THE EDITOR'S PAGE

THE busy business man has the developments of science so placed at his disposal these days that he can keep busy, even when he is on a vacation. The Canadian Pacific is the most recent institution to realize the need for keeping men in touch with their offices. They have ordered radiophones installed in all of their steamships. These phones will now connect with shore stations, giving a two-way service. Travelers may now take down a telephone in their staterooms, be linked to shore by radio, and thence plugged into long distance. Other steamship companies will follow suit. It will be only a matter of months before one may sit in his home and talk with a relative or a friend on the high seas. The thing can be done now, but is too expensive to be commercially practical. However, engineers are working on simplifications which will make this service satisfactory. It will some day be no more of a novelty to talk from a hotel to the stateroom of a liner than to speak across the bay.

Just how far this thing has gone was illustrated on April 14 when Clement Johnson, an Alameda radio expert, operator on the flagship of the Alaska Packers' Association fishing fleet, using a tiny portable radio set which he built himself, spoke from Karluk, in Alaska, to a friend at Croydon, England, linking Alaska and England by voice for the first time. The current used was less than a housewife uses to operate her vacuum sweeper. The Britisher was able to hear every word from a tiny suitcase outfit in far-off Alaska, which Johnson carried easily in one hand. Johnson's only comment is repre-

sentative of the mental attitude of these science wizards: "It didn't work as well as it should. I expect to do better with it." With that spirit behind it, radio will go far toward solving most of the needs of the human family.

Further interest attaches to this Alaska-England talk when it is known that the total apparatus used cost less than \$20. Think of it! For the price of a woman's cheap hat one may say "Hello" to a friend 5,000 to 15,000 miles distant. This living in the other fellow's front yard will do more to break down international hatreds than any other agency. If some of these fanatics who are anxious for world peace and who keep collecting funds for this and that purpose, would get together and finance international radio research, the world would come closer to world peace by the very understandings worked out by the ability to chat together at will. The keynote of world peace is "getting acquainted." That the radio, more than any other agency, is accomplishing.

Now that the north and south poles have been explored it would seem that there remains little for an intrepid wanderer of the far places to do. At this very critical moment when the very essence of exploring is hung in the balance, a scientist comes forward with the suggestion that the bottom of a dozen oceans remain yet uncharted. This his cheered up the professional explorer mightily. After all there is more mystery ten fathoms down than ten miles up! The next radio broadcast should therefore come from the bottom of the ocean.

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
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The RADIO TATTLER

THE cute little dynamic speaker which lifts the house from its foundations and makes skittish old ladies skittisher, is beginning to attract attention from architects, contractors and house builders in general, because of the need to include it in future construction plans. Today, when a man buys a home, he looks for a garage first and space for his dynamic second. What's left belongs to the family.

Stripped of its trimmings, the dynamic resembles the business end of a blunderbuss, or an outfall sewer, or the box where the water meter is kept. You can't step into a radio store anywhere today but what one of these one-eyed dynamics leers at you from a shelf, or a chair, or up against the ceiling. Dealers mount them like a shotgun guard in a bank, behind a shield, from which point they glare down at the customer with grim singleness of purpose.

The dynamic could have stayed put in its box, as well as any other loudspeaker, and been converted into an article of furniture. There isn't a bit of sense in nailing it, naked and unadorned, to a bread board or a door panel. The thing was started by a radio man whose brother-in-law was an architect, named Ed. He wanted to show Ed that a speaker could be fastened to a wall downstairs and curdle milk on the third floor front. So he screwed his dynamic to a table top and leaned the top against the wall. He convinced Ed—and 50,000,000 other persons.

Now, no matter where you turn, there are dynamics. And also a lot that claim to be dynamics and aren't. Grandma gets a dynamic for her birthday. The baby gets one, too—so that when he grows up he will have the very latest in radio. The beaux gives his sodden moment a dynamic, and she, in turn, buys one for "his folks." Thus it goes. Dynamics are getting as common as fleas in a movie theater. You can even put them together at home with a box of parts and a blueprint.

The dynamic works on the principal of the husband and wife in a family. One coil either works with or bucks another. One is stronger than the other. Whatever one

coil hears and repeats, the other emphasizes and assists. Now and then, just as in the best regulated families, a fuss blows or a note blasts. But in general, a well-married dynamic can be depended upon to show the neighbors something.

The dynamic is made to hitch to the electric lights. That is a great fad these days—to hitch everything to the electric lights. You buy a refrigerator to get a cold drink and you have to hitch it to the juice. You want coffee. You grind it by electricity, cook it by electricity, and wash the pot in an electric washer. There is even a cork-screw for pulling illegal liquor out of its hiding place—with a motor. The dynamic is no different than an egg-beater or a toaster. It likes to clamp its sucker to an outlet plug.

We suspect the P. G. and E. of thinking up the dynamic. They have a specialist they call Si who gets paid a fancy salary for thinking up the various ways people can use juice. Si is a demon for wasting current. Every other employee of the P. G. and E. is taught economy. But Si is encouraged to develop machinery for wasting juice, because Si's ideas mean revenue for the company.

Si sees a woman rocking a baby. His eye lights. He dashes back to the office and grabs for a pencil. Pretty soon you'll find a baby rocker on the market. Right now Si is working on a dinkus for turning soft-boiled eggs over on their sides by pressing a button. The minute he gets it, 10,000,000 people will want to turn their eggs—people who have eaten their soft-boiled eggs with the same side up for years. That's the way it goes.

The dynamic has Si's touch about it. A dynamic could just as well have been run by water power, or steam, or hand power. But no. Someone had to attach it to the poor, old, hard-working light circuit. Now, when grandpa puts on his bedwarmer and climbs in, the whole family knows it. Little dynamic, listening on the line, broadcasts the fact to everybody in the house. Grandpa hasn't any more privacy any more than a gnat bathing in a glass of beer.



A Peep Across the Music Firmament

NATIONAL Music Week, headed by President Herbert Hoover as national honorary chairman, may be said to have been the greatest musical week observance ever held in the country. During the period from May 5 to 12 more and better musical programs, both public and private, were placed at public disposal than ever before. More than 2500 cities and towns participated—certainly a glowing tribute to the spirit of music and the awakening of musical consciousness in America.

* * *

John McCormack gave his eighteenth concert in Boston on April 14, his 72nd in Chicago on April 21, and his 114th in New York on May 5. Now if someone will send us in all the other cities in which McCormack has appeared and the number of his concerts, we can print the grand total and take a long breath for another year.

* * *

Hope Hampton, whose movements are always more or less public property, due to a vivid personality and a good press agent, is on her way to a complacent Europe. She intends to sing, it is announced. Among other interesting engagements is one at the Opera Comique in Paris. If the expatriated Americans leave any seats, a few French people may hear her.

* * *

We have tried with all sincerity to be enthusiastic about these talking movies, with their hollow utterances and mechanical inadequacies. The only really benevolent feature we have been able to find is that they provide a place where great opera singers may slide, rather than fall from Metropolitan heights, upon softly upholstered salaries. For instance, it is reported that Tito Ruffo will shortly be "seen in action and heard in motion." This will break the ice. We see no reason why, shortly, one or more of them should not step forward to the edge of the silver sheet and sell us gasoline or toothpaste in furtherance of the recent wedding of art and commerce.

The Little Theater Opera, for which so many pessimistic prophets arranged a decorous funeral, appears, on the contrary, without the pulmotor of critical approval, to be a lusty, brawling infant, nevertheless, with

much promise of a sane and sturdy life before it. Such excursions in cultural adventure are, as a matter of fact, less a question of how than when. A sort of mental horticulturalization. In America the time for musical planting seems to be at hand. The soil is certainly full of vocal sprouts and better and faster transportation will have to develop to take them to Europe for the regular operatic routine, or we may be shocked by the development of adequate schooling on native soil.

Radio listeners have had an opportunity, from time to time, to listen to this and that guest conductor. It is an interesting sidelight that musicians are beginning to realize that "guest conducting" is ruining a number of good orchestras. A guest conductor is a fine box office asset provided he is a good conductor. But when an orchestra is put under the strain of being conducted by a variety of idiosyncracies it loses unity. There remains the silent struggle, therefore, between the commercial sponsors and the true artists who see ultimate lowering of the national orchestral music level. This may seem premature with guest conducting somewhat of an experiment, but we believe the listener as well as the musician will agree with us.

We can only sigh over the announcement of a twenty-nine-weeks' music series for 1929-30 by the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra, which is one of the greatest. And New York is considering underwriting another orchestra for \$160,000 for a separate season!

* * *

Harold Milligan, secretary of the National Music League, recently called attention to the fact that there are now half a dozen music conservatories of the highest standard where only three existed a few years ago. More than \$100,000,000 a year is being spent for musical education in the country, he declared. These may be called hopeful symptoms.

The Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra is shortly to go on tour and the East will see the stellar musical organization of the West's south in professional contrast with its inviolate best.

KJBS announces a new studio feature with the appearance before its microphone of Walter J. Rudolph, one of San Francisco's better known musical directors and pianists, and the only contestant in the history of the Chicago Musical College to win its diamond medal for three consecutive years, competing each time with over five hundred pianists from all over the United States. He possesses one of the largest musical libraries in the United States, valued at \$10,000, and containing over 18,000 compositions.

Mr. Rudolph will present a thirty-minute piano recital over KJBS every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon between 4:30 and 5 o'clock.

Among the recent tokens of appreciation by Sylvia, conductor of the Happy Hour, was an autographed picture of Dolores del Rio. Miss del Rio first heard Sylvia over KFI on location during the recent filming of her latest picture "Evangeline," and has listened in on the Happy Hour program ever since.

Letters continue to pour into the KNX. Hollywood, studios from all over the world telling of the ease of reception on the "cleared channel" and 5000 watts power under which the pioneer broadcaster is now operating.

When Jean Dunn, popular KFI blues singer, is not entertaining her vast radio audience, she may generally be found at a piano in one of the many Los Angeles music stores trying out new numbers. Which will explain why, as one of our contemporaries puts it, she is always "first with the latest."

With the departure of Herman Kenin's Golden Gate Gypsies for a prolonged engagement at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, Georgie Stoll, violin virtuoso, will bring his orchestra to the studios of the ABC Western Network and KYA, in San Francisco.

The popularity of Georgie Stoll in his theatrical appearances on the Pacific Coast, where he has played as Master of Ceremonies for Fanchon and Marco, assures him of an eager audience in radio land. His orchestra and violin solos will be a regular feature over stations of the ABC Western Network and KYA. The first broadcast is scheduled for May 27.

Lucile Kirtley, KGW staff soprano, leaves this week for California for three months' rest and study. Long a favorite in and around Portland, Lucile will visit several large southern stations, including the San Francisco studios of the National Broadcasting Company, and make her bow over the air to new audiences.

Serious inroads are being made upon the radio microphone ranks, as more and more singers are being drafted into talking pictures. Recently a large film booking office in Hollywood sent out a call for registrations from vocalists and instrumental soloists, and the Paramount-Express station KNX had calls for seven of its leading artists.

KQW is staging a big surprise program on June 1 from 7:30 to 10 p. m. from San Francisco. During the program important announcements will be made regarding KQW.

Frank J. Sardam, long a favorite humorist over radio airways of the Pacific Coast, has joined the staff of the American Broadcasting Company as assistant production manager.

Philosophical and with a clever wit, Mr. Sardam has endeared himself to a host of people during his five years of broadcasting. He will be remembered as "The Sage of Yamhill" and "The Grand Scream" on Hoot Owl weekly frolics broadcast over KGW, Portland. He comes to the San Francisco offices of the ABC Western Network to devote his time to dramatic program and the coaching and continuity of novelty sketches.



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SCIENTIFISTICS

ON JUNE 1, or thereabouts, Commander E. F. McDonald, Jr., Arctic explorer, will start on a "mapping expedition" through Labrador, the land of mystery. The expedition plans to touch country which has never seen a white man. The expedition will go north as far as possible and then continue with an amphibian plane. It will be joined by Commander MacMillan in his famous ship, the Bowdoin, and the two will spend July, August and September in Labrador. They will carry radio and will be in constant touch with stations in this country.

* * *

The federal radio commission has placed station WSAI, at Cincinnati, back on the air again, after ruling it off after sunset. The commission has heretofore ruled, in accordance with the new policy that 500 watt stations should be at least 500 miles apart, when operating on the same wave length. WSAI had a number of neighbors on the same wave and was told to shut down at night. The commission is now letting it run to determine just how much interference will exist. Four other stations will use the same wave.

* * *

One of our readers has written to know the difference between wave lengths and kilocycles. They are the same thing, practically, expressed in different terms. The use of the phrase "wave length" to designate transmission is awkward and unsatisfactory. The correct measurement should be in kilocycles. Waves, as the term is used in radio, have definite rates of vibration. The longer waves vibrate or oscillate slowly. The short waves very rapidly. One complete oscillation is a cycle. A kilocycle is a thousand cycles. For instance, a station which uses a 231-meter wave length turns out waves which vibrate at the rate of 1,330,000 vibrations per second, or 1,330 kilocycles. Thus it will be seen that by using the kilocycle method, one can tell exactly what the frequency of a station's waves are. This simplifies the calibration of instruments when it is known that the radio commission at Washington endeavors to so arrange broadcast stations that there will be at least 10 kilocycles in frequency between any one station and the next nearest one to it. A receiving set calibrated, therefore, in kilocycles will tell the user exactly how close one station is to the next, which a wave length scale will not do, with-

out elaborate scaling. To further simplify matters, the kilocycle scale has been grouped into "channels," and listeners will often find a number of stations in one channel. The channel designation does away with the multi-figures of the kilocycle scale and gives a simple reading on the dial, similar to the meter scale but free of the fractional designations which the meter scale had to use to be accurate.

* * *

The advent of the "shield-grid" or "screen-grid" tube—two names for the same product—has revolutionized radio sets. This is due to one factor, viz., the tube itself gives enormous amplification. Heretofore ordinary tubes did not amplify very much. The amplification in sets had to be accomplished by means of transformers which stepped-up the signals to a degree suitable for loud-speaker delivery. But the shield grid tube was developed and proved to be a god-send. The tube itself amplified so much that it was possible to build a set using only one or two of these tubes, which amplified the signals as much as seven or eight tube set. Manufacturers overnight changed their set design to meet this new friend. But, as usual, the fakir jumped in. There are a number of sets now on the market which use the shield-grid tube, in which the amplifying factors of this tube are not utilized at all. This enables the sets to be sold as shield-grid sets when, as a matter of fact, they do not perform as a shield-grid set should perform. Many of these will be found in the "jip" stores—nice cabinets, good parts, shield-grid tubes—and not worth a hoot in an empty tunnel. Buyers of the new shield-grid sets should be sure they are buying a standard set made by a well-known company in which the tube is being properly used for results, and not for a sales talk.

* * *

Because of the general dissatisfaction everywhere with the "zoning" arrangement by which a certain number of broadcast stations are allowed for a certain area, it is probable that the federal radio commission will shake up the entire zone plan. At the present time there are areas which have not enough stations for the service that could be given, and in other areas actual congestion exists because there are too many stations. The commission may create more zones in order to more nearly equalize the number of stations.

Editor Broadcast Weekly:

After the idiocy of a Lucky Strike program comes an average "RKO" program, purporting to present the "stars" of vaudeville. Stars there are, but the majority of them "get over," not at all. The footlights, the grease paint, are missing and the stars are just plain humans. And many of them inject vulgarity into their "acts"—vulgarity that doesn't seem to matter so much when heard from an orchestra row; but which makes most of us shiver when we look across the room at the youngsters, listening.

I wonder what it is all coming to? Certainly, I'm not squeamish; I actually enjoyed the profanity of "The Front Page," a stage play, because for the most part, it fit into the play. But bald vulgarity over the radio is "something else again." And nine-tenths of vaudeville is vulgar, to a certain extent—even the athletic acts contain their share of rough stuff.

I listened last night for the third time in as many weeks to the youthful ex-wife of a certain famous screen comedian; heard the announcer expose the astounding fact (?) that she was appearing in response to overwhelming requests. There was nothing whatever in her act to commend her. Her voice was hard as nails, her pronunciation worse than that of the average vaudevillian—and the Lord knows that is awful.

If the sponsors of the RKO programs believe those programs will increase attendance at their theaters, they are the greatest optimists in the world.

Incidentally, except for Walter Damrosch, the Atwater Kent programs and a few others, the transcontinental programs for the most part bring us a surplus of "popular" music. Most of it is no better, or not so good as we get in local programs, from 10 p. m. on. Just why the sponsors shove such stuff at us in the early evenings is hard to understand. The difference in time between New York and the Pacific Coast perhaps accounts for it.

I find plenty of support for the statement that most radio listeners are getting pretty tired of the "crooning" that forms 50 per cent of the popular programs. Some of us are beginning to believe there are few real MALE voices left.

TED A. ROY of KGW

LESS than two years ago the air and press of the country heralded a winner in a national song contest who was known as the Singing Blacksmith. This was odd. For, although blacksmiths were thought to have powerful lungs (probably due to associating them with their bellows) and there is nothing to prevent them from singing while they work, few persons believed there were any but a few old-time blacksmiths in the country.

But here was one who was born in 1905 and blacksmithed for eleven years before he found the first rung of the ladder of artistic success. He also worked in the hay and wheat fields (perhaps during his spare time) and at the Oregon State College washed dishes in his fraternity to help defray his expenses.

To Paul Petri, musical instructor at Oregon State College, Ted A. Roy gives much of the credit for his success. He had studied with Mrs. S. H. Forshaw of Pendleton, Oregon, during his high school days, and with Mrs. Forshaw's sister, Mary E. Wylie, in Oklahoma, previously. After entering Petri's class at college he says that his voice improved in leaps and bounds.

While still a junior at college, 22 years old, he entered the National Radio Audition of the Atwater Kent Foundation to eventually end up in second place among the male singers. He says: "The most interesting and thrilling radio experience I ever had was during the Atwater Kent finals in 1927. Never will I forget the queer feeling I had when I stepped to the "mike" to compete with ten other singers who had won their way to the finals in New York. Only just before I began to sing did I realize that it was estimated between 35 and 50 million people were listening in that night. Strange to say, it did not make me nervous, but made me realize that I had to give my best."

Something like ten years previous to this Master Ted A. Roy went through another ordeal which he will never forget and from which he did not emerge so triumphantly. There was a certain little schoolmate of the opposite sex towards whom he enter-

tained such sentiments that he was robbed of the power of speech. And so he decided to impress her with his astonishing skill as a bicycle rider. At noon time he waited until this most beautiful of young ladies—and regulator of his heart's beats—was in sight of the school steps. Then, down the walk he came, full speed, intent upon making a graceful leap over the steps in true dare-devil fashion, but to the intense chagrin of all concerned the bike's front wheel caved in and the whole affair ended in a most embarrassing disaster.

Ted Roy's voice is a free, natural tenor with a scope that additional culture will undoubtedly develop into a beautiful maturity. His physical ease and power he manages to duplicate in the emotional realm of his music. He has the voice, youth, the discriminating feeling for truth and beauty that is called brains—he should go far. Only recently he joined the staff of KGW, and is

heard from that station from eight to ten times weekly. His ambitious love of music keeps him studying four or five hours each day. Following his National contest triumph there was talk of study in Europe, but for the present he will confine his activities to the radio.

Schubert, Beethoven and Brahms are his favorite composers. Faust, Aida and Rigolette his favorite operas. Emil Jannings and the Barrymores he rates first among the actors and Van Dyne, Poe, Hugo and Hawthorne are the writers who have stimulated him most. He plays baseball and tennis, bridge and cribbage, and is fond of dancing. He finds plenty of material for inspiration in the beauty and charm of young ladies—he likes them all and is still matrimonially unfettered. All in all, he is an ambitious, thoughtful, modest, personable, hard working and extremely talented young American, and his countrymen should all take pride in his success.

The singing blacksmith was born in Pilot Rock, Oregon, and still calls it his home. His father was both a singer and a blacksmith before him, though his professional activities were confined to the forge. His two older brothers also sing.



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
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
