

The Kingston Trio is, in a sense, unique. It sings on key and with a passionate regard for the geographical and musical meaning of whatever song is being presented. This impressive integrity is unmistakably evident in the hat-dancing inspiration of the Mexican Coplas, in the rollicking fun of Three Jolly Coachmen, an English ditty that the trio sings with an extravagant Mayfair accent.

There is versatility here, from the haunting, ghostly quality of

Fast Freight to the calypsian verve of Banna, from the cocktail lounge-type Scotch and Soda to the mournful cry of Tom Dooley, a classic "do" of the Tennessee hill-folk.

There is also high humor and a feeling for the dramatic, along with sound knowledge of the gamut from sea chanteys to calypso



rhythms to the inevitable western-type roundelay. And there is the musicianship to put this knowledge into its most delightful expression.

Singing comes naturally to the boys, and all play guitar. Dave Guard and Bob Shane were brought up in Hawaii, where they learned to strum ukuleles about the same time they learned to swim—at the age of seven. Both Dave and Bob play banjo in addition to guitar. Nick Reynolds, who sings and plays conga drums, was born in California, but as the son of a Navy career officer he traveled widely and picked up new songs each time the family moved.

You don't have to be an expert to sense that these boys like to sing. Better yet, they sound as if they like to sing together, During their engagements at such bistros as San Francisco's "The Purple Onion" and "the hungry i," Chicago's "Mr. Kelly's," and New York's "Village Vanguard," they have been heard and roundly applauded by everyone from Bing Crosby to Admiral Chester W. Nimitz. This album gives you a chance to do the same.



# SOUTH PACE

Rodgers and Hammerstein's "South Pacific" opened at New York's Majestic Theatre on April 7, 1949, and has been running somewhere ever since. The Broadway conquest ran a record 1,925 performances; there have been uniformly successful national and international tours; constant performances on TV and radio of songs from the score. And currently, of course, the popular motion picture version is delighting audiences everywhere.

Because of the range of drama, wit, and especially the romantic lyricism in the timeproof score, Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians are particularly qualified to interpret SOUTH PACIFIC. Throughout a long and successful career in all media. Fred Waring's music has been characterized by a tasteful imagination that heightens the music's essential message without distorting the intentions of the composer.

Fred Waring is especially fond of SOUTH PACIFIC-one of his associates observes. "Fred can hum the whole score by heart." In this album, he has applied to his treatment of the songs his customarily meticulous preparation and determination to invest the music with its full color and warmth. Never were the shores of Bali Ha'i more alluring or the drama of Some Enchanted Evening more appealing than when the Waring chorus and orchestra interpret the unforgettable words and music.

There is laughter in I'm Gonna Wash that Man Right Outa My Hair and Honey Bun, And there is a note of sweet sadness in Younger Than Springtime and This Nearly Was Mine. All these selections and more from the wonderful world of SOUTH PACIFIC prove what one critic once said of Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians. "... they give as well as receive."

TCHAIKOVSKY: SERENADE IN CMAJOR, OP. 48 PROKOFIEV: CLASSICAL SYMPHONY, OP. 25

Tchaikovsky's beloved Serenade for Strings contains some of the loveliest music ever written by the composer. While the First Movement, a gravely melodic passage, was Tchaikovsky's favorite, the Second Movement, Waltz, is one of the most popular pieces in all the world. The sweeping strains of the unforgettable harmonies are colorful and romantic. The violins slow, quicken, and then hold their

breath in moments of delightful suspense. The Third Movement, Elegy, is in a solemn mood, heightened by the interplay of orchestral voices suggesting an operatic duet. For the fourth, and last, Movement, Tchaikovsky turned to Russian forms of music, powerful and stirringly eloquent, ending with a bell-like return to music of the First Movement.



Prokofiev's familiar *Classical Symphony* was composed as an answer to critics of 191<sup>-</sup> who claimed he could only write "modernistic" pieces—a straightforward demonstration that the composer was thoroughly grounded in the principles of classical art. It was a symphony written, he said, "as Haydn would have written it had he lived in our day."

The music of all four movements is cliquent with wit, charm and old-world grace. The first two movements are notable for their beautiful string passages while the Third Movement is the vigorous gavotte, long a favorite with concert audiences. The finale recaptures the moods of each part of the Classical Symphony, relating them with string melodies.

Prokofiev never again composed an apologia like this one. But even as he matured and took on the stature of a master—one of the Olympians of modern music—classical principles remained among the prime tenents of his musical faith. He too, like Tchaikovsky, wrote grander pieces than the present one; but there is none with more consummate artistry.

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# HAYDN CONCERTO IN D MAJOR BACH CONCERTO IN D MINOR

From the beginning of the seventeenth century until the end of the eighteenth, when it was overshadowed by the piano, the harpsichord was the all-purpose instrument for both accompaniment and solo performances. For this album, Sylvia Marlowe remains true to the traditions of both Baroque and Classical performers by not only appearing as soloist but conducting the orchestra as well.

Haydn's Concerto in D Major for harpsichord and orchestra is perhaps his finest concerto. As performed here by Sylvia Marlowe and the orchestra, the music's refinement and grace are destined to charm today's listener. While the concerto's opening music unfolds, the listener will note the smoothness with which orchestra and harpsichord blend and contrast. Suddenly the calm spell is broken by the flashing music of an Hungarian gypsy dance, only to return once more with the enchanting melodies of the closing themes.

Of the various harpsichord concerti written by Bach during his years in his beloved Leipzig, the *D-Minor Concerto* is unquestionably the most familiar and the greatest. Miss Marlowe and the orchestra play the stirring melodies here as Bach intended: with harpsichord heard alternately as soloist and as complement to the orchestra. The opening movement, brilliant with powerful Baroque harmonies, is followed by a lovely Adagio. The third and final movement is a sturdy, almost earthy Allegro. It is, in noted musicologist Tovey's opinion, "the most important of all Bach's instrumental finales."



At the age of eighteen, while a pupil of Nadia Boulanger, Sylvia Marlowe began studying the harpsichord. Since then, she has performed to constant international acclaim on the concert stage, in numerous radio concerts and in a distinguished NBC televisian series. Renowned critic Virgil Thompsan has described her playing as "authoritative, masterful, and deeply poetic."

An outstanding interpreter of eighteenth-century music superbly performs two of that period's most engaging works.

**BUDDY RICH—Hi-Fi Drums:** Swinging out on the title tune is Buddy Rich, joined by *Woody Herman's Herd*. Here, his four-minute solo displays the explosive style that has made him the greatest of today's "showman" drummers.

LOUIS BELLSON—Sticks: In this Shorty Rogers original, Lou's rolling, double bass-drum technique backs up his own *Just Jazz All Stars*. Lou has sparked the Benny Goodman, Tommy Dorsey, Harry James, Duke Ellington organizations.

**CHUCK FLORES**—Skinned: It's the *Woody Herman Herd* again on Skinned, featuring young Chuck, former student of Shelly Manne, member of the Herd; and, more recently, a prominent figure in West Coast jazz. His work here swings nicely, leading the brass and saxes with a free, easy rein.

**DAVE BLACK**—Gonna Tan Your Hide: Dave joins *Duke Ellington* in this tune by the Duke and Billy Strayhorn. Dave is up and away on this one, winding up with a blazing finale.

**ALVIN STOLLER – Brushed Off:** Here's a swinging original by *Billy May* and Stoller. After a tempestuous intro, Alvin takes over on brushes to lead Billy's brass and saxes on a merry chase. Stoller is a veteran of Teddy Powell, Benny Goodman, Claude Thornhill, Charlie Barnet and Billy May groups.

**CHUCK FLORES-Skinned Again:** A rousing encore by Chuck, featured with *Woody Herman's Herd*.


STAN LEVEY, ALVIN STOLLER, IRV COTTLER—Tri-Fi Drums: Levey, currently with Howard Rumsey at Los Angeles "Lighthouse," served with Dizzy Gillespie and Charlie Parker before moving on to Stan Kenton, Charlie Ventura, and Woody Herman. Irv Cottler has worked with Red Norvo, Claude Thornhill, Tommy Dorsey and Les Brown. Tri-Fi Drums, written by Bill Holman, features the three, playing breaks and in unison with Billy May's Band. The galvanic finale has all three in a driving, down-to-the-wire finish that adds the final, dazzling stroke to HI-FI DRUMS.

Coleman Hawkins virtually created the tenor saxophone as a jazz solo instrument and he has remained one of its most popular stars ever since. Beginning with Mamie Smith's Jazz Hounds and later as an important soloist with Fletcher Henderson and his orchestra. Hawkins perfected his technique into the linear sax style that has become his trademark. His recording of "Body and Soul" made Hawkins a national jazz figure, and secured his position as a solid mainstream jazzman, bridging the eras of swing and cool. His associations with other prominent men include records with Count Basie and Dizzy Gillespie; tours with his own sextet featuring Sir Charles Thompson, Howard McGhee and Denzil Best. Today, as THE GILDED HAWK testifies, Coleman Hawkins is still an artist unsurpassed.

Here, Hawkins' fabled tenor sax captures a soft, beautifully romantic jazz mood. His leisurely, rhapsodic solos are wonderfully enhanced by backgrounds that feature a string choir, augmented from time to time by woodwinds.

The tunes he performs in this album are familiar ballads, untarnished by too frequent exposure. All




of them respond eloquently to the Hawkins touch, to the big, sensual tone that is distinctively his. There is a gentleness too in these solos, rooted in strength and thus all the more persuasive. Possessing that rare combination of imagination and control, Coleman Hawkins shapes solos in *It Had to Be You* and *Baubles, Bangles, and Beads,* with firm outlines. And whether he is coaxing rich feeling out of the tune itself or fashioning expressive phrases of his own, his melodic interpretation makes every selection a gilt-edged performance.
