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THE EDITOR'S PAGE

THIS is undoubtedly the day of opportunity, via the radio. It has been truly named, this infant science, the "university of the air." Lectures by accepted authorities on sciences, arts, political economy and statesmanship open for students on these subjects, extension courses for the twist of a dial—subjects which a few years ago were available to only a few, and then at considerable expense.

In one week we have had poured into every home in the land in which stood a radio set: the President's message to Congress, read and explained; talks by the Controller of Currency; David Laurence, premier political news specialist; Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt; Attorney General William D. Mitchell; Charles M. Schwab; Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, new Secretary of the Interior; Arthur M. Hyde, Secretary of Agriculture, and the musical offerings of Tito Schipa, Anna Case, Rudolph Gans, Walter Geiseking, the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, the Atwater Kent successes, and the Curtis Institute presentations. What a golden gift from the Gods raining into our laps at the press of a button!

A recent development of radio—a war tank, operated without human aid on the ground, and controlled by an airplane a mile high in air, offers a picture of a hideous mechanistic army in some future war—a war of push buttons and decimation. The same system is to be applied to ships and aerial torpedos. We can see the approach of an entire war movement controlled from a central point by radio with mechanical robots, built

for terrific destruction, and locked in a ghastly embrace that is almost cataclysmic. It is most regrettable that with every step forward in the positivism of electrical development there comes a corresponding utilization of the negativism of its application. This is a human quality and seems inevitable—at least until a world chaos demonstrates the futility of unbalanced impulses so emphatically that men will put aside the effort to secure balance by experimentation and will seek the more sure applications of sheer justice. Radio and its sisters of the magnetic field may eliminate war by making it impracticable—but only after a demonstration!

It would seem that the new electrical eye of science—the selenium cell, which throws a relay and actuates an electrical circuit upon the impact of light, might shortly play as important a part in human affairs as the radio. Already it is being used as a protection against fire, crime and cold. It is an automatic regulator of many of the activities of human life. Through these cells, thousands of men, now engaged in manual or semi-manual labor, will be released for other occupations. It is an interesting fact that a mechanical device properly constructed which eliminates the frail human element of judgment which is seldom good, is of more value industrially than the most loyal employee.

What is near us, out in cosmic space? Is there an invisible planet which astronomers have not yet seen—so near that our radio



At such times he wishes he had listened when he was asked to join the club.

It is even reducing profanity. Like the iceless refrigerator, it is making contented women. She has found happiness.





The STARGAZER

A Peep Across the Music Firmament

By FREDERICK NORWOOD

THE racial problem is commanding the serious attention of music thinkers. Perhaps the art of Bela Bartok has been the greatest incentive to active study of the rhythmic and melodic structures of outstanding modern composers. It is a rich and stimulating field of excavation.

When the spectrum of racial origins can be discerned and traced, who knows but the great white light of a symphonie humanitque may blaze forth that will speak in the veritable tongue of the planet itself. At any rate, it is a breathless thought.

* * *

There is no doubt about it—New York is a musical town. During Easter week there were no less than fifteen first-class musical comedies, exclusive of revues, running at one time. We think ourselves fortunate here in the West if we have one that is worth seeing, including revues. But then—we haven't the superlative crop of baldheads here that the east coast boasts!

* * *

Several benefit performances have been given by the Metropolitan Opera Company recently. There was a period in the operatic history of the country when such a move was wholly taboo. Individual artists "appeared" at functions and by their presence augmented ticket sales. Now and then a great one sang. But the turning over of an entire production to a charitable purpose indicates a changing attitude of mind. It means that opera is coming closer to the people, and out of this approach will come operatic works which will reflect the mind and sentiments of the people. We have long needed such a cross section, but it cannot come until the people as a whole develop musical appreciation.

* * *

Berlin, say musical critics, is as yet without a "newer opera," i. e., one which represents the modernism of Germany. In place of it the well-known operas are being redressed to meet modern needs, taking the form of the "Kroll opera" and the "Klemperer opera," after two eminent conductors. They represent revamped Wagnerianisms due to the fact that much of Wagner's work was not truly operatic. This year an epochal attempt is to be made at Duisburg, an indus-

trial city on the Rhine, by the General Musical Society to present a number of summer festivals at which these newer versions are to be tried out. The verdict of the German public is awaited with interest in musical circles.

* * *

We have received many communications, with which we heartily agree, wanting to know the possibility of again hearing that young wizard of the cello, Tibor de Machula, of the Curtis Institute of Music. It is to be hoped that this may fall beneath the responsive eye of Josef Hofmann.

* * *

The matter of personality plus, versus virgin art, brings to mind numerous queries from "listeners in" who ask to know why the famous Mme. Thus-and-so sounds so infinitely more satisfying in person from the stage than over the air, while the infamous (that's quoted) Miss Whoosy Bla, who, in person, would make one's ear-whiskers writhe, sounds surprisingly good via the microphone. It's a pernicky business, broadcasting. In the first place the radio is no respecter of persons. Brilliant coloring, svelt figure, flashing eyes, are a dead loss after they have been strained through a mike, and the same impartial treatment is accorded ungainly stage presence and graceless personality. The singer has just as much quality, volume, artistry and expressive life of voice as he or she has. And that is that.

Nothing else that he or she can do will help or hinder the reception of the work from a musical standpoint. Take Alda, for instance, whose brilliance and verve of personality are such an addition to her stage work, and Breslau, whose facial contortions so handicap the onlooker's pleasure. Over the impartial air, the former reveals surprising jerks and stridences, deprived of her alluring presence, while the latter rolls out smooth, velvet sonorities that become cramped in visual memories.

Then there is the very important matter of "microphone consciousness" which is difficult for the technique of the stage artist and which necessitates a constant use of vocal pedal and tone thinning to fit the capacity of the mechanical diaphragm. Perhaps this will throw a little light on the plaint of these disappointed listeners.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



The Kentucky Derby, famous turf classic of the blue grass country, will be made a classic of the air available to a nation-wide radio audience when it is broadcast over a coast-to-coast network on Saturday afternoon, May 18. This broadcast will be released in the West through stations of the American Broadcasting Company network.

The scene of the race will be the famous track at Churchill Downs. From the top of a fifty-foot tower mounted at a strategic point in the infield, Ted Husing, well-known sports announcer, will give a minute description of the race which he will follow through a pair of special military field glasses mounted on a tripod and pointed by gun sights.

Microphones placed at the bandstand, grandstand, starting line and paddock will give the radio audience a glimpse of the local color and music preceding and following the race.

Spokane station KHQ announces an addition to its announcing and singing staff in Harvey Wickson, formerly chief operator and program director of KWSC, Pullman, Washington.

Mr. Wickson is a Washington State College man, from the college of music, and his training has been under Mrs. Laverna E. Kimbrough. In 1927 Wickson was the Washington State Atwater Kent audition winner, and competed in the Pacific Coast finals at San Francisco. In 1928 he was runner-up in the Atwater Kent auditions.

During his college days Wickson was tenor soloist of the glee club for four years, and was featured tenor soloist with the varsity quartet. He is now doing an announcing shift for the Spokane station, as well as being featured as tenor soloist on programs.

Following the close of a successful season, the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra, whose concerts have been heard by thousands through KFI, will leave on its annual tour.

Under the direction of George Schmevoigt the orchestra will fulfill engagements in the principal cities of the Pacific Northwest and Rocky Mountain area. A special train will be used to transport the organization, which contains more than eighty musicians.

“SCIENTISTICS”

By MAX BEHR

POSSIBILITY of another war has developed another terrible fighting engine, this time one that is purely mechanical. It is an armored tank which can be controlled from an airplane high in the air. The device was recently tested out in Ohio and was back, stopped, started and turned about in all directions by radio impulses sent from the plane. The idea is to be applied to aerial controlled torpedoes and dynamite or explosive ships or mines which can be detonated from a distance by a radio device. The tank receiver or controlled mine is responsive to certain frequencies only. * * *

Curio collectors save many objects to which they attach importance or value. But Dr. R. B. Moore, head of the chemistry department of Perdue University, Indiana, has the most unique collection in the world. His collection is of rare gases. Two samples are believed unduplicated in the United States, viz., krypton and xenon. Krypton exists in the atmosphere in the proportion of one part in 19,000,000 and xenon one part in 190,000,000. The two tubes which hold the gases appear empty, but their invisible contents is worth thousands of dollars. One pull on the cork of either and a fortune is gone. * * *

Despite the fact that grasshoppers are “grown” by the million in this country, the National Zoological Park at Washington recently imported two tons of the leaping insects from Africa to feed certain rare African birds who insist on grasshopper diet. The birds refused to thrive except on their own diet. * * *

The Pullman Company estimates that a traveller who sleeps in an upper berth of a train rides twenty inches farther than one who sleeps in a lower berth. This is due to the fact that the upper berth is a greater distance from the center of the earth than the lower, and consequently the traveller in the upper berth rides over a longer arc of a circle. The distance was predicted on a trip from coast to coast. * * *

The latest device to engage radio engineers is the attempt to operate automobiles by radio. This involves the energizing of a motor apparatus by means of a radio wave, which will operate to free stored power. This is the idea in crude form. Its achievement depends more or less upon the ability of en-

gineers to transmit energy by radio. This so far has not been achieved. * * *

The packing of radio parts, mostly fragile and breakable, in corrugated paper cartons has taught the farmer something. He is now beginning to ship his eggs the same way. A firm has inaugurated the shipment of “carton eggs” which will shortly be on the market in sealed packages like breakfast food. * * *

The use of the photo-electric cell as a recording “eye” has had a further development in its adaptation for a fire alarm. The “eye” guards property at night when everybody is asleep. The light of a flickering fire instantly affects the eye, which is “light sensitive” and it closes a relay and rings in an alarm. On actual test, the eye rang a bell when a bucket of gasoline was ignited in its presence. * * *

Fifty Sargent-Raymont radio receivers, Type 710, designed in Oakland, Calif., have been ordered by the Chicago Tribune to be installed in police squad cars as an aid to the Chicago police department in suppressing crime in that city. The order is the result of several weeks of experimentation by Carl Meyers, chief engineer of the Tribune's stations WGN and WLIB. The instrument, cut in half at the dial compartment, is mounted with one unit above the other for compactness. It is suspended from springs against the back of the front seat and operates from a fifteen-foot antenna in the roof of the car. Each receiver is tuned to WGN's wave and permanently locked. Police broadcasts from WGN can be received by these sets in any squad car while the machine is running at seventy miles an hour. In an opinion handed down on April 20, United States District Judge Ira Lloyd Letts decided in favor of the CeCo Manufacturing Company, against which the Westinghouse Lamp Company of Bloomfield, New Jersey, had brought a suit alleging certain infringements of the plaintiff's patents on radio tubes.

The opinion of Judge Letts has been awaited by the radio tube industry of the United States with great interest because it

involves an issue upon which depends an immense amount of money.

The Westinghouse Lamp Company, in its suit, had asked for an injunction to restrain the CeCo Manufacturing Company from any further manufacture of tubes and for a financial accounting of all profits that they have made from the manufacture of radio tubes.

The trial of the case before Judge Letts lasted eight days. Some of the best-known experts on radio in the country testified for both sides. Attorneys for the Westinghouse Lamp Company were Horatio E. Bellows, Providence, and Cooper, Kerr & Dunham, of New York, counsel for the C. E. Manufacturing Company, Inc., were former Congressman George F. O'Shaunessy, of the firm of O'Shaunessy & Cannon, and Charles J. Holland of New York.

Announcement is made of the entry of Silver-Marshall, Inc., into the field of RCA-licensed radio receiver manufacturers. This veteran radio manufacturer of Chicago has established an enviable reputation during the past four years as makers of parts and kits for custom set-builders, and of power units and complete amplifiers for the trade.

Models which will be shown by Silver-Marshall at the June R. M. A. Trade Show include console lowboys and highboys at popular prices. These models, incorporating the same chassis, will utilize the new A. C. screen grid and intermediate power tubes shortly to be placed upon the market. Silver-Marshall was the pioneer in developing transformers and other special apparatus required for D. C. screen-grid tubes when they first appeared on the market in December, 1927.

A new factory on the west side of Chicago, to be occupied within a few weeks, will provide over 100,000 square feet, or approximately four times the manufacturing space now utilized by Silver-Marshall in their present location on Jackson Boulevard.

The screen-grid model, which will be marketed by Silver-Marshall, has been under development for over a year and a half, and will be shown to the trade through exclusive distributors well in advance of the June show.

JENNINGS PIERCE, NBC

NEAT, careful, orderly, self-contained, fond of detail, conscientious, optimistic, friendly, emotionally stable: these are some of the personal attributes the observant person discerns in the voice of NBC's Chief Announcer and Assistant Program Director for the Pacific Coast, Jennings Pierce. After one knows him one will ever after feel these things in his radio reproduced voice and so it would seem possible, theoretically at least, to uncover them from a loud speaker without personal acquaintance.

A farmer in the elaborate central studios of a great broadcasting network, guiding radio audiences through popular and classical programs of music and drama! That is Jennings Pierce! But discard the vision of un-cut hair, straw in mouth, blue denim shirt, overalls and milk-stained shoes or any logical evolution of that aspect. Jennings Pierce probably hasn't had a pitchfork in his hands since high school vacation days but he tilled acres of theories about growing things during four assiduous years of study at the University of California, terminating in 1923. It was his weakness for singing that kept him in the city. A member of the Golden Bear Quartette, he met Howard Milholland, who later became director of KGO. When offered an opportunity to qualify at the microphone as Milholland's assistant his faith in the great possibilities of radio, together with memories of the difficult struggle his parents had always had on the soil, outweighed the regret involved in the indefinite postponement of the application of his recently acquired knowledge. That was five years ago and his personal back to the farm movement has not been postponed until the precincts of old age have been reached. Then he hopes to have a farm of his own. Included in his optimism is the faith that the right attitude of mind in connection with a desire of this sort cannot help but be efficacious; and he lives as though it were a certainty that he eventually will have the farm of his heart's desire, not neglecting as much pecuniary preparation as possible, of course.

Jennings was born and raised on his parents' dairy and grain farm near Bakersfield. His opening announcement was in

1897. There were two brothers and a sister. Grandparents were farmers, too, and although there were no professional musicians in the family until Jennings sang for the first time on KGO there was much love of music. His mother is a pianist and one of the family's principle pleasures was derived from frequent evening song fests. At Bakersfield High he was a member of the track team and played football for three years, Captain of the squad in his final year. To earn money for attending Davis, the Agricultural School, he joined the field forces of the Standard Oil Company and was soon a "rotary bully," which is only a way of saying that he was a derrick-man, or assistant to the driller.

Rotary bullying proved extremely lucrative to the mind of the high school graduate, and two years later the war found him still at it. He joined the Marines and was stationed at Mare Island for a year and a half.

Neatness, orderliness, regulation! Both the army and Jennings are fond of them, consequently the army and Jennings got along very well together. He was active in the Marine Corps Quartette and his first stage appearance was with that organization at the Imperial Theatre in San Francisco in a war act which ran for two weeks.

Neatness, orderliness and regulation do not require nearly as much of a man's thinking as they do of his time, and Jennings did considerable headwork while in the service. He came to the conclusion that a college education is a very essential thing, and so when he was handed his discharge in August, 1919, he turned it in on some matriculation papers at the University of California.

Many would class Jennings' romance and marriage as ideal. Three years in High School he "kept company" with a classmate—the loveliest little girl in school, Ruth Johnson. In the marines, at college, they corresponded. Meanwhile Ruth had graduated from San Diego Normal and was teaching. It was an uninterrupted romance of many years that climaxed in a June marriage, 1923. They didn't have much upon which to marry, all he had were a few debts from college, and so Ruth kept on teaching





signals bounce against it, and come hotfooting back again to us? Scientists are beginning to ask these questions as a result of experiments at the giant station at Oslo, where repetitions or echoes of waves transmitted from the station have been heard coming back at intervals of from three to fifteen seconds afterward. Radio waves circle the globe in one-seventh of a second. Therefore it seems plain that the delayed signals must have come from some far distant point in space—millions of miles away in fact. But from what? There is no known heavenly body at the necessary distance to reflect the waves in that time period and the discovery has aroused intense interest.

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
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
