle was that he kept saying he was going to Las Vegas. I had been there in 1960 with Gordon Jenkins and wanted to go back. What I didn't know was that Lee meant Las Vegas, New Mexico!"

After a brief hiatus spent back home in Wisconsin, Milt went to Chicago and busied himself with record dates and transcriptions. A local booker had been assembling a band for Hal Dickinson, of the Modernaires, to break in an act at the Sahara in Las Vegas (the Nevada one this time). Yaner was invited to join; after a short tour the group asked him if he would like to accompany them west.

"That was in January of 1961. For several years I stayed with the Tex Beneke-Ray Eberle-Modernaires package, then went back to Chicago again."

During a tour with Phyllis Diller, a bus driver who was taking Milt to a gig mentioned that he had worked with Si Zentner. "We talked about Si

was about seven years ago, and I've been there ever since.'

Milt's taste in saxophonists, he says, has always leaned pioneers, who were his influences in the early days. "To me, the most wonderful alto player of all was always Benny Carter. Q. What is the American|received if he had been sixty-Fund?

a fund established to provide monthly pension or death benefits to its covered mem-

Q. When and how was the fund started?

A. The AFM and EPW Fund was established in 1959, as a result of the Phonograph **Record Labor Agreement which** required employers to finance a pension plan by contributing a specified percentage of scale wages of covered musicians. Since 1959, the American Federation of Musicians has negotiated agreements with other employers to include musicians in radio, television, TV films, electrical transcriptions, motion pictures, video tapes, A. F. of M. travelling engagements, jingles and commercials. Participation in the fund also opened to the A. F. of M. locals on behalf of their employees and to musicians in local employment.

Q. What is the death benefit of the fund?

A. A death benefit is provided to the beneficiary of a musician who dies while working under coverage of the fund, or for a musician who dies after retirement but before receiving pension. The basic eligibility monthly benefits totalling a specific amount.

Q. What is the death benefit for active musicians who have met the eligibility requirements for a pension?

Q. What is the death benefit if a musician dies after retire-

A. If a pensioner dies before receiving an amount equal to one hundred times the monthly benefit he would have received at age sixty-five, the difference will be paid to his beneficiary in a lump sum payment. This means that in case of death, the expanded the fund by having pensioner and his beneficiary will receive a total of 170 per cent of what was in the musician's pension account. In the case of a pensioner who was receiving a past service benefit, the guarantee is equal to seventy-five times the benefit he would have received at age sixty-five, including the past service benefit.

> Q. What is the death benefit of an active musician with fewer years of service than necessary for a pension?

A. A death benefit is also provided for a musician who dies even though he has not yet achieved the pension credits necessary to qualify for a provision for this benefit is that the musician must have at least one year of pension credit and must have earned at least \$500.00 in contributory employment either in the calendar year in which he died or in the preceding year. Phil Nimmons Nine Plus Six



but there is one in Canada that has consistently enjoyed a coast-to-coast audience since the early '50s. That's Phil Nimmons' aggregation known as Nimmons 'n' Nine Plus Six.

It is unique in more ways than one. Most of the band's playing these days takes place in secondary schools, colleges and universities, where a new generation is learning to love the sounds of brass, reeds and rhythm.

It is a band that owes its national reputation almost entirely to radio.

Nimmons, an accomplished clarinetist, arranger and composer, formed the band in 1953. Along with fellow musicians who wanted to indulge in jazz playing away from their studio jobs, Nimmons felt a need to write for and play in a jazz group. In those days, the band was known as Nimmons 'n' Nine which soon attracted so much attention that it became a regular feature on Canadian Broadcasting Corporation radio programs.

For years its public appearances were rare. Among the earliest and most important was an appearance at the Stratford Festival in 1956, count. followed a year later by a performance with the Toronto appear more frequently in ing together.' concert but on the whole it is a band whose reputation was established by radio. reputation. Now it's known as Nimmons 'n' Nine Plus Six, consisting of four trumpets. four trombones, three reeds and a four-man rhythm section. The rhythm section includes accordion, which from the beginning has given the band its distinctive sound.

The band has played at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa, at art galleries, festivals and universities. For several years it has played for Canadian forces stationed in Europe and the Middle East. Phil, as a soloist, has visited Alert in the Arctic and in 1967 went around the world on a CBC jaunt that celebrated the country's centennial year.

Yet Nimmons finds that some of his most rewarding moments come from the high school concerts in Toronto and suburbs. He is elated by the students' enthusiasm; dismayed by their lack of opportunity to hear jazz on commercial radio stations. "I have nothing against rock," he says, "but it shouldn't exclude all other forms of music. There's room for all types. We don't all have to go in the same bag."

The results have been gratifying. "Some of these student musicians actually follow us around to the various collegiates," he says. "It shows that there is an audience there and if only the kids are afforded the chance to hear this music they will continue to develop.'

To reach his young audiences, Nimmons includes equal portions of contemporary music and standard ballads along with his own original works which number around 300. Now he notes that the kids are becoming aware of color in music, aware of horns. "They are getting away from the guitars and the high decibel

To the forty-seven-year-old leader, one of the most stimulating assignments was the band's 1970 appearance at the annual Festival of Chamber Music and Jazz at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton, New Brunswick. The band had been especially requested to appear by Phil's sister, Arlene, a concert pianist, who with her husband. violinist Joseph Pach, are artists-in-residence.

The performance proved to be a very special occasion for it brought together Nimmons and his long-time friend, Oscar Peterson, who was guest soloist with the band. Highlight of the program was Peterson's Canadiana Suite, arranged for orchestra by Nimmons.

It was in 1959 that Phil had joined forces with Oscar Peterson, bassist Ray Brown and drummer Ed Thigpen in organizing the Advanced School of Contemporary Music. What they brought to Toronto was a new concept of teaching iazz. They believed that the most effective results could be attained by instructors, such as themselves, who were active musicians. The idea was immediately accepted. Students flocked from all over Canada and the United States but by

> Nimmons had long been one of Toronto's most prolific arranger-composers. When the school folded he once more concentrated on writing, a talent that had developed when he was a youngster in Vancouver. Born in Kamloops, British Columbia, Nimmons had moved with his family to Vancouver when he was a child.

> The son of Dr. and Mrs. G. R. Nimmons, Phil intended to follow in his father's footsteps. He studied medicine at the University of British Columbia, but before he had graduated his interest had turned to music. He switched to an arts course, graduated with a B.A., and then departed for New York and study at the Juilliard School where in his first year he won a scholarship for clarinet. For three years he studied with Arthur Christmann. In 1948, he started studying composition at the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto.

When he left the Conservatory, Phil returned to Vancouver where he joined the Ray Norris Quintet, which eventually moved to Toronto. When the group broke up a year later Nimmons wed pianist Noreen Spencer and Toronto late 1963 the faculty had to became their home. It was then shops.

Nimmons' ever increasing audience now includes students in community colleges and universities. Besides his concerts he has taken on a weekly teaching assignment at the University of Toronto where he conducts and rehearses a student jazz orchestra.

Nimmons still writes for radio programs; still continues as a composer, adept in both classical and jazz realms. When he first began appearing down east at the summer festivals in New Brunswick in 1968, he wrote a work for jazz quartet and string quartet.

In 1971, Phil appeared as guest soloist with Teddy Komar's Winnipeg orchestra. And again Phil played for his favorite kind of audience. His listeners were music students at the International Music Camp at the International Peace Gardens on the U.S.-Canadian border that divides North Dakota and Manitoba.

Highlight of the summer of '72 was a two-week seminar on the performing arts at the Niagara College of Applied Arts and Technology. That's when Phil Nimmons and members of his band presided over daily sessions on big band arranging and instrumental work-

Social Security Claim Number Is Important

People collecting monthly social security checks should always keep a record of their claim number, according to social security officials.

"With almost 27 million social security beneficiaries — some of them with the same names — the claim number is important because it immediately identifies an individual record," a spokesman said.

The claim number is not always the social security number of the person getting monthly payments.

"It's actually the social security number of the worker on whose record the beneficiary is collecting checks," the spokesman said. "The claim number has nine digits followed by one or two letters, such as A, B, C, or HA.'

The claim number appears on monthly checks, Medicare cards, and most correspondence from the Social Security Administration that involves the claim.

People should use the claim number whenever they write a letter about their claim and should have the number handy if they call or visit a social security office. "The claim number assures prompt and accurate action for the beneficiary," the social security spokesman said.

Creedence Clearwater Revival, one of the super pop groups, has decided to call it quits. A quartet until leader Tom Fogerty left eighteen months ago, it continued in the trio format but never reached the heights of popularity of the original unit.

The three remaining members, John Fogerty, Stu Cook and Doug Clifford, made the announcement late in October. Each intends to continue recording, as a solo artist, for Fantasy. However, no more Creedence Clearwater albums or singles will be released by that label.

"The decision was reached by mutual agreement," a statement from the threesome said. 'We don't regard this as breaking up, but as the natural extension of our activities."

What a convention! What a week! The Grand Ole Opry has had another birthday and the country music industry has had another exhausting week. If you've never participated in the Opry Birthday Celebration, a quote from Country Music Magazine editor Peter McCabe might provide some insight into the pace: "I've never seen so many activities packed into one week in one city in my life and never before have I got on a plane headed home to New York thinking 'Well, maybe now I can get some rest.' '' Roy Clark surmised the situation by "I'm gonna have to move to Nashville to spread it out over the whole year instead of puttin' it all in one week. I haven't been to sleep since March—and that was '63.''

The events that were officially scheduled came off as smoothly as a polished walnut —the Early Bird Bluegrass Concert was a superdooper and I don't have space to name all the folks that did superdooper jobs, although WSM's Bud Wendell and Jerry Stroebel deserve special mention for their co-ordinating efforts. 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Questions and Answers

Q. I'm sixty-six and getting | investments, pensions, and inmonthly social security retirement checks, and I'm also working part-time for a church nursery. Since the church has not decided to cover my parttime work by social security, can these earnings affect my monthly checks.

A. Yes, if your total earnings for the year go over \$1,680. Earnings from any work, whether or not covered by social security, have to be included in figuring the amount of benefits due you for a year.

Q. My wife and I are both retired and get monthly social security payments. Since my wife is collecting on my work record, will her earnings at a part-time job affect my monthly payments?

A. No. Your wife's earnings affect only her payments.

Must these be reported to social security as earnings?

A. No. Neither your dividends nor your pension have any effect on your social security payments. What the law considers is the extent of your retirement from work. Only earnings from employment or self-employment affect your payments and must be reported.

Q. My wife and I were retired and getting monthly social sepayment to help with the funeral expenses. Is this correct?

A. No. The death payment is only made when a worker, insured under social security,

Q. I'll be seventy-two next month, but I intend to go on working as long as I can. I know I can earn as much as I want after I'm seventy-two and still get all my social security checks. But will my earnings from the first part of this year, before I was seventy-two, still affect my social security payments?

A. Yes. You will get a social security check for every month beginning with the month of your seventy-second birthday no matter how much you work or earn. However, your earnings for the entire year in which you become seventy-two

apply for a lump-sum death | ments can be made to you for the months you were still seventy-one.

> Q. When I'm sixty-five next month, I plan to retire and apply for monthly social security payments. However. next year I'm going to visit friends in Norway for a year. Can my checks be sent to me in Norway?

> A. Yes. Social security checks can be sent to most foreign countries, including Norway. But be sure to notify the Social Security Administration of your address in Norway before leaving for your visit.

> Q. My husband is sixty-seven and gets monthly social security retirement payments. I'm fifty-eight and totally disabled. Can I get disability benefits on my husband's work record?

A. No. You are not eligible to receive a wife's benefit until you're sixty-two unless you have a child in your care who is entitled to cash payments on your husband's work record. But, if you've worked long enough and recently enough, you may be eligible for disability benefits on your own work record if your disability will keep you from working for a year or more.

Q. I'll be sixty-five near the end of this year and I'm planning to retire then. Since my earnings up to the time I retire will be well over \$1,680, should I delay applying for retirement payments until early next year?

A. Definitely not. You should apply for payments about three months before your sixty-fifth birthday. Regardless of your earnings for the year, you can still get a social security payment for any month in which you neither earn \$140 in wages nor perform substantial services in self-employment. You can also apply for Medicare protection at that time.

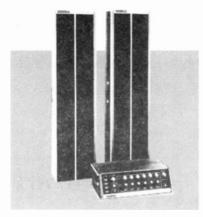
Q. My three children, all under eighteen, and I get monthly social security checks. If my oldest daughter works part time and earns nearly \$2,000 during the year, does she have to make an annual report of her earnings to social security?

A. Yes. An annual report of earnings is required from every social security beneficiary who is under seventy-two and has earnings of more than \$1,680 in 1972. The annual report is due by April 15 of the following year.

Q. I'm looking ahead and trying to figure my retirement income. Is it possible for me to find out how much my monthly social security payments will be?

A. Yes. Any social security office can give you an estimate of your social security payments. It's a good idea to talk to a representative when you're beginning to think about retirement. In addition to giving you an estimate of what your payments will be when you retire, he can also tell you what papers and other information you'll need when you apply.

The orchestra is a full time professional ensemble entirely financed through the Local Initiatives Program of the Department of Manpower and Immigration of the Federal Government of Canada. It is composed of fifty-five young members of Local 406, Montreal. and is an excellent example of the fine musicians being developed in this area.

Another highlight of the meeting was the appearance of Secretary Emeritus Ed Charette, who was Secretary of the Eastern Conference and Canadian Conference for a period of twenty-five years.

He was the author of several books on legal and musical subjects. Col. Rosenbaum is survived by his wife, Edna Phillips Rosenbaum, former first harpist of the Philadelphia Orchestra; one son, three daughters, and four grandchildren.

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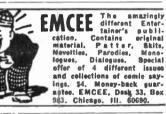

BOOK NOTES

THE DANCE BAND ERA: The Dancing Decades from Ragtime to Swing (1910-1950), by Albert McCarthy. 176 pages. Chilton Book Company, 401 Walnut Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 19106. \$10.00.

Orchestras whose primary function is to play music to which listeners can dance have existed for centuries. However, to modern-day man the golden era of the dance bands was the era of the fox-trot, the waltz, and the quick-step and the bands of Paul Whiteman, Glenn Miller, the Dorseys and many others. These were the golden years from 1910 to 1950. Too, these were the years when dance music and popular music seemed to be synonymous. Needless to say, this is no longer true, but we are witnessing a revival and keen interest in the music of the big band-dance band years. Unlike similar books that have recently paid tribute to this vibrant

period in our musical history, the author re-examines the status of the well-known and the lesser-known bands of that era. As a result some of the lesser-known bands, whose contributions were none-the-less considerable, are given proper recognition. Throughout the book he evaluates each band's recorded achievements and gives us a select discography of available recordings.

Among other topics the author discusses are: the business of dance music, the decline of the big band after World War II, the rise of the featured singer, and the ways in which some bandleaders have main-

tained their popularity to the present day.

The "Dance Band Era," with some 350 vintage photographs, press clippings, advertisements and catalogue reproductions, is an important contribution to the history, interpretation, appreciation and legacy of the ''golden era.''

BASSOON REED MAKING, by Mark Popkin and Loren Glickman. 30 pages. The Instrumentalist Co., 1418 Lake Street, Evanston, Illinois 60204. Price not quoted.

In this book the authors are considering only the Heckel or German system bassoon and are endeavoring to provide the bassoonist with enough detailed information to make his own reeds and repair and maintain his own instrument. The book is fully illustrated with many very good black and white photographs.

Both authors, professional bassoonists of long standing and much experience, have included a closing segment of the book on an approach to bassoon playing with emphasis on tonal sufficiency, embouchure, breathing, intonation accuracy, musicality and dependability.

This book should be of practical value to every bassoon student and already seasoned bassoonists who have never looked into this important segment of their world.

THE FLUTIST'S PROGRESS, by Walfrid Kujala. 96 pages, plus seveninch LP record. Progress Press, 1261 Ash Street, Winnetka, Illinois 60093. \$4.50.

Walfrid Kujala brings a broad background as both teacher of flute and professional musician to the writing of this excellent book. He is the head of the Flute Department of The School of Music, Northwestern University, a member of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and other performing ensembles.

This book is an instruction course in flute playing and musicianship. As such it is designed to be used by the beginner or can be used to supplement the private teaching of a flutist on most any grade level. The author hopes that the book will cover enough of the fundamental matters of flute playing and musicianship so that the teacher will be free to concentrate on each individual's particular problems.

Mr. Kujala has used 178 musical examples in the book covering a wide spectrum of styles and problems, technical studies, folk songs, popular songs, duets and selections from twenty-four master composers ranging from Bach to Stravinsky. The seven-inch L.P. that is an integral part of the book demonstrates thirty-four of the illustrated pieces.

RHYTHM: NOTATION and PRODUCTION, by Grant Fletcher. 178 pages. For further information contact: Grant Fletcher, 1626 E. Williams Street, Tempe, Arizona 85281.

In the musical sense, it is hard to find any two persons agreeing on the definition of the word "rhythm." To some it covers only the time side as distinct from the pitch side. To others it takes in beats, beat groupings, measures, groups of measures, pulsation, bars, rests, etc. But, all would no doubt agree that bad rhythm in musical performance leads to bad performances.

Dr. Grant Fletcher has devoted years of his life in the music education field to find the solution to rhythmic problems. This comprehensive treatise deals with what he feels are the essential elements in the study of rhythm, notation and production. To state very briefly, the author divides the rhythmic element into two parts: duration and contrasting stresses. He then further divides this perception into three phases: duration, metric pulsation and dynamic accent.

> Merle Evans began to play the cornet (or cornit, as he calls it) as a youngster and soon played it so well that the world of the "Big Top" took note, and he rose to the first ranks of his field. Whenever clowns tumbled, horses stepped smartly, acrobats balanced precariously, Merle and his cornet were there.

> Gene Plowden is a professional writer and a circus aficionado. In this book he has captured the essence and spirit of the man Merle Evans as well as giving us a colorful story of circus life as seen from the band stand. The book contains some thirty illustrations.
