UA OPENS "WINTER WONDERLAND SALES MAGIC" AT MIAMI MEET

Miami Beach—United Artists Records opened its annual winter distributor meetings Jan. 2 at the Eden Roc Hotel, introducing its new product under the slogan "Winter Wonderland Sales Magic." In attendance were UA distribs covering the entire continental U.S., Canada, Puerto Rico, and Hawaii as well as distribs from UA's subsidiary labels, Musicor, Contempo, Garex. Park Avenue and Ascot.

Highlight of the sales plan was the introduction of a new series of five "Fifty Fabulous Favorites" wherein such top artists as Ferrante and Teicher, Al Caiola, Tito Rodriguez, Ralph Marterie and The Greenhill Singers perform half a hundred evergreens. The series will be the subject of an all-out advertising, promotion, merchandising and publicity push by the label.

President Art Talmadge presided at the two day session in which Si Mael, vice-president and comptroller; Lloyd Leipzig, director of creative services; Joe Berger, national sales man-


and comptroller; Lloyd Leipzig, director of cager; and Jay Jacobs, national director of sales merchandising and promotion, also officiated. Andy Miele, general manager for subsidiary labels presided over concurrent sessions of the subsidiary labels. Also present at the sessions were A&R director Jack Gold, and Production Director Ron Nackman.

In their presentations UA execs spotlighted the depth of the entire catalog, the steady flow of saleable merchandise, development of new artists and the diskery's success in keeping pace with new trends.

GIANT DENNY AGENCY CHANGES NAME TO DENNY-MOELLER TALENT

Nashville—The board of directors of the Jim Denny Artist Bureau Inc., meeting last week, voted unanimously to change the name of the giant talent agency to Denny-Moeller Talent Inc., according to W. E. "Lucky" Moeller, newly elected president.

Denny died last September after one year's illness.

As executive vice-president and general manager of the Denny agency, Moeller headed up the bureau, allowing Denny to devote more time to the increased workload as president of his flourishing Cedarwood Publishing Co.

The two firms pioneered the establishment and growth of "Music Row"—the area around Sixteenth Avenue, South, in Nashville. Both firms now occupy one of the most modern structures in the area with its address as 815 Sixteenth Avenue, South.

The Denny-Moeller firm is the largest C&W talent agency and handles exclusively a host of such top stars as Webb Pierce, Kitty Wells, Johnny Wright & Tennessee Mountain Boys, Bill Phillips, Porter Wagoner and The Wagonmasters, Norma Jean, Hank Snow & The Rainbow Ranch Boys, Carl Smith, Minnie Pearl, Carl and Pearl Butler, Stonewall Jackson, Jimmy Dickens, Lefty Frizzell, Jean Shepard, Grandpa Jones, George Morgan, Red Sovine, Billy Walker, Claude Gray, Willis Brothers, Justin Tubb, Archie Campbell, Martha Carson, Duke of Paducah, Connie Hall, Cousin Jody, Carl Perkins, Shirley Ray, Dottie West, Johnny Western and Jan Moore.

Moeller said Denny-Moeller Talent Inc. has handled approximately 3,000 bookings this past year and the coming year looks even brighter, based on an increase in bookings already set during this year's first quarter.

Moeller moved to Nashville in 1954 as personal manager of Webb Pierce and Red Sovine. In addition to guiding the careers of some 40 performers, Moeller serves as secretary of the Country Music Association.

GUY MITCHELL IS PACTED BY COLPIX

New York—Don Kirshner, executive veep for the record division of Columbia Pictures-Screen Gems TV, has announced the pacting of Guy Mitchell by Colpix Records. Mitchell had a fabulous seller several years ago in "Singin' the Blues". He has made numerous European tours, has appeared in two Paramount films, and is a favorite among nitery crowds.

AMY'S BIGGEST DAY ON "MIDNIGHT MARY"

New York—Amy Records last week was rushing release of its new Joey Powers LP, "Midnight Mary" coinciding with the single, of the same name, according to topper Larry Uttal. He said Dec. 27 was the biggest day the firm has had in "Midnight Mary" orders, with 30,000 singles being shipped in one day.

Bill Denny was elected executive vicepresident of Denny-Moeller Talent Inc. and will continue to serve as president and general manager of Cedarwood Publishing Co. Denny said the two firms would continue to work together as they have in the past. Other new officers of the talent agency are: Larry A. Moeller, vice-president; and Mary Claire Rhodes, secretary. PHILIPS 'STAGE III' SET FOR BIRTHDAY

Chicago-Setting the stage for the start of its third year of operation Feb. 1, Philips Records, last week introduced its January sales plan termed "Philips Stage III", and its new product of 12 outstanding albums.

Lou Simon, national sales manager, conducted the meeting in a room set up as a replica of a theater complete with stage, wings and lighted side marquees plus a "box office". The distributors occupied "producer chairs".

Sees Big Year Ahead

"Not only has 1963 been good for all of us associated with Philips," Simon said, but your success and ours in the product area has broken down all barriers in distribution, dealer co-operation and consumer recognition. We believe that with the established artists coming our way, the youngsters we intend to develop, and our already powerful roster, 'Stage III' will be a year of sales excitement and profits for all associated with Philips".

Other speakers included Mercury Records president Irving B. Green, Mercury executive vice-president E. H. Steinberg, Clair Van Ausdall, Philips classical A&R director; Bill O'Brien, national promotion manager; and Aaron D. Cushman, public relations adviser.

In salute to its forthcoming anniversary Philips Records inaugurated an award program in which a "Philip" statuette was presented as a "Meritorious Award For All-Product Sales Performance" to Mutual Distributors, Seaboard Distributors, and Big State Distributing Corp.

The Philips sales plan offers a 10 pct. discount on all new January releases and the entire LP catalog in effect from Jan. 1 through Feb. 29.

Chicago-A vitally expanding record industry and an explosive growth period for Mercury Record Corp., will characterize a strong, healthy economy through 1964, 150 distributors representing the corporation's Mercury, Philips and Smash labels, were told at the "Music Bowl" national sales meetings Dec. 29 and 30 at Pheasant Run Lodge at St. Charles, Ill.

The combined corporate meeting carried a football bowl game theme throughout because, according to President Irving B. Green, "We feel that this year the corporate team of Mercury, Philips and Smash have had such a successful winning season that we've established our own Music Bowl game.'

Setting the pace for the meetings, Green reviewed the company's outstanding product achievements for 1963 which have resulted in the best sales year in the company's history and announced an increase in sales volume of 50 pct. over the previous year. Green asserted the firm's belief that "although our industry

is often accused of over producing, we believe the primary sales problem today is under-demand . . . the failure to key the product closely to what the consumer wants."

Corporate Goals

He outlined the company's goals as:

1. Continue to meet consumer demand; 2. signing of top name talent; 3. development of fresh new artists; 4. development of additional unique material and presentations; 5. an expanded program of market research; and 6. continue close attention to the problems of the distributor.

Irwin H. Steinberg, executive vice-president, pointed out that the country's economy is beginning its 34th month of expansion and in this period has achieved a 100 billion dollar rise in gross national product, without evidence of deterioration. Additional signs for a highly profitable 1964, Steinberg said, are "the expectation that as a group, consumers will spend virtually all the additional purchasing power to come with lowering of personal income taxes; plus the 432 billion dollars in disposable personal income in 1964-which should represent a gain of more than 7 pct. over 1963. Steinberg said that for distributors to take full advantage of the present economy, they may have to (1) go to market in terms of a changing distribution pattern which might eventually find them servicing the consumer directly and (2) distributors must prepare to develop more adequate financial resources.

Changed Buying Patterns

Kenneth S. Myers, vice-president in charge of sales, outlined the changing patterns of consumer buying habits since World War "Today the customer looks for convenience", Myers said, "and doesn't care what type of store carries the wanted product as long as it is conveniently located and easy to shop in. The consumer not only demands the type of product but now dictates the entire marketing operation".

Myers added that the industry must present its product at a price competitive to other leisure time industries; also that with manufacturing costs constantly rising, the in-

Chicago-Introducing an impressive array of new albums, Mercury Records kicked off its January product and sales plan with all the fanfare of a pre-bowl game parade at the label's sales meeting last week.

Kenneth S. Myers, vice-president in charge of sales, conducted the meeting from a speaker's platform in the form of an actual parade float. Walls of the room bore giant drawings of artists in the release, depicted as drum majorettes, parade band members and football players.

Other speakers included Irwing B. Green, president; Harold Lawrence, artistic director; Bernard Braddon, administrative director, both of the classical division; George Balos, merchandising manager; Morris Diamond, promotion manager; Dick Bruce, sales manager; Harry Kelly, Wing sales manager; and Shelby Singleton, A&R director.

Guest speaker was Ed Gourfain, president of Mercury's advertising agency, Gourfain, Loeff & Adler.

Fifteen pop albums were introduced led by four top selling stars-Johnny Mathis, The Chad Mitchell Trio, Brook Benton, and Sarah Vaughn. Moms Mabley also makes her debut on the label. There were also highly esteemed new classical albums plus six new LP's in the successful "Great Music" series, plus an expansion of Mercury's "Storyteller" series.

The sales plan offers a 10 pct. discount on all new releases except the "Storyteller" series, and on all album product. The first of annual awards for outstanding distributor performance went to Seaboard, Hartford; All South, New Orleans; Mid-America, Des Moines; Multi-Disc, New York; and Dale Enterprises, Boston.

RED-HOT SMASH PLANS EXPANSION

Chicago-Smash Records' national sales meeting, attended by all Smash distributors, Smash executive personnel and regional men at the Pheasant Run Lodge and Country Club in St. Charles, Ill., last week marked the label's forthcoming third birthday Feb. 1 and geared distributors for the firm's full scale expansion plans for 1964.

The meeting was conducted by Smash chief Charlie Fach who announced the sales plan as "1964-A Smash of a Leap Year," with cartoon characters Lil Abner and Daisy Mae inspiring a "Sadie Hawkins Day Race For Record Sales" theme.

Attending the meeting besides Fach were Irwin H. Steinberg, executive vice-president of Mercury Record Corp.; Doug Moody, Smash A&R director; Alan Mink, national promotion manager; Eva Dolin, publicity director; and regional managers Lou Dennis,

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

New York—Columbia Records will release 24 albums this month, highlighted by the historic release of nine Bruno Walter recordings and release of the original Broadway cast recording of "The Girl Who Came To Supper." Also included are 12 pop albums and two Latin-American LP's.

"The Girl Who Came To Supper" is described as a champagne musical by Noel Coward, starring Jose Ferrer and Florence Henderson. It was produced by Goddard Lieberson, Columbia prexy.

MR REGRETS ERROR IN VOKES LP STORY

A printing error in a recent issue of MUSIC REPORTER inadvertently left the erroneous impression that the Howard Vokes album, "Tragedy and Disaster in Country Songs" was available free to deejays by writing to Starday Music. Vokes says the album can be bought on a cost-sharing basis by deejays and that his single, "The Miner" would be sent free. "If an album won't sell readily without extensive deejay promotion we don't make or issue it," according to Starday president Don Pierce. MUSIC REPORTER regrets the error.

DECCA'S JAN. PLAN OFFERS 25 ALBUMS

New York—Decca Records this week is announcing the release of 25 new pop and classical albums, spearheading the company's January re-stocking program, the dominant theme being "Up Front Counts More With Decca-Coral-Brunswick". The program encompasses the entire catalog of LP's and EP's on the three labels. The new releases will be offered dealers under an attractive incentive plan, details of which are available through local Decca branches and distributorships.

Decca currently is reported in the midst of one of its strongest selling periods in recent months, riding the sales wave with such big albums as "That Was the Week That Was", Brenda Lee's "Let Me Sing", and Rick Nelson's "For You", plus such hit singles as "As Usual" by Brenda Lee, "For You" by Rick Nelson, and Burl Ives "True Love Goes On and On."

Coral is represented by such artists as "Big" Tiny Little, Lawrence Welk, The McGuire Sisters, and Pierre Noles and ork. Representing Brunswick are Jackie Wilson, and top names in the Jazz world under the title of "Swingin' Friends".

GELD-UDELL INKED AS MERCURY PRODUCERS

Chicago—Mercury Records prexy Irving B. Green has announced the signing of Geld-Udell as producers for the Mercury group of labels, the deal to run for five years with an undisclosed number of sides, but of substantial volume. The signing is a further step in Mercury's expanded program of working with indie producers. Geld-Udell has a highly successful producing record with such artists as Brian Hyland, Ray Peterson and Curtis Lee. In addition they have produced sessions for ABC-Paramount, Brunswick and MGM Peter Udell and Gary Geld, writers as well as producers, teamed up in 1960.

DECCA INTROS 3 NEW PHONOGRAPHS

New York—Three brand new phonographs, all in the popular price range, were introduced at recent Decca sales meetings. With the additions, the line now consists of 12 portables, three consoles, a consolette, a component system and a demonstrator model. The new phonos are in stock at local Decca branches and ready for immediate delivery to dealers. An extensive advertising schedule has been set.

He says he frequently gets ideas for songs and comedy routines when he's driving along in a car because—"There's not much to think about when you drive but driving."


