The Paupers are getting a big push from MGM and this package shows why. The group includes "Magic People," seemingly their theme song and current single (MGM FT/FTS 3026).

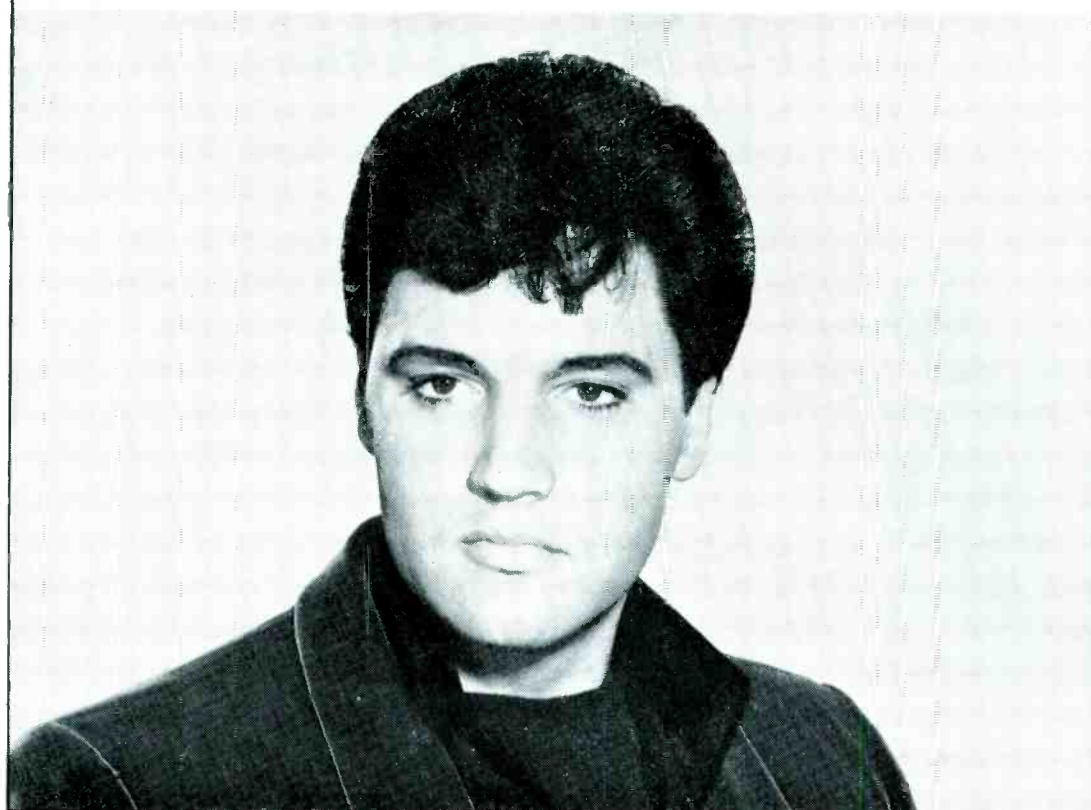

NARA Convention:

Huge Turnout at Lavish Regency Hyatt in Atlanta

ATLANTA, GA.—At press time last week, the NARA Convention at the Regency Hyatt House here was in full swing, with a huge turnout of more than 500 in attendance so far.

The Regency was proving a popular topic of conversation and activity, with its color TV sets and terraces with each suite and crowds of conventioners milling about enjoying the decor.

On Wednesday, Aug. 9, Otis Redding got things groovin' in a big way with an all-night barbecue at his ranch in Macon. The Bar-Kays, Otis Redding and several local acts performed.

George Lee Luncheon Host

The Thursday, Aug. 10, the Warner Brothers luncheon saw label's George Lee officiating as guest host. Lee introduced the members of the Warner-Reprise-Loma staff, including Loma's producer Jerry Ragovoy and promo man Ron Moseley, plus Don Carroll, Atlanta promotion man for all three labels; and Loma star Linda Jones and her producer, George Kerr.

Sen. Leroy Johnson gave an address at the Thursday luncheon; as did Del Shields, NARA Executive VP, who noted his disappointment at Sen. Robert F. Kennedy's being unable to attend the convention for the second year in a row.

All in all, however, the NARA was having a most auspicious beginning for its convention which was set to last through Sunday, Aug. 13. More details next week.

Neil Bogart, Staff Exit Cameo-Parkway

PHILADELPHIA — Following the recent announcement by Alfred Rosenthal, President of Cameo-Parkway Records, that Allen Klein and Abbey Butler

had purchased 56% of label shares, Cameo Vice President Neil Bogart has announced his resignation, along with several other staffers.

There Two Years

Exiting Cameo-Parkway along with Bogart, who has been with Cameo for two years, are national promotion managers Cecil Holmes, also with the diskery two years, and Marty Thau, with a year's tenure; and Carol Coviello, Bogart's assistant.

In the past couple of years, Cameo-Parkway has had about 30 records on the charts.

Concept Difference

In stating the reason for the resignation, Bogart said that his prime concern was "a difference of a basic concept relating to record sales and promotion in today's industry. The staff has been negotiating over the past few weeks with many companies, both major and independent, and has decided to go with one of the more recently formed independents."

After contracts have been completely executed, the staff will announce its decision, Bogart informed.

Shields Hosts NARA Meet

ATLANTA, GA. — A press conference presided over by Del Shields, Executive Vice President of NARA, was heavily attended here last Friday (11) during the 12th annual NARA Convention at the Regency Hyatt House.

Among those present were artists Nina Simone and Otis Redding and representatives of Life Magazine, the Atlanta Journal, the Atlanta Constitution, Atlanta Magazine, Soul Magazine (of California), the Associated Press, CBS-TV and NBC-TV.

The meeting involved discussions of the Civil Rights movement and what NARA could contribute.

Garland & 'Dolittle' At Home on ABC LPs

Label Intro's 18 Albums In NY

NEW YORK—Coincidentally, Judy Garland, star of a classic family film of another time, "The Wizard of Oz," and what promises to be a classic family film of today, "Dr. Dolittle," both figured prominently in ABC Records' last of three regional distributor meetings held here last week.

ABC has recorded Judy live for an LP during her current smash engagement at the Palace Theater, and the label will be distributing 20th Century-Fox Records' soundtrack to the Rex Harrison film, "Dr. Dolittle." All together, 18 albums were unveiled, marking one of ABC's biggest releases.

Previous meetings were held in Los Angeles at the Beverly Hillcrest Hotel on Friday, Aug. 4, for Western distributors; and in Chicago at the Ambassador East on Monday, Aug. 7, for Midwestern distributors. Presiding over the New York meeting was Bud Katzel, Director of Merchandising for ABC.

Of the new releases, seven are on the ABC label; four on Impulse; three on BluesWay; two on Dunhill; and two on 20th Century-Fox. The presentation of "Judy Garland—At Home At the Palace—Opening Night" brought cheers for the ABC label from distributors. The LP represents the first recording for ABC by Miss Garland, who was recently signed to an exclusive recording contract. The album also features her two younger children, Lorna and Joey Luft, who appear in the Palace show.

'Minifilm' Highlight

A highlight of all three ABC meetings was the screening of a specially prepared "minifilm" of "Dr. Dolittle," the 20th Century-Fox motion picture premiering on Dec. 19 at Loew's State Theatre in New York as the largest budgeted musical in the history of Fox. The original cast album, with words and music by Leslie Bricusse, starring Rex Harrison, Samantha Eggar, Anthony Newley and Richard Attenborough, was given a rousing debut by the minifilm and a dynamic presentation by ABC Records' sales force.

ABC President Larry Newton introduced the film's producer, Arthur Jacobs, and publishing co-ordinator Happy Go-day at the screening.

The deluxe "Dr. Dolittle" album consists of a single record packaged in a doublefold jacket with an eight-page, four-color story booklet insert. The main selling theme for the picture and LP is "You've Never Seen or Heard Anything Like It In Your Life!" Extensive dealer merchandising aids include: a large four-color cardboard center window display with color negatives of scenes from the film; a four-color, four-panel hanging mobile display; four-color counter/window display cards; counter display browser box holding 25 "Dr. Dolittle" albums; four-color window and wall streamer; four-color fold out poster; a set of 19 large four-color photographs; "Dr. Dolittle" buttons reading "Dr. Dolittle for President of A.M.A."; and a direct mail stuffer.

A vast consumer advertising program includes Look, Life, McCall's, New Yorker and New York Times magazines, as well as radio advertising. Radio station breaks and open-end interviews with Rex Harrison (who, it is rumored, will be specially recording other disks for ABC) will be available.

Plans for Judy

The signing of Judy Garland to ABC occurred only the other week, and plans for promotion of the Garland package are still being formulated, beginning with a full-page ad in the New York Times magazine section Aug. 20. Responding to tremendous demands for display material, ABC is currently preparing a number of items for dealers. Judy's Manager, Sid Luft, spoke briefly at the meet-

Spiegelman Dot Eastern Manager

Dot Records Vice-President and National Sales Manager George Cooper has announced the appointment of Dot's Eastern Divisional Manager Seymour Spiegelman to the position of Director of Eastern Operations.

Spiegelman, who has been associated with Dot for the past 15 years, both as a recording artist and in sales, first joined the company in 1952 when he was a member of the famed Hilltoppers which recorded exclusively for the Dot label.

In 1954 Spiegelman entered the U.S. Army to become a member of the famed Ft. Dix Soldiers Chorus which was seen and heard throughout the nation on leading television and radio shows. During his last year of service he became their director.

In 1957 Spiegelman rejoined the Hilltoppers, appearing in leading supper clubs and colleges throughout the nation until January of 1961 when, with his Masters Degree in Music education from Nashville's George Peabody College, left the group to become a music teacher. However, six months later he was persuaded by Randy Wood, President of Dot, to rejoin the label in the sales and merchandising areas.

Following one year as a salesman at the Memphis Branch, Spiegelman was appointed Branch Manager of the Boston Area where he remained until 1966 when he became Eastern Divisional Manager.

Headquartering in Dot's New York offices, Spiegelman now is directly responsible for sales, promotion and merchandising throughout the East.

Goodman Wax Hilites Command Meets in NY

Command, in conjunction with parent company ABC, completed a series of regional sales meetings last week, which included new product presentations in Los Angeles (4), Chicago (7) and New York (9).

Larry Newton, ABC head, attended the Command meetings, which were presided over by Loren Becker, Vice President and General Manager of Command, with key participation by Charles Trepel, label National Sales Manager, who spelled out new merchandising and promotion ploys.

A highlight of the New York meeting was the presentation of new waxery pactee Benny Goodman, whose first album "Benny Goodman and Paris: Listen to the Magic" and first single "Sholom Aleicham" coupled with "Hava Nagilah" were unveiled for the distrib.

Of his new package Goodman said, "I rather like it"—a typically modest assessment of what sounded rather exciting as played at the confab.

During his introductory speech, Becker digressed to urge distrib to stock up on 8-track tape. He suggested that

the space provided by slack-off in monaural inventory would provide the right impetus for increased cartridge endeavors.

In Two Groups

The new product which was introduced was broken into two groups, the first one being shipped in August, and the second group being shipped by October 1st. Four albums were presented in the August group, which included new releases by Toots Thielemans, Warren Kime & His Orchestra, William Steinberg & the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, and a Christmas Album from the Command Family of Artists.

The September/October group featured Jerry Fielding (new on the label), the Ray Charles Singers, Ashley Miller, Steinberg and the Pittsburgh Symphony and Command's first album by Benny Goodman. Excerpts from each album were played by Becker with a brief discourse on how and why the album was produced.

Also played were singles to be released by the Ray Charles Singers, Dick Hyman, Doc Severinsen, Toots Thielemans and Warren Kime.

Pfeiffer RCA Red Seal Producer

John Pfeiffer has been named Executive Producer, Red Seal Artists and Repertoire for RCA Victor Records.

The promotion of Pfeiffer was announced by Roger Hall, Manager, Red Seal Artists and Repertoire, to whom Pfeiffer will report.

Pfeiffer, well-known throughout the recording industry as a producer of recorded performances by such artists as Jascha Heifetz, Vladimir Horowitz and Wanda Landowska, has for the past five years been RCA Victor's Administrator of Red Seal Audio Coordination. In this capacity he was one of the engineers responsible for the development of Dynagroove Sound as well as being in charge of all sound for Red Seal releases.

"In his new position, Pfeiffer will not only return to his previous role as an active producer, but also assist my department in a number of administrative duties," Hall said. "We consider Pfeiffer to be one of the most valuable persons in the industry. As a result of his new position, RCA Victor will have the full benefit of

his creative gifts as an Artists & Repertoire Director and his knowledge and expertise in the recording art."

Joined RCA in '49

Pfeiffer joined RCA in Camden in 1949 as a design and development engineer. The following year, he joined the RCA Victor Record Division as Quality Control Engineer. Shortly thereafter, he became a Red Seal Artists and Repertoire Producer which position he held until he was named Red Seal Audio Coordination Administrator in 1962.

MIDEM Drive in High Gear for Jan. 21-27

Jan. 21-27, 1968, have been confirmed as the official dates for MIDEM 2, the second annual record and music publishing market to be held in Cannes, France, according to M. Jean-Claude de Villeroy, MIDEM international manager, in a statement issued at the close of his seven-week tour of North and South America.

De Villeroy explained that earlier uncertainty with regard to the MIDEM dates was occasioned by the organization's efforts to obtain maximum operating facilities and hotel accommodations in the Riviera resort town. "The week of Jan. 21, 1968, was finally selected," de Villeroy said, "because of the availability at that time of the entire Hotel Martinez for MIDEM office spaces."

De Villeroy noted that his extensive trip here on behalf of the Paris-based organization, which is headed by M. Bernard Chevry, had proved extremely fruitful in terms of "expected participation by the great majority of the most im-

portant record companies and music publishers. Actually," he continued, "though we are working six months in advance of MIDEM 2, we already have signed contracts from a number of these companies."

De Villeroy arrived in the United States in mid-June, and was accompanied on his round of New York and California meetings with disceries and publishing firms by Ren Gre-vatt, the American representative for MIDEM. De Villeroy later visited Mexico and Brazil before his return to New York for a final week of meetings prior to flying back to Paris on Friday (4).

Working Out Details

Meanwhile, Chevry and several key lieutenants have been in Cannes for the past few weeks to work out details of MIDEM 2. It was pointed out that the anticipated 300 percent increase in attendance and participation over last year's MIDEM will necessitate new arrangements for more working spaces.

The projected complex will house all office and booth spaces for more than 300 participants, and is expected to be completed in time

for the 1969 MIDEM 3.

For the 1968 affair, MIDEM Commissariat Generale Chevry has secured the use of the Hotel Martinez, which is located only two squares from the main Palais des Festivals. All galas will take place in the Palais itself.

Singles Increasingly Being Forced Out of Albums

By DAVE FINKLE

Since radio stations—top 40 especially—have increased their programming of cuts from albums, an interesting development in singles releases has taken shape.

There seems to be an increase of singles forced from albums by deejay and listener demand.

A single taken from an album is nothing new, but the frequency with which it is happening now is.

At Atlantic, execs definitely are finding the new corollary to be true. For instance, Aretha Franklin's million-selling "Respect" was taken from her album. Two weeks ago label pulled Wilson Pickett's "Funky Broadway" from "The Sound of Wilson Pickett." Last week they released Sondra Williams "God Bless the Child" from her religious "Hark the Voice" disk. This week's new Percy Sledge is one—from his latest album. All after response from heavy airplay.

Via Sudden, Intense Play

RCA Victor excerpted the Youngblood's "Get Together," a peace-in tune from their first album, because of sudden intense play on the West Coast. And last week an early leak on a cut from Nilsson's forthcoming first elpee forced out a new single release, "You Can't Do That."

The Buckingham's "Mercy, Mercy, Mercy" (Columbia), in the top 10, was initially meant only to be an album inclusion.

The Mamas and the Papas' "Creeque Alley" (Dunhill) was chosen by deejays.

The list continues, and as stations continue to play more cuts from today's increasingly more well-rounded rock albums, the list will certainly continue to grow.

This probably means that companies will maintain the

fairly usual pattern of releasing two singles from any given teen album (any more than two would probably pass the point of diminishing returns), but the advantage to waxeries is that the edge is taken off the gamble of that second single. Labels can release a single with a greater certainty of its eventual success. The cut has already been test-marketed by radio station music directors.

Another Outgrowth?

Another outgrowth of the album airplay situation could be the increase of cover singles in the case of cuts from albums getting play with no eventual single release. This has already been the instance with many Beatles tunes, where just about every cut on an album gets play, but Capitol or the Beatles themselves, have refused to release any cuts as singles. The result: a rash of cover versions.

More of this type activity could mount.

The new wrinkle is an interesting one, and one that may be more interesting not ironed out.

Firsts for Duke



Duke Ellington managed another "first" in his illustrious career last week by winning in no fewer than five categories in the 15th annual Down Beat International Critics Poll. Two of the awards were for his Victor albums, "The Popular Duke Ellington" (Record of the Year) and "Things Ain't What They Used to Be" (Reissue of the Year) which was released in the RCA Victor Vintage Series. In addition, the Duke topped the poll in the best Band and Composer categories. Ellington's "Sacred Concert," also on RCA Victor, placed fifth in the Record of the Year category. Not only did Hawkins produce these records, but he was also in charge of sales and promotion for the Abnak label. He also produced "Not Too Long Ago" by the Uniques on the Paula label.

As an artist several years ago, Dale had such hits as "Susie Q, My Babe," "La Da Da Da," "House Car," "Wedding Ring" and "Class Cutter."

Hawkins produced the Abnak hits in the Dallas, Texas, area and will continue to seek out talent and cut in Dallas. His first sides for Bell will be released shortly.

'Singing Mayor' Vallee May Sign Record Contract

The way "Singing Mayor" Roland S. Vallee of Manchester, N. H., feels, if actors can go into politics, politicians can go into show business. Which is just what he is doing.

"I was tired of entertainers coming into our profession—I thought we should fight back," Mayor Vallee told *Record World* last week. (Adding: "When I made this statement once before, it was carried around the country.")

Recently, Mayor Vallee completed a successful singing engagement at Manchester's Six Acres Supper Club, where he did two shows a night for a week. He donated his salary to the blind—his wife, he reported, is "95% blind." He also sang at the Bedford, N. H., Camp Allen for Blind Girls not long ago.

'Suppressed' Interest

Vallee, who had always been interested in voice but had "suppressed it," began to sing while in the service from 1948-1953, and is currently dicker-ing with several record labels. He has sung on TV and radio; although he hastens to inform: "I'm not interested in losing my political career, but I would like to keep on singing. I've used music in my campaigning, as have others in the country—it's not really new. Everywhere I go, people say, 'We want you to sing.' It's a great way to campaign. People remember you."

He continued: "I went to a mayor's conference in Honolulu not long ago, a luau with about 15,000 in attendance and maybe 200 mayors. I wasn't too well known before; but after I sang, they all knew me."

Vallee, a baritone unheard as yet by the interviewer but

possessing a voice, in his words, "something like Robert Goulet's," has been Mayor of Manchester for almost four years. Thirty-three years old with six children (four girls and two boys), Vallee, a commercial pilot, has been in Democratic politics eight years. He seems to feel he is looked upon favorably for an even higher office in New Hampshire. He already holds the distinction of being the youngest mayor ever—not to mention the first silverthroated one—in the history of the state's largest city (100,000 population).

"There is a trend today of young people in politics, as you know," he went on.

Any Opposition?

Has there been any opposition to his singing?

"At first. When I announced I would sing at a supper club, some of the politicians thought it might not be so good. But I'm the kind of a politician who, once he makes up his mind to do something, goes through with it."

Is Roland Vallee any relation to another Way Down Easter of some musical note named Rudy Vallee? The Mayor laughed, "No, but I've been kidded about that plenty—especially in the Army!"

Jillbern Action On New Disks

NEW YORK — Herb Bernstein's recently formed Jillbern Music firm is showing signs of life.

Aside from Lainie Kazan's current single, "Road to Ruin," Jillbern also publishes one side of the new Barbara Banks on MGM, "The Night-Time Feelin'." Frankie Valli has recorded a Jillbern song. Also, Herb reports that the Royalties will have a new release on Roulette and one side will be published by Jillbern Music.

Peer - Southern's Solid Summer

NEW YORK — Lucky Carle announces that summer is turning into one of Peer-Southern Music's peak release periods.

Single releases include: "There is a Mountain" by Donovan on Epic, "Be Not Too Hard" by Joan Baez on Vanguard, "Let's Go to San Francisco" by the Flowerpots on London, "Mas Que Nada" by the Alan Lorber Orchestra on Verve and "He's Coming Home" b/w "He Won't See the Light" by Beverly Ann on RCA.

Six New London Albums In Fast Sales Breakouts

Three new artists shared the spotlight with three tried and tested veterans in the top positions for early market reaction among the 25 new LPs recently introduced by London Records. Fall product was presented to distributors across the nation by a team of London execs, with all merchandise tagged "A Fabulous 25 for a Fabulous Fall 67."

Prominent British pianist Ronnie Aldrich, who has recently moved into one of the most sought-after niches in the London catalog, took down initial sales honors in company with baton veterans Mantovani and Stanley Black among the established names. Among the best-received new album artists were John Mayall and the Bluesbreakers; David Bowie, 19-year-old singer; and Les Reed, songwriter turned arranger-conductor. Both Bowie and Reed appear on the London-distributed Deram label.

Interestingly, Aldrich recently completed a successful U. S. promotional tour, and both Mantovani and Black are scheduled for returns to this country in the near future. Mantovani, popularly known as

"Mr. Music," will arrive in America on Sept. 25 for his 12th annual tour. Stanley Black will be guest conductor of the Royal Philharmonic during a tour of this country to commence in early 1968. Powerful promotions will be launched by London in connection with both tours.

Special Accolades

The Aldrich LP received special accolades during London's fortnight of distributor presentations for its track of "A Whiter Shade of Pale," current top 10 smash for the Procol Harum.

Among the newcomers, and also in the instrumental grouping, the first LP by Les Reed drew a most favorable reaction. Reed, the composer of "It's Not Unusual," an early Tom Jones hit, as well as of Herman's Hermits' "There's a Kind of Hush," also has a current single, "Imogene," featured in the album along with other of his own material. Currently engaged in a number of film assignments, Reed is expected to occupy a place on the music and recording scene as a sort of British Mancini.

David Bowie is making a strong initial impact with no previous singles successes. Special interest is being focussed by the distributing fraternity on "Please, Mr. Gravedigger," one cut from the Bowie album.

Finally, London execs have found that the label's success earlier this year with the first LP by the Bluesbreakers was solidly based, despite lack of singles activity for the group. Introduced last January, this first album turned out to be the sleeper package of the entire release. The follow-up, featuring John Mayall and his three colleagues, was announced at the recent product presentations and has already brought heavy re-order action in San Francisco, Seattle and Chicago.

Francis TRO Exec Director

NEW YORK — H. Minton Francis has joined The Richmond Organization as Executive Director, it was announced by TRO President Howie Richmond.

A specialist in business organization and management, Francis is a graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point. He retired from the Army as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1965 and since then has worked with civilian government agencies.

At TRO, Francis will concentrate on developing the optimum business procedures and means of internal communication required by TRO's concept of "total music publishing."

During his 21 years in the Army, Francis received commendations for exceptional performance in connection with officer training, the launching of the first U. S. earth satellite, and for leadership in conducting Army management studies. He was graduated from the U. S. Army Command and General Staff College in 1959, and was awarded the degree of Master of Business Administration, with honors, by Syracuse University in 1960.

After leaving the Army, Francis joined the Department of Housing and Urban Development as an assistant to Secretary Robert C. Weaver, where he played a major role in planning and organizing the newly-established department.

Barrington Inks Faded Blue

CHICAGO—Barrington Records President William F. Simonini has announced that the label has signed Chicago's Faded Blue to a three-year recording contract, with an initial single release set from group's feature length motion picture, "Blast-Off Girls." The film is scheduled for release in autumn.

The first single release effort with the Faded Blue, "The Next Time" b/w "The Day Was Fair," will be released prior to film's exhibition, and the full sound track album will be released on Barrington to coincide with the opening of the picture. A promo tie-in with the film is set, with the Faded Blue scheduled to make P.A.s during September and October.

Quintet hails from Chicago's north side, and is composed of Tom Tyrell, leader and lead guitarist; Denny Hickey, rhythm, both 19 years old; Chris Wolski, 18, organist; Ralph Mullin, 20, drums; and Ron Liace, bass, also 19. Radio and television promotions are set in conjunction with the record's release in mid August, and will be kicked off with a concert booking at Milwaukee's Washington Park on Aug. 23.

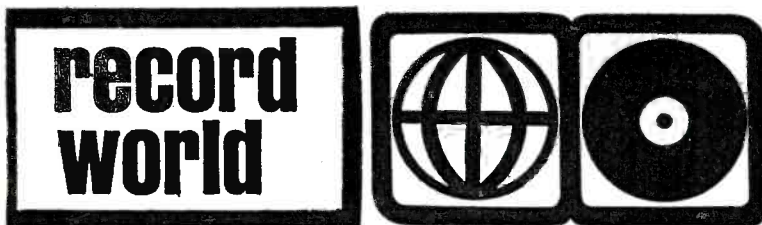

For the next few hours I was in a nerve-shattered state, contemplating the next jump I would have to make when the tender returned. When it did, this time I took a flying leap and landed in a heap on a very untender deck!

Aboard Radio London I was given wonderful hospitality by the djs. They were highly elated by the scoop they had just achieved. An advance copy of the new Rolling Stones single had been thrown to them from the tender. Within 17 seconds both sides were being broadcast—the first broadcast by any radio station in the world. This is the sort of initiative and staff "Auntie" BBC will have to use if they are truly to replace the pirate ships. The record they played is a Stone certainty for the hit parade.

The boys were very enthusiastic about a disk titled "Whatever Happened to the Seven Day Week" issued on Columbia and recorded by Bella & Me—two blonde Swedish beauties named Bella Munter and Gunnel Sandgren. The girls teil me they are dying to visit the U. S.

Fortunes for UA

The Fortunes signing to the United Artists label is likely to make all sides a fortune. The UA team of Noel Rogers, Martin Davies and Roger Welch is doing a 100% promotion behind them. The Fortunes have proved to be one of the best UK hit-making groups. Their latest single, titled "The Idol," should be no exception. Fortunes manager Terry King has a full date book for them in

Europe, and it should not be long before the U. S. sees them live.

Welcome U. S. visitors here are the New Christy Minstrels, whose European itinerary has been previously reported in Record World. They were given a reception by CBS Records on their arrival. Kit Lambert and Chris Stamp, joint Managing Directors of Track Records, whose artists include the Who and Jimi Hendrix, announce the appointment of Tony Hall as Consultant Executive Producer to Track Records.

Liberty Records' first release since it set up independently is the Strawberry Children's "Love Years Coming." Liberty has also signed two British groups, the Idle Race and the Bonzo Dog Doodah Band.

**Ode Single Hits
Abroad, Too**

Scott McKenzie's drive for "flower power" has really taken hold both in the United States and abroad, as evidenced by the success of his current Ode single, "San Francisco (Be Sure to Wear Flowers in Your Hair)."

Produced by Lou Adler, head of the Ode label, the record is now No. 1 and 2 on the British best-selling charts. In addition, "San Francisco" is currently No. 2 in Australia and No. 4 on Dutch charts.

Scopitone Films To Jack Gordon

NEW YORK — J. Cameron "Jack" Gordon, for many years President of Seeburg Corp., announced on his return from two weeks of meetings in Europe that he has acquired world wide licensing rights to all of Cameca's Scopitone patents.

"My trip was to assure the future of 'sight and sound' now, both here in the United States and internationally," Gordon said.

In addition to world patent rights from Cameca, Gordon obtained the rights to over a thousand original film negatives made by top American and international artists. The major-

ity of these have never been released in the United States.

Gordon has incorporated Cameron International, Ltd., with offices at 515 Madison Ave., which will have available parts and service for Scopitone equipment. "Of utmost importance to the operator," Gordon said, "would be our extensive film program."

In addition to these original film masters, Gordon set up a world wide film program by concluding joint ventures to produce film for audio visual equipment in Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, the Benelux countries, as well as the United States.

This program will serve to develop artists and attractions for the "sight and sound" explosion.

Gordon, who is responsible for many of the important innovations in the coin operated music field, is following the pattern in his new venture which he previously set at Seeburg.

"My faith in the future of 'sight and sound' is also shared by David Rosen of Philadelphia, Pa., and one major coin operated phonograph manufacturer, Rowe-AMI," Gordon concluded.

UA Internat'l Has Hit Album

The first hit album on the recently-formed UA International label of United Artists Records is "Canta Raphael," a program of performances by Raphael, Spain's foremost pop vocalist.

The collection has hit pay-dirt in Puerto Rico where Carlos Julio, Sales Manager of the J. M. Vela Company, UA distributors for the territory, reports that it has just skyrocketed past the 50,000 mark in total sales, making it one of the biggest-selling sets in that area's recent history. Vela has placed two recorders of ten thousand copies each during the past 10 days alone. Excitement has now spread to New York City where Alpha Distributors is reporting heavy action.

Much of the impact created by Raphael is due to the fact that his starring film, "Cuando Tu No Estats," is a boxoffice moneymaker in Puerto Rico and his album contains many of the songs performed by the young star in the movie, which will soon be seen in New York.

Ron Eyre, UA International's Artists & Repertoire chief, is currently readying a new program by Raphael for prompt release.

Other highlights of her performance were her new single "Be Not Too Hard," "There But for Fortune," "I Want My Freedom Now" and "I'm a Poor Pilgrim," the last two rendered a cappella.

Vanguard's artist is an interesting one. She is committed to her songs to such an extent that her voice, quite an instrument, takes a back seat. It seems to me that Joan could arrange her songs such that, without losing lyric content, she could use her voice as more than an expedient.

Perhaps that's caviling, for she is still an outstanding artist.

First Annual CMA Awards

NASHVILLE — The Country Music Association has begun mailing information to its membership in preparation of the first annual CMA C & W Awards which will be presented during their annual show and banquet this fall on Oct. 20 at the Municipal Auditorium in Nashville.

A multitude of awards have been presented in the recent years, but this marks the first time the CMA will undertake an all-industry award which is not limited to any geographic

area of the country, or based on the voting of a small number of judges.

The entire CMA membership will have an opportunity to both nominate and vote. The outcome of the election will be kept secret by an independent auditing firm until the Friday night of the awards. The CMA will send out the basic information to its membership advising them of the mechanical aspects of the election, and disclosing that the operation and tabulation of the procedure will be done by Price Waterhouse.

Awards will be presented in the following 10 categories: 1. Entertainer of the Year; 2. Single of the Year; 3. Album of the Year; 4. Song of the Year; 5. Male Vocalist of the Year; 6. Female Vocalist of the Year; 7. Vocal Group of the Year; 8. Instrumental Group or Band of the Year; 9. Instrumentalist of the Year; and 10. Comedian of the Year.

The awards will be combined with the annual CMA banquet and live C & W show, and will precede the annual Hall of Fame presentation.

Miss Myers pointed out that Starday offers an unusual opportunity for qualified writers because of the fact that the Starday label is in constant need of new material, and the Starday Publishing Enterprises are actively working with A & R heads and artists of other labels for the ultimate exposure of new material. The promotional setup at Starday under Charlie Dick maintains close personal contact with all the leading disk jockeys and the music scene. Dick is assisted by Miss Myers. Wats telephone facilities are available to artists and writers to use from the Starday Townhouse on Music Row in contact work.

'Long Song' Goes Country

NASHVILLE — Country music observers think they've spotted a trend developing, the "Long Song," a moniker as accurate as any.

"The Beatles may have started the whole thing off" in the pop-rock field, comments Felton Jarvis of RCA Victor, "but we've some strong candidates locally for the C&W distinction."

"Long Songs" can appear in either single or album format. While the Beatles' best example is their latest LP "Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," the most outstanding C&W example is Bobby Bare's just-released Victor album "A Bird Named Yesterday," which is setting a blistering sales pace nationally.

Bare's "Bird" is the brainchild of Jack Clement, one of country music's most unique and successful song stylists. Clement conceived the album idea, and then wrote most of it.

Like Sgt. Pepper, "Bird" is actually a collection of songs designed to blend into a whole or single entity. In this manner, the "long song" causes the LP to be viewed by the listener as an "entire art form," rather than as a series of single unrelated recordings.

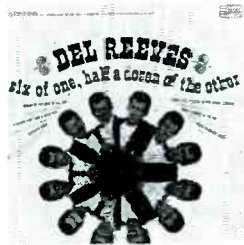

LONDON—Hank Locklin has just concluded a successful tour of Germany and Great Britain, backed by an Irish group called the Kingpins. I interviewed Hank on my BBC radio show, "Call It Country Style," and he expressed his delight in seeing the growth of country music here since his last visit several years ago.

Carl Belew is another Nashville artist making personal appearances around this way.

The Hillsiders from Liverpool have started recording for RCA some singles and LP's in Nashville. One with Bobby Bare, and several of their own.

While in Music City, USA, they will be doing some Grand Ole Opry shows, then some touring dates . . . A new LP by the Tumbleweeds is due out on Decca for Oct. 1, called "London Country" . . . Steve Benbow is making many fans with his radio series on BBC; his LP on the Folklore label, "This, That and the Other," has quite a selection of songs including tracks that I am sure will never be broadcast because of their naughty (but funny) lyrics.

Aug. 6 sees the arrival of the current country chart man, David Houston, to promote his "With One Exception" hit on British radio, TV and P.A.'s. Accompanying him will be Tammy Wynette, with whom

David has cut another chart entry, "My Elusive Dreams" . . . One of the Carolina Travelers, Locklin Deeming, was killed in a car accident recently. British country music groups have rallied 'round to help his family by putting on a series of benefit concerts. C.; and University of Illinois School of Music, Urbana, Ill., received honorable mention and awards of merit.
