Wood Exits Dot In 'Amicable' Parting

LOS ANGELES — Randy Wood, who resigned his Dot president post last week 17 years after he started the label on \$1000, announced that the parting between him and Gulf & Western Industries, now parent company of the diskery, was amicable.

Talking of his future plans, Wood said, "I'll probably be going back to Tennessee on other business matters." It's possible Wood will also take on independent producing chores.

In leaving his post, Wood terminates his contract, although it was to have remained effective until August 1969.

Label business, up to \$15 million in 1966 from \$12 million in 1965, is estimated to reach \$23 million this year.

Within recent months Wood concluded pacts that brought Snuff Garrett's Viva label, Kenny Myers' Acta label, Jeff Barry's Steed label and Bob Crewe's Dynovoice label into the Dot family.

Wood entered the music business in 1941 when he opened Randy's Record Shop in Gallatin, Tennessee, where he still maintains his retail and mail order concerns. He also has maintained a home there.

It has been estimated that the singles and albums Wood personally produced for Dot (by Pat Boone, Johnny Maddox, Lawrence Welk, The Hilltoppers,



Burk New Dot Head; Peirce Named Veep





Arnold D. Burk, vice president in charge of the music division of Paramount Pictures Corporation, has been named president of Dot Records as well. The announcement was made last week by Martin S. Davis, executive vice president and chief operating officer of Paramount Pictures Corporation, a subsidiary of Gulf & Western Industries.

At the same time, Richard H. Peirce has joined Dot as vice president and general manager, and will undertake with Burk the direction of Dot's worldwide interests in the recording field.

Burk replaces Randolph C. (Randy) Wood who resigned last week.

Dot Records is one of the principal components of Paramount's new music division, which was recently formed to

consolidate all of the company's recording, publishing and filmmusic activities under Burk's supervision.

Peirce was formerly A&R administrative director for Liberty Records. His new appointment marks his return to Paramount, where he headed the West Coast operations of Famous Music in 1965.

A former band leader, Peirce became active in the administrative areas of the music business in 1956 as head of MCA's record department. He then joined RCA Victor in charge of its West Coast offices, and was also founder and chief executive officer of Charter *Records.

Under recent arrangements Dot Records exclusively distributes the Viva, Acta, Steed and Dynovoice labels.

Loooong Singles Run On and On and . . .

Loooong singles are the thing these days. And they're getting loooooooonger.

Record World noted the situation a few months back and wondered at that time what the developments might be if the trend continued.

Well, the trend is continuing. Bobbie Gentry, an unknown artist (two months ago) brought out a 4:15 debut disk and the country fell in love. The Rolling Stones are taking 4:39 seconds to tell teens "We Love You" on their new London release. The Doors "Light My Fire" Elektra cut is almost seven minutes long.

And how are radio stations reacting? Not well it seems.

Last week John Rook of KQV-Pittsburgh announced that he will play no record over 3:30 seconds until it is in the top 30 on national charts.

Paul Drew of CKLW-Detroit told Record World last week, "We have a tendency not to be interested in the long records. A new artist would really have a rough time with any release over three minutes. Of course, we'll play a hit."

Rick Sklar of WABC-New York said, "I don't know how much longer we'll play long records. It's an intolerable situation. If a record hits the top 20, we have to program it. I don't know that after this week we'll start off any new ones. "We had a meeting this week and a lot of the long records on our current playlist were taken off. We can't play them till they're top 20 if they run longer than 3:30 seconds.

"You can cut the records in half, but the kids complain."

Bertha Porter of WDRC-Hartford lodged a minority (as far as **Record World's** poll extended) opinion. "The last thing I look at on a record," she said, "is the time. If it's a good record I play it. Other radio people have been calling me to see what I'm doing about long records. I'm not doing anything. Or I'm doing what I've always done — play a record I like.

One of RCA Victor's best selling artists, Gary has 14 albums in the catalogue, including the new release "The John Gary Carnegie Hall Concert." recorded live on Mar. 27, of this year. Ten of Gary's 14 albums are also available on RCA Stereo 8 Cartridge Tape.

The merchandising campaign is designed to give maximum exposure to the complete John Gary Catalog. In addition to two-page spreads in music trade journals, full page ads will run in such consumer publications -the New Yorker, Chicago Tribune Magazine, Los Angeles Times' West Magazine, the New York Times Magazine and Cosmopolitan. The ads will reach over 15 million potential buvers.

Twenty, 30, and 60-second special radio transcriptions, featuring the newly released Carnegie Hall album and the complete album line are being made available for local advertising.

Point-of-sale materials available to dealers include a sixbin "Starring John Gary" rack header; browser divider cards listing all of Gary's album product; a "Starring John Gary" counter merchandiser; "Starring John Gary" six-bin die-cut title strip piece and two-color blowup drawings of the artist. Also available is a "Starring John Gary" window display and a John Gary consumer catalogue.

Promotional materials include teaser mailings, blanket ad mats featuring all John Gary albums, 140-line and 280-line ad mats on the Carnegie Hall album, plus glossy miniature

album covers.

300+ To Narm Meet

PHILADELPHIA — Pre-registration for the Mid-Year Meeting of the National Association of Record Merchandisers, Inc., which will be held Sept. 5-8, at the Host Farm in Lancaster, Pa., has already passed the 300 mark, it was announced today by Jules Malamud, NARM Executive Director. Despite the fact that an entirely new format is being used this year, the response of both the Regular and Associate Membership has been overwhelming. This will be the biggest attendance ever registered for a NARM Mid-Year Meeting.

In addition to the 22 new members which were announced to the industry several weeks ago, 11 additional new member companies have enrolled, and will be attending the Mid-Year Meeting. The new companies represented will be Raymond Rosen Company of Philadelphia, a record distributing company and its rack jobbing company, I. J. Morgan; Comstock Distributing Co., which has a rack jobbing subsidiary, Sound Marketing; Cadet Distributing Company, a rack jobber affiliated with Cornell Records of Detroit, Michigan; and Regal Records, a rack jobbing company affiliated with Fenway Distributing Company and Standard Distributing Company of Pittsburgh.

MGM, Hullabaloo Sam the Sham Tie-IN

NEW YORK-MGM Records and Hullabaloo Magazine have begun a series of joint promotions of MGM recording artists who will be highlighted in cover blurbs and feature stories and contests in the magazine. This was jointly announced yesterday by Gerald Rothberg, Editor and Publisher of Hullabaloo and MGM Records.

The first contest and promotion appears in the current October issue and features Sam the Sham. Magazine will award various prizes built around a contest with Sam, including albums, singles, Sam the Sham posters and photographs, MGM playtape machines and cartridges. MGM will promote this issue to its record dealers, rack jobbers, wholesalers and road men, and also to disk jockeys across the country.

Hullabaloo Magazine sent special notices and Sam the Sham albums to its more than 800 wholesalers.

No Mono End At London

LONDON — London Records has no intention of discontinuing the production of monaural albums, according to D. H. Toller-Bond, president of the company.

Amplifying the statement, Toller-Bond said that all of the company's classical releases, which are already blueprinted for the release period through the end of this year, have been allocated for production in both mono and stereo units. This includes both opera and orchestral recordings.

London's pop division, which, with its family of labels including Hi, Parrot, Press, and Deram among others, is now particularly hot with major hit LP's by The Rolling Stones, Engelbert Humperdinck, Tom Jones, and Procol Harum, also envisions no change in its policy of issuing both mono and stereo versions of all LP re-

No Classical Hike: Pickwick's Leslie

NEW YORK — Cy Leslie, President of Pickwick International, Inc. said last week that the company contemplates no price increase on its economy-line Pickwick/33 classical albums

Leslie's statement came after announcements by Elektra and Vanguard that prices on their new classical economy lines would be \$3.50.

"Pickwick's classical album suggested list price of \$2.50 mono and stereo will remained unchanged," said Leslie. "We intend to keep the economy in economy-price. To raise it would hurt the enormous new audience that economy records have built for classical music. We believe the \$2.50 list is the best price for us and for the record buyer."





The Choir is composed of Wally Bryson, lead guitar; Dave Smalley, rhythm; Jim Bonfanti, drums; and James "Snake" Skeen, bass.



Happy Together

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK—In an age when the threat of total automation is a constant worry, it's certainly a refreshing and startling thing to see a reverse move from machine to man.

But that's just what's happening at Koppelman-Rubin Associates where golden-eared Charlie Koppelman and Don Rubin have found a way to replace the demo record. They call it Alan Gordon and Garry Bonner, the songwriters, exmembers of K-R recording group, The Magicians.

Gordon and Bonner, whose first published tune was prophetically "Happy Together," have a credit list that is quite something considering the amount of time they've been at it (since October).

And they don't make demo records. Uh-uh.

Operating under the theory that songs are best performed (or at least peddled to artists and/or a&r men) by the writers, the team present their songs in the flesh. Garry Bonner, who has a Columbia recording contract and will have his first single released Sept. 15, sings lead and accompanies himself on the guitar, while lean, blonde Alan Gordon is the rest of the orchestra, suggesting quite graphically where a trombone comes in, what a chorus would do, how the percussion should operate, exactly what drums do down to the merest paradiddle.

Quite Something

The fellows are sensational and it's no wonder that in a short eight or 10 months they have amassed such a large number of recordings.

First off, they have written all three recent White Whale-Turtles tunes, starting with "Happy Together" through "She'd Rather Be With Me" to the current "You Know What I Mean." The team also penned "Contact." the Teddy Neeley (Capitol) single now beginning to break around the country. And they wrote some supple-

mentary songs for the new Teddy Neeley album. Gary Lewis' "Jill" is a Gordon-Bonner confection. And that's only the beginning.

Last week the duo had at least three big singles released—Petula Clark's "Cat in the Window (Bird in the Sky)" (Warner Bros.) with the strange ending, Bobby Darin's cool, hip "She Knows" (Atlantic) and the bright "Kitty Doyle" (Reprise) (not to be confused with "Kitty Foyle").

And speaking of the "Cat in the Window (Bird in the Sky)," Gordon and Bonner are in the catbird seat right now because they are highly prized by employers Koppelman and Rubin, who have been signing some significant production deals recently, for instance, the Pet Clark pact (seemingly her first away from Tony Hatch). The duo have already written three additional numbers for Pet's next album and took an active part in the production of same on a recent Coast trip.

They told Record World last week that they are increasingly becoming involved with these chores, and that seems logical since they have such detailed ideas about how songs, records should be written and recorded.

Among the impending G-B releases are Garry's Columbia "The Heart of Juliet Jones," a Zal Yanofsky cut on a soon-to-be announced label, "Small Talk" by Claudine Longet for A&M (with guest artist Andy Williams, it's rumored), "You're Free" by Verve's Bobby Hatfield and a Warner Bros. Elmo and Almo cut.

And in the further future perhaps a TV series for the sweet-singing Garry and a hoped-for Broadway show.

Happy together? It would seem so.

Key distributors across the country will be sent a series of major promotional material which will include posters, window display material, radio spots, new black and white and color pictures of the group and personally autographed albums to the presidents of Turtle Fan Clubs in every city in the country. White Whale will also film television spots which will



It's absurd not to. The biggest request we have now is the seven minute Doors record. Should I keep it off the air because it's too long? If the kids would rather hear one seven minute than two three and a half minute records, then we'll play it. We aren't here to run a marathon to see how many records we can get on the air."

Juke box operators are definitely aggravated. Jukes can play 20 three-minute records in an hour-only 15 fourminuters in the same time span. That means a loss of 50¢ per hour. So it's possible juke sales on the long records will sag.

And so the argument goes. Mitch Ryder came out with his 4:14 "What Now My Love" (DynoVoice) last week and disk went immediately on WKNR-Detroit as a pick.

Record World will be watching closely for further upshots.

Could be, if a reaction sets in immediately at some stations, records like The Innocence "Someone Got Caught in My Eye" (Kama Sutra), which runs a brief 1:57, will be getting highly increased play. Ditto Pet Clark's new 1:57 "Cat in the Window" (Warner Bros.)

It's a certainty that hits will be played, but a hit can't become a hit until it is played.

So there's no predicting which way the turntable spins.

by Anthony & Imperials . . . We predict that "In the Heat of the Night" as sung by Ray Charles in the new smash film will also develop the same popularity as "Alfie" as the movie gets to the neighborhood houses and drive-ins.

R&B Going Pop

It has not escaped the attention of the industry that many R&B records are going pop in a big way. "Higher & Higher"—

"Everybody Needs Love"—Gladys Knight is top 5 R&B and big pop in many cities as is Chris Bartley. "Get On Up"—Esquires is making it pop. The Jimmy Ruffin is a pop giant in Detroit. Linda Jones went top 10 pop in Boston. "Tell Him"—Patti Drew, Capitol is a pop Giant in Phila. The Queen Reigns In Detroit

Martha Jean "The Queen." That's the name of one of Detroit's best known and best loved radio personalities. Martha Jean Steinberg is the Queen's full name, but "The Queen" is certainly an appropriate title for the female announcer.

Born and raised in Memphis, Tenn., Martha Jean graduated from a Catholic high school and began college but did not finish. The Queen tried her hand at nursing school but became restless and decided to go into the business world. Martha Jean got married. The marriage did not last, but it did produce three lovely children, all girls.

The Queen's introduction to radio, 15 years ago, was at radio station WDIA in Memphis. "They more or less wanted a hostess around the station . . . and so they asked me." Being a hostess was pleasant, but it only served to whet the appetite of Martha Jean "because I saw fellows doing things on the air and I thought I could do them better." She was hired at the station and began amidst cries of 'You don't have any experience!', "you can't even talk!" and "you just don't have it in you." As it turned out, she could talk, and did have it in her, and of course experience came with the application of these talents.

The Queen was successful; she began to move. There were three years at WCHB in Detroit. Then on to WJLB in the same city, where she now broadcasts. She spins records, but also talks very sincerely to her listeners.

In the face of the recent rioting in Detroit, Martha Jean's voice was heard almost continually over the airwaves urging listeners, "My people, do you hear me? Get off the streets! Go to your homes. Right now! I know you all want peace for Detroit, but there is nothing we can do now to help except to go home." The Queen tried in her own way to help curb the mass hysteria that had hit the city, sometimes walking the streets herself speaking to "my people."

Soul Wagon

Detroit's Queen has always been interested in communicating with everyone, but especially to those other than the white collar workers. Martha Jean began The Blue Collar

Workers of America. While at WCHB she used to ride in the station car, "The Soul Wagon," that toured the city. In a segment of her show called "Tastin' Time," she would salute the manual laborers in town. Workers began to stop the Soul Wagon and ask the Queen to remember the "cats behind the barn on Woodward Ave.," or "the guys working in the hole on Ecorse Road." Martha Jean would always remember and salute them on the air. The Blue Collar Workers of America is now a formalized organization with well over 5,000 registered members who help in community affairs, give social functions, and create a generally healthy atmosphere in the area.

The Queen will always be involved in the welfare of her listeners. She has a mission, she says, to "communicate with people, the forgotten people." Long live the Queen.

He and seven of his men (Johnny Hodges, Paul Gonsalves, Cat Anderson, John Lamb, Harry Carney, Steve Little, Lawrence Brown) are playing for dancing at the sky high Rainbow Grill, New York's most romantic dance spot and certainly the place where Ellington's "Sophisticated Lady" did much of her "dancing, dining, diamonds shining."

NEW YORK-Milestone Records, a New York-based label devoted primarily to jazz, has been acquired by Robert Bialek, leading Washington, D.C. record and book retailer. Bialek's plans call for immediate expansion of the label's activities, with experienced record executive and jazz producer Orrin Keepnews named as general

An initial release of seven albums, backed by national consumer magazine advertising, is about to be shipped by the new organization. Featured are packages by vocalist Helen Merrill, tenor sax star James Moody, pianist Wynton Kelly, and top French jazzman Martial Solal. Two other key releases, part of a series of classic-jazz reissues, spotlight Jelly Roll Morton and legendary bluesman Blind Lemon Jefferson.

A greatly augmented sales and distribution network is being set up for the label, which will remain in New York, having moved into new offices at 22 West 48th Street. According to Keepnews, a unique sales pattern will be employed, working through normal wholesale channels "in those areas where there are distributors with the knowledge and interest to properly handle the task of doing a solid sales job with a special product like jazz." Elsewhere Milestone will go directly to the retailer. In such cases the line, which has a list price of \$4.79 for all LPs, wil be sold at normal mark-up to an approved list of "knowledgeable, interested dealers," Keepnews

Milestone is already in negotiations with several established jazz names and promising newcomers.



LONDON — The folk scene has been very active since our last report.

For example the Third Cambridge Folk Festival, sponsored by the Arts and Entertainments Committee of the famous college town, took place. It was a three day festival held during the first week-end in August. The line-up was a very impressive one, headed by Tom Paxton, Judy Roderick, Doriss Henderson, and Tom Rush (the American representatives), while the British side featured the Young Tradition (who had a very successful trip to the States where they appeared at

the Newport Folk Festival, folk clubs in New York and Toronto), The Tinkers, Fred Jordan, Roy Harper, Alex Campbell and many others. The crowd of

two thousand came from many parts of the British Isles, many camping out on the beautiful grounds of Cherry Hinton Hall in tents and bed-rolls.

There was something for everyone: club night for local amateur and semi-professional talent; competitions for the best groups and individuals playing British and American country and folk music; barn

dance; and discussion groups. Those artistes not on the official program who performed while the main show was off included folk singer Vera Johnson from Canada, who held an enthusiastic audience with her Canadian folk songs; and a talented twosome from Holland.
