

MGM Sales Boom

NEW YORK—MGM Records completed the most successful year in its history by breaking all sales records through the last two periods of its sales year according to Mort L. Nasatir, President.

The parent MGM label with its associated Verve, Metro and Verve/Folkways lines, along with the labels it exclusively distributes, Deutsche Grammophon and Kama Sutra, hit an all-time high of more than three million dollars for the usually slow summer period of July and August.

Nasatir also pointed out that the company has been one of the hottest for the entire year with as many as from five to 11 albums on the national charts at one time, and as many as nine singles on trade paper lists in a single week.

In explaining the solid performance, the MGM Records' president pointed to consistent sales by Herman's Hermits, the Animals, Connie Francis, Johnny Tillotson, Hank Williams, Jr. and the "Your Cheatin' Heart" soundtrack and Sam the Sham and the Pharaohs as solid reasons for the year's success. Instrumental in the record-breaking year and period sales was the acquisition of first product by Roy Orbison.

On the Verve label, the MGM President mentioned the outstanding sales of a line led by Stan Getz, Astrud Gilberto, Jimmy Smith and Cal Tjader. The Metro budget line has accounted for a solid percentage of over-all sales in the short

eight or nine months of its existence. This was underlined again at the NARM convention where much Metro business was written.

Solid Future, Too

Nasatir spoke of the label's momentum in terms of future product as well as the current sales leaders it has under its wing. Foremost is Orbison who has already contributed significantly to the record breaking closing of the sales year. In addition, he spoke of the strong product from the Kama Sutra label with its Vacels and Lovin' Spoonful singles. Then, too, Nasatir sees a solid sales potential in the newly-formed Verve/Folkways label as a result of the fever pitch interest in folk, folk rock, folk beat and bluegrass music.

The MGM Records' President gave particular credit for the showing to the talent and know-how of album sales manager, Sol Greenberg; single sales director Lenny Scheer; national promotion manager Frank Mancini; Director of Publicity Sol Handwerger; Irv Stimler, Ed Barsky, who package and sell Metro; and Jerry Schoenbaum, head of DGG and Verve/Folkways wings.

He also hinted at a wider variety of product to come from the label and an even more aggressive approach to talent and masters. Nasatir wound up his remarks with the statement: "For MGM and its associated labels, this has indeed been the longest, hottest summer on record."

It's Roger Williams Month

NEW YORK — Roger Williams Month is being celebrated by Kapp Records now through Oct. 15 in observance of the 10th anniversary of Williams' first single record hit, "Autumn Leaves."

A major promotion and merchandising effort has been planned, incorporating saturation radio spots with listener contests, extensive local co-op advertising through key stores in top markets, advertising in both trade and major consumer media and one of the heaviest in-store display campaigns in the history of the company. Special sales incentive programs have been planned for distributors and their sales and promotion personnel.

Williams has sold more than 10 million albums to date. Tied in with the month-long promo is the release of a new version

of "Autumn Leaves," which features a choral background along with Williams' piano and orchestra. The original version of the song is on the flip side.

At the local level, extra promotion is planned wherever Williams is scheduled for a concert appearance in the months to come. His normal schedule calls for at least 60 concert appearances a year.

In addition to extensive trade paper advertising, Kapp has scheduled space in such key consumer publications as the New Yorker and Esquire magazines. Promotion will focus on the anniversary itself; the new single record and on Williams' latest album, "Summer Wind," which has just hit the market.

All Williams LP product will be detailed in colorful catalog stuffers being made available to dealers now.

BMI's Student Competition Opens

A total of \$17,950 is available to be granted to young composers who enter manuscripts of concert music in the 14th annual Student Composers Awards competition sponsored by Broadcast Music, Inc., an organization which licenses the performing rights of music.

Established in 1951 by Broadcast Music, Inc. in cooperation with music educators and composers, the SCA project annually gives cash prizes to encourage the creation of concert music by student composers (under 26) of the Western Hemisphere and to aid them in financing their musical educations. Prizes ranging from \$250 to \$2,000 will be awarded at the discretion of the judges, who base their decisions on evidence of creative talent as shown in original manuscripts which are submitted and judged under pseudonyms. To date, 95 students, ranging in age from eight to 25, have received SCA prizes from BMI.

SCA 1965 is open to students who are citizens or permanent residents of the Western Hemisphere and are enrolled in accredited secondary schools, colleges and conservatories or are engaged in private study with recognized and established teachers. Entrants must be under 26 years of age on Dec. 31, 1965. No limitations are established as to instrumentation or length of manuscripts. Students may enter as many as three compositions, but no contestant may win more than one award. Competition closes Feb. 15,

Kirshner Re - Signs Keller, Greenfield

NEW YORK — Signing of new individual long-term contracts with Jack Keller and Howard Greenfield was announced today by Don Kirshner, President of Columbia Pictures—Screen Gems Music Division. The songwriters have been under contract to Kirshner since 1958.




Howard Greenfield, Don Kirshner & Jack Keller.

As a team, and also in collaboration with other writers, they have 23 Top 10 songs to their credit. Their biggest song was "Everybody's Somebody's Fool" which sold 2½ million copies for Connie Francis. "My Heart Has A Mind Of Its Own," "Breaking Up Is Hard To Do" and "Run To Him" also became No. 1 best sellers. With Keely Smith, they wrote a new song for Frank Sinatra which he included in his best selling "Sinatra '65" album and released as his current single.

When Kirshner sold Aldon Music to Columbia Pictures in 1963, it gave Greenfield and Keller an opportunity to write for TV and movies. They didn't waste any time in taking that opportunity. Last season they wrote the theme song for the hit TV show, "Bewitched," Such artists as Steve Lawrence, Peggy Lee and Lawrence Welk were quick to record the song. This season "Camp Runamuck," "Gidget," "Hazel," "The Wackiest Ship in the Army" besides "Bewitched" will show Greenfield and Keller's names on the video tube as their composer and lyricist. "Gidget" has already been recorded by Johnny Tillotson.

Next year they are looking forward to the movie screen. They have written the theme song for the MGM movie "When the Boys Meet the Girls," which stars Connie Francis, who has recorded the tune for release around Christmas. Greenfield also wrote the theme song for her hit movie "Where the Boys Are." Included in future title song assignments for Columbia Pictures is "Winter A Go Go."

Command's Departing Light Interested In Films & TV

Other Personnel Remains Intact Under Becker

NEW YORK — Enoch Light got a call from the Coast the other day and was told that the two topics of conversation out there were the weather and where Enoch Light would be going after he exits his Command Records post Sept. 30.

The speculation is rampant in the East and the Midwest as well.

But it can be only speculation now, Light told Record World last week because he intends to make no final decision or even hold discussions until his Command contract runs out. He said he has too much to do in the office before then.

That "too much" means no less than 15 recording dates this month to finish up four new albums—his last for the label. They'll be a Tony Mottola package, a Ray Charles package, a Virgil Fox package and a William Steinberg package, Beethoven's Fifth Symphony.

(When Light leaves, label personnel will remain intact under new General Manager Loren Becker. Light said he'd be leaving people with whom he had worked as long as 19 years.)

What will take Light's fancy after Oct. 1, although specifics are unavailable now, can be surmised from the way he talks about what he'd like to do. His eyes light up when he thinks of the possibility of doing a movie score. "I think there are many ways that haven't been tried," he said. "The use of music in movies can be greatly developed in order to contribute to the overall effect of the movie."

Peeved With Teevee

Light is at once peeved with the state of music on TV and enthusiastic about what it could be. "There are two kinds of musical shows on TV now," he asserted, "old-fashioned or hysterical. I think much more experimentation in the overall format—and that means design, dance, music—should go on." Light admitted that he'd been thinking about packaging a TV show himself and had talked with producers about the idea. He also has ideas about commercials.

Certainly it's safe to assume that Light will continue to record. He has even considered the possibility of starting his own label but realizes that such a time-consuming move might prohibit TV and movie work at the outset.

A variety of activities seems to be Light's goals, because as he put it, "You have to keep walking. And I'm excited,"

Light is also excited about leaving with his "Magnificent Movie Themes" album on the top 100 charts. Light notes proudly that of the 32 albums he has made for Command as an artist, 29 of them have hit the charts. Sales on these 32 records, Light proffered, have surpassed the \$22 million mark. And that, he reiterates, is just the albums he has cut as an artist.

47% Made Charts

Of all the albums released under the Light command, 47%, Light said, have made the charts. He also mentioned that he is pleased with the work he has done with recording on 35 mm film, use of magnetic tape, multi-mike pick-up, work on tape cartridges (an area Light feels is just opening up) and on and on.

And, Light said, his interest in technological progress, will go on and on too.

But whatever he does, Light emphasizes that it will be done with a regard for the public, which he feels is continually underrated by the industry. "We have proven here," he said, "that the public will pay for quality. They're more aware of excitement in music than many people in the business think."

The song is a slow lament intoned by a boy who has received his draft notice and doesn't want to go.

WMCA-New York and KD-KA-Pittsburgh have refused to play the song for the present, although stations in Boston, Baltimore, Cleveland, Chicago and Dallas have put it on the play list.

The controversy centers over the question whether the song is unpatriotic or a sincere protest of one youth's reaction to the present draft situation.

Buddy Kaye, Richie's father, publishes the tune for his Greenleaf house.



Darin Puts Accent On Young Writers

NEW YORK — In keeping with the times, the accent is very much on youth at TM Music, Inc. When one realizes that Bobby Darin is owner of the firm, this seems only natural.

Still in his 20s, Darin has created the basic philosophy there of young writers and young artists, with Edgar Burton, Executive Vice President who runs TM, and Irwin Schuster, Professional Manager of the pubbery. The stress, however, is on new writers, making TM Music that rarity: a substantial artist-owned independent publishing operation.

"In '64 and '65, so far, the firm has gone far in excess of a million performances," said Burton, "and they're playing TM songs 3,000 times a day, which is not bad."

Burton continued, "In an era when independent publishing firms are either being bought up by big users, when artists have firms or indie producers have firms, Bobby has proved you can still build a powerful indie pubbery firm."

Assignment Writing

As head of TM, Darin doesn't believe in having writers just go in and write a song. He believes it's better to have an artist's requirements to shoot for. Hence, a great deal of TM's songwriting activity is assignment writing. "We'll get a request from a label to come up with something for, say, the Drifters or Herman's Hermits or Ronnie Dove," the Executive VP illustrated.

Wayne Newton is a discovery of Darin's and Darin has personally produced all his Capitol records. He occasionally tosses TM songs to the select few artists he produces; but Bobby's main concern in this area is making a hit record artist and many TM songs have wound up on B sides of a disk.

Basically Pubbery

"We're not primarily producers at TM," Burton went on. "When we come across someone Bobby feels can make it, we sign him. Like Jesse

Colin Young on Mercury." He added that Bobby himself is "a four-headed man — artist, writer, producer and publisher. But when he's active as Bobby Darin, the artist, he concentrates completely on this; when he's producing Newton or anyone else, that's it."

In spite of the fact that Darin owns TM, it's not an "artist firm"—the last five TM hits were not written by Darin. (Newton's initial click, "Danke Schoen," not TM's, was first submitted to Bobby.) Last year TM won three BMI Awards and two so far in '65, none of the songs written or recorded by Atlantic Records' Darin, proving the firm is no mere byproduct of Bobby Darin. The winning tunes: "The Shoop Shoop Song," "Under the Boardwalk," "Hey, Little Cobra,"
"Little Bit of Heaven" and "One Kiss for Old Times' Sake." Heading for a third award is "Just a Little Bit Better."

The TM writers' staff now numbers close to a dozen, most having started from scratch at the pubbery. Among them, Artie Resnik, Kenny Young, Rudy Clark, Paul Leka and Santo and Johnny Farina. And Bobby recently signed three

Coast writing talents, Mike Curb, Freeman King and Russell Alquist.

Major Darin Catalogue

TM has a major Darin catalog. When Bobby bought Burton's stock in Trinity Music in February, 1963, Trinity had Darin as an exclusive writer. Bobby composed the title song and score for his current Universal film vehicle (co-starring wife Sandra Dee), "That Funny Feeling." Firm is building a hefty motion picture catalogue, also lists "Come September," "If a Man Answers," "The Lively Set" and "Major

Dundee" scores.

The pubbery is already doing title themes for TV pilot films into 1966-67.

TM has opened offices in London, Sydney, Australia, and Hamburg, Germany, in addition to its Hollywood-New York digs.

Although there have been rumors that TM is on the sales block, Bobby says, "Absolutely not!" (Admittedly, there have been offers.) TM Music, Inc., is doing well, a fact which Darin attributes to "Edgar Burton, Irwin Schuster and some of the most prolific writers in the business."

Pop Art Part Of Cap Kid Contest

HOLLYWOOD—Chances are most kids are toting a set of five, full-color, pop art bookcovers back to school this year which were designed by awardwinning artist Charlie White and have become the basis for a national contest being conducted by Capitol Records Distributing Corporation.

One of the five bookcovers is for physical education. On the cover is a box of wheaties—the connection is, of course, P.E. and wheaties, the "Breakfast of Champions." The other covers are history (with a caricature of George Washington on the front cover), biology (with a frog—dressed in coat and tie), English (William Shakespeare) and math (Albert Einstein).

Capitol will give more than a half-million college and high school students the opportunity to be one of the "in-crowd" (and a contest winner) by distributing 500,000 of the covers to record stores and college book stores where they will be given away.

In order to enter the contest, the students who have the covers will have to send in a caption for the picture on the cover (I. E. Einstein, Wheaties, Shakespeare, Washington and the Frog). The caption will win an auto-stereo for his (or her) car and second place will be awarded a year's supply of Capitol albums.

The covers actually serve a dual purpose. Besides being used as vehicles for a contest, they also have (on the inside) pictures of 20 of Capitol's best selling, teen and college-oriented albums. In order to enter the contest, the contestant has to list three song titles from any three of the albums pictured. This will lead him (or her) into the record store—the place he can find the albums and the titles—and thus serve as a traffic builder.

Window streamers and ad mats telling of the availability of the bookcovers are currently being distributed to the stores,







A New Voice in Town

Ever have the pleasant feeling that you've "discovered" someone? I have. I recently had the good fortune to hear an exciting new vocalist named Marian Taylor. Having just finished an extended engagement at a club called the Alibi in Groton, Conn., Miss Taylor was appearing at the Fantasy East in Queens, N.Y.C.

Miss Taylor is a romantic, and is best with the ballad; but she can also dish out the uptempo numbers with taste and verve and end them with a positive "yeah!". Her beautifully projected voice has enough range and quality to handle them all. Miss Taylor's very personal style defies labeling: she is not a jazz singer, she is a good singer.

At the Fantasy East, the vocalist was backed by a trio of sax, organ and drums as she offered a program of well chosen, class tunes. Miss Taylor has the good judgment to sing songs not because they are chic, but because she happens to like them. When the songstress sings a tune like "I Wanna Be Around" you are again aware that Hell Hath No Fury. Then she is totally tender with tunes like "More" and "Try To Remember," and devilishly cute with the rock and roller "You Got What It Takes," added for a little spice. Her feel for lyrics was notably evident on "Can't Help Loving that Man Of Mine"; when she was through the song had a hand-rubbed finish.

Marian Taylor is ready for much bigger things, and it would behoove one of our onthe-ball record companies to invest a little time in exploring this immense talent.

This young lady is the possessor of all the "right" ingredients looked for in her profession. She can, of course, sing, she has stage presence, she is attractive, she is relaxed and doesn't mind introducing numbers and talking to her audience. And she isn't going to be the "next" anybody, she has too much to say herself. She is the first Marian Taylor.

I loved Houston because that's where I got hip to the dance called the Alligator, which I think was invented in San Antonio. Now it's the world's first legit horizontal dance. They do it to the music of Roy Head's "Treat Her Right." And at the convention the Houston Go-Go dancers tried it on Detroit distributor, Armon "The Lover" Boladin, which messed up his mind so totally that he rushed back to Detroit and got Don Robey a fast Pick on the Roy Head on CKLW. (And that's the REAL inside story of how the Roy Head spread from Houston. In fact, when the Alligator was observed by Sly Stewart of KSOL, San Francisco, that's how Roy Head must have got a Tempo Wizard and a S.F. Bustout!)

The two champ Boosters of the Alligator in Houston are Al (who dropped the name "Duke of Earl" for this up-tight hip tag) and Steve Tyrell, who promotes records and cuts Chuck Jackson in his spare time. I'm advising Don Robey not to show the Alligator on the Roy Head LP as the teen-agers outside of Texas are already in enough trouble.

The other big record for doing the Alligator in Houston is: "The Fat Man"—John Steel, Wand.



It sounded like a good idea to safeguard the ratings on Steve Lawrence's opening CBS-TV show by having Lucille Ball as guest, but unfortunately the chemistry between the two stars was wrong. The production was elaborate and expensive. Lawrence and Miss Ball tried hard, and still nothing happened. Steve acted like a nervous fan and Lucy had an air of condescending boredom. Lawrence proved he's a great showman on Broadway in "What Makes Sammy Run" and we're sure he'll do the same on TV once he recaptures Sammy's cocky selfconfident air.

AROUND THE DIAL: We know it's a caddish thing to say but most of WNEW, New York, deejays are pushing 40 from one side or the other. So we wonder how they feel when they have to read those commercials for Broadway's "Roar of the Greasepaint" musical. The copy reads "If you're over 35 don't see 'Roar of the Greasepaint." . . . Sybil Christopher was all over the dial last week plugging her new husband Jordan Christopher's album with the Wild Ones . . . Femme singers will garner a needed TV show case when George Burns presents an hour-long special on ABC-TV in February. The program will spotlight only "girl guests," with Burns, of course, as emcee.

An interesting situation is developing in the local New York TV market. Sam Riddle, whose syndicated show, "Hollywood A' Go Go," is currently featured on WPIX, will shortly be in competition with himself when WOR-TV carries his other rock series "9th Street West." The latter package, heretofore a local Hollywood show, is now being syndicated by RKO-General.

Meanwhile, the local teen-dance show field continues to expand. Latest entries are "Hollywood Discothèque," KCOP, Hollywood; and a special "Hoi-Hoi-USA" WXYZ-TV, Detroit. Latter show, hosted by Dave Price, is Japan's top-teen program.

Label in Vanguard With Folk Rock

Baez Single Hot, But She's No Trend Follower: Prez Solomon

NEW YORK-With folk rock getting so much attention these days and the message song an important item on the market, tradesters are wondering how Vanguard, where much of this type activity has been going on for so long, is reacting.

After all, Vanguard, with Joan Baez leading their list of album sellers with her songbag of Dylan tunes et al, suddenly finds that even Joan has broken through in the singles field with her single guitar version of Phil Ochs' "There But for Fortune"—a song that may not have done quite so well if released, say, four months ago.

So Record World ventured down to Vanguard's busy 14th Street offices to ask President Maynard Solomon how the label was reacting to the turn of events. Solomon's answer was: in no special way.

No Fad Jumping

Solomon said that he was preparing singles releases for seven or eight of his artists, but that none of them was a conscious attempt to jump on any current fad. In fact, Solomon continued, label is wary of fads, because fads usually contain the eves of their own destruction. As far as the topical song goes, Solomon noted that "Blowin' in the Wind" and others have been popular for a number of years.

The affable prexy said that he certainly doesn't deny that there is a greater market for folk material these days, but he feels there has just been an increasing acceptance for the lyric of social importance. And therein lies the difference.

His company sales record shows him that there has been a growing audience on the high school level for folk music and that college sales have remained the same.

On the Vanguard recording roster appear writer-artists like Phil Ochs, John Hammond, Patrick Sky, Buffy Sainte Marie, Ian and Sylvia and Mimi and Richard Farina. Solomon said that increasingly these people are writing their own material and that they are going in many directions - traditional, blues, social.

"Some of our singers wouldn't think of singing a social protest song," Solomon said.

"And," he went on, "an artist like Joan Baez would never follow a trend. Why, she has probably introduced as many of the most recorded folk songs as anybody, but she is still highly selective. I would say she decides to sing one in a 1000 new songs that are shown to her. For this reason alone, we have trouble releasing more than one Baez album a year."

Solomon is excited about a new Rooftop Singers album release. The group he said now has a new girl singer and although there has been no tremendous record activity engendered around them lately, Solomon said that "Walk Right In" got up momentum enough so that the threesome is in constant demand. And, Solomon asserted, "We feel that Erik Darling, the leader of the Rooftop Singers, is just about the greatest folk personality."

You Said It!

The Question

It is said many recording sessions have been cancelled or pushed back for a later date because you were too busy at the time and were unable to make it. Is this true?

The Answers



Producer: More often than not, it's not true. Many companies with whom I have a close relationship

would bend over backwards to reschedule their recording dates in order to fit my time. On the other hand, there are other record companies and independent producers with whom I don't have as close a relationship but have made many successful recordings for. These people may have artist commitments and time limitations. Especially in the case of a promised record release date. I always appreciate being the first one called, and in the event that I can not do this session I'm called for, I will then try to recommend an arranger. Even though I have made a great many hits for many artists and companies, I can't expect them to work at all times within my schedule. Since I am a producer as well as an arranger, I can sympathize with those who have to work within a given time limit.

Gary Chester, Drummer: It



is true. It depends upon arrangers, producers and artists. And how important they think I am to their

recording session. It is a known fact that I just don't go in to do a session with the idea of doing the session just for the money. I actually go in to help them create a concept which has already been conceived by the arranger and or producer: therefore, they hire me to make the concept come off in the studio. I insist on using ear-phones known as "Cans" in a studio so that I can hear how/or where the vocalist is phrasing so I don't step on her or his performance and lyric. By doing this I do not lose any creative drum work that may be needed to make the product come off.

Brooks

Arthur, Recording Engineer: Yes, it's true and has been

told to me by various producers and artists, which flatters me.

My feeling, however, is that we're all part of a team and I'm one of the infielders. I've been playing the engineering game for about two years, with the lucky batting average of 200 hit records. There is a creative-emotional aspect involved also. For example, when the schedule is rough and I'm very tired, I explain to the producer that the little sensitive things that we'd like to happen won't unless I give my ears a rest. We usually reschedule and come back in the next day and win the ball game!

Charles Macey, Guitarist:



There are some leaders and contractors in the recording field who like certain musicians on their dates

and will make the date at the time they are able to do it. It has happened to me several times but not too often. Once a date is booked a leader or contractor will rarely cancel it because of one man-unless that particular man happens to play an instrument that is rare as in my case the steel guitar.







He burnt down Los Angeles town, and in my previous newsletters I said he burned down Chicago and New York and he did just that. I stated to other disk jockies in one of my recent editorials to use Montague's tactics and burn their town down. I did not mean for them to become arsonists and burn down their HOMES . . . but to become No. 1, or the king of the disk jockies of their communi-

Spartan Ltd. Disk jockey copies may be obtained by writing to P.O. Box 7006, Nashville.




