There was a slight disagreem between the Ramsey Lewis Trio and the producer of Ninth Street West and Hollywood A-Go-Go last week.

Ramsey Lewis and his trio just recently broke into the popular market with their recording of "The In Crowd," were on the West Coast for an appearance at the Lighthouse, a Hermosa Beach

Agreed To Appear Lewis talked with Milt Hoffman, executive producer of the

two television programs, on the phone and agreed to appear on Vinth Street West while he was here, according to Hoffman. A short time later he called back and said he wouldn't appear on the show

He was reported to have said "I don't want to lose my feeling of being a jazz artist, I couldn't care less about the teenage kids.

A Different Story Lewis, however, had a different stoy to tell. He says he was contacted by Hoffman weeks ago and had agreed to do the show but leter changed his mind. Lewis said he told Hoffman, "At

this point I'd rather wait awhile because I'm more interested in a different caliber show,"

So the show was cancelled. But Lewis said he was contacted later



by Hoffman about trying again. He said he was told that the show

would be built around him. Lewis explained, "My main criticism is not of the teenagers-God forbid!-they bought a lot of "In Crowd." And I am not trying to create an image of a jazz musician, as Hoffman contends I said. Not until you can rid yourself of that connotation can you enjoy success in most instances. Sixty percent of those who bought

"Crowd" were not necessarily jazz fans as such Says Mis-Used Terms 'Hoffman mis-used these terms then he says I told him I wanted to solidify my image as a jazz mus-

ician. I told him we were not directing our music particuarly to teen agers. But I said I felt I owed it to he people from 22 to 35 to continue along those lines. The shows we have worked in the past few

years definitely are not geared to So the Ramsey Lewis Trio never appeared on the show. Freddy Cannon came down at the

last minute and filled in. So far nothing more has been done to get the trio on the pro

gram, but Hoffman said that Lewis will always be welcome to come on the show. He has an open invitation but he says he doesn't want to marr his image.

LIVERPOOL, England-"Come and Get It." That's what all the record stores in Liverpool are proclaiming in their window posters this week. What's the reason for this? Ouite simple, Liverpool's top group, the Clayton Squares, have their first record release this week, and the title is "Come going to be a big, big hit.

and Get It." The record is certainly causing a lot of interest here in England, particularly since the Squares performed it on the television show "Seen at the 630." So popular are the Squares that on the day the

record was released nearly 100 of their most ardent fans formed a queue outside one of Liverpool's biggest record stores over an hour before the store was due to open. They were determined to obtain the record as soon as possible

### Overjoyed

The boys themselves are overjoyed with the re-action to the record and Mike Evans, their leader, told me all the boys are keeping their fingers crossed that it will be a big seller.

The day before the record was released the boys performed it for the first time at a dance. Many celebrities in the show business world came to wish the boys luck with the record but judging from the reception they received there is going to be no need for that. Over 1,000 teenagers who crammed themselves into the small ballroom showed their appreciation of the number.

My opinion of the number is that it is going to be very big indeed. It is a very catchy song which Danny Alexander performs with great zest. The big sound of the Squares is solidly behind Denny and makes the number a cut above the normal record. The 'B' side was written by the Squares them

# Chad And Jill In Love With U. S.

It's a beautiful, wind-blown afternoon in Southern California. Trees are gently waving to the people on the street. Everything is peaceful and quiet in the warm, mid-afternoon sun.

We have an appointment with an extraordinary young man in a few minutes. He is young (handsome in a boyish sort of way) British, and one half of a successful recording duo. His name is Chad

As we arrive in the courtyard beneath his apartment, he appears above us on the balcony and invites us to come upstairs. "Welcome," he says with a smile as he throws open the door.

Inside the apartment, we see yellows, oranges and lots of fantastic multi-colored stuffed animals everywhere we look. They belong to Jill, who belongs to Chad. She is Mrs. Stuart.

### Witty Cat

It is very easy to talk to Chad, because he is an extremely witty and intelligent person. So, it isn't very long before we find ourselves plunged headlong into a fascinating conversation with our talented

He begins speaking of his childhood in England and of the partnership he eventually formed with Jeremy Clyde:

"I was born September 10.

"1947, in the Lad chisrica, a very beautiful part of England. It's very rainy and very beautiful, and it has lots and lots of fall trees. My father he used to chop the trees down, so I had an idyflic childhood! Later on, I went sawy to boarding school—the conventional fate for a moderately weathly Englishman's son also a chorister from the ages of 10 to 14 at Durham Cathedral where I picked up all my music, because I was reading and writing

tually - but right now it is a problem, because I'm having to run things my end and he keeps saying: "What are you doing, and I hear auful stories about this and

hear awful stories about this and that, and it's a big, big hassle right now. then, and view some of those de signs and patterns which are passing through the life of P.F. Sloan. Soft colors of yellow and pale orange: his friends call him Flip... was born in New York in

Jamaica, Long Island. I was the most rebellious child-at two hated everything. I was a terrible alker-that's how I got my name, Flip; Flip Flop! I used to trip over every rock. If there was a rock in the middle of the street, I'd find it and trip over it, no matter where I was, I'd trip. I was always on the floor. and browns, and pat-

terns of thought and irritation: he is surrounded by adults . . .

"The word "adult" is a dirty word; being an adult is not something to be desired. Because all adults are cowering in their own closed-in boxes and they're narrow-sighted and closed-minded. re is the word I'd rather see. I'd rather be a mature-thinking person. I think we should all be little kids, but mature enough to face the outside world Kids don't mind who they play with; and kids don't start riots in Watts.

And this guy doesn't want to even listen to the record and find out what I'm saying. We're going through pretty troubled times now, and if someone has to throw a couple of mud pies at you to open your eyes, then that's what's conna have to be done. I feel that this record is a mud pie and it's gotta be thrown at the people who have their eyes closed

"I think the younger generation is fantastically hip. Philosophical folk sones could have never sone over before, you never would have had a chance to say anything. I've been getting phone calls; everybody reads son into it - something they don't want to hear, something they don't want to believe. It's kind of hard to take-most people can't take it. I think our whole generation is straying away from all accepted norms: straying away from ganized religion-not religion in itself, but organized religion-just as a means of expressing themselves. 'Eve of Destruction' doesn't mean that we're all gonna he destroyed tomorrow, but it's an eventuality that we have to prepare for and discuss and do something about. I believe if we don't do something, we're on the 'Eve of Destruction.'"

Turning, turning-you keep on turning, for there is so much more of him to see. But all of P.F. Sloan cannot be contained within a onedimensional kaleidoscope.

## MFQ Members Are Zany Philosphers

The MFQ visited The BEAT
recently and revealed their plans

MFQ, for those of you who may not know, stands for the Modern Folk Quartet. That is, it used to. Now they have added a drummer and are officially the Modern Folk Quintet, but prefer to be known as the MFQ.

The group started seven years ago when three of them, Cyrus Faryar, Chip Douglas and Tad Diltz were splaying in a Honolulu coffee house owned by Cyrus. Then about three years ago they came to Los Angeles, met Jerry Yester and became the original

They had great success as a folk group and traveled quite a bit. But the boys believe in change. The group goal, says Cyrus is "never to be the same."

## Verges On Poetry Cyrus is really the philosopher

of the group. He sometimes verges on poetry when he talks. I asked Cyrus to explain the

I asked Cyrus to explain the change from folk to rock 'n' roll.
"We play rock 'n' roll as a logical outcome of how we think. We would have had to change our whole mental attitude to stay where we were," he said.

So when the four guys, the original three from Honolulu and Jerry, who is from Los Angeles, met Eddie Hoh, a drummer from Chicago, about two months ago they decided to try the rock 'n'

### Now With Spector

They are getting off to a great start with Phil Spector, who produces a lot of the Righteous Brothers' records, producing their first single titled "This Could Be The Night."

These five guys are really a bunch of characters. The first thing Jerry did when he walked in the offices of The BEAT was to ask for some tape to tape together a one dollar bill he had accidentally torn in half. He's a thrifty one. He also told me that the man-in-the-moon doesn't smoke, a fact I

Tad, who bears a remarkable resemblance to ohm Sebastian of the Lovin' Spoonful, plays an electric banjo which he invented himself. He says it bites sometimes. He had an odd looking symbol on a chain around his neck. I asked him what it was and Jerry told me it was the key to his apartment. Tad explaimed that it wasn't really. It's an old Egyptian symbol that was given to him.

Cyrus, the deep one of the group, tried to explain more about the group's goals.

## New Vocabulary

"We hope to become a part of the new vocabulary. We want to stay as new as we can so people will have trouble describing us,

except in superlatives."

"We're lucky because we're free," he went on. "We can talk and dress the way we want. When

you live in the world you have to play other people's games but now other people are playing our games and I have to admit it's nice." Cyrus has a natural tendency

to act as spokesman for the group and the others don't mind. "It's always a pleasure to sit down and hear Cyrus say what I'm

thinking," explained Jerry.

The boys believe in protest songs but feel that they are more sympathetic toward the whole movement than many of today's protest singers.

## Such A Poet

"Dylan can say what he wants because he's such a poet," noted Cyrus. "But even Dylan's not too sympathetic. We feel a little more sympathetic toward the whole protest bag."

Besides Tad's electric banjo, the group has three guitars, a six string, 12 string and bass, drums and a "bozouke."

The "bozouke" is Cyrus' and he explained that it is a "cross be tween an oud and a sitar." He swears it's real. I asked him what it looks like and helpful Jerry threw in that it resembles a "pregnant mandolin." Cyrus added that it has butterflies on it.

Cyrus also revealed that he has a particular fondness for kangaroos. He wouldn't say why but he did say that he hoped the group gets to go to Australia sometime so he can see some that aren't be-

gets to go to Austraina sometime so he can see some that aren't behind bars.

The boys have got a busy schedule already set up for them. They just finished a stint at a West Coast




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
