

MUSIC VENDING: A BRIEF HISTORY

(Editor's Note: This MOA Convention, biggest and best yet, obviously reflects the growth and development of the music vending industry. From this convention will emerge indications and portents of the trade's future. While all delegates and exhibitors will be looking toward that future, it might be interesting to reflect on the origins of the industry. MUSIC VENDOR therefore offers this brief history of the trade.)

While some customers may complain that phonographs play too loudly, the phonograph and the phonograph record were invented because the telephone was not loud enough for Thomas Alva Edison. He tried to find a way to record the phone messages.

The first words, recorded by Edison in his laboratories in West Orange in 1877, were "Mary had a little lamb."

There might have been something prophetic in this animalistic reference. When Emile Berliner brought a talking machine to Eldridge Johnson's shop in Camden, N. J., Johnson said, it sounded "like a partially educated parrot with a sore throat." Neither Edison nor Johnson could foresee what Elvis Presley's philosophical postulate, "You ain't nothin' but a houn' dog" would mean to the juke box trade more than half a century later. Obviously, Presley wasn't referring to RCA Victor's little dog trade mark.

In 1896, Johnson perfected the first turntable to spin at constant speed, long before electronics controlled the rpms.

But the music vending business began, it is believed, when a man named Jesse H. Lippincott of Pittsburgh formed the North American Phonograph Co. Lippincott had been granted exclusive sales rights to Edison's invention and he proceeded to form 30 subsidiary companies.

Edison and Lippincott had envisioned the "Talking Machine" as a replacement for stenographers. But office managers thought otherwise. After all, mechanical talking machines were cumbersome contrivances that sat less comfortably on one's lap than earlier models did. Sales were below expectations.

Through Glass -

One of Lippincott's distributors on the West Coast was Louis Glass, who saw things clearly. Glass affixed a coin-operated mechanism to a phonograph and installed it in the Palais Royale Salon in San Francisco. This opening at the Golden Gate swung open a new and profitable market for other franchise holders.

By the beginning of the century, coinoperated phonographs were established as mechanized music machines and were making money for their owners. The earliest models — prior to 1906 used Edison's original cylindrical records. The last phonograph built to play cylinders was constructed in 1906. It played 25 cylinders and hit on all 25, one after another, without permitting the customer to choose what he wanted to hear for his money.

The beginning of the music vending business as we know it today began when John Gabel of Chicago built the first phonograph that played a platter or disc-type of record. Gabel's machine held a dozen records and was equipped with a selection device. The customer could turn a knob to select the tune he (Continued on Page 43)

S. 1870 Attacked by Operators Tavern Owners and Songwriters

Opponents of Bill Would Favor Adding Penny To Mechanical Royalty Payments on Records

WASHINGTON—Witnesses for MOA and the phonograph manufacturers were supported by testimony from songwriters, tavern owners and hotel operators in voicing their opposition to Senate Bill 1870, when hearings on the measure were held here April 23, 24 and 25 by the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Patents, Trademarks and Copyrights.

The hearings were conducted by Senator O'Mahoney (Dem., Wyo.), chairman of the subcommittee and author of the bill that would amend the Copyright Act of 1909 and impose performance fees on juke box operators.

Arrayed in favor of the bill were representatives of the performance rights societies (ASCAP, BMI, SEECO), the Copyright Office and the State Department. Opposed were the juke box operators (MOA), phonograph manufacturers and hotel and tavern owners. Songwriters joined the opposition, refuting ASCAP's arguments that composers were being victimized by operators because of the exemption from performance fees granted in the Copyright Act of 1909.

Sen. O'Mahoney asked opponents of the bill to consider a fair measure should new legislation be feasible. Such a measure, Sen. O'Mahoney felt, should place a ceiling on performance fees if they are to be imposed.

Opponents of the bill, however, said they would favor payment of another penny per side per record in mechanical royalties. This would bring the royalties now paid by the operators to three cents per side. Addition of this extra penny, the opponents to the bill said, would be preferable to dealing with the three performance rights societies. Bookkeping alone, it was pointed out by the operators, would be too complex.

Proponents claimed the music vending

industry was now flourishing and its members should pay for performances as do all other users of music. They also declared the 1909 Copyright Act was outmoded and should be revised. Exemption from payment of performance royalties, they said further, was a form of special treatment for a single industry that uses recorded music for profit. Another argument advanced by the proponents was that juke box performances do not make hits, but that juke box operators program records after they have become hits.

Opponents countered these arguments by citing the "exposure" given records on juke boxes. George A. Miller, president of MOA, and Hammond Chaffetz, counsel for the manufacturers, argued that juke box operators are small businessmen making under \$4,000 per year on the average. With rising expenses, the addition of performance royalties would drive many out of business. Songwriters, it was shown, receive money in the form of mechanical royalties paid by the juke box operators with each record purchase. Additional bookkeeping costs, to satisfy three performance rights societies would force many out of business. Thus the songwriters, who now derive income from jukebox purchases, would earn less than they do now.

Perry Alexander, songwriter-publisher, spoke in favor of the operators and opposed the bill by citing his unfair treatment from ASCAP and BMI. He told of the difficulty of joining ASCAP, then said he had published "Cry," which became a Columbia hit for Johnnie Ray, and brought him \$30,000 in record royalties alone.

Representatives of the American Hotel Association said the bill would penalize hotels whose customers played coinoperated radios or TV sets in their rooms.

INTERDEPENDENCE OF VENDOR-DJ-RETAILER

(The following article, published in MUSIC VENDOR No. 560, Feb. 24 of this year, drew much comment. It is being reprinted for this MOA issue, because it concerns delegates, exhibitors and guests.)

Interdependence between music vendors, disc jockeys and record retailers becomes more important every day. All three benefit from this interdependence. It would be wise, therefore, for the music vendor, the deejay and the retailer to participate actively in the development of this relationship instead of merely letting it grow without mutual co-operation.

There are many retail record stores that do not have listening booths where prospective customers can hear the records before making their purchases. In supermarkets and discount record shops, for instance, records are sealed or packaged so that customers will buy "fresh," unmarred, non-sampled records. This means that the artists and their tunes must be known to the customers before they buy the records.

How do these records become known to the customers?

They become known through two prime means of exposure –

- 1. The coin-operated phonograph;
- 2. The disc jockey shows.

More and more deejays run "record hops" and use juke boxes for playing the records. The rapport between music vendors and disc jockeys in some areas is becoming increasingly pertinent. In fact, the co-operation between deejays and music vendors is accepted in many parts of the country.

Since records are now being sold in regular retail shops, discount houses, drug stores and supermarkets, some vendors have been able to place coin-operated phonographs in these establishments.

Alert, public relations-minded vendors participate in community activi-

ties, and commendable charities, such as the March of Dimes. Properly programmed juke boxes are a source of wholesome entertainment for youth. As public-spirited businessmen, vendors are involved in Boy Scouts, city council and other civic responsibilities.

Any charitable endeavors that interest disc jockeys, music vendors and retailers would benefit from mutual co-operation. In addition to giving aid to the charities or civic betterment programs, the participation could aid the public relations endeavors of all.

There's no doubt that the music vendor helps the disc jockey because both are concerned with proper programming. Conversely, the deejay draws attention to the records a customer wants to hear on the juke boxes. Both benefit the retailer. Since all are dependent upon knowledge of record popularity, they help each other.

Up to now, this help, in the main, has developed haphazardly. With some thought and some active co-operation, the interdependence of the vendor, deejay and retailer can benefit each other even more.

The Woody Herman hit of a few years ago. WOOD-CHOPPERS' BALL, is given a new swing by Hutch Davie on an Atco disc to become a Hit Parader this week . . . TRY THE IMPOSSIBLE is a hit suggestion by Lee Andrews and the Hearts on the United Artists label . . . Bert Siegelson tabbed Mickey & Sylvia's ROCK AND STROLL ROOM as a hit side for Vik, but the Music Guild of America survey tabulations show the flip side, BEWILD-ERED, as the Hit Parader, ROCK AND STROLL ROOM is a two-star entry.

The Stroll continue to figure in songs and titles, with Kay Starr, whose ROCK AND ROLL WALIZ was a big hit, delivering STROLL ME in Hit Parader style on an RCA Victor disc . . . The Champs, whose serving of TEQUILA on a Challenge platter, was a heady offering, remain in a Latin area with EL RANCHO ROCK. It's already become a Hit Parader.

Incidentally, four of the Popular Hit Paraders also became R&B Hit Paraders simultaneously. They are TRY THE IM-BEWILDERED, WOOD-POSSIBLE. CHOPPERS' BALL, and EL RANCHO ROCK.

FLASH: Patti Page and entourage will fly - on wings of Mercury? - to the MOA Convention . . . There's a bright Sunbeam disc by Gerry Granahan with NO CHEMISE, PLEASE backed by a new twist on GIRL OF MY DREAMS. How to Develop Location Insecurity

(Maybe it was the heat of last summer. It made us lightheaded about a serious situation. Many subscribers wrote to say they got a chuckle — and a lesson — from the following article, which is reprinted from MUSIC VENDOR No. 529, July 27, 1957.)

Some juke box operators, we know, in contradistinction to music vendors, feel they know everything one has to know about the business because they had 15 to 25 years of experience. Of course, it's been pointed out that 25 years of experience doesn't mean anything if the same experience is repeated every year. Yet, there are those who feel there is nothing they can learn from anyone else.

Most vendors seek what, for want of a better term, is called location security. Operators who say they already know everything there is to know about the business and need no outside aid or support are hereby offered gratis, some ways to insure location insecurity. And every operator can do it himself.

1. Make record selection a guessing game by using handwritten title strips. A knowledge of Sanskrit helps, especially if the location's customers have archeological interests. This keeps customers in a location since it takes time to decipher the titles.

2. Use your own musical tastes as a guide to programming. This impresses the location owner with your superior wisdom and knowledge. He is thrilled to be associated with brilliant critics and prophets who know more than A&R men and the general public.

3. Never polish or clean your equipment. If the phonograph becomes dirtencrusted and the glass or plastic portions become opaque, the phonograph becomes part of the background of an establishment, fading into the general decor. Thus, customers will not be attracted to the juke box instead of the bar or tables.

4. Never rotate equipment. Tell the location owner that you cannot afford to place newer equipment in his establishment. This will convince him that you are not making an unconscionable

profit on the music service. Thus he will be sure he is getting the most of the money, if any.

5. Change records only once a month. This will emphasize the fact that your musical judgment is superior — that you can pick the best records at all times. In addition, his customers will develop affection for the records because of their very familiarity.

6. If you can afford a routeman, make sure he is surly and non-communicative. Or be that way yourself, if you cannot afford service crews. This straightforward attention to detail, without letting personaltiies or politeness intrude, shows that you mean business and have no time for non-productive time-wasting.

7. Disregard all holidays and events. If the location owner feels you are not concerned with Holiday Music he'll also feel you are not concerned with matters that have no bearing on the music business.

8. Always offer to undercut a competitor. While this makes a location owner feel his present music merchant has been taking unfair advantage, it proves you are a good business man, willing to give all your profit to the location owner. Everybody appreciates a good deal.

9. Use no promotional devices or ideas to stimulate business. This shows the location owner that you are not spending money that would normally accrue to him. It proves that you are concentrating on his location, because he gets money that you might otherwise spend.

10. Make big loans to the location owner. If you go into hock to obtain an account you are demonstrating your understanding of the location owner's plight and your willingness to sacrifice much to gain a little, if anything.

Group Life Insurance For Members of MOA

A brochure describing the life insurance plan for members of MOA, their employes and associates, was distributed to all members of the national organization two weeks before the convention was scheduled. Purpose of the distribution was to enable members to study the plan and raise questions when the subject is discussed at a convention session.

Prepared by the California Life Insurance Co., the plan would provide all active employers and their employees up to the age of 60, a benefit of \$10,000. From the age of 61 up, the benefit would be \$5,000. No medical examination is required.

De La Viez in Europe, To Miss MOA Confab

LONDON - Hirsh de La Viez, music vendor whose headquarters are in Washington, D. C., will miss his first MOA Convention in several years because of his duties in England and on the Continent as president of the Washington Variety Club. De La Viez. in past years, was stage manager for the floor show at the banquet of each MOA confab.

After surveying the coin-operated phonograph business in England, de La Viez was to visit the World's Fair in Brussels this week.

Why 10-Cent Play?

The Labor Dept.'s Consumer Price Index rose steeply in March, hitting 123.3% of the 1947-1949 average, compared with 122.5% in February and 118.9% in March a year ago.

Food prices were the biggest factor in the climb, jumping to 120.8% from February's 118.7% and topping the year-before March by 6.7%. The costs of housing, medical care, personal care, reading, and recreation also moved upward.

Not in the Bag: Victor's Sack Pack

The sack dress has become a grab bag for RCA Victor, promoting the label's recording of "Boppin' In A Sack" by the Lane Brothers. The four releases are "Tommy Potter's Hard Funk," featuring bassist Tommy Potter; "The Jackie Paris Sound," with Jackie delivering ballads of the Swing Era; "Lars Gullin Swings," with Sweden's baritone saxaphonist in quartets, quintets, sextets, octets, and big band settings; and "Prestidigitator George Wallington," with the keyboard magician and his quintet.

Artists on the roster of Decca Records and its subsidiary Coral and Brunswick labels will perform at the MOA Convention floor show in Hotel Morrison, Chicago, May 8. wanted to hear. In effect, then John Gabel, was the father of the music vending business.

Electrified -

By 1927, phonographs were being constructed with electrical amplification. They were designed to play both sides of a record and permitted automatic selection.

By 1941, when manufacturers of coin-operated phonographs converted to war work, there were over 350,000 phonographs on locations in the United States. They offered 12, 16, 20 and 24 selections. After the war, as part of the boom in electronics, automation and hi-fi, phonographs were improved and 45-rpm records became standard equipment. Some phonograph models today permit up to 200 selections and music vendors now have to exercise skill in programming.

The coin-operated phonograph has ceased to be a novelty. Today's coin-operated phonograph is a permanent part of America's show business. It differs from every show business medium by allowing the patron to hear what he wants to hear when he wants to hear it.

The average cost of buying, servicing and maintaining a coin-operated phonograph has increased approximately 300 per cent. Music vendors like other business men faced with rising costs, have had to adopt more efficient methods and procedures to earn a profit. Dime play is becoming standard.

The radio boom of the 20's temporarily affected the music vending business. After World War II when television became a potent mehcanical form of show business, some gloomy prophets predicted the TV set would replace the

coin-operated phonograph in taverns and restaurants.

Choice Product -

But despite competition from television, radio and movies, music vending continues to thrive because it offers something no other mechanized form of entertainment allows — freedom of choice. When a customer wants to hear a specific tune, he can hear it by inserting a coin into the phonograph. That is, assuming the music vendor has been wise enough to program his equipment in accordance with charts of popularity compiled via survey.

The future looks bright for music vending because experimentation and research has not stopped. There is much talk now of "stereo-discs" and the effect the tape will have upon the industry.

Manufacturers of phonographs, meanwhile, are creating modern, fool-proof instruments that incorporate technological advances in their mechanism. Nobody jests about garish designs of juke boxes any more, because the contemporary coin-operated phonograph is a handsome device.

One of the strong and stabilizing elements in the hurly-burly of the industry is the trade association. These associations function on local, regional and statewide levels. Nationally, of course, there is the MOA, an organization that has unified the trade and has consistently presented a united front of opposition to the attempts of ASCAP and others to extort performance fees from the operators.

Because of MOA and because of the business maturity of vendors, there is a sharing and pooling of information which benefits every individual operator.

What of the future?

The answers will be presented at the forum meetings of this convention and in roundtable discussions.

ALBUM REVIEWS OF THE WEEK

GEMS FOREVER - Mantovani and His Orchestra (London LL-3032).

• Another fine offering by Mantovani, a consistent producer of successful LP's. As with past performances, this package features the soaring sound of Mantovani's 39-piece orchestra incorporating 26 strings, in intricate by listenable arrangements. Art work on the cover sparkles with precious gems and the melodies are also precious mementoes, such as "All The Things You Are," "Summertime," "I Could Have Danced All Night," etc.

TAKE FIVE - Ronny Graham and the "At the Downstairs and the Upstairs Room" Casts (Offbeat Records O-4013).

 The spot recording from the popular New York bistro is one of the more entertaining albums in many a season. Refreshingly different, with the duo piano work of Stan Keen and Gordon Connell, the cast romps through some funny material. Ronny Graham, who starred on Broadway in "New Faces," is featured in two comedy numbers-one as a harrassed embezzler being quizzed on a Mike Wallace type of interview, and the other as the gone jazz character, "Harry the Hipster." The four others who make up the "Take Five" group are Jean Arnold with a hilarious number called "Gristede's", named after Manhattan's supermarkets, in which she reports that while there looking for Wheaties, she met a guy looking for Kix. As a change of pace, Ellen Hadlev does a love song, "Perfect Stranger," written by Bart Howard. Ceil Cabot tells the story of "Roger the Rabbit," a retrogressed rodent who does not have the rabbit habit when it comes to love making.

Gerry Mathews delivers a rapid fire ditty called "Witchcraft," not to be confused with the song of the same title recorded by Frank Sinatra. The cast offers three satirical and inventive numbers, "The Poet's Corner," highlighted by Graham's interpretation of a "beat

generation" character; "Grapevine," and "Doing the Psycho-Neurotique," giving a Latin lilt to the libido. Abbot Lutz deserves encomiums for producing this album. He succeeded in transferring a visual showcase into an aural performance that evokes mental images of the show.

PARIS HOLIDAY - Original Cast Album - (United Artists UAL 4000).

● Listing of Bob Hope should be enough to make this album sell, but when you add the Old Groaner Bing Crosby, you have a double guarantee. While Bing isn't in the film from which this album was taken, he joins Bob to sing "Nothing In Common," and makes it the highlight of the recording. Hope surprises with fine treatment of two oldies, "The Last Time I Saw Paris" and "April in Paris." Joe Lilley's orchestra and chorus also brighten this musical vacation in the fabled city.

SAY DARLING - Original Cast IRCA Victor LOC 10451.

• Although "Say Darling" is not listed as a musical, but rather as a comedv about a musical, it has several enjoyable tunes, as this album proves. David Wayne, Vivian Blaine, and Johnny Desmond, who's making his Broadway debut in this show, star in the production and give the songs by Betty Comden, Adolph Green and Jule Styne the full treatment. Unlike the actual production which uses two pianos for accompaniment, the songs are recorded with full orchestra conducted by Sid Ramin. Johnny's version of the title song, and "Dance Only With Me," by Mitchell Gregg and Vivian Blaine, and the show stopper, "Something's Always Happening On the River," done by Wayne and the cast, are top tunes. A special nod goes to the technical quality of this LP, much finer than is usual on cast album records. RCA Victor is to be commended for technical excellence here.

THE 'MUSIC MAN' GOES DIXIELAND -Jimmy McPartland's All-Stars (Epic LN 3463).

• Meredith Willson's score for his hit musical gets a wonderful Dixieland workout from McPartland and Co. With Jimmy in this session are Max Kaminsky on trumpet, and Tyree Glenn and Cutty Cutshall on trams; Pee Wee Russell, Bob Wilbur and Peanuts Hucko on clarinet; Mrs. McP. at the piano; Eddie Condon on guitar and George Wettling on Drums, to mention just a few. Dick Carey's arrangement of "76 Trombones" is a two-beat treat. Eddie Condon's prose in the liner notes is also distinctly in the Dixieland idiom. A-one, a-two, a-three.

JOANN MILLER . . . Unrestrained (Audio Fidelity AFLP 1864).

• This girl is a first rate singer and a welcome addition to the ranks of versatile record stars. She bounces through some sophisticated numebers, such as "Good Little Girls," then belts some good old Dixieland jazz tunes like "New Orleans." Another switch finds her delivering in warm show biz style "Baubles, Bangles and Beads" and "Look to the Rainbow." One good listen-through of this album inspires many more.

MUSIC VENDOR ALBUM of the WEEK



This encore or sequel to Sinatra's Volume One is a hit anthology of singles scored by the versatile singer with Nelson Riddle supplying the right complements to the Sinatra delivery. Spelled backwards or forwards, Sinatra means hits and sales.

THE STORY OF

ABC-PARAMOUNT

Observers of the record business and the history of the industry have ceased classifying a minor group of labels as "majors" for quite some time. During the

past five or six years, the majority of hit records have appeared on labels which ranged the wide gamut from larger independents to relatively obscure and unknown firms. Generally, the major, long-established

record manufacturers have come in for a goodly share of best-sellers, naturally; over a period of time, however, it appears that the platter-buying public is no longer too interested in recognizing old trademarks or buying the latest release of a particular artist, simply out of loyalty.

In the case of ABC-PARAMOUNT, much of the credit is rightly due to the man who was selected by the discerning board of executives of ABC-PT to head up their record company project back in August of 1955: Sam H. Clark.

Having screened a number of prominent recording executives for the key post of President for the label, the top-brass took notice of the many who made frequent reference to Sam Clark, and they noted, particularly, how so many of the interviewees offered Clark's name as reference. Deciding that such respect and esteem must be worthy of survey, they asked Clark to leave his Boston distributorship for a few days for a conference in New York.

After a few perfunctory discussions, Clark was appointed to head the new affiliate, was elected President of the label and given carte blanche to set up the organization.

The processof organization was a long and careful one, with Clark screening all prospective department heads and general employees personally. Except for a few changes, he could draw genuine satisfaction from his top administration officer, Vice-President Harry Levine, a post he had held with the Paramount Theatre organization for almost thirty years; heading up his A. & R. divisions, Clark had assigned Don Costa, famed arranger, conductor, composer and guitarist, and Creed Taylor, the brilliant, young producer; for his National Director of Sales, Clark had engaged Larry Newton, a twenty-year veteran of the record industry, and, heading up the Album Sales & Merchandising department, is Dewey Bergman, Jr., also a respected and admired name in recordom; for his National Director of Promotion & Publicity, Clark's finger landed on Natt Hale, nationallyfamed, top-rated flack; to serve a double purpose, Irwin Garr was asked to head up the company's ASCAP and BMI music publishing firms and to serve as National Disc Jockev Relations chief; and, for the other important functions, Al Genovese heads the Department of Accounting & Fiscal, Romeo Fabrizio is Director of Production, John Natoli serves as Album Production Manager, Rick Ward holds the reins as Administrative Assistant in Promotion and Publicity and Gene Moretti was recently given the newly-created post of Coordinator of Foreign Sales.

With the trends and general record market constantly changing, Clark and his top aides made it a point to be constantly aware of what ABC-Paramount should produce to make their enviable distributorship chain mutually beneficial. The label has seen fit to present the most commercial and saleable records to the sales organization throughout the country. Closely linked to this format, the company has steadfastly looked to build up their contract artists, with such stellar names as Eydie Gorme, Paul Anka, George Hamilton IV, Johnny Nash, Billy Taylor, Don Costa and a host of others too numerous to mention.
