



Is it really country music?????

Let's take a long hard look at this music we tag "Country" in Canada. We have the Maritime sounds of Stompin' Tom Connors and John Allan Cameron along with the prairie twangs of Hank Smith and Dick Damron — tied together with the upcountry Upper Canada sounds of The Mercey Brothers, Diane Leigh, Orval Prophet and Dallas Harms. How different is Newfoundland's Dick Nolan from Vancouver's Dave Baker? — Nova Scotia's Jim and Don Haggart from Winnipeg's Rick Neufeld? Does Cy True's "Countrytime" show fit into the same category as CTV's "Pig & Whistle" or Ken Gibson's Vancouver production of "The Irish Rovers"? — and what about the highly successful "Tommy Hunter Show"?

Let's take a look at RPM's most recent Country Playlist. We see here a listing of 36% Canadian content. Here are the artists, we call country, who are known nationally: Anne Murray, Diane Leigh, Alabama, Hank Smith, Orval Prophet, John Allan Cameron, Ian Tyson, Lisle, Carroll Baker, The Mercey Brothers, Dick Damron, Gary Buck, Dallas Harms, Jack Bailey, Tim Hewie, Dave Baker, The Family Brown, Canadian Zephyr, Humphrey and the Dumptrucks, Doug Lewis, The Creamcheeze Good-Time Band, Roy MacCaull, Jim & Don Haggart, Lloyd Phinney, Roy Payne, Joyce Seamone, Stompin' Tom Connors, Gates Lepine, Winston James, Jerry Eli, Ron Perkins, Linda

Brown, Ben Kerr, Cliff Edwards, Ray Griff and Joe Firth.

Now, how confusing can Canadian "Country" music be? Are Saskatoon's Humphrey and The Dumptrucks and Kitchener's Creamcheeze Good-time Band as country as The Mercey Brothers or Lisle? Are they being programmed on country stations because they happen to be unique and entertaining or are programmers giving these Canadian artists an airing because of the 30% Canadian content ruling? I happen to think the latter is the case.

Pre-1971, the number of Canadian "Country" (and we're stuck with that tag) singles aired on Canadian country stations amounted to less than 1/2 of 1%. Granted, our industry really hadn't put its best foot forward in attempting to get into the market or, indeed, establish Canadian country music as part of the industry. The gates were opened January 18, 1971 and, like our rock cousins, we threw everything but the kitchen sink into productions. Everything, that is, but professionalism. This laid the foundation for cynicism, now firmly entrenched in our industry. After almost three years of legislation can we honestly say it has helped us? But let's not be too negative. A check with BMI's Harold Moon or John Mills at CAPAC will reveal a tremendous thrust forward in the field of songwriting. Payments made to writers and publishers have shown a phenomenal increase. But what of the performers? Does recorded product by Jerry and Jo Anne (Jerry Robitaille and Jo Anne Moreault) and Morris and Dot Rainville really add to their income and popularity? Surprisingly enough, it does. The same situation exists for most touring Canadian country artists. But, "What price fame?" Week after week — forty-eight to fifty weeks a year, playing for a little better than scale. Do hotel and tavern

owners really regard these artists as more than "just filler"? Are we selling ourselves short, just so we can have an audience — any audience? The same thinking would appear to go into the putting together of a record production. For the most part, country artists utilize recording studios as factories. They continue to take their hard-earned money and pump out a constant barrage of sound that is just not conducive to today's country radio listeners. Their record session is usually their club act. They feel that if their barroom audience dig their sound then so must those who are not familiar with them. You can blow that argument all to hell too. Naturally there are exceptions.

Case in point, Dick Nolan, the only Canadian country artist who has certified for Canadian Gold (RPM Gold Leaf Award). His RCA album, "Fisherman's Boy", containing "Aunt Martha's Sheep" has sold in excess of 125,000 albums — and all in his home town province of Newfoundland. Here we have a regional phenomenon. The combined efforts of VOXM Radio, Crawford's Record Sales and Ron McNeill Record Service created this exceptional situation. What about the rest of Canada? RCA was unable to secure a foothold on the mainland — at least he is now recognized across the country. Stompin' Tom Connors is probably the best example of Maritime country success, although none of his albums have apparently reached the sales pinnacle of that of Dick Nolan. Most major country radio programmers balk at the playing of another Stompin' Tom record. But you can't ignore success. His albums sell consistently and his tours flourish. He is now known from St. John's to Victoria and north to Inuvik. Is this the sound we're looking for in Canada? Can we be original and unique and be accepted by

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

CANADIAN COUNTRY MUSIC SUBJECT OF NEW MOVIE

"The Hard Part Begins" is a Canadian movie with a couple of differences. It is the first dramatic film ever made in this country that deals with the world of country music. It is also the first Canadian feature to integrate original Canadian country music into the format.

Produced by Odyssey Films Limited with CFDC assistance, "The Hard Part Begins" deals with one week in the life of a country singer and his band. The setting is West Eden, a fictitious town representing any number of the small towns in Canada where groups like "King and Country" provide the staple entertainment in local bars and taverns.

The story concerns the problems and the people in King's life, past and present, and the pressing decision to stay with his chosen career, with all its hardships, or give it up for something more secure but less fulfilling.

The film stars Donnelly Rhodes, Paul Bradley, Nancy Belle Fuller and Doug McGrath and a large supporting cast — some of whom are not professional actors.

"The Hard Part Begins" was written by John Clifford Hunter and directed by Paul Lynch both veterans of CBC-TV drama.

Musical Director, Ian Guenther selected the songs in the film, all of which were written by new young country songwriters among them, Leon Dubinsky of Sydney, Nova Scotia, Dave Essig of Emsdale, Ontario and Joan Chisholm also from Nova Scotia, as well as Ian Guenther himself.

The songs were recorded by members of Eastwind, Toronto's top country band.

Vocals were dubbed by well known Toronto musician Zeke Sheppard and a young newcomer Louise Gadzala. Cliff Carol, a local country singer appears as himself in the film.

Additional music scoring utilized Toronto musicians, Fred Mollin, John Shand, and Hal Greer.

All music for "The Hard Part Begins" was recorded at RCA Studios in Toronto. Sessions were engineered by George Semkiw and Mark Smith.

Production of the songs and score for this film was a project of 3 Hats Productions. This new young company sees several offshoot projects coming out of the work done on "The Hard Part Begins".

A soundtrack album is now being readied for release. Louise Gadzala and Cliff Carrol have

CANADIAN ATTENDANCE AT WSM BIRTHDAY GROWING

The Nashville 21st Birthday Anniversary Celebration of the Grand Ole Opry has grown from less than 100 in attendance in 1952 to an expected 10,000 this year. Although the festivities will be underway a week prior, official functions will not commence until Wednesday Oct. 17. First event will be an Early Bird Concert (Bluegrass) at the Opry House at 7:30PM. The United Talent-Shure Bros. concert will take the night out commencing at 10:30 PM.

Oct. 18: from 11:30 AM to 2PM will be the Opry and WSM luncheon and show at the Auditorium. The Country Music Association's International Show will take place at the Auditorium from 3:30PM to 5:30PM. The Sho-Bud Baldwin and Gretsch Show will hold forth at the Opry House from 5:30PM to 7:30PM with the United Artists Show at the Auditorium from 7:30PM through 10PM.

Oct. 19: The MCA breakfast and show from 8 to 10:30AM at the Auditorium. There will be taping sessions on the lower level of the Auditorium from 10:30AM to 12:30PM. The Dot luncheon and show will be held at the Auditorium from 12:30 to 2:30PM with another taping session from 2:30 to 5PM. The Friday Night Opry will commence at 7:30 running through to 11PM.

Oct. 20: RCA's breakfast and show begins the day at 8 to 10:30AM with Capitol's luncheon and show commencing at Noon to 3PM. Columbia will present their show from 5 to 8PM. All above shows will take place at the Auditorium. The Grand Ole Opry

Attendance by Canadians this year is expected to surpass those of past years.

HALL OF FAME RECIPIENTS TO BE ANNOUNCED OCT. 15

Country Music's highest honour will be awarded to two of ten finalists in contention for election to the Country Music Hall of Fame on October 15 as this year's winners are announced on the Seventh Annual Country Music Association's Awards Show.

Normally, the CMA panel of electors elects one new member to the Hall of Fame each year; however, election procedures stipulate that if two years pass without the election of a deceased person, the third year's election requires that two ballots be issued. One, the regular ballot may contain names of living or deceased nominees with the second containing only deceased nominees.

Regular ballot nominees for this year are: Cht Atkins, Pee Wee King, Minnie Pearl, Vito Pellettieri and Kitty Wells. Pellettieri, probably the least known publicly, was the stage manager for the Grand Ole Opry for nearly 40 years and was instrumental in the development of stage presence during the formative years of many artists who are now Country Music Stars.

Deceased candidates are: Rod Brasfield, Patsy Cline, Paul Cohen, Vernon Dalhart and Leon Payne.

The Awards Show, hosted by Johnny Cash and sponsored again this year by Kraft Foods, is scheduled to be broadcast on the CBS-TV network at 9:00PM on October 15.

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ALBERTA'S DAMRON DOES IT FOR TORONTO FOLK

Fresh from a successful cultural exchange with Germany, arranged through the province of Alberta and a bang-up session at a British Columbia log cutting, rolling, tree climbing etc. gig, Dick Damron rolled into Toronto's Horseshoe Tavern (Sept. 17) and did his "Countryfied" thing. Opening night at the Horseshoe is about as exciting as watching Mayor Crombie exchange niceties with Stompin' Tom Connors but Damron even managed to stir Harry (with the rug) the waiter, or it could have been the big tipping by Frank Klees or Columbia's Ontario promo rep, Mike Watson.

MODERN COUNTRY COULD BE COUNTRY'S UNDOING

Industry people have, over the past few months, taken sides for and against "modern country". For those who are for it, statistics are proving that "modern country" would appear to be the most fashionable — and profitable route. Traditionalists claim that the "modern country" sound is a ploy by Madison Avenue types to move country music into stagnation. Proof of this has been

several country names have covered it including George Hamilton IV. The song was so catchy to Hamilton he used it as his theme for his BBC Television series and is also using it as his theme for his Canadian television series (CHCH Hamilton). A little bit of patter, a good line of humour, at the expense of bass man George Pasher and Damron got into a yodelling trip, an old Wilf Carter song. His trip to Germany and the Alps must have given him a new slant on this art — his tonsils vibrated into a healthy bit of double time yodelling that will probably become an important part of his act.

Damron's pick-up band — he's worked with them before, were exceptional. They are comprised of: Ken Near, steel; Keith Mackay, lead guitar; Roy Feener, drums; and George Pasher, bass. The latter was showcased during Damron's first set with an old nostalgia rock bit, "Candy Store Blues" — a bit of a shaker for the country pickin' Shoe fans but nevertheless a good vehicle to show off the many talents of Pasher.

Damron took his set out with his current chart single, "The Prophet", not his strongest but a heady-type of prairie entertainment that kind of sums up Damron's own philosophy.

the successful crossover of country artists into the pop music field yet their seemingly loss of popularity within the country ranks.* Country artists who have crossed over into the pop music field have lost their box office appeal with the usually loyal country fans, and because they are not yet established as pop artists, lose out with this type of fan, as well.

Unfortunately for the traditionalists, country programmers would appear to oppose them. A survey of Canadian radio stations programming some country (85% of which do), more than 76% program "modern country". Those stations programming country music twenty-four hours a day, rely primarily on "modern country". They are forced to include traditional country because of the 30% Canadian content regulations.

Record companies in Canada are still holding with the traditionalist line. A check of Canadian country reveals a little less than 2% modernization.

MARATHON BOOSTS IMAGE OF NEWCOMER LINDA STONE

Linda was discovered while singing in the Newfoundland Club by The Dorymen, a Marathon group. The group was so impressed they invited her to become a permanent member of the band. While the Dorymen were in Toronto, Marathon's Doug Taylor took Linda into Eastern Sound and recorded her first album.




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Harold Moon: Not retiring, just shifting gears

"I like country music," says Harold Moon, "because I don't have to work to enjoy it."

The 65-year-old Managing Director of BMI Canada Limited turns his job over to old friend Cam Ritchie at the close of this year — and then becomes the first BMI employee to enjoy a pension plan he created himself.

We spoke recently in Moon's large office, a full corner of BMI's handsome six-year-old building on Toronto's Valleybrook Road. While Moon sipped a sugar-free soft drink ("I'm addicted to this stuff."), he ruminated

about his 26 years with BMI and his plans for retirement. In Moon's case, "retirement" is an inaccurate word; he'll merely be shifting gears.

"Hell, I've got three homes to look after: one here, one in the Muskokas and one in Arizona. You're probably wondering why a man with only a wife and a dog needs three homes." I wasn't. But it's one of Moon's characteristics that he was quick to jump on any suggestion of pretense in his statement. His point was simple: for health

reasons his wife must winter in Arizona and they enjoy their retreat in the Muskokas for the rest of the year. The third residence, in Toronto, is really a quick shave-and-change spot for Moon. With official retirement on the horizon, he's looking forward to time to relax. He puts in fatiguing 16-hour days with BMI at the moment and has to leave their Muskokas home at 2:30 in the morning to rest in Toronto before arriving at his office at 7:00.

And Moon travels frequently on behalf of the 700 publishers and more than 4000 writers affiliated with BMI. The performing



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

rights organization also has offices in Vancouver and Montreal, and maintains friendly links all over the world. Moon has toiled for Canadian music talent at BMI since 1947 but it wasn't until 20 years later, in Canada's Centennial Year, that he saw his efforts rewarded by a burst of proud Canadian creativity.

"We've always had Canadian music," he said, "and I'd been involved in Centennial planning for nine years before 1967. But it was tough trying to pull music — and money for the music — out of people for the occasion. Then it happened. People finally put their money where their mouths were and we enjoyed an explosion of music."

HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO THE GRAND OLE OPRY

This year marks the 48th Anniversary of WSM's Grand Ole Opry and the world's largest annual country music birthday party will be held October 17 through 20 in Music City U.S.A., Nashville, Tennessee.

The event is expected to attract over 10,000 official delegates and hundreds of curious spectators who will all take part in the five days of fun and celebration.

Since its beginning in 1925, WSM's Grand Ole Opry has been the most enduring radio program anywhere. Officials are now making plans to move the Opry to new headquarters in April of 1974. The new Grand Ole Opry House at Nashville's \$25 million entertainment park will be the world's largest broadcasting studio, and the first theatre built specifically for the Opry.

The actual convention begins Wednesday, October 17 with the Early Bird Bluegrass Concert and is climaxed by the cake-cutting celebration on stage at the Saturday Grand Ole Opry.

As in the past, this birthday celebration will be designed for the enjoyment of the artists, disc jockeys and guests.

HIT PARADE RENEWED: EDDY ARNOLD WILL HOST

Eddy Arnold, The Country Music Association's 1967 Entertainer of the Year, will host the Second Annual "Country Music Hit Parade" scheduled for broadcast in early 1974.

The first one, aired in February of this year, drew a 39% share in the ratings for its time period. The top Country songs for 1973 will be featured as well as some of the traditional favorites.

Guests on the NBC-TV special will be announced at a later date, with top names in the country music field being invited.

Phillip Productions will produce the "Hit

Parade", with Joe Cates as Executive Producer. Walter Miller and Chet Hagan will be co-producers with Hagan also writing the script.

Working closely with the producers will be Irving Waugh and Jack Stapp, co-chairmen of CMA's Television Committee and again this year the show is to be sponsored by the American Gas Association.

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ZEPHYR BRINGS BACK THAT OLE MUSIC

Canadian Zephyr were formed three years ago as the vehicle for the return to the entertainment scene of a group of ex-rock musicians who had weathered the early rock and roll days, and decided to call it quits. After a few personnel changes, the group became a trio with its current line-up.

John Hayman, leader of the group, is in his late twenties. His musical background includes six years as lead guitarist of "The Emeralds" a popular Toronto r&b group of the early sixties, who even had a record released on Tamarac in 1963. Then followed two years as vocalist and lead guitarist of the Shades of Blue, a group whose specialty was one-nighters. Eight years of classical piano provide a strong basis for his songwriting,

which has seen him pen all the Canadian Zephyr's recorded works to date: "Cheap Lowdown Wine", "World Of Make Believe", "Leaving Blues" and "Sweet Caroline", currently riding the country charts after 12 weeks of release. Their forthcoming album contains nine of his compositions, including the next scheduled single "Loving My Lady". His duties in the group include arrangements, lead and acoustic lead guitar, harmonica, 5-string banjo, mandolin and a considerable amount of lead-singing and harmony work.

Bill Meens the only other original member of the Canadian Zephyr is also in his late twenties. His musical experience includes playing trombone in his high-school band in Belleville; acoustic guitar which he later dropped in favour of bass. In the group he plays bass, drums, autoharp, and some rhythm guitar. He has begun to develop his

writing talent also, with one of his songs being scheduled for release some time next summer.

Garth Bourne is now the lead singer of the group. His voice is the one most often heard on their records, however, on stage, he shares the mike duties with John, and occasionally sings harmony for him. He is currently the rhythm guitarist, however he is soon to become the full-time bassman on



stage. His other instrumental abilities include some banjo, autoharp, bongos and steel drums. His slight accent and repertoire of calypso songs attest to his being born in Port of Spain, Trinidad. A self-confessed ladies man, Garth is the personality of the group. He also is considering songwriting, although perhaps not on the same scale of output as John, he has turned out some very fine lyrics.

The Canadian Zephyr were one of the first acts signed to Bronco a year ago, with two singles having been released so far. Their new single should be released on October 15th, with their initial album to follow shortly after. Their unique musical sound is largely due to their instrumentation and original arrangements.

HIBBS/CHRISTIE INTO PALLADIUM COUNTRY

Country has come to Toronto's Palladium - and that's where the smooth broadcasting voice of Gil Christie is hanging out. The ex-broadcaster, taking a seasonal hiatus from the business, is handling public relations for the club which is situated at Gerard and Broadview in downtown Toronto.

The club's policy has changed to that of a Sunday evening jamboree-cum dance-cum dinner arrangement. Set for the opener (Oct 7) is newly signed Marathon recording artist, Harry Hibbs, complete with squeeze-box and hat. Hibbs will be appearing on a regular basis at the converted theatre which holds upwards of 500 - sittin' or dancin'.

MORE AND MORE CANADIAN STATIONS INTO COUNTRY

It has been established that more than 85% of Canadian radio stations are now programming "some" country. There are fourteen full-time country music stations now operating — successfully. One of the latest to go country music, twenty-four hours a day is CKGY Red Deer.

A unique situation occurred recently with CJVI Victoria going all-country. Local Times critic Brian Hay bemoaned this changeover and, for his troubled writing, apparently discovered that Victoria was ready and waiting for the change. Ironically, the change came through CJVI general manager, John Ansell, an eastern Canadian. The actual programming was left up to Ron Robinson, program director who formatted the station with a degree of subtlety designed to educate his on-air personalities as well as listeners. He programmed 50% charted singles, 25% album tracks and 25% gold. The format has apparently worked and added yet another giant Canadian listening post for the exposure of Canadian country product.

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
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THE ALLAN SISTERS WELCOMED OUT WEST

In attendance for CJGX Radio, Yorkton, Saskatchewan was promotion manager and country jock Ron Waddell. Through the girls' manager, Charlie Underhill, Ron arranged a lengthy interview for his country show. He then spent

ELI INTO STUDIOS FOR NEWFIE ALBUM

Jerry Eli, currently seeing chart action with his initial Matador single release, "The Other Side Of Town", has returned to the studios for an album session. The Eli group will be comprised of Bobby Munro, piano; Roddy Lee, drums; Larry Dee, steel; Dottie Randall, bass; Andy Greatrix, bass; Delmer Dorey, accordian; and Eli on rhythm guitar.

The session will be produced by Eli and Munro at Toronto's Eastern Sound Studios. The title of the album has already been established as "Newfoundsongs Of Newfoundland". All ten selections were penned by an east coast writer who wishes to remain anonymous. One cut, "My Canada", has already drawn interest from music people. It is an anthem type song using the flowers of the different provinces to punch home the message.

An early October release for the album is expected.

STOMPIN' TOM'S MOVIE DEBUTS AT BIG COUNTRY

One of the features of RPM's Big Country Communication Meeting will be the advance screening of "Across This Land", a film built around country artist and personality Stompin' Tom Connors.

The 90-minute film will be released as a feature with a family entertainment classification following the Official Premiere October 5 in Ottawa's Rideau Theatre.

This all-Canadian production was made by Cinepix of Montreal. A great deal of footage was shot live at the Horseshoe Tavern in Toronto, as well as other locations in and around Toronto and the neighboring countryside.

A number of other Canadian artists are shown performing, along with Stompin' Tom Connors, they include: Sharon Lowness, Chris Scott, Kent Brockwell, Bobby LaLonde and Joey Tardiff. Both LaLonde and Tardiff are in their early teens and considered to be country prodigies.

BMI had no official position on the CRTC regulations in 1970, although they were pressed for an opinion at the time: "It wasn't up to us to take a stand. We had lots of arguments among ourselves but nobody outside knew about them. We deliberately stayed in the middle of the controversy because we felt we had no right to say anything, to play God."

And now? Moon is still cautious: "I can see where the regulations have done some good. And we've certainly had a lot of people join us since 1970. But I sometimes wonder whether quality has suffered as a result, because so many people wanted to hop on the bandwagon at the same time."

Although his job has forced him to balance his appreciation of various forms of music, it's no secret that Moon has a deep personal affection for country music. He has friends all over the American south, particularly in Nashville, and reports that opinion of Canadian country talent is high there. "And they really know Canadian country music," he said. "Ask Tex Ritter, for instance, and he'll name every Canadian writer from Victoria to St. John's."

Why is Canadian country talent held in such high esteem? "We're good. That's number one. And, secondly, country music hasn't had to come through the back door up here the way it has in the States. We've always had country music up here and it's always been considered a legitimate form."

Moon helped found the Country Music Association and has been actively involved in its activities since the beginning. He was instrumental in erecting country music's Hall of Fame in Nashville, now an international symbol of unity and dedication. In 1972 the CMA presented him with a special award that cited his efforts: a unique and touching gesture from his friends in the field.

Moon's personal collection of country music records totals about 5000, including many original 78's. The Canadian government approached him with an invitation to donate his records to their archives but he would rather see them in the hands of a Canadian section of the CMA: a fitting gesture in view of his determination to give country music the respectability it deserves.

Beginning January 1, Harold Moon will have more time on his hands. But the music industry won't be losing one of its most valuable allies: he's considering several offers at the moment, among them some prestige consultancies. He has decided to wait until around December 1 to make any kind of statement about his future and, although he enjoys being active, a stern doctor has ordered him to slow down a little.

When Moon opened the BMI doors in 1947, he shared his office with one other employee. There were no affiliates. Now, with three offices, BMI employs nearly 70, very busy people. BMI's success in Canada can be traced directly to Moon. A true pioneer in Canadian music, he has helped stir this country by aggressively promoting its talent. Concurrently, he has earned a reputation for

honesty and integrity in his dealings. And he has won legions of friends with his friendly, unpretentious style. He exhibits a genuine concern for Canadian talent, supported by intelligence and dedication.

Now he wants some time to himself: "I've got a few tunes kicking around in my head and maybe I'll finally have a chance to write them." For few people realize that Moon was an active songwriter and composer before he joined BMI; his concern for artists is rooted early in his own career.

The music industry anxiously waits for Harold Moon to decide what happens after January 1. It's a measure of his enormous popularity that he probably won't be allowed to relax for very long.

BARRY RYMAN NEW WESTERN PROMOTION REP FOR MCA

Barry Ryman, previously handling record promotion for British Columbia and Alberta has been named Western District Promotion Manager for MCA Records (Canada).

Ryman's district of operations covers British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

MCA's philosophy is to produce a promotion influence that will parallel the effect district sales manager Jack Williams has created out of MCA's new Calgary stocking branch.

Ryman will continue to operate out of the MCA offices in Vancouver.


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MORE CANADIAN TALENT FOR NEXT YEAR'S CNE

What had expected to be a fiery meeting between CNE executives, booking agents, promoters and North York (Toronto) Alderman Ben Nobleman with regard to a 60% Canadian quota for CNE Grandstand headliners, turned into a fairly dove-like meeting with only a few eruptions.

Nobleman, long the champion of Canadian talent, had mustered his forces in the spring of the year resulting in a petition signed by several thousand Torontonians and others calling for more Canadian talent at the CNE Grandstand. Nobleman's plea to Metro Executive Council with the petition as backing, resulted in the setting up of this meeting to explore the possibility of utilizing the services of more Canadian entertainers.

Nobleman scored several good points, although he did admit that 60% was perhaps a little out of line. David Garrick, General Manager of the CNE, claimed that much more effort had been put into the selection of Canadian talent, indicating that the total use of Canadian talent amounted to more than 85% this year. There had also been much more emphasis placed on the use of Canadian acts for the Grandstand including The Guess Who, a headliner act grossing \$102,000 for one night, as well as The Stampeders, returned for a second year because of their obvious popularity. Other Canadian groups had also been used as supporting acts for the giant stage show.

Blair Kirby, music critic for the Globe and Mail wasn't too impressed with the proposed quota and tagged it as "fine on principle, but the problem the CNE faces is that they have got to have really big names to fill the place." adding, "You have to consider how terrible a place it is to perform in. The Grandstand has 21,500 seats and unfortunately nationalism will not sell a heck of a lot of tickets."

Nobleman jumped into the fray along with Boot (Records) PR gal Carol Jamieson, pointing up the drawing power of Stompin' Tom Connors and suggested several new avenues of presenting Canadian talent including well publicised folk, country and rock nights. This led to the question of profit which the Grandstand has been making over the past few years. Alderman Ben suggested the CNE shouldn't be interested in profit and indicated that Metropolitan Toronto had "millions of dollars to give away" and could subsidize the CNE Grandstand should they suffer a loss — an argument that was quickly shot down.

Okeh Jones, past president of the CNE advised that from the year 1968 the CNE had left the door open in an effort to increase the use of Canadian talent throughout the grounds during the Exhibition dates.

Gino Empry, a highly respected impresario, agreed with Nobleman's flagwaving, drawing a parallel between his own nationalistic feelings and those of Nobleman. He pointed up some of the problems of playing the giant stage, tagging it "a killer" particularly

to a Canadian artist or group, not yet fully developed. He called it "a monstrous responsibility" for a group to entertain one of the world's largest outdoor audiences. "They could bomb", said Empry, adding "They would then be an embarrassment to themselves and to those responsible for their appearance." He would prefer a fully developed group - "ready for the CNE."

There had been some questioning of the reliability of the bookers responsible for the rock bands booked for the CNE. It was suggested by some of those in attendance that an unbiased committee, excluding bookers, be formed to ensure that a good cross-section of Canadian talent be utilized for next year's show.

Nobleman suggested that further meetings be held to explore the subject. Kirby was opposed to any further meetings, however CNE President Doug Palmer and Okeh Jones agreed that perhaps get-togethers such as this could result in a better understanding of the aims and goals of the CNE. Palmer did point out however, that the time for booking acts for next year's show was crucial because of the competition from other fairs throughout Canada and the U.S. for top name international stars.

It was agreed that the CNE would advise the Metro executive council that they would continue to increase their use of Canadian talent and although it might not be able to reach the 60% at the Grandstand

RAIL STRIKE THROWS SCREW INTO INDUSTRY

Canada's recent rail strike created several bad situations with the recording industry, most of which have shown signs of returning to normal.

Bert Dunseith, national sales manager Columbia Records reports a somewhat tense situation during the strike. Columbia arranged alternate carriers to beef up their Kwikasair method of shipping. They also arranged for air freight which ran into an embargo problem within a few days of the strike. Service for the major Quebec and Ontario markets continued without too much difficulty. Columbia maintains much of their own trucking service for these areas.

RCA's national sales coordinator, Pat McQuade, made arrangements for truck transportation, direct from their Smiths Falls plant through to Vancouver. These trucks serviced branches in Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver and, aside from boxcars still sitting on the spur line, the service is close to being back to normal. The Vancouver situation is expected to take another week or so to clear up.

A different twist to the problem came from A&M. Their national promotion manager Pete Beauchamp had to hold back on several releases because of a cardboard problem, required for the manufacture of album covers. They also experienced some difficulty with getting product out across the country, utilizing air freight until the embargo curtailed that method.

Bill Gale, traffic manager for Quality Records, was one of the few to find the strike less than annoying. Gale claims Quality came out of it "smelling like a rose". They have maintained an exceptional flow of business with other than rail and air transportation. Their accounts throughout Ontario and Quebec have been fully serviced and service to Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver has been close to normal. However, they did air freight some product, and were on top of the situation when the embargo came into effect.

Dave Sturgeon, plant manager for WEA Music of Canada, resorted to alternate carriers and

was able to ship sizeable orders via air, to Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver. He had found that after the third day of the strike that shipments were being backed up by as much as six days in Vancouver. They received exceptional treatment from their surface carrier, Consolidated Fast Freight which kept product flowing, although at a reduced rate. They are still shipping product via air to Vancouver.

Most record companies will admit that they did suffer some discomfort during the strike, much of it the added costs of shipping via air.

YOUNG COMPOSERS TO BE GRANTED \$15,000 BY BMI

A total of \$15,000 is available to young composers in the 22nd annual BMI Awards to Student Composers competition sponsored by Broadcast Music, Inc. (BMI), a performing rights licensing organization.

Established in 1951 by BMI in co-operation with music educators and composers, the BMI awards project annually gives cash prizes to encourage the creation of concert music by student composers (under the age of 26) of the Western Hemisphere and to aid them in financing their musical education. Prizes ranging from \$300 to \$2,500 will be awarded at the discretion of the judges. To date, 185 students, ranging in age from 8 to 25, have received BMI Awards.

The 1973 BMI Awards competition is open to student composers who are citizens or

permanent residents of the Western Hemisphere and are enrolled in accredited secondary schools, colleges and conservatories or are engaged in private study with recognized and established teachers. Entrants must be under 26 years of age on December 31, 1973. No limitations are established as to instrumentation or length of manuscripts. Students may enter no more than one composition, which need not have been composed during the year of entry.

The permanent chairman of the judging panel for BMI Awards to Student Composers is William Schuman, distinguished American composer.

The 1973 competition closes February 15, 1974. Official rules and entry blanks are available from Oliver Daniel, Director, BMI Awards to Student Composers, Broadcast Music, Inc., 40 West 57th Street, New York, New York 10019.





DOUBTFUL STANLEY KRAMER NOW AN ANNE MURRAY FAN

There's an interesting story behind the selection of Anne Murray as the singer of the love theme, "Send A Little Love My Way", on the soundtrack of "Oklahoma Crude". Producer-director Stanley Kramer originally envisioned a man for the chore.

"I felt it would make sense for the character Faye Dunaway plays to be listening to a male singer", explains Kramer. "But Henry Mancini, who wrote the score, suggested a girl be hired because it would be unexpected.

Several voices were considered and rejected before Mancini recommended Anne Murray. Kramer wasn't enthusiastic since, by his own admission, he wasn't one of her biggest fans.

"I didn't dislike her," he says, "I just wasn't that excited about her. But Henry persisted, claiming her voice was exactly what the song, and film needed."

Kramer gave in and is happy he did. In fact, he's now an Anne Murray convert and sings her praises at every opportunity. "She has a rich, true voice that reminds me of some of the best jazz singers," he says. "I was so happy with her work on the song that I took her to the Tulsa opening of the film. She's an interesting and dynamic girl and did a terrific job of helping us promote the film".

Anne, in turn had the same initial unenthusiastic reaction when the song was presented to her. "I didn't know what to think," she

FILM HOUSE CLOSES DOORS "INDEFINITELY"

Film House Ltd., regarded as Canada's second largest film production company, has closed its doors (Sept. 17) advising their 70 odd employees that the move was indefinite.

This closing however, comes on the heels of an announcement by Robert Crone, Film House president, that the firm had gone into receiver-managership under the Clarkson Co.

Clarkson Co. had been called in by the Mercantile Bank of Canada, which had also withdrawn its credit from Film House. Crone had apparently claimed in his announcement of last week that the company could survive but that it had problems that could take a month or so to iron out.

Clarkson spokesman Ian Strang has now entered the picture advising that Clarkson had seized the assets and was in control of Film House. He reportedly advised that developments, within the next day or two, could change the situation and perhaps bring about a long-term solution.

Strang also revealed that Crone was now an employee of Clarkson Co. and that some employees had been kept on to phase out the current operation.

Film House had become an important part of the film and record industry over the past couple of years. They processed film, provided sound effects and sound mixing facilities and editing rooms and office space for film producers.

There had been rumours of Film House becoming a part of a huge conglomerate that would include three or four recording companies, two, possibly three pressing plants and two recording studios — all reportedly under the control of Life Investors.

This syndicate is headed up by Toronto lawyer Robert Macaulay. They are reported to have purchased Film House from Mr. Crone for more than \$2 million. The takeover had been slated for July 31st of this year.



Although Ben Nobleman and Carol Jamieson hadn't won their point completely they were responsible for shaking the foundation of a thought-to-be unshakeable Kremlin the CNE. It's expected that several suggestions put forth by Miss Jamieson and Nobleman will be acted upon next year — and they're not through yet.

"The Stampeders have benefited from having appeared at the CNE in gaining engagements in the U.S. such as Michigan State Fair, Nebraska, etc.

"I trust you appreciate hearing from some Canadians who enjoy being on the big show."

The battle of the giants and the little people will no doubt continue.

Canadian programmers — or do we have to "prostitute" ourselves with that "modern country" fast taking the country out of country? So, what do we have? There are those who complain about the lack of professionalism in Canadian records, yet we have proof that the Canadian public is more tuned into the sounds of our artists than radio stations. Record companies and artists say "those airwaves belong to the Canadian public and as such we should be heard." The programmers agree - with the ownership of the airwaves, they have to, but they have established a code of ethics whereby they are the final judge as to what they program — "for the protection of their listeners" and to maintain a place in the ratings game. Can there ever be a meeting of minds? Can the Canadian country artists and record companies ever see and accept the point of view of Canadian programmers - and vice-versa? That's what RPM's BIG COUNTRY MUSIC meeting is all about. Perhaps after this two day meet we can honestly answer the question? "Does Canada really deserve a country music industry?"





A most unfortunate release all round. At first glance, the cast looks impressive, in fact, formidable. But unfortunately they are hampered by Karajan's bumptious style which is more suited to von Suppe and Strauss than to the suave urbanity of Puccini. The producer of this disaster should have insisted that he study carefully the Seraphim Beecham performance which is the finest Puccini committed to disc so far. I am certain that each individual member of the cast is capable of essaying great interpretations of their respective rolls with the help of inspired leadership, but here they are permitted vocal and theatrical excesses that would not be allowed in the most provincial productions. In a word, a bummer!

Two of Dvorak's lovely tone poems for orchestra, the Golden Spinningwheel and the Midday Witch receive stylish, idiomatic performances by the Czech Philharmonic orchestra conducted by Zdenek Chalabala. The disc is completed by a lively performance of the Hussite Overture Op. 67 by the late Karel Ancerl. First class production.

This disc is the first in a series which will eventually complete the Bach Cantatas. This set will be attractive to those who found the use of boy sopranos for the treble solos unsatisfying in the recently inaugurated cantata series on the Telefunken label. This new series by the Bach-Collegium Stuttgart conducted by Helmuth Rilling features the solos sung by the usual quartet comprising a Soprano, Alto, Tenor and Bass. The singers perform with conviction and vocal expertise. The orchestra features outstanding instrumental soloists. The continuo is played on harpsichord and organ by Martha Schuster with musicianship and good taste. Enclosed notes include the text in German and thematic excerpts from each movement of the work. Recorded sound and surfaces are superb.

His fastidiously controlled technique and supremely beautiful tone have been captured to perfection by DGG's engineers and the Vienna Philharmonic orchestra under the direction of the brilliant Italian conductor Claudio Abbado produce performances of aristocratic splendour. One hopes that many such performances by this greatest of artists will follow.

BARTOK String Quartets 1 to 6

Bela Bartok's six string quartets are as popular with performing string quartet groups as the Beethoven Quartets and it is seldom that one can attend a string quartet recital that doesn't include a Bartok quartet in the programme. The Vegh Quartet which was founded in 1940 has made a speciality of these works and this is their second recording of the series. Their understanding of the works is profound and their performances are in the highest order of accomplishment. The excellent liner notes include an essay on the Quartets by Peter Cahn in German, English and French and the recording which was produced by the French company Valois is outstanding. A definitive version in every way.



**CFTR LICENSE RENEWAL
 UNDER CONSIDERATION**

The Canadian Radio Television Commission has apparently questioned radio station CFTR rather closely with regard to their news policies. The station has applied for a five year licence renewal. Their present licence expires March 31.

CRTC lawyer C.C. Johnston claimed the Commission had been monitoring the station and checking logs and has found the station was not providing the news and public affairs broadcasts promised.

John W. Graham, chairman of Radio Rogers Ltd., was apparently satisfied that CFTR has lived up to all its program commitments and hasn't received any complaints from the CRTC. Graham claimed that since CFTR and its sister station CHFI-FM began separate programming, CFTR had to develop a new style, which he tagged "adult contemporary" and which was aimed at a demographic breakdown 18 to 50. According to Graham there had not been any reduction in news service, claiming the station had been stressing news of local interest. He indicated there had been some reduction in news concerning the arts which were assigned to the FM station.

The CRTC's Johnston revealed records showing that in representative weeks CFTR had broadcast only seven, eight, and nine hours of news, weather and traffic reports, compared with its commitment to broadcast a minimum of 12 hours. Graham's figures, on the other hand, indicated the station was

above the 12 hour minimum, claiming a discrepancy in the method of compiling figures.

Being more specific, Johnston had a tally for one day, between 7AM and noon where the station broadcast only nine comments beyond mere introduction of recorded music.

One of these was the statement that it was garbage day, and "don't forget to take the garbage out". Johnston claimed this to be a radical change in programming from what CFTR had promised when it was last before the Commission. Graham countered with the report that CFTR broadcasts more public affairs discussion, traffic reports, and play-by-play sports coverage now than it did in 1968.

The CRTC has apparently taken the licence renewal application under consideration.

Funeral services were held in Toronto.



TORONTO'S MAYOR CROMBIE SUPPORTS CDN COMMERCIALS

At a recent meeting of the Advertising and Sales Club at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto's Mayor David Crombie asked for a ban on American-made television commercials in Canada. He wants to "keep the money in Canada and turn out a distinctly Canadian product."

The Mayor, who has become more than an interested fan of the Canadian recording industry, claimed that if American-made ads were banned on Canadian television, Canadian actors and musicians could increase their earnings by more than \$720,000 a year with Canadian film production houses and processing labs chalking up another possible \$2.34 million a year.

It was his opinion that foreign-controlled advertising agencies were in a much more competitive position than their Canadian counterparts.

NEW SERIES ABOUT CANADA PREMIERS ON CHANNEL 19

This Fall and Winter the Ontario Educational Communications Authority (Channel 19) will be presenting a monthly six-part series that focuses on some of the people, places and events that have made Canada what it is — for good or for bad. The shows promise to be irreverent, funny, probing and totally unorthodox.

The series is called True North and will have four regular hosts, RCA recording artist Roy Payne, folk singer Angele Arseneault, broadcast journalist Barbara Frum and Michael Magee, alias the crusty social commentator Fred C. Dobbs.

True North's producers Jim Hanley, Bob Ennis and Don Thompson have created a unique magazine format for the series. Soap opera, historical dramatization, satirical skits, contemporary drama, old film footage, broadcast journalism and animation are combined for a new television effect.

The pilot for the series, "We Stand On Guard For Thee" will be aired on September 25 at 8:00 PM and launches an investigation of the power structure in Canada. Also featured on the opening segment will be a contemporary drama situation revealing the plight of the small farmer as he fights to survive against the competition of the large food combines. Host Roy Payne will perform his present single release for RCA. "One Step Forward, Two Steps Back", which describes the little man's fight to put food on his table.


