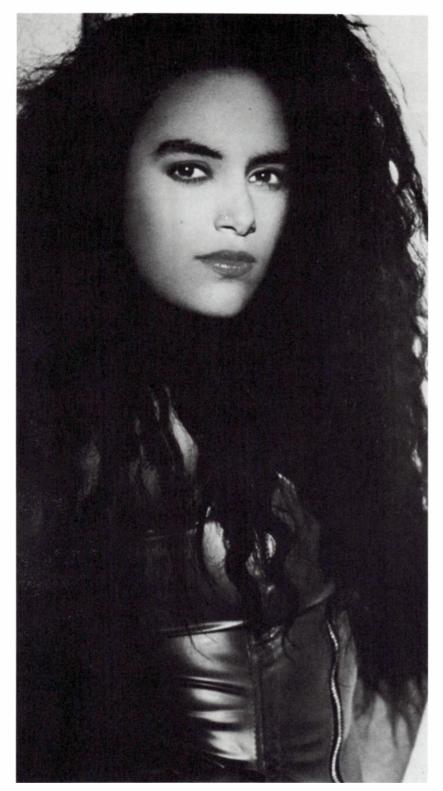

MICHAEL PAOLETTA

MR. FINGERS

"What About This Love" (Alleviated Music/Gherkin 12" ML 2208) Produced by Larry Heard

The new year is upon us and with it comes a new release by the incomparable Mr. Fingers, otherwise known as Larry Heard. 1989 was quite a busy year for this accomplished composer as he worked with Blakk Society, Mondee Oliver, and Lil Louis. His jazzy presence could be felt (and heard) on everything he "touched." I guess you could call it his trademark sound – warm, ethereal, jazzy, and very deep

Penned, produced, and mixed by Larry Heard, "What About This Love" finds Mr. Fingers questioning a current relationship that seems to be quite one-sided. The lyrics are extremely emotional with the second verse starting as follows: "What about my kisses. Did they mean anything to you?" This is dance music that rises above all the rest.

Coupled with smoothly-sung emotive lyrics is the dreamy synthheavy rhythm track. Are those real vibes I hear? This is club music of a high stature and certainly not for everybody. Only serious dance music enthusiasts need apply. 113 BPM. Enjoy!

S.O.S. BAND

their "Diamonds In The Raw" LP. This "classic" intro is quickly followed by much hyped percussion work that really pumps. And when that fierce bassline and keyboard kick in you just know you're in for something special. Something special like additional production and remix by Blaze.

With Blaze's additional work, "Secret Wish" takes on a very contemporary feel. What was once a mediocre LP track is now pumped and ready for serious club play. This is one of those songs that greatly benefits forma remix, especially when it done with such style as Blaze has done.

For kickin' club music you will want to play the 12 inch Club Mix and the fierce (!) Dub. For a more pop appeal you will find the 12 Inch Mix more than appropriate. Radio should definitely investigate this one – are you reading this Mr. Crocker? 105 BPM.

FRIGHTY & COLONEL MITE

"Life (Is What You Make It)" (Profile 12" PRO-7281) Produced by Y & D

Dancehall reggae is crossing over big time as "Life (Is What You Make It)" moves into radio territory (after having seduced New York's clubs last summer via import) and becomes a heavily requested song on two of New York's top radio stations – WBLS and WRKS. And it's no wonder. "Life (Is What You Make It)" sports a heavy duty groove with uplifting harmonies and a reggae rap.

Coming by way of London (and not Jamaica), Frighty & Colonel Mite give us the Englishmen's version of "ragamuffin style" which owes its sound to Kingston, Jamaica, where it is currently the rage. The best part is that none of the sound's buoyant energy was lost in its transcontinental conversion.

The 12" contains four mixes with the standouts being the Vocal and Dub mixes. The U.K. Remixes tend to add one too many samples and added effects for this reviewers taste. Play the Vocal Mix and let the lyrics take you to a higher ground. 98 BPM.

By the way, you may want to play this alongside Foxy Brown's "Sorry (Baby Can I Hold You)" and "Fast Car" as well as the too-good-for-words adaptation of Al B. Sure's "Night And Day" by Wayne Wonder and Brian & Tony Gold.

SYLVESTER

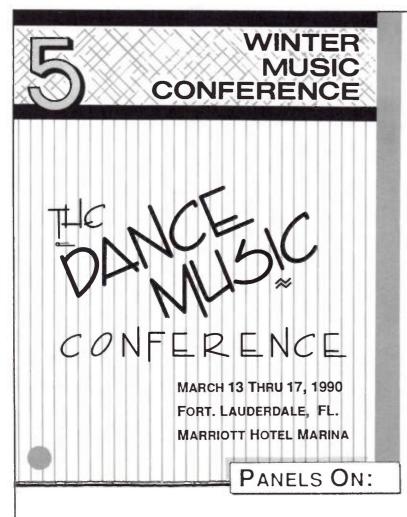
"Immortal" (Megatone Records LP M-1026) Various Producers

One look at the album's cover should be all the enticement you need to check out this latest (and most likely late) offering from the "immortal" Sylvester. The album is a delightful mixture of new songs and remixes of Sylvester classics.

The classics contained on this winning LP include the recent 12" "Rock The Box," the Les Adams House Remix of "Do You Wanna Funk," and the synthy, ethereal Deep House Mix of the Boystown anthem—"Menergy" (actually a song made famous by Patrick Cowley with vocals by Sylvester). Also included is the Underground Remix of the Garage classic "I Need You." (Also, the latest 12" release from the album.) "I Need You" benefits the most from its remix because none of its original R&B intentions have been lost. This song is a true classic! It is R&B/club music at its warmest and greatest.

"I'm Not Ready" with its pounding house rhythms and INXS-like guitar links and the Prelude/West End sounding "Man Enuff" are two songs that Sylvester recorded but never found their way to vinyl. Until now. Ditto for the remaining two songs on the LP. The divinely gospel "How Great Thou Art" and "He'll Understand." Two torch

The spirits of Sylvester definitely continues with the release of "Immortal." Listening to his album is proof positive that there will never be another Sylvester. No one can rise above his soaring vocals. He is truly an inspiration for us all!

KAOMA

"World Beat" (Epic LP E46010)

Produced by Jean-Claude Bonaventure

It looks as if 1990 will be the year that new world beat charm finally gets the welcome that it so deserves. It has been a fairly rocky road for artists like Ofra Haza, The Gipsy Kings, and Les Negresses Vertes to consistently make dents in the American music charts. I feel that all this will certainly change especially with the current state of affairs - walls having tumbled down and nations adopting a more democratic way of life. I hope that the U.S. will not be the only country to miss out on this inspirational and moving musical phenomenon. Remember, there is more to life than house music all night long!

With all this in mind, we can now take a look at the debut album by the multi-national groove band Kaoma entitled "World Beat." Yes, this is the LP that contains "Lambada," the largest selling single in the history of CBS/Europe with sales of over 3,400,000 units. Lambada is also a type of music and a name of a very sensual tango-like dance that originated decades ago in the Bahia region of northeastern Brazil.

Over the years, Lambada began incorporating elements of other Afro-Carribean styles. Most notably zouk, salsa, and reggae while

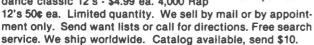

still retaining its original Brazilian flair. This combination of international sounds makes for a very tropical heatwave. Carnaval all year

Do yourself a huge favor and start playing the 12" mix of "Lambada." After that the choice is up to you because the LP is chock full of similar tasty island offerings. My favorites include "Dancando Lambada," "Lamba Caribe," "Jambe Finete (Grille)," and "Salsa Nuestra." C'mon, expand your horizons while educating your audience - that's what music is all about.

MAJOR WEEKS

"Don't Give Up" (Epic 12" 49-713117) Produced by Fede Yon

A pumping rhythm track sets the tone for this track which utilizes the same uplifting qualities as early eighties Prelude product such as "D" Train's "Keep On" and Visual's "Somehow, Someway." Vaughan Mason has supplied the mixes on this scorcher of a 12" and you will definitely feel his presence.

Percussion, synth work, and a pumpin' bassline supply the necessary rhythm while the fab flute (!) solo adds a nice touch. And it is Major Weeks who supplies the fierce unrelenting vocals. Ain't nuthin' but a party y'all.

Club jocks will want to investigate the superb Vocal Version, the "Let it roll" attitude of the Hip House Version, and the a cappella.

Trendy/fashion clubs will play this because of its hyped energy while underground/R&B clubs will not only play it for its energy but for its positive message as well. A must at 120 BPM.

RISSE

"Chain Of Fools" (Atlantic 12" DMD 1442)

Produced by Steve "Silk" Hurley

After months of waiting we finally get a 12" of Risse's "Chain Of Fools." Originally appearing on Steve "Silk" Hurley's "Work It Out Compilation" LP, this track was an immediate stand-out on the LP and club jocks who knew what they were doing immediately began playing it as did Frankie Crocker at WBLS in New York. Risse has injected the Aretha Franklin classic with so much fierceness that even "'Retha couldn't help but admire this remake.

The pumped up attitude of this song can be attributed to "Steve "Silk" Hurley who not only produced it, but arranged, mixed, and edited it. Steve utilizes his now-famous sound that he made popular with Roberta Flack's "Uh-Uh, Ooh-Ooh . . . " It's a sound that works only too well with Risse's powerhouse vocals.

Listen to both the Extended Mix and House Mix – both are quite similar with only minor differences. The choice is yours. Not to be missed is the a cappella which begins like a classic a percapella but after about 2 minutes the rhythm track kicks in for a scorching combination of rhythm and voice. Reminiscent of the LP version of "Back To Life."

If this is not massive then something is definitely wrong in clubhand, 120 BPM,

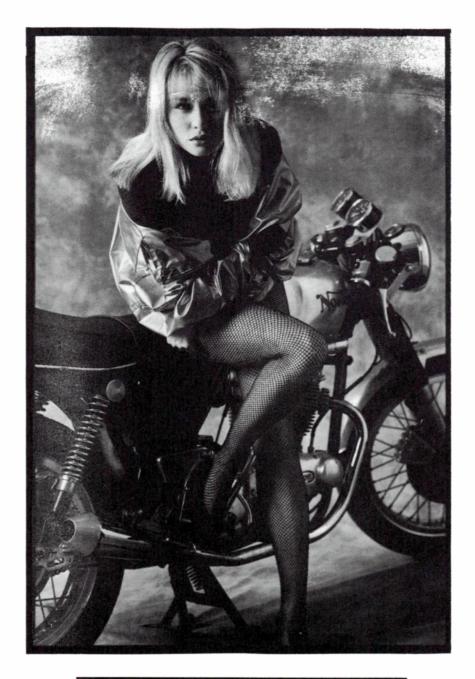
ALYSON WILLIAMS

"I Need Your Lovin'" (OBR/Columbia 12" 44-73142) Produced by Vincent Bell and Russel Simmons

Taken from Alyson's much acclaimed "Raw" LP, "I Need Your Lovin'" gets a total revamping in the form of additional production and remix by Jazzie B and Nellee Hooper. B and Hooper have basically kept Alyson's vocals intact while completely altering the rhythm track - giving the song a more "current" feel yet not making it sound like another Soul II Soul clone. Now that's refreshing.

"I Need Your Lovin'" clocks in at 95 BPM making it perfect for the now-popular downtempo R&B set of the evening. It can be played with any Soul II Soul, and its imitators, as well as with the current crop of dancehall reggae. Be forewarned, however, that it seems much slower than its 95 BPM. So play it accordingly.

Three mixes are provided - 12" Remix, Instrumental, and 7" Edit for your dancing and listening pleasure.

KRIS NEEDS

HIGH PERFORMANCE

"Here's A Party Jam" (Nastymix 12" 76983) Produced by Ron Stewart & High Performance

Following the phenomenal gold-plated success of Sir Mix-a-lot and the impressive label-debuts of Kid Sensation and Whiz-Kid, the Seattle company unleashes what could prove to be one of the big rap outfits of the new decade. The song is full of twists, turns and breaks based on a funky JB-guitar riff. Hovering behind on the hooks is Marvin Gave's "Got To Give It Up" and, later on, Clinton's "Flash Light" bursts in. The rap is spirited and full of fire and wit. Comes in Edit and Club Remix and Dub. Special attention must be paid to the other cut on the flip, "The Hill", a graphic realization of the back cover shot where two armed cops take aim at a street guy ... with his back to them. One of the most effective urban paintings since "The Message" - the rhymes and music will haunt you long after the run-out groove has done its stuff.

ELECTRIBE 101

"Tell Me When The Fever Ended" (Mercury 12" 876 405) Seductive and spacey, this beautiful Produced by Electribe 101. single follows in the footsteps of Coldcut/Lisa Stansfield and the whole new soul music - I'd say real music but what's that mean except an elite new order where only real people are capable of

appreciating it? Anyone - even a gnul - would be able to get off on the singer's creamy tones and the understated brilliance of the backing. The hook is the title and it sticks after one play.

This wonderful song comes in six mixes: Extended Vocal (7.26); After Dark Mix (8.18); 7" (3.52); Yankee Mix (5.17); Ragga Mix (5.06); Instr. (5.34).

LISA STANSFIELD

"All Around The World" (Arista 12" promo) Produced by Devaney & Morris

This gem was number one in the UK and I wouldn't be at all surprised if that success wasn't repeated here. True soul music has been on the rise in that country since the rise of Jazzie's Gang and has obviously intoxicated a mounting audience here.

Lisa Stansfield leapt to prominence with her soaring performance on Coldcut's "People Hold On". It was an obvious move for her to make a solo record and the album, "Affection", is on the way. Meanwhile, her solo debut 12" should cement her name as the new soul voice to emerge in 1990. Her sound is understated and basically low-key, sensual and even beautiful - the latter especially applying to "All Around The World", a devastating ode to lost love and the following mission to find it again. Hauntingly glorious strings of a Chic/Philly mode understate a rivetting vocal performance which is shot with regret and loss but also determination. Meanwhile, the beat is that Soul II Soul slow bounce (doesn't it make those Latin hip-hop drum-machine synth-attacks seem so tinny and dated?).

I don't know what form the eventual product will take cos I got a test pressing but on the European pressing there's a Long Version (plus two other cuts: the sensuous "Wake Up Baby" and more uptempo "The Way You Want It"). The test pressing has two Long Versions, including plus a semi-dub with instrumental bit tacked on (emphasizing a great bass-line, that beat and a curiously scratchy violin). There's also a Radio version.

Whatever form it comes in, this song is a glowing masterpiece, a perfect and promising start to the new decade and what's gonna be a meteoric new career in this country.

APRIL WAYNE

"The Bigger They Come The Harder They Fall" (Enigma 12"75531) Produced by Michael Eckart & Jon St James)

First thing that grabs the attention is the incredible mouth and a lot of other factors relating to this new girl's cover representation . . . and I've had a lot of records come on like this -ensnared by the photo you slip on the vinyl and find yourself with compressed buffalo dung. But April Wayne from Los Angeles is, to coin a phrase, more than a pretty face.

It's a dance cut of simple-but-severe rhythm - the sort of thing that will collectively grab the pants-legs of a bubbling dance-floor and up the energy/ecstasy level several notches by virtue of deft rhythm-instrumental embellishment. April's performance is assured but innocent with a lot of nice little touches and nuances. Getting most DJ-attenton is the Passion Mix (8.30 - title speaks for itself). Other mixes: Big Shot (4.20), Original (4.07) and (wait for it) The Invasion Of The Hippie Zombie Guys (5.08).

Yes there's a lot of young ladies coming out with racy dance-pop stuff. What counts is the floor-rating and if you can also appreciate at home. I wouldn't even say that if this didn't obliterate at least 80 per cent of the like-minded opposition.

MO ARORA

CONCEPT OF ONE feat. TONY MORAN

"Dance With Me" (Cutting 12" CR-234) Produced by Tony Moran

Boy, does Cutting Records have a hot one on their hands. I see this track doing great in the clubs, besides the fact that radio should accept it with open arms. Tony Moran, of The Latin Rascals, brings

READERS COMMENTARY

To The Editor

I grew up with 45's - practically weaned on those seven-inch round pieces of vinyl and styrene. The collection began with The Beatles' "She Loves You" and Ricky Nelson's "The Very Thought Of You", and grew and grew and grew. ... It seemed in 1964 there were more different American owned record labels than models of cars. You couldn't beat the price, either: 59 cents or 3 for \$1.89. The Golden Age of Record Collecting for this collector, with Motown, British Invasion and Surf Music at my fingertips

25 years later, things have become dismal and bleak at best. Credit the 1982 mass introduction of the compact disc and the 1990 premier of digital audio tape as the fatal stab to the heart of the vinvl format. I'm not against advances in the industry. Records have been around for 101 years. Maybe it's time for a change and maybe it's not. I've become incensed with the music industry appearing to be in collusion to eliminate the vinyl format for another more financially lucrative. During 1989 alone. Capitol. A&M and Motown have ceased production of singles, with no albums being released by A&M (now a German-owned operation) after December 31, 1989. WEA (Warner/Elektra/Atlantic) are planning to phase out singles by the end of this decade. Already Columbian, MCA and Polydor are limiting vinyl 7" releases, shifting to cassette singles ("cassingles") – the latest bogus invention since 8-track tapes and quadraphonic sound.

I like (note I said "like" not "love") CD's. I have hundreds of them. However, I realize that music by many local and regional artists will never be transferred to the CD format. Just walk into your favorite record store. er, music store and ask for the Magnificent Men or Root Boy Slim albums on CD. Or how about the "B" or flip sides of many of your favorite artist's singles that were never released on an album? Chances are these musical gems will get lost in the shuffle, as well as the garage bands trying to get that badly needed first exposure. Sounds like the American people could become mandated by what the label wants them to hear

Ten years ago, the record industry was crying the blues. Sales were off, volume was dismal. Disco music was around,too. Now the picture has changed. Profits are better than they have been for quite some time. However the industry has abandoned or completely neglected three important end product users: Vending companies, collectors, and mobile disc jockeys. I feel it's time for the record companies to show these specific consumer groups that they are caring for their needs

Vending companies operate hundreds of jukeboxes in all types of locations. Many have sizable investments in their equipment and may find it financially unfeasible to re-invest in pricey CD jukeboxes to replace current installations. Facilities that own their own equipment may find it a hard nut to swallow as well. In the end, the industry ends up the loser. Let me explain: John Doe sees the latest video by XYZ groups on MTV (they now make and break the hits, not radio). He visits his corner bar for a brew and conversation with friends. After putting a quarter in the jukebox, he learns his favorite tune is nowhere to be found. He hits the coin return button. Loss of revenue for the coin op vendor, loss of revenue to the record company and no royalties to the artist – a three way losing streak. A scene that is likely to be repeated over and over all across the country for lack of 7" vinyl product. Record collectors are a small but growing number of people in the country who collect artists and their music in vinyl format. Many have been storing away music for 40, 50 or even 60 years. Some even collect those vintage turn-of-the-century recordings. A good number of them keep up to date with the latest releases. However, if vinyl isn't available, many will refuse to purchase the release in an alternate format. Some serious collectors are stopping their collections at 1989 - The year vinyl started to die. Again, more loss of revenue, etc. Another vital end user group being brushed under the carpet are the mobile disc jockeys across the country that perform at a host of functions, including parties, wedding receptions, class reunions and other events. Due to the nature of their events and occasional tight schedule, many need to play a variety of music with each selection under five minutes. The extended play 12" singles are great for club use, and sometimes feature a radio edit or 7" mix (even though a 7" version may not exist, depending on the label). However, the 12" single takes up a lot more room, creating extra, unnecessary baggage. 7" vinyl unavailability creates a loss of revenue.

There is a market in the USA for 7" 45 and 12" LP vinyl product. I feel confident that a particular single or album that becomes a hit should be able to generate 20,000 units in sales. For my money that seems like a decent amount to warrant pressing and distribution in the vinyl format.

Now that I've presented the problem and the need, it's time to present viable possible solutions. A few come to mind, but most call upon the combined cooperation of record labels.

I would be willing, as I believe others would, to subscribe to a promotional singles and/or album service from major labels at a nominal fee. Better yet, a pool of the hottest material from each of the labels through one central clearing house would be the most efficient.

Another idea for the labels to consider (if they don't want to handle it themselves), is to lease vinyl rights of music that reaches the Top 20 to companies that may be willing to press it (Rhino, Collectibles, Charly, Eric, etc.). Another possibility is to have the labels form a combined label that exists for the sole purpose of distribution of their biggest material in vinyl format. These solutions are all viable if the record companies are willing to meet and master the challenge. The demand is there. Now it's time to manufacture the supply.

Most music chains encourage feedback from their customers of how they can improve their efforts. We need to write to their CEO's and let them know how we feel about the mass exodus of vinyl. Public outcry might do some good. It did for the "Cagney and Lacey" show. Perhaps it can work again. And while you're writing those letters, why not send some to the record labels that have already begun to dump vinyl. My letter is already in the mail.

"Energy Dawn" (XL Records UK XLEP-103)
Produced by Frankie "Bones" and Tommy Musto

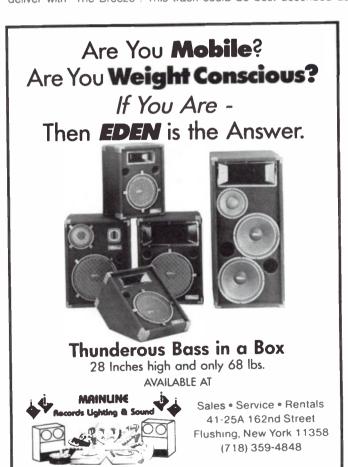
As I hop from store to store, I tend to find a great deal of inferior product and when I come across this EP, it gave me the immediate feeling that someone out there actually knows what they're doing. There are a total of six cuts on this house EP, every one having their own distinct flavor. Though all these are sample tracks, they seem to go much further by using a lot of clean samples and creativity. The Flowmasters have reached a higher step in sampling where one questions if the track is all samples or original material. The simple fact is that this EP is HOT! A MUST for anyone who's a product of the sample generation or anyone who just appreciates good product!

TWO WITHOUT HATS

"The Breeze" (MicMac 12" 534)

Produced by Danny "Holiday" Vargas and Victor Vargas

With the overwhelming success of "Try Yaz" under their belts, much is to be expected from Two Without Hats, and believe me they deliver with "The Breeze". This track could be best described as



hyped-up techno-flavored sample track with vocals. There are seven versions in all, and every one's a scorcher. "Try Yazz" brought us the every popular 'Esta Loca...' club chant, and if that wasn't enough, "The Breeze" does the same, with a new chant, having to do with old Latin saying (You'll have to translate this one for yourself).

I've been playing this for a while and it's been my secret weapon. Now the secret's out and, soon enough, "The Breeze" will hit you, but its effects will be more like a tornado. BUY IT NOW!!!

PAULA BRION

"That's How He Stole My Love From You" (Tommy Boy 12" 946) Produced by Ronald Burrell

Tommy Boy is kicking off their second decade in style with a strong dance **song** from Paula Brion ("Excuses"). "That's How He Stole My Love From You" is the kind of heartfelt, well-sung dance record people are always saying they want. Well, put your turntable where your mouth is and play this.

Lack of mixes is no excuse. There are five to choose from, courtesy of Justin Strauss and Hugo Dwyer, and they waste no vinyl in the process. The City View is the more traditional dance mix and covers the basics well for DJ's and dancers. For a more progressive trip, flip over and mix into the "Warehouse Treatment." A radio version is also included, which must become standard issue on all 12 inches in 1990 out of fairness to DJ's and other vinyl junkies who will have no other way to get the 45 version of most songs. Record companies note: you'd be surprised how often the radio version for a dance record comes in handy for a DJ.

"That's How He Stole My Love . . ." follows in the "You Used to Hold Me"/"Thanks To You" school of "girl tells off guy," and Paula Brion's sassy but not overwrought style comes off appropriately as "Loleatta Lite." It's pop-soul with a sense of fun but serious attitudes as well. The vocals wail at times, and the rap's surprisingly good. The beat is a modified house/garage style that doesn't scream "house" but would work well as an easy chance of pace in a house-dominated program. Everyone likes to hear a real song now and then, 123 BPM.

2 IN A ROOM

"Do What You Want" (Cutting 12" 232)

Produced by Roger Pauletta, Dose and Aldo Marin

This is simply the liveliest, most distinctive hip house record of the young year. I hesitate even to call it hip house, because that name recalls stereotypes and formulas that this record smashes. The beat, rap style and structure of the song is all its own, and they combine in an avalanche of energy that's sure to drive this song toward the top of the charts.

Pity there's only two mixes, but that was plenty for me to have a great time playing with this record. The "12 Inch Remix" and "Deep Dub" have what it takes to make the record work in a variety of formats. "Do What You Want" is one of those great songs that sounds similar enough to mix with everything, but different enough to stand out. Mixes are by Chep Nunez, Aldo Marin, Roger Pauletta, Dose and Louis Flores. On the flip side is the Todd Terry-ish "Take Me Away" (124), a strong cut with good Junior Vasquez and Louie Vega/ Aldo Marin mixes. Some may even prefer it to "Do What You Want." 122 BPM.

JULIAN "JUMPIN" PEREZ

"Let's Work" (DJ Int'l 12" 955)

Produced by Julian "Jumpin'" Perez and Craig S. Loftus

It's been a pleasure to watch house music grow from a few strange independent-label Chicago records to become the biggest dance club sound of the late eighties. House music has brought the DJ to the forefront as artist and producer more than any other type of dance music, and it's been gratifying to see so many of the DJ's

SOUNDS OF THE SOUTH

hat a chilling way to end an old year and start a new one; freezing weather all the way to Miami and snow flurries all over Florida. If you thought it was cold last year at the Winter Music Conference then you should have been here for this! By comparison, the music scene remained pretty hot, althought not as busy as most of the year. Still, there's more than enough to get your attention

Perhaps the biggest release in early 1990 is "The Miami Bass Express" by that very talented group Various Artists (Pandisc LP 8806 (305) 948-6466). This compilation LP has six new cutz, one previous release and one remix from another album. The Maggotron **Crushing Crew** is back with more classic boom and those trademark high and low vocals on the title cut (4:58) and "Bass It To The Max" (5:45). Maggozulu Too returns with "Mix It Up" (4:17) and a remix of "Sweat" by Renard With No Regard (4:33), DXJ, who wrote most of the album tracks, is paired with **Smokey Dee** on "My Bass Weighs" A Ton" (4:42) and with The Miami Bass Mob on "Do You Want To Rock?" (4:40). Two new groups wrap up this Miami Bass monster LP. The Latin Maggots bring us "Uh, Uno, Tres, Four" (4:54) and DJ Fingerz and Cutmaster Knobs ask "Are You With Me Out There?" (4:52). The last cut is undeniably the most adventurous (and unusual) of the whole lot, but there's not really a bad tune in the bunch. If you're into the Miami Bass scene, you'll eat this one up.

With the success of "Roll It Up" in hand, **Success-N-Effect** is back with their first LP, titled "In Tha Hood" (On Top LP 9002; (305) 633-4322). There are nine strong rap cuts including: "Roll It Up" (6:23), "Freeze" (3:58), "Non-Stop" (4:24), "N-2-Deep" (3:42) and "In The Hood" (4:14). There's some strong beats and powerful scratchin' throughout, along with a range of tales direct from the streets. Some of the messages are pretty strong stuff, too, but this album is not all gloom and doom. Good effort from this talented duo. Be sure and check it out.

Ace Records has released a big record from **Catch - 22**. "Boogie Down (Do It)" is backed with "Shake It Up" (Ace 12" 001 (407) 622-1486) to make a double-sided smash. Catch - 22 is made up of Aaron Ray and the multi-talented Lon Alonzo of **Dynamix II**. "Boogie Down (Do It)" is a powerful dance floor packer filled with potent beats, sassy scratchin', and numerous samples (120 BPM); a sparse rap completes this catchy hip-house cut. "Shake It Up" is more of the same (although not a "sound-alike" at all). The numerous mix effects are very special and the sparse rap is better than the other side. Play them both to hear which you prefer – both sides are recommended.

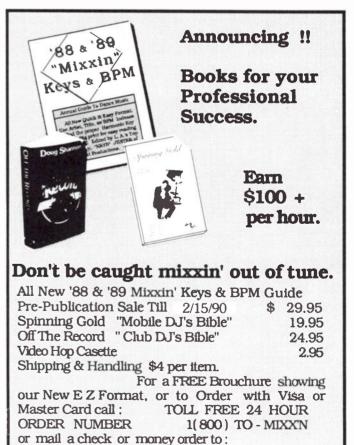
I'm not sure y'all are ready for this one, but here it is. It's a cover of the **Diana Ross and the Supremes** classic "Someday We'll Be Together" by **Wanda Williams** (Wandaland 12" 1462 (305) 691-0107). It comes complete with radio mix (5:57), pop version (5:00), house mix (!!) (4:38), club mix (3:08) and something called Nostalgia (3:08). Actually, this is pretty wandaful (sic). Wanda could fool a host of listeners; she sounds oh-so much like Diana. The mixes themselves vary from very true to very up-dated. The female background vocals are punched up with a vocoder that really does add a lot. OK, so the house mix isn't really New York House, but it's a good mix. In fact, the club mix is more house than the house mix. It really doesn't matter . . . if you like this tune then you should have this single. (All right all you "performers" doing Diana: time to put away that old scratched-up copy and try this new one out!) Very nice job all around.

For all you fans of the "Miami Sound" there's **Alex Crary** with "Give It All" (Dial 12" 005). It has the prerequisite multiple percolating

keyboards, Latin feel and light female vocals. It's a little bit fast (124 BPM), but I'm sure you can handle it. There's a club mix (5:15), bonus beats (2:26), radio edit and instrumental (5:10). The club mix comes with a strong break, but I prefer mixing the bonus beats and the instrumental. (In fact, the instrumental has a real electronic "ITALO" feel to it that can really stand alone.) Nice special edit effects also included. Certainly worth more than a listen.

Also, from over at Dial Records comes **Don't Know Yet**with "What Time Is It?" (Dial 12" 006). This is not Miami at all!! This is good, solid house music with just a scattering of samples and effects over strong keyboards and very powerful beats. In fact, it's borderline "industrial"-style music. Very different for S. florida and very fresh indeed. There's a bunch of mixes including a club mix (7:50), a radio mix, a bass mix (5:16) and a dub mix (5:16). I don't know how this will be received in Miami, but it should be a monster in New York where house is king. Should be huge in alternative venues everywhere as well. (124 BPM) An excellent offering . . .highly recommended.

Meanwhile, up in West Palm Beach, Mas-Jam Productions has been turning out a pile of 12" vinyl. Recent releases include **T. Boyz D.L.** with "Jump On It" (Cut It Up Def 12" 504), **Joey C.** with "All I'm Asking" (Jam On It 12" 1003) and **D.J. Jealous J. & D.J. Jock D.** with "Party Time" backed with "D.J. Wars" (Cut It Up Def 12" 505 (407) 588-0766). The last record seems to be headed for two-sided success. "Party Time" is a fast-paced Florida style rap delivered (Continued on page 20)

The Jive Bunny rehash of granma's favorite toe tappers. Next most requested was Billy Joel's "We Didn't Start The Fire"... Was there a 12"? Can I do the "aerobic" remix? Would someone send me their 12"? Send it to Miss Kimberly, c/o Graeber's, 203 Main St., Boise, Idaho 83702, and I will send you my life story in 28 volumes ... PLUS ... my granmas's recipe for "Heavenly Hash".

Would you like to receive a funny piece of paper every month? I'll send you my Top 20 if you'll send me yours! Aerobic lists and record pool charts are nice to get. The mail man rides by here at least once a week. If the horse makes it through the nuclear waste sites. Had your teeth X-rayed lately? Just try and avoid it!

Mentioned here a few columns ago was the 12" of "Stomp" by Kyze on Warner Brothers records. The lyric "Move, jump, jack your body" caught quickly in class. Try it for a warm-up and brew a *lot* of excitement! To Jack: lean from one foot to another, legs are wide apart, relax your arms and shimmy your shoulders side to side. Kyze really talks to your body! Gradually work into some placement with the arms: shoulders stay low during the warm-up. Continue to get on down with the truly funky "Pump It Hottie" by Redhead Kingpin on Virgin records. You'll love the busy little Kraftwerk riff simmering in the background. (125 BPM) A must for low-impactFollow with a new Dance Oriented Rock record called "Is That What You Call Love? (126) on MCA by Lattanzi. Body-firming beats and a British-sounding vocal work well for traveling moves, arms go up and stay strong.

Increase tempo and heartrates with a HiNRG cut off of Sylvester's new LP "Immortal", lovingly brought to you by Megatone records in the heart of San Francisco. "I'm Not Ready" (136) is a new release produced and mixed by the multi-talented David Diebold. There are many good cuts on the album. "Rock the Box" is an energetic 120 beats per minute, rock it for four counts, then work power lunges halftime. "Menergy" is given a "Deep House mix"; dynamite used with a 1-2-3 type polka step. Many aerobic instructors do not know that Sylvester died of an AIDS related illness on December 16, 1988. Sylvester has been the most popular artist in the aerobic world since the beginning of Dance/Exercise. Every convention of seminar I've ever been to included some of his music. It is so sad and ironic that someone who inspired so much exercise movement had to die so young. Sylvester left us one last positive message on this his last album. He sings "How Great Though Art" with the love and emotion, positively identifying Sylvester as one of God's chosen ones

From "Rock the Box", up your tempo and change your emphasis to DOR with Peter Murphy's KILLER 12" on RCA called "The Line Between the Devil's Teeth" (148 BPM). Don't let a few little guitar chords scare you, this song is serious aerobic music. Best for your serious Hi-intensity crowd, you know, the ones who wouldn't smile even if Arsenio Hall was teaching class . . Peter Murphy's new song does not come under the category of what I call "cute fluff", there are no "La La La's" for the housewives whose couch-potato husbands send them off to get them out of the house. The lyric and content are for your thinkers. Give them high-kicks (as long as their hip stays down) or run in place for three counts, plant both feet on "4", and do 5-6-7-8 in a half-jack. Dead or Alive's new single is picking up momentum around the nation. "Baby Don't Say Goodbye" boasts that sneering voice of the bangingest, clangingest beat that makes you want to boogie all around. That's on Epic and it's 124 BPM's.

People in class were quick to catch on to the Technotronic craze.

"Pump Up The Jam" has been a favorite for low-impact and concentrated floorwork sets. If the exterior walls of your exercise room have dancebars around them, take advantage of them by laying on your back, buttocks close to the wall, legs crossed and up on the bar, and work external obliques (side stomach muscles), lifting opposite elbow to opposite knee. Work one side at a time for 10 counts and switch to the other side. This kind of exercise gives definition to the waist area, slimming and toning the sides. Also on the floorwork, "Let the Rhythm Pump" (Doug Lazy does the honors, 122 BPM). Laying on your side, bend the top knee and lift the knee for inner thigh strengthening. Ten City's "Suspicious" provides a smooth groove for low-impact with weights.

"Tribal Rites" is a new book by David Diebold that chronicles the "memories of love, stars, and parties in the city by the bay". There are many interesting interviews and rare photos that brought back good memories of people and places. David has done a fine job of compiling a mass of information. It's easy reading and "tons of fun", so look for it at your book or record store.

Nine Inch Nails' debut "Pretty Hate Machine" is a wonderful enmeshment of industrial dance rock. A highlight of the album, "Something I Can Never Have" is a beautifully haunting piano ballad which evokes similar sentiments as Kate Bush's "The Sensual World." "Pretty Hate Machine" production, etc. credits read as a who's who (Adrian Sherwood, Flood, Keith LeBlanc, John Fryer) and I wish it had been in my Top 3 as it was nearly all I listened to over the holidays. The same will be done with the Cabaret Voltaire catalogue. Marc Almond appears to have switched labels in the UK and has an album imminent on Rough Trade though I don't know where that leaves him in the states. More on that to come later. **Loop**'s been in the studio with producer Paul Kendall (Wire, AC Marias . . .) for a long player through Beggars Banquet.

UK house hero **Baby Ford** sees his American full length debut this month certain to make him a pop legend. Finally, finally, **Renegade Soundwave**'s US release is here. "Biting My Nails" is the 12: on Enigma with some brand new mixes. On the B side are two tracks that are creating an import stir: "Phantom" and "Ozone Breakdown." **Nick Cave** is scheduled to release a new one in a couple of months. This will be, in my opinion, the "Ocean Rain" of his career. **Ofra Haza**'s second Warner Bros. album (not the second of her career, by any means) will be hitting the shops soon. Let's hope it outdoes "Shaday" proving that album's success was not a flash in the pan. **New Order**'s **Peter Hook** has embarked on a solo career

with a record just out and a tour in the works. Bernard Summer (also of New Order), Johnny Marr, ABC's David Palmer and Neil Tennant (of Pet Shop Boys) have done a collaboration under the name Electronic out on Factory in the UK with an American deal for an LP in the works. The Pixies was '89's Next Big Thing. Who will it be this year? Possible candidates are 808 State and Inspiral Carpets, both of whom now have US deals.

Back to Skinny Puppy for a minute . . . I think this will be the year for bands like Skinny Puppy and Voivod (two completely different genres) to break out of their pigeon hole and reach the same ground as, say, Metallica. With what's going on musically with styles becoming somewhat interchangeable, I sincerely hope prejudices, preconceived notions, and limiting categorizations will blur. Further on Puppy . . . The guys are doing a – get this -- house record which features vocals by none other than **Neubauten**'s **Blixa Bargeld**. Can't wait to hear that one!

Look for the following to merely scratch the surface of upcoming tours: Mighty Lemon Drops, Jesus and Mary Chain, Primitives, Erasure, Wire, Nitzer Ebb, Depeche Mode, Caterwaul, Meat Beat Manifesto, Peter Murphy, Frontline Assembly, Waterboys, Violent Femmes, Ian McCulloch, and Nina Hagen.

I respect make their mark on vinyl.

At the top of that list is Chicago radio and club hot-mixer Julian Perez. It is strictly a matter of opinion who is "the hottest DJ" in any market. But certainly "hot" means constantly working and keeping up with the newest music and mixing techniques, and not resting on your laurels just because you've been in the business for a while. As a live DJ, Julian Perez doesn't rely on hype of his name, but truly spins a hot show, with lightning fast hands and cutting-edge programming few can match. And live is what really counts.

Julian's new record, "Let's Work" is rocking the clubs of Chicago now, even on test pressing. There's a nice rap from Brother D. ("Everybody Dance"), energetic mixes from Mike "Hitman" Wilson, Joe Smooth, Julian and Craig Loftis, and of course, good intros/breaks. I can't see this record failing to ignite any crowd that's open to hip house, and it is exploding everywhere I've seen it played. Don't waste any time getting on this one. 126 BPM.

"It's About Time" (Underground 12" 132)

Indeed, "it's about time" Martin "the Boogie Man" Luna cut that hit house record we all knew he had in there somewhere. One of the more colorful personalities ont he Chicago scene, Martin pulled together some of the top Chicago hip-housers to throw down the most infectious house riff to be heard in the clubs these days.

"It's About Time" contains strong mixes from Fast Eddie, Tyree, Julian Perez, Craig Loftis and Martin himself. Each mix bears the distinctive sound of its namesake, and some DJ's familiar with Chicago records should be able to pick their favorite mix right off

Georgie Porgie had a dance hit with "Baby Come Back" a while ago, but has been off the charts for a while. Now he's back with an interesting house-based record that mixes in pop, latin, acid and some unique elements. "Girl You Are The One" has a melody that sticks with you and some fine mixes for DJ's and dancers.

The mixes are by several Chicago All-Star DJ/producers and they live up to their bylines. The "Bad Boy Bill" mix has an acid house feeling, with a great intro and break. The subsequent "Ralphi Rosario" mix is equally mix-friendly, with a smoother and bassier feel. Flip over for a crisp, Ricky Lenior/Larry Thompson dub, the lively, hip "Porgie's Mix" and a radio version. The mixes all sound different, while maintaining the spirit of the song.

It's rare when a dance/house record has a truly pop-worthy melody, but I feel "Girl You Are The One" has the hooks to take off like the Stevie B records. Don't mix out on this one. 124 BPM.

Take M.C. Hammer's "Pump It Up," put girl vocals on it, add a little extra California boom to it and you've got Oaktown 3.5.7's "Juicy Gotcha Crazy." But what you've also got is a smash that can easily blow all the fuses on your amps and speakers. The girlz take their usually tough rap deliveries and blend them with soulful harmonies that give this boomin' hip-hop track more of an R&B feel that's perfect for urban radio. Northern California has already welcomed this song and the rest of nation should not be far behind.

Three versions of the song are included with the vocal mix being top choice for mixing purposes. The album version takes on more of a guitar edge while eliminating some of the boom.

alling all Lime fanatics! There is some good news and there is some bad news. The good news is that Denis LePage and company are back in the studio finishing up a brand new Lime album, probably their best effort to date if early samplings are any indication. The bad news is that you're going to have to wait until March to hear it for yourselves. I spoke with Denis recently in the studio in Montreal where he is finishing up the as-vet-untitled new collection for Unidisc and found him to be extremely enthusiastic, not only about his new project but about the dance music industry in general. He lives in Montreal with his wife (and singing partner) Denise and their young daughter. Claudine and he keeps abreast of the club scene from there. "I am very fond of Prince and of the music like "Pump Up The Jam" by Technotronic that utilizes the percussion style of the 70's." We can look forward to a sampling of Denis' own retro-progressive interpretation of 90's-styled Hi-NRG in the weeks to come when the first 12" crosses the border from up north, though they are having trouble selecting one track over another as this new package is loaded with potential chart-toppers. "My Precious Love" and "Pick Me Up" are among the tracks being considered for the initial push and either would do nicely. This album marks a return to the energetic style that made them Hi-NRG superstars in the early 80's and Denis says that it's his best work since his personal favorite album, "Unexpected Lovers." When asked about his absence from the scene in the last few years he said that he and Denise just needed a moment to breathe after completing the "Brand New Day" and "LePage" projects back-to-back in 1987, neither of which really took off. His return to Hi-NRG is welcome and as soon as the album is out, the LePages

American Releases: "You'll Never Stop Me From Loving You" by Sonia is all set to finally make its U.S. debut on Chrysalis, though it's been a Hi-NRG favorite since last summer. The tentative release date is February 12 and it's already all over New York radio. Epic has decided to release "Love Pains" instead of "Don't Drop Bombs" from Liza Minnelli's excellent "Results" LP and it should ship shortly, along with a downbeat remix of "I Called You" by Lil Louis on or about the same date (Feb. 1). Epic's also got one of the hottest sleaze records around in "Tainted Love," the very popular Impedance single that first gained momentum here as an import. Tina Turner's "Steamy Windows" (Capitol/130 BPM) is off to a fast start with NRG iocks as are labelmates Technotronic whose new one, "Get Up" is backed with the wonderful David Morales remix of "Pump Up The Jam." I've had lots of inquiries from overseas about the phenomenally fun remake of "Baby, Now That I've Found You" by David Vella on Gimme A Beat Records. David's one of Hi-NRG's biggest supporters (he organized the first annual Hi-NRG awards last summer with David Diebold and Casey Jones) and deserves our support on this latest project, an energetic reworking of the classic Foundations song. There's no word yet on whether or not A&M or Vendetta will pick up Leigh Jaeger's wildly popular "Johnny & Mary" but I expect one will move shortly. From Atlanta, Aron Seigel's favorite, Jane Doe, has a new one coming out on the Hot Hits label called "Everything Is Music" that's awesome, particularly the so-called "house" mix, which has more energy than any record I've heard recently.

Arista's just released **Lisa Stansfield**'s #1 U.K. hit. "All Around The World," which is getting a lot of morning music play here in the states. From Megatone, talented **Nick John** gets back behind the mike for the first time in ages with the rousing, anthemic "We Stand Together" (130). It's a powerful record that sounds like a natural for multi-format radio and club play due out in the first two weeks of February. Labelmate **David Diebold** enlisted vocal support from **Ernest Kohl** (this boy is everywhere!) on a hot new duet called "Dance Right Back Into Heaven" (134) to be featured on his forthcoming

Those anxious for a taste of the latest Diebold project should check out the new issue of Tampa-based **T-Dance** remix service which next month is featuring his track "Last Word" as well as a new mix of **Hazell Dean**'s "Ain't Nothing Like the Real Thing." Call them at (813) 884-0431 for more information.

While we're at it, let's catch up on the rest of the remix services. Wayne West's Texas-based NRG Mixx offers a hot Dead or Alive medley on their forthcoming issue, along with an energetic remix of "Tonight" by Alta Dustin and a Taylor Dayne hits mix. You can reach them at (214) 879-5645, where Wayne is already busy working on the next program, which may include the hot "Love Gets Ready" by Jennifer Rush if the legalities can be worked out. Rhythm Stick's "Holidaze" issue features some dazzling remixes from Steve Bourasa ("Don't Drop Bombs" & "Pump Up The Jam"), Glen Cattanach (Akasa's largely overlooked "One Night In My Life") and Mark Watkins (the definitive remix of "The Sun Rising" by the Beloved). Check in with them at (415) 864-8815 for more details.

Some big changes are occurring over at **Disconet**, though vinyl still figures in their plans. All I can tell you at this point is that the new issue will feature the traditional year-end medley with lots of special edits, overdubs and some spectacular new material. They won "Remix Service Of The Year" honors last time out and Steven and company are out to surpass themselves in the new decade. **Prime Cuts** (404-388-7500) also recently delivered a superior set that includes "Sugar Daddy" by the **Thompson Twins** and **Nancy Martinez**'s "You Got Me On Fire" along with some nice remixes of current radio records by Seduction, Milli Vanilli and the like. And now, on to Europe!

U.K. Imports: From Debut Records we've got a surprisingly NRGetic remake of Silvetti's "Spring Rain," beautifully done by Rico (125) while the Passion label offers up a new interpretation of "Sweet Dreams" by Revenge featuring Billy (126). It's hard to categorize "Boy" by Soho (122) which might by best described as a Euro-house/Hi-NRG hybrid. Progressive jocks might also enjoy "Energy Dawn" by the Flowmasters (XL/123), though they are already certifiably crazy about Electronic's "Getting Away With It" (Factory/128) the super-group single featuring alumni from The Smiths, New Order and the Pet Shop Boys.

The flip side of **Kylie Minogue**'s new PWL 12", "Tears On My Pillow" features a brand new Stock Aitken Waterman production called "We Know The Meaning Of Love," Mixed by Dave Ford. While the A side is a ballad, "Meaning Of Love" is a terrific dance track. **Jimmy Somerville** follows "Adieu" with a killer version of **Sylvester**'s "You Make Me Feel (Mighty Real)" on London/UK and I probably would've labeled it the best remake so far in the decade if it hadn't appeared at the same time as "Instant Replay" by **Yell!** What a monster this is going to be in it's newest interpretation, especially with the powerful "Rebound Club" mix supplied by PWL's mixmaster Pete Hammond. Run, don't walk to your favorite outlet and grab a copy of this Fanfare label release before they're all snapped up!

From the Nightmare family of labels, we have a whole slew of exciting new productions from lan Levine's Motor City label, starting with the lovely "Extraordinary Girl" by Frankie Gaye. It's a 122 BPM bouncing beauty that is already garnering club reports from the East Coast. During the next few weeks, watch for "No More Broken Hearts" (129), a new one from Sisters Love reminiscent of Diana Ross' "The Boss" as well, a super-fast (180!) retro record from the Marvelettes called "Holding On With Both Hands." In the traditional Hi-NRG vein, Ian's offering Claudette Robinson's "Hurry Up" (134), an emotional slow-intro diva record along with "Starting All Over Again," an ass-kicking 132 BPM potential smash featuring the five octave voice of lovely Liz Lands. On the lower end of the BPM scale, Motor City's got some pretty new entries for the morning music market including the Monitors' "Standing Still" (106), "Footsteps Following Me" by Frances Nero (105) and David Ruffin's "Hurt The One You Love" (112), which was actually recorded quite a while ago (before Ruffin's widely publicized arrest) though now it's been re-done totally with all new instrumentation surrounding the original vocal track courtesy of Levine and company. Of the last three, lan himself is particulary fond of the Monitors' record, which he describes as centered around (Continued on page 26)

over familiar beats and samples ("Party People" and **Planet Patrol** to mention a couple); two versions provided. "D.J. Wars" is centered on the scratching and mixing talents of the two DJ's involved and it's pretty impressive . . .would like to see it done live. Why not give these guys a call to check out more of their stuff!

Neverstop Productions, Eric Griffin and Missy Mist are back with "Gettin' Bass" backed with "Let The Good Times Roll" (Neverstop 12" 1111, but call Pandisc (305) 948-6466). This is an extra strong new offering from this popular Miami rapper. Her delivery is strong and clear and the bass is really pumping. Both tunes are supplemented with powerful "dancetramental" versions that should send both cuts straight to a host of dancefloors. The mixing and editing talents of Eric Griffin are considerable. This is one of the best rap records released in S. Florida in some time and the instrumental versions increase the appeal many-fold. You'll definitely want two copies. Be sure to check this one out!



IMPORTS

JARED LEWIS HOFFMAN

A GUY CALLED GERALD "F/X" (12" Subscape UK)

The magic didn't stop with "Voodoo Ray." A Guy Called Gerald is back with a vengeance. A five second blast of the massive, gurgling, synth bass that kicks "F/X" into overdrive will make a believer out of you. "Voodoo Ray" earned its permanent spot among the club classics with a deep, hypnotic groove quite unusual for the Techno genre.

Now for the encore. "F/X" reveals Gerald at his peak, pushing the groove deeper still. Gerald pumps the bass into "F/X" with a Moroder-like intensity that provides an instant contrast to "Voodoo Ray's" simple, bass driven melody. The percussion is stronger and sharper providing an extra kick that belies the fact that at 117 BPM, "F/X" clocks in a few ticks slower than "Voodoo Ray." Seductively simple, "F/Z" spins its web with a Bolero-like intensity. Always building and cycling, but never resolving, "F/X" generates the kind of tension that can make a dancefloor scream.

The Subscape label is Gerald's own label, as negotiated in his signing to CBS/UK. So far the projects under way all bear his unique stamp. "F/X" is also being distributed as part of a cassette soundtrack for a book about life in the Manchester underground. The "F/X" sleeve is a collector's item that few sane record companies would attempt. Check it out for yourself.

ART FREEDLAND

ELECTRONIC

"Getting Away With It" (Factory 12" England)

Positively brilliant collaboration between vocalists Bernard Sumner (New Order) and Neil Tennant (Pet Shop Boys) leads us into an era of music which will reach new creative boundaries whose limitations are only confined to one's musical imagination. We've seen in the past that collaborative efforts which feature already-established artists have proved fruitful in developing new sounds. These all too infrequent meetings of musical minds have made past efforts by such groups as M/A/R/R/S, Tom Tom Club, and 2 Men and A Drum Machine classic offerings.

"Getting Away With It" features a stellar roster of notable artists under the moniker "Electronic". Fave guitarist Johnny Marr backs the vocal dream team of Bernard and Neil while the rhythm is provided by drummer David Palmer. The 136 BPM track exhibits a tenor which weaves Neil's flowing orchestration-associated with his P.S.B. work – and Bernard's unique New Order sound. Vocally Bernard takes a more upfront role in the track, while Neil's splendid backing harmonizes wonderfully with the hook-ridden melody. Every aspect of this production is infectious, from the pulsating bassline to the Anne Dudley string arrangement.

Two pressings are presently available on import . . . the original Extended Mix, which I prefer because of its livelier, more pop/NRG approach, or the heavily progressive Electromix pressing, which probably serves fiercer club situations. Either way "Getting Away with It" is a MONSTER release which can find a home in ANY club format. It's that good!

JIMMY SOMERVILLE

"You Make Me Feel (Mighty Real)" (London/ffrr 12" England)

Jimmy serves another track for the boystown crowd with this electro-synth interpretation of Sylvester's classic. Probably tampering

with such a holy classic of the NRG genre could be considered blasphemous, if done by any other artist besides Jimmy. In any case, this version is more an interpretation of "You Make Me Feel . . ." than a measure for measure cover. The production is totally synthoriented, much in the same vein as Zino's cover of "Lovin' Is Really My Game", though the B-sided original mix presents us with an entire different pop feel. Jimmy delivers the lyrics in an interesting rhythmic meter which at times verges on soul, all the while heavily processed with echo. Surely the 129 BPM-tempoed production will make its way on to NRG dancefloors but aerobics instructors should take note of its potential for their classes.

GAIL ROBINSON

"Bust Your Body" (NBS Records 12" Belgium)

Will this be the next "Pump Up The Jam" from Belgium? Time will tell...but this Hip-house track from Gail Robinson is garnering attention as a real solid single that introduces some New Beat nuances to the thriving Hip-House sound. The lyrics, which aren't overly catchy, do provide listeners with enuff hook to make the track memorable. Gail works the track with a steady rhythmic fervor which is a key ingredient to any hip-house success. Lacking some of the punch of "Pump Up The Jam", I would consider this track a solid effort with not quite enough production power behind it to make it a real heavyweight track. 126 BPM.

STUPID DEF

o we're in the 90s and I live in hope that Rap's second full decade as vital musical force drops the negative aspects of the 80s and realizes the amazing potential running rampant in its veins (but that seems to be happening, slowly but surely). I also hope that those in positions of power who dismiss, deride or ignore it either wake up and get busy or retire to the sheep farm.

Just to kick 'em in the teeth and get the ball rolling like a runaway Batmobile . . .

Welcome To The Terrordome.

The new Public Enemy single is finally out this month. "Welcome To The Terrordome" is no great departure from the P.E. sound but packs a punch unseen since . . .oh, "Fight The Power". And actually takes the passion-ometer up another notch. I've never heard Chuck so venomous, committed or angry. The true Prophet Of Rage. Maybe that's because I heard the record was inspired by the Bensonhurst redneck-slaying of Yusef (originally the new single was gonna be "911 Is A Joke").

Chuck D is unsurpassable as deliverer of rhymes. His commitment dominates a sound that in other hands would swamp the MC with its power. "I've got so much trouble on my mind . . ." The Shocklee-Ryder-Sadler production may be James Brown-derived in the funky drumming but so dense and powerful it takes the breath out of your body. The intro grabs you by the scruff of the neck and slams you in the chest. No escape. Then the beat comes in, a metallic, evil guitar drone starts up creating unbelievable tension and Chuck's let out of the corner, ranting his inimitable urban poetry. Flavor is a constant shadow, what sounds like a church choir soars and the whole effect is galvanizing, rivetting and possibly the best P.E. ever. "Crucifixion ain't no fiction"..."wait for the state to decide our fate". He pays tribute to murdered Panther leader Huey Newton and . . . oh, just hear this record! There's a Terrorbeat (3.10), 18 seconds of Flav-mania and bite-splattered Terrormental instrumental mix (3.41). One DJ has already told me that this sound is too powerful and dense to play in his club. Boyngg!1

Def Jam/Columbia are set to release the third Public Enemy album, "Fear Of A Black Planet" in February. Meanwhile this'll more than keep the flame roaring. The 90s are here and when I'm writing this column in 10 years' time I **know** this'll be down as one of the records of the decade (But, hold up! I ain't heard the album yet!).

Don't forget Chuck and Flavor pop up on the new **George Clinton** single, "Tweakin'", a funk classic for the 90s if ever there was one. Looks like George's fifth decade in music is gonna be a killer and the public seem ready to escalate him to the heights of the 70s, if the show I saw at the Apollo in Harlem was anything to go by. Keep those P-Funk letters coming in for Clinton Corner. Nose D'Avoidafunk whiners who don't have The Funk can wallow in their unhappy funless worlds.

YZ HERE?: Cos he's gonna be one of the rap sensations of the 90s, that's why!

One of the rap singles of '89 was "In Control Of Things" by **YZ-G Rock**, which originally appeared on the New Jersey Diversity label before being picked up by Tuff City. This 12" indicated that something akin to huge talent was afoot and now YZ - just YZ - has finished his own album, "Sons Of The Father".

What we have here is an original approach which means you can't say he sounds like anybody else (with many rappers you say, "oh, he's been listening to Kane or LL"). It's a rich, dense sound which steers clear of sample-cliches - I'm sure that "I'm Workin'" uses a snip of the piano-riff from **John Lennon**'s "Watching The

Wheels". The mood is often laid-back in **EPMD** -mode but the raps can be forceful and incisive - "Back Again" kicks off with a spoken intro that goes, "If a lizard could be a crocodile MC, I could be Crocodile Dundee" (before lurching into one of those jazz-piano grooves). "Get It Right (Put On Your Bally Shoes)" is brassy funk, but "Tower With The Power" captures a warm, loose feel. Cuts from YZ's debut Tuff City 12" are here - "In Control Of Things" and "Thinking Of A Master Plan". "Spank-ed" uses the early 80s disco classic "Spank" by **Jimmy Bo Horn**. "On A Friday" is slow, bare and underlines YZ's way with words. Altogether a great debut set.

Still on the same label, I'm ecstatic to report that **The 45 King** has a new album, "45 Kingdom". His previous sets for Tuff City have been pure break-beats, open invitations to DJs and MCs to get busy. This one has a first side of funky-dope outings like "Roach Clip", "Mark's House", "Mr Smith & Mr Wesson", and the aptly-titled "Strong Beats From A Strong Man". But side two has four cuts which see Mark with **Lakim Shabaz** - "Master Of The Game", "Passin' The Mike", "Black And Proud" and "When A Wise Man Speaks". Titles are pretty self-explanatory, I reckon, though I'll add that the duo are on top form and compliment each other to hyped extremes.

Tuff City's other breaks-man, **Louie Louie**, has a new set, "Deadlier Than Ever" - all instrumental grooves (often on a JB tip) like "Lethal", "Schizophrenia", "House It Up", "Lou's Groove", "Freestylin'" and "Rhythmical Cutthroat".

12"-wise, veteran **Spoonie Gee** has a "new" single, "Mighty Mike", another ode to Tyson with ringside commentaries. This was produced by **Marley Marl** and recorded over a year ago, as was the **Teddy Riley**-directed flip, "Didja Come To Party?", a JB-tinged groove with hyperactive snare. Worth a peek . . .

BITE THE BULLET: If anything, '89 showed that UK rap - after trying for years to emulate the US - finally came into its own. Killer singles by **Black Radical Mk II**, **Overlord X** and **Silver Bullet** were harder than much American output. Now Silver Bullet has followed the raw surge of "Bring Forth The Guillotine" with another no-holdsbarred slice of rampant anger. "20 Seconds To Comply" again rails against society, apathy and injustice, packing a kick like a mule.

The intro is all doom-chords and Freddy Krueger/Robo-voice before a hectic, James Brown-ish riff crashes through with a guitar out of Herman Kelly's "Drummer's Beat". Bullet's delivery is gruff and aggressive, fired with the passion of a man who believes in his lyrics to the core.

Two mixes: The Final Conflict (6.12) and The Omen Mix (6.06). The latter is most rhythmically brutal, with effects exploding amidst the rhymic rampage. Hats off to **DJ Mo**. Just to ram home the fact that this guy is dangerous, there's a DJ Beats version of "Guillotine", complete with movie-bite mayhem. If this one gets out in the US watch out!

Still in London, Music Of Life has shoved out two butt-detonators which also deserve status higher than import. **S.L. Trooper featuring Sweet Pea** again use that relentless JB-scuttle rhythm-rush to back up the frantic rap of "Movement". All hell breaks loose as cuts and brass-blasts slice through - one of the most energy-charged raps I've heard in ages. Vocal (4.20) and Instrumental (4.00). Flip, "There It Is" (two mixes), is likewise inflamed.

Einstein is a talented rapper from South London who released "Friday Night And Saturday Morning" on Profile last year. Music Of Life just put out his new one, "Gostago", produced by **Norman Cook** and, again, resting firmly on JB's funk machine (although the chorus comes from Mr Clinton - a snatch of "feets don't fail me now" at the

end of the hook). Vocal and Instr.(both 6.05) and "Food For Thought" bonus (5.55). This galloping funk beat is dominating UK rap right now, along with the inevitable hip-house, but the quality of the cuts, bites and rhymes finally puts this country on a par with the States. Now if **Coldcut** can get Black Radical back in the studio . . .

GOT THE HUMP: "Doowutchyalike" should've been an instant monster. Instead it hung around for weeks. Now **Digital Underground** fire another unique blast of their lunatic-hybrid of rap, funk and cartoon sensibility. "The Humpty Dance" (Tommy Boy), turns the spotlight on the guy who looks like a B-Boy Groucho Marx and sounds like the rapping cod - **Eddie "Humpty-Hump" Humphrey**. It's a new dance craze, a deranged version of The Twist, involving much broken-leg wobbling and rubber-limbed cavorting. "You look like MC Hammer on crack", is one of the taunts fired at Hump as he confesses that he likes his oatmeal lumpy and "once got busy in a Burger King bathroom." This idea could easily fall flat on its false nose if the execution by Hump and **Shock G**'s immaculate funkdrenched production didn't work so well. I mean, they must have been doing the bass part when the 'quake hit Oakland! Positively shot with P-Funk!

Comes as Mini-Hump Radio Mix (4.40), Bonus Hump Mix (6.28) and Humpstrumental (3.16). Next, "Sex Packets", an album which will turn rap upside down just like **De La Soul** did nearly a year ago. It's more of the same, which means it's totally unlike anything else.

BASE!: It took a while for **3rd Bass** to get there but the video for "Steppin' To The AM" suddenly catapulted them into the upper chart reaches. Now they've plucked one of the best cuts off the LP - "Gas Face" - and made it the new single. Masterstroke! This is definitive New School - sprawlingly wacky in Digital mode - all the announcements and laffs . The sort of rolling funky-jazz piano-riff groove as used by **Young MC** on his album. Much attention to rhythm power and **Prince Paul (Stet**'s guy who did **De La Soul)** production. Truly different and mucho fun. Radio Mix (3.45) & Instr. (2.20). A Gas Face?

Also included is "Wordz Of Wisdom" - a darker concoction with dense guitar riffs and funky drummer beats. Produced by **Sam Sever**. Tour-de-force rap by **MC Serch**. The killer is the eight-minute Death In The Afternoon mix. Also included: Club Mix (8.02) & Radio (4.18). Def Jam continue to be one of the prime leaders.

LOW YO-YO: **Low Profile** are latest signing to Priority on the West Coast. Their debut single, "Pay Ya Dues", is a trailer to the forthcoming album, "We're In The Together". Rapper **W.C.** is a protege of **Ice-T** and it seems that man can't put a foot wrong. This is a single which hits on several levels. The words say something -dissing MCs who think they can just mouth off and get rich overnight instead of working for success, while the groove is a slapping, heavy beat (shades of "Atomic Dog") with subtle undercurrents and overall attack which means they can't fail.

L.P. are **DJ Aladdin**, who won the '89 DMC DJ contest in NYC (defeating **DJ Miz** and **DJ Richie Rich**), and W.C. (I shouldn't say it but - that's an English term for the men's room - not that there's any waste in this man's rhymes). They rap with a message on every cut - from "How Ya Livin's" anti-drug stance to the single. The flip, ""That's Y They Do It" tackles inner city brain-frying with no nonsense and the rhythm is a def-dealer in itself, showing Aladdin's skill. Lyrics are direct and honest. Watch out for this one.

COMPLETE CONTROL: **Hank Love** is known for his radio show, but he also has a group - **Majestic Productions**, who also consist of **Half Pint D**, **Great** and **Alemo**. They debuted last year on DNA International with "Drop Method" but meet the 90s head on with "Cold Sweat"/"Frontline" - both which come in four versions apiece.

"Sweat" is the dancefloor demolition side, as the lads plough through a fast, hard beat with rapid, alternating rhymes. Vocal (4.17), Vocal Hip-hop (4.39 and best for clubs as the emphasis is on the beats), Instrumental (4.10), Acapella (3.34 - you definitely need two with this!). Meanwhile, "Frontline" is mellower with a rhythm reminiscent of the **Mary Jane Girls**: "All Night Long" (as used on Kane's "Smooth Operator"). Very much a jam spirit as Hank and Half Pint swap lines (in dialogue too). Versions: Vocal Control (3.47), Control Instr. (3.59), Vocal Majestic (4.49), Majestic Instr. (4.39).

DNA-International have more irons in their fire: **Too Poetic** are readying their debut LP, "The Poets Of Hip-hop", while the Majestics will be unleashing their first set later in the year. New signings include **C.K.O. & Sta-La-Fro**, who apparently combine "political commentary with TV sitcom sensibilities" (as long as it's "Married With Children" and not "Father Knows Best"!), the label's first R&B signing **Kyle Robinson**, **Crew I.Q.**, **Rob Well**, **R.E.G.** and **Reg-Reg**.

RIGHTEOUS BROTHERS: The **Poor Righteous Teachers** are on Profile with a new 12" called "Time To Say Peace" - a good way to say hello. I've said this before - there's a new school in hip-hop, which keeps on getting new pupils. **De La Soul, Jungle Bros, Divine Styler** . . . these are the groups blazing new trails and pulling apart rap confinements, such as gold, brags and ham hosepipes. Generally the music is richly laid-back, more obscure of sample and the rhymes take either a positive or off-the-wall tip. Here the beat is new jack with 70s brass, vaguely-reggae tinges and relaxed De La/Jungle delivery of socially aware lyrics. The intro shows how short a song's pre-sample life can be: it's **Soul II Soul**'s acapella of "Back To Life". This is all on the remix ((5.15), but there's a slower, dope-reggae Original Version (4.42).

The flips kicks off with the oddly-titled "Butt Naked Booty Bless" (plus instrumental - both 4.29), rude of rhyme but musically eclectic with Afro percussion and soul organ/sax interjections. Also interesting is the bonus "Word Is Bond" (4.28), dominated by medieval flute-style keyboard and the nearest these guys get to boasting.

OAK-HEY!: **Oaktown's 3.5.7.** have a new **MC Hammer**-produced 12", "Juice Gotcha Krazy" - another track off the "Wild And Loose" LP (Capitol). The girls have their own style. The original version is here (4.21), but there's a new Vocal mix (4.52), which plays down the bite of **2 Live Crew**'s "We Want Some Pussy" (oh that juice!) and emphasises the near-"Wild Thing"-beat with boom and various moans. There's also an Instrumental (4.52).

MIST AGAIN: **Missy Mist** had a single on Atlantic, now she pops up on Pandisc subsidiary Never Stop with **Eric Griffin** producing on "Gettin' Bass", a boom-outing with vibrant rhyme style (but how many more times is Chuck D gonna pop up with his "Bass!" yell?). Vocal & Dancestrumental (both 3.56). I prefer the flip, "Let The Good Times Roll", with its use of **Chic**'s "Good Times" - once the most-used rhythm in rap, except here we have the violin whoosh and a pinch of chorus over avalanche groove. There's a guy intoning the title and some understated funk-guitar. Vocal & Dancestrumental (both 4.28).

SKY HIGH: In the wake of **2 Live Crew**'s "As Nasty . . ." LP and "Me So Horny" single going platinum, the next Crew 12" will be "C'Mon Babe", already a radio fave. The Crew are also releasing a live video.

Skyywalker has also signed **Rhythm Radicals**, who may or may not be the same guys who made a GREAT 12" on the old Umbrella label a few years back. Described as "the most radical rap group to come on the scene in a long time", their first Luke-vinyl will be a single called "Brother To Brother". **Afro Rican**'s next single will be another LP cut, "This Is How It Should Be Done". but the flip will be the previously-unreleased hip-house track, "Get On Up And Dance", which may or may not feature Bonannon's "Let's Start The Dance" exhortation. **Tony Rock** does the right thing by releasing "Street Resident" off his "Let Me Take You To The Rockhouse" LP and donating a portion of the profits to a Miami homeless charity - the issue the single tackles. Skyywalker's newest signing are a "Baby 2 Live Crew" duo called the **Poison Clan**, currently working on their first album.

HIP-HOUSE CORNER: A late 80s stormer arrived in the form of

the **Spy Guys**' "Spy Talk" from Chicago (Mixdown Records: (312) 734 4MIX). Three very different mixes: A Spy's House (4.56): Starts with orchestral crescendo like the end of the Beatles' "A Day In The Life", before launching into elevating house-bass pulse. Produced by **Kelly Wright**, **Jef Fleming** and **Ron Staley**, this is prime hiphouse, with killer acid bridge achieving lift-off before returning to original beat. Plus: Razor Blade (7.11): Extended and one which'll set fire to the floors; Ron's Club Mix ((5.56): James Brown has been peeking in but now the old "whoo"-loop is here, in addition to the funky horn riff which gets dismissed in the previous mix with the words, "Hold it! That's played out! Hit it!" I would've kept the funky horn riff . . .that said, this is a great sound, on this version wheeling in the acid with reverse-drum bass-blooped monster-beat.

Grandmaster Flash is a producer these days and makes his hip-house debut with a young Brooklyn rapper called **Doom** on Profile. Doom started rhyming when hanging out at Flash's studio in '87 and the Grandmaster took him under his wing as a "diamond in the rough". "Shake Your Body Down" is a veritable galloper sprinkled with lethal cuts (the great man himself?), while "On We Go" has a great inner-propulsion (with more razor-cuts) and piano-beat link.

Per-fect Sound's "Blind Date" - a sorry tale of regret - is raw and in your face with **Todd Terry**-type rhythm-charge, speed-rap and bellowed chorus. Two seven-minute mixes (Soul Street).

RED'S MARATHON: As I'm writing this, **Red Alert** is cutting up a storm on KISS FM with the best of 80s rap. No doubt about it, this guy is the best DJ. The way he mutates and mutilates and detonates and just blows the top of your head clean off is causing me to hit the ceiling with my feet!

The BDP stretch was dynamite and Red's power-chord kamikaze assault on LL's "Rock The Bells" is one of the radio intestine-disrupters of the decade - but then the whole six hours is. And I got the lot on tape! HA HAAAA!!!! Stupid Def is now going out live as I listen - Red's follow-up, Tony Humphries, ain't shown up cos of the weather so now all hell is breaking loose and he's cutting "Bring The Noise" into "It Takes Two". This is one of the best things I've ever heard in my life! Rhythm is obviously the first thing on his mind and his hands just spout it like Zeus potting boats in "Jason And The Argonauts". Now it's over-running and Red's getting into gear with "Champ" by The Mohawks. Never heard a deck screech . . . here's JB - the "Say It Loud" extended guitar break. Back into "Champ"...Bobby Byrd's shouting from next door . . . Hit me! . . . One time! Ska now - Prince Buster's "I Am The Magnificent!" Those ESG chords (you'd know if an evil string-drone like "Psycho"). This was how you heard 'em they used to do it in the park - now it's live on radio. Thanks for being late, Tony. This is the spirit of hip-hop. Real Music.

What's this? - a telephone with Red cutting into Cheryl Lynn's "To Be Real". Back to nearly a decade ago and "Good Times", one of **the** breaks. One of JB's ultimate screams and Red's getting going with bongos . . .it's from the live JB LP . . . "Stomp your feet"... "Clap your hands, huh!". Here's the most-used break after JB - Herman Kelly's "Dance To The Drummer's Beat"...now another funk riff, drums accelerating, slap-bass dipping. Now he's cutting brass from Junior Walker and more 70s killer-break material . . .Run DMC with "Peter Piper": Bob James' "Take Me To The Mardi Gras" piano with Red grunging on the scratch front.

I stood in front of Red Alert once and watched him work - remarkable - he could've been watering the garden but he was creating an aural Pearl Harbor. "Catch The Beat", the Grand Groove one by **T-Ski Valley** (most recently used on De La's "Buddy" remix)...here we go...the remake of **Taana Gardner**'s "Heartbeat" by **Sweet G...**here comes the break and Red's cutting. It's Old School time - more Enjoy stuff. Another beat - Flash with the Five's first ever single- "Superappin'" - the accelerated "Skintight" riff (**Ohio Players**) and first real pass-the-mike expedition. Now he's into the "900 Number", **DJ Mark**'s bad-break biggie of '89...no it's "Pump Me Up" by **Trouble Funk**...no, it's **Biz Markie** - current charter with "Just A Friend" - with his '88 biggie "Nobody Beats The Biz".

can't describe the buzz I get off one of these Red-excursions, but this is the loosest I've ever heard him. His scratching's like sawing up an old wardrobe (Compliment) ... Crash Crew ... Trouble FunkKurtis Blow's last hit, "If I Ruled The World ('85). BOOM! It's Schoolly D and "PSK", his debut single and first real blast of the gangster-rap personna - not to mention a cavernous beat never surpassed on modern recording equipment . . . Whodini's "Funky Beat" and Red's patented "hold me, hold me!" bit - all the stuff I've loved over the years . . . explosions . . . and this is the first time I've heard the new version of the Sugarhill Gang's "Rappers' Delight" -hip-housed up . . . "there's not a problem that I can't fix . . . ". Now, after four and a half hours of inspired mixology, Red Alert winds down the wheels of steel and calls it a night (after paying tribute to original DJs like Flash, Bam, Herc, AJ, Hollywood and the men who paved the way for rap). "I didn't know so many people were into Old School", exclaims Red with surprise at how many requests were phoned in for old classics. But listening to the whole eight hour retro-session you can see how great some of the seminal old records were (not all, but quite a few). "Without these guys we wouldn't be here", was what he was saying. And after tonight, I don't think rap would be the same without Red Alert.

DAYLE WARNING: **Dayle**, the Rapping Teach, is a remarkable lady, having given up a teaching career to start Revenge Records. Now there's a subsidiary, B Down. Just out is a great debut by **GSP** (**Gangstarr Posse**). "Swinga" comes with deadpan rap, mid-tempo, jazz-tinged beat, fierce brass and massed la-la chorus. Vocal & Instr. (both 4.02). Flip is "Read The Label". Vocal & Instr. (both 4.45-ish). It's produced by **Grandmaster Flash**. Meanwhile, **Powerule** have been recording demos for a forthcoming album, "Smooth". The four cuts I heard sounded great, with a particularly lethal hip-house excursion

QUICK KUTS: Seattle's mighty Nastymix label - in addition to watching the massive Sir Mix-a-lot go gold with his severely large "Seminar" album (you really should get on this hotbed of bad beats, sharp rhymes and dynamite delivery to see how fast this West Coast delivery-king is progressing) is widening its roster - which also includes Kid Sensation and High Performance. They've just signed Bob & The Mob, the New Jersey outfit who did the very huge "It's A Shame" - previously on local Holiday Records and planed for first Nasty-release. Also Side F/X, a killer Miami group whose first 12" will be "Rock The House"/"What Makes You Wanna Shout". This is gonna be good! . . . King Shameek, red-hot Newark cutmaster and production partner of Hollywood Impact (of Twin Hype fame) is currently in the studio doing pre-production work on the debut album by MC Joe (label 2B announced). Joe was formerly half of Cali-duo Mooky & Joe - Mooky went on to join Red, Black & Green but is relocating to Newark and will rap on the LP. Another local, MC Kason, will appear too. Meanwhile, Twin Hype are working on their second LP. One cut's called "Double Barrell". Reports say this'll blow heads clean off ... Ice-T, Kool Moe Dee and Big Daddy Kane pop up on the new Quincy Jones album, "Back On The Block", joining a horde of jazz guest stars (including Miles Davis, Dizzy Gillespie, George Benson and Ella Fitzergerald) on a remake of Weather Report's "Birdland". The rappers provide a lengthy intro introducing the jazzers (rather like the Last Poets' "Jazzoetry") over a plink-plonk rather like the clock in "Jeopardy"!...While rappers expand the perameters of lyrical subject matter, it's obvious that the boast rap will never die. Unique have two such missives on each side of their 12". "Pure Dynamite" and "Axe Maniac" (New Day) are both just over three minutes with no mixes but make their point. The former has tasty jazz-brass samples and JB guitar while the guys adopt a laid-back style. However, the words are pretty violent with their "bloodstains and membranes"...as is "Axe Maniac", unsurprisingly. This one's faster and uses psycho-imagery for brag purposes.

Londoner **Richard Crowley** shoves out maniacal acid-househip-hop creations and, in the process, creates fearsome grooves. "Warhol Machine" (Lime Skull) pays hallucinogenic homage to the

late artist with an acid take on JB's "Papa Don't Take No Mess". Five mixes - Video, Extended, Factory Rap, Industrial and Sansonix - career through a gamut of extended acid burble-grooves and volcanic sound effects (not to mention Godzilla's bollock of a bass rumble). The reason it's in S.Def is cos some London rappers called the **Rolla Boyz** gatecrash with spirited rhyming. Acid hip-house meets the JB dope-groove.

Went to the Def Jam Christmas Party at The Saint. It was fun. Had some drinks, said hello to a few rap industry people as well as **LL**, **Oran "Juice"** and **Kid 'N Play**but didn't see any bonkin' - that's blown it.

Reggae continues to nibble at hip-hop's pants-leg - latest outing is Frighty & Colonel Mite's "Life (Is What You Make It)" (Profile), which comes from the "Dancehall Stylee" compilation LP in four mixes. Like Daddy Freddy & Asher D this one emanates from raggaaware UK.. Maestro Fresh-Wes bursts in with the ancient break-ridden but dope "Let Your Backbone Slide" (LMR). "Funky Drummer" rubs shoulders with "Champ" by the Mohawks (you know, that de de-de organ riff). A nice record with dramatic spoken intro and foreful rap. Four more mixes with the Bonus Beat (3.05) giving the DJ something to play with (and much use of JB guitar and even a snippet of Hall & Oates. Wes (plus DJ Ltd) come from Ontario, Canada...Tandem just released two dopified singles. MC Downbeat's "Get To The Beat" - a laidback treatment of a **Herbie Hancock** tune with singing which comes in two mixes (Radio & Club). The second 12" is by the unpromisingly-named Macho Man & DJ Romeo but instead of bacon torpedo-isms we get two hot dance-rap tunes: "Ah Freakout" obviously hooks itself around Chic's "Le Freak", but also brings in the "Shaft" theme wah-wah over a springy beat. "Crime" is the serious side, putting the listener in the mind of two burglars - one bold, the other questioning. The rapper rails against urban decay, crime and citizen's apathy with sound effects, sonic cuts and unexpected Chipmunk finale.

"beautiful vocal harmonies a la the Manhattan Transfer or Fifth Dimension."

Italian Imports: On the High Energy label, Edyta's exceptionally good "Be A Slave To My Heart" is a fast seller here in the states as is the latest from Aleph called "Hero". "Bohemian" by Kylie Gane is also first rate Italian dance pop that specialty stores are running out of almost as fast as they can stock it. Another brisk mover on the High Energy label is Lisa's "Stand Up & Sing" all of which points to a positive upturn for Italian product. (It had suffered at the retail level of late. Among the most encouraging are the reports from 12" Dance in DC and Disco Europa in New Hope, PA, where Italian twelves are all the rage!)

Continuing with Italy we find the new **Coo** Coo twelve "Happy Days" (Flea) to be less frenzied than usual, which lets the duo's playful vocals stand out for a change. "Day By Day" by **Dex** is another mid-tempo male vocal that's bright and bouncing with just the right balance of synthesizers and percussion to let Dex's talent come through. Ditto for the **Reflectors**' excellent "You Drive Me Crazy" (first class Italo-pop!) and **Michelle**'s (Touch Moi," a beautiful track that could break down that old language barrier and score big with progressive NRG purists and jocks alike.

German Imports: Tina Charles returns with "Go To Work On

My Love" (Global/126), a bright piece of energetic pop that's sure to warm up some mid-winter dance floors. ZYX offers up an absolutely perfect high tech burner with **Karen Jones'** vocals sparkling on "Shout In The Night" by **In-side**. It's fast-paced, electronic disco at its best!

That's about all the news for this time out that we can fit into the space afforded us but before I close I'd like to mention all the letters we've received about **Sean Mauer**'s excellent **Disco International** show on Trenton's WTSR-FM. This Hi-NRG specialty program which runs on Saturday evenings from 10pm to 2am is in danger of cancellation if the management doesn't see more interest in it from the local (NY, NJ, PA) communities it services. Don't let this happen! I urge all of you within its listening area to take a moment to drop a line to the station and let them know how much we all appreciate the kind of programming that Sean does so expertly (and tirelessly!). this fresh DSK release for a while. There's never a boring moment during the song. It's filled with various vocals, rappers and a multitude of samples. This bumpin' house track starts off with a female rap and then goes to the deep male vocal hook. The verse vocals seem to be handled yet by another male/female duo. All in all, the singing is terrific - soulful and energetic.

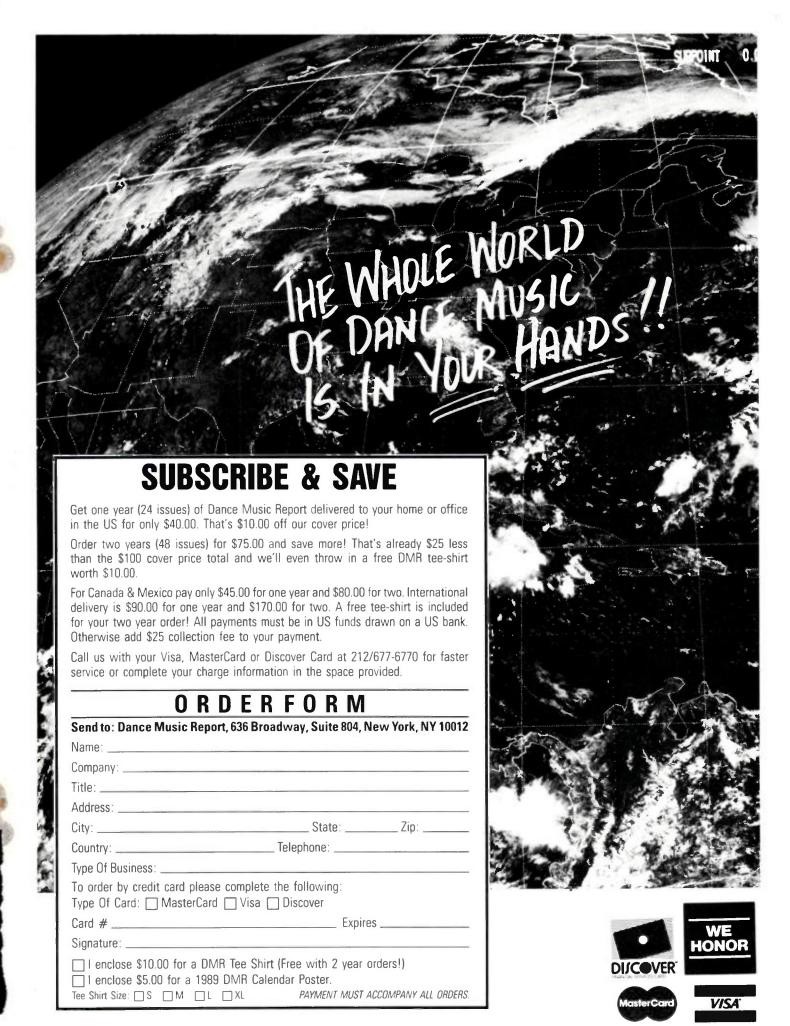
Interestingly enough, the radio version is the only house mix with vocals. There's also the house instrumental and "The French Kiss"-like bonus track. And that's just the A-side. Flip the 12" over and you've got the freestyle versions with their boomin' bass and various samples. There are many more edits than on the house track. The freestyle mixes also seem more DJ-friendly.

VICIOUS BEAT POSSE

"Legalized Dope" (MCA Records 12" MCA 9490) Produced by DJ Gill for GSG Productions

"Knowledge is dope and I'm giving it to you." This song tries to be a socially-conscious rap and it fails in that respect. But it also tries to rock the dance-floors and in that respect it definitely succeeds. The combination of the new-jack swing beat, the timely hip-hop samples and the funky-ass bass-line creates the kind of energy that pulls masses in droves right on to the dancefloor as if with a magnet. The variety of rappers present on the 12" keep the sound fresh throughout the whole song and the many def scratches and edits only pump up the energy of the song to even a higher level.

All cutmasters should also check out the a cappella version, for it provides the DJ's with ready-made edits with which to work.
