

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Lee Farley to head up CTI Canadian operation

Lee Farley, a twenty year veteran of Quality Records and one of the most respected people in promotion, leaves this employ to take over the helm of CTI Records of Canada Ltd., Farley's position will be that of General Manager. He leaves Quality twenty years to the day (Sept 12) from when he

first became associated with the leading independent operation. Farley has already moved the base of operations of CTI from Montreal to Toronto - 546 Gordon Baker Road, Willowdale, Ontario M2H 3B4 and has already fully staffed the company. This includes an Ontario sales manager and a Quebec sales manager (names to be announced at a later date) and a Maritime sales rep, Ted Evans. Distribution for B.C. and Alberta will be handled by Taylor, Pearson & Carson and he is currently negotiating for Manitoba and Saskatchewan distribution. Farley will reactivate a successful format from years back by insisting that his sales reps also act in the capacity of promotion people.

Farley has been given complete autonomy for the Canadian operation and will report directly to Creed Taylor, President of the New York-based CTI Inc.

In commenting on his new venture Farley explained: "After twenty years I felt a change was necessary", adding, "If it was going to be any company it would be CTI. I like Creed (Taylor) personally. He's a very sincere and top-rated record person with a sound knowledge of the record business." Farley went on to explain: "I'm looking

forward to the challenge and the new goals involved in building a label almost from scratch in Canada. I intend to build the company with a strong national base."

Initial concentration will be getting product out into the field and "heavy promotion." Top priority will be Esther Phillips' "What A Difference A Day Makes" and her new album under the same title as well as Grover Washington's "Mr. Magic" and "The Chicago Theme" by Hubert Laws. There will also be a heavy concentration on the disco and contemporary jazz markets. Effective immediately will be a price structuring of both albums and tapes from \$7.29 to \$7.98 and a unique sales incentive of allowing the same discount for both records and tapes.

On leaving Quality, Farley says: "I found it difficult to make the final decision to leave Quality. I have the utmost respect for George Struth who, as president of Quality, afforded me the best four years of my association with Quality." Farley was also thankful for the "good people" he has met in the broadcast business over the years. "Without the music directors and program directors my job in the promotion field would have been impossible. They (the programmers) were the greatest factor for my success as a promotion man."

Farley, a native of Montreal, was working at Dave Campbell's Melody House on Sherbrooke St. in Montreal when he suffered an accident resulting in the loss of his eye. It was while he was recuperating in the hospital that he was asked to join Quality by Phil Anderson (now of A&M Music). Quality was taken over shortly after by George Keane, who Farley credits with "teaching me almost everything I know about the record business. George Keane was one of the toughest people in the business to work for but his methods of operation armed his people with a complete knowledge of the business which was the reason that Quality commanded one third of all the Canadian chart action during the sixties."

The twenty years of association with Quality saw Farley appointed to several management and executive posts - his most recent and last being Vice President of Merchandising.

Canada-Wide operation takes on new labels

Eddy Swiatek, president of Canada-Wide Record and Tape Sales, has completed negotiations for Canadian distribution of the Amherst, Gold Plate and DJM labels.

Initial product will include: John Mahoney's "Angel" (Amherst), "Blind Over You" by Chicago Gangsters (Gold Plate) and the latest single by the Campbell Brothers. Other artists and production deals are being negotiated and will be announced shortly. The DJM deal could develop into a major happening for Canada-Wide being that Dick James Music of England have world-wide rights for Elton John.

McLauchlan single & album ready to roll

Moving in on the success of his "Down By The Henry Moore" single, Murray McLauchlan keeps the True North banner flying with his new single, "Little Dreamer."

Also on tap is his "Live" two record set, "Only The Silence Remains" which is specially priced at \$8.95. The session was taped at McLauchlan's Dalhousie University appearance earlier this year - using the facilities of Audio Atlantic and engineer Al Feeney. The session was remixed at Toronto's Thunder Sound Studios.

Dates for McLauchlan's concert activities include: Waterloo, Oct. 22, Hamilton (25) Ottawa (26) and Toronto's Massey Hall (27).

Commercials and jingles under review by CAPAC

The Distribution Committee and Board of Directors for CAPAC have reviewed their distribution procedures in regards to "commercials", "jingles" and "advertising promos."

The CAPAC Association recognizes the use of music material in "commercials" providing that the creator of the material possesses a contract which would prove his copyright (and not having been assigned to the agency who had commissioned the spot) and that the commercial messages are filed by the radio and television stations in the acceptable manner.

In CAPAC's opinion, their long-established distribution rule has greatly reduced a member's credit received for a musical message due to the nature and use of his material.

CAPAC states that "even if the appropriate information . . . as to copyright ownership could be achieved, the financial return would be minor compared to the overhead factor."

Therefore the Association has set down these guidelines: Members when entering a contractual agreement regarding the production of "commercial jingles" should negotiate a fee before hand with the understanding that they will not be eligible to collect a performing rights fee.

CAPAC insists that it is the responsibility of the agency assigning the commercial to see that the adequate compensation is made. On a unanimous recommendation, it has been decided by CAPAC that, "commercial jingles" will NOT be included in CAPAC's distribution procedures.

If adhering to their former procedure, CAPAC would have been in the position of doling out great sums of money, therefore increasing their charges in other areas.

CAPAC will be open to re-consideration if a more suitable proposal can be established.

A&M and Carol Risch pact distribution deal

Gerry Lacoursiere, Vice President of A&M Canada, has finalized a distribution deal with Carol Risch of Crisch Records.

A&M Records, under the terms of the agreement will be the exclusive distributors of Crisch product in English Canada with a single "Brazilia Carnaval" by the Chocolate Boys to be the initial rush-release.

The single has already gained sales of over 600,000 copies in the artist's home-country of France and has been rush-released in Quebec under a Trans-Canada distribution agreement.

The album is forthcoming.

It's been six years now since Downchild began its career, working for a great deal less than scale in a dumpy bar on Spadina Avenue - a gritty little place where the bandleader once passed the hat, and got \$16.25 back in small change . . .

The bandleader, Donnie Walsh, has become something of a legend in the last six years, partly because of the nature of his band's music, and partly because of his prodigious attitude towards life.

A recent article in Macleans did nothing to diminish the legend - the first two paragraphs managed to include the fact that Walsh had missed an interview appointment because he was in jail for non-payment of \$400-worth of parking tickets on his Cadillac, that he once raised pigs "because you can get closer to them than you can to people", that Johnny Walker Red Label was his drink, and that the band's fans included two cocaine dealers from, of all places,

Thunder Bay.

Let's deal with the music first. It is, simply, good time blues-based rock and roll, put together in a fast-moving show that simply forces people to get up and dance. It is not, to be truthful, particularly original music - it is hard to tell Walsh's original material from that of the roster of blues greats whose music Downchild uses: Willie Dixon, Jimmy Reed, B.B. King, Muddy Waters, Sonny Boy Williamson, Elmore James, Robert Jr. Lockwood, and dozens of others. It is performed, however, with a degree of energy that is unusual, and with a high degree of musical skill.

Walsh is a show-stopping harmonica player, and a first-rate guitarist. He is not a good singer, but does only one song in most shows - delivered in a flat, take-it-or-shove-it monotone that audiences, for some reason, get right off on. Tony Flaim, born in Italy and reared in Canada, handles the vocals without frills or affectation. Dave Woodward, a vague lookalike for Mick Jagger, plays tenor sax, and occasionally sings. His lady,

the way most people collect notices from the tax department. Sure, Walsh has played some pretty hairy gigs in his time - but you never hear the customers complaining they didn't get a good show for their money.

Walsh, if you ask him, doesn't tell you he's a guitarist, a bluesman, or even a musician. What he is, he'll tell you, is an entertainer. And that means you run your business properly (or you hire competent people to do it for you, if you can't), you show up on time, you play every gig as best you can, and you fulfill your obligations to give the promoter, as well as the customer, his dollar's worth.

Downchild's early history, from Grossman's Tavern onwards and upwards, is nothing more than a tribute to hard work. And Downchild does work hard - 48 to 50 weeks a year, week in week out, night in night out. There have been three albums so far - with the fourth just on the point of release now. Bootleg, the first, came out in 1972 as the result of a series of sessions in a pint-sized recording studio in the basement garage of

Jane Vasey, plays two-fisted barrelhouse piano, only slightly softened by her classical training at conservatories in Winnipeg and Toronto and by her fondness for jazz. And bass player Jim Milne (along with Woodward a six-year veteran with the band) and drummer Bil Bryans provide the kick from the rhythm section.

The legend, on the other hand, is one part fact mixed to three parts imagination and faulty memory inspired by sentiment and the aforesaid Johnny Walker. Sure, Donnie Walsh once used to keep pigs (he even managed to make a little money at it). Sure, he's spent a couple of nights in the slammer, rather than pay his parking tickets - which, in the old days, he used to accumulate in

Rochdale College - RCA Victor picked it up, it's still in catalogue, and it's still selling modestly. Then came Straight Up on Special Records, distributed by GRT - which did 30,000 copies and included Flip Flop and Fly, the only major single hit the band has had so far. Dancing, which included Goin' Dancing, a strong hit out west, also did well - and now GRT is nearly ready with Ready To Go, Downchild's fourth. A single, Old Ma Bell, a left-handed compliment to the telephone company, has just been released (backed with The Slide,) and a follow-up single is in the wings.

Meanwhile, the band is - where else? - on the road again. A freebie one-nighter for

"A terrible problem" is what George Struth, president of Quality Records Ltd. and president of the CRIA calls the flooding of the market by tape piracy unauthorized material . . . usually sold under the guise of the manufacturer's original product and moved in the manner of eight-track tape recordings.


Observers estimate the cost as totalling a \$5 million a year business. "Maybe there's still growth and they're taking it away", said Struth to the suggestion that pirates may be skimming off the true growth in the tape market.

In addition to costing the record companies enormous figures in potential sales, tape bootlegging involves an infringement of copyright/trademarks and non-payment of royalties to the original artist.

All one needs to set himself up in business is a live concert to attend, a durable stereo portable tape recorder, blank 8-tracks and it's away to big business for all the customer/fans that want to hear their favourites in live performance.

The CRIA hopes that police seizures of tapes will deter the would-be counterfeiters, but Struth implied that bootleg sales are

now a more serious problem in the outlying areas than in the major city centres. Sales across the industry have been softer this



year, due to the state of the economy . . . " . . . buyers have been more selective, but I think it's picking up," Struth said.

Hardy's "Homecoming" fluking its way home

Regarded by some as a "fluke", the Hagood Hardy single, "The Homecoming" and album under the same title have totalled an impressive national picture. Out of the production house of the Canadian Talent Library - not known for producing hits but rather concentrating on the easy listening (pop) market, the single has continually impressed many major programmers having a contemporary rock format. These include: CKXL Calgary (38 to 20), CFTR Toronto (8), CHLO London (39 to 37), CFGO Ottawa (29), CHUM Toronto (29), CJON St. John's (24 to 19) CFRA Ottawa (29 to 19) and VOXM St. John's (29).

Major market stations playlisting the single include: CFRB, CKFM, CHFI and CKEY all of Toronto, CHML and CKOC of Hamilton, CFPL-FM, CFPL and CJBK London, CJOB and CKY-FM Winnipeg, CHQM, CKNW, CFUN and CKLG Vancouver and CKDA and CFAX of Victoria to name a few.

federal government will likely lead to higher costs due to the resins used in the manufacture of discs. Struth declined to predict an increase in suggested lists prices, but implied that "What you may see is a wider range of prices with little change in the list. . . suggested lists of \$6.29, may be up to \$7.98."

"Nobody sells at list", he pointed out, insuring the consumer that the suggested list is a max price guide-line for the calculation of artist royalties.

Chater's Music Mgt steps up acquisitions

Music Management's Brian Chater, has announced the signing of a contract to represent Hot Egg Music and Ragamuffin Music Worldwide. The companies are both owned by R. Dean Taylor and publish all his self-penned material . . . the English group, Strife, are also with the company releasing through Chrysalis and material by Sabu released by Pye.

"Let's Talk It Over", is the new R. Dean Taylor single, being released immediately in Canada, the U. S. and England, to be followed by an album containing all original material.

Camilleri and Promo staff hold promo conference

Charlie Camilleri, director of national promotion for Columbia Records has called a one day Promotion Conference at Toronto's Inn On The Park for Sept 22.

Besides the local Toronto promotion personnel, Mike Watson and Terry McGee, there will be Frank Gigliotti from Vancouver and Montreal's Michel Girard and Pat Deserio.

With a hefty release and one of the most important Fall Plans in the history of the company, much emphasis will be placed on promotion over the next few months - a major factor in getting the promo troops together to map out an effective strategy.

Pat Deserio to Columbia promo

New staff appointments at Columbia include that of Pat Deserio who will look after promotion duties for the Montreal Branch. Deserio's territory will include the Ottawa Valley as well as part of Quebec province.

Deserio was formerly with Capitol Records. He will report directly to Charlie Camilleri, director of national promotion for Columbia.

New Zealand's Music World introduces comic strip

The newest and perhaps the first in record promotions is Music World's comic strip character "Super Record Fan", introduced as a marketing asset for New Zealand's leading budget record company.

The "Super Record Fan" character is currently appearing in half page comic strip advertisements in many of New Zealand's consumer publications. The campaign is being supported by special "Super Record Fan" display posters and free record and cassette catalogues. The company is also releasing an album titled "Super Record Fan's

20 Smash Hits".

Hoghton Hughes, Managing Director of the Christchurch-based Music World, had the following comment to make: "Super Record Fan is already receiving a tremendous amount of 'fan' mail, and we believe the potential is enormous. With the recent doubling of the sales tax over here (now 40% of the wholesale price) the record industry has consequently been depressed." adding "We felt this an opportune time to take a positive attitude by giving the public a laugh, and introducing our new product".

Columbia's Pink Floyd finally rolling with LP

Under contract with Columbia for almost two years and without album product (for Columbia) Pink Floyd finally scores with an album release and a "first" for Columbia. For the first time in the company's history an album has reached platinum status "before pressing." Orders for Floyd's "Wish You Were Here" album have actually surpassed the 130,000 mark, which includes tapes and albums. The flag is up at Columbia's pressing plant and it's expected that three shifts, working over a considerable time period, will be necessary to fill the orders for the Pink Floyd album as well as other "key" album product scheduled for release over the next few weeks.

It's been almost four years since Floyd's "Dark Side Of The Moon", which has now sold in excess of four million copies internationally (a Capitol release). It had been hoped that an album would be available for the group's Ivor Wynn Stadium (Hamilton) engagement that attracted more than 50,000 of an audience - an ideal sales promotion. Obviously the long wait hasn't taken away from the popularity of the group.

Columbia is sweetening the release with a 10% free goods sales incentive to rackers and dealers - on the initial order only. September 22nd has been set as a one day release for the album - right across the country.



"What the hell I got"

A CHART BUSTING SINGLE ON COLUMBIA RECORDS



ALLMAN'S CHUCK LEAVELL

(This is the final of a two-part series on Capricorn's Allman Brothers by internationally-known rock journalist Ritchie Yorke.)

Chuck Leavell became an Allman brother in the Fall of 1972, after living in Macon for two years and working with Friends and Neighbours, a band which toured widely

with Alex Taylor and Dr. John. Brothers and Sisters, released in the late summer of '73, was the first Allmans' album on which Leavell appeared. In an interview conducted in Louisville, Ky., in November of that year, Gregg Allman told me the band found the historic sales and airplay reaction to Brothers and Sisters to be "just unbelievable. We all felt so grateful it was like we had a cue ball stuck in our throats. It really was very gratifying for us. That's the way we all feel, especially Chuck Leavell. Chuck's in the Garden of Eden man: he has a party every damn night just to celebrate life and what's been going down."

Leavell has calmed down considerably since those ecstatic days and he proved to be a most informative source of background notes on the new album. "Sure it had been a long time since we got it together in the studios", he readily admits. "Then it took a while to get things going on the new one. It was sort of on and off, on and off. We'd get started and get things happening and then there would be distractions. We first put down "Can't Lose What You Never Had". that song went real smoothly. It was like a snap. Then there was a bit of a lull. After a while, we picked up again.

"All in all, the album was recorded over a period of five months. That sounds like a long time I guess but the actual studio time was much less. It's just that the sessions were kind of drawn out. We had new small trips along the way, various things that stopped us from getting it together. Gregg was going through things with Cher and he had to be out of town for a while. So a few things slowed down the progress of the sessions.

"But when it happened, everybody really enjoyed getting back together. It had been several months since we'd even seen each other's faces. And it sure felt good to be back making music together. It was just a big up for all of us." There can be no doubts that Leavell means what he says. And that he and the band feel very good about the results of the recording reunion.

"As far as the actual tracks are concerned, here's how it went down. "Can't Lose What You Never Had" was the first song we cut. To tell you the truth, it came together very quickly. It was like a third or fourth take situation. A very natural thing was happening. Richard Betts and I got together beforehand and spent a day working out melodies, harmonies and stuff like that. The tune was written by Muddy Waters. Our arrangement

is completely different from his. It was basically Gregg's arrangement with a few little things thrown in by the rest of us. In the beginning, Gregg was going to write a new set of lyrics for the tune. But then he decided that what it was already saying just could not be improved upon. It was right there, you know. A real get-down lyric.

"Just Another Love Song" was one of the last tracks we cut. Dickie had started writing the song even before we began the album.

But when he played it for us, he only had one verse completed. Towards the end of the sessions, we all started to push him to finish off the song. "That is a real nice tune man, you should get that together" we told him one night. So the next night, he turns up with it all finished, and we went in and laid it right down. There was barely a pause. It just came together right there." (Dickie Betts' reticence and modesty about his original tunes was reflected in some observations by Gregg Allman in Nov. '73 concerning the million-selling single - the band's first - from Brothers and Sisters entitled "Rambling Man." "In a sense, "Rambling Man" was one of Dickie's rejects. He just wasn't going to do it. One time he told us

that he had an old piece of shit country tune in the back of his head in case we needed something to complete the album. We weren't really getting pushed to finish the album but we'd been in the studios for so long that we just wanted to get out. We got Dickie to play "Rambling Man" again for us and our reaction was: 'Hey, there ain't nothing wrong with that tune.' But he didn't have any confidence in the song. I told him that he had to get around it. He had to look at the thing another way. This all happened at a time when Richard and I were really getting close. He was really getting into writing. And he's a real natural. He's not hatching so many of those instrumentals anymore. He's getting into other things. But I'm the first to admit that it's not easy to introduce a new song to the Allman Bros. Band. I've had a few tunes turned down by the band man and I'll admit it. One of them was "Queen of Hearts" (which appeared in spectacular fashion on Gregg's first solo album, Laid Back). And I was really proud of that song man - it was one of those tunes that kind of freaks you. When it's finished, you say: 'I didn't write that. It just came out of my hand.' Some serious inspiration brought this one to the surface.")

"Nevertheless" is one of Gregg's older tunes", Chuck Leavell continues. Both Lamar Williams (bass player) and myself were doing that tune regularly on Gregg's solo tour last year. But Gregg and I were worried about how the song would come off with the Brothers. We'd been using three horns on the live version and that wasn't going to fit

the Brothers. But then we came up with a totally different approach to the tune. We just went to the studio one night and came up with a new way of doing it. We kind of smoothed it out. Then Dickie put on the slide guitar and that just gave it the right touch. It wound up being just right for the Allman Bros. Band. There had been one of those lulls in the sessions before we cut that one. We'd been like a month away from it and then this tune came together really quickly and that was a nice buzz for us all. The whole tune worked out fine.

"Win Lose or Draw", the title tune, is another of Gregg's older songs. I always remember the first time Gregg ever played the song. It was during some radio interview in some place I don't remember. Gregg had

written it the night before and he played it in this interview. He wrote the song about one of his friends. As you probably noticed from the lyrics, it's about being in jail. We had to go through some changes with the song, as to who played what instruments and so on. Different combinations. But once we hit on the groove, it kind of laid itself in. This was one of the harder tunes to get down. Mainly because we're more accustomed to a more uptempo feeling and approach. To make it come across properly, we had to work on it for a while. But in the end, I think it came out expressing the right kind of feeling for the song.

"The first side closes with "Louisiana Lou And Three Card Monty John." Man, it was just so much fun cutting that tune. And you can hear it on the record - the feeling is just so happy. You could ride a bicycle to California on that thing, no trouble at all. It just has that certain feeling. It's a Dickie Betts tune and is based on a couple of real-life characters that Dickie met in Mobile, Ala., while he was doing his solo tour. Louisiana Lou is a pool hustler and the other guy had a card trick number. Dickie kind of like them, fell in with them and hung out for a few days watching their act - seeing them hustle pool, pull of card trips, doing their whole number. Dickie just couldn't resist writing a song about them.

"High Falls" was written by Dickie Betts during the recording of the album. One night Dickie came into the studio and suggested that we needed an instrumental. And then he went out and came up with it.

Dickie met up with a couple of people from the Return to Macon County movie and they took him up to their shooting location, High Falls. He took along his guitar and while sitting around watching and listening to the water, he started to write the tune. Once he had the initial thing down, he played it for me. It was pretty much different then from what it is now - it went through a lot of changes along the way. But I think that High Falls was really a highlight for all us -

we all enjoy getting down with an instrumental tune. It's always been a special thing in this band - cutting instrumentals."

I suggest that High Falls may well be viewed as the Brothers' supreme accomplishment thus far in the instrumental area. "Yeah, probably. It has more melody and more flow than any other instrumental we've ever done. I even got to play some Moog synthesizer on the tune which was really interesting. I enjoyed that a lot. We don't get into things like that too often. We all kind of flung ourselves into High Falls. It was very special, and it was a big up for the band.

"Sweet Mama" was the last thing we recorded and the last track on the album. We'd finished everything else when we realized that we had enough room for another tune on side two. Billy Joe Shaver had just signed with Capricorn and he and Dickie became good friends. Billy wrote the tune, played it for Dickie and Dickie brought it along to us. "Hey that's it", we said. We haven't done an easy shuffle in quite a while. Two nights in the studio and we had it all down. I believe that it's one of the best vocal performances that Richard Betts has ever sung. He really did it justice."

(Win Lose or Draw will without doubt draw close attention to Richard Betts' excellent guitar playing abilities, a factor which has been at least partially downplayed by many media tastemakers. To some rather cynical observers, when Duane Allman bowed out in Oct. 71, the Brothers lost their only unique guitar player and he would never be replaced. Yet in the words of manager Phil Walden: "Duane always said that he had it made as a guitar player. Everytime he'd play something nice, he'd get credit for it; and everytime Dickie Betts would play something exceptionally good, Duane would still get credit for it. 'Shit', Duane would say, 'I got it coming from both ends.' Duane always told people that Dickie Betts was as good as he was. And he meant it to be taken seriously."

Win Lose or Draw seems bound to focus mass attention on the unique talents of Richard Betts, and indeed on the band's present state of togetherness, musically and personally. It is simply an album that cannot be denied or ignored or downplayed.

The stunning jacket picture was shot in a restored saloon in old Atlanta by the Brothers' official photographer, Dan Hudson, who also handled pictures on the Brothers and Sisters album. Hudson is regarded around the Brothers as the band's official picture-taker. Art direction was assigned to the extremely capable hands of Keith Crossley, Capricorn's recently-appointed art director.

And of the musical product in an overall sense - an informed opinion with a twist of per-

spective. Chuck Leavell ponders the question for a few moments. Perspective does not rise lightly from the hearts of dedicated and perfection-oriented musicians. "There's a contrast from the Brothers and Sisters album. It's a progression onwards. A step up. It was different in the sense that we have not recorded as a band since Brothers and Sisters, which was almost three years ago. There was a lot of time between albums.

"Brothers and Sisters was the first album I worked on with the Brothers. This is my second venture. In between I've worked with the various solo projects of Gregg and Dickie. But the chance to get back with the 'Big Boys', the Allman Bros., I mean that was a whole other trip. We all wanted to get that one together.

"Overall I don't think that there are many things that we could have done better on Win Lose or Draw. It sounds real nice to me when I listen to it now. We're all in a very up space, rehearsing the new show, getting the act back together. Everybody's ready to get out on the road now and bust arse. We've got new material to play, a whole new trip to get into. I think that everybody's going to get off: we'll get off and I think our audiences will get off too. And I can't think of anything better than that. It's going to be a great tour for all of us and we're really, really looking forward to getting down to it."

Canada's largest nightclub will feature Doug Kershaw, Sept. 8th-13th, Don McLean, Sept. 22nd and 23rd, Johnny Rivers, 24th-27th, Lou Rawls, Oct. 2nd-11th, Bobby Blue Band, Oct. 24th-29th, James Darren, Oct. 30th-Nov. 8th, and Buffy Ste. Marie making her first local nightclub-date Nov. 10-13th. B. B. King, previously in Toronto at Convocation Hall is set for a return on Jan. 8th-18th and Fats Domino is scheduled for May.

The Jethro Tull vocal material - Ian Anderson - moves a little to the left of


front and centre for a pounding "out front" performance by a fine lot of musicians. John Evan's piano and organ, the drums

City Council of Newport, Rhode Island, scene for the greatest festivals of jazz (from 1954 to 1971) has threatened to revoke their license unless David Clayton Thomas and Blood, Sweat and Tears be removed from the headline bill.

The festival moved its premises to New York after rioting crowds brought an end to the Newport hospitality.

Newport officials have since been cautious as to the selection of artists appearing in concert.

Mayor Humphrey J. Donnelly said that he was particularly concerned "about attracting a rowdy crowd on the same weekend that Gerry Ford would be in town for a fund-raising dinner."

A spokesman for the concert's promoter said that Blood, Sweat and Tears are more of a jazz band than a rock-group and that they don't draw unruly audiences.

"Calling it Canadian Talent sounds like a crutch to me"

George Struth

In an interview with the *Globe* and *Mail's* Susan Wishart, George Struth president of Quality Records Ltd. and president of The Canadian Recording Industry Association, agreed with the proposal of incentives for the Canadian record industry, but in his opinion the proposal to apply a surtax to the price of tapes and records made from foreign-produced master tapes is attacking the problem the wrong way.

The surtax, (a recommendation in a report to the Ontario Government by provincial civil servant Peter Klopchic) would lead to retaliation in kind from other countries, Struth warned.

The Association favours the federal government to allow record companies to deduct

the costs of producing recordings by Canadians from the 12% federal sales tax that they already pay.

This estimation could then allow the companies to produce more Canadian content. Struth has occupied a number of positions in his eighteen years with Quality Records Ltd. and most recently was their vice-president and managing director. Quality is the largest Canadian-owned record company, with the original Canadian owners buying back their interests from a controlling MGM and United Artists.

Struth estimated that 15% of Quality's total sales are Canadian recordings, although he dislikes the use of the term "Canadian Content."

He prefers records and tapes by Canadian artists to be known as "domestic production." Calling it Canadian Content sounds like a crutch to me. We want our recordings to succeed in the world market."

The term "Cancon" may have been a "crutch" term in the past, but it was a necessary label to insure Canadian talent that they had the feet to walk on.

A crutch may not be needed now, thanks to the therapy of the government in their regulations and the social awareness now experienced by a definitive Canadian culture. "Domestic production" is idealistically the better term, but the "Cancon" label is still necessary for all those still not aware of superior Canadian talent - according to many observers.

Children's Ron Bartley undergoes throat surgery

Jack Morrow, head of the Rampage Records label, has announced that Ron Bartley, leader and co-founder of "The Children" (formerly "Abraham's Children") must undergo throat surgery and a further convalescence of two months, following examination by doctors when the band returned to the Toronto area. A new stage-show, prepared in the northern part of Ontario had been rehearsed by the band in the summer months, as an accompaniment to a new album-release (their second and first for Rampage). Morrow explained that the remaining members of the group will spend the two months time-off, in order to tighten and hone their act.

"The Children" is presently under the direction of co-leader Shaun O'Shea "whose particular style of foot-stomping, ass-kicking rockin' and rollin' music has always been one of the highlights of the groups performance."

Gary Glitter to star in new rock pantomime

Sparkler Gary Glitter will play the lead in a rock 'n roll Christmas pantomime based on the "Dick Whittington and Puss 'n Boots" story.

The title for the scheduled rock-show set to play in London's West End, will be called "Dick Destiny and the Black Cat meet the Chrome Rainbow and the Razzle Dazzle Cats."

Stones' Jagger visits Toronto's Thunder Sound

Mick Jagger, who recently visited Toronto to check out recording facilities, dropped into Thunder Sound, one of the busiest studios in town. Thunder Sound played host to Jagger and provided the "midnight rambler" with a tour of the studio.

Other artists keeping Thunder Sound busy are: Murray McLauchlan, Adam Mitchell completing his sessions with re-united Mainline, including Joe Mendelson and Mike McKenna; Shirley Eikhard was in

completing tracks for a future CBC documentary on rock music. Ian Tyson has sessions booked for Gene McLelland's future album, and Perth County Conspiracy's Cedric Smith is also due to be in the studio shortly.

McLauchlan's new single was produced by McLauchlan and Bernie Finklestein, and is entitled "Little Dreamer", to be released on the True North label. The single was engineered by Bill "Thunderfoot" Seddon.

University of Ottawa presents Jazz Fest

A gathering of Canada's finest jazz-musicians will inaugurate the University of Ottawa's school year, by their participation in the region's first Jazz Festival.

Bands from Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto will take part in jam-sessions, workshops and a public-concert to be held on the campus . . . September 8th to 13th.

A "jazz all-nighter" on Saturday September 13th will bring together Canada's finest guitarist Sonny Greenwich, Jim Galloway's Metro Stompers, Quintonal Jazz, the Sadik Hakim Jazz Ensemble, the Fred Stone Quartet, Zak, Sayyid Abdul Al-Khabyr and Son, as well as the Bernie Senensky Trio.

Columnist-lady Nighthawk, of the Montreal Gazette, will be around to intro the artists.

The concert starts at 8:00 PM, in the Chapel, Tabaret Hall, 500 Cumberland St. Tickets are on sale at the Information Desk, University Centre, 85 Hastey, with prices at \$2.50 for students at the University of Ottawa, and a charge of \$4.00 for non-students.

The purpose of the event is "to present outstanding Canadian jazz to the University and exterior community . . . attract attention to jazz as a serious music form . . . implicate community groups and individuals in the planning and organization of the festival . . . and to create opportunities to publicize local jazz groups."

Performance Righters zero in on juke-box ops

U.S. organizations representing writers, BMI, ASCAP, and SESAC have been making regular trips to Washington, persuading their Congress to bring the 1909 juke-box law up-to-date.

The first juke-box was invented by two San Francisco phonograph promoters in 1890.

Their machine received U.S. patent 428,750 and featured a single musical selection which a single listener could hear through a single set of "flexible listening tubes."

Looking similar to "the hind end of a doctor's stethoscope", every person had to pay his nickel and listen to music through his own individual set of tubes. American songwriters are still suffering from an antiquated copyright law written to accommodate the 1890 machine.

Since only a single person could listen to his nickel-paid private performance, Congress was persuaded that the law should exempt juke-box owners from paying writers for the use of their music.

Commercial music users pay for the public performance of music in radio and television stations, ballrooms, skating rinks, hotels, shopping centres, movie drive-ins, airplanes, and wherever else music is performed for a profit.

The organizations are now hitting Congress for the protection of their writers.

Jagger and Californians go to court over concert

As well as checking out Toronto studio locations, Mick Jagger is in the news concerning a fight in court to the amount of \$690,000 presented by a group of irate Californians. The Alameda County ranchers are holding Jagger and his Stones responsible for damage to their lands caused by some 300,000 fans who attended a free concert in 1969.

Jagger admitted to "slapping" a process server when she handed him a summons in the case.

Jagger claims that the papers were "thrown" at him. The judge in the case hopes to settle all differences in court and not on the battlefield.

GRT's combined office party and sales convention kicked off a tour that, as of September 6, has already seen Ottawa's Central Canada Exhibition (three encores), a week at the A4 Club in Saskatoon, and a week in Calgary at the Refinery (where the band holds the house record, and at which it recorded a 16-track remote for the Moffat FM-er in that town). In the coming weeks, Downchild will do one-nighters in Red Deer, Banff, Calgary, Edmonton, Grande Prairie, Peace River, Saskatoon, Regina, Winnipeg, and Thunder Bay, as well as week-long stints at the Body Shop in Vancouver (where they also hold the house record), and the Sahara in Regina. On their return to Toronto they'll do a week at the Queensbury Arms, and then move straight on to one-nighters in Quebec, a week at In Concert at Montreal, and engagements throughout the Maritimes.

Along the way the band is playing selected gigs in jails - partly because Walsh likes playing for the enthusiastic, talent-starved audiences, and partly because American expatriate Dave Woodward has, under the conditions of his sentence for avoiding the Vietnam War, to play a series of concerts in prisons.

Downchild, of course, is checking out the larger market south of the border. Already, the band have made a couple of modestly successful forays to the States - the Philadelphia Folk Festival ("we died", says Walsh, laconically - but in fact the band did quite well), a week at the Agora in Cleveland (owner Howard LaConte wants them back; Walsh is waiting till he has a U.S. Record deal); and a hilarious and drunken week, a couple of years back, at the New Orleans Jazz and Blues Festival.

At the moment, though, Walsh is taking his own brand of Downchild music from coast to coast. Along the way, he's laughing, having fun, handling a whole mess of newspaper, radio, and TV interviews with his usual mixture of wry off-handedness and road-wise intelligence. He's keeping his mind on business - and his business is keeping the folks entertained. With his band's distinctive kind of rock-on, good-time, get-high, blues-based rock and roll.



Is it "checkmate" at the CRTC?

Pierre Juneau, sworn in as Communications Minister in replacement of Gerald Pelletier, will be running for Parliament in a by-election set for October 14th.

Pelletier resigned his seat and Cabinet position to become the Canadian Ambassador to France . . . telling reporters that he was unable to renew himself intellectually if remaining in the Cabinet.

Juneau, now 52, steps up from his role as Chairman of the CRTC which he has filled since its inception in 1968. As Chairman he pushed through many regulations regarding substantial Cancon in broadcast programming.

Trudeau said of Juneau, ". . . he is of the same generation of Pelletier and myself (and) represents the same values . . . As Chairman of the CRTC and as a federal civil servant, Mr. Juneau has proved his loyalties to the federal government."

With Juneau's appointment to the Cabinet, Harry Boyle becomes acting chairman of the CRTC. Trudeau could not tell the press whether Boyle would continue on as the CRTC head.

TPC's Calvin Lew captures monopoly title

Sales and promotion man Calvin Lew (T.P.C. Records West) qualified for the opening round of the CKLG-Vancouver sponsored West Coast Monopoly championships.

Going into the semi-finals the press entered

"I will seek the advice of my Minister of Communications", Trudeau said. Juneau apparently has the respect of broadcasters throughout Canada. ". . . the prophets of doom, the messengers of mediocrity . . ." Juneau has done a lot for the plight of Canadian-broadcast recognition.



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
