MEET & AUCTION REPORT

Antique Wireless Association Conference and Auction Report Rochester, New York — August 20-23, 2009

REPORTED BY RAY CHASE WITH CONTRIBUTIONS FROM JOHN V. TERREY AND THE AWA

The 48th Antique Wireless Association (AWA) Conference was held August 20-23 at the RIT Inn and Conference Center in Rochester, New York. Registration began on Thursday at 5 A.M. and though parking was permitted in the flea market area, selling was not permitted officially until Friday morning. However, some dealers did set up to sell without any "policing" by the AWA.

Although the first presentation was on Thursday evening, Friday was the grand opening day and activities continued through Sunday, encompassing the whole weekend. The auction was the close-out event on Sunday and finished at 3 P.M. This was a shift in scheduling from previous years when activities started on Wednesday and ended on Saturday. Most people appreciated not having to take as many weekdays off work to attend the meet as in the past. There was some reshuffling of club personnel and their roles and a few problems along the way, but in general a good time was had by all.

Total attendance as reported by the AWA was 417, slightly up from last year's total of 402. It appears that the AWA was successful in counteracting several years of a downward trend in attendance. Dropping the re-

quirement of AWA membership may have been a factor since 44 of the attendees were not members.

The weather prediction for most of the event was

dire, indeed, mostly forecasting rain. Fortunately, the predictions were largely wrong, and the rain that did occur did not cause too much disruption. Knowing that rain might be a problem, the organizers took a new tack and erected a very large tent in the parking lot for flea market vendors. As usual, assigned vendor spots were marked by chalk on the macadam, but a very heavy rain on Thursday night washed out most of them. The result was a bit of confusion on Friday.

Friday moming was clear and most vendors took their assigned spots, so the tent was largely empty. However, a few small showers during the morning sent them scurrying to the shelter of the tent, and many stayed there for the rest of the meet. The remainder of (Continued on following page)


(AWA 2009 Conference, continued) the weekend had mostly clear weather so some vendors opened up back on the macadam.

AWA officials reported that flea market spaces sold were up this year. Paul Farmer's count on the first morning of the flea market was 111 this year, up from his count last year of 88. [Unfortunately, last year we credited another "Farmer," instead of Paul with the flea market count. We apologize to Paul.] Still, there were vast barren areas on the parking lot. Nevertheless, the tent area remained full, and officials vowed to keep this benefit for next year.

The book fair returned to its original location in the assembly court, much to the relief of the participants, and good traffic on Friday and part of Saturday resulted. However, the major bobble in the event was the hotel's scheduling of a large wedding and reception in the same area as the book fair from late Saturday afternoon through the evening. This caused huge disruptions to the book fair, as vendors had to pack up and leave the area on Saturday. Although they could set up again on Sunday morning, few did.

In general, the wedding interfered with the uninterrupted use of the space usually occupied by the AWA. Though registration took place in the ballroom as expected, items for the auction could not be left there. Instead, they were crammed into two small rooms that made viewing difficult. They then had to be moved to the ballroom for the auction on Sunday. Initially, this caused the auction input to be smaller than usual. On Sunday morning, more items came in, but



then, there was less time to look them over.

Apparently, the AWA was aware of the "double booking" by the hotel, but the book fair vendors were not advised in advance. Obviously, a great deal of frustration resulted.

The seminars are always a highlight of this event, and reports were that they were up to their usual quality and professionalism. Tom Perera made the first presentation on Thursday night accompanied by a guest speaker, Virginia Utermohlen-Lovelace. Their subject was "Disappearing Wireless History." Utermohlen-Lovelace is the granddaughter of Jack Binns, the wireless operator who triggered the first radio/sea rescue by using radio communications when his ship the *Republic* collided with the *Florida* in 1909. Tom also moderated the Key and Telegraph seminar with participants David Bart, Roger Buttingnol, Vince Thompson, and Gil Schlehman.

The "Authors and Editors Get-Together" was an informal program to discuss ideas for articles in the AWA Review and the AWA Journal. New ideas are always welcome in hope of attracting new readers to these publications. The title of Steve Goldstein's seminar "True Confessions of a Heathkit Addict" was an attention-getter, but no matter what the title, there's much to learn at every one of the AWA seminars.

The contest was also up to its excellent standards.

The theme was kit radios and the entries varied greatly

from a DeForest 15-panel receiver to Philmore, Knight, Heathkit, and other makes. Even a Heathkit EC-1 analog computer showed up.

Although a ladies' luncheon was not scheduled this year, many complaints from the distaff side caused the hasty organization of a luncheon by the ladies themselves for Saturday. The conference organizers learned a lesson here: "Do not dis the ladies," and promised that the luncheon would be back on the schedule next year.

The highlight of the banquet, attended by 119 diners, was Tom Peterson's presentation reviewing the plans for the new museum building complex. In the next few years, the move into the first-class museum will take place. Included will be an auditorium/radio studio for presentations, some staged as if in an early radio studio. An important component is the library, which has received major funding from Max Bodner who was honored during the event. Visitors can look forward to entering the museum as (Continued on following page)

THE AUCTION


As for the auction, its being held on Sunday caused quite a lot of consternation as some attendees needed Sunday to return home. In spite of this, the attendance held up fairly well. Conducted again by Richard and John Estes and supported by AWA volunteers, it got off to a late start at 9:25 A.M. As already indicated, late arrivals of more merchandise, as well as last minute viewing, seemed to be the cause of the delay.

This year the auction started with paper goods and that went quickly. A good selection of tubes, with quite a few foreign types, was then offered. In the general auction that followed the most significant item was an American Marconi 4V 4-step audio amplifier that sold for \$4,400. As usual there were quite a few (19) no-sale items where the buyer's reserve was not met.

In all, it was a fairly average sale with some bargains to be obtained here and there. Box lots were of higher quality than usual. Some buyers must have spent the time to examine the contents rather thoroughly since several sold for over \$100. Examples: 30 to 40 tubes in cartons sold for \$200; a large box of tubes, including (16) 01-As sold for \$165, a large box of brass-based 201s, 80s, 27s, and 51s sold for \$145; a box of 99s & WD-11s, etc., sold for \$150; and a box that included many audio transformers sold for \$190. These lots are not included in the listing below.

The number of items was 311, with 25 no-sale items. An official total of \$25,295 was realized, somewhat less than the \$28,000 in 2008 and considerably less than the \$32,000 in 2007. These numbers are well down from the high points of 10 years ago. The auction may have suffered mainly from the confusion with the wedding the evening before and also from being held on Sunday. Maybe next year things will be better organized.



The Sony Model CF-580 Have Boombox — Will Travel

Andrew Hayden's article continues on the theme of his previous A.R.C. articles on high quality audio items of the mid-20th century. (Editor)

By the early 1980s, the boombox phenomenon had exploded and virtually every young person wanted one. It also seems that every manufacturer offered at least two or three different models, from small and light to big and loud. Between 1980 and 1985, the prices kept dropping on these AM/FM stereo cassette players. Unfortunately, so did the quality of many of them. The competition became so fierce that companies kept undercutting eachother's pricing. Millions of units were on the streets by mid-decade. Some had different brand names, but were, in fact, the same product with a slightly modified appearance.

In the early to mid-1970s, quite a few smaller monophonic AM/ FM cassette players were on the market, but precious few stereo radio/cassette players in a pack-

age that came to be known as the "boombox." One of the first was the Sony CF-550 from 1971 which really set the standard for these integrated units.

The actual first one on the market is something audio collectors of the 1960s and 1970s enjoy debating. There were several incarnations in the late 1960s, but these seemed to be more of a novelty rather than a refined product. Sony's 550 was different — it had quality, styling, and durability. Sony had built its reputation on these traits across its entire product line. The design reflected an aesthetic which values symmetry — modern, yet conservative.

THE SONY MODEL CF-580

It was in 1976 when the big brother to the CF-550 was introduced, the CF-580. It was Sony's flagship portable cassette player/radio, a very impressive piece of equipment, which cost \$400. This is what a decent component system went for back then.

Nostalgia was the inspiration for my recent purchase of the CF-580 shown in Figure 1. I was in high school when my father brought a brand new one home one day. Being a kid who liked fine radios, I was impressed! The contours of the cabinet were smoothed out and the overall size was larger than the CF-550, measuring 16" x 12" x 6".

The cabinet materials of this set are high density, charcoal-colored plastic, brushed and polished aluminum, die-cast knobs, and very nice toggle switch controls. With its eight D cell batteries on board, it weighs a whopping 18 lbs. I think the fit and finish of this Sony is fantastlc, unlike the offerings from many other makers. Features include the ability to play three types of cassette tape — normal, Ferric Oxide (Fe2O3), and Chromium Dioxide (CrO2). A close-up of the cassette drive is shown in Figure 2.

Two built-in condenser microphones, along with jacks for external mikes, are on the front panel, in addition to the headphone jack. An angled linear

dial panel for AM/FM reception with a tuning meter and a stereo/mono switch are nice touches. Twin rabbit-ear antennas provide excellent FM reception. This Sony is listed at two watts of audio power output per channel with only 2 percent total harmonic distortion. It has separate bass and treble adjustments, a combination automatic frequency control-interface suppress switch to lock in stations, and a sliding balance control.

A very nice 4-speaker matrix system has two 4" x 6" oval speakers on the front panel and a 3" x 5" oval speaker on each of the side panels. This layout gives a very full spatial quality to the sound. The front panel of the CF-580 is accurately labeled "Super Wide Sound." The back panel has an AC plug socket, line-in and line-out, a phono input, plus a pair of extension speaker jacks.

WHY IT STANDS OUT

I've owned a variety of porta-




Figure 3. A 70-watt amplifier from Heathkit.

ble radios and boomboxes through the years and what really stands out with this Sony CF-580 is the overall classy modern appearance, the impressive sound quality, and the feeling that this piece of equipment was deigned to last forever. It is really built, which leads me to what I feel is its only shortcoming — its weight is 6-7 pounds heavier than many other units its size, a shortcoming I can live with. An advertisement for the CF-580 is shown in Figure 3.

Sony continued to make a wide variety of boomboxes in the coming years, some very impressive. However, they seemed to lose that "we make the best" reputation with many of their offerings when production was moved out of Tokyo, Japan, the location of company headquarters, to other parts of Asia in the mid-1980s.

Today, we're used to very small digital music formats like the iPod, which fit into a shirt pocket. But, there's something really nice about having a portable unit that can be proudly set on a mantle and can fill a room with sound. Yet, you can still grab it by the handle and head out on the road. Observing selling prices of the CF-580. I find that they seem to go for over \$100 these days. When offered for sale on the Internet, sometimes the price goes to over \$200, which is evidence that collectors do, indeed, like them.

WITH THE COLLECTORS

Lucky Literary Find at Auction

BY OLIN SHULER

Sometimes the unexpected addition to an auction purchase can lead to a trip back in time. Olin Shuler reports on his two hours well spent with an old radio magazine. His article takes your editor back in time also. In 1958, I was a senior in high school, very much into high fidelity and had built several Heathkits myself. (Editor)

This story contains elements reminiscent of those in the film Forrest Gump, when the "hero" innocently walks through scenes where historically significant things are happening, right before his eyes.

There I was, sitting on the front row at a Saturday morning antique radio auction conducted by the Mid-America Antique Radio Club (MAARC) in Kansas City. The auction was winding down, when up came a 1950s vintage DuKane audio amplifier - about a 25-watter. I listened for bids, but heard none, while admiring the substantial size of the power and output transformers, plus three nice power tubes. "This might be useful," I thought, and was about to bid, but there was silence. No other bidders

The auctioneer reached down and picked up a cardboard box containing a few old radio magazines, placed them under the amplifier and said, "Now, do I have five dollars?" Up went my bid card and more silence, until the words, "Sold — number 753, Five Dollars!" It was mine.

After the auction, I had two and remission hours to spend waiting to meet a friend. I went to a nearby fast foodery for lunch. Convinced that it was not good form to examine a 50-year old boat anchor amplifier while sitting in a restaurant booth, I took the magazines in with me instead. Included was a Radio & Television News from January 1958, a time when I was four years into a 21-year stint in production engineering at Motorola. "There should be things in here that I have long since forgotten," I thought.

Indeed, here was a fascinating time-capsule showing the industry in the pre-dawn hours just before the immense popularity of stereo sound, its accom-

panying revival of FM radio, and other pivotal events.

HI-FI AND STEREO

The magazine cover, in full color, showed top-ofthe-line high fidelity equipment, with a pretty girl and all. Very '50-ish! See Figure 1.

High fidelity equipment articles were plentiful, with multipage advertisements from Heathkit, Knight Kit, TeleMatic, and others. See Figures 2, 3, and 4.

The promise of stereo disc recordings tantalized industry during the annual High Fidelity Show just completed in New York. Two possible technical stan-

dards were up for grabs; one from London Records in England and the other from Western Electric (the one that was finally chosen).

News was out that RCA-Victor, Capitol, Columbia and Decca were acquiring Western Electric cutting heads capable of either standard. Availability of the first stereo discs was anticipated in about one year at an estimated cost of \$45 to \$60 each.

There was a project that could be built to receive stereo sound over the radio. This was about two years prior to FM multiplex, and about a year before stereo records.

In some metropolitan areas, a few combined AM and FM stations were doing stereo sound demonstrations using AM for one channel and FM for the other. The advertisement in Figure 4 shows such a tuner and

accompanying amplifiers. [Attending college in Boston, Mass., in the late 1950s, your editor listened to the Boston Symphony stereo broadcasts over AM and FM stations, with each broadcasting one channel.]

Public demonstrations of stereo sound were being presented in New York City at Steinway Hall, on 57th Street. Limited quantities of stereo tapes were available.

One report said that in private meetings at the High Fidelity Show, inventor Murray Crosby demonstrated his fully compatible FM Stereo Multiplex transmission system to key broadcast executives. Arrangements were being made for initial trials in the New York City area with WABI-FM. The target date was March, 1960. By that time, it was felt that adapters would be readily available. (Later, I was the production engineer when Motorola manufactured adapters for upgrading their console stereos.)

PAY TELEVISION

Then, there was another article on a proposal from the FCC for pay television. It would allocate over-theair channels (this was before cable) where viewers would pay for supposedly "superior" quality program-

ming (a pre-historic HBO). Zenith, Blonder-Tongue, and International Television proposed various toll collection schemes.

The media was talking about it, while Congress was deciding whether or not to authorize a trial period. There was not much favorable comment, I recall, and Congress never brought it to a vote.

DIGITAL CODES FOR U.S. MAIL

In other technical news, the US Post Office, and the National Bureau of Standards were developing a method of encoding pieces of mail, letters, with digitally (Continued on following page) Lucky Literary Find, continued)

readable dots, identifying the destination post office. This would enable automatic sorting. Regions within metropolitan areas, or states, with high concentrations of incoming mail would have their own unique digital codes. From this beginning came automatic mail sorting and the ZIP Code.

VIDEO TAPE RECORDER PROTOTYPE

And last, but not least, RCA announced "Color TV Programs on Tape." The video tape recorder in prototype stage shown in Figure 5 was forecast to be available for studio use by the end of 1958. The photo shows the equipment housed in three 19-inch racks, seven feet high.

RADIO ROW

Not knowing what lay ahead, businesses on Cortlandt Street's Radio Row in New York City, where the World Trade Center was to be built, advertised their wares, optimistically looking to the future. An advertisement for Airex Radio Corp., 64 Cortlandt Street, is shown in Figure 6.

What a day, what a day! The two hours passed quickly, while snippets of a misspent youth passed before me once again. And all because I took a few seconds to consider the value of heavy iron and vacum tubes in a 50-year old amplifier. Is this a great hobby, or what?

RESTORATION TOPICS

Making Plastic Dial Covers At Home A Narrative from a Beginner's Point of View

As in previous articles, Daniel Schoo gives us a careful step-by-step guide to a restoration project. Dan always makes us stop and think, "Why not do it myself?" (Editor)

Anyone who collects old radios knows the problem of shrunken plastic dial covers. A dial cover is the transparent plastic window that covers a radio tuning dial. Transparent plastics from years ago could not hold their shape over time. Aging causes the dials to become vellow, distort, and often split or tear. Figure 1 shows a classic example of this problem the dial on my Templetone Model BP2-A5 military "morale" radio. No matter how much work you put into getting the radio in working order or restoring the cabi-

net, a dial disaster mars the appearance.

There are several individuals who make replacement plastic dial covers to order. They provide a nice new cover at a reasonable price. Unless the dial is an unusual shape for example, the one used in the Crosley model 63TA "Victory Model" with a large window area that curves inward 90 degrees at the top - it is fairly easy to get a new cover. Simply trace the outline of the dial opening onto a piece of heavy paper or cardboard and send the tracing out to someone who does this work. Often the people who do a lot of these covers have a number of molds already in stock and can make a cover for you from just the make and model information.

I became interested in dial cover fabrication when I started a restoration project on a radio with a shrunken split dial cover. In the past, I have ordered custom dial covers, but I never gave much thought to making one myself. Besides finding the right plastic material, I always thought it would require special equipment and talent.

Then I saw an advertisement for www.

dialcover.com. They advertised kits of the materials you need to make your own dial covers at home. The price of a kit was the same as a single professionally produced dial cover, and there was enough material in there to make several of them. There were two sizes of kits offered — a small size with 6½ square sheets of plastic and a large size with 11" square sheets. That sounded interesting and cost effective so I ordered a large kit.

The kit had three sheets of plastic and three pieces of 11" square, 1/4" thick, 5-ply plywood to make the molds. There was a page of instructions included, but for someone who is doing his first dial cover, the instructions were a little vague. The basic idea is not complicated, so I managed to figure it out. Once you have successfully made one and see how everything works you don't need instructions.

After I had made my first cover, I decided to do some further research and share with others what I had learned. A little Web searching, along with some practical experiments,

(Plastic Dial Covers, continued) filled in some vital details, which I will share.

THE BASIC MATERIALS

For optimal results, you need a transparent plastic that can be easily softened by heat and conformed to a mold — a process called thermoforming. An easily formable thermoplastic material such as PVC (Polyvinyl Chloride) or Vivak® PETG (Polyethylene Terephthalate Glycol) works very well.

PVC is used extensively in blister and clamshell packaging and is identified by the recycled plastics code number 3. PETG is less popular in the packaging industry, but it has the advantage of being easily available in very small quantities in the .020-inch thickness used for making dial covers. It is soft and rather easy to scratch, so it is sold with a protective film on each side that you peel off. PVC does not come with a protective film, and therefore. can be scratched or hazed in shipment.

The mold material should be something that can stand

moderate heat, is capable of producing a smooth, splinter free, cut edge, and can be easily shaped when it is sawed. I have heard about people using materials such as corrugated cardboard for molds and this does work, but it is difficult to shape in other than a plain square edged block, and it isn't very firm. A better material is something like plywood or Masonite. For consistently good results Baltic Birch 5-plywood is recommended. Baltic Birch ply has a fine grain, no voids, and many plies for stability and quality of the cut edges.

You can use common plywood with fewer plies, especially for the outer part of the mold that is not so critical, but it won't cut as smoothly and can splinter more easily at the edges. Dial cover molds typically use ¼" thick plywood, but you can vary this depending on the depth of the cover that you make. The outer mold should be ¼" or thicker plywood. It is important that the mold and the base under it be absolutely flat and sturdy. Warped or flimsy molds will not produce good results.

THE PROCESS

The example discussed in this article is the dial from the Templetone Model BP2-A5 military "morale" radio shown in Figure 1.




Figure 3. The traced pattern to be used for both the inner and outer molds.

To begin, I removed the old dial cover and cleaned out the dial opening of any remaining cover pieces or dirt. You need to make a transfer pattern of the dial opening in order to make a mold. The finished mold consists of two parts — an inner solid sheet the size, shape and depth of the dial cover, and an outer sheet with a hole matching the inner mold. The two halves need enough space for the plastic to slip in between them comfortably. A little more space won't make a lot of difference, but too little will bind and damage the soft plastic.

Take a piece of cardboard or heavy stock paper such as a file folder and trace an outline of the inside of the dial opening onto the cardboard, as shown in Figure 2. To get a pattern from some radios, it is better to place a sheet of cardboard inside the cabinet. Hold it tightly against the front and trace the outline of the opening onto the cardboard. Some radios like the Zenith Model 6D029 "Boomerang" have a separate metal trim piece around the dial that holds the dial cover. You can remove the trim piece from the cabinet for better access when you trace it.

Now that you have the pattern drawn (see Figure 3), carefully cut it out along the inside of the tracing line starting from the outside edge of the sheet and cut into the marked

perimeter. Save the inner "donut hole" part that you cut out and discard the surrounding cardboard. Try the pattern to check its size and shape against the hole in the radio. Verify that the pattern fits easily inside the opening without binding and that it matches the shape, as shown in Figure 4.

For the inner part of the mold, use a sheet of material, usually wood, a little larger than your dial opening and of the same thickness that you want for the depth of the dial cover. Some professionals use ¼" thick plywood, but for my Templetone, I used a scrap of ½" thick Masonite because the original cover was about ½" deep, and I wanted to match it. If you want a ¼" depth, use ¼" inch thick material.

The instructions included with the www.dialcover.com kit direct you to cut the mold with a jig saw (a term that some people use when referring to what is now more commonly called a scroll saw) using a 0.018-inch thick saw blade to cut out both halves of the mold in one operation, saving both the hole and the surrounding sheet. You have to start at the outside edge of the plywood sheet and cut into the center hole leaving a narrow slot in the outside mold. If you do that. it will make the two halves match very well with just enough space between them for molding the plastic material. This would use less plywood and take less time than cutting two separate pieces which is important for people who make

a lot of these. Since I don't have a scroll saw, I found it easier to use two separate pieces and cut each half of the mold separately using a saber saw (a.k.a. a jig saw). This is also necessary if you are using two different mold thicknesses as I did.

Place the pattern in the center of the inner mold material and draw a line around the outside of it, as shown in Figure 5. Remove the pattern and carefully cut the sheet along the center of the line. You can use any convenient tool with a fine tooth blade, such as a saber saw, scroll saw, or band saw. If you absolutely have to, you can also cut it by hand with a hacksaw blade, coping saw, or keyhole saw, but it's really hard to hold a straight true line cutting with hand tools.




Figure 6. Cutting the outer mold.

After you cut out the inner mold, lightly sand the edges on a flat surface to smooth out and straighten any rough areas or splintering, and round the edges a little. The inner mold should be sanded as smooth and clean of any particles or splinters as possible. The finished dial will closely match the shape and surface texture of this inner mold much like stretching a balloon over a book. If the dial cover should have a smooth rounded edge, then smooth out the edges of the mold to the desired shape matching the original cover.

For the outer part of the mold, start with a sheet of ¼" thick plywood several inches larger all around than the cover. Place the pattern in the center and draw a line around (Continued on following page)

it. This time cut a hole in the plywood along the center of the tracing line, shown in Figure 6, and remove the part inside the hole. Sand the rough surfaces of the outer mold smooth but don't round off the edges.

After making the outer mold, verify that the hole is not larger than the actual dial opening. The size of the hole will depend on the width of the saw blade that you used and how closely you followed the pattern line. If the hole is too large, the new dial cover may be too big to fit easily into the opening in the radio. Put the cardboard pattern in the outer mold and check that the hole is no more than a pencil line's width bigger on all sides. If it is, you probably should start over and make a new outer mold.

If you don't have experience, it might be a good idea to try making precision cuts on scrap plywood. Otherwise, you may experience making scrap plywood trying to make precision cuts. (Please excuse the bad joke!)




Figure 7. Checking the fit of the inner and outer molds.

Now that you have the two halves you should fit them together and make sure that you have enough clearance between them for the plastic to fit between the gap. (See Figure 7.) PVC is .020 inches thick and PETG is about .023 inches thick with the protective film on both sides. You will need at least this much space all around the perimeter between the two halves of the mold in order for it to fit together with the plastic between them.

An easy way to verify that the spacing is correct is to fit the two mold halves together and put some small strips of the plastic material that you are using into the gap between them. One strip on each side takes up just the amount of space necessary in each axis of the mold. The strips should fit between the two halves of the mold without becoming stuck anywhere along the length of the side. Test all sides of the mold for proper fit and sand any areas of the inner mold that are too tight. Don't sand the outer mold or you risk making it too big. It is always better that the cover be a little smaller than too big.

When the mold is done you are ready to make your dial cover. Cut out a piece of the plastic at least an inch larger on all sides than the old dial cover. You can trim it to size later




Figure 8. First, place the inner mold on a base plate.

after it has been molded. The dialcover.com instructions direct you to leave the protective film on the plastic for molding. The PETG data sheet implies that the protective film be removed before molding, and I found that the results were better when I did.




Figure 9. Then, place the plastic sheet over the inner mold.




Figure 10. Finally, olace the outer mold over the plastic sheet.

Make sure that the inner mold is clean, smooth and free of particles. The process of stretching the plastic in the mold can transfer the outline of particles, dirt, and even the wood grain and surface texture to the dial cover. For the first try, I stacked the parts on a plywood base a little bigger than the mold parts. First the inner mold went in the center of the base, as shown in Figure 8. Then I centered the plastic on top of it, as shown in Figure 9. The outer mold went on top of the plastic sheet centering the hole over the inner mold below, as shown in Figure 10.




Figure 11. Place the mold stack in the oven. (Note, for this and the following figures, a cifferent dial cover is pictured, one using the thinner, Masonite inner mold.)

Initially, for molding PETG, I followed the instructions and preheated the oven to 250°F. If you mold PVC, a setting about 50°F higher works better. When the oven was hot, I put the mold stack in and allowed it to heat for 8 to 10 minutes. See Figure 11. After it was heated, I removed the stack from the oven using heat-resistant gloves for protection. I put the mold on a sturdy flat surface and pressed down on the outer mold, as shown in Figure 12, forcing the plastic film down over the inner mold until the outer mold was flat against the base. I held

it there securely until it was cool.

POSSIBLE PROBLEMS AND SOLUTIONS

When the plastic gets hot, it becomes soft and rubbery. When you press the mold together, it has a tendency to push apart slightly because of this. It is important to clamp the mold tightly on all sides while the plastic is cooling. If you don't, the edges can buckle and the plastic can shrink.

Here is where things got interesting for me. The instructions with the kit say to leave the protective film on the PETG. When I left the film on, I ended up with patterns molded into the surface that looked something like water marks. When I removed the film before I molded the PETG, that eliminated the marks, but other things

happened. For example, one thing that caused big trouble was moisture. About a minute after removing the mold from the oven, condensation formed on the inside surface of the dial cover. If left there. it would permanently haze either type of plastic material. To prevent this from happening, I held the mold together as long as there was no haze forming. As soon as I saw a haze start to form, I quickly took the mold apart and let the plastic continue to cool in air. That completely eliminated the hazing and made the clearest cover that I had seen so far. However, it wasn't easy. The plastic was not quite cool enough, and it stuck to the mold. Also the edges were still soft, and they would buckle a little, especially when molding PETG.

To solve the moisture problem, I tried a couple of things to prevent condensation. First I covered the inner mold with aluminum foil to seal in any moisture. That did prevent condensation, but unless I applied the foil absolutely flat and perfectly (Continued on following page)

smooth, it produced a surface pattern in the plastic. Preheating the mold in the oven for about twenty minutes to drive out moisture was a much better solution. After the preheat, I placed the plastic in the mold and let it heat up for another three minutes. That solved the condensation problem, but I still wasn't getting consistently good results. The plastic would droop and stick to the inner mold ruining the surface of the plastic.

I finally concluded that setting the temperature to 250°F for PETG was too hot. The plastic should be soft and rubbery enough to mold, but not so hot that it gets limp and droopy. Lowering the oven temperature to 225°F made all the difference. At the lower temperature the results were excellent and consistent. Every dial cover came out with a beautiful clear surface and molded well. See Figure 13.

To sum up, I preheat the mold for twenty minutes at 225°F to expel moisture. Then I put the plastic in the mold and heat it up for another three minutes. When the plastic has heated, I remove the mold stack from the oven and press the mold together tightly until it cools. It takes about five minutes for the plastic to harden sufficiently enough to remove it from the mold, but don't be in a hurry.




Figure 14. Comparing the old and new dial covers.




Figure 15. Placing the new dial cover in the front panel of the Templetone.

After the plastic is cool, remove it from the mold and trim the edges of the dial cover so that it will fit inside the radio leaving enough around the outside to attach it to the case. Comparing the size to the old cover will help with this (see Figure 14), but re-

member the old cover has shrunk, so allow for that. Place the cover in the dial opening, shown in Figure 15, and secure it with whatever means the radio manufacturer used. Often for wood radio cabinets they simply tack stapled them in. For Bakelite, they might have used small metal press-in "trimounts" or small screws. For radios with metal trim around the dial, you may have to cut small slots or holes in the dial cover to fit over metal twist tabs on the trim.

The new dial cover mounted in the Tem-

pletone radio is shown in Figure 16.

The dialcover.com Instructions actually work quite well, if you don't mind a little watermarking of the cover. You get fairly repeatable results, and the instructions are uncomplicated. The protective film watermarking may be less severe at the lower temperature setting, but I did not try it.

I have used both PVC and PETG in tests and both produce acceptable results. PVC holds its size well, while PETG sometimes has a tendency to shrink a little. I left extra around the outside of the mold to make up for this and to be sure I had enough to attach to the radio. PETG conforms to the shape of the mold a little better, flattens well, and has a very good surface quality due to the protecting films. This is probably why the professional dial cover makers prefer it. PVC gives more consistent results but may not have as nice a surface finish as the PETG. Many of these problems could just be due to my inexperience at molding plastic, and you may have the same situation.

The ultimate stiffness of the plastic changes significantly depending on your oven temperature. Domestic kitchen ovens can vary by more than 50 degrees from the setting depending on the accuracy of the heat control and the placement of the

mold in the oven. As little as 25 °F too high can make all the difference between a perfect cover and a hazed reject. Once you know what setting works for your oven, the results are fairly repeatable. Certainly practice and experimentation are necessary to learn what works better and what doesn't in your oven.

If you regularly do restorations or simply like to do your own work, you can make your own dial covers at home. You don't need a lot of special equipment or tooling. If you can cut a square hole in plywood, you can probably make a dial cover and save a few dollars. Making your own cover also allows you to do some customizing and matching odd shapes, depths or curvature.

After you have some practice at making the mold parts, you can probably skip some of the steps that check for proper size, but for the first several tries I'd rather be sure before I make scrap out of plastic film. Most covers do not have to be made with great precision so some inaccuracy here and there won't matter. As long as the cover fits in the hole and looks reasonably close to the original, you are successful.
