## Obituary

**Bernadette Andrews Star feature writer**

The music industry was shocked to learn of the sudden death of Toronto Star feature writer Bernadette Andrews who succumbed to a sudden illness, Nov 19, at the age of 33. Ms. Andrews became a much needed friend to the music industry while working the entertainment beat with the Toronto Telegram until the paper closed in 1971. She was co-host of CBC-TV's The Morning After show from 1969 to 1971 and later worked as a music publicist before joining the Star in 1973. Although relegated to covering social and interior news for the Star, Bernadette also kept close tabs on the Canadian entertainment scene and was a welcome guests to all music industry functions.

Her value to the Star and her obvious loss can best be summed up by the paper's tribute to her which read: "Her colleagues and friends will mourn her as a person with an aspiring ability to grab the very best from life. One of her great assets as a journalist was her infinite supply of contacts. If it was happening, Bernie knew where, when and who would be there. (And she always knew the unlisted numbers). Her energy and curiosity were invaluable to the people who worked with her as well as her friends."

Bernadette is survived by her husband, Christopher Dingle, their son, Tyler, 4, parents Stanley and Delores Andrews,

sisters Helen Burt and Delores Doyle and brother Gregory.

Bernadette was born and educated in Toronto.

**EMI Ltd. reports highest international earnings**

Total earnings for the international British-based EMI corporation rose 63% this year above last year's fiscal period to a record high in the company's 77-year history. Based on July, the company's worldwide sales totaled \$1,101,165,000, up from \$825,028,000, a dollar value based upon July pound sterling conversion rates.

Stockholders learned that each share, after taxes and other effects, was worth 37.88 cents per share, compared to 23.45 cents per share last year.

Part of the surge, according to a release from Molesworth Associates, Inc., EMI's New York representatives was due to increasing business by the corporation's music firms, including Capitol Records. Sales were up 33% worldwide from \$423,683,000 to \$565,379,000, and profits were up 38% from \$32,410,000 to \$44,692,000.

EMI's music interests accounted for 51% of its sales this year and 42% of its profits. Electronics are the company's next major interest, accounting for 31% of sales and 40% of profits.

In overall earnings, North America contributes 19% in sales, following the UK with 36% and Europe with 25%. Other overseas countries account for the remaining 20% of sales.

**A&M hosts reception-bash for Offenbach LP release**

A&M Canada head Gerry Lacoursiere and sales manager Joe Summers hosted a bash November 22 at the company's Scarborough offices to mark the occasion of the release of Offenbach's first album for A&M. College and commercial radio reps as well as other media notables were invited to meet the Quebec band and hear the unveiling of their English-language album, Never Too Tender.


The bilingual group, who will be releasing a French album as well in the new year, will be appearing at the New Yorker theatre in Toronto December 18.

Pagliari will perform twice nightly November 24 to 28, premiering his new band and a single on CBS, Last Night/Cross Your Heart.

The Grand Salon is booked by Paul Lesvesque, well-known Montreal talent booker. Pagliaro is managed by Ben Kaye.

## Quality signs distribution deal with Roulette

Quality Records has picked up the manufacturing and distribution in Canada for Roulette Records, following a preliminary trip to New York by Quality president George Struth. Roulette president Morris Levy signed the agreement.

Quality will have access to the considerable catalogue of previously-released product, much of which dates back to the early '60s, including hits by Tommy James and The Shondells, as well as material by Ronnie Hawkins. Quality has about 300 albums at its disposal, although no plans have been established as yet in regard to the re-releasing of the older material.

The label has been active recently as well, with single and album material by Betty Carter (It's My Turn, LP), Jay Black (a single, One Night Affair, written by Frankie Valli), Whirlwind (a single, Full Time Thing), Poison, and The Gentlemen And Their Lady.

## Net from Bee Gees NYC date to be donation

When the Bee Gees appear in New York December 2, they'll donate the net proceeds to the city's Police Athletic Fund, a charitable group run by New York's finest which supports play streets in Harlem, recreation centres and a teenage employment centre, among other things.

Advance orders in the U.S. have apparently placed the album near gold status there before its release.

The usual heavy media promotion will be undertaken by WEA.

## Righteous Bros play Toronto's Imperial Room

The Righteous Brothers returned to Toronto for the first time in years last week at the Royal York Hotel's Imperial Room.

Bill Medley and Bobby Hatfield began under that name in 1962, recording a string of hits including You've Lost That Lovin' Feelin', Little Latin Lupe Lu, Soul And Inspiration, Unchained Melody, and Ebb Tide. After playing Las Vegas, they split in 1968 to pursue solo careers. Meeting up again in Las Vegas, they began recording together again releasing Rock 'N' Roll Heaven and Dream On. The latest album is called Sons Of Mrs. Righteous, which includes the single Never Say I Love You. They record on their own Haven label, distributed by Arista, which is in turn distributed by Capitol in Canada.

Playing at the Imperial Room for the full week, they were noted as the first rock 'n' roll act ever to play there.

## Pooh! Pooh! on the CNE Grandstand and its critics

The ritual of attacking the Canadian National Exhibition Grandstand show is beginning early this year. What is worse is the fact that now there is a team of pro-Canadian talent types who have found that

the local papers give good space to criticism of the CNE executive and the "lack" of Canadian talent at the Grandstand show.

It's obvious that across Canada there is an untapped potential in grandstanding the names of politicians and press conscious ego maniacs who are looking for a popular cause.

The CNE, for instance, is constantly badgered by a group of politicians who know little or nothing about showbusiness but who demand that Canadian talent must appear on that gigantic CNE Grandstand stage. Canadian artists have repeatedly told the CNE that they don't want to appear on the Grandstand stage but, unfortunately, Canadian artists have appeared and had a very poor showing.

While the CNE promotes the attendance of audiences from all over the continent, the critics punch home their belief that the CNE should promote Canadian talent, at

any cost. Actually, the value of a CNE appearance to the type of artists that would attract is really not that valuable as a promotion. It can, in fact, be a killer. The artists who don't draw are ready to risk it and are willing to learn the hard way - but they really haven't anything to lose anyway.

If I were a top name Canadian artist, I would object strenuously if my name was suggested to do the Grandstand show to "promote Canadian talent". The choice should be that of the entertainer and I don't know of one name act, who could draw that kind of an audience, who has ever complained.

It does make copy however, to the Canadian content starved dailies and it does help the noisy politicians and it must drive the CNE executive mad to have to show a profit and run an amateur show to promote Canadian talent.

Being nationalistic is one thing but the common sense value of the Grandstand stage is over-rated as a promotion. Promotion comes from mass media and television and radio and, when a star is born, the natural course is for the CNE to demand that these artists appear because they have been accepted by the public. But to use the Grandstand as a promotional vehicle is for the birds and you know what they do on the Grandstand stage - and now we have politicians doing it too.

But Canada's stars . . . don't want to.

Co-writers Peter White and Paul Hann booked time to tape a session for Access TV and Tommy Banks and affiliates took time for master mixes and sessions with CBC Radio.

## International release for Moxy as tour continues

Polydor Canada's A&R director Peter Horvath has announced that the new Moxy album, Moxy II, has been released in the U.S., Britain, Ireland, Japan, Hong Kong, Germany, Sweden, Holland, France, Denmark and Belgium. It has been released in these countries by the Phonogram affiliate in each.

Meanwhile, the group's tour of the U.S. continues, the most recent stop being in Chicago. The tour ends in December, when the band will return to Toronto for a break before embarking on a Canadian tour in the new year. Manager Roland Paquin reports they have received booking offers from several other countries, including Hong Kong.

## Lightfoot's Summertime Dream LP is gold in U.S.

Gordon Lightfoot's newest Reprise LP, Summertime Dream, has been certified gold in the U.S. with sales in excess of 500,000 units. The achievement was assisted by the success of the single, The Wreck Of The Edmund Fitzgerald, which topped the RPM 100, November 20 of this year.



# Jackson Hawke album caps three hits in a row


Jackson Hawke's first album was recently released to unusually good industry reaction. That means even people who work for other record companies are talking about it.

It may have something to do with the fact that the third song from the album in the past couple of months has again racked up impressive airplay action. You Can't Dance was their first earlier this year, and it turned into a doublesided hit when, independently, programmers began flipping it on turntables across the country to air the group's version of the Van Morrison song, Into The Mystic. She's The One is following similar success, as Jackson Hawke is already an established good risk name to playlist.

Within the past six months or so, almost everyone has heard the story of their recent past - a trio of Tim Ryan, Bob Yeomans and Gene Falbo performing under the name Hero around Toronto, brought to the attention of Bob Gallo and Don Larusso at Columbia's A&R department by Linda Dawe, at that time with MCA. With a name change and a drummer, they became Jackson Hawke.

Actually, they've just changed drummers again, reaching into their "own back yard" in Sault Ste. Marie, for Bob 'Crow' Clarke. And since they used some keyboards on the album, especially on Into The Mystic, they're looking for a permanent keyboard player as well.

"Things have happened fast in the past year," Tim Ryan told RPM recently. "But we've been sweatin' for ten years. It's one of those ten-year overnight successes. With that success comes the first real autonomy

or control over our situation we've ever had."

The group, and Ryan in particular, is amazingly articulate on the music business and their own success within it. Ryan has an intelligent and well thought-out philosophy on the balance between pop music as art and pop music as a commercial marketable commodity. He credits producer Bob Gallo with helping to shape that philosophy. "Our biggest change is in our attitude, in our writing style and approach. Now we have a sense of audience, a sense of our own appeal. We're no longer writing blind."

Most of the songs are written by Yeomans and Ryan, in a kind of partnership where musical and lyrical ideas are tossed back and forth by both until the song is written.

One of the songs on the album, No Sad Songs was taken from a live taping done for a CHUM-FM broadcast recorded at Manta Sound with an invited audience. It turned out so good that the studio version that they had already finished was dropped in favour of it. String sweetener was added to

the solo vocal/piano track.

Considering their sudden extensive success it is interesting to note, getting back to the story of their career, that a demo tape they had recorded earlier was turned down by all the record companies they checked out "because there was no hit material. You Can't Dance was one of the songs on that demo," related Yeomans. "CBS and Gallo were our last chance. Actually, one guy said Dance was a hit, but he wasn't in a position to do anything about it. That was Bernie Finkelstein. The guy has the best ears in the business, as well as being the best manager."

Presumably the remark is unsolicited, as Finkelstein has nothing to do with the group. They're managed by Jim Zeppa who is also from Sault Ste. Marie. They're booked by Tim Cottini and The Agency.

They've slowed down a bit for the Christmas season while they seek out a keyboard player. In the new year, they'll get back out on the road. With a couple of recent singles and a new album behind them there's more to look forward to in that then there was a few years ago.

A collaboration between CPI, A&M and CHUM-FM produced a \$2.99 special show, which sold out to a crowd of older earthy types, some of whom even brought their kids. It was that kind of atmosphere, suited to this kind of band; earthy, home-grown, very relaxed and loose. They concentrated

on cuts from their new A&M album, *Men From Earth*, but played older songs including their two singles, *Jackie Blue* and *If You Wanna Get To Heaven*. The growing cultish success of the Daredevils reflects a shift of popularity to southern bands from West Coast groups among the older, first generation of underground rock lovers.

The rowdy crowd was both a blessing and a problem for Bim, opening the show with *Betsy* and *The Blue Boys*, his supporting musicians. For while members of the crowd were unusually vocal in their cheering and whistles of approval, others didn't hesitate to be rude. Bim managed to leave the stage with a rousing round of noise, after performing material from his first and soon to be released *Casino/A&M* second album.

Chapin's cult following continues to grow, and it's probably got something to do with the highly entertaining shows he puts on, which last well over two hours without an opening act. The audience rapport was unusually strong, and they very readily joined in on chorus singing and whatever else Chapin asked them to do. He performed all the favourites. His uniquely melodic folk songs are backed by a half-dozen relaxed musicians including a cellist.

## New single & new sound for Skyline's Wednesday

Wednesday's new single *Ruby Baby* represents a change of pace for the band, who made their name with charted covers of ballads like *Last Kiss* and *Loving You Baby*. *Ruby Baby* is a rock version of the Leiber and Stoller number that was a hit for Dion.

Programmers apparently are willing to embrace the band's new sound, as the song was added immediately at CKPT Peterborough, CKOC Hamilton, and on most of the western Moffat stations, which includes CKLG Vancouver.

The single, on Skyline and distributed by Quality, was produced at Sounds Interchange with John Dee Driscoll in the chair.

The band says that their actual performing format hasn't changed, "it's just that the new single is more indicative of what we're really like on stage, which is very much rock 'n' roll."

The band continues working a lot of club dates and one-night stands, and hopes to land more opening concert spots. They're managed by Canadian General Artists.

Just a short note to thank you and the RPM staff for the professional and highly successful set-up of the Talent Buyer's Conference. As a new company in the industry, we at Ixtlan Records learned and achieved more in those three days than we could have hoped to have accomplished in three months of working on our own. The panel discussions were of infinite value but most impressive was the smooth coordination of the showcasings. We are looking forward to attending next year's RPM Talent Buyer's Conference.

# Amesbury questions web of deals

This year Toronto's Bill Amesbury had three charted singles in Britain and produced the best-selling Canadian record ever in Britain (J.J. Barrie's No Charge);

but he hasn't had any chart action in Canada since his big 1974 hit in the U.S. and Canada, Virginia.

That hit won him a U.S. trade most-promising-artist nomination.

For a few years Amesbury has enjoyed the free-spending backing of manager Bill Gilliland - also his publisher and owner of Ahd Music, Amesbury's production company. He's made a fair living producing other artists for Ahd, and picking up the performance royalties on his own successful records.

Amesbury finds it difficult to figure out the spider web of disc deals spun around his records: technically he's on Gilliland's Power Exchange label -- distributed in Europe and North America through EMI companies, each through a separate deal. He's on Capitol here through a deal between Gilliland and Capitol U.S. directly. His Virginia hit was on Casablanca in the U.S. and the Yorkville label in Canada. He figures a good hit will untangle that web.

Gilliland has him under a total contract, owning all of his activities in the music business: producing, composing, recording and performing. Gilliland is perhaps best known for managing the briefly successful, but ill-fated career of Ocean (of Put Your Hand In The Hand fame).

Capitol (Canada) recently released the title cut from Amesbury's Can You Feel It LP, which contains his three British hits: Every Girl In The World Tonight, Saturday Night, and I Remember. He's going right at top-40 formats with the new mono-mixed single.

His management wants him to try some

disco, but, he says: "I've got to keep musically healthy. I like to try different things with each cut -- that scares the record company." On the LP he uses a boys choir on one cut, and Toronto country musicians on another.

He plans to do his next LP (he has to complete it by the end of the year) in at least two U.S. studios. He's already demoed about 30 of his own new songs in the studio.

It's tough to break a song in Canada, even with the 30 per cent airplay ruling, unless the recording act is also performing.

For a while, Amesbury has been reluctant to stage a show because he feels he can't hire quality musicians like those on his records who are free to travel. But now he has succumbed.

Last week, when Gilliland was out of town, Amesbury auditioned musicians for a six-piece band (in addition to himself on rhythm guitar) with two female vocalists. He plans to rehearse throughout December and begin performing in the new year.

Can you feel it has been breaking big throughout the west and, last week, was playlisted at CHUM in Toronto.

Of the two French groups A&M has signed recently, one (CANO) isn't from Quebec, and the other - Offenbach - recorded their first album for the label in English. (A completely different, French language album is slated for release in the new year.)

The rock on the album has very definite Anglo roots with some loose, loud slow blues thrown in as well. Good instrumental work is built around the gutsy, powerful vocals of leader Gerry Boulet, who also plays keyboards and rhythm guitar. Johnny Gravel is lead guitarist, Willy Lamothe is bassist, and 'Wezo' Belval is drummer.

The album was produced in Toronto at Phase One, with the group and George Semkiw producing, and it's a technically good sound. Some tracks were recorded at Studio Six in Montreal with the same people.

# Bert Mitford: a big-band booker bounces back

It's the 10th anniversary of the start of Bert Mitford's second career in the Canadian music-booking business.

Mitford, a very successful Canadian booker during the big-band era, retired from the business in 1953. But after 13 years in the other world, opened his Music and Artist Placement Ltd., (November 1966), an agency specializing in booking one-night appearances -- like dances, conventions, fairs and concerts.

At present he also handles all bookings in Canada for George Hamilton IV and The Mercey Brothers.

In the 40s Mitford toured bands led by names like Tommy Dorsey, Duke Ellington, Louis Armstrong and Woody Herman. He toured Bob Hope through Ontario once, and when the comic returned to the U.S. he was asked why he played a place like Guelph, Ontario: "For \$10,000," he replied.

Now Mitford is booking bands again. He's setting up tours for Rob McConnell's Boss Brass and Hagood Hardy's band. He figures a national tour for bands this size requires about five concert-type dates each in eastern, central and western Canada. He's also booking tours for Keith Barrie and John Allan Cameron.

Mitford first got into booking in 1938 with his father, at that time a concert impresario, and in 1939 young Bert started the Bert Mitford Agency.

During the war years he toured a Coca-Cola road show through army bases from Newfoundland to Victoria, staging Canadian and U.S. performers for the troops with a live radio hookup.

After the war Mitford became the biggest dance-band booker in Toronto -- packing Maple Leaf Gardens with big-band fans and booking local dances regularly with groups like the Modernaires, and the bands of Ellis McClintock and Frank Bogart.

In those days colleges, universities, service organizations and the like booked dance bands; but as styles shifted, Mitford moved out of the business.

Until the early 50s Mitford could rent Maple Leaf Gardens for \$750 a night plus staff costs; but when Con Smythe took over, the rate was set at 25 per cent of the gross plus staff and, in the waning years of the big-band popularity, that was just too big a bite for Mitford.

When he began booking again in 1966 big bands were out. Mitford's agency booked tours for Gordon Lightfoot, Ian and Sylvia, and even got into rock one-nighters in the late 60s. From there, with very little fanfare, he once again built a very efficient and comfortably lucrative business.

Ninety-nine per cent of his business, he says, he handles over the phone through two Toronto offices, one in his apartment, the other in his cottage in eastern Ontario where he has four phones.


His associate Maureen Enright, vice president and secretary of his agency, is his only staff. She runs the other office in Toronto.

# Cano could break language barrier

The press and promo departments of A&M Canada got together with their Montreal counterparts recently in Montreal and Quebec City to organize the national promotion and marketing of CANO, the company's first French language signing.

The event was held October 18 to 20. A&M threw a reception at the Nelson Hotel and a showcase at L'Eveche downstairs, one of Montreal's top rock clubs.

The showcase/reception was very well attended by an estimated 350 or more journalists, radio station and record store personnel and other VIPs, which exceeded the number hoped for.

Also on hand were A&M's national and regional sales and promotion people.

The last of the three days involved a trip to Quebec City for a dozen dealer presentations. Retailers and press were again out in force.

A&M took the three leaders of the group, Rachel and Andre Paiement and Marcel Aymar with them to Quebec City for the cocktail reception.

All in all, there are nine members of the CANO group. It's a rather loose collection of singers and musicians which was formed last year out of a group of various kinds of French language artists who had gathered together on a 320 acre co-operative farm in Sudbury. They were intent on helping develop the creative and artistic culture of

French Canada with some kind of unity. CANO is the musical contingent of this little society. Many, in fact, have expertise in other fields explored by the general group, particularly drama. The term CANO actually comes from the title of the collective: Co-operative des Artistes du Nouvel-Ontario.

The first practical result of the five-year contract they signed with A&M Canada is their first LP, called Tous Dans L'Meme Bateau, which translates as All In The Same Boat. Critical reaction by French and English press has so far been favourable to both the album and to the L'Eveche showcase.

It will be a real challenge for A&M, who are known for their above-average national sales techniques, to nationally market this album. The lyrics are in French, but for those who need to know what the words mean, the group has thoughtfully supplied translations on the inside liner. The language barrier has long been a one-way stumbling block for English record companies, but it could be due in part to the fact that few of the majors really bother trying to overcome it anymore. A&M has their work cut out for them.

CANO's album was featured in the November 13 issue of RPM, and the last paragraph of the review read:

"Will they listen in Vancouver or Winni-



peg or Toronto? Maybe a thoughtful FM or MOR programmer could catch his listeners off guard and slip in something like Le Vieux Mederic. By the time they find out it's French, it'll be too late, because they'll already be booked into the music."BT



## Sheila Ann Show to tour

Saskatchewan's Sheila Ann Show earned some notice in the central and eastern regions of Canada recently with a couple of Big Country nominations and performance at ACME's Big Country affair in September.

Last Spring the group recorded an LP, *The Pump Proudly Presents The Sheila Ann Show*, produced by Don Grashey and re-

leased on his Gaiety label. Two singles from the LP, *Tender Emotions* and *Beginning Of The End*, have seen some airplay action across Canada.

Sheila Ann manager Al Gain is planning to follow up that national action with a club tour of the Toronto and Ottawa areas early in the new year.

Colleen Peterson's new Capitol single, *Souvenirs* hit the Billboard top 100, entering at 100 in the November 27 issue. Peterson is signed to Capitol (U.S.) who farmed out the promo on the disc to an independent firm. To attract attention, it was first sent to major U.S. stations without a label. Her earlier Capitol single stiffed. She wrote the current hit, so that's three parts Cancon.

He's getting a few items on Canadian country performers into Britain's *Countryside* magazine. He finds interest there in Canadian country heightened by the recent sale of George Hamilton IV's TV show to Britain's Commercial Television Company. Booker Bert Mitford, who handles George Hamilton IV and The Mercey Brothers, is now pencilling in a national tour for Carroll Baker in the new year.

Roy Payne and RCA have agreed to an amicable separation. Payne reports that he is talking new deals with other labels.

Royalty singer Chris Nielsen, who also doubles as the firm's promo assistant, sent RPM a copy of a feature on Royalty's Gloria Carriere in the November issue of *Credit Union Way*. Carriere doubles with a day job as a successful office manager for Estevan Credit Union.

R. Dean Taylor has just completed a movie soundtrack score for *Kings Of The Hill*, produced by actor Jim Bohan. The flick will be released by Lone Star Pictures in January, with a Taylor-produced soundtrack LP to follow. The publishing is held by Taylor's Ragamuffin Music.

The Golden Lion Lounge, a new country room in Niagara Falls opened recently with an engagement by Big Country's top country group, The Family Brown. The Browns did a little opening of their own recently - - their first Family Brown record store, at the Armprior Mall in Arnprior, Ontario. CKBY's Ted Daigle, and country singers Ron McMunn and Orval Prophet were on hand to help out.


Though he is known internationally for wishing he could get back home to Abeline, George Hamilton IV has spent most of his recent years building his career in Canada and Britain and touring places like Europe and the Soviet Union.

Now he's spending a lot more time at his home in North Carolina and back on the stage at the Grand Ole Opry, which he recently rejoined.

He cut his new LP, however, with RCA (Canada) last spring, and he's already enjoyed chart action here with two of the singles, Bad Romancer and Headed For The Country.

The LP, produced by Jack Feeney at RCA's Toronto studio with musical support from arranger John Arpin, is straightforward soft country - - no surprises. Some of the cuts have been softened even more with strings - with an eye not so much to the MOR charts, but the British market, where Hamilton is gaining more of a following through sale of his TV show (produced for Hamilton, Ontario's CHCH) to British commercial TV.

No doubt Bad Romancer and Headed For The Country are the strongest cuts; Sleeping Through Goodbye is a good third pick. All three of those cuts are well punctuated by Arpin's pinao work, present throughout the LP.



RPM Country Album Notes

# Taxes and death are certain

Following is text of important Tax speech made by Jim Henning to delegates of recent RPM Talent Buyers Conference. Mr. Henning is a partner in the highly respected accountancy firm of Waymark Reid & Co., and is considered a specialist on industry taxes.

One of the most discussed topics in entertainment is taxation. The Canadian tax department has placed great interest in the taxation of both resident and non-resident entertainers.

This interest has been created by the rumour that some entertainers have very high incomes and pay virtually no income taxes (like entertainers performing services through companies incorporated in tax havens); the dynamic growth of the entertainment industry in the last ten years, and the standard of living exhibited by some artists.

I will highlight some of the tax problems which entertainers have brought to me in recent years. I will start at the initial stage of an entertainment career.

At first, entertainers can't afford to have any tax problems because they are usually broke. Despite the lack of financial resources, they do have questions.

Usually, the first question I am asked is, "What expenses can be deducted?" They never ask what income is taxable.

The general rule is that expenses are deductible if they are incurred to earn income, and if they are reasonable.

The most common expenses are: booking agent fees and management fees, accounting and legal fees, travel expenses (for business purposes), automobile expenses (for business use), equipment rental (sound, lights, etc.) stage clothing, used exclusively on stage, repairs and supplies, wages, insurance, limousines, promotion, interest on bank loans, union dues.

The tax department is usually faced with three problems at this stage.

The performer's financial records are often in such a mess that they can not determine how much was earned and where it was spent. It is essential to keep adequate records. Part of the problem is that entertainers are not considered excellent credit risks and therefore must pay cash at all times. Receipts are frequently misplaced and tour income is rarely reconciled to the cash deposited in the bank.

A number of expenses are semi-personal, for example: stage clothing, automobile, food, dry cleaning, hair-dos and promotion.

The entertainer often spends his money on living expenses, tour costs and equipment before paying his tax bill. This can be avoided by paying taxes in installments or setting aside funds in a savings account until the taxes are payable.

## STARTING TO RECORD

After a number of years of playing clubs and making barely enough money to survive, the artist is "discovered" by a record company. He is induced to sign an exclusive recording contract without really understanding all the terms of the contract. He is not usually in the position to alter the terms of the contract and usually is afraid to miss an opportunity to record.

This is when the artist needs the guidance provided by good management and

competent advisors - as he has the potential of either earning or losing immense sums of money in a relatively short period of time.

The performer's most common questions would require more time than is available (and besides I don't want to reduce our fees too much). I would like to discuss some ideas relating to touring and recording in the United States. I think that this will be very relevant as usually an artist must penetrate the U.S. market to become a millionaire.

You are probably aware that the Internal Revenue Service requires concert promoters to withhold a tax of 30 per cent from the concert proceeds. A number of patriotic entertainers prefer to be taxed in Canada. This can be accomplished by organizing one's affairs to qualify for the necessary at this stage in his career are: "How are royalties taxed?" and "Should I incorporate separate companies for live performances and recording activities?"

Royalties are usually taxed in the year that advances are received, even though the royalties may not be earned until future years. Royalty advances are taxed on this basis because the advances can only be repaid from royalties earned and the advances usually do not have to be repaid from any other sources.

When an individual sets up a company he establishes a separate legal entity. The establishment of a company that provides the services of an artist requires careful legal planning to ensure that it operates as a legitimate company. It is necessary to keep separate accounting records and to file separate tax returns for the company. Some artists incorporate because they consider it prestigious to call themselves "president".

I think that a corporation can involve a lot of unnecessary legal and accounting fees unless it is required for limited liability or international tax planning.

At first entertainers receive income from the record companies in the form of advances. However, these advances are usually used to finance tours as well as to produce a record. I have noticed that tours can initially generate huge losses which must be financed by the royalty advances and loans. Therefore, it is possible that a touring company will have a loss and a recording company will have income that is taxed. Plans like this will increase the cash flow problem of the artist.

Every artist hopes to earn fantastic sums of money and, unfortunately, to spend fantastic sums. At this stage, entertainers often require more than competent managers, lawyers and accountants. They require divine help to prevent them from buying unnecessary luxuries and to encourage an investment program so they can retire at a young age and to effect the most advantageous arrangements to reduce taxes.

## FOREIGN TOURS

"How should foreign tours be organ-

ized?" A detailed discussion of this topic treaty exemptions.

It is necessary to incorporate a company to lend out the services of entertainers. It is of utmost importance to establish that the entertainers are employees of the corporation and that the entertainers do not manage or control the company. Also, the company must have business reasons to exist, have employees other than entertainers, own assets and have invested capital.

The company must file an income tax return in the United States and claim a refund of the taxes withheld under Article I of the Canada-U.S. Tax Treaty which provides an exemption for companies not having permanent establishments in the United States.

The employees who perform services in the United States will be exempt from taxes if they are bona fide employees of a Canadian corporation and they were not present in the United States for more than 183 days - if they are, they will be taxed in the U.S. on all their income.

## PERMANENT ESTABLISHMENT

The term "permanent establishment" is not defined in the Income Tax Act. Generally, I think of things that are relatively fixed, as permanent. However, this term has been interpreted to include the use of substantial equipment, such as musical and sound equipment, the rental of a hall and the use of large trucks to transport equipment.

I have clients who have set up these elaborate arrangements to qualify for the exemptions. They have incurred large accounting and legal fees; however, they have received a refund of their taxes. In some cases, the accountants and lawyers are similar to the tax department, as both taxes and fees have to be paid.

An alternative is not to have these elaborate arrangements and be taxed in the U.S. as a non-resident alien and be taxed on an individual basis in Canada, if the Canadian taxes exceed the U.S. taxes paid. This is advantageous only if the entertainer is fairly successful. However, it is necessary to incur some taxes in order to live in a luxurious manner.

In both of these cases, it is advantageous to set up a U.S. company to promote all U.S. performances in order to reduce the cash flow problems.


If an entertainer earns \$100,000 for a concert, has expenses of \$70,000 and taxes withheld of \$30,000, there is no money left. Alternative arrangements can be made with the I.R.S. to have the withholding tax calculated on the gross income less tour expenses. Therefore, the net tour income is \$30,000, the taxes withheld are only \$9,000 and \$21,000 remains for the entertainer. Therefore, the entertainer can use

CFTR paid a visit to the Sick Children's Hospital October 28 to bring Hollowe'en to the shut-in kids. Announcers Paul Godfrey and Bobby Day handed out candies, chocolate bars and LPs.

## LEAMINGTON (Windsor)

CHYR radio has planned a Stevie Wonder special for airing November 28. The 3½-hour special will be highlighted by the presentation of all the music on Wonder's new Songs In The Key Of Life. There'll be Stevie Wonder grab-bags, containing either six of his previous LPs, or one copy of his new one - which shows how much it's worth to most people. Listeners - Canadian only - just have to send in a card or letter to be drawn for one of the 15 bags.

## OTTAWA

Things are moving right along for the new progressive FM station in Ottawa, CHEZ-FM scheduled to begin broadcasting early in the new year. They've got some of their preliminary staff together, including MD Brian Murphy, formerly of CKBY and Treble Clef; Tim Thomas ex of CHUM-FM and CHOM-FM; Tom Young in the engineering department; and Hugh Batchelor, from the executive ranks of the CHUM organization. Brian Murphy is seeking the support of the record companies at this time, and it seems

## CRTC Quebec hearings set for December 14

The CRTC will meet in Montreal December 14 to discuss 77 applications for and renewed broadcast licences in the province of Quebec.

Radio CJFP is asking for a French FM station at Riviere-du-Loup, Radio Gaspé wants a French FM station in Gaspé, Radiodiffusion De l'Est has applied for a French AM station in Gaspé to rebroadcast programmes of CHNC, New Carlisle, and CBC wants a French FM station in La Malbaie to rebroadcast CBV, Quebec.

Club Social La Grande wants licences to rebroadcast radio and television programming in the James Bay power project area.

## OECA concerts moved up to cover cut live show

TVOntario, Ontario's public TV system, has moved its scheduled nightmusic pre-recorded concerts from the 12:30 a.m. Saturday slot to the 11:00 p.m. Friday slot following the cancellation of the show's 90-minute live portion by network authorities last week.

Rainer Schwarz, Nightmusic host, for the past two years, exited the show for reportedly allowing comics MacLean and MacLean to do their known thing, live, on the air.

Nightmusic concerts are taped two days before they are aired. The schedule for the rest of the year is:

Christopher Ward, (November 19), Marc Mercer (26), David Wiffen (3), Eyes (10), Peter Mathieson (17), Watson and Reynolds (24), and The Heartaches Razz Band (31).

## CBC, Kraft Foods & CBS set superspecial promo

Kraft Foods is going all out to promote its Richard Rogers two-hour TV Special which will premiere on the CBC-TV Network Dec 5 from 7 to 9 pm (erroneously reported as Dec 9 in last week's RPM).

Jack Haley Jr., who produced the special with David Susskind, is being flown to Toronto by Kraft the week before the broadcast date. They are also involved in the promotion of a CBS Special Projects album of big stars like Mary Martin, Maurice Chevalier, Enzo Pinza and Johnny Mathis, performing Rogers' classics.

The album was produced by Kraft and manufactured by CBS Records.

## Composers League salute on CBC's special show

CBC Radio's Special Occasion will broadcast a tribute to The Canadian League of Composers in early December. The CLC is celebrating its 25th anniversary.

The CLC was founded in 1951 to promote the musical creations of Canadian serious-music composers, and to serve composers' common interests.

Composer Norman Symonds wrote and hosts the show, which includes interviews, history, and sampling of the works of some of the CLC's members.

Symonds' major work, Big Lonely (The hobo name for Canada) premiered on CBC radio a few years ago, and is recorded on the RCA label.

The programme will be aired December 2, 9:00 p.m. on the FM network, and December 5, 1:05 p.m. on CBC-AM.

## Five CTV programmes nominated for awards

Five CTV network shows were nominated for awards at the 1976 International Film and Television Awards of New York; Keeping The Peace and The Creative Spirit (both part of The Human Journey documentary series); The Scots (one of the Heritage series); Children's Hospital (educational programme from WS); and Time Of The Jackals (TV newsprogram from the Window On The World Series).

## GRT sets price drop for ABC country LPs

GRT is going to follow ABC-Dot (U.S.) by dropping the suggested list on all ABC country LPs. ABC LPs are now listed at \$5.98 in the U.S.; \$7.98 in Canada (a \$7.98-list LP sells for about \$6.50 at most Canadian retail stores).

The price drop follows a big sales boom in country product in the U.S. and, to a lesser extent, in Canada. GRT reports the ABC line is doing exceptionally well out West.

The amount of the price drop hasn't been decided yet, but it could be as much as \$1.00.

## Date of Symphonic Slam Toronto debut changed

The date and venue of Symphonic Slam's debut in Toronto has been changed to December 22 at Massey Hall, A&M press officer Jim Monaco announced last week. The band, which has never performed live in its present form, will headline the date at the 2700-capacity hall.



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the earnings from live performances to live and to finance future tours.

**WHERE TO RECORD**

More Canadians are recording in Canada, and also more non-U.S. citizens are recording in Canada. A number of people attribute this change to the improvement of the recording studios and the personal desires of the artist. However, another major reason is the Internal Revenue Service.

The I.R.S. has interpreted that many recording contracts are contracts for services. If a service is performed in the United States, the artist as an individual is taxable or a corporation would be taxable as the income is generated through a permanent establishment, which is the recording studio. To make a long story short, the I.R.S. wants to tax income and requires that record companies withhold tax from the artists royalties, if the records were recorded or mixed in the U.S. As you can imagine, this can amount to a lot of money and it does not recognize any of the expenses of recording, which can be significant. A number of record companies do not withhold taxes if the artist agrees to indemnify the record company.

I would strongly recommend that all recording and mixing should be done in Canada. In a number of cases, it is necessary for the artist to record in the United States and take the risk that he will be taxed in the U.S.

**RECORDING IN CANADA**

Assuming that the artist records in Canada, the royalty income will be subject to tax only in Canada. Normal expenses, such as management fees and travel, can be written off against income. Production costs can be written off at once if the masters are sold to the record company. However, the production costs can only be depreciated at 20 per cent per year if the masters are leased. At this point, the entertainer can reduce his taxes through the purchase of various tax shelters. Tax shelters do not reduce taxes permanently, they defer them to later years when the artist's current earnings are relatively low. I would like to

restrict my comments to income-averaging annuity contracts.

An annuity contract requires an individual to make an investment which is repaid with interest over a number of years. This investment can be deducted from his income and the interest and return of capital are taxed when received. The purchase of the annuity allows the entertainer to spread the income over a number of years and, consequently, to pay lower taxes.

Income from the activities of an athlete, musician or entertainer can be offset by income-averaging annuities.

Income-averaging annuities have a number of advantages: they are secure and are guaranteed for a given term; and they provide flexibility - banks will accept them as security for a loan.

**NON-RESIDENT ENTERTAINERS**

In Vancouver, a number of club owners have not followed the prescribed regulations and have incurred heavy penalties for failing to withhold a tax of 15 per cent from payments to non-residents for performing services in Canada.

The tax department will accept representations to reduce withholding taxes in cases where it is felt that the tax causes "undue hardship". The tax department demands that headliners make representation to ensure that the estimated tax does not exceed the 15 per cent withholding tax.

The tax department requires that the artist substantiate his income and expenses by providing concert contracts, management contracts, employment contracts and invoices. Non-resident artists must withhold taxes from other non-resident employees performing services in Canada and non-resident equipment owners leasing in Canada, if representations are made.

Methods of organizing tours in the United States would be applicable to U.S. residents touring in Canada; but these are seldom used as well-known entertainers tour Canada fairly infrequently and the tours are usually not very extensive.

It is difficult, at times, to simplify taxation, as tax departments are changing their interpretations and international tax treaties often are renegotiated.
